- South Carolina enters the 2019 SEC tournament as the No. 11 seed and is set to face the No. 6 seed Florida Gators in the opening round on Wednesday.
- Carolina looks to get a little revenge as Florida swept the season series last year in Gainesville and took down the Gamecocks in the SEC Tournament Championship in Columbia, Mo.
- If the Gamecocks were to win, it would be their first win over Florida since 2013 and just the second under head coach Beverly Smith.
- This would mark the first neutral site win over Florida since a 9-2 victory over the Gators in 2000.
- Jana Johns comes into the tournament having hit four home runs in her past three games and six over her last 10. She is just one off from breaking the school record for homers in a season (would be 16).

South Carolina has seen its star rise again in the collegiate softball world, and head coach Beverly Smith has guided that process since arriving as head coach in July of 2010. She oversees all aspects of the program and works most closely on the field with the pitchers. As a head coach, Smith's overall record is 314-212, becoming only the second Gamecock softball coach with over 200 career wins.

From 2013-18, Smith has guided the Gamecocks to six-consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances, which is tied for the longest streak in program history. The Gamecocks have competed in the regional championship three-consecutive seasons, as the 2018 team reached the program's second-ever super regional.

The Gamecocks finished the 2018 season with an impressive 49-17 (15-9 SEC) mark on their way to a third-place finish in the SEC, their best finish since placing second in the SEC East in 2003. Carolina used the momentum from a strong conference campaign in the SEC Tournament on its way to the program's first Tournament Championship appearance since 2001. The 49 overall wins were the most since 1999, while the 15 conference wins were the most since winning 18 in 2003. In the polls Carolina finished 11th, its highest final ranking since 1997 and the second-best finish in school history. In total, the Gamecocks broke four season records as a team (home runs, RBI, HBP, fielding percentage and double plays turned) while Jana Johns broke three individual season records (HBP, assists at third and fielding percentage at third). For the first time since 1997, Carolina had five players receive All-SEC honors (Kenzi Maguire, Mackenzie Boesel, Alyssa VanDerveer, Johns and Kelsey Oh). With national recognition, the Gamecocks had three players named to All-Region Teams (Maguire, Boesel and VanDerveer) for the first time since 1999. In the classroom, Boesel became the 10th Gamecock in program history (second under Smith) to take Academic All-America honors.

Over the course of the past six years, the team has improved its final RPI from the NCAA from No. 37 in 2013 to No. 9 in 2018. During the past eight seasons the program's offense has posted some of its strongest seasons during Smith's tenure, setting 28 team program records. In the per-game team records, Smith's group holds eight of the 16 tracked. Gamecock pitching has improved markedly during that same tenure. From 2013-15, Smith's staff improved its strikeout-to-walk ratio in each season, while the 2016 and 2017 groups posted the program's first earned-run average under 3.00 since 2008 (2.82 in 2016, 2.96 in 2017). In 2018, the team had three different 10-plus game winners for the first time under Smith's leadership while the trio of pitchers produced the team's lowest ERA since 2007.

Two Gamecocks have moved onto the National Pro Fastpitch circuit during her tenor. Garcia spent three years in the league with the NY/NJ Comets and the Pennsylvania Rebellion, getting drafted by the Comets in the fourth round of the 2013 College Draft. Page played for the NPF's 2016 champs, the Chicago Bandits.

Prior to coming to South Carolina, Smith served as the top assistant at North Carolina, working mostly with the pitchers and catchers. The final three years, she was the associate head coach after nine as an assistant. Smith helped the Tar Heels to two Atlantic Coast Conference titles in 2001 and 2008 and eight of their nine NCAA Tournament appearances. She served as the lead recruiter for the Tar Heels during that time, helping to bring in five All-Americans into the UNC program. She also helped North Carolina achieve a top-25 ranking in the USA Today/NFCA Coaches Poll at least once per season from 2006-10.

Born in Asheboro, N.C., and Smith was raised in Houston, Texas. She is a graduate of the University of North Carolina.

21 NCAA TOURNAMENT BIDS EIGHT WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES

THE GAMECOCKS AT THE SEC TOURNAMENT

- South Carolina set the tone for SEC softball, taking home the first conference tournament title in 1997 as Trinity Johnson earned Tournament MVP honors in Columbus, Ga.
- Carolina has two SEC Tournament championships to its name. The first coming in 1997 and the second just three years later in 2000. Megan Matthews Buning was honored as the Tournament MVP while Joyce Compton coached the Gamecocks to both championships.
- The Gamecocks have reached the tournament finals four times (1997, 2000, 2001 and 2018). That mark is the fifth-most appearances in finals game.
- Overall South Carolina has won 20 tournament games (sixth-most in SEC history) as the Gamecocks won two last season on their way to the tournament championship. Under the direction of Beverly Smith Carolina has taken home five wins in the tournament. The program is 20-21 (.488) all-time at the tournament.

2018 SEC TOURNAMENT - RUN BACK TO THE SHIP

- A magical 2018 regular season for Carolina was followed with a memorable 2018 SEC Tournament as the Gamecocks won their first two games over Mississippi State and Arkansas to reach their first SEC Championship Game appearance since 2001.
- It started against Mississippi State as Cayla Drotar earned the win in the circle going all seven innings in the 3-1 victory. Kenzi Maguire, Drotar and Alyssa Kumiyama plated runs in the contest. The Bulldogs attempted a comeback in the seventh with a run but it wasn't enough as Drotar allowed just four hits all day.
- The Tournament continued against Arkansas in a 3-1 victory with Dixie Raley going all seven innings in the circle. She allowed just five hits with seven strikeouts as Kenzi Maguire and Tiara Duffy plated runs. Duffy notably blasted a two-run homer in the bottom of the first to help Carolina break the school record for home runs in a season.
- A matchup with the Florida Gators in the championship didn't go how the Gamecocks wanted as they dropped a 3-1 contest. Cayla Drotar plated the lone Carolina run but Kelsey Oh took the loss in five innings of work with four hits and four strikeouts.

OTHER WINS IN SC'S TOURNAMENT HISTORY UNDER SMITH

- In 2013 at John Cropp Stadium in Lexington, Ky., Carolina earned its first SEC Tournament win under Beverly Smith. The Gamecocks took down host Kentucky in a 6-3 victory. Redshirt sophomore Julie Sarratt tosses a complete game to help the Gamecocks to the win.
- In 2015, Carolina returned to Lexington as it took down Texas A&M in a 6-3 game in the opening round. Senior Olivia Lawrence tied the game in the sixth with a solo homer before Victoria Williams sent a ball to the gap in right center to score three and give the Gamecocks the eventual 6-3 victory.
- In 2016, the Gamecocks took down Missouri in a 7-4 victory in eight innings in Starkville, Miss. A two out, pinch-hit home run to score three off the bat of junior Taylor Williams in the eighth gave Carolina a tournament win for the second-straight year.

LAST 10 COMING INTO COLLEGE STATION

- Carolina comes into the SEC Tournament with a 6-4 record over its past 10 games while outscoring teams 56-37 with 18 home runs and a .382 team on-base percentage.
- The Gamecocks took two games from UNCG and a game over USC Upstate over its bye week. Carolina outscored the pair 25-9 with six home runs while slugging .688 in three games.
- South Carolina dropped its series to Georgia, 2-1. Cayla Drotar had a team-best four RBI.
- Carolina dropped its series to Missouri, 2-1, over the weekend.

THE GAMECOCKS

- Carolina comes into the 2019 season looking to build upon a 49-17 season in which the Gamecocks reached the program’s second ever super regional after winning the Columbia Regional.
- The Gamecocks welcome five freshmen and transfer Katie Prebble to the program this season to bring the Gamecocks to 19 active members.
- Head coach Beverly Smith has been keeping the local talent home recently, as the Gamecocks have five South Carolina natives on roster and two of the last three South Carolina Gator Players of the Year.
- Carolina won't be lacking arms this season with five available coming into the new season, leaving 14 fielders. Freshman Rachel Vaughan comes in as coach Smith’s first left-handed pitcher during her time at South Carolina.

THE UPCOMING WEEK

- South Carolina softball will be the No. 11 seed in the SEC Tournament next week in College Station, Texas. The Gamecocks will face Florida in the opening round on Wednesday at 1:30 PM ET on SEC Network.
- With 12 SEC wins on the year the Gators earned the No. 6 seed and will meet the Gamecocks for the first time in 2019 in a rematch of the 2018 SEC Tournament Championship.
- Joining South Carolina on its side of the bracket is No. 7 seed Missouri and No. 10 seed Auburn. The winner of the Carolina game will face No. 3 seed LSU while the winner of the other contest will move on to play No. 2 Tennessee.
- No. 12 seed Mississippi State will play No. 13 seed Texas A&M in the opening game of the tournament with the winner moving on to face No. 5 seed Ole Miss. No. 8 seed Georgia and No. 9 seed Arkansas will also meet on Wednesday on that side of the bracket. The victor in the Ole Miss game will move on to play No. 4 seed Kentucky while the winner of the other contest will face No. 1 seed Alabama. LSU, Tennessee, Alabama and Kentucky were the four teams to earn first-round byes.

NOTES AND TRENDS HEADING INTO THE WEEKEND

- South Carolina comes into the weekend looking to build its resume with one last chance to impress the selection committee in the SEC Tournament.
- Carolina comes into the week having hit at least one home run its past eight games and two or more in five of them. Jana Johns as led the way with four in just her past three games.
- Johns has been tearing it up over the past 10 games at the plate. She’s batting .387 with six home runs and 11 RBI on her way to slugging 1.000. 11 free bases, including eight walks, have helped her to a .548 on-base percentage. She has also scored 11 runs during the stretch.
- There have been a couple notable trends this season surrounding the Gamecocks and scoring. Carolina is 26-1 when it scores at least six runs and 27-5 when it scores first. In contrast, the Gamecocks are just 10-15 when scoring less than six runs and 9-11 when the opponent plates one first.

THANK YOU SENIORS

- South Carolina honored its two seniors against Georgia with Dixie Raley’s day on Saturday and Kennedy Clark’s on Sunday.
- The pair have won 85 games together over the past two year (Raley transferred in) and helped Carolina reach its second-ever super regional last season.
- Kennedy Clark stands second all-time for fielding percentage in a career at South Carolina for an outfielder.
- Dixie Raley is the only pitcher under Smith to beat Alabama twice in a career.

IS THERE AN ART TO GETTING HIT?

Records are meant to be broken, but when three individuals on the same team rank No. 1, No. 2 and No. 3 in program history for an offensive statistic, it’s pretty unique. Many of South Carolina’s team and individual records for a single season and a career have fallen over the last seven years, and as a result the Gamecocks are in the hunt for their seventh consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance.

Care to take a guess which career record has three current Gamecocks at the top of the list?

No, not home runs. Not yet, anyway.

It’s not RBI either. Nor is it doubles or stolen bases.

If you need a hint, think about Hughie Jennings and Craig Biggio if you’re a Major League Baseball aficionado. Maybe Rudy Stein from The Bad News Bears if you’re in to classic sports movies?

Redshirt junior Kenzi Maguire, sophomore Jana Johns, and senior Kennedy Clark rank first, tied for second, and third, respectively, for the most times to be hit by a pitch at South Carolina. It’s not that they can’t get out of the way. They just choose not to.

“Our motto is, ‘we’ve got ice.’ So, if we do get hit, we can put ice on it,” Clark said. “It’s not a big deal.”

“O-B-P (On Base Percentage) is life! If they want to put us on base, we’re going to take it,” Johns said.

Maguire has been hit a program-leading 48 times in her career, but after having to sit out a couple of weeks with an ankle injury this season, her teammates are on her heals! Johns is tied with Dana Hathorn (2011-2014) for second on the list, earning 46 beanballs, including a single-season record 28 plunkings as a freshman last year. Clark is next on the list at 38. (Clark’s total hit by pitch is currently the third highest number, and since there is a tie for second, you could technically count her as fourth overall.)

If “taking one for the team” is a badge of honor, these three are certainly well-decorated, even if it hurts sometimes.

“It depends where you get hit,” Clark said. “Most of the times it happens so quickly, you think, ‘oh, good I get to go to first,’ so you don’t think about it. Then you’re standing on first base, and it starts throbbing. Kenzi and I get mad because we don’t get bruises, and you can’t show how hard it really hit you; but Jana, she bruises!”

MACKENZIE BOESEL FEATURE

A junior from Orange County, Calif., softball player Mackenzie Boesel is nothing less than a rock star. A previous recipient of the esteemed Academic All-American award, Boesel is talented both on the field and in the classroom.

Seeing one's name on the Academic All-America list is something that many athletes only dream of. For Boesel, it is proof that all of her hard work is paying off.

"You spend so much time on both school and softball, and to know that all of that hard work and stress that you go through throughout the year is worth it is really rewarding," Boesel stated. "I'm pretty busy doing both so it's nice to get recognized for it."

South Carolina head coach Beverly Smith recognized Boesel's gifts and ambition early in the recruiting process and began pursuing her as soon as her freshman year of high school.

"I was doing this hitting clinic, and the hitting coach that was here a few years ago saw me and told Coach Bev to watch out for me," Boesel said. "She recruits a lot in California, because softball is huge there. So when she came out and watched me play, she told me that she wanted me to come visit the campus. I did and I loved it the first time I came out here."

Like many other student-athletes, Boesel's days are long and hard. She often starts around 6:15 a.m. and doesn't finish until the evening. Then she starts it all again the next day. While all of this together can be stressful, Boesel uses it as motivation to strive and work harder.

"I just love the competition every day," Boesel stated. "There's always room to improve. There's always room to get better. I'm a very competitive person, and softball provides that outlet for me."

"Playing with the team and meeting my teammates here, they're some of my best friends. I love playing with the team and the competition it provides."

Although Boesel has played softball since she was five, she has explored a variety of sports like many other young athletes. However, with both a mother and sister that played softball in college, the sport has always held a top place in her heart.

"I wanted to be a gymnast, but that didn't work out. I also played soccer, but I didn't like running that much, so softball was it," Boesel said.

- Carolina earned its first SEC series win on the road of the year three weekends ago at No. 12 Auburn after taking the last two.
- Cayla Drotar earned both wins as Dixie Raley came on in relief to earn the save on Sunday to seal the series win.
- As a team, the Gamecocks outscored Auburn 22-10 with five home runs and a .417 on-base percentage.
- Carolina scored 22 of the last 28 runs over the course of the series on its way to earning the wins.

DIXIE DOMINATES ALABAMA WEEKEND

- Carolina got a much needed SEC win with a 2-1 series victory over No. 4 Alabama a few weekends ago. Dixie Raley went 2-0 on the weekend as SC got its first series win over the Tide since 2009.
- Raley earned the win in the Saturday and Sunday games going 12 innings with just one run allowed.
- For her efforts, Raley was named SEC Pitcher of the Week for the first time in her career.
- Boesel hit .556 with a homer, double and 2 RBI with .636 on-base percentage during the series.

IRON BOWL SERIES WINS

- Carolina became just the third team since 2005 to earn series wins over Auburn and Alabama in back-to-back weekends (11 chances).
- The Gamecocks outscored the two rivals 30-20 with a .318 batting average with eight home runs.
- Madison Owens led the way with a .462 batting average on six hits while Mackenzie Boesel had 10 with four RBI.
- Jana Johns has been an RBI machine with six to go along with her three home runs and .389 batting average.

THIS ISN'T SPARTA... BUT SHE'S GOT 300

- Head coach Beverly Smith earned her 300th victory as a head coach at South Carolina a few Wednesday nights ago with a 5-4 win over Duke. She was already in elite company only the second coach in program history with at least 200 wins.
- Smith's first win as a head coach came on Feb. 11, 2011, at Beckham Field in a 10-6 victory over Charleston Southern. The Gamecocks eventually went 3-1 her first opening weekend that season.
- Smith's most recent win as a head coach came over Missouri on Sunday afternoon.
- A graduate of the University of North Carolina, Smith's moved to 3-0 all-time against the Blue Devils and earned win No. 300 against Duke.

ARKANSAS... LET’S KEEP MOVING FORWARD

- South Carolina dropped its three-game series at Arkansas earlier this year, 2-1, as the Razorbacks took the first two games of the series.
- The series was tight as could be, as Arkansas outscored the Gamecocks just 16-15 over the weekend and had just three more hits.
- Jana Johns led the way at the plate, hitting .375 with a .545 on-base percentage. Alyssa Kumiyama had a team-best five RBI. In the circle Dixie Raley earned the win for the Gamecocks.
- The Carolina pitching staff found ways to get strikeouts throughout the weekend as the unit produced 19 in three games.

NOT THE START YOU’D ASK FOR

- There is no way to spin it, the opening weekend in SEC play for South Carolina was not what the program hoped for. Then-No. 22 Kentucky took all three games of the series.
- While the weekend wasn’t great, it’s not quite time to hit the panic button. Teams do get swept from time to time, and it was the first weekend of the season in SEC play (the nation’s toughest conference).
- Over the weekend, Carolina’s Kenzi Maguire notably became the school record holder for hit by pitches in a career as she collected her 47th in the series finale.

THE WINNING STREAK

- The Gamecocks came into the week at the start of the year riding a 15-game winning streak and had won 15-straight games for the second-straight year. This marked the first time since the 1996 and 1997 seasons the Gamecocks had won 10-straight games (or more) in back-to-back seasons. Carolina had outscored opponents 139-31 (+108) during the streak while batting .390 as a team.
- A better look into the numbers, Carolina hit 27 home runs with 133 RBI and a .489 on-base percentage thanks to a 82 free bases. The pitching wasn’t been bad either, as Dixie Raley posted a 1.56 ERA with a 4-0 record (and two saves) in 27 innings of work with 31 strikeouts while holding teams to a low .177 batting average.
- At the plate, Carolina had five hitters batting .400 or better (Jana Johns, Mackenzie Boesel, Kennedy Clark, Cayla Drotar, Kenzi Maguire).
- Some notable game highs during the streak included 33 at bats at South Florida, 16 runs scored against Campbell, 16 hits against Campbell, five doubles three different times, six walks twice, four hit by pitches three times 11 strikeouts of opposing hitters against Coastal Carolina.

ALEXIS LINDSEY FEATURE

Busing tables doesn’t sound like the most memorable summer vacation, but when you’re working at one of the most spectacular national parks, and you have a chance at new adventures during your off-time, it’s a much better deal. At least that’s the case for South Carolina softball redshirt sophomore Alexis Lindsey, who interned at Yellowstone National Park this summer to earn credit towards her tourism management degree.

“I had gone and visited Yellowstone last year with my family, and I just loved it,” Lindsey said. “I wanted to work with the national parks because of my major, and I thought this would be the perfect opportunity. I’d get to spend a couple of months in a national park and get a hike in whenever I want on the weekends. It was an amazing experience.”

For someone who loves the outdoors, there was not a lot of downtime when she wasn’t on the job.

“When I wasn’t working, I was hiking and doing whatever I could to see as much as possible,” Lindsey said. “We’d work for five days straight, then you’d have a weekend. I’d go hiking and camping every weekend. I went to Grand Teton National Park, which was not even an hour away from Yellowstone. It was so beautiful.”

Lindsey’s summer adventures took her to 10 different states and five national parks.

“I went to a different state every weekend,” Lindsey said. “I was in Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, South Dakota, North Dakota, Nebraska, and lots of other places. We drove to South Dakota strictly to see Mount Rushmore. I mean, when else am I going to get to see that?”

“The wildlife is unbelievable at Yellowstone. I really like elk and bison, and they are everywhere! You would be walking down the street, and all of the sudden there’s a bison standing there. So, I’d say ‘hey man, what’s up’ to this 1,000-pound bison! Honestly, getting up knowing you can go where there will be wildlife and just watch them in nature was probably my favorite part.”

Lindsey is also an amateur photographer, and she had plenty of opportunities to put the camera, which was a gift from her father a few years back, to good use.

“The Tetons were so majestic, but a picture doesn’t do them justice,” Lindsey said. “I took a lot of geyser pictures. There were over 300 of those in Yellowstone. Badlands National Park in South Dakota was really cool, too. It’s so different. You’re just driving along these prairies and all of the sudden there are these huge canyons.”

GAMECOCKS DOMINATE GAMECOCK INVITATIONAL

- After a 3-2 weekend in Mexico, the Gamecocks got right back on track at home with a 4-0 weekend in the Gamecock Invitational as the team outscored opponents 40-13 with eight home runs.
- The Gamecocks had five players with at least 10 at bats hit .400 or better over the weekend (Kennedy Clark, Cayla Drotar, Lauren Stewart, Mackenzie Boesel and Jana Johns).
- Cayla Drotar stood out all weekend and was later named SEC Player of the Week for the first time in her career. A junior, she hit .636 with 12 RBI and notably hit three home runs over the last two games, including a grand slam in the win over Campbell.
- Kennedy Clark wasn't so bad herself. A senior, she hit .700 with seven hits and four runs scored to go along with her four RBI.

MEXICO IS IN THE BOOKS

- South Carolina finished with a respectable 3-2 record to open the 2019 season a couple months ago in Mexico against BYU, No. 18 Baylor, Duke, Notre Dame and North Carolina.
- The Gamecocks earned win No. 1,500 in program history with the 4-3 win over BYU to open the season.
- Kenzi Maguire led the way at the plate for the Gamecocks, hitting .333 with two runs, six hits, a home run and five RBI.
- For their efforts, Kenzi Maguire and Haley Simpson were named to the All-PVC Tournament Team. Simpson hit .571 with four hits and two RBI in her collegiate debut weekend for the Gamecocks.

LET'S GET IT OUT OF THE WAY... WHAT A SEASON 2018 WAS

- 2018 will go down as one of the more special seasons in South Carolina softball history as the program reached its second ever super regional thanks to a 49-17 season. The 49 wins were the most under Beverly Smith and the most since 1999.
- You've probably heard the underdog story by now. The Gamecocks were picked to finish 12th in the SEC but chose not to listen, finishing 15-9 to take third. The 15 wins were the most in the Beverly Smith era and the most since winning 18 in 2003.
- Carolina had five players named to the All-SEC Teams (Kenzi Maguire, Mackenzie Boesel, Alyssa VanDerveer, Jana Johns and Kelsey Oh). The five overall recognitions were the most since the program also had five in 1997.
- Home was home sweet home for the Gamecocks as Carolina posted an impressive 29-3 record at Carolina Stadium. South Carolina outscored opponents 173-63 and posted a .983 fielding percentage.

LAST SEASON WAS ALL ABOUT THE START

- Carolina opened the 2018 season with a 20-1 record, including the program's best 20-game start in school history.
- During that time, Gamecock batters were hitting .315 while outscoring opponents 134-25.
- In the circle, Cayla Drotar led the way with a 10-0 record to go along with her 1.24 ERA. As a staff, Dixie Raley and Kelsey Oh posted a 1.15 era with 95 strikeouts during that time.
- In total, the Gamecocks finished with a 22-3 record before the start of SEC play.

SEC SUCCESS WAS OH SO SWEET

- South Carolina won five of its SEC series (Ole Miss, Tennessee, Arkansas, Mississippi State and Missouri). During those series wins, Carolina outscored teams 86-44 with a .297 batting average.
- Mackenzie Boesel played a big role in the SEC series wins, as she led the Gamecocks with a .417 batting average with 14 runs, 10 RBI.
- In the circle, the trio of Kelsey Oh, Dixie Raley and Cayla Drotar posted a 2.47 ERA during those games with 55 strikeouts and seven complete games.
- South Carolina went on to reach the SEC Tournament Championship for the first time since 2001 with wins over UA and Miss. State.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS WASN'T SO BAD EITHER

- Carolina went 34-8 in non-conference games last season, finishing a commanding 18-1 at home in those games and 12-2 in neutral games. The Gamecocks outscored teams 214-66 (+148) in those games.
- Once again, as she did all season, Mackenzie Boesel shined in those games batting a Carolina-best .352 with 45 hits, 34 runs and 34 RBI. Teams quickly caught on to what the problem was, as she drew 16 walks throughout the non-conference games.
- The pitching trio (Dixie Raley, Cayla Drotar and Kelsey Oh) dominated the competition, posting a 1.50 ERA with 25 complete games. The trio of doom posted 217 strikeouts.
- Cayla Drotar proved to be ultra-valuable during the non-conference games, posting a 1.65 ERA in the circle with 14.

2018: THE YEAR RECORDS FALL

- The Gamecocks set single season records for home runs (65), RBI (309), hit by pitches (86), fielding percentage (.979) and double plays turned (31).
- Individual season records included hit by pitch (Jana Johns, 28), assists at third base (Jana Johns, 151) and fielding percentage at third base (Jana Johns, .978).
- 40,209 fans came to Carolina Stadium at Beckham Field last season, the most in program history. 2,023 was the season high against No. 2 Tennessee in the Saturday game of the series.

... MOVING ON FROM OLD NEWS. HOW ABOUT THE NEW!

- Carolina welcomes five new freshman and All-American transfer Katie Prebble to the program this season. Jordan Fabian, Karly Heath, Madison Owens, Haley Simpson and Rachel Vaughan join the team as the five freshman.
- Jordan Fabian holds the honor of youngest Gamecock on roster as she graduated a year early (brains and skills) to become a Gamecock a year early.
- Karly Heath, what can't you do? The most recent South Carolina Gator Player of the Year to join the program pitches, plays in the field AND hits for herself.
- Rachel Vaughan isn't just new in the fact that she's a new pitcher for the Gamecocks, but she also holds the title of Beverly Smith's first left-handed pitcher during her time at South Carolina.

RESPECTING THE NAME AND NUMBERS

- Last season was the year of the underdog for the Gamecocks as the team entered the season unranked and picked to finish 12th in SEC Play. This offseason has been just a little different.
- This year the SEC coaches have picked the Gamecocks to finish fourth in conference play and named Mackenzie Boesel to the All-AEC Preseason Team, Carolina's first selection to the team during the Beverly Smith era.
- The national polls also tossed Carolina some love, as the Gamecocks were ranked T-ninth in the NFCA Poll, ninth in the USA Softball Rankings and seventh in FloSoftball's Poll. The rankings from the NFCA and USA Softball mark Carolina's first time since 2004 to start the season ranked.
- Sophomore Katie Prebble comes to South Carolina as the program's second returning All-American under Smith and the first since 2012. The Gardner-Webb transfer has been named a pre-season All-American by Flosoftball and Justin's World of Softball this year.

ALEX FULMER ON THE BEAT

Alex Fulmer isn't just going along for the ride. After spending time on patrol with the Richland County Sheriff's Department in ride-alongs last year, South Carolina softball's sophomore outfielder continues to seek hands-on experience in pursuit of a future career in law enforcement and is now working part-time with the with the R.C.S.D.'s Fugitive Task Force.

"We go after people involved in intense crimes with arrest warrants," Fulmer said. "It could be murder, attempted murder, violent crimes, and things like that.

"We know who we're going after because we've done the research in advance. We know everything about them. It's usually a pretty easy grab. A lot of times we go early in the mornings, and they're asleep by the time we get there."

The Newberry, S.C., native is studying criminal justice, and during her ride-along experiences last year, Fulmer was on patrol with deputies who were part of the Live P.D. television show, which follows law enforcement officers during evening patrols.

"After working with them for a few months, our senior investigator Tanesha Reese, really influenced me to want to do more," Fulmer said. "She told me to come see her at the office, we talked about it, and it worked out."

Fulmer works at the Richland County Sheriff's Department three days per week in between classes and practices. In addition to investigating where to find the alleged offenders, Fulmer sometimes goes out with the deputies when the arrests are made.

"I don't get scared," Fulmer said. "Whenever we go out on operations, I stay in the truck until our team deems that it's safe. We usually have a pretty good idea what we're going into, but sometimes if you're going after one accused of attempted murder or assault with a deadly weapon, your nerves can get going. You have to push your emotions to the back. For the most part, I know our people will be OK."

Fulmer's long-term law enforcement goals include becoming a Secret Service agent, but for now, she is happy to work her way up.

"What I like about law enforcement is being able to help out the community any way that I can," Fulmer said. "I've learned a lot.

"Some of the crimes that I've looked into are very disturbing. They can make you upset, and you think 'how can somebody do that to somebody else?' It's a great feeling when you know you've helped get someone like that off the streets. I do feel like I'm making an impact."

BETTER LOOK INTO BOESEL

- Currently batting .346 (would be just off a career best if the season ended today) on 56 hits (24 of which have gone for extra-base hits) as she's posted a .457 on-base percentage thanks in part to 34 free bases thus far through 52 games. With just 15 strikeouts through 52 games, she is well under pace for the past two seasons on her way to a career low in that category.
- In Charlotte on Feb. 24, became the 17th Gamecock in program history to bring home 100 or more RBI in a career in the 15-1 victory in five innings over Winthrop. Currently in her career she is tied for 8th in runs scored, fourth in home runs, tied for eighth in RBI, and tied for 10th in hit by pitches. Is also standing strong with the second-best on-base percentage for a career in school history. (5/6)
- Received plenty of attention at the start of the 2019 season, as she was named to the Preseason All-SEC Team and selected to the USA Softball Top-50 Watch List for Player of the Year.
- Mackenzie Boesel couldn't have asked for a much better sophomore year, as she became just the 10th Gamecock in program history to be named an Academic All-American as well as her selection to the All-SEC Second Team (her second All-SEC honor of her career).

BETTER LOOK INTO MAGUIRE

- Kenzi Maguire is batting a .306 thus far through 52 games with a career best slugging percentage (.504). Over the course of her career, Maguire is batting .301 in 165 games with 141 hits (40 of which have gone for extra bases) with a .414 on-base percentage.
- Just seven doubles away from entering the top 15 for most doubles in a career as of 5/6. Notably became the school record holder for hit by pitches in a career on March 10 against Kentucky with No. 47 of her career. Currently has 49, and is tied with Jana Johns for the most in school history.
- In 2018, notably had an 11-game hitting streak and 23-game reached base streak, both of which were Carolina bests for the year.
- Was named to the All-SEC Second Team, All-Region Second Team, SEC Player of the Week for the first time in her career (4/10) and had the SEC Defensive Play of the Year in the win over Mississippi State (4/28).

BETTER LOOK INTO CLARK

- Senior Kennedy Clark brings plenty of experience to the outfield and plate for the Gamecocks after having started 220 games over her career, by far the most in the outfield right now for South Carolina's group of overall young outfielders.
- Was hitting .475 with 19 hits and 16 RBI during the team's 15-game winning streak at the start of the year. Notably hit .529 with seven RBI in the five wins at the USF Tournament a couple months ago with a 1.000 slugging percentage. Overall on the season she's hitting .381 with 56 hits and 28 RBI on her way to a career best in batting average.
- Shined in the postseason last year with four hits in the Columbia Regional and a two-run home run to help the Gamecocks avoid a no-hitter in the first game of the ASU Super Regional.
- Became the 18th Gamecock in program history with 100 or more RBI in a career in the win over Bryant on 3/13. Currently has 110. Has also played in the 11th-most games out of any active Division I softball player in the country with 233 up to this point.

BETTER LOOK INTO DROTAR

- Shined in the circle for the Gamecocks in 2018 with 21 wins and 16 complete games. Is off to a good start in 2019, as well, posting a 11-6 record to start the year. So far in her career, has a higher batting average (.259) than opposing hitters are batting against her (.247) in the circle.
- Off to a career-year kind of start at the plate in 2019, hitting .270 with 40 hits and 43 RBI (career best). Hasn't been far off in the circle, either, striking out 67 batters in contrast to just 48 walks.
- 10 multi-RBI games (one of three Carolina players to do so) in 2018.
- Was named to the All-SEC Tournament Team, as well as the Second-Team All-Region squad last year.

BETTER LOOK INTO JOHNS

- Named SEC Player of the Week for the first time in her career on 2/25 after going 10-for-11 with at least one single, double, triple and home run the previous four games. Named South Carolina Female Student Athlete Freshman of the Year for 2018.
- As of 5/6, is batting .382 (career best) with 55 hits (26 of which have gone for extra-base hits) with 44 RBI and a crazy .785 slugging percentage.
- Led the Gamecocks with 28 hit by pitches (program record) which paced the SEC on the year in 2018. Tied for first for HBP in a career now at 49.
- Was named the SEC Freshman of the Week twice and to the All-SEC Freshmen and Defensive Teams in 2018.

BETTER LOOK INTO OH

- Although just a freshman, Kelsey Oh posted a 1.92 ERA on her way to a 14-5 record with a team-best 135 strikeouts in 35 games last year.
- Was the only Gamecock pitcher to allow fewer than 10 home runs on the season.
- Held batters to a low .195 batting average.
- Was named to the NFCA Top-25 Freshman Watch List as well as the All-SEC Freshmen Team.

BETTER LOOK INTO RALEY

- Dixie Raley came to South Carolina as a transfer from Georgia Southern last season and quickly made an impact with a 14-win season with 106 strikeouts in 2018.
- Posted her second-straight double-digit win season at Carolina in 2019 with her 10th win over the year coming in the Sunday victory over No. 4 Alabama. It marked the first time in her career she started back-to-back SEC games and was the first time under head coach Beverly Smith the Gamecocks had a pitcher earn two wins over the Crimson Tide in a season.
- In 2019, currently leads the South Carolina staff with 11 wins in 26 appearances with four saves (career high). Just two complete games away from matching her total from last season (9).
- Named SEC Pitcher of the Week for the first time in her career on 4/9/2019 after defeating Alabama twice in one weekend (back-to-back wins).

THE GAMECOCKS ALL TIME - THE COACHES

- South Carolina is 1,535-820-7 in its 44 years of softball. 314 of those have come during the Beverly Smith era.
- The Gamecocks have had nine coaches during the program's history, starting with Vivian Hamilton in 1975. By far the longest tenured and winningest coach in program history was Joyce Compton.
- Compton coached from 1987-2010, winning 951 games (most in school history) with 182 conference wins and 13 NCAA Regional appearances.
- Smith and Compton are the only two who have stayed more than four years.

WHAT IS IN A NUMBER

They wore the same number for the same program, and although they didn't play at the same time, former South Carolina softball infielders Chrissy Schoonmaker (2004-2008), Evan Childs (2009-2012), and Krystan White (2015-2018) may as well be teammates. The trio created a special bond through regular communication over the years to make sure the generations wearing their beloved number 11 are doing well and doing things the right way.

"We've all kept up with each other, and I enjoy being involved with all of them," said Schoonmaker, who is now an assistant coach at UCONN and was a volunteer assistant for South Carolina early in Childs' career. "We just all support each other, and that's one of the cool things about being a South Carolina alum in that we're always going to support each other. You want the program to do well of course, but you cheer a little harder for them and pull for them because you share a common bond."

"It meant a whole lot," said Childs, who now operates her own business as a successful certified personal trainer. "Everybody loves to have a mentor. Chrissy is such an awesome person. As a coach or friend, she just shines at everything."

"They've both been amazing," White said. "They always reach out and we keep that 11-bond going. I thought it was really special to have them keeping up with things. We have a lot of bonding moments over number 11 and certain other things. When anything good happens, I'll get a message or tweet saying, 'way to go number 11.'"

For Schoonmaker, it all started when she was a freshman for the Gamecocks in 2004 and the recently graduated Danielle Quiñones (2000-2003), who wore 11 before her, reached out with a phone call.

"She gave me a pep talk about embracing the journey," Schoonmaker said. "She built me up and talked to me about leaving the uniform better than you found it. She would come back for alumni weekend each year and was really encouraging and helpful. I appreciated that."

That inspired Schoonmaker to pay it forward when she graduated and was part of South Carolina's staff as a volunteer assistant coach for a couple of years for which she had plenty of chances to pass on her knowledge to the next number 11, Evan Childs.

"I always felt like we had a special bond when she was a volunteer coach here," Childs said. "Even though she couldn't play favorites, I felt like there was always an extra high-five for me. She always made me feel really good."

21 NCAA TOURNAMENT BIDS EIGHT WOMEN'S COLLEGE WORLD SERIES APPEARANCES

DAWN STALEY AND THE GAMECOCKS

- It's no secret at this point, legendary coach Dawn Staley is a fan of the softball program, having traveled to numerous road games over the years and making it to plenty of home games.
- Softball head coach Beverly Smith returns the love by doing the same, cause that's what friends do right? The two live down the street from each other and have grown to become great friends over the years.
- And of course, their pets (Muffin the cat and Champ the dog) are best friends too.
- Best friendship in sports? We won't argue with that.

SOUTH CAROLINA HISTORICAL RECORD

- South Carolina has played 2,359 games in its softball history, going 1535-820-7 (.647) in its 44 years of history.
- The Gamecocks have posted 30 or more wins each of the past seven seasons under the direction of head coach Beverly Smith. (includes this season)
- Carolina has protected home well, also, with 20 or more coming in friendly confines each of the past six years.
- The Gamecocks have posted a combined 63 conference wins over the last five years.

GAMECOCKS VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

- South Carolina is 140-319-1 (.293) against opponents ranked in the NFCA top 25 since 1995.
- Broken down by site, the Gamecocks are 66-104 (.358) at home, 32-147 (.154) on the road and 43-67-1 (.407) in neutral-site outings.
- Last season, the Gamecocks went 8-14 against ranked teams, including an 8-1 record in home games. The Gamecocks notably swept Tennessee and Mississippi State in home series against ranked teams last year. The Gamecocks also took two of three games against Arkansas, as well.
- In road games, the Gamecocks notably won a road series at Ole Miss to start the SEC season and earned their first win over Texas A&M since 2015.

THE BEVERLY SMITH ERA: WHAT A TIME IT HAS BEEN

- South Carolina is running strong under the leadership of head coach Beverly Smith after the Gamecocks made the postseason just once the previous six seasons before she arrived.
- The Gamecocks have improved upon their final RPI ranking under Smith each of the past six years.
- South Carolina has made it to six-straight postseason trips under Smith (tied for the longest streak in school history). The program has missed the postseason just twice under Smith.
- The Gamecocks have been ultra popular under Smith on social media as the program had a 31 percent increase in followers over Twitter/Instagram/Facebook last season (tied for best in the SEC).

STEWART IS BACK

Lauren Stewart always seems to be smiling. South Carolina's redshirt junior outfielder has seen the highs and lows each year of her collegiate career, but patience has paid off as a reliance on her faith and a solid personal support system within the team and at home has helped her become a big part of the Gamecocks' success in 2019.

"My mindset over the summer was that I was going to come back better than I've ever been and this is going to be the best season I've ever had," Stewart said.

The Alpharetta, Ga., native began her college career at Purdue where she started every game as a freshman, batted .306, and led the team in runs and doubles while ranking seventh in the Big 10 Conference with 18 stolen bases. While things seemed to be going well, a desire to be closer to home led Stewart to transfer to South Carolina.

"I definitely loved Purdue. I loved the school, the atmosphere and the softball team," Stewart said. "I just figured that a new place was going to be best for me. As soon as I visited South Carolina, I knew there was definitely something there for me. With it being closer to home, and it being in a big conference with the SEC, I knew it was going to be a great fit.

"The best part about being here at South Carolina is the culture of all the sports, the fans in the community, and how we have such a big impact on not only people who come to our games and the little girls that see us and look up to us, but on the community as a whole and how this university is represented."

Stewart didn't recapture the same individual on-field success initially with the Gamecocks. Although South Carolina was an NCAA Tournament team in 2017, Stewart played more of a reserve role, playing in 50 games with 11 starts in the outfield while being used primarily as a pinch runner and defensive replacement. She went 2-for-14 in limited plate appearances, but Stewart stayed patient and wasn't worried.

"It was definitely mentally challenging, but I wanted to be the best teammate possible," Stewart said. "I tried not to focus on things I couldn't control. I was just trying to be prepared for when my name was called and tried to stay as positive as possible. I was still only a sophomore, and while I do have very high expectations for myself, I knew that the team still needed me. So, I tried to focus more on the team. It drove me to keep working, and I tried to focus on what I could bring to the table, whether it was my speed, my hitting, or my play in the outfield.

SOUTH CAROLINA STAFF HAS TOP CREDENTIALS

- South Carolina head coach Beverly Smith has been a part of 14 NCAA Tournament teams as a coach (eight at UNC and six at Carolina).
- Associate head coach Lisa Navas has been to seven NCAA Tournaments as an assistant coach (five at Carolina, and one each at UNC and Missouri) and eight as a head coach (six Division II at Barry, two at NC State). Navas was selected to be a part of the 2017-19 USA Softball Women’s National Team coaching pool alongside 21 other coaches.
- Carolina adds hitting coach Kaela Jackson to the staff in 2019. Jackson joins the Gamecocks from Michigan State before her playing days at South Carolina for head coach Beverly Smith.
- Volunteer assistant Taylor Wike joins the Gamecocks this season from the University of North Carolina. She primarily works with the runners and infield alongside coach Lisa Navas.

MUST WIN AT HOME! AND THE GAMECOCKS DO

- South Carolina is 167-80 (.665) at home during the Beverly Smith era, which does not include a 4-1 record at home while hosting a regional at Carolina Softball Stadium at Beckham Field.
- The Gamecocks have lost more than 10 games at home in a single season just three times in her eight years.
- Carolina has finished .500 or better at home seven of Beverly Smith’s nine years.
- South Carolina has not lost double digit games at home in six years, and has won 20 or more the past six seasons.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS IS NOTHING NEW FOR SC

- South Carolina is 165-43 (.780) over the past six years in games outside the SEC. Notable wins include Texas, Penn State, Houston, Arizona State, North Carolina, Florida State, California, Virginia Tech, USF, Long Beach State, Hofstra and Liberty.
- The 165 wins in notable because they account for 64 percent of the Carolina wins during that time (yeah, it’s really tough to win SEC games and of course there are more opportunities to win non-conference games. But still).
- This year Carolina is set for at least 25 more non-conference games.
- Carolina has won 22-straight non-conference games following the Wednesday night victory over USC Upstate.

SOME OF THE GREATS THAT HAVE COME THROUGH

- Trinity Johnson: 2004 Carolina Hall of Fame inductee, three-time All-American, 1996-97 Honda Award for Softball Player of the Year (the first Honda award winner for any sport at Carolina). She recently became the first Gamecock in program history to have her jersey retired. (Jersey was retired on the Saturday of the Alabama series)
- Tiffany Tootle: Three-time All-American, Led the nation in hits and runs in 1992 and 1993, one of four three-time All-Americans in school history. Was inducted into the UofSC Hall of Fame in 2006 and was the second to receive the honor.
- Megan Matthews Bunning: 1999 NFCA All-American, led the nation in saves in 2000, two All-SEC nods and the 2000 SEC Tournament MVP award. Notably calls home games on the SEC Network + for the Gamecocks.
- Darleen Lowery was a 2014 UofSC Hall of Fame inductee after a career in which she was named a two-time All-American. Notably led the nation with 9.49 strikeouts per seven innings in 1987.

MORGAN DAVIS FEATURE (2018)

Morgan Davis is inspired to chase her passions, which include softball, art, and becoming a brain surgeon. Throw in an affinity for Elvis Presley music, and speaking with the freshman from Mount Zion, Ill., is like opening four different sections of the daily newspaper all at once. It’s a lot to take in, but Davis is confident she can do it all.

“I think I’ll be a brain surgeon by the time I’m 32, if I’ve done the math right,” Davis said. “I love a fastball, so probably becoming an (successful) artist would be the biggest challenge.”

The McKissick scholarship recipient is studying biochemistry and molecular biology at South Carolina with the goal of becoming a brain surgeon. The passion for the medical field came at an early age after her cousin, Chase, was diagnosed with Adrenoleukodystrophy when he was approximately ten years old.

“He lost his eye sight one day at Disney World, and he lost his ability to use his legs,” Davis recalled. “He had to go through a ton of different treatments that were new in the United States at the time. His story inspired me to help children get back to their families and their lives because of how he was able to fight through everything that he did with the help of God and all of the doctors who were involved.

“He is wheelchair-bound and can’t move his legs, and he can’t really speak. Our family is really close to each other, so whenever I’m home, I get to see him a lot.”

Adrenoleukodystrophy is a genetic brain disorder that destroys myelin, the protective sheath that surrounds the brain’s neurons -- the nerve cells that allow you to think and to control muscles.

“Just seeing him fight and seeing him grow up with that is what got me interested in [the medical profession]” Davis said. “He has been an inspiration. I can get up every day and do things that I love. His life is a lot harder than mine, so with any problem I have, it puts things into perspective.”

Davis’ passions don’t stop there as she is also an artist.

“Oil painting is my favorite,” Davis said. “I got into oil painting when I was in the eighth grade. I like to paint trees; a lot of trees. And mountains. A lot of landscapes. I like to turn on music when I paint. It kind of relaxes me. I love to see how a picture in your mind turns out on a canvas.”

WOMEN AT SOUTH CAROLINA: THEY RUN THINGS, Y'ALL

- South Carolina athletics had plenty to talk about with its women's teams in 2017-18, as the women produced a final four appearance, SEC Players of the Year, All-Americans and many more honors.
- Women's soccer notably reached the final four in 2017 after winning a second-straight SEC regular-season championship while Savannah McCaskill was and Grace Fisk were named SEC Players of the Year.
- This most recent fall, the volleyball program notably made the post-season for the first time in 14 years under new head coach Tom Mendoza.
- In 2017-18, Dawn Staley and the Gamecocks went to another elite as A'Ja Wilson finished her historic career as the National Player of the Year.

TOURNAMENTS... WE GO EVERYWHERE

- South Carolina is scheduled to go to Mexico, Florida and North Carolina this season for tournaments, but traveling early in the season is nothing new for Carolina.
- Since the start of the Beverly Smith era, Carolina has been to six states (Florida, Oklahoma, California, Arizona, Texas and South Carolina) for a total of 31,756 miles of travel.
- Carolina has been everywhere from Miami (twice), Orlando (twice) to Tempe, Austin and Norman as well as four different towns in California (Fullerton, Santa Barbara, Cathedral City, Riverside).
- 2019 will be no different for the Gamecocks as they will travel to Mexico, Tampa (for the second time in the Smith era), Charlotte and host one of their annual tournaments.

HOW TO WATCH THE GAMECOCKS IN 2019

- ESPN has shown some respect for the Gamecocks in the preseason, giving the program at least 30 games on the Family of Networks.
- Carolina will have 21 home games broadcast as well nine road contests.
- The Gamecocks first nationally televised game comes on March 24 against Ole Miss with a game on SEC Network.
- South Carolina will have five games on SEC Network, two on ESPNU, two on ESPN2 and one on ESPN.

REPLAY AT SEC TOURNAMENT

- The Southeastern Conference will use a video replay review process for the 2019 SEC Softball Tournament, which will be held May 8-11 in College Station, Texas.
- The plays that can be reviewed include:
 - *Deciding if a batted ball called fair* is fair or foul.
 - *Deciding if a batted ball called a ground rule double or home run* is fair or foul.
 - *Deciding if a batted ball called foul* that could result in a ground rule double or home run is fair or foul.
 - *Spectator interference.*
 - *Deciding scoring plays at home plate* inclusive of collisions (il legal and/or malicious slides), obstruction by a defensive player or time plays.
 - *Force/Tag Play Calls:* Plays involving all runners acquiring the base before the defensive player's attempt to put the runner out at any base.
 - *Hit-by-Pitch Calls:* Those plays for which there is a possibility that a pitched ball touches a batter or her clothing, which shall incorporate a review on whether the batter is inside or outside the batter's box if it is determined upon review that a pitched ball has touched a batter or her clothing.
 - *Placement of Runners:* An umpire's placement of all runners (per the rules/case book) after any blocked ball call.

TRINITY JOHNSON AFTER JERSEY RETIRED

I was shocked when I found out (about jersey being retired). It's such a blessing to be the first. There are so many wonderful memories and so many amazing women who have played here. For me to be chosen as the first to have this honor, there are two words together; honor and blessing.

It still seems somewhat surreal.

Of all the honors and statistics, my senior year ERA is what I'm most proud of, by far. My SEC ERA was 0.00. That's easily the best stat.

There are so many memories! Road trips on the bus. I remember Carrie Lyons, specifically, dancing up and down the aisles. One of my other memories was winning the SEC. We all came to the center circle, and we all tackled each other. I kind of skipped out and went and gave Coach (Joyce) Compton a hug. She, in her true nature, just stood in the dugout and kind of watched it all happen. It was fun to bring her into that more.

A lot of people don't remember that I was a transfer here. I went to school out there (in California) and didn't have the best experience my freshman year. Carrie Dever was the assistant coach here, and we were long-term family friends. I wanted to be in the south and everything fell into place.

(My coaches) helped me in so many ways. They helped me become a better player physically, but, by far, it was my mental game. My emotional game and stability were, by far, improved while I was here.

Having my family here means everything. My parents are the only reason I got this far. To have my kids (four-year-old twins Alberta and Shepard) here; they're just old enough where they might remember it, so it's fun. I don't know what they know and understand. So, this will be fun for them to watch with all the crowds and the cameras.

Now, I'm a sonographer (in Memphis, Tenn.). I do ultrasound. I look at babies all day. At least that's what people think.

I don't actually watch or play softball anymore. I don't know why that is, exactly. There was a lot of inner turmoil for me with how my career ended. People think I'm crazy because I had so much success. I don't think I went out the way I wanted to. My college career was amazing, but when I played with the (U.S.) National Team and professionally, I had some injuries. It didn't end the way I'd hoped.
