DURHAM, N.C. — South Carolina played its first NCAA match ever outside the state of South Carolina and came away with a hard-luck 3-2 loss to the highly-regarded Blue Devils at Duke Field. The Gamecocks had lost to the Blue Devils 3-2 in overtime earlier in the year and were poised for revenge after Gavin Coombs scored nine minutes into the game.

But after Duke tied the game at the 22:47 mark on a goal by Steve Kerr, the Blue Devils pushed another goal across when Tommy Loeber and goalie Chris Foley collided on a crossing pass, sending both players to the hospital. Duke would score again just 28 seconds later for a 3-1 lead, but Carolina fought back to a 3-2 halftime deficit after a Dan Ratcliff unassisted goal with less than a minute to play.

The Gamecocks would not go quietly, though. Just over two minutes later, junior Greg Reece rifled a shot and Wiggins earned the save with a deflection, but Deter hustled after the loose ball and headed the ball just across the goal line to bring USC back to within a goal.

Carolina's furious rally continued, but came up short. After being out-shot 13-7, the Gamecocks turned the tables, out-shooting Charleston, 18-7, in the final 45 minutes.

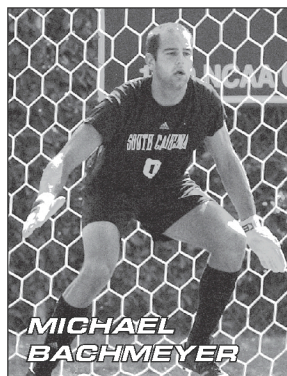
Both goalkeepers had busy nights. Sophomore goalkeeper Brad Guzan finished with seven saves, while USC forced Wiggins to stop 10 shots.

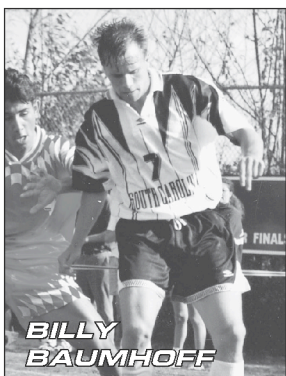

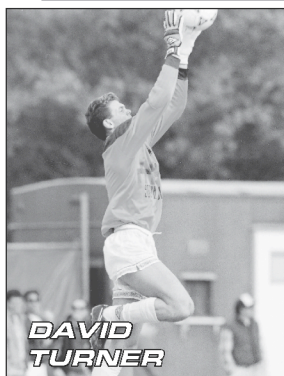




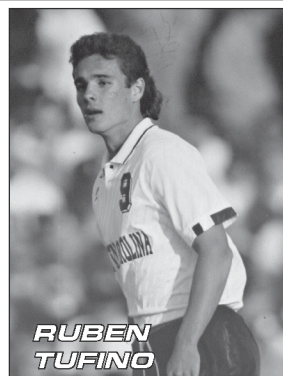

## JOHN M. JOHNSON AWARD

The John M. Johnson, Jr. Memorial Award was established in 1982 to recognize South Carolina's Most Valuable Player during the season. The award is voted upon each season by the players and coaches and is presented at the annual team banquet following play each fall.

The award is given in the memory of John Johnson, an avid South Carolina soccer fan and lifelong supporter of the Gamecock soccer team and the entire University of South Carolina athletic program. Johnson is survived by his wife who presents the award each year. Henry Ring (1999-2000), Mike Solano (1995-96) and Tommy Loeber (1989-90) have each earned the honor twice.

## BRIAN WINSTEAD AWARD

The Brian Winstead Memorial Award was established to honor the memory of Carolina soccer great Brian Winstead, who was killed in a private plane crash in December 2004. A pioneer for Gamecock soccer, Winstead was the first player to sign a scholarship agreement with USC in the men's soccer program's inaugural season in 1978.

Winstead went on to lead the Gamecocks in scoring in both of his seasons in Columbia, and in 1978, he became the first South Carolina player ever to earn All-South Region honors. He also served as a team captain in 1979. Winstead's name remains etched in the South Carolina record books to this day. In just two seasons, he scored 80 points, which ranks eighth for points in a career.

## ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

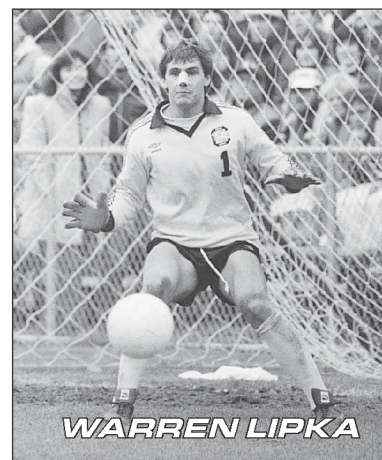
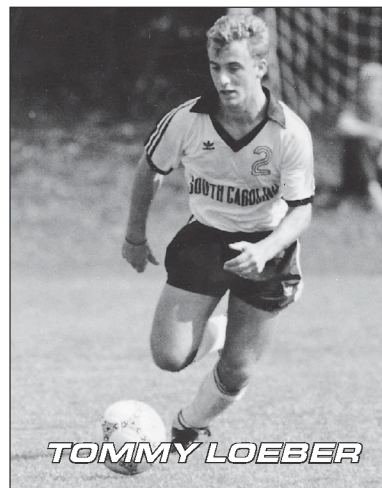
South Carolina has established the finest of all traditions in the college soccer world with its promotion of the student-athlete concept. As an illustration of that fact, no fewer than 12 Gamecocks overall and 10 different players have been named to an Academic All-America team over the past 15 seasons.

Gamecocks who have received the honor have displayed a combination of fine athletic ability to go along with the classroom success. Defender Greg King was a three-year starter and earned 1994 honors on the GTE Academic All-America first team squad. Defender Peter Duitsman, a native of Naperville, Ill., was selected as an Academic All-America after serving as the Gamecocks' team captain in 1993. Ruben Tufino earned Freshman of the Year honors from Soccer America in 1989 and is the school's eighth leading scorer. Charles Arndt was the National Goalkeeper of the Year in 1988 while earning Academic All-America honors the same year. Former Gamecock assistant

coach Doug Allison, a 1988 graduate with a degree in physical education from South Carolina, captured Academic All-America honors after the 1986 and 1987 seasons. Ragnar Thorarinsson, who played for South Carolina in 1984 and 1985, was the first Gamecock ever to be chosen to the squad. Along with receiving the award in 1985, Thorarinsson started in the midfield for USC's South Region championship team.

## UMBRO SELECT COLLEGE ALL-STAR CLASSIC

South Carolina's first participant in the prestigious College Soccer All-Star Classic (formerly known as the ISAA Senior Bowl) was goalkeeper Paul Turin in 1979 while David Burr played in the game in 1982. Since then, the Gamecocks have posted participants in 10 of the last 14 years, including defender Bill Hency (1986), forward Doug Allison (1987), goalkeeper Charles Arndt (1988), defender Tommy Loeber (1990), forward Andrew Coggins (1991), defender Billy Clifford (1995) and midfielder Clint Mathis. Most recently, defender Chris Morman (1999), goalkeeper Henry Ring (2000), forward Joey Worthen (2001), forward Jordan Quinn (2002) and defender Tim Glowienka (2002) have joined the elite group.





**ALL-SOUTH REGION TEAM**

With the selection of Brad Guzan to the 2004 All-South Region team, 36 different Gamecocks occupy 54 spaces on the all-time listing since head coach Mark Berson started the South Carolina program in 1978.

Fourteen Carolina players made the All-South Region team more than once during their career, including three-time honorees Doug Allison, Chris Faklaris and Rob Smith.

The Gamecocks have continued their fine success on the All-South Region team especially since the 1983 season. South Carolina has placed at least two players on the All-South team for 15 out of 17 seasons with four players being named to the squad in the 1986, 1987 and 1994 seasons.

**GOALKEEPER OF THE YEAR**

One of the most prestigious awards on the national college soccer scene is "Goalkeeper of the Year," so named by adidas and the NSCAA. Within a four-year span, South Carolina brought home two of those awards — Warren Lipka winning in 1985 and Charles Arndt in 1988.

Arndt became one of USC's best players ever after a sparkling senior campaign that saw him engineer 13 shutouts for the Gamecocks en route to a Final Four finish in the NCAA Tournament. Arndt broke Lipka's long-standing record for minutes played in a career and has the best career goals against average in school history — allowing a goal every one-and-a-half games for a 0.70 career mark. Arndt was also named All-South, All-American, Academic All-American and John M. Johnson award winner after the 1988 season.

Lipka became the Gamecocks' first-ever "Goalkeeper of the Year" award winner in 1985, after South Carolina completed what is still the best school record in history (20-3-1) while advancing to the NCAA quarterfinals. Lipka played 2,155 minutes in goal that season (still a school best) while being a part of 15 shutouts in 24 matches that year for another school standard.

**GAMECOCK CAPTAINS**

Since the beginning of the South Carolina soccer program in 1978, 40 different Gamecocks have donned the Garnet and Black as captains. Last season, juniors Greg Reece and Eric Szeszycki were joined by sophomore Brad Guzan as team captains.

**H. BOYD MCWHORTER SEC MALE SCHOLAR-ATHLETE OF THE YEAR**

Peter Duitsman, South Carolina's 1993 team captain, earned the prestigious 1994 H. Boyd McWhorter Male Scholar Athlete of the Year from the Southeastern Conference. The \$10,000 postgraduate scholarship is presented by the SEC. A native of Naperville, Ill., Duitsman posted a 3.84 grade point average in Economics and was named an NSCAA Academic All-American in 1993.

**INDEPENDENT ALL-STAR TEAMS**

Beginning with the 1998 season, the nine Independent teams voted on All-Independent all-star teams. Six Gamecocks were named to the All-Independent teams in '98, four to the first team and two to the second-team. John Harr, Jonas Myltenberg and Scott Campagna joined Henry Ring on the first team. Harr and Myltenberg were a part of the USC offense that outscored its opponent 47-14.

Midfielder Ryan O'Neill and forward Joey Worthen were named to the second team. Worthen also earned the honor of Co-Rookie of the Year. Head Coach Mark Berson also earned postseason accolades by earning Independent Coach of the Year honors.

In 1999, four Gamecocks represented South Carolina on the All-Independent squads. Senior defender Chris Morman made his first appearance on the first team, while fellow senior Ryan O'Neill makes his second appearance after making the second team last season. Sophomore forward Joey Worthen also made the move from second team in '98 to first team in '99. Worthen led the team in scoring with 11 goals and five assists for 27 points.

Freshman Tim Glowienka rounded out the list by making the second team. The midfielder started all 19 matches as a freshman and ended the season with three goals and two assists for eight points.

In 2000, eight of the Independent teams formed the Atlantic Soccer Conference, leaving South Carolina as a true independent.

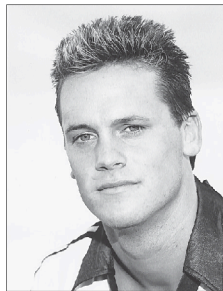

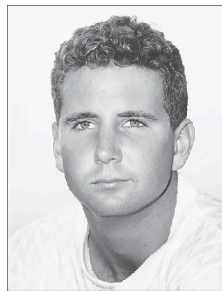

### DOUG ALLISON

*1987 • Forward*

Allison is the school's all-time leading point (158) and goal scorer (63). He led Carolina in scoring all four of his years and went to the NCAA Tournament three straight years from 1985-87. A native of Barnstaple, England, Allison was the school's first first-team All-American. He is currently the head coach at cross-state rival Furman.



### CLARK BRISSON

*1989 • Forward*

Brisson earned All-America honors after leading USC with a then-school record 50 points (21g, 8a). Brisson closed out his career in 1990 with 98 points (36g, 26a), good for third all-time in USC history. In Brisson's four-year career, USC compiled an amazing 61-14-11 (.773) mark and advanced to the NCAA Tournament four times.



### MARTY BALTZEGAR

*1987 • Defender*

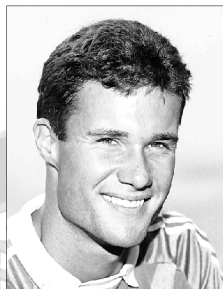
Baltzegar was named a second-team All-American after anchoring a stifling defense that allowed only 10 goals all year, two coming on penalty kicks. Baltzegar joined teammate Doug Allison as Carolina's first ever All-American honorees. Baltzegar scored 24 career points on six goals and 12 assists.

Loeber was a first-team All-America selection by the NSCAA. He led a defense that only allowed 19 goals all year while advancing to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Loeber, an Arlington, Texas native, started more games than anyone in Carolina history, notching 87 starts in 87 games. He finished his career with six points on two goals and two assists.



### CHARLES ARNDT

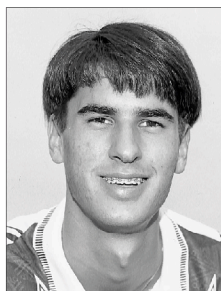
*1988 • Goalkeeper*

A first-team All-America selection, Arndt compiled 13 shutouts while leading the Gamecocks to their first semifinal appearance in the NCAA Tournament during his senior campaign. For his efforts, Arndt was named National Goalkeeper of the Year. He holds career school records for goals against average (0.70) and combined shutouts (29). Arndt is an assistant coach

with former teammate Doug Allison at Furman.

Carolina's second all-time leading scorer with 124 points (55g, 14a), Faklaris led the Gamecocks to their first National Championship appearance in 1993.



**BRAD GUZAN**

*2004 • Goalkeeper*

Guzan earned second-team All-America honors from the NSCAA in his second and final season as a Gamecock in 2004. He was also a semifinalist for the Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Trophy and one of Soccer American's 11 Collegiate MVPs.

The Homer Glen, Ill., native played every minute in goal of his two seasons at Carolina. He compiled an 0.96 goal-against average as a freshman and totaled nine shutouts, both of which rank among the best ever for a freshman at South Carolina. As a sophomore he added five more shutouts to his resume and finished with a 1.34 goals-against average.

Guzan turned opted to turn pro following his sophomore season and was the No. 2 pick in the Major League Soccer SuperDraft. Expansion-club CD Chivas USA made Guzan the highest goalkeeper ever drafted. He started as a rookie in goal for Chivas.



**ROB SMITH**

*1994 • Midfielder*

Smith, a third-team All-American selection, ended his career as the all-time Carolina leader in assists with 40. A starter in all 84 matches of his four-year career, Smith is tied for seventh all-time in Carolina scoring with 78 points (19g, 40a). Smith, who played for the MLS's Columbus Crew, completed his degree at USC in 2001. He represented the United States at the 1996 Olympic Games in Atlanta, Ga.

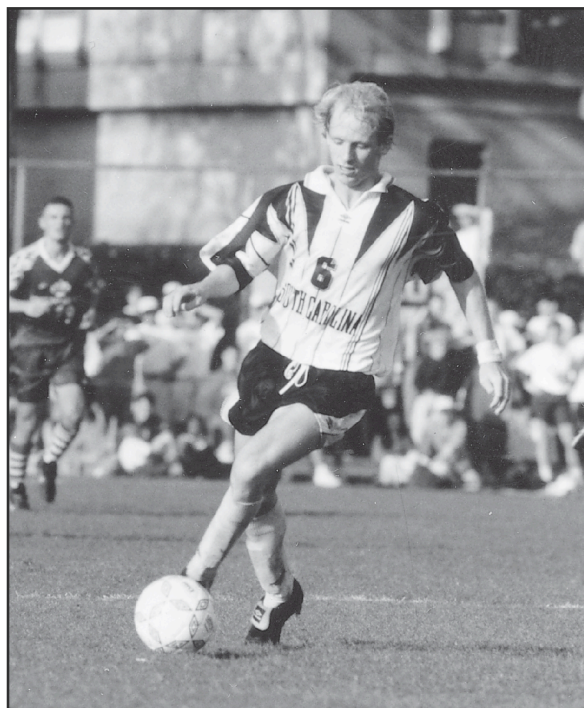


**CLINT MATHIS**

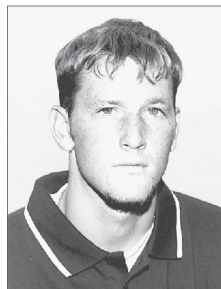
*1995 & 1997 • Midfielder*

Mathis set three USC season standards for most points (53), goals (25), and game-winning goals (10) on his way to becoming a consensus first-team All-America selection in 1995. A third-team selection in 1997, he finished his career as the third all-time leading scorer in USC history with 121 points (53g, 15a). He was a three-time finalist for the Hermann Trophy and the

Ring ended 1998 with a goals against average of 0.72. Ring recorded 9.5 shutouts in 1998, allowing only 14 goals in 1,753 minutes. Ring was named to the first-ever All-Independent first team as well as being named Independent Player of the Week (Sept. 16).

Ring became only the second Gamecock to earn All-America honors twice after ending the 2000 campaign with a 0.93 GAA, allowing only 17 goals his senior season. He was drafted by the Chicago Fire in the 2001 MLS Superdraft and was the starter in net for the Fire in 2004.

KICKOFF CLASSIC

USC KICKOFF CLASSIC

For a decade, the University of South Carolina hosted the Kickoff Classic. During those 10 years, USC went 9-1 in the Kickoff Classic, only taking a loss to Wisconsin in 1995.

USC has victories against Davidson (2-0) in 1991, St. Louis (3-1) in 1992, Santa Clara (2-1) in 1993, Brown (2-1 in overtime) in 1994, a loss to Wisconsin in 1995, a 3-1 victory over UMass in 1996 and a 2-1 win over SMU in 1997. Carolina highlighted its Carolina Kickoff experience by defeating No. 1 UCLA 2-1 in 1998. In 1999, USC continued its unbeaten streak against Air Force with a 3-0 shutout against the Falcons. The Gamecocks dominated the 2000 Kickoff Classic with a 4-2 win over the Virginia Tech Hokies. Seven of the nine South Carolina opponents that have participated in the Classic have advanced to the NCAA Tournament during the season in which they appeared in Columbia, including Wisconsin, who went on to win the 1995 NCAA National Championship.

In 2000, Carolina used a four-goal offensive explosion to defeat Atlantic 10 rival Virginia Tech in the Kickoff Classic. Freshman Ryan Daley delivered the game-winner for the Gamecocks.

Carolina recorded its second-straight shutout of the season (3-0) at the 1999 Kickoff Classic against Air Force. In its first meeting since 1993, USC was led by senior John Harr who scored the first and third goals of the match for Carolina. Sophomore Joey Worthen sandwiched in a goal between for the 3-0 win.

USC faced No. 1 and 1997 defending national champion UCLA in 1998. In front of a season-high 5,750 Gamecock fans, Carolina got off to a 1-0 lead with a goal from junior John Harr. After the Bruins tied the score at 1-1 early in the second half, the determined Gamecocks fought back with a goal from senior Nathan Watkins, sealing the USC win. Carolina's

win gave Coach Berson his 300th career win.

In 1997, Carolina avenged a 3-2 overtime loss from the year before by defeating the Mustangs of SMU, 2-1. SMU jumped out to an early 1-0 lead before Carolina tied the match two seconds before the first half ended on a Clint Mathis penalty kick. Newcomer Anders Ronnevig sealed the victory for Carolina when he scored an unassisted goal in the 75 minute. Redshirt freshman Henry Ring made his first start in goal for Carolina, registering five saves while playing extremely well in front of the 2,078 Gamecock fans.

In 1996, Carolina defeated UMass, 4-1, behind the two-goal performance of Clint Mathis. Carolina rebounded from a 0-1 deficit halfway through the first half before netting four-straight goals. Also tallying goals in the victory for Carolina were David Tart and Ryan O'Neill in front of a season-high crowd of 2,900 fans.

In 1995, Carolina dropped its first Carolina Kickoff Classic game, 3-2, to eventual national champion Wisconsin. The Badgers came out storming, scoring the first three goals of the match. The Gamecocks made a furious comeback in the second half, tallying two goals in the last 20 minutes but couldn't put the game-tying goal away.

In the 1994 Kickoff Classic, South Carolina defeated Brown 2-1 in overtime on a Chris Faklaris goal nine minutes into the extra period.

The 1993 Classic saw South Carolina edge west region power Santa Clara 2-1 before a crowd of 1,970 at The Graveyard. All three goals were scored via penalty kicks in a match that saw players falling all over the place after a morning of much needed rain made the field soft and slippery.

Santa Clara staked itself to an early 1-0 lead just 9:35 into the first half and held USC

scoreless until just before the half. South Carolina missed an opportunity to tie the match seconds after the Broncos only score as forward Chris Faklaris drove a penalty shot into the chest of the Broncos' goalkeeper. Midfielder Rob Smith scored USC's equalizing goal with only 44 seconds remaining in the half on a penalty kick. South Carolina midfielder Brett Kurland scored the winning goal at the 77:07 mark to give the Gamecocks its third-straight Umbro Kickoff Classic crown.

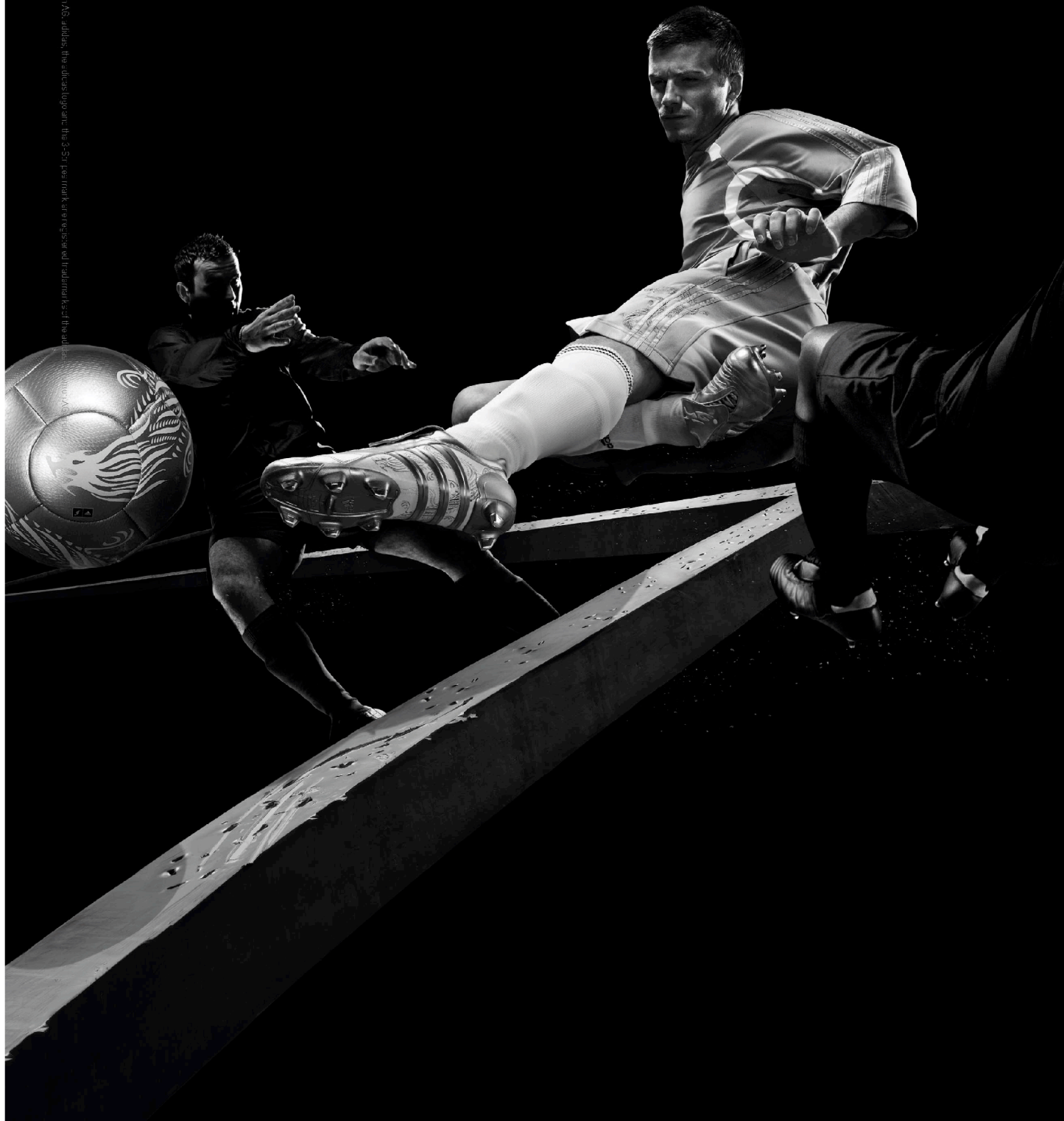
In 1992 South Carolina stunned then second-ranked St. Louis 3-1 before an overflow crowd of 3,250 in the Second Annual Classic that propelled the Gamecocks to a 4-0-3 start and vaulted USC to a No. 4 national ranking — the highest position for Carolina that year.

USC took an early 1-0 lead when forward Matt Haiduk rocketed a shot into the Billikens' net just five minutes into the game. Forward Chris Faklaris made it 2-0 only 13 minutes later when he blasted a pass from midfielder Rob Smith past a diving Saint Louis goalkeeper. Midfielder Ruben Tufino answered a second half Billiken goal with a beautiful direct kick from just outside the box past the Saint Louis defense that sent the South Carolina faithful into a frenzy.

In the inaugural Kickoff Classic against Davidson, the Gamecocks used first half goals by forwards Billy Baumhoff and Andrew Coggins to down the Wildcats, 2-0. Baumhoff's goal came at the 22:30 minute mark when he sailed a pass from defender Chris Crosby past the Davidson goalkeeper. South Carolina made it 2-0 about 12 minutes later when Coggins connected on a double assist from Faklaris and Baumhoff. Goalkeeper David Turner recorded the shutout which was witnessed by 3,650 fans.
