and won nearly 75 percent of the college games in which he has coached, is in his fourth season as head coach at

the University of South Carolina. Spurrier was introduced

Now in his 19th collegiate season, Coach Spurrier has

compiled a 163-56-2 (.742) won-loss record as a major

college head coach, including a 21-16 mark at Carolina. He led the Duke Blue Devils to the 1989 Atlantic Coast Con-

ference championship before returning to his alma mater,

the University of Florida, as head coach in 1990. During

his 12 seasons with the Gators, Spurrier's teams won seven

Southeastern Conference championships, one national title

and finished ranked in the nation's top 10 nine times. His record at Florida was an amazing 122-27-1 (.817). Spur-

rier, who won the 1966 Heisman Trophy as a quarterback

for the Gators, most recently was head coach of the NFL's

Washington Redskins (2002-03). He returned to the college

ranks in 2005 after a one-year absence from the sidelines. In his first season at South Carolina, Coach Spurrier led

the Gamecocks to a 7-5 record and a second-place finish

in the SEC Eastern Division. In doing so, he posted a five-

game winning streak, the 15th consecutive year in which

he has had a five-game winning streak, something no other

coach in college history has accomplished. He was hon-

ored as the SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press

after leading the Gamecocks to a school-record five straight SEC wins, their first win ever at Tennessee and their first

win over Florida since the 1930s. It was the eighth time he has been honored as his league's Coach of the Year.

He came back with an 8-5 record in 2006, just the ninth

time in school history that the Gamecocks posted eight or more wins in a season. The season was capped with a vic-

tory in the Liberty Bowl over Conference USA champion

Houston. With that win, Coach Spurrier matched Joe Mor-

rison for the most wins by a Carolina head coach in his first

In his third season with the Garnet & Black, Coach Spur-

rier's squad raced out to a 6-1 record and moved as high as

No. 6 in the BCS rankings, before finishing the campaign

with a 6-6 record. With 21 wins, he holds the Carolina re-

cord for coaching victories after three seasons at the helm.

Carolina has finished with a .500 or better overall record in



• Two-time All-American at the University of Florida.

◆ Inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame as a player in 1986.

◆ Became the first person to have both won a Heisman Trophy and to have coached a Heisman Trophy winner (Danny Wuerffel).

◆ In 2006, he was one of the first four inductees into the Gator Ring of Honor alongside Danny Wuerffel, Emmitt Smith and Jack Youngblood.

◆ Compiled a 122-27-1 record at Florida from 1990-2001, the most wins for a Gator coach in school history and a winning percentage (.817) that ranked among the top three in SEC history.

◆ His 122 victories at Florida from 1990-2001 rank as the best win total for a coach in his first 12 years at a school in major college history.

◆ Coached Florida to two National Championship Game appearances (1995 and 1996), claiming the 1996 national title.

◆ The only coach in SEC history and one of only two coaches in major college history to lead a squad to six straight seasons of 10 or more wins (1993-1998).

◆ His Gator teams appeared in the weekly polls 202 of a possible 203 weeks, including each of his last 202 consecutive weeks. From 1990-2001, the Gators were ranked number one in the polls 29 times, appeared in the top five for 117 weeks and among the nation's top 10 for 179 weeks.

◆ The only coach in SEC history and one of only three coaches in major college history to lead a school to 12 consecutive seasons (1990-2001) of nine or more wins.

◆ One of only five coaches in major college history to have his team ranked in the final Top 15 Poll in each of 12 consecutive seasons (1990-2001).

◆ His UF squads finished in the Top 10 of the polls nine times and six times in the final top five, totals that both ranked second best in the nation over his 12 seasons (1990-2001). UF's average poll ranking of 6.5 in the decade of the 1990s was second best in the nation.

◆ He achieved 100 career victories at Florida in a faster time period (10th season, eighth game) than any major college coach at a school in the 20th century.

◆ One of only five major college coaches in history and only the second in SEC history to lead a school to 100 wins during a decade (102-22-1 at UF from 1990-99).

◆ One of only three coaches in major college history and the only one in SEC history to lead a school to an appearance in the weekly polls for a period of 200 consecutive weeks.



◆ He and the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant are the only coaches in SEC history to win as many as four straight league championships. (1993-96).

◆ His 98-27 record in SEC play ranks as the second-best winning percentage in conference history (.784) and his 73 league wins in the 1990s represent the most SEC wins during a decade in conference history.

◆ The only coach in SEC history to win eight conference games in a season four straight years (1993-96).

 The only coach in SEC history to lead a school to nine consecutive January bowl game appearances.

◆ His six outright SEC titles ('91, '93, '94, '95, '96, 2000) ranked as the second-best total in SEC history, trailing only "Bear" Bryant's 11.

◆ Under his leadership, the Gator offense became the only unit in modern collegiate history (since the NCAA started keeping stats in 1937) to score at least 500 points (including bowl games) for four straight years (1993-96). Yale also achieved that distinction from 1886-89 and Michigan from 1901-04.

◆ Led Florida to seven appearances in the SEC Championship Game (1992-96, 1999-2000), with five victories (1993-1996, 2000).

◆ Prior to his arrival in 1990, Florida had never won more than nine games in a season. In 12 seasons at the helm he lead the Gators to nine seasons of 10 or more wins.

◆ He has been selected as a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award four times (1990, 1991, 1995, 1996).

◆ In his 18 years as a collegiate head coach he led his squad to the best record in the conference standings eight times (Duke in 1989 and Florida in 1990, 1991, 1993, 1994, 1995 1996 and 2000).

◆ He won his 100th game at Florida in 1999 in just his 120th overall game (100-19-1 record), a total that ranks among the six fewest games to reach that level at a major college school in the 20th century.

◆ Has been named his conference's Coach of the Year eight times (1988 and 1989 in the ACC with Duke, in 1990, 1991, 1994, 1995 and 1996 in the SEC with Florida and in 2005 in his first year at South Carolina).

◆ He has led teams to 14 bowl games, including each of his last 11 years (1991-2001) at Florida and in 13 of his last 14 seasons overall. Of his 14 bowl teams, 10 played in January games.

◆ Named the 2007 Davey O'Brien Legends Award winner by the Fort Worth Club.

• Steve Spurrier was an outstanding quarterback during his playing days at the University of Florida. He was the recipient of the 1966 Heisman Trophy.

• Spurrier was a two-time All-America selection and was tabbed as the 1966 SEC Player of the Year.

• During his three-year playing career, he broke every single-game, singleseason and career record in passing and total offense and broke all league passing records.

• Became the first player in the history of the Sugar Bowl to earn MVP honors despite playing for the team that did not win the game after breaking six game records in the Gators' 20-18 loss to Missouri.

• First-round draft pick of the San Francisco 49ers. Spurrier played 10 years of pro football with the 49ers and Tampa Bay Buccaneers. He set a 49ers team record with five touchdown passes vs. the Chicago Bears.

• Inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Football Hall of Fame in 1986.

• Finished ninth in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 1965.

1965 — Named first-team All-American at Florida.

**1966** — Named winner of Heisman Memorial Trophy and SEC Player of the Year; repeats as first-team All-American. Most Outstanding Player in 1966 Sugar Bowl.

**1967** — Selected in the first round, third overall, by San Francisco in the NFL draft. He played for San Francisco from 1967-75 and for Tampa Bay in 1976.

1978 — Named quarterbacks coach at University of Florida.

**1979** — Named quarterbacks coach at Georgia Tech.

1980 — Named assistant coach at Duke.

**Nov. 22, 1982** — Named coach of the Tampa Bay Bandits of the United States Football League. He compiles 35-19 record in three seasons.

1987 — Named head coach at Duke.

**Nov. 18, 1989** — Shut out North Carolina to clinch the ACC Championship.

**Sept. 8, 1990** — Coach Spurrier won first game as coach at Florida, 50-7, against Oklahoma State.

**Dec. 5, 1992** — The Gators participated in the first SEC Championship game, losing 28-21 to Alabama.

**Dec. 31, 1992** — Florida won its first bowl game under Coach Spurrier, a 27-10 victory against North Carolina State in the Gator Bowl.

**Dec. 4, 1993** — Florida gained revenge against Alabama, beating the Crimson Tide 28-13 in the second SEC Championship game.

**Sept. 3, 1994** — Coach Spurrier's Gators took to the field for the first time as the nation's No. 1-ranked team. They beat New Mexico State, 70-21.

**Dec. 2, 1995** — Coach Spurrier capped his first undefeated regular season (12-0) at Florida with a 34-3 victory against Arkansas in the SEC Championship game.

**Jan. 2, 1997** — Florida routed Florida State 52-20 in the Sugar Bowl to win the national championship and complete the team's second-consecutive 12-1 season.

**Oct. 30, 1999** — Coach Spurrier won his 100th game at Florida, a 30-14 victory against Georgia. He is the only coach in the century to win 100 games in his first 10 years at a school.

**Oct. 8, 2001** — Florida gained the No. 1 ranking for one week — the last time a Spurrier-coached team was ranked No. 1.

**Jan. 2, 2002** — Coach Spurrier coached his final game at Florida – a 56-23 win over Maryland in the Orange Bowl.

Jan. 4, 2002 — Coach Spurrier resigned as Florida coach.

Jan. 14, 2002 — Coach Spurrier signed a five-year contract to coach the Washington Redskins.

**Aug. 3, 2002** — Coach Spurrier made his Redskins coaching debut in a 38-7 preseason victory against San Francisco in the 2002 American Bowl in Osaka, Japan.

**Sept. 8, 2002** — Coach Spurrier won his regular-season debut with Washington, defeating Arizona, 31-23.

**Dec. 29, 2002** — The Redskins defeated Dallas 20-14 in their season finale. The team finishes 7-9 in his first season.

**Sept. 28, 2003** — The Redskins beat New England 20-17 to improve to 3-1. They were the last team to beat the Patriots before New England's 21-game unbeaten streak, which spanned parts of two seasons and included a Super Bowl win.

**Nov. 23, 2004** — Coach Spurrier was introduced as the 32nd head coach of the South Carolina program.

**April 16, 2005** — Almost 40,000 fans attended the Garnet and Black Spring Game, ushering in Coach Spurrier at Carolina.

**Sept. 1, 2005** — ESPN GameDay was on hand for the first game of the Steve Spurrier Era at South Carolina. The Gamecocks defeat UCF by a 24-15 score.

**Oct. 29, 2005** — The Gamecocks invaded Knoxville and left Tennessee with a 16-15 win over the Volunteers, the first USC win ever in Knoxville.

**Nov. 12, 2005** — In his first contest ever against his alma mater, Steve Spurrier led Carolina to a 30-22 upset win over the 12th-ranked Florida Gators. It was USC's first victory over Florida since the 1930s.

**Dec. 29, 2006** — The Gamecocks defeated Houston 44-36 to win the 2006 Liberty Bowl and gave Coach Spurrier his first bowl victory as the Carolina head coach. He was the first coach in school history to take his team to a bowl game in each of his first two seasons at the University.





### **Ron Cooper** Safeties Fifth Year at South Carolina



Ron Cooper, who has nine years of head coaching experience, is in his fifth season at South Carolina. He will oversee the safeties in 2008.

Cooper has had several responsibilities in his time at Carolina. He coached the defensive backs in 2004. He handled the outside linebackers and was the special teams coordinator in 2005, then worked with the secondary and served as the Assistant Head Coach in both 2006 and 2007.

In 2007, the Gamecocks were ranked among the top five in the country in pass defense for most of the season, including several weeks at No. 1. He coached cornerback Captain Munnerlyn and safety Emanuel Cook to All-SEC recognition by the league's coaches in 2007.

Cooper did a solid job guiding the USC secondary in 2006 after losing a pair of standouts in safety Ko Simpson and cornerback Johnathan Joseph in the first four rounds of the NFL draft. Despite playing a pair of true freshmen extensively, the Gamecocks ranked 43rd in the country in pass defense.

Cooper served as the head coach at three schools – Eastern Michigan (1993-94), Louisville (1995-97) and Alabama A&M (1998-01).

Prior to joining the Gamecock staff, he worked as the secondary coach at Wisconsin in 2002 and was the defensive coordinator and safeties coach at Mississippi State in 2003.

While on the staff at Notre Dame for the 1991 and 1992 seasons, Cooper helped lead the Fighting Irish to victories in the 1992 Sugar Bowl against third-ranked Florida and in the 1993 Cotton Bowl against fourth-ranked Texas A&M.

As the head coach at Alabama A&M, Cooper helped lead the Bulldogs to the 2000 championship game of the Southwestern Athletic Conference, with that team leading the nation in rushing defense and finishing eighth in total defense.

During his stint at Louisville, his 1995 Cardinal team led the nation in turnovers forced, finished ninth nationally in scoring defense, 18th in total defense and 20th in rushing defense. His 1996 UL squad ranked fourth in the NCAA in both total and rushing defense.

Born Feb. 11, 1962 in Huntsville, Ala., Cooper was also the defensive coordinator at UNLV and Murray State. He worked as an assistant coach at East Carolina and Austin Peay and was a graduate assistant at Minnesota under Lou Holtz and also at Appalachian State.

Cooper played college football at Jacksonville State, where he helped lead his team to the NCAA Division II playoffs on three occasions.

He earned his bachelor's degree from JSU in 1983 and later received a master's degree from Appalachian State in 1986.

He and his wife, Djuna, have a daughter, Tyler, and two sons, Tristan and Ronald Jr.

## Running Backs Fourth Year at South Carolina

Robert Gillespie is in his third season as a full-time college football coach. He was promoted to the Gamecocks' running backs coach on Dec. 16, 2005, after spending the 2005 campaign as a graduate assistant for video at South Carolina.

In his first season as running backs coach, he saw two of his backs – Cory Boyd (three times) and Taylor Rank (once) – rush for more than 100 yards in a game, and two others, Mike Davis and Bobby Wallace, have games with more than 90 yards on the ground.

Under Gillespie's watch, the South Carolina backs combined to rush for 1,876 yards in 2006, marking a 61 percent increase from the year prior to his appointment as running backs coach for the Gamecocks. South Carolina averaged 144.31 rushing yards per game in 2006, ranking 49th nationally just one year after ranking 108th among Division I-A teams with a 95.17 yards per game average. The increased productivity of the Gamecocks running backs catapulted Carolina's third-down conversion percentage from 34 percent the year prior to Gillespie (95th nationally) to 48 percent his first year (12th nationally).

In 2007, tailback Cory Boyd rushed for 903 yards, the most yards for a Gamecock back since Derek Watson logged 1,066 yards rushing in 2000. Boyd also was selected in the NFL Draft by the Tampa Bay Bucs.

A former running back and team captain at the University of Florida, Gillespie played for Steve Spurrier from 1998-2001, earning a spot on the SEC All-Freshman Team and SEC Player of the Week recognition during his time with the Gators. Gillespie finished his college career ranking second all-time at Florida in receiving yards by a back. A two-time selection to the SEC Fall Sports Academic Honor Roll in 2000 and 2001, Gillespie returned to Gainesville to earn a degree in sports management from Florida in 2005.

Gillespie played for the NFL's Washington Redskins in 2002 and 2003 and played for the Frankfurt Galaxy of NFL Europe in 2003 before taking a teaching job at his alma mater, Hattiesburg HS in Hattiesburg, Miss., in 2004. He stayed on at Hattiesburg HS for an internship in the athletic department in 2005 before making his way to South Carolina.

### **John Hunt** Offensive Line Fourth Year at South Carolina



John Hunt, who has extensive experience in Coach Steve Spurrier's offensive system and who played a prominent role in the success of the Florida Gators from 1999-2001, is in his fourth season as the Gamecocks' offensive line coach.

For the second-straight season, the 2007 Gamecock offensive line used nine different starting players. Despite that challenge, the Gamecock offense rolled up 501 yards of offense against Tennessee, 489 yards against Arkansas and 402 yards versus Mississippi State, all teams that played in bowl games.

Hunt's offensive line showed tremendous growth throughout the 2006 campaign. The Gamecocks started two true freshmen and two others who came to USC as walk-ons. Despite having no first-team all-conference performers, the offense chalked up 410 yards against national champion Florida, a 492-yard effort against Clemson, a team that entered that game with the nation's fifth-best defense statistically, and capped the year with a season-best 512 yards against Houston.

Hunt helped coach the offensive line at Florida from 1999-2001, specifically working with the tackles under Coach Spurrier. During that three-year span, Hunt tutored three first-team All-Southeastern Conference linemen – tackles Cooper Carlisle, Mike Pearson and Kenyatta Walker. Pearson was a first-team All-America pick in 2001 and was a second-round NFL draft pick in 2002. Walker was a first-round draft pick in 2001 and was chosen the Jacobs' Blocking Trophy winner in 2000, an honor that goes to the SEC's top offensive lineman. Carlisle was a fourth-round draft pick in 2000. Hunt coached in the 1999 and 2000 SEC Championship games.

Hunt followed Coach Spurrier to the Washington Redskins, where he worked with the offensive line for two years (2002-03). During that stretch, he worked with two of the NFL's top tackles in Chris Samuels and Jon Jansen.

Hunt was a four-year letterman at offensive guard for the Gators. He was named second-team All-SEC in 1983 and he started the final 23 games of his career. He appeared in four bowl games and was drafted in 1984 by the Dallas Cowboys. Hunt played in two seasons in the NFL, with Dallas and Tampa Bay.

A native of Orlando, Fla., Hunt holds bachelor's (1985) and master's degrees (1991) from the University of Florida. He worked as a graduate assistant at his alma mater for two years (1989-90) and was a volunteer assistant for the Gators in 1991. Two of those seasons (1990-91) he worked under Coach Spurrier. The 1991 Gators went 10-2 and won the SEC Championship.

Hunt coached in the prep ranks in Florida from 1992-98, including stints at Buchholz High School and Dr. Phillips High School. He was the head coach at Buchholz in 1995 and 1996.

Hunt and his wife, Rene´, have two children, Christopher and Cameron.

Ellis Johnson, joined the Gamecocks on Jan. 24, 2008, after logging a brief stint on Bobby Petrino's staff at the University of Arkansas. He serves as the defensive coordinator and also handles the linebackers. In addition, he holds the title of Assistant Head Coach.


Johnson spent the past four seasons as the defensive coordinator at Mississippi State under Sylvester Croom. He also coached the Bulldog safeties in 2004 and '05 and the inside linebackers from 2006-07. In Johnson's final game with the Bulldogs, the Mississippi State defense yielded only 231 yards of total offense to Central Florida in the Liberty Bowl, holding the nation's leading rusher, Kevin Smith, to nearly 70 yards below his season average.

Johnson's 27 years as a collegiate coach include four as a head coach and 13 as a defensive coordinator. His resume includes head coaching experience at his alma mater, The Citadel (2001-03), and at Gardner Webb College (1983). He has logged stints as the defensive coordinator at Appalachian State (1984), Southern Miss (1988-89), Clemson (1995-96), Alabama (1997-2000) and Mississippi State (2004-07). He has coached in three SEC Championship games, has been part of one national title and has had more than 25 players make NFL rosters.

Johnson has logged two stints at the University of Alabama. He was the defensive coordinator and outside linebackers coach at Alabama from 1997-2000, helping the Crimson Tide go 10-3 in 1999 with an SEC title and a spot in the Orange Bowl. His 1999 defense was No. 2 in the nation against the rush and No. 9 in total defense. Johnson also helped Alabama earn a spot in the 1998 Music City Bowl. He served as the outside linebackers coach at Alabama from 1990-93, helping head coach Gene Stallings' teams go a combined 41-9, including an undefeated national championship season in 1992. Alabama's defense ranked No. 1 that season against the run and in total defense. The Crimson Tide ran off a 31-game winning streak and a 34-game unbeaten streak from 1991-93. He began his career as the defensive ends coach at The Citadel under Bobby Ross in 1975 before working as an assistant coach at Gaffney (S.C.) High School from 1976-78 and as both an assistant and head coach at Spartanburg (S.C.) High School from 1979-81.



Brad Lawing is in the third year of his second stint and his 13th year overall in Columbia. Lawing was handed the role of defensive line coach for the Gamecocks prior to spring ball in 2006.

In 2007, Lawing coached defensive end Eric Norwood to first-team All-SEC honors as selected by the league's coaches. Norwood finished the season with a school-record 19.5 tackles for loss. True freshman Ladi Ajiboye was a secondteam Freshman All-America selection by the *Sporting News*.

In 2006, Lawing pieced together a D-line that had no seniors in the rotation and lost its best interior lineman (Marque Hall) to a season-ending injury early in the campaign. True freshman Eric Norwood shared the team lead in sacks (7.0) while earning first-team Freshman All-America honors by the *Sporting News*.

In his previous 10-year stint at South Carolina (1989-98), Lawing tutored the defensive line and served as recruiting coordinator under Sparky Woods and Brad Scott. During his time with the Gamecocks he helped produce three NFL players in Corey Miller, Gerald Dixon and Henry Taylor. He also coached three AII-SEC players, including Taylor, nose tackle Eric Sullivan and end Stacy Evans. He also recruited defensive end John Abraham, a 2003 NFL Pro Bowl selection.

Between his stops at Carolina, Lawing spent four seasons at Michigan State where he served as defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. During his tenure, the Spartans led the Big Ten in total defense during the 1999 and 2000 regular seasons. In his first season at MSU, the Spartans led the Big Ten and ranked fifth nationally in rushing defense. Lawing also played an integral part in helping MSU assemble one of the nation's top 20 recruiting classes for three straight years. He was instrumental in the development of four NFL players, including All-America and first-round draft pick Julian Peterson, Robaire Smith, Jace Sayler and Josh Shaw.

More recently, Lawing spent three seasons as North Carolina's defensive ends coach and recruiting coordinator. His three recruiting classes were ranked among the nation's top 25 by the scouting services.

Lawing began his college coaching career at Appalachian State. He coached the defensive line for five years and the tight ends and offensive tackles for one season. Eight of his players earned all-conference honors, including Southern Conference Player of the Year Anthony Downs in 1987 and future NFL players Tommy Dawkins and Mike Frier. Over his final four seasons, the Mountaineers compiled a record of 34-12-2, including back-to-back league championships (1986-1987) and consecutive trips to the I-AA playoffs.

A four-year letterwinner in football and a 1979 graduate of Lenoir-Rhyne, Lawing earned a master's degree in athletics administration from Appalachian State in 1985. A native of Hickory, N.C., Lawing and his wife, Laura, have two children.

David Reaves is in his fifth season as a full-time member of the South Carolina coaching staff after spending two seasons as a graduate assistant. After two seasons assisting Head Coach Steve Spurrier in coaching the Gamecock quarterbacks he was handed the full-time quarterback coaching duties in the spring of 2007.

In addition, Reaves was given the duties of recruiting coordinator in February 2006. He solidified his reputation as one of the top young recruiters in college football when the 2007 Gamecock signees formed a consensus top-10 class and were regarded as the most highly touted recruiting class in school history. Following the February signing day, he was selected as one of the top 25 recruiters in the country by *Rivals.com*.

In 2007, the Gamecocks threw for over 3,000 yards and averaged 258.2 yards per game through the air with senior Blake Mitchell and redshirt freshman Chris Smelley sharing time under center.

In 2006, the USC quarterbacks, primarily Blake Mitchell and Syvelle Newton, combined to throw for 3,259 yards, an average of 250.7 yards per game.

In 2005, Reaves assisted with the development of quarterback Blake Mitchell, who threw for 2,370 yards, the seventhhighest single season total in school history.

Reaves spent the 2004 season as Carolina's defensive backs assistant, working with the safeties.

Reaves served as an assistant head coach at Tampa (Fla.) Catholic High School for one season prior to coming to Carolina. He was team captain and a three-year starter at quarterback for Appalachian State University, where he helped lead the Mountaineers to three straight national playoff berths. Reaves was a standout quarterback at Columbia's Spring Valley High School, graduating in 1997.

Reaves comes from a football family. His father, John, was an All-America quarterback at the University of Florida and later played in the NFL. John Reaves served as an assistant coach under Steve Spurrier at Florida from 1990-92 and in 1994 and was on the coaching staff at South Carolina from 1996-97. His brother-in-law, Lane Kiffin, was recently tabbed as the head coach of the Oakland Raiders in the NFL.

Ray Rychleski joined the Gamecock coaching staff on Dec. 18, 2007. He will serve as the Gamecocks' special teams coordinator and tight ends coach in 2008.

Rychleski has spent the past seven years as the special teams coordinator and tight ends/H-backs coach at the University of Maryland. Over that seven-year period Maryland had zero punts blocked, the longest current streak in Division I-A football. His special team units blocked 22 kicks and had eight returns for touchdowns in that seven-year span. In addition, Maryland led the country in kickoff return yardage defense, allowing just 16.56 yards per kickoff return in 2007. Rychleski coached an All-Atlantic Coast Conference punter for six straight years (2001-06), had one specialist selected in the NFL draft and five others sign as free agents.

During his seven-year run at Maryland, Rychleski had three tight ends selected in the NFL Draft, including Vernon Davis, the sixth pick overall in the 2006 draft, and four others who signed free agent contracts.

Rychleski helped the Terrapins to a record of 56-31 with five bowl appearances during his tenure, including the 2001 ACC Championship, the 2002 Peach Bowl Championship, the 2004 Gator Bowl Championship and the 2006 CHAMPS Sports Bowl Championship. The Terps were ranked in the Top 25 three times (2001, 2002 and 2003) and appeared in their first-ever Bowl Championship Series bowl game in 2001 (Orange Bowl).

Prior to his arrival in College Park, Rychleski spent eight seasons (1993-2000) at Wake Forest University. For the 1999 and 2000 seasons, Rychleski was the Demon Deacons' tight ends coach while also serving as the team's special teams coach. For the three years prior to that, he worked with WFU's outside linebackers. During his first three seasons at Wake (1993-95), Rychleski coached the defensive line.

A veteran of 28 years of coaching, including 26 seasons at the collegiate level, Rychleski began his coaching career on the prep level in Pennsylvania in 1979 before heading to Temple University, where he took a position as a graduate assistant. Shortly thereafter, he was promoted to his first full-time collegiate coaching post. He spent eight years at Temple (1981-88) before joining the Northeastern staff as a defensive coordinator/inside linebacker coach. After two years at Northeastern (1989-90), he spent a year as a G.A. at Penn State and one summer with the Toronto Argonauts as a volunteer assistant.

In 1992, Rychleski was hired as a special teams coordinator and defensive backs coach at East Stroudsburg University where he helped the Warriors to their best record in 13 years. After his brief stint there, he left for Wake Forest in 1993.

A native of Old Forge, Pa., Rychleski earned his degree in social studies from Millersville (Pa.) State College (now known as Millersville University) in 1979.

Steve Spurrier Jr., who has served on the coaching staffs of two national championship teams and tutored a bevy of outstanding receivers at both the collegiate and professional levels, is in his fourth season as the coach of the Gamecock wide receivers.

In 2007, junior wide receiver Kenny McKinley earned firstteam all-league recognition after setting a school record with 77 receptions for 968 yards and nine touchdowns.

In 2006, his top two receivers, Sidney Rice and Kenny McKinley, combined for 123 catches and 1,970 yards receiving, the top tandem marks in school history. Rice owns two of the top three receiving seasons in Carolina history and set numerous records in just two campaigns in the Garnet and Black.

In his first season with the Gamecocks, Spurrier mentored Rice, who broke nearly every receiving record at the school en route to freshman All-America honors. Rice ended the campaign as the school's single-season receiving yards leader after catching 70 passes for 1,143 yards.

Spurrier brought 11 years of coaching experience to Carolina, with his most recent stop being at the University of Arizona under head coach Mike Stoops.

He spent two seasons as wide receivers coach with the NFL's Washington Redskins. While with the Redskins, Spurrier, Jr., coached Laveraneus Coles, whose 2003 receiving totals of 82 receptions for 1,204 yards earned him his only Pro Bowl appearance. He also coached Rod Gardner, who was Washington's leading receiver in 2002 with 1,007 yards.

Spurrier was part of Bob Stoops' rebuilding project at Oklahoma, which culminated with a perfect 13-0 record and national championship in 2000. He spent three seasons as the Sooners' wide receivers coach, working with such standouts as Mark Clayton and Josh Norman.

Prior to his stay at OU, he worked at Florida for five seasons and was part of the Gators' 1996 national championship club.

During his collegiate coaching career, he has been involved with nine postseason bowl teams, four conference championships (three SEC and one Big 12) and two national championships (Florida, 1996 and Oklahoma, 2000).

Born Sept. 26, 1971 in Palo Alto, Calif., Spurrier played college football at Duke University, where he earned his bachelor's degree in 1994. He later earned a master's degree at Florida in 1996.

Spurrier and his wife, the former Melissa Beauchamp, are the parents of triplets: Luke, Gavin and Emmaline; and another son, Nolan.




