THE SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE

Intercollegiate athletics opened the 1990's faced with numerous decisions. Throughout its 61-year history, the Southeastern Conference has been at the forefront of the national scene and again provided leadership in a time of transition.

After existing with 10 members since 1966, the SEC welcomed the University of Arkansas on Aug. 1, 1990 and the University of South Carolina on Sept. 25, 1990. Joining Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi (Ole Miss), Mississippi State, Tennessee and Vanderbilt, Arkansas and South Carolina, the first schools added in conference history, officially became the 11th and 12th members of the SEC on July 1, 1991.

Arkansas and South Carolina participated in SEC championships for all sports except football during the 1991-92 academic year. They joined the football race in 1992.

SEC schools began competition with one another more than 100 years ago as members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Seven institutions attended the SIAA organizational meeting of faculty representatives, called by Dr. William L. Dudley of Vanderbilt, in Atlanta, Ga., Dec. 22, 1894.

Student teams from the schools began meeting in various sports with little pattern to their contests. Baseball was the most popular campus sport, but the Americans adaptation of the English game rugby called "football" was drifting down from the East and Midwest. Southerners were quickly attracted to this sport formalized in 1869.

The first football game in the Southeast was played April 9, 1880, on the ground now called Ole Stoll Field at the University of Kentucky. Kentucky, then known as Kentucky A & M, was host to the contest in which Transylvania College, then called Kentucky University, upset Centre College 13 3/4 to 0. Kentucky A & M (now UK) organized a team and in November, 1881, played Transylvania a three-game series (winning 7 1/2 to 1, then losing 1 to 2 and 2 1/2 to 3 3/4). By 1895, 11 SEC members were playing football.

Basketball moved quickly to the South as Vanderbilt was playing at the Nashville YMCA just two years after Dr. James Naismith originated the game at Springfield (Mass.) College. The Commodores won 9-6 in a game with nine players on each team. Basketball became an intercollegiate sport in 1901 and in 1908 Vanderbilt was meeting Columbia and Yale intersectionally.

Track was organized on a conference level at the 1885 SIAA meeting presided over by President Dudley who served until his death in 1914. The first annual championship meet was held at Vanderbilt May 15, 1896. By 1900, eight of the 13 charter SEC members were participating.

The seven member SIAA expanded to 19 institutions in 1895 and by 1920 there were 30 members. The larger schools reorganized as the Southern Conference at a meeting in Gainesville, Fla, Dec. 12-13, 1920. Professor S.V. Sanford of Georgia called the meeting and served as the first president. Despite an original limit of 16, the membership grew to 23 by 1928. At one time or another, the SIAA and the SC included most of the Southern colleges from Virginia to Texas.

The 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference at the annual SC meeting of Dec. 8-9, 1932 in Knoxville. The 10 coast members remained in the Southern Conference. Dr. Frank L. McVey of Kentucky was elected president of the new conference whose charter members were: Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Geor gia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi State, Ole Miss, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt. (Sewanee withdrew Dec. 13, 1940, Georgia Tech on



June 1, 1964 and Tulane on June 1, 1966). McVey held an informal meeting of the school presidents in Birmingham, Ala. on Feb. 16, 1933, then the first full meeting in Atlanta, Feb. 27.

The new SEC discovered both stature and stability by designating voting power to the presidents of the member institutions. They determined the policies of the league and through the years it has been the principal source of strength in the evolution of the league, with particular reference to eligibility regulations and academic requirements.

The office of the commissioner was started in 1940 in Jackson, Miss. Former Mississippi Governor Martin S. Conner took office as commissioner Aug. 21, 1940. Conner, who was an extension of the authority of the college presidents, later became ill and the secretary of the conference, Dean N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee, served as acting commissioner during the fall of 1946.

With the appointing of former LSU coach Bernie H. Moore as the second full-time commissioner on Feb. 21. 1948, the office moved to Birmingham, Ala.

Upon Moore's retirement, A.M. (Tonto) Coleman succeeded Moore April 1, 1966 and served six and a half years.

Dr. H. Boyd McWhorter, who was then Dean of Arts and Sciences at Georgia and secretary of the league since 1967, accepted the position upon the retirement of Coleman, Aug. 1, 1972. Under his direction, the SEC grew substantially. In McWhorter's first year, the SEC distributed \$1.57 million in revenue to the member institutions. In his final year and 14 years later, the league distributed \$15 million to its members.

Dr. Harvey W. Schiller, an Air Force colonel and faculty chair at the U.S. Air Force Academy, took office Sept. 15, 1986, following Dr. McWhorter.

On Jan. 10, 1990, Roy F. Kramer, who has served on many NCAA committees, succeeded Schiller. Kramer joined the league office after a 12-year stint as athletic director at Vanderbilt.

The first SEC champions were crowned in 1933 in baseball, basketball, football and outdoor track. The conference's inaugural championship event was a basketball tournament held Feb. 24-28, 1933 in Atlanta, Ga. Records show in 1935, the first men's title for cross country was awarded. Golf and swimming were added in 1937. The conference began hosting championships in tennis (1953) and indoor track (1957).

SEC championships for women in basketball, tennis and volleyball were recognized in the 1979-80 academic year. One year later, golf, gymnastics, swimming and track and field were added. The administration of women's athletics officially was under the umbrella of the conference on Sept. 1, 1984.

The SEC currently regulates nine sports for men and 11 sports for women — MEN: baseball, basketball, football, golf, swimming, tennis and track (cross-country, indoor and outdoor); WOMEN: basketball, golf, gymnastics, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis, track (cross country, indoor and outdoor) and volleyball.

THE NATION'S TOP TRACK AND FIELD CONFERENCE

In the ever-changing world of collegiate athletics, the tradition of excellence in the Southeastern Conference has remained constant. The SEC boasts a rich history and has dominated track and field like no other conference.

Men's cross-country was brought to a higher level with Arkansas joining the league in 1991. The Razorbacks have gamered seven national titles in the last 10 years. Arkansas' Godfrey Siamusiye won the league's first individual titles with back-to-back crowns in 1995 and 1996. Tennessee adds the other league NCAA Championship, winning the title in 1972. Since 1984 the league has produced 66 All-Americans and 30 teams have finished among the top 20 in men's cross-country.

Women's cross-country has featured one NCAA team championship since 1982, 46 All-Americans and 34 top 25 finishes.

The NCAA Indoor Championship has been home to the SEC in recent years. The league has gamered 10 men's championships since 1992 and 10 women's titles since 1987. In 2002, SEC teams swept the men and women's national title. The Tennessee men's team won the school's first-ever NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championship. The SEC also displayed its dominance as one of the top track conferences in the nation, boasting of six teams placing in the Top 10 at the NCAA Championship for the 4 second time in conference history. Individually, the men have posted 93 NCAA individual champions and three NCAA Championship record holders. In 2002 alone, 53 conference athletes were All-Americans in men's Indoor Track and Field.

On the women's side, LSU brought home its ninth NCAA Indoor Track Championship. The Tigers won by 14 points over two time defending champion UCLA. The SEC was well represented with five teams finishing in the top 11 spots. Since the NCAA Women's Indoor Track and Field Championship began in 1982, SEC schools have won 10 team titles, seven runner-up finishes and five third places. Since 1986, at least seven conference schools were represented at the meet 10 times. In addition, the SEC has had at least two teams finish in the Top-10 every year since 1983.

TheSEChasownedthemen'sNCAAOutdoorChampionships, as the league has produced 13 NCAA titles and 13 of 14 championships since 1989. Three different schools have won outdoor titles and at least seven schools have participated in the NCAA'ssince 1990. In the 2002 outdoor season, USC won the women's NCAA title.

LSU has become synonymous with women's outdoor track. The Lady Tigers won 11 straight NCAA titles NCAA titles, from 1987 to 1997, and again in 2000. Since 1982, the SEC has had three schools finish in the Top-10 at the NCAA Championships on 13 different occasions.

CROSS COUNTRY

Men-Eight national, two individual titles, 67 All-Americans since 1984, 31 teams have finished among the Top 20 since 1984.

Women-One team championship in 1988, 44 All-Americans since 1981, 33 teams have finished among the top 25 since 1982.

INDOOR TRACK

Men-Ten national championships since 1992, 93 NCAA individual champions (not including relays) and three NCAA Championship record holders, 53 individuals earned All-Americans status in 2002.

Women-Ten national championships since 1987, 63 NCAA individual champions (not including relays), nine NCAA Championship record holders, 47 All-Americans in 2002.

OUTDOOR TRACK

Men-Fifteen NCAA titles and 13 of 14 national championships since 1989, 127 NCAA individual champions (not including relays), five NCAA Championship record holders, 66 All-Americans in 2002.

Women-Eleven consecutive NCAA titles by LSU from 1987-97 and again in 2000, 75 NCAA individual champions (not including relays) since 1982, eight NCAA Championship record holders, 34 All-Americans in 2002.
