STORY LINES

- Riding the momentum of three wins over Top 25 foes and its first nine-win season in decades, No. 20/23 Cincinnati heads to its sixth bowl game in eight years. Listed among the Top 25 at the end of its schedule for the first time in the program's 120 seasons, UC faces former Conference USA foe Southern Miss. in the Papajohns.com Bowl.
- First-year head coach Brian Kelly guided the Bearcats to a 9-3 regular-season finish that included a 4-3 record in the BIG EAST Conference and earned him BIG EAST Coach of the Year honors. Cincinnati's 9-3 mark is the third-best posted by a first-year coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision this season.
- One win shy of equaling the record for wins in a season, during the 2007 campaign Cincinnati has set records for points (441), touchdowns (59), passing touchdowns (32), and punting (46.0 yards average). UC also established a single-game record for sacks, with 11, in the regular-season finale.





Series Notes

- The 2007 Papajohns.com Bowl pits a pair of old Conference USA rivals against one another. It marks the 15th time that the Bearcats and Golden Eagles have met on the gridiron.
- The all-time series between Cincinnati and Southern Miss. is knotted, at 7-7. The two sides have not tangled since the Bearcats cruised to a 52-24 win over the No. 21-rated Golden Eagles in Hattiesburg, Miss., on Nov. 6, 2004.
- Southern Miss. owned a 5-2 advantage when the two sides met as C-USA adversaries from 1996-2003.
- The series dates back to Oct. 2, 1976, when Cincinnati claimed a 28-21 victory at M.M. Roberts Stadium. UC won four of the first five meetings in the series.

Inside the Numbers

431

Quarterback **Ben Mauk** continues to shine in the Bearcats offense. Against

Syracuse, "Bionic Ben" enjoyed the No. 2 passing game in Cincinnati history with 431 yards through the air. Mauk completed 29-of-42 pass attempts, including four touchdown strikes.

With four touchdown passes in the regular-season finale, **Ben Mauk** set a new Bearcats single-season record with 27 scoring passes. Mauk, who has notched a TD toss in 10 of his 11 games played, eclipsed Gino Guidugli's previous record of 26 set in 2004.

Marcus Barnett is posting the finest season ever by a first-year receiver at Cincinnati. Barnett snared three touchdown grabs at Syracuse to break UC's single-season with 13 touchdown receptions. Barnett surpassed Jim O'Brien's mark of 12 set in 1968.

Inside the Carrier Dome, the Bearcats' defensive front applied plenty of heat on Syracuse, registering a school-record 11 sacks for minus-89 yards. Cincinnati is listed 14th in the nation with 38 sacks.

Senior defensive end **Angelo Craig's** 16-yard fumble recovery for touchdown at Syracuse marked Cincinnati's seventh touchdown of the season to come via either defense or special teams.

Syracuse, the Bearcats' ferocious front seven pushed the Orange back for minus-15 yards on 34 rushing attempts. The negative rushing output marks the seventh-lowest ever allowed by a Cincinnati defense. It is the lowest rushing output against UC, since the Bearcats held Kansas to minus-46 yards rushing in a 34-7 win at Nippert Stadium on Sept. 29, 1997.

General Notes

BEARCATS FINISH REGULAR SEASON IN TOP 25: Riding the momentum from three wins over Top 25 teams and its first nine-win season in decades, No. 20/23 Cincinnati concluded its regular season with a 52-31 triumph at Syracuse. UC is hoping to finish in the final Top 25 for the first time in the program history.

VOTERS TAKE NOTICE: Receiving votes from the national pundits for a record 13 straight weeks, Cincinnati maintained its spot in the Dec. 2 Associated Press Poll. At No. 20 in the AP Poll with 394 votes, Cincinnati is listed No. 23 in the USA Today Coaches' Poll with 215 tallies. UC stands at No. 20 in the Harris Interactive Poll and is 22nd in the all-important BCS Standings.

TARGET 10: At 9-3, Cincinnati posted nine wins for the fourth time in the program's 120 seasons. A win in the 2007 Papajohns.com Bowl would give the Bearcats 10 victories for the second time in history. The only 10-win season in Cincinnati history came in 1951 when UC finished 10-1 and won the Mid-American Conference crown.

IN DECEMBER: Cincinnati is 5-4-1 all-time when playing in the final month of the calendar. The fifth-oldest program in the Bowl Subdivision, UC's first December football game resulted in a 0-0 tie against Miami (OH) on Dec. 8, 1888. Dating back to the 1997 Humanitarian Bowl, Cincinnati is 2-3 in December bowl games. The last time UC played in the 12th month, it throttled Marshall 32-14 in the 2004 Fort Worth Bowl.

ONE OF THE TOP FIRST-YEAR COACHES: A far cry from a rookie, **Brian Kelly** has led UC to the third-most wins of any first-year head coach in the country. The top five win outputs of first-year coaches is listed below:

KELLY BOASTS IMPRESSIVE RECORD WITH BEARCATS: Dating back to the 2007 International Bowl, Brian Kelly is 10-3 as head coach of the Bearcats. The only coach to start his tenure 7-0 at UC, Kelly has the best record of any first-year coach in the modern era of Cincinnati history.

KELLY AMONG THE NATION'S ELITE COACHES: People in Cincinnati know Brian Kelly is an excellent football coach, but do they know he is one of the winningest active coaches in Division I Bowl Subclassification? Utilizing winning percentage, Kelly is listed 12th among active coaches with a minimum of five full years experience.

PLAYING TAKEAWAY: UC is third nationally with a giveaway/takeaway margin of +1.42 per game. The Bearcats have yielded nine interceptions and 12 fumbles, but have created 39 turnovers (16 fumble recoveries, 23 interceptions).

WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR MAKES: With a reputation for defense, Cincinnati has added a potent offensive punch in 2007. UC scored 441 points (36.8 per game) to set school records for single-season scoring. They also established single-season records with 59 touchdowns and 32 scoring passes.

TURNING DEFENSE INTO OFFENSE: Taking advantage of the opponents' miscues, the Bearcats have scored 135 points off of opponents' turnovers. Below are the turnovers and resulting points for Cincinnati:

AGAINST RATED OPPONENTS: UC has reveled facing the best competition this season, posting a 3-1 record against Top 25 foes. Cincinnati boasted a string of four-straight wins over Top 25 teams, that dated more than 52 weeks. UC owns an 8-61 all-time record against Top 25 opponents.

DOME SWEET DOME: After the 52-31 win in the Carrier Dome, Cincinnati has won each of its last three games indoors. The streak dates back to Oct. 29, 2005, when UC claimed a 22-16 win over Syracuse in the Carrier Dome. Sandwiched between games at Syracuse is the 2007 International Bowl victory at the Rogers Centre. Coincidentally, Cincinnati wore black uniforms in all three contests.

THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME: Finishing 4-2 at home, over the past four seasons, the Bearcats are 21-8 (.724) when playing at Nippert Stadium. They posted a 6-1 mark at home in 2006. Head Coach Brian Kelly boasts an all-time mark of 78-18-1 in home games over his 18 seasons.

REGULAR FEATURES

- CATTITUDE at Varsity Village: The official pregame party starts two and a half hours before each game at Marge Schott Stadium. There is reasonably priced food and drink, along with music, promotions, tented seating and visits by the UC Band, Cheerleaders and Dance Team.
- Bearcat Kids Zone: Tailored to the young Bearcat fan, on Sheakley Lawn, features face painting, inflatable games, music and concessions, beginning two and a half hours before kickoff.

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The Offense

SCOUTING REPORT: Noted for his ingenious offensive schemes, Brian Kelly has moved Cincinnati to a no-huddle offense that emphasizes stretching the field and finding openings to attack via the run or pass. UC is listed 14th nationally in scoring (36.8 points per game) and 28th in total offense (436.3 yards per game). The Bearcats employ three and four wide receivers and one back in a variety of formations.

THE MATCHUP: Cincinnati's offense faces a Southern Miss. defense that is listed as the No. 47 defense in the country, allowing 363.2 yards per game. The Golden Eagles' defense allowed 242 rushing yards and 360 yards of total offense in the 16-10 victory over Arkansas State its last time out. Sophomore linebacker Gerald McRath leads the defense with a team-high 131 tackles, with 10 tackles for loss and 4.5 sacks. McRath has 40 more stops than the No. 2-tackler Brandon Sumrall. Sumrall leads the secondary with five interceptions. Yielding 23.6 points per game, Southern Miss. has allowed 30 or more points five times this season and is 1-4 in those games.

PENCHANT FOR POINTS: Cincinnati has established a new single-season scoring record with 441 points this season. Boosted by scoring 52 points at San Diego State and Syracuse, plus 59 against Southeast Missouri State, UC set a record with its 36.8 points per game scoring average.

QUICK STRIKE CAT ATTACK: With an ability to score in quickly, the Bearcats have scored 11 touchdowns in one minute or less this season. The sixth-most quick strikes, the Bearcats have posted 27 scoring drives of two minutes or less, which is seventh-most in the nation. The Top 10 lists in both categories is below:

RUNNING THE SPREAD AND SPREADING THE RUN: Seeing the shotgun formation, fans expect to see the pigskin flying from all angles, but Cincinnati has shown an ability to run the football at a rate of 157.9 yards per game. UC has rushed for more than 200 yards in three contests this season.

ENJOYING THE RED ZONE: Cincinnati started nearly perfect at scoring when penetrating the opposition's 20 yard line. UC scored on its first 12 drives inside their opponents' red zone before a missed field goal at Miami (OH) stopped the streak. Cincinnati has converted 47-of-53 red zone trips (88.7 percent) into points.

MAUK HAS BEEN "NEW AND IMPROVED": After tossing four touchdowns and 10 interceptions in 18 games, over three seasons, at Wake Forest, **Ben Mauk's** arm has been "new and improved" at Cincinnati. Mauk is ninth nationally with a passer rating of 154.55, and is completing 61.4 percent of his attempts. He has completed a school-record 27 touchdown passes and carded six interceptions. Although his touchdown to interception margin was -6 at Wake Forest, Mauk currently owns the single-season mark at +21 at UC, breaking the previous single-season record of +18 set by Gino Guidugli in 2004.

Offensive Braintrust



The last appointment Brian Kelly made after he was hired as Cincinnati's 38th head coach was hiring **Jeff Quinn** as offensive

coordinator. Quinn, who enters his 17th season alongside Kelly, coordinates the Bearcats' offensive gameplan. A year ago, his Central Michigan offense led the MAC in scoring (29.7 ppg) and total offense (375.3 ypg).

If Cincinnati Wins ...

- It would mark the second time in the 120 seasons of football that the Bearcats posted 10 victories in a season. The 1951 team finished 10-1, making them the first team to post 10 wins at UC.
- It would give Cincinnati a 5-4 all-time series advantage against Southern Miss.
- The Bearcats would wrap up 2007 with a 2-0 record against Conference USA competition. On Sept. 22, they defeated Marshall 40-14 at Nippert Stadium to move to 4-0 during the non-conference season.
- UC would improve to 6-4 in bowl games and extend its postseason win streak to three straight. Cincinnati was victorious in the 2007 International Bowl and the 2004 PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl.
- The Bearcats would finish the season 6-1 on the road. Brian Kelly would improve to 7-1 away from Nippert Stadium as head coach of the Bearcats.
- Brian Kelly would move to 2-0 in bowl games and 11-3 as head coach of the Bearcats.

BEN WAS A BEAST INSIDE THE BIG EAST: Quarterback **Ben Mauk** has shined brightest over the seven-game BIG EAST Conference schedule, tossing 18 touchdowns against four interceptions. In league play, the Kenton, OH native averaged 287.1 yards through the air, totaling 2,010 passing yards. Mauk also paced the rushing attack with 292 yards (41.7 yards per game) in league competition.

MAUK SHOWS HIS ARM AND LEGS AGAINST MOUNTAINEERS: Described as the heart and soul of the offense, **Ben Mauk** showed both his arm and his legs in Cincinnati's 28-23 loss to then-No. 5 West Virginia. Mauk completed 19-of-34 passes for 323 yards, including two touchdowns. He also rushed for 52 yards and finished as UC's leading rusher for the third time in the last four games.

MAUK CELEBRATING A SEASON FOR THE HISTORY BOOKS: A story loaded with adversity, **Ben Mauk** has persevered to post one of the top passing seasons in Cincinnati lore. Mauk is tops in UC single-season history in touchdown passes (27) and passing efficiency (154.55). He is third in completion percentage (61.4), fourth in passing yards (2,787), seventh in completions (205) and eighth in attempts (334).

GOODMAN CATCHES DAD ON SINGLE-SEASON LIST: UC's top target each of the past two seasons, **Dominick Goodman** leads the team with 61 catches for 774 yards in 2007. With four catches against West Virginia, the junior passed his father, Don's top mark of 51 receptions in 1983. Goodman's 61 receptions are tied for fifth with Chad Plummer who caught 61 passes for UC in 1998.

GOODMAN SURPASSES 1,000 YARDS AND REACHES TOP 10 CHARTS: Fourth on Cincinnati's career receptions list with 113 grabs, **Dominick Goodman** is 67 yards shy of joining the school's Top 10 in career receiving yards at 1,389. The junior wideout's 13 career touchdown catches have him tied for sixth in the record books.

BARNETT MAKES CASE AS ONE OF THE TOP RECEIVING TARGETS: The Bearcats have spread the ball to 16 different targets and none have totaled more yards or touchdowns than **Marcus Barnett**. After sitting out the 2006 season, Barnett has set rookie records in every receiving category. He leads the team in receiving yards (845) and touchdown catches (13) and is one behind the team lead in receptions (60).

FRESHMAN CATCHES 30-YEAR OLD TOUCHDOWN MARK: By snaring three touchdowns in the regular-season finale, **Marcus Barnett** set a new Bearcats record with 13 touchdown grabs for the season. Barnett broke the previous mark of 12 touchdown receptions, which was held by Jim O'Brien since 1968. Among Football Bowl Subdivision freshmen, Barnett's 13 scoring grabs are second nationally.

BARNETT'S CATCH 21: One week after registering 10 receptions for 210 yards and two touchdowns against West Virginia, rookie receiver **Marcus Barnett** did one better by tallying 11 catches for 127 yards and three scores at Syracuse. Barnett's 210 yards receiving were the fourth-most in a game by a Cincinnati receiver and the most since Jon Olinger totaled 240 yards on 13 catches against Miami (OH) in 2002.

RAMSEY REWARDED WITH STARTING ROLE: Sophomore running back Jacob Ramsey garnered the starting nod for each of his last three games and has totaled 117 yards on 44 carries in the first extensive action of his career.

BENTON LEADING THE GROUND GAME: One of three senior running backs, Butler Benton is pacing the Bearcats' ground attack with 499 yards on 99 attempts. The senior paced UC four times, including a nine-carry, 63-yard performance at Syracuse.

ALL HE DOES IS SCORE TOUCHDOWNS: Bradley Glatthaar is the most efficient rusher in the running back rotation, totaling eight touchdowns on 47 carries this year. Glatthaar's two-yard touchdown run at Syracuse moved him into a tie for sixth in the UC record books with the 21st rushing score of his career.

Joe Tresey is entrusted with directing the Bearcats' defense. A veteran of both the prep and collegiate ranks, Tresey is entering his 13th

season on the college sidelines. In his one season at Central Michigan, Tresey's group ranked 48th in stopping the run (126.5 ypg).

Historic Nippert Stadium

Nippert Stadium is the fifth-oldest NCAA Division I-A or I-AA stadium still in use. Opened in 1916, Nippert Stadium is preceeded in history by Harvard Stadium (1903), Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd/Grant Field (1914), the Yale Bowl (1914) and Cornell's Schoellkopf Stadium (1915). Though the permanent stadium first came into use in 1916, UC has been playing on the site since 1902.

Sellouts Abound at Nippert

Highlighted by three sellout crowds of 35,097 this season, Cincinnati established a new single-season attendance record of 181,477, an average of 30,246 fans, for six home games at Nippert Stadium.

Including the 2007 campaign, Nippert Stadium has enjoyed a total of 16 sellouts in its lengthy history. Nippert Stadium's 13 largest crowds are listed below:

The Defense

SCOUTING REPORT: Boasting seven returning starters on one of the BIG EAST's top defensive units, the Bearcats are allowing 18.6 points per game, to rank tied for 11th in the country in scoring defense. Listed second nationally with 38 takeaways, the Bearcats are 15th against the run (105.7 ypg), and 51st in total defense (370.7 ypg).

THE MATCHUP: Cincinnati's defense meets a Southern Miss. offense that features sophomore running back Damion Fletcher. Listed as the 22nd-best rushing team in the nation, USM averaged 200.3 yards per game on the ground during the season. Fletcher is ranked as the 14th-best rusher in the country with his 1,431 yards and 15 touchdowns. The Golden Eagles average 193.6 yards per game passing behind the arm of Jeremy Young. Young has been efficient, completing 102-of-192 pass attempts, for 53.1 percent and 1,342 yards. The senior signal caller has fired nine touchdowns against five interceptions. His top target is Torris Magee, who has made 42 catches for 617 yards, and three touchdowns.

STINGY BEARCATS: Second in the BIG EAST and tied for 11th nationally in scoring defense, the Bearcats have allowed 223 points (18.6 ppg) this season. The last time Cincinnati allowed fewer than 223 points in a season was the 1977 campaign. In 1977, UC used three shutouts and gave up 121 points on its way to a 5-4-2 season.

ON THE CUSP OF SACKS RECORD: Cincinnati is tied for 10th in the nation, and three sacks away from the program's all-time record, with 38 sacks this season. A big reason for that total has been the play of senior defensive end Anthony Hoke. The team leader with 12 sacks, Hoke managed three sacks in the 27-3 victory over Connecticut and matched the number with three sacks in the 52-31 win at Syracuse. BEARCATS SACKS COME APLENTY IN THE DOME: Fueled by three-sack performances by defensive ends Anthony Hoke and Lamonte Nelms, Cincinnati set a single-game record with 11 sacks in the win at Syracuse. UC's previous record for sacks in a game was eight, set in a 28-3 triumph over Memphis on Oct. 21, 1995. The defensive unit's efforts established a new top single-game mark for the Football Bowl Subdivision this season. Cincinnati's top single-game performances are below:

OPPORTUNITIES FALL INTO BEARCATS' HANDS AT RAYMOND JAMES STADIUM:

Cincinnati equaled a school record by forcing eight turnovers in the 38-33 win at USF. UC collected four interceptions and four fumble recoveries and would have added another, but NCAA statistics do not recognize statistics on PAT tries. The other game in which UC forced eight turnovers was a 28-21 victory at Rice on Sept. 21, 1974.

UC TOUGH IN THE RED ZONE: No pushover on defense, Cincinnati has allowed 73.8 of opponents' drives (31-of-42) inside its own 20 yard line to result in scores. UC has given up 19 touchdowns on 42 drives inside their own Red Zone.

MICKENS IS AROUND THE FOOTBALL: Two-time all-BIG EAST second-team cornerback Mike Mickens is playing like an all-America choice in 2007. Mickens leads the team lead with six interceptions and has 10 for his career with the Bearcats. The three-year starter kicked off his season with two interceptions and six tackles in the victory over Southeast Missouri State. He stepped in front of a Redhawk pass and returned the second interception 45 yards for a touchdown in the season opener. The two-time all-BIG EAST performer has finished each of his first two seasons in the top 10 nationally in passes defended.

MICKENS SHOWS HIS METTLE AT USF: The much-ballyhooed Mike Mickens showed why he is one of the best cornerbacks in the country on two gamechanging plays in the 38-33 win at USF. Mickens picked off a pass and outran the competition 79 yards up the left sideline to give UC a 24-14 lead in the first quarter. Just as memorable was his leaping pass breakup in the end zone with two seconds remaining to preserve the win.

DEANGELO SMITH IS MAKING A NAME FOR HIMSELF: In his first year as a starter, cornerback DeAngelo Smith has had no trouble learning his role. Smith is tied for third in the BIG EAST with five pickoffs. He returned an interception 54 yards for a touchdown at Miami (OH). One ahead of fellow cornerback Mike Mickens for the team lead with 10 passes defended, Smith is listed in a tie for 49th nationally in PBUs.

NAKAMURA PACKS A PUNCH: The leader of the secondary, and co-recipient of the squad's Claude Rost MVP Award, Haruki Nakamura is tops on the team lead with 86 tackles (52 solo, 34 assists). UC's leading tackler in five games this season, Nakamura paced the squad in tackles in each of the final three games of the year. The senior posted six stops against Connecticut, 10 tackles vs. West Virginia and nine hits at Syracuse. The senior safety finished with 11 tackles, all solos at USF. A starter in 36 consecutive games, Nakamura was named BIG EAST Player of the Week after forcing a pair of fumbles and tallying an interception at USF. The Bearcats' active leader with 231 career stops, Nakamura paced the team with 76 tackles in 2005.

HELLO AGAIN, COREY SMITH: Second on the squad with 76 tackles, Corey Smith continues to chase down ballcarriers from his outside linebacker spot. A three-year starter for Cincinnati, Smith has registered 37 solo tackles and 39 assists. Second among active Bearcats, the Salem, N.J. native has 200 career stops.

SENIORS BOOKEND DEFENSIVE FRONT: The duo of senior defensive ends Angelo Craig and Anthony Hoke provide a steady presence for the Bearcats defensive front. In his first year as a full-time starter, Craig has 39 tackles to his credit. The Cleveland native has 17 tackles for loss and seven sacks in his career. Hoke leads the squad with 15.5 tackles for loss and 12 sacks. The Warren, OH product has tallied 21 career sacks.

HOKE APPROACHING CINCINNATI'S TOP SACK MARKS: A former linebacker, Anthony Hoke is making a case to join some of Cincinnati's all-time best defensive linemen. Second in the BIG EAST Conference with 12 sacks on the year, the number lists Hoke second on UC's single-season list behind only Antwan Peek's 12.5 sacks in 2001 for the top spot. Hoke's 21 career sacks list him third, only six sacks behind Peek's record 27 career sacks.

BYRD UNCAGED: The defense's honoree for the John Pease Award as the team's Lineman of the Year, Terrill Byrd capped the regular season with 3.5 tackles for loss and five tackles at Syracuse. The junior defensive tackle finished the season with 14 tackles for loss and six sacks. The 2004 Gatorade National High School Defensive Player of the Year, Byrd is a returning first-team all-BIG EAST performer.

The Special Teams

SCOUTING REPORT: Special teams have already played a large role this season in the Bearcats' success. Three first-year starters junior punter and holder Kevin Huber, redshirt freshman long snapper Mike Windt and redshirt freshman kickers Jake Rogers and Brandon Yingling are making names for themselves as specialists.

HUBER LEADING THE NATION: A finalist for the Ray Guy Award, Kevin Huber entered the season with seven career punts for a 38.1 average, but has shown to be one of the best in the country in 2007. Huber is averaging 46.9 yards on 53 punts this season. Huber boomed a career-long 62-yard punt at Miami (OH) and then kicked two 62-yarders in the victory over Marshall. Not only kicking long, Huber has notched 18 punts inside the opposition's 20 and four have been downed on the opposition's 1.

HUBER SETS RECORD DAY: Behind a pair of 62-yard punts, Kevin Huber established a Cincinnati single-game record with a 59.7 yard per punt average on three kicks against Marshall.

ROGERS REBOUNDS AFTER SHAKY START: Redshirt freshman Jake Rogers rebounded from his shaky start to convert field goals of 38 and 55 yards in the 34-3 victory over Oregon State. One week after converting 1-of-3 PAT kicks and missing a 47-yard field goal, his 55-yarder was the second-longest field goal in UC history. Rogers is currently 10-of-18 on field goals and 47-of-50 on PAT kicks. He had converted 37 consecutive PATs before missing wide left on his second try against Connecticut.

KICKING UP THE KICK RETURN GAME: Dominick Goodman who averaged 25.8 yards per return is back for another year as the deep kickoff return man. DeAngelo Smith, who averaged 20.2 yards on four kickoff returns last season, is also ready to return kickoffs. An experienced kickoff and punt returner, Mike Daniels is an able reserve. Daniels is seventh on UC's all-time list in kickoff returns (40) and eighth in kickoff return yardage (777).

NEW NAMES IN RETURN GAME: Sophomore Jacob Ramsey has been the Bearcat top returner early this season. Ramsey has returned 16 kickoffs for 351 yards, a 21.9 yards per return average. Ramsey saw limited action on kickoff coverage a year ago. Dominick Goodman has 13 returns for 265 yards (20.4 yards per return) to his credit this season. Marshwan Gilyard averaged 22.0 yards on eight kickoff returns in 2005 and has five returns for 137 yards (27.4 yards per return) this season.

NAKAMURA PROVIDES STEADY HANDS ON PUNT RETURNS: Not known for owning breakaway speed, Haruki Nakamura has carded 104 yards on 15 punt returns. Nakamura registered a career-long 24-yard return at Rutgers.

BLOCK THAT KICK, AGAIN! More noted for his prowess as a walk-on for the basket-ball team each of the last two seasons, junior tight end Connor Barwin carded Cincinnati's third blocked punt of the year and Antwuan Giddens recovered the bounding ball in the end zone at USF. Barwin's block marked is the third punt block of the year for UC. The Bearcats have scored either a safety or a touchdown on each of its three punt blocks. One week after Marshwan Gilyard blocked a punt against Oregon State, Gilyard repeated the feat at Miami (OH). Against Oregon State, Gilyard's block was recovered in the end zone by Marcus Barnett. Against Miami (OH), the Bearcats' 2006 scout team special teams player of the year's block went through the end zone for a safety.

Brian Kelly 2007 BIG EAST Coach of the Year

Head Coach • 17th season • 1st at Cincinnati

Named the University of Cincinnati's head football coach on Dec. 4, 2006, Kelly has established a reputation for building winning teams. Entering his 17th season, he has compiled a 138-51-2 record as a head coach.

Kelly has not inherited a program in need of a turnaround. Having defeated the highest-ranked opponent ever to fall at Nippert Stadium weeks before his appointment, and advanced to its fifth bowl game in seven years, Kelly was passed the baton of a program loaded with expectations.

During a whirlwind first month on the job, Kelly proved that he was up to the challenge. While preparing his new team for the inaugural International Bowl, he also managed to complete his coaching staff and fill out a talent-rich recruiting class. The Bearcats 27-24 bowl victory over Western Michigan, just 34 days after his hiring, was the icing on the cake for a coach who never missed a beat.

While many coaches lecture on the virtue of possession time, Kelly stresses up-tempo play on both sides of the ball, using each practice to make his point. Armed with his no-huddle offense and

the philosophy of a defense that must play 60 minutes, the Bearcats' new mentor brought a different attitude to spring workouts.

A program builder, Kelly proved that he can work magic in a short period of time during his three years in Mount Pleasant, transforming a Central Michigan program that had won more than three games only once in the past four seasons into a conference champion. The Chippewas posted a 9-4 record in 2006 en route to winning the MAC Championship and qualifying for their first bowl game in 12 years.

Kelly's formula for success starts with an imaginative offense. His 2006 CMU team ranked 22nd nationally in passing offense, 23rd in scoring offense, and 32nd in total offense. At the same time, CMU's defense moved up 46 places in the national total defense rankings under his direction.

Kelly inherited a program that had produced a mere 12 wins over its previous four seasons when he took the helm at Central Michigan in 2004. He guided the Chippewas to a 4-7 record in 2004 and a 6-5 slate—the school's first winning season in seven years—in 2005.

Bowl History

Cincinnati's proud football history includes a number of firsts, possibly including the first postseason bowl game.

The NCAA Official Football Records recognizes the Rose Bowl, which was started in 1902, as being the first collegiate bowl game. A manuscript written by former UC athletic director Bill Schwarberg points to a bowl appearance by Cincinnati that pre-dates the Rose Bowl by five years.

Schwarberg, who played for the Bearcats from 1933-36 and served as interim Director of Athletics in 1976, cited a record in the University's McMicken Review. It indicated that following the 1897 season, Cincinnati became the first institution from Ohio to make a trip south to play in a postseason game.

Cincinnati posted a 7-1-1 record that year, which included a 34-0 win over Ohio State. The lone team to beat UC was the powerful Carlisle Indians.

Shortly after Thanksgiving, management of the Cincinnati team received an invitation from the Southern Athletic Club to play a game in New Orleans on New Year's Day. A travel party of 14, which included the substitutes and the coach and manager, departed for New Orleans on Dec. 30 where they were hosted by the Southern Athletic Club. Accounts of the game have UC winning with ease by a score of 16-0.

At a victory party that evening, players from Louisiana State challenged the Bearcats to a game the next day in Baton Rouge. UC accepted the challenge and overwhelmed the LSU team, 28-0. Accounts of the trip describe lavish entertainment provided during the trip.

If this was indeed UC's first bowl game, it was 49 years before the Bearcats again experienced postseason play.

The post-World War II influx of veterans into colleges rejuvenated college athletics, and with that came a surge of new bowls.

Cincinnati capped a successful 1946 season with a trip to the Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas. There, the Bearcats defeated Virginia Tech, 18-6.

UC made appearances in the Glass Bowl in Toledo in 1949 and returned to the Sun Bowl at the end of the 1950 campaign.

Cincinnati then went 47 years without a bowl appearance. That drought was broken when the Bearcats played in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, Idaho in 1997.

With Conference USA developing alliances with five bowls, the Bearcats made three straight bowl appearances in 2000, 2001 and 2002—the first two in the Motor City Bowl in Detroit and the third in the New Orleans Bowl.

In 2004, UC was selected to represent Conference USA in the PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl, the Bearcats' fourth bowl appearance in the past five years. UC defeated Marshall, 32-14, in that contest.

Last season, Cincinnati earned its first BIG EAST Conference bowl appearance after knocking off Connecticut in the season finale. In unusual circumstances following Mark Dantonio and his staff's departure to Michigan State before the bowl game, UC hired Brian Kelly from Central Michigan who came in and in just 34 days prepared UC and defeated Western Michigan University, 27-24, in the inaugural International Bowl in Toronto, Ontario.



Kevin Lovell's 33-yard field goal with 6:11 remaining provided the winning margin for Cincinnati and Western Michigan's 51-yard field goal try with 1:26 left fell short.

Dominick Goodman was named the game's Most



John Bowie put UC on the scoreboard first when he gathered in a tipped pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter. On Cincinnati's next drive, Davila connected on a 21-yard TD toss to Goodman. Goodman later hauled in a second touchdown pass in the second quarter.

The reeling Broncos used some trickery on the first play following Lovell's field goal. E.J. Biggers, on a double reverse, lofted the ball to Jamarko Simmons for a 76-yard touchdown.

The Broncos' defense got the ball right back and Cubit tossed a 30-yard scoring pass to close the gap to 24-14. A miscue by the UC offense—Davila's pass was deflected and intercepted with 23 seconds to play in the half—setting up Nate Meyer's 29-yard field goal.

2004 PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl Dec. 23, 2004 • Fort Worth, Texas

Cincinnati's seniors capped their careers with a dominating performance in a 32-14 win over Marshall at the PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl.

Linebacker Tyjuan Hagler started things by blocking a punt one

minute into the game, which was returned by Antwan Giddens for a touchdown. Hagler forced a fumble to set up one of three Kevin Lovell field goals, recorded a sack



and had a team-high seven tackles to earn a spot on Football News' all-bowl team.

Trent Cole and Andre Frazier each recorded sacks while leading the defensive pursuit from their end positions. Cole also blocked a punt for a safety. UC's defense held the Thundering Herd to 134 total yards, minus-3 yards rushing.

Gino Guidugli capped his stellar career with his guttiest performance. Playing with a broken hand, Guidugli completed 24-of-36 passes for 231 yards and staked the Bearcats to their lead with a pair of second-quarter TD tosses. Guidugli was to be limited to shotgun snaps, but with the running game sputtering, he moved under center in the second quarter, a move which energized the offense. UC gained 168 yards on the ground, 62 by Richard Hall who capped his senior season with 1,000 yards. Hannibal Thomas caught nine passes for 102 yards to top the 1,000-yard mark in receiving.

UC jumped out to a 10-0 lead on Antwuan Giddens return of Hagler's blocked punt and Lovell's 23-yard field goal. The Herd retaliated with two late first quarter TD's, the second on a 32-yard interception return of an errant Guidugli pass, the senior's lone miscue of the night. The Bearcat defense shut down Marshall after that, allowing just 52 yards in total offense the remaining three quarters.

Guidugli capped scoring drives of 13 and 11 plays with TD passes of 15 yards to Brent Celek and eight yards to Earnest Jackson to give UC a 28-10 lead before the half. The Bearcats coasted from there.

Levin Galbreath rushed for 130 yards and a touchdown to earn MVP honors as North Texas defeated Cincinnati, 24-19, in the second annual New Orleans Bowl.

After Cincinnati took an early 7-0 lead on a six-yard pass from Gino $\,$

Guidugli to Tye Keith, North Texas ran off 24 straight points to build a 24-7 advantage.

Patrick Cobbs put the Mean Green ahead for good, 10-7, when he broke free for a 27-yard TD run with 10:53 left in the half. UNT extended the lead to 17-3 at the intermission when Jeremy



Pearl returned a Guidugli interception 20 yards for a TD.

Galbreath finished the UNT scoring when he broke loose for a 35-yard TD run on the opening drive of the second half.

The Bearcats rallied as Jonathan Ruffin connected on field goals of 29 and 33 yards, the second allowing him to break his own school record with 13 straight field goals made. Franklin Callicott pulled UC to within 24-19 when he stripped Cobbs of the ball in the backfield and raced 43 yards for a touchdown with 5:15 left. Guidugli's two-point conversion pass fell incomplete.

Cincinnati would not get the chance to come any closer as North
Texas used a time-consuming ground game to key an 11-play drive
to run out the clock

Guidugli led the UC offense by completing 19-of-34 passes for 224 yards and a touchdown but the sophomore threw a career-high five intercentions

DeMarco McCleskey rushed 23 times for 85 yards to set the UC season rushing record with 1,361 yards. Jon Olinger's four catches for 107 yards raising his season receiving total to 1,114 yards, allowed the senior to break Jim O'Brien's 34-year old record of 1,107 receiving yards.

Toledo 23, Cincinnati 16

2001 Motor City Bowl Dec. 29, 2001 • Pontiac, Mich.

Chester Taylor rushed for a bowl-record 190 yards, including a game-winning 24-yard touchdown with 3:23 left to lead Toledo to a 23-16 win over Cincinnati in the Motor Bowl.

Cincinnati had a chance to tie the game in the closing moments but could not score following a first down at the 11 yard line.

Tavares Bolden was 14-for-28 for 135 yards and ran for 99 yards,

which helped the Rockets set a Motor City Bowl-record with 322 yards rushing.



Toledo held Cincinnati to just 13 yards on the ground, also a record in the five-year history of

Taylor's 24-yard touchdown capped an 80-yard drive, which he sparked with three carries for 52 yards. The third-team all-America selection had a bowl-record 31 carries.

After Todd France gave Toledo a 3-0 lead on a 28-yard field goal with 9:24 left in the first quarter, the Bearcats ran off 13 straight points to take a 13-3 halftime lead.

Jonathan Ruffin sandwiched field goals from 29 and 46 yards, the latter coming as time expired in the first half, around a 28-yard Gino Guidugli touchdown pass to Tim Walker.

Toledo pulled even after three quarters as France connected on a 42-yard field goal and quarterback Tavares Bolden scored on a 28-yard run with 1:44 left in the third.

Both teams put together long drives on the first two possessions of the fourth quarter but settled for field goals.

The Rockets went 76 yards on 14 plays over five minutes, but stalled at Cincinnati's 13. France's 30-yard field goal gave them a 16-13 lead with 9:42 left.

The Bearcats then stalled at Toledo's 8 after driving 73 yards. Ruffin's 25-yard kick tied the game with 6:26 to go.

The Rockets then drove 80 yards in seven plays with Taylor breaking loose up the middle for the winning score with 3:23 left.

Gino Guidugli was 29-for-46 for 283 yards and a touchdown. Tye Keith caught a bowl-record nine passes for 63 yards.

Marshall scored a pair of third quarter touchdowns, a one-yard run by Leftwich on its opening drive, and a Frank Wallace four-yard run with 7:24 left.

The Cincinnati offense, which ran up 181 yards of total offense in the first half, struggled after intermission, failing to score on any of its six possessions.

Leftwich paced the Thundering Herd, completing 17-of-30 passes for 221 yards while UC's Deontey Kenner connected on 19-of-39 passes for 189 yards and a pair of interceptions.

1997 Humanitarian Bowl Dec. 21, 1997 • Boise, Idaho

Chad Plummer threw for a touchdown and ran for another score and Cornelius Bonner caught two touchdown passes as Cincinnati defeated Utah State, 35-19, in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl.

Deontey Kenner, who rotated at quarterback with Plummer, completed 10-of-16 passes for 124 yards and one touchdown for

Cincinnati, which had not played in the postseason since the 1951 Sun Bowl.

HUMANITARIAN

Plummer, voted the game's Most Valuable Player, completed 5-of-10 passes for 61 yards while rushing 15 times for 53 yards.

Bonner, who had 48 yards on four receptions, caught touchdown passes of 14-yards each from Plummer and Kenner as the Bearcats raced to a 21-0 halftime lead.

Orlando Smith led Cincinnati in rushing with 82 yards on 15 carries while the Bearcats held a 265-76 advantage in rushing yards while holding the ball for more than 42 minutes.

Following a fumble by Utah State's Demario Brown early in the second half, the Bearcats went 57 yards in seven plays, capped by Plummer's 15-yard scoring run around right end that made it 28-0.

Just 1:03 later, Utah State's Steve Smith turned a five-yard pass from Matt Sauk into a spectacular 75-yard touchdown as he broke tackles and outran the secondary. But Cincinnati answered with a seven-yard scoring run by Orlando Smith on a screen pass that was ruled a lateral.

Melvin Blue's three-yard TD run capped an 80-yard drive in just 1:54, but the Aggies missed the extra point and trailed 35-13 with 29 seconds left in the third quarter.

The Aggies got themselves back in the game two minutes into the fourth quarter. Cincinnati punter Doug Johnson could not handle a high snap and freshman linebacker Brent Passey picked up the loose ball and went 10 yards for the score.

Game-by-Game Bowl History

W. Texas A&M 14, Cincinnati 13

1951 Sun Bowl Jan. 1, 1951 • El Paso, Texas

Amissed extra point in the second quarter proved to be the difference as West Texas A&M edged Cincinnati, 14-13, in the 16th annual Sun Bowl.

The Buffaloes took a 7-0 lead three minutes into the second quarter. Bill Cross capped off a 57-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown run.

Cincinnati used the passing game to come back. On a 68-yard scoring drive, quarterback Gene Rossi completed a 36-yard pass to Joe Benzinger and short passes to Dick Jarvis and Dan McKeever. When Dan McKeever was injured on a running play, he was replaced by his brother, Tom, who carried three straight plays, the last a three-yard touchdown.

Jim Kelly's extra-point attempt went wide right and proved to be important as the game progressed.

Cincinnati claimed its first lead, 13-7, when Rossi threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to Bob Stratton and Bill Shalonsky added the extra point. A crucial play in the 69-yard drive came on third down at the UC 43 when Rossi completed a 22-yard pass to Kelly and a West Texas A&M penalty moved the ball to the Buffalo 20.

West Texas A&M used a trick play on a fake punt to score the game-winning touchdown. Faced with a fourth and long, punter Frank Wise moved under center, took the snap and lateraled to the right to quarterback Gene Mayfield. Mayfield completed a pass to Cross at the UC 40 and Cross broke several tackles to finish the 62-yard touchdown pass. Roy Lee Dunn added the extra point to give West Texas A&M a 14-13 lead.

Cincinnati could not take advantage of its best scoring chance in the fourth when Shalonsky's 35-yard field goal attempt went wide right.

West Texas A&M drove 79-yards to the UC one but the Bearcat defense held on a fourth down play. With time running out, the Bearcats moved to the Buffalooes' 27 on a long pass to Kelly, but the game ended when Rossi was sacked on successive plays.

1949 Glass Bowl Dec. 3, 1949 • Toledo, Ohio

Cincinnati used a strong defense and solid play on special teams to dominate Toledo, 33-13, in the fifth annual Glass Bowl.

After a scoreless first quarter the Bearcats recorded a safety when Jack Tracy trapped Rocket back Emerson Cole in the end zone. Following a Toledo fumble, UC's Bob Stratton scored the first of his two touchdowns on a 10-yard run. He later added a 29-yard TD early in the third quarter.

Gene Gibson showed his open-field running skills with a pair of touchdowns. He returned a punt 76-yards in the third quarter to give the Bearcats a 27-6 lead. On the next possession, Don Jansen intercepted a Toledo pass and pitched it to Gibson who returned it 80 yards for the score.

UC outgained Toledo, 330-286 on offense, but owned a lopsided advantage on special teams. The Bearcats returned punts, kickoffs and interceptions for 258 yards while the Rockets managed only 97 return yards.

Cincinnati 18, Virginia Tech 6

1947 Sun Bowl Jan. 1, 1947 • El Paso, Texas

The Bearcats played in their first-ever bowl game in school history, earning an 18-6 victory over Virginia Tech in the 12th annual Sun Bowl.

Both teams struggled offensively in the first half, due largely in part to the three inches of snow that fell in El Paso the day before the game.

The Bearcat offense dominated play in the second half. UC outrushed the Gobblers, 369 to 34 for the game, scoring all three touchdowns on the ground.

After a scoreless first half, Cincinnati took the second half kickoff and drove 75 yards for the game's first score, a 13-yard run by sophomore Harold Johnson. After holding Virginia Tech to just three plays on offense in the next possession, the Bearcats regained possession and drove 52 yards for the second score, taking a 12-0 lead on junior fullback Hugo Sabato's one-yard run.

Virginia Tech cut the lead to 12-6 early in the fourth quarter when Ralph Beard capped off a 55-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown run.

Johnson emerged as the defensive leader for the Bearcats, intercepting a pass in the end zone late in the third quarter to stop a potential game-tying drive.

With time running out, Tech drove into Cincinnati territory, before Johnson made his second interception, returning it deep into Gobbler territory. Three plays later, Don McMillan scored on a quarterback sneak from three yards to provide the final margin.

Cincinnati finished the season with a 9-2 record, including wins over defending Big Nine champions Indiana and Michigan State.





Training in Politics Helps Cincinnati Coach

CINCINNATI — Brian Kelly appeared destined for a career in politics. He grew up campaigning for his father, an alderman in Chelsea, Mass., and worked for <u>Gary Hart</u>'s 1984 presidential campaign.

Kelly, now the football coach at Cincinnati, spent much of his life appealing to voters.

"Even when he was quite young he would go out with me on the weekends, and go off and think nothing of knocking on someone's door to give them a leaflet," Paul Kelly said of his son.

Who knew that training in politics would also be perfect for a career in coaching? But Brian Kelly's engaging personality, political skill and public speaking ability make him an ideal modern coach. In his first full season at Cincinnati, he is as comfortable giving orders on the sideline as he is mingling with alumni donors or sitting in a recruit's living room.

"It's the reaching out," Kelly said of the similarities between politicians and head coaches. "You have to go door to door to get votes. It's the same thing taking ownership of a program."

Kelly, 46, has become one of the country's fast-rising coaching talents. He not only won two N.C.A.A. Division II national titles at Grand Valley State and the Mid-American Conference title at Central Michigan in 2006, but also guided the Bearcats to a 6-0 start this season and their first top-25 ranking since 1954, before they lost the next two games.

Kelly's outreach to the students and the community has helped double the team's season-ticket sales and changed the biggest football problem on campus from how to fill the 35,000 seats at Nippert Stadium to how to meet the students' demand for seats. More than 1,000 students camped outside the stadium before the Louisville game on Oct. 13. Kelly was right at home in the middle of the tent city, shaking hands, chatting and handing out pizza.

"Brian was just born that way," said the Cincinnati athletic director, Mike Thomas. "He's comfortable dealing with the media, alumni, donors, students and fans. It's a skill set a lot of people don't have and a lot of coaches don't have."

Kelly, who once held campaign signs for his father outside polling places, participated in student government and played football at St. John's Preparatory School in Danvers, Mass., then majored in political science at Assumption College in Worcester, Mass.

He was a four-year starter at middle linebacker at Assumption. His coach, Bernie Gaughan, remembered him as the type of player who would try to fire up his teammates even when the team was losing by three

touchdowns in the game's final minutes.

"I liked the camaraderie and the ability to compete," Kelly said. "I was weird. I loved practice and the things that went along with that, the leading and competing. I enjoyed those things even more than the game itself."

But Kelly had dreams of a life in public service. He took an admission test for the <u>Central Intelligence Agency</u> and planned to study international affairs in graduate school at American University. But weeks before Kelly left for American, Gerry D'Amico, a state senator from Worcester, asked him to work in his office.

That is where Kelly learned about taking care of details and organization, two tenets of coaching. His duties included arranging jobs for people on the Massachusetts Turnpike and having coffee with constituents who were willing to put campaign signs on their lawns.

"We had a chicken cookout to raise money, and he did everything from collect money to barbecue the chicken," D'Amico said.

When D'Amico became the co-chairman in Massachusetts of Hart's 1984 campaign for the Democratic nomination, Kelly was thrust into a presidential race. His duties included briefing the local news media when Hart stopped in Boston. Kelly also drove Hart, then a Colorado senator, around the city in his 1980 Ford Escort, which he said was running on only three cylinders.

"Campaigns are like sports events, among other things, and a lot like circuses," said Hart, now a professor at the <u>University of Colorado</u> at Denver. "I would hope that Mr. Kelly got some experience in our operation these many years ago about how to coordinate and how to get along."

But Kelly said he found politics too scripted at the national level and too petty at the local level. After Hart lost the nomination to Walter Mondale, Kelly returned to Assumption as a graduate assistant and was drawn into a world that was unscripted.

Kelly coached the women's softball team, and it reminded him of what he loved about football practice: the passion, the camaraderie and the teamwork. He became the defensive coordinator under Gaughan, who noticed Kelly's gift for connecting with people.

"I always said he'd be a great recruiter of mothers," Gaughan said. "He's charismatic and had a really good feel for people and doing what was right."

In 1987, Kelly packed up his Escort and sputtered to the cornfields of Michigan for a \$4,200-a-year job as a graduate assistant and defensive backs coach at Grand Valley State. He took over as the coach in 1991. For 13 seasons, he helped build perhaps the most powerful program in Division II. Kelly's 118-35-2 record there included a 32-game winning streak.

Grand Valley, now coached by Kelly's former defensive coordinator Chuck Martin, has won two more national titles since Kelly left.

"Brian enjoys engaging with people, which goes back to his days in politics," the Grand Valley athletic director, Tim Selgo, said. "He enjoys recruiting and is good at it. But don't let that hide the fact that he knows

how to win football games."

Kelly coached at Central Michigan for three seasons before leaving in December for Cincinnati. The Bearcats, bruised by Mark Dantonio's departure to <u>Michigan State</u>, still had a game to play — the International Bowl in Toronto. Kelly won the players over immediately by adapting to them.

He memorized the existing playbook and coached the running backs, quarterbacks and wide receivers.

Cincinnati beat Western Michigan, 27-24, and Kelly won his players' trust. The Bearcats found his engaging demeanor to be a pleasant contrast to Dantonio's hard-nosed approach.

"He can sell water to a whale," Mike Daniels, a senior running back, said of Kelly. "He can have the worst team in college football believing they're the best team. That's the kind of guy he is."

Kelly has Cincinnati dreaming of the big time in its third year in the Big East. The Bearcats added quarterback Demetrius Jones, a transfer from Notre Dame, who can execute Kelly's spread offense in the future. And Thomas, the Cincinnati athletic director, said there had been discussion of expanding Nippert Stadium to 50,000 seats, and adding luxury boxes and club seats.

A project like that needs someone who can raise money virtually door to door. Cincinnati seemingly has the perfect coach to do just that.

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Haircut for a cause Bearcats' Grutza sheds his locks

Dustin Grutza's contribution to charity began last June when the University of Cincinnati quarterback, offensive lineman Digger Bujnoch and former quarterback Nick Davila began growing their hair.

Twelve months later, Grutza sat in a chair on a platform above Nippert Stadium as his stylist placed the chopped strips of his mane into a gallon-sized plastic bag.

A year's worth of hair growth was held together by rubber bands and half-filled the bag, which would be mailed to Beautiful Lengths - a charity that takes healthy hair donations and turns them into wigs for cancer patients. Hair for which Grutza felt mixed emotions.

"It feels different," Grutza said Monday before running his fingers through his new hairdo. "It's definitely a different look. But I did it for the cause. I think it's worth it. My hair is definitely going to grow back, and there are a lot of people that would appreciate that hair more than I would."

Grutza has old friends who have donated their hair to charities similar to Beautiful Lengths, and last year, while talking to Davila - who had a grandmother who died of cancer - Grutza, Bujnoch and Davila decided to do the same.

At one point, as his locks continued to grow, Grutza hated his hair, but lately, he'd gotten used to the nest on top of his head. Even as it covered his face while lifting weights or swimming in the pool, he didn't mind it so much.

His mom, Gwynn, also grew to like her son's style, although some of his friends began referring to Dustin as "Gwynn with muscles." She admitted that those comments were a little disturbing, but other than that, she liked his look.

"It's a wonderful thing he's done," Gwynn Grutza said. "He didn't think about it. He just started doing it. (The length) bothered him a little bit, but he stuck with it. I'm proud of him. I couldn't be prouder of him."

The makeover began about 10:45 Monday morning, when Gwynn and Crystal Carpenter, who's been cutting Dustin Grutza's hair for the past 12 years, drove to UC from Maysville, Ky.

They began by straightening his hair and sectioning it into small ponytails with mini rubber bands. Then, Carpenter began snipping, and Grutza placed the sections of hair into the plastic bag.

Some organizations, like Locks of Love, require 10 inches worth of hair, but Beautiful Lengths only needs 8. Since Grutza said his hair measured about 9 inches, he decided to donate to the latter charity.

While he's maintained a love/hate relationship with his hair for the past year - he said he could pull his bangs past his chin - he was glad to see it sheared off his head and headed for a good cause. He left Nippert Stadium about an hour after the process had begun, presumably a little bit lighter - and in search of some hair gel.

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Coach deserved a little company

Somebody was bound to say it, sooner or later. Bravo for Brian Kelly.

The University of Cincinnati football coach was understandably upset Tuesday that neither local newspaper, nor any local television station, saw fit to cover the Big East Media Day in lovely Newport, R.I. Of the eight conference football schools, UC was the only one unattended in such a way.

And Kelly, in his first full year on the job, proud of his bowl victory, prolific with the press, dead serious about raising the profile of the program, wasn't about to let it ride. At the podium, in front of reporters from most of the major Eastern cities and several national entities, he scolded the Cincinnati press corps and challenged it to become "a credible source of information."

Later, as reported by a Connecticut newspaper, he added that "Cincinnati doesn't get it yet. They don't understand what they have. We have to get the media to understand where we are and the great conference we have."

He's mostly right about that. After decades of indistinctive football among the ranks of independents and Conference USA, the Bearcats had become a room-temperature item in their home city. Crowds were light and coverage correspondingly slight.

But things have been a bit different since UC knocked off undefeated Rutgers last year, Mark Dantonio skedaddled off to Michigan State and Kelly barreled into town toting conspicuous aptitudes for offense and public relations. If you've detected an unfamiliar buzz around the Bearcats, the new coach gets the credit for it. So, to a lesser extent, does the media through which the message has been disseminated.

But to the papers and stations, Media Day was another matter. It was a particularly tough proposition for The Post, where budget restrictions are underscored by the fact that we're going out of business at the end of the year.

"It's hard for us to make UC football a priority when they play so many Saturday games (and the paper has no Sunday edition)," said Post sports editor Keith Herrell. "My focus these last five and a half months is on the Reds, Bengals, Northern Kentucky preps and, I hope, shining a light where it needs to be shined. It's on helping my people find jobs and, yes, staying within my budget.

"Why would we go to Newport, Rhode Island, to do a story on Haruki Nakamura when we've already done stories on

him from here? When Media Days are held in Newport, Kentucky, instead of Newport, Rhode Island, we'll be there with bells on, and I'll buy the pizza."

That said, Herrell would still have sent somebody - namely, UC beat writer Josh Katzowitz - if he'd had the money for it. And therein lies the larger, more legitimate complaint.

The issue is not, as so many UC fans have hotly supposed, about a conspiracy theory against the Bearcats. For heaven's sake, it's not about some editor's rooting interest in Ohio State or Xavier. And it's only partially about Cincinnati football.

Rather, it's about playing the game at the appropriate level. It's a matter of spending the dollars necessary to do what needs to be done, a consideration that of course goes to the top of the respective corporations.

Put it this way. Often, as I've chastised the Reds for prioritizing the payroll or the Bengals for failing to hire more personnel people, I've written with a weighty awareness of the double standard involved. I've realized that if either of our big-league teams, or the community at large, would point out the hypocrisy inherent in those charges, we'd be exposed.

In other words, if the Reds or Bengals went about their business as The Post and the Enquirer do, we'd rip them from here to there. And we have.

This week's development is but another example of our small-time tendencies, and hardly the most acute. It's unconscionable that neither paper - particularly the Enquirer, which publishes on Sundays and has a far greater circulation in Ohio - covers Ohio State football as a beat, much less Buckeye basketball. Nor do we do enough with Kentucky football. Or auto racing or soccer or horse racing or small colleges or hunting and fishing or track and field. Or women. Our staffs and budgets are grossly inadequate to cover local sports - forget the regional or national scenes - in the manner that most major cities take for granted.

But we're all over the tennis tournament this week. It's a well-done event, with international appeal and strong local support. Obviously, it should be covered. But not at the expense of the local BCS football team, the one with a newsmaking coach and a bowl title and most of the defense coming back. And Kelly is spot-on to say so.

"I think, quite frankly, that Cincinnati is the only one that dropped the ball in not having any print or electronic media here," he continued in a broadcast interview with Tommy Gelehrter of gobearcats.com. "It smacks of arrogance, that they know everything about the Big East. Clearly, we're going to have to do a lot of work there in educating our media about what this is about. We've got four Heisman Trophy candidates, legitimate. We've got three teams in the top 15 in the country, and four in the top 25.

"We need to break out from the years of mediocrity. I mean, it's been a .500 level program for many, many years, and we're here to win a Big East championship. I don't know how to say it any other way. Does that mean we're going to win one next year? I hope so, but I don't know that we're ready to do that, as indicated earlier. We don't have everyone rowing in the right direction yet."

A couple program notes: As newspapers, we're not here to row in the direction of any commercial enterprise. We're not here to subjectively support any particular program. We're here to write and report on matters of interest and relevance to the citizenship. On that score, and that score only, did we belong in Newport, R.I., this week.

We should mention, also, that Kelly is not entirely fault-free in this area. There have been several occasions on which Katzowitz has called him for a story and not received a call back. Just for the record.

But that's not the point. The point is the one the coach made, quite correctly, in Rhode Island.

We should have been there.

We should have been a lot of places.

Mauk ready for QB battle Bearcats open practice Friday

Standing 20 yards away from his father, Ben Mauk could throw the football confidently, with speed and skill. Move back another five yards, though. Try that. See if you have the same zip, the same accuracy and the same confidence.

Mauk, the Wake Forest transfer who will compete for the University of Cincinnati starting quarterback job when the Bearcats open preseason practice Friday, would try it. But those 15 feet were a barrier he couldn't quite hurdle.

"It was very tough," Mauk, a graduate student, said. "I came back home about a month ago (after summer workouts) and was throwing with my dad and I'd go to 20 yards and feel fine. Once I got to 25 or 30 yards, I'd stand there for literally five minutes and try to make myself believe I could do it. I kept trying to push through."

Mauk, of course, has had much to overcome.

As a junior redshirt last year at Wake Forest, he won the starting job but dislocated his shoulder and broke his arm while diving for a ball in the first game of the season against Syracuse.

The Demon Deacons, led by ACC rookie of the year quarterback Riley Skinner, won the conference title, as a battered Mauk - Ohio's Mr. Football in 2002 while at Kenton High School - watched from the sideline.

He transferred to UC for the academics and to play closer to home. He had his fresh start.

But the shoulder, until last week, hadn't responded completely.

"The reports we got from our trainers after the conclusion of our offseason workouts were that he had been throwing about 80 percent," UC coach Brian Kelly said. "He had what were considered good days and bad days with soreness after, but he wasn't confident to let the ball go. He was timid in terms of ripping it."

Even throwing to his father 25 yards away made him apprehensive.

His breakthrough, however, came last week. He finally could

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rip it. He could throw the ball hard and accurately on sideline routes. He couldn't feel the pain in his arm. Throwing 25 yards was nothing.

"That was the kind of turning point where now I don't have any blockage in my mind," Mauk said. "When I throw the ball it's going to where I want it to go. That was a defining moment."

And gives the Bearcats quarterback competition a nice little boost.

When Mauk made the decision to transfer to UC, the move excited Bearcats fans. Grutza was inconsistent last season, throwing nine touchdowns and 13 interceptions before an injury allowed Nick Davila to take the starting job and win the last three games.

Grutza had a strong spring game, but Mauk, even if he didn't win the quarterback spot right away, would be the one to lead the Bearcats in Kelly's pass-happy offense.



What fans might have overlooked were these points: Mauk hasn't played in nearly a year, his shoulder still isn't 100 percent, he won the Wake Forest job as a sophomore but then lost it four games into the season, and he's thrown four touchdowns against 10 interceptions in his college career.

"I wouldn't say I'm coming in overly confident," Mauk said. "I'm just excited to have the chance to compete. I'm going to push Dustin and he's going to push me. We're going to make each other better. I'm excited about the opportunity to compete."

The competition against Grutza, who will enter fall practice as the starter, certainly will be the most-watched position battle. Kelly said Grutza is in great shape and is ready for a fight. After all, Kelly didn't bring in Mauk so Mauk could back up Grutza.

"Dustin Grutza has done everything we've asked him to do," Kelly said. "Now, if we could stretch him out and get him to about 6-3. He's done everything and has put himself in position because he's got some Big East experience. I thought he handled himself very well in the spring. It's about Grutza, and then it's about a guy challenging Grutza."

It'll be a test for Mauk, simply because he needs to accomplish more than Grutza to win the job.

"He has two challenges," Kelly said. "One, he has to be able to gain the respect and the trust of the other 10 guys around him. That's first. When he gets his opportunity, he has to take command. Two, he's got to be able to be productive when he's in there at that position. If he went in there and was productive but didn't have the other 10, well, I know Grutza has the other 10. Those guys will go to war with him. Dustin will have to rely heavily on the production side of things. Mauk has to do both."

With a shoulder on which he now can depend, though, Mauk's chances of winning the starting job have improved. His breakthrough last week could impact the Bearcats the rest of the season.

"He was able to throw down the field without pain," Kelly said. "Does that mean he's ready to go tomorrow? No. But I think he can come into camp and compete with Grutza. There were some questions physically as to whether he'd be able to even compete. Now he can come into camp and compete for the starting position.

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Selling job pays off at UC Kelly boosts fans' interest

From the time the University of Cincinnati finished spring football practice, coach Brian Kelly took to the campaign trail. He attended golf outings, he did the meet-and-greets, he spoke at public events.



The mission: get people excited about Bearcats football, and get them buying tickets.

While last year's squad - led for most of the season by former coach Mark Dantonio - started that process, recording an 8-5 record with a victory against No. 7 Rutgers, Kelly has continued it. And then some.

Before UC opened preseason camp with a twohour practice at Nippert Stadium Friday, Kelly estimated he had attended three public-speaking events per week in an attempt to sell his program.

His hard work is paying off - after recording season ticket sales of 6,464 last year, UC has sold nearly 7,500 for this season with about four weeks to go until the opener against Southeast Missouri State.

"That's a big difference," senior safety Haruki Nakamura said. "That's people noticing the program. People are going to start buying in. With a guy like coach Kelly, he's very exciting to listen to and he gets you amped up about football. People didn't really understand that they have a BCS team in their back yard. There are two BCS teams in this state, and people need to realize it."

Kelly is doing his best to make sure people understand that point. But he's not alone, he said. He's not much different from most coaches at this

"It's part of the job," Kelly said. "I don't think you can be a football coach at a Division I institution and not market your program. The days of sitting in your office and watching film until midnight are over. You have to be out doing a number of different things.

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I'm well equipped to do it because I've done it for so long. I've always had to market my program at smaller levels.'

Perhaps that's partially why he seems part politician, part football coach. When you have to obtain publicity

for a Central Michigan program that was mediocre before Kelly's arrival and a Division II squad, you learn how to accomplish your goals.

"Cleary, I feel more comfortable doing it," Kelly said. "Some coaches are more comfortable doing it than others. I think we all realize it's a necessary part of your job."

He can't do it alone, though. He needs help from his players as well.

"Our role is to get the job done on the field," senior running back Bradley Glatthaar said. "Get it done in the classroom and the community and winning. That's what gets people here. Just do the right thing, you know?"

The Bearcats were trying during a sizzling hot practice Friday. Quarterback Ben Mauk made an appearance, and although he drew praise from Kelly and Nakamura, it was clear that Mauk, who dislocated his shoulder last season while at Wake Forest, needs to increase his arm strength.

Dustin Grutza, who enters workouts as the starting quarterback, played effectively and gave no reason why he couldn't continue in that role when the Bearcats open their season.

"It was good to get out with all the guys and get the helmets on and actually go through a practice," Mauk said. "I felt pretty good. There were periods where I was resting for about five minutes and then had to work it up again. But I felt really good overall."

Most of UC's players could say the same thing. Only sophomore wide receiver Marshwan Gilyard had to leave practice and receive intravenous fluid. Pretty impressive, considering the heat.

"I couldn't be more pleased with (strength and conditioning coach Paul) Longo in terms of what he did," Kelly said. "Marshwan was not with us in the spring, he was not enrolled in the summer, he wasn't part of our workouts on a consistent basis. Not one of our players who were here for the summer had to leave the field today. That's a positive thing."

The day itself was pretty positive. Nakamura just hopes his teammates will help sell Kelly's program this fall so that the coach doesn't have to work quite so hard in the offseason.

"Our job as players is to work hard, do the right things on and off the field and bring a level of competition to the Big East," Nakamura said. "Show our fans that we are one of the best teams in the Big East. We proved we could hang with the best last year. That showed that we have enough talent on this team to open some eyes."

Kelly's reverse decision

Coach decides to give returning running backs a chance

The decision already had been made.

At the end of spring practice, University of Cincinnati football coach Brian Kelly was prepared to go with his two talented sophomores, Jacob Ramsey and John Goebel, this season despite the presence of three senior running backs on his roster.

"It was their time," Kelly said of seniors Greg Moore, Butler Benton and Bradley Glatthaar. "But that didn't mean it was their team."

Moore had missed a lot of spring practice with an injury. Glatthaar was 20 pounds heavier than he is now. And Kelly wondered how they would buy into his one-back spread offense.

"Looking at it, it looked quite average," Kelly said. "Instead of average, I go with young guys and know that I can develop those guys."

Moore and Benton were surprised Friday to hear that Kelly had come that close to demoting them.

"I had no idea about that one," Moore said.

But they can relax.

The three seniors, who combined for 1,491 yards last year, have worked so hard that not only is Kelly going back to them, he's decided to alter his offense to use two backs occasionally.

"They're physically in the best shape of their life," Kelly said. "Combined, they've got over a couple of thousand yards rushing. They've all been, in some capacity, productive and they came back committed. I want to have seniors that are committed to what we're doing."

Benton said he felt honored that he and his colleagues have worked so hard that Kelly has decided to alter his offense.

"That's something special for two of us on the field at the same time," he said. "We can't wait to do that."

The three backs had to share time in the backfield under former head coach Mark Dantonio, who liked the idea of going with the hot hand and keeping a fresh back on the field.

Last season, Moore received the bulk of the carries with 162 for 709 yards, followed by Benton at 118 for 497 and Glatthaar at 94 for 285.

There might not be that many carries to go around this season under Kelly's more pass-oriented spread offense, but the backs could end up touching the ball more frequently as receivers.

"You can show more of your talent in this offense," Moore said.

Benton said there was a time when he used to think about what it would be like to be the featured back and get 20 to 25 carries a game.

But he doesn't anymore.

"I really like this offense a lot," he said. "I like how we're spread out, how it gives us a chance to utilize our skills in space, catching the football."

That attitude, combined with their superb conditioning as practice begins, had Kelly smiling Friday on the first day of practice.

"They made a 360 and decided that they want to be part of what we're going to do this year," Kelly said. "That's why I stand corrected and we're going to get them involved in our offense."

Kelly was also happy with what he saw from new quarterback Ben Mauk, who's recovering from shoulder surgery as he competes for the starting job.

"I thought Mauk did better than I expected," Kelly said. "Tomorrow will be really important to see how he bounces back. He's never had to throw back-to-back days. If he comes back tomorrow and he still has the ability to rip the ball, that will be a very encouraging sign. But if we have to shut him back tomorrow, then maybe we did a little too much today."

'D' paves way for 'O'

Offense-minded UC coach pleased with talent he inherited on defense

Brian Kelly made his coaching reputation by having his teams put up big offensive numbers, but he has never forgotten the importance of defense.

The University of Cincinnati football coach actually began his career as a defensive coach, and although he loves to see his teams light up the scoreboard and understands the entertainment value of offense, he makes sure that defense doesn't take a back seat.

"At the end of the day, it's about winning," Kelly said Saturday. "If you can't stop the run, it's the most debilitating thing there is.

"First and foremost, you've got to stop the run and you can't give up the big play. If you do those two things on defense, you can be kind of crafty and exciting on offense.

"But you'd better do those two things first."

The good news for Kelly is that he inherited a pretty good defense. In fact, entering the season, defense is the strength of this UC team.

Last year, the Bearcats ranked third in the Big East in total defense, allowing an average of 304.2 yards per game, although they were last in turnover margin at minus-5.

The hope is that with seven players returning from that unit and with a more zone-oriented defensive scheme in place this year, the Bearcats will be able to force more turnovers, especially in the defensive backfield, where second-team all-Big East cornerback Mike Mickens returns after intercepting three passes last year.

"Like (defensive backs) coach (Kerry) Coombs says, there's going to be a lot more picks now," Mickens said. "We've just got to be aggressive. We can see the ball a lot better now instead of being in man coverage."

Former Middletown High School head coach Joe Tresey takes over as defensive coordinator for Pat Narduzzi, who followed Mark Dantonio to Michigan State.

Narduzzi was a ball of energy and intensity at UC and his players responded, flying around the field, using their speed and athleticism to confound opposing offenses.

Tresey is more laid-back both on the field and off.

"His personality is different," said Terrill Byrd, a first-team all-Big East selection last year at tackle. "But they bring the same things to the table - play fast, play hard, get to the ball."

Byrd and Mickens have received most of the attention based on their play last year, but Kelly says this unit's talent doesn't stop there.

"There are some guys on this field who don't get as much ink that they would want in their foxhole," Kelly said,

citing linebackers Corey Smith and Leo Morgan and cornerback DeAngelo Smith.

"I think we can play very fast," Kelly said. "In this league, you'd better be able to get to the football in a hurry."

UC must replace two key players from last year's defense - middle linebacker Kevin McCullough and safety Dominic Ross, both of whom were first-team all-conference selections. Junior Ryan Manalac likely will start in McCullough's spot, backed up by Andre Revels. Junior Cedric Tolbert will play safety, with Aaron Webster backing him up.

After just two days of practice, the Bearcats still are in a learning mode as they attempt to digest the new defense.

But they're making progress.

"We have our moments when they kind of revert back to the past," Tresey said. "But that's just their reacting in the heat of battle. I can't tell you how pleased we are. They've really embraced what we want to do, and they've gone full bore with it.

"We think we have a shot to be really good," Tresey continued. "I would say our biggest concern is that we want to be able to have good depth.

"We've got to have eight guys up front that can play for us so we can play fast. I think we're getting there. We feel good about where we're going right now, but it's only Day Two."

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Kickoff job gets tougher this year

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With collegiate place-kickers slated to boot kickoffs from the 30-yard line this season, the University of Cincinnati's Jake Rogers still is struggling with the extra 15 feet.

During the offseason, the NCAA moved kickoffs from the 35 to the same spot NFL kickers use.

Rogers' leg is strong enough to handle the extra five-yard load, but the redshirt freshman from Warsaw, Ind., is struggling with the mental hurdle of adding some extra turf to his kicks.

"I know it's only 15 feet, but it does get to you sometimes," said Rogers, who likely will win the placekicking job but is battling with junior Brandon Yingling for the top kickoff spot. "You try to overkick it, and that's what I've been doing lately. If you slow down and take your time and do it, it'll find its way."


When Rogers overkicks the ball, the results aren't pretty. His kicks usually come off his foot on a low line drive and land at about the 15-yard line or shorter. A kick that is short and has little or no hang time isn't going to help the special teams complete the squad's objective.

Instead, it's going to make life tougher.

It's clear to Rogers, then, that he has to figure out a way to kick the ball into the opponent's end zone from the 30.

"It's five yards, but it's going to affect you a little," Rogers said. "It's all in the head really. I'm not kicking the greatest right now, but I think it'll come. The 30, it really is mental. That's what it comes down to. I have to work on that part of it."

The 30-yard line kickoff, which was legislated to force more kick returns and fewer game stoppages, also affects Bearcats coach Brian Kelly and his

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recruiting practices.

Now, he actually has to start recruiting kickers who can boot the ball 70 yards or more.

"It really forces you into giving a scholarship," Kelly said. "The thing it brings me right back to is you have to treat it like a skill position. You can't bring in some walk-ons and let them battle it out.'

He also knows this.

"You'd better have a pretty good kicker," Kelly said. "Clearly, you've got to prepare for this type of

MAUK HURTING - Senior quarterback Ben Mauk still is hampered by the offseason shoulder surgery he underwent after his year-ending injury at Wake Forest. It kept him out of much of Monday's twohour practice, and it's kept him frustrated.

As the quarterback candidates participated in an 11-on-11 drill at the end of practice, Mauk stayed on the sideline and watched his competitors for the starting position - mostly Dustin Grutza and Craig Carey - take snaps.

"My arm feels real sore," Mauk said. "We'll see how it feels (today), the first day in full pads. It's frustrating to me that I can't compete."

But Kelly said he isn't worried. Mauk's pain, Kelly said, isn't emanating from his shoulder or elbow.

"With the six screws (in his upper arm), it's causing some inflammation and soreness in the back of his arm," Kelly said. "(Trainer Bob Mangine) said it's like a guy pitching 15 innings. You have to ice him down and shut him down for a day.

"If it was the shoulder, a reoccurrence of the rotator cuff, or if it was in the elbow with tendinitis, I'd be very concerned. But when it's muscular, we can control that. He's upbeat. He knows he physically doesn't have a problem. He's mad because he's not in there."

Mauk is trying to stay ready.

"You always have to stay positive and hope for the best," Mauk said. "My dad says you have to prepare your fields for the rain. Even if it's a drought season, you have to prepare for it. That's my mentality right now."

FIT AS A FIDDLE - Through four practices, Kelly said his team has suffered only two minor injuries.

Junior tight end Nick DeFilippo and sophomore wide receiver Marshwan Gilyard have been hampered by hamstring problems, but both practiced Monday. Other than that, Kelly said everybody has been healthy.

"We've gone through four days and had just two hamstrings," Kelly said. "That is laying the groundwork in spring about how to practice.'

Bearcats' line goes slimmer for '07

Playing for the former University of Cincinnati coaching staff, which featured a Big Ten type offense that focused on the running game and needed offensive linemen with plenty of mass, senior tackle Digger Bujnoch was told to eat and eat and eat.

Then, go ahead and grab seconds.

As a redshirt sophomore, Bujnoch weighed about 260 pounds, but Mark Dantonio's staff wanted him closer to 300. The offensive linemen were supposed to be big and strong, even though the byproduct of that is linemen who also are blubbery and slow.

Playing for the current UC coaching staff, though, Bujnoch has been told a different story. Don't stuff your face until the food piles up in your esophagus. Stick to a diet of, and all of the offensive linemen gleefully could recite this, "meats, leaves and berries."

That means, cut down on the starches, cut down on the carbohydrates and cut down on the weight.


Look at junior guard Trevor Canfield for an example.

Canfield, who weighed about 330 pounds last season, has dropped to about 295. And he's feeling pretty good about himself.

"I move better," said Canfield, who plans to lose another 10 pounds. "I look completely different, a lot more toned up."

The offensive linemen, as a whole, could say similar things about their bodies. According to Bujnoch, senior guard Ken Rodriguez has lost 25 pounds while senior Mario Duenas has managed the same feat.

With a new spread offense that relies on quick passing and no huddling, the offensive line had to lose some poundage.

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"You need athletic offensive linemen that can get out in space and move in space," said UC offensive coordinator Jeff Quinn, also the offensive line coach. "They have to run the zone scheme, which is our No. 1 running concept. To do that and pass protect, you have to have light-footed kids that move well and react well. When you're asking them to do a lot more in our system of offense than just straight power and iso(metrics), you have to lean them out. They have to be more athletic."

Bujnoch can feel the athleticism seep into his body as the 15 pounds he's lost have melted away.

"With more of an up-tempo offense, you have to be in shape," Bujnoch said. "We're getting our bodies used to it. You can move a lot easier. It's a lot easier on your knees. When you get out in space against guys, you're a lot more agile with them."

It's the system UC coach Brian Kelly and Quinn are comfortable employing. With strength and conditioning coach Paul Longo joining the Bearcats staff this season - along with Kelly and Quinn, he previously was at Central Michigan - UC's coaching staff is remaking the look of the offensive line.

Since Kelly took over the program, he and his staff have recruited linemen who are slimmer and more athletic, but for now, these newly built Bearcats will do.

"What we've been able to do is demonstrate to these kids that if they live the right way and they stay with the gameplan off the field - in terms of how they take care of themselves, how they eat, how they train - their body will change," Quinn said. "Their weight won't change, but their body composition will change.

"When they started seeing that transition from being a little heavier and having more excessive body fat (to a leaner body type), they enjoyed what they saw. That excited the kids and they started saying, 'Hey, this will make me a better football player, less cargo to carry around.' They're leaner, they're quicker, and their reaction time has improved."

Plus, they look pretty good.

"They had to lose body fat to run the pace of this offense," Kelly said. "It's much, much better. Look at Trevor Canfield. He could do four chin-ups last year. This year he did 16. They're not going in (the) huddle anymore. They have to go to the line of scrimmage, they have to run a play and they have to go again."

Six players contend for shared time at tight end

You can't walk onto the field at Nippert Stadium these days without bumping into a tight end.

The University of Cincinnati football program is loaded with them. At last count, there were six tight ends on the roster vying to fill the void left by Brent Celek, who was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles.

"It's a luxury we can't afford to have," UC coach Brian Kelly said of the tight end glut. "In two or three years, we won't have (so many) tight ends. We'll have two or three."

For now, though, Kelly has so many quality players at the position that he plans to use multiple-tight end formations occasionally.

The two who are expected to receive the most playing time are 6-foot-3, 225-pound senior Earnest Jackson from Southfield, Mich., and 6-4, 275-pound Doug Jones from Dixie Heights High School.

They'll be pushed by Connor Barwin, who missed most of spring practice with an ankle injury and is still trying to catch up.

"Right now, Ernie Jackson is making the case to be No. 1," Kelly said. "Connor Barwin hasn't been consistent enough. But he's shown that he's a good player as well. I like both of those kids a lot. And Doug Jones is a senior, a veteran guy. He's going to get his snaps, but in a little bit different fashion than those two."

The other tight ends are sophomore Kazeem Alli, who underwent surgery to repair a torn ACL during the spring and might not be able to play until October; redshirt freshman Ben Guidugli and junior Nick DeFilippo.

That's one crowded position.

"It keeps you on your toes," Jackson said. "It keeps you working hard, because you know the next guy behind you is just as good as you."

Kelly had a hand in creating this logiam by moving Jackson from wide receiver, where he has caught 68 passes during the past three seasons, including 17 for 223 yards last season.

His feeling was that Jackson, with his wide receiver speed, could help stretch the defense vertically.

Jackson was OK with the move, even though he had become comfortable at wide receiver. But he's still learning the position, especially the blocking part.

"That's the biggest change that I'm having," Jackson said. "I'm about 225. On the line, some of those guys are around 270 or 280, so I have to use more power and more form. It's a lot more technique. I might look like one of the biggest guys out there, but I'm a slender, muscular-type guy. I don't have that bulky weight on me."

Jones is clearly the better blocker.

"That's my specialty," said Jones, who has 47 career catches. "I like running routes and catching the ball, but it's

whatever I have to do to get on the field and help the team."


Jones is playing for his third head coach in five years at UC. He has undergone two ACL surgeries and has switched positions seemingly every year, having played fullback, H-back and even having a brief tryout on the offensive line.

He's looking forward to playing his final season at tight end in Kelly's passing offense.

"We're going to put a lot more points on the board," Jones said. "Hopefully, we can take a little pressure off the defense."

Guidugli also has acclimated himself well during the first week of practice but might have trouble getting offensive snaps, especially after Alli returns.

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Grutza making run at QB

Competition tough for starting position

There's a new Dustin Grutza in the University of Cincinnati's preseason camp this summer.

"He's not a finished product," said UC football coach Brian Kelly. "But he's starting to look like a Big East guarterback.'

Grutza's teammates have noticed a difference. They've also noticed how hard Grutza worked during the offseason to prepare himself for the challenge from newcomer Ben Mauk.

"He's learning to become a true quarterback now," said UC safety Haruki Nakamura, Grutza's roommate. "Coach Kelly has really been stressing the point that you have to be a good technician to be a quarterback and you have to be a leader. He's become more consistent since the spring. I know he's worked really hard over the summer. He put in a lot of hours. He's definitely been impressive."

While Mauk is still feeling his way as he attempts to revive his career after a shoulder injury prematurely ended his season at Wake Forest last year, Grutza has clearly been UC's best quarterback in the early

He credits his improvement to the work he did during the summer and the adjustments in his mechanics that Kelly helped him make. He's also stronger than he was a year ago.

"A lot of it is footwork," Grutza said, "making sure I get my hips through. That's been helping a lot. I was using too much arm. It's not just arm strength. It's using your body. It's kind of like I knew it before but you get into some bad habits. I just had to get back into some good mechanics."

Grutza, a junior from Maysville, Ky., completed 60.9 percent of his passes last season with nine touchdowns and 13 interceptions, ranking fifth in the Big East in pass efficiency. He also rushed for 246 yards.

He started the Bearcats' first 10 games in 200, but was replaced by Nick Davila for the Rutgers game Nov. 18 because of an injury.

Davila led the Bearcats to an upset of the seventh-ranked Scarlet Knights. Grutza started the season finale against Connecticut but was relieved by Davila, who started the Bearcats' International Bowl victory over Western Michigan.

During the offseason, Kelly brought in Mauk, who put up prolific passing numbers in high school.

The message to Grutza was clear: If he intended to be UC's starting quarterback in 2007, he would have to improve.

"He's really been mature about the whole thing," tight end Connor Barwin said of Grutza. "I've never heard him complaining about it at all. That might have been what spurred him to work so much harder. When you bring in a quarterback that started at Wake Forest and the media loves him, it's definitely a challenge."

"You can't think about that," Grutza said. "You have to just go out there and play and have fun while you're out there. While the other quarterbacks are going, I'm trying to make my reads like I was the quarterback. Every time they're out there, I'm trying to get a mental rep at the same time."

It's far too early to say that Grutza is the favorite to be UC's starting quarterback for the Aug. 30 opener against Southeast Missouri State.

"I think he should be where he is," Kelly said. "If he wasn't where he is and didn't have some separation (from the other quarterbacks), we didn't do a very good job coaching him in the spring."

Still, Grutza has performed so well that he has sent a message of his own to Mauk, the coaching staff and his teammates: He won't forfeit his job without a fight.

"Dustin's a competitor," Nakamura said. "That's what years of experience here have taught him, especially with all the things we've gone through. ... He knows the competition level is there, and he's going to compete every time he steps on the field."



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Kelly solves problem of overcrowding 2 freshmen WRs to redshirt in '08

WEST HARRISON, Ind. - With a logjam of wide receivers at his disposal, including five freshmen, University of Cincinnati coach Brian Kelly has made a couple decisions to help sort out the mess.

Kelly said Monday that freshmen Adrien Robinson and Tomaz Hilton will redshirt this season and Orion Woodard will try to earn playing time as a defensive back.

With so many other quality receivers trying to fill spots, Kelly said keeping Robinson and Hilton in the Bearcats program an extra year was the problem solver. Plus, freshman Armon Binns has impressed the coaching staff and might have the ability to help UC this fall.

"We decided Binns is a little further along," Kelly said. "We're going to keep him with us. We'll see if he redshirts or not through the season. We felt like of all the four receivers that we graded out, Binns had some natural instincts and ability. He fits the position we have the biggest need for. We don't need another outside quy."

That leaves sophomores Marty Gilyard and Jared Martin battling with senior Mike Daniels for one receiver spot; freshman Marcus Barnett and senior Antwuan Giddens fighting for another; and junior Dominick Goodman taking most of the snaps at the other receiver position.

Woodard, therefore, doesn't have a spot on the offense. Kelly's solution: Try him out at safety.

"He's a kid who played both sides of the ball in high school," Kelly said. "On special teams, he just looked special. He flies down the field. We're all set with the receivers we have right now. We thought we'd give him a look on defense, because he wants to play right now. He asked if he could try defense so he could play as a freshman."

So far, the Pompton Lakes, N.J., native is adjusting to his new position. It helps, of course, that he's familiar with the spot.

"I played it in high school, so it's not too bad," Woodard said. "They came to me and asked if I wanted to try defense. Coach (Kerry) Coombs wanted me to try it out. I felt I would because I'll do what's best for the team. It's going good so far. I did it in high school so it wasn't much of a change."

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SAME OLD, SAME OLD - Although Wake Forest transfer Ben Mauk took most of the first-team snaps during Monday's morning practice at Higher Ground Retreat Center, Kelly said he hadn't decided yet on a starting quarterback.

In fact, it might be a while before he's ready to announce anything - a chance he might not make a decision until October.

"There's a chance we could go through our non-league schedule to decide who the starting quarterback is," Kelly said. "It may require them to play games. It may. We may find out in the first half of the Southeast Missouri game. I have to be prepared that it could take the regular non-conference schedule to figure that out."

Kelly met with the quarterbacks after practice and told them there's a reason NFL teams play four preseason games to determine their roster. It takes time. In UC's case, he said there are too many other unknowns within the offense to name a starting quarterback.

"We're going to have to play some games to see who the No.

1 guy is," Kelly said. "There's too many moving parts to single out the quarterbacks. The first snap of our scrimmage (Saturday), the ball's on the ground, and (Tony Pike) loses a rep. Dustin (Grutza) runs and scores two touchdowns, but if it was a game situation, he might have gotten sacked. The other 10 (positions) aren't settled. That make it a whole lot more difficult to settle on the quarterback."

O-LINE BATTLES - Two other position battles are shaping up on the offensive line. With left tackle Digger Bujnoch, left guard Ken Rodriguez and right guard Trevor Canfield set to start, the starting center and starting right tackle spots are unclear.

Converted linebacker Jason Kelce had been penciled in as the starting center, but sophomore Chris Jurek took most of the first-team snaps Monday morning, while junior Khalil El-Amin and sophomore Jeff Linkenbach have been competing at right tackle.

"We're going to need all four of them to play for us," Kelly said, "because not one of them is a finished product."

Byrd making mark at UC

But lineman's not yet satisfied

Opponents didn't actually say the words to Terrill Byrd when he first lined up as freshman nose tackle for the University of Cincinnati, but he could tell what they were thinking.

"At first they looked at me, like, 'Look at this short, fat guy right here,' " Byrd said. " 'What's he going to do out there?' I just went out and did what I know how to do. I've been playing the game since I was 5. I just know how to play football."

As Byrd prepares for his junior year at UC, he has achieved a level of respect he wasn't able to reach at Colerain High School.

Even though he played on a state-championship team and was named the national defensive player of the year by Prep.com, Byrd wasn't heavily recruited by major college programs because, at 6 feet 1, he was considered too short to play in Division I-A.

"When I had Terrill Byrd in high school," said Kerry Coombs, the former Colerain head coach who's now the defensive backs coach at UC, "I talked to every college in the country and I told them they were making a huge mistake if you don't take Terrill Byrd. One of the few teams that was sold on him was Cincinnati, and he's paying them back every day."

Byrd's selection last year as first-team all-Big East provided the validation he had lacked. But UC coach Brian Kelly, defensive line coach Keith Gilmore and Coombs expect a lot more.

Before he was part of the UC staff, Coombs used to sit in the bleachers as a fan and watch Byrd play.

"Terrill kept coming off the field and I kept thinking to myself, why is Terrill coming out of the game?" Coombs said. "When I got here, during the spring, I realized he just wasn't in physical shape to play every down."

When Kelly began breaking down tape of UC's games, he noticed that Byrd, despite recording 8.5 tackles for loss and three sacks, was not playing up to his potential.

"He was not a full-time player last year," Kelly said. "He was an explosive player, and then you wouldn't see him for a quarter. If he can play at the level that he's shown for four quarters, I think he truly will be a star for this football team."

Byrd seems to have received the message.

He says he's in better condition than he's ever been, trimming his weight from about 285 to 270.

He's always been big on the weight room, able to bench-press 400 pounds, but that strength didn't translate into being able to play all out on every play for four quarters.

That's Byrd's goal this season.

"My motivation is to go out there and play hard and not think about getting tired," Byrd said. "The conditioning I did during the offseason helped me. I feel like I'm a lot quicker on my feet, quicker to my gaps."


Because of his prior relationship with Byrd, Coombs tries to spend time talking with him about how good he could be.

It was Coombs, after all, who switched Byrd from running back after his freshman year in high school to the defensive line.

"He can be moody," Coombs said. "He can have up-and-down days. I'm always just trying to encourage him, making sure he's looking toward all of the good things that he can do when things are going his way rather than focusing on the bad things that happen.

"He's growing up and maturing. What we've tried to do is get him to take it to another level this year. I think he's accepted that challenge."

Byrd has started 24 consecutive games for UC. He's so difficult to block that he sometimes creates openings for other members of the defensive line to make plays.

UC defense never rests

2-0 Bearcats have not surrendered a touchdown in their two games

The players say they don't spend a lot of time talking about it, but rest assured that the University of Cincinnati's two-game streak of not allowing a touchdown is a huge source of pride.

"Right now we're No. 1 in the Big East in scoring defense," said senior free safety Haruki Nakamura. "For us to ride that as long as we possibly can, that means a lot because that makes a statement that we do have one of the best defenses in the country."

To be more accurate, the Bearcats currently have the No. 2-ranked scoring defense in the nation, having allowed only one field goal in each of their first two games.

The last time a UC team prevented its opponents from scoring a touchdown during its first two games was in 1940 when the Bearcats opened with a 49-0 win over Hanover and a 7-0 win over Louisville.

That team went on to finish 5-3-1.

UC will attempt to stretch its two-game streak to three Saturday when it travels to Oxford to face a Miami team that's averaging 436 yards per game, but is expected to play without senior running back Brandon Murphy, who suffered a knee injury last week in Miami's triple-overtime loss at Minnesota.

Last year, the Bearcats finished fifth in the Big East in scoring defense, allowing 19.2 points per game.

With seven starters returning from that unit, they figured to improve on that standing this season.

"We already knew we were a good defense," senior defensive end Anthony Hoke said. "That's something we should be doing because we've got a lot of veterans, a lot of our seniors, on our defense."

The UC defense is not very big. But the Bearcats compensate with speed and athleticism, a legacy from the Mark Dantonio coaching era when Dantonio and defensive coordinator Pat Narduzzi put most of their best athletes on the defensive side of the ball.

Current coach Brian Kelly has moved some of those players back to offense and has changed the defensive scheme with more of an emphasis on zone pass coverage.

"Our defense is totally different from last year," Hoke said. "We're kind of undersized, but I think that's where we get our edge because we can use our quickness to our advantage."

The Bearcats have surrendered a fair amount of yardage, allowing 286 yards per game, including 105.5 on the ground. And although they rank only fifth in the Big East in rushing defense, they've been stingy enough against the run to force opponents to throw.

Last week, they limited Oregon State, with its talented running back Yvenson Bernard, to 36 yards.

When their opponents have thrown the ball, the Bearcats have been there to make them pay. They have eight

interceptions already, leading to a plus-9 turnover margin, which ranks No. 1 in the country.


"They were very good on defense last year," Miami coach Shane Montgomery said. "They've obviously added their wrinkles scheme-wise, but they're playing fast and they're very opportunistic.

"They stop the run. The two teams they've played have not been able to run the football. They cause a lot of havoc."

The UC defenders say they're too busy doing the work they need to do to keep the streak alive to spend much time discussing it among themselves.

But if the Bearcats haven't allowed a touchdown late in the game against Miami and the RedHawks drive deep inside UC territory, expect the cry to be heard: Don't let these guys cross the goal line.

Nakamura isn't predicting that will happen, but if it does, "We don't even want them to get the impression that they can score on us."





Ranking boosts UC's profile Showdown looms at No. 10 Rutgers

With the University of Cincinnati sporting a No. 24 Associated Press poll ranking, a 4-0 record and a seven-game winning streak, the Bearcats - if they get by San Diego State on the road this Saturday night - could force the nation to watch their game in two weeks.

That's when a nationally ranked UC squad will head to No. 10 Rutgers in what could be a monumental showdown.

And as nice as that sounds, Bearcats coach Brian Kelly said the fact that his team is ranked for the first time since 1976 doesn't mean much in September. It'll mean more in January.

"It's not a stated goal," Kelly said. "For us, it's where we finish. Everybody knows there's more out there for us. We're excited to be ranked, but we'd rather be ranked in the top 25 at the end of the year rather than today."

Still, the Bearcats, after their 40-14 win against Marshall Saturday night, were there when Sunday's poll was released. Along with Arizona State, UC entered the poll while Louisville and Texas A&M dropped out.

It marked the first time UC has resided in the poll since Oct. 25, 1976. Kelly diverted some of the credit to last year's squad.

"I think the Rutgers win last year, finishing strong, going to the bowl game, and the momentum," Kelly said. "The momentum was gaining on this thing from last year. If we had just come off a 4-7 season and we were 4-0, there's no way we'd be in the top 25. Being in a bowl game and winning the bowl game and winning seven in a row, that has to be considered."

Not to say he and his team aren't excited by their new top-25 status. Maybe just not as excited as their supporters.

"It's more for the fans, those that follow the program," Kelly said. "But it helps in areas off the field. It helps in recruiting, helps in your fan support. There's definitely an advantage to being a top-25 team."

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Bearcats are becoming used to making history

Angelo Craig already had finished his portion of the postgame news conference, and he stood in the north end zone of Nippert Stadium, still in his University of Cincinnati uniform, talking with friends.

Soon, a reporter approached asking for more of his time. A couple of youngsters, in the meantime, waited patiently to request autographs. All around him, kids threw footballs and ran themselves sweaty on the turf.

This scene, about an hour after the Bearcats' 40-14 win over Marshall on Saturday, isn't much different than the past. Even last year, when UC started the season 1-3, fans flooded the field after games and horse-played until they were exhausted.

Only now, there are so many more fans. Only now, the feeling surrounding this team - surrounding Craig, a senior defensive end - is different. In five short games under the tutelage of UC coach Brian Kelly, the Bearcats have transformed themselves into a fan-frenzied squad that could compete for a conference title.

Consider that during Saturday's game: Marshall quarterback Bernard Morris completed 67 percent of his passes for 252 yards and two touchdowns, officials penalized UC 10 times for 80 yards, the Bearcats converted on only 2 of 10 third downs and the quarterback position continues in a state of flux.

In all, UC didn't play all that well, but still, the Bearcats walked away with an impressive-looking 26-point win in front of a stadium-record tying crowd of 30,097.

With kids, tape recorders and autograph-seekers surrounding, this is exactly where Craig envisioned himself.

"We could," Craig said. "Everybody else couldn't."

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With good reason. Last year at this time, UC was struggling at 1-3. Now, it's ranked No. 24 in the Associated Press poll, the first time the Bearcats have been included in the top-25 since 1976.

This year's Bearcats squad, though, has become accustomed to making history. Kelly's 5-0 record is the best start by a first-year UC coach since Russ Cohen in 1935, and the team's 4-0 record is the best beginning to a season since Sid Gillman's squad went 8-2 in 1954.

The Bearcats are dealing with some mind-boggling numbers right now.

"It is crazy," said junior quarterback Dustin Grutza, forced to start in place of Ben Mauk and, for the second straight week, played well, completing 14 of 20 passes for 142 yards and two touchdowns. "It's what we expected, but I don't think anybody else in the nation expected it. Coach Kelly has a plan, and we're just following through. It just seems like everything is coming together."

Kelly, of course, doesn't exactly see it that way. Look at Marshall's passing game - Kelly said the safeties not named Haruki Nakamura need to play better - or the penalties or the third-down conversions.

But he said he's not too concerned with the quarterbacks. Especially if Mauk continues to struggle with his shoulder and Grutza continues to play well as his backup.

In the week before the Marshall game, Kelly insisted Mauk was his starter, and after Thursday's practice, he reinforced that point. But when UC's offense took the field for the start of the game Saturday, Grutza was under center.

"It's a minute-to-minute situation where (Mauk) looks good at times," Kelly said. "He made some great throws, the one down the sideline and the one for the touchdown. But then he gets a little discomfort in there. It's really out of my hands right now. There's something going on in there that's not allowing him to consistently throw the ball with zip on it

"He looked great Thursday and threw a couple of passes in pregame and felt like he was locked up a little bit. It's something above my understanding. Those are questions I can't answer."

Grutza, though, answered some questions of his own. He started the game, gave way to Mauk (who completed 6 of 7 passes for 77 yards and a score) in the second quarter, and after Mauk pulled himself from the game, Grutza reentered and led UC (4-0) to a third-quarter score that made it 33-14 and ended the Thundering Herd's (0-4) chances.

"Ben went in there and made some good plays and led us on a drive," Grutza said. "When I got my chance to come back in, I wanted to go down and put some points up. The game was getting a little closer, but it worked out."

Also worked out well for UC - which is getting fans excited and reminding supporters of the Bearcats squads from 50 years ago.

"You have to win the football games you're favored to win," Kelly said. "When you're playing the Marshalls and the Miami of Ohios, you have to expect that you're going to play well and win those football games. We have to clean up some things, but I'm happy we can win a football game and not play our best."

Kelly's no talk, all action

Raising level of preparation, not emotion, is focus for UC coach

During his short time as the University of Cincinnati's football coach, Brian Kelly has demonstrated he's not shy about speaking out.

But when it comes to giving rousing pregame speeches or exhorting his players to work up an emotional froth during the week, Kelly's not interested.

There was no Vince Lombardi-type speech before the rivalry game against Miami last week, he said, and there will be none before the Marshall game this week.

"I'm not very good at it," Kelly said.

So, even though the Bearcats (3-0) are preparing to face a Marshall team on Saturday that's 0-3 and just lost to Division I-AA New Hampshire, Kelly said he won't spend time talking to his players about an emotional letdown after their win over Miami. That's because they weren't on an emotional high to begin with.

"My comments after the Miami game were that we were businesslike," Kelly said. "It wasn't to cast aspersions on anybody. It was that our guys didn't play real emotional.

"Our guys will tell you that I'm not a big speech guy.

"I do a lot of our work during the week," Kelly continued. "I try to make practices as mentally challenging as possible. We may not bang and knock people down and play physical during the week as much as maybe some other programs do, but mentally we're going to challenge you during the week."

Kelly's practices last two hours almost to the minute and are conducted at a rapid pace. The idea is for the players to focus so when game day arrives, they're prepared to play fast and with a thorough knowledge of how to negate an opponent's strength.

Kelly's businesslike approach is in direct contrast to that of his predecessor, Mark Dantonio, who talked frequently about playing with great emotion and made it a staple of his weekly preparation.

"It's real different," defensive end Anthony Hoke said. "Dantonio, he tried to make every game personal."

That doesn't mean one approach is right and the other is wrong. But Kelly, who's in his 17th year as a head coach and has two Division II national championships to his credit, knows what works for him.

"We've tried to move as far away from being emotional as possible," Kelly said. "I want our guys to be enthusiastic. I want them to genuinely love what they're doing. If they enjoy what they're doing and we prepare, that's been my recipe for success. I have not changed that, and I'm certainly not going to change it at this point."

So far, it's hard to argue with the results.

"He brings a great attitude to the game," tight end Doug Jones said. "It's a different type of preparation. It seems

like practices are harder than the games. We go out there, and we already know what we need to do. That's a big part of why we're winning right now."


So far, everything has bounced right for Kelly.

The Bearcats have avoided major injuries. Their early-season schedule has been favorable and they've attracted some national attention by winning their games by a combined score of 140-16.

But Kelly knows that things won't always be so rosy. That's why he's trying to keep everything on an even keel, so when the tough times arrive, his players will be steeled to confront them instead of being deflated emotionally.

"We used the analogy yesterday of the climb to Mount Everest, that the top is a championship," Kelly said. "We've just started. Along that climb, it gets dangerous as you continue to move up to the top. There are more challenges. As long as everyone knows to hold onto the rope and stay focused on what we're doing, we'll overcome anything that comes our way."

Mauk remains No. 1 at QB Starter has sore shoulder

Brian Kelly doesn't have to answer who will start at quarterback for the University of Cincinnati this Saturday when the Bearcats host Marshall. He's already made that announcement.

Despite junior Dustin Grutza's Big East offensive player of the week performance last Saturday against Miami University (25-of-35 passing for 290 yards and two touchdowns), Kelly's quarterback, without question, is senior Ben Mauk - even if Mauk's sore shoulder kept him from playing last Saturday.

"If he's 100 percent, and we think he's going to be 100 percent, he's our starter," Kelly said. "We feel pretty good that we made a good decision in not playing him. It's giving him more time to get that shoulder back to 100 percent. We'll be careful with him this week, but he's our starting quarterback. If he's not ready to go, it's next man in."

After not playing Saturday and taking off Sunday and Monday, Mauk didn't do much throwing at practice Tuesday. When the team practiced seven-on-seven drills, Grutza worked mostly with the first-team offense and Tony Pike performed with the second team.

Mauk was in there occasionally, handing off to a running back or making a short-yardage pass.

Kelly said he simply wants to be careful with his starter.

"We want to be smart," Kelly said. "We may have pushed him too hard too early (this season). We came right out of camp, and we threw him right to the wolves. But we had to. Not only did he have to win the job, he had to get over from a leadership standpoint. We had to push him hard. We needed to do that. The nice part of is that it's no structural damage, nothing other than he's got some inflammation and we have to get him stronger.

"We want to take it easy with him, work him in. He had a lot of run stuff and short gain stuff (Tuesday). You have to be

careful with him, monitor his pitch count."

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According to Kelly, Mauk made 22 throws at practice Tuesday. In the 11-on-11 drill during the last minutes of practice, Mauk took 11 snaps, Grutza had nine and Pike seven.

The quarterbacks, per Kelly's orders, were unavailable for comment after Tuesday's practice, but following the Miami game, Mauk said he appreciated Kelly's support.

"It's good the coach has the faith and trust in me to bounce back and go out there and get the job done," Mauk said. "Him having faith in me and having confidence in my abilities, it means a lot to me. It's going to make me play harder for him."

Kelly remains confident Mauk will be the first quarterback you see play against the Thundering Herd.

"Dr. (Angelo) Colosimo and (trainer) Bob Mangine say he should be able to go this weekend," Kelly said. "We're preparing all three of them, because that's what I've been doing (this year)."

At some point, though, doesn't Mauk actually need to make some tough, long throws in practice?

"We've got plenty of time," Kelly said. "Thursday is when we really try to push it down the field. We'll get a better feel where he is by Thursday. He had no pain today. He felt good. We're just going to be careful with him."

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UC's raising the stakes

Mike Thomas sometimes speaks the language in ways that make you scratch your head and run for the dictionary. "Arms races" and "stakeholders" and "infrastructure?" I thought we were talking about football

UC's move to the Big East didn't just mean Big Monday, more TV games and gold at the end of the BCS rainbow. It meant more money, more donors and more playpens for better athletes. Arms, stakeholders and infrastructure. We're not in Conference USA anymore, Toto. Props to Thomas for getting a jump on things.

(While we're at it, a round of applause for the UC athletic director, who quietly hired two of the brighter stars in the college coaching universe, Brian Kelly and Mick Cronin. Thomas doesn't impress you with a swagger. He just gets things done. But that's another column.)



What UC is doing is moving from the dollar slots to No Limit Texas Hold 'Em. What that means is, if you want the Bearcats to be a player, you'll have to ante up. That goes for Mr. Casual Fan (don't gasp at future ticket prices) to Mr. Friend of the Program (how'd you feel about leasing a luxury box?) to Mr. Heavy Hitter (can we count on you for \$1 million?).

This was predictable. What wasn't predictable was how fast it would be an

UC football is 5-0, and suddenly Kelly's \$800,000-a-year base salary isn't big enough. Nippert Stadium needs luxury boxes, there is no outdoor practice field and,

really, how are we supposed to compete without an indoor place to practice?

Thomas calls it an "arms race," the popular term to describe the revving-up of big-time college athletic departments. Thomas says UC won't enter the race. Kelly begs to differ.

"You can't avoid it. We haven't even addressed the fact we're in an arms race," Kelly said. "We don't have an indoor facility, we don't have a practice field. I believe when I was hired here, they understood the stakes. They didn't pay me so much money to come here and be .500. If you're going to pay that much, you better be willing to do things right."

In other words: The Joneses live in a five-bedroom mansion with a pool. Our three-bedroom ranch is cute, in a Mid-American Conference kind of way.

If UC loses Kelly, it won't be because it can't pay him. It'll be because he can't compete with his peers in the Big East. I'll see your indoor practice field and raise you a grass practice field.

"I want to be careful with this," Kelly said Tuesday. "I came here to win a championship. Look at who your competition is. Louisville. West Virginia. Look at South Florida. If you want to play with the big boys, you gotta act like a big boy. That means investing in your program. I believe they understand that, or I'm here under false pretenses.


"I believe in Mike knowing we have to continue building this program. If they'll do that, this is a great place to be. If they don't want to do it, they shouldn't have hired me.'

Your serve, Mr. Thomas,

Thomas recently sent to 10,000 "stakeholders" in UC athletics a brochure titled "Raising the Bar" that outlined the athletic department's wish list. Its intent was to inform, not solicit. The solicit part is coming, though. It's just a matter of time.

"We need to do our best to live within our means," Thomas said. "It's up to us to enhance our standard of living. How we fit in with our peers is important. On a campus, everybody asks for a bigger slice of the pie. We've got to make our own pies. If we have 2,000 donors and Louisville has 8,000, that's a big difference.'

The best thing about Kelly's early success isn't the sellouts of four UC home games; it's the eyes



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that the winning has added. "People who maybe never had UC football on their radar," Thomas said.

It's a huge undertaking to build a big-time football program. That's nothing compared to maintaining one. There's a reason Ohio State is Ohio State, and Boise State is not.

Settle in for some version of the arms race. At UC's level, the 12th Man is always money.



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'Cats, Mauk adjust to injury Shoulder needs pampering

In the week of practice leading to the Sept. 22 Marshall game, much of the media attention was focused on the right shoulder of University of Cincinnati quarterback Ben Mauk.

Less than an hour before the Miami University game the week before, Mauk had been taken out of the starter's spot, because his surgically repaired right shoulder bothered him. His health and whether he would start the Marshall contest was a topic of interest.

UC coach Brian Kelly planned to test Mauk's arm the Thursday before the Marshall game to confirm he could play. Afterward, Kelly called reporters and seemed excited about Mauk's progress. Two days later, Mauk, though he played part of the game, couldn't start again.

Which meant No. 20 UC (5-0, 0-0 Big East) had to make more adjustments to Mauk's practice regimen last week. For Kelly, trainer Bob Mangine and strength and conditioning coach Paul Longo, it's still a matter of making perfect the recipe for how much Mauk practices and how much he sits during the week.

"It's just having that interaction with him in the quarterback meeting every day," said Kelly, whose squad will travel to No. 21 Rutgers at 8 p.m. Saturday. "We can find out how he feels today, what do you want to do, here's what's on the scripts. We're not going to have him go out there, and throw verticals 15-20 times. We'll pick our spots.

"I think we're getting closer in terms of finding out what works best in his routine. You still have to take reps in this offense. There are too many things that run through the quarterbacks. You have to go out there and see the looks you're getting to be prepared for Saturday."

Mauk, who is ranked fourth in the country in passing efficiency, also knows the positives of less intensity during the week. His arm simply won't allow him to take all the snaps a first-team quarterback usually enjoys during practice. He knows he has to pace himself. He learned that for sure on the Thursday leading to the Marshall game.

"On that Thursday, I felt like I had to prove to (Kelly) I could play," Mauk said. "I tried really hard and gave it everything I had. It just fatigued my arm."

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Last Thursday's practice was a bit different. Not as intense for the senior from Kenton, not as tiring, and much more effective in the long run for Mauk, who started last Saturday's San Diego State game and completed 17 of 23 passes for 257 yards and four touchdowns.

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"We're kind of experimenting with it," said Mauk, who is completing 70 percent of his passes this season for 777 yards, nine touchdowns and two interceptions. "It's an injury I've never been through before. Not many quarterbacks have broken their arm and dislocated their shoulder. Week by week, we're trying to see what's best. He took it easy on me in practice. The deeper throws I didn't make until later in the week. Thursday was a real slow day for me and gave me another day of rest."

And even if, for some reason, Mauk can't compete at Rutgers (3-1, 0-0) this Saturday, he's confident his fellow quarterbacks will come to the team's rescue.

"It's kind of a neat situation," Mauk said. "Dustin Grutza can come in and he does a really good job. He can win the game for us. I'm pretty confident I can do the same thing. It's a not a big thing where everybody is worried about who's going to be the quarterback. We know we have somebody back there who will get the job done. After last week, we gained some confidence in how to take care of the shoulder. I think we'll be OK from here on out."

NOTEWORTHY - Notre Dame transfer quarterback Demetrius Jones practiced with UC for the first time Tuesday. "I got a chance to talk him through some of the offense, and he's pretty excited," Kelly said. "As we were running some seven-on-sevens, I explained some of our terminology, and he kept saying, 'Boy, I'm going to love this offense.' ... UC's eight-game winning streak is the third-longest active stretch in the country. Only Wisconsin (14 consecutive) and LSU (12) have longer streaks.

The more students the better at UC football games

The UC student section at the Marshall game was absolutely amazing. According to UC Senior Associate Director of Athletics, Mike Waddell, roughly 7,500 students showed up to cheer on the Cats against the 0-3 Marshall Thundering Herd. With the massive student section roaring, the atmosphere was more like an Ohio State game than a traditional UC contest.

For long-time Bearcats football die-hards, like me, it was pretty surreal. It was far and away the largest and loudest crowd I have seen in the 15 years I have been coming to Nippert Stadium.

This dramatic increase in student attendance poses an unusual problem for the University: there are now too many students going to the football games.

"Over the past six years our average football student attendance has been 2,800 so I don't think anybody really envisioned this as being too much of an issue," Waddell said. "Right now we are managing in uncharted waters."

The university's solution to this problem is to limit the number of student tickets to 6,000.

To the university's credit, they are reserving 17 percent of the stadium's capacity for students. The problem is Nippert Stadium only has 35,000 seats, making it the smallest stadium in the Big East.

The University of Connecticut by comparison has a 40,000-seat stadium and they reserve around 4,500 tickets for students, or 11 percent of their stadium's capacity. There is one big difference however.

"We aren't turning any students away," said Leigh Torbin, Assistant Director of Athletic Communications at the University of Connecticut.

Here at UC that is what they will be doing for the Homecoming game Oct. 13 against

Louisville. If a game against a winless non-conference opponent draws 7,500 UC students, think about how many students will show up for a game against a conference rival with possible Big East championship implications.

I understand placing a cap on student tickets is necessary to prevent overcrowding, but if 7,500 students came to the last game why not make the cap 7,500 tickets?

Earlier in the season, head coach Brian Kelly stressed the importance of getting students to the games.

"I think any college football stadium has to have that kind of electricity in that the student brings," Kelly said. "It's different than the average fan that buys the ticket."

To have a great atmosphere at a college football game you need a great fan base and it starts with the students.

The UC football program's fan base has been barely noticeable over the past few decades. Now with an exciting coach, a talented team and the shortcomings of the Cincinnati Bengals, UC has a unique opportunity to basically build their fan base by being the only winners in town.

That's why getting as many students as possible to the games is important. If you become a UC football fan as a student, chances are you will be a fan for life, especially if you have great memories of going to the games.

So why will we be turning away at least 1,500 students for the Homecoming game?

The only reason I can think of is the extra \$30,000 the university will make by selling the tickets instead of giving them away to students.

Thirty grand is a lot of money for a student like me but for a university that spent \$35,000 to have a company italicize the C-paw and call it a new logo, it seems a little more manageable.

The long-term solution to the "problem" of having too many students coming to the games is obvious: renovate Nippert Stadium.

Deciding what to do until then is difficult and for now, the solution is going to be a 6,000 ticket cap.

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Students camp out for Louisville tickets

If you took a drive down Corry Street on the University of Cincinnati campus Wednesday morning, students clutching pillows, sleeping bags and blankets were there to meet you walking up the hill.

With freshly acquired student football tickets in hand, they with their sleep masks pushed up on their forehands, wiping the gunk out of their eyes - most likely were headed home. Hopefully, to shower.

Already they'd accomplished the unprecedented. Hundreds of students camped out Tuesday night to acquire their free tickets for the Oct. 13 UC-Louisville game.

The line stretched from the tennis courts in front of the Lindner Center to Corry Street, snaking its way back and forth on Sheakley Lawn leading to the left-field fence of Marge Schott Stadium and making its way past the Oscar Robertson statue and continuing behind the right-field scoreboard.

To pass the time, students played cornhole, threw the football, and ate the pizza Bearcats coach Brian Kelly delivered to them Tuesday night.

Then, they tried to sleep.

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Jon Sutermeister, a freshman from Dayton, Ohio, didn't have much success. After getting in line at 8 p.m. Tuesday, about three hours after the first students arrived, he said he slept about two hours on a bench.

By about 9 a.m., he walked away from the ticket windows at the Lindner Center with his prize, one of the 4,000 free student tickets (another 500 tickets will be distributed the day of the game).

"This is the first time it's happened at UC," Sutermeister said. "It's great to be part of this. This is going to happen for the West Virginia game, too. We're making history."

Normally, students haven't had to worry about securing their tickets before a game. But after they showed up for the Sept. 22 Marshall contest in much bigger numbers than expected, leading to an environment that Bearcats players and coaches marveled at afterward, the UC ticket office set up a system of in-person distribution at the Lindner Center.

It also put 1,000 online tickets on sale at 8 a.m. Wednesday. Those were gone in eight minutes. By 9:20 a.m., the 500 student guest tickets had sold out as well.

"We knew a small group was coming, but we didn't expect this," said Greg Harrell, manager for group ticket sales and special events. "The student body really represented itself. When you see how far it's come in just one calendar year, you just don't see that happen every day. It's unique."

It was also in Kelly's plans. In his seventh-floor Lindner Center office, he could see the line of students waiting to buy tickets to see his squad. The response was exactly what he wanted.

"You have to make a football game more than just a game at Nippert Stadium," Kelly said. "It has to be an event. It can't be an event unless you have your students. If your students are actively engaged with what you're doing as a football program, you have a great chance of creating a special atmosphere. We started from Day One trying to attract our students here and trying to engage them. We're showing that it can happen at the University of Cincinnati."

Not everyone was happy, though. Antonio Mazzaro, a UC law student from Melbourne, Ky., wrote in an e-mail to The Post that he didn't understand why the school couldn't allot more online tickets. He also pointed out that when the school sent out an e-mail to the student body, explaining the new ticket policy, it originally stated online tickets would go on sale at noon.

Later in the e-mail issued by UC, the time is listed at 8 a.m.

"I don't blame them for the inconsistencies; they were flying by the seat of their pants, and I know these policies are for safety more than anything else," Mazzaro said. "I am quite sure UC would love to let every student in the entire student body in if they could. Maybe UC should survey the student body, or get better input from the Student Government.

"That said, I hope UC learns from this experience, allots more to most of the tickets for online reservations, and doesn't expect students to always wait for 10-12 hours in person for tickets."

Big East's rep helping Bearcats

Conference has added prestige

The University of Cincinnati's sudden success in football might seem a little difficult to grasp for some local sports fans, but Big East Conference commissioner Mike Tranghese always was confident the Bearcats would reach this point.

All they needed, he believed, was the boost in prestige that the Big East could provide.

That's why Tranghese pushed for the league to invite UC, along with fellow Conference USA members South Florida and Louisville, after Miami (Fla.), Virginia Tech and Boston College left for the Atlantic Coast Conference.

"Cincinnati is a great market," Tranghese said. "They've got a great football tradition, although it's been dominated by the NFL. If you put them in this environment with an automatic BCS berth, could they have success? We all thought the answer was yes."

Tranghese didn't know how long it would take for UC to flourish, but even last year, as he sat in a half-empty Nippert Stadium to watch UC beat South Florida, he never wavered from his conviction that the Bearcats would succeed in football and that when they did, the fans would come to watch.

As No. 20 UC (5-0) prepares to open its third Big East season Saturday at No. 21 Rutgers (3-1), he's been proven right.

UC registered its first sellout in six years for the Sept. 22 Marshall game and also has sold out the Oct. 13 Louisville and Nov. 17 West Virginia games. Tuesday night, UC students were camping out to secure tickets for the Louisville game.

Tranghese concedes that UC's history of attendance problems was a concern when he and the rest of the league began to look for new members in 2003.

But upon further investigation, he became convinced that Cincinnati would support a winning Big East program much the same way it has supported the school's more successful basketball program.

"I thought if they won they could begin to attract interest," Tranghese said, "but you don't know until it happens. Ohio is a great football state. If they win, why wouldn't they attract fans?

"There's no mystery. It's all about winning. We live in this day and age of what I call marketing gurus. You can have all the marketing you want, but the best marketing technique is simply winning. It will take care of a lot of your problems."

What's happening now is what former UC athletic director Bob Goin talked about when he campaigned to get UC into the Big East. He believed it was a chance for the Bearcats to take a place among the giants of college football, and maybe the only chance to make football work at what traditionally has been regarded as a basketball school.

As the Bearcats prepared to move from Conference USA to the Big East, Goin fired 10-year head coach Rick Minter and replaced him with Ohio State defensive coordinator Mark Dantonio, who recruited most of the players

on the current team.

After Dantonio left last year for Michigan State, Goin's successor, Mike Thomas, hired Brian Kelly, who's unbeaten in six games as UC's head coach, including a win in the International Bowl last season.

"It all comes down to who you hire as a coach," Tranghese said. "They've made two coaching hires, and both of them have contributed mightily to where they are. I think they're just scratching the surface.

"Now they have something to sell. I understand that Ohio State is a huge (presence) in Ohio, but Ohio State can't get every player. Brian Kelly showed me his plan. He's organized. He's structured. As a result, I think they're going to get better football players."

Kelly said the Big East has been instrumental in UC's rise and he doesn't believe the Bearcats would be ranked if they still were in C-USA, even with the same 5-0 record against the same opponents. After all, Saturday's game will be their first this season against a ranked team, and their five victories have come against opponents with a combined record of 7-17.

"You don't get ranked in the top 20 for being 5-0 in Conference USA," Kelly said. "You just don't."

But you do in the Big East.

"I think there's a prestige to being in one of the automatic-qualifying conferences," Tranghese said. "I also think when they vote, they know Cincinnati is going to have to line up against Rutgers, South Florida and West Virginia. There's a method in determining whether it's valid or not."

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3CDC: Forgive us, UC

It's rare in this day and age to see anyone plainly admit a mistake - particularly anyone in authority.

Hence the apology issued this week over a bad call on Fountain Square was all the more remarkable.

Steve Leper, the president and chief executive office of the Cincinnati Center City Development Corporation - better known as 3CDC - acknowledged in a press release that his organization should have aired the University of Cincinnati vs. Rutgers football game on the big video display screen above Macy's last Saturday night.

What did it show instead?

The Ohio State - Purdue contest.

Admittedly, there was local interest in both, and fans throughout the tri-state were flipping between both games throughout the night.

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But handing out remotes to folks on Fountain Square wasn't an option. Well, not a good one anyway, though if it were technically feasible it might have made for an interesting social experiment.

But as it stood Leper, or whoever was in charge of picking the channel, had to make a decision that really wasn't that difficult. He, she or they should have gone with the hometown Bearcats - particularly since they've been on such a roll lately. (Their 28-23 victory over Rutgers left the Bearcats ranked 15 in the national Associated Press poll and tied for first in the Big East conference.)

"We made a mistake," Leper said in his press release. "Clearly, we should have given priority to the University of Cincinnati."

We trust the University of Cincinnati - which hasn't been shy about voicing its opinions when it considers press attention of its football program to be insufficient - will accept Leper's apology with grace. After all, he promised to show all future Bearcats football games on Fountain Square if they're available through the Time Warner feed.

Leper is no doubt glad that Xavier University doesn't field a football team.

LB is UC's hard-hitter

Manalac's play belies off-field demeanor

His game-clinching interception was the play that everyone noticed, but linebacker Ryan Manalac would have been the University of Cincinnati's most valuable defensive player in Saturday's win over Rutgers even without it.

Manalac, a junior from Pickerington, Ohio, led the Bearcats with 11 tackles, eight of them solo. And he was instrumental in holding Rutgers running back Ray Rice to 94 yards on 34 carries, a 2.8-yard average.

"The interception was huge, but I will tell you that Ryan played a great game," UC coach Brian Kelly said. "There's a lot of people who have to shut down Rice, but Ryan saved a lot of guys on our front in making some great plays."

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The Big East defensive player of the week, Manalac is in his first season as a starter. He arrived at UC in 2004 as a preferred walk-on under then-coach Mark Dantonio, hoping for a chance to play big-time college ball but was redshirted.

"I wasn't getting any offers," he said. "... I thought Coach Dantonio would be a good coach to play for, so I came here to get an opportunity."

Everything worked out fine until Dantonio left at the end of last season. Manalac had earned a scholarship and played in 11 games at linebacker in 2006.

But when Kelly took over for Dantonio, Manalac wondered what that would mean for him.

"Then I started listening to Kelly and buying in," he said.

It took some time for Kelly to discover what he had in Manalac, a 6-foot, 220-pounder who runs the 40-yard dash in 4.7 seconds.

"There's a million of those guys," Kelly said.

But during the Bearcats' stay in August at Camp Higher Ground in Indiana, Kelly made it a point to get to know more about Manalac. And the more he learned, the more he liked.

"He's very insightful, very thoughtful," Kelly said. "He does not fit the profile of a middle linebacker. Most middle linebackers, you walk in and you kind of know he's a middle linebacker. He keeps a lot of his thoughts close to the vest."

Manalac, an honor student majoring in finance, doesn't have a lot to say to reporters. It's just not in his nature to

do much talking.

"I keep a lot inside," he said.

On the field, though, he's so vocal that he helps to energize his teammates.

"He wants to be a perfect player and he works to be a perfect player," safety Haruki Nakamura said.

Manalac has started the last four games at middle linebacker but essentially shares the position with Andre Revels as part of Kelly's plan to keep players fresh.

But even though he's not on the field for the entire game, Manalac still ranks as UC's third- leading tackler with 31. He leads in solo tackles with 23.

And he doesn't mind sharing the position with Revels.


"He helps me a lot, and I help him a lot," Manalac said. "We talk on the sideline. We tell each other what we see. We help each other in the film room. We share all information. He refers to us as the two-headed monster."

Manalac is the second straight UC middle linebacker who began his college career as a walk-on, following Kevin McCullough, who was a first-team all-Big East selection last season.

"I didn't know that I'd be a linebacker," Manalac said. "But I hoped eventually that I would start."

In his own quiet way, Manalac has fulfilled that goal.

"He got his chance and made the most of it," Kelly said. "He's one of the strongest guys on our football team. He runs extremely well. I thought he was just a journeyman player when I got here. He's made a lot of strides even in that time."





Kelly teaches leaders by the numbers

Brian Kelly needed a way to motivate his football players and entice them to work harder while playing the game and developing their leadership skills. It was the mid-1990s, Kelly headed the Grand Valley State football team, and the Lakers were in a stretch during which it would make the NCAA Division II playoffs only once in four seasons.

Kelly needed a hook, needed to figure out a way to show his players what the coaching staff thought of them.

He needed a numbering system that was easy to understand.

"I first used it back in the mid-'90s when we had some leadership issues," said Kelly, whose current squad, No. 21 University of Cincinnati (8-2, 3-2 Big East), will face fifthranked West Virginia (8-1, 3-1) at 7:45 p.m. Saturday. "You hear this all the time. 'Boy, we don't have great leadership.' Well, it's your job to build great leadership. I needed to find a way to let our guys know, 'Here's where we perceive you to be. You need to move through that.' It was a way to communicate to the players, here's where you need to grow."

So, here's the system he developed, assigning player values based on the Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4. No. 4s are the strongest; No. 1s are the weakest. The explanation by Kelly is easy to understand:

A No. 4: "The 4," Kelly said, "is clearly the guy that mirrors what we talk about every day. Walks the walk, talks the talk and also can influence those around him. He has the ability to go up to a guy and say, 'Hey listen, that's not how we do things.' Somebody who is willing to confront others that are not doing things the right way."

A No. 3: "The 3 to me plays at an all-conference level on and off the field. He does the right things in the classroom and represents you positively."

A No. 2: "The 2s are the ones who are going to give you that

A No. 1: "The 1s aren't giving it to you at all."

but they're not giving to give it to you all the time."



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The results of his new system took a few years to sink in while Kelly was at Grand Valley State, but from 2001-03, the players who had learned those classifications from the time they stepped onto campus captured two national titles, finished runner-up for another and won 47 of 49 games. Perhaps his ranking system contributed to that pair of national crowns, and perhaps Grand Valley State's success is coincidental.

But either way, Kelly believed in it enough to continue using it. The Bearcats believe in it as well.

"It's a cool ratings system for the team," senior offensive tackle Digger Bujnoch said. "Everybody wants to be a 4, because then you're going to be the guy and everybody else will look up to you. We all respect each other, but it's a deeper respect for somebody."

According to Kelly, though, UC doesn't employ any 4s. Players such as Bujnoch and senior safety Haruki Nakamura are solid 3s, Kelly says, but it's not easy to crack the next level. The 4 is the player who makes everybody around him better. The 3s haven't learned how to accomplish that yet.

"You have to have special qualities that are probably more innate than they are learned," Kelly said. "You can learn how to be a 3 by having a great work ethic and character and athletic ability. The 4 requires something special. A lot of times, that's hard if you don't have it."

Kelly is convinced players such as Nakamura and Bujnoch would become 4s if they weren't graduating after this season. A player such as senior receiver Mike Daniels has the qualities of a 4 when he's off the field, but in Kelly's mind, you can't be classified a 4 if you hardly contribute while on it.

"Every guy should shoot for being a 4," Bujnoch said, "and I think they do, because if you're a 4, you're a top-notch player and a good leader."

Junior linebacker Corey Smith is one who Bujnoch says potentially could reach the level of 4. Smith doesn't disagree.

"A lot of guys, when they came in here, the sky was the limit," Smith said. "Well now, we're in the sky. We're there. We have to take things to a whole new level. I think I can get to the 4. I think there are a lot of other guys that can get to the 4. That will mean we'll have to step out of our comfort zone. Doing things we wouldn't normally do."

For Smith, that means becoming a vocal leader and continuing his production on the field. For now, though, UC will have to compete for a Big East title with some 3s and no 4s. For now, that's just the way it is.

"For this group, if we had them again, we'd pop out some 4s," Kelly said. "If I had another year with a Haruki or a Digger Bujnoch, another year with a couple other seniors, we probably could do it. One year is not enough time."
