Hilton Dayes has compiled a diverse background of experience as both a successful coach and an accomplished player. Dayes is in his eighth season as head coach at Cincinnati, but his 23rd in the college coaching ranks. He has served as a head coach for 18 seasons, during which time he has compiled a 161-138-38 record. He led the Bearcats to their third-ever appearance in the NCAA championships in 2006. As an assistant coach, Dayes helped develop teams that made three appearances in the NCAA championships. As a player, he earned all-America honors in all four seasons of competition as Wright State University.

Dayes' 2007 squad qualified for its third straight BIG EAST Tournament

and won its first conference tournament match, a 2-0 win at Providence. Kenny Anaba became the third straight first-team all-BIG EAST selection and the fourth Bearcat to be drafted by an MLS team, as he was selected in the supplemental draft by Real Salt Lake.

Dayes led UC to a BIG EAST Red Division title in 2006, just the second season in the prestigious league for the Bearcats. UC earned an at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament after finishing 11-5-2 during the regular season and reaching as high as No. 14 in the national rankings. Dayes tutored Omar Cummings, who earned first-team all-America honors, the first player in school history to do so. Cummings then became the third Bearcat to be drafted by a Major League Soccer franchise under Dayes' watch when he was chosen by the Colorado Rapids in the 2007 MLS SuperDraft.

In 2005, Dayes led the Bearcats to a 10-7-2 overall record and a third-place finish in conference play. UC was ranked as high as No. 15 in the nation and reached the BIG EAST Tournament in the school's first year affiliated with the conference.

In three seasons in the BIG EAST, one of the nation's top soccer conferences, the Bearcats have won a division title, earned seven postseason all-conference awards, and made an NCAA appearance. Dayes has claimed six wins against nationally-ranked opponents over the last three seasons, including a victory against No. 1 Connecticut in 2005.

Dayes led UC to a third-place Conference USA finish in 2004. Six Bearcats earned all-C-USA recognition and three players moved on to the professional ranks following the season. UC defeated perennial power Saint Louis on the road and knocked off undefeated ninth-ranked South Florida at home during a six-match unbeaten streak late in the campaign.

Dayes led UC to just its second NCAA Tournament appearance in school history and a regular season C-USA title in 2003, garnering C-USA Coach of the Year honors. He produced a winning conference record in each of his first four years at UC.

A 1988 graduate of Wright State, Dayes compiled a 32-37-8 record in four years as head coach of his alma mater's men's team, highlighted by an 11-7-3 slate and the program's first ever appearance in the Midwestern Collegiate Conference Tournament final in 1998.

Dayes began his coaching career at Wright State, serving as the men's assistant in 1986 and the head women's coach from 1987-1994. During his tenure, the Raiders amassed a 64-48-11 slate.

In 1994, Dayes left Wright State to become the men's assistant at James Madison, helping direct the Dukes to a 51-13-6 record and three straight NCAA Tournament appearances, including trips to the Elite Eight in both 1994 and 1995.





Dayes returned to Wright State in 1997 to head up the men's program.

Prior to joining the coaching ranks, Dayes enjoyed a distinguished playing career at Wright State from 1982-1985. A four-time all-Mideast, all-Ohio and team MVP selection, Dayes is the only athlete in school history to be named all-American all four years of his career. He also is one of three student-athletes to have his jersey retired at the school. Dayes played on the professional level for the Dayton Dynamo of the National Professional Soccer League for two seasons and the Orlando Lions of the American Professional Soccer League for one year. A native of Kingston, Jamaica, Dayes graduated with a degree in electrical systems engineering. He is a former chair of the NSCAA board and chairman of the Black Soccer Coaches Committee, as well as a Region II Olympic Development Program coach. He is accredited with the NSCAA Advanced National Coaching diploma, the USSF National A license, as well as being a member of the NSCAA National Academy Coaching Staff.

Dayes was married to Karen Ferguson in May, 2008.

Dan Ensley enters his 11th season in the collegiate coaching ranks in 2008 and his fourth season with the Cincinnati soccer program.

A tireless recruiter, Ensley is responsible for team training, compliance and eligibility issues, as well as his duties as recruiting coordinator.

During his first three seasons at Cincinnati, Ensley has helped guide the Bearcats to 30 wins, a BIG EAST Red Division title, and an NCAA appearance. UC's recent recruiting classes have been ranked among the Top 40 in the nation by *CollegeSoccerNews*. Following the 2006 season, Ensley was promoted to Associate Head Coach.

Prior to joining the UC staff, Ensley spent the 2003 and 2004 seasons at Duke, where he helped lead the Blue Devils to the 2004 NCAA College Cup. He handled coaching responsibilities, including travel coordination, daily operations, and NCAA compliance, while assisting with team training, recruiting, match analysis, season planning, video editing, and individual instruction.

Ensley previously served as an assistant at his alma mater, James Madison University, for four seasons, during which the Dukes made two NCAA appearances (2000, 2001) and won a Colonial Athletic Association regular-season title (2000) and tournament crown (2001).

He served as head coach at Division III Bridgewater College (Va.) from 1997-1999 where he helped the Eagles establish several school records and become highly competitive in the Old Dominion Athletic Conference.

Ensley has various youth soccer coaching experiences at the club level in Ohio, North Carolina, and Virginia. Prior to relocating to North Carolina, Ensley held a Director of Coaching position with the Soccer Organization of Charlottesville/Albemarle (Va.), while coaching their Boys Premiere U-18 and Girls Premiere U-15 Teams.

As a student-athlete at James Madison, where he played under current UC mentor Hylton Dayes, Ensley led the Dukes to the quarterfinals of the NCAA College Cup in 1994 and 1995.

A native of Burke, Va., Ensley's successful coaching career has mirrored his accomplishments as a youth player. He captained his VISTA Hurricane Club Team to a

USYSA U-19 Boys Youth National Championship in 1992.

Ensley, his wife, Dana, and their three-year old daughter, Hannah, reside in Cincinnati.

Jared Micklos, enters his second season as an assistant with the University of Cincinnati men's soccer coaching staff in 2008. At Cincinnati, Micklos assists with team training and focuses on developing and training the goalkeepers.

Off the field, Micklos is responsible for video analysis, team travel, adidas equipment, compliance, marketing initiatives, and assisting with recruiting efforts. Micklos serves as the Camp Coordinator for the Cincinnati Soccer Academy at UC and various satellite camps in the local soccer community, in addition to serving as the Head Coach for the Classics Hammer FC U-15 boy's team.

Micklos, who spent three seasons with the University of Rochester, including two as recruiting coordinator, helped the Yellowjackets to a 39-9-7 record during his tenure, reached two NCAA tournaments, and achieved a Top 10 national ranking in 2005. UR earned NSCAA Team Academic Awards in each of his seasons with the Yellowjackets and compiled the highest national team GPA across all divisions in 2004.

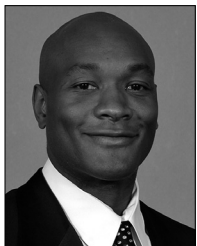
The Palatine, Ill., native earned a B.S. in business management and international studies from Indiana University in 2002. While at IU, Micklos served as head coach of the women's club soccer team at the university, leading the Hoosiers to the Midwest Conference title and a spot in the national finals in 2001. During his collegiate career, Micklos earned a roster berth as a place kicker on the varsity football team as a walk-on freshman.

While at UR, Micklos coordinated the Rochester Elite Soccer Camp, with duties including marketing, registration, scheduling and curriculum development. He also served as head coach of the U-16 Rochester Jr. Rhinos, leading the squad to an undefeated league season and the finals of the State Cup in 2005. He earned a master's degree in Higher Education Administration from Rochester in 2006.

Micklos holds the NSCAA Advanced National Diploma, the NSCAA Advanced National Goalkeeping Diploma and the United States Soccer Federation 'B' License.

university PRESIDENT

dr. nancy ZIMPHER



Nancy L. Zimpher — a widely recognized leader in higher education, civic engagement, economic development and urban education reform — serves as the president of the University of Cincinnati,

one of the nation's top public research universities. She became UC's 25th president and its first woman president in October 2003. Under her leadership, UC embarked on an unprecedented consultation process that involved a wide spectrum of the university's stakeholders and resulted in the strategic vision, UC[21: Defining the New Urban Research University.

Under President Zimpher's direction, the university continues to make significant strides in its UC[21 vision to become a leading urban research institution for the 21st century. The university has experienced enrollment growth to over 36,500 students, increased retention and graduation rates, improved student satisfaction and enhanced national rankings — including breaking into the Princeton Review's 2008 best colleges list. These achievements have been accomplished through a number of strategic actions that President Zimpher implemented, among them restructuring the university's decision-making process and introducing comprehensive state-of-the-art business practices; raising admissions standards while growing enrollment and maintaining the university's deep commitment to access and a diverse student body; introducing a series of academic reforms related to Strategic Enrollment Management, program offerings and performance-based budgeting; redesigning mechanisms for research support and opportunities for commercialization on intellectual property; as well as transforming decadal leadership through the completion of several national searches.

Additional examples of President Zimpher's achievements at UC include:

- Completion of the final phases of a \$1.7 billion, 15-year capital transformation of the urban UC campus in Uptown Cincinnati;
- Creation of a university Academy of Fellows for Teaching and Learning;
- Initiating the largest campaign in UC history;
- Stepping up freshman innovations, an assessment center and undergraduate research opportunities;

- Establishment of UC's new Center for the City, designed to facilitate innovative and productive partnerships that leverage university and public expertise to work toward the betterment of the community;
- Chairing the Uptown Consortium, a five-member partnership in neighborhood development that involves five of the largest employers in the Uptown area surrounding the UC campus; and
- Founding of Strive, a Cincinnati-Northern Kentucky partnership focused on college access and success. President Zimpher is a co-founder of this partnership, which involves higher education institutions in the region, urban P-12 school districts in Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky, as well as business, civic and nonprofit organizations.

Prior to her arrival at UC, Dr. Zimpher served as the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, where she led the university from 1998 to 2003, developing The Milwaukee Idea strategic vision and holding a faculty position in the School of Education. Prior to her appointment in Wisconsin, she was the Executive Dean of the Professional Colleges and Dean of the College of Education at The Ohio State University in Columbus, Ohio. During her career at OSU, she worked in various administrative positions and engaged in research and development efforts concerned with improving the preparation of teachers, especially teachers for urban contexts.

President Zimpher is highly engaged on the national and regional level and remains committed to an active role as a thought-leader in the 21st century. She serves as past-chair of the Board of Directors for National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges (NASULGC), the nation's primary alliance of public universities as well as the oldest higher education association in the United States, now consisting of 215 members. Dr. Zimpher also chairs a national network of presidents called the Coalition of Urban Serving Universities (USU), an organization committed to the urban agenda and the role of urban-located universities in their communities. In November 2007, she represented urban universities at the launch of the Blueprint for American Prosperity at the Brookings Institution. In addition, she serves as the Big East representative to the Division I Board of Directors of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) and on the national board for the Fund for the Improvement of Postsecondary Education (FIPSE). A past president of a national education reform network, The Holmes Partnership, she has previously served on the Executive Board of the National Council for Accreditation of

Teacher Education and the AACTE, on the board of the American Council on Education (ACE), as chair of NASULGC's Commission on International Programs and as Project Director for a U.S. Department of Education Teacher Quality Grant.

Dr. Zimpher participates on numerous state, regional, civic and community commissions and boards. Presently, she co-chairs the Ohio Board of Regents' Articulation & Transfer Advisory Council. She serves as chair of the board of the Cincinnati USA Regional Chamber of Commerce. She also serves on the Cincinnati Business Committee, co-chairing its Education Task Force; serves on the boards of the Cincinnati Center City Development Corp. (3CDC), and the United Way of Greater Cincinnati.

Dr. Zimpher is the co-author and co-editor of books on university leadership as well as books on teacher education and urban education. She also has authored and co-authored many monographs, book chapters, and academic journal articles related to academic leadership, school/university partnerships and teacher education, and in many instances her co-author has been her husband, Dr. Kenneth R. Howey, a research professor in education at UC. She often is sought after as a key participant at both national and international conferences, making numerous presentations for groups such as ACE, NASULGC, American Educational Research Association (AERA), Association of Colleges for Teacher Education (AACTE), and Association of Teacher Educators (ATE).

She is the recipient of numerous awards including the People of Vision Award from Prevent Blindness Ohio; the Council for the Advancement and Support of Education's Chief Executive Leadership Award; Ohio State University's Alumni Association Professional Achievement Award; the Urban Appalachian Council's Kinship Award; the Association of Teacher Educators' Distinguished Research Award; the AACTE's Edward C. Pomeroy Award for Outstanding Contributions to Teacher Education; and Virginia Commonwealth University's Distinguished Woman Scholar Award. In 1998, she was inducted into the Ohio Women's Hall of Fame, and she has been recognized with the YWCA's Women of Achievement award in Columbus, Milwaukee and Cincinnati.

President Zimpher holds a bachelor's degree in English education and speech, a master's degree in English literature, and a PhD in teacher education and administration in higher education, all from The Ohio State University.

mike **THOMAS**



A 22-year veteran of college athletics administration, Mike Thomas was named as the University of Cincinnati's Director of Athletics on October 20, 2005. Since taking the reins of the department with 18 teams and 560 student-athletes,

Thomas has championed student-athlete development and fiscal responsibility, while also authoring a detailed plan for competitive success in the BIG EAST Conference and on the national level.

In May of 2006, Thomas introduced his vision for Bearcats Athletics, aptly titled CATAPULT. His five-year vision for UC's 18-sport intercollegiate program was launched on his six-month hiring anniversary. The plan focuses on three main initiatives: winning BIG EAST team championships, a high-level of academic achievement, and a comprehensive integration with the UC Campus and Greater Cincinnati Community.

CATAPULT – an acronym for championships, academics, and together – sets a goal that in the next five years UC will win a BIG EAST championship in every sport; UC's student-athletes will lead the general student body in graduation rate and grade-point average; and UC's student-athletes and coaches will engage the Cincinnati community in service.

Through the 2007-08 Winter Quarter, the second year under the CATAPULT plan, UC's sports teams continue to make marked improvement in academics as 14 of the 18 sports programs achieved a grade-point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher and the student-athletes continued to graduate at a rate 10 percent higher than the overall student body. Those numbers will continue to grow as more and more students receive the benefits of the recently expanded and redefined academic services office and NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program. Overall, 12 teams showed improvements in their GPAs from 2006-07 to 2007-08.

"It is exciting to see our student-athletes and staff working together and making significant progress in so many areas, so quickly," says Thomas. "We will continue to progress as we work towards our collective goals in the three components of our CATAPULT program."

A total of 273 student-athletes from UC's 18 sports were named to either the Bearcat or the Topcat Honor Roll. To qualify for the Bearcat Honor Roll, a student-athlete must have earned a grade point average between 3.0 and 3.49 for the quarter, while Topcat honorees must maintain between a 3.5 and a 4.0 GPA.

The Bearcats continue to step up their levels of performance in their third season in the BIG EAST, having three teams finish in the upper third of the conference and six student-athletes bring home individual championships.

The football team made program history in 2007 under first-year head coach Brian Kelly as the team tied the school record for single-season wins (10), ranked No. 17 in the final *Associated Press* Poll, a first for the UC program, and captured its second straight bowl victory, winning the Papajohns.com Bowl vs. Southern Mississippi.

The UC baseball team also posted a historic year in the spring as it finished second during the regular season with a school-record 39 wins and made its first trip to the BIG EAST Tournament title game. All told, UC Athletics produced five all-Americans, two all-Region selections, and 31 all-BIG EAST honorees in 2007-08.

In 2006-07 UC's men's soccer team became the first Bearcat squad to claim a BIG EAST title, winning the Red Division of the league's regular-season race.

"Spreading the Bearcats' message is vital to our continued brand building efforts and our charge to reach out to our fans, alumni, and sports fans and share the excitement of being a Bearcat," says Thomas. "I am very proud of the strides that we are making in all areas of UC Athletics. Our achievement is coming as a result of working together as a team. Our student-athletes and staff are setting the bar high and then reaching their goal, which is fun to be a part of."

During his tenure at UC, Thomas has hired five head coaches (head men's basketball coach Mick Cronin, head women's basketball coach Kelley Hall, head football coach Brian Kelly, head women's lacrosse coach Lellie Swords, head women's soccer coach Michelle Salmon), added the sport of women's lacrosse, and has introduced a new financial management plan which will trend operations towards a balanced budget for the first time in over a decade.

In March 2007, UC Athletics was recognized in the 2006-07 Diversity in Athletics Award, presented by the Laboratory for Diversity in Sport at Texas A&M University. The award recognizes the NCAA Division I athletics departments that excel in various areas of diversity and UC was recognized for the graduation of African American male student-athletes. UC was one of just 10 programs nationwide to earn the Diversity in Athletics Award for the graduation of African American male student-athletes.

As expenses continue to rise in the world of college athletics, the University of Cincinnati has kept pace and made historic leaps in 2007-08. The football program established new records for sellouts (3) and ticket sales revenues, while the development area, better known as UCATS, reached all-time highs for donors (3,000) and donations to the annual fund. Three months before the first football game of 2008, season ticket sales for UC football broke the all-time record and crossed over the 10,000 mark for the first time.

Beginning in the fall of 2008, all UC teams will be outfitted exclusively in adidas footwear, uniforms, training apparel, and accessories as the department signed its first across-the-board shoe

and apparel contract. The four-year, \$14.5 million contract aligns UC with other adidas marketing partners such as the NFL, MLS, and an 11-year exclusive all-league partnership with the NBA.

Prior to coming to UC, Thomas spent five years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Akron, bringing a model of academic and athletic success with him from his seven years of experience as an associate athletic director at the University of Virginia. Virginia finished in the Top 25 in the Director's Cup in each year of Thomas' tenure there, while at the same time was in the Top 10 nationally in student-athlete graduation rates.

Under Thomas' direction, Akron rose from last to second place among Mid-American Conference schools in the Director's Cup annual rankings. Simultaneously, Akron vaulted from last to second place in the MAC Academic Achievement Awards.

Thomas hired highly successful football and men's basketball head coaches at Akron, and served on several coaching search committees at Virginia. He is well-connected with several national leaders in both NCAA and NBA basketball realms. In his career, he has worked with coaches who have won over 30 national championships combined.

Thomas increased the financial base of the Akron athletics program through increasing corporate sponsorship levels by 500 percent and boosted annual giving to athletics to its highest level in the school's history. Community support was rallied, with marked increases shown in football and basketball attendance.

Support services and facilities for academic support for student-athletes were significantly increased, which resulted in a significant improvement in grade point averages and graduation rates of UA student-athletes.

Thomas coordinated over \$140 million in facility construction and renovation, including \$25 million in capital improvements to Akron's athletic facilities. He also was instrumental in the initial fundraising and planning stages of the new football stadium which is under construction on the Akron campus.

Recognized for his administrative acumen by his peers, Thomas presently serves on several national and conference committees, including the NCAA Division I Championship/Competition Cabinet, the NCAA Postseason Bowl Licensing Subcommittee, the NCAA Men's Basketball Issues Committee, and he also chairs the BIG EAST Championship and Competition committee. Thomas has also previously served as a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Issues Committee, the NCAA Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, and the Division 1A Athletics Director's Association Legislative Review Committee.

Twice during his career, Thomas has received distinction for his efforts and dedication as a director of athletics, garnering the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletics Director Award in 2005 at Akron and then again this past April (2008) at Cincinnati.

Prior to his experience at Virginia, Thomas spent seven years at the University of Denver as assistant athletic director for internal operations, and one year at the University of Iowa in marketing and promotions.

Thomas, 48, received his B.S. degree in Business Administration from Colorado State University in 1983, and his M.S. degree in Athletic Administration from Western Illinois University in 1986. He and his wife, Jenifer, have four children: Vince, Joey, Mick, and Meredith.

bob arkeilpane

deputy director of athletics

Bob Arkeilpane joined the University of Cincinnati as Deputy Director of Athletics in December of 2005. He is the No. 2 administrator in charge of UC's 18-sport intercollegiate athletics program and oversees the daily operations of the athletics department.

Arkeilpane has three decades of Division I experience as a student-athlete, coach, and administrator. He joined the Bearcats Department of Athletics in 2005 after serving for three years as Associate Vice President of the UC Foundation, the private sector fund-raising entity for the University of Cincinnati and its campuses, colleges, departments, and units. Arkeilpane previously had worked for the UC Foundation as college director of development and alumni affairs from 1987-91.

Arkeilpane made his return to UC after five successful years as Director of Athletics at the University of Buffalo. Arkeilpane was named officer-in-charge in UB's Division of Athletics and then served as interim athletics director for 10 months prior to being named director in February 1999. He was promoted to the helm of the Bulls' department of athletics after spending three years as Associate Athletics Director of Development at UB starting in 1995.

A native of Amherst, N.Y. and a standout high school football player at Sweet Home High School, he earned an athletics scholarship to Syracuse, where he was a starting defensive back for three seasons. He played with future NFL stars Art Monk, Joe Morris, and Gary Anderson—and against such big-name players as Warren Moon, Dan Marino, and Jim Kelly. mike waddell

senior associate director of athletics/external relations

Mike Waddell joined the UC athletics family as senior associate director of athletics in March, 2006. His duties include oversight of marketing/fan development, ticketing/customer service, sports communications, information technology, the Wheels of Support program, and UC's profitable licensing and merchandising efforts. He also oversees UC's fundraising efforts with UC's professional sports alumni and serves as a member of the Campus Communications Cabinet.

senior associate director of athletics/development

Andy Hurley joined the University of Cincinnati in March of 2006 to head the Athletics Development office. His primary duties as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Development are centered on managing efforts to generate private, philanthropic support to assist UC's student-athletes and coaches in building championship caliber programs in the BIG EAST.

He came to UC after seven years at the University of Buffalo, where he served as an assistant athletics director for the last three.
