The trial of Jesus before Pilate? Most commentators, even most Bibles with headings, describe this section of John this way. But in a spiritual sense, the tables are actually turned. For the three characters of this story, they are on trial before God incarnate when they showed the kind of heart they had in the circumstances they were in.

Sadly, what we see here is a picture of three kinds of people without God, who will find themselves forever without God:

- 1. THE TRIAL OF THE ENEMIES OF JESUS: PEOPLE DETERMINED TO BE AGAINST GOD (VV. 28-32)
 - The story continues with Jesus being led before the Gentiles, because the Jews were powerless to execute Him by crucifixion. They wished to ensure that Jesus was not viewed as a martyr for God's cause, but as an impostor who died under the curse of God (*Deuteronomy 21:23*). How little they knew! Jesus took God's curse on Himself willingly for all mankind (*Galatians 3:13*).
 - By their own admission, the Jews had prejudged Jesus in a mockery of a trial. And by their own admission, the Jews had unwittingly fulfilled Jesus' prophecies by making Him die through crucifixion, at the hands of Gentiles like us (John 12:32, Matthew 20:18-19). By their own admission, the enemies of God had sealed their own fate by their own unrepentance.
 - The only unpardonable sin today is unrepentant unbelief. As believers, we do not give up living out and sharing the gospel, because we never know when it is God's time to move the unrepentant. But for those decided against Jesus, let this serve as a warning: as the commercial ditty goes "we seal our fate with the choices we make."

2. THE TRIAL OF PILATE BEFORE JESUS: PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT AGAINST GOD, BUT FOR THEMSELVES (VV. 33-38)

- As Pilate stood before the living embodiment of Truth, he had opportunity after opportunity to realize Who really stood before him, and to come to faith in that Person. But political, legal, and personal considerations stood in the way.
- This would be the first of two chances Pilate had to release Jesus. He failed at both. Not all the water in the world could cleanse his hands or conscience, because he knowingly let an innocent man be condemned, for self-serving reasons.
- There are people who refuse to acknowledge Jesus as Lord and Savior because of
 what it will cost them. How many will be in hell because they feared people and
 sought to please them! Does Pilate represent who you are?

3. THE TRIAL OF THE CROWD BEFORE JESUS: PEOPLE WHO ARE NOT AGAINST GOD, BUT FOR ANYONE ELSE BUT GOD (VV. 38-40)

- When the crowd was given a choice, they chose the one who was popular, who represented their selfish hopes of political, earthly liberation. In doing so, they failed to realize they needed to be saved from themselves and the eternal consequences of choosing self over God.
- It's a principle we see in the Bible over and over again: the majority is NOT always
 right; numbers don't always indicate the will or favor of God. Matthew 7:13-14
 says, "For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and
 many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life,
 and only a few find it."

Yet how often do we let our preferences be dictated by the standard of popularity? That best-selling book, that super popular motivational speaker, that hyped-up attractional service of a popular church may have the figures going for them, but does it indicate the will and favor of God? Let your preferences be driven by the standards of the Word of God, never by the standards of men.

FINAL THOUGHTS

I pray you will not find a picture of yourself here. If you do, now is the day of salvation. No one comes to Jesus, pleading for forgiveness and salvation, who is ever turned away.

But we all know and love certain people who are represented here. Take the same message then, that saved you, driven by the urgency of the brevity of life and the reality of the judgment of God, and "snatch them from the fire"! May God grant you success in this endeavor

The Shepherd's Voice

Having been asked, let me answer why GCF is one of the few megachurches still doing praise and worship with lights on. This excerpt from an article* by Ronni Kurtz help explain why:

WHY WE SING WITH THE LIGHTS ON by Ronni Kurtz

I'm a pastor at a church comprised of Millennials. Our church is a prime candidate for loud, attractive music sung in a dimly lit room with an impressive worship team. Yet we sing in a completely lit room; no lasers, no candles, no dimmed lights, or anything of the sort. So why do we sing with the lights on?

1. Fellow members are evidence of grace

The brothers and sisters who are next to you singing on Sunday morning, like you, are miracles of God's saving grace. It would be a shame if you couldn't witness them praise the author and sustainer of their faith for the sake of mood lighting.

Whatever gain there might be in lowering the lights during worship, it's hard to imagine the advantages of a dim room could outweigh the wonder found when you observe blood-bought-saints around you praise their King.

2. Christianity and the corporate reality

One of the arguments for a dimly lit room during service is to eliminate distractions so that the attendee can focus on what they sing to Jesus. Yet I fear that in our attempt to eliminate distractions we've also eliminated the corporate reality of worship.

Christianity is a corporate faith where we all march together toward the Promised Land. It is in this corporate identity that we are given the charge to, "see to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God" (*Hebrews 12:15*). Those fellow members you might be tempted to count as distractions are the very ones who will make sure that you don't die on the banks of the Promised Land.

3. Confidence in another person's Jesus

There have been many times...due to something in my life—whether it be sin, doubt, fear, or something else—I didn't feel I was in a place where I could truly worship without being fake.

On most of these Sundays, what pulled me out of this rut was singing with the saints at my local church. A friend of mine once said...Sometimes I need to borrow someone else's faith." That's what happens to my cold soul on these hard Sunday mornings. While I might not feel enough confidence in Jesus to sing that morning, my brother does, and I can trust him.

Conclusion

Friends, consider keeping the lights on this Sunday...a glare on the screen, a potential distraction from another member, or some imperfection that may be noticed cost little compared to the tremendous gift of witnessing redeemed brothers and sisters sing to their Savior

For 'In him we live and move and have our being'.

- Acts 17:28a (NSRV)

It is easier to see creation as a display of God's power. But God is more than someone who creates, more than a god who seems to be out there, far removed and detached from His creation. The God revealed in the Bible is so much more than that of an all-powerful, distant God. In Scripture we see the God who is near, a God whose name means presence. We see a God who is all-powerful in His love.

Ultimately, in Jesus, we see God with flesh and blood. In Jesus, we see once again, God walking in the evening breeze, seeking humanity, "Where are you?" We see God with feet that walked the earth, and hands that touched the dirt of broken humanity.

These hands and feet encountered the powers that held hostage God's beloved. As Christ served, the power of sin was revealed at work in human hearts. These hands and feet, which encountered humanity, were pierced and nailed on the cross. The hostaged humanity became His murderers.

But God is love. In His death, He forgave, for His love is stronger than the grave. The love that reached out to humanity has conquered death, and has given hope to all humanity—a hope that that in God there is forgiveness, life, and love.

As we partake and participate in the communion, let us ask God to make us see it both as a celebration and an invitation. We celebrate Christ's finished work on the cross, remembering our guilt and shame is now forgiven. And we receive His invitation to us: to be His hands and His feet, seeking the lost, giving rest to the restless, and walking alongside the broken

God's Way to Heaven

THE GOSPEL

"Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day according to the Scriptures."

(1 Corinthians 15:3-4).

THE TRUTH ABOUT GOD

God is holy and righteous: "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty, the whole earth is full of his glory" (*Isaiah 6:3*). **He requires holiness of us as well:** "Be holy, for I am holy" (*1 Peter 1:16*).

THE TRUTH ABOUT MAN

Man is sinful: "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (*Romans 3:23*). Sin demands a penalty: "For the wages of sin is death" (*Romans 6:23*).

THE TRUTH ABOUT CHRIST

Christ is the expression of God's love for us: "God demonstrates his own love for us in this: while we were still sinners, Christ died for us" (Romans 5:8). Christ paid the penalty of our sins and died for sinners: "For Christ died for sins once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous, to bring you to God" (1 Peter 3:18). Through Christ, God offers man reconciliation: "God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting men's sins

against them" (2 Corinthians 5:18). WHAT SHOULD WF DO?

Believe and receive Jesus as Lord and Savior: "If you confess with your mouth, 'Jesus is Lord,' and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved" (*Romans 10:9*).

PRAYER: Lord Jesus Christ, Son of God, have mercy on me, a sinner. I believe that you died on the cross in my place, to save me from my sins, and I accept you as my Savior, and the Master of my life forever. Amen.
