2005-2006 SEASON REVIEW

High expectations hampered by a rash of injuries and a strong finish with yet another appearance in the NCAA Tournament highlighted the South Carolina men's tennis team's 2006 season.

The Gamecocks rode the momentum of a trip to the NCAA Championship Round of 16 in 2005 into the spring 2006 season. With its top six players returning. South Carolina opened the season with a lofty No. 12 ranking and an invitation to the prestigious 16-team ITA National Indoor Championship in Seattle, Wash. DeMars' charges reeled off six consecutive victories to begin the campaign, despite an early injury to junior Pedro Rodrigues. Rodrigues went down with an ankle injury in the season opener versus Troy (Jan. 28), landing him on the sidelines for 11 of the next 12 matches and the entire month of February. Junior Dmitry Babenko was also slowed by a chronic back injury that allowed him to play in just seven dual matches.



Following a 4-2 loss to then-No. 27 North Carolina, the Gamecocks headed west for the ITA Indoors in Seattle, Wash. An undermanned South Carolina team struggled, dropping matches to No. 5 Mississippi (4-1), No. 38 Florida State (4-1) and No. 47 Penn (4-2). The squad returned home and dropped a 5-2 decision to No. 39 NC State. Carolina went back on the road and snapped a five-match losing streak with an emphatic victory at No. 13 Wake Forest. Still playing without a pair of key starters, the Gamecocks rose to the occasion to claim a 4-3 win over the Demon Deacons. At No. 6 singles, senior Adam Adler won a third-set tie break to tie the match and sophomore Jaime Cuellar sealed the Gamecock victory with a third-set tie break triumph of his own.

South Carolina, now 7-5, turned its attention to SEC play. On the first weekend of conference action, the Gamecocks hosted Mississippi State and Mississippi, earning a split of the two matches. In the opener, Carolina knocked off No. 27 MSU, 5-2, but fell to the fifth-ranked Rebels, 7-0. The road did not get any easier. Carolina hit the road to face top-ranked Georgia in Athens. Prior to the meeting with the Bulldogs, senior Geraldo Knorr suffered what would be a season-ending

injury with a collapsed lung. Rodrigues returned from his ankle injury for the match, but retired during his singles match and South Carolina fell, 7-0, Georgia. The Gamecocks traveled to Knoxville to face No. 44 Tennessee and dropped a 4-1 decision to the Volunteers.

Carolina took a brief reprieve from conference play. USC played No. 58 UNLV in Las Vegas over spring break, falling 5-2. Rodrigues and Cuellar accounted for the Gamecocks' two points with singles victories. The Gamecocks snapped a four-match losing streak by rolling to a 4-0 win over Charleston Southern in Columbia.

A pair top-20 teams were next on the schedule for the Gamecocks. No. 19 LSU shut down the Gamecocks, 7-0, in Baton Rouge, La. Senior Tom Eklund, the team's mainstay at No. 1 singles, was hurt and retired from his match with the Tigers. At 16th-ranked Arkansas, Eklund was unable to play in singles, forcing the Gamecocks to forfeit a singles point and move each player up a position in singles. The result was a 4-0 loss to the Razorbacks.

Back at home for a three-match homestand, the Gamecocks picked up their play. Carolina opened the home stretch with a 4-3 victory over No. 48 Auburn on March 31. Two days later, USC rallied to pull off a 4-3 victory over No. 40 Alabama. The Crimson Tide won the doubles point and proceeded to take a 3-0 lead with a pair of singles victories. South Carolina fought back to win all four of the remaining singles matches with Eklund clinching the final point at the No. 1 position. Cuellar was victorious at No. 2, Rodrigues won the No. 3 position and Yevgeny Supeko claimed the No. 4 spot.

In their home finale, the Gamecocks turned in an impressive performance to upset No. 21 Kentucky. After splitting No. 2 and No. 3 doubles matches, the Wildcats rallied from a 6-1 deficit to defeat Eklund and Rodrigues at No. 1. The pair rebounded in singles action. Supeko evened the match with a win at No. 4 singles and Eklund pushed the Gamecocks ahead by winning his match at No. 1 singles. Cuellar came out on top at No. 2 before Adam Adler secured victory for Carolina with a win at No. 6 singles. All four of the matches were straight-set wins. The Gamecocks extended their win streak to four with a 5-2 triumph at Vanderbilt to set a school record for consecutive SEC victories on April 9.

South Carolina played its final two regular season contests on the road, falling to 21st-ranked Clemson on the, 6-1, and dropping at 7-0 decision to No. 14 Florida. Next, it was on to Tuscaloosa, Ala., for the SEC Championship. The No. 7-seeded Gamecocks were pitted against No. 10-seed Tennessee, a team it lost to in the regular season, in the first round. The match turned out to be a thriller. The Gamecocks moved ahead by winning the doubles point. Eklund and Rodrigues were victorious at No. 1 and Adler and Thomas Stoddard clinched the point with an 8-6 win at No. 3. Five of the six singles matches went to three sets, but Adler eventually put Carolina into the quarterfinals. With the match tie at three points apiece, Adler prevailed 13-11 in a third-set tiebreaker at No. 6 singles. The Gamecocks' SEC Tournament run ended in the quarters with a 4-1 loss to the Gators. Supeko put South Carolina on the board with a win at No. 4 singles.

A week later, the Gamecocks were invited to the NCAA Tournament for the 13th-straight year. South Carolina was set to face No. 24 Clemson in Chapel Hill, N.C., in the opening round. Despite winning the doubles point, the Gamecocks fell to the Tigers, 4-1.

At the end of the season, Carolina had a 14-15 overall record and finished with a 5-6 mark in conference regular season play. The Gamecocks posted seven wins against ranked teams, and 14 of Carolina's 15 losses came to teams ranked in the top 50 at the time of the match. Nine setbacks were against top-25 teams.

Cuellar was selected second-team all-SEC and Eklund made the SEC's Good Works Team. Eklund also earned South Carolina's Male Scholar-Athlete of the Year Award. CoSIDA Academic All-District honor. Ind. addition, he was selected the school's SEC H. Boyd McWhorter Postgraduate receipient and won the athletic department's Inspiration Award, after playing with near-constant back pain throughout the season.
