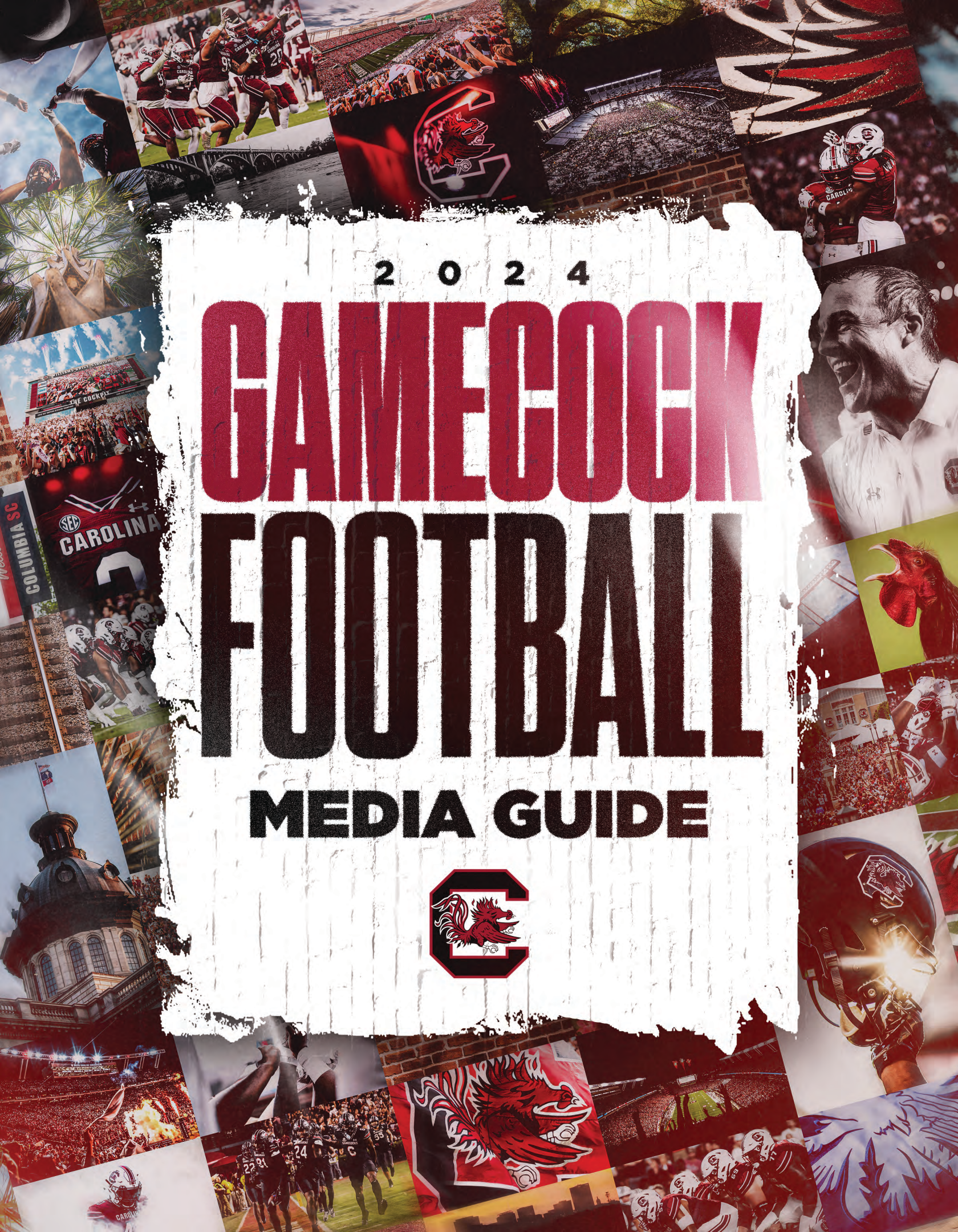

South Carolina returns 44 letterwinners, including 14 starters from the 2023 squad. The offense returns five starters while the defense has eight starters back from the 2023 campaign, including All-SEC linebacker Debo Williams. 2022 All-American punter Kai Kroeger also is back for a final season.

2023 IN REVIEW

The Gamecocks featured one of the top passing tandems in college football in quarterback Spencer Rattler and wide receiver Xavier Legette. The squad finished the season strong, winning three of its four games in November, to log a 5-7 record, including a 3-5 conference mark in the final year of divisional play in the Southeastern Conference.

RECORDS

Spencer Rattler, and Xavier Legette etched their names in the South Carolina single-game and single-season record books with standout performances during the 2023 campaign. Rattler threw for 3,186 yards, the third-highest mark in school history, while Legette was on the receiving end of 71 balls for 1,255 yards, the second-highest single-season total in Gamecock history.

HISTORY

The Gamecocks have a long and storied history. Alshon Jeffery became the sixth player to have his name added to the press box exterior after having his jersey retired during the season. Carolina had four players selected in the 2024 NFL Draft, the sixth-straight year in which at least three Gamecocks were taken in the draft.

BOWL GAMES

South Carolina has celebrated a victory in six of its last nine bowl games, defeating Nebraska (2012 Capital One Bowl), Michigan (2013 and 2018 Outback Bowl), Wisconsin (2014 Capital One Bowl), Miami (Fla.) (2014 Independence Bowl) and North Carolina (2021 Duke's Mayo Bowl) during that stretch.

Williams-Brice Stadium Facts

- First game as Carolina Stadium: Oct. 6, 1934 (USC 22, VMI 6)
- Dedicated as Williams-Brice Stadium: Sept. 9, 1972 (UVA 24, USC 16)
- Capacity: 77,559
- Stadium Record: 317-205-14 (.604)
- When the Gamecocks take the field on gameday, Williams-Brice Stadium is packed with approximately 80,000 screaming Gamecock fans, making it more populated than all but four cities in the state of South Carolina.
- Williams-Brice Stadium is recognized as one of the finest facilities in all of college football. Carolina annually ranks among the nation's leaders in attendance, and Gamecock fans are regarded as some of the most loyal in the country.
- South Carolina established a school record for football season tickets sold in 2005, selling 62,604 season tickets, surpassing the previous mark of 62,103 set in 2002. The numbers do not include student tickets and tickets contractually obligated to visiting teams.
- South Carolina ranked 16th in the nation in home attendance in 2023, averaging 77,833 fans for seven games with five sellouts.

Built during the Great Depression with help from federal Works Progress Administration (WPA) funds, the stadium was completed in 1934 and was known as Carolina Municipal Stadium. The original seating was 17,600 and included seating along the sidelines only.

During the 1940s and 1950s, endzone seating was added which turned the stadium into a bowl and increased capacity to over 40,000.

Martha Williams-Brice's husband, Thomas H. Brice, was a Gamecock football letterman from 1922-24, and her family operated the Williams Furniture Company in Sumter. She left a substantial inheritance from the furniture fortune to her nephews, Thomas W. and Philip L. Edwards, much of which they passed on to the University of South Carolina. That included a bequest from her estate for stadium renovations in the early 1970s which included the addition of over 14,000 seats, an Astroturf playing surface and a west upper deck. This brought the seat count up to 54,000. The name was officially changed from Carolina Stadium to Williams-Brice Stadium in dedication ceremonies during the Sept. 9, 1972 opener with Virginia.

The east upper deck was added in 1982 and capacity grew to 72,400.

In the 1990s, the Kay and Eddie Floyd Building was added behind the north endzone and suites, clubs and a new press box were added on the west side. This was quickly followed by a south upper deck which increased total seat count to over 80,000.

Added in 2012 was a \$6.5 million state-of-the-art videoboard that sits above the north stands. It measures 36' x 124'.

In 2015, the \$14.5 million Springs Brooks Plaza transformed the circumference of Williams-Brice Stadium into an aesthetically-pleasing footprint.

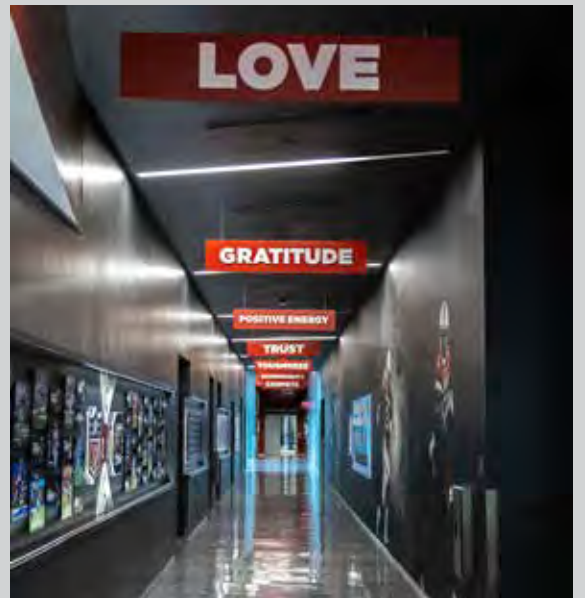

Nickname: The Fighting Gamecocks

The University of South Carolina is the only major college athletic program in the country that uses "Fighting Gamecocks" as its official nickname and mascot. The University's athletic teams have been known as Gamecocks since the early 1900s.

At the turn of the 20th century, after struggling for more than decade under numerous nicknames, the school's football team was the impetus of the new moniker. In 1903, Columbia's morning newspaper, *The State*, shortened the name to one word and Carolina teams have been Gamecocks ever since.

Those early teams must have been a feisty and spirited group. A gamecock is a fighting rooster known for its spirit and courage. A cock fight, which was a popular sport throughout the United States in the 19th century, would last until the death of one of the combatants. Cock fighting has been outlawed by most states for humanitarian reasons, but it is still held surreptitiously in many areas.

The South Carolina Mascot

The State of South Carolina has long been closely connected with the breeding and training of fighting gamecocks. General Thomas Sumter, famed guerrilla fighter of the Revolutionary War, was known as "The Fighting Gamecock."

Beginning in 1971, John Nelson, an undergraduate biology student, began attending games in a Gamecock costume. He was known as "The Rooster". This evolved to Big Spur, who appeared during the 1970s and was a bit intimidating.

At the 1980 Homecoming game, the current version of Cocky, by Robert Lane, made his debut as Big Spur's son. Cocky became the University of South Carolina's official mascot after this appearance and has maintained this role ever since.

Cocky soon won the hearts of Gamecock fans and is one of the most recognizable figures in college athletics. In 1986, he was chosen as America's First "National Mascot" by the Universal Cheerleading Association, Ford Motor Company and American Airlines.

That same year, Cocky brought home his first UCA Mascot Championship. He continued his success by capturing his second championship in 1994 and also won the Capital One mascot championship in 2003.

Cocky can be seen pepping the crowd up at a variety of athletics events and also makes numerous community service appearances throughout the year.



Sir Big Spur

Sir Big Spur, is the official live mascot of the Gamecock Athletics. Sir Big Spur is an Old English Black Breasted Red Gamecock. He debuted in 1999 at a Carolina baseball game and his first game at Williams-Brice Stadium was in 2006. He can now be seen at all home football games, various baseball games and other events supporting the Gamecocks.

"2001"

The South Carolina Gamecocks feature perhaps the most unique and electrifying pregame entry in all of college football. In fact, Sporting News rated USC's "2001" as the most exciting pregame entry in all of college football. As the minutes wind down on the game clock prior to the opening kickoff, the Gamecocks leave the locker room following final pregame instruction from their coaching staff and assemble in the tunnel in the southwest corner of Williams-Brice Stadium. Then, as the crowd of nearly 80,000 begins its roar of anticipation, the first notes of the theme song from "2001-A Space Odyssey" blare over the stadium sound system. As the music continues, the enthusiasm of the crowd is feverish. Finally, at just the exact moment, in perfect coordination with the music, the Gamecocks hit the field running.

Sandstorm

Visit Williams-Brice Stadium a few hours before kickoff on any gameday and one will see a series of white towels being distributed at seats throughout the stadium. A visitor may pause and wonder upon seeing this activity but Gamecock fans know exactly why the towels are there. A sandstorm is coming..

"Sandstorm" is an instrumental piece by Finnish DJ and record producer Darude that was originally released in the late 1990s. The piece was played during the South Carolina-Ole Miss game in 2009 and was instantly embraced by the student body. Since then, it has been incorporated into football opening game festivities, is heard after football scores and is used at other sports venues as a rally cry for fans and players alike. A sequence of up and down motions are executed in unison as the music starts and these ultimately culminate in a flurry of waving white towels as the song progresses. Chants of "USC" are also repeated in rhythm with the music. What began as a celebration tune toward the end of a big game has become one of the most loved traditions at University of South Carolina athletics events.

Gamecock Walk

Approximately two hours and 20 minutes prior to every home game, the Carolina team buses drop the players off on the Garnet Way in Gamecock Park. Through a throng of Gamecock fans and well-wishers along with the Carolina Marching Band, the team walks on the Garnet Way, crosses Bluff Road and the stadium tarmac and heads to the locker room, located in the southwest corner of Williams-Brice Stadium, to prepare for the game ahead.

School Colors

Garnet and Black were adopted near the turn of the century as the official colors of the University of South Carolina athletic teams. The colors are the dominant ones on the gamecock, which is the University's official mascot.

The Cockaboose Railroad

What is perhaps the most unique form of tailgating and featured throughout the years in numerous magazines and television shows, the Cockaboose Railroad has made its way to Columbia and University of South Carolina football. Twenty-two cabooses line a railroad track just outside of Williams-Brice Stadium - but these rail cars don't move and they certainly aren't something you would see passing by on the rear end of a train.

In the late 1980s, a local businessman and his wife dreamt up a highly unique concept of combining tailgating for University of South Carolina football games with an abandoned set of railroad tracks running along the south end of the Williams-Brice Stadium property. In 1990, the beautifully-designed Cockaboose Railroad began catering to the serious Gamecock tailgater with amenities never before associated with in tailgating: running water, cable television, air conditioning, and heating, and a living room highlight each and every Cockaboose.

The Cockaboose Railroad - it's different, it's unique, and it's exciting; and there's nothing else like it in the nation.



Alma Mater: "We Hail Thee Carolina"

Set to the tune of Robert Burns' "Flow Gently, Sweet Afton", the alma mater was written in 1911 by George A. Wauchope, an English professor at the university. At the time, several songs submitted as candidates for the alma mater were collectively placed in a songbook and sung at chapel; however, Wauchope's emerged as the most popular and later became the official alma mater.

The first stanza of the alma mater is sung at all athletics events and the custom of raising one's right hand with fingers cupped as if offering a toast is visible among fans when the phrase "Here's a Health, Carolina" is sung at the end.

*We hail thee, Carolina, and sing thy high praise;
With loyal devotion, remembering the days;
When proudly we sought thee, thy children to be:
Here's a health, Carolina, forever to thee!*

Fight Song: "The Fighting Gamecocks Lead the Way"

The lyrics listed below comprise the official university fight song entitled "The Fighting Gamecocks Lead the Way". The song's tune is from the musical "How Now, Dow Jones" and the original song in the musical was titled "Step to the Rear". The music was chosen as the fight song by former football coach and Athletics Director, Paul Dietzel, who also wrote the lyrics. The song is played by the school band during athletics events to motivate players and inspire fans, many of whom throw a hearty fist pump when they hear "Go Cocks!" toward the end of the song.

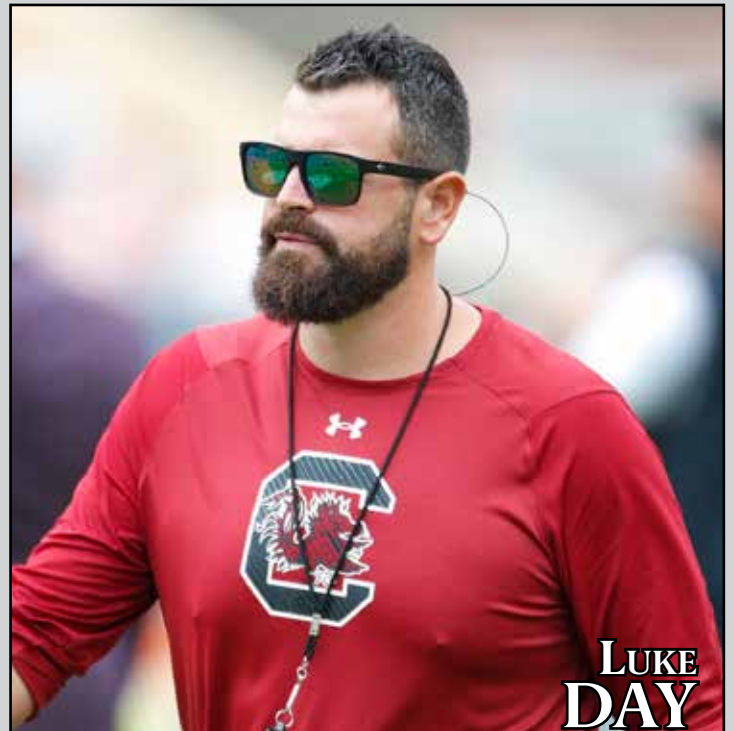

Gamecock Football works out in a 24,000-square foot weight room/ cardio deck that rivals any in the country. It features 20 customized Armor Camp House Racks from Sorinex. Twenty Olympic drop zones are built into the floor. There is a motion capture machine, and a recovery nutrition station inside the weight room, in addition to the nutrition hub outside the locker room.



The University of South Carolina provides its student-athletes with high-quality health care from nationally recognized surgeons and athletic trainers. This care includes a comprehensive physical medical exam with lab tests (e.g., sickle cell, CBC blood test, and Ferritin) and comprehensive medical, dental, vision, psychological, rehabilitation and associated health care services for injuries or illnesses sustained by a student-athlete while practicing or competing in a varsity sport.



The University of South Carolina cares about the mental health and well-being of its student-athletes. The Gamecock Athletics staff includes a director of mental health, two psychologists and a psychiatrist available to assist in dealing with issues affecting the student-athletes' lives and sports performance.

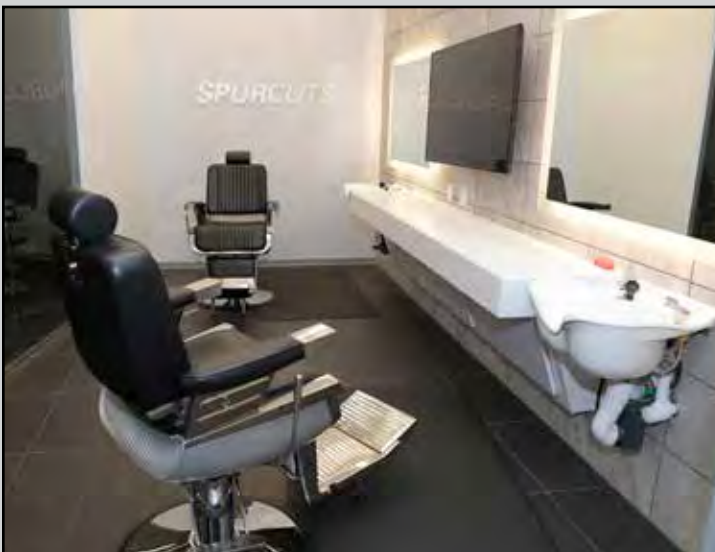


LONG FAMILY FOOTBALL OPERATIONS CENTER

The trajectory of building a program and getting it to the level that meets expectations is rarely linear.

After exceeding expectations in each of his first two seasons in Columbia, head coach **Shane Beamer's** Gamecocks took a small step back in 2023. Coach Beamer took over a program that went 2-8 in 2020 and improved it to 7-6 in 2021, earning him a share of the Steve Spurrier First-Year Coach of the Year Award. He followed that up with an 8-5 campaign and a national ranking in 2022, again surpassing the preseason prognostications, before slipping back to a 5-7 mark last fall in a season that was marred by numerous injuries, most notably on the offensive line.

Undeterred, Coach Beamer is driven to right the ship and guide the Gamecocks as they compete in the new-look, ultra-competitive, 16-team Southeastern Conference with a goal of earning a spot in the expanded College Football Playoffs.

After the disappointing 2023 season changes were inevitable, and Coach Beamer did not shy away from making moves both on and off the field in an effort to recapture the program's upward trajectory.

Coach Beamer went to work to upgrade his on-field coaching staff. SEC coaching veteran **Marquel Blackwell** was brought on board to mentor a revamped running backs room after working at Ole Miss and Texas A&M over the past two seasons. When special teams guru Pete Lembo left to take a head coaching position at Buffalo, Coach Beamer did what most thought was not possible - find another special teams savant to at least match and possibly even improve the South Carolina special teams units. Coach Beamer was able to do that with the hiring of **Joe DeCamillis** as associate head coach/special teams coordinator. DeCamillis, who has family ties to the Carolina football program through his late father-in-law, Gamecock Legend Dan Reeves, brings over 30 years of NFL special teams experience to Columbia, including a pair of Super Bowl rings. The next move of the coaching carousel saw the return of **Shawn Elliott** to Columbia as the run game coordinator/tight ends coach. Elliott, a Camden, S.C. native who served as the Georgia State head coach for the past seven seasons, was an assistant under Steve Spurrier at Carolina during the glory days when the Gamecocks posted three-straight 11-win campaigns from 2011-2013. Elliott brings the wisdom of running his own program coupled with his intense, high-energy brand of coaching back to Columbia. The final piece of the puzzle was the addition of **Mike Furrey** as wide receivers coach. Furrey, who played in the NFL for eight years and coached in the league for an additional four, has spent the past two seasons as the head coach at Division II Limestone University.

Coach Beamer also went to work to upgrade the roster. South Carolina added 20 incoming scholarship transfers, along with 15 freshmen newcomers, most of whom arrived in January and got an early start by going through spring drills. Coupled with a bevy of newcomers from a year ago, nearly two-thirds of the Gamecocks' spring roster is built on players who are in either their first or second year in the program. The areas that received the biggest influx of transfer talent were at wide receiver where five players were brought in and at running back where three players were added. Three transfers joined the offensive line, while four defensive linemen and a pair of linebackers also came through the portal.

The coaching staff will be tasked with getting those newcomers to buy into a culture already established and getting them to gel with the returners to build a cohesive squad all working together and towards the same goals.

The Gamecocks return 44 lettermen from last year's squad, 16 on offense, 25 on the defensive side of the ball, and three specialists. Among that group are 14 returning starters, five on offense, eight on defense and one specialist.

Offensive coordinator **Dowell Loggains** must replace arguably the most talented quarterback ever to wear the Garnet & Black in Spencer Rattler, and Xavier Legette, who turned in one of the best individual seasons by a wide receiver in school history. With a new quarterback at the helm and a slew of established running backs on board, the Gamecocks are looking for improvement in the run game and a more balanced look on offense overall.

Redshirt freshman signal-caller **LaNorris Sellers** was named the starting quarterback coming out of the spring. Sellers is cut from a completely different cloth than what Rattler provided over the past two seasons, so look for Loggains to adjust accordingly, taking advantage of Sellers' exceptional size and athleticism. While last year's strength was in the passing game, this year's offense, at least on paper, figures to make more of a concerted effort to establish the run. All-SEC caliber running back **Raheim "Rocket" Sanders** looks to bounce back to his 2022 form after struggling with injuries last season at Arkansas. He will be complemented by transfers **Oscar Adaway III** and **Jawann Howell**, along with returner **Juju McDowell**, giving the backfield much more quality depth than they've had in a number of years. The offensive line, which was decimated by injuries a year ago, has four starters returning, including left tackle **Tree Babalade**, left guard **Jakai Moore**, right guard **Trovon Baugh** and right tackle **Vershon Lee**, and have an influx of talent which should make for great competition and improved depth as the coaches determine the best five and their best positions. The tight end room features a pair of veterans in **Joshua Simon** and **Brady Hunt** and should see no drop off. **Nyck Harbor**, fresh off an All-American track season, is the lone returning starter at wide receiver, but that unit has been overhauled with five transfers looking to make an impact, so starters and rotational players will need to be decided in the fall.

Defensive coordinator **Clayton White** has eight returning starters who have been through the SEC wars, with leaders at every level of his Flex-Nickel package. A trio of veterans in **Tonka Hemingway**, **Alex Huntley** and **T.J. Sanders** are forces in the middle of the defensive line. The EDGE position is loaded with experienced veterans and talented youngsters who will push for early playing time. All-SEC performer **Debo Williams** returns at linebacker where the Gamecocks will be much more athletic and deeper than they were a year ago when Williams was asked to be on the field for virtually every meaningful snap. The secondary features a pair of safeties in **Nick Emmanwori** and **DQ Smith**, who figure to be one of the top tandems in the country. In addition, Nickel **Jalon Kilgore** was a Freshman All-American a season ago. **O'Donnell Fortune** returns as a starter at one of the cornerback positions, giving defensive backs coach Torrian Gray four returning starters among the five secondary positions.

Joe DeCamillis will have a chance to put his stamp on the special teams units which feature two of the nation's best in punter **Kai Kroeger**, a 2022 All-American, and returning All-SEC long snapper **Hunter Rogers**.

When you want to be the best, you have to play the best. As has regularly been the case, South Carolina boasts one of the nation's toughest schedules. With the expanded SEC, the 2024 slate, will have a different look than in past years. The Gamecocks will not face traditional rivals Florida, Georgia or Tennessee, but have games against Blue Bloods like LSU, Alabama and Oklahoma.

With that on tap, the opportunity is there to keep the trajectory headed up.



QUARTERBACK

The quarterback position will look a lot different in 2024 than it has in the past two seasons when Spencer Rattler, a fifth-round draft pick by the New Orleans Saints, took every meaningful snap. Following spring drills, head coach Shane Beamer anointed redshirt freshman **LaNorris Sellers** as QB1 heading into fall camp. Sellers was impressive in limited duty as a true freshman and has worked extremely hard to gain a better understanding of the offense. His skill set is different than Rattler's, so offensive coordinator Dowell Loggains will look to take advantage of Sellers' God-given athletic abilities. Don't be surprised if Auburn transfer **Robby Ashford** works his way into a regular role. Ashford has excellent speed and has experience playing in the SEC, which can only serve him well. **Luke Doty** is another player with SEC experience at quarterback. While Doty spends much of his time in the wide receivers' room, he is more than capable of filling in at quarterback, should that situation present itself. **Davis Beville** returns to his home state to finish out his playing career. Beville is more of a traditional dropback passer and doesn't have the speed or elusiveness of the other quarterbacks in the room, but has big-game experience, playing at both Pitt and Oklahoma, including a start in the Red River Rivalry. **Dante Reno** is a true freshman who joined the squad in the spring and flashes potential. **Jimmy Francis** a walk-on from the Lonestar State, joined the team in the summer.

RUNNING BACK

No area has been upgraded more in terms of experience, depth and talent than at running back. The addition of **Raheim "Rocket" Sanders**, a transfer from Arkansas who was an All-SEC performer two years ago after rushing for more than 1,400 yards, immediately gives the room credibility. While Sanders can certainly become the bell cow, he is not the only capable performer out of the backfield. **Juju McDowell** is the top returner. McDowell has proven to be effective and can make people miss when he has the ball in space. **Oscar Adaway III** brings plenty of game experience following a stint at North Texas. He, along with South Carolina State transfer **Jawarn Howell**, who may have the most upside in the room, and sophomore **Djay Braswell**, who showed flashes in a limited role last season, give new running backs coach Marquel Blackwell plenty of viable options. Incoming freshman **Matthew Fuller** joins the squad this summer with high expectations. **Bradley Dunn**, **Nathan Harris-Waynick**, **Larry Scott**, **Chase McCracken** and **Neil Salvage III** are all walk-ons that add depth to the room.

WIDE RECEIVER

Another area of the offense that received an influx of new talent is at wide receiver. Heading into the fall, no one has established themselves as the "go-to" guy for new wide receivers coach Mike Furrey, but the same could have been said a year ago before Xavier Legette burst onto the season and played his way into a first-round draft selection. The key for the new faces is to overcome the learning curve and understand the playbook to be able to play fast. The lone returning starter is two-sport standout **Nyck Harbor**. Harbor, did not participate in spring drills instead taking his freakish talents to the track where he earned All-America honors as a sprinter. Versatile **Luke Doty** has honed his skills as a receiver after beginning his career at quarterback and has experience at this level. Five transfers were brought in to compete for spots in the rotation. The quintet includes **Jared Brown** (Coastal Carolina), **Dalevon**

Campbell (Nevada), **Ahmari Huggins-Bruce** (Louisville), **Vandrevius Jacobs** (Florida State), and **Gage Larvadain** (Miami (OH)). All but Jacobs were here in the spring and had an opportunity to adjust to Gamecock Football.

Tyshawn Russell, **CJ Adams** and **Elijah Caldwell** are all in their second seasons in the program and look to take the next step in their development. Former walk-on **Payton Mangrum** has become a regular on special teams and is someone the coaches trust with his consistency and leadership. True freshmen **Mazeo Bennett Jr.** and **Debron Gatling** arrived in the spring and began to showcase their talents and make a bid for early playing time. **Eriq Rice**, **Aaron Morton** and **Emazon Littlejohn** are walk-ons who add depth.

TIGHT END

After undergoing a complete overhaul a year ago, the tight end room has a lot of familiar faces returning in 2024 but has a change in leadership with Shawn Elliott returning to Columbia to mentor the group. **Joshua Simon** is the top returning receiver on the squad after hauling in 28 passes for 256 yards a season ago. **Brady Hunt**, who earned Freshman All-America honors in 2022 at Ball State, is the lone new transfer in the room and should make an early impact. **Nick Elksnis**, **Connor Cox** and **Maurice Brown II** all lettered a season ago and are vying for a consistent role. True freshman **Michael Smith** is well thought of and could make an early impression despite not arriving until the summer. **Reid Mikeska** and **Lukas Vozeh** return for their second season.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Injuries completely decimated an already thin unit a year ago, so Coach Beamer and offensive line coach Lonnie Teasley made it a point to find some additional help to avoid finding themselves in that situation again. Four starters return including a pair of veterans in left guard **Jakai Moore** and right tackle **Vershon Lee**, and a pair of youngsters who were forced into the fray as true freshmen a year ago in left tackle **Tree Babalade** and right guard **Trovon Baugh**. All four are certainly in the mix to start again, but they will face some challengers to hold onto a starting role, and the position they played last season may not be the same in 2024. In addition, **Cason Henry** was the Day 1 starter at right tackle in 2023 and **Markee Anderson** was slated to compete for a starting role, but both were plagued by injuries. If they are back to full strength, expect them to play prominent roles as well. Three transfers in **Kamaar Bell** (FAU), **Aaryn Parks** (Oklahoma) and **Torricelli Simpkins III** (North Carolina Central) were brought in to immediately figure into the two-deep and possibly start. Scholarship players **Ryan Brubaker** and **Jatavius Shivers**, along with walk-ons **Ni Mansell**, **Chase Sweigert**, **Mac Walters** and **Campbell Vandiver** have been with the program and provide depth. The future looks bright with a trio of highly decorated freshmen in **Blake Franks**, **Kam Pringle** and **Josiah Thompson** on board. All three got an early taste of big-time football by going through spring drills. First-year walk-ons **Parker Lawson** and **Jake Recker** round out the unit.

DEFENSIVE TACKLE

The Carolina defensive tackle position may be the most experienced unit on the field, littered with older players who have earned their stripes. Second-year coach Travian Robertson, a former standout in his own right at the position, will lean on the trio of **Tonka Hemingway**, **Alex Huntley** and **T.J. Sanders** to set the tone. The three have been interchangeable, combining for 111 games played and 38 starts (Hemingway 48/17; Huntley 37/14; Sanders 26/7). Senior **Nick Barrett** is strong at the point of attack and has appeared in 34 games over the past three seasons. A pair of veteran transfers joins the unit, giving the Gamecocks a solid three-deep at the position. **DeAndre Jules** has spent the past five seasons at Pitt and logged 7.5 tackles for loss a season ago. **Monkell Goodwine** saw limited action over the past three seasons at Alabama, but his stint with that program has to pay dividends. **Jamaal Whyce** is in his third season with the program. He has shown flashes as he works to gain more consistency. **Rondarius Porter** and **Chase Kibble** are a pair of walk-ons new to the program in 2024.

EDGE

The EDGE position lists seven players on the roster, and all seven figure to see extensive playing time this fall, making this position one of the most interesting to watch this fall. The group features the most depth in recent years which should lead to more productivity. The top returning player is **Bryan Thomas Jr.**, who has added some weight while maintaining his speed. The additional weight will help him in the run game, while his arsenal of pass rush moves makes him a threat off the edge. Seniors **Kyle Kennard** and **Gilber Edmond** are the two portal additions from the ACC. Kennard is a veteran player who logged a half dozen sacks at Georgia Tech last season. Edmond is very familiar with South Carolina, having played for the Gamecocks from 2020-2022 before spending last season at Florida State. Senior **Elijah Davis**, redshirt junior **Jatius Geer** and sophomore **Desmond Umeozulu** all are in their second season with the Gamecocks and look for their role in increase as they have a better understanding of the defense. Davis was a junior college transfer, while Geer, who has been hampered with some injuries, spent two seasons at Syracuse before coming to Carolina. The coaching staff raves about true freshman **Dylan Stewart**, who joined the squad in January. The most coveted player in the 2024 signing class, Stewart appeared to be as good as advertised in the spring and could make an immediate impact.

LINEBACKERS

The linebackers room showcases more depth from top to bottom and should be solid in 2024. Leading the way is All-SEC performer **Debo Williams**, who was the Gamecocks MVP for the defense and selected as a permanent team captain in 2023. An aggressive player who loves contact, Williams collected a team-leading 113 tackles a season ago, the most for a Gamecock since 2002. **Bam Martin-Scott** continues to see his stock rise. A versatile linebacker, Martin-Scott has good speed, can blitz and can cover. A pair of portal pickups in **Bangally Kamara** and **Demetrius Knight Jr.**, give defensive coordinator Clayton White more veteran options this season. Kamara spent the past four seasons at Pitt where he played in 48 contests including 21 starts. Knight began his career at Georgia Tech where he spent four seasons, before having a breakout campaign in 2023 at Charlotte where he earned All-AAC honors after collecting 96 tackles for the 49ers. The wild card to the unit is **Mohamed Kaba**.

Kaba was a Freshman All-SEC selection in 2020, but a pair of ACL injuries over the past two seasons has derailed a promising career. If he can get healthy and back to the player he was, it would be a huge bonus. Redshirt sophomore **Jaron Willis**

is a role player who can provide a pass rush. Four walk-ons in **Colin Bryant**, **Andrew Colasurdo**, **Ronnie Porter** and **Jamian Risher Jr.**, all lettered last season, provide depth at the position and could all figure in prominently on special teams. Two true freshmen in **Wendell Gregory** and **Fred "JayR" Johnson** joined the squad in January and have bright futures in the program.

DEFENSIVE BACKS

The Carolina secondary, under the guidance of Torrian Gray, has a core of excellent players that can line up with anyone. Continuing to build trust in the depth beyond that first-line unit will be key as the fall progresses. The safety position is a strength with the return of a pair of juniors in **Nick Emmanwori** and **DQ Smith**. Both have been starters almost since they first arrived on campus and now combine that experience with their God-given ability, making them one of the top safety tandems in the SEC if not the country. **Jalon Kilgore** was a Freshman All-American a season ago and figures to be the top candidate for the Nickel position in Clayton White's Flex-Nickel base defense. **David Spaulding** is a veteran who makes plays but has been sidelined with some injuries. Redshirt senior **O'Donnell Fortune** figures to hold down one of the starting cornerback positions. The Gamecocks have produced a number of NFL-ready corners, and Fortune is looking to become the next in that line. The competition for the corner position opposite of Fortune was a three-person tussle between **Emory Floyd**, **Judge Collier** and **Vicari Swain**. Floyd is a former member of the track team, Collier made a pair of starts last season and Swain has displayed excellent ball skills. All are looking for the consistency to earn the coaches' trust. Tennessee Tech transfer **Gerald Kilgore**, Jalon's older brother by about 16 months, joined the squad in the spring and could factor in at safety, along with **Peyton Williams**, who was working his way back from an ankle injury last fall. **Zahbari Sandy** suffered an ACL injury in the spring and will miss the 2024 season. Three scholarship true freshmen are vying for a role as well. **David Bucey** and **Kelvin Hunter** went through spring drills, while highly regarded **Jalewis Solomon** was a summer addition. Walk-ons **King-Demenian Ford**, **Joseph Byrnes** and **Jace Blackshear** have been with the program and add depth and special teams help. Greer, S.C. product **Buddy Mack III** returns to his home state to finish out his career after spending the past four years at Pitt where he saw action primarily on special teams. **Jackson Burger**, **Landon Kurtz** and **Isaiah McClary** are true freshmen walk-ons. Burger and Kurtz joined the squad in the summer, while McClary was an early enrollee and had a highlight with an interception in the Garnet & Black Spring Game.

PLACEKICKER

The Gamecocks have been nearly automatic on field goal attempts in the three seasons under head coach Shane Beamer and special teams coordinator Pete Lembo, connecting on 39-of-42 field goal tries (93 percent) since the start of the 2021 season. New special teams coordinator Joe DeCamillis will look to keep that same efficiency, but will have to do it with an unproven kicker. **Alex Herrera** was placed on scholarship in the spring, enticing him to come back for a sixth year with an opportunity to win the starting job. Herrera has never attempted a field goal during a collegiate game but has been successful on all four of his extra point attempts. Herrera struggled with an injury in the spring leaving the door open for his competition. Redshirt junior **William Joyce** focused more on placements and took advantage of the opportunity presented and put together a big spring propelling him solidly into the mix. **Daniel Lester** a redshirt sophomore has an explosive leg, maybe the strongest on the squad, but needs to continue to hone his craft and become more consistent. **Peyton Argent** is a redshirt freshman with a strong leg who continues to improve and develop.

PUNTER

There may be no one more secure with their starting role on the squad than punter **Kai Kroeger**. Kroeger, a 6-4, 213-pounder from Lake Forest, Ill., is in his fifth season punting for the Gamecocks. He has been the starter since setting foot on campus in August of 2020, earning All-SEC and All-America honors in 2022 when he averaged 46.1-yards per punt. He looks to get back to that All-America form this season after he saw his average dip a bit to 43.2-yards per punt a year ago. Kroeger is also a weapon with fakes, as he has completed 7-of-8 passes in his career for 205 yards and three touchdowns, an incredible 426.5 career quarterback rating. True freshman **Mason Love** figures to be the backup punter. Despite standing just 5-11, Love has shown some power in his leg and will benefit from learning from Kroeger for a year.

KICKOFF SPECIALIST

The kickoff specialist role is wide open entering the fall following the departure of Mitch Jeter. **Alex Herrera** is the only kicker with experience as he has handled a dozen kickoffs over the last three seasons. **William Joyce**, **Daniel Lester**, **Peyton Argent** and **Mason Love** are all candidates as well. They all have the ability, but consistency is the key that eventually will win out.

LONG SNAPPER

If punter Kai Kroeger doesn't have the biggest stranglehold on a starting role, that would go to long snapper **Hunter Rogers**. Rogers, a redshirt senior from Columbia, has handled the snapping duties since midway through the 2021 season. Rogers' work has paid off, as he was recognized as a first-team All-SEC selection by the league's coaches a year ago after earning second-team honors in 2022. In addition, he is Phil Steele's 2024 preseason first-team All-SEC and second-team All-America deep snapper. Redshirt senior **Cole Rasmussen** and redshirt freshman **Jordan Franke** compete for the backup role, should something unfortunate happen to Rogers. True freshman Gunnar Yocum joined the team in the summer. Yocum has an interesting story to tell, as he was granted an extra year of eligibility in high school after missing a year while undergoing cancer treatment.

HOLDER

There may be no better holder in the country than **Kai Kroeger**. Not only does he have excellent hands, he is adept at throwing the ball off a fake placement, making him even more dangerous. Kroeger should be on the Mortell Award list again this year and is a key part of the equation as to why the Gamecocks have converted 93 percent of their field goal attempts over the past three seasons. **Mason Love** worked in the spring as the holder and goes into the fall as the backup to Kroeger in this important but often overlooked role.

KICK RETURNER

Plenty of candidates will compete for the kick returner role, which has been a strong suit for Carolina Football in the recent past with the likes of Deebo Samuel and Xavier Legette leading the charge. **Juju McDowell** has the most experience, as he has returned 24 kicks for a 22.3-yard average during his career, with a long of 63. Sophomore **Tyshawn Russell** and **Oscar Adaway III** got a look in the spring, along with **Luke Doty**. A wild card who would be interesting to see would be **Nyck Harbor**, who has the prolific size and speed that would make every return something to witness.

PUNT RETURNER

As is the case with kick returner, the punt return role is up for grabs with numerous candidates who could emerge as the starter. **Jalon Kilgore** is the incumbent, logging nine of the team's 13 punt returns in 2023. He is steady and smart. **Juju McDowell** catches it freely and can make the first man miss. Transfer **Gage Larvadain** gained experience at the role at both Southwestern Louisiana and Miami. **Payton Mangrum** catches the ball well, while **Ahmari Huggins-Bruce** and **Vicari Swain** could get an opportunity as well.

GUNNER

The Gamecocks will need to replace one of the game's top gunners in Xavier Legette, who used his speed and size to be a force on both punts and kickoff coverage. Some of the top candidates coming out of the spring to handle those roles include **DQ Smith**, **Vicari Swain**, **O'Donnell Fortune**, **Gerald Kilgore**, **Nyck Harbor**, **Payton Mangrum** and **Gage Larvadain**.

QUICKLY: 2024 marks year four of the Shane Beamer Era and the 131st season of intercollegiate football at the University of South Carolina, dating back to 1892. It is the 118th-consecutive year in which South Carolina has competed on the gridiron. The University did not field a team in either 1893 or 1906. Carolina owns an all-time record of 634-613-44, a .508 winning percentage. Since the start of the 21st century, the Gamecocks have posted a 168-131 record, a .562 winning clip. Under Coach Beamer, the Gamecocks are 20-18, a .526 winning clip.

IT JUST MEANS MORE: The 2024 season will mark South Carolina's 33rd year in the Southeastern Conference. South Carolina and Arkansas joined the SEC prior to the 1992 campaign. The Gamecocks earned the SEC Eastern Division title in the 2010 season. The Gamecocks are 109-148-1 (.424) all-time in SEC regular season play, but posted a 42-38 (.525) record in conference action from 2010-19. Under Coach Beamer, the Gamecocks are 10-14 in SEC play, a .417 winning percentage.

YOU'RE SIXTEEN: The Southeastern Conference will take on a new look in 2024 with the addition of blue blood programs Texas and Oklahoma. The Gamecocks will not face the Longhorns in 2024 but will travel to Norman for their first encounter with the Sooners on Oct. 19. With the additions of the two schools, the league will no longer be divided into two divisions, but rather just one 16-team conference with the top two finishers advancing to Atlanta for the SEC Championship game.

FIRST TIME FOR EVERYTHING: South Carolina will face two opponents on the gridiron in 2024 for the first time in school history. The Old Dominion Monarchs, out of the Sun Belt Conference, will come to Columbia on Aug. 31 to kickoff the season, while the Gamecocks will travel to Norman, Okla. on Oct. 19 to take on new SEC rival Oklahoma.

MISSING YOU: With the addition of Texas and Oklahoma to the SEC and the subsequent dissolution of divisional play, the Gamecocks do not have long-time Eastern Division rivals Georgia, Florida or Tennessee on the 2024 slate. They have met each of those schools every year since joining the conference in 1992.

THE FALL CALENDAR: The 2024 edition of South Carolina Football gets underway when the team officially reports for fall camp on Thursday, Aug. 1. The first practice is scheduled for Friday, Aug. 2. The Gamecocks will generally practice in the mornings. The first two days will be in helmets. Shells will be added for practices 3, 4 and 5. The

first day of full pads will be practice No. 6, tentatively set for Thursday, Aug. 8. Scrimmages are set for Saturday, Aug. 10 and Saturday, Aug. 17. Fall classes will begin on Thursday, Aug. 20.

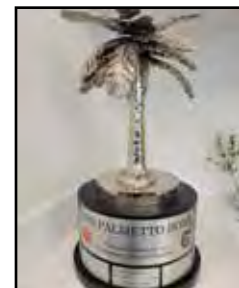
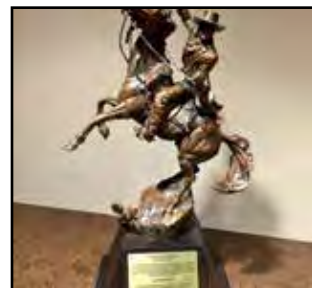
BIG WEEKENDS: South Carolina has several big weekends on tap for home football games in 2024. The Akron game on Sept. 21 has been tabbed as Family Weekend on the USC campus. The annual Homecoming week festivities culminate on Nov. 2 when the Gamecocks host Texas A&M. The popular "Salute the Troops" game is scheduled for Nov. 23 when USC faces Wofford.

TOUGH SLATE: South Carolina traditionally has one of the nation's toughest schedules and 2024 is no exception. 247Sports and Sports Illustrated are in agreement, both tabbing the Gamecocks as having the fourth-toughest schedule in the country. 247Sports said this:

"South Carolina's football schedule is always a challenge, but one would think missing annual rivals Georgia, Tennessee and Florida for the first time in decades would make things easier on the Gamecocks. Hardly. South Carolina hosts LSU and Ole Miss and travels to Alabama, Oklahoma and Clemson next season. That's five games against teams who could likely be inside the top 15 at the time of contest. That Week 2 road game against Kentucky is pivotal for both based on the difficult schedules for each."

2023 IN REVIEW: South Carolina concluded the 2023 season with a record of 5-7, including a 3-5 mark in the SEC. After dropping six of their first eight games, including four in a row, the Gamecocks finished the season strong, winning three of four games in the month of November. Four of their seven losses came to teams that finished the season ranked in the Associated Press Top-20, including No. 4 Georgia, No. 8 Missouri, No. 17 Tennessee and No. 20 Clemson.

WHO ARE THESE GUYS?: The Gamecocks have four new on-field assistant coaches for the 2024 season, including three on the offensive side of the ball. Regarded as an outstanding recruiter, **Marquel Blackwell**, who also has SEC ties having coached most recent with Coley at A&M and before that Ole Miss, takes over as the new running backs coach. Long-time NFL special teams savant **Joe DeCamillis** assumes the duties vacated by Pete Lembo as associate head coach and special teams coach. DeCamillis has ties to Carolina, as his father-in-law, Dan Reeves, is a Gamecock Legend and former NFL head coach. DeCamillis owns two Super Bowl rings of his own. Former Gamecock assistant and Georgia State head coach **Shawn Elliott** returns to Columbia as the run game coordinator/



South Carolina have three "trophy games" this season, all in the month of November. The Gamecocks take on Texas A&M for the Bonham Trophy on Nov. 2, battle Missouri on Nov. 16 for the Mayor's Cup and wrap up the season against Clemson on Nov. 30 with the Palmetto Bowl trophy on the line.

tight ends coach. Elliott, a Camden, S.C. native, was the head coach at GSU for the past seven seasons and served as a Gamecock assistant from 2010-16 under Steve Spurrier and Will Muschamp. **Mike Furrey**, who spent seven seasons in the NFL as a player and four more as a wide receivers coach, is the newest member of the staff. He spent the past two seasons as the head coach at Limestone.

NEXT LEVEL COACHING EXPERIENCE: Six of the Gamecocks 10 assistant coaches have coaching experience in the NFL. Those who have earned their stripes with NFL teams include **Joe DeCamilis, Mike Furrey, Torrian Gray, Dowell Loggains, Sterling Lucas** and **Lonnie Teasley**.

RUN IT BACK: The Gamecocks welcome 44 returning letterwinners to begin the 2024 fall session. The lettermen consist of 16 offensive players, 25 on the defensive side of the ball and three specialists.

RETURNING STARTERS: The Gamecocks list 14 returning starters of a possible 24 (offense, defense, punter, placekicker) from the 2023 squad, five on offense, eight on defense and one specialist. The returning offensive starters are LT **Tree Babalade**, RG **Trovon Baugh**, WR **Nyck Harbor**, RT **Vershon Lee** and LG **Jakai Moore**. The eight returning starters on defense are S **Nick Emmanwori**, CB **O'Donnell Fortune**, DT **Alex Huntley**, N **Jalon Kilgore**, DT **T.J. Sanders**, S **DQ Smith**, DE **Bryan Thomas Jr.** and LB **Debo Williams**. **Kai Kroeger** returns to handle the punting duties.

GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN: The Gamecocks said good-bye to 28 letterwinners including 10 starters off last year's team - six on offense, three on defense and one specialist. The departed starters include RB **Mario Anderson**, WR **Ahmarean Brown**, OC **Nick Gargiulo**, TE **Trey Knox**, WR **Xavier Legette**, and QB **Spencer Rattler** on offense, along with CB **Marcellas Dial**, LB **Stone Blanton** and EDGE **Jordan Strachan** on defense, and placekicker **Mitch Jeter**.

EVERY TIME OUT: The Gamecocks had six players start all 12 games in 2023 including QB **Spencer Rattler**, WR **Xavier Legette** and OL **Nick Gargiulo**

on offense and LB **Debo Williams**, LB **Stone Blanton** and CB **Marcellas Dial** on defense. Williams is the lone returner for 2024.

THE DANDY DOZEN: Twelve players have been on the Gamecocks' roster since head coach Shane Beamer's arrival in Columbia in December of 2020. The dozen includes **Luke Doty, Bradley Dunn, O'Donnell Fortune, Tonka Hemingway, Alex Herrera, Alex Huntley, Mohamed Kaba, Kai Kroeger, Vershon Lee, Payton Mangrum, Jakai Moore** and **Hunter Rugers**.

JUST CAN'T GET ENOUGH: Eleven Gamecocks began their collegiate careers in 2019. **Oscar Adaway III, Kamaar Bell, Davis Beville, Dalevon Campbell, Alex Herrera, DeAndre Jules, Demetrius Knight Jr., Bam Martin-Scott, Jakai Moore, Joshua Simon** and **David Spaulding** all were 2019 high school graduates.

UTILIZING THE PORTAL: The Gamecocks' fall roster features 22 players who were on other team's rosters last fall including 20 scholarship players. Of the 22 transfers, 12 are coming from Power-5 conferences, including seven from the ACC, three from the SEC and two from the Big 12.

EARLY ENROLLEES: The Gamecocks had 13 true freshmen enroll in January including a dozen from the 16-player signing class. The four signees who joined the team during the summer include freshmen **Matthew Fuller, Michael Smith** and **Jalewis Solomon**, and JUCO transfer **Jerome Simmons**.

THE PITT STOP: The 2024 transfer portal had a distinct Pitt Panther vibe to it as defensive tackle **DeAndre Jules**, linebacker **Bangally Kamara** and defensive back **Buddy Mack III** all made their way down to Columbia from the confluence of the Allegheny, Monogahela and Ohio rivers. In addition, quarterback **Davis Beville** spent his first three collegiate seasons on the Pitt campus before transferring to Oklahoma for the last two campaigns.

ROSTER TURNOVER: Seventy-seven of the 120 players on the spring roster (64 percent) are in either their first or second year in the Gamecock program.



Four Gamecocks, including Xavier Legette (1st round-Panthers), Spencer Rattler (1st round-Saints), Marcellas Dial (6th round-Patriots) and Nick Gargiulo (7th round-Broncos) were selected in the 2024 NFL Draft.



BEEN THERE, DONE THAT: The 2024 fall roster features 24 players who have made at least one start for the Gamecocks in their career. Jakai Moore leads the way with 28 career starts, while fellow offensive lineman Vershon Lee is just one behind with 27 career starts. Junior safeties Nick Emmanwori (23 starts) and DQ Smith (22) have the most starts as Gamecocks on defense.

BY THE NUMBERS: Carolina returns 15 percent of its rushing yards, four percent of its passing yards and 25 percent of its receiving yards from 2023. Juju McDowell (63 yards) is the top returning rusher while tight end Joshua Simon (256 yards) is the top returning receiver. The Gamecocks' top returning passer is LaNorris Sellers, who threw just four passes for 86 yards a year ago. The top four tacklers from 2023 all return, including team-leader Debo Williams (113 tackles), Jalon Kilgore (76), DQ Smith (73) and Nick Emmanwori (71 tackles). T.J. Sanders (9.5 tackles for loss, 4.5 sacks) is back after leading the squad in those two categories, while Nick Emmanwori (2 interceptions, 8 pass breakups) and O'Donnell Fortune (2 INT, 6 PBU) are the top returners in those categories.



LaNorris Sellers (Joe Morrison Offensive Player of the Spring) and DQ Smith (Rex Enright Defensive Player of the Spring & Jim Carlen Special Teams Player of the Spring) were honored at the Garnet & Black Spring Game.

HEY TURN ME OVER: The Gamecock defense has been opportunistic under the leadership of defensive coordinator Clayton White. The Gamecocks forced 17 turnovers a year ago and have forced 64 turnovers over the past three seasons, tops in the SEC. Alabama is second during that span with 58.

BLOCK THAT KICK: When your head coach is named Beamer, special teams are a big part of the game. The Gamecocks have been among the leaders in blocked kicks over the past three seasons, topping the conference with 14 during that time, nearly double any other school.

ALMOST AUTOMATIC: Dating back to 2021, the Gamecocks have successfully converted 39 of their last 42 field goal attempts (92.9 pct.), the best mark in the SEC.

BROTHERLY LOVE: The Gamecocks have two sets of brothers on their roster, all of whom play on defense. Jalon Kilgore was a Freshman All-American for the Gamecocks in 2023, while his older brother, Gerald Kilgore, joined the team in the spring as a transfer after two seasons at Tennessee Tech. Both play in the secondary. Walk-on linebacker Ronnie Porter begins his fourth season in the program. This year he is joined by his younger brother, Rondarius Porter, who plays defensive tackle.

TWO-SPORT STAR: Gamecocks wide receiver Nyck Harbor is one of the fastest players in college football. The two-sport star posted a 20.87 clocking in the 200 meters and 6.73 in the 60 meters during the indoor season. He earned All-America honors during the outdoor season after logging personal bests of 10.11 in the 100m and 20.30 in the 200.

STARGAZING: The Gamecocks 2024 roster features several players who have established a resume that should have them under consideration for preseason All-SEC accolades. On offense, running back Raheim "Rocket" Sanders, tight end Joshua Simon, wide receivers Jared Brown and Gage Larvadain and center Vershon Lee have earned their way. Defensively, the standouts have been defensive tackles Tonka Hemingway, Alex Huntley and T.J. Sanders, linebackers Debo Williams and Bam Martin-Scott, and defensive backs Nick Emmanwori, O'Donnell Fortune, Jalon Kilgore and DQ Smith. Special teams are headed up by 2022 All-American punter Kai Kroeger and long snapper Hunter Rogers.

The Gamecocks have 24 players who will be wearing graduate patches this fall, including several who graduated from the University of South Carolina in May, 2024.

CAPTAIN, MY CAPTAIN: Defensive tackle **Alex Huntley** and linebacker **Debo Williams** return after being two of six permanent team captains from the 2023 squad. The other permanent captains named for the 2023 season were QBV **Spencer Rattler** OL **Nick Gargiulo**, WR **Xavier Legette** and RB **Dakereon Joyner**.

YOU'RE NOT WORTHY: The Gamecocks are 42-15 in their last 57 non-conference games, a .737 winning percentage, with eight of the 15 losses in that stretch coming against Clemson. The Gamecocks went 2-2 against non-conference foes in 2023, posting wins over Furman and Jacksonville State and bookending losses to ACC rivals North Carolina and Clemson. The 2024 non-conference slate includes home games against Old Dominion (Aug. 31), Akron (Sept. 21) and Wofford (Nov. 23) and a road contest at Clemson (Nov. 30).

PROTECT THIS HOUSE: South Carolina has won 38 of its last 45 home games (.844) against non-conference foes. The Gamecocks had won a school-record 22-straight home games against non-conference teams before dropping the final two games of the 2015 regular season to The Citadel and Clemson. The Gamecocks were 2-1 in home non-conference games in 2023, defeating Furman and Jacksonville State and losing to Clemson.

WORKING OVERTIME: The Gamecocks are 3-4 in games decided in overtime since the rule was added in 1996, the most recent being a double-overtime win at Georgia in 2019, a victory that earned them National Team of the Week honors.

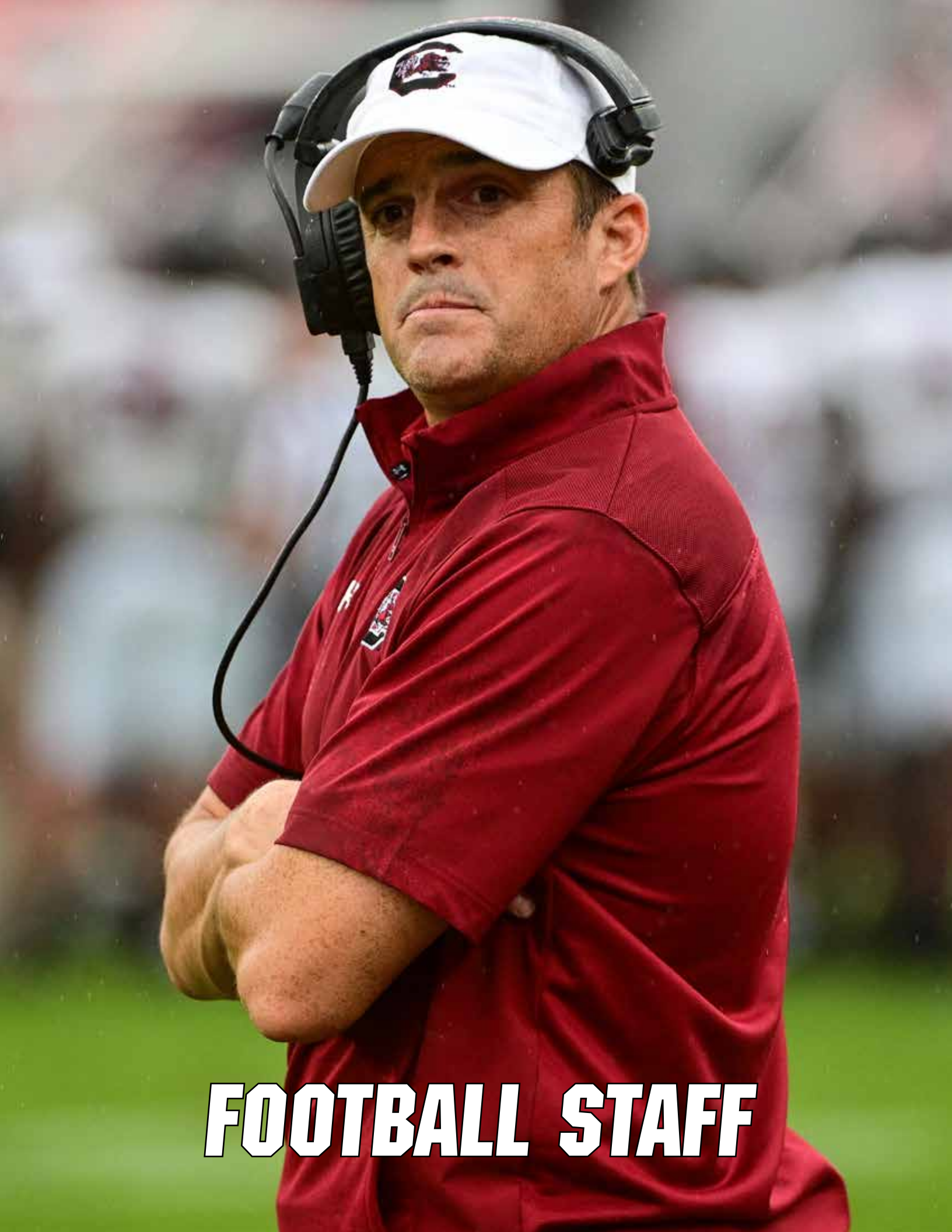

LOOKING AHEAD: The 2025 schedule will have a similar look at the 2024 slate with the same contests taking place, just at the opposite venue. Shane Beamer is in his fourth season leading the South Carolina program in 2024. He was named the Gamecocks' 36th head football coach on Dec. 6, 2020. Coach Beamer owns a 20-18 mark through three seasons in Columbia. During his tenure he has posted victories over three coaches who have won national championships – Jimbo Fisher, Dabo Swinney and Mack Brown.

Beamer had a successful first season in Columbia, improving the Gamecocks by 3.5 games, from a 2-8 mark in 2020 to a 7-6 campaign in 2021, including a convincing win over North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl. He tied the school record for wins by a first-year head coach, doubled the preseason's expected win total and surpassed the win total of the two previous seasons combined, earning him a share of the Steve Spurrier First-Year Coach of the Year Award, presented by the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA). Safety Jaylan Foster earned All-America honors and three players were selected in the NFL Draft following his inaugural season.

In 2022, the team again exceeded expectations by recording eight wins, including three wins over ranked opponents. The Gamecocks won eight games for just the 15th time in 129 seasons and for the first time since 2017. The Gamecocks were ranked 23rd in the country in the final AP and USA Today Coaches' polls. It marked the first time since 2013 that the Gamecocks finished the season ranked in the top-25 and the 10th time Carolina has finished the season ranked in the final AP poll. The Gamecocks defeated No. 5 Tennessee and No. 7 Clemson in the final two games of the regular season, the first time Carolina has posted back-to-back wins over top-10 teams and just the seventh time in history that a school has defeated AP Top-10 opponents in consecutive weeks as an unranked team, the first since 2003. Punter Kai Kroeger earned All-America honors, leading a special teams unit ranked No. 1 in the country. Five players were selected in the NFL Draft off that squad, the most since 2013.

Challenged by one of the toughest schedules in the FBS, the 2023 Gamecocks finished the campaign with a 5-7 mark, including a 3-5 ledger in the SEC. The squad was led all season by senior quarterback Spencer Rattler and senior wide receiver Xavier Legette. Rattler set the school's single-season record for completions (275) and completion percentage (68.9), while his 3,186 passing yards was the third-highest total in school history. Legette, a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award, led the team with 71 receptions for 1,255 yards and seven receiving touchdowns. His 1,255 receiving yards was the second-highest single-season mark in school history.

Prior to his first head coaching stint, Beamer had been an assistant coach at seven Football Bowl Subdivision schools for 21 seasons. During his career as an assistant, he coached in 17 bowl games, including a College Football Playoff National Championship Game, posted 18 non-losing seasons, six of those with double-digit victories, and his teams won 63 percent of its games. He has coached all three phases of the game – offense, defense and special teams.

Beamer is not new to Carolina. The Charleston, S.C. native, served as an assistant coach with the Gamecocks for four seasons from 2007-10 under head coach Steve Spurrier. In 2007, he served as the outside linebackers coach and co-special teams coordinator. He mentored the cornerbacks in 2008, then coached the Spurs and strong safeties and was the special teams coordinator and recruiting coordinator in 2009 and 2010, setting the foundation for the most successful run in school history.

In 2009 at South Carolina, Beamer was nominated for the Frank Broyles Award. His special teams' units recorded five blocked kicks, tying for the SEC lead and for the eighth-highest total in the nation. He also helped coach a defensive unit that ranked third in the SEC and 15th in the country in total defense, and second in the league and eighth in the country in passing defense.

As the Gamecocks' recruiting coordinator, his 2009 class was ranked 12th-best in the country, and the 2010 and 2011 classes were ranked in the Top 25.

During his tenure as recruiting coordinator, nine Gamecocks were selected in the NFL Draft, including first round selection Stephen Gilmore (Buffalo) and second round picks Alshon Jeffery (Chicago) and D.J. Swearinger (Houston).

The Gamecocks all-time winningest quarterback, Connor Shaw, and rushing touchdown leader, Marcus Lattimore, were also in the 2010 class.

Beamer has been a part of building programs throughout his career. He has been on three coaching staffs where the head coach was in his first or second season at the school. He joined Sylvester Croom's staff at Mississippi State in his first season, Kirby Smart's program at Georgia in his first season, and Lincoln Riley's unit at Oklahoma in his second season.

Beamer came to Carolina from Oklahoma, where he served as the assistant head coach for offense and mentored the tight ends and H-backs for three highly-successful seasons. In 2020, Oklahoma ranked sixth in the country in scoring (43.0), 11th in total offense (494.7) and 14th in passing offense (315.0). In 2019, the Sooners led the nation in yards per play (8.0) and ranked third in total offense (537.6) and fourth in passing efficiency rating (187.0). Oklahoma led the nation in total offense (570.3), scoring offense (48.4) and yards per play (FBS-record 8.6), and ranked second in passing efficiency rating (194.9) in 2018.

Prior to his arrival in Norman, Beamer spent two seasons on the staff at Georgia as tight ends coach and special teams coordinator under Kirby Smart. The Bulldogs posted a 21-7 combined record with Beamer on staff. In 2017, the Bulldogs won the SEC Championship and finished second in the nation, falling in the CFP title game to Alabama in overtime. His special teams ranked eighth nationally in net punting (41.7), and 20th in kickoff returns (23.5) while blocking four kicks.

The son of Hall of Fame coach, Frank Beamer, he worked with his father as the associate head coach and running backs coach at Virginia Tech from 2011-15. In his first year, he coached David Wilson, who broke the Tech single-season rushing record and was named All-American and ACC Player of the Year and went on to become a first-round NFL draft selection by the New York Giants. Shane served as the Hokies' acting head coach in the 2014 Military Bowl win while his father watched from the press box following throat surgery.

Beamer's first full-time coaching position was at Mississippi State, joining the Bulldogs in 2004 as cornerbacks coach and recruiting coordinator. In his first two seasons at State, he guided three defensive backs to SEC All-Freshman Team accolades. He maintained the recruiting coordinator title but made the move to running backs coach in the spring of 2006 where he tutored running back Anthony Dixon to SEC All-Freshman honors.

Beamer spent three seasons (2001-03) as a graduate assistant at Tennessee, helping with the cornerbacks and assisting in all special teams areas. He also oversaw game opponent scouting while earning a master's degree in sport management in December 2003.

Before joining the staff at UT, he worked one season (2000) as a graduate assistant at Georgia Tech, helping with the Yellow Jacket quarterbacks and wide receivers.

A December 1999 graduate of Virginia Tech, Beamer was a member of five bowl teams (1995-99 seasons) and three Big East Conference championship squads on the Hokie football team as a long snapper and wide receiver. He was a long snapper on the 1999 Virginia Tech team that played for the BCS National Championship.

Beamer and his wife, Emily, are the parents of three children – two daughters, Sutton and Olivia, both born in Columbia, and a son, Hunter, born in Blacksburg, Va.

Blackwell began his time at Houston as the co-offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2019 before taking over the running backs for the 2020 and 2021 seasons.

In his second season as running backs coach, Blackwell saw the total rushing production improve by 847 yards. Cougar running backs found the end zone 27 times in 2021 compared to 12 in 2020.

Blackwell helped freshman phenom Alton McCaskill to a record-setting season in 2021 that concluded with him being named American Athletic Conference Rookie of the Year. McCaskill's 961 rushing yards were the most by a UH running back since 2015 while his 16 rushing touchdowns led all true freshmen across the country.

Blackwell spent the 2018 season at West Virginia and helped lead a Mountaineer offense that eclipsed the 500-yard and 40-point marks eight times during the season, including 704 yards and 56 points vs. Oklahoma.

West Virginia had three different running backs register 100-yard rushing games during the 2018 season in Leddie Brown, Kennedy McKoy and Martell Pettaway. Brown became the first WVU true freshman to record multiple 100-yard rushing games since 2007.

Blackwell arrived at West Virginia after serving as the running backs coach at Toledo in 2016-17. He was part of a staff that led the Rockets to a 20-7 mark through two seasons, including an 11-3 record in 2017, the 2017 Mid-American Conference championship and two bowl appearances.

In 2017, Terry Swanson led the Mid-American Conference with 1,363 rushing yards and was third in the league with 14 touchdowns. That same season saw Shakif Seymour run for 704 yards and 12 touchdowns, No. 3 in the MAC and No. 4 among all freshmen in FBS. Against Bowling Green, Seymour tied a school record with five rushing touchdowns.

In 2016, Kareem Hunt led the MAC and was No. 15 nationally with 1,475 yards while rushing for at least 100 yards eight times. A third-round NFL Draft selection by the Kansas City Chiefs, Hunt finished with a Toledo-record 4,945 yards, ranking No. 3 in MAC history.

Prior to his time at Toledo, Blackwell coached 20 high school players who earned Division I scholarships, as well as three college players who became first-round NFL draft picks.

Blackwell's first coaching positions came at Freedom High in New Tampa, Fla., first as the offensive coordinator in 2006, then as the head coach from 2007-08. He served at his alma mater, USF, from 2009-11 as a quality control coach.

Following a year as the running backs coach at Western Kentucky in 2012, Blackwell returned to USF, as the director of player development in 2013. He returned to the high school ranks in 2014 as the offensive coordinator at Lakewood High before spending the 2015 season at Florida as a quality control specialist, working with the Gator quarterbacks.


Blackwell was USF's starting quarterback for four years, leading the Bulls to a 30-12 mark. He threw for 9,108 yards and 57 touchdowns and had 1,235 rushing yards and 20 touchdowns in his career. He set most of the Bulls' career passing records and is among the tops in rushing yards and touchdowns. The three-year captain led the Bulls to a 9-2 record as a senior before playing in the NFL with the New York Jets.

Blackwell and his wife, Sharvettye, have three daughters, LeQuay, Shaye, and Shyeloh.

Marquel Blackwell is in his first season with the Gamecocks after joining the staff as the running backs coach on January 19, 2024.

Blackwell came to Carolina following a one-year stint at Texas A&M. Prior to his arrival in Aggieland, Blackwell spent the 2022 season at Ole Miss after three seasons at Houston.

At Ole Miss, Blackwell helped lead one of the best rushing offenses in the nation, as the Rebels ranked third in the country and led the SEC with 256.5 yards per game. Freshman Quinshon Judkins led the SEC and ranked among the top 10 nationally with 1,565 yards and 16 TDs in his debut season.

Longtime NFL special teams coach Joe DeCamillis was named as the Gamecocks' associate head coach/special teams coordinator on Jan. 29, 2024.

DeCamillis spent the 2023 season on Steve Sarkisian's staff at the University of Texas where he served as a special assistant to the head coach while sharing ideas and analysis of the Longhorns' special teams units with special teams coordinator/tight ends coach Jeff Banks.

Texas ranked 20th in the country in special teams efficiency in 2023, according to ESPN analytics. The Longhorns tied for 10th in the nation with three blocked kicks, ranked 11th in the nation with a 15.9-yard punt return average and 16th in the country with a net punting average of 41.8 yards. The Longhorns won the Big 12 title and advanced to the College Football Playoffs in DeCamillis lone season in Austin.

Prior to his stint at UT, DeCamillis spent the previous 34 years in the NFL including 32 as a special teams coach. He helped lead his squad to seven AFC or NFC Championship Game appearances and four Super Bowls, winning Super Bowl titles with the Denver Broncos in 2015 and the Los Angeles Rams in 2021.

DeCamillis began his NFL career as an administrative assistant for his father-in-law, then Denver Broncos head coach Dan Reeves, a former Gamecock football standout. DeCamillis was promoted to a position on Reeves' coaching staff in 1991 as a special teams assistant and spent two years in that post with the Broncos.

DeCamillis continued to work for Coach Reeves as a special teams coach for the New York Giants from 1993-96 and the Atlanta Falcons from 1997-2003. After Reeves' departure, DeCamillis remained on the Falcons' staff through the 2006 season. He has also served as the special teams coach for the Jacksonville Jaguars (2007-08), and as the special teams coordinator for the Dallas Cowboys (2009-12), Chicago Bears (2013-14), Denver Broncos (2015-16), Jacksonville Jaguars (2017-20) and Los Angeles Rams (2021-22). He also held the title of Assistant Head Coach while with the Bears.

On Oct. 13, 2016, DeCamillis served as the interim head coach for Denver's game against the San Diego Chargers while Gary Kubiak was recovering from an illness. The Broncos dropped a 21-13 decision in his head coaching debut.

Born June 29, 1965, and raised in Arvada, Colo. where he was an all-state quarterback and wrestler, DeCamillis did not play football in college. He wrestled for the University of Wyoming where he was a two-time All-Western Athletic Conference performer and an All-American after placing eighth at the 1988 NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships.

DeCamillis and his wife, Dana, have two children, Caitlin and Ashley, and four grandchildren, Decker, Annabelle, Brooks and Reeves.

Shawn Elliott returns for his second stint with Carolina Football. He was named the Gamecocks' run game coordinator and tight ends coach, on Feb. 16, 2024.

The Camden, S.C., native has been part of 23 winning campaigns and 21 postseason appearances in 27 seasons as a college coach. Most recently, he served for seven seasons as the head coach at Georgia State where he posted a 41-44 record and led the Panthers to four bowl wins in five appearances. A long-time offensive line coach, Elliott built the GSU program by establishing one of the nation's most productive rushing attacks. Over the last five seasons, the Panthers averaged 214 yards rushing per game.

During his tenure in Atlanta, Elliott posted GSU's first winning season as an FBS program in 2017. He logged the school's first consecutive winning seasons and three-straight bowl berths from 2019-21, culminating with a school-record eight wins in 2021. He pulled a stunning upset in 2019 with a win at Tennessee for the program's first Power 5 win, earning him Dodd Trophy National Coach of the Week honors, and engineered the school's first win over a ranked opponent with a win at No. 21 Coastal Carolina in 2021.

While at Georgia State, Elliott produced 71 All-Sun Belt Conference players, one All-American and one Freshman All-American. Eleven of his players signed NFL free agent contracts, including five who played in the league. In addition, GSU had eight Academic All-District selections and one Academic All-American during his tenure.

Before taking over the Georgia State program, Elliott worked seven seasons (2010-16) at South Carolina under Steve Spurrier and Will Muschamp, highlighted by three consecutive 11-win seasons from 2011-13 during the most successful run in the Gamecocks' history. In addition to coaching the offensive line, he was the running game coordinator in 2010 and 2011, was elevated to co-offensive coordinator in 2012, and then served as the interim head coach following Spurrier's retirement midway through the 2015 season.

Elliott originally joined the South Carolina staff in 2010 and helped the Gamecocks reach five-straight bowl games while coaching some of the most prolific and balanced offenses in school history. The Gamecocks turned in the program's best offensive season, statistically, in 2013, averaging 34.1 points while rolling up a school-record 452.3 yards per game.

South Carolina's 2014 unit scored nearly 33 points per game while averaging over 440 yards of offense as All-America and All-Southeastern Conference offensive guard A.J. Cann paved the way. In 2010, Elliott's first season in Columbia, his offensive line blocked for record-setting running back Marcus Lattimore, the National Freshman of the Year.

In addition to Cann, a third-round draft pick by the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2015, Elliott developed future NFL linemen Corey Robinson, Ronald Patrick, Brandon Shell, T.J. Johnson and Rokeyvious Watkins.

Before coming to South Carolina in 2010, Elliott coached his entire career at Appalachian State, his alma mater. In 13 seasons, he was an integral part of App State's three consecutive NCAA titles from 2005-07 and the Mountaineers' historic upset at Michigan in 2007.

Beginning in 1997, he worked two seasons as a defensive assistant (1997-98) and then two seasons as the tight ends coach (1999-00) before taking over the offensive line in 2001.

In nine seasons as the Mountaineers' offensive line coach, Elliott's players earned All-America distinction on 12 occasions, including four different linemen who received first-team All-America accolades. He also coached All-American and future NFL tight end Daniel Wilcox in 2000. In 2003, offensive lineman Wayne Smith was the first pick in the Canadian Football League Draft. From 2005-07, Elliott coached three-consecutive Southern Conference Jacobs Blocking Trophy recipients.


Elliott helped lead the Mountaineers to 10 NCAA playoff berths in 13 seasons with two trips to the national semifinals and three appearances in the quarterfinals in addition to the three championships.

He was one of three App State coaches to earn the NCAA's Award of Valor for their efforts in rescuing two individuals from an automobile accident in 2000.

The two head coaches under whom Elliott spent the bulk of his time as an assistant coach, Spurrier at South Carolina, and Jerry Moore at Appalachian State, are both enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Elliott was the first player in Mountaineer annals to appear in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs four separate seasons. He was a four-year letterwinner, helping the Mountaineers to two Southern Conference titles and a combined record of 36-16. He served as a co-captain of the 1995 Appalachian State squad that finished 12-1 while earning all-league distinction as a defensive end.

Born June 26, 1973, Elliott earned his bachelor's degree from Appalachian State in 1996. He is married to the former Summer Scruggs, also an App State grad and a stand-out tennis player for the Mountaineers, and the couple has two children, Maddyn and Max.

Mike Furrey is in his first season with the Gamecock Football program. He was tapped as the Gamecocks' wide receivers coach on February 29, 2024.

Furrey, 47, has spent the past two seasons as the head coach at Limestone University, a Division II school located in Gaffney, S.C. He led the Saints to back-to-back 8-4 campaigns, including a share of the title in the South Atlantic Conference's Piedmont Division and a spot in the Division II playoffs in both seasons, in his second stint at the school. He previously served as the Saints' head coach in 2016 and 2017.

Sandwiched between the two stints at Limestone, Furrey logged four seasons as the wide receivers coach on Matt Nagy's staff with the Chicago Bears. He helped Chicago to an NFC North title in 2018, while the Bears reached the playoffs in both 2018 and 2020. The Bears posted a 34-31 record during his four-year tenure in the Windy City.

Furrey began his coaching career in 2011 as the head coach at Kentucky Christian University, an NAIA program in Grayson, Ky. He turned the struggling program around from an 0-11 campaign in the year prior to his arrival to a 7-4 season and a Top-25 ranking in 2012. He left KCU after two seasons to become the wide receivers coach at Marshall University, a position he held for three years. During his tenure with the Thundering Herd, Furrey helped guide the program to three-straight bowl wins and the 2014 Conference USA

Championship. Marshall led Conference USA in scoring offense while ranking in the Top-5 nationally in total offense during the 2013 and 2014 campaigns.

Through six years as a head coach, Furrey owns a combined record of 33-34, including an 8-14 mark at Kentucky Christian and a 25-20 ledger at Limestone. He is Limestone's all-time leader in wins.

Furrey played a combined seven years in the NFL with the St. Louis Rams (2003-05), Detroit Lions (2006-08), and Cleveland Browns (2009). His best season as a professional came during the 2006 season with the Lions when he led the NFC with 98 receptions for 1,086 yards and seven touchdowns. His 98 catches that season set an NFL record for most receptions in a season after having none the previous year. He played on defense with the Rams in the prior season.

After signing with the Indianapolis Colts as an undrafted free agent in 2000, Furrey spent one season with the Las Vegas Outlaws in the XFL before playing two years with the New York Dragons of the Arena Football League. He would then sign with the St. Louis Rams in 2003, playing in 13 games during his rookie year. He helped guide the Rams to the NFC Divisional Round as a safety a year later.

Twice nominated for the NFL Walter Payton Man of the Year Award while with the Lions, Furrey was a finalist for the prestigious award during the 2009 season as a member of the Cleveland Browns. The Walter Payton Man of the Year Award honors a player's volunteer and charitable work as well as his excellence on the field.

Furrey won the 2009 JB Award, an accolade given to those who specialize in community service by then CBS studio host James Brown, and was selected as the 2009 NFL Ed Block Courage Award recipient, an honor that highlights courage, compassion, commitment, and community service.

After spending his freshman season as a walk-on at Ohio State, Furrey transferred to the University of Northern Iowa, where he was a three-time All-American. He was inducted into the UNI Athletics Hall of Fame in 2017.

In 2007, he founded the Mike Furrey Foundation, raising money to help improve the lives of those who are hurting, hungry, hopeful and/or homeless. He also served as the board president for Basket of Hope with former NFL coach Tony Dungy as the organization's spokesperson.

Furrey graduated from UNI in 2000 with a Bachelor of Arts in Liberal Studies. He and his wife Koren have three children, Makayla, Stone and Kanon.

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Torrian Gray is in his fourth season in Columbia. He was named the Gamecocks' defensive backs coach on Jan. 15, 2021.

Gray has coached the secondary for 24 years, including 20 at the collegiate level and four in the NFL. He has developed a number of NFL defensive backs, including Brandon Flowers, Kam Chancellor, Kyle Fuller and Kendall Fuller at Virginia Tech; Teez Tabor, Marcus Maye, Quincy Wilson, Duke Dawson and C.J. Henderson at Florida and Cam Smith and Darius Rush at South Carolina.

In 2023, Gray mentored a young defensive secondary that featured Freshman All-America defensive back Jalon Kilgore. Kilgore also earned Freshman All-SEC accolades. Carolina ranked fifth in the SEC in defensive passing efficiency.

In 2022, the Gamecocks ranked 27th in the country in pass efficiency defense and

34th in passing defense, allowing just 206.7 yards per game through the air. Carolina intercepted 15 passes, which ranked first in the SEC and 14th in the nation. They scored two touchdowns on interception returns in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl against Notre Dame. Safety Nick Emmanwori earned first-team Freshman All-America honors and was named to the SEC All-Freshman team, while freshman DQ Smith was a third-team Freshman All-American according to CollegeFootballNews.

In 2021, Carolina surrendered 180.8 yards per game through the air, the fewest since 2011. They ranked first in the SEC and seventh in the nation in passing yards allowed per game. Carolina intercepted 15 passes, tying for second in the SEC lead and for 14th in the country. Safety Jaylan Foster earned second-team All-America and first-team All-SEC honors after leading the team with 96 tackles and five interceptions, tied for fourth in the country. Corner Cam Smith defended 14 passes with three INTs and 11 PBU.

Prior to his arrival in Columbia, Gray spent two seasons coaching the cornerbacks at Florida, his second stint with the Gators. In 2019, the Gators tied for ninth in the FBS with 16 interceptions. UF was one of only two FBS teams (FAU) to feature four players with at least three interceptions. Cornerbacks CJ Henderson (First Team) and Kaiir Elam (Freshman) earned All-SEC honors. Henderson was the ninth pick in the 2020 NFL Draft, while Elam earned first-team All-SEC honors.

Prior to his stint with the Gators, Gray worked with the defensive backs for the Washington franchise in the NFL. In 2017, his first season in the nation's capital, Gray's unit helped produce the team's strongest season against the pass in nearly a decade. They ranked third in completion percentage allowed (57.6 percent), the team's best ranking since leading the NFL in the category in 2005 (54.4), while finishing ninth in passing yards allowed per game (213.8, the team's lowest since 2009) and 10th in opponent passer rating (81.0, lowest since 2008). One of his standout performers was former Gamecock DJ. Swearingin.

In 2016, Gray served as the defensive backs coach at Florida. Under Gray's guidance, cornerback Teez Tabor earned first-team All-SEC and second-team All-American honors. Gray also helped defensive back Quincy Wilson earn second-team All-SEC accolades.

Gray spent a decade (2006-15) at his alma mater, Virginia Tech, leading some of the nation's best defensive backfields. In his 10 seasons coaching the secondary in Blacksburg under head coach Frank Beamer, his unit allowed just 185.0 passing yards per game and a 106.5 opponent passer rating – both ranked second in the nation over that span. Opposing quarterbacks completed just 50.4 percent of their passes in those 10 seasons, the lowest percentage of any defense in the nation. The Virginia Tech secondary ranked in the top 15 nationally in opponent passer rating eight times in Gray's 10 seasons leading the unit, including three top-five finishes. During Gray's tenure, a total of 11 Hokie defensive backs were selected in the NFL Draft.

In 2014, the Hokies had the fourth-best pass defense (189.2 ypg) in the Atlantic Coast Conference despite losing All-American Kendall Fuller early in the season due to injury. His unit allowed opponents to complete just 49.6 percent of their passes, second-best in the conference.

In 2006, his first year leading the group, they ranked first in the country in passing yards allowed per game (128.2) and second in opponent passer rating (91.3).

Before returning to Virginia Tech, Gray spent two seasons in the NFL as assistant defensive backs coach for the Chicago Bears from 2004-05. In 2005, the Bears ranked fifth in the NFL in passing defense and finished tied for second in interceptions (24) as defensive backs Nathan Vasher and Mike Brown both earned Pro Bowl selections.

Gray began his coaching career at the University of Maine, serving as defensive backs coach for two seasons from 2000-01. He then spent the 2002-03 seasons as defensive backs coach at the University of Connecticut. During his time with the Huskies, he coached cornerback Justin Perkins, helping him to two all-conference selections and 12 career interceptions.

Following a standout career at Kathleen High in Lakeland, Fla., Gray played collegiately at Virginia Tech and became a three-time all-conference selection. He helped lead the Hokies to a pair of conference titles and was drafted by the Minnesota Vikings in the second round (49th overall) of the 1997 NFL Draft. He spent three seasons with the Vikings before retiring after a career-ending knee injury in the spring of 2000.

A native of Lakeland, Fla., Gray has two daughters, Tori and Lexi.

Dowell Loggains is in his second season as the Gamecocks' offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. He was named to that post on Dec. 13, 2022.

In his first season in Columbia, Loggains turned quarterback Spencer Rattler and wide receiver Xavier Legette into one of the most lethal pass-and-catch combinations in the country. Rattler set a school record by completing 68.9 percent of his pass attempts for 3,186 yards, the third-highest single-season total in school history. Legette caught 71 passes for 1,255 yards, the second-highest receiving yards mark in the Carolina record books, while earning all-conference recognition. In addition, offensive guard Trovon Baugh was named to the SEC All-Freshman team.

Loggains spent the previous two seasons as the tight ends coach at the University of Arkansas as part of Sam Pittman's staff. Equipped with a wealth of experience as an offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from his time in the NFL, Loggains has also established himself as an excellent recruiter in his two-year stint with the Razorbacks, ranking in the top 25 nationally.

Loggains spent 16 years in the NFL (2005-2020) with six different organizations, primarily as a quarterbacks coach, including seven seasons as an offensive

coordinator. He served as either an offensive coordinator or quarterbacks coach for the Tennessee Titans (2010-13), Cleveland Browns (2014), Chicago Bears (2015-17), Miami Dolphins (2018) or New York Jets (2019-20).

Loggains served as the New York Jets offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in 2019 and 2020. During his first season in The Meadowlands, he guided an offense that was among the league's most proficient on opening drives, scoring 40 first-possession points. Quarterback Sam Darnold's numbers improved from his rookie campaign, increasing his completion percentage, passing yards, touchdown passes and passer rating while also lowering his interceptions.

Loggains oversaw a Miami offense that averaged 4.68 yards per rush in 2018, the NFL's ninth-best mark. The Dolphins also ranked second in the league with 14 passing touchdowns of 20+ yards. Running back Kenyan Drake become one of just nine players in the league to register at least four rushing and receiving touchdowns while producing over 1,000 total yards.

Loggains began a three-year stint in Chicago in 2015 as the Bears' quarterbacks coach, where he mentored Jay Cutler to a career season as the veteran posted then single-season bests in passer rating and yards per attempt, all while reducing his interception total by seven from the previous season.

Loggains was promoted to the Bears' offensive coordinator in 2016 and helped running back Jordan Howard finish sixth in the league with 1,313 yards rushing as a rookie. In 2017, he helped Mitchell Trubisky, the second overall selection in the draft, transition to NFL starter as the quarterback finished second among rookie passers in yards and passer rating in 12 starts.

He also groomed another rookie, fourth-round pick Tarik Cohen, that season. The running back became the first rookie since 1965 and first player since 1975 to record a rushing, passing, receiving and punt return touchdown in the same season. Both running back Jordan Howard and guard Josh Sitton earned Pro Bowl selections under Loggains' watch during the year as Howard again produced 1,000+ yards rushing.

Loggains worked as the Cleveland Browns quarterbacks coach in 2014 under offensive coordinator Kyle Shanahan. He helped quarterback Brian Hoyer to a career season as the six-year veteran won seven games (in 13 starts) and threw for over 3,000 yards while the offense produced 31 passes of 25+ yards, the 10th most of any team in the league.

Loggains began his coaching career with Tennessee in 2006, and spent eight seasons with the Titans in a variety of roles, ultimately serving as the offensive coordinator for part of 2012 and all of 2013. After head coach Mike Munchak elevated him to full-time offensive coordinator, he helped wide receiver Kendall Wright and running back Chris Johnson become just the organization's fifth 1,000-yard receiving/rushing combo as Wright brought in 94 catches for 1,079 yards and Johnson gained 1,077 rushing yards.

Loggains joined the Titans as a coaching administrative assistant (2006-07) and quality control coach (2008-09) before spending the next three seasons as the quarterbacks/passing game coordinator, helping Vince Young achieve a career-high passer rating in 2010, garnering a Pro Bowl appearance.

Loggains first professional experience came with the Dallas Cowboys as a scouting assistant in 2005. In that role, he helped the Cowboys with opponent film breakdown and statistical analysis to be used for game-plan preparation.

Loggains graduated from the University of Arkansas with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology in 2003 and a master's degree in education in 2005. He walked-on to the Razorback football program in 2000 as a quarterback and holder before earning a scholarship and becoming a four-year letterman, appearing in 50 games.

Loggains and his wife, Beth, have four children: daughters Reese, Aven and Connor and son, Ryne.

Sterling Lucas is in his third season on the Gamecocks' coaching staff. He officially joined the Gamecocks' on-field coaching staff on Jan. 14, 2022 as the defensive ends/outside linebackers coach.

In 2023, the Gamecock defense surrendered 149.4 rushing yards per game, the fewest since 2017 and the second-fewest since 2012, while forcing 17 turnovers in 12 games.

In his first season in Columbia in 2022, the Gamecocks ranked 27th in the country in pass efficiency defense and 34th in passing defense, allowing just 206.7 yards per game through the air. The Gamecock defense forced 23 turnovers, including eight fumble recoveries and 15 interceptions. The 23 turnovers forced ranked second in the SEC and 20th in the country, while the 15 picks ranked first in the league and 14th in the nation.

Lucas, an Orangeburg, S.C., native, spent the previous year as an assistant defensive line coach for the NFL's Jacksonville Jaguars. Prior to that, he spent five seasons (2016-20) working with the Baltimore Ravens.

Lucas began his tenure in Baltimore in 2016 and held various roles on the defensive side of the ball until 2020, when he worked with the defensive line under current Jaguars defensive coordinator Joe Cullen. With Lucas on staff from 2016-20, the Ravens led the NFL in total defense (314.1 yards per game), allowed the second-fewest rushing yards per game (97.1) and produced the third-most takeaways (126). Lucas worked closely with several Pro Bowl players while in Baltimore, including DL Calais Campbell (2020), OLB Matthew Judon (2019 and 2020) and LB C.J. Mosley (2017 and 2018).

In 2020, Lucas helped the Ravens advance to the AFC Divisional round as their defense allowed the second-fewest points (18.9) and seventh-fewest yards (329.8) per game in the NFL. He was promoted from defensive quality control coach to defensive assistant/linebackers coach in 2019 and assisted with the team's linebackers, which helped the team allow the NFL's third-fewest points per game (17.6) and the fourth-fewest yards per game (300.6). Baltimore earned a franchise-best 14-2 record and its second-straight AFC North title.

In 2018, Lucas worked with the NFL's No. 1 ranked defense (292.2 yards per game allowed), which permitted the league's second-fewest points per game (17.9). He served as an administrative assistant for the defense in 2017, helping Baltimore post NFL bests in takeaways (34), INTs (22) and shut-outs (three). He originally joined the team in 2016 working on the defensive side of the ball, while also assisting the strength and conditioning staff.

Lucas began his coaching career at North Carolina State where he spent 2013 as a graduate assistant in the strength and conditioning department prior to spending 2014-15 as a defensive graduate assistant, with a primary focus on coaching the linebackers and nickelbacks. South Carolina's defensive coordinator Clayton White was on the NC State defensive staff during that time, coaching the safeties.

A product of Orangeburg-Wilkinson High School, Lucas graduated from North Carolina State in 2012 with a bachelor's degree in communications and played linebacker for the Wolfpack from 2008-12, finishing his career with 167 tackles, 4.0 sacks and one INT.

Lucas and his wife, Brittany, have four girls, Londyn, Ari, Nova and Zuri.

Travian Robertson is in his second season as the Gamecocks' defensive line coach. He was named to the post on May 1, 2023.

In his first season back in Columbia, the Carolina alum led a defensive line that surrendered 149.4 rushing yards per game, the fewest since 2017 and the second fewest since 2012. Both T.J. Sanders and Alex Huntley were recognized as SEC Defensive Lineman of the Week during the 2023 campaign. Sanders led the team with 9.5 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks from his defensive tackle position.

Robertson spent the 2022 season at Tulane, where he helped head coach Willie Fritz and the Green Wave to a 12-2 record overall, including a win over Southern California in the 2023 Cotton Bowl. The Green Wave went 7-1 in the American Athletic Conference, defeated UCF in the conference championship game for their first-ever AAC football title, and finished the season ranked ninth in both the AP and Coaches' polls. Tulane allowed 22.2 points and 360.4 yards per game, surrendering just 3.9 yards per rush. Defensive tackle Patrick Jenkins and defensive end Darius Hodges both earned second-team all-AAC honors.

Robertson came to Tulane after serving as a defensive line coach at Georgia State, where he worked under former Gamecock assistant and interim head coach Shawn Elliott for three years. During that three-year stint, the Panthers collected 94 sacks (2.4 per game), including a school-record 38 sacks in 2021.

The Panthers earned back-to-back-to-back bowl berths in his three seasons, and under Robertson's tutelage, defensive linemen Dontae Wilson and Hardrick Willis earned All-Sun Belt Conference honors. Willis also became the Panthers' career sack leader.

In 2021, GSU ranked 15th nationally in tackles for loss at 7.1 per game. The team was second in the Sun Belt Conference and 23rd nationally in sacks, averaging 2.92 per contest.

In 2020, Robertson helped the GSU defense rank No. 8 in FBS with 21 turnovers forced while allowing a program-record 3.86 yards per rush. The Panthers' average of 136.6 rushing yards allowed per game was the second-best mark in school history, while boasting four of the program's top 11 single-game performances against the run.

A former graduate assistant on the Georgia State staff, Robertson returned to Atlanta in June 2019 after one season as the defensive line coach at Albany State. He helped the Rams to a 7-4 record, including the SIAC East title, in 2018.

Robertson originally served on Elliott's staff in 2017 as a graduate assistant working with the defensive line. The Panthers posted a 7-5 record, capped by the program's first bowl victory over Western Kentucky in the AutoNation Cure Bowl. The GSU defense set school records for fewest points allowed per game, fewest rushing yards allowed per game (136.4) and fewest yards per rushing attempt (4.13) as well as most sacks in a game (7) and season (24.0).

Robertson was an outstanding defensive lineman himself, lettering four years at South Carolina from 2007-11, where he earned Southeastern Conference All-Academic honors and served as team captain in 2011.

He was selected by the Atlanta Falcons in the seventh round of the 2012 NFL Draft and played for the Falcons as well as the Seattle Seahawks and Washington Redskins over four seasons.

Born Dec. 9, 1988, Robertson is a native of Laurinburg, N.C. He and his wife Kettiany, who ran track at South Carolina, have three sons: Travian Jr., Trenton and Tristan.

Lonnie Teasley is in his second season as the Gamecocks' offensive line coach. He assumed that role on a full-time basis on Jan. 6, 2023, replacing Greg Adkins as one of the Gamecocks' 10 on-field coaches.

In 2023, Teasley's unit was besieged by a rash of injuries, many of which were season ending. Teasley pieced together a unit that used a different starting combination in each of the first nine games. The Gamecocks started three left tackles, three left guards, two centers, two right guards and four right tackles during the season. Offensive guard Trovon Baugh was recognized on the Freshman All-SEC squad as selected by the league's coaches.

Teasley took over the on-field coaching duties with the Gamecocks' offensive line early in the 2022 season while Adkins was dealing with a minor health issue that limited his availability. Under his guidance, Jovaughn Gwyn earned second-team All-SEC honors from the league's coaches, was invited to the Reese's Senior Bowl and to the 2023 NFL Combine and was a seventh round draft selection by the Atlanta Falcons.

Teasley joined the South Carolina staff in 2021 as an offensive analyst after spending the previous two years as the offensive line coach at North Carolina Central University. Prior to that, he worked as the offensive line coach at Arkansas-Pine Bluff (2018) and Tennessee Tech (2017). He also has NFL experience, having worked for two seasons (2015-16) with the Baltimore Ravens, assisting the offensive line coach. He also served as an assistant offensive line coach at Temple for the 2014 campaign.

Teasley coached for three years in the MEAC as an assistant coach and graduate assistant at Delaware State, leading the linebackers (2013) and tight ends (2011-12). He began his coaching career at Brunswick (Ga.) High School as a defensive line coach for three seasons (2008-10).

Teasley played on the offensive line at Hofstra and Winston-Salem State, graduating from WSSU in 2008.

Born April 6, 1984, Teasley and his wife, Carma, have three daughters, Elizabeth, Ava and Olivia.

Clayton White, a four-time Frank Broyles Award nominee for the nation's top assistant coach (2017, 2019, 2020 and 2021) and a 21-year coaching veteran, returns for his fourth season in Columbia. He was named the defensive coordinator on Jan. 10, 2021 and also coaches the inside linebackers.

Over his three seasons in Columbia, White's defenses have forced 64 turnovers, the highest mark in the SEC during that stretch.

In 2023, the Gamecock defense surrendered 149.4 rushing yards per game, the fewest since 2017 and the second-fewest since 2012. Opponents rushed for just 3.88 yards per carry, the best mark since 2012. The Gamecocks posted the SEC's second-best redzone defense and forced 17 turnovers in 12 games. Linebacker Debo Williams was a first-team All-SEC selection, while Nickel Jalon Kilgore earned Freshman All-America accolades.

In 2022, the Gamecocks ranked 27th in the country in pass efficiency defense and 34th in passing defense, allowing 206.7 yards per game through the air. They forced 23 turnovers, ranking second in the SEC and 20th in the country. Fifteen picks ranked first in the league and 14th in the nation. The defense scored two touchdowns, both on interception returns in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl against Notre Dame. Safety Nick Emmanwori earned true freshman All-America honors and was named to the SEC All-Freshman team.

Three defensive players – Cam Smith, Zacch Pickens and Darius Rush – were selected in the 2023 NFL Draft.

In his first season in Columbia, the Carolina defense allowed 24.0 points per game, ranking 46th in the nation, with six of its 13 opponents scoring 17 points or less. That was following a 2020 season in which they allowed 36.0 points per game and ranked 105th in scoring defense. The Gamecocks forced 24 turnovers, ranking first in the SEC and tied for 14th in the country in turnovers gained. Fifteen interceptions tied for second in the SEC lead and for 14th in the country. Nine fumble recoveries tied for the SEC lead and for 25th in the nation. The defense scored four times – three pick-sixes and a scoop-and score, tying for the SEC lead and for seventh in the nation. Carolina surrendered 180.8 yards per game through the air, the fewest since 2011, ranking atop the SEC and seventh in the nation. Safety Jaylan Foster earned All-America honors.

White spent the prior four seasons as the defensive coordinator and cornerbacks coach at Western Kentucky University.

In 2020, the Hilltoppers ranked 28th in total defense, including eighth in the nation in passing defense, allowing just 177.3 yards per game through the air. WKU was third in the nation with 68 passes defended and the defense scored three touchdowns.

In 2019, WKU produced a top 25 overall defense. WKU allowed 20.1 total points per game, the lowest mark for the program since 2004 and ranked No. 22 in FBS. Defensive end DeAngelo Malone was voted 2019 CUSA Defensive Player of the Year after producing 99 total tackles – including 21 for loss – with 11.5 sacks and 16 quarterback hurries.

The Hilltoppers were one of the nation's stingiest inside the red zone in 2018. WKU allowed just a 103.41 passer rating with their backs against the wall, good for the sixth-best mark nationally. Even better, the Hilltoppers allowed opposing quarterbacks to complete passes at just a 32.7 percent clip, the best mark in the nation.

During White's first campaign as the defensive playcaller in 2017, the Hilltoppers enjoyed a historic stretch, holding opponents to their fewest point totals through the season's first seven games in 15 years and a record over that span in the FBS era.

The pass defense was also one of the nation's stingiest in allowing passing touchdowns, as opposing teams found the end zone just 11 times through the air, a mark which ranked No. 5 nationally. The Hilltoppers ranked No. 40 nationally in pass defense – an improvement of 79 spots from the previous season.

Prior to his arrival in Bowling Green, White spent four seasons as the co-Special Teams Coordinator/Safeties Coach at NC State (2013-16). The Wolfpack ranked in the top-30 in total defense in both 2015 and 2016. In 2015, NC State was one of only two schools in the FBS to finish in the Top 20 in both kickoff return and punt return. Defensive back Dontae Johnson was selected in the fourth round of the 2014 NFL Draft by the San Francisco 49ers.

White served as the Special Teams Coordinator/Running Backs Coach at UConn from 2011-12. While in Storrs, the Huskies tied for the national lead with three punt returns for touchdowns and led the Big East with a 12.5 punt return average, good for No. 18 nationally. Running back Lyle McCombs was named an FWAAs Freshman All-American after becoming just the second Husky to rush for more than 1,000 yards in his freshman campaign.

White spent one season in Bowling Green on Willie Taggart's first staff in 2010 and helped to build the WKU program during the FCS-to-FBS transition. He served as the Co-Special Teams Coordinator and Defensive Backs Coach.

White had a three-year run at Stanford (2007-09) where he coached the Cardinal defensive backs, including future NFL Pro Bowler Richard Sherman, and future NFL players Michael Thomas, Johnson Bademosi and Delano Howell. The Cardinal rose to No. 14 in the polls in 2009 and reached a bowl game for the first time since 2001 that year.

White's first coaching stop came as a defensive backs coach at Sanderson (N.C.) High in 2003. He also had stints at Western Carolina and Western Michigan.

White was a three-year letterman at linebacker at NC State (1997-2000), ending his career in the Wolfpack record book in several categories including career tackles for loss (33), single-season tackles for loss (16) and tackles in a single game (23). He had a three-year NFL career with the New York Giants (2001-02) and Tampa Bay (2003).

Originally from Dunn, N.C., and a 2001 graduate with a degree in sport management from NC State, White and his wife Kelly have two children, Chase and Macy.

Luke Day is in his fourth season at Carolina after being tabbed to lead Gamecock football's strength and conditioning program on Jan. 10, 2021.

Day, who has experience at both the collegiate and professional levels, came to Columbia after spending the 2020 season as the head strength & conditioning coach at Marshall University, his second stint with the Thundering Herd. Day worked on the staff at the University of Colorado in 2019.

Day initially joined the Herd as the head strength and conditioning coach in January of 2016, a position he held for three seasons. He was recommended by Scott Sinclair, Day's predecessor, who in three years transformed the Herd strength and conditioning philosophy during a run of three-straight seasons of 10 or more wins by Coach Doc Holliday's team. Day and Sinclair – who moved from MU to the strength and conditioning director's role at Georgia – previously worked together at UCF under veteran strength coach Ed Ellis.

Prior to his arrival in Huntington, Day spent one year as an assistant on the Cincinnati Bengals' strength and conditioning staff.

Day is a native of Hamilton, Ohio, where he was significantly involved with inner-city ministry for the Hamilton Dream Center. Prior to his year with the Bengals, he spent two years as an assistant in strength and conditioning at UCF, following stints at USF (2012) and Cincinnati (2011-12). He also served as a summer volunteer in strength and conditioning with the New Orleans Saints in 2010.

Day graduated from Hamilton High School in 2006 and went to Morehead State, where he played defensive line for two years. He transferred "back home" to Miami (Ohio) and started working as a strength room intern and graduated with a degree in physical education.

His first job was designing, developing and implementing a weight room and strength program at Mount Healthy High School in Cincinnati, and through that work he made connections to the University of Cincinnati, where he spent 14 months on the strength and conditioning staff.

Day and his wife, Trisha, have a son, Jay and a daughter, Norah.

Chip Morton is in his fourth season in Columbia after joining the Gamecock football strength & conditioning staff in 2021.

Morton coached in the National Football League for 27 seasons from 1992 to 2018, working as an assistant strength and conditioning coach for the San Diego Chargers (1992-94), as the head strength and conditioning coach for the Carolina Panthers (1995-98), as an assistant for the Baltimore Ravens (1999-2001), and again as the head strength and conditioning coach for the Washington Redskins (2002) and Cincinnati Bengals (2003-18).

During his NFL career his teams compiled a cumulative record of 228-201-3. In addition, Morton has coached two Super Bowl teams – the 1994 Chargers and the 2000 World Champion Ravens.

Prior to working in the NFL, Morton served as an assistant strength and conditioning coach for Ohio State (1985-86) and Penn State (1987-91).

Morton earned a bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina in 1985, and a master's degree from Ohio State in 1986. He and his wife, Stacey, have seven children, including Gamecock wide receiver Aaron.

Mitch Okey is in his fourth season with the Gamecocks. He came to Columbia after a one-year stint at Marshall. Prior to his arrival in Huntington, Okey worked on the Georgia football strength staff in a part-time role.

Okey spent two years (2016-17) at Georgia Southern. In 2016, he was in a G.A. role before serving as Interim Head Strength Coach for Football from July to December. In 2017, he was in an assistant role for football and served as the Head Strength Coach for women's tennis, track & field and cross-country.

Prior to that, he logged a year at UCF, working as an intern for four months before serving as an assistant strength coach for the remainder of his tenure.

Team

- South Carolina finished the 2023 season with a 5-7 record overall and a 3-5 mark in the SEC, good for a fourth-place tie with Kentucky and Florida in the SEC Eastern Division. The top three teams in the SEC East - Georgia, Missouri, and Tennessee - finished the season ranked fourth, eighth and 17th in the final Associated Press poll.
- South Carolina faced one of the toughest schedules in the nation in 2023, including four ranked opponents in the first seven games. Their opponents combined for a 95-59 record, a .617 winning percentage. Removing games involving FCS teams, South Carolina's opponents were 88-54, a .620 winning percentage, the 13th-best mark in the FBS. Nine of its 12 opponents posted a record of .500 or better. Eight of their opponents were bowl-eligible and one was in the FCS playoffs with only Vanderbilt winning fewer than five games.
- Three of the Gamecocks' seven losses came to teams that were ranked at the time of the game (No. 21 North Carolina, No. 1 Georgia, and No. 20 Missouri), while four of their losses came to teams that finished the season in the A.P. Top-25 (No. 4 Georgia, No. 8 Missouri, No. 17 Tennessee and No. 20 Clemson).
- In a scheduling quirk, South Carolina played its final road game of the regular season in the last week of October at Texas A&M. The Gamecocks' final four games were all scheduled for Williams-Brice Stadium during the month of November. South Carolina was the only school in the FBS to have each of its final four games of the 2023 regular season at home.
- South Carolina went 3-1 in the month of November and are now 8-4 in November under head coach Shane Beamer.
- The Gamecocks best win was a 17-14 decision against Kentucky on Nov. 18. It marked Carolina's second-straight win over their rivals from the Bluegrass State after the Wildcats had won seven of the previous eight contests.
- The Gamecocks defeated Vanderbilt for the 15th-straight time. The Commodores have recorded at least two wins over every SEC Eastern Division team since its last win over South Carolina in 2008. They have topped Kentucky six times (2008, 2011, 2012, 2013, 2015, 2022), Tennessee five times (2012, 2013, 2016, 2017, 2018), Missouri three times (2012, 2015, 2019), Florida twice (2013, 2022) and Georgia twice (2013, 2016) in that span.
- The Gamecocks used 40 different starters, 21 on offense and 19 on defense during the 2023 season.
- Carolina sold out five of its seven home games during the 2023 season and finished the year averaging 77,833 per game, 16th in the NCAA.
- Five Gamecocks were invited to the 2024 NFL Combine, held Feb. 26-March 4 at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. The quintet includes quarterback **Spencer Rattler**, wide receiver **Xavier Legette**, tight end **Trey Knox**, offensive lineman **Nick Gargiulo** and cornerback **Marcellas Dial**.

Offense

- Led by quarterback **Spencer Rattler**, the South Carolina offense ranked fourth in the SEC and 23rd in the country in passing offense, throwing for 278.0 yards per game. That was their best mark since throwing for 281.6 yards per game during the 2014 season.

• **Spencer Rattler** completed 275-of-389 passes for 3,186 with 19 touchdowns and eight interceptions. He ranked fifth in the SEC and 27th in the NCAA in total passing yards with the third-highest single-season total in school history. Rattler averaged 265.5 yards passing per game, third in the SEC and 22nd in the nation. He set the school's single-season record for completions (275) and completion percentage (68.9) while logging five 300-yard passing games, one shy of the school record.



- **Xavier Legette** was the most decorated player on the squad. He was a third-team All-American (Phil Steele and College Football Network) and was an All-SEC performer, earning second team honors from both the coaches and the Associated Press as a wide receiver and from the A.P. as an all-purpose back.
- **Xavier Legette** was named the Blanchard-Rogers Trophy winner, which is the "Heisman" award for the state of South Carolina and was a semifinalist for the Biletnikoff Award.
- **Xavier Legette** led the team with 71 receptions for 1,255 yards, and seven receiving touchdowns. He tied Bryan Edwards for the fifth-most receptions in a single season. His 71 receptions were more than the next two players on the squad combined (65). Legette's 1,255 receiving yards was the second-highest single-season mark in school history, and he became the fifth player in school history to eclipse the 1,000-yard receiving mark in a single season. He averaged 104.6 receiving yards per game (second in the SEC and eighth in the country), 17.7 yards per reception (fifth in the SEC) and 5.9 receptions per game (fourth in the SEC). He collected six 100-yard receiving games.

- **Spencer Rattler** and **Xavier Legette** were invited to the Senior Bowl all-star game following the season. Rattler was voted the best quarterback on the American Team by opposing defenders and capped the week by being selected as the Reese's Senior Bowl Most Valuable Player.
- **Trey Knox** earned second-team All-SEC accolades from the league's 14 coaches after catching 37 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns.
- **Mario Anderson** was the Gamecocks' top rusher. Anderson had just eight carries for 41 yards through the first three games but after a 26-carry, 88-yard effort against Mississippi State, moved into the starting lineup. He finished the season with 143 carries for 707 yards and three touchdowns on the ground.
- Due to a slew of injuries, the Gamecocks used a different combination of starters along the offensive line in each of the first nine games, the only team in the country to accomplish that feat.

Defense

The Gamecocks started three left tackles, three left guards, two centers, two right guards and four right tackles in 2023. Right guard **Trovon Baugh** earned a spot on the SEC's All-Freshman team.

- The South Carolina defense allowed opponents to rush for 149.4 yards per game. That was the best mark posted by a Carolina defense since the 2017 team logged a 141.1 average.
- The Gamecock defense forced 17 turnovers including seven fumble recoveries, second in the SEC. Over the past three years, South Carolina has forced more turnovers (64) than any other SEC school.
- Linebacker **Debo Williams** earned All-SEC honors, was a Phil Steele honorable mention All-American and was named the Joe Morrison MVP for the Defense. He recorded 113 tackles which ranked third in the SEC and was the most recorded by a Gamecock since Jonathan Martin recorded 122 in the 2002 season. Williams led the SEC and ranked 12th in the nation with 67 solo tackles. He was also second on the squad with 9.0 tackles for loss.
- True freshman **Jalon Kilgore** was named a first-team Freshman All-American by ESPN.com and 247Sports and was a third-team selection by College Football News. A member of the SEC All-Freshman team, Kilgore was recognized as one of 14 semifinalists for the Shaun Alexander Freshman of the Year Award. He was second on the team with 76 tackles and tied for 16th overall in the SEC and tied for sixth among all freshmen in the FBS with 6.33 tackles per game.



Special Teams

- The Gamecocks blocked four kicks in 2023 and have blocked 14 kicks over the past three years after logging eight blocks over the previous five years (2016-20) combined.
- Placekicker **Mitch Jeter** converted 12-of-14 field goal attempts with a long of 51 yards. He was a perfect 11-for-11 in field goal attempts inside 50 yards. Dating back to 2021, the Gamecocks have successfully converted 39 of their last 42 field goal attempts (92.9 pct.).
- Punter **Kai Kroeger**'s numbers dipped a bit from his All-America season of 2022, but the Gamecocks still ranked 24th in the country in net punting at 41.2-yards per punt, and 17th in the nation in opponents' punt returns, allowing just 3.7 yards per return.
- **Kai Kroeger** went 1-for-2 on the season passing for 32 yards. In his career, Kroeger is 7-for-8 passing for 205 yards and three touchdowns and a gaudy 426.5 career quarterback rating.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Heisman Trophy hopeful Drake Maye threw for 269 yards and two touchdowns, North Carolina's upstart defense had nine sacks and the 21st-ranked Tar Heels beat border rival South Carolina 31-17 on Saturday night in a neutral-site game.

British Brooks ran for 103 yards and Omarion Hampton added two short TD runs for the Tar Heels.

Maye, who grew up in the Charlotte suburb of Huntersville, led scoring drives on five of North Carolina's first six possessions, excluding a kneel down at the end of the first half.

The redshirt sophomore made NFL-type throws — back-shoulder fades, deep outs and sidearm tosses under pressure — while repeatedly keeping alive plays with this feet. He wasn't perfect, with two interceptions in the game's final 18 minutes as the Tar Heels were trying to put the game away.

But Maye didn't need to be perfect on this day.

The Tar Heels got an unexpected lift from Gene Chizik's defense, which struggled most of last season. The Tar Heels had just 17 sacks all of 2022 and surrendered 30.8 points and 436.5 yards per game.

North Carolina moved the ball at will in the first half.

Maye hit Kobe Paysour in stride with a 34-yard touchdown strike along the right sideline to give the Tar Heels a 17-14 lead just before at halftime. North Carolina could have scored more had it not been for two drive-killing drops by wide receiver Gavin Blackwell in South Carolina territory, including one on fourth down.

Blackwell was pressed into a bigger role with starting wideouts Devontez Walker (ineligible) and Nate McCollum (lower body injury).

The Gamecocks appeared to gain momentum when they pulled one out of the Sean Payton playbook and recovered an onside kick to start the second half. But UNC smothered the drive before it began, forcing the Gamecocks to turn the ball over on downs.

The Tar Heels capitalized with Blackwell redeeming himself with a sliding 37-yard catch at the South Carolina 1 to set up Hampton's second touchdown. Maye then connected on an 18-yard completion with tight end John Copenhaver, who made a one-handed grab in the end zone to put the Tar Heels up 31-14.

THE TAKEAWAY

North Carolina: It was expected that Maye would play well, but UNC's defensive pressure turned some heads with Amari Gainer recording two sacks and Cedric Gray and Beau Atkinson combining for three. The Tar Heels made quality stops at key times, particularly in the second half.

South Carolina: The offensive line is going to need some big time help if the Gamecocks are to make some noise in the SEC. They gave up nine sacks to a defense that wasn't very good season and didn't give QB Spencer Rattler enough of a chance to make plays. Rattler threw for 353 yards on 30-of-39 passing.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — South Carolina quarterback Spencer Ratter completed 25 of 27 passes for 345 yards and three touchdowns and ran for another TD to lead the Gamecocks to a 47-21 win over Furman on Saturday night.

Ratter, who returned to South Carolina (1-1) after an up-and-down 2022, is reminding people why he was a Heisman contender at Oklahoma before imploding, being benched and transferring.

Rattler hit long bombs, short slants and throws where he had to patiently find a third or fourth choice. He's averaging 348 yards passing in his past five games after throwing for just 198 yards a game in his first 10 outings for the Gamecocks.

Rattler said it's all about trust. He trusts his receivers to bail him out when his throws aren't just right and he trusts new offensive coordinator Dowell Loggains to give him the best chance to thrive.

"We put in the work this offseason. So we expected to have success on the field," Ratter said.

Perhaps most important, Ratter was not sacked Saturday a week after North Carolina sacked him nine times.

"He's a special talent. He's an elite talent. You saw that tonight," South Carolina coach Shane Beamer said.

There were still some concerns for South Carolina against the Football Championship Subdivision Paladins (1-1). The Gamecocks ran for just less than 3 yards a play behind an inexperienced and banged up offensive line. Both their two-point attempts failed.

Furman, ranked sixth in FCS, had a couple of long touchdown drives. Tyler Huff was 14-of-24 passing for 129 yards, while Joshua Harris caught six passes for 73 yards.

When South Carolina needed something, Rattler and Xavier Legette delivered. The game turned late in the second quarter when Furman punted with 23 seconds left and the Gamecocks up 20-14 after already scoring a TD once in the final minute.

Rattler only needed 20 seconds to drive the Gamecocks 75 yards to a touchdown, the big play a 53-yard strike to Legette, who caught six passes for 118 yards.

"What a drive by Spencer — awareness of the clock," Beamer said. "That was huge for us."

FABULOUS FRESHMAN

South Carolina's backups got some work too. Freshman LaNorris Sellers completed all four of his passes for 86 yards and two touchdowns for the Gamecocks, including a 50-yard pin-point TD to fellow freshman Tyshawn Russell.

Getting his highly-touted freshmen making big plays was almost as important to Beamer as Rattler's continued quality play, Beamer said.

Beamer said Norris was giddy with his play and his coach was too. "I thought he looked pretty dang good. He was awesome," Beamer said.

THE TAKEAWAY

Furman: The Paladins take \$500,000 back to Greenville. The Huff-to-Harris passing combination proved it can work even against the likely best team on Furman's schedule.

South Carolina: Just getting a win was critical for a South Carolina team who lost its opener to North Carolina and still has No. 1 Georgia and No. 9 Tennessee later in September with Mississippi State in between.

ATHENS, GA. (AP) — Carson Beck passed for 269 yards, Daijun Edwards, Dillon Bell and Cash Jones ran for second-half touchdowns, and No. 1 Georgia rallied from 11 points down to beat South Carolina 24-14 on Saturday.

The two-time reigning national champion Bulldogs won their 20th consecutive game in uncharacteristic fashion, trotting off to a smattering of boos from their home fans and facing their biggest halftime deficit in nearly three years.

But Georgia (3-0, 1-0 Southeastern Conference) played like a champ after the teams returned to the field on a soggy, gloomy day between the hedges.

The defense totally shut down Spencer Rattler and the Gamecocks (1-2, 0-1), who couldn't build on their 14-3 lead at the break. They managed just 129 yards over the final two quarters, with Rattler held to 6 of 24 passing for 104 yards with two interceptions. The Beck-led offense came out from the break nearly perfect, scoring touchdowns on three of its first four possessions — the only blip being a drive that ended with a missed field goal. Beck finished 27 of 35 passing.

Edwards, who missed the first two games with a lingering knee injury, rushed for 118 yards on 20 carries.

Georgia took the second-half kickoff and quickly drove 75 yards in six plays, scoring its first TD of the day on Edwards' 7-yard touchdown.

After South Carolina went three-and-out, the Bulldogs ripped off a 49-yard drive that ended with Bell, a receiver who has been getting extended time at running back, taking it in from the 3 to give Georgia its first lead of the game before the third quarter was halfway done.

Finally, Georgia finished off the Gamecocks when Cash sauntered in from 13 yards out with just over 9 minutes remaining.

The first half was a stunner, as Rattler carved up the Bulldogs by completing 16 of 18 for 152 yards, including a 17-yard touchdown to Antwane Wells Jr. on a third-and-16 screen.

It was the first time Georgia has trailed since last year's playoff semifinal victory over Ohio State in the Peach Bowl.

The Bulldogs answered with Peyton Woodring's 31-yard field goal, but the Gamecocks tacked on another TD with just a minute left in the half after Woodring missed a chip shot from 28 yards.

Rattler guided South Carolina on a five-play, 80-yard drive that was capped by Dakereon Joyner powering in from the 2 off a direct snap to push the margin to double-digits.

Rattler completed two passes for 53 yards and scrambled twice for 20 yards on the lightning-quick possession, which was helped along by a 15-yard facemask penalty on Georgia's Warren Brinson.

The final play of the half summed it up for the Bulldogs: Beck was sacked near midfield as the clock ran out with Georgia facing its largest halftime deficit since the Bulldogs trailed Florida 38-21 in the Cocktail Party rivalry on Nov. 7, 2020.

THE TAKEAWAY

South Carolina: The Gamecocks have shown a lot of promise under coach Shane Beamer, and their performance over the first two quarters against the nation's top-ranked team was certainly impressive. But the second-half meltdown demonstrated they're not quite ready for prime time in the SEC.

Georgia: The Bulldogs' running game got a big boost from the return of Edwards, who provided the sort of explosiveness they'd been missing. But Georgia appears to have a problem in its kicking game, which has traditionally been one of its strongest areas. Woodring is just 3 of 6 on the year, including two misses from inside of 30 yards. He also was wide right on a 43-yarder against the Gamecocks.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Spencer Rattler went 18-of-20 passing for 288 yards and three touchdowns to lead South Carolina to a 37-30 win over Mississippi State on Saturday night.

Rattler's favorite target, Xavier Legette, caught five passes for 189 yards, including touchdowns of 76 and 75 yards for the Gamecocks (2-2, 1-1 Southeastern Conference).

South Carolina didn't lean on Rattler entirely. "We knew the plays would be there. But we needed to get the run game going," coach Shane Beamer said.

And they ran the ball 47 times for 144 yards, a modest total, but nearly triple the 53 yards they averaged in the first three games.

But when South Carolina needed something, they turned to Rattler, the Oklahoma transfer who in his past seven games has finally shown why he was once one of the Sooners' most highly touted recruits.

Rattler has thrown just 33 incomplete passes in four games this season, and 20 of them came last week against No. 1 Georgia.

Rattler credits new offensive coordinator Dowell Loggians for his accuracy "The offense, the scheme we have. It's that simple," he said.

Rattler also ran eight times for 43 yards. Mario Anderson was the Gamecocks' leading rusher with 88 yards on 26 carries.

After three weeks of pounding the ball on the ground with inconsistent results, Mississippi State (2-2, 0-2) returned to the kind of Air Raid passing attack the Bulldogs used under coach Mike Leach, who died in December.

Will Rogers threw for a career best 487 yards on 30-of-48 passing with a touchdown and an interception. Lideatrick Griffin set a school record with 256 yards receiving on seven catches, including a 65-yard touchdown.

It was an encouraging outing after a 41-14 loss last week to LSU and Rogers said the Bulldogs can build on it.

"It starts with practice. You find out a lot about a person when things don't go right," Rogers said. "I practiced as hard as I ever practiced. Keep working on it."

But Rogers had an interception in the red zone and a fumble in a game where both defenses struggled to get stops. South Carolina had 99- and a 98-yard touchdown drives to open the game..

THE TAKEAWAY

Mississippi State: The loss put the Bulldogs in a hole in the SEC. They will need to find two SEC wins somewhere to continue their streak of 13 straight seasons going to a bowl. Maybe getting back to passing is the answer? Mississippi State gained 519 yards, by far their best against a Football Bowl Subdivision team this season.

South Carolina: The Gamecocks needed a win in a tough September and got it. With Clemson left on the non-conference schedule, South Carolina could need four SEC wins to get to a bowl. And if Rattler continues to play at this high of a level, that is well in reach.

Jaylen Wright ran for 123 yards and a touchdown for the Volunteers (4-1, 1-1 Southeastern Conference) in their first game against the Gamecocks (2-3, 1-2) since a meltdown last season that cost them a spot in the College Football Playoffs.

“This was a line of scrimmage game,” Tennessee coach Josh Heupel said. “We challenged (the players on offense and defense) all week. They had to own it.”

Vols defensive lineman James Pearce Jr. had two sacks.

“We had to play together and play relentless,” Pearce said. “(Heupel) was preaching all week that we’ve got to take over the game.”

South Carolina struggled on third down (2 of 14) and fourth down (2 of 5).

“When you (struggle on third and fourth down) you make it tough on yourself,” Gamecocks coach Shane Beamer said.

Kamal Hadden returned an interception 28 yards for a touchdown to give Tennessee a 24-10 lead at halftime.

“I trust Spencer in that situation,” Beamer said.

Rattler threw for 164 yards and Mario Anderson ran for 101 yards, with a 75-yarder for a score.

“We just didn’t find a rhythm all night,” Rattler said. “We’re 2-3, but it doesn’t feel like 2-3. It’s their Super Bowl. Congrats to them.”

Milton targeted slot receiver Squirrel White nine times and he caught all nine for 104 yards, including an amazing 50-yarder that set up a touchdown.

“I didn’t even see the ball,” White said about the pass that came with a defender draped in front of his face. “I felt the ball hit my hands and just held onto it.”

ODDS & ENDS

Tennessee’s Cooper Mays, generally regarded as one of the top centers in the SEC, saw his first action of the season. Midway through preseason camp, Mays underwent an unspecified medical procedure. At the time, he was expected to be ready for the start of the season. Five weeks later, he finally made his debut. ... A special guest of the Vols was former quarterback Hendon Hooker. Now a rookie with the Detroit Lions, Hooker was able to visit because the Lions played Thursday night. It was the South Carolina game last year when Hooker suffered a torn ACL, which derailed his Heisman Trophy campaign. ... Vols receiver Bru McCoy, a redshirt senior transfer from Southern California, was taken from the field on a stretcher after a right leg injury midway through the second quarter.

POLL IMPLICATIONS

Still smarting from a frustrating loss to Florida a couple weeks ago, Tennessee is slowly climbing its way back up the ladder. The victory over the Gamecocks added a bit more credibility than the conquest of UTSA, but the Vols’ next couple opponents — Texas A&M and Alabama — would be very impressive.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Graham Mertz threw for a career-best 423 yards and three touchdowns, the last a 21-yard throw to Ricky Pearsall with 47 seconds left, and Florida rallied from 10 points down in the fourth quarter to beat South Carolina 41-39 on Saturday.

The Gators (5-2, 3-1 Southeastern Conference) looked finished when Spencer Rattler connected for his fourth TD to Joshua Simon for a 37-27 lead with 9:11 to play.

But Mertz followed with a pair of 75-yard touchdown drives to pull off the comeback. He hit tight end Arlis Boardingham on a 4-yard scoring pass to cut the lead to 37-34 with 4:40 left.

The Gators forced a punt on South Carolina's next series and Mertz was off to the races once more. Pearsall caught a 26-yard pass on fourth-and-10, then Eugene Wilson III collected a pass that bounced off a teammate's hand to reach the Gamecocks' 16.

Mertz gave a shoulder fake on the game-winning throw and Pearsall was wide open for the catch.

Safety Miguel Mitchell picked off Rattler on South Carolina's final possession. The Gators took a safety with 4 seconds left for their second straight SEC win.

The comeback ruined a brilliant performance by South Carolina's Rattler, who passed for 313 yards and four touchdowns.

The Gamecocks (2-4, 1-3) have lost two straight and three of their last four.

The Gamecocks trailed 27-24 on the last of four Trey Smack field goals midway through the third quarter. Two series later, Rattler led the go-ahead drive that included his 27-yard run into Florida territory and a 20-yard scoring toss to Trey Knox for a 31-27 lead.

Rattler was at it again the next time he got the ball, finishing a 70-yard drive with a 33-yard scoring toss to tight end Joshua Simon.

The first half was a classic shootout with the teams trading long drives and big plays. The teams combined for 521 yards and 26 first downs in a half where neither defense could make a stop.

Florida scored on four of its five first-half possessions and Smack's fourth field goal, from 28 yards, sent the team into halftime ahead 24-21.

Rattler connected with four different receivers on his touchdowns, including a 20-yard toss to tailback Mario Anderson where the Division II transfer leaped over safety Miguel Mitchell to reach the end zone.

THE TAKEAWAY

Florida: The Gators pulled off the comeback behind Mertz, who came into the game second in the nation in pass completion percentage (80 percent). They shook off a lackluster first 20 minutes of the second half and got hot when it counted most.

South Carolina: During their bye week, the Gamecocks had hoped they could fix what went wrong in a 41-20 loss at Tennessee two weeks ago. It looked they had solved some problems before their pass rush got caught flat-footed at the end and let Mertz and the Gators pull off an unexpected rally.

COLUMBIA, MO. (AP) — Cody Schrader ran for 159 yards and two touchdowns and No. 20 Missouri sacked Spencer Rattler six times in a 34-12 victory over South Carolina on Saturday.

Missouri (7-1, 3-1 Southeastern Conference) has seven victories in its first eight games for the first time since 2013.

“It really doesn’t mean anything other than we’re focused on the task at hand,” Missouri coach Eli Drinkwitz said. “I think that’s really been why our team has been so effective is we haven’t looked ahead to anything. Everybody else is, we’re not.”

Brady Cook completed 14 of 24 passes for 198 yards and a touchdown and ran for another score, and Luther Burden III caught four passes for 90 yards and a TD.

Rattler completed 23 of 40 passes for 217 yards, and South Carolina kicker Mitch Jeter converted four of five field goals.

“We didn’t play well enough in the first half, didn’t coach well enough in the first half,” South Carolina coach Shane Beamer said. “But we had opportunities to make plays and we didn’t get that done. I’m proud of the way our guys came out for the second half.”

After South Carolina (2-5, 1-4) cut it to 24-12 with 10:31 left on Jeter’s field goal, Schrader sealed it with an 11-yard touchdown run with 2:46 to go.

“That’s something that we’ve definitely got to go back and correct and get that fixed,” Schrader said about closing out games. “I know this offense will because by our standards that’s not good enough. We need to continually just score and put teams away early when we have such a lead and our defensive is playing so well.”

Cook capped an 87-yard drive with a 17-yard rushing touchdown, and Harrison Mevis hit a 21-yard field goal in the second quarter to give Missouri a 24-0 lead. Jeter spoiled the shutout with a 51-yard field goal with 31 seconds left in the half.

Schrader had 10-yard touchdown run to give the Tigers a 14-0 lead with 46 seconds remaining in the first quarter.

Missouri took a 7-0 lead when Cook threaded a 42-yard touchdown pass to Burden through double coverage with 6:31 remaining in the first.

“That touchdown today, I was like, man, he really caught that,” Cook said. “He continues to impress me.”

THE TAKEAWAY

South Carolina: Needs to win four of its last five games to become bowl eligible, but it is not slated to face any opponents currently in the Top 25 after facing ranked foes in four of its first seven contests.

Missouri: The Tigers did not allow a touchdown for the first time since beating Vanderbilt 41-0 on Nov. 28, 2020.

TROPHY STAYING PUT

Missouri is keeping the Mayor’s Cup trophy given to the winner of the matchup between the two schools in cities named Columbia.

POLL IMPLICATIONS

Missouri is poised to rise at least a spot or two and will likely have its highest ranking since being ranked 14th at the 2014 season.

COLLEGE STATION, TEXAS (AP) — Max Johnson threw for 249 yards and a touchdown and Texas A&M snapped a two-game skid with a 30-17 win over South Carolina Saturday.

The game was tied late in the second quarter before the Aggies (5-3, 3-2 Southeastern Conference) scored two touchdowns in less than a minute to take a 21-7 lead into halftime.

The Gamecocks cut it to 21-10 on a 49-yard field goal early in the third quarter.

Spencer Rattler threw a 23-yard pass to Nyck Harbor on third-and-9 before a 29-yard run by Mario Anderson got South Carolina to the 2. Rattler then found Joshua Simon in the back of the end zone for a touchdown on the first play of the fourth quarter that cut the lead to 24-17.

But South Carolina (2-6, 1-5) couldn't get anything done on offense after that as the team lost a fourth straight game.

Texas A&M extended the lead to 27-17 on a 24-yard field goal with 11 minutes remaining.

South Carolina went for it on fourth-and-1 on the next drive and Rattler fumbled a low snap. He recovered it but was tackled for a loss of 2 on the play to give the Aggies the ball back.

They added a 52-yard field goal to extend the lead to 30-17 with about 7 ½ minutes to go.

Rattler entered the game averaging 277 yards passing a game but managed just 176 yards and a touchdown Saturday against Texas A&M's tough defense. The Aggies hurried and harassed Rattler all day, and he was called for three intentional grounding on consecutive drives in the second quarter while trying to escape the rush.

Ainias Smith had 118 yards receiving and a 42-yard touchdown reception for his second 100-yard game this season to help the Aggies to the win.

Dakeron Joyner took a direct snap and ran 1-yard for a touchdown that put South Carolina up 7-0 with about two minutes left in the first quarter.

The Aggies tied it when Rueben Owens got great blocking and ran 14 yards for a touchdown with nine minutes remaining in the second.

A 1-yard touchdown run by Amari Daniels put Texas A&M up 14-7 less than two minutes before halftime. Johnson kept that drive going with a sneak on fourth-and-1 before a 26-yard reception by Smith on third-and-5 set up the score.

Rattler had his third intentional grounding penalty of the quarter on South Carolina's next drive and was sacked on the next play to force a punt.

Texas A&M needed just one play to extend the lead as Smith evaded multiple defenders on his 42-yard catch-and-run TD that made it 21-7 with 52 seconds to go in the half.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Xavier Legette caught nine passes for 217 yards and two touchdowns to lead South Carolina to a 38-28 win Saturday over Jacksonville State.

Spencer Rattler was 27-of-38 passing for 399 yards but outside of the two best players on the field, the game didn't increase hopes for fans of South Carolina (3-6, 1-5 Southeastern Conference) that the team can win three more in a row and make a bowl.

Jacksonville State (7-3, 5-1 Conference USA) committed four turnovers and the biggest mistake — a pass that South Carolina's Stone Blanton stepped in front of and ran back 88 yards for a touchdown with 2:02 left — finally did in their hopes for a first win over a SEC school since beating Ole Miss in 2010.

A Ron Wiggins fumble early in the fourth quarter led to South Carolina breaking a 28-all tie and Logan Smothers lost a fumble on a snap with 53 seconds left in the second quarter. Two completions to Leggette later, South Carolina took a 21-14 lead into the locker room.

Jacksonville State's last hope ended with a O'Donnell Fortune interception with 1:42 left in the game.

South Carolina came into the game averaging 86.1 yards a game rushing, fifth-worse in the country. They gained 89 yards on 38 carries Saturday, 40 of that on Mario Anderson's first carry of the game.

The only rushing TD came when 6-foot-3, 285-pound defensive lineman Tonka Hemingway rumbled over right end with his first-ever carry for a 2-yard score.

The offense load fell mostly to Rattler and Legette, who came into Saturday averaging 94.5 yards a game, the 11th-best total in the country.

Jacksonville State is in its final season transitioning from FCS to FBS and can play in a bowl game if not enough teams get the six wins needed to fill 82 spots. They failed to eliminate South Carolina from contention Saturday.

THE TAKEAWAY

Jacksonville State: It had plenty of chances to pick up a program defining win, but the mistakes were killers. Jacksonville State ran for 225 yards, the 27th straight game the team has gained over 100 yards.

South Carolina: A win is a win, especially when about to teeter out of bowl eligibility, but the lack of a running game, and the insistence to keep trying even when it fails, raises questions. South Carolina threw the ball 39 times for 399 yards and ran it 38 times for 89 yards on Saturday.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Spencer Rattler threw 351 yards and three touchdowns as South Carolina won its 15th straight over Vanderbilt, 47-6, on Saturday.

The Gamecocks (4-6, 2-5 Southeastern Conference) took control early to open a 27-0 lead and break a four-game SEC losing streak.

Rattler, who also ran for a score, finished 28 of 36 and was looking for the end zone with the game well in hand as he connected with O'Mega Blake on a 26-yard TD with less than six minutes left to put South Carolina up 40-6.

It was another disheartening performance for Vanderbilt (2-9, 0-7), which must go to No. 14 Tennessee — the Vols won that matchup 56-0 a year ago — to avoid a second winless SEC season in coach Clark Lea's three years.

Rattler and the Gamecocks came out firing despite the rainy, cold air and consistently found his favorite target this season in Xavier Legette.

Legette's 39-yard catch to the Vanderbilt 1 bailed out a scrambling Rattler and defensive tackle Alex Huntley caught the TD pass a play later.

Rattler hit all seven of his passes on the next drive, which he ended with a 1-yard TD run.

Mario Anderson had a 72-yard touchdown burst after escaping a wall of Vanderbilt defenders to put South Carolina ahead 27-0 in the third quarter. Anderson finished with 102 yards rushing.

Gamecocks freshman Keenan Nelson Jr. blocked a Matthew Hayball punt and ran it back 18 yards for a touchdown.

Legette, who had nine catches for 120 yards, became the fifth South Carolina receiver ever to surpass 1,000 yards in a season with 1,093. It was his fourth game with over 100 yards in pass catches this season.

The biggest drama after halftime was whether South Carolina would post its first shutout over an SEC team since 2006. But Ken Seals' 19-yard scoring pass to Quincy Skinner Jr. to start the fourth quarter took care of that.

THE TAKEAWAY

Vanderbilt: The Commodores showed early on they wouldn't have enough offensively to make a dent in South Carolina's defense on a soggy, dank afternoon. Vanderbilt's best starting position came at the SC 35 after an interception. But it managed only 2 yards the next four plays to give the ball back to the Gamecocks.

South Carolina: It was the second-straight win for South Carolina in the month of November and, with four wins and two games remaining, the Gamecocks still have a chance to get bowl-eligible. They host Kentucky and Clemson in their final two games of the season to send coach Shane Beamer to a bowl game for the third time in as many seasons.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Spencer Rattler completed 19 of 27 passes for 207 yards and two touchdowns and Xavier Legette caught nine of those passes for 94 yards as South Carolina beat Kentucky 17-14 on Saturday night.

When the Gamecocks (5-6, 3-5 Southeastern Conference) needed something after six straight drives that went nowhere, the senior quarterback found the senior receiver on 3rd-and-15 deep in their territory early in the fourth quarter to keep alive what turned out to be the winning drive.

“That was huge, just to get us going,” South Carolina coach Shane Beamer said. “We hit a big play. Spencer to Xay.”

The Gamecocks started November in a big hole, but three straight wins have left them on the cusp of a bowl bid if they can beat bitter rival Clemson next week.

“Right now it’s like the playoffs,” said South Carolina defensive back Nick Emmanwori who had an end zone interception. “We have to win or stay home.”

The Wildcats (6-5, 3-5) have lost five of six since starting the season 5-0.

“It’s not a good recipe to win on the road with critical penalties and turnovers,” said Kentucky coach Mark Stoops, whose team turned the ball over three times and had seven penalties for 52 yards.

South Carolina took a 10-0 lead, but went stagnant, gaining just 25 yards on its next six drives.

Then came the Rattler-to-Legette completion for their first third-down conversion in over two quarters. Seven plays later, Rattler found Legette again for a 17-yard TD that gave South Carolina a 17-14 lead.

Ray Davis, the SEC’s second leading rusher, ran 12 times for 61 yards for Kentucky. Devin Leary was 17-of-34 passing for 171 yards with a touchdown.

The turnovers by the Wildcats included Emmanwori’s interception and a strip by Jordan Strachan of Leary that Tonka Hemingway grabbed at midfield with 1:59 left.

“That’s a very difficult loss for us right there. We didn’t do a better job of putting them in position to be successful,” Stoops said.

Down to just two running backs, South Carolina rushed for just 50 yards. Rattler was the team’s second leading rusher.

“We kept playing the field position game and punting and our defense kept making stops, which was huge,” Beamer said.

THE TAKEAWAY

Kentucky: Remember when the Wildcats were 5-0 and heading for a SEC East leading showdown with No. 1 Georgia? It’s been all downhill since that 51-13 loss to the Bulldogs. Kentucky can dash their in-state rival Louisville’s slim playoff hopes next weekend.

South Carolina: The Gamecocks often maligned defense held Kentucky to 296 yards, but even more importantly forced three turnovers and held Kentucky to its fewest points this season outside of Georgia. It’s been a slog at times, but what Beamer has called “a November to remember” and a bowl bid is within reach if they can knock off Clemson. That seemed like a tall task after losing 30-17 to Texas A&M on Oct. 28 to fall to 2-6.

COLUMBIA, S.C. (AP) — Clemson finished off a four-game November sweep with a satisfying 16-7 win over rival South Carolina on Saturday night, rallying after a 4-4 start that spoiled the preseason ACC favorites plans to add another title this season.

“Really proud of my players,” Swinney said. “Great, great response by all these guys.”

On Saturday night, it was freshman defensive back Khalil Barnes who scored the team’s only touchdown, kicker Jonathan Weitz who made the three longest field goals of his career, and a defense that held Gamecocks quarterback Spencer Rattler to a season-low 112 yards passing.

“Our defense is as good as there is out there,” Swinney said.

Especially against the Gamecocks who punted eight straight times after their lone touchdown in the first quarter.

“We knew we had to stay strong,” said Barnes, who also had an interception.

Barnes jumped on a backwards pass thrown by Rattler that bounced off Xavier Legette’s hands. The freshman scooped it up and went 42 yards for the touchdown 35 seconds into the game.

Weitz, called back to Clemson by Swinney in September, had his best game since the return, hitting from 50, 49 and 42 yards — all longer than his career-best of 41 coming in.

“To do this here, yeah, it’s special,” said Weitz, a backup behind B.T. Potter the past few years who put a financial career on hold for another opportunity at football.

When the game ended, the team rushed to a corner of the stadium to celebrate in front of the school band, family and supporters.

Following South Carolina’s only TD, a 1-yard run by Luke Doty in the first quarter, it punted its next eight drives.

The Gamecocks saw their last chance ended when Rattler’s pass to Doty on fourth down came up short with 3:19 to play. Rattler finished 16-of-32 passing.

Weitz has had his up-and-down moments this year, including missing a 30-yarder late in a tie game with No. 5 Florida State that the Tigers eventually lost in overtime.

But he came up huge in this one, connecting on the 50-yard kick to put Clemson up for good, 10-7 before adding the others.

THE TAKEAWAY

Clemson: This wasn’t anything to brag about, but winning the rivalry game is always a satisfying way to end a regular season. The preseason favorites to win the ACC closed the year with four straight victories and can use this finish to springboard into next season.

South Carolina: The Gamecocks have a long and anxious wait to see if they’ll play again. The extra practice time is essential for coach Shane Beamer to keep this team moving forward after going from eight wins in 2022 to just five this season. “The hardest part about not getting that sixth win is not being able to spend the next month with them,” Beamer said.

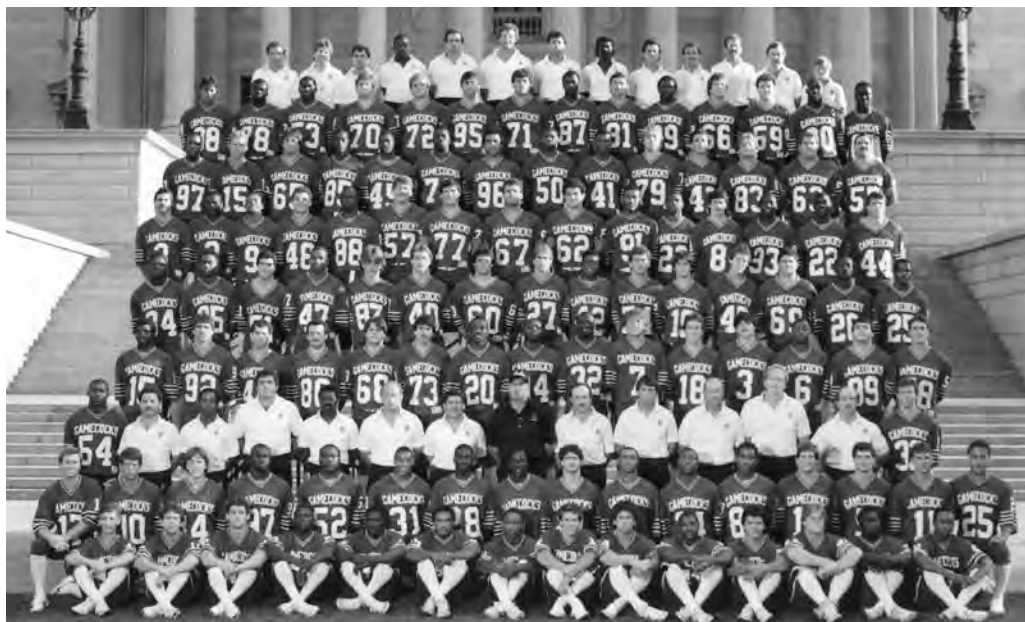

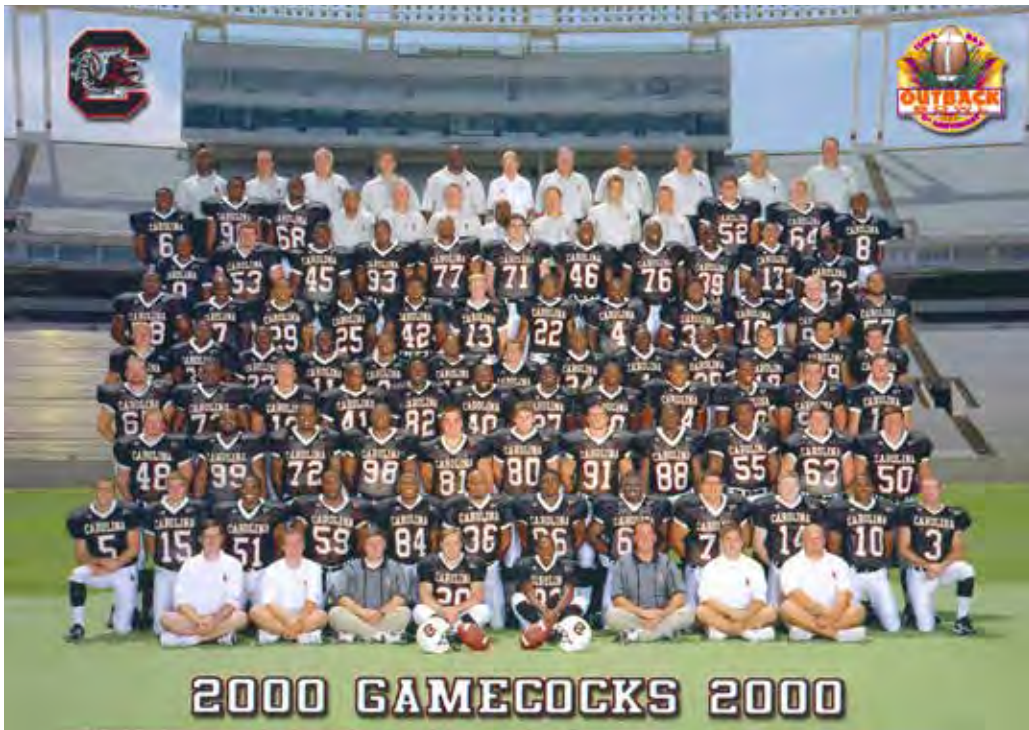

Since 1962, South Carolina has recorded 21 victories when trailing by 12 or more points, including a school-record 24-point, fourth quarter comeback against North Carolina on Sept. 28, 1968. The 2021 Gamecocks, under the direction of head coach Shane Beamer, was the first squad to have multiple wins after trailing by 13 or more points, as that team rallied from 14 points deficits against both East Carolina and Auburn to pull out victories. George Rogers
1980 Heisman Trophy Winner



All-America running back George Rogers won the 1980 Heisman Trophy following his senior season at South Carolina, as he was recognized as the nation's top collegiate football player. The Duluth, Ga., native was a consensus first-team All-America selection that year after leading the nation in rushing with 1,894 yards. Rogers went on to become the first player chosen in the 1981 NFL draft and starred for the New Orleans Saints before moving on to the Washington Redskins, where he helped lead his team to a Super Bowl Championship in 1988. Rogers was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1997.

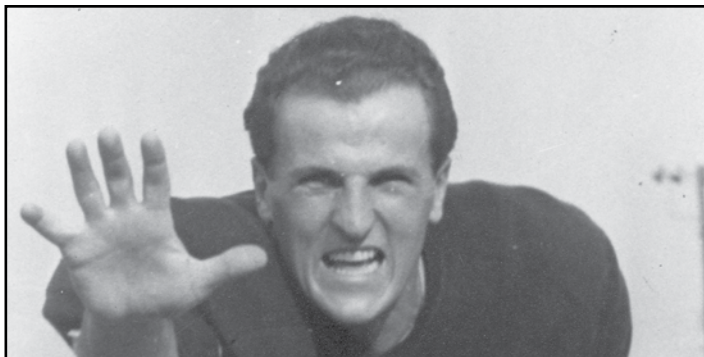
Sterling SHARPE 2

Sterling Sharpe concluded his career as the school's all-time leading receiver with 169 catches for 2,497 yards and 17 touchdowns. Sharpe had his jersey retired following the 1987 regular season. He became only the second Gamecock to have his jersey retired while he was still active at the school. Sharpe was a first-round draft pick by the Green Bay Packers in 1988. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 2014.



Steve WADIK 37

Running back Steve Wadiak, who wore No. 37 for Carolina from 1948-51, was the first to have his number retired, after a tragic automobile accident claimed his life. Wadiak, who still appears throughout the Carolina record book, was the school's all-time rushing leader for 28 years after his senior season. Wadiak rushed for 2,878 yards in his career. He led the team in scoring and rushing all four years he played. His number was retired in 1951.



George ROGERS 38

Considered the greatest player in school history, 1980 Heisman Trophy winner George Rogers had his No. 38 jersey retired during halftime ceremonies at Carolina's final 1980 home game. Rogers was the first South Carolina player to have his jersey retired while still active at the school. Rogers was the first player chosen in the 1981 NFL Draft by the New Orleans Saints. He was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1997.



Mike JOHNSON 56

Mike Johnson, a 6-4, 226-pound offensive center from Church Hill, Tenn., became gravely ill around Christmas time prior to the start of his junior season and the illness cut short a potentially great football career. While just a sophomore, Johnson served as the Gamecocks' starting center over the final half of the 1964 campaign. His number 56 was retired following his death in 1965.

Jadeveon Clowney, a two-time first-team All-American and All-SEC selection and the 2012 SEC Defensive Player of the Year, had his jersey retired in ceremonies at halftime of the Georgia State game on Sept. 3, 2022.

The Rock Hill, SC, native came to South Carolina as the nation's top high school recruit in 2011 from South Pointe (S.C.) High School and immediately made an impact for the Gamecocks.

As a true freshman in 2011, he was named SEC Freshman of the Year and second-team All-SEC. He was named to multiple Freshman All-America teams after being credited with 36 total tackles, 12 for losses, including eight sacks and five forced fumbles.

His sophomore season in 2012 was his greatest year as a Gamecock. He tallied 54 total tackles, a school single-season record 23.5 for losses, including a school-record 13 sacks and three forced fumbles. Clowney became South Carolina's second unanimous All-American in school history and first since George Rogers in 1980. He was the recipient of the Ted Hendricks Award as the nation's top defensive end. Additionally, he was a finalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award, the Bronko Nagurski Trophy, the Lombardi Award, and finished sixth overall in the 2012 Heisman Trophy voting. In addition, he was voted by the fans as the 2012 AT&T All-America Player of the Year.

Clowney's tackle, forced fumble and fumble recovery against Michigan in the 2013 Outback Bowl is regarded as one of the most iconic moments in college football history.

In his junior and final campaign as a Gamecock, Clowney registered 39 total tackles, 11.5 for losses, including three sacks and a forced fumble on his way to a second-straight first-team All-American season.

The Gamecocks were a combined 33-6 overall and 18-6 in SEC play during his three seasons wearing the Garnet and Black. Carolina finished each of the three seasons with bowl victories – 2011 vs. Nebraska in the Capital One Bowl, 2012 vs. Michigan in the Outback Bowl and 2013 vs. Wisconsin in the Capital One Bowl. Carolina finished in the Top 10 in each of his three seasons and was ranked in the AP Top 25 every week of Clowney's career.

He was the first selection of the 2014 NFL Draft by the Houston Texans.



Alshon JEFFERY 1

All-America and All-SEC wide receiver Alshon Jeffery had his jersey retired at halftime of South Carolina's Sept. 23, 2023 game against Mississippi State.

The St. Matthews, S.C. native finished his three-year career with 183 catches for 3,042 yards and 23 touchdowns. In the Gamecock career record books he ranks third in receptions, second in receiving yards, tied for first in receiving touchdowns, first in 100-yard receiving games (12), sixth in yards per reception (16.6) and third in consecutive games with a reception (36).

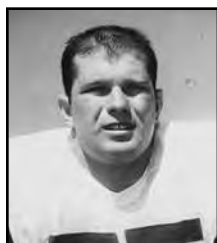
In 2009, he was named consensus Freshman All-SEC and a first-team Freshman All-American. He had a team-high 46 catches for 763 yards and six touchdowns during his first year at Carolina. Against Kentucky in his freshman season, he had seven catches for 138 yards and three touchdowns and was named SEC Freshman of the Week. He followed that up later in the season with eight catches for a season-best 161 yards and a score against Vanderbilt, and five catches for 116 yards and a touchdown against Arkansas.

Jeffery's best statistical season for the Gamecocks was his sophomore campaign in 2010. He led the SEC with 88 catches for 1,517 yards and nine touchdowns enroute to earning All-America and unanimous All-SEC honors and helping the Gamecocks to their first SEC Eastern Division title. He was a finalist for the Biletnikoff Award, given to the nation's top wide receiver. Against Auburn, during the regular season, Jeffery had eight catches for career-high 192 yards and two touchdowns. At the time, it was the fourth-highest receiving yardage game in school history and remains sixth on the all-time list. He earned the Ernest Brooks Offensive MVP Award with five catches for 141 yards in a win over Clemson and had nine catches for 130 yards against Florida State in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Prior to his junior season, ESPN ranked Jeffery as the best player in the SEC. He had 49 catches for 762 yards and eight touchdowns in his junior campaign. He was the Capital One Bowl MVP, catching four passes for 148 yards and had a 51-yard TD catch at the end of the first half to give Carolina a halftime lead that helped propel the Gamecocks to a win over Nebraska.

Jeffery was selected in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft by the Chicago Bears.

National Coach of the Year

Joe Morrison - 1984



Head coach at South Carolina from 1983-88... died of a heart attack Feb. 5, 1989... compiled a 39-28-2 record during his six seasons in Columbia... led Carolina to three bowl games... his 1984 squad posted a then school-best 10-2 record and was ranked as high as No. 2 in the nation after winning its first nine games, earning him National Coach of the Year honors by the Walter Camp Foundation... also named All-South Independent Coach of the Year in 1987 by the Associated Press... was head coach at UT-Chattanooga and New Mexico before coming to Columbia prior to the 1983 season... his 16-year head coaching mark was 101-72-7... enjoyed an outstanding 14-year career (1959-72) with the NFL's New York Giants... nickname in the pros was "Old Dependable" and his all-purpose play enabled him to play eight positions during his career... a seven-time team captain, the Giants retired his #40 jersey in 1972... outstanding collegiate player at Cincinnati, where he received his degree in 1959... a native of Lima, Ohio.

Lou Holtz - 2000



South Carolina head coach from 1999-2004... named National Coach of the Year in 2000 by *Football News* and *American Football Coaches Quarterly*... led Carolina to its second bowl victory, defeating Ohio State 24-7 at the 2001 Outback Bowl... named SEC Coach of the Year... named Region Coach of the Year by the AFCA... led Gamecocks to the biggest regular-season turnaround in SEC history and the fourth-best regular season turnaround in NCAA history... became the first coach ever to lead six different programs to bowl games... became the only coach to guide four programs to final top-20 rankings... led South Carolina to back-to-back bowl victories and consecutive top-20 national rankings, both firsts in school history... led Notre Dame to the 1988 national title... also was head coach at Minnesota, Arkansas, NC State and William & Mary... a native of East Liverpool, Ohio.

JOHN ABRAHAM (2021) Football • 1996-99

After playing just one year of high school football, became a disruptive force on defense... logged 23.5 sacks during his Gamecock career, while leading the team in sacks in all four seasons... earned second-team all-SEC honors in 1999... a first-round selection in the 2000 NFL Draft, went on to play 15 seasons in the NFL, earning first-team All-Pro three times and appearing in five Pro Bowls.

CHUCK ALLEN (2017) Football • 1977-80 Board of Trustees • 2008-Current

Outstanding defensive tackle who helped lead Carolina to the 1979 Hall of Fame Bowl and the 1980 Gator Bowl... served as a team captain in 1980... has been a tireless supporter of Gamecock Athletics and the University since that time, most notably as a member of the Board of Trustees since 2008.

BRANDON BENNETT (2004) Football • 1991-94

USC's second-leading career rusher with 3,005 yards... holds the single game rushing mark of 278 yards in 1991... finished his career with the most pass receptions (111) for a USC running back.

CLYDE "MULE" BENNETT (2003) Football • 1951-53

Played both offense and defense as a two-way end at USC ... earned All-Atlantic Coast Conference honors and third-team A.P. All-America honors in 1953 as a top pass receiver ... played one season for the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League before beginning a career in the U.S. Air Force ... was a retired USAF colonel before passing away in 2021 at the age of 89.

JAKE BODKIN (2013) Football • 1958-60

Offensive lineman who was voted first-team All-ACC in 1960 after earning second-team honors in 1959... won the Jacobs Blocking Trophy for the Palmetto state in 1960... drafted by Buffalo.

ED BOINEAU (1970) Football • 1928-30

Three-year football letterman... nickname was "Bru"... helped the Gamecocks to three consecutive winning

campaigns and a three-year total 18-11-2 mark.

ROBERT BROOKS (2003) Football • 1988-91

Logged 156 career catches for 2,211 yards... was a Freshman All-America selection by The Sporting News in 1988... finished his career with a school record 19 touchdown receptions... played seven seasons for the Green Bay Packers (1992-98) and was part of Super Bowl XXXI championship team... credited with start of the "Lambeau Leap."

SHELDON BROWN (2015) Football • 1998-2001

Earned first-team All-America honors in 2000 and was a third-team All-America honoree in 2001... was an All-SEC selection in 2000 and 2001 and was a member of the back-to-back Outback Bowl teams... a second round selection in the 2002 NFL Draft who had an 11-year pro career with the Eagles and Browns.

BOBBY BRYANT (1979) Football • 1964-66 Baseball • 1965-67

Named a first-team All-America as a defensive back in 1966 by the New York Daily News and by the Detroit Sports Extra... All-Atlantic Coast Conference in 1966... won the Anthony J. McKelvin Award in 1967 as the outstanding athlete in the ACC... holds the school

record for the longest punt return (98 yards vs. N.C. State, 1966)... lettered in football in 1964-66 and in baseball in 1965-67... played in the 1967 Hula Bowl... played for the NFL Minnesota Vikings from 1968-81... drafted by the New York Yankees and the Boston Red Sox in baseball... the first pitcher at USC to strike out 100 batters in a season.

JIM CARLEN (2016) Football Coach/AD • 1975-81

Carolina's second-winningest coach with a 45-36-1 record at the end of his tenure... led team to three bowl games... Gamecocks had played in two bowl games prior to his arrival... teams pulled off some of its most impressive victories... 1980 team won at Michigan, 17-14, over a team that would go 10-2 and win the Rose Bowl... In 1981, went to Chapel Hill and whipped previously undefeated and third-ranked North Carolina, 31-13... recruited George Rogers, the only Heisman Trophy winner in school history... also recruited three players who would become first round NFL draft picks (Rogers, Rick Sanford and Willie Scott)... no University of South Carolina player had been drafted in the first round prior to his arrival.

EARL CLARY (1967) Football • 1931-33

The "Gaffney Ghost" lettered three times and was named All-Southern in



1933 as a running back... Gamecocks compiled a 16-11-4 mark during his career, including a 3-0 mark vs. Clemson.

LARRY CRAIG (1976)
Football • 1935-38

Named All-Southern Conference as an end... lettered all four years... played professionally for the NFL Green Bay Packers (1939-49).

LEON CUNNINGHAM (1980)
Football • 1951-54

Selected as an All-America center in 1953 by *True* magazine... also named a third-team All-America by the Associated Press and by the National Editorial Alliance in 1954... tabbed an All-Southern Conference linebacker in 1952... named All-ACC in 1953 and 1954 as a center... lettered all four seasons... played professionally with Detroit in 1955.

BILL CURRIER (2017)
Football • 1974-76

Defensive back who was named the defensive captain and garnered Steve Wadiak MVP honors in 1976... earned All-South Independent honors, and represented Carolina in the 1976 Blue-Gray post-season All-Star Game... drafted by Houston in 1977 and spent nine seasons in the NFL with the Oilers, Patriots, and New York Giants... was the Giants' defensive captain for the final five years of his NFL career... has been inducted into the state of South Carolina Hall of Fame and the state of Maryland Hall of Fame.

BO DAVIES (2016)
Football • 1969-71

Held the school record with 14 career interceptions upon his induction in 2016... helped Paul Dietzel's team to the 1969 ACC championship... played for Paul "Bear" Bryant in the Coaches All-America game... selected by the Saints in the fifth round of the 1972 NFL Draft.

ZOLA DAVIS (2014)
Football • 1995-98

Caught 164 passes for 2,354 yards... scored 17 touchdowns... best game was a 14-catch, 206-yard effort vs. Vanderbilt... ranks fourth in the Gamecock record book for career receptions and yards gained... had over 100 yards receiving in a game eight times.

DAVE DECAMILLA (2013)
Football • 1968-70

Anchored the offensive line from 1968-70... named first-team All-ACC in both 1969 and 1970 and was a member of the 1969 ACC Championship squad.

SAM DELUCA (2005)
Football • 1954-56

A third-team AP All-American and on the 33-man Paul Williamson All-America team as a senior tackle... won the Jacobs Blocking Trophy... played for San Diego in the AFL and the New York Jets... a member of the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame.

THOMAS DENDY (2012)
Football • 1982-85

Rushed for 2,767 yards, the fifth-best mark in school history... averaged 5.6 yards per carry, second on the all-time list, on 494 rushing attempts... scored 18 rushing touchdowns and had four runs of 57 yards or longer during his career.

PAUL DIETZEL (2012)
Football/AD • 1966-74

Credited with changing the culture of South Carolina Athletics in the late 1960s and early '70s... initiated an upgrade plan for all athletic facilities, including "The Roost" athletic dorm and enlarging the football stadium... wrote the Carolina Fight Song which is still used today... mandated the recruitment of black athletes in all sports at Carolina and signed the first black athlete to a football scholarship in 1970... coached the football team to its only conference championship in 1969 by going undefeated in the ACC... posted a 5-0 record against the rival Tar Heels in the "Battle of the Carolinas"... hired Bobby Richardson, vaulting Carolina into national baseball prominence.

KING DIXON (1991)
Football • 1956-58
Athletics Director • 1988-92

Outstanding halfback who was a tri-captain in 1958... co-captain of the South team in the North-South Shrine Game... graduated cum laude in 1959 with a B.A. in political science... Phi Beta Kappa honor society member... after graduation he built a distinguished 22-year career in the Marines, retiring with rank of lieutenant colonel... earned many military decorations, including the Bronze Star, the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat V for Heroic Services and the Vietnamese Cross of Gallantry with Silver Star... Carolina's athletics director from 1988-92.

EARL DUNHAM (1997)
Football • 1941-42, 1946
Basketball • 1941-43, 1947
Baseball • 1941-43, 1947

Letterman in three different sports... is the only player in school history to be named captain of the football, basketball and baseball teams in a single year... collegiate career was interrupted by World War II... had a 42-month stint as a paratrooper... earned honorable mention All-America honors on the gridiron upon his return.

MIKE DURRAH (2021)
Football • 1980-83

Lettered at linebacker for the Gamecocks from 1980-83, recording 396 tackles, which still ranks third on the school's all-time list... was recognized on the All-South Independent team following his senior season after recording a school record 179 tackles.

ERNEST DYE (2023)
Football • 1991-92

Played two years at South Carolina after transferring from JUCO... an offensive lineman, he earned first-team

All-SEC recognition in his senior season, becoming the first Gamecock to garner first-team All-SEC honors... drafted by the Phoenix Cardinals with the 18th pick in the first round of the 1993 NFL Draft... played from 1993 to 1998 for the Cardinals before his career came to an end in 1999 after he was seriously injured in an automobile accident.

BRAD EDWARDS (2003)
Football • 1984-87

Named second-team All-America by UPI and a third-team selection by the AP in 1987... returned interceptions for touchdown against Clemson in both 1986 and 1987... went on to a 10-year NFL career, playing for the Vikings, Redskins, Falcons and Packers... was part of Redskins Super Bowl XXVI championship team.

TODD ELLIS (2005)
Football • 1986-89

Finished his career as the all-time leading passer and winningest quarterback in Gamecock history... re-wrote the school's passing records during his career where he set more than 20 school passing marks while throwing for 9,953 yards... led USC to the 1987 Gator and 1988 Liberty Bowls... the 1987 squad finished No. 15 in the final national polls... team MVP three times... a graduate of USC Law School.

REX ENRIGHT (1968)
Football/AD • 1938-60

Head football coach from 1938-42 (record: 17-27-4) and from 1946-55 (record: 47-42-3)... career mark was 64-69-7... was athletic director from 1938-60... the South Carolina athletic department office building was named in his honor.

RASHAD FAISON (2019)
Football • 1991-02

Named a Freshman All-American in 1999, Faison is the Carolina school record holder with 247 unassisted career tackles... a defensive back who is seventh in total tackles with 349, 10th in tackles for loss with 27.5, and ranks fourth in school history with 25 career passes broken up.

J.D. FULLER (2011)
Football • 1979-83

Standout linebacker who finished his career and remains the school's all-time leader in career tackles with 405... one of only two players in South Carolina history to record more than 400 tackles in his career ... credited with over 100 tackles in three consecutive seasons (143 in 1981, 131 in 1982 and 121 in 1983).

DOMINIC FUSCI (1993)
Football • 1942-43, 46

Three-year letterman... two-way lineman... led USC to two winning campaigns... also a member of the State of South Carolina Hall of Fame... chosen to the first half-century all-time team during the centennial celebration of Gamecock football in 1992... nickname was "Dynamite."

BILLY GAMBRELL (1991)
Football • 1960-62
Track & Field • 1961

Won the ACC indoor long jump championship in 1961 where he jumped better than 23 feet... racked up over 2,300 yards on the gridiron during his career... played seven seasons of pro football in the NFL with the St. Louis Cardinals and Detroit Lions... also played briefly in the Canadian Football League.

JOHNNY GRAMLING (2000)
Football • 1951-53
Baseball • 1952-53

South Carolina's first passer to surpass 2,000 career yards... passed for 2,007 yards and 18 touchdowns, both career records at the time... career high single game was 227 yards against Wake Forest in 1953... threw four touchdown passes in first half against Furman in 1952... played professionally with Ottawa Roughriders of Canadian Football League in 1954... professional career was cut short by military service in Korean War... lettered two seasons as a pitcher on the baseball team.

JEFF GRANTZ (1985)
Football 1973-75
Baseball 1973-76

Second-team All-America quarterback in 1975... amassed more than 5,000 yards of total offense in his career... ranks among the career leaders in virtually every passing category at South Carolina... led 1975 squad to 7-5 record and Tangerine Bowl berth... co-captain of the 1975 squad... one of the more popular players to ever wear the Garnet and Black... outstanding shortstop and second baseman on the diamond... holds school fielding record for shortstops and second basemen... played on three NCAA playoff clubs, including the 1975 team that advanced to the finals of the College World Series... drafted by the Miami Dolphins.

HAROLD GREEN (2002)
Football • 1986-89

Led the team in rushing for three consecutive years (1987-89)... ranks third all-time at USC in rushing yards with 3,005... rushed for 172 yards vs. Wake Forest on Nov. 11, 1987... played for the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals (1990-96), St. Louis Rams (1996-97) and Atlanta Falcons (1997-98)... a member of the All-South Independent team in 1987 and 1989... his 33 career TDs ties him with George Rogers for second in school history.

BOB GRESSETTE (2005)
Football • 1928-30

Named to an All-American team by an organization board that was headed by Notre Dame Coach Knute Rockne and Pop Warner... coached high school and junior college football.

TATUM GRESSETTE (1993)
Football • 1920-21
Baseball • 1922

Two-year letterman... his drop-kick field goal gave the Gamecocks a 3-0 win over Clemson in 1920... USC also shut



out the Tigers in 1921 while he served as captain... teams compiled a 10-5-2 mark during his career... lettered one season in baseball at first base and his brother Marion played centerfield.

JOE GRUGAN (2019)
Multi-Sport • 1937-41

Spent five different decades either playing, coaching or serving the University in an administrative role... was a star running back in football from 1937-41 for Rex Enright and was a star pitcher and outfielder in baseball for coach "Catfish" Smith... following his military service during the war years, he returned to South Carolina to coach PE, which he did for 25 years... also restructured the USC intramural program, working as its director... served as the head baseball coach, tennis coach and golf coach, as well as assisting on the football and basketball staffs.

FRED HAMBRIGHT (1969)
Football • 1931-33

Won the South Carolina Blocking Trophy in 1931... lettered in football from 1931-33... Gamecocks notched a combined 16-11-4 mark on the gridiron... played pro football with the AAFC New York Yankees in 1937.

DICKIE HARRIS (1998)
Football • 1969-71

Named first-team All-America by the American Football Coaches Association... All-ACC... ranks as one of the top return specialists in school history... accumulated 162 returns (kickoff/punt/interception) for 2,767 yards and six touchdowns (17.1-yard average)... returned a punt 97 yards for a touchdown versus North Carolina in 1970 and had a pair of touchdown returns, one a kickoff return for 96 yards and the other an interception for 94 yards, against Georgia in 1970.

ALEX HAWKINS (1970)
Football • 1956-58

Named the Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Year in 1958... played halfback... Associated Press Third-Team All-America (1958)... played in the 1959 Senior Bowl... Gamecocks notched a 19-11 mark in his career... rushed for a career-high 129 yards vs. Furman... played pro ball with the NFL Baltimore Colts (1959-65, 1967) and Atlanta Falcons (1966).

LUTHER HILL (1968)
Football • 1911-15

First one sport, five-year letterman in South Carolina history... nickname was "Luke"... coached by John H. Neff and N.B. Edgerton... helped the Gamecocks to three winning campaigns and an overall record of 20-17-5.

JAY LYNN HODGIN (2012)
Football • 1972-74

Rushed for 2,478 yards, averaging 4.8 yards per carry during his three-year varsity career... scored 22 rushing touchdowns... returned a kickoff for a touchdown in the Houston Astrodome in 1973... scored three TDs against Clemson during his career.

MARCUS LATTIMORE (2019)
Football • 2010-12

Despite an abbreviated career due to injury, ranks sixth on the school's all-time rushing list with 2,677 yards, and owns the school record for both rushing touchdowns (38) and touchdowns scored (41)... best season came as a freshman in 2010 when he rushed for 1,197 yards while being a unanimous selection as a Freshman All-American... was a fourth-round pick by the San Francisco 49ers in the 2013 NFL Draft.

BILLY LAVAL (2016)
Football Coach • 1928-34
Baseball Coach • 1928-34
Basketball Coach • 1932-33

First football coach in Carolina history to produce seven-consecutive winning seasons, a feat only matched by Steve Spurrier... asked to coach the basketball team for the 1932-33 season and won the Southern Conference championship that season... title was Carolina's only basketball championship until Frank McGuire won the ACC in 1971... of the head baseball coaches at Carolina who have coached over 50 games, Laval holds the all-time top winning percentage, as his teams from 1928-1934 went 89-33-1 for a .728 mark.

JOHN LEHEUP (2012)
Football • 1970-72

Named to the first team Coaches All-American squad in 1972... head coach Paul Dietzel said, "John LeHeup is the best defensive tackle I have ever coached. If I have ever seen an All-American, John LeHeup is one."

KEVIN LONG (2002)
Football • 1974-76

Led the team in rushing in 1975 with 1,133 yards, the fifth best mark in USC history, averaging six yards per carry... registered six games with 100+ yards... posted a career-high 160 yards against N.C. State on Nov. 1, 1975... ranks in the top-10 in yards per carry with 5.3... played for the New York Jets from 1977 to 1981... also played in the USFL in 1983 (Chicago) and 1984-85 (Arizona).

COLLIN MACKIE (2009)
Football • 1987-90

A local product from Irmo... accumulated 330 points... has the most productive seasons ever for field goals, booting 25 in 1987... is the school leader in career field goals made with 72... kicked a school record five field goals in a 29-10 win over West Virginia in 1990.

HAROLD MAUNEY (1971)
Football • 1932-34

Gridiron letterman from 1932-34... played for Coach Billy Laval... the Gamecocks posted winning marks all three seasons for a career record total of 16-11-3.

MIKE MCCABE (2005)
Football • 1973-75

Won the Jacobs Blocking Trophy... fans picked him on the Post World War II USC team... a 6-5, 250-pound center who was from Knoxville, Tenn... one

of 10 children... all nine other siblings went to the Tennessee... father was originally from South Carolina.

KENNY MCKINLEY (2015)
Football • 2005-08

Finished his career as South Carolina's all-time leader in pass receptions with 207 in a four-year career and second only to Alshon Jeffery in yards receiving with 2,781... caught 19 career touchdown passes and holds the Carolina record with 43 consecutive games with a reception.

BRYANT MEEKS JR. (1972)
Football • 1945-46

Tabbed All-Southern Conference as a center in 1946... nickname was "Meatball"... Associated Press second-team All-America in 1946... lettered in 1945 and 1946... played for Johnnie McMillan in 1945 and Rex Enright in 1946... played pro football with the NFL Pittsburgh Steelers in 1947 and 1948.

COREY MILLER (2022)
Football • 1987-90

Standout defensive end for the Gamecocks from Pageland, S.C., who went on to a successful NFL career... earned All-South Independent honors as a defensive end in both 1989 and 1990... totaled 187 tackles with 15.0 tackles for loss and 10.0 sacks... selected as Carolina's Outstanding Defensive Player in 1989 and a team captain in 1990... played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game... selected by the New York Giants in the sixth round of the 1991 NFL Draft... logged seven seasons with the Giants before wrapping up his playing days with the Minnesota Vikings.

FRANK MINCEVICH (1975)
Football • 1952-54

Selected first-team All-America in 1954 by the FWAA... was an All-Atlantic Coast Conference guard during the 1953 and 1954 seasons... South Carolina compiled an 18-12 mark in his career... played in the 1954 North-South Shrine Bowl and the 1955 Senior Bowl.

JIMMY MITCHELL (2016)
Football • 1969-71

A first-team All-ACC receiver... keyed many Gamecock victories with touchdown catches or punt returns... in October 1969, Mitchell's 72-yard punt return for a touchdown beat N.C. State and kept Carolina perfect in the ACC... earned honorable mention All-America honors in both 1970 and 1971... ended his career as the Gamecocks' second all-time receiver in catches, yards and touchdowns... averaged 16.4 yards per reception on 90 catches for his career.

JIM MOSS (1997)
Football • 1960-62

Three-year letterman at tackle on the gridiron... two-time All-ACC selection (1961 and 1962)... two-time winner of the Jacobs Blocking Trophy (1961, 1962) as the best blocker in the state of South Carolina, as voted by sportswriters... played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game after his senior season (1962).

WARREN MUIR (2003)
Football • 1967-69

First-team Coaches All-American in 1969... rushed for 969 yards in 1969... amassed 2,234 career rushing yards... led USC to the 1969 ACC Championship and Peach Bowl berth... Coach Paul Dietzel called him "the toughest inside runner in college football."

JAMAR NESBIT (2017)
Football • 1995-98

Offensive tackle who was a three-time All-SEC performer, earning recognition in 1996, 97 and '98 after being named to the SEC All-Freshman squad in 1995... recognized by the SEC for his community service work and was named to the 11-member Chick-fil-A "Good Works Team" in 1996... spent 11 years in the NFL with the Carolina Panthers and New Orleans Saints.

ERIC NORWOOD (2017)
Football • 2006-09

Named first-team All-America in 2009 by both the Associated Press and the Walter Camp Foundation as an outside linebacker... was a three-time All-SEC first-team selection by the coaches, twice by the Associated Press, and named a Freshman All American by the Sporting News in 2006... served as a team captain in both 2008 and 2009... is the school record holder in tackles for loss in a career with 54.5, and for sacks in a career with 29.0... earned numerous national and conference Defensive Player-of-the-Week awards, as well as tying a national record by returning two fumbles for touchdowns against Kentucky in 2007... played in the NFL for the Carolina Panthers and in the Canadian Football League

ED PITTS (2002)
Football • 1957-59

Team captain in 1959... outstanding tackle... member of the Paul Williamson All-America Team in 1959... selected to the All-Atlantic Coast Conference first team in 1958 and 1959... former executive director of the Gamecock Club.

MACKIE PRICKETT (1995)
Football • 1954-56

Compiled a 16-13 record as a starting quarterback... entered his first varsity game against nationally-ranked Army and engineered a 95-yard scoring drive to propel USC to a 34-20 come-from-behind win... was a full-time starter his junior and senior seasons and shared the starting role as a sophomore... led USC to a 7-3 record as a senior and the school's first win over Duke in over 25 years... led the '56 team in scoring and played in the Blue-Gray All-Star game.

ANDREW PROVENCE (2010)
Football • 1980-82

One of only two players to record 400 or more tackles during his career, finishing with 401... also ranked second in tackles for loss (35.0) and in sacks (26.0)... set the single-season sacks record with 10.0 in 1982... led the team in tackles in both 1981 and '82... named to the Modern Era All-Time Team... named



to *The Sporting News* All-America team in 1982... named third-team Associated Press All-American in 1982... selected to play in the Senior Bowl... drafted by Atlanta in the third round of the 1983 NFL Draft.

DAN REEVES (1977)
Football • 1962-64

Lettered in 1962-63-64... played quarterback for Coach Marvin Bass... has been an NFL head coach for the Denver Broncos, New York Giants and Atlanta Falcons... also was an assistant coach with the NFL Dallas Cowboys... was a running back for the Cowboys from 1965-72.

SIDNEY RICE (2016)
Football • 2005-06

A first-team All-SEC receiver and earned Freshman All-America honors... caught 142 passes in just a two-year career before becoming a star in the NFL... hauled in 23 touchdown passes in his career, which includes a school-record 5 in one game... career receiving totaled 2,233 yards with an impressive 15.7 yards per catch.

BILL ROGERS (1969)
Football • 1924-26
Baseball • 1925-27
Basketball • 1925-27

Earned nine letters while playing three varsity sports at USC from 1924-27... played football under Coach Branch Bocock from 1924-26... the football squad compiled a 20-10 record had three-straight winning campaigns... in basketball, scored 345 points in 47 career games... led USC to a 33-16 combined record on the hardwood... scored a career-high 23 points in a win at Clemson... lettered three years in baseball.

GEORGE ROGERS (1987)
Football • 1977-80

1980 Heisman Trophy winner... was inducted into the NFL Foundation Hall of Fame in 1997... led the nation in rushing as a senior with 1,894 yards and was second in 1979 with 1,681 yards... still holds numerous Gamecock rushing records including most career rushing yards (5,204) and most yards rushing in a single season (1,894)... rushed for 100 or more yards in 27 of his 46 games played as a collegian, including his last 22 games in a Gamecock uniform... topped the 200-yard rushing mark three times during his college career, with a single-game high of 237 yards in 27 attempts against Wake Forest... selected as the first player overall by the New Orleans Saints in the 1981 NFL draft... named *The Sporting News* NFL Rookie of the Year in 1981 after leading the league in rushing with 1,674 yards... rushed for over 1,000 yards in four of his seven NFL seasons... played for the 1988 Super Bowl champion Redskins.

MAX RUNAGER (2013)
Football • 1974, 1976-78

Was an outstanding punter in the late 1970s and was voted to Carolina's all-time team in 1992... punted in the NFL from 1979-89 for the Eagles, 49ers and

Browns... punted for two Super Bowl teams, the 1980 Eagles and the 1984 49ers.

RICK SANFORD (2002)
Football • 1975-78

The school's first first-round NFL draft pick... played for the New England Patriots from 1979-84... also played with the Seattle Seahawks in 1985... named to *The Sporting News* All-America Team in 1978 after leading the squad with four interceptions.

JOHN SAUNDERS (2010)
Football • 1957-59

Considered one of the top fullbacks in school history... earned All-ACC honors... awarded the Jacobs Blocking Trophy for the ACC as a junior... led the ACC in rushing in 1958... selected to play in the 1959 North-South Shrine Game.

WILLIE SCOTT (2006)
Football • 1977-80

Tight end who is a member of the modern era all-time team... lettered four years under Coach Jim Carlen... played professionally for the Kansas City Chiefs from 1981-86.

JAMES SEAWRIGHT (2003)
Football • 1981-84

Earned Associated Press and Football Writers All-America first-team honors and was a second-team selection by United Press International and *Football News* in 1984... played linebacker and recorded 369 career tackles, including 133 as a senior... was leading defensive player on 10-2 "Fire Ants and Black Magic" team of 1984.

STERLING SHARPE (2000)
Football • 1983, 1985-87

Finished his standout career with 169 career catches for 2,497 yards and 17 touchdowns... had his best season with 74 catches for 1,106 yards and 10 TDs in 1986... caught a pass in 34 consecutive games... had school-record 104-yard kickoff return against Duke in 1985, the longest play of any kind in Carolina history... two-time All-American (1986 & '87)... all-Pro with Green Bay Packers in NFL (1988-94) until injury ended his playing career.

CONNOR SHAW (2021)
Football • 2010-13

Led the Gamecocks to three-consecutive 11-win seasons from 2011-13, the greatest run in school history... the Gamecock signal-caller posted a perfect 17-0 record at Williams-Brice Stadium during his career and owns the most wins by a quarterback in school history with 27... is also the school's all-time record holder in career completion percentage and is second in passing touchdowns.

LARRY SMITH (1979)
Football • 1949-51

Tabbed All-Southern Conference in 1951 as a center... played in the 1951 Blue-Gray Classic... lettered in 1949-50-51... played pro ball with the NFL Chicago Bears (1952) and Green Bay Packers (1953) and the Canadian Football

League Montreal Alouettes (1954) and the Hamilton Tiger-Cats (1955).

LOU SOSSAMON (1968)
Football • 1940-42

Named second-team All-America (1942) by the Associated Press... played center for Coach Rex Enright... was All-Southern Conference in 1941 and 1942... played in the 1942 Blue-Gray Classic... played pro ball with the New York Yankees of the AAFC (1946-48)... is a former member of the USC Board of Trustees and publisher of *The Gaffney Ledger* newspaper.

BISHOP STRICKLAND (1975)
Football • 1947-50

Played in the 1951 Senior Bowl and the 1950 North-South Shrine Bowl... lettered from 1947-50... played for the 1951 San Francisco 49ers.

TOMMY SUGGS (1989)
Football • 1968-70

Standout quarterback... established numerous passing and total offense records during his career... led the Gamecocks to the 1969 ACC championship and Peach Bowl berth... shares the school record for most touchdown passes in one game (5)... completed 355-of-672 passes for 4,916 yards and 34 touchdowns... all of those marks were once records... named USC's Most Valuable Player in 1970... was named the Outstanding Player in the 1970 Blue-Gray All-Star game... threw for 200 or more yards eight times during his career... as a quarterback, he never lost to Clemson during his career.

STEVE TANEYHILL (2006)
Football • 1992-95

Flamboyant quarterback who passed for almost 9,000 career yards and 62 touchdowns while completing 60 percent of his passes as a Gamecock... named to the Freshman All-America squad by *Football News* in 1992... also was the SEC Offensive Freshman of the Year... led USC to its first bowl win in school history – the 1995 Carquest Bowl over West Virginia – and was named MVP of the game... his trademark long hair and swagger gave him a unique presence on the field.

ALFRED H. VON KOLNITZ (1967)
Baseball/Football • 1911-13

Earned four letters, two each in football (1911-12) and baseball (1912-13)... nick-name was "Fritz"... played pro baseball for the Cincinnati Reds from 1914-16.

STEVE WADIK (1967)
Football • 1948-51

Second-team All-America as a running back in 1951, as named by the Helms Foundation and Paul Williamson... was All-Southern Conference in 1950 and 1951... played in the 1952 Senior Bowl and the 1951 Blue-Gray Classic... holds the school record for the longest run from scrimmage (96 yards vs. George Washington, 1950)... ranks fourth on the South Carolina career rushing list with 2,878 yards... his number 37 was retired.

J.R. WILBURN (2004)
Football • 1963-65

All-ACC performer in track and football in the mid-1960s... lettered in football 1963-65... went on to play pro football with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

DEL WILKES (2022)
Football • 1980-84

Offensive lineman who was named to four All-America teams in 1984 (Kodak Coaches, Walter Camp, AP and UPI (2nd team) while also being named All-South Independent and winning the Jacobs Blocking Trophy as the top blocker in the state... a co-captain of the squad, he was named MVP as a senior and selected to the modern era all-time USC team in 1993... went on to a career in professional wrestling as "The Patriot".

CLARENCE WILLIAMS (2008)
Football • 1975-76

Rushed for 2,311 career yards, including eight 100-yard games, during his two years at USC... was a member of the Gamecocks' "Hall of Fame" backfield of 1975, joining Kevin Long and Jeff Grantz... played professionally for the San Diego Chargers and Washington Redskins from 1977-83.

ROGER "RED" WILSON (1998)
Football • 1946-49

Played offense and defense... all-state team four years straight, one of two to achieve this feat in the state's history... named honorary captain 1947 and 1948... honorable mention AP All-American twice... drafted by the Green Bay Packers in 1949... lettered in baseball and made all-conference team in 1948... also lettered in track, throwing the javelin and shot and was a part of the state championship track team.

BILL WOHRMAN (1998)
Football • 1952-54

Only player in Carolina history to win four Jacobs Blocking trophies... football co-captain in 1954 and was also named Most Valuable Player... named All-ACC in 1954... played pro football with the Cleveland Browns and the New York Titans... lettered in baseball from 1953-55 at centerfield and third base.

HARRY WOLF (2019)
Multi-Sport • 1925-28

One of the more incredible athletes to ever attend the university, Wolf was a star in the late 1920s... won the conference heavyweight boxing championship, was a member of the football and basketball teams and competed in the weight throws in track & field where he was the Southern Conference shot put champion.

FRED ZEIGLER (1995)
Football • 1967-69

Finished his career as the all-time leader in receptions (146) and yards (1,876)... caught a pass in 29-straight games, a record that lasted until 1987... was a two-time All-ACC pick... in his last home game, caught nine passes for 122 yards in a 27-13 win over Clemson.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA. (AP) — Tyler Buchner accounted for five touchdowns to help offset two interceptions returned for TDs, and No. 19 Notre Dame beat 20th-ranked South Carolina 45-38 in a wild TaxSlayer Gator Bowl.

The highest-scoring game in Gator Bowl history was filled with big plays and memorable moments. But Buchner delivered the knockout blow when he found tight end Mitchell Evans wide open for a 16-yard touchdown on a third-and-7 play with 1:38 remaining.

Buchner, who regained the starting job after Drew Pyne entered the transfer portal following the regular-season finale, threw for 274 yards and three touchdowns. He also ran for 61 yards and two scores.

But his three interceptions nearly proved too much to overcome.

O'Donnell Fortune returned one of them 100 yards for a touchdown in the fourth quarter, and DQ Smith returned another 47 yards for a score in the first. But Buchner bounced back from both miscues to earn his first victory in three career starts.

Notre Dame (9-4, No. 21 CFP) overcame a 14-point deficit and won despite South Carolina's scoring on the two pick-6s and on special teams. Punter Kai Kroger connected with long-snapper Hunter Rogers for one of the oddest TDs in bowl lore.

Spencer Rattler completed 29 of 44 passes for 246 yards for the Gamecocks (8-5, No. 19 CFP), with an interception and two touchdowns to Xavier Legette.

South Carolina was missing a number of key starters, including running back MarShawn Lloyd, versatile tight end Jaheim Bell, tight end Austin Stogner, defensive lineman Zacch Pickens, safety Devonn Reed, cornerbacks Cam Smith and Darius Rush, and receivers Josh Vann and Jalen Brooks.

Notre Dame played without All-American tight end Michael Mayer, standout edge rusher Isaiah Foskey, cornerback Cam Hart and defensive lineman Jayson Ademilola.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — South Carolina coach Shane Beamer had a bucket of mayonnaise dumped over his head Thursday, putting a memorable and messy finish on the Gamecocks' 38-21 victory over North Carolina in the Duke's Mayo Bowl.

Jaheim Bell had five catches for 159 yards and two touchdowns for South Carolina (7-6), which rebounded nicely after it lost 30-0 to Clemson in its regular-season finale on Nov. 27. Kevin Harris added 169 yards rushing and a score, helping secure the mayo bath for Beamer.

Bell came into the game with 338 yards receiving and three TDs during the regular season, but figured prominently into the game plan early on.

The sophomore tight end got free for a 69-yard touchdown reception from wide receiver-turned-quarterback Dakereon Joyner and hauled in a 66-yard TD catch from former graduate assistant coach Zeb Noland on South Carolina's first two possessions.

Juju McDowell added a 35-yard TD run in the second quarter as South Carolina averaged 11.6 yards per play while opening a 25-13 lead in the first half.

Sam Howell threw for 205 yards and a touchdown for the Tar Heels (6-7), and reserve running back British Brooks had a bowl record 63-yard touchdown run for the Tar Heels.

South Carolina rotated Joyner and Noland under center, and both were effective.

Joyner came into the game having attempted only one pass this season and 31 in his college career.

But the element of surprise proved effective on the Gamecocks' first possession, when Joyner hit the 6-foot-3, 232-pound Bell in stride down the middle of the field.

Joyner finished 9-of-9 passing for 160 yards and also ran for 64 yards. Noland was 3-of-6 passing for 82 yards as the Gamecocks went nearly three quarters before their first incomplete pass.

Howell, a projected first-round pick in the NFL draft, made several impressive throws with his strong, accurate arm. But the junior quarterback spent most of the game under heavy duress playing behind an offensive line that struggled most of the season.

The Tar Heels cut the lead to 11 midway through the third quarter on a double-reverse flea flicker, with Howell finding a wide-open Garrett Walston for a 37-yard touchdown.

But South's Carolina's offense proved too much for a porous North Carolina defense as the Gamecocks racked up 543 yards on offense.

GAME CHANGER

Dakereon Joyner found Jaheim Bell on Carolina's first possession for a 69-yard touchdown pass with 10:15 left in the first quarter, giving the Gamecocks a lead it would not relinquish. Joyner was a perfect 9-for-9 passing and earned MVP honors while Bell had a career high 159 yards on five receptions.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Bryce Perkins threw three touchdown passes to Olamide Zaccheaus, Virginia's defense dominated and the Cavaliers beat South Carolina 28-0 in the Belk Bowl on Saturday for their first bowl win since 2005.

Perkins completed 22 of 31 passes for 208 yards and ran for 81 yards as the Cavaliers (8-5) ended the ACC's longest bowl drought. Zaccheaus, named the game's Most Outstanding Player, had 12 catches for 100 yards. Jordan Ellis ran for 106 yards and a touchdown, helping Virginia hold the ball for more than 42 minutes.

The Gamecocks were shut out for the first time since 2006, when they lost 18-0 to Georgia.

The Cavaliers' 14th-ranked pass defense put the clamps on a hot South Carolina offense that had averaged 38.2 points per game over the past five games. Jake Bentley had thrown for 16 touchdowns during that span, including a 510-yard, five-TD performance against No. 2 Clemson, but struggled without wide receiver Deebo Samuel, who elected to bypass the bowl game to begin preparing for the NFL draft.

Bentley was limited to 218 yards on 17-of-39 passing and was intercepted twice. South Carolina was 2 of 13 on third down conversions and 2 of 5 on fourth downs.

The Cavaliers controlled the ball for more than 20 minutes of the first half and built a 14-0 lead at halftime. Perkins found Zaccheaus on a fourth-and-2 in the back of the end zone for a 6-yard score, and Jordan Ellis added a 9-yard touchdown run to make it 14-0.

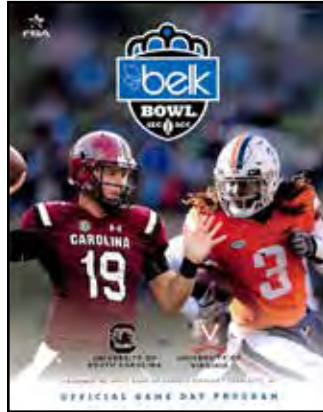
Perkins found Zaccheaus twice in the second half for TDs of 10 and 12 yards.

"We don't have all the trophies and the tradition and history but we have some grit," the coach said after the Gamecocks rallied from a 16-point second-half deficit to beat Michigan 26-19 in Monday's Outback Bowl.

Jake Bentley threw for 239 yards and two touchdowns Monday to pace the win, which gave the Gamecocks (9-4) at least nine wins in a season for just the seventh time.

Bentley shrugged off a slow start to toss scoring passes of 21 yards to Bryan Edwards and 53 yards to Shi Smith, the latter giving his team a 23-19 lead early in the fourth quarter.

The sophomore said once the Gamecocks began to have some success, the offense's confidence grew.

"It's just we started to execute well. The excitement, I think, is contagious to the whole team," Bentley, voted the game's most valuable player, said. "You see where we went from there."

Michigan (8-5) finished with its first three-game losing streak under coach Jim Harbaugh. The Wolverines turned the ball over five times after halftime, including an end zone interception that denied them an opportunity to regain the lead with just under eight minutes to go.

Bentley was 19 of 32 passing with one interception. Rico Dowdle, playing for first time since breaking his leg against Tennessee on Oct. 14, began South Carolina's comeback from a 19-3 deficit with a 17-yard TD run.

Brandon Peters had a tough day for Michigan, completing 20 of 44 passes for 186 yards and two interceptions. His second pick, with 1:05 remaining, sealed South Carolina's second Outback Bowl victory over the Wolverines in five years.

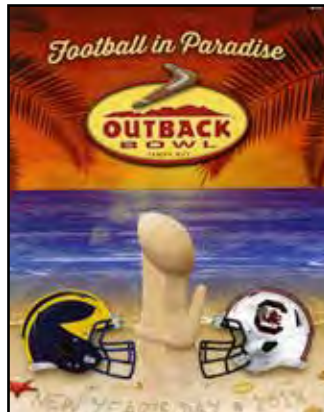
Quinn Nordin accounted for most of Michigan's scoring, kicking field goals of 35, 26, 45 and 48 yards. Fullback Ben Mason scored on a 1-yard run in helping Michigan build its 16-point lead.

GAME CHANGER

South Carolina recovered one of its five forced turnovers with 57 seconds left in third quarter and struck on the next play with a 21-yard pass from Jake Bentley to Bryan Edwards, cutting Michigan's lead to 19-16. After the Gamecock defense forced Michigan to punt, Bentley found Shi Smith for a 53-yard touchdown pass to give South Carolina the lead for good.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA. — South Carolina (6-7) stormed back from an 18-point deficit to force overtime, but USF (11-2) came through in the end to claim a 46-39 victory in the 2016 Birmingham Bowl from Legion Field.

The Bulls wasted no time in taking the advantage in overtime, as quarterback Quinton Flowers scrambled before finding Elkanah Dillon in the end zone for the decisive score. The Gamecocks benefited from a face mask penalty to keep their OT possession alive, but Mike Love, on 4th-and-6, produced a sack to end the chance and the game in the Bulls' favor.



In the fourth quarter, South Carolina got a critical score with 9:41 to go. On 4th-and-2 from the USF 9, a Bull defender tipped the Jake Bentley pass, but freshman wide receiver Bryan Edwards, diving right behind the tip, brought in the catch at the back of the end zone for a touchdown. That brought the Gamecocks within a score at 39-31.

The Gamecocks drove inside the Bulls' 10 with a chance to tie the game, but cornerback Tajee Fullwood forced a fumble at the two, and Khalid McGee recovered it to end that chance.

The Gamecock defense stepped up and held the Bulls to only a yard and forced their third punt in four possessions. Chris Lammons returned the punt to the USF 2, setting up A.J. Turner's one-yard score. Needing two to tie the game, Bentley hit Hayden Hurst in the back of the end zone to convert and tie things at 39-39. The Gamecock defense held again to force overtime.

In the first quarter, USF got a pair of four-yard runs from its starting quarterback Flowers, the first on a designed draw and the second on a scramble, to take the advantage. The Bulls converted a two-point conversion after the first score, making it 15-0 after the traditional PAT kick after the second run.

The Gamecocks struck fast with a four-play, 81-yard drive that saw freshman quarterback Bentley run for the first 10 yards before throwing the final 71 yards. A completion to sophomore wide receiver Deebo Samuel came before two receptions by Hurst, the final a 25-yard scoring catch.

A fourth-down conversion helped USF send the lead back to 15. Flowers hit D'Ernest Johnson, who rumbled 22 yards to keep the drive going. Three plays later, Flowers completed a one-yard run for his third score of the game.

On the Gamecocks' final drive of the first half, Bentley went 5-for-6, including capping it with a three-yard score to Samuel. But USF answered, as Flowers hit Johnson for a 37-yard TD pass to make it 29-14 at the end of the first half.

South Carolina scored on the first drive of the second half, with Samuel capping the drive with a four-yard run. Freshman running back Rico Dowdle had the biggest gain on the drive, running for 26 yards to get the ball into Bull territory.

The Gamecock defense held the Bulls to a field goal after USF drove inside the Gamecock 5. But on the ensuing South Carolina possession, Fullwood intercepted a pass and returned it 47 yards for a touchdown, putting the Bulls' lead to 39-21.

With 22 seconds left in the third, Gamecock senior Elliott Fry hit a 43-yard field goal to make it 39-24, starting the comeback bid by Carolina.

SHREVEPORT, LA.— It would come down to the very last minute of the game, but the South Carolina Gamecocks (7-6) secured their 11th-straight season with a record of .500 or better thanks to a 24-21 win over Miami (6-7) in the Duck Commander Independence Bowl.

A bend-but-don't-break defense helped carry the Gamecocks through the early portion of the game while the offense was still finding its footing. Despite a pair of Miami drives that went deep into Carolina territory, the Hurricanes could only muster a pair of field goals after being stopped inside the ten yard line both times.

It took a big play halfway through the second quarter to shake the offense from its slow start. On second down at its own 22, Dylan Thompson hit a wide-open Pharoah Cooper on a post route down the middle for the 78-yard touchdown to move the Gamecocks ahead 7-6 with just under eight minutes to play in the first half. The yardage in just that one play matched the offense's total gains for the entire game up until that point, and tied for the longest pass play in the bowl's history.

The score broke the seal on the offense, which scored on the very next drive after the defense forced a three-and-out from Miami. Starting near midfield, Thompson spearheaded the scoring drive with a trio of difficult throws. After hooking up with Cooper for a 13-yard first down, he followed it up with a 35-yard strike to Damiere Byrd to get to the Hurricane five-yard line.

A penalty pushed the Gamecocks back to the 15-yard line before Thompson rolled to his left and threw across his body to Mike Davis in the back of the end zone for a 14-6 lead.

On the very next drive, a pass from Miami's Brad Kaaya was tipped up in the air and intercepted by Jonathan Walton. The turnover would set up a 32-yard field goal from Elliott Fry and cap the team's scoring for the half, a 17-6 lead.

After struggling to stop Miami's nationally renowned rushing offense in the first quarter, the Gamecocks defense learned quickly and held the opposition to just 44 yards in the second quarter after allowing 160 in just the first two drives of the game.

The third quarter was largely controlled by Miami, who drew within a field goal of tying the game after an 11-play, 93-yard drive for a touchdown and a two-point conversion. The offensive momentum for Carolina would not carry over the break, as its first four drives of the second half would go for just 71 yards on 25 plays.

Carolina punted the ball with seven minutes left in the game, still ahead 17-14. On the drive's second play, Miami's Duke Johnson rushed to the right and was swarmed immediately. Gerald Dixon would emerge from the pile with the ball to give the Gamecocks possession.

On the ensuing drive, Thompson and Cooper would combine yet again for a big play, as the sophomore wide receiver went over the back of his defender on the under-thrown ball and hauled in the 25-yard strike to set up first-and-goal at the two yard line. On the very next play, Thompson would sell the read option fake and keep it for the touchdown, strikingly similar to his game-winner against Florida.

Miami drove 72 yards in under two minutes for a touchdown to make it 24-21.

With 2:16 still to play and needing to run out the clock, the Gamecocks turned to Davis to seal the win. He converted a third-and-one that would be the clincher, as it forced the Hurricanes to use their final two timeouts.

In his final game in the Garnet and Black, Thompson would finish with 284 yards through the air and a pair of touchdowns to go with his rushing score.

Cooper would bring in nine catches for 170 yards and earned offensive MVP honors for his efforts. Skai Moore earned defensive MVP honors.

ORLANDO, FLA. — Behind five touchdowns from quarterback Connor Shaw, No. 8/8 South Carolina (11-2) claimed a 34-24 victory over No. 19/19 Wisconsin (9-4) in the 2014 Capital One Bowl.

The Capital One Bowl MVP, Shaw accounted for 369 yards of offense, going 22-for-25 in the air for 312 yards and 3 TDs while also running for 48 yards on 16 carries and a score. Shaw also caught a TD pass for 9 yards. Junior Bruce Ellington caught six passes for a career-best 139 yards and two touchdowns and threw for another, while sophomore Shaq Roland pulled in six passes for 112 yards, both career bests.



The Gamecocks took the lead late in the third quarter behind the senior quarterback in his final game. Shaw found Ellington from 22 yards away to hand South Carolina a 20-17 advantage, but the duo had a much more pivotal play to keep the drive going. On 4th and 7, Ellington tipped the Shaw pass to himself before pulling it down and going out of bounds for a 22-yard gain and conversion. Shaw's arm accounted for all but three yards of the series, completing six of seven pass attempts on the drive.

South Carolina's defense stepped up to start the fourth quarter to snuff out a Wisconsin drive. With 1 yard to gain, the Gamecocks twice stopped Melvin Gordon, who rushed for 143 yards in the contest, for no gain to turn the ball over on downs. The Gamecocks proceeded to drive 74 yards in six plays to take a 10-point lead. Shaw twice found Roland on the drive, the second time a 49-yard catch that saw Roland's concentration as he brought in the catch among two defenders. It was tight end Jerell Adams who scored from 3 yards out for the Gamecocks, pulling down Shaw's third TD pass.

Wisconsin made it a one-score game again when Kenzel Doe found a seam and dashed 91 yards on the kickoff return, making it 27-24 in favor of the Gamecocks.

On the next possession, however, Shaw drove South Carolina 88 yards for another score, wrapping the drive with Shaw's 1-yard sneak. Another big pass from Shaw to Roland, a 33-yard reception, helped keep the drive alive.

The Badgers, behind backup quarterback Curt Phillips, tried to answer on the next drive, but on 4th and 1 in the Gamecocks' territory, the pass hit Jadeveon Clowney's helmet and sophomore linebacker Kaiwan Lewis corralled it to end that drive. South Carolina gave the Badgers back the ball two plays later when Ethan Armstrong recovered the Gamecocks' fumble.

After the fumble recovery, Wisconsin drove inside the 20, but Gamecock freshman linebacker Skai Moore came up with his second interception of the day in the end zone to stop the Badger threat. After the Gamecocks punted the ball back to Wisconsin, the Badgers drove again deep into South Carolina territory, but Lewis picked up the fumble on the catch-and-pitch attempt.

South Carolina took the initial lead after a Wisconsin turnover toward the end of the first quarter, when Moore picked off the pass from Badger starting quarterback Joel Stave. On the next play, Shaw hit Ellington for a 39-yard score. Wisconsin answered when Sam Arneson brought in the 1-yard pass from Stave on the tight end out, leveling the score at 7-7.

The offensive duo of Shaw and Ellington handed South Carolina the lead again but in reverse from their normal. To cap the 12-play, 86-yard drive, Carolina called up a double-reverse, halfback pass, as Ellington took the second handoff before firing a strike to Shaw from 9 yards out to hand the Gamecocks a 13-7 lead after the PAT attempt failed.

Wisconsin claimed the halftime lead when Stave found Jeff Duckworth for a 3-yard score and its PAT kick went through the uprights. The Badgers made it a 17-13 lead when Jack Russell hit a 35-yard field goal to end the Badgers' first second-half drive.

Shaw finished with 27 wins as a starting quarterback. The 312 passing yards ranks as the most during a single game in his senior season.

TAMPA, FLA. -- Dylan Thompson's 32-yard TD pass to Bruce Ellington with 11 seconds remaining lifted South Carolina (11-2) to a 33-28 victory over Michigan (8-5) to win the 2013 Outback Bowl.

Trailing 28-27 with 3:29 remaining, Carolina made one final drive. Connor Shaw converted a 4th & 3 with a 6-yard slant pass to Ace Sanders and followed that up with completions of 6, 8 and 6, all to Sanders to earn two more first downs. Shaw left the game as he was nicked up, bringing Thompson in the game.

Thompson moved the Gamecocks down to the Michigan 32-yardline with 20 seconds left where he unleashed a perfect strike to Ellington near the goal line. The Gamecock wide receiver made his way into the end zone to give the Gamecocks the win.

The back and forth affair saw Shaw and Thompson deliver for Carolina. Shaw finished 18-for-26 for 224 yards in the air and a pair of TDs and added 96 yards rushing. Thompson was 7-for-10 for 117 yards and two scores.

Sanders caught 9 passes for 92 yards with two touchdown receptions as well as a 63-yard punt return for a touchdown en route to MVP honors.

The Gamecocks needed just three plays to find the end zone. Damien Byrd got behind the Wolverine secondary and Shaw connected with him for a 56-yard scoring strike to give the Gamecocks a 7-0 lead.

Michigan trimmed the lead to 7-3 with a 39-yard field goal.

After the Carolina defense pushed the Wolverines back to their own 9-yard line with a sack by Aldrick Fordham, Michigan punted to Sanders, who weaved his way 63 yards to the end zone, giving the Gamecocks a 14-3 advantage.

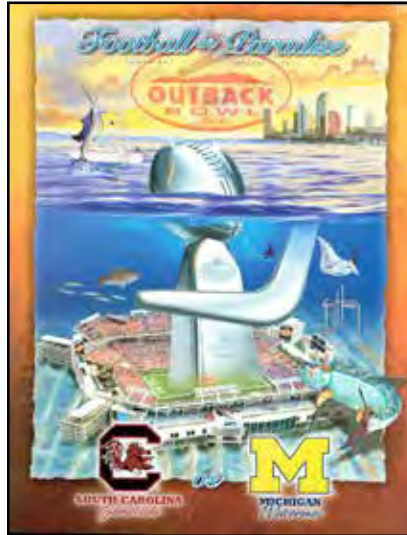
The Wolverines answered with an 11-play, 75-yard scoring drive capped by a 5-yard pass from Devin Gardner to Drew Dileo.

The Gamecocks responded quickly with a four-play, 75-yard drive. Thompson found Nick Jones across the middle for a 70-yard pass to set Carolina up at the Michigan 4. Thompson then rolled right and found Sanders in the end zone to give the Gamecocks a 21-10 lead. A 40-yard field goal by Gibbons closed the gap at the intermission.

Michigan got a 52-yard field goal from Matt Wile, then went on a 10-play, 65-yard scoring drive capped by a 10-yard touchdown pass from Gardner to Jeremy Gallon to take a 22-21 heading into the final stanza.

After a very questionable first down was awarded to the Wolverines, Jadeveon Clowney made a big defensive play. Clowney forced and recovered a fumble by tailback Vincent Smith giving the Gamecocks the ball on the Michigan 31-yardline. South Carolina quickly struck then as Shaw completed a 31-yard touchdown pass to Sanders as the Gamecocks reclaimed a 27-22 lead.

Michigan answered on its ensuing drive to take a 28-27 lead before Carolina's late-game heroics.

ORLANDO, FLA. – No. 10/9 South Carolina wrapped up one of the most successful seasons in school history with a 30-13 victory over No. 21/20 Nebraska in the Capital One Bowl.

With the win, Carolina became the first team in school history to reach 11 wins.

Junior receiver Alshon Jeffery played a key role in leading Carolina to its record-setting win and made a little history of his own. Jeffery finished the day with four receptions for 148 yards and a touchdown on his way to earning bowl MVP honors.

Gamecock quarterback Connor Shaw had a stellar end to his sophomore campaign, completing 11-of-17 passes for 230 yards and two touchdowns. He added 42 yards and one touchdown on the ground. Junior running back Kenny Miles finished with 67 yards and a touchdown on 15 carries and had two receptions for 13 yards and a score.

The Gamecock defense delivered another solid performance, holding Nebraska to 253 yards of total offense with just 64 yards allowed in the second half. Carolina tied a season-high with six sacks on the day, including two from freshman Jadeveon Clowney and 1.5 from senior Melvin Ingram. Junior D.J. Swearinger and senior Antonio Allen led the way with seven tackles apiece.

The Cornhuskers (9-4) struck first. On Nebraska's third play from scrimmage, quarterback Taylor Martinez found Kenny Bell for a 30-yard touchdown strike. However, Travian Robertson blocked the extra point and Stephon Gilmore returned it for two points to make it 6-2.

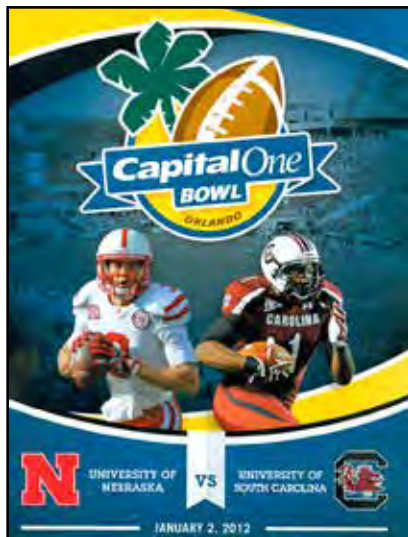
Bruce Ellington gave Carolina excellent field position on the ensuing possession with a 45-yard kickoff return. A 24-yard run by Miles set up the Gamecocks deep in Nebraska territory. Shaw capped the drive on fourth and goal by punching it in from a yard out, giving Carolina a 9-6 advantage.

Nebraska answered with an eight-play, 60-yard scoring drive, aided by a Carolina drive-extending penalty, to regain the lead. Ameer Abdullah finished off the drive with a 1-yard touchdown run to give the Cornhuskers a 13-9 lead.

Stephon Gilmore gave the Gamecocks one more chance to score before halftime by intercepting a Martinez pass at the Gamecock 26. With seven seconds until intermission from the Carolina 49, Shaw rolled right and heaved it downfield where Jeffery leaped over a defender, came down with the ball and dove into the end zone for a 16-13 lead heading into the locker room.

The Gamecocks pushed their lead to 23-13 early in the fourth quarter with a five-play, 41-yard scoring drive. Shaw hooked up with Ace Sanders for a 23-yard pass play on third and 18 to move the ball to the Nebraska 11. Two plays later, Shaw found a wide-open Miles for a 9-yard touchdown pass.

Miles added a 3-yard touchdown run with 3:05 left in the game.

ATLANTA, GA.—EJ Manuel threw a fourth-quarter touchdown pass to stop a South Carolina rally and lead Florida State to a 26-17 victory in the Chick-fil-A Bowl.

Manuel took over after senior quarterback Christian Ponder left early in the second quarter with a concussion. The sophomore appears ready to assume the starting role next season.

Manuel completed 11-of-15 passes for 84 yards and a touchdown and had seven carries for 46 yards.

He was 7-for-7 passing on the fourth-quarter touchdown drive.

Dustin Hopkins kicked four field goals for the No. 23 Seminoles (10-4), who reached 10 victories for the first time since 2003. Hopkins tied his own school record for a bowl, and the four field goals also matched the Chick-fil-A Bowl record.

No. 19 South Carolina (9-5), which was seeking its first 10-win season since 1984, lost star running back Marcus Lattimore when he was hit hard on the Gamecocks' first drive. Coach Steve Spurrier's team also committed five turnovers.

"We had (414) yards," Spurrier said. "It wasn't a terrible offensive performance. It was just the turnovers that hurt us."

"Stephen struggled early and then he made some pretty decent throws in the second half," Spurrier said. "It looked like we had a chance to get back in the game."

Garcia recovered to lead two long touchdown drives that trimmed Florida State's lead to 19-17 before Manuel answered with the seven-yard scoring pass to Taiwan Easterling.

"Man, I was so happy," Manuel said. "We weren't moving the ball like we wanted to. We weren't getting touchdowns. We were getting field goals instead."

Florida State cornerback Greg Reid, whose hits caused the fumbles by Lattimore and Jeffery, deflected a fourth-down pass by Garcia with 3:23 remaining to end the Gamecocks' last hope.

Garcia completed 19 of 34 passes for 243 yards and also scored on a nifty play in the third. On a third-down play from the Florida State three, Garcia threw a screen pass to Ace Sanders, who threw back across the field to Garcia alone in the right side of the end zone.

The Seminoles answered with Hopkins' fourth field goal, from 45 yards, to push the lead to nine. Hopkins also kicked four field goals in the Seminoles' Gator Bowl win over West Virginia.

Garcia responded by leading a 79-yard drive, capped by Brian Maddox's seven-yard TD run. Garcia helped set up the score with a 29-yard pass to Jeffery.

Reid's hit on Lattimore knocked the freshman out of the game with an injury announced as a cut to his mouth. Spurrier said after the game that Lattimore also had "a little bit of a concussion" and was taken to a hospital for stitches.

BIRMINGHAM, ALA. —Andre Dixon rushed for 126 yards and a touchdown en route to MVP honors and resilient Connecticut (8-5) ended a trying season with a 20-7 victory over the South Carolina Gamecocks (7-6) in the PapaJohns.com Bowl.

Carolina quarterback Stephen Garcia completed just 16 of 38 passes for 129 yards while gaining 56 yards on 15 carries. He lost a fumble, was intercepted once and didn't get much help. An emotional Garcia called the Gamecocks' performance "very disappointing."

UConn had a pristine performance, with zero penalties. Linebacker Lawrence Wilson called it "the most complete game we've played all year."

The Gamecocks avoided their first shutout in three seasons on Brian Maddox's 2-yard touchdown run with 3:24 left. Their only other possession ending in UConn territory resulted in a botched field goal attempt.

The Gamecocks' effort was marred by dropped passes, a missed interception and costly penalties that kept a mostly garnet-and-black clad crowd subdued – and steadily shrinking by the fourth quarter.

Leading receiver Alshon Jeffery was held to three catches for 28 yards, all in the first half. Tailback Kenny Miles had just six carries for 24 yards.

Dixon's 10-yard touchdown with 13:12 left effectively put the game away. Jesse Simpson had set the Huskies up at the Gamecocks' 29-yard line by forcing Garcia to fumble, knocking it away from behind at the end of a run.

A South Carolina team that pounded Clemson with 58 runs in a win to finish the regular season finished with 26 rushes for 76 yards.

UConn jumped ahead 13-0. Kashif Moore snagged the ball one-handed down the right sideline for a 37-yard touchdown catch from Zach Frazer in the first quarter. Dave Teggart then hit field goals of 33 and 44 yards. The first kick was set up when Garcia was stopped on a sneak on fourth-and-1 from South Carolina's 32.

South Carolina didn't even manage its initial first down until midway through the second quarter, and that took Garcia converting a third-and-16.

South Carolina's sloppy play continued into the second half. Running into the kicker and roughing the passer calls helped UConn keep its first drive alive for more than seven minutes, though it ended with a fumble.

Then, cornerback Akeem Auguste dropped an easy interception with nothing between him and the end zone.

TAMPA, FLA. – Shonn Greene, the Big Ten's most valuable player, rushed for 121 yards and three touchdowns Thursday, helping the Hawkeyes trounce South Carolina 31-10 in the Outback Bowl.

Greene ran for more than 100 yards in all 13 of Iowa's games and scored in all but one. He finished with school single-season records of 1,850 yards and 20 TDs.

Iowa (9-4) won for the sixth time in seven games since losing three straight to fall to 3-3. South Carolina (7-6) lost three straight down the stretch while being outscored 118-30.

Greene scored on a pair of 1-yard runs to help Iowa build a 21-0 halftime lead, then added an 11-yarder to make it 31-0 late in the third quarter. South Carolina scored on Chris Smelley's 10-yard TD pass to Jared Cook and Ryan Succop's 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

After struggling offensively in lopsided losses to Florida and Clemson, Gamecocks coach Steve Spurrier decided to start quarterback Stephen Garcia, a highly regarded redshirt freshman from Tampa who was the centerpiece of his recruiting class in 2007.

But Garcia turned the ball over four times in the first half and was replaced by Smelley after going 9-for-18 for 79 yards and three interceptions.

The 20-year-old's homecoming turned sour in a hurry. His first pass was intercepted and returned 29 yards set up an Iowa touchdown, then the dual-threat quarterback fumbled on his first run to give the Gamecocks turnovers on two of their first four offensive plays.

The next two South Carolina possessions ended with interceptions. After Bradley Fletcher picked off Garcia in the end zone, Iowa drove 80 yards to take a 21-0 lead on Greene's second touchdown.

Ricky Stanzi was intercepted twice before halftime, but neither mistake really hurt the Hawkeyes. Iowa was trying to turn Garcia's third interception into a quick TD when South Carolina's Chris Culliver made a leaping pick in the end zone.

Smelley, who started nine games for South Carolina this season, replaced Garcia at the start of the second half. Moe Brown fumbled on the quarterback's first completion to set up an Iowa field goal, but the Gamecocks did have some success moving the ball the rest of the game.

Stanzi was 13-for-19 for 148 yards, including a 6-yard TD throw to Trey Stross on the first drive of the game. Smelley finished 16-of-31 for 174 yards and no interceptions.

– Steve Spurrier's offense was humming along in the first half, but the Carolina defense was doing nothing to stop Houston.

In the final 30 minutes, Spurrier's Gamecocks got a little D to go with their O.

Defensive end Jordan Lindsey came up with two turnovers for a defense that made the stops that mattered most, and South Carolina beat Houston 44-36 in the Liberty Bowl on Friday for its first bowl victory under Spurrier.

Blake Mitchell tied a bowl record by throwing four touchdown passes, Cory Boyd ran for two more TDs as the Gamecocks (8-5) finished Spurrier's second season with their best record since 2001.

Kevin Kolb, making his 50th start at quarterback for Houston (10-4) finished 26-of-39 for 386 yards and three touchdowns.

Houston led 28-27 at the half - a Liberty Bowl record for points in a half - but South Carolina held the Cougars to 63 yards in the third quarter when the Gamecocks took control. They sacked Kolb three times, forced two turnovers and stopped the Cougars twice on fourth down in the fourth quarter.

The teams combined for 588 yards in the first half, much of it just before halftime. The second quarter took 61 minutes, and a game that was tied at 7 went haywire. In the final three minutes of the half, four TDs were scored in a span 12 plays - the last a 77-yard TD catch by Houston's Vincent Marshall with 11 seconds left.

The Cougars didn't score in the second half until Jackie Battle ran in from 3 yards out with 5:42 left. The 2-point conversion cut South Carolina's lead to 44-36.

Houston outgained South Carolina 527-512, but the Cougars managed only 200 in the second half.

With a pair of coaches known for their offensive ingenuity, this had a little of everything: four TDs in a span of 12 plays, a flea flicker for an interception, a punt on fourth-and-goal, a halfback pass and an option by Houston when backed up against its own goal line.

Ryan Succop kicked a 45-yard field goal into winds gusting up to 20 mph on the Gamecocks' opening drive of the second half to put Carolina ahead to stay at 30-28. Mitchell padded the lead with a pair of 43-yard TD passes to Kenny McKinley, the last with 7:39 to go for a 44-28 lead. Mitchell, the game's MVP, was 19-of-29 for 323 yards.

Houston ruined its best scoring chance on the drive after Succop's kick. In the shotgun on third-and-goal at the 8, a bad snap went wide right of Kolb, who tried to chase down the ball and kicked it out of bounds for a penalty. That forced Houston to punt from midfield after having first-and-goal.

– South Carolina's game plan of keeping Brad Smith in check worked great - for a half, anyway.

Then, the Missouri quarterback broke loose, rushing for three touchdowns - including a 1-yarder in the final minutes - and passing for another to rally the Tigers for a 38-31 victory in the Independence Bowl.

Smith accounted for 431 yards of Missouri's 504 yards as the Tigers staged their biggest comeback of the year.

Missouri (6-6) trailed 21-0 after the first quarter as Steve Spurrier's Gamecocks dominated the first half. South Carolina (7-5) outgained Missouri 312 yards to 174 in the first half and held the football almost 11 minutes longer (20:02-9:58)

Mizzou didn't convert a third down until the final 58 seconds of the half.

Smith completed 21 of 37 passes for 282 yards, with one touchdown and an interception. He passed for 200 or more yards for the 18th time. He also ran for 150 yards and three TDs on 21 carries.

The Gamecocks needed less than 3 minutes to go 80 yards for their first score. Blake Mitchell's 23-yard pass to Sidney Rice put Carolina up 7-0. Rice finished with 12 receptions for 191 yards.

Tony Temple fumbled on Missouri's first play and South Carolina's Ricardo Hurley scooped up the ball. Four plays later Mike Davis, who ran for 125 yards on 18 carries, scored on a 5-yard run for a 14-0 lead.

The Gamecocks' third scoring drive covered 69 yards in 1:59. This time Mitchell, who completed 20 of 38 passes for 266 yards, hit Carson Askins with a 20-yard scoring pass to make it 21-0. Mitchell passed for two touchdowns, and was intercepted three times.

Marcus King gave Missouri its first points, grabbing Mitchell's pass at the goal line and returning it 99 yards to make it 21-7.

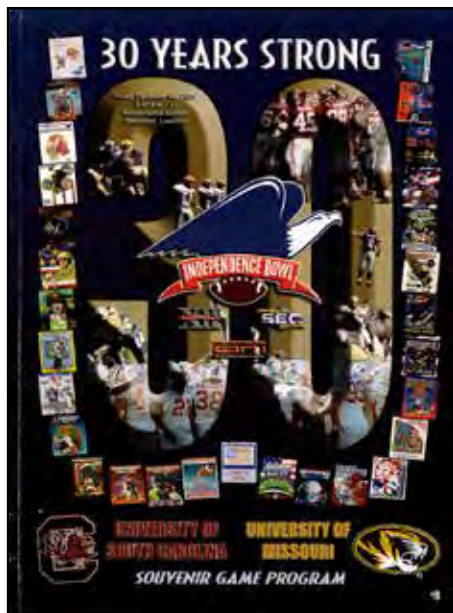
After Davis' 2-yard TD run gave the Gamecocks a 28-7 lead, Missouri staged its first long drive of the game. The Tigers went 77 yards and Smith hit Chase Coffman with a 5-yard touchdown pass to make it 28-14 at halftime. Coffman finished with eight catches for 99 yards.

Smith pulled Mizzou to 28-21 with a 31-yard run with 2:41 left in the third.

Another apparent Missouri TD was nullified by a 15-yard penalty. Smith finally got the score on a 4-yard run that tied the score at 28 early in the fourth quarter.

Crossett kicked a 50-yard field goal to put the Tigers up 31-28, but Josh Brown countered with a 30 yarder that tied it at 31-all.

Then, with 2:13 remaining, Smith sealed the Missouri win with a 1-yard TD run.

TAMPA, FLA — With the score tied and no time left, South Carolina kicker Daniel Weaver knew his 42-yard field goal attempt wasn't his best effort. So he put his faith in the wind.

The kick barely cleared the crossbar, as No. 14 South Carolina survived with a 31-28 win over No. 22 Ohio State in the Outback Bowl.

Steve Bellisari led Ohio State from a 28-0 deficit to tie the score. But he was intercepted by Sheldon Brown, whose return to Ohio State's 29 with 23 seconds left set up Weaver's game-winning kick.

Phil Petty, the game's MVP, threw for 227 yards and two touchdowns, and Andrew Pinnock scored twice for South Carolina. But none of that mattered when Bellisari finally got the Buckeyes (7-5) going.

He ran for a 2-yard score to close the third quarter, then hit Darrell Sanders with a 16-yard TD pass with 10:18 to go that cut the lead in half.

Bellisari, who was 21-of-35 for 320 yards, then drove Ohio State to the South Carolina 18 but lost the snap. South Carolina linebacker Jeremiah Garrison recovered.

On the next play, Derek Watson fumbled right back to Ohio State's Mike Doss. Three plays later, Jonathan Wells' 1-yard run made it 28-21.

Ohio State got the ball back on its 11 with 3:56 to play. Bellisari went 6-of-6 for 86 yards, tying the game on Sanders' 9-yard catch.

Cie Grant gave the Buckeyes a chance for victory at the end, intercepting Petty with 1:12 left. A celebration penalty backed them up to their 18, but no one at Raymond James Stadium was doubting Bellisari.

However, the long pass was picked off by Brown, whose twisting cutback 37-yard return gave the Gamecocks hope.

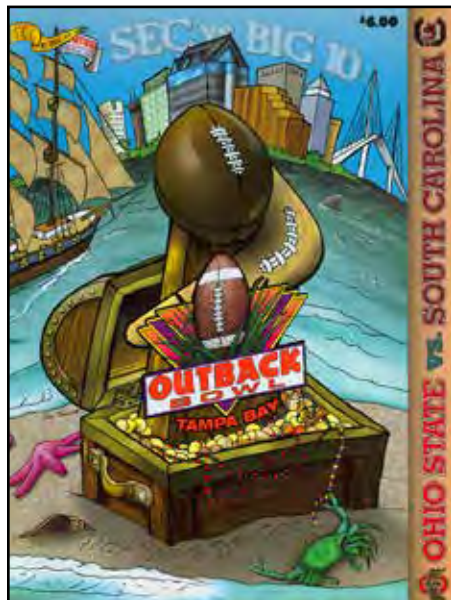
Petty had throws of 9 yards to Watson and 13 to Brian Scott that set up Carolina's first score, a 1-yarder by the 250-pound Pinnock.

On the Gamecocks' next drive, Petty passed to Scott for 30 yards and Pinnock for 9, ending things with Scott's 7-yard grab over freshman safety Dustin Fox to lead 14-0 at the half.

Petty started the third quarter with a 50-yard TD throw to Andrea Gause. Pinnock's 10-yard run made it 28-0 before the fun began.

Ohio State started strongly, forcing three first-quarter punts, including a bowl record 70-yarder by Tyeler Dean.

But after Bellisari hit Sanders on a 17-yard pass that was Ohio State's longest play at the time, defensive end George Gause stripped the ball to start the Gamecocks' first touchdown drive.

TAMPA, FLA. — South Carolina capped off its amazing turnaround season with an impressive 24-7 win over Ohio State in the 2001 Outback Bowl.

Claiming only the second bowl victory in the program's history, the Gamecocks ended the season 8-4 and ranked No. 19 in the AP rankings and No. 21 in the USA Today/ESPN poll.

Sophomore running back Ryan Brewer had a day to remember. The Troy, Ohio, native, who chose Carolina over his home-state university, dismantled the Buckeyes both on the ground and in the air. Brewer carried the ball 19 times, gaining 109 yards, and caught three passes for another 92 yards. The eventual game MVP was responsible for all of USC's touchdowns, scoring on runs of seven and two yards and a 28-yard TD reception early in the fourth quarter that put the game out of reach.

Also contributing on the offense for USC was quarterback Phil Petty. The junior was 9-of-19 for 175 yards and a touchdown. Jermale Kelly and Brian Scott each caught three passes.

Defensively, the Gamecocks were led by linebacker Kenny Harney who had a total of eight tackles (six unassisted), with two of those going for a loss. True freshman Deandre' Eiland contributed from his free safety position with two interceptions and tackles with three of them adding up to 17 yards of lost yardage for the Buckeyes.

MIAMI, FLA.— The Gamecocks defeated West Virginia 24-21 in the 1995 Carquest Bowl.

South Carolina quarterback Steve Taneyhill threw for one touchdown, ran for another and was named the game's MVP. Brandon Bennett rushed for 100 yards and fullback Stanley Pritchett scored the Gamecocks' final TD with a 1-yard power run.

The win was the first in nine bowl tries for South Carolina (7-5) and the fifth consecutive postseason loss for the Mountaineers (7-6).

Mountaineers tailback Jimmy Gray fumbled on their opening play and six plays later Taneyhill hit Boomer Foster for a 2-yard TD.

Quarterback Chad Johnston was driving West Virginia for a go-ahead score in the third quarter when the ball glanced off Lovett Purnell and was caught by cornerback Ben Washington. His twisting, juking, 42-yard return led to Pritchett's score, and West Virginia couldn't recover.

Still, the Mountaineers trailed by three throughout the final period, twice giving the ball up on downs in the final six minutes.

The Gamecocks had chances to extend the lead, but failed.

They went on a 12-play drive that got to West Virginia's 4, but Taneyhill was sacked and a field goal try was blocked.

Pritchett went on a 28-yard run with 1:14 left and was headed for a score, but fumbled the ball and West Virginia took over on its 3. Johnston, though, was sacked for the sixth time and Carolina's lead was safe.

Up 10-7, Taneyhill ended a 14-play drive just before halftime with his second touchdown run of the season. The junior ducked between two defenders, faked a throw at the line of scrimmage and dived over the top for a 4-yard score.

Reed Morton set a Carquest Bowl record with a 47-yard field goal, giving the Gamecocks a 10-0 lead in the second quarter.

West Virginia tripped itself up several times in the first half. Brooks stopped Kantroy Barber for no gain on fourth-and-2 at the Gamecocks 23. After the Mountaineers recovered Monty Means' fumble on South Carolina's next drive, Vanterpool lost the ball at the end of a 25-yard completion on the next play.

Another West Virginia sequence - this time an eight-play series - ended at South Carolina's 29 when Brooks knocked away a fourth-down pass to Robert Walker in the end zone.

Robert Walker gained 132 yards, including 62 during West Virginia's only scoring drive of the first half. He bounced through the left side for a 24-yard touchdown run to make it 10-7.

MEMPHIS, TENN.— Dave Schnell passed for 378 yards and two touchdowns, including an 88-yard game-breaking toss to Rob Turner, leading Indiana to a 34-10 Liberty Bowl victory over South Carolina.

The victory capped an 8-3-1 season for Indiana. Carolina ended the year 8-4. The Gamecocks never have won a bowl game, dropping to 0-8 with the loss.

Collin Mackie had kicked a 43-yard field goal for South Carolina, making it 20-10.

But Schnell then put the game away on the first play of the fourth quarter.

He spotted Turner behind the secondary and Turner pulled in the pass at the Gamecocks' 40. He never was touched on the longest scoring pass in Liberty Bowl history.

Indiana established its dominance on its first play from scrimmage as Anthony Thompson ignited an eight-play, 88-yard scoring drive with a 48-yard run to the Gamecocks' 40-yard line. Seven plays later, Thompson, who gained 63 yards on five carries during the drive and 140 yards in the game, scored from the 7.

Cornerback Erick Coleman set up the Hoosiers' next drive when he intercepted Todd Ellis at the Indiana 31 and brought the ball back to the Gamecocks' 40.

Schnell, who completed 16 of 31 passes and was named the game's most valuable player, took Indiana to the 10-yard line in four plays before connecting with Cal Miller for the Hoosiers' second touchdown.

Miller, who was slashing across the middle of the defense, took Schnell's pass at the 4 and sliced his way through two South Carolina defenders at the 1 for a 14-0 lead with 5:54 left in the half.

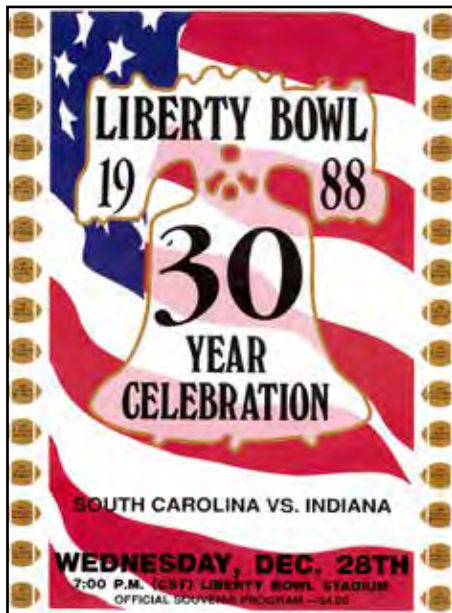
The Hoosiers turned another turnover into three points late in the half. Andre Hall halted a South Carolina drive at the Hoosiers' 16 with an interception with 2:23 left in the half.

Schnell and Tony Buford combined for a 46-yard pass play to the Gamecocks' 38 on first down. Thompson broke free along the left sideline on the next play, but stepped out of bounds at the 12.

The South Carolina defense then stiffened, and Peter Stoyanovich kicked a 28-yard field goal for a 17-0 lead at the half.

South Carolina's defense put the Gamecocks back in contention in the third quarter. Antonio Walker blocked a punt by Mackey Smith and Mike Tolbert picked it up and ran 34 yards for a score.

Indiana drove 55 yards to the South Carolina 1 later in the quarter, but a mishandled snap by Schnell and an incomplete pass forced another field goal by Stoyanovich, from 19 yards, and a 20-7 lead.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—South Carolina's blitzing defense backfired against seventh-ranked Louisiana State, which beat the Gamecocks 30-13 in the Gator Bowl.

LSU quarterback Tom Hodson eluded the South Carolina rush and threw three touchdown passes to wide receiver Wendell Davis, who was able to get open against the Gamecocks' one-on-one coverage. Hodson completed 20 of 32 passes for 224 yards.

Davis, LSU's all-time leading receiver, caught nine passes for 132 yards. The touchdown receptions covered 39, 12 and 26 yards.

Hodson's first two scoring passes to Davis came in the first five minutes of the game as the Tigers, who finished 10-1-1, jumped to an early 14-0 lead.

Louisiana State opened a 27-6 lead before ninth-ranked Carolina, 8-4, scored its only touchdown on a 10-yard run by Harold Green at the start of the fourth quarter.

South Carolina quarterback Todd Ellis, who broke a finger on his left hand in the second quarter, threw four interceptions and was sacked seven times for losses totaling 62 yards. Ellis completed 28 of 47 passes for 304 yards.

The Tigers took a 7-0 lead when Davis caught a sideline pass and eluded three tacklers on the 39-yard scoring play. That scoring drive was set up when Clapp sacked Ellis for a 20-yard loss, forcing the Gamecocks to punt from their own 16.

On South Carolina's next offensive series, LSU's Greg Jackson picked off an Ellis pass and returned it 48 yards to set up Hodson's second scoring pass.

Davis slipped behind South Carolina's secondary to catch a perfectly thrown ball by Hodson into the corner of the end zone as the Tigers took a 14-0 lead with 9:59 left in the opening quarter.

South Carolina took advantage of LSU's first turnover, a fumble by Davis at his own 32, to set up a 44-yard field goal by Collin Mackie.

David Brown dyke sandwiched field goals of 27 and 18 yards around a 39-yard field goal by Mackie in the second period as LSU took a 20-6 halftime lead.

The Tigers took a 27-6 lead when Davis pulled in Hodson's 26-yard scoring pass to climax their opening drive of the second half.

LSU's defense not only forced five South Carolina turnovers, but limited the Gamecocks' to 25 yards net rushing. Jackson picked off two Ellis passes, returning the interceptions for total of 92 yards.

Although he wasn't sacked, Hodson fumbled twice. Both fumbles were recovered by South Carolina noseguard Roy Hart.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—Tight end Barry Hanna, who had not scored all season, turned Rusty Hilger's short pass into a dramatic 25-yard touchdown with 1:04 left, lifting ninth-ranked Oklahoma State (10-2) to a 21-14 Gator Bowl victory over No. 7 South Carolina.

The bitter setback prevented South Carolina from winning for the first time in six bowl trips, although the Gamecocks, also 10-2, are the first team in the school's history to win more than eight games in a season.

Hanna caught Hilger's pass at the Carolina 21, evaded a would-be tackler and was hit at the 8-yard-line, but dragged three defenders into the end zone.

The winning touchdown capped an 88-yard drive in 11 plays, with Hilger completing six of eight passes for 75 yards, including a 13-yarder to Hanna on fourth-and-six from the South Carolina 49.

Oklahoma State thoroughly dominated the first half and took a 13-0 lead on Thomas' 1-yard run in the first period and his 6-yard pass to Hilger in the second quarter. But the Cowboys had to come from behind after South Carolina scored twice in the third period.

The Gamecocks, whose offense was the nation's ninth best during the regular season, were held to just 71 yards in the first two periods by State's 8th-ranked defense and were shut out for the first time in any half this year.

And even though they had the football for just 1:42 in the third quarter, they managed to take a 14-13 lead on halfback Quinton Lewis' 24-yard pass to Chris Wade and a 57-yard bomb from quarterback Mike Hold to Ira Hillary. The first strike covered 71 yards in four plays and 56 seconds, while the latter was a two-play, 77-yard thrust that took only 40 seconds.

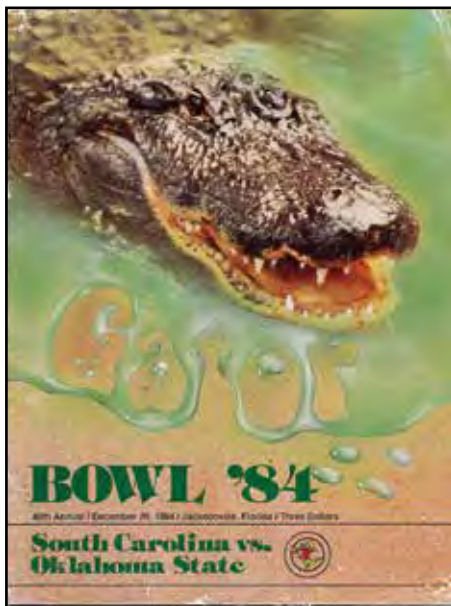
The Gamecocks' only other possession in the third period ended with a fumble on the first play, one of four South Carolina turnovers.

Oklahoma State's first-half touchdowns capped methodical, time-consuming drives of 69 and 74 yards.

Thomas and Hilger produced all the yards as Oklahoma State took a 7-0 lead on its first possession. Thomas carried eight times for 40 yards, while Hilger completed all four pass attempts for 29 yards.

The Cowboys made it 13-0 at 5:21 of the second period after linebacker Ricky Adams recovered a fumble by Hold at the OSU 26.

The 15-play drive included a 20-yard back-hand shovel pass from Hilger to Thomas. On third-and-goal from the six, Hilger pitched right to Thomas, and the tailback lobbed the ball back to the left to Hilger, who scored easily.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—South Carolina's second trip to the prestigious Gator Bowl was not much better than the first trip — 34 years before. The Pitt Panthers, gunning for a national championship, poured it on the Gamecocks, 37-9.

The game matched two nationally-ranked teams. Pitt came in with the #4 national ranking and South Carolina was ranked 17th. In addition, two of the nation's best athletes, South Carolina's George Rogers and Pitt's Hugh Green, were showcased. Rogers, who rushed for 113 yards, had won the Heisman Trophy while Green, who recorded five tackles, was honored as the nation's finest lineman with the Lombardi Trophy.

An unusually cold evening with temperatures in the 40s and 15 mph winds greeted the teams and South Carolina didn't react to the adverse conditions from the word go. Rogers broke open for a nice seven-yard gain on the first play, but fumbled with the Panthers recovering on the South Carolina 29 yard line. Seven plays and four minutes later Pitt scored to take a 7-0 lead, a lead they would not relinquish.

South Carolina finally got on the scoreboard before the half on a 39-yard Eddie Leopard field goal. At the half Pittsburgh led 17-3 and led 34-3 by the end of the third quarter as turnovers and an inability to move the ball plagued the Gamecocks.

Pat Bowen picked off a pass and returned it 31 yards to the 14-yard line with 3:34 left to play in the game. Quarterback Gordon Beckham then connected with Tim Gillespie for South Carolina's lone touchdown.

Grantz's passing enabled Carolina to finally get on the scoreboard late in the third quarter. He passed for 60 yards during the 13-play, 73-yard drive. The score came on a three-yard Tom Amrein dive.

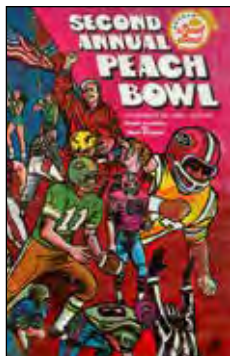
ATLANTA, GA.—South Carolina's first bowl game in 24 years was a defensive battle with West Virginia posting a 14-3 win in the Peach Bowl.

Late in the first half, Tommy Suggs led Carolina down the field and had a first-and-goal at the West Virginia 10 before a fumble thwarted the drive.

But a West Virginia fumble of a punt set up a score just before the half and place kicker Bill DuPre booted through a 37-yard kick to get on the board.

After a scoreless third quarter, Carolina mounted one serious drive that was stalled by a pass interception. West Virginia scored with 23 seconds left in the game, thanks to another pass interception.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA.—Despite a record-breaking 90-yard pass interception return for a touchdown, the South Carolina Gamecocks fell to old nemesis Wake Forest, 26-14 in the inaugural Gator Bowl.

This was the first bowl outing for the Gamecocks and the first and last season for coach Johnnie McMillan. He was filling in for coach Rex Enright who was completing his military obligation. Enright had a lot to do with the Gamecocks receiving the bid as he was stationed in the Jacksonville area.

The game was a rematch of sorts since weeks before Carolina and Wake Forest had played to a 13-13 deadlock. But playing in 55 degree weather before a near capacity crowd did not serve well.

Wake Forest jumped off to an early 6-0 first-quarter lead on a three-yard run by Nick Sacrinty. But the Gamecocks used the one-yard burst by Bobby Giles and a Dutch Brembs extra point to grab a 7-6 half time lead.

Wake Forest regained the lead with a Dick Brinkley run and the kick was blocked to lead, 12-7. Brinkley scored another touchdown early in the fourth quarter and added a 25-yard Bob Smathers run to blow to a 26-7 lead.

The only joy left for South Carolina in its first bowl appearance was the record-setting return by Brembs.

Michael Amiridis, the University of South Carolina's 30th president, is committed to using two of the university's greatest strengths — education and research — to improve prospects for all South Carolinians.

The challenges facing higher education are many, but President Amiridis is confident in the university's ability to address them with a commitment to excellence, transparency and accessibility. As the university's 30th president, he is drawing on his experience as a faculty member, academic administrator and higher education leader to guide South Carolina into its next era of success.

President Amiridis began his term at South Carolina on July 1, 2022. Prior to coming to USC, he had served as chancellor of the University of Illinois-Chicago since 2015.

Amiridis earned his Ph.D. in chemical engineering from the University of Wisconsin-Madison in 1991. As a researcher, he earned the National Science Foundation's award for early-career scientists and engineers in 1999. He was elected a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2012 and a fellow of the American Institute of Chemical Engineers in 2015.

During his tenure at UIC, the school completed a successful capital campaign that raised more \$750 million and saw six years of record campus enrollment, while winning national accolades for attracting an increasingly diverse student population. He served on the Chicagoland Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors for seven years.

Prior to his leadership at UIC, Amiridis spent more than two decades at the University of South Carolina in Columbia. He held positions as a chemical engineering professor, department chair, dean of the College of Engineering and Computing and, from 2009 to 2015, the university's executive vice president for academic affairs and provost. He received numerous awards as a professor, including the University of South Carolina's Michael J. Mungo Undergraduate and Graduate Teaching Awards and the Samuel Litman Distinguished Professor Award.

Amiridis was born in Greece and was recognized by Carnegie Corporation of New York as a Great Immigrant in 2022. He and his wife, Ero, have two children, both graduates of the University of South Carolina.

University of South Carolina Athletics Director Ray Tanner begins his 13th year guiding the Gamecocks' athletics programs. After a long and highly successful career as Carolina's baseball coach, Tanner officially began his new duties on Aug. 2, 2012.

As of June 1, 2024, the 12-year tenure of Tanner as Carolina's athletics director is currently the third-longest of an AD at the current school in the Southeastern Conference and the third-longest in USC history.

On March 17, 2023, Tanner was awarded a contract extension, keeping him in the AD's chair until 2026.

As reforms start to take place in intercollegiate athletics, Tanner has maintained the importance of the student-athlete experience at South Carolina. The athletics department has committed to giving each student-athlete the maximum amount of financial awards as allowed by the Alston vs. NCAA Supreme Court decision.

South Carolina has also put resources in place for its student-athletes to take advantage of the Name, Image, Likeness opportunities. Whether it is NIL compensation-generating opportunities or learning about promotion, branding and business, Gamecock student-athletes can succeed in this new landscape of intercollegiate athletics.

Under Tanner's watch, Gamecock student-athletes have achieved tremendous success in intercollegiate athletic competition, in the classroom and in the community.

Gamecock student-athletes have posted a cumulative 3.0 grade point average or better in 35-consecutive semesters. Since 2015, Gamecock student-athletes have earned more SEC Academic Honor Roll honors than any other school. In the Spring 2024 semester, 86 student-athletes earned President's List honors (4.0 GPA), while 188 made the Dean's List (3.5 GPA) and 411 made the Athletics Director's Honor Roll (3.0 GPA).

Under Tanner's watch, the Gamecocks have won four national championships (2014 equestrian, 2017, 2022 and 2024 women's basketball), 19 SEC regular season and tournament championships and have posted three of the top six finishes in the Learfield IMG College Directors' Cup All-Sports Standings in school history.

During Tanner's tenure as AD, the Gamecocks have had 42 teams finish in the Top 10 and 95 finish in the Top 25.

In September 2014, Tanner spearheaded the development of "The Gamecock Student-Athlete Promise," a document that showcases the depth and breadth of the commitments the South Carolina Athletics Department has made to its student-athletes. As part of the document, USC became the first school in the SEC to guarantee four-year scholarships for all qualifying sports. It also offers former student-athletes the opportunity to return to campus to complete their undergraduate degree as part of the "Gamecock Degree Completion Program."

In fulfilling The Promise, the Gamecock athletics department launched "Beyond Sports," a professional development and internship summer program for student-athletes, who wish to get "real world" experience in their field of study.

As part of giving Gamecock student-athletes a "championship experience", the commitment to develop the finest facilities in the nation continues.

Since taking on the athletics director role, every athletics program at USC has been

the beneficiary of either a new or significantly upgraded practice or competition facility. These include the Cyndi and Kenneth Long Family Football Operations Center, Springs-Brooks Plaza and the Bignon Game Day Center, Jerri and Steve Spurrier Football Indoor Practice Facility, USC Soccer Complex, Wheeler Beach Volleyball facility, Carolina Softball Stadium, practice courts, training rooms and weight rooms for basketball and volleyball, and locker rooms in Carolina Natatorium.

For the 2022 football season, Williams-Brice Stadium had new LED lighting, ribbon boards and audio upgrades to enhance the fan experience.

Prior to the 2020 football season, renovations to Williams-Brice Stadium included upgrades in premium seating for the East Side, West Side and South Lower, as well as a new "2001 Club" located near the team entrance.

Tanner has negotiated contracts for Gamecock Athletics that have created additional exposure and revenue for the department. As part of a 10-year agreement with IMG, a new center-hung scoreboard and 360-degree LED ribbon board was added to Colonial Life Arena in 2018. South Carolina's IMG marketing arrangement, finalized in 2016, was ranked as the seventh-largest in college athletics by the Portland Business Journal.

The Gamecocks have a 10-year contract with Under Armour as its official outfitter, which was signed in 2016. At that time, the contract was one of the 10 largest in college athletics, ranked by Forbes magazine.

During Tanner's tenure, revenues for Gamecock athletics have increased more than 45 percent. While the costs of sustaining a major college athletics department is increasing, Tanner is committed to giving Gamecock student-athletes a "championship experience."

Tanner ensured Gamecock student-athletes had the latest in safety and health precautions during the COVID-19 pandemic, working closely with campus and local health officials and represented their interests on the SEC and national collegiate level.

Tanner served on the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee for four years and was its chair for two seasons.

A dedicated community leader whose charitable organization, The Ray Tanner Foundation, has made a difference in many South Carolina families, a three-time National Coach of the Year and Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year, Tanner completed 16 years as head coach at the University of South Carolina, establishing one of the premier programs in college baseball prior to being named AD. He led the Garnet & Black to two NCAA Division I Baseball Championships, a pair of national runner-up finishes, six College World Series appearances, three SEC championships, six SEC Eastern division titles, a SEC tournament crown and 13 consecutive NCAA Tournament appearances.

Tanner gained valuable experience at an international level in his association with USA Baseball. He served five stints with Red, White and Blue, including in 2003 as head coach for the USA National Baseball Team. He was named the U.S. National Coach of the Year for his work that season.

Tanner was named the South Carolina head coach June 14, 1996, after nine successful seasons as head coach at his alma mater, North Carolina State.

His 16 years as Gamecock baseball coach is the 12th longest tenure of any coach in school history, and when adding his AD tenure, his 28 years would be the third longest in school history, only behind Mark Berson (43 years) and Arlo Elkins (28+ years).

Born March 25, 1958 in Smithfield, N.C., Tanner owns two degrees from NC State. He and his wife, Karen, have three children, Gracie, Maggie and Luke.

The University of South Carolina understands the importance of assisting the media in providing coverage of the institution, its athletics programs, administrators, coaches and student-athletes. Our goal is to disseminate information as widely, uniformly and fairly as possible using normally accepted media standards. To this end, the best attempt will be made to fill reasonable requests by recognized media outlets. Members of the media are encouraged to work with the South Carolina Athletics Communications and Public Relations staff to assist in that endeavor. **It is not permissible for media members to schedule interviews directly with any athletics department administrator, associate, coach or student-athlete without first working through the communications department.**

Press Credentials

Working press credentials for the 2024 South Carolina home football games must be requested online through www.sportssystem.com/clients/seccredentials. Credential requests must come from the sports editor or the sports director only.

It is not possible to accommodate all requests. No one under 18 years of age will be issued a credential without prior approval.

The credentialing system will begin operation approximately August 1. All credentials will be approved and issued on a game-by-game basis only. Requests should be made no later than seven (7) days prior to game day and will be approved the week of the game. Once approved, **ALL** credentials must be picked up on game day at Media Will Call, located on the west side of the stadium by the press box elevators. Media Will Call will open three (3) hours prior to kick-off. A photo ID must be presented to receive the press credential. Photographers must have appropriate equipment on hand to receive a sideline photo vest.

Note: Credentials will be considered only for those media members on specific assignment for a specific media outlet that meets the criteria below. Credentials are non-transferable and may be revoked at any time.

The granting and number of credentials for daily **NEWSPAPERS** will be based on the newspaper's circulation on a space-available basis.

Those newspapers publishing more than twice a week, but less than six, will have priority after those in the daily newspaper category.

WEBSITES that meet one of the following criteria will be issued a maximum of three (3) approved press box credentials, which includes the videographer, and one (1) field pass to be used for still photography.

1. Is the official website of the home or visiting school or its conference;
2. Is the official online service of a national over-the-air or cable television network;
3. Has a "national affiliate agreement" with or is an officially licensed site of a national or local news gathering organization and has at least one full-time employee dedicated to writing for the site; or
4. Is a local news gathering organization that has at least two full-time employees and is owned by a media company with multiple assets.

Websites that are an extension of a non-digital local media outlet (newspaper, radio, television) will not be issued credentials independent of their originating organization.

Sport-specific websites with more than two full-time writers will be considered on a case-by-case, space available basis.

No credentials will be issued to any website that is not deemed by the Athletics Communications department to have adequate editorial oversight. Credentials will not be approved to anyone who writes or posts under an alias.

TELEVISION stations will be issued a maximum of two (2) approved press box credentials. However, press box seating is not guaranteed for both credentials. Television stations will receive a maximum of one (1) field pass.

Local **RADIO** stations will be granted one (1) approved press box credential for a full-time host of a daily (Monday-Friday) sports show that is a minimum of 60 minutes in length. In addition, one (1) press box credential will be distributed per station for the sports director. Field passes will not be issued to radio stations. Non-daily local radio sports shows and out-of-market radio stations that have a daily sports show will be granted a maximum one (1) credential on a game-by-game, space available basis to the show's host or the station's sports director only.

STUDENT MEDIA outlets for the home and visiting schools will be issued credentials in accordance with the policy for their format (newspaper, website, radio, television). To be considered student media, the outlet must be sanctioned as such by the university, have full-time university staff overseeing the training of staff or be governed by a university-appointed board, and receive some portion of its funding from student fees.

PHOTO WIRE SERVICES that distribute nationally and retain all rights for sale and usage of any image taken at the event will be issued one (1) field pass with an option for a second on a game-by-game, space-available basis. Any wire service that sells/shares its images for non-editorial uses must provide the University of South Carolina Athletics Communications and Public Relations department with a statement indicating how it ensures that non-editorial clients use its images within NCAA

regulations to protect the name, image, likeness rights of the student-athletes.

All other credential requests, including weekly newspapers, magazines, specialty publications, etc. will be considered on a game-by-game and case-by-case basis at the discretion of Steve Fink, Associate AD/Communications. All credential policies are subject to change, and final approval of all credentials is at the discretion of the Associate AD/Communications.

Non-affiliated bloggers, podcast staff and freelance photographers and websites that are primarily focused on gambling will not be credentialed.

Media outlets that cover the visiting school will be considered using the credential criteria established and in consultation with that school's communications staff.

Media with Press Box only credentials are not allowed on the sidelines at any time until the teams have cleared the field following the game.

Sideline Policy

The University of South Carolina adheres to the NCAA and SEC guidelines regarding media representatives on the sidelines:

1. Accredited photographers must check in at Media Will Call and present photo ID. Those photographers working on the sidelines will be issued a vest. The vest must be worn at all times on the sidelines. No other type of photo or media credential will allow an individual access to the sidelines during the game.

2. Only working photographers/videographers with professional-grade cameras will be allowed on the field. A cell phone is not considered appropriate equipment. Those without proper equipment or not shooting the game will be escorted from the sidelines regardless of credential. "Runners" will not be issued a sideline pass.

3. Working photographers/videographers are permitted to shoot in the designated area (between the two marked dotted lines outside the team bench area). Media will not be allowed to shoot from either end zone.

4. A limited number of photographers will be assigned space to work in the photo work room, located on the field level of Williams-Brice Stadium. Wired and wireless internet are available. While security in this area is provided, the University of South Carolina is not responsible for the loss of any items.

5. According to NCAA policies, the presence of any type of photographer/videographer in the bench area is strictly prohibited with the exception of one (1) institutional videographer in the football bench area. According to the NCAA Football Rules and Interpretations Manual (Rule 1, Section 2, Article 4b): "the team area shall be limited to squad members in full uniform and





a maximum of 60 other individuals directly involved in the game. The 60 individuals not in full uniform shall wear special team area credentials." (Rule 1, Section 2, Article 4e): "No media personnel, including journalists, radio and television personnel, or their equipment, shall be in the team area or coaching box, and no media personnel shall communicate in any way with persons in the team area or coaching box."

The SEC also prohibits photographers/videographers from stopping and shooting from behind the bench area or into the bench area. The bench area at Williams-Brice Stadium is covered with a white tarp.

6. Photographers and videographers are considered working members of the media and they are to refrain from cheering or talking to players, coaches or officials.

7. Any individual regularly violating the sideline policy is subject to having their credential revoked. Revocation of the credential would be to the individual, not the outlet.

SEC Internet Real Time Policy

By acceptance and use of an SEC media credential, the holder agrees to the following conditions for any and all athletic events hosted by the SEC and its member institutions:

1. The SEC and its member institutions grant a media organization a limited license to use certain gathered information on the media organization's own Internet or online site beginning at the start of an athletic event and up to the conclusion of such event, all subject to the following limitations and conditions:

(A) No more than 10 still photographs may be used for news coverage of the game and other editorial purposes during the event.

(B) Videotape may only be shown as part of a single, non-archived, online "simulcast" of a television station's regularly scheduled news program.

(C) While a game is in progress, the use of statistical information is time-delayed and limited in amount so that an organization's Internet or online game coverage does not undercut the authorized and rights-paying fee organization's rights to play-by-play accounts of the game and/or exclusivity as to such rights.

2. Any proposed media use on an Internet or online site of the game information that is more detailed and/or more than described above will require separate written authorization by the SEC and/or its member institutions. However, such written authorization will not permit the use of game information in entertainment contexts and will not authorize game coverage that, due to immediacy of detail, constitutes or approaches a play-by-play account of a game.

3. Should any of these conditions be breached, the SEC and/or its member institutions will issue a written warning for the first violation. If this violation occurs during the last game of the institutions' regularly scheduled season, the media organization may not be credentialed for the SEC Championship. A second violation of this policy will result in revocation of credentials to cover future football games hosted by the SEC and/or its member institutions.

Press Box

South Carolina's press box (P-2 level) opens three hours prior to kick. It has 144 seats in the main area, along with radio booths, coaches' booths, scoreboard, replay, public address and

stadium operations/security booths. Located just above the press level is the photo deck. All members of the media covering the game are invited to a meal, which is served beginning two hours prior to kickoff. The broadcast television booth is located on the P-1 level.

Wireless internet is available for use. Wired outlets for photographers and videographers are available in the back of the press box.

The South Carolina press box is for the working media only. In accordance with the Football Writers Association of America, no cheering will be allowed.

In-Game Statistics

Media should utilize StatBroadcast for all the latest live statistical information during games. Visit gamecocks.statbroadcast.com for live scoring of all home football games. The password will be provided on game day. The Athletics Communications and Public Relations department supplies final team and individual statistics along with head coach and players' quotes.

Postgame Interviews

Both teams' postgame press conferences will take place in their respective media rooms. Coach Beamer will be available approximately 10 minutes after he leaves the playing field. Selected student-athletes will also be available in person following the cool-down period. **No interviews, other than those conducted by the rightsholders, should be conducted on the field following the game.**

Media Parking

Media parking is available in the Key Road parking lot, located southeast of Williams-Brice Stadium. Please contact Associate Director of Athletics Communications and Public Relations Kent Reichert at 803-777-5257 or by email at kentr2@mailbox.sc.edu for any parking needs. Digital parking passes will be distributed in advance via mobile device.

Visiting Radio

The visitor's radio network must be designated by the opponent's athletics director. The visiting radio booth is located at the far north end of the P-2 level. Any non-designated stations will be admitted on a space-available basis. The Gamecock Sports Network will be handled by Learfield. Stations requesting information regarding the network should contact: Liz McMillan at (803) 777-8254.

Login information to the department's media FTP site will be provided. Please credit GamecocksOnline when using footage from the FTP site.

Live Broadcasts

It is not permissible for any non-rightsholder to broadcast over the air, stream over the internet (audio or video), or transmit in any other way, including social media apps, any live event without the consent of the University of South Carolina Athletics Department. Live events include varsity contests, press conferences (including but not limited to weekly scheduled and postgame press conferences) and any other group media

availability. Exceptions may be made for any major news-breaking event and will be communicated prior to the event. No television live shots, with the exception of the rightsholder, may take place inside the stadium beginning 30 minutes prior to kickoff until the broadcast is concluded.

Non-Rightsholder Radio Appearances

South Carolina coaches will be limited to one appearance from one member of a sport's coaching staff per week on any radio station or any radio show that is aired as part of a state-wide, regional or national network in the Columbia market. The length of the interview should be no more than one segment, defined as "commercial-break to commercial-break." In addition, the same member of a sport's coaching staff or administrator cannot make appearances in consecutive weeks on the same radio station. Media outlets in which the institution or the SEC is contractually affiliated is exempt from this language. Exceptions can be made in the occurrence of a major "breaking news" event. Please work through the team's communications and public relations contact to help coordinate any request.

Game Day Media Availability

No University of South Carolina Athletics staff member may appear live on a non-rightsholder radio show during any Gamecock Radio Network-owned programming, including pre-game and post-game shows, live game action or coaches' call-in shows, without prior consent of Athletics Communications.

Student-Athlete Interview Policy

It is not permissible for media members to schedule interviews directly with any student-athlete without first working through the communications department. This allows the communications staff to arrange the interview when it best suits the student-athlete's and the reporter's schedules. Please contact the communications department well in advance to make your interview requests. Cell phone numbers for student-athletes will not be provided to the media. Should you need to conduct a telephone interview with a student-athlete, a call will be placed to you from the student-athlete at a mutually agreeable time.



Gamecock Sports Properties, a partnership between the University of South Carolina Athletics Department and the country's leaders in the collegiate sports marketing industry, Learfield, is the originating medium for radio coverage of the South Carolina Gamecocks.

2024 marks the eighth year of a 10-year extension between the University and Learfield that runs through 2026. The extension adds to an agreement between the University of South Carolina and Learfield that dates to 2003. 2024 is also the third year of a five-year extension with Cumulus Media for WNKT-FM (107.5 The Game) to continue as the official flagship station of Gamecock Athletics.

Gamecock Sports Properties is responsible for the overall management of the athletics program's corporate partnership effort, which includes producing, selling and distributing the Gamecock Radio Network (live play-by-play and call-in shows) and coaches television shows, print advertising in various athletics department publications, and selected signage in university athletic facilities.

The Gamecock Sports Network from Learfield counts two dozen affiliate stations for the 2024-25 season. For Sirius/XM subscribers, follow the Gamecock Radio Twitter page for weekly updates on channel information for Gamecock broadcasts.

Todd Ellis, the all-time leading passer in Gamecock history, is in his 33rd season with the network and his 22nd as the play-by-play voice of Carolina football. Ellis previously served as sideline reporter for the radio network and as a color analyst and play-by-play announcer for Comcast Sports Southeast for Gamecock telecasts. Ellis has also hosted the coaches television show and served on CBS's bowl game radio coverage. He hosts the Shane Beamer Television Show and Carolina Calls with Shane Beamer, the Coach's weekly radio call-in show. Ellis set more than 20 school passing marks during his career (1986-89) while throwing for 9,953 yards.

Tommy Suggs, a former standout Gamecock quarterback, is back for his 52nd year as color analyst for the radio network. Suggs played for Carolina from 1968-70 and is regarded as one of the school's all-time premier signal-callers. He led the Gamecocks to the 1969 ACC championship and Peach Bowl berth and was named MVP of the 1970 Blue-Gray All-Star Classic. Suggs was inducted into the University's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989 and is also a member of the state of South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame. In 2012, friends and colleagues of Tommy and Jane Suggs established the Tommy Suggs Endowed Quarterback Scholarship to honor his long-time commitment to the University and Gamecock Athletics. The scholarship is awarded to a quarterback each year and was the first endowed scholarship for the football program.

Chet Tucker returns for his second season as the sideline reporter for the Network. Tucker is not new to Carolina Football, having previously served as a co-host for the network's pregame and postgame shows. Tucker was a placekicker/punter on the Carolina football squad in the late 1990s, including a stint as the starting placekicker at the end of the 1998 season while playing for head coach Brad Scott.

Liz McMillan serves as the Executive Director of Gamecock Sports Properties in Columbia, while **Nick Kistler** is the General Manager. **David Spence** is the spotter and **Doug Adams** is the statistician. **Chris Miller** returns for his sixth season hosting for the Network, participating throughout the six-hour gameday broadcast.

The weekly **Carolina Calls** show airs Thursdays from 6-7 p.m. on the flagship station of the Gamecocks, WNKT-FM, across the Palmetto State on the Gamecock Radio Network and over the Internet at GamecocksOnline.com. It is conducted live each week at Backstreets Grill, 2400 Devine Street.

SEC Tops in Fan Support

The SEC has led the nation in total attendance in football every year since 1981 and since 1988, the SEC has led the nation in average attendance. An average attendance of 76,667 witnessed first-hand, the excitement of SEC football in 2022. The average capacity of the 14 SEC stadiums during the last 10 years, excluding the COVID year of 2020, has been over 97 percent. Every year since 1988, the SEC has had at least four teams ranked in the top 10 in average attendance, with six in the top-10 in 2022.

SEC Shines in NFL Draft

- The SEC led the nation's conferences in NFL Draft picks for the 18th-consecutive year in 2024 with 59 selections.
- For the 13th time in the last 14 years, the SEC tied or led the nation in First Round NFL Draft selections, as the league produced 11 opening-round draft picks.
- During the last 20 NFL Drafts, the SEC has a nation-leading 179 players taken in the opening round, an average of nearly nine per season.
- 2024 marked the 10th-straight year for the SEC to see 50 or more players taken in the NFL Draft. Only three times in the last 29 years has another conference other than the SEC seen 50 or more players drafted.
- 2024 was the eighth-consecutive year the SEC has seen 25 or more players selected through the first three rounds of the NFL Draft.
- The SEC has averaged over 50 selections per draft since 2006.
