SETTING THE SCENE

- The No. 22 Black Knights are set for their first road test as they visit No. 14 Cincinnati on Saturday, Sept. 26 at 3:30 p.m. CT. The contest at Nippert Stadium will be televised live on ESPN.
- Mark Jones will handle the play-by-play duties, the color analyst is Dusty Dvoracek and the sideline reporter is Quint Kessenich.
- The game can be heard on the radio, both on the flagship stations WBNR and WLNA, Sirius 134, XM 210 and streamed through the TuneIn app on the Army Black Knights Radio.

RANKED VS. RANKED

- The No. 22 Black Knights will visit No. 14 Cincinnati in search of its first win in a game matching ranked teams since 1958.
- The most recent win against a ranked opponent for the Black Knights came in a 17-14 victory over then-No. 19 Air Force in 1972.

FACING THE BEARCATS

- •The Black Knights and the Bearcats have met six times in program history and the record is an even 3-3 in those games.
- The first game was in 1963 at Michie Stadium, a 22-0 victory by the Black Knights. The last meeting between the two clubs was in 2004 at Michie Stadium, where Army won, 48-29. That victory snapped Army's 19 game losing streak from 2002-04.
- The game is set to be the first in Cincinnati for the Black Knights since a close 33-29 loss in 2003.
- UC leads the series 2-1 in contests played at Nippert Stadium.

NEW-LOOK SCHEDULE

- · Army's athletics administration came together to put together a new-look schedule amidst the CO-VID-19 pandemic. Just three opponents remain on the schedule from the original 2020 slate (Air Force, Tulane and Navy).
- The Black Knights added nine new opponents to round out a full 12-game schedule, with highlights including BYU at Michie Stadium on Sept. 19 and at Cincinnati on Sept. 26
- Three of the Black Knights' games have been picked up on the CBS Television Network (BYU, Air Force and Navy), while seven others will be on CBS Sports Net.

HEAD COACH JEFF MONKEN

- · Head coach Jeff Monken is in his seventh season at the helm of Army football and has a 42-36 record, which includes a 37-18 mark dating back to the start of 2016.
- · Monken is tied for fifth all-time at Army in coaching wins with Tom Cahill (1966-73). He trails Bob Sutton (1983-90) by four wins for fourth all-time.

USMA NOTES

• Lieutenant General Darryl A. Williams became the 60th Superintendent of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point in July of 2018.

Lt. Gen. Williams graduated from the U.S. Military Academy in 1983. He holds masters' degrees in Leadership Development, Military Art and Science and National Security and Strategic Studies.

Williams was a defensive lineman for the football team, earning three varsity letters (1980-82).

• More than 1,220 U.S. citizens and 13 international students, including 286 women, 493 minorities, and 18 combat veterans reported to West Point on Reception Day.

The incoming class of 2024 was selected from a pool of nearly 16,000 applicants.

Minority enrollment, roughly 40 percent, includes 214 African Americans, 141 Hispanic Americans, 118 Asian-Americans, and 20 Native Americans.

The Class of 2024 includes cadets from every state in the nation and 12 international students entering under the sponsorship of their respective countries.

The countries represented include Albania, Bosnia Herzegovina, Brunei, Cambodia, Cameroon, Kosovo (2), Mongolia, Philippines, Rwanda, South Korea, and Taiwan. Upon graduation, these cadets will return to their countries as officers in their armed forces.

• One of the duties of the new cadets is selecting a class motto. That motto, selected during Cadet Basic Training, is displayed during March Back on a large banner during the 12-mile return to West Point.

TEAM NOTES

PUTTING UP A ZERO

- The Black Knights defeated Middle Tennessee State, 42-0, in the season opener, the first Army shutout since it blanked Air Force in Colorado Springs, Colo., 21-0, on Nov. 4, 2017.
- The 42-0 victory was Army's largest shutout victory over an FBS school since 1963, when it defeated Wake Forest, 47-0.
- It was Army's first shutout at Michie Stadium since it blanked Fordham, 55-0, on Oct. 29, 2011.
- The last time Army blanked its opponent on its home-opener was on Sept. 11, 1993, when the Black Knights topped Colgate, 30-0.
- Saturday's shutout was the second of Coach Monken's tenure.

FAN ATTENDANCE

- The first two games of the season at Michie Stadium took place with just the Corps of Cadets in attendance.
- Decisions on fan attendance at future games this season will be made at a later date.

DEFENSIVE PROWESS

- The Army defense forced four turnovers vs. MTSU, the most since it had the same amount against Morgan State on Sept. 21, 2019.
- The Black Knights' defensive unit limited the MTSU to 184 yards of total offense.
- Army's defensive unit forced six Louisiana-Monroe three-and-outs.
- The Cadets' defense limited ULM to just 9 first downs, which is tied for the fourth fewest surrendered in the Jeff Monken era.

RHATTIGAN MAKING AN IMPACT

- LB Jon Rhattigan had a 43-yard interception returned for a touchdown vs. MTSU. The play marked both his first career interception and touchdown in his first career start.
- Rhattigan's pick-six was Army's first since Max Regan took an interception 48 yards to the house at Rice on Oct. 7, 2017.
- Rhattigan had played just 21 snaps on the defensive side of the ball in his career prior to 2020, but
 he earned a starting role this season and has played
 incredibly well through two games. He earned PFF
 grades above 90.0 in both contests against Middle
 Tennessee and ULM.

HOME SWEET HOME

- Army is now 18-2 at Michie Stadium dating back to the 2017 season.
- The 2019 season marked Army's fourth consecutive winning season at home.
- Head coach Jeff Monken is now 5-2 in season openers at Army, 6-1.
- •The Black Knights are 6-1 in home openers at Michie Stadium under head coach Jeff Monken, including winning the last five-straight.
- The Cadets currently own a four-game home winning-streak. During the stretch, the Black Knights have outscored their opponents by a total of 189-20.
- Army's streak of not allowing a touchdown at Michie Stadium ended at the 2:12 mark of the second quarter vs. ULM. The Cadets had gone 202:03 without allowing a touchdown on their home turf, dating back the UMass game in 2019.

OFFENSE COMING ALONG

- Army finished the victory over MTSU 368 yards of total offense, with 340 coming on the ground.
- All of Army's drives resulted in touchdowns, with an exception to its final drive when it ran out the clock.
- •The Cadets have seen 142 minutes and 17 seconds of action since their last punt at Michie Stadium. Army's last punt on its home turf occurred at the 7:17 mark of the third guarter against UMass on Nov. 9, 2019.
- Army started two of its drives in Middle Tennessee State territory.
- Dating back to last season Army started the season by scoring a touchdown on 13-straight drives that did not result in the end of a regulation at Michie Stadium.
- The Cadets only had two offensive plays go for negative yardage, both of which were losses of just one yard vs. MTSU.

YOUNG GUNS

- Freshman RB Tyrell Robinson led all rushers with 94 yards in his collegiate debut vs. MTSU on nine carries. He had a long rush of 37 yards on the first drive of the second half.
- Sophomore RB Jakobi Buchanan rushed for his first career touchdown and then added his second score of the day vs. ULM. He finished the day with 106 yards to makr his first career 100-yard rushing game and the first such effort for a Black Knight this season.

TEAM NOTES

- The Black Knights will have a new-look defense in 2020 under new defensive coordinator Nate Woody and Co-Defensive Coordinator Greg Gasparato.
- Woody was named Athlon Sports Defensive Coordinator of the Week after leading the Black Knights to a shutout victory in his Army debut.
- Woody, who brings an attacking 3-4 scheme to Army, was hired to run Georgia Tech's defense in 2018.
- He worked under then-Georgia Tech head coach Paul Johnson, who Monken was an assistant coach for with the Yellowjackets (2008-09), at Navy (2002-07) and at Georgia Southern (1997-01). In 2018, the Yellowjackets' defense had a nose for the football, as they were tied for fifth nationally in fumble recoveries (13), tied for 16thin total takeaways (25) and tied for 17th in defensive touchdowns (3).
- Woody directed Appalachian State's defense for five seasons. He took over a defense in 2013 that ranked eighth in the nine-team FCS Southern Conference in total defense the season prior to his arrival. Under Woody's leadership, his unit led the Sun Belt Conference in total defense three times and ranked among the top 30 in NCAA Division I FBS each of his last four campaigns at Appalachian State (2014-17).
- West Point's punting game has been strong. The Black Knights finished 2019 seventh in the nation in net punting (42.24) and 17th in punt return defense (4.11).

NEW LOOK STAFF

• Eight new coaching staff members will patrol the sidelines for the Black Knights in 2020. New DC Nate Woody, Co-DC Greg Gasparato/Safeties, Keith Gaither (WR), Saga Tuitele (OL), Matt Drinkall (TE), Shiel Wood (Inside LBs), Cody Worley (QBs) and Tank Wright (DL). For Gaither and Tuitele it is their second stints at Army, while Drinkall is promoted after a year at offensive quality control to assistant coach. Gaither was the wide receivers coach in 2015 and 2016, while Tuitele was on staff in 2007 and 2008.

BOWL CONNECTIONS

- On Oct. 24, 2019 Army West Point announced a new six-year bowl tie-in for Army Football with ESPN Events and the Independence Bowl. Through 2025, Army will have primary tie-ins with the Independence Bowl (even years) and an ESPN owned and operated bowl game (odd years).
- •Then on Nov. 5, 2019, Army announced an agreement with the Charlotte Sports Foundation, owner and operator of the Belk Bowl. Army will serve as a primary back-up for the Belk Bowl, and will have the opportunity to accept an invitation to the game twice during the next six-year bowl cycle that runs from 2020 through 2025.
- The Black Knights are joining the rest of the nation in celebrating 150 years of college football.
- As part of the celebration, Army will wear 150 patches on all of its jerseys throughout the year.
- Army has been an integral part of College Football since the first Army-Navy Game on the Plain at West Point in 1890.

NEWCOMER RELATIONS

- True freshman Camden O'Gara has some famous football ties, as his grandfather, Vince Costello, played for the Cleveland Browns for 12 years and the New York Giants for two. He also coached with the 1972 undefeated Miami Dolphins under NFL Hall of Famer Don Shula.
- Another true freshman, defensive lineman Caleb Tomlin is the nephew of Pittsburgh Steelers head

coach Mike Tomlin.

• TE Chris Cameron is the son of former NFL coach Cam Cameron.

PLAYER NOTES

- JR P Zach Harding averaged 48.2 yards per punt (program record) in nine games in 2019, pinning opponents inside the 20 yard line seven times and had eight points of 50+ yards. Against Air Force he had a boot of 78 yards and had a 67-yard punt against Hawai'i (Nov. 30)
- As a junior in 2019, linebacker Jeremiah Lowery made eight starts for the linebacking corps.
- Senior DBs Javhari Bourdeau and Jabari Moore have each appeared in 39 career games.
- Senior Amadeo West is looking for a bounce-back season after multiple season-ending injuries. He is moving back from linebacker to defensive end for his senior season
- Kwabena Bonsu (9), Amadeo West (5) and Joe Stephenson (1) all have starting experience on the defensive line.

Freshman Tyrell Robinson has been explosive during fall camp after coming down from the prep school.

- The Black Knights defeated Middle Tennessee State, 42-0, in the season opener, the first Army shutout since it blanked Air Force in Colorado Springs, Colo., 21-0, on Nov. 4, 2017.

Jeff Monken heads into his seventh season at the helm of Army West Point football in 2020 after being named the 37th individual head coach in program history on Dec. 24, 2013.

Monken shows a 78-52 career record as a head coach and a 42-36 mark at Army. The Black Knights have enjoyed success over the past four-plus seasons with a 34-18 record, including back-to-back wins over Air Force, three-straight wins over Navy and three consecutive bowl-game victories.

In 2018 Monken led the Cadets to a historic year as his squad became nationally ranked in early November for the first time in 22 years (1996). They remained in the Top-25 throughout the rest of the season and finished ranked No. 19 in the Associated Press Poll and No. 20 in the Amway Coaches Poll. The year was highlighted by a programrecord 11 wins, marking the first time in Academy history the Black Knights registered 10-plus wins in back-to-back seasons. Army also won the Commander In Chief's trophy in consecutive seasons for the first time in program lore, while also garnering the Lambert Trophy for the first time in 60 years. The Black Knights became the first three-time winner of the Armed Forces Bowl as well that season after they routed Houston, 70-14, on Dec. 22. The 70 points put up by Army in that contest tied an FBS record for points scored in a bowl game.

To cap the 2018 season, the Cadets won 13 games in a row at home and finished their second-straight season going unbeaten at Michie Stadium. They held five consecutive opponents to 14 or less points to end the year as well and finished 11-0 when leading at the half. Army closed the year ranked first nationally in third down conversion percentage (.571), fourth down conversion percentage (.861), and time of possession (38:33), while also sitting second in rushing offense with 312.5 yards per game.

Twelve cadet-athletes were named to the Phil Steele's All-Independent Team, and Monken received national praise after winning the George Munger Collegiate Coach of the Year Award and the Vince Lombardi Award for National College Coach of the Year. He was also named a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant and Eddie Robinson Awards for Coach of the Year.

In 2017 Monken led Army to its most successful season in over two decades, earning 10 victories, the Commander in Chief's Trophy and a victory in the Armed Forces Bowl. The Black Knights won the NCAA Division I Football Bowl Subdivision rushing title by averaging 362.3 rushing yards per game and finished with 50 rushing touchdowns, which broke the program record for a single season set a year prior. On the other side of the ball, Army was third in the nation in red zone defense and 14th against the pass. The Black Knights held opponents to 22 points per game and ended Air Force's 306-game scoring streak with a 21-0 victory at Falcon Stadium. It was the first shutout against a service academy since 1969. The Black Knights were also rewarded for their success as the ECAC Division I FBS Team of the Year.

The 2016 season was a memorable one for the Black Knights under Monken. He led them to their first win over Navy since 2001 and a victory in a bowl game. The last time the Black Knights accomplished both feats in the same season was in 1984. Army was second in the nation in rushing offense and ran for a then Academy single-season 46 touchdowns, which eclipsed the 1945 national

championship team. Defensively, Army was consistently in the Top-10 in total defense and closed out the year fourth in the nation.

In 2015, Monken coached Army to a pair of wins over Bucknell and Eastern Michigan. The Black Knights had five players reach 100 yards rushing in a game that year and had three different quarterbacks throw for 100 yards. Signal callers Ahmad Bradshaw and Chris Carter ran and threw for 100 yards in their career debuts. Army won on the road for the first time since 2010 with a 58-36 win over Eastern Michigan as well. The Black Knights closed the season ranked 12th in the country in rushing offense at 244.3 yards per game. Linebacker Andrew King finished 21st in the nation in tackles for loss with an average of 2.1 per game and 26th in fumbles recovered with two.

In his first season at Army, Monken guided the Cadets to home victories over Buffalo, Ball State and Fordham, in addition to a dramatic win against Connecticut at Yankee Stadium. Under his guidance, running back Larry Dixon, linebacker Jeremy Timpf, defensive back Josh Jenkins and offensive lineman Matt Hugenberg earned 11 citations on postseason all-star teams. Two players, Joe Drummond and Dixon, competed in The Medal of Honor Bowl Game and East-West Shrine Game, respectively, as well.

Army was fifth in the country in rushing offense at 296.5 yards per game in Monken's inaugural season and sixth in fewest penalties per game with just 4.08 infractions per contest. He tutored a host of players who were listed in the national rankings as well. Timpf was seventh in the nation in solo tackles per game and 23rd in tackles per game. Jenkins was eighth in the country in blocked kicks and 33rd in interceptions per game, and both Lama Johnson-Harris and Xavier Moss ranked 11th in punt return touchdowns. Dixon was nationally ranked in rushing yards per carry (30th), rushing yards (39th) and rushing yards per game (41st).

With the Black Knights' 47-39 win against Buffalo, Monken became the first head coach to win his first game since Bob Sutton did so in 1991 with a victory over Colgate. Prior to that, the last Army coach to win his first game against a Football Bowl Subdivision opponent was Ed Cavanaugh in 1980.

Monken came to the banks of the Hudson River following a successful stint as head coach at Georgia Southern. He spent four seasons as head coach of the Eagles after learning the triple-option offense under one of the nation's premier option proponents, Paul Johnson, during assistant coaching stints at Navy and Georgia Tech.

In his four seasons at Georgia Southern, Monken authored a 38-16 mark and spearheaded the programs transition to the elite Football Bowl Subdivision level from the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) ranks.

Georgia Southern, which joined the Sun Belt Conference following Monken's tenure, was a member of the FCS and qualified for the NCAA playoffs in all three eligible seasons under him. The Eagles advanced to the national semifinals each year, while also posting double-digit victory totals.

Monken guided tradition-rich Georgia Southern to some of the biggest wins in school history, with the most memorable arguably being a 26-20 victory at Florida at the vaunted "Swamp." Despite that headline-grabbing victory, the Eagles were not eligible for the FCS playoffs that season due to their transitional status.

Monken and Johnson are the only coaches in Georgia Southern school history to win at least 10 games in each of

their first three seasons. A finalist for the 2012 Liberty Mutual Coach of the Year award, Monken guided the Eagles to 10 wins his first season, 11 his second and 10 in his third. His 2013 squad posted a 7-4 mark, including the stunning, season-ending upset of Florida in Gainesville.

Under Monken's guidance, Georgia Southern was one of the top rushing teams at the FCS level, claiming the NCAA rushing title in 2012 at 399.36 yards per contest. Walter Payton Award candidate Jerick McKinnon and running back Dominique Swope established the NCAA record for rushing yards by teammates with 3,063. Monken coached a lengthy list of all-stars, including the school's highest-ever National Football League draft choice, safety J.J. Wilcox, a third-round selection by the Dallas Cowboys in 2013.

Georgia Southern was ranked No. 1 in both FCS polls for seven weeks in 2011 and stopped Wofford, 31-10, to win its ninth Southern Conference championship. Five players were named All-America, Brent Russell was selected Southern Conference Defensive Player of the Year, Monken earned conference Coach of the Year plaudits and Swope was named Southern Conference Freshman of the Year. Home playoff wins against Old Dominion and Maine were part of the Eagles' memorable 11-3 campaign.

Monken got off to a great start in his first year a Georgia Southern, knocking off top-ranked and previously unbeaten Appalachian State en route to its a 10-5 season. The Eagles ended the year with three straight wins to qualify for the postseason and registered three playoff victories to advance to the national semifinals.

In addition to the success on the field, Monken helped Georgia Southern re-emerge academically with the team's cumulative grade point average ranking as the highest in school history in each of his first two seasons. Not only were the Eagles successful in the classroom and on the football field under Monken, but the players and staffs were part of several community service programs and local events.

Monken was named Georgia Southern's head coach in November of 2009, continuing a family history of football coaches. Jeff's father, Mike, and a dozen family members have coached at the high school, collegiate or professional

Monken's first head coaching job came after accumulating 20 years of experience as an assistant, 13 of them with his mentor Johnson. Monken coached slotbacks at Georgia Southern from 1997 to 2001 before joining Johnson first at Navy and then Georgia Tech.

As an assistant coach at Georgia Southern, Monken was part of two NCAA FCS National Championship squads (1999 and 2000) and five-straight playoff teams. Georgia Southern was among the top-five rushing teams in all five seasons and twice led the nation in rushing. The Eagles ranked in the top-15 in scoring four out of five seasons as

After serving as an assistant at Georgia Southern, Monken accepted a position on Johnson's coaching staff at Navy. Monken not only mentored slotbacks, he later added special teams coordinator duties.

In Annapolis, Monken helped the Midshipmen to five-straight Commander in Chief trophies and five consecutive bowl game appearances, including a 10-win season in 2004. Following his time at Navy, Monken moved to Georgia Tech where for two seasons he served as the slotbacks coach and special teams coordinator. The Yellow Jackets posted double-digit wins in 2009 and captured the Atlantic Coast Conference championship, although that title was later vacated.

Monken began his coaching career in 1989 as a graduate assistant at Hawai'i and later spent one season at Arizona State. Monken moved to Buffalo as the wide receivers and tight ends coach who also handled recruiting. He served on the staffs at Morton (III.) High School as the head coach and at Concordia University in Illinois as the offensive line coach.

A native of Joliet, Ill., Monken played wide receiver for four years and earned two varsity letters in track and field, while earning his bachelor's degree from Millikin University in 1989. He was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in October 2013 and collected his master's degree from Hawai'i in 1991.

Monken and his wife Beth reside at West Point with their three daughters, Isabelle, Amelia and Evangeline.
