A Time for **Assembly**

Introduction to gather together through an ice breaker (10 minutes)

Scripture Reading: Genesis 21:1-21

WORD

A Time for Admonition

Instruction to communicate one's investigation of the story (content), interpretation based on the setting (context), and integration of the two for the spiritual truth (concept) (50 minutes)

- 1. Genesis 21:2 of the New American Standard Bible (NASB) version reads, "So Sarah conceived and bore a son to Abraham in his old age, at the appointed time of which God had spoken to him." What does Isaac's birth show about God's attributes (21:1-2)?
- When Sarah first heard of God's promise that she will bear a son, how did she laugh (Genesis 18:10-12)? How did Sarah laugh this time, when Isaac was born (21:6,7)?
- 3. What were Sarah's reasons for asking Abraham to drive Hagar and Ishmael away (21:9,10)?

- 4. Ishmael was already a teenager when Isaac was born. Abraham appeared to have grown in his affection toward Ishmael. What caused him to follow Sarah's demand to drive Hagar and Ishmael away (21:11-14)?
- 5. What are the serious and lasting consequences of Abraham and Sarah's lack of faith in the promise of God (21:19-21)? Read Genesis 25:13-16.

WALK

A Time for **Accountability**

Invitation to apply the implication of the Scripture (connect), implementation of a specific action (condúct), and intercession for the saints/seekers (concern) (about 35 minutes)

- What would you plan to do to reconcile with a family member you have a conflict with?
- 2. Would your growth group consider visiting an orphanage as your outreach project this year?
- 3. How can the group pray for you? Share now your personal needs or concerns with your accountability and prayer partners. These may include attitudes that need to be changed and/or specific actions to be done in obedience to God's Word. As you intercede for each other, pray also for others outside the group who need to know Jesus.
