
We also are moving forward with the initial plans for our 2016 Quilt Show. I hope you will consider which committee you will be joining.



PROGRAMS AND WORKSHOPS

After a busy week, I finally had a chance to look over the four patch blocks we made at the March meeting. Everyone did a great job and we have enough blocks for two hospice quilts. I plan to finish assembling them at our March quilt weekend, and once quilted, will show them at our May meeting.

April 14-15: Program and workshop. AQS author Robert DeCarli will present Remarkable Rectangles. His primary interest, besides teaching, is designing various size, interlocking log cabins and converting weaving patterns to quilts. In each area, the number of possibilities is seemingly endless, but he pursues them one at a time. I'm very excited to have Bob presenting this program and workshop. The workshop is filled.

THIRTEEN STATES



Supplies: Sewing machine, bobbins, thread (gray), ruler, cutting mat, rotary cutter, scissors, pins, pencil and paper

Materials: one yard of the dark and one yard of the light.

Cutting:

Dark: three 3/4" strips; seven 1" strips; three 1 1/2" strips.

Light: three 3/4" strips; three 1" strips; one 1 1/4" strip; one 1 3/4" strip; three 2" strips; one 2 1/4" strip; two 3" strips; one 3 1/4" strip and one 3 1/2" strip.

The book: Remarkable Rectangles – Martingale 2014.

May: Pot Luck Dinner starting at 6:30. The quilts from our March meeting will be presented to a representative from hospice...and we'll all have a chance to win a prize!

June 9-10: Suzi Parron of Stone Mountain, Georgia is the author of "Barn Quilts and the American Trail Movement". She will present our program and then offer a workshop where you can paint your own quilt block. Sign ups for the workshop began at the March meeting. The cost is \$35 for the workshop. Most materials will be supplied.

Barn Quilt Painting Workshop

with Suzi Parron, author of "Barn Quilts and the American Quilt Trail Movement" Join the barn quilt movement by creating your own painted quilt block. You will begin with a pre-primed board and go through each step—drafting, taping, and painting, with careful attention to detail.

- 1 We will spend 3-4 hours together; once painting begins, you may work at your own pace.
- Depending on your design, you will leave with a finished quilt block or with one last color (which will be provided) to add at home. Ready for show and tell at your next meeting!

 The finished product will be two-by-two feet and is the perfect size for mounting on smaller buildings. After the workshop, you will have the knowledge and skills to paint blocks of any size.

CRANBERRY WALNUT QUINOA SALAD

- 1 cup quinoa
- 1 cup dried cranberries
- 1 cup frozen green beans, defrosted
- 1/4 cup walnuts, chopped
- 1/4 cup green onions, sliced
- 1/4 cup balsamic vinegar
- 1-1/2 tablespoons olive oil
- 4 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Combine quinoa with 2 cups water in a medium saucepan and bring to a boil over high heat. Reduce heat to a simmer, cover, and continue cooking until all water is absorbed.

In a medium bowl combine cooked quinoa, dried cranberries, green beans, walnuts and green onions until well mixed. In a small bowl, whisk the balsamic vinegar, olive oil and garlic until well blended. Pour over the quinoa mixture. Toss until well blended. Season with salt and pepper to taste. Chill for at least 30 minutes before serving.

BABY BANK

A "baby bank" was started a few years ago to help provide small baby needs to the Nurse Family Partnership of the Visiting Nurse Assoc. at St. Luke's. NFP is a program that pairs a specially trained registered nurse with a first time, low income mom. The nurse will provide home visits throughout the pregnancy until the child is 2 years of age. The goal is to promote & teach positive health & attachment behaviors between the mother & her baby. Currently, 250 families are being served by NFP.


BLOCK OF THE MONTH - PAPER PINWHEELS


COLOR 1 - ANY BRIGHT SUMMERY COLOR PRINTS OR SOLIDS This makes a 12" block! COLOR 2 - MUSLIN

** Preparing the Pieces and Sewing the Block **






First mark and cut the Color 1 and Color 2 3-1/2" x 14" strips into four 3-1/2" squares of Color 1 and eight of Color 2...




Now stack the Color 1 and Color 2 3-7/8" x 7-3/4" strips right sides together and all edges aligned. On the back of the top strip lightly draw in the 3-7/8" square line, then mark in the diagonals as well. Sew 1/4" above and below the marked diagonals. Cut apart on the square line and on the marked diagonals between the rows of stitching. This will give you four half squares. Press seams towards darker fabrics. These should measure 3-1/2" square...



Now just piece the block, by sewing together four rows as shown at left, using the units we just made. Press seams in alternating directions by row to keep your seams lying nice and flat!
