University Administration



As one of the nation's oldest statesupported institutions of higher education, the University of South Carolina is in its third century of service to the people and state of South Carolina.

The 2001 bicentennial celebration of the university's charter in 1801 marked a new era in the life of the university. Today, USC President Dr. Andrew A. Sorensen has set a goal of having USC become one of the nation's top 50 public universities.

Scholarships and Research Productivity

USC's freshman class continues to grow in academic excellence. In 2003 - 2004, USC captured a record number of awards in national competitions. USC students were awarded more than 50 scholarships, fellowships and honorable mentions in the prestigious Fulbright, Truman, Goldwater, National Science Foundation, National Security Education Program, Rhodes and Rotary International Scholarship programs. Since 1994, when the USC Office of Fellowships and Scholar Programs was established, USC students have won approximately 250 national awards totaling more than \$6.2 million for advanced academic

The University also is attracting top research grants. A \$2.5 million grant from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration to researchers in USC's College of Science and Mathematics, added to a \$1 million grant received earlier from NASA, will enable scientists to use satellite data to look for environmental trouble spots in the United States. Together, these grants will allow USC researchers to search for potential problem areas worldwide where climate change most likely will affect coastal communities. Their work will involve cutting-edge remote sensing, modeling and physiological approaches.

Selected Program Rankings

• USC's programs for first-year students were cited in the 2004 "America's Best Colleges Guide," as being a national model. The guide, published by U.S.News & World Report, listed USC and 32 other colleges under the heading,

"First-Year Experiences," and under the broad category, "Programs to Look For."

- USC's international business degree for undergraduates is ranked No. 1 in U.S.News & World Report, 2004 Best Colleges Guide. The graduate international business program is ranked No. 2 in the country, also in U.S. News & World Report, Best Graduate Schools issue,
- USC libraries rank in the top 50 for overall size of collections among more than 3,000 college and university libraries in the United States and Canada, according to the Association of Research Libraries' report.

Dr. Andrew A. Sorensen

Andrew A. Sorensen came to USC after serving as president of the University of Alabama (1996-2002) and provost and vice president for academic affairs at the University of Florida (1990-1996).

Dr. Sorensen also has been executive director of the AIDS Institute at the Johns Hopkins Medical Institutions and director of the School of Public Health at the University of Massachusetts at Amherst. He was a faculty member at Lincoln University, the University of Rochester, and Cornell University.

He also has been a visiting faculty member at the Harvard University School of Medicine and at the University of Cambridge School of Medicine.

Author or editor of seven books and more than 100 articles, he is professor of epidemiology and biostatistics in USC's Arnold School of Public Health.

Dr. Sorensen has focused his work on health policy, health services research, and epidemiology. He holds a bachelor's degree in ethics and master's and doctoral degrees in medical sociology from Yale University. He also earned a B.A. in history from the University of Illinois and a master of public health degree from the University of Michigan.


Currently, he is vice president of the Southeastern Conference and is the past president of the Southern University Conference, past chair of the Southern Universities Research Association Council of Presidents, and a trustee of the Universities Research Association. He was a member of the Public Health Task Force on AIDS for the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, the Education Advisory Committee for President Bush's Transition Team during 2000-2001. He was appointed in 2002 to U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services Tommy Thompson's Advisory Council on Public Health Preparedness.

Donna Sorensen

Donna Ingemie Sorensen holds a baccalaureate degree in chemistry from Wheaton College and master's degrees in nutrition from Cornell University and in chemistry from Weslevan University. She was recently appointed by S.C. Department of Education Superintendent Inez Tenenbaum to serve on the S.C. Department of Education Task Force on Nutrition and Health in Our Youth, a new effort that will examine the problem of childhood obesity. She also is a board member of the Girl Scout Council of the Congaree Area and a board member of the S.C. Arts Foundation. She currently serves as vice chair of the national Board of Directors for the American Social Health Association.

Mrs. Sorensen has focused her volunteer efforts in working with children and young adults, AIDS outreach, Easter Seals, Success by Six, and the Girl Scouts.

The Sorensens have two sons, Aaron and Ben, and a grandson, Art.



In 2002, the University of South Carolina named Dr. Russ Pate as its faculty athletics representative to the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletic Association.

Pate, a professor and former chairman of the department of exercise science at the Arnold School of Public Health, is the school's associate dean for research. Internationally recognized for his research on the link between physical activity and health, Pate is a former president of the American College of Sports Medicine.

His duties will include advising USC President Andrew Sorensen on matters related to the athletics program and working with Dr. Sorensen to determine the university's position on NCAA legislation. Pate also will review the eligibility, admission and progress of all student-athletes. He will assist in evaluating compliance with NCAA regulations, attend SEC and NCAA meetings, serve as the university's voting delegate at the NCAA's annual meetings and participate in the organization's certification program.

Pate's research has been supported by the National Institutes of Health, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the American Heart Association and the U.S. Olympic Committee.


Pate replaces Dr. Susie H. VanHuss, who continues in her role as executive director of USC Foundations and distinguished professor emeritus in the Moore School of Business.

DR. MIKE MCGEE



Athletics Director

Under the capable and strong leadership of Mike McGee, the University of South Carolina athletics department has steadily continued its climb toward the elite in collegiate athletics. During



put together a program that is committed to excellence, with the goals of winning championships, graduating its student-athletes and having a positive impact in the community.

The Gamecock program has emerged as one of the most competitive across the board in the nation, with strong finishes in the NACDA Director's Cup all-sports rankings and consistent top 20 status with the majority of its athletic teams. Two of the past three years has seen Carolina post top 20 finishes in the Director's Cup, with a school-best 11th-place showing in 2002 and a final ranking of #18 in 2003. Among the highlights over the past three years include:

- USC affiliated athletes won seven medals, including four gold medals at the 2004 Athens Olympics - tying them for the most in the SEC
- Three straight appearances in the College World Series by the Gamecock baseball team, with finishes of 2nd, 6th, and 3rd in the nation to its credit
- The women's track team won the school's first-ever national team championship, claiming the 2002 NCAA Outdoor crown
- A record 17 teams competed in post-season competition in 2001-02, with 16 teams qualifying in 2002-03 and 15 teams advancing in 2003-04
- USC has won four SEC championships baseball (2), women's golf, women's outdoor track
- Opened its new 18,000-seat Colonial Center in grand style, with the facility serving as home to Gamecock basketball and class A entertainment never before seen in the Midlands area
- The football team captured the 2002 Outback Bowl championship and finished 13th in the final national rankings. The Gamecocks also put together consecutive top 10 ranked recruiting classes – a first in the program's history
- The men's basketball team was one of the surprise teams in the SEC this past season and won 23 games while advancing to the NCAA Tournament
- The women's basketball team advanced to the NCAA Elite Eight in 2002 and posted back-to-back top 20 national finishes
- Continued the upward trend in academic performance, with the department establishing an all-time best semester grade point average of 2.936 for the spring semester, 2004
- Seen its fund-raising have record-breaking years, with more than \$11.9 million raised through the Gamecock Club this past year, the most in the program's history
- Had the athletics department successfully certified by the NCAA

McGee assumed his duties with South Carolina on Jan. 1, 1993, having brought with him a wealth of administrative experience, national respect among his colleagues and peers and strong leadership skills. Since arriving at Carolina, McGee has made a multitude of positive moves in enhancing the total Gamecock program. Under his direction, the USC program has successfully moved from the Metro Conference (now Conference USA) to the nation's most competitive all-sports conference—the SEC. Carolina's

program is indeed moving in an upward trend under McGee's leadership. USC's emergence in football has captured national headlines, with Lou Holtz-coached teams winning consecutive New Year's Day Bowl games and recording two straight top 20 national finishes. Coaches Curtis Frye (track and field) and Ray Tanner (baseball) have each won National Coach of the Year honors while at Carolina, with Coach Frye being selected as an assistant for Team USA at the 2004 Summer Olympic Games and Coach Tanner leading the Team USA Baseball team last summer at the Pan American Games. McGee has indeed been able to attract some of the top coaches in America to lead the Gamecocks. The past eight seasons, 13 Gamecock head coaches have earned either National Coach of the Year 87 or SEC Coach of the Year accolades.

In 2000, for the first time in the history of the SEC, USC had three of its athletes named National Athlete of the Year in their respective sports, as Kip Bouknight (baseball), Terrence Trammell (men's indoor and outdoor track), and Miki Barber (women's outdoor track) were all named National Athletes of the Year.

McGee has taken steps to improve the department's sports programs by upgrading facilities and making staff additions across the board. Under his watch, the department continues to be a leader in addressing the gender equity issue in a proactive manner, as two women's sports have been added since his arrival. In addition, USC is a leader for hiring female head coaches, as the Gamecocks feature six female head coaches, tops in the SEC.

McGee has been a leader in facilities improvements and additions since coming to South Carolina. With the completion of the new arena, he has overseen more than \$110 million in facilities improvements, including: a south end zone expansion project at Williams-Brice Stadium which raised the seating capacity to more than 80,000; a renovation project to the stadium's west side which includes executive boxes, premium club seats and a new press box; a basketball practice facility and volleyball competition site which includes new offices for both sports; a football office complex in the stadium's north end zone; a state-of-the-art scoreboard with a video display system; remodeled and improved lockerroom, weight room and meeting room facilities at the stadium; additions and improvements to the baseball stadium; a new softball stadium; a new soccer stadium; new football practice fields; refurbishments to the outdoor track facility; and major improvements to the swimming pool. McGee also was instrumental in the development of a landscaping and beautification project around Williams-Brice Stadium that has resulted in significant improvements to the area.

The new \$65 million Colonial Center, which opened in November, 2002, has drawn rave reviews, and is recognized as one of the premier sports and entertainment facilities in the Southeast. Currently under construction is a \$3 million remodeling of the south end zone at Williams-Brice Stadium, including a new weight room, meeting and recruiting rooms.

Under his leadership, fan support at Carolina has never been better. For the sixth-consecutive year, USC has sold out its home season football tickets prior to the season opener. Over the last six-year aggregate period, USC's home football attendance ranks among the Top 10 in the country, with a per game average of better than 80,000. The overall athletics budget has also increased significantly during McGee's tenure. The athletics department generates more than \$45 in annual revenues, reflecting a \$27 million increase since McGee came to Carolina.

The academic progress of the athletics department has continued its steady climb under McGee's watch. USC's graduation rate for its studentathletes consistently has ranked as high as second in the SEC, while the football graduation rate in 2003, as calculated by the American Football Coaches Association, is at an all-time high of 76 percent.

McGee enrolled at Duke University where he was a first-team All-American tackle in football and graduated in 1960 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He earned a Master's degree in 1965 and a Ph.D. from North Carolina in 1982.

McGee won the 1959 Outland Trophy as the nation's outstanding

lineman. He was drafted in the second round by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1960. A neck injury ended his playing career in 1962. McGee began his coaching career as an assistant at Duke (1963-65). He was an assistant coach at Wisconsin (1966) and at Minnesota (1967-69) before being named head coach at East Carolina University in 1970. He returned to Duke as the head football coach for eight seasons (1971-78) where he compiled a 37-47-4 record. McGee was named to the All-ACC Quarter Century Team (1953-78) as a defensive lineman and most recently, was chosen to the ACC's All-Time Team.

He began his administrative career at the University of North Carolina, serving as a special assistant to athletics director Bill Cobey while pursuing his doctorate. He also served as a commentator on ABC college football telecasts in 1979.

McGee was named director of athletics at the University of Cincinnati in 1980 and in 1983, the Bearcats defeated defending national football champion Penn State. In 1984, McGee was named director of athletics at the University of Southern California and during his eight and one-half years at Southern California, the Trojans participated in eight bowl games, including four Rose Bowls (Pac-10 champions).

The Southern California men's program was the nation's highest ranked private institution sports program three of his last four years there and was ranked number two for all institutions in 1990. In the 1992 Olympic games, 24 current or former Trojan athletes in 10 sports competed, winning nine medals. During McGee's tenure at Southern California, fund raising and overall revenue doubled, while the budget was balanced his final seven years there.

McGee has served on numerous NCAA and conference committees. During the last two years of his tenure at Southern California, he represented the Pac-10 Conference on the NCAA Council and served on the Special NCAA Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics. He currently serves on the NCAA Management Council and is a member of the Division 1 Incentives and Disincentives Working Group. He also served on the SEC Task Force Committee on Compliance and Enforcement. McGee was previously a member of the NCAA Division I Working Group to Study Basketball Issues. For four years he served as chair of the NCAA Recruiting Sub-Committee. Together with the athletic departments and business schools of the University of North Carolina and University of Notre Dame, he founded the Sports Management Institute to train future college and professional sports administrators. SMI's partner schools now include South Carolina, Southern Cal, North Carolina, Texas and Michigan.

In 2002, McGee received the Order of the Palmetto by the Governor, which is the highest honor a civilian can receive in the State of South Carolina.

McGee and his wife, Ginger, have four children and 13 grandchildren. Kathy, her husband, Tom, and their children, Lauren, Kyle and Luke; Michael Jr., his wife, Amy, and their children, Alex, Michael III and Samantha; Matthew, his wife, Chantal, and their daughters, Maddison, Abby Grace, Rebekah and Eden; and Jerry, his wife, Alana, and their sons, Graham, Emmett, and Charlie. Four members of the McGee family — Michael Jr., Matthew, Chantal and Tom — are current or former U.S. Air Force pilots.

- Diver Allison Brennan won the NCAA championship in the one-meter competition, helping lead the women's swimming and diving team to a school-best 11th-place finish at the NCAA Championships.
- Adrienne Gautreaux of the women's golf team was a first-team Academic All-America selection and also won the prestigious Dinah Shore Tro-phy as presented by the LPGA, which goes to the most outstanding scholar-athlete in women's collegiate golf.

- The men's track team posted its ninth top 20 finish in the last 11 years at the NCAA Indoor Championships.
- · Cristina Ciocan became the all-time assists leader for USC's women's basketball, while Lauren Simms was named to the SEC All-Freshman
- Men's tennis qualified for its 11 consecutive NCAA Tournament berth.
- In equestrian, Tara Brothers won the national championship in Hunter Seat competition.
- Three members of the USC women's soccer team were named to the SEC All-Freshman squad.
- Men's soccer coach Mark Berson eclipsed the 350 career victory mark this past season.
- The men's golf team earned its ninth straight NCAA Regional Tournament bid.
- The women's tennis team appeared in its 10th straight NCAA Tournament, which ranks as the longest active streak among USC women's
- The softball team qualified for its sixth consecutive NCAA Tournament and Coach Joyce Compton went over the 900 career victory mark.
- The men's swim team finished 20th at the national championships and had two athletes place among the top five in individual events.
- The women's track and field team recorded its ninth straight top 10 finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships.
- Featuring a youthful squad, the volleyball team was led by SEC Co-Freshman of the Year Lynae Vanden Hull.

Athletic Administration

BRAD EDWARDS



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Brad Edwards, who starred on Gamecock football teams from 1984-1987 and enjoyed a sterling nine-year career in the National Football League, is in his sixth year at his alma mater and is the senior associate athletics director for business and development.

Edwards, who was tri-captain of Carolina's 1987 team that finished 8-4, played in the Gator Bowl and ended the year ranked 15th, has a variety of responsibilities in his role with the Gamecocks. His primary responsibilities are serving as the department's chief financial officer and overseeing the business office. He also is the department liaison to all the various agencies and licensees for The Colonial Center and for Williams-Brice Stadium. The Gamecock Club

Thousands of student-athletes have received their education at the University of South Carolina through the generous contributions of the Gamecock Club, the University's official athletic booster and fund-raising organization.

The right arm of the Gamecock athletic department started in 1942 and in its 62-year existence has grown to the point that annual donations have surpassed the \$11.9 million mark. The Gamecock Club was one of the nation's first athletic fund-raising bodies to top \$1 million in contributions when that goal became a reality in 1977.

Hosts of alumni and zealous fans of Gamecock and Lady Gamecock athletes have joined themselves in a "Commitment to Excellence" through their financial support in educating the young men and women who proudly wear the Garnet and Black and represent the University of South Carolina.

The Gamecock Club is recognized by the State and Federal Government as an eleemosynary and tax exempt entity, in order that individual contributions are eligible for deduction.

The charter of the Gamecock Club is approved by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), the Southeastern Conference, the University of South Carolina and the athletic director of the University of South Carolina, main campus. Its sole purpose is to provide financial aid to student-athletes in 20 varsity sports. This aid is in the form of recruitment, tuition fees and charges, meal cost, housing cost, medical cost, injury insurance and rehabilitation expense, as well as special education needs and tutorial sessions.

Funds raised by the Gamecock Club are used for supporting student-athletes who qualify on the basis of prescribed levels of scholastic achievement established by the National Collegiate Athletic Association and by the Scholarship Committee of the University of South Carolina, in addition to meeting the standards of athletic ability and achievement set by the respective coaching staffs.

The 53 chapter presidents constitute the Board of Directors, which governs the club. An elected 17-member executive council meets regularly to make recommendations concerning policy matters.

By virtue of its contributions, the Gamecock Club continues to rank as one of the nation's leaders among booster clubs.

Gamecock Club membership is open to any alumnus or friend of the University – anyone interested in the advancement of the University and its athletic program.


