Psalm 90

A Prayer of Moses, the man of God.

¹Lord, you have been our dwelling place in all generations.

²Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever you had formed the earth and the world, from everlasting to everlasting you are God.

³You return man to dust and say, "Return, O children of man!"
⁴For a thousand years in your sight are but as yesterday when it is past, or as a watch in the night.

⁵You sweep them away as with a flood; they are like a dream, like grass that is renewed in the morning:

⁶in the morning it flourishes and is renewed; in the evening it fades and withers.

⁷For we are brought to an end by your anger; by your wrath we are dismayed. ⁸You have set our iniquities before you, our secret sins in the light of your presence.

⁹For all our days pass away under your wrath; we bring our years to an end like a sigh.

WORD: Understanding the Word

Lesson Aim: Members will decide to list their priorities for the remaining years of their life.

Introduction

For many people today, "to be happy" is the most important goal in life. Every decision that they make is done based on the question, "Will this make me happy?" Unfortunately, not every decision that is motivated by personal happiness is beneficial or good. For example, a married man leaves his wife of 30 years and pursues a younger woman because he just wants to be happy. Is that an honorable decision?

Our study today will teach us that we are ultimately accountable to God, not to ourselves, for the way we live our life on earth. How then should we live so that our lives are in tune with God?

Leader: Lead in reading Psalm 90 aloud together. Then read the paragraph on the "Key Verse."

Key Verse: "So teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom" (v. 12). A heart that is filled with the wisdom of God will seek to know God, please him and walk in his ways.

Go through the whole psalm again and underline the phrases that talk about what God does or had done. For example: "you had formed" (v. 2), "You return" (v. 3).

Questions for Adults

- 1. If you live to be 70 years old, you will have lived approximately 25,567 days. How many days do you have left? What are the things that you would focus on doing during these remaining days?
- 2. Moses prayed, "Let the favor of the Lord our God be upon us" (v. 17). In what areas and/or activities of your life would you want to experience the favor of God? Why? Share this with the group.
- 3. Individually and as a group, pray back this psalm to God. You could start by saying something like:
 - O Lord, teach us to number our days that we may get a heart of wisdom...
- 4. Pray for GCF (Prayer requests supplied by the Leader).

Questions for the Youth

1. YOLO: You only live once. A term or phrase that we young people use to justify all the crazy acts we do. "We're here for a good time, not a long time," as some may also say. We have yet to face the reality of toil, work, and the monotony of daily work for survival. But this

- Psalm outlines exactly that: we will work, we will toil, and we will all pass away one day. Have you ever reflected the future after your graduation?
- 2. As young people, we want to live a life of purpose. We want to be able to make a difference or at least do something of significance. What do you feel as though your purpose could be? What impact do you feel you can impart to the world?
- 3. Have you ever tried asking and seeking God for your purpose? How can you and your group help you intentionally seek God's calling?

Questions for Children

- 1. The psalmist mentioned that God had our sins in front of him, even our secret sins. How does it make you feel, knowing that God knows all your sins and he is angered by sin?
- 2. The psalmist said that we normally live up to seventy or eighty years, and yet those years are filled with "toil and trouble." Have you heard your grandparents talk about their life (whether past or present)? How do their stories reflect the same truth mentioned by the psalmist?
- 3. The psalmist asked God to teach him to number his days, so that he may become wise. What do you think is the connection between the two? What does it mean for you to number your days and how will you go about it?
