CINCINNATI STORYLINES

- » Cincinnati is averaging 75.8 points (most since 2004-05 [75.9]) with four players averaging double figures in points. The Bearcats haven't had four double-digit scorers at the end of a season since 2011-12.
- » Defensively, UC's adjusted defensive efficiency of 84.7 ranked as the 11th lowest in the KenPom era (since 2002). The Bearcats' field-goal percentage defense (.371) and scoring defense (57.1 points allowed) ranks second in the nation.
- » Gary Clark (12.8 points, 8.7 rebounds, 2.0 assists, 1.4 steals, 1.3 blocks) has been named a member of the Citizen Naismith Trophy Late Season Team and is a finalist for the Karl Malone Power Forward of the Year. He ranks among the AAC leaders in eight categories and has led UC in either points or rebounds in 21 games this season.
- » Jacob Evans III (13.7 points, 4.4 rebounds, 3.3 assists, 1.4 steals, 1.0 blocks) is a finalist for the Julius Erving Small Forward of the Year Award. He ranks among the AAC leaders in seven categories and has scored in double figures in 22 of 27 games.

- » Kyle Washington leads the AAC in blocks (1.9) since the start of league play with at least one rejection in each of UC's 14 conference games.
- » Jarron Cumberland accounted for a team-high 18 points against Wichita State on Sunday. He has reached double figures in scoring in six of the last nine conference games.
- » Justin Jenifer (31 assists and 11 turnovers) and Cane Broome (37 assists and 16 turnovers) collectively own a 2.52-to-1 assist-to-turnover ratio during league play. Broome's assist-to-turnover ratio (2.3-to-1) in AAC action ranks second in the conference.
- » Cincinnati is playing its 2017-18 home schedule at BBGT Arena in Highland Heights, Ky., while Fifth Third Arena undergoes an \$87 million renovation.
- » Cincinnati is one of eight teams to appear in the NCAA Tournament each of the last seven seasons (along with Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas, Michigan State, North Carolina, VCU and Wisconsin).

THE UCONN GAME

GAME PREVIEW

- » The 11th-ranked Cincinnati Bearcats (23-4, 12-2 American) look to snap a two-game slide Thursday when UConn (13-14, 6-8) visits BBGT Arena in Highland Heights, Ky. Tipoff is set for 7 p.m. ET on ESPN and 700 WI W
- » Fans are encouraged to "wear black" inside the arena.
- » Cincinnati suffered its first home loss since December 2015, ending the nation's longest home-court win streak at 39 games when it came up short to Wichita State 76-72 on Sunday. Jarron Cumberland led the Bearcats with 18 points and a trio of three-pointers. Cane Broome and Jacob Evans III added 16 points each. Gary Clark contributed 11 points, eight rebounds and three steals.
- » UConn snapped a two-game losing streak Sunday, earning an 84-80 road win at ECU. Jalen Adams poured in 26 points on four three-pointers. Terry Larrier added 20 points while Christian Vital contributed 16 points and team-best six rebounds.
- » UConn owns a slight 13-12 advantage in the series with Cincinnati though the Bearcats have won four in a row and six of the last seven.
- » Evans scored a team-high 19 points while Kyle Washington registered a double-double with 13 points and 11 rebounds in Cincinnati's 65-57 win over UConn earlier this month in Storrs, Conn.
- » NEXT GAME: Cincinnati wraps up its 2017-18 home schedule on Sunday when it greets Tulsa on Senior Day. Tipoff is set for noon ET on CBS Sports Network and 700 WLW. Senior Day festivities are scheduled to start around 11:30 a.m.

SCOUTING UCONN

- » UConn snapped a two-game losing streak with an 84-80 win at ECU on Sunday. It marked the Huskies' second road win in league play.
- » The Huskies feature three of the league's Top-12 scorers in Jalen Adams (third at 17.8 points), Christian Vital (9th at 14.8) and Terry Larrier (12th at 14.0).
- » Adams also ranks among the league's best in minutes played (1st at 38.0), assists (3rd at 4.5), steals (6th at 1.5), free throw percentage (8th at .807) and assist-to-turnover ratio (12th at 1.5).
- » Vital is listed among the AAC leaders in minutes played (6th at 34.2), free throw percentage (2nd at .853), steals (5th at 1.6) rebounds (15th at 5.2).
- » Larrier ranks among the conference's top three-point shooters, listing eighth in three-point percentage (.396) and three-pointers made (2.1).
- » UConn entered the week leading the league in free throw shooting percentage (1st at .752) and was fifth in blocks (3.9) and turnover margin (+0.3).
- » UConn finished 16-17 overall and tied for fifth in The American at 9-9 last season.
- » The Huskies were picked to finish fifth in The American in a preseason poll of the league's coaches in October.

SERIES HISTORY

- » UConn leads the series 13-12 overall. Cincinnati leads 6-3 in Cincinnati and 3-1 in Storrs. UConn leads 4-2 in Hartford and 5-1 in postseason meetings.
- » The Bearcats have won four in a row and six of the last seven in the series. The two teams have met three times in a season for each of the last four years.
- » The Bearcats won earlier this month in Storrs, Conn., earning a 65-57 victory on Feb. 3.
- » Cincinnati won all three meetings last season: 82-68 on Feb. 4, 2017 in Cincinnati; 67-47 in Storrs, Conn., on March 5, 2017 and 81-71 in the semifinals of the American Championship on March 11, 2017 at the XL Center in Hartford, Conn. It marked Cincinnati's first three-game season sweep of the Huskies in series history.
- » The 104-97 four-overtime UConn win over Cincinnati on Mar. 11, 2016 in the quarterfinals of the conference tournament tied for the second-longest game in school history, equaling a 99-85 four-overtime home lost to Memphis on Jan. 31, 1981. The Bearcats played in the longest game in NCAA history, a 75-73 seven-overtimes Cincinnati win over Bradley, on Dec. 21, 1981.
- » Cincinnati has won five in a row and six of the last seven meetings at home.

LAST MEETING

- » EARLIER THIS SEASON IN STORRS, CONN.
- » CINCINNATI 65, UCONN 57 (Feb. 3, 2018)
- » (AP) Jacob Evans III scored 19 points and No. 8 Cincinnati left Gampel Pavilion with a 65-57 victory over a struggling UConn team. It was UC's 14th straight win.
- » Kyle Washington added 13 points and 11 rebounds for Cincinnati, which struggled at times but never trailed.
- » Jalen Adams scored 20 points and Christian Vital added 18 for the Huskies, who have lost five of their last six.
- » The Bearcats shot just 38 percent from the floor, almost 10 percentage points below their season average and were outscored 26-14 in the paint. But they held UConn to 36 percent shooting.
- Cincinnati opened the game with three straight 3-pointers and ran out to a 13-0 lead. The Huskies missed their first 10 shots and didn't score until Christian Vital drove the lane for a layup almost eight minutes into the game.
- » The Bearcats had a drought of their own, getting just six free throws over a nine-minute span before a 3-pointer from Evans made it 26-16.
- » A 3-pointer by Keith Williams at the halftime buzzer sent the Bearcats into the locker room up 32-21.
- » Consecutive 3-pointers by Cane Broome eight minutes into the second half extended the lead to 17 points. The Bearcats extended that to 19 and then weathered a late 12-4 UConn run.
- » Cincinnati hit 9 of its 25 shots from behind the arc, while UConn went 5 of 17.
- » The game was a homecoming for Cincinnati guard Cane Broome, who is from East Hartford and played at Sacred Heart in Fairfield before transferring to Cincinnati. Broome, who averages just over eight points a game, scored 10 points. He played against UConn once before, as a sophomore at Sacred Heart, scoring just seven points, the only time that season he failed to reach double figures.

RECAPPING THE LOSS TO WICHITA STATE

- » (AP)- Landry Shamut scored 19 points, and No. 19 Wichita State ended the nation's longest home-court winning streak, beating No. 5 Cincinnati 76-72 at BB&T Arena in Cincinnati.
- » The Bearcats had won their last 39 home games.
- » The Shockers hit seven of eight shots during a 17-3 run that gave them a 34-23 first-half lead. Cincinnati responded by turning up its full-court defense, forcing three quick turnovers, and going on a run that cut the deficit to 42-40 at halftime.
- » The Shockers showed a little defense of their own, forcing five turnovers while rebuilding their lead to 59-48 with 11 minutes left, matching its biggest of the game. Cincinnati closed to 72-70 on Trevon Scott's dunk with 13 seconds left, but the Shockers scored on a pair of inbound passes by Landry, the last a full-court heave to Morris for a dunk that provided the final margin.
- » Jarron Cumberland led the Bearcats with 18 points, including a trio of threes. Cane Broome and Jacob Evans III added 16 points each. UC gave up 22 points of 13 turnovers.
- » The Shockers beat a Top 5 team on the road for the first time since 1964.

LOOKING TO REBOUND FROM A TOUGH WEEK

- » Cincinnati looks to get back on track after taking a pair losses last week that ended two of the nation's longest win streaks.
- » The Bearcats suffered a 67-62 loss at Houston (2/15) ending Cincinnati's 16-game active win streak which was tied with Rhode Island for the longest in the nation.
- » Three days later, the Bearcats saw their nation-leading 39-game home win streak stall after suffering a 76-72 loss to then-No. 19 Wichita State (2/18) at BB6T Arena. The home-win streak spanned parts of three seasons, two venues and was the longest of the Mick Cronin coaching era (since 2006-07).

BEARCATS RANKED IN AP POLL FOR 31ST CONSECUTIVE WEEK

- » Despite last week's pair of losses, Cincinnati received a No. 11 ranking in this week's Associated Press poll marking the Bearcats' 31st consecutive week appearing in the poll. It represents the longest streak of the Mick Cronin coaching era (since 2006-07).
- » UC has been ranked for 16 consecutive weeks during 2017-18, the longest single-season streak of the Cronin coaching era.
- » The Bearcats climbed as high at No. 5 in the poll last week, Cincinnati's highest ranking of the Cronin era, before suffering losses at Houston and home against Wichita State.

» Through Feb. 19, Cincinnati ranked among the nation's Top 25 in 11 categories: scoring margin (1st at +18.7), field-goal percentage defense (2nd at .371), scoring defense (2nd at 57.1), win-lost percentage (7th at .852), rebound margin (7th at +8.1), blocked shots per game (12th at 5.5), offensive rebounds per game (14th at 13.3), total blocks (14th with 148), turnover margin (18th at +3.5), three-point field-goal percentage defense (15th at .308) and total rebounds per game (20th at 39.5).

BEST OFFENSIVE NUMBERS UNDER CRONIN

- » Cincinnati's offensive numbers for points, three-point shooting percentage and assists remain the best of the Mick Cronin coaching era (starting in 2006-07).
- » The Bearcats are averaging 75.8 points (most since 2004-05 [75.9]) with four players averaging double figures in points. The Bearcats haven't had four double-digit scorers at the end of a season since 2011-12 (Sean Kilpatrick [14.3], Yancy Gates [12.2], Dion Dixon [13.0] and Cashmere Wright [10.9]).
- » Senior forwards Kyle Washington (.528) and Gary Clark (.509) are both shooting 50 percent or better from the floor this season while Jacob Evans III (.451) and Cane Broome (.453) are shooting better than 45 percent from the field.
- » Six Bearcats have made 18 or more three-pointers this season, including a team-high 47 from Evans and 43 from Jarron Cumberland.
- » UC's average of 75.8 points per game is its highest since 2004-05 (75.9). The Bearcats have averaged 76 or more points in a season three times this millennium (77.6 points in 1999-2000; 78.2 points in 2001-02 and 76.7 points in 2003-04).
- » UC is averaging 16.0 assists this season, the highest since 2003-04 (16.2). After averaging 15.4 assists in 2015-16 and 15.5 assists in 2016-17, the Bearcats are looking to average 15 or more assists in three consecutive seasons for only the second time in school history: 1995 (16.2), 1996 (16.5) and 1997 (15.4).

BEARCATS FOURSOME HAS SCORED 1.000 COLLEGIATE POINTS

CATECODY COONIN EDA UICUS (SEASON)

- » The 2017-18 Bearcats feature four players who've scored 1,000 or more collegiate points each during their careers.
- » Junior swingman Jacob Evans III (1,134 points) became the most recent member of Cincinnati's 1,000-point club when he scored 16 points at USF (1/13).
- » Senior forward Kyle Washington (1,172 points) eclipsed the 1,000-point plateau for his career against Cleveland State (12/21). The NC State transfer compiled 404 points in two seasons with the Wolfpack (2014 & 2015) and has 768 points in a season-plus as a Bearcat.
- » Senior Gary Clark (1,343 points) joined UC's 1,000-point club in the season opener against Savannah State (11/10). He currently ranks 19th on UC's career scoring chart.
- » Junior guard Cane Broome (1,330 points) scored 1,136 points in two seasons at Sacred Heart (2015 & 2016).
- » SECOND TIME IN SCHOOL HISTORY: It marks only the second time in school history, a Cincinnati team features four players who have scored 1,000 or more points during their collegiate careers, matching the 1977-78 Bearcats' foursome of Robert Miller (1,498 points from 1975-78), Mike Jones (1,058 points from 1975-78), Pat Cummings (1,762 points from 1977-78, 1978-79) and Steve Collier (1,252 points from 1975-78).
- » ONE OF TWO CURRENT TEAMS IN THE NATION: Only one other team in the nation has four 1,000-point scorers on its roster: Saint Mary's with Emmett Naar, Calvin Hermanson, Jock Landale and Cullen Neal.

NOTING THE DEFENSE

- » Cincinnati's adjusted defensive efficiency of 86.3 ranks as the 11th lowest of the KenPom era (since 2002).
- » Cincinnati's field goal percentage defense (.371) is the lowest of the 12-year Mick Cronin coaching era and the lowest at UC since the 1955-56 campaign (.333).
- » The Bearcats' scoring defense (57.1 points allowed) is the second lowest under Cronin behind only 2014-15 (55.8).
- » UC has allowed 70 or more points in only four games this season. UC has surrendered more than 60 points only nine times this season and only three times since the start of AAC play (70 points to Houston [1/31], 67 points at Houston [2/15] and 76 to Wichita State [2/18]).
- » Since UC started its run of now seven consecutive appearances in the NCAA Tournament (starting with the 2010-11 season), the Bearcats have allowed opponents to score 70 or more points in only 14.8 percent of their games (40 of 270).
- The Bearcats have held 18 of their 27 opponents under
 40 percent shooting from the field this season. They held
 20 of 36 foes under that number a year ago.
- » On the defensive end, UC ranks nationally in field-goal percentage defense (2nd at .365), scoring defense (2nd at 56.3), rebound margin (7th at +8.3), three-point field-goal percentage defense (8th at .303), blocked shots per game (12th at 5.5), total rebounds per game (15th at 40.0), offensive rebounds per game (15th at 13.4), total blocks (15th with 143) and turnover margin (19th at +3.5).
- » Cincinnati and Virginia have been the only programs to finish the year ranked in the nation's Top 25 for scoring defense each of the past five seasons.

He joins Oscar Robertson (2,973 points/1,338 rebounds from 1958-60), Jack Twyman (1,598 points and 1,242 rebounds from 1952-55), Paul Hogue (1,391 points and 1,088 rebounds from 1960-62) and Robert Miller (1,498 points and 1,060 rebounds from 1975-79).
- » Clark is on pace to join former Bearcat Yancy Gates (2009-12) as the only two players in school history to lead their teams in rebounding for four seasons.
- » DOUBLE-DOUBLES: With 27 career double-doubles Gary Clark is the double-doubles leader at UC during the Mick Cronin coaching era (since 2006-07) and the current double-doubles leader among all active players in the AAC.
- » Averaging 13.2 points with 8.7 rebounds through 14 conference games this season, Clark has recorded six double-doubles in league play and nine during the season.
- » Clark has led the Bearcats in either points or rebounds in 21 games this season.
- » AMONG THE NATION'S TOP REBOUNDERS: Clark ranks third in the nation with 1,053 career rebounds (through Feb. 18) behind Seton Hall's Angel Delgado (1,372) and Hofstra's Rokas Gustys (1,278).
- » Clark currently ranks fifth in career rebounds at Cincinnati. He needs eight rebounds to pass Robert Miller (1,060 rebounds from 1975-79) for fourth place.
- » He became the all-time leading rebounder during the Mick Cronin coaching era when he pulled down 11 boards at UCLA (12/16), passing Yancy Gates (916 from 2008-12).
- » Clark has led the Bearcats in rebounds in 18 of 26 games this season and in 66 contests during his career.
- » LEAGUE RANKINGS (SEASON STATS): Clark ranks among the league leaders in nine categories (through Feb. 18): rebounds (1st at 8.7), double-doubles (1st with nine), offensive rebounds (2nd at 3.1), defensive rebounds (2nd at 5.6), blocks (T6th at 1.3), steals (7th at 1.4), field goal percentage (10th at .509), free throw percentage (14th at .748) and points (18th at 12.8)

He registered 24 points and 14 rebounds against Buffalo (11/20) and scored UC's first 13 points against Wyoming (11/22) en route to leading

the Bearcats to the tournament crown, finishing with 17 points and six rebounds in the title game. For his efforts he was named The American's Player of the Week.

- » 51ST MEMBER OF 1,000-POINT CLUB: Clark became the 51st member of Cincinnati's 1,000-point club, when he posted a double-double with 13 points and 11 rebounds in the season opening 107-77 win over Savannah State.
- » CANDIDATE FOR SENIOR CLASS AWARD: Clark was named one of 30 candidates for the 2017-18 Senior CLASS Award, an honor given annually to a men's basketball student-athlete who excels both on and off the court.
- » UC head coach Mick Cronin said recently, "He's one of the greatest kids you will ever coach. I can only hope that the good Lord thinks I'm half as nice a human as Gary Clark because he's a really good person."
- » An academic honor roll recipient on pace to earn his criminal justice degree this spring, Clark earned UC's prestigious Legion of Excellence Award in 2016 for owning the highest cumulative grade-point average on the men's basketball team. During the summer 2016, Clark interned directly with Dr. Robin Engel, who serves as UC's Vice President of Safety and Reform, working to positively impact campus safety.
- » A positive example and strong representative for his team, university and the city of Cincinnati, Clark is an active volunteer who has logged more than 50 hours of service in the Cincinnati community leading his teammates to spend time at such places as Our Daily Bread, the Sheakley Boys and Girls Club and the Friar's Club. There he spends time with area youth encouraging them to follow rules and stay in school.
- » Clark also participates in campus orientation efforts during the fall to help new students grow comfortable with their surroundings and recently visited a hospitalized patient to offer words of encouragement.

-SEASON NOTES BEARCATS PICKED TO WIN THE AMERICAN

- » American Athletic Conference coaches picked Cincinnati to win the league at preseason media day on Oct. 16.
- » The Bearcats received a league-high seven first-place votes and 116 points overall in the preseason poll to finish ahead of conference newcomer Wichita State, who gathered five first-place votes and 115 points overall. UCF (93 points) was tabbed third followed by SMU (91), UConn (79), Houston (72), Temple (68), Tulsa (52), Memphis (36), Tulane (30), ECU (24) and USF (16).
- » It marks the second consecutive year Cincinnati has been the preseason pick to win a league. The Bearcats were picked first over UConn by one vote a year ago. Prior to 2016-17, the last time UC was picked to win a league in the preseason was 2002-03 (Conference USA).

- » Johnson, a 6-2, 170 guard from Mountain View, California, averaged 18 points, eight rebounds, five assists and two steals as a junior at Saint Francis High School, helping lead the Lancers to the Northern California Division II championship game.
- » A four-star prospect according to Scout.com, Johnson was listed among the Top 20 players in the Golden State and among the Top 150 players in the nation by 247 Sports and Rivals.com.

- » Johnson finished his junior season as the West Catholic Athletic League Most Valuable Player, the San Francisco Chronicle Player of the Year, the Cal Hi Sports Bay Area Player of the Year, a Mercury News First Team All-Bay Area selection, a Pangos All-American and a Cal Hi Sports Third Team All-State honoree.
- "Logan is a great athlete and has a huge upside for a guard," Cronin said. "Most guards are developed physically coming in, but Logan is still growing and filling out into his body. He has great quickness and ball handling skills. He is a tough competitor and really coming into his own as a player. Logan is also a solid person from a very close family. We are excited he is a Bearcat."
- » Logan's older brother, Tyler Johnson, is in his fourth season as a guard for the NBA's Miami Heat.

DERMARR JOHNSON STILL WITH PROGRAM

- » Former UC men's basketball standout and NBA player DerMarr Johnson continues as a student assistant coach during the 2017-18 campaign. He joined the staff prior to last season while he takes classes to complete his degree.
- » The sixth pick in the 2000 NBA draft by the Atlanta Hawks, Johnson played one season at Cincinnati, earning Conference USA Freshman of the Year accolades while averaging 12.6 points and 3.8 rebounds during the 1999-2000 campaign. On a team that featured National Player of the Year Kenyon Martin and third-team All-American Pete Mickeal, as well as Steve Logan and Kenny Satterfield, Johnson helped guide the Bearcats to a 29-4 overall record and the league's regular-season title while ranking as the nation's No. 1 team for 12 weeks.
- » Johnson played two seasons with the Hawks, averaging 8.4 points and 3.4 rebounds in 2001-02. He averaged 17 points and shot 49.9 percent with Denver during the 2004-05 season.

BB&T ARENA SERVING AS HOME OF THE BEARCATS FOR 2017-18 SEASON

- » BB6T Arena in Highland Heights, Kentucky, will serve as the temporary home of the Bearcats during the 2017-18 campaign while Fifth Third Arena undergoes an \$87 million renovation before its scheduled reopening in the fall 2018.
- » BB&T Arena seats 9,400 fans and serves as the home for Northern Kentucky University athletics.

FIFTH THIRD ARENA SCHEDULED TO REOPEN IN FALL 2018

Fifth Third Arena, the home of Cincinnati basketball since the start of the 1989-90 season, is currently undergoing a privately-funded \$87-million renovation.

Renovations began immediate following Cincinnati's 2016-17 home finale against Houston on March 2.

"Our entire University has grown and transformed into one of the best in the country over the past 15 years, both academically and aesthetically," men's basketball head coach Mick Cronin said. "This arena will be awesome. The planning has been meticulous and the first-class, new design is as good as I've seen across all of college basketball. This building is about our future and is a testament to the commitment our University and donors have toward our programs."

Proposed improvements to the facility, built in 1989 and originally named the Myrl H. Shoemaker Center, include the creation of a 360-degree seating bowl, new HD scoreboard, ribbon boards, sound system, an LED lighting system which will allow for enhanced gameday presentation, new restroom and concession facilities, a new upper-level concourse with its own fan amenities, expanded food and beverage options and a new main entrance and plaza with centralized ticketing and guest services. The renovated arena also will feature upgraded locker room spaces, expanded premium seating options, including a courtside club, arena club and concourse club as well as enclosed suites, loge seating, a new Bearcats Lounge and super suites.

"We are inspired by the passionate engagement from the Board of Trustees, campus leadership and key constituents who are making a bold commitment to our athletic program and the campus community," UC Director of Athletics Mike Bohn said.

BEARCATS PLAYING GAMES AT BB&T ARENA IN 2017-18

Cincinnati men's basketball is playing its 2017-18 home schedule at BBGT Arena in Highland Heights, Kentucky. The facility is home to Northern Kentucky University athletics.

"We are excited for the opportunity to play in one of the newest facilities in the area," UC Director of Athletics Mike Bohn said. "This was a long, thorough and engaging process with numerous stakeholders throughout our region. Hamilton County officials were all in for the right reasons and a key part of our discussions. The tri-state area is unique because of its regionality which encompasses a large swath of our fan base. All of those factors helped us make the right decision for our department and University while being fiscally responsible and providing an outstanding experience for our student-athletes, fans, students, donors and supporters."

BB&T Arena was built in 2008 and provides the Bearcats a state-of-the-art facility a short drive from UC's campus. The 9,400-seat multipurpose arena is located seven miles from downtown Cincinnati and features 12 luxury suites, a pair of party suites and 8,000 parking spaces within a five-minute walk to the arena. A four-sided video board, statistics boards and ribbon boards will keep fans up-to-date on what is going on in-game.

CINCINNATI TO REOPEN FIFTH THIRD ARENA AGAINST OHIO STATE

Cincinnati will reopen Fifth Third Arena by welcoming Ohio State in the 2018-19 season opener. The news came in early October as part of a home-and-home series announcement.

The Bearcats will open a newly renovated Fifth Third Arena against the Buckeyes in 2018 with Ohio State playing host in Columbus in 2019. Although dates for the games have not been determined, the game will take place on the first allowable date of competition in each of the next two years.

The two schools haven't played a regular-season game since 1921. Ohio State leads the series 6-4 overall, including an 81-66 victory in the last meeting: March 22, 2012 in the NCAA East Regional semifinals in Boston.

CINCINNATI HEAD COACH MICK CRONIN

Mick Cronin's tenure as head basketball coach at the University of Cincinnati has seen the rebirth of the Bearcats, rising from a program that featured only one returning scholarship player when he arrived in 2006-07 to one that posted 30 wins in 2016-17, made its seventh consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance last season and awaits the reopening of a renovated, state-of-the-art, Fifth Third Arena for the 2018-19 campaign.

Cronin is one of six coaches in the nation to take his team to the NCAA Tournament each of the past seven seasons, along with Mark Few (Gonzaga), Tom Izzo (Michigan State), Mike Krzyzewski (Duke), Bill Self (Kansas) and Roy Williams (North Carolina).

The Cincinnati native and UC alumnus leads the nation in Division I wins (329) and total NCAA Tournament appearances (nine) among active coaches his age (46-years old) and ranks second in Division I wins among active coaches under the age of 50.

Built on toughness, tenacious defense and continuous all-out effort, Cronin's Bearcats rank as one of two programs (along with Virginia) to be listed among the nation's top 25 in scoring defense each of the past five seasons. You can also find Cincinnati's name listed among the top 25 teams in field-goal percentage defense and blocks per game every year since 2012-13.

Cronin guided Cincinnati to a share of the 2014 American Athletic Conference regular-season crown while earning the league's coach of the year honor. At Murray State from 2004-2006, Cronin guided the Racers two Ohio Valley Conference tournament titles and one regular-season crown while receiving OVC Coach of the Year distinction in 2006.

Along with his three seasons in Murray, Cronin has compiled a 329-163 career record in 14-plus years as a college head coach, including a 260-139 mark at Cincinnati.

Cincinnati's 2017-18 squad features the return of its top three scorers – Jacob Evans, Kyle Washington and Gary Clark – along with six other lettermen and six newcomers.

Cronin's rebuilding job began immediately when his first squad featured only one returning starter for the 2006-07 campaign. He tirelessly went to work setting the culture necessary to building long-term success while competing within arguably the sport's toughest league ever organized – the old BIG EAST Conference.

Despite the surroundings, Cincinnati began the retooling process, becoming the only program from a major conference to improve its win total every season from 2007 to 2011, building from 11 wins in 2007 to 26 victories and a return to the NCAA Tournament in 2011.

Now a fixture at the Big Dance, Cincinnati can include itself among an elite list of eight programs appearing in seven consecutive NCAA Tournaments, along with Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas, Michigan State, North Carolina, VCU and Wisconsin.

SEVEN CONSECUTIVE TRIPS TO THE NCAA TOURNAMENT

2016-17: Cincinnati achieved the second-most wins in program history (30-6), advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, and tied the school record for league victories (16-2) while finishing second in the American Athletic Conference. The Bearcats also posted an 18-0 home record, the fourth undefeated season at Fifth Third Arena and was ranked in the national polls for 15 weeks during the season, a Cronin-era record high. The UC head coach also achieved a milestone, registering his 300th career victory against Tulsa on Feb. 18.

2015-16: Cincinnati won 11 of its final 15 games of the regular season, including a 61-54 win over then-No. 24 SMU, to register its sixth consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. Junior Troy Caupain received First Team American Athletic Conference accolades while sophomore Gary Clark was named the league's defensive player of the year and second-team all-conference honoree. The Bearcats finished 22-11 overall and tied for third in the league with a 12-6 mark.

2014-15: A young, inexperienced group of newcomers and role players overcame the loss of its head coach due to health reasons and banded together to register a 23-11 mark and achieve the program's first second-round NCAA Tournament appearance since 2012. UC finished third in the conference but swept league-winner SMU and registered a victory at second-place Tulsa (in the only meeting between the schools) to secure the school's fifth consecutive NCAA Tournament invite. The Bearcats outlasted Purdue 66-65 in overtime in the first round of the NCAA Tournament before falling to previously unbeaten Kentucky, 64-51.

2013-14: Cincinnati won a share of the inaugural American Athletic Conference regular-season crown, the program's first conference title since 2003-04, behind the efforts of AP All-American Sean Kilpatrick and league defensive player of the year Justin Jackson. Kilpatrick led The American with 20.6 points per game and Cronin was named The American's Coach of the Year in leading UC to a 27-7 record – its most wins since 2001-02. The Bearcats strung together 15 consecutive wins, including their first 11 league games. UC was listed among the top 15 teams in the AP poll during each of the last eight weeks of the regular season, climbing as high as seventh.

2012-13: Senior Cashmere Wright fought through nagging injuries and, along with fellow senior JaQuon Parker and junior Sean Kilpatrick, helped lead the Bearcats to a 22-12 overall record and third consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance. Wright finished his career as UC's all-time steals leader (198) and Cronin claimed his 200th career coaching win. The Bearcats ranked sixth nationally with 6.1 blocks per game.

2011-12: Cincinnati advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16, registered 26 wins for the second consecutive season and defeated a school-record eight nationally ranked teams, including No. 2 Syracuse in the semifinals of the BIG EAST Championship. The Bearcats posted a school-record 12 wins in the BIG EAST en route to tying for fourth place in the league standings and finishing as runners up in the league tournament. Yancy Gates capped off his career as one of only six players in program history to compile more than 1,400 points and 900 rebounds. The Bearcats outlasted Texas and Florida State before falling to Ohio State in the NCAA Tournament.

2010-11: Cincinnati won its first 15 games of the season and closed strong with five victories in its last six regular-season contests to secure its first NCAA Tournament appearance since 2005. Yancy Gates led the Bearcats with 11.9 points and 6.9 rebounds and Sean Kilpatrick was named to the BIG EAST All-Rookie team. UC defeated Missouri 78-63 before falling to eventual national champion UConn 69-58 in the second round of the NCAA Tournament. The Bearcats finished 26-9 overall.

PRIOR TO CINCINNATI

Success seems to follow Cronin, who came to Cincinnati after serving three years as head coach at Murray State (2004-06). As mentor of the Racers, Cronin compiled a 69-24 overall record while earning a pair of NCAA tournament berths.

In his debut season as head coach, Cronin directed Murray State to a school-best 28-6 record, the Ohio Valley Conference Tournament championship and an NCAA Tournament appearance. His 28 wins were the sixth most in NCAA history for a first-year head coach at the time. He earned OVC Coach of the Year honors two seasons later, guiding Murray State to another OVC regular-season title, league tournament crown and NCAA Tournament appearance with a 24-6 mark in 2005-06.

Prior to Murray State, Cronin built a sterling reputation for his ability to evaluate and recruit top talent. In his stint at UC as an assistant coach for Bob Huggins from 1997-2001, Cronin recruited several top players, including NBA Draft selections Steve Logan (Golden State); DerMarr Johnson (Atlanta); Pete Mickeal (Dallas); Kenny Satterfield (Dallas); and Jason Maxiell (Detroit).

Following the 2000-01 season, Cronin became the associate head coach and recruiting coordinator at Louisville, under Rick Pitino. In his first year, Cronin helped attract a top-10 ranked recruiting class.

COMMUNITY INVOLVEMENT

Cronin's passion for success on the court also carries over to the local community where he is committed to making a difference. He currently serves as a board member on both the American Cancer Society and the ACS's Coaches vs. Cancer of Southwest Ohio chapter.

He also assists with a major fundraising event - Soul of the City Soiree - for Our Daily Bread that has generated more than \$100,000 each of the past four years to assist the soup kitchen and community center in Cincinnati.

Cronin also annually speaks with the Young Executive Group of the Catholic Inner-City Schools Education (CISE) Fund. The group raises money from area corporations to help give children from low income urban settings the opportunity to attend Catholic schools

During the 2013-14 season, Cronin also wrote a column in the Cincinnati Enquirer highlighting the dangers of texting while driving as part of the ATGT sponsored "It Can Wait" campaign. He spotlighted the campaign again during an on-campus awareness event in October 2014.

PATH TO COACHING

Cronin has long held great pride in the Queen City, the University of Cincinnati and the sport of basketball. As a child growing up on the west side of town, he used to follow his father Harold "Hep" Cronin -- a highly successful local high school coach with more than 400 career wins -- around the gyms of Cincinnati. A product of LaSalle High School, Cronin had his playing career end sooner than expected due to a knee injury in high school.

That didn't stop his desire to find his place in basketball. While completing his undergraduate degree at UC, Cronin served as assistant varsity coach and head junior varsity coach at Woodward High School. He helped develop six players who went on to play Division I college basketball, including former Bearcat Damon Flint, who ranks among the top 25 scorers in program history.

Cronin made the jump from high school to college coaching during the 1996-97 season joining Huggins as video coordinator at UC. A year later, Cronin was elevated to an assistant coach for the Bearcats, setting the stage for his long tenure in college basketball.

Cronin resides in Cincinnati with his 11-year old daughter, Samantha.
