STONE STADIUM

Located in the heart of the South Carolina campus is the home field of the Gamecocks, Eugene E. Stone III Stadium, also known as "The Graveyard".

The stadium, which debuted in 1996, was made possible by the \$1 million gift given by the late Eugene E. Stone III. Stone, who passed away in 1997, was a Carolina graduate and Chairman of Stone Manufacturing Co. Inc., the parent company of UMBRO International.

Stone Stadium's west side houses permanent stands that hold 4,000 fans. It is equipped with a 70' by 8' press box with a camera deck on top. The press box houses both the brand new scoreboard operating system and the public address system as well as room to comfortably seat members of the media.

The facility includes two team rooms, an officials' dressing room, a concession stand for the fans and restrooms for both men and women on each side of the stadium. Also nicknamed The Graveyard because of its close proximity to the House of Peace cemetery, the area has proven to be a "graveyard" for opponents over the years.



MEMORABLE HOME MATCHES

Over the last 30 seasons, many great memories have been made at South Carolina home matches at The Graveyard, since named Stone Stadium. These memorable matches range from NCAA Tournament wins to strong individual showings, to wins that marked a specific moment in Carolina soccer history.

9/19/78 With a 12-0 shutout of Presbyterian College, USC's first-ever home match, Carolina began an excellent record at home.

11/17/85 Doug Allison and Scott Cook both add a goal and an assist, as USC wins its first NCAA home match, a 3-0 victory against the Duke Blue Devils.

10/12/86 Carolina secured its first home win against archrival Clemson, a hard-fought 4-3

11/1/92 The Gamecocks score just 15 seconds into the game and have their captain ejected at 56 seconds, however, they still win a 2-0 thriller over Clemson.

Senior All-American Tommy Loeber scored his first career goal with seconds left against College of Charleston to send the match into overtime, where 11/4/92 the Gamecocks won.

11/28/93 USC reaches second Final Four behind six-goal outburst by six different Gamecock goal scorers to defeat Air Force.

10/14/94 Future MLS star Clint Mathis shows first signs of brilliance leading South Carolina to a 7-5 win over North Carolina.

10/29/97 Carolina erased a 4-2 second-half deficit to come back and defeat Wake Forest, 5-4, behind five Josh Wolff points.

11/23/97 First NCAA match at newly-named Stone Stadium showcases Clint Mathis and Kim Eriksen combine to score two goals, as Carolina defeated Charleston

USC defeats top-ranked and defending national champion UCLA, 2-1, for 9/6/98 Berson's 300th career win.

11/8/98 A bicycle kick by Nathan Watkins gives USC another one-goal win, Berson's 300th win at Carolina as he defeated his alma mater, North Carolina, 2-1. 10/10/04 Ryan Deter's goal in the 24th minute sends Carolina past archrival Clemson, 1-0,

marking Berson's 375th career win. Cory Lewis scores twice as the Gamecocks defeat UAB, 2-0, and give coach 9/27/06

Mark Berson his 400th career victory.





MARK BERSON'S CAROLINA SOCCER CAMPS, among the most sought out and highly regarded camps throughout the country, offers an array of camps for rising soccer players of all ages and skill levels. The University of South Carolina has a proven record of developing quality talent on the varsity team. The same focus and attention to detail will again be found in the camp program, which will be directed towards serious soccer training. The staff features coaches from around the country with the experience to teach and evaluate players. Campers attend from around the nation, including members of the US national youth team and regional teams. Campers reside in fully air-conditioned dorms. Trainers are on duty for the entire camp period. The camp has attracted teams from New Jersey, Seattle, Dallas, Atlanta, Houston, Jacksonville, Charlotte and many other areas, which along with our South Carolina teams, creates a competitive tournament atmosphere. GAMECOCKS IN THE PROS

GAMECOCKS IN THE PROS

The University of South Carolina soccer program continues to prepare its student-athletes for the total experience in college, and for making the next step to the professional soccer world. In 30 years of play – all coming under the direction of head coach Mark Berson – the Gamecocks have had over 40 players that were drafted or played in the professional ranks. Those individuals were drafted by teams either in the North American soccer leagues or in foreign leagues.

With the emergence of Major League Soccer in 1996, Gamecock Rob Smith joined the Columbus Crew, former Gamecock greats, Clint Mathis (New York/ New Jersey Metrostars) and Josh Wolff (Chicago Fire/Kansas City Wizards), soon joined the list of Gamecocks in the MLS. Wolff and Mathis finished second and third, respectively, in the voting for MLS Rookie of the Year in 1998. Henry Ring was the first goalkeeper drafted in in the 2000 MLS Super Draft and spent three years with the Chicago Fire and was named to the MLS All-Star team during a breakout 2004 season. Josh Wolff played for a short time overseas, but returned to the friendly confines of MLS in 2008, rejoining the Kansas City Wizards.

In 2003, three more Gamecocks joined the professional ranks. Defender Tim Glowienka was drafted by the NY/NJ Metro Stars and later joined teammate Michael Bachmeyer with the A-League's Pittsburgh Riverhounds. Midfielder David Moore joined the Atlanta Silverbacks, also a member of the A-League. Joey Worthen played with the Richmond Kickers of the A-League in 2004 and Real Salt Lake of the MLS in 2006.

Brad Guzan was the No. 2 pick, the highest ever for a goalkeeper, in the 2005 MLS SuperDraft. Guzan was a three-year starter for CD Chivas USA, however, in August of 2008 he made the move to the English Premier League, signing with Aston Villa. In 2007, Mike Sambursky was drafted by the defending MLS Champions and his hometown Houston Dynamo. The most recent former Gamecock to join an MLS squad is former goalkeeper Mike Gustavson who is a member of the San Jose Earthquakes.


MAJOR LEAGUE SOCCER

Goalkeeper Brad Guzan earned 2007 MLS Goalkeeper of the Year honors and enjoyed a breakout season with his club Chivas USA. Along with South Carolina's first Major League Soccer player, Rob Smith, Guzan, Mathis and Wolff have had a huge impact on the MLS and the U.S. National Team.

Both Mathis and Wolff entered the MLS after the 1997 season by different methods. Mathis was drafted by the Los Angeles Galaxy as the sixth overall pick in the 1998 draft. Wolff signed with "Project 40" and was assigned to the Chicago Fire.

Mathis and Wolff had breakthrough seasons in 2000. Mathis was the star of the 2000 All-Star game, playing for the NY/NJ MetroStars in the same season that Wolff led the U.S. Olympic team to its best finish in the Olympics. Wolff played every minute for the U.S. during the Olympic Games.

Despite suffering injuries in 2001, Mathis and Wolff were named to the 2002 U.S. World Cup team by head coach Bruce Arena. Both strikers impacted the team's success in South Korea.





In 2001, Wolff was joined by former USC teammate Henry Ring. The goalkeeper was drafted in the third round by the Fire. Ring was the first Gamecock since Mathis to earn two All-America honors (1998 and 2000). Ring, Mathis and Wolff were all teammates during Carolina's 16-3-1 season in 1997, when they closed out their season in the second round of the NCAAs. Wolff was traded from the Chicago Fire to the Kansas City Wizards in 2003. Ring assumed starting duties for the Fire in 2004 and had a breakout season, being named to the MLS All-Star team, while Mathis spent the 2004 campaign playing overseas with Hannover 96 of the German Bundesliga before returning to the MLS.

Guzan, the most recent Gamecock alumni to make his mark on MLS, collected 13 shutouts during the 2007 en route to MLS Goalkeeper of the Year honors. Following a successful three-year stint in MLS, Guzan signed with Aston Villa of the Barclays Premier League in England for the 2008 season.

These Gamecocks are carrying on the Gamecock tradition on the national scene. Mathis and Wolff have been featured on ESPN and ABC for their efforts in the MLS, tracing their start at South Carolina.

GAMECOCKS ON NATIONAL TEAMS

A number of players have played on various United States national teams throughout the years. Coach Mark Berson directed the South team to the gold medal at the U.S. Olympic Festival in Durham, N.C., in 1987 – one year after serving as assistant coach for the South squad. 2008 SEASON PREVIEW

Depth will be the strength of the South Carolina men's soccer team in 2008. Led by head coach Mark Berson, who enters his 31st season at the helm of the program, the Gamecocks bring a wealth of experience to the pitch. Along with a core of veteran players, Carolina welcomes a recruiting class ranked No. 14 in the country by CollegeSoccerNews.com.

"The overriding strength of this year's team will be in its depth," Berson said. "We have a number of players that gained a lot of experience last year. At this time last year, we started five freshmen and four sophomores in our lineup, and all of those guys return this season with a lot of experience under their belts. At the same time, our senior class will certainly contribute and will lend their experience, particularly their experience of winning a conference championship, to this team. Added to that is a very good recruiting class that will give support both with players contributing immediately and as players develop and provide depth throughout the season to our team. When you put all of those things together, you come up with a team that should have good depth. We hope that this will help us not only in winning individual contests, but in the larger picture of keeping our team fresh and hopefully healthy as we move through the season."

DEFENSE

South Carolina returns its entire defensive line in 2008. Led by sophomore goalkeeper Jimmy Maurer, who tallied five shutouts during his rookie season, the Gamecock defense will be a definite strong point this season.

"Jimmy Maurer returns as the reigning Conference USA Freshman of the Year. He was outstanding in the goal for us, but at the same time, he was able to learn a lot last season," Berson said. "In a number of competitive situations, Jimmy was outstanding, and he also had situations where he was able to learn and gain experience. That is a part of the growth of a freshman into his sophomore season. He's a student of the game and he's very mature in his approach and study of the game. Jimmy is a player who will benefit from the experiences he had last year.



"On the physical side, Jimmy is much stronger. He comes into the preseason with an added 10-12 pounds of muscle and this will be an important asset for him as he heads into the campaign. He's also worked very hard on his distribution and that has improved as well.

In several critical areas, Jimmy has improved himself over a player that was among the top goalkeepers in Conference USA last year. Clearly his leadership will be important. He is the type of individual who commands leadership by his presence, his accomplishments and his hard work in practice everyday. That leadership and that steadying influence are very important to us on our defensive line."

Junior defenders Mario Burstein, Tyler Ruthven and Mark Wiltse will join Maurer and fellow sophomore Will Traynor on the defensive line in 2008. Wiltse, a Conference USA Third Team member, and Ruthven, the C-USA Newcomer of the Year and a Third-Team honoree in 2007, will anchor a line that allowed a league-low seven goals during conference play last season. The squad helped Carolina collect six shutouts on the season, while allowing just 21 goals (1.10 goals per game) last year.

South Carolina is fortunate to have nearly 100 percent of its offense from last season returning to the field in 2008. The attacking part of the game is generally the last part to fall into place, but the Gamecocks are a step ahead this season with the strength and leadership of the back line in tact. A lot of the attack begins with the distribution and strength of the defensive line.

"A lot of the things that you do in the game of soccer begin with the stature, presence, calmness and ability to read the game from the backline. Our defense has a lot of experience this year, which is a great plus for our team."

MIDFIELD

The midfield will once again hold a wealth of talent for the Gamecocks in 2008. Junior Jeff Scannella, a 2007 member of the All-Conference USA First Team and NSCAA All-South Region Second Team, will anchor that position for Carolina this fall. Scannella led the Gamecocks with seven goals last season and collected a number of awards for his outstanding play. Sophomore Josh Stewart will join Scannella in the midfield again this season, while classmate Blake Brettschneider will make the move from forward to midfield this fall. Brettschneider contributed four goals and led the team with four assists a year ago. Senior David Smith will also play the majority of his time in the midfield. Smith will provide not only veteran experience, but he will also pose a serious offensive threat to opponents. Two newcomers join the midfield this fall in freshmen David MacVane and Stephen Morrissey. A highly-touted recruit from upstate New York, MacVane will bring a wealth of talent to the Gamecock midfield, having spent time in residency with the U.S. U-17 National Team in 2006. Morrissey, the 2007 Gatorade Tennessee State Player of the Year, will also contribute a great deal to the middle of the field.

"Basically everyone returns in the midfield. No question Jeff Scannella on the left side is a major factor, as well as Blake Brettschneider, who saw time at both the forward and midfield positions last fall. David Smith will also join Brettschneider at the right midfield position. That duo is two of the better players at that postition anywhere, and we have the luxury of having them both out there for our team.



"In the middle of the field, we have four players who have really done a great job for us. Spencer Lewis returns from the conference championship team in 2005. He is joined by Josh Stewart, who as a freshman last year played a vital role on our team. Freshman Stephen Morrissey has done extremely well in the middle of the field throughout preseason, and of course David MacVane, who we think is one of the most talented young players in the country this year. No question he is one of the brightest freshman players anywhere in any conference, as he has really shown for us in preseason. As he learns and gains more experience with the college game, the different venues, the different competitive arenas that he is going to enter he will clearly get better and better. We really have a lot of depth in the midfield."

FORWARD

The Gamecock offense will pose a huge threat in 2008 against opposing defensive lines. South Carolina has a wealth of depth at the forward position. Sophomore Sam Arthur returns after missing the final 10 games of last season with a leg injury. Joining Arthur on the front line is classmate Mike Lindsay, who provided a spark off the bench for Carolina the majority of last season. He collected four goals in the final five games of the season and was named to the *TopDrawerSoccer.com* Team of the Week and the C-USA All-Tournament squad. Newcomer Ryan Kropp, a transfer from USC-Upstate, will provide depth at the forward position, as will juniors Schuyler Reardon and Bryan Lowder, while Brettschneider may also see time on the forward line.

"We are very fortunate this year to have a solid group of returning players that will provide depth on the forward line for us," Berson said. "Sam Arthur, who was injured last year, was one of the leading scorers on our team despite that setback. Sam is back this year, he's healthy and he's playing extremely well. He is one of the dominant young forwards in the country in my opinion. Teamed up with him is Mike Lindsay who had a typical freshman year. It took him a while to find his legs, but by the end of the season he was creating a number of dangerous

chances and was voted on the C-USA All-Tournament team at the end of the year. Those guys give us a very dynamic combination up front.

"Senior Kevan Hawkins has had the best preseason of his career in 2008. He's playing very well, he's creating a number of chances and also scoring. It's great to see Kevan healthy and playing with the ability that he has shown in preseason. A number of other guys have also done very well for us at the forward position. Junior Schuyler Reardon and Ryan Kropp, who is a redshirt freshman, has done very well despite nursing a shoulder injury. Junior Bryan Lowder has also had his best

preseason as a Gamecock in 2008. We're really fortunate to have a number of guys that can contribute for us this season."

SCHEDULE

Contests against four teams that participated in the 2007 NCAA Tournament, including three that were ranked in the final NSCAA (National Soccer Coaches Association of America) top 25 poll, highlight the upcoming 2008 season of South Carolina men's soccer. The Gamecocks will play nine regular-season home games at Stone Stadium, including the highly anticipated season opener against archrival Clemson on Aug. 29.

From the final NSCAA top 25 poll, South Carolina will face topranked and defending national champion Wake Forest at its home tournament, the adidas Classic, in mid-September. Also from the final poll, Carolina will face No. 18 SMU and No. 20 Tulsa, both Conference USA opponents.

South Carolina looks for its second-straight season-opening victory over Clemson in 2008. South Carolina won the 2007 contest in fashion, as then-freshman Blake Brettschneider netted his first career game-winning tally in the 109th minute of double overtime to capture the 1-0 win. Following its regular-season opener against the Tigers at Stone Stadium on Aug. 29, South Carolina will host Presbyterian College on Sept. 2 before the Garnet and Black travel to the Wake Forest adidas Classic, Sept. 5-7, joining the host Demon Deacons, the University of North Carolina and UCLA in the grand slam tournament field. Carolina will face UNC (Sept. 5) and defending national champion Wake Forest (Sept. 7) at the event.

South Carolina will host the annual adidas Gamecock Classic Sept. 12-14. Carolina welcomes Lehigh University, Jacksonville University and Presbyterian College to Stone Stadium for the weekend tournament. The Gamecocks will face Lehigh in the premier game on Sept. 12, followed by a match with Jacksonville on Sept. 14.

The Gamecocks travel to intrastate rival College of Charleston on Sept. 19. The Cougars finished second last season in the Southern Conference standings with their only league loss against South Carolina's next opponent, fellow in-state competitor, Furman. The Paladins and Gamecocks will play in Furman's Stone Stadium on Sept. 24. Carolina will host Davidson in its final non-conference game of the regular season in Columbia on Sept. 27.

The Conference USA season begins with a home match against Florida International (Oct. 4) followed by a two-match road trip where the Gamecocks will face SMU (Oct. 8) and Kentucky (Oct. 12). Carolina returns home to host Memphis on Oct. 17, before traveling to Marshall on Oct. 25. South Carolina will play two of its final three regular-season contests at home, beginning with a match against UAB on Oct. 29. The Gamecocks will travel to the Midwest for a Nov. 1 matchup with Tulsa, before returning home for their regular-season finale against Central Florida on Nov. 7.

SMU will host the 2008 Conference USA Championship, Nov. 12-16, in Dallas, Texas. All dates and times are subject to change.
