







A four-time conference coach of the year and the 1995 National Coach of the Year, Dave Odom enters his seventh year at the Gamecock helm. During that time, USC has won two NIT titles (2005, 2006), played for a third (2002) and advanced to the NCAA Tournament (2004). In addition the Gamecocks have made three trips to the SEC Tournament semi-finals and once played for the SEC Tournament title (losing 49-47 to eventual NCAA Champion Florida in 2006).

While at USC, Odom has had eight players garner All-SEC honors and seen two—Carlos Powell (2005) and Renaldo Balkman (2006) crowned as the NIT MVP. Looking at post-collegiate play, Odom-coached athletes from South Carolina are on four NBA rosters to begin the pre-season in 2007: Renaldo Balkman with the Knicks was drafted in the first round (20th overall) in the 2006 NBA Draft; Tarence Kinsey played his rookie season with the Memphis Grizzlies last season after signing a free agent contract and was rewarded as the NBA Rookie of the Month in April, 2007; Brandon Wallace (Boston Celtics) and Carlos Powell (Golden State Warriors) both signed free agent contracts this past summer.

Continuing to support his players' progress when their eligibility is over, the summer of 2003 Odom saw two of his former prize pupils, Tim Duncan (San Antonio Spurs) and Rodney Rogers (New Jersey Nets) square off against each other in the NBA Finals. Duncan was also named the NBA's Most Valuable Player for the second straight season in 2003 and led the Spurs once again to the NBA title in 2005 and 2007.

Including his tenures at South Carolina, Wake Forest and East Carolina, Odom's career head coaching record is an impressive 392-260. He achieved his 200th overall career win on February 12, 1997, in a 55-49 Wake Forest victory over Clemson, win No. 300 over Syracuse in the 2002 NIT semifinals and win No. 100 at USC in a 76-64 win over Michigan in the 2006 NIT Final. Odom spent the summer of 1999 as an assistant coach on the 1999 USA Basketball Junior World Championship team. That team competed in Portugal in July and captured the silver medal at the FIBA Men's Junior World Championships

Odom is 114-86 in his six seasons at Carolina all while playing in the Southeastern Conference, considered the toughest conference in the country the past several years. The SEC has won the NCAA title the past two years (Florida) with LSU also playing in the Final Four in 2006. He has tutored the Gamecocks to four

20 wins seasons in the past six years. During that time, USC have won two NIT title (2005, 2006), finished as the runner-up in the NIT (2002) and advanced to the NCAA Tournament (2004). In addition to three trips to the SEC Tournament semi-finals, the Gamecocks have also played in the SEC final once (2006).

In 2004, he joined Cliff Ellis (Auburn and Clemson) as the only two head coaches to receive the nod for conference coach of the year in both the SEC and ACC. In addition to the SEC Coach of the Year award in 2004, Odom was the ACC Coach of the Year three times at Wake Forest; he also received National Coach of the Year honors in 1995.

Last season, his sixth at the USC helm, Odom saw three players receive SEC post-season honors. With five transfers on the bench chomping at the bit to play in 2007-08 and a top-20 recruiting class waiting in the wings, Tre' Kellev was named All-SEC First Team on both the AP and Coaches teams: Brandon Wallace was named All-SEC Honorable Mention on and Dominique Archie was named to the



Bottom right: son Ryan, his wife Lucia and sons Owen and Conner (front).



Kelley was honored with the Frances Pomeroy Naismith Award winner - given to the nation's top player 6 feet and under. He was also a finalist for the Chip Hilton

The team finished 14-16 in 2006-07 and highlights included winning at NCAA Sweet 16 participant Southern California, in the grand opening its new arena. USC also defeated another Sweet 16 participant, Tennessee. Wallace broke the school record in career- blocked shots (249) and career games played (135). Kellev finished ninth in all-time points scored and third in career assists. He finished second in school history in games played (134), after setting the school record in 2006 for games played (38) and games started (38).

In his fifth year as the USC coach, Odom led the Gamecock basketball team to its second straight NIT title in 2006 - a feat only matched by the 1943 and '44 St. John's teams. The team finished the season at 23-15, posting his fourth 20 win season in five years at the helm. He joined the legendary Frank McGuire as the only Carolina coaches to post four 20-win seasons during their careers. McGuire did it six times in 16 years, while Odom has done it four times in six years.

In addition to USC's NIT title, USC set an NIT record by winning 10 straight games in the prestigious postseason tournament. Renaldo Balkman was named the 2006 NIT MVP with Kelley and Kinsey also being named to the NIT All-Tournament team. It was the second straight year a Gamecock was named the NIT MVP (Powell, 2005). Odom also led the team to the SEC Tournament Championship game, losing 49-47 in the final seconds to No. 16 Florida, the eventual national champion – who USC defeated in both meetings during the regular season. USC defeated Mississippi State, No. 16 Tennessee and Kentucky on the way to the SEC final.

Kinsey, who finished his career with 1204 points, was named to the 2006 All-SEC Coaches second team and Stephen McDowell was honored on the SEC Academic Honor Roll. USC broke three individual school records and five team records for the season, including Kelley who broke the school's season record for most minutes played (1323) and most games started (38)

The 2004 SEC Coach of the Year, Odom was looking for a return trip to the NCAA Tournament in 2004-05. The surprise team of the SEC in 2003-04, USC wasn't going to sneak up on anyone. Wins over No. 3 Kentucky and close calls at No. 2 Kansas, at No. 6 Kentucky and at No. 10 Pittsburgh (lost to each by four

to the NCAA Tournament. But, Carolina did receive an NIT bid and entered the tournament with unprecedented vigor. Wins at home against Miami, UNLV and Georgetown punched the Gamecocks ticket for New York City for the second time in four tries.

Playing in Madison Square Garden in the semi-final game against Maryland, the 2002 NCAA Champion, and USC took the ACC-perennial powerhouse out, 75-67. Advancing to the final two nights later, Tarence Kinsey hit a three-pointer with less than two seconds on the clock to secure the NIT title, a 60-75 win over St. Joseph's. Powell was fittingly named the MVP and Wallace earned NIT All-Tournament honors. Powell finished his career as No. 6 on the career points list



with 1,541 and shattered the then-career games played record, tallying 132 games on the court. Powell also earned All-SEC honors for the second straight year.

Kinsey graduated this summer with Wallace and Sheldon are just short of their degrees. In 2006 Rocky Trice finished his degree. All four 2005 seniors graduated with John Chappell, Josh Gonner, John Land and Powell adding to the list of graduates that included Boynton, Ivan Howell and Sheldon Everett from the previous season. Chappell is currently enrolled in USC's world-renowed Interna-

tional School of Business working on his MBA. Bradley, Grant, Lucas, McKie, Petravicius and Chris Warren have all graduated. Getting the coaching bug, after two years as an assistant coach at Coastal Carolina University, Boynton was baned the Associate Head Coach at Wofford University this past summer.

Kelley took his game overseas this season and is playing point guard for Cibona with former teammate Chris Warren also on the same team. Other Gamecocks playing overseas include: Josh Gonner (Finland), Rocky Trice (Germany), Chuck Edison (Lithuania), Rolando Howell (Italy), Aaron Lucas (Lithuania), Marius Petravicius (Lithuania), and Antonio Grant (France), BJ McKie (Italy) and Ryan Stack (Ukraine).



100 YEARS FACT: In his 31 years of collegiate coach, Dave Odom has been to 15 NCAA Tournaments and 7 NITs - winning three NIT titles.



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Head Coach Dave Odom





Odom joined an all-star cast of college coaches, including Michigan State's Tom Izzo, Oklahoma's Kelvin Sampson, Charlotte's Bobby Lutz, George Washington's Mike Jarvis and former Georgia Tech great Bobby Cremins and ESPN analyst Jay Bilas in August of 2005 on a special mission in the Middle East, titled Operation Hardwood, was nicknamed "Hoops with the Troops". The group flew to Kuwait and coached a three-day basketball tournament, including slam-dunk and three point contests with U.S. service men and women serving in the Gulf region. Odom's team, Camp Navistar, made the semi-finals with Izzo's team winning it all.

In 2003-04, USC started off the season with eight straight wins and won 12 games before the New Year - a Gamecock first in basketball. The USC basketball team took the pre-season prediction of last place to heart and believed it would 'find a way' in 2004. USC went 8-8 in the SEC and advanced to the SEC Tournament semi-final falling to eventual champion Kentucky. USC won the Guardians Classic, had a player on the All-SEC team (Carlos Powell), a player on the SEC All-Freshman team (Renaldo Balkman) and a player on the SEC All-Tournament team (Mike Boynton, Jr.) - all firsts in one season for Odom.

Averaging over 17,000 fans for its SEC homestand, the Gamecocks were road warriors as well, defeating the likes of SW Missouri State, Richmond, Clemson, Auburn, Georgia and Vanderbilt. Boynton led the team on and off the court. He finished his career with 125 games played. Boynton was also named the SEC Community Service Male Student-Athlete of the Year, receiving a \$5000 post-graduate scholarship for his work with Team Gamecocks.

In 2002-03, undefeated in their new home in non-conference play, the Game-cocks fell on harder times in SEC play, finishing the year with a 12-16 overall record. The team, which battled the injury bug all season throughout the line-up, saw the inaugural season at The Carolina Center average nearly 13,000 fans per home game. Chuck Eidson broke the school record for steals with 271 in his career and steals averaged per game at 2.42 as he finished No. 3 on the all-time SEC list. Kitchings finished his career at then-No. 6 in shots blocked (123), leading the Gamecocks four straight years.

In 2001-02, Odom led the Gamecocks to a 22-15 record, the most wins ever for a first-year Gamecock head coach and the NIT finals, falling to Memphis. He coached the Gamecocks to the semifinals of the SEC Tournament - USC's fourth appearance in the SEC Tournament semis in the last six years, an SEC best - and combined with a 4-1 record in the NIT, Carolina ended the year with a 6-2 record in postseason action.

The 2001-02 Gamecocks not only finished strong, they started strong, winning more games (10) than any other Carolina team prior to January - a feat topped only by his 2003-04 squad which won 12 games prior to January 1. More than 11,000 fans scooped up tickets in less than 36 hours for the Ball State home season finale, a game Carolina won 82-47 in the final regular-season contest ever at the Frank McGuire Arena. To cap it off, Odom's last victory in 2002 (NIT semifinals win over Syracuse) was the 300th of his coaching career, the third highest career victory total in the SEC.

Odom, who led Wake Forest to 11 consecutive national postseason tournament appearances and built that program into a national contender while averaging 20 victories per year during his tenure there, was introduced to an overflow crowd of media and fans at an April 10, 2001 news conference at the USC Basketball Practice Facility.

Odom was a three-time ACC Coach of the Year and earned National Coach of the Year honors in 1995. He led Wake Forest to two ACC championships and three Top 10 national finishes. His Demon Deacon teams appeared in seven straight NCAATournaments from 1991-97, including an Elite Eight showing in 1996

by advancing to the Regional Finals. His 2000 Wake Forest squad caught fire at the end of the season to claim the NIT championship, and his 2001 squad was Odom's eighth NCAA Tournament team at Wake. His last 11 Deacon teams advanced to postseason play.

Upon his arrival in Winston-Salem as head coach in 1989, Odom inherited a program that had suffered four straight losing seasons. However, he turned things around and has made school history by winning more games during his 12 years at Wake Forest than any other coach over a similar period of time, compiling a 240-132 record during his time at the school.

Under his direction, Wake Forest emerged as one of the elite programs in the country, becoming a force at both the conference and national levels on a yearly basis. Odom's 101 wins in ACC play are the most ever by a Deacon coach. His overall winning percentage (64.5%) was the best at the school in nearly a century, and he can claim .500 or better marks in ACC Tournament and NCAA Tournament competition as well.

Odom was named ACC Coach of the Year three times. Three times the U.S.


Basketball Writers Association has chosen him district coach of the year and twice he has been a National Association of Basketball Coaches award-winner on the district level, as well. The Touchdown Club of Columbus (Ohio) also named him its 1995 national coach-of-the-year after conducting a poll of head coaches across the country.

In 12 seasons with the Demon Deacons, Odom compiled an impressive 240-132 record. He left Wake Forest with the eighth highest victory total in ACC history and the second-most victories in Wake Forest history.

Since his only losing record at Wake Forest in 1990, Odom's teams won more than two-thirds of their games, recording 228 victories (20.7 per year) the last 11 campaigns. In addition to the back-to-back ACC titles in 1995 and 1996, Wake spent 10 weeks as the nation's No. 2-ranked team in 1997 -the school's highest ranking ever.

In 1995, 1996 and 1997, Wake Forest finished as one of the Top 10 teams in the country, claiming the No. 3 spot in 1995, and the No. 9 position in both the 1996 and 1997 final polls. The 26-6 records of '95 and '96 were the best in school history, as well.

Odom has also coached three players who have earned All-America honors, including 1997 consensus national player of the year Tim Duncan (1996, 1997), guard Randolph Childress (1996), and forward Rodney Rogers (1993). Duncan was also a two-time ACC Player of the Year, an award also won by Rogers while in a Wake uniform. Rogers and Robert O'Kelley both earned ACC Rookie of the Year honors, too (Rogers in 1993; O'Kelley in 1998).



Odom became the 18th head basketball coach in Wake Forest history on April 8th, 1989. Odom, a native of Goldsboro in eastern North Carolina, began his athletic career as a three-sport standout that served as captain of his football, basketball, and baseball squads as a senior at Goldsboro High. He took his talents and love of athletics to Guilford College in the early 1960s. There he was quarterback on the football team for three years, as well as playing on the basketball squad for all four years.

As a senior, Odom was named the captain of the basketball team, and that same year (1965), was honored as the school's most outstanding athlete. Eighteen years later (1983), Guilford College inducted him into its Hall of Fame. In 1991, he received similar recognition from his hometown by being accepted into the Goldsboro High School Hall of Fame as well.

Following his graduation from Guilford, Odom began his coaching career at his former school, Goldsboro High, while at the same time working toward a graduate degree in physical education at East Carolina. He received his master's in 1969, and in the fall of that year accepted the head coaching position at Durham High School. After a successful tenure at Durham High (he was five times named his


league's Coach of the Year), Odom made his debut on the collegiate coaching scene at Wake, serving as an assistant coach under Carl Tacy for three seasons (1977-1979)

The Deacs were 53-33 during that time, including a 22-8 campaign in 1976-77 when they advanced to the NCAA Midwest Region finals, matching the school's farthest progress in postseason play in the past 35 years.

After a three-year stint as head coach at East Carolina (1980-82), joined Terry Holland at Virginia and helped lead the Cavaliers through their most successful period ever. Virginia compiled a 142-83 (63.1 winning percentage) overall record during the seven years that Odom was involved in its program and made postseason appearances every year except 1988. Five of those seasons, the Cavaliers were among the NCAA championship field, including a trip to the Final Four in 1984. Odom left Holland's staff in the spring of 1989 when he returned to Winston-Salem. That move marked only the second time in ACC history that an assistant at one school had become head coach at another (Vic Bubas had been the first, going from NC State to Duke in 1959).

Odom and his wife, Lynn, have two sons - Lane and Ryan, who is a member of the staff at Virginia Tech University. Lane is the head coach at Charlotte Latin in Charlotte, N.C.

Odom serves on the National Association of Basketball Coaches Board of Directors.

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




 Odom's pupils continued to make their way towards professional basketball after their Carolina careers with Renaldo Balkman (Knicks) and Tarence Kinsey (Grizzlie) playing their rookie years last season. This summer Brandon Wallace signed a two-year contract with the Boston Celtics after going undrafted in 2007 and Kelley is playing for Cibona Zagreb in Croatia.


 Winning its second straight NIT title - a feat not accomplished since the early 1940s - USC also played eventual NCAA champion Florida down to the wire in the SEC title game in 2006.

Carolina, who had gotten the best of the Gators twice during the regular season, saw Tre' Kelley and Renaldo Balkman be named to the SEC All-Tournament team. Balkman was later named the NIT MVP, while Kelley was named to the NIT All-Tournament team. Tarence Kinsey was named All-SEC as USC won 20 games for the fourth time in five years under Odom.


- Has a combined record of 587-376 in 31 seasons as an assistant coach or head coach on the college level, being a part of 22 postseason teams (including 15 NCAA Tournament teams and 3 NIT titles).
- Watching all four seniors graduate, Coach Odom led the Gamecocks to the 2005 NIT title with a 60-57 win over St. Joseph's. NIT MVP Carlos Powell garnered SEC honors for the second straight year as the Gamecocks tallied up their third 20 win season in four years. Powell finished his career with 1,571 points - sixth on the all-time list and played in a school record 132 games in the garnet and black. Team highlights included a win over No. 3 Kentucky and a second-straight series sweep of Georgia.

 In 2004, Coach Odom led USC to the NCAA Tournament his ninth visit as a head coach and his 15th visit overall. The Gamecocks, who lost in the SEC semi-finals to eventual winner Kentucky, fell 59-43 to Memphis in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. USC won the season-opening Guardians Classic with



a 67-61 win over Richmond, as Tarence Kinsey was named the MVP.

- Led the Gamecocks to 12 victories prior to January, 2004, the most wins by a Carolina team ever prior to January.
- Coach Odom saw a player on the All-SEC team in Carlos Powell, a player on the SEC All-Freshman team in Renaldo Balkman and a player on the SEC Tournament team in Mike Boynton, Jr. - these three all in one year were a first for Odom. In its second year of the Colonial Center, USC averaged almost 17,100 for its eight-game SEC homestand - including a school record crowd of 18,000 to see the Gamecocks play Kentucky.
- In 2002-03, opened The Carolina Center to record crowds, with the team finishing 11-4 at home, including a perfect 7-0 against non-conference teams.
- Chuck Eidson broke the career steals record (272) and steals per game record (2.42 spg) at USC. He finished third on the SEC all-time list.
- In 2001-02, won more games (22) as a first-year South Carolina coach than any mentor in Gamecock history and led the Gamecocks to the NIT finals. No USC team prior to 2002 had ever been past the quarterfinals of either the NCAA or NIT post-season classics.
- In 2002, led Carolina to a combined record of 6-2 in the NIT and SEC postseason classics, as USC advanced to the semifinals of the SEC Tournament with wins over eventual NCAA teams Ole Miss and Kentucky.
- Prior to 2003, had led his last 12 teams to postseason appearances, including seven showings in the NCAA Championships.
- Guided his last 11 Wake Forest teams to consecutive postseason appearances, including seven straight NCAA Tournament trips from 1991 through 1997.
- Led the Deacons to eight NCAA appearances and three trips to the NIT, with Wake Forest capturing the 2000 NIT championship.
- Wake Forest made eight appearances in the NCAA Tournament prior to Odom's arrival before the 1989-90 season, and he equaled those eight appearances in his 12 years with the Deacons.
- Prior to 2002, all-time, Wake Forest appeared in 21 postseason tournaments (NCAA and NIT). Eleven of those appearances (53 percent) came under Odom.



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
Dave Odom Coaching Highlights

- Had a 10-8 record in NCAA Tournament games while at Wake Forest, leading the Deacons to the Sweet 16 twice (1993, 1995) and the Elite Eight once (1996). He easily is the Wake Forest all-time leader in NCAA Tournament victories (Bones McKinney is second with six).
- In 1995, 1996 and 1997, Wake Forest finished as one of the top 10 teams in the country, claiming the No. 3 spot in 1995, and the No. 9 position in both the 1996 and 1997 final polls. The 26-6 records of '95 and '96 were the best in school history, as well.
- Wake Forest spent 10 weeks as the nation's No. 2-ranked team in 1997 the school's highest ranking ever.
- Led Wake Forest to the 1995 and 1996 Atlantic Coast Conference championship and is one of only 11 coaches to lead teams to at least two ACC titles.
- · Was the 1995 National Coach of the Year.
- Was named ACC Coach of the Year in 1991, 1994 and 1995, becoming the first individual to receive that honor in consecutive seasons since Virginia's Terry Holland in 1981 and '82.
- Led the Deacons to finishes of fifth place or better in the Atlantic Coast Conference over each of the last nine seasons, a feat equaled by just North Carolina in that time period. In Odom's 12 years at Wake Forest, the Deacons finished fifth or higher in the standings 10 times.
- Is second on the Wake Forest all-time wins list (240), winning more games in his 12 years than any other Deacon coach over a similar period of time. He ac-

complished this despite taking over a program that had suffered four-straight losing seasons prior to his arrival (1989-90 season).

- His 240 overall victories in 12 seasons (average of 20 wins per season) at Wake Forest ranks eighth on the ACC overall wins listing. He finished the 2001 season third to Duke's Mike Krzyzewski and Maryland's Gary Williams on the active list.
- Odom's 101 wins in ACC play are the most ever by a Deacon coach.
 He ranks ninth on the career ACC wins list and finished 2001 second to Mike Krzyzewski on the active list.

- Had an overall winning percentage of 64.5 percent while at Wake (240-132), which was the best at the school in nearly a century, and he claimed .500 or better marks in ACC Tournament and NCAA Tournament competition as well.
- A three-time winner of district coach of the year honors by the U.S. Basketball Writers Association and twice he has been a NABC award-winner on the district level.
- Since his only losing record at Wake Forest in 1990 (his first season), Odom's teams won more than two-thirds of their games, recording 228 victories (20.7 per year) the last 11 campaigns.
- His Wake Forest teams posted a remarkable 82-5 record at home against non-conference opponents, including a number of matchups against Top-20 nationally-ranked teams.
- In his 12 seasons at Wake Forest, Odom's teams defeated 40 nationally-ranked teams, including 17 victories against Top 10 opponents. His teams also defeated seven Top 10 teams on the opponents' home floors.
- Odom has also coached three players who have earned All-America honors, including 1997 consensus national player of the year Tim Duncan (1996, 1997), guard Randolph Childress (1996), and forward Rodney Rogers (1993).
- Including his tenure at East Carolina, Odom's career coaching record is an
 impressive 355-229 (a 60.8 winning percentage). He achieved his 200th overall
 career win on February 12, 1997, in a 55-49 Wake Forest victory over Clemson;
 and win No. 300 in the NIT semifinal victory (66-59) over Syracuse.
- He spent the summer of 1999 as an assistant coach on the USA Basketball Junior World Championship team. That team competed in Portugal in July and captured the silver medal at the FIBA Men's Junior World Championships.
- Began his college coaching career as an assistant coach for three seasons under Carl Tacy at Wake Forest (1977-79). The Deacs were 53-33 during that time, including a 22-8 campaign in 1976-77 when they advanced to the NCAA Midwest Region finals, matching the school's farthest progress in postseason play in the past 35 years.
- Odom became head coach at East Carolina in 1979, and led the Pirates to a 38-42 record in the difficult world of a Division I independent from 1980-82. His first Pirate squad, however, compiled a 16-11 record, the school's best since 1975.
- · Was an assistant coach under Terry Holland at Virginia (1983-89), where the team compiled a 142-83 (63.1 winning percentage) overall record during the seven years that Odom was involved in its program, making post-season appearances every year except 1988. Five of those seasons, the Cavaliers were among the NCAA championship field, including a trip to the Final Four in 1984.



Combining outstanding basketball knowledge with a good sense of humor, Rick Duckett is in the sixth year of his second showing with the Garnet and Black.

Prior to joining Coach Odom's staff in 2002, Duckett was head coach at Winston-Salem State for three seasons. Duckett's first tour on a Gamecock staff was an assistant coach for USC head coach Bill Foster for the 1985-86 season.

Duckett is responsible for recruiting, scouting, working with the perimeter players in practice and overseeing the academic area for the student-athletes. Graduation is job one with the Gamecock basketball team. Of the 2006 senior class, Rocky Trice graduated in May, 2006 and Tarence Kinsey recently completed his degree. The senior class of 2005 of John Chappell, Josh Gonner, Jon Land and Carlos Powell all walked across the stage for graduation.

Duckett, who also was the head coach at Fayetteville State for five seasons, combines with Coach Odom for 25 years of head coaching experience on the Gamecock staff.

Duckett had a remarkable record at Winston-Salem State in his three seasons there. He led the squad to a combined 73-19 mark, while capturing the CIAA championship in 1999 and 2000. Duckett had a five-year mark of 76-57 at Fayetteville State (1994-98), leaving his eight-year head coaching

tally at an impressive 149-76 (.662). In both 1999 and 2000, Duckett earned the CIAA Tournament Coaches Award, and he also was the NCAA Division II South Atlantic Coach of the Year in 1999.

Duckett earned a Bachelor's degree in Education from the University of North Carolina in 1979 and a Master's degree in Education in 1980 from UNC. In his time at UNC, he served as an undergraduate assistant for the Tar Heels and went on to become the junior varsity coach and a graduate assistant coach during the 1979-80 season.

He continued his coaching career the following season, spending two years as an assistant at Harvard (1981-82) before returning to his high school alma mater, R.J. Reynolds, as an assistant coach for one season (1983). He spent one season at Jacksonville University (1984) and at the University of Central Florida (1985) before serving one season on the staff of Bill Foster at South Carolina (1986). Duckett then spent six seasons as an assistant at Wichita State (1987-92), helping lead the Shockers to two NCAA Tournament appearances and an NIT showing. Prior to his head coaching assignment at Fayetteville State (1994-98), he returned to R.J. Reynolds High as an assistant coach for one season (1993).

Duckett is married to the former Letita Miller. They have a son, Philip (19), and a daughter, Keigan (15).

Familiar with Coach Odom's system as a former assistant at Wake Forest, Ken Potosnak joined the Carolina staff in June of 2005. Potosnak hit the ground running, helping the Gamecocks recruit one of its deepest classes in years two years in a row.

Prior to coming to South Carolina, Potosnak was an assistant coach under then-head coach Larry Davis at Furman University for eight years. Under Davis, Furman enjoyed its best two seasons since the early 1990s. Furman was 17-12 in 2004, including an 8-8 mark in the Southern Conference (SoCon). A year later, FU was 16-13 overall and 9-7 in league play. It was the first time in 13 years Furman had a winning record in the league, including a late season victory over 2005 NCAA Tournament participant Tennessee-Chattanooga on the Mocs homecourt. In addition, Potosnak aided Furman's efforts in making the 2003 SoCon finals for the first time in 25 seasons. In the finals, the Paladins fell 64-59 to NCAA Tournament participant Davidson.

Potosnak played a major role in the Paladins rebuilding efforts, investing time and energy in every aspect of the program, including domestic and international recruiting. His numerous contacts and hard work aided the school's efforts in finding international talent who made major contributions to the program. Three of Potosnak's top international recruits, Brazilian guard Guilherme Da Luz, French forward Karim Souchu and Senegalese forward Malaye Ndoye, were All-SoCon performers during their outstanding careers.

Potosnak's domestic focus was primarily the

Southeast, where Furman secured a pair of topnotch performers in Quan Prowell (Columbus, Georgia), the 2005 SoCon Freshman-of-the-Year and Robby Bostain (Lilburn, Ga.), the 2005 So-Con's top scoring freshman


and Hobby Bostain (Lilburn, Ga.), the 2005 So-Con's top scoring freshman.

Prior to joining the Paladin staff, Potosnak served as an assistant at The Citadel (1992-97) for five seasons. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Wake Forest in 1990, where he served alongside then-Wake Forest head coach Dave Odom. During his two-year stay in Winston-Salem, the Deacons made consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament with teams that featured future NBA stars Randolph Childress, Rodney Rogers, Chris King and Anthony Tucker. In addition to his work as a collegiate coach, Potosnak also has a wide resume of experience as a clinic and camp coach both domestically and internationally. Stateside, Potosnak has been a familiar face both as a player, counselor and coach at the Five-Star Basketball Camp where he initially met Coach Odom. His international clinic stops have included Spain, Greece, Turkey and China.

Potosnak is a 1990 graduate of Randolph-Macon College in Ashland, Va. Playing for the legendary Hal Nunnally at Randolph-Macon, Potosnak helped lead the Yellow Jackets to two top 25 finishes in 1989 (No. 22) and 1990 (No. 14). As a senior guard in 1990, he was named Randolph-Macon's Scholar Athlete-of-the-Year.

A native of New Kensington, Pa., Potosnak later earned a master's degree from Wake Forest University in 1992.

Part of his pedigree, basketball is in the Sanderson blood. From a basketball family, Sanderson's father Wimp and brothers Scott and Jim all belong to the college coaching fraternity.

Barry Sanderson is in his seventh season at South Carolina and his seventh year alongside Gamecock Coach Dave Odom. Sanderson is responsible for scouting, recruiting and working with perimeter players in practice. He is also the Director of the Team Camp in the summer.

He is the son of legendary coach Wimp Sanderson and the younger brother of Scott, who played for coach Bill Foster at USC from 1981-84. Scott is the head coach of Lipscomb University in Nashville, Tenn. The Bisons' were on USC's schedule last year and the Gamecocks ruined his homecoming with a 75-68 win.

A 1990 graduate of the University of Alabama, Sanderson has been a part of winning and successful teams everywhere he has coached. Prior to his stint at Wake Forest, Sanderson was a top assistant at Lipscomb, where he helped that squad produce a 34-4 record and a No. 2 national ranking in 1999-2000.

Prior to his one-year stint on the NAIA level, Sanderson helped build three different Division I programs.

During the 1998-99 season, Sanderson worked


in the state of North Carolina as an assistant coach at East Carolina. As part of one of the nation's youngest coaching staffs (head coach Joe Dooley -- a former South Carolina assistant coach -- was 33 at the time), the Pirates produced a winning record and posted non-conference wins over the Gamecocks and Evansville.

From 1992 through the 1998 season, he served in a variety of positions for six seasons at Arkansas-Little Rock, where he worked as a successful recruiter and helped coach players such as NBA first-round draft pick Derek Fisher. During his stay at UALR, the Trojans captured the Sun Belt Conference regular-season title (1995-96), posting a 23-7 record with an NIT berth that same season. For four of his six seasons in Little Rock, he worked under his father, head coach Wimp Sanderson, who served 38 years as a college coach.

Sanderson's career began as a student assistant coach at Alabama, where he worked all four seasons as an undergraduate.

After earning his bachelor's degree at Alabama in 1990, he worked at Texas A&M during the 1990-91 season as a graduate assistant coach. The next season, he worked in the same capacity at Georgia (1991-92).

Spending 10 years at Furrman as a coach, he spent the first nine seasons as an assistant before being promoted to associate head coach.
