

 one children's oncology quilt (42" by 44" or 42" by 54") - to be donated to Lehigh Valley Hospital Muhlenberg two preemie quilts (18" by 25") -to be donated to Sacred Heart Hospital and St. Luke's Hospital NICU two mastectomy pillows and bags - to be donated to Lehigh Valley Hospital Cedar Crest four teddy bears or cats - to be donated to St. Luke's Hospital Emergency Department one wounded soldier quilt (55" by 65"minimum donated to Quilts of Valor Foundation (<u>http://www.qov.org</u>) to be sent
Lois Walters has a longarm quilter and will help choose the batting and quilt your Quilt of Valor on her longarm machine, To reach her check our members directory on the Member's Only section on our website
 one Visiting Nurses Association (VNA) of St. Luke's Hospice quilt (63" x 93") two pillowcases- can be for hospice at Lehigh Valley or St Lukes, or a child's theme pillowcase for peds oncology at Lehigh Valley hospital NICU covers for incubators (48" x 55" finished size)
NICU covers are easy to make one children's panel with a contrasting border to create the right size, or you can use 1-1/4 yard of a children's print and add borders to create the needed size. PLease use a light color fabric for the back. Simple quilting can use diagonal quilting one or both ways. Add a binding and wahoo you're done!
Please sew your own label on your Oncology and wounded warrior quilts and hospice quilts and nightgowns. - "Made and Donated by Colonial Quilters Guild 2014 or 2015 - whenever you finish. Thank you.

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BLOCK OF THE MONTH

Keep up the great response to the Block of the Month!! This month we will be making a scrappy Christmas Tree, a great way to use up all your green scraps. Muslin is used for the background and a small piece of brown for the tree trunk. Put 4 together for a great table runner!! Maybe you will win enough to make a whole forest!!



BLOCK OF THE MONTH - SCRAPPY CHRISTMAS TREE

CUHING MUSLIN ASST GREEN CUT a - 21/2" Squares Cut 1 - 2'2x12'2 Strip aut 2 - 21/2 x 31/2 strips 1-a/2×101/2 CUT 2 - 21/2×41/2 1-21/2×81/2 1-21/2×61/2 CUT2 - 21/2× 51/2 CUTZ - 21/2×6/2 1- 21/2×41/2 CUTZ - 21/2 × 10 Brown Cut 1 - 1/2x 21/2

Sewing

Sew using a ¼" seam allowance with right sides together (RST) unless otherwise indicated. Always press towards the darker fabric while assembling, unless otherwise noted by the arrows.

Block Assembly

1. Sew one 2 ½" x 6" Mu5 10 strip to each side of one 1 ½" x 2 ½" ' Oraun strip to make one tree trunk (Fig. 1).

2. Place one 2 ½" (NUS) in . square on the left side of one 2 ½" x 12 ½" green strip, right sides together (Fig. 2). Sew across the diagonal of the Fabric E square from the upper right corner to the lower left corner (Fig. 2). Flip open the triangle formed and press (Fig. 3). Trim away the excess fabric from behind the triangle, leaving a ¼" seam allowance.

3. Place another 2 ½" MuSh of square on the right side of the 2 ½" x 12 ½" of Reco strip, right sides together (Fig. 4). Sew across the diagonal of the Fabric E square from the upper left corner to the lower right corner (Fig. 4). Flip open the triangle formed and press (Fig. 5). Trim away the excess fabric from behind the triangle, leaving a ¼" seam allowance to complete Row 1 of the tree.



5. Place one $2 \frac{1}{2}$ " $x \frac{3}{2}$ " MuSh strip on the left side of one $2 \frac{1}{2}$ " $x 10 \frac{1}{2}$ " Green strip, right sides together as shown in Figure 6. Sew across the diagonal of the square formed by the two overlapping fabrics from the upper right corner to the lower left corner (Fig. 6). Flip open the Fabric F strip and press (Fig. 7). Trim away the excess fabric from behind the triangle, leaving a $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam allowance.



6. Place another 2 1/2" x 31/2" MUS IN strip on the right side of the 2 1/2" x 10 1/2" QCLEN. strip, right sides together (Fig. 8). Sew across the diagonal of the square Fig. 7 formed by the two overlapping fabrics from the upper left corner to the lower right corner (Fig. 8). Flip open the triangle formed and press (Fig. 9). Trim away the excess fabric from behind the triangle, leaving a ¼" seam allowance to complete Row 2 of the tree. Fig. 8 7. : 8. Repeat Steps 5-6 using 2-2 1/2" x 4 1/2" MNSIN strips and / -2 1/2" x 8 1/2" Green Fig. 9 strips to make Row 3 Unit. (Fig. 10). 9. Repeat Steps 5-6 using 2 - 2 1/2" x 5 1/2" MUS In strips and 1-2 1/2" x 6 1/2" green C strips to make Row 4 Unit. (Fig. 11). 10. Repeat Steps 5-6 using 12-2 1/2" x 6 1/2" MUS In. strips and 1-2 1/2" x 4 1/2" queen strips to make ____ Row 5 Unit. (Fig. 12). Fig. 11 Fig. 10 Fig. 12 11. Sew together one tree trunk unit and one each of Rows 1-5 to make one tree block (Fig. 13). Fig. 13

November Refreshments


