How the Redeemed Should Respond to Ruthlessness

Today's Message (30 August 2020) / Psalm 109

TRUE SONS
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If any psalm has gotten "bad press" in the Bible, this is it. A question always asked of it is, "doesn't PSALM 109 depart from the spirit and ideals of the "love your enemies" command of Jesus?" No, it does not. But you must think about this psalm deeply to understand why.

So what do you do when people intentionally and unfairly make life hard for you?

1. TELL GOD WHAT'S REALLY HAPPENING, INCLUDING YOUR ROLE IN IT (vv. 1-5)

- The psalmist's source of pain: a hate group that he had not hated. They were ruthless, relentless, and dishonest. You can't have a worse group against yourself.
- What pained David most is that he had loved them, and they reciprocated with hatred.
- When people treat you like they treated David, look at your possible contribution to the situation, and make amends the best you can. If you already did, or are totally innocent, do what David did: tell God everything, details included. You are guaranteed to have His ears, the attention of the best Listener in the universe.

2. YOU DON'T HAVE TO DO TO OTHERS WHAT THEY ARE DOING TO YOU (vv. 6-20)

- This is the prophetic section of PSALM 109. ACTS 1:16-20 verifies that this section applied to Judas as judgment for choosing to betray Jesus Christ. Like in many other psalms, David's experience foreshadowed that of Jesus.
- However we can't deny these were David's feelings in his time. Here are three ways to understand this portion:
 - The Law of Moses decreed that a false accuser was to be given the punishment he wanted for the accused (DEUTERONOMY 19:16-21). David possibly had this in mind. So his words are not evil wishes, but a call for justice according to the Law.

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- 2. David is not vengeful in actions. His response is to bring it to God in prayer and to leave it there a great example of ROMANS 12:19. His way is better than taking matters in our own hands and ruthless vindictiveness. But caution is needed and aligns with the warning that even "righteous anger" is close neighbor to sin (EPHESIANS 4:26).
- 3. Finally, is it possible that imprecatory psalms are not for most believers to claim, not because these psalms have a lower standard of holiness, but because they are too lofty for us to imitate without danger?
- What was really the fault of David's enemy? Verse 16 "he did not remember to show kindness, but pursued the poor and needy and the brokenhearted, to put them to death." Don't keep breaking the broken. You may just find yourself on the receiving end one day, when a perfect Judge who never errs takes up their cause. He always does.

3. PRAY PURPOSEFULLY WHEN THE OPPRESSION PERSISTS (vv. 21-31)

- Anchor the hope and passion of your prayer on the unchanging Character of God (VV. 21, 26).
- Tell God what He already knows: All the consequences of your maltreatment the emotional trauma, physical distress, social ostracism, public humiliation, and more (VV. 22-29). Far better to vent than to be vindictive!
- Worship God more than ever. Then stand firm, and see the salvation of the Lord (VV. 30-31; EXODUS 14:13-14)

FINAL THOUGHTS

Human relationships will constantly break your heart unless you can accept these two realities: True sons of God are often more willing to forgive than others are willing to stop. True sons of God are often quicker to forgive than others are able to repent.

So make this prayer your own: "But you, O God my Lord, deal [kindly] on my behalf for Your Name's sake; because Your steadfast love is good, deliver me!" (PSALM 109:21)

Lord help me simply accept that the enemy may never stop. But neither will you. You will never stop being on my side. You will always be for me, never against me. And nothing can ever separate me from your love. In this I find my hope. In this I rest. Though Jesus Christ, I humbly give thanks, and worship You. Amen

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- 1. Does Psalm 109 give us an excuse to keep hating our enemies? Explain your answer.
- 2. Why is it true that even "righteous anger" hovers dangerously close to sin (Ephesians 4:26)? How can you avoid going there?
- 3. Pray together as a group/family, and ask God to help you release your anger towards people, to God in prayer instead, then to help you love the unlovable. Only divine grace can help you do so.

Imagine with us the difference if these leaders look beyond the here and now, setting their minds on things that are eternal! These people are our country's future for the next 10 or so years, and they too will lead those who will follow soon after them.

Would you join us in prayer as we seek the Lord's guidance and strength for each leader? Pray with us as we call upon God to continually raise leaders whose lives are witnesses, with a clear vision of transforming the communities they are in because of the work of the Lord being done in them and through them!
