Psalm 25 Of David.

¹To you, O Lord, I lift up my soul.

²O my God, in you I trust;
let me not be put to shame;
let not my enemies exult over me.

³Indeed, none who wait for you shall be put to shame;
they shall be ashamed who are wantonly treacherous.

⁴Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths.
 ⁵Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation; for you I wait all the day long.

⁶Remember your mercy, O Lord, and your steadfast love, for they have been from of old.

WORD: *Understanding the Word*

Introduction

It has been said that reading and meditating upon the Bible keeps us from sin, and sin keeps us from the Bible. But God is gracious. Even though our sins may keep us from spending time with God and his Word, God continues to reach out to us. And once we have turned from our sins and placed our trust in him alone, we can be assured that God's love and faithfulness will always be with us, to keep our lives in tune with him, no matter the circumstances surrounding us.

Leader: Lead in reading Psalm 25 aloud together. Then read the paragraph on the "Key Verse."

Key Verse: This psalm focuses on the Lord's ways and teachings/instructions. But God's teachings are not just for the righteous; they are primarily for the unrighteous. It shows that "good and upright is the Lord; therefore he instructs sinners in the way."

WALK: Applying the Word

Questions for Adults

- 1. How intentional are you in knowing God's ways? What are you doing in order to walk in it?
- 2. How do you feel knowing that God instructs and forgives you according to his character, and not based on your merits? If God's forgiveness does not depend on people's merits (or lack of it), then why do people avoid God when they sin?
- 3. How confident are you that God's love and faithfulness remains with you despite the difficulties and trials of life? What are some things that may shake your trust in him?
- 4. Commit to set aside a portion of time each day to read, study, and meditate upon God's Word. Put in a journal the things you learn each day.
- 5. Individually and as a group, pray back this psalm to God. You could start by saying something like:
 - Father, thank you for being faithful and trustworthy. Reveal yourself to me that my heart and mind may be transformed to be more like yours.
- 6. Pray for our country (Prayer requests supplied by the Leader.)

Questions for the Youth

- 1. It's difficult to open up to a complete stranger. There is the risk of being judged or misunderstood. Who are people whom you can fully open up to? Why are you able to open up to them?
- 2. God knows you through and through. He knows you better than you know yourself because he is the one who created you. Are you able to open up to him? What are things that prevent you from being able to do so?
- 3. Athletes have coaches to guide them. Students have professors to teach them. Do you have somebody who guides you through life? Commit to set aside some time to read, study, and meditate on God's Word every day.

Questions for Children

- 1. In moments of trouble and difficulty, where should we go for help? In whom should we trust? Where do we go when we need guidance and truth?
- 2. Verse 8 says that the Lord leads us in the way we should go through his Word. How many times in a week do you read and study the Bible? Pray that God will help you read and obey his Word more consistently.
- 3. In verse 14, David says those who fear the Lord will receive his friendship. What kind of friend do you think God is? Describe in your own words.
- 4. Do you know of somebody who needs a friend like Jesus? Pray for them that they may get to know him through you.
