# CAROLINA BASEBALL

## GAMECOCKS WIN 41 IN 2005, EARN SIXTH STRAIGHT NCAA BID

South Carolina tallied 41 victories in 2005 and earned its sixth consecutive bid to the NCAA Regionals but the Gamecocks fell short of participating in a sixth consecutive Super Regional and a fourth straight trip to the College World Series. The Gamecocks participated in the NCAA Regionals for the 21st time in school history.

Carolina won three games in the regional tournament hosted by Georgia Tech in Atlanta but was shut out in a final showdown with the Yellow Jackets to miss a berth in the Super Regional by one game.

Two years earlier, the Gamecocks won the Atlanta Regional then advanced to Omaha with a home field sweep of North Carolina in the Super Regional. Carolina also advanced to Omaha in 2002 and 2004 finishing second to Texas in 2002 and third in 2004.

### Ten Win Start

The 2005 season got off to a good start as the Gamecocks won 10 consecutive home games before flying to Minneapolis to compete in the Dairy Queen Classic, hosted by the University of Minnesota at the Metrodome.

The 10-game season-opening homestand included three game sweeps of Longwood (5-1, 4-1, 13-3), Radford (20-0, 16-4, 7-4) and Niagara (8-3, 19-1, 6-3), plus a 13-1 win over Wofford.

The competition was stiffer in Minneapolis as Carolina trailed California entry Pepperdine, 7-1, after eight innings. A four-run rally in the bottom of the ninth inning fell two runs short and the Gamecocks dropped from the unbeaten list.

Steven Tolleson collected four hits and Michael Campbell homered as Carolina bounced back with an 18-hit attack to drub host Minnesota, 13-6, and closed out the three-game indoor series with a 9-3 win over New Orleans. Brendan Winn contributed a home run. Designated hitter Jon Willard, Winn and second baseman Chris Brown made the all-tournament team.

Carolina returned home with an 11-1 record and made it 12-1 as four pitchers combined to shutout Charleston Southern 1-0. Steve Pearce drove in the only run and Andrew Cruse was the winning pitcher.

The Gamecocks traveled to Clemson for the first of the annual four game series with the Tigers and recorded a 6-3 win. Aaron Rawl improved his season record to 4-1. Brown and Winn led a 12-hit attack with home runs.

The rivalry switched to Sarge Frye Field the next day and the Gamecocks made it 2-0 over the Tigers with a 6-5 win. Pearce hit a two-run home run and Carolina staged a three-run eighth inning rally aided by a Michael Campbell triple, a double by Winn and a Clemson error.

### SEC

A 6-2 win over Wofford in the second of the fourth scheduled games with the Terriers lifted the Gamecocks' record to 16-1 entering Southeastern Conference competition against the Arkansas Razorbacks at Sarge Frye Field. Carolina won

the middle game 12-3 but lost 9-1 in the opener and 5-3 in the rubber match to begin the conference season 1-2.

A mid-week non-conference 10-1 win over Davidson preceded a trip to Gainesville to tackle the Florida Gators. Aaron Rawl and Jason Fletcher combined to register a 2-0 shutout in the first game with Tommy King and Davy Gregg driving in a run apace. Florida rallied to take the next two games, however, 7-3, 6-1 and the Gamecocks were 2-4 in SEC games after two series. The overall record was 19-5.

That stretched to 21-5 with two mid-week wins, 7-2 over Brown and 4-2 at the Citadel.

The Georgia Bulldogs came to Sarge Frye Field and Carolina recorded its first SEC sweep of the season with scores of 7-5, 17-2 and 6-1. Steve Pearce homered twice in the series and Mark Stanley had five hits in the final two games as the conference record improved to 5-4, 24-5 overall.

Carolina used eight pitchers in a 9-4 Sarge Frye Field win over The Citadel with Andy Lambert receiving credit for the win to improve his record to 3-0.

### Sweep LSU

The Gamecocks traveled to Baton Rouge and notched their first ever sweep of LSU. The scores were 3-1, 5-1 and 7-5 to boost the conference record to 8-4 and the overall mark to 28-5. Jason Fletcher allowed five and one run in 8.1 innings to win the series opener. The stellar pitching continued the next day as Zac McCamie pitched a complete game, allowing five hits to earn SEC Pitcher of the Week honors and improve his record to 7-1. Aaron Rawl closed out the weekend with a solid 6.2 innings of work to complete the sweep as his record rose to 6-2.

Mark Stanley, Steve Pearce and Davy Gregg each had two hits in the first LSU game. Gregg and Pearce had two hits in the second contest with Pearce logging a homer and Michael Campbell homered twice and Ian Paxton once in the third game.

The third victory of the LSU series was Ray Tanner's 400th win as a Gamecock.

The nine-game win streak came to a halt with a 12-2 loss at Clemson. The Tigers hit four home runs in a 15-hit attack to win their first victory in three ties against the Gamecocks.

Vanderbilt stretched Carolina's losing streak to three games before the Gamecocks rallied to take the final game of the SEC series at Sarge Frye Field.

Carolina avoided a sweep with a 7-4 victory behind Aaron Rawl. Steven Tolleson homered and Davy Gregg, Michael Campbell each had two hits.

Clemson evened the series at two wins apace with a four-run ninth inning rally and a 7-5 win. A three-run homer by Kris Harvey did most of the damage.

After losing the first two games at Alabama 6-4 and 10-4, Carolina avoided a Crimson Tide sweep with a 5-2 victory in the third game, sparked by a home run from Steven Tolleson and three hits by Michael Campbell.

In a home series with Auburn, Carolina lost the first game 4-1 but took two one-run victories 3-2 and 8-7 to win the series and boost the SEC record to 12-9, 32-12 overall.

The longest losing streak of the season followed as the Gamecocks were upset 6-2 by Furman at Greenville and were swept at Tennessee 3-2, 6-5 and 11-5. The four losses were the most consecutive losses since 2003, ironically to the same two teams, when the Gamecocks lost three at Tennessee and one at Furman.

Mark Stanley, who was batting .311 after breaking into the starting lineup either in the outfield or as the designated hitter, was lost for the season when he fractured a finger while hitting for a base hit to lead off the first Tennessee game.

Carolina broke the losing streak with a 12-0 win over Wofford, the fourth victory of the season over the Terriers but the Gamecocks were upset at home, 11-5 by Furman, the second loss to the Paladins.

In the series opener at Ole Miss, Aaron Rawl pitched a three-hit complete game shutout to win 2-0. He struck out six and walked none, but Carolina lost the next two games and the series 7-2 and 8-4, to fall below .500 in the SEC at 13-14, 34-19 overall.

## Sweep Wildcats

Kentucky came to Sarge Frye Field to close out the regular season and Carolina responded with a sweep to finish with a conference mark of 16-14. Brendan Winn, who battled injuries all season, closed out his home career with eight hits as the Gamecocks won 9-7, 12-9, 12-1. Winn had three doubles and four RBI in the series. Steve Pearce had six hits including a home run and Michael Campbell chipped in with five hits. Also highlighting the weekend was a grand slam by Neil Giesler in Saturday's matinee that tied the game in the eighth inning and led to USC winning the game on a three-run homer by Steven Tolleson.

Carolina opened the Southeastern Conference Tournament at Hoover, Ala. against Tennessee, which had recently swept the Gamecocks at Knoxville. Carolina responded with an 18 hit attack and a 12-2 victory. Steve Pearce went 4-for-4 with a home run. Neil Giesler was 4-for-5 with a pair of doubles. Davy Gregg also went 3-for-5.

That was it for the Gamecocks in the SEC tournament, however. They dropped a 6-2 decision to Mississippi State and lost a 4-1 rematch with Tennessee.

Third baseman Neil Giesler was named to the SEC All-Tournament team. In three games he had six hits in 11 at bats. Two Carolina players were named to the regular season All-SEC team. Shortstop Steven Tolleson was named to the first team and first baseman Steve Pearce to the second team.

Carolina awaited an at large bid to the NCAA Tournament. The Michigan Wolverines of the Big Ten Conference furnished the opening opposition in the regional at Atlanta.

Carolina led 5-4 after eight innings behind Aaron Rawl but relief pitcher Brent Marsh gave up a pair of hits and a run in the top of the ninth inning to tie the score. In the bottom of the ninth inning Davy Gregg beat out a bunt, was sacrificed to

second, stole third and scored the winning run on a base hit by Steve Pearce.

Georgia Tech, with a 43-16 record, defeated the Gamecocks, 10-2, behind the complete game pitching of Blake Wood.

With their backs to the wall, the Gamecocks put together one of the finest single day performances with back-to-back wins over Michigan and Georgia Tech to stay alive in the NCAA Regional.

The Gamecocks earned their second one run victory over Michigan. Zac McCamie pitched 7.2 innings for his ninth win and Brent Marsh earned his 11th save.

Having achieved their 40th win, the Gamecocks remained alive but had to defeat Georgia Tech twice to advance to the super regional.

Andy Lambert pitched 5.2 innings and Jason Fletcher followed with 3.1 shutout innings as Carolina forced an extra game with an 8-3 victory. Lambert remained unbeaten as a Gamecock with a 4-0 record. Steve Pearce homered twice, increasing his season total to 21 and Michael Campbell also homered. They had three runs batted in apiece.

The Cinderella story ended, however, as Georgia Tech shut the Gamecocks out 5-0 behind the pitching of Tim Gustafson and Matt Wieters. Aaron Rawl, pitching on two days rest, took the loss to drop his senior season record to 9-6. Rawl's 35 career wins moved him into third place on Carolina's all-time list.

Third baseman Neil Giesler, outfielder Michael Campbell and first baseman Steve Pearce were named to the Atlanta Regional All-Tournament Team. In five Regional games, Pearce had seven hits including three home runs and drove in four. Campbell had four hits including a homer and four RBI. Giesler's five hits included a double and a homer and he drove in five.

The final record was 41-23, the sixth consecutive season that Carolina has reached or topped the 40+ win mark and the 18th overall. Tanner has won more than 40 games in seven of his nine seasons with the Gamecocks.

## Triple Crown

For the second consecutive season first baseman Steve Pearce won the triple crown, leading the team in batting with a .358 average, in home runs with 21 and runs batted in with 63. He led a contingent of five Gamecocks who were drafted and signed professional baseball contracts.

Pearce signed with the Pirates, outfielder Davy Gregg with the Cubs, shortstop Steven Tolleson with the Twins, right-handed pitcher Zac McCamie with the Marlins and right-handed pitcher Aaron Rawl with the Phillies. Two left-handed pitchers, Arik Hempy and Forrest Beverly, were also drafted but both returned for their junior seasons with the Gamecocks in 2006.

## The SEC In Omaha

- The SEC has sent 32 teams to the College World Series since 1990. That was accomplished despite no SEC teams making the field in 1992. LSU has been to Omaha 10 times and Florida four times, while South Carolina, Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi State and Tennessee have been three times each. Auburn has been once while Arkansas advanced in 2004.

- SEC teams have won six of the last 16 national championships, with LSU winning five (1991, 1993, 1996, 1997, 2000) and Georgia claiming the 1990 title. The SEC has finished runner up three times in that time, 1997, 2002 and 2005.

- SEC teams were 61-55 since 1990 in Omaha, a 52.6 winning percentage. Not counting games against each other, the SEC has a 46-41 record in the CWS since 1990, a 52.9 winning percentage.

- The SEC has played 25 games in the "Final Four" of the College World Series since 1990, an average of over 1.5 per year. Only three times, 1992, 1994 and 2003, has the SEC failed to get a team to the "Final Four" of the CWS.

- The SEC has averaged almost eight games played per year in the College World Series since 1990. In 2004, 12 of the 15 games played in Omaha involved a SEC team. In 1997, the SEC had a team in 13 of the 14 games played in the CWS. Since 1990, an SEC team played in 101 of the 223 games played in the College World Series, an amazing 45 percent of games.

- The SEC has sent nine of its 12 schools to the College World Series since 1990 - Alabama, Arkansas, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, LSU, Mississippi State, South Carolina and Tennessee.

- Since 1990, 100 SEC squads have been invited to the NCAA Tournament, an average over six per season. The SEC set yet another NCAA record in both 2004 and 2005 with nine teams earning postseason berths. The SEC also had a NCAA-record five teams earn regional host sites in 2004.

- The SEC has had an NCAA-high 10 different teams compete in the 56-year history of the College World Series. In those appearances, the conference has registered a 83-96 record, a 46.4 winning percentage.

- Since 1990, 22 SEC squads have posted 50+ win seasons, while 77 have won 40+ games in a season including seven teams in 2005.

- The SEC posted a 274-77 record against non-conference foes in 2004, a 78.1 winning percentage. Since 1990, the SEC has accumulated a 3812-1444-4 record against non-conference teams, a 72.5 winning percentage.

- SEC teams have also been strong in the polls. Since 1990, 75 conference teams have appeared in the final *Baseball America* poll, 79 in the final *Collegiate Baseball* poll and, since 1992, 71 in the final *Baseball Weekly* poll.
