THE GLORY OF THE STORY

(The Paradoxes of Christmas)
Luke 2:1- 20

Jesus descended from the peak of glory to the lowly position of birth in a manger in order that He might raise us from our lowly position to His glory. **This is a paradox.** (Paradox - a statement that seems contrary to common sense and yet is perhaps true. A paradox is an apparent contradiction).

Let's look at five (5) contrasts which illustrate this central paradox.

1. Human Birth and Heavenly Birth.

First there is a contrast between Luke 2:11 and John 1:12. Both deal with birth; **Human birth** and **Heavenly birth**.

The point is that Jesus underwent a human birth so that we who believe in Him might have a heavenly birth. Jesus became a man, was born below, that we might be born above. Jesus was born a baby in a shepherd's pen that we might have the glory of a spiritual heavenly birth.

Have you become a child of God?

"If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come" (2 Corinthians 5:17).

2. A Manger and a Mansion

Second, there is the contrast between Luke 2:7 and John 14:3. A **manger** on earth and a **mansion** in heaven.

As Christians, we are just pilgrims here, our true home is in heaven.

How do we get to our mansion? Through a door to heaven. Jesus said, "I am the door."

John 14:6, "I am the way, the truth and the life; no one comes to the father but through me."

3. The Contrast between a Human Family and God's Family.

Thirdly, there is a contrast between a **Human Family** and **God's Family**. We take **Matthew 2: 11** and place it alongside **Galatians 3:26**

Here we see that **Jesus became a member of a human family** so that **we** might become **members of God's family.**

Are you a member of God's family?

We become members of God's family through faith/trust in the Lord Jesus Christ. This is the **Good News.**

What is the Good News (the Gospel)?

The way to be saved by Him **is not works of merit,** but **faith in the God who justifies the ungodly** (Romans 4:5, 5:1; Ephesians 2:8-9; 1Corinthians 2:9).

The angel delivered, "The good news for all people, a Savior has been born to you."

4. Poverty and Riches.

Fourthly, the contrasts of **Poverty** and **Riches.** Matthew 8:20 says that during the days of His earthly ministry the Lord was so poor that He had "no place to lay His head."

We have been made rich with salvation; rich with forgiveness of sins, rich with the fullness of God the Spirit, rich with a life planned and protected by God, rich with a life of serving the living God, rich with a home in glory, rich with an abundance of brothers and sisters in Christ! **Yes, through His poverty we have been made very rich!**

Now that we are rich in Christ, are we generous like Christ? God gave His all - His Son. Christ gave His life.

"It is more blessed to give than to receive." (Acts 20:35b)

5. Humble Shepherds and Heavenly Angels.

In the fifth contrast, Shepherds and Angels, is found between Luke 2:16 and Luke 15:10.

Jesus was welcomed by poor, humble shepherds at His birth, and we in contrast at our new birth are welcomed by angels.

Conclusion.

These are the great contrasts of the Christmas story. It is that which makes **Christmas irresistibly attractive.** It is the reversal of roles at God's cost for our benefit: (1) Jesus endured a **human birth** to give us a **new spiritual birth.** (2) He occupied a stable (a **manger**) that we might occupy a **mansion.** (3) Jesus had an **earthly mother** so that we might have a **heavenly Father.** (4) He **left His home in glory to give us glory.** (5) He became **poor** that we might be **rich.** (6) He was **welcomed by shepherds** at His birth whereas we at our new birth are **welcomed by angels.**

Jesus was "laid in a manger" A wooden manger (feeding trough; feeding box) and died on a wooden cross.
