Omaha – that one name on the minds of 300-plus Division I schools, with dreams of a national championship. The opportunity to dog pile and be the last team standing after months of competition. Each season – teams fight, claw and battle to reach the pinnacle of collegiate baseball. In this – the last season at Rosenblatt Stadium – the South Carolina Gamecocks stood alone. With the index finger pointing No. 1, South Carolina's dream of a national title came true.

The 2010 South Carolina Gamecocks entered the year with a veteran corps returning both in the field and on the mound. Senior right-hander Blake Cooper and junior right-hander Sam Dyson anchored a pitching staff that returned 34 wins from the previous season. Add to that senior right-hander and captain Jay Brown, along with a solid group of newcomers in junior college transfers and freshmen and the Gamecocks looked to have one of the deepest pitching staffs in all of college baseball. Carolina's lineup also had a veteran presence with junior outfielder Whit Merrifield at the top of the order along with sophomore standout Jackie Bradley Jr. Up the middle defensively, the Gamecocks featured senior catcher and captain Kyle Enders along with senior shortstop Bobby Haney and junior second baseman Scott Wingo. A pair of newcomers, Adrian Morales at third base and Christian Walker at first base also figured in the mix, and there was reason of optimism in the locker room at Carolina Stadium.

South Carolina opened the season with a series sweep of Duquesne. The Gamecocks earned victories of 10-3, 13-3 and 5-3 vs. the Dukes to start the season off with a 3-0 record. South Carolina was stellar on the mound as the pitching staff finished the opening weekend with a 3.00 ERA as well as 39 strikeouts in 27 innings pitched. Opening day starter Blake Cooper earned a win after five innings allowing two runs on three hits with seven strikeouts in the 10-3 victory.

The Gamecocks would go through a bit of adversity in the next couple of weekends though – the Yardcocks had losing weekends against ECU and Clemson. Despite the setbacks – the Gamecocks entered the middle of March focused on putting the series losses to the Pirates and Tigers in the rearview mirror and looked forward knowing that the season is a marathon and not a sprint. In the middle of a two-game series with Valparaiso, Carolina junior right fielder Whit Merrifield set a school record, hitting safely in 26 consecutive games besting the previous record of 25 set by Greg Keatley.

The SEC season began at home for Carolina with the Gamecocks hosting SEC East rival Tennessee. In a sign of things to come, the Gamecocks battled and fought their way to three straight victories to sweep the Volunteers at Carolina Stadium. Carolina had wins of 4-2, 10-7 and 4-0, with game three highlighted by the pitching of Tyler Webb as he limited the Volunteers to one hit, a bunt single in the sixth inning by P.J. Polk, and tied a season-high with 5.2 innings pitched. Webb struck out six batters and walked three as well. Matt Price closed the game out with two perfect innings and three strikeouts to earn his first career save. For Webb's efforts, the Gamecock left-hander would earn SEC Freshman of the Week honors.

Riding high on an 11-game winning streak, the Gamecocks turned their attention to the road and took the weekend series against Auburn. Carolina returned home and took two of three games against Mississippi State. A 10-2 win over the Bulldogs saw Brady Thomas shine as the Gamecock designated hitter tallied a pair of two-run homers to back Blake Cooper, who pitched a season-high 8.1 innings in the win. Carolina would take the series in a 14-2 win over the Bulldogs on Easter Sunday. All nine starters reached base with eight of nine tallying at least one hit. Adrian Morales was 2-for-4 with a homer. Kyle Enders, Bobby Haney and Scott Wingo each had two hits. It was enough support for Matt Price, who entered the game in the fourth inning and shut down MSU until the ninth inning. Price allowed just two hits and struck out six batters to improve to 3-0 on the year.

Three up and three down, the Gamecock baseball team would take its show back on the road with a weekend tilt in Music City against Vanderbilt. Friday night Blake Cooper showed why he was the ace and among the top pitchers in the country as he bested Vandy right-hander Sonny Gray in a showdown of two of the top conference arms as the Gamecocks upended the Commodores 3-2. Following an 8-2 loss in game two, the Gamecocks looked to take the rubber game of the series as Jay Brown, Michael Roth and Matt Price combined to face the minimum on Sunday afternoon and recorded a two-hit shutout as the Gamecocks defeated Vanderbilt 2-0. With the victory, head coach Ray Tanner tallied 1,000 career victories.

Having won four consecutive series – the Gamecocks returned home for another weekend set in conference play – this time against the Ole Miss Rebels. The pitching matchup between Blake Cooper and Ole Miss starting pitcher Drew Pomeranz was everything as advertised as both staff aces put up zero after zero on the scoreboard through the night on a warm evening in Columbia, S.C. Pomeranz did not allow a hit until the sixth and Cooper retired 11 in a row at one point. Pomeranz left after seven innings allowing no runs on two hits with 10 strikeouts and four walks. It would be the eighth inning against the Rebels bullpen that would be when the Gamecocks made their move. Scott Wingo opened the frame with a leadoff walk against Ole Miss reliever Trent Rothlin. With reliever Brett Huber into the game, Whit Merrifield also walked to give the Gamecocks a pair of runners. Carolina then caught a break as Jackie Bradley Jr. laid down a sacrifice bunt with an errant throw by third baseman Zach Miller going past first baseman Miles Hamblin and allowing Wingo to score from second base. With Bradley on second and Merrifield on third with one out, the Rebels intentionally walked Nick Ebert to load the bases. Still with one out, Huber got the second out of the inning with a strikeout against Adam Matthews. However, it would be Adrian Morales that would strike with the key hit in the inning as he roped a double to right center clearing the bases and putting the Gamecocks ahead by four runs. Kyle Enders kept the momentum going as he tripled to right center then scoring Morales and giving the Gamecocks a 5-0 lead. That was enough for Cooper – who hurled a four-hit complete game shutout in the 5-0 victory. Cooper struck out a career-high 10 batters in the victory, his fifth complete game of his career but his first career complete game shutout. He allowed just four hits and one walk in the victory. He would pick up SEC Pitcher of the Week honors for his performance – the second straight week a Gamecock pitcher had earned the award.

Carolina followed up Cooper's masterpiece with a win on the next day to clinch the series vs. Ole Miss. Christian Walker's grand slam highlighted a seven-run second inning and starting pitcher Sam Dyson did not allow an earned run in 6.1 innings of work as South Carolina defeated Ole Miss 9-5.

The Gamecocks found success on the road in the next weekend with a series sweep of Georgia in Athens. Cooper improved to 8-0 on the year with a victory in the 11-4 win over Georgia on Friday night. Sophomore outfielder Jackie Bradley Jr. got it rolling this weekend vs. Georgia batting .538 (7-for-13) in the series with a homer, three RBI and five runs scored vs. the Bulldogs. Bradley reached base five times with four hits including a homer and a game-winning RBI single in the top of the seventh inning as South Carolina held on for an 8-7 victory over Georgia in game two of the doubleheader. His four hits was a season-high as well. For the third straight week – a Gamecock pitcher earned conference pitcher of the week honors. In a 5-0 complete game shutout, Dyson finished with 69 strikes out of 96 pitches and allowed just one runner from Georgia to get in scoring position in the seven-inning shutout. All 21 putouts by the Gamecock came from the diamond, as Dyson struck out five batters and recorded 14 ground ball outs. The win was the first complete game shutout of Dyson's career.

# 2011 Baseball

Things would get crazy the next week as Carolina hosted Alabama at Carolina Stadium. Brady Thomas connected with a two-out, two-run homer in the bottom of the 11th inning lifting South Carolina to a 9-7 victory over Alabama on Friday night. After falling on Saturday to the Crimson Tide, the Gamecocks won the rubber game over Alabama as South Carolina pounded out a season-high 25 hits setting a Carolina Stadium record for hits in a game with Kyle Enders driving in a career-high five runs on five hits and Brady Thomas batting 3-for-3 with four RBI as well as the Gamecocks defeated Alabama 20-15. Eight Gamecock players tallied multi-hit games. Enders became the first Gamecock player for the season to tally five hits in a game, a career-high for the senior catcher. He also hit his first home run of the season. Thomas' 3-for-3 day at the plate saw him tally his sixth home run of the year and second of the series. He also scored four runs on the afternoon. Whit Merrifield finished 3-for-4 with two runs scored and a RBI. Adam Matthews was 2-for-3 with two RBI with Evan Marzilli also tallying two RBI with his first career home run. Jackie Bradley Jr. was 2-for-3 with a homer, three RBI and three runs scored. Scott Wingo also had two hits as did Christian Walker, who scored three runs. The 25 hits ties for the fifth highest mark by a Gamecock team coached by Ray Tanner.

With a 16-8 record in SEC play, the Gamecocks had two conference series left and headed to Fayetteville, Ark., with a three-game series against SEC-West leading Arkansas. The series proved to be one of the top weekends for the season as the Gamecocks swept the Razorbacks on their home turf at Baum Stadium. Jackie Bradley Jr.'s one-out double in the top of the seventh inning broke a 2-2 tie and Gamecock starting pitcher Blake Cooper allowed just two runs on three hits in seven innings of work to improve to 10-0 on the year as South Carolina defeated Arkansas 3-2 in the first game. After Cooper's outing, the Gamecocks got another solid start – this from Sam Dyson, who pitched a complete game shutout with the offense backed by a two-run homer by Brady Thomas as the Gamecocks defeated Arkansas 5-0 on Saturday afternoon to clinch the weekend series vs. the Razorbacks. Dyson had a tremendous outing as he limited the Razorbacks to just six hits and walked only two on the afternoon. He struck out eight batters and went to only three three-ball counts in the game. With two victories in the book, Carolina went for the sweep. Trailing 3-2, the Gamecocks made their move in the top of the eighth inning. With reliever Jordan Pratt into the game for Arkansas, leadoff hitter Scott Wingo drew a walk on four pitches. With a full count, Whit Merrifield drove a two-run homer to left center for his second homer of the game and 12th of the season giving the Gamecocks a one-run lead. The Gamecocks added some key insurance as Adrian Morales drove a solo homer to left center, his fifth of the season to give South Carolina a 5-3 lead. That was enough for freshman Matt Price, who handcuffed the Razorbacks in 1.1 innings of relief to pick up a save, his seventh of the season and second of the series. Gamecock reliever John Taylor earned the win after two scoreless innings of relief with just one hit allowed.

The series sweep set the stage for a weekend series at home vs. Florida – with the winner claiming the SEC championship. 8,188 fans came out for game one at Carolina Stadium as Florida scored three runs in the third and fourth innings and three Gator relievers combined to limit the Gamecocks to just one run in the final 5.2 innings as Florida defeated South Carolina 3-2 in the series opener.

The buzz was still going strong in Columbia for game two as the Gamecocks honored the 2010 Senior Class before the contest. In addition, the Gamecocks saw one of their own perform at the highest level – not with a baseball – but with an electric guitar – as freshman outfielder Evan Marzilli showed his musical chops with a strong ballad of the National Anthem before the game. In front of a sellout crowd of 8,242 fans, the largest in Carolina Stadium history, Carolina and Florida stood at 2-2 entering the top of the seventh. The Gators made their move in the top of the seventh as Brian Johnson led off with a single. With pinch runner Bryson Smith into the game, Florida's Daniel Pigott set a down a sacrifice bunt. On the play, South Carolina starting pitcher Sam Dyson threw to second base but Smith beat the throw to the bag giving the Gators a pair of runners. After a sacrifice bunt by Ben McMahan, Dyson battled for Carolina as he struck out Tyler Thompson to get the second out of the inning. With runners still in scoring position and two outs, Adams connected on a 1-1 pitch with a double to the gap in right center scoring both runners and giving the Gators a two-run cushion. That lead was extended to 5-2 in the ninth inning as Adams again delivered with two outs with a RBI single to right field scoring McMahan, who reached base earlier on a Gamecock error. Florida would then claim the championship for the Southeastern Conference as Kevin Chapman worked the final 1.2 innings and closed out the Gators 5-2 win.

Although Carolina did not win the SEC championship, the squad bounced back in the final regular season game of the year with an 11-6 win over Florida in the series finale. Jackie Bradley Jr. hit a grand slam home run and Adam Matthews tallied three hits and homered for the second straight day. The win showed tremendous resolve for Carolina, as the Gamecocks and Florida showed why they were the top two teams in the conference. With the SEC title in the background, Carolina set its attention toward the ultimate goal – a trip to Omaha and a chance to play for a national championship.

## NCAA REGIONAL RECAP

Following a disappointing 0-2 finish at the SEC Tournament, the Gamecocks went back to work in Columbia. Going back to the basics, Carolina worked on fundamentals and reestablishing what helped bring the team one game within an SEC championship in the regular season. With a renewed set of confidence and excitement in the air, the Gamecock baseball program hosted one of the 16-team NCAA regionals that featured No. 2 seed Virginia Tech, No. 3 seed The Citadel and No. 4 seed Bucknell.

In game one, Bucknell got off to a fast start and broke out to a 5-1 lead heading into the bottom of the sixth inning. The Gamecocks would cut the Bison lead in half with a two-out rally in the sixth. A one-out double from Adrian Morales set the table, for Evan Marzilli to hit a HR over the right-field wall to bring in two runs and reduce the deficit to 5-3. The Carolina offense finally exploded in the eighth inning. Bradley put South Carolina on top for the first time all night with one swing of the bat, launching a home run just over the left-field wall to score Merrifield in the bottom of the eighth, giving the Gamecocks a 6-5 lead. Morales blasted a three-run homer to left to give the Gamecocks a 9-5 lead they would not relinquish as Michael Roth would retire the side in order in the ninth.

In the winner's bracket, it would be an All-Palmetto State affair in game two with the Gamecocks meeting The Citadel on a hot Saturday evening at Carolina Stadium. The contest featured two of the top pitchers in the country with Blake Cooper on the mound for Carolina and The Citadel going with junior right-hander Asher Wojciechowski. The Bulldogs held a 4-2 advantage but South Carolina finally got to Wojciechowski in the seventh inning. With one out, head coach Ray Tanner elected to go with left-handed pinch-hitter Evan Marzilli and the freshman came through in a big way, lacing a base hit to right field to plate Haney and Wingo, tying the game at 4-4. Then, with two out, Thomas singled up the middle, moving Marzilli to third. Thomas would then try to force a balk by taking off early from first, but Wojciechowski never flinched as the Carolina catcher took second without a throw. Clearly rattled at that point, a subsequent Wojciechowski pitch slipped out of his hand and sailed to the backstop, allowing

Marzilli to score from third to give Carolina a 5-4 lead. Morales delivered an RBI double into the right-field corner, scoring Thomas to make it 6-4 Gamecocks and chasing the Citadel ace from the game. Christian Walker then ripped another double into the gap in left center to bring home Morales, making it 7-4 Gamecocks. Cooper struck out a career-high 12 batters, and South Carolina defeated The Citadel 9-4 to advance to the regional championship.

One win away from a trip to the NCAA super regionals, the Gamecocks had one team left to defeat – the Virginia Tech Hokies, who staved off elimination against The Citadel. Virginia Tech struck first. A walk to Michael Seaborn brought up Steve Domecuc, who launched his 13th home run of the season to give the Hokies an early 2-0 lead.

The Gamecocks got on the board in the fourth when Brady Thomas and Christian Walker both laced doubles, with the latter scoring the former to cut the deficit to 2-1. An inning later, the Gamecocks would add another to tie the score on Jackie Bradley Jr.'s RBI sacrifice fly.

As had been their custom during this regional, South Carolina broke it open in the late innings. For it was the sixth inning this time, after first baseman Christian Walker and Kyle Enders delivered back-to-back singles, a Bobby Haney fly ball advanced Walker to third and brought up second baseman Scott Wingo with two out. The junior delivered his first RBI in a month as he drove a 2-2 pitch into right field, scoring Walker to give the Gamecocks a 3-2 lead. But they were not done. Marzilli ripped his third hit of the night (a career high) to score Enders, and Wingo came across after Whit Merrifield delivered an RBI single of his own to make it 5-2 and end Virginia Tech starter Matthew Price's night on the mound.

But a new pitcher for the Hokies would receive a rude welcome from Bradley as he roped the third pitch he saw over the right-field wall to blow the game wide open, scoring Marzilli and Merrifield to make it 8-2 and energize the Carolina Stadium crowd of 6,233. While Jose Mata kept Virginia Tech at bay, the Gamecocks would tack on two more runs in the seventh and eighth innings. Mata would then work a scoreless eighth, while Michael Roth shut the door with a perfect ninth to clinch the regional championship for Carolina.

Six Gamecocks were named to the All-Tournament team for the 2010 NCAA Regional - C Kyle Enders, 3B Adrian Morales, OF Jackie Bradley Jr., OF Evan Marzilli, DH Brady Thomas and P Blake Cooper.

Adrian Morales was the NCAA Regional MVP along with earning All-Tournament team honors. Morales hit a homer in all three games of the Regional and finished the weekend batting .500 (7-for-14) with five runs scored, and seven RBI as well.

## NCAA SUPER REGIONAL RECAP

Down to the final 16 teams in the country, the Gamecocks headed east for a NCAA Super Regional showdown with the No. 4 national seed – Coastal Carolina. It was hot and it was humid – as BB&T Coastal Field filled up with both Gamecock and Chanticleer fans finding their way in to see both teams battle with a trip to Omaha on the line.

Carolina sent ace Blake Cooper to the mound with Coastal going with left-hander Matt Rein. South Carolina jumped on Coastal early with three runs in the top of the first inning. Whit Merrifield reached base with one out on a throwing error by Rein. Rein then struggled with control as he walked Jackie Bradley Jr. and hit Adrian Morales to load the bases with one out. Christian Walker delivered for South Carolina as he smacked a two-run single to left field giving the Gamecocks the lead. After a walk to Adam Matthews loaded the bases a second time, Kyle Enders drove in Morales with a RBI sacrifice fly to right field to put South Carolina ahead 3-0. South Carolina extended the lead to 4-0 in the top of the second inning, with one out and the bags full, Jackie Bradley Jr. walked to score Haney.

Coastal cut that lead in half in the bottom of the second inning on a two-run homer from Daniel Bowman. The Chanticleers crept to within a run in the bottom of the fourth on the back of three consecutive hits from Tommy LaStella, Jose Iglesias and Chance Gilmore. Gilmore's RBI bloop single to left field would score La Stella.

With South Carolina leading 4-3 heading into the fifth inning, the game became an intense, emotional affair as both teams pitchers battled to keep each other's offense in check. Coastal loaded the bases with one out in the sixth inning only to see Cooper get out of the jam on a double play ball that deflected off his glove and back to second baseman Scott Wingo who tagged the base at second and threw to first just nabbing Daniel Bowman and keeping the Gamecocks ahead by a run. The next moment of truth came in the eighth inning as Coastal had loaded the bases with no outs. Enter, Gamecock closer Matt Price, who battled, as he struck out Chance Gilmore swinging, got Taylor Motter on a called third strike and ended the frame with getting Bowman to ground out back to him to keep the Chanticleers from tying up the game. Coastal looked to make a score in the ninth inning off of reliever Matt Price. With one out, Adam Rice worked Price to a full count and drew a walk to give CCU a base runner. With two outs and Rice still on first base, Rico Noel just got a handle of a Price pitch and beat out an infield single that was down the third base line to put a pair of runners on base for Coastal. Price kept battling though and preserved the Gamecock victory as coaxed Tommy La Stella into a fly out to center field giving the Gamecocks a 4-3 victory.

With temperatures in the 90's and the heat index in triple digits, the Gamecocks and Chanticleers faced off again in game two of the super regional. Unlike the previous game, both

squads would show off the offense in a back and forth affair that kept the fans on the edge of their seats.

Rico Noel gave Coastal Carolina a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning with a solo home run off of starter Sam Dyson. South Carolina answered though in the bottom half and scored twice to take a 2-1 lead. Evan Marzilli led off with a double to left center. With Merrifield on second base, the Gamecocks scored their second run as Jackie Bradley Jr. extended his hitting streak to 16 games with a double over left fielder Chance Gilmore.

CCU regained the lead in the top of the second inning batting around to score four runs and take a 5-2 lead. Taylor Motter tied the game as he stroked a one-out solo homer to left field, his 12th home run of the year.

South Carolina fought back and tied the game at 5-5 in the bottom of the third with three runs and took advantage of a pair of Chanticleer errors in the process. All the scoring came with two outs as Morales drew a walk and Christian Walker reached base on third baseman Scott Woodward's fielding error. Adam Matthews delivered for the Gamecocks as he roped a RBI double down the left field line that plated home Morales with Walker also scoring. Carolina then tied it on Kyle Enders' RBI single up the middle.

Coastal regained the lead in the top of the fourth with a single run. With two outs and Rich Witten on second base, the Chanticleers caught their own breaks with a hit by pitch to Rico Noel followed by consecutive walks to Tommy La Stella as well as Jose Iglesias that plated home Witten. That lead was extended in the top of the sixth to 7-5 as Adam Rice led off with a single and with two outs scored on Tommy La Stella's RBI single to right field.

South Carolina answered in the bottom half of the sixth to tie the game at 7-7. Bobby Haney drew a leadoff walk and after Scott Wingo's sacrifice bunt would score on pinch hitter Nick Ebert's RBI base hit to right center. With two outs and runners on the corners, pinch-runner Robert Beary scored as a throwing error by third baseman Scott Woodward allowed the Gamecocks to even the game.

CCU struck again in the top of the seventh inning as Bowman launched a two-out solo home run to left field that gave Coastal an 8-7 lead. They would increase the advantage to 9-7 in the top of the eighth as Scott Woodward reached base with one out, and later score on Jose Iglesias' RBI base hit to left field. With the Gamecocks trailing by a pair of runs in the eighth, South Carolina mounted a two-out rally against Coastal closer Austin Fleet with a walk to Jackie Bradley Jr. and a double by Adrian Morales. That set the stage for Christian Walker, who after taking a pair of strikes and a ball, launched his seventh home run of the season giving the Gamecocks a one-run lead. With Gamecock reliever Matt Price on the mound, Carolina closed the game, as Price retired all three batters he faced including a ground out by Rich Witten to end the game and setting off a dog pile on the mound by the Gamecock players.

## COLLEGE WORLD SERIES RECAP

South Carolina headed to the College World Series for the ninth time in school history. After arriving in Omaha, the Gamecocks immediately made a special trip to Rosenblatt Stadium before heading to the team hotel, just to get a glimpse at the setting where college baseball's national championship would be crowned.

Eight teams with four on each side of the bracket would do battle with one emerging as champion. Carolina's bracket featured Big 12 contender Oklahoma, No. 1 national seed Arizona State and Palmetto State rival Clemson.

## OKLAHOMA (4), SOUTH CAROLINA (3)

The Gamecocks would open up CWS play vs. the Sooners. It was a wild day at Rosenblatt Stadium as the start time was delayed four hours and 15 minutes by rain with an additional two hour and one minute delay just before the start of the bottom of the sixth inning as well. Oklahoma broke ahead 1-0 in the bottom of the first inning. Chris Ellison led off with a single and was sacrificed over to second base. With two outs and Ellison still on second, the Sooners grabbed the lead on a RBI single to right center by Tyler Ogle. Carolina struck back quickly to tie it at 1-1 in the top of the second inning as Christian Walker led off with a solo home run to left center, his eighth homer of the year. Walker crushed a 1-0 pitch from Rocha for his second consecutive home run in as many at bats. The Sooners reclaimed the lead in the bottom of the second with Caleb Bushyhead delivering a solo home run to right field, his sixth round tripper of the year as Oklahoma went back ahead 2-1 on the Gamecocks. Carolina again answered with a home run as Jackie Bradley Jr. tagged his 12th homer of the season to right field knotting the game at two apiece in the top of the fourth. Oklahoma would again reclaim the lead with a single run in the bottom of the fourth inning. Cody Reine opened the frame with a single and was sacrificed over. With two outs and Reine on second base, Bushyhead drove in his second run of the game with a RBI single down the right field line. Trailing 3-2 in the top of the eighth inning, South Carolina looked to tie the game up loading the bases with a one-out single by Whit Merrifield and a pair of two-out walks to Adrian Morales and Christian Walker. Oklahoma reliever Jeremy Erben was able to get out of the jam though as Brady Thomas lined a hard shot into right field that was corralled by Cody Reine. Oklahoma got some important insurance in the bottom of the eighth on Bucechele's solo home run to take a two-run lead. Carolina again battled in the top of the ninth as Kyle Enders singled to left field followed by a base hit to right field by pinch hitter Robert Beary. With one out, the Gamecocks then loaded the bases on a walk to Evan Marzilli. Oklahoma reliever Ryan Duke got the second out of the inning with Whit Merrifield popping up to Buechele in follow territory right near third base. Down to its final out, Carolina's Jackie Bradley Jr. walked

on four pitches scoring Enders and cutting the Sooners lead to just one run. Duke however stayed composed and was able to get Adrian Morales to fly out to center field ending the game and giving Oklahoma the victory.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (11), ARIZONA STATE (4)

With their backs against the wall, the Gamecocks returned to the field in an elimination game against No. 1 national seed Arizona State. South Carolina pounded out eight runs on eight hits in the bottom of the second inning and starting pitcher Sam Dyson had a quality start with 7.1 innings of work as the Gamecocks defeated Arizona State 11-4.

The big frame for South Carolina was the second inning as the Gamecock bats struck for eight hits, the most hits in an inning for Carolina this year as South Carolina broke ahead 8-0 on Arizona State. Adrian Morales and Kyle Enders each singled to start things off for Carolina. With both runners on first and second base and one out, Scott Wingo drove a RBI double down the left field line scoring both Morales and Enders. It marked Wingo's first multi-RBI game since April 30 vs. Alabama. After an Evan Marzilli single, Whit Merrifield knocked a RBI single over the first baseman's head allowing Wingo to score and increasing Carolina's lead to 3-0. Jackie Bradley Jr. had the big hit in the inning then as he drove a three-run homer to left center for his team-leading 13th round tripper of the year and his second of the College World Series. That wouldn't be the only home run of the inning though as Morales connected with a two-run blast to left field off the foul pole giving Carolina the eight-run cushion. That home run was also Morales' second hit of the inning and his ninth home run of the year.

Carolina increased the advantage to 10-0 in the third inning. Bobby Haney led off with a double followed by a walk to Wingo and Marzilli reaching on a hit by pitch. With one out, the Gamecocks scored as Bradley also reached base on a hit by pitch that scored Wingo. That was followed up by a walk to Christian Walker scoring Marzilli.

All nine position starters reached base at least once with eight of nine tallying at least one hit.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (3), OKLAHOMA (2) (12 innings)

Having survived one elimination contest, the Gamecocks earned the right to face Oklahoma for a second time in another match-up that would send the loser home with the winner surviving another day. Just like the previous game, both South Carolina and Oklahoma battled each other to the fullest with neither team being able to muster much offense.

Both Gamecock starting pitcher Blake Cooper and Oklahoma starter Zach Neal had quality starts and kept each of their respective teams in position to win the game. Cooper worked 5.2 innings allowing just one run on four hits with six strikeouts and two walks. Neal lasted seven-plus inning and yielded one run on five hits with seven strikeouts and a walk.

It was a dramatic night at Rosenblatt Stadium with both teams battling back and forth with the result in question until the final play. After Oklahoma took a 2-1 lead in the top of the 12th on a solo home run by Tyler Ogle, the Gamecocks made their move as Robert Beary singled to open the frame and give the Gamecocks the tying run on the base paths. With two outs and Beary on second base in scoring position, Jackie Bradley Jr. battled Oklahoma closer Ryan Duke to a full count before lacing a RBI single past Oklahoma's diving first baseman Cameron Seitzer to score Beary and tie the game. Jeffery Jones then walked moving Bradley into scoring position setting the stage for Brady Thomas, who roped the first pitch he saw from Duke up the middle for a RBI single to win the game and setting off a celebration among the Gamecock players on the field.

Down to the final strike and possibly the end of the season, the Gamecocks earned a 3-2 win over Oklahoma to advance to the final four teams at the 2010 College World Series. Carolina's next opponent – a team from right down the road in the state – Clemson.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (5), CLEMSON (1)

South Carolina – Clemson – One of college baseball's greatest rivalries on the national stage with the winner getting a shot at a national championship. The path for Carolina was simple – win two or go home with the Tigers just needing one game to advance to play for the title.

With starting pitchers Blake Cooper and Sam Dyson both unavailable, Carolina turned to an unlikely pitcher to face Clemson. Left-handed reliever Michael Roth received the ball for the next game against the Tigers – his first start of the season.

In what could only be described as "the game of his life", Roth controlled Clemson from the get go and kept them off base for pretty much the entire contest as he hurled a three-hit complete game and was backed by an offense that included a home run by Kyle Enders and two RBI by Jackie Bradley Jr. as South Carolina defeated Clemson 5-1 to force one more game between the two schools. Roth was masterful throughout the evening as he limited the Tigers to just one double and a pair of singles. Roth, making only his third start of his career, went the distance and allowed just one run while striking out four batters and walking just one. Along with the four strikeouts, he had 16 ground ball outs and six fly outs. He is now 2-1 on the year.

The Gamecocks broke ahead 1-0 in the top of the first inning. Evan Marzilli led off with a double down the left field line and with one out scored on Jackie Bradley Jr.'s RBI groundout to the shortstop. That lead increased to 2-0 in the second inning as Brady Thomas led off with a double of his own and scored on Adrian Morales' RBI single to right field. It was pushed to 3-0 in the top of the third as Marzilli drew a walk and after stealing second base, scored on Bradley's RBI double to the gap in left center.

Clemson got on the scoreboard in the bottom of the third inning to cut Carolina's lead to 3-1 as Richie Shaffer doubled to open the frame and with one out scored on a passed ball issued by catcher Kyle Enders. South Carolina reclaimed a three-run cushion in the top of the fourth inning as Enders launched a two-out solo homer to left field, his third round tripper of the year giving Carolina a 4-1 advantage. After a scoreless fifth inning, Enders drove in his second run of the game with a two-out RBI base hit in the top of the sixth to score Thomas and extend the lead to 5-1 against the Tigers. Clemson's looked to rally in the eighth inning but could not get on the scoreboard again vs. Roth. With two runners on and one out, Roth induced a fielder's choice and then a fly out to hold the Tigers at bay.

The Gamecocks played with heavy hearts that evening as one of the team's biggest fans – seven-year old Tayler Beal – had lost his battle with cancer the night before. Many players, including Roth, sported the letters TB – in honor of Tayler – on their ball cap.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (4) CLEMSON (3)

Drama – suspense – just a couple of ways to describe the College World Series for the Gamecocks. It would be more the same in the next contest, as South Carolina and Clemson fought toe to toe to earn the right to face UCLA in the CWS championship finals. South Carolina broke ahead 1-0 in the bottom of the first inning. Three consecutive singles by Evan Marzilli, Whit Merrifield and Jackie Bradley Jr. put the Gamecocks in position to score. Harman limited the damage though as he induced Christian Walker into a 4-6-3 double play that scored Marzilli. Clemson would tie the game 1-1 in the top of the third inning. Will Lamb reached base on a hit by pitch and advanced to third on Mike Freeman's single to right center. Lamb scored on a RBI fielder's choice off the bat of Schaus. Dyson would limit the damage for Carolina as well though as he struck out John Hinson swinging with two runners on to maintain the tie. Carolina regained the lead at 2-1 in the bottom of the fourth inning on a solo home run from Walker, his ninth of the season and third of the NCAA Tournament. Walker crushed a 2-2 pitch from Harman over the wall in left center to give the Gamecocks a one-run lead. Clemson tied it at 2-2 in the seventh inning as the Tigers scored after a fielder's choice on a throwing error by second baseman Scott Wingo.

A see-saw affair saw the Gamecocks and Tigers knotted at two apiece heading into the bottom of the seventh inning. That's when Carolina made its final move as Evan Marzilli reached base with one out on a hit by pitch against Clemson starter Casey Harman. With Alex Frederick on in relief for Clemson, Whit Merrifield struck out swinging. However, on the play, Marzilli stole second base and advanced on a throwing error by Clemson catcher Spencer Kieboom. With Marzilli in scoring position, Clemson elected to intentionally walk Jackie Bradley Jr. that brought Christina Walker up to the plate. On Frederick's 3-1 pitch, Walker roped a RBI single to left center scoring Marzilli and giving the Gamecocks a one-run lead. That was followed up by a RBI base hit by Adrian Morales scoring Bradley and putting the Gamecocks ahead 4-2. With Carolina ahead by two runs, the Tigers mounted a rally as John Hinson reached base on a triple to right after both Merrifield and Wingo collided going for the ball. Hinson would then score on Brad Miller's RBI ground out to bring the Tigers back within a run. Clemson mounted one final rally in the top of the ninth as Mike Freeman reached base with two outs on a single up the middle. But Matt Price kept the game in check and was able to get Jeff Schaus to ground out on a sharp ground ball to first baseman Christian Walker preserving a victory for the Gamecocks.

Just a few months before this game – Clemson had edged out the Gamecocks 2-1 in a weekend series. With a pair of victories in Omaha, the Gamecocks came out on top in 2010 with a 3-2 edge in wins over the Tigers. Most important – the Gamecocks survived and advanced to face UCLA in the championship series.

## SOUTH CAROLINA (7) UCLA (1)

Heading into the championship series, South Carolina and UCLA had only one previous meeting in each school's history, when the Bruins defeated the Gamecocks on March 23, 1972, 10-4 in a tournament in Riverside, Calif.

The scenario was a little bit different now though – as a champion would be crowned – in this the final series to be played at historic Rosenblatt Stadium.

For game one, South Carolina would send senior right-hander Blake Cooper to the hill. Cooper is 12-2 on the year with a 2.86 ERA with a team-high 129.0 innings pitched. He has 116 strikeouts to just 38 walks. In the postseason, Cooper owns a 2-1 record with a 2.52 ERA in 25 innings pitched. He faces off against UCLA sophomore right-hander Gerrit Cole (11-3, 3.26 ERA).

As he did all season, Cooper showcased why he was one of the top pitchers in the country. On three days rest, Cooper had a strong game as he worked in and out and kept the UCLA batters in check for most the evening allowing just one hit in his first eight innings of work.

While Cooper masterfully set down the UCLA offense, the Gamecocks started strong out of the gates with the bats breaking out to a 2-0 lead in the top of the first inning. Jackie Bradley Jr. bunted for a base hit with two outs followed by a single to left center by Christian Walker. Bradley scored Carolina's first run as Brady Thomas hit a check swing base hit down the left field line. The Gamecocks were then able to take advantage of a UCLA miscue as a ground ball off the bat of Adrian Morales went through the legs of second baseman Cody Regis allowing Walker to score. Carolina increased the lead to 3-0 in the top of the second as Scott Wingo tripled down

the left field line with one out and scored on Evan Marzilli's RBI base hit to right field. It would then be extended to 5-0 in the top of the third as Haney delivered with a two-out RBI single that scored both Morales and Thomas.

Carolina added single runs in the fifth and eighth innings. Haney drove in his third run with a sacrifice fly RBI to score Morales and Merrifield collected a two-out RBI single in the eighth that plated home Wingo. UCLA completed the scoring in the ninth inning with a run as they loaded the bases with no outs and scored on a double play ball off the bat of Trevor Brown. Cooper handed the ball off to John Taylor in the ninth inning, who got the final three outs of the game to preserve the win. Final score – South Carolina 7, UCLA 1. Cooper improved to 13-2 on the year and earned his 34th career victory at South Carolina, tying him for fourth all-time in school history. Most important – he had brought his team one step closer to a national title!

## SOUTH CAROLINA (2) UCLA (1) (11 INN.)

The dream began in August – fall workouts – skill work – offseason strength and conditioning – all the blood, sweat and tears – all the hard work – for this one chance – to be crowned – NATIONAL CHAMPION. With that dream so close – but yet so far – head coach Ray Tanner and the Gamecocks rolled the dice again – sending left-hander Michael Roth out to start his second game of the College World Series.

Roth and UCLA's Rob Rasmussen locked up in tight duel as neither offense could muster much against the pair of left-handers. It would be UCLA that would break a scoreless tie with a run in the fifth inning. Trevor Brown led off with an infield single, moved to second on a sacrifice bunt and scored on Niko Gallego's RBI single to left.

Still trailing by a run, the Gamecocks finally tied the score in the bottom of eighth. Pinch-hitter Brady Thomas led off the frame with a solid single to center. Pinch-runner Robert Beary went to second on a ground out and scored when Bobby Haney's grounder ended up in right field after being misplayed by UCLA first baseman Dean Espy and eluding second baseman Cody Regis. Deadlocked at 1-1, Carolina went back to the bullpen with right-hander Matt Price. Similar to his previous outings in the postseason, Price showed why he was one of the most dominant closers in the game as he kept the Bruins in check, not allowing one runner to cross the plate for UCLA. With the bases loaded and two outs in the ninth, Price got his biggest out of the game with a strikeout against Niko Gallego that set off a thundering applause among the 24,000-plus fans in Rosenblatt Stadium.

With Price giving the Gamecocks momentum, Carolina looked to end the game in the bottom of the 11th inning. Scott Wingo battled UCLA closer Dan Klein to a full count and earned a walk. Carolina then caught a break as a passed ball allowed Wingo to reach second base and get into scoring position with no outs. He would get 90 feet closer then as Evan Marzilli layed down a perfect sacrifice bunt putting Wingo at third base and bringing the fans to their feet.

With a 2-0 count, Whit Merrifield stood in the batter's box and laced a RBI single to right field scoring Wingo and clinching the national championship.

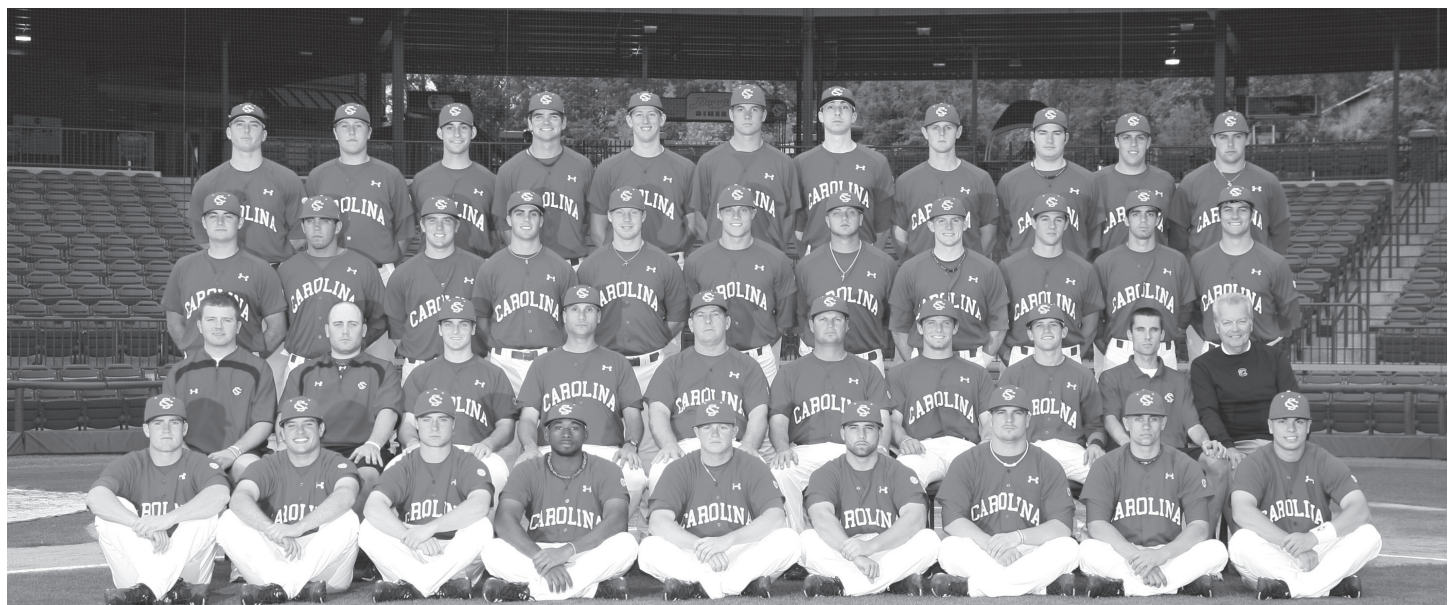
