Entered the starting lineup for the second game of 2009 and started the final 12 games at linebacker ... second on the team with 100 tackles, ranking eighth in the BIG EAST Conference ... set a career best with 14 tackles against Illinois and added his second double-digit tackle game with 10 against Florida in the Allstate Sugar Bowl ... added 5.5 TFL, 3 INT, 3 PBU, and 1.5 sacks.

STREAKS, STORYLINES, SIDEBARS

- The University of Cincinnati enters its 123 football season in 2010 with an all-time record of 547-542-51 (.502).
- Cincinnati (1885) is one of the five oldest programs in college football along with Rutgers (1869), Michigan (1879), Navy (1880), and Minnesota (1883).
- UC opens up the 2010 campaign on Sept. 4 at Fresno State and is 76-37-10 all-time in season openers.
- Cincinnati won its second-straight BIG EAST Conference title in 2009, earning the league's BCS bowl bid for the second time.
- Head coach Butch Jones enters his first season with the Bearcats after going 27-13 with two Mid-American Conference Championships in three years at Central Michigan University.
- UC returns 13 starters from the 2009 squad, including all-league selections Armon Binns (WR), Ben Guidugli (TE), Alex Hoffman (OL), and Jason Kelce (OL).
- The defense returns four of its top six tacklers from 2009, including LB JK Schaffer (100 tackles), DB Drew Frey (64 tackles, 2 INT), DB Dominique Battle (60 tackles, 2 INT), and LB Walter Stewart (59 tackles, 8 TFL, 4.5 sacks).
- QB Zach Collaros, named the team's starter prior to Bearcat Bowl IV, has been named to the watch lists for the Davey O'Brien

- National Quarterback Award and the Manning Award.
- LB JK Schaffer has earned a spot on the watch list for the Bronco Nagurski Award, given annually to the nation's top defender.
- Cincinnati has won 18-straight regular season games.
- Cincinnati had its third straight 10-win season in 2009. Before 2007, Cincinnati had exactly one 10-win season (1951).
- UC's 33 wins over the past three seasons trail only Boise State (36), Florida (35), and Texas (35) among NCAA FBS teams.
- UC was No. 3 in the final BCS rankings, No. 8 in the Associated Press poll, and No. 9 in the USA Today Coaches Poll. All three final rankings are the best in school history.
- UC is 20-8-1 as a ranked team.
- Over the past two seasons, UC has spent 20 weeks ranked in the AP poll. Prior to 2008, UC had appeared in only 14 AP polls from 1936-2007.
- UC turned the ball over 10 times in 2009, the fewest turnovers in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision.
- UC was the last NCAA FBS team to lose a fumble in 2009.
- UC was second in the nation in passing efficiency (161.21) despite using five different quarterbacks through the course of the season.

MITCH'S MISSION

- The Bearcats adopted Mitch Stone, a 12-year old brain cancer patient, through the Friends of Jaclyn Foundation.
- Mitch, a Cincinnati native who attends Maddux Elementary School, was diagnosed with a primitive neuroectodermal brain tumor (PNET) in Feb. 2009.
- He underwent surgery to attempt to remove the tumor, four bouts of chemotherapy, and 31 radiation treatments.
- Mitch has been cancer free since November of 2009.
- The Stone family has dubbed his battle with cancer, Mitch's Mission.
- Mitch has attended the Southeast Missouri State, West Virginia, Illinois, and Sugar Bowl games as well as numerous practices. He was on the field with the team prior to the games, in the locker room pregame and has led the team out of the tunnel on three occasions.
- Prior to the Sugar Bowl, FOJ founder Denis Murphy addressed the team along with Mitch.
- Student-athletes, coaches, and support staff wear red white and blue wrist bands that say 'Mitch's Mission.'
- UC was the first NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision team to adopt a child through FOJ.
- In December of 2009, Mitch started 'Mitch's Mission', a non-profit organization that raises funds to send children with cancer and blood diseases to summer camp.

- UC head football coach Butch Jones and UCATS launched the 1200 Club, the inner circle of the UC football family, in the spring of 2010.
- Membership has topped the century mark with all funds raised going to the football program.

A NEW ERA BEGINS ...

- Butch Jones, who was named the head coach at the University of Cincinnati on Dec. 16, 2009, enters his first season at the helm of the Bearcats program.
- Jones most recently led Central Michigan University to a pair of Mid-American Conference Championships and three-straight bowl appearances.
- At CMU, Jones continued that program's renaissance, going 27-13 over the past three seasons, including a 22-3 mark in league games, winning a pair of MAC Championships (2007, 2009), playing in three-straight bowl games, and earning a postseason ranking of No. 23 in 2009.
- Jones spent a total of 11 seasons as an assistant at the Division I-A level. He served as the offensive coordinator at three different schools, spanning eight seasons, and worked directly with 24 all-conference selections in 15 years as a full-time position coach.

ACADEMICS STRONG IN 2010 ...

- Since arriving in Cincinnati, head coach Butch Jones has made an immediate impact, overseeing an academic quarter of great success.
- The Bearcats achieved a team GPA of 2.7 during the Winter 2010 quarter, up from a 2.4 in the Fall 2009.
- Thirty-two student-athletes achieved a GPA of 3.0 or above, including linebacker JK Schaffer who tallied a 4.0 GPA.

- UC returns 13 starters from last year's BIG EAST Championship squad, including all-league selections Armon Binns (WR), Alex Hoffman (OL), Jason Kelce (OL), and Ben Guidugli (TE).

HOME FIELD ADVANTAGE ...

- UC is 12-0 at Nippert Stadium in the past two seasons, the first time in school history the Bearcats have two-straight seasons with an unblemished home record.
- UC's 2009 average of 33,957 set a single-season mark for attendance, shattering the 2008 record of 31,964.
- In the past three seasons, UC has set three-straight attendance records and over 500,000 fans (577,006) have come through the Nippert turnstiles.

A LOOK AT THE START LIST ...

- UC returns 17 players, 11 on offense and 6 on defense who have earned a start during the UC careers.
- Senior OL Jason Kelce and wide receiver Marcus Barnett lead the team with 26 starts apiece.
- Kelce has started 18 consecutive games, earning the team lead, while Barnett is the only player on the squad to earn a start on both the offensive and defensive sides of the ball.

AN OFFENSIVE COMPARISON ...

- With head coach Butch Jones taking over the UC program entering 2010, many have wondered what that will mean for the high-octane offense Bearcats fans have seen the past several years.
- Have no fears, as Jones has kept the spread no-huddle attack, but fans will see a bit more offensive balance in 2010 as Jones and offensive coordinator Mike Bajakian will place an emphasis on offensive balance and the running game.

WOLFE LEADS THE PACK ...

- Defensive tackle Derek Wolfe enters his junior season as the leader on the defensive line.
- He made 13 starts a year ago, making 41 tackles, eight tackles for a loss, five sacks, a forced fumble, and fumble recovery.
- Wolfe had a strong offseason in the weight room and should see some increased numbers due to UC's transition back to a 4-3 base defense.

SETTING THE LINE ...

- UC returns a three starters on the offensive line in LT Samuel Griffin, LG Jason Kelce, and RG Alex Hoffman.
- C Evan Davis and RT CJ Cobb are penciled in to start entering fall training camp. Cobb started one game in 2009.

**UC IN ELITE COMPANY ...**

- ▶ With its second-straight outright league title, UC has entered an elite group among its fellow BCS members.
- ▶ The Bearcats are just the sixth school to win two or more outright BCS conference titles since 2000.
- ▶ The six BCS automatic qualifier leagues are the ACC, BIG EAST, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-10, and SEC.

COLLARIOS NAMED TO A PAIR OF WATCH LISTS ...

- ▶ UC QB Zach Collaros (Steubenville, Ohio/Steubenville) was named to the 2010 watch lists for both the Manning Award and Davey O'Brien Award.
- ▶ He appeared in all 13 games as a sophomore, making four starts and helped lead UC to a 12-1 season and its second-straight BIG EAST Conference Championship.
- ▶ He was 93-of-124 for 1,434 yards and 10 touchdowns. Collaros also added a quarterback rating of 195.5, 344 yards rushing, and four touchdowns.
- ▶ Collaros was named BIG EAST Player of the Week on Nov. 9, 2009 after setting a league record with 555 yards of total offense (480 passing, 75 rushing) against Connecticut. He was 29-of-37 for 480 yards and one TD through the air and carried the ball 13 times for 75 yards and two touchdowns. His 480 yards passing was the fourth 400-yard passing game in school history and ranks second all-time in UC history behind Greg Cook who threw for 554 against Ohio in 1968.

SCHAFER ON NAGURSKI WATCH LIST ...

- ▶ LB JK Schaffer has earned a spot on the watch list for the Nagurski Award, given to the nation's top defender.
- ▶ He started the final 12 games in 2009 and was second on the team with 100 tackles, ranking eighth in the BIG EAST Conference.
- ▶ Schaffer set a career best with 14 tackles against Illinois and added his second double-digit tackle game with 10 against Florida in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.
- ▶ The junior also added 5.5 TFL, 3 INT, 3 PBU, and 1.5 sacks.

UC AGAINST THE TOP-25 ...

- ▶ Since 2007, UC tops the NCAA FBS in winning percentage against top-25 teams during the regular season.
- ▶ During that span, UC is 8-2 (.800) in 10 games against ranked foes, leading Texas (.778), USC (.750), and Florida (.727). The complete list is below.

STRONG GROUP OF WIDEOUTS ...

- ▶ Seniors Marcus Barnett, Armon Binns, and Vidal Hazelton, and junior DJ Woods will form the core of a strong group of wide receivers entering the 2010 season.
- ▶ Binns had 61 catches for 888 yards and 11 touchdowns and Woods caught 51 balls for 640 yards and four scores in 2009.
- ▶ Barnett was a freshman all-America selection and has 102 career receptions for 15 touchdowns.
- ▶ Hazelton caught 50 balls for 540 yards and four scores in 2007 at USC.
- ▶ Junior college transfer Kenbrell Thompkins is waiting to be cleared to play by the NCAA and freshman Dyjuan Lewis could make an impact with a strong camp.

PAIR OF GRAD STUDENTS ON THE 2010 SQUAD ...

- ▶ Seniors C.J. Cobb, and John Goebel received their bachelor's degrees on Saturday, June 12, 2010 during the 191st Commencement of the University.
- ▶ Both will enroll in graduate school for the 2010 season.

RICHARDSON EARNS SCHOLARSHIP ...

- ▶ Junior DB Wesley Richardson, after two years as a walk-on earned a scholarship on Sept. 3, 2009.
- ▶ Richardson, a junior chemistry major, represents the sixth player since 2007 to have earned a scholarship through the walk-on program.
- ▶ The others are Alex Daniels, Charley Howard, Jason Kelce, Collin McCafferty, and Mike Windt.
- ▶ Richardson saw action in all 13 games in 2009, making 21 tackles on defense and special teams.

NEW PRACTICE FIELDS TO DEBUT ...

- ▶ The Jefferson Avenue Sports Complex, which includes new practice fields for the Bearcats football team is scheduled to debut in early Sept. of 2010.
- ▶ The ground breaking took place on March 16, 2010 for the project with an estimated construction cost of \$15.5 million.
- ▶ The first phase of construction, scheduled to be completed by Sept. 1, 2010, includes two lighted fields, one 100 yards in length and the other 50 yards.
- ▶ The 100-yard field will also become a seasonal indoor practice facility during winter months via an air-supported "bubble" that will be inflated over the field.
- ▶ The bubble, which will be erected from late November to late February, will maintain an interior ambient temperature between 50-60 degrees.
- ▶ The complex will also help the university go green. A chilled water thermal storage tank will be installed under the shorter field to assist with the university's air conditioning systems. The storage tank will help the university realize an ongoing annual energy savings in the range of \$750,000 to \$1 million.
- ▶ The second phase of the construction process will include the addition of bleacher seating, a press box, a scoreboard, a video/viewing tower, locker/team rooms, a training/taping room, restrooms and a plaza to connect the practice facilities with UC's Varsity Village.
- ▶ UC is one of only two football-playing schools (out of 120) in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) that use game day facilities for practice.

NIPPERT STADIUM**GOING STREAKING ...**

- ▶ UC won all of its home games in 2008 and 2009, a 12-game streak, the first time in school history the team went undefeated at Nippert Stadium in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ The school-record streak of 15-straight wins was set during a span from Nov. 8, 1952-Nov. 13, 1954.
- ▶ Ten of the Top-12 crowds in Nippert history, including a stadium record of 35,106 against Illinois in 2009, have occurred since 2007.
- ▶ With an average of 31,964 fans in six home games in 2008, UC established a single-season attendance record, topping the 2007 average of 30,246.
- ▶ UC's 2009 average of 33,957 set a single-season mark for attendance, shattering the 2008 record of 31,964.
- ▶ Since 2007, UC has set three-straight attendance records and over 500,000 fans (577,006) have come through the Nippert turnstiles.

STREAKING AT HOME IN NON-LEAGUE PLAY ...

- ▶ UC has won 16 straight home non-conference games at Nippert Stadium, dating back to a 30-24 win over Temple in three overtimes on Sept. 20, 2003.
- ▶ UC is 10-0 on the home turf in non-conference play since the 2007 season.

SELLOUTS AT NIPPERT ...

- ▶ Including the 2009 campaign, Nippert Stadium has enjoyed a total of 21 sellouts in its lengthy history.
- ▶ Four of UC's six home games in 2009 were sellouts.
- ▶ Nippert Stadium's 12 largest crowds are listed below.

NIPPERT STADIUM ...

- ▶ UC's home field, Nippert Stadium was built in 1902 and completed as a full stadium in 1923, is the second-oldest playing site in the nation for college football.
- ▶ Among NCAA FBS and FCS schools, Nippert (1923) is the nation's seventh-oldest stadium still in use, preceded by Penn's Franklin Field (1895), Harvard Stadium (1903), Georgia Tech's Bobby Dodd Stadium (1913), the Yale Bowl (1914), Cornell's Schoellkopf Stadium (1915), and Wisconsin's Camp Randall Stadium (1917).
- ▶ Head coach Butch Jones calls Nippert the 'Wrigley Field' of college football.

A HYBRID PLAYER ...

- Sophomore Walter Stewart, coming off an impressive campaign as a redshirt freshman, will be a key cog in the Bearcats defense entering the 2010 season.
- Playing the role of outside linebacker/defensive end, Stewart had 59 tackles, 8.5 tackles for a loss, 4.5 sacks, and an interception a year ago.
- Stewart gives UC a solid edge presence and teaming with inside players Derek Wolfe and John Hughes should continue to give opposing QBs pause during 2010.

S(PEAD) KILLS ...

- Running back Isaiah Pead returns and should see an increased role in 2010 in head coach Butch Jones' offense.
- Pead saw action in all 13 games in 2009, making three starts, leading the BIG EAST Conference with a 6.7 yards per carry average.
- He gained 806 yards on 121 carries with nine touchdowns
- Pead had a career-best 175 yards on 18 carries against West Virginia and added four games of 75 yards rushing or more.
- He reached double-digit carries only six times and had 20 receptions for 201 yards and two touchdowns.

OUT FOR REDEMPTION ...

- Senior John Goebel is back in 2010 after an 2009 campaign marred by injuries.
- He was limited to nine games, carrying the ball only 12 times and appearing on special teams.
- Goebel has 648 career rushing yards and seven touchdowns to his credit along with 28 receptions for 295 yards.

FREY THE OLD MAN OF THE DEFENSE ...

- Sophomore Drew Frey enters his fourth year with the UC program in 2010.
- The defensive back played in 12 games in 2009, ranking fourth on the team with 64 tackles. He also added four pass break ups, 3.5 tackles for a loss, two interceptions, and a sack.
- He missed the entire 2007 season and most of the 2008 season due to injury.
- Frey was granted an extension of eligibility request by the NCAA for the 2012-13 academic year.

ROAD WARRIORS ...

- UC has put together a school-record 10 game-road winning streak, dating back to Oct. 25, 2008, a 40-16 loss at Connecticut.
- During the 1950-51-52-53 seasons the Bearcats went 6-0-1 in road games, beating Western Michigan, Kansas State, Hardin-Simmons, Ohio, Tulsa (tie), Western Reserve, and Tulsa before falling to Marquette on Sept. 26, 1953.
- To equal UC's nine road wins over the past two seasons, you would have to combine all of the program's road victories from 2002-2006.

CIRCLING CINCINNATI ...

- The UC football coaching staff have made it no secret that they will use Cincinnati as a recruiting base for future UC student-athletes.
- Currently, UC has 52 players on its roster from the State of Ohio, far more than any other state represented.
- Of those 52, 28 are from the greater Cincinnati area.

SEASON TICKETS SELLING AT RECORD PACE AGAIN ...

- The UC Department of Athletics is enjoying another record-breaking season ticket sales pace that has surpassed the 20,000 mark for the first time ever, setting the stage for a possible preseason sellout of available season tickets for Bearcats Football this fall.
- Cincinnati has established program attendance standards over the last four seasons.
- The Bearcats drew a total of 181,477 fans in 2007 before setting back-to-back regular season average records with program-best 191,788 and 203,741 clips in 2008 and 2009, respectively.

WOMEN'S FOOTBALL 101 RAISES RECORD AMOUNT ...

- The Fifth Annual University of Cincinnati Women's Football 101, held in June, raised nearly \$13,000 for breast cancer awareness.
- Proceeds from the event, totaling nearly \$13,000 will benefit breast cancer research at the UC Barrett Cancer Center at University Hospital and its clinical, educational, and research programs. The donation is an event record and surpasses the \$8,000 raised a year ago.

MAY MENTORSHIP PROGRAM A SUCCESS ...

- As part of the Cats in the Community program, the Bearcats held a May Mentorship event that featured bi-weekly speakers on a wide range of topics.
- The topics presented to the team included academics, safety, psychology, proper nutrition, and life skills.
- One of the highlights was NFL Vice President of Player Development Troy Vincent who presented a league-sponsored program called Pathway to the Pros.
- The program is part of an outreach effort involving the NFL and NCAA.
- One of Vincent's main points, made throughout the event was the importance of getting a degree.
- The players were warned about the potholes along the way -- things as seemingly harmless as social networking to serious issues such as texting while driving, violence, alcohol, and drugs.
- Vincent also touched on the issues of conduct, image, and what made him a success at the professional level.

BEARCATS' GRADUATION RATE LEADS BCS TOP-10 ...

- The Bearcats rank atop the final 2009 Bowl Championship Series Top-10 in academic rankings, according to the latest Graduation Success Rates, released by the NCAA.
- UC checked in with a 75 percent NCAA graduation rate and a 71 percent federal government rate, the only team in the BCS top-10 to surpass the 70-percent plateau on both lists.
- The graduation rates are for student-athletes entering college in 2002-03, meaning they earned their diplomas within six years.

TWO BEARCATS SELECTED IN UFL DRAFT ...

- A pair of former University of Cincinnati football players, wide receiver Antonio Chatman and linebacker Curtis Young, were chosen by the Sacramento Mountain Lions in the 2010 United Football League Draft.
- Chatman was selected with the third pick of the sixth round and 28th selection overall. Young was taken with the fourth choice of the 10th round (49th selection overall).

**NOTING THE ASSOCIATED PRESS POLL ...**

- ▶ UC has been ranked in the *Associated Press* poll for 20 weeks over the 2008 and 2009 seasons, reaching as high as the No. 4 spot on two occasions in 2009 – Nov. 1 and Dec. 6.
- ▶ Prior to that, the Bearcats appeared in only 14 AP polls from 1936 to 2007.

FOOTBALL WINS COMMUNITY AWARD ...

- ▶ The University of Cincinnati football team was recently honored with the Erich Kunzel Queen City Advocate Award at the Cincinnati USA Convention & Visitors Bureau's annual meeting at the Duke Energy Center.
- ▶ The award recognized the Bearcats for bringing positive media coverage to Cincinnati and the region during their record-setting 2009 season.
- ▶ UC went 12-0 during regular season, won its second-straight BIG EAST Conference Championship, and played in the 2010 Allstate Sugar Bowl against Florida, its second-straight Bowl Championship Series appearance.
- ▶ This year, the bureau renamed its Queen City Advocate Award in honor of Erich Kunzel, the late conductor of the Cincinnati Pops Orchestra.

UC ATHLETIC TRAINER HONORED ...

- ▶ UC football athletic trainer Bob Mangine recently received the prestigious American Sports Medicine Institute Career Service Award for Contributions to baseball at the 28th Annual Injuries in Baseball Conference in Birmingham, Ala. The award was presented by Dr James Andrews.
- ▶ Mangine, entering his eighth season with the football program, also serves as the Director of Sports Therapy for Clinical Residency for NovaCare Rehabilitation.
- ▶ He was presented the award for contributing to participate in the program over the last 28 years and his work in the field of Sports Medicine.

FORMER BEARCAT A PART OF SUPER BOWL WIN ...

- ▶ Former University of Cincinnati linebacker Troy Evans helped lead the New Orleans Saints to a 31-17 win in Super Bowl XLIV, at Sun Life Stadium in Miami, Fla.
- ▶ Evans (1999-2000), a special teams captain, called the coin toss in the Saints favor prior to kickoff.
- ▶ Evans wrapped up his third season with the Saints and eighth in the NFL. He played in all 19 games in 2009 and is one of the top special teams players on the Saints and provides veteran depth to the linebacker corps. His career totals include 146 career tackles, three fumble recoveries and an interception.

NO DOUBLING BACK ...

- ▶ UC earned its second-consecutive outright BIG EAST Conference title in 2009.
- ▶ UC last won back-to-back league titles in 1963-1964, sharing the Missouri Valley Conference Championship in 1963, and winning the title outright in 1964.
- ▶ The last school to earn or share the BIG EAST title in two-straight seasons was West Virginia from 2003-05.

FUTURE SCHEDULES ...

- ▶ UC announced it will take on SEC foe Tennessee in 2011 and will face Virginia Tech from the ACC at FedExField in Landover, Md. in 2012.

LOOKING BACK AT 2009 ...

- ▶ The Bearcats finished the regular season with a school-best 12-0 mark and won their second consecutive BIG EAST Conference championship.
- ▶ Cincinnati was one of five unbeaten teams in the nation during the regular season.
- ▶ Unranked in preseason polls, Cincinnati's undefeated regular season catapulted the Bearcats to No. 3 in the BCS standings and earned them an invitation to the Allstate Sugar Bowl, the school's second-consecutive BCS game.
- ▶ UC set numerous school records in 2009, including those for wins (12), road wins (6), consecutive regular season wins (18), points (502), passing yards (4,014), fewest fumbles (10), fewest fumbles lost (2), and fewest turnovers (10).
- ▶ The Bearcats had an individual top the 100-yard plateau in eight out of 13 games.
- ▶ UC was second in the nation in passing efficiency (161.21) despite using five different quarterbacks through the course of the season.
- ▶ The Bearcats rank second nationally in kickoff returns (29.2), third in tackles for a loss (8.4), sixth in passing offense (320.3), scoring offense (39.8), and total offense (464.3), while sitting tied for eighth in sacks (2.9), and 10th in sacks allowed (0.9).
- ▶ Eleven UC student-athletes were honored as all-BIG EAST selections, including four out of five starting offensive linemen. Chris Jurek (1st), Alex Hoffman (2nd), Jason Kelce (2nd), and Linkenbach (2nd) earned all-BIG EAST honors in 2009.
- ▶ Cincinnati has won 18-straight regular season games.
- ▶ Cincinnati had its third straight 10-win season in 2009. Before 2007, Cincinnati had exactly one 10-win season (1951).
- ▶ UC's 33 wins over the past three seasons trail only Boise State (36), Florida (35), and Texas (35) among NCAA FBS teams.
- ▶ UC was No. 3 in the final BCS rankings, No. 8 in the *Associated Press* poll, and No. 9 in the *USA Today* Coaches Poll.
- ▶ Tony Pike was one of 10 finalists for the Manning Award, sponsored by the Allstate Sugar Bowl. He threw for 2,520 yards and 29 TDs, despite missing four games due to injury.
- ▶ Mardy Gilyard, the BIG EAST Conference Special Teams Player of the Year, was named to the AFCA all-America squad at wide receiver.
- ▶ Gilyard had 87 catches for 1,191 yards and 11 touchdowns.
- ▶ His 25 career TDs place him atop the UC record book.
- ▶ Gilyard closed out his career as the BIG EAST career leader in kickoff return yards (2,457) and all-purpose yards (5,697).
- ▶ UC has turned the ball over 10 times in 2009, the fewest turnovers in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision.
- ▶ UC was the last NCAA FBS team to lose a fumble in 2009.
- ▶ LB Andre Revels had a team-high 109 tackles.
- ▶ DE Alex Daniels had 8.5 sacks to lead the team.
- ▶ RB Isaiah Peard leads the BIG EAST and ranks in the Top-10 nationally with a 6.7 yards per carry average.
- ▶ UC ranked atop the final Bowl Championship Series Top-10 in academic rankings, with a 75 percent NCAA graduation rate and a 71 percent federal government rate, the only team in the BCS top-10 to surpass the 70-percent plateau on both lists.

Since arriving in Cincinnati, Jones has made an immediate impact, building a staff of championship-level coaches and teachers, as well as an atmosphere of competition and family, while also overseeing an academic quarter of great success. The team achieved a GPA of 2.7 during the Winter 2010 quarter, its best ever. Thirty-two student-athletes achieved a GPA at 3.0 or above.

At Central Michigan, Jones continued that program's renaissance, going 27-13 over the past three seasons, including a 22-3 mark in league games, winning a pair of MAC Championships (2007, 2009), playing in three-straight bowl games, and earning a postseason ranking of No. 23 in 2009. He is the only coach in CMU history to lead the team to consecutive bowl games and is the first in MAC history to do it in his first three seasons as head coach.

"Butch Jones has proven himself to be a championship-caliber football coach," Director of Athletics Mike Thomas said. "I am impressed by the qualities he brings to the table, his knowledge of the BIG EAST Conference, and his desire to succeed. We're proud to welcome him to the UC family."

Jones coached 32 all-MAC performers, including two-time MAC Offensive Player of the Year and 2009 MAC Vern Smith Leadership Award winner Dan LeFevour, and two-time MAC Special Teams Player of the Year Antonio Brown. Under his tutelage, 13 student-athletes earned Academic all-MAC accolades. LeFevour had an NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision Record 148 career touchdowns (101 passing, 46 rushing and one receiving). His 101 career passing TDs, are the most in MAC history.

CMU was 22-3 against MAC opponents during Jones' tenure, including victories in the 2007 and 2009 MAC Championship Games. The Chippewas were 12-1 in MAC road games under Jones and earned two-straight wins over Big Ten teams.

In 2007, Jones became only the ninth first-year head coach to lead his team to a Mid-American Conference championship. The Chippewas' eight victories marked the second-most of any CMU coach in his debut season, and Jones was one of three first-year head coaches nationwide to coach in a bowl game.

The Chippewas clinched the 2007 MAC West Division title with a 34-31 win at Western Michigan, CMU's first win in Kalamazoo since 1993. CMU went on to defeat Miami (OH), 35-10, four weeks later in the MAC Championship Game, a win that secured the Chippewas a spot in the Motor City Bowl.

The 2008 season was highlighted by another win over Western Michigan, 38-28, in front of a record crowd at Kelly/Shorts Stadium and a 37-34 win on the road at Indiana. The victory over the Hoosiers was CMU's first against a Big Ten opponent since 1992. CMU capped the 2008 season with its third consecutive appearance in the Motor City Bowl.

CMU led the MAC in both all-conference and academic all-conference selections in 2007, and the Chippewas' seven All-MAC first team selections in 2008 were the most for the program since 1990. Over the past two years, CMU has collected the league's offensive player of the year (Dan LeFevour, 2007, '09), freshman of the year (Antonio Brown, 2007) and special teams player of the year (Antonio Brown, 2008, '09) honors. LeFevour earned the offensive player of the year accolade after becoming just the second player in NCAA history to pass for 3,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in the same season.

Prior to becoming the Chippewas' head coach, Jones spent a total of 11 seasons as an assistant at the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision level. He served as the offensive coordinator at three different schools, spanning eight seasons, and worked directly with 24 all-conference selections in 15 years as a full-time position coach.

A native of Michigan and a former offensive coordinator at CMU, Jones returned to Mount Pleasant after spending

the 2005 and 2006 seasons as an assistant coach under Rich Rodriguez at West Virginia University. West Virginia, employing a spread offensive attack, ranked second in Division I-A in rushing offense (303.0 ypg), third in scoring offense (38.9 ppg) and fifth in total offense (461.4 ypg) in 2006.

Jones translated that success to CMU. In 2007, the Chippewas were the only team to rank in the top four in the MAC in scoring offense (first, 33.8 ppg), total offense (second, 447.9 ypg), rushing offense (third, 182.8 ypg) and passing offense (fourth, 265.1 ypg). In 2008, CMU ranked second in the conference in both passing (289.8 ypg) and total offense (423.5), and the passing attack ranked 12th nationally.

CMU scored 30 or more points in 16 games during Jones' tenure; the Chippewas posted at least 40 points seven times, including three 50-point efforts. The 2007 and 2008 campaigns are the program's highest scoring seasons since CMU joined the MAC in 1975.

In two seasons at West Virginia, Jones was part of teams that recorded back-to-back 11-win campaigns, a pair of top-10 national rankings and victories in the 2006 Sugar Bowl and 2007 Gator Bowl.

Jones spent a total of 11 seasons as an assistant at the Division I-A level. He served as the offensive coordinator at three different schools, spanning eight seasons, and worked directly with 24 all-conference selections in 15 years as a full-time position coach.

Jones filled a variety of roles during his first stint at CMU (1998-2004), including serving as offensive coordinator from 2001-03. The Chippewas averaged just 271.5 yards per game and 12.5 points per game in 2000; in 2001, Jones' first season directing the offense, those averages jumped to 379.5 yards per game and 22.8 points per game, respectively. He coached three different running backs who earned first or second team all-MAC honors.

A 1990 graduate of Ferris State University where he was a two-year letterman on the football team, Jones broke into the coaching ranks while still an undergraduate by serving as intern for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1987-89. He spent the 1990-92 seasons as a graduate assistant at Rutgers University before taking over as the offensive coordinator at Wilkes University in 1993. He directed an offense at Wilkes that led the Middle Atlantic Conference in scoring offense and total offense in 1993, a season in which it won a conference title and qualified for the NCAA Division III Playoffs.

Jones returned to his alma mater in 1995 as a running backs coach, only to be promoted to offensive coordinator for the 1996 season. The Bulldogs, while leading the Midwestern Intercollegiate Football Conference in total offense and scoring offense, won a second consecutive MIFC championship in 1996 and advanced to the NCAA Division II Quarterfinals.

Jones, 41, and his wife Barb are the parents of three children: Alex, Adam, and Andrew.

**KERRY COOMBS**

Fourth Season » Dayton '83

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR/DEFENSIVE BACKS

Kerry Coombs, who directed Colerain High School in suburban Cincinnati to a Division I state championship (2004) and four other semifinal appearances, enters his fourth season at UC coaching the defensive backs.

Following the close of UC's BIG EAST Championship winning season in 2008, he was promoted to Associate Head Coach. He takes on the additional role of special teams coordinator entering 2010.

In 2008, Coombs mentored three NFL Draft picks, Mike Mickens (Dallas Cowboys), DeAngelo Smith (Dallas Cowboys), and Brandon Underwood (Green Bay Packers). Mickens was a second-team Walter Camp all-America honoree and UC's all-time leader in interceptions and interception return yardage, while Underwood was a first-team all-BIG EAST performer at safety in his only season at UC. Smith was the national leader in interceptions in 2007 with eight, and ranks second in UC history behind Mickens. The defense finished 31st in the nation in total defense (321.9 ypg) in 2008.

Coombs' first campaign as a member of the UC staff yielded instant results. The 2007 defense, led by his ball-hawking secondary, led the NCAA with 26 interceptions and 42 takeaways. That season, Coombs coached all-BIG EAST safety Haruki Nakamura, who was selected in the sixth round of the 2008 NFL draft.

One of the most celebrated prep coaches in Ohio, Coombs compiled a 161-34 (.826) record in 16 seasons at Colerain. His 2004 team posted a 15-0 record and won the state's Division I title with a 50-10 win in the championship game. Over his last seven seasons at Colerain, the Cardinals won seven league titles while compiling an 86-8 (.915) record.

Coombs' 2006 team went 13-1 and was ranked No. 1 in the final Ohio Associated Press poll and No. 18 in the USA Today national rankings.


His success at Colerain emphasized a defense he personally coached. In 2006, the Cardinals posted six shutouts and yielded just over a touchdown per game.

Coombs has mentored Ohio Division I Defensive Player of the Year award winners in 2004 and 2006, including former UC defensive tackle Terrill Byrd, who was also the national high school Defensive Player of the Year in 2004.

Coombs guided Colerain to 10 playoff appearances and seven undefeated regular-season records. The Cardinals won the Greater Miami Conference title and advanced to the regional finals of the state playoffs in each of his final seven seasons.

A member of the University of Dayton's 1980 NCAA Division III National Championship team, Coombs completed his bachelor's degree at Dayton in 1983 and later earned his master's in education at Wright State.

Coombs and his wife Holly have three children, Brayden, Cortney, and Dylan. Brayden is a coaching assistant with the Cincinnati Bengals and Cortney is a senior soccer player at Ball State University.

**STEVE STRIPLING**

First Season » Colorado '76

ASSISTANT HEAD COACH/DEFENSIVE LINE

Steve Stripling was named the assistant head coach and defensive line coach at Cincinnati in Jan. 2010. He served as Central Michigan's interim head coach for the 2010 GMAC Bowl, leading the Chippewas to a 44-41 double overtime win over Troy.

For Stripling, who has 30 years of coaching experience, the GMAC Bowl was the 21st bowl game he has participated in as either a player or coach.

Stripling joined the CMU coaching staff in 2009 as the associate head coach-defense and coached the defensive ends. Stripling worked directly with a pair of All-Mid-American Conference defensive ends during his first season in Mount Pleasant. Frank Zombo was an All-MAC first team selection for the second straight season, while Larry Knight was an All-MAC third team honoree.

Prior to CMU, Stripling coached the defensive line at Michigan from 2005-07. He worked directly with defensive end LaMarr Woodley, a 2006 All-American who won the Lombardi Award and Ted Hendricks Trophy. Woodley also was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Lineman of the Year in 2006. Tackle Alan Branch also earned All-Big Ten first team and All-America second team accolades under Stripling.

The 2006 Wolverines led the nation in rush defense, surrendering just 43.3 yards per game on the ground. Stripling was a part of Michigan teams that played in the Alamo Bowl, Rose Bowl and Capital One Bowl.

Stripling's other Big Ten experience includes two seasons at Michigan State University (2003-04), four seasons at the University of Minnesota (1997-2000) and 13 seasons at Indiana University (1984-96). He was the defensive coordinator at Indiana in 1996.

Stripling worked directly with two all-Big Ten selections at Michigan State, two at Minnesota and seven at Indiana. He was part of the 2003 Alamo Bowl at Michigan State, the 1999 Sun Bowl and 2000 MicronPC.com Bowl at Minnesota and six bowl games at Indiana.

Stripling also spent four seasons at Northern Illinois University (1980-83) and two years at the University of Louisville (2001-02). He helped lead NIU to the 1983 Mid-American Conference championship and coached three all-conference selections at Louisville, including 2001 Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year Dewayne White.

Stripling earned a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Colorado. As a player, he was part of Colorado teams that played in three bowl games: the 1971 Bluebonnet Bowl, 1972 Gator Bowl and 1975 Bluebonnet Bowl.

He signed a free-agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons after graduating from Colorado in 1976. He spent the 1977-78 seasons as a graduate assistant at his alma mater before filling the role of recruiting coach at the University of North Carolina in 1979.

Stripling and his wife, Gayle, are the parents of three children: Christy, Cody and Chad.





MIKE BAJAKIAN

First Season » Williams '96

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS

Mike Bajakian joined the Cincinnati staff in January 2010 as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after three years in the same role at Central Michigan University.

Bajakian's CMU offense ranked in the MAC's top-5 in most offensive categories in 2009, including leading the league in scoring offense (33.9 ppg) and passing efficiency (146.96). CMU's scoring offense was ranked 15th nationally in 2009 while its passing efficiency mark was 14th overall.

Over the last three years, CMU scored 30 or more points 24 times, 40 or more points 13 times and 50 or more points five times. The 2007-09 Chippewas have been the three highest scoring teams CMU has fielded since joining the MAC in 1975.

During his time at CMU, Bajakian mentored quarterback Dan Lefevour, one of the most prolific offensive players in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history.

Lefevour, who closed out his career with an NCAA FBS record 150 touchdowns (102 passing, 47 rushing, 1 receiving), led the MAC in passing efficiency, and ranked No. 11 nationally, with a 150.26 rating. He was second in the league in total offense (296.5 ypg) and ranked 10th nationally. His 66.4 career completion percentage ranked him seventh among active NCAA FBS players at the close of the 2009 season.

He tallied 15,853 yards of total offense during his CMU career, trailing only Timmy Chang of Hawai'i (16,910 yards) in the NCAA ledger. He ranks ninth on the NCAA's all-time passing yards list with 12,905. He is the only player in NCAA FBS history to pass for 12,000 yards and rush for 2,500 yards in a career.

More than 30 school records were set or broken during Bajakian's tenure at CMU, and the offensive unit produced five all-MAC selections in 2009, including Lefevour, who earned the MAC Player of the Year honor as well as his second award as MAC Offensive Player of the Year.

Bajakian, who coached the Chippewas' quarterbacks during the 2002 and 2003 seasons, returned to CMU fresh off a trip to Super Bowl XLI with the Chicago Bears.

Bajakian spent the 2004-2006 seasons as the offensive quality control coach for the Bears, during which time he worked with the Bears' wide receivers. He was part of a coaching staff that led the Bears to Super Bowl XLI and back-to-back NFC North Division championships.

A 1996 graduate of Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., Bajakian was an All-New England Small College Athletic Conference and All-Eastern College Athletic Conference selection as a quarterback. He broke into the coaching ranks as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Delbarton School in Morristown, N.J., helping lead the school to consecutive trips to the parochial state finals.

Bajakian spent the 1998 and 1999 seasons at Rutgers University as a graduate assistant coaching the defensive backs. He then spent a brief period at Sacred Heart University in Fairfield, Conn. as quarterbacks coach before moving on to Michigan for the 2000 and 2001 seasons.

The New Jersey native played his prep ball at Bergen Catholic High School in Oradell, N.J.

Bajakian lives in Cincinnati with his wife, Micheline.



TIM BANKS

First Season » Central Michigan '95

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/DEFENSIVE BACKS

Tim Banks was named the co-defensive coordinator at UC following three years in the same role at Central Michigan.

His 2009 CMU defense led the Mid-American Conference in scoring defense (18.9), ranked second in rushing defense (122.8), third in pass efficiency defense (117.4), and fourth in total defense (344.2).

The Chippewas led the Mid-American Conference in rush defense in both 2007 and 2008, and the 2008 defensive unit led the conference in sacks with 35.

Four players earned First Team all-MAC honors during Banks' tenure: linebackers Red Keith and Ike Brown in 2007 and linebacker Nick Bellore and end Frank Zombo in 2008 and 2009.

CMU generated five turnovers in a game three times during the last two seasons, including a seven-turnover effort against Army in 2007. Cornerback Josh Gordy tied a school record with three interceptions, including one he returned for a touchdown, against Army.

Largely due to injury, CMU used 19 different players in its defensive starting lineup in 2007. That number rose to 21 in 2008. Both seasons saw the Chippewas use nine different players in the starting lineup in the secondary alone.

Following the 2007 season, Banks was invited to participate in the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy.

Banks had spent the previous four seasons at the University of Maryland before returning to his alma mater. He coached the Terrapins' secondary in 2006 after spending his first three seasons with the inside linebackers.

Under his guidance, linebacker D'Qwell Jackson was a two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference first team selection (2004-05), ACC Defensive Player of the Year (2005) and a Bednarik Award finalist (2005).

Jackson (Cleveland Browns) is one of three players Banks coached at Maryland who are now in the NFL. The others are linebacker David Holloway (Arizona Cardinals) and cornerback Josh Wilson (Seattle Seahawks).

Prior to Maryland, Banks spent two seasons as an assistant at the University of Memphis (2001-02) and two years at Bowling Green (1999-00). At Memphis, the Tigers ranked ninth in Division I-A in pass defense in 2002—his only season working the cornerbacks.

Banks was a four-year letterman and two-time All-MAC second team selection (1993-94) at CMU. After redshirting as a true freshman during CMU's 1990 championship season, Banks was a co-captain for the Chippewas' 1994 MAC championship team and led the 1993 team in tackles with 105.

Banks graduated from Central Michigan in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in industrial management.

Banks and his wife Robin live in Cincinnati.



**JOHN JANCEK**

First Season » Grand Valley State '91

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/RECRUITING COORDINATOR/LINEBACKERS

John Jancek was named co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at the University of Cincinnati in January 2010 after spending five seasons on the defensive staff at the University of Georgia. He also serves as the Bearcats' recruiting coordinator.

Jancek was at Georgia from 2005-09, coaching linebackers before assuming the role of co-defensive coordinator in 2009. During his time at UGA, the Bulldogs won 48 games, one SEC championship, been to two BCS bowl games, and finished in the nation's top ten three times.

In 2009, Jancek mentored Rennie Curran, who led the SEC with 130 tackles and was a finalist for both the Rotary Lombardy Award and Chuck Bednarik Award. The two-time First-Team all-SEC selection was a Butkas Award finalist in 2008.

In 2008, UGA linebacker Darryl Gamble earned the Bronco Nagurski National Player of the Week honor and received an ESPN Helmet Sticker from the College Gameday Final crew after intercepting a pair of passes for touchdowns against LSU.

The 2007 season saw the Bulldogs rank No. 2 in the postseason Associated Press poll after an 11-2 record and a victory over Hawai'i in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Following the 2006 season, all three of his starting LB's (Tony Taylor, Jarvis Jackson, Danny Verdun Wheeler) signed professional football contracts. Taylor led the nation in interceptions by a linebacker with seven.

Jancek continually reconfigured a 2005 Georgia linebacker unit into a solid group despite being hit by a rash of injuries during the year.

He was at Central Michigan from 2003-04 coaching the defensive line in 2003 before being named defensive coordinator in 2004. Prior to joining the Chippewas, he was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach under former UC head coach Brian Kelly at Grand Valley State University, the 2002 NCAA Division II national champion.

A native of Muskegon, Jancek guided the Lakers into one of the top defensive units in Division II football during his four-year tenure from 1999-2002. GVSU opponents scored only 16.5 points per game in 2002 while posting a 14-0 record. Opponents managed just 279.9 yards per game in total offense and turned the ball over 36 times.

Jancek returned to his alma mater in 1999 after previously working as the defensive coordinator for three years at Hillsdale (1996-98). He also was the defensive tackles coach at Central Florida during the winter/spring of 1996. He also spent three years as defensive coordinator at Wayne State (1992-94). He spent the 1991 season as a graduate assistant at Grand Valley.

A 1991 graduate of Grand Valley and '94 master's degree recipient of Wayne State, Jancek was a three-year letterwinner with the Lakers as a defensive lineman. GVSU compiled a record of 28-7 during his three years and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs twice. He earned All-Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference honors as a senior.

Jancek and his wife, Kelly, have four sons, Zachary, Brock, Jack, and Brady.

**JAHMILE ADDAE**

First Season » West Virginia '05

RUNNING BACKS

Jahmile Addae (JUH-mall uh-DYE) was named UC's running backs coach in May of 2010 after serving the previous five months as the director of player development.

In his former role, Addae worked directly with UC's student-athletes, providing guidance and counsel while ensuring they adhered to the seven core principles of Coach Jones' program, regarding intellectual, social, spiritual, physical, and skill development.

He also managed many of UC's off-the-field responsibilities including overseeing the highly-successful Cats In The Community program.

He came to UC after two seasons as a defensive graduate assistant at the University of Michigan working with the Wolverines' defensive secondary and scout team offense.

Addae was a graduate assistant in the football video department at West Virginia University in 2007. Prior to joining the Mountaineers staff, he taught English at Riverview High School.

He was a four-year starter and two-time captain at West Virginia. He was a finalist for the 2005 Ronnie Lott Trophy and was named to the watch list for the Jim Thorpe Award that same season. A three-time all-BIG EAST performer, Addae received first-team accolades his final two seasons (2004-05) after garnering second team honors as a sophomore (2002).

A native of Tampa, Fla., Addae signed a free agent contract with his hometown Tampa Bay Buccaneers and spent the end of the season with the Indianapolis Colts. He was selected for the Senior Bowl in 2005 and participated in the NFL Combine.

Addae and his wife, Maryann, have a son, Agyeman. His brother Jahleel is a sophomore defensive back at Central Michigan University.

First Season » Case Western Reserve '00

TIGHT ENDS

Cincinnati native Mark Elder enters his first season the Butch Jones' staff at Cincinnati and will coach the tight ends after spending the previous three seasons coaching linebackers at Central Michigan.

Elder, a graduate of Sycamore High School, had at least one of his CMU linebackers earn all-conference accolades in each of his three years in Mount Pleasant. Nick Bellore was an all-conference first team pick in 2008 and 2009, following in the footsteps of former CMU standouts Red Keith and Ike Brown in 2007.

Bellore averaged nearly 10 tackles a game in 2009 (9.4) and ranked fifth in the MAC and 24th nationally. His 148 tackles in 2008, matched Keith's 2007 total and tying for the third-most in a single season in school history. Bellore's average of 11.3 tackles per game led the MAC and ranked fourth nationally in 2008.

Keith and Brown led CMU in tackles with 148 and 106, respectively, in 2007. Keith's 474 career stops rank second in school history and seventh in NCAA Bowl Subdivision history. His 10.6 tackles per game in 2007 ranked 19th nationally.

Bellore, who started all 14 games at middle linebacker as a true freshman in 2007, made a CMU freshman-record 102 tackles and earned Freshman All-America honors.

Elder arrived at CMU by way of Michigan, where he spent the 2005 and 2006 seasons. As a defensive graduate assistant in 2006, Elder worked closely with the UM linebackers, including All-Big Ten selections David Harris and Shawn Crable. The 2006 Michigan defense led the nation in rushing yards allowed (43.4 ypg) and ranked 10th in total defense (268.3 ypg allowed).

Elder has previously served as the defensive coordinator at Wayne State (2004) and Iona (2003), also serving as the linebackers coach at both institutions. He worked with a pair of All-Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference linebackers at Iona and directed a defense that ranked first in the MAAC in total defense and second in scoring and rushing defense.

Elder began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coaching defensive backs at Akron (2000-01) before spending the 2002 season as an assistant linebackers coach at Lehigh. He was part of a co-MAC East Division championship at Akron in 2000 and assisted in coaching first team All-American Dwight Smith.

A 2000 graduate of Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, Ohio, Elder graduated cum laude with a bachelor of arts in economics while earning four varsity letters in football. He was a three-time all-conference selection as a defensive back. Elder also earned a master's degree in education from Akron.

Elder and his wife Lindsey live in Cincinnati.



DON MAHONEY

First Season » Marshall '90

OFFENSIVE LINE

Don Mahoney was named to Butch Jones' Cincinnati staff in Jan. 2010 as the offensive line coach after serving three years in the same role at Central Michigan University.

The CMU offense was third in the Mid-American Conference in 2009, averaging just under 170 rushing yards per game (167.6). The Chippewas were second in the league in total offense (423.1), and led the MAC in scoring offense (33.9). CMU allowed an average of 1.21 sacks per game, a mark that ranked second in the MAC in 21st in the NCAA FBS. Redshirt freshman left tackle Jake Olson earned freshman all-America honorable mention accolades from CollegeFootballNews.com in 2009.

Mahoney coached a pair of all-Mid-American Conference performers in each of his three seasons in Mount Pleasant. Allen Ollenburger was a First-Team all-MAC selection in 2009 while center Colin Miller earned second team honors. Andrew Hartline (first team) and Greg Wojt (third team) were all-conference selections in 2008, while Hartline (second team) and Eric Tunney (third team) were recognized in 2007.

Hartline and Wojt are both playing professionally. Hartline signed with Green Bay Packers as an undrafted free agent in 2009, while Wojt is with the Edmonton Eskimos after being selected by the club in the 2008 Canadian Football League Draft.

As a unit, the CMU offensive line allowed just 1.57 sacks per game in 2007, the third fewest in the MAC. CMU tied for first in the MAC with an average of just one sack allowed in seven conference games. The Chippewas posted a stretch of four straight games without a sack allowed midway through the season and allowed one sack or fewer in five of the final six regular season games.

Mahoney has had at least one of his linemen earn academic all-district honors seven times in the last nine years. Hartline was an Academic All-MAC honoree in both 2007 and 2008.

Mahoney spent the 1999-2006 seasons coaching the offensive line at Tulane University after six previous seasons as an assistant at CMU. Mahoney served two years as a graduate assistant and four years as a fulltime assistant, working with tight ends and the offensive line, from 1993-98 at CMU.

At Tulane, Mahoney mentored offensive lines that led the way for the top rusher and all-purpose yardage gainer, the top passer, and the top scorer in school history. The 2006 line featured a trio of All-Conference USA honorable mention selections as well as a Conference USA All-Freshman team honoree. He was also part of a coaching staff that guided the Green Wave to a victory in the 2002 Hawaii Bowl.

Mahoney was an all-conference selection and three-year starter at guard for Marshall University, serving as team captain as a senior in 1990. He was a student assistant at Marshall when the Thundering Herd claimed the 1992 Division I-AA national championship and a graduate assistant at CMU in 1994 when the Chippewas won the MAC title and played in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Mahoney earned his bachelor's degree from West Virginia State in 1993. Mahoney and his wife, Carissa, have three children: Jacob, Tulia, and Domenic.



**T.J. WEIST**

First Season » Alabama '88

WIDE RECEIVERS

T.J. Weist (pronounced WEEST), is in his first year at the University of Cincinnati coaching the wide receivers.

The 22-year coaching veteran joins the Bearcats after eight years at Western Kentucky mentoring the receivers. He also served as the team's assistant head coach (2007-09), and offensive coordinator (2003-06).

During his time with the Hilltoppers, Weist was instrumental in the development of wideouts Jake Gaebler and Curtis Hamilton. Gaebler set the school record for receptions (168) and ranks among WKU's Top-5 pass catchers all-time in yardage (1,924).

Hamilton concluded his four-year career in 2007 by setting the school's all-time records for both catches and receiving yards (2,324), while his 66 receptions as a senior matched the WKU season mark. He also finished third in the season record books with 873 yards.

Weist was WKU's offensive coordinator from 2003-06, calling plays for one of the most prolific units in school history. Not only did four-year starters Justin Haddix and Lerron Moore etch their names in the WKU record book in numerous categories, Hamilton became the first Topper wide out to be selected to an All-America team since 1996 following the 2006 campaign.

WKU ranked 23rd in the country in total offense, also finishing 17th in pass efficiency rating, while posting more than 4,000 total yards for the fifth consecutive season. Weist's passing attack averaged better than 200 yards per outing for the first time since 1986, as the 2,248 yards racked up by the unit through the air were the fifth most in WKU history.

Weist came to WKU from Indiana, where he served as wide receivers coach from 1997-01. While at IU, he also held special teams responsibilities with the return units and was the recruiting coordinator his first two years.

Weist was also the receivers coach at Tulsa (1996), Southern Illinois (1994-95), Michigan (1990-93) and Alabama (1988-89).

The Wolverines reached four postseason bowl games during his tenure, including two Rose Bowl appearances, while the Crimson Tide appeared in a pair of postseason contests while he was on the coaching staff including the 1990 Sugar Bowl.

A native of Bay City, Mich., Weist was a wide receiver at Alabama from 1984-87, taking part in three postseason bowl games. He earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1988, then added an exercise physiology master's degree one year later.

Weist and his wife Karen have a son, James.

**DAVE LAWSON**

First Season » W.Va. Institute of Tech. '92

DIRECTOR OF FOOTBALL STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Dave Lawson was named the director of football strength and conditioning at the University of Cincinnati in January 2010.

Prior to coming to Clifton, Lawson spent three years working with head football coach Butch Jones at CMU. Lawson, who worked closely with the football program, oversaw and directed the strength and conditioning efforts for all 16 CMU varsity athletic programs.

Lawson is a certified strength and conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Association and a certified speed and explosion specialist by the National Association of Speed and Explosion.

He has coached seven Strength and Conditioning All-Americans, eight football All-Americans and more than 80 football players either drafted or signed as free agents by the National Football League.

In 2009, Lawson was recognized as a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach, the highest honor presented in the field, by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches association (CSCCa). Two CMU student-athletes—football player Brian Brunner and softball player Ali Pettit—earned Strength and Conditioning All-America honors under Lawson's tutelage in 2009.

Lawson came to CMU from Eastern Michigan University, where he spent five years as head strength and conditioning coach. He developed and implemented strength and conditioning programs for all 21 of Eastern Michigan's varsity programs, as well as designing speed, agility and flexibility regimens for EMU's student-athletes.

Lawson spent seven years at West Virginia University prior to his time at EMU. He started at WVU as a graduate assistant in January 1994 before being named assistant strength and conditioning coordinator in May 1995. For six years, he worked with all 22 varsity sports with concentration on football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, men's and women's swimming and diving and women's crew.

At WVU, Lawson worked with five football teams that played in postseason bowl games. He also worked with men's basketball teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament and National Invitational Tournament.

Lawson began his coaching career while an undergraduate at West Virginia Institute of Technology. He spent two years as a student assistant on both the strength and conditioning staff and football coaching staff. Upon graduation, he was named the head strength and conditioning coach at his alma mater. He also served as an assistant on the football staff, coaching defensive linemen and special teams in 1992 and 1993.

Lawson earned a bachelor of arts degree in physical education from West Virginia Institute of Technology in 1992 and a master of science degree in physical education from West Virginia University in 1995.

Lawson and his wife, Shannon, are the parents of four children: BrittLeigh, Emma, Maggie, and James.





BOB MANGINE

Ninth Season » Pittsburgh '77

FOOTBALL ATHLETIC TRAINER

Bob Mangine's extensive experience in the field of athletic training makes him well-suited to diagnose and treat injuries as well as advising on their prevention.

As athletic trainer for football, Mangine supervises a program that addresses the health and well-being of the Bearcats on a year-round basis by drawing from over three decades of experience in sports medicine.

Mangine, who assumed the football duties in 2005, has served as Director of Rehabilitative Services at the University of Cincinnati since 2002. He has worked with both amateur and professional athletes since 1976, when he first arrived at UC. In 1982, he assisted in the development of the nationally recognized Cincinnati Sportsmedicine and Orthopaedic Center. After serving approximately 10 years with the organization, he started his own practice which merged with NovaCare Rehabilitation in 1998.

While he was a student at the University of Pittsburgh, Mangine launched his career in athletics training. He served as assistant trainer of the Pittsburgh Condor Basketball Club and as head athletics trainer at the Community College of Allegheny County prior to graduation in 1977.

Mangine served as director of rehabilitation at UC from 1977-80 while earning his master's degree. After two years as an assistant professor of physical therapy at the Medical College of Virginia, he returned to Cincinnati to work in private clinics.

Mangine currently serves as National Director of Clinical Research and Education for NovaCare and is President of MBM Consultants, which provides management for physical therapy and occupational therapy management.

A 25-year award recipient of the National Athletic Trainers Association, he was the head athletic trainer for the aquatic teams at the 1996 Olympics, and the Goodwill Games of 1986, 1990 and 1998. He is a charter member of the Sports Physical Therapy Section Hall of Fame.

Mangine and his wife Marsha have two children, A.J. and Angela.



JOHN WIDECAN

21st Season » Mercyhurst '88

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC DIRECTOR/FOOTBALL OPERATIONS

John Widecan begins his 20th season with the University of Cincinnati Football Program. As the Assistant Director of Athletics for Football Operations, he is in charge of the day-to-day operations for the team, including duties such as team travel, recruiting operations, events, camps, clinics, team schedule, technology, and other facets of the football program.

Widecan joined the Bearcats in 1989 as a graduate assistant football coach. Milo Austin joined the University of Cincinnati football staff in June 2010 as the Director of Player Development.

Austin joins the Bearcats after spending the spring of 2010 as the running backs coach at Montana State University.

In his role, Austin will work directly with UC's student-athletes, providing guidance and counsel while ensuring they are adhering to the seven core principles of head coach Butch Jones' football program, regarding intellectual, social, spiritual, physical, and skill development.

Oshnock joined the head coach Butch Jones' UC staff after a year working under Jones at Central Michigan. The Chippewas tied a school record in 2009 with 12 victories, winning the MAC Championship and knocking off Troy, 44-41, in double overtime in the GMAC Bowl. CMU, 12-2 overall, was ranked at the end of the season, No. 23 in the Associated Press poll and No. 24 in the USA Today Coaches poll, for the first time in program history.

Oshnock comes to CMU from Byrnes High School in South Carolina, where he was a varsity assistant coach for two seasons. Byrnes won Class 4A-Division I state championships in 2007 and 2008, the sixth time in the last seven years it won a state title. Byrnes also was ranked in the top 15 nationally in the final USA Today Super 25 poll both seasons; it was the preseason No. 1 team in the poll in 2008.

Oshnock was a four-year letterman (2003-06) and three-year starter as a defensive back at Wayne State. He was a co-captain each of his final two seasons. Oshnock earned Academic All-Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors four times and was a CoSIDA/ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District first team selection twice. Three times he was the recipient of WSU's Randy Guzowski Award, which is for true dedication to the university community, demonstrated outstanding team leadership and exemplary school and community citizenship.

Oshnock earned his bachelor's degree from Wayne State in education in 2006.

**JOHN SELLS**

Fourth Season » Ball State '96

VIDEO COORDINATOR

John Sells begins his third year as the video coordinator for the Cincinnati football program. Mike Szerszen (SIR-shin) was named assistant football strength and conditioning coach at Cincinnati in January 2010 after three years as the head strength and conditioning coach at Eastern Michigan University.

Brian White enters his first season at the University of Cincinnati as the graduate assistant coach for the offense, working with the offensive line.

White will assist the offense staff in all facets of the program's day-to-day operation, including practice planning and management, working with the defensive scout team, and assisting with the offensive line.

White comes to UC after serving in similar roles at the University of Notre Dame (2009) and the University of Maryland (2006-08).

In 2009, while at Notre Dame, White assisted on an offensive staff that produced the eighth-rated offense in the nation, averaging 451.75 yards per game, and the winner of 2009 Biletnikoff Award.

During the 2008 season at Maryland, White also filled the role of interim special teams and tight ends coach during the month of December leading up to the 2008 Humanitarian Bowl. White's special teams unit featured a 99-yard kickoff return for touchdown, setting a bowl record, and helped Maryland defeat Nevada 42-35.

Prior to his stint at Maryland, White spent two seasons at Hargrave Military Academy, a college prep academy in Chatham, Va., serving as offensive line coach and recruiting coordinator. During his tenure at Hargrave, White tutored two future NFL Offensive Linemen, Branden Albert (Chiefs) and Jared Gaither (Ravens).

A native of Oakland, N.J., White is a 2004 graduate of Juniata College where he earned a bachelor's degree in history. He received a master's degree in special education from Maryland in 2008.


ANGELO COLOSIMO

DIRECTOR OF ORTHOPAEDIC SERVICES

Angelo J. Colosimo, M.D. is currently an Assistant Professor, Director of the Division of Sports Medicine and Director of Orthopaedic Services for University of Cincinnati Department of Athletics.

Colosimo is in his 20th season as Team Orthopaedic Surgeon for the University of Cincinnati and also serves the same role for the Cincinnati Bengals Football Club. He is the co-director of the University of Cincinnati/Wellington Sports Medicine Fellowship.

Dr. Colosimo takes an active role in the Greater Cincinnati community by supporting and providing medical coverage for several area high schools.

PISCATAWAY, N.J. (AP) - Tony Pike threw for a career-high 362 yards and three touchdowns, and Cincinnati used its high-speed, no-huddle offense to hurry past Rutgers 47-15 on Monday.

The defending Big East champion Bearcats got a jump on the conference race by improving to 4-0 against Rutgers since joining the league.

Looking to christen its newly expanded stadium and extend a seven-game winning streak, the Scarlet Knights couldn't keep up with Pike, Mardy Gilyard and the Bearcats. Instead, it looked like the bad ol' days at Rutgers.

Coach Brian Kelly began his third season with the Bearcats as a rising star in the business.

With the luxury of a returning starter at quarterback for the first time at UC, Kelly unleashed his fast-paced, Oklahoma-style offense.

Pike completed 27 of 34 passes, Gilyard caught eight passes for 89 yards and a score and Isaiah Pead scored two touchdowns.

With Pike directing traffic at the line of scrimmage, the Bearcats burned down the field on the opening drive of the game, covering 81 yards in 2:29 without an incomplete pass. Pead capped the drive with a 2-yard TD run.

Rutgers' response to UC's speed was a methodical, 20-play, 78-yard touchdown drive, that took more than 10 minutes and was capped by a 5-yard run by Joe Martinek.

Pike went 20 of 25 in the first half for 286 yards with touchdown passes of 5 yards to Gilyard and 41 yards to Pead as the Bearcats raced to a 31-7 halftime lead.

Cincinnati even gave Rutgers a dose of the Bearcat Formation--with redshirt freshman tight end Travis Kelce, a former quarterback, taking two snaps and bullying 16 yards to finish off the first of three consecutive second-quarter touchdown drives. They were the first two touches of Kelce's career. He added a 2-yard TD run in the third quarter.

CINCINNATI (AP) - Mardy Gilyard scored four touchdowns as part of the third-best scoring performance in Cincinnati's history, reaching the end zone on an electrifying punt return, a run and two catches during the 23rd-ranked Bearcats' 70-3 victory over Southeast Missouri State.

A quick-strike offense scored every which way during a 49-point first half, the biggest in coach Brian Kelly's three seasons at Cincinnati (2-0). Gilyard was the catalyst, putting together one of the top individual performances in school history.

Gilyard, the Big East's top returner last season, took back the game's first punt 53 yards for a score. It was the Bearcats' first punt return for a touchdown in 12 years. He also had his first career rushing touchdown against the Redhawks (1-1), out of the Bearcat formation, and caught two touchdown passes from different quarterbacks.

The senior became the first Bowl Subdivision player to score on a punt return, run and catch in the same game since UCLA's Maurice Jones-Drew did it on Oct. 8, 2005 against California, according to STATS, LLC.

The 70 points were the third-most in Cincinnati history and the most since a 115-0 win over Kentucky Wesleyan 1921.

Tony Pike threw three touchdown passes and ran 1 yard for another during the first half. He headed to the bench for the final drive of the half, which ended when Gilyard took a short pass from Zach Collaros and dashed 37 yards down the middle of the field for a touchdown.

Redshirt freshman Darrin Williams returned the second-half kickoff 100 yards. Cincinnati used five quarterbacks in all.

Pike was 17 of 23 for 229 yards in less than a full half.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) - Tony Pike threw for 332 yards and hit Mardy Gilyard with an 18-yard scoring pass in the fourth quarter as No. 17 Cincinnati stopped a second-half Oregon State comeback bid for a 28-18 victory on Saturday.

The Bearcats (3-0) snapped Oregon State's streak of 26 straight nonconference victories at Reser Stadium, dating back to a 67-28 win over Northern Illinois on Nov. 16, 1996.

Pike completed 31 of 49 passes and two touchdowns and Gilyard had nine catches for 65 yards. D.J. Woods had a career-high seven catches for 117 yards and his first career score.

Sean Canfield completed 29 of 45 passes for 240 yards and an interception for the Beavers (2-1). Jacquizz Rodgers' 9-yard scoring run to open the second half was Oregon State's lone touchdown.

Cincinnati built up a 21-8 halftime lead but didn't score again until Gilyard's TD catch.

Oregon State's Rodgers appeared bothered by a sore ankle that lingered from last weekend's 23-21 victory over UNLV last weekend. Quizz and big brother James Rodgers, a flanker, had scored six of Oregon State's seven touchdowns through two games this season, and accounted for 597 yards in total offense.

While propelled by its offense, Cincinnati's defense passed its first major test.

The Bearcats went ahead 7-6 on Pike's 7-yard run, but Oregon State responded with a safety and regained the lead.

Cincinnati went ahead 21-8 before the half on Isaiah Pead's 1-yard scoring run and Pike's 45-yard touchdown pass to DJ Woods.

Rodgers' scoring run opened the second half and Kahut's 23-yard field goal to open the fourth quarter narrowed it further for Oregon State.

CINCINNATI (AP) - Tony Pike was on the field just long enough to save No. 14 Cincinnati.

Pike threw three touchdown passes in a quick-strike offense that was hardly on the field Saturday, and the Bearcats held on for a 28-20 victory over a Fresno State team that ran all over them for most of the game. One big gamble made the Bulldogs (1-3) come up empty.

Facing fourth-and-2 at the Cincinnati 6-yard line to open the fourth quarter, Fresno State chose to throw. Ryan Colburn's pass was picked off by Craig Carey, and Pike put the Bearcats (4-0) in control with a 23-yard touchdown pass to Mardy Gilyard six plays later.

Gilyard also caught an 11-yard touchdown pass in another career day. The senior receiver and returner had nine catches for a career-best 177 yards, giving him eight TDs in four games.

The Bulldogs' strategy was to keep one of the nation's top offenses off the field. It nearly succeeded. Cincinnati came in averaging 48 points per game, fourth-best nationally, but was on the field for only 16:18. With Ryan Mathews grinding out the yards, the Bulldogs held the ball for 43:42. That fourth-down play made it not quite good enough.

Mathews carried a career-high 38 times for 145 yards, topping the 100-yard mark for the fourth straight game.

Cincinnati's offense had the ball for only one minute in the third quarter - a three-and-out drive that put the whole burden on the defense. Linebacker Craig Carey's first career interception on Fresno State's pivotal fourth-down pass helped the Bearcats improve to 25-0 under coach Brian Kelly when they open the fourth quarter with a lead.

The Bearcats' no-huddle offense needed only 2:12, 1:43, 2:53 and 1:45 to zip down the field for its touchdowns, giving the defense little rest.

Colburn's fourth-down pass from the Cincinnati 37 was broken up by safety Aaron Webster with 39 seconds left, clinching it.

OXFORD, Ohio (AP) - With its state-of-the-art passing attack stymied, No. 10 Cincinnati showed it can win the old-fashioned way, too.

Jacob Ramsey ran for 103 yards and three touchdowns in Cincinnati's pass-oriented offense Saturday, and the Bearcats broke open a close game in the fourth quarter for a 37-13 victory over Miami (Ohio) that showed a little grit to go with the glitz.

The oldest rivalry west of the Allegheny Mountains has been a mismatch since Kelly showed up at Cincinnati and turned the Bearcats (5-0) into Big East champs. They won their fourth straight over Miami (0-5), retaining the Victory Bell in blustery conditions in front of Yager Stadium's biggest crowd in six years.

They did it in an uncharacteristic way.

Tony Pike had a so-so game, going 23 of 42 for 270 yards with two touchdowns and an interception in the wind. The senior came in with 70.5 percent completion percentage, but repeatedly forced throws into a defense that double-teamed his top receivers and fell back to take away the long pass.

The Bearcats put the game in Ramsey's hands. He became the first Bearcat to run for 100 yards since the opening game of the 2007 season, and the 15th in school history to score three touchdowns in a game. His 2-yard run with 11:35 remaining gave the Bearcats a 30-13 lead.

The first top 10 team to play at Yager Stadium made the game-turning play. Dysert lost his footing as he threw into the crowded end zone, allowing JK Schaffer to intercept the errant throw.

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Even with starting quarterback Tony Pike on the sideline, Cincinnati's quick-strike offense kept rolling.

The eighth-ranked Bearcats got two touchdown passes from Pike before he left in the third quarter with a left (non-throwing) arm injury, then backup Zach Collaros ran 75 yards for a score in a 34-17 victory over No. 21 South Florida on Thursday night.

Collaros squirted through an opening in the middle of the defense for the long touchdown three plays after replacing Pike. The senior was injured after being hit as he released an incomplete pass on Cincinnati's first possession of the second half.

Pike threw scoring passes of 3 and 8 yards to Armon Binns in the second quarter, helping the Bearcats (6-0, 2-0 Big East) to a 17-10 halftime lead over USF (5-1, 1-1).

The Bulls led early on B.J. Daniels' 28-yard touchdown pass to Jessie Hester, and closed within 24-17 late in the third quarter when safety Nate Allen intercepted an ill-advised pass by Collaros to set up a 1-yard TD run by Daniels.

But Collaros, one of two freshmen quarterbacks who bailed Cincinnati out after two starters - Dustin Grutza and Pike - were injured early last season, was not rattled by the mistake. He came right back to lead a six-play, 70-yard scoring drive that restored the 14-point lead.

Collaros finished with 132 yards rushing on 10 carries. Pike, who threw a TD pass for the 16th consecutive game, was 12 of 25 for 140 yards without an interception.

Binns had one career touchdown reception before Pike's first TD pass gave Cincinnati a 10-7 lead less than a minute into the second quarter. The junior from Pasadena, Calif., stretched out in the back of the end zone to make the diving 8-yard catch that put the Bearcats up 17-7.

CINCINNATI (AP) - Standing on the sideline in a sweat suit and baseball cap, injured quarterback Tony Pike watched his backup do a nearly perfect job.

Sophomore Zach Collaros threw only two incompletions while passing for 253 yards and three touchdowns Saturday, steadying fifth-ranked Cincinnati to a 41-10 victory over Louisville in the Bearcats' first game without their marquee quarterback.

The Bearcats (7-0, 3-0 Big East) are off to their best start since 1954 despite losing Pike, a senior whose strong arm is the perfect fit for their no-huddle, spread offense. He didn't suit up four days after having surgery on his non-throwing forearm, watching from the sideline with his left arm tucked inside his jacket.

His understudy proved to be a quick study against lowly Louisville (2-5, 0-3).

In his first collegiate start, Collaros went 15 of 17, repeatedly finding receivers running open through one of the conference's worst defenses. His 31-yard pass to Mardy Gilyard made it 31-10 midway through the third quarter and left the senior receiver tied for the school record with 22 career touchdown catches.

Isaiah Pead added a pair of touchdown runs, including a 67-yarder in the third quarter.

Cincinnati coach Brian Kelly is adept at changing quarterbacks because of injuries. He used five of them last season—Pike broke his left forearm, had a plate and six screws inserted, and returned after missing only two games.

The game drew 35,099 fans, the largest crowd in Nippert Stadium's history—one more than the previous mark.

Collaros completed 10 consecutive throws, showing that the nation's fourth-highest-scoring team wasn't going to fall apart without Pike. The Bearcats didn't punt until there were seven minutes left in the game.

SYRACUSE, N.Y. (AP) - Zach Collaros threw four touchdown passes, three off broken plays, the Cincinnati defense forced two critical turnovers and the No. 5 Bearcats remained perfect with a 28-7 victory over Syracuse on Saturday.

Collaros was 22 of 28 for 295 yards and no turnovers. A threat to run, he managed 22 yards on nine carries, preferring to use his strong right arm to inflict the damage.

Collaros hit Armon Binns on scoring passes of 81 and 13 yards off scrambles, Kazeem Alli for 16 yards off a botched field goal, and Adrien Robinson for 4 yards as Cincinnati (8-0, 4-0 Big East) won its 14th straight regular-season game to remain in contention for the BCS national championship.

Cincinnati is one win off the best start in school history - the 1951 team won nine straight to begin the season. Its mistake-free offense - the Bearcats did not have a turnover and remain the only team in the nation not to lose a fumble this season - and opportunistic defense made the difference.

The turnovers cost the Orange dearly. Drew Frey intercepted Greg Paulus's pass in the back of the end zone late in the second quarter and defensive tackle Derek Wolfe recovered a fumble on a first-and-goal carry from the Cincinnati 7 by Delone Carter late in the third.

Collaros had three TD passes and only two incompletions in his first college start a week ago, a 41-10 victory over Louisville, and was able to scramble away from trouble and find wide open receivers most of the afternoon against the Orange.

Even when his receivers were covered, it didn't matter. Facing a second-and-9 and leading 14-7 early in the third quarter, Collaros rolled right and, just when he seemed out of time, hit Binns in the corner of the end zone despite solid coverage by Da'Mon Merckerson.

CINCINNATI (AP) - Sophomore Zach Collaros threw for 480 yards - the second-best passing performance in Cincinnati's history - and showed beyond-his-years composure on the clinching drive of a wild 47-45 victory over Connecticut on Saturday that let the Bearcats match the best start in their history.

Cincinnati (9-0, 5-0 Big East) is off to its best start since 1951, when it won the Mid-American Conference title. The stakes are much higher this time - the Bearcats are keeping themselves in the conversation about national title contenders. The win over Connecticut (4-5, 1-4) provided more talking points.

The sophomore has taken big steps in each of his three fill-in starts. In the first three quarters alone on Saturday, he threw for 447 yards, topping everyone except Greg Cook's 554-yard passing game in the school record book.

His most important work came after Cincinnati let most of a 20-point lead slip away, forcing the Bearcats to grind it out down the stretch. Collaros went 4 for 4 for 33 yards on the final drive, completed by Isaiah Pead's 14-yard touchdown run on a fourth-and-1 play with 1:52 left that made it 47-38.

Cincinnati finished with a school-record 711 yards of offense. Collaros had a hand in three touchdowns - he threw for one and ran for two more. His 555 yards passing and running set a school record.

CINCINNATI (AP) - Far from perfect, No. 5 Cincinnati was good enough to stay unbeaten.

Tony Pike threw two touchdown passes in a cameo appearance Friday night, and the Bearcats overcame a self-destructive first half to beat West Virginia 24-21 for the best start in school history.

Cincinnati (10-0, 6-0 Big East) struggled offensively because of uncharacteristic mistakes -- a fumble, a dropped touchdown pass, a missed field goal, and an interception -- all in the first half.

Isaiah Pead ran for a career-high 175 yards, and sophomore Zach Collaros threw for 205 yards in his fourth start for Pike, who is recovering from an injury to his non-throwing arm.

West Virginia (7-3, 3-2) took advantage of the mistakes to keep it close.

The Mountaineers wasted a chance with 5:23 left, going for it on fourth-and-8 from the Cincinnati 24-yard line. Jarrett Brown's pass into the end zone while under pressure fell incomplete.

Pead cut across the field on a 43-yard run on the next play that put Cincinnati in position to take control. Jake Rogers' 38-yard field goal made it 24-14 with 2:08 left. Brown's touchdown pass against a soft defense cut it to 24-21 with 39 seconds left and West Virginia out of timeouts.

Cincinnati's Armon Binns recovered the onside kick to finish it off.

Cincinnati had been the only team in the Bowl Subdivision that hadn't lost a fumble this season. The streak ended when tight end Adrien Robinson coughed it up at midfield after a catch, setting up West Virginia's first score.

PITTSBURGH (AP) - No. 5 Cincinnati trailed Pittsburgh by 21 points late in the first half, a perfect season and BCS bowl berth in peril.

Tony Pike's 29-yard touchdown pass to Armon Binns with 33 seconds left finished the comeback from a three-touchdown deficit, and the Bearcats stunned No. 14 Pittsburgh 45-44 on to secure their second straight Big East title.

The first de facto Big East championship game since the conference began playing football in 1991 was a high-scoring classic. Freshman Dion Lewis' three touchdowns and 194 yards rushing on 47 carries in a Tony Dorsett-like performance carried Pitt (9-3, 5-2) to leads of 31-10, 38-24 and 44-38, only to have the Mardy Gilyard-led Bearcats (12-0, 7-0) rally each time.

Gilyard gave the Bearcats a much-needed jolt with a 99-yard kickoff return only 70 seconds before halftime - immediately after coach Brian Kelly and a half-dozen teammates pleaded for a game-changing play - and he made it 31-24 in the third quarter with a 68-yard scoring catch.

Gilyard's 49-yard kickoff return also led to Pike's 8-yard scoring pass to D.J. Woods that cut Pitt's lead to 38-30 early in the fourth quarter. Gilyard has four kickoff return touchdowns in his career and three kick return scores this season.
