- UC will play its 124th football season in 2011.
- The Bearcats travel to Tennessee and Miami (OH) in non-conference play. UC will welcome Akron, Austin Peay, and NC State to Nippert Stadium.
- UC last faced Tennessee in 1992 and Austin Peay in 1993. It is the sixth meeting with Akron, second with NC State, and 116th with Miami (OH).
- In league play, UC will play home contests against Connecticut (Nippert), Louisville (PBS), and West Virginia (PBS) while facing road matchups at Pittsburgh, Rutgers, Syracuse, and USF.

Binns and DJ. Woods were top-2 receivers in the BIG EAST in yards per game, overall yardage, touchdown receptions, and 100-yard receiving games.

Took Second-Team All-BIG EAST honors at linebacker ... led the defense with his 111 tackles and 67 solo stops ... recorded his second-straight 100-tackle campaign ... his 9.5 tackles for a loss ranked second on the squad ... had six passes defended and five pass break ups which tied for the team lead ... had four double-digit tackle games, including a career-best 16 stops twice (at NC State, at WVU).

STREAKS, STORYLINES, SIDEBARS ...

- The University of Cincinnati, one of the five oldest football programs in college football, enters its 124th football season with an all-time record of 551-550-51 (.502).
- Head coach Butch Jones enters his second season at the helm of the program and returns his entire coaching staff in 2011, the first time in the past three seasons there has been no staff turnover among the full-time assistant coaches.
- The Bearcats return 18 starters, including all 11 on defense, and 51 letterwinners from the 2010 squad.
- Among the returners are First-Team All-BIG EAST signal caller Zach Collaros and Second-Team All-BIG EAST selections: RB Isiah Pead, LB JK Schaffer, and WR DJ. Woods.
- Collaros needs 662 yards passing, 181 completions, and 14 touchdowns to become only the second QB in UC history to pass for 50 touchdowns, complete 500 passes, and throw for over 5,000 yards.
- Five members of UC's 2011 signing class, LB Dwight Jackson, DB Malcolm Murray, LB Nick Temple, WR Shaq Washington, and QB Stephen Weatherford, enrolled in winter classes and participated in spring football. Murray and Washington

enrolled in January, while the other three joined the team and are in classes for the Spring 2011 Quarter.

- TE Travis Kelce returns to the team after sitting out the 2010 season due to a violation of team rules.

FROM I-71 South (Columbus)

I-71 south to Exit 3 - Taft Road (Taft is one-way going west).

Stay on Taft approximately seven blocks to the intersection of Jefferson Avenue. University Plaza will appear on the right.

Turn right at the University Plaza onto Jefferson Avenue.

At the first light, turn left on Corry Street.

Corry and Calhoun Garages are on the left.

FROM U.S. 50 (Portsmouth and East)

U.S. 50 to Taft Road (Taft is one-way going west).

Stay on Taft to the intersection of Jefferson Avenue.

Turn right at the University Plaza onto Jefferson Avenue.

At the first light, turn left on Corry Street.

Corry and Calhoun Garages are on the left.

FROM I-75 North or South

Take Exit 3 - Hopple Street. At the end of the ramp (stop light) turn left (east).

Cross over interstate and through Central Parkway. Hopple eventually becomes Martin Luther King Drive, the campus will appear on the right.

At the sixth light, turn right onto Jefferson Avenue.

At the second light, Corry Street, turn right.

Corry and Calhoun Garages are on the left.

FROM I-74 (Indianapolis and West)

Take I-74 to I-75 south

Follow directions above from I-75.

Fifth Third Arena at Shoemaker Center is to the right with Nippert Stadium next to it. Armory Fieldhouse is behind the Shoemaker Center. Gettler Stadium is on the left.

GAMEDAY PARKING

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

Requests for official working media credentials should be directed to the UC Sports Communications Office. All credential requests should be received no later than noon, two days prior to the game. For more information, contact UC Sports Communications at 513.556.5191. Season credentials will be available for pickup prior to the first game. No credentials will be mailed after Tuesday preceding the game. Thereafter, credentials may be picked up on gameday at the media will call located on the west side of Fifth Third Arena at the ticket windows.

SCOUTING PASSES

Professional scouts may obtain credentials through UC's Sports Communications Office. Scouts will be issued seating in the press box on a space-available basis.

SIDELINE PASSES

The University of Cincinnati follows NCAA guidelines regarding media representatives on the sidelines. Photographers and videographers are permitted to shoot between the 23-yard lines and the goal lines on both sidelines, or anywhere behind the restraining line in the end zone.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Complete stats, scoring summaries, running play-by-play, quickie stats and post-game notes and quotes are provided by the UC Sports Communications Office. Pre-game food service is available beginning approximately two hours prior to kickoff, while beverages are available throughout the contest. This service is provided as a courtesy to working media. In addition, concession areas are available within the stadium confines. Wireless internet is available in the press box at Nippert Stadium. Members of the UC Sports Communications staff will be available to assist you. There is no access fee.

GOING GREEN

Starting with the 2010 season, the University of Cincinnati will no longer print media guides. Complete information, including a record book/media supplement will be made available on the football page at www.GoBEARCATS.com.

UC WEEKLY MEDIA LUNCHEON

The Bearcats hold a weekly media luncheon each Tuesday in the second floor Bob Goin Team Room of Richard E. Lindner Center. Lunch is served at 11:30 a.m., selected players are available for one-on-one interviews from 11:45-12:15, and head coach Butch Jones takes the podium at 12:15.

PRACTICES

During a typical Saturday game week, media may interview players and coaches immediately following practice on either Tuesday or Wednesday. Practice is generally closed to the public. Anyone hoping to observe practice should contact UC Sports Communications in advance. Failure to do so may result in an individual's removal from the venue. During regular-season practices, unless otherwise noted, still and television photographers will be allowed to shoot stretching, warm ups and the first 20 minutes (four periods). At the conclusion of practice, head coach Butch Jones will address the media on the field. First-year players, including freshmen and transfers, will be made available to the media only after they have made a significant contribution or at the coach's discretion.

WEB VIDEO CONTENT

Per UC's multimedia contract with IMG College, UC coaches, players, and administrators are not permitted to take part in one-on-one interviews or feature stories that will be made available exclusively for internet distribution.

INTERNET POLICIES

Live updating of websites, blogs and social network feeds is not allowed during practices.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

The UC locker room will remain closed following all football games. Media should request players through Doug Mosley or Ryan Koslen for the media room during the fourth quarter. Media will be allowed to enter the field (for home games) late in the fourth quarter but will not be allowed to conduct interviews with UC football players on the field (home or away). Only the originating television and radio networks will be allowed to conduct interviews on the field.

Coach Jones will address the media in Room 3200 of the Campus Recreation & Wellness Center following home games. Players will be brought into the interview area as soon as possible.

Postgame availability on the road will be determined on gameday. Please see football contacts Doug Mosley or Ryan Koslen for details.

BIG EAST TELECONFERENCE

WLW augments the broadcast coverage with pregame and postgame programming. Additionally, head coach Butch Jones is featured on an hour-long call-in show each week from the original Montgomery Inn, allowing Cincinnati fans to meet the coach and ask their questions up close and personal.

Mo Egger is the host, producer, and engineer on UC broadcasts. He is the morning sports anchor on 700 WLW, and hosts afternoons on 1530 Homer. A New Jersey native and a graduate of the University of Dayton, he has been with Clear Channel since 1997 and has worked on UC broadcasts since 2001.

TELEVISION

When it comes to television, the University of Cincinnati has one of the most extensive television packages in the country as its partners cover not only the state of Ohio, but the nation.

Seven BIG EAST Conference members are located in the top 12 media markets (DMAs), and 12 members are located in the top 34, covering over 25 percent of all U.S. markets - by far, the largest coverage of any conference. Since its inception in 1979, the BIG EAST Conference has prided itself as a creative innovator in television and publicity concepts.

The BIG EAST has continued that tradition today by providing student-athletes at its 16 member institutions with unparalleled exposure through new landmark agreements with its two primary television partners: ESPN and CBS Sports. The specifics from each of the league's television agreements are outlined below.

The 2010-11 academic year marks the fifth of a six-year agreement between the BIG EAST Conference and ESPN, Inc. for men's and women's basketball and the third of a six-year term for football. Both founded in 1979, ESPN and the BIG EAST have enjoyed a relationship that has existed for the lives of both entities. The current landmark men's and women's basketball and football contracts have ensured a long-term continuation of that relationship. The number of guaranteed BIG EAST Conference appearances in these sports has been expanded to unprecedented levels under these pacts. Further, they ensure that the BIG EAST will continue to have a solid foothold in national and regional television and new media exposure in the foreseeable future.

In addition, the BIG EAST Network, produced by ESPN Regional Television (ERT) will continue to distribute its Game of the Week package to a nationally syndicated audience, reaching more than 30 million homes.

UC is in a multi-year agreement with FOX Sports Ohio that makes the network the exclusive regional cable home of UC football. Programming includes game telecasts, preseason and post-season specials, and a weekly coaches show titled 'Bearcats Sports Weekly With Butch Jones'.



BROADCAST PARTNERS





NIPPERT STADIUM



Entering its 110th season, Carson Field at Nippert Stadium is the venerable home of the University of Cincinnati football team and provides the Bearcats with one of the best home-field environments in college football.

Nippert Stadium has been home to Bearcats football since 1901, making it the fourth-oldest playing site and fifth-oldest stadium in college football.

The Bearcats have established program attendance standards over the last five seasons. UC drew a total of 30,246 fans in 2007 before setting back-to-back-to-back regular season average records with program-best clips of 31,965, 33,957 and 35,067 in 2008, 2009 and 2010, respectively.

Through numerous renovations, the structure situated in the middle of the Clifton campus has retained its early-century brickwork, wrought iron gates, and trim giving Nippert a comfortable old-time stadium charm and appeal, while remaining a classic showplace for college football. On Nov. 27, 2009 in a game against the University of Illinois, a crowd of 35,106 filled the stadium, setting a single-game attendance record for the fourth time in 2009.

Early-century brickwork combined with wrought iron gates and trim give Nippert a comfortable old-time stadium charm and appeal, while continuing renovations have enabled it to remain a classic showplace for college football.

The last major renovation occurred in 2005 when a new, permanent grandstand added new and improved seating in the North endzone. Underneath the structure are new game locker rooms for both the Bearcats and the visiting team.

The scoreboard features a new video board, nearly twice as large as the previous display, while the playing field is a new installation of FieldTurf, the grass-like artificial turf.

The stadium's founder was Arch Carson, who as captain and principal organizer played a significant role in starting football on the UC campus in 1885. In 1901 as physical director of the university, Carson guided the construction of the field which was later named for him -- the playing surface is still called Carson Field.

In 1916, construction began on a permanent brick-and-concrete stadium structure, which was completed, section-by-section, as funds were raised.

During the season-ending clash with rival Miami (Ohio) in 1923, Jimmy Nippert sustained a spike wound injury and died a month later from blood poisoning. His grandfather, James N. Gamble of Procter and Gamble, provided the funds needed to complete the horseshoe-shaped

structure, and the James Gamble Nippert Memorial Stadium was dedicated on Nov. 8, 1924.

In 1936, the playing field was lowered 12 feet to allow spectator seating to increase to 24,000.

The Reed Shank Pavilion was added in 1954 to bring the capacity to 28,000. In 1991, the capacity was upped to 35,000 through extending the upper deck, now called the Herschede-Shank Pavilion, and a new pressbox was constructed.

Artificial turf was first installed in 1970 and in 2000, the stadium became one of the first in

the U.S. to utilize FieldTurf, a grass-like synthetic surface.

The stadium served as home for the American Football League expansion team, the Cincinnati Bengals, in 1968 and 1969, while their eventual permanent home at Riverfront Stadium was being constructed.

Along with this, the stadium has served as a venue for concerts by Britney Spears, Michael Jackson, NSYNC, Janet Jackson, KT Tunstall, The North Mississippi All-Stars, The Roots, the Cincinnati Opera Company and many more.

On November 2, 2008, President Barack Obama held a campaign rally at Nippert two days before the 2008 Presidential Election to an estimated 27,000 attendees.

The University is currently exploring options for future expansion and renovations to ensure that Nippert Stadium maintains its place as one of the great venues in college football.

PRESEASON NEWS & NOTES

OFFENSE

- ▶ In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ypg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27).

QUARTERBACKS

- ▶ Quarterback Zach Collaros, a unanimous First Team all-BIG EAST selection in 2010, returns for his second year as a full-time starter.
- ▶ He was 225-of-383 for 2,902 yards and 26 touchdowns. He led the BIG EAST in passing yards per game (263.8), total passing yards (2,902), total offense (282.2), and was third in pass efficiency (137.5).
- ▶ He needs 662 yards passing, 181 completions, and 14 touchdowns to become only the second QB in UC history, along with Gino Guidugli (2001-04), to pass for 50 touchdowns, complete 500 passes, and throw for over 5,000 yards.
- ▶ The No. 2 quarterback battle needs to be settled. Leading the charge will be a group that includes junior Brendon Kay, sophomore transfer Jordan Luallen, and sophomore Munchie Legaux.
- ▶ Waiting in the wings are a pair of freshmen signal callers in Patrick Coyne and Stephen Weatherford.

RUNNING BACK

- ▶ UC also returns the top running back in the BIG EAST, Isaiah Pead. He was a Second Team All-BIG EAST Conference honoree in 2010 after rushing for 1,029 yards and six touchdowns on 157 attempts, despite missing almost two full games due to injury.
- ▶ He ranked third in the league in rushing, but led the league for the second-straight year with his 6.6 yards per carry average. That average ranks him in the top-10 of all running backs nationally.
- ▶ Pead will be backed up by George Winn as Darrin Williams continues to recover from injuries.
- ▶ UC added a pair of highly touted freshmen in Akise Teague and Jameel Poteat in its latest signing class.
- ▶ Poteat averaged 5.07 yards per carry, tallying 1,724 rushing yards, scoring 12.8 points per game, while totaling 31 rushing touchdowns in 2010. He was listed by Rivals.com as the No. 15 running back nationally, and helped lead Bishop McDevitt to the PIAA Class AAA Championship Game, and was a finalist for the 2010 Mr. PA Football Award.
- ▶ Teague, tabbed as Ohio's Mr. Football following the 2010 season, was also named the MVP of the 2011 PNC Big 33 Football Classic. He averaged 10.9 yards per carry as a senior, earning 2,492 rushing yards and helped lead Youngstown Ursuline to an Ohio Division V State Championship.

TIGHT ENDS

- ▶ Travis Kelce returns from a year-long suspension to head the group at tight end. Kelce scored a pair of touchdowns out of the wildcat package during the 2009 season.
- ▶ Senior Adrien Robinson has 17 career receptions and two touchdowns to his credit. Sophomore Blake Annen was a key special teams player in 2010 along with Demetrius Richardson. Josh Russ makes the switch over from linebacker and freshman Matt Staubach also enters the fray.

WIDE RECEIVERS

- ▶ Leading the receivers is 2010 Second-Team All-BIG EAST selection D.J. Woods. He caught 57 balls for 898 yards in 2010. He added 10 touchdowns while also serving as UC's primary punt and kick returner. He led the conference in all-purpose yardage and his 10 touchdowns (eight receiving, two rushing) tied for fourth in the BIG EAST.
- ▶ UC, looking to replace the downfield threat of 1,000-yard receiver Armon Binns, now with the Jacksonville Jaguars, will get its first look at Kenbrell Thompkins (transfer), Damon Julian (junior-college transfer) and Dyjuan Lewis (redshirt freshman) along with incoming freshmen Chris Moore (Parade All-American), Alex Chisum and Shaq Washington.

OFFENSIVE LINE

- ▶ Alex Hoffman leads all returning offensive players with 25 career starts on the line. Hoffman played both guard and tackle a year ago. Randy Martinez started the final 11 games of the season at left guard and returns for his second year as a starter.
- ▶ Coming out of spring football, Sean Hooley had locked down the left tackle spot and Evan Davis is slotted to start at center. One of the better training camp position battles will be the continuation of the campaign that pits Austen Bujnoch against Andre Cureton at right guard.
- ▶ Corey Keebler missed the spring with a knee injury but is healthy and up to 286 lbs.

DEFENSE

- ▶ On paper, the defense returns 11 starters from a year ago.
- ▶ Key players returning from injury include: Dominique Battle, Reuben Johnson, Wesley Richardson, Solomon Tentman and Adrian Witty.
- ▶ UC's interceptions (8) and sacks (27) from 2010 were its lowest totals since and 2005 (7 interceptions, 24 sacks).

LINEBACKERS

- ▶ Linebacker J.K. Schaffer was a Second-Team All-BIG EAST selection after averaging 9.2 tackles per game, which ranked second in the league. Schaffer had his second straight 100-tackle season, finishing with 111 stops to lead the Bearcats.
- ▶ The linebackers suffered from a definite lack of depth in 2010 that saw senior Schaffer and junior Maalik Bomar taking the lion's share of the snaps. The starting duo returns 181 tackles and 36 career starts.
- ▶ True freshmen Dwight Jackson and Nick Temple arrived in time for spring football gaining valuable repetitions along with redshirt freshman Solomon Tentman who missed the 2010 season with a knee injury. Joining the corps for camp will be a pair of transfers in Greg Blair (Lackawanna CC) and Ben Pooler (Maryland) along with true freshmen Clemente Casseus, Kevin Hyland and Innocent Macha.

DEFENSIVE LINE

- ▶ Brandon Mills led the squad in 2010 with 12.5 tackles for a loss and 6.0 sacks.
- ▶ Walter Stewart moves full time back to defensive end after playing both the DL and LB spots the past two seasons. He has bulked up to 248 lbs and will team with returning starter Dan Giordano to provide the Bearcats with a better edge presence.
- ▶ Derek Wolfe leads the defensive returners with 25 career

DEFENSIVE BACKS

- ▶ No position group will see more competition entering training camps than the defensive backs.
- ▶ Senior Dominique Battle returns after missing the final eight games of 2010 with a knee injury. Battle has 15 career starts. Camerron Cheatham and Reuben Johnson have made 11 career starts apiece and Deven Drane has one start to his credit.
- ▶ At one safety slot, Wesley Richardson missed most of the spring due to off-season surgery, leaving the reps to newcomer Malcolm Murray. Murray is a junior-college transfer from Mt. SAC. Drew Frey is the veteran of the group with 24 starts under his belt. Pat Lambert and Chris Williams will also battle for reps.

SPECIAL TEAMS

PUNTER

- ▶ Pat O'Donnell is one of the strongest punters in the country. In his first year of competition in 2010, he ranked fourth in the BIG EAST averaging almost 42 yards per punt (41.9). He's also been consistent as our holder.

KICKER

- ▶ UC must replace the record-setting work of four-year kicker Jacob Rogers, who is in camp with the New Orleans Saints. A number of candidates for the job will be in camp, including senior transfer Shane Popham (Wake Forest), junior Danny Milligan also a wide receiver for UC; redshirt freshman Tony Miliano and true freshman A.J. Fleak. The battle will likely carry on throughout training camp and a starter might not be named until Austin Peay game week.

RETURNERS

- ▶ Returner D.J. Woods was one of the most productive players in the league a year ago, leading the BIG EAST in all-purpose yards, averaging 154.9 per game. He ranked in the Top-10 in the conference in receptions per game (3rd/4.8), receiving yards per game (2nd/74.8), punt return average (6th/7.7) and kick return average (7th/22.8).

LONG SNAPPER

- ▶ Long snapper Tom DeTemple brought consistency to the position a year ago, filling a void left by the graduation of Mike Windt. Now in his senior year, DeTemple will mentor true freshman Kirk Willis, who signed with the Bearcats in the winter.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE ...

- ▶ The University of Cincinnati football team achieved an all-time team record with its 2.9 team grade point average in the recently ended 2011 Winter Academic Quarter.
- ▶ The team GPA, reflecting 83 student-athletes enrolled in classes, is an all-time high for the Bearcats football program.
- ▶ Thirty-eight of the 83 players (46 percent) achieved a 3.0 or better for the quarter, while 11 student-athletes ranked between a 3.5 and 4.0.
- ▶ Defensive lineman Eric Lefeld (Coldwater, Ohio/Coldwater) took home top GPA honors with his 3.956.
- ▶ Since Coach Jones' arrival in the winter of 2009, the team GPA has stayed consistently above a 2.7.
- ▶ In 2010, 19 student-athletes were named Academic All-BIG EAST and John Goebel (Milford, Mich./Brother Rice) earned the 2010 American Eagle Outfitters BIG EAST Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year award.
- ▶ UC was awarded the 2011 BIG EAST Academic Excellence Award, recognizing the top team GPA among the league's eight football schools.

SCHAFFER UP FOR AFCA/ALLSTATE GOOD WORKS TEAM ...

- ▶ Linebacker J.K. Schaffer was named one of a record 132 nominees for the 2011 Allstate AFCA Good Works Team®.
- ▶ The award, in its 20th year of existence, recognizes the selfless contributions to volunteerism and community service made by college football student-athletes across the nation. The honor is widely considered the sport's pre-eminent community service award.
- ▶ Schaffer, a Second-Team All-BIG EAST selection a year ago, led the defense with his 111 tackles and 67 solo stops. It was the second-straight 100-tackle campaign for the junior. He also added 9.5 tackles for a loss; five pass break ups, three sacks, two forced fumbles, an interception, and quarterback hurry. He was recently named to the watch lists for the 2011 Rotary Lombardi Award and Bronko Nagurski Trophy.
- ▶ In the classroom, Schaffer is a three-time Academic All-BIG EAST honoree (2009, 2010, 2011), seven-time Top Cat Award Winner for a quarter GPA of 3.5 or above and he was inducted into the UC Athletics Academic Legion of Excellence in the Fall of 2010.
- ▶ Off the field, he is heavily involved with UC's Cats in the Community Program, taking part in Right To Read, UC's Play After Practice program, Recess With The Bearcats, and College Mentors For Kids while also volunteering at the Ronald McDonald House, Walnut Hills Soup Kitchen and at

Cincinnati Children's Hospital.

SOME MINUTIAE ON 2010 ...

- ▶ The University of Cincinnati wrapped its 123rd football season with an all-time record of 551-550-51 (.502).
- ▶ Cincinnati (1885) is one of the five oldest programs in college football along with Rutgers (1869), Michigan (1879), Navy (1880), and Minnesota (1883).
- ▶ UC had seven new starters on defense and four on offense this season. UC has 63 players at sophomore level or below.
- ▶ The Bearcats started eight sophomores on defense and no seniors, making UC the youngest defensive unit among all BCS Conference teams in 2010.
- ▶ UC's 4-8 mark was its worst record since 2005, the same year the Bearcats last missed a bowl game.

CRANKING OUT THE YARDAGE ...

- ▶ UC surpassed 600 yards of total offense twice in 2010, with a season high 661 coming against Rutgers and 609 yards against Miami (OH).
- ▶ Over a six-game span, UC averaged 478.5 yards of total offense, 32.7 points per game, 184.0 yards rushing and 294.5 yards passing along with 16 passing touchdowns and 10 rushing scores.

SHEAKLEY ATHLETICS CENTER DEBUTS ...

- ▶ The Sheakley Athletics Center, formerly known as the Jefferson Avenue Sports Complex, which includes new practice fields for the Bearcats football team, made its long anticipated debut on Sept. 2, 2010.
- ▶ The ground breaking took place on March 16, 2010 for the project with an estimated construction cost of \$15.5 million.
- ▶ The first phase of construction, completed on Sept. 1, 2010, includes a lighted 100-yard field.
- ▶ A lighted 50-yard field was completed in November.
- ▶ The 100-yard field becomes a seasonal indoor practice facility during winter months via an air-supported bubble that was inflated over the field. The bubble maintains an interior ambient temperature between 50-60 degrees.
- ▶ The complex is also helping the University go green. A chilled water thermal storage tank was installed under the shorter 50-yard field to assist with the University's air conditioning systems.
- ▶ The storage tank will help the university realize an ongoing annual energy savings in the range of \$750,000 to \$1 million.
- ▶ The second phase of the construction process, started in July of 2011, includes bleacher seating, a press box, a scoreboard, a video/viewing tower, locker/team rooms, a training/taping room, restrooms, and a plaza to connect the practice facilities with UC's Varsity Village.

FIFTH SEASON OVERALL » SECOND AT CINCINNATI » FERRIS STATE '90

Butch Jones, who was named the head coach at the University of Cincinnati on Dec. 16, 2009, is in his second season at the helm of the Bearcats program.

Since arriving in Cincinnati, Jones has made an immediate impact, building a staff of championship-level coaches and teachers, as well as an atmosphere of competition and family, while also overseeing an academic program of great success.

The team's GPA has stayed consistently at a 2.7 or above since Jones' arrival. Nineteen players were named Academic All-BIG EAST and John Goebel earned the 2010 American Eagle Outfitters BIG EAST Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year award.

UC was honored with the 2010-11 BIG EAST Team Academic Excellence Award. The football team achieved a 2.68 GPA for the 2010-11 year, including an all-time team record of a 2.9 team GPA for the 2011 Winter Academic Quarter.

Much of the academic success can be credited to the start of the Bearcat Olympics program. The Bearcat Olympics program was started in 2009 by Coach Jones. Players are grouped into teams and they compete during the offseason in a number of activities, including academics, community service, and workouts.

In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ypg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27). Wide receiver Armon Binns and quarterback Zach Collaros were both First-Team all-BIG EAST selections while five other teammates earned all-BIG EAST honors.

In four years as a collegiate head coach, Jones holds a 31-21 mark, a 22-8 record in conference play, three bowl appearances, and a pair of league championships.

Prior to leading the Bearcats, Jones spent three seasons at Central Michigan University, leading the Chippewas to a pair of Mid-American Conference Championships and three-straight bowl appearances from 2007-09.

Jones continued the Chippewa program's renaissance, going 27-13 over three seasons, including a 22-3 mark in league games, winning a pair of MAC Championships (2007, 2009), playing in three-straight bowl games, and earning a postseason ranking of No. 23 in 2009. He is the only coach in CMU history to lead the team to consecutive bowl games and is the first in MAC history to do it in his first three seasons as head coach.

Jones coached 32 all-MAC performers, including two-time MAC Offensive Player of the Year and 2009 MAC Vern Smith Leadership Award winner Dan LeFevour, and two-time MAC Special Teams Player of the Year Antonio Brown. Under his tutelage, 13 student-athletes earned Academic all-MAC accolades.

LeFevour had an NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision Record 148 career touchdowns (101 passing, 46 rushing and one receiving). His 101 career passing TDs, are the most in MAC history.

The Chippewas were 12-1 in MAC road games under Jones and earned two-straight wins over Big Ten teams.

In 2007, Jones became only the ninth first-year head coach to lead his team to a Mid-American Conference championship. The Chippewas' eight victories marked the second-most of any CMU coach in his debut season, and Jones was one of three first-year head coaches nationwide to coach in a bowl game.

The Chippewas clinched the 2007 MAC West Division title with a 34-31 win at Western Michigan, CMU's first win in Kalamazoo since 1993. CMU went on to defeat Miami (OH), 35-10, four weeks later in the MAC Championship Game, a win that secured a spot in the Motor City Bowl.

The 2008 season was highlighted by another win over Western Michigan, 38-28, in front of a record crowd at Kelly/Shorts Stadium and a 37-34 win on the road at Indiana. The victory over the Hoosiers was CMU's first against a Big Ten opponent since 1992. CMU capped the 2008 season with its third consecutive appearance in the Motor City Bowl.

CMU led the MAC in both all-conference and academic all-conference selections in 2007, and the Chippewas' seven All-MAC first team selections in 2008 were the most for the program since 1990. During a two-year span, CMU collected the league's offensive player of the year (Dan LeFevour, 2007, '09), freshman of the year (Antonio Brown, 2007) and special teams player of the year (Antonio Brown, 2008, '09) honors. LeFevour earned the offensive player of the year accolade after becoming just the second player in NCAA history to pass for 3,000 yards and rush for 1,000 yards in the same season.

Prior to becoming the Chippewas' head coach, Jones spent a total of 11 seasons as an assistant at the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision level. He served as the offensive coordinator at three different schools, spanning eight seasons, and worked directly with 24 all-conference selections in 15 years as a full-time position coach.

A native of Michigan and a former offensive coordinator at CMU, Jones returned to Mount Pleasant after spending the 2005 and 2006 seasons as an assistant coach under Rich Rodriguez at West Virginia University. West

Virginia, employing a spread offensive attack, ranked second in Division I-A in rushing offense (303.0 ypg), third in scoring offense (38.9 ppg) and fifth in total offense (461.4 ypg) in 2006.

Jones translated that success to CMU. In 2007, the Chippewas were the only team to rank in the top four in the MAC in scoring offense (first, 33.8 ppg), total offense (second, 447.9 ypg), rushing offense (third, 182.8 ypg) and passing offense (fourth, 265.1 ypg). In 2008, CMU ranked second in the conference in both passing (289.8 ypg) and total offense (423.5), and the passing attack ranked 12th nationally.

CMU scored 30 or more points in 16 games during Jones' tenure; the Chippewas posted at least 40 points seven times, including three 50-point efforts. The 2007 and 2008 campaigns are the program's highest scoring seasons since CMU joined the MAC in 1975.

In two seasons at West Virginia, Jones was part of teams that recorded back-to-back 11-win campaigns, a pair of top-10 national rankings and victories in the 2006 Sugar Bowl and 2007 Gator Bowl.

Jones spent a total of 11 seasons as an assistant at the Division I-A level. He served as the offensive coordinator at three different schools, spanning eight seasons, and worked directly with 24 all-conference selections in 15 years as a full-time position coach.

Jones filled a variety of roles during his first stint at CMU (1998-2004), including serving as offensive coordinator from 2001-03. The Chippewas averaged just 271.5 yards per game and 12.5 points per game in 2000; in 2001, Jones' first season directing the offense, those averages jumped to 379.5 yards per game and 22.8 points per game, respectively. He coached three different running backs who earned first or second team all-MAC honors.

A 1990 graduate of Ferris State University where he was a two-year letterman on the football team, Jones broke into the coaching ranks while still an undergraduate by serving as intern for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1987-89.

He spent the 1990-92 seasons as a graduate assistant at Rutgers University before taking over as the offensive coordinator at Wilkes University in 1993. He directed an offense at Wilkes that led the Middle Atlantic Conference in scoring offense and total offense in 1993, a season in which it won a conference title and qualified for the NCAA Division III Playoffs.

Jones returned to his alma mater in 1995 as a running backs coach, only to be promoted to offensive coordinator for the 1996 season. The Bulldogs, while leading the Midwestern Intercollegiate Football Conference in total offense and scoring offense, won a second consecutive MIFC championship in 1996 and advanced to the NCAA Division II Quarterfinals.

Jones, 42, and his wife Barb are the parents of three children: Alex, Adam, and Andrew.



KERRY COOMBS

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH/SPECIAL TEAMS COORDINATOR/DEFENSIVE BACKS
FIFTH SEASON » DAYTON '83

Kerry Coombs, who directed Colerain High School in suburban Cincinnati to a Division I state championship (2004) and four other semifinal appearances, is in his fifth season at UC coaching the defensive backs.

Following the close of UC's BIG EAST Conference Championship winning season in 2008, he was promoted to Associate Head Coach. He took on the additional role of special teams coordinator entering 2010.

Coombs has been recognized in each of the past four seasons as one of the BIG EAST's top recruiters by Rivals.com.

In 2010, four of Coombs' defensive backs, Reuben Johnson, Drew Frey, Camerron Cheatham, and West Richardson, ranked among the top-10 tacklers on the squad. Johnson's 62 stops ranked third on the team while Frey and Richardson tied for the team lead with two interceptions apiece.

Kicker Jacob Rogers closed out his UC career as the holder of five school records, including the all-time mark for points scored (339). Rogers (Tampa Bay) and long snapper Mike Windt (San Diego) are both playing in the NFL.

Coombs coached First-Team all-BIG EAST Safety Aaron Webster in 2009. Webster (69 tackles) along with Frey (64), and Dominique Battle (60) ranked among UC's top-five tacklers in the 12-1 BIG EAST Championship season. Webster and Brad Jones both spent time in NFL training camps.

In 2008, Coombs mentored three NFL Draft picks, Mike Mickens (Dallas Cowboys), DeAngelo Smith (Dallas Cowboys), and Brandon Underwood (Green Bay Packers). Mickens was a second-team Walter Camp all-America honoree and UC's all-time leader in interceptions and interception return yardage, while Underwood was a first-team all-BIG EAST performer at safety in his only season at UC. Smith was the national leader in interceptions in 2007 with eight, and ranks second in UC history behind Mickens. The defense finished 31st in the nation in total defense (321.9 ypg) in 2008.

Coombs' first campaign as a member of the UC staff yielded instant results. The 2007 defense, led by his ball-hawking secondary, led the NCAA with 26 interceptions and 42 takeaways. That season, Coombs coached all-BIG EAST safety Haruki Nakamura, who was selected in the sixth round of the 2008 NFL draft.

One of the most celebrated prep coaches in Ohio, Coombs compiled a 161-34 (.826) record in 16 seasons at Colerain. His 2004 team posted a 15-0 record and won the state's Division I title with a 50-10 win in the championship game. Over his last seven seasons at Colerain, the Cardinals won seven league titles while compiling an 86-8 (.915) record.

Coombs' 2006 team went 13-1 and was ranked No. 1 in the final Ohio Associated Press poll and No. 18 in the USA Today national rankings.

His success at Colerain emphasized a defense he personally coached. In 2006, the Cardinals posted six shutouts and yielded just over a touchdown per game.

Coombs has mentored Ohio Division I Defensive Player of the Year award winners in 2004 and 2006, including former UC defensive tackle Terrill Byrd, who was also the national high school Defensive Player of the Year in 2004.

Coombs guided Colerain to 10 playoff appearances and seven undefeated regular-season records. The Cardinals won the Greater Miami Conference title and advanced to the regional finals of the state playoffs in each of his final seven seasons.

A member of the University of Dayton's 1980 NCAA Division III National Championship team, Coombs completed his bachelor's degree at Dayton in 1983 and later earned his master's in education at Wright State.

Coombs and his wife Holly have three children, Brayden, Cortney and Dylan.

Steve Stripling was named the assistant head coach and defensive line coach at Cincinnati in Jan. 2010

Stripling, a 30-year coaching veteran, has played or coached in 21 bowl games throughout his career.

Brandon Mills led the squad in 2010 with 12.5 tackles for a loss and 6.0 sacks. Derek Wolfe, John Hughes and Dan Giordano both ranked in among UC's Top-10 tacklers a year ago. Wolfe had 48 stops, 6.5 tackles for a loss and 4.0 sacks, while Hughes had 47 tackles and 4.5 tackles for a loss and Giordano had 36 stops, 8.0 tackles for a loss and 4.5 sacks.

He served as Central Michigan's interim head coach for the 2010 GMAC Bowl, leading the Chippewas to a 44-41 double overtime win over Troy.

Stripling joined the CMU coaching staff in 2009 as the associate head coach-defense and coached the defensive ends. Stripling worked directly with a pair of All-Mid-American Conference defensive ends during his first season in Mount Pleasant. Frank Zombo was an All-MAC first team selection for the second straight season, while Larry Knight was an All-MAC third team honoree.

Prior to CMU, Stripling coached the defensive line at Michigan from 2005-07. He worked directly with defensive end LaMarr Woodley, a 2006 All-American who won the Lombardi Award and Ted Hendricks Trophy. Woodley also was named Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Lineman of the Year in 2006. Tackle Alan Branch also earned All-Big Ten first team and All-America second team accolades under Stripling.

The 2006 Wolverines led the nation in rush defense, surrendering just 43.3 yards per game on the ground. Stripling was a part of Michigan teams that played in the Alamo Bowl, Rose Bowl and Capital One Bowl.

Stripling's other Big Ten experience includes two seasons at Michigan State University (2003-04), four seasons at the University of Minnesota (1997-2000) and 13 seasons at Indiana University (1984-96). He was the defensive coordinator at Indiana in 1996.

Stripling worked directly with two all-Big Ten selections at Michigan State, two at Minnesota and seven at Indiana. He was part of the 2003 Alamo Bowl at Michigan State, the 1999 Sun Bowl and 2000 MicronPC.com Bowl at Minnesota and six bowl games at Indiana.

Stripling also spent four seasons at Northern Illinois University (1980-83) and two years at the University of Louisville (2001-02). He helped lead NIU to the 1983 Mid-American Conference championship and coached three all-conference selections at Louisville, including 2001 Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year Dewayne White.

Stripling earned a bachelor's and master's degree from the University of Colorado. As a player, he was part of Colorado teams that played in three bowl games: the 1971 Bluebonnet Bowl, 1972 Gator Bowl and 1975 Bluebonnet Bowl.

He signed a free-agent contract with the Atlanta Falcons after graduating from Colorado in 1976. He spent the 1977-78 seasons as a graduate assistant at his alma mater before filling the role of recruiting coach at the University of North Carolina in 1979.

Stripling and his wife, Gayle, are the parents of three children: Christy, Cody and Chad.



MIKE BAJAKIAN

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/QUARTERBACKS
SECOND SEASON » WILLIAMS COLLEGE '96

Mike Bajakian enters his second season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after directing the top-rated offensive unit in the BIG EAST Conference in 2010.

In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ypg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27). Wide receiver Armon Binns and quarterback Zach Collaros were both First-Team all-BIG EAST selections.

Collaros led the BIG EAST and ranked in the Top-20 nationally in passing yards per game (263.8), total offense (282.2), and points responsible for (15 ppg). He also led the conference in total passing yards (2,902), touchdown passes (26) and completions (20.5 cpg).

Binns and D.J. Woods were the No. 1 and 2 ranked receivers in the BIG EAST in 2010 in yards per game, overall yardage, touchdown receptions, and 100-yard receiving games. Binns (1,101 yards) became only the eighth receiver in UC football history to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in a single season.

Along with running back Isaiah Pead's 1,029 rushing yards, Binns and Pead became only the third duo in UC football history to achieve 1,000 rushing and receiving yards in the same year. Pead was UC's first 1,000-yard rusher in nearly a decade, and only the seventh all-time.

UC showed off its high-powered offense as the Bearcats were the only NCAA FBS school to have two wide receivers with 15 or more 20-yard receptions in 2010. Additionally, UC was the only BCS team to have a pair of wideouts with 10 more touchdowns apiece. The Bearcats had six players with 22 or more catches and four with over 25 receptions apiece.

Bajakian, a 15-year coaching veteran at the collegiate level and in the NFL, joined the Cincinnati staff in January 2010 as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach after three years in the same role at Central Michigan University.

Bajakian's CMU offense ranked in the MAC's top-5 in most offensive categories in 2009, including leading the league in scoring offense (33.9 ppg) and passing efficiency (146.96). CMU's scoring offense was ranked 15th nationally in 2009 while its passing efficiency mark was 14th overall.

Over the last three years, CMU scored 30 or more points 24 times, 40 or more points 13 times and 50 or more points five times. The 2007-09 Chippewas have been the three highest scoring teams CMU has fielded since joining the MAC in 1975.

During his time at CMU, Bajakian mentored quarterback Dan Lefevour, one of the most prolific offensive players in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision history.

Lefevour, who closed out his career with an NCAA FBS record 150 touchdowns (102 passing, 47 rushing, 1 receiving), led the MAC in passing efficiency, and ranked No. 11 nationally, with a 150.26 rating. He was second in the league in total offense (296.5 ypg) and ranked 10th nationally. His 66.4 career completion percentage ranked him seventh among active NCAA FBS players at the close of the 2009 season.

He tallied 15,853 yards of total offense during his CMU career, trailing only Timmy Chang of Hawai'i (16,910 yards) in the NCAA ledger. He ranks ninth on the NCAA's all-time passing yards list with 12,905. He is the only player in NCAA FBS history to pass for 12,000 yards and rush for 2,500 yards in a career.

More than 30 school records were set or broken during Bajakian's tenure at CMU, and the offensive unit produced five all-MAC selections in 2009, including Lefevour, who earned the MAC Player of the Year honor as well as his second award as MAC Offensive Player of the Year.

Bajakian, who coached the Chippewas' quarterbacks during the 2002 and 2003 seasons, returned to CMU fresh off a trip to Super Bowl XLI with the Chicago Bears.

Bajakian spent the 2004-2006 seasons as the offensive quality control coach for the Bears, during which time he worked with the Bears' wide receivers. He was part of a coaching staff that led the Bears to Super Bowl XLI and back-to-back NFC North Division championships.

A 1996 graduate of Williams College in Williamstown, Mass., Bajakian was an All-New England Small College Athletic Conference and All-Eastern College Athletic Conference selection as a quarterback. He broke into the coaching ranks as the quarterbacks coach and passing game coordinator at Delbarton School in Morristown, N.J., helping lead to the school to consecutive trips to the parochial state finals.

Bajakian spent the 1998 and 1999 seasons at Rutgers University as a graduate assistant coaching the defensive backs. He then spent a brief period at Sacred Heart University in Fairfield, Conn. as quarterbacks coach before moving on to Michigan for the 2000 and 2001 seasons.

The New Jersey native played his prep ball at Bergen Catholic High School in Oradell, N.J.

Bajakian lives in Cincinnati with his wife, Michelene, and daughter Mary (1).

Tim Banks was named the co-defensive coordinator at UC following three years in the same role at Central Michigan.

Banks, who joined the Bearcats after three years in the same role at Central Michigan University, inherited a defense with seven new starters, featuring no seniors and eight sophomores, making UC the youngest defensive unit among all BCS Conference teams in 2010.

Linebacker J.K. Schaffer was a 2010 Second-Team All-BIG EAST selection after averaging 9.2 tackles per game, which ranked second in the league. Schaffer had his second straight 100-tackle season, finishing with 111 stops to lead the Bearcats.

Defensive backs Reuben Johnson, Drew Frey, Camerron Cheatham and West Richardson, ranked among the top-10 tacklers on the squad. Johnson's 62 stops ranked third on the team while Frey and Richardson tied for the team lead with two interceptions apiece.

His 2009 CMU defense led the Mid-American Conference in scoring defense (18.9), ranked second in rushing defense (122.8), third in pass efficiency defense (117.4), and fourth in total defense (344.2).

The Chippewas led the Mid-American Conference in rush defense in both 2007 and 2008, and the 2008 defensive unit led the conference in sacks with 35.

Four players earned First Team all-MAC honors during Banks' tenure: linebackers Red Keith and Ike Brown in 2007 and linebacker Nick Bellore and end Frank Zombo in 2008 and 2009.

CMU generated five turnovers in a game three times during the last two seasons, including a seven-turnover effort against Army in 2007. Cornerback Josh Gordy tied a school record with three interceptions, including one he returned for a touchdown, against Army.

Largely due to injury, CMU used 19 different players in its defensive starting lineup in 2007. That number rose to 21 in 2008. Both seasons saw the Chippewas use nine different players in the starting lineup in the secondary alone. Following the 2007 season, Banks was invited to participate in the NCAA Expert Coaches Academy.

Banks had spent the previous four seasons at the University of Maryland before returning to his alma mater. He coached the Terrapins' secondary in 2006 after spending his first three seasons with the inside linebackers. Under his guidance, linebacker D'Qwell Jackson was a two-time All-Atlantic Coast Conference first team selection (2004-05), ACC Defensive Player of the Year (2005) and a Bednarik Award finalist (2005).

Jackson (Cleveland Browns) is one of three players Banks coached at Maryland who are now in the NFL. The others are linebacker David Holloway (Arizona Cardinals) and cornerback Josh Wilson (Seattle Seahawks).

Prior to Maryland, Banks spent two seasons as an assistant at the University of Memphis (2001-02) and two years at Bowling Green (1999-00). At Memphis, the Tigers ranked ninth in Division I-A in pass defense in 2002—his only season working the cornerbacks.

Banks was a four-year letterman and two-time All-MAC second team selection (1993-94) at CMU. After redshirting as a true freshman during CMU's 1990 championship season, Banks was a co-captain for the Chippewas' 1994 MAC championship team and led the 1993 team in tackles with 105.

Banks graduated from Central Michigan in 1995 with a bachelor's degree in industrial management.

Banks and his wife Robin live in Cincinnati.



JOHN JANCEK

CO-DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/LINEBACKERS COACH/RECRUITING COORDINATOR
SECOND SEASON » GRAND VALLEY STATE '91

John Jancek was named co-defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at the University of Cincinnati in January 2010 after spending five seasons on the defensive staff at the University of Georgia. He also serves as the Bearcats' recruiting coordinator.

Jancek was at Georgia from 2005-09, coaching linebackers before assuming the role of co-defensive coordinator in 2009. During his time at UGA, the Bulldogs won 48 games, one SEC championship, been to two BCS bowl games, and finished in the nation's top ten three times.

In 2009, Jancek mentored Rennie Curran, who led the SEC with 130 tackles and was a finalist for both the Rotary Lombardy Award and Chuck Bednarik Award. The two-time First-Team all-SEC selection was a Butkas Award finalist in 2008.

In 2008, UGA linebacker Darryl Gamble earned the Bronco Nagurski National Player of the Week honor and received an ESPN Helmet Sticker from the College Gameday Final crew after intercepting a pair of passes for touchdowns against LSU.

The 2007 season saw the Bulldogs rank No. 2 in the postseason Associated Press poll after an 11-2 record and a victory over Hawai'i in the Allstate Sugar Bowl.

Following the 2006 season, all three of his starting LB's (Tony Taylor, Jarvis Jackson, Danny Verdun Wheeler) signed professional football contracts. Taylor led the nation in interceptions by a linebacker with seven.

Jancek continually reconfigured a 2005 Georgia linebacker unit into a solid group despite being hit by a rash of injuries during the year.

He was at Central Michigan from 2003-04 coaching the defensive line in 2003 before behind named defensive coordinator in 2004. Prior to joining the Chippewas, he was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach under former UC head coach Brian Kelly at Grand Valley State University, the 2002 NCAA Division II national champion.

A native of Muskegon, Jancek guided the Lakers into one of the top defensive units in Division II football during his four-year tenure from 1999-2002. GVSU opponents scored only 16.5 points per game in 2002 while posting a 14-0 record. Opponents managed just 279.9 yards per game in total offense and turned the ball over 36 times.

Jancek returned to his alma mater in 1999 after previously working as the defensive coordinator for three years at Hillsdale (1996-98). He also was the defensive tackles coach at Central Florida during the winter/spring of 1996. He also spent three years as defensive coordinator at Wayne State (1992-94). He spent the 1991 season as a graduate assistant at Grand Valley.

A 1991 graduate of Grand Valley and '94 master's degree recipient of Wayne State, Jancek was a three-year letterwinner with the Lakers as a defensive lineman. GVSU compiled a record of 28-7 during his three years and advanced to the NCAA Division II playoffs twice. He earned All-Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference honors as a senior.

Jancek and his wife, Kelly, have four sons, Zachary, Brock, Jack, and Brady.

MARK ELDER

RUNNING BACKS COACH
SECOND SEASON » CASE WESTERN RESERVE '00

Cincinnati native Mark Elder enters his second season at Cincinnati, handling the running backs in 2011 after coaching the tight ends in 2010.

Elder coached Second-Team all-BIG EAST Conference tight end Ben Guidugli in 2010, helping the senior total 24 catches and a pair of touchdowns.

In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ypg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27).

Prior to joining the UC staff in Jan. 2010, Elder spent the previous three seasons coaching linebackers at Central Michigan.

Elder, a graduate of Sycamore High School, had at least one of his CMU linebackers earn all-conference accolades in each of his three years in Mount Pleasant. Nick Bellore was an all-conference first team pick in 2008 and 2009, following in the footsteps of former CMU standouts Red Keith and Ike Brown in 2007.

Bellore averaged nearly 10 tackles a game in 2009 (9.4) and ranked fifth in the MAC and 24th nationally. His 148 tackles in 2008, matched Keith's 2007 total and tying for the third-most in a single season in school history. Bellore's average of 11.3 tackles per game led the MAC and ranked fourth nationally in 2008.

Keith and Brown led CMU in tackles with 148 and 106, respectively, in 2007. Keith's 474 career stops rank second in school history and seventh in NCAA Bowl Subdivision history. His 10.6 tackles per game in 2007 ranked 19th nationally.

Bellore, who started all 14 games at middle linebacker as a true freshman in 2007, made a CMU freshman-record 102 tackles and earned Freshman All-America honors.

Elder arrived at CMU by way of Michigan, where he spent the 2005 and 2006 seasons. As a defensive graduate assistant in 2006, Elder worked closely with the UM linebackers, including All-Big Ten selections David Harris and Shawn Crable. The 2006 Michigan defense led the nation in rushing yards allowed (43.4 ypg) and ranked 10th in total defense (268.3 ypg allowed).

Elder has previously served as the defensive coordinator at Wayne State (2004) and Iona (2003), also serving as the linebackers coach at both institutions. He worked with a pair of All-Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference linebackers at Iona and directed a defense that ranked first in the MAAC in total defense and second in scoring and rushing defense.

Elder began his coaching career as a graduate assistant coaching defensive backs at Akron (2000-01) before spending the 2002 season as an assistant linebackers coach at Lehigh. He was part of a co-MAC East Division championship at Akron in 2000 and assisted in coaching first team All-American Dwight Smith.

A 2000 graduate of Case Western Reserve in Cleveland, Ohio, Elder graduated cum laude with a bachelor of arts in economics while earning four varsity letters in football. He was a three-time all-conference selection as a defensive back. Elder also earned a master's degree in education from Akron.

Elder and his wife Lindsey live in Cincinnati.

Don Mahoney his second season on the Cincinnati staff as the offensive line coach.

In his first year in Clifton, Mahoney mentored an offensive line unit that paved the way for a 1,000-yard rusher and receiver for only the third time in school history. It was UC's first 1,000-yard rusher in almost a decade.

Mahoney mentored Second-Team all-BIG EAST Conference selection Jason Kelce, who made a successful transition from guard to center early in the season.

In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ypg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27).

Mahoney came to UC in Jan. 2010 after serving three years in the same role at Central Michigan University. The CMU offense was third in the Mid-American Conference in 2009, averaging just under 170 rushing yards per game (167.6). The Chippewas were second in the league in total offense (423.1), and led the MAC in scoring offense (33.9). CMU allowed an average of 1.21 sacks per game, a mark that ranked second in the MAC in 21st in the NCAA FBS. Redshirt freshman left tackle Jake Olson earned freshman all-America honorable mention accolades from CollegeFootballNews.com in 2009.

Mahoney coached a pair of all-Mid-American Conference performers in each of his three seasons in Mount Pleasant. Allen Ollenburger was a First-Team all-MAC selection in 2009 while center Colin Miller earned second team honors. Andrew Hartline (first team) and Greg Wojt (third team) were all-conference selections in 2008, while Hartline (second team) and Eric Tunney (third team) were recognized in 2007.

Hartline and Wojt are both playing professionally. Hartline signed with Green Bay Packers as an undrafted free agent in 2009, while Wojt is with the Edmonton Eskimos after being selected by the club in the 2008 Canadian Football League Draft.

As a unit, the CMU offensive line allowed just 1.57 sacks per game in 2007, the third fewest in the MAC. CMU tied for first in the MAC with an average of just one sack allowed in seven conference games. The Chippewas posted a stretch of four straight games without a sack allowed midway through the season and allowed one sack or fewer in five of the first six regular season games.

Mahoney has had at least one of his linemen earn academic all-district honors seven times in the last nine years. Hartline was an Academic All-MAC honoree in both 2007 and 2008.

Mahoney spent the 1999-2006 seasons coaching the offensive line at Tulane University after six previous seasons as an assistant at CMU. Mahoney served two years as a graduate assistant and four years as a fulltime assistant, working with tight ends and the offensive line, from 1993-98 at CMU.

At Tulane, Mahoney mentored offensive lines that led the way for the top rusher and all-purpose yardage gainer, the top passer, and the top scorer in school history. The 2006 line featured a trio of All-Conference USA honorable mention selections as well as a Conference USA All-Freshman team honoree. He was also part of a coaching staff that guided the Green Wave to a victory in the 2002 Hawaii Bowl.

Mahoney was an all-conference selection and three-year starter at guard for Marshall University, serving as team captain as a senior in 1990. He was a student assistant at Marshall when the Thundering Herd claimed the 1992 Division I-AA national championship and a graduate assistant at CMU in 1994 when the Chippewas won the MAC title and played in the Las Vegas Bowl.

Mahoney earned his bachelor's degree from West Virginia State in 1993. Mahoney and his wife, Carissa, have three children: Jacob (11), Tulia (8) and Domenic (5).



T.J. WEIST

WIDE RECEIVERS
SECOND SEASON » ALABAMA '88

T.J. Weist (pronounced WEEST), is in his second year at the University of Cincinnati coaching the wide receivers.

In 2010, Weist coached a pair of all-BIG EAST Conference selections in Armon Binns (first team) and D.J. Woods (second team). The duo were the No. 1 and 2 ranked receivers in the BIG EAST in 2010 and Binns became only the eighth receiver in UC football history to eclipse the 1,000-yard mark in a single season.

Binns' 1,101 yards led the BIG EAST. The four-year veteran also led the league in yards per game (91.8), receptions (6.2), touchdown receptions (10), 100-yard receiving games (6), and receptions of more than 10 yards (50). Woods led the league in receptions of more than 20 yards (17), and ranked second in the conference in yards per game (74.8), receiving yards (898), and 100-yard receiving games (3).

UC showed off its high-powered offense as the Bearcats were the only NCAA FBS school to have two wide receivers with 15 or more 20-yard receptions in 2010. UC's wide receivers accumulated 23 of the team's 27 receiving touchdowns and UC was the one of two teams nationally to have a pair of wideouts with eight more touchdowns apiece.

The 23-year coaching veteran, who has mentored 16 NFL receivers, joined the Bearcats after eight years at Western Kentucky mentoring the receivers. He also served as the team's assistant head coach (2007-09), and offensive coordinator (2003-06).

During his time with the Hilltoppers, Weist was instrumental in the development of wideouts Jake Gaebler and Curtis Hamilton. Gaebler set the school record for receptions (168) and ranks among WKU's Top-5 pass catchers all-time in yardage (1,924).

Hamilton concluded his four-year career in 2007 by setting the school's all-time records for both catches and receiving yards (2,324), while his 66 receptions as a senior matched the WKU season mark. He also finished third in the season record books with 873 yards.

Weist was WKU's offensive coordinator from 2003-06, calling plays for one of the most prolific units in school history. Not only did four-year starters Justin Haddix and Lerron Moore etch their names in the WKU record book in numerous categories, Hamilton became the first Topper wide out to be selected to an All-America team since 1996 following the 2006 campaign.

WKU ranked 23rd in the country in total offense, also finishing 17th in pass efficiency rating, while posting more than 4,000 total yards for the fifth consecutive season. Weist's passing attack averaged better than 200 yards per outing for the first time since 1986, as the 2,248 yards racked up by the unit through the air were the fifth most in WKU history.

In addition to Hamilton's performance, redshirt freshman Gaebler was selected to the Gateway Football Conference All-Newcomer Team in his first season of action while Hamilton, Haddix, Moore and Chris Sullivan earned all-league honors, and Andrew McCloud was also a member of the All-Newcomer squad.

Weist helped direct an offense that averaged 405.73 yards per game in 2005, which was the fifth-highest mark in school history, while scoring more than 30 points a game. The Hilltoppers ranked in the top 30 nationally in four different categories, which included leading the Gateway Conference and standing 14th in rushing offense. Three Hilltoppers were named first-team all-league on offense that year, while two others made the conference's All-Newcomer Team.

Weist's unit stood second in the Gateway Conference in 2004 after averaging 396.42 yards per game and ranked third with 29.17 points per contest, with the offense throwing for more than 2,000 yards for the first time since 1986. Both Haddix and Moore were able to pick up second-team all-league honors in his offense.

In 2003, Weist directed a unit that averaged 32.8 points and 394.5 yards per contest, with the former the fifth-highest per-game figure in school history. His efforts in shifting to a more balanced attack led to the Toppers throwing for 1,974 yards, the most by a WKU offense since the 1986 season. Haddix was selected the Gateway Conference Freshman of the Year, while

In his first year at WKU, Weist coached second-team all-Gateway Conference selection Jon Frazier - who tied a school season record with nine 100-yard games and posted the second-best season mark with 1,537 rushing yards - as well as Jeremi Johnson and Rooney, both members of the league's All-Newcomer Team. Three running backs collected more than 500 yards as the team recorded the second-best season rushing total in school history, while three wide receivers averaged more than a catch per contest for the first time since 1998.

Weist came to WKU from Indiana, where he served as wide receivers coach from 1997-01. While at IU, he also held special teams responsibilities with the return units and was the recruiting coordinator his first two years.

Weist was also the receivers coach at Tulsa (1996), Southern Illinois (1994-95), Michigan (1990-93) and Alabama (1988-89).

The Wolverines reached four postseason bowl games during his tenure, including two Rose Bowl appearances, while the Crimson Tide appeared in a pair of postseason contests while he was on the coaching staff including the 1990 Sugar Bowl.

A native of Bay City, Mich., Weist was a wide receiver at Alabama from 1984-87, taking part in three postseason bowl games. He earned a bachelor's degree in health and physical education in 1988, then added an exercise physiology master's degree one year later.

Weist and his wife Karen have a son, James (3).

Dave Lawson was named the director of football strength and conditioning at the University of Cincinnati in January 2010 after spending three years in the same role at Central Michigan.

Strength and conditioning is one of the most important ingredients of any successful college football program. To help the Bearcats' student-athletes maximize their athletic potential, UC combines a modern, comprehensive facility with the latest techniques in strength training.

The goal of the football strength and condition program is to develop the total athlete. The strength and conditioning staff works with UC student-athletes in the following areas: strength/power, agility/skill development, nutrition, mental toughness, speed, flexibility, conditioning, and injury prevention to lead to total athlete development.

Prior to coming to Clifton, Lawson spent three years working with head football coach Butch Jones at Central Michigan University. Lawson, who worked closely with the football program, oversaw and directed the strength and conditioning efforts for all 16 CMU varsity athletic programs.

Lawson is a certified strength and conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Association and a certified speed and explosion specialist by the National Association of Speed and Explosion.

He has coached seven Strength and Conditioning All-Americans, eight football All-Americans and more than 80 football players either drafted or signed as free agents by the National Football League.

In 2009, Lawson was recognized as a Master Strength and Conditioning Coach, the highest honor presented in the field, by the Collegiate Strength and Conditioning Coaches association (CSCCa). Two CMU student-athletes—football player Brian Brunner and softball player Ali Pettit—earned Strength and Conditioning All-America honors under Lawson's tutelage in 2009.

Lawson came to CMU from Eastern Michigan University, where he spent five years as head strength and conditioning coach. He developed and implemented strength and conditioning programs for all 21 of Eastern Michigan's varsity programs, as well as designing speed, agility and flexibility regimens for EMU's student-athletes.

Lawson spent seven years at West Virginia University prior to his time at EMU. He started at WVU as a graduate assistant in January 1994 before being named assistant strength and conditioning coordinator in May 1995. For six years, he worked with all 22 varsity sports with concentration on football, men's and women's basketball, volleyball, baseball, men's and women's swimming and diving and women's crew.

At WVU, Lawson worked with five football teams that played in postseason bowl games. He also worked with men's basketball teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament and National Invitational Tournament.

Lawson began his coaching career while an undergraduate at West Virginia Institute of Technology. He spent two years as a student assistant on both the strength and conditioning staff and football coaching staff. Upon graduation, he was named the head strength and conditioning coach at his alma mater. He also served as an assistant on the football staff, coaching defensive linemen and special teams in 1992 and 1993.

Lawson earned a bachelor of arts degree in physical education from West Virginia Institute of Technology in 1992 and a master of science degree in physical education from West Virginia University in 1995.

Lawson and his wife, Shannon, are the parents of four children: BrittLeigh, Emma, Maggie and James.

Bob Mangine's extensive experience in the field of athletic training makes him well-suited to diagnose and treat injuries as well as advising on their prevention.

He serves as UC's Associate Athletic Director for Sports Medicine and head athletic trainer for football. Mangine supervises a program that addresses the health and well-being of the Bearcats on a year-round basis by drawing from over three decades of experience in sports medicine.

Mangine, who has been the head football athletic trainer since 2005, has been at UC since 2002 while serving as the department's rehabilitation coordinator.

During the summer of 2011 and following an extensive departmental review, UC made the decision to outsource its sports medicine operation to Select Medical, the parent company of NovaCare Rehabilitation which is UC's long time provider of rehabilitation services. The transition has been relatively seamless due to UC's long-standing relationship with NovaCare Rehabilitation.

Under the direction of Mangine, UC's athletics training staff is the backbone of the sports medicine program. Trainers are present at every practice and event to monitor the health of the student-athletes and respond to injuries. The team physicians are led by Dr. Jon Divine, the head team physician, Dr. Angelo Colosimo, the director of orthopedic services, and Dr. Ken Stephens, the director of institutional services.

Mangine has over three decades of experience in the field of sports medicine. He has worked with both amateur and professional athletes since 1976, when he first arrived at UC. Since 1982, he has been active in the development of multiple sports medicine programs in the tri-state area. In 1988 he started his own practice which merged with NovaCare Rehabilitation in 1998.

While he was a student at the University of Pittsburgh, Mangine launched his career in athletics training. He served as assistant athletic trainer of the Pittsburgh Condor Basketball Club and as head athletics trainer at the Community College of Allegheny County prior to graduation in 1977.

Mangine served as director of rehabilitation at UC from 1977-80 while earning his master's degree. After two years as an assistant professor of physical therapy at the Medical College of Virginia, he returned to Cincinnati to work in private clinics.

Mangine currently serves as National Director of Sports Physical Therapy Clinical Residency for NovaCare and is President of MBM Consultants, which provides educational management services for physical therapy and occupational therapy professionals.

A 25-year award recipient of the National Athletic Trainers Association, he was the head athletic trainer for the aquatic teams at the 1996 Olympics, and the Goodwill Games of 1986, 1990 and 1998. He is a charter member of the Sports Physical Therapy Section Hall of Fame and the Covington Catholic (Ky.) High School Athletics Hall of Fame.

Mangine and his wife Marsha have two children, A.J. and Angela.

**BEARCATS FOOTBALL HISTORY***The 1924 Bearcats**Jonathan Ruffin**Connor Barwin*

The University of Cincinnati's rich history and tradition in intercollegiate athletics is founded in the Bearcats' football program. The football tradition has grown during the years and reached new heights over the past four years. In the past three seasons, UC has gone 27-12, won back-to-back BIG EAST Conference titles, played in two-straight Bowl Championship Series games, and have reached as high as No. 3 in all three major polls (Associated Press, USA Today, Bowl Championship Series).

UC's football program is one of the nation's oldest — only Rutgers (1869), Michigan (1879), Navy (1880), and Minnesota (1883), among NCAA Division I institutions, predate Cincinnati, which began the sport in 1885.

UC has been involved in several historic college football milestones starting with Dec. 8, 1888. That day, the Bearcats and Miami (Ohio) University engaged in the first college football game played in the state of Ohio, launching a rivalry that is tied for the oldest in the game among major universities — North Carolina vs. Wake Forest began playing that same year. The Battle for the Victory Bell is the fifth-most played rivalry series in college football.

A few years later in 1897, UC received an invitation to visit New Orleans to play a football game as a reward for a successful season. The game was a precursor to the current postseason football bowl games.

In the 1930s, a UC football player wore a device with his helmet to protect his broken nose. The device was a forerunner of the now standard face mask. The first soccer-style place kick was also attempted by a Bearcat, Hank Hartong, in the early 1960s.

Coaching luminaries have patrolled the sidelines at Cincinnati. College Football Hall of Fame coach Frank Cavanaugh began his 24-season career at UC. Sid Gillman, a member of the College and NFL Halls of Fame, was the architect of one of the top eras of Cincinnati football history. He directed the Bearcats to three conference titles and a pair of bowl game appearances during his six seasons (1949-54) before leaving for the professional ranks. Cincinnati, with Gillman developing the passing offenses which would make him successful in the pro ranks, became known for its aerial attack in the early 1950s. That notoriety continued long after his departure.

In 1968, the Bearcats were the nation's top passing team with quarterback Greg Cook leading the NCAA in total offense, while receiver/kicker Jim O'Brien captured the national scoring title. A year later, Cook earned Rookie of the Year honors as a Cincinnati Bengal, and two years later, O'Brien kicked the game-winning field goal for the Baltimore Colts in Super Bowl V.

With more than 100 players advancing into the professional ranks and nine earning Super Bowl wins, 40 earning all-America honors, and 11 garnering academic all-America recognition, Cincinnati football has clearly made an important impact on college football with its long history of accomplishments.

>> **BOWL-CATS** Cincinnati has been to eight bowl games over the last 11 seasons and 12 in the program's 122 seasons. UC played in the first Bowl Championship Series game in school history, taking on Virginia Tech in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2009.

>> **ALL-AMERICA TRADITION** Forty Bearcats have earned all-America recognition. Mike Woods garnered first-team honors in 1977, earning him an appearance on Bob Hope's television special. Punter Kevin Huber became the first two-time First-Team Associated Press all-American in UC history when he earned the honor in 2007 and 2008.

>> **"THE TOE"** Jonathan Ruffin received the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top kicker in 2000 after booting a record 26 field goals. He was presented the award by ESPN's Chris Fowler. Ruffin was also a consensus all-American that year.

>> **TROPHY GAMES** The Bearcats are involved in three trophy games. Cincinnati's annual clash with the Miami RedHawks is the nation's eighth-oldest and 11th longest running rivalry in NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision. The winner of the yearly fall battle claims the Victory Bell. The winner of the UC-Louisville contest takes home the Keg of Nails, while the winner of the UC-Pittsburgh game stakes claim to the recently created River City Rivalry Trophy. UC currently holds two of the three trophies.

>> **UPSET CATS** UC football has been dangerous to top teams over the years, knocking off the likes of No. 8 Wisconsin, 17-12, at home in 1999, going to defending national champion Penn State in 1983 and upending the Nittany Lions, 14-3, and dominating Virginia Tech, 16-0, in 1995 while allowing just 41 yards of offense. However, possibly the biggest upset in UC history came in 2006 as the Bearcats beat its highest-ranked opponent in Nippert Stadium history, blowing away then-No. 7 Rutgers, 30-11.

>> **CHAMPIONSHIP FOOTBALL** With a 37-15 record since the 2007 season, the Bearcats have become relevant on the national stage once again. In 2008, UC claimed the BIG EAST title, the school's first outright conference crown since 1946. The Bearcats climbed as high as No. 12 in the Associated Press, and USA Today Top 25 polls on the way to a school-record 11 wins. In 2009, UC set a school-record with 12 wins, finished No. 3 in the final Bowl Championship Series rankings, won its second-straight BIG EAST crown, and played in the Allstate Sugar Bowl. The Bearcats played in four straight bowl games for the first time in school history.



BEARCATS FOOTBALL HISTORY

1885 UC fielded its first football team under the organization of Arch Carson, who served as the first coach. The team won a pair of games over a club from neighboring Mt. Auburn.

1888 Cincinnati and Miami faced off in Oxford for the first college football game in the state of Ohio. The game ended in a scoreless tie but launched a rivalry that is tied for the honors of being the oldest among major college schools.

1897 Following a 7-1-1 season—the lone loss was to the fabled Carlisle Indians—Cincinnati was invited to celebrate New Years in New Orleans and play a contest against the host Southern Athletic Club. A day after their victory, the Bearcats accepted a challenge from LSU and also defeated the Tigers.

1898 Frank Cavanaugh, immortalized as the Iron Major, began his head coaching career at Cincinnati. He was elected to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame at the conclusion of his illustrious career.

1902 Cincinnati played its first home game at the current site of Nippert Stadium, defeating Hanover, 18-0.

1912 Cincinnati scored a school-record 124 points in a shutout win over Transylvania. Ike Stewart and Bob Heuck each tallied six TDs and Alonzo Wells kicked 12 PATs, all UC records.

1914 Cincinnati teams first used the nickname Bearcats.

1916 Construction began on permanent stadium seating and facilities.

1922 George McLauren, another UC mentor to be elected to the College Football Hall of Fame, began his four-season tenure as UC's head coach.

1923 Nippert Stadium was the site of the first night football game in the Midwest as Cincinnati defeated Kentucky Wesleyan, 17-0. In the season-ending game vs. Miami, Jimmy Nippert sustained a spike wound and died a month later of blood poisoning. His grandfather, James Gamble, donated the money needed to finish the stadium construction.

1924 Nippert Stadium was dedicated.

1933 UC won the first of two straight Buckeye Athletic Association titles.

1934 UC played its first Homecoming game, defeating Marshall, 7-0.

1935 The Bearcats' first NFL players, Bill Feldhaus (Detroit) and Ray Nolting (Chicago), lead UC to a 7-2 record before embarking on their pro careers.

1942 UC hosted No. 2 Georgia at Nippert Stadium. The Bulldogs won, 35-13, and won the Rose Bowl a few months later. The other lone blemish on UC's 8-2 record was to Sugar Bowl victor Tennessee.

1943-44 Football suspended due to World War II.

1946 Cincinnati defeated defending Big 10 Conference champion Indiana in the season opener en route to a 9-2 record. The season was capped by the Bearcats' first bowl appearance. UC defeated Virginia Tech, 18-6, in the Sun Bowl.

1947 UC won its first Mid-American Conference championship. The Bearcats won four crowns in their six-year association with the league.

1949 Sid Gillman took over as head coach and promptly piloted UC to a Mid-American Conference title and a win over Toledo in the Glass Bowl. Tom O'Malley's 1,617 passing yards led the nation.

1950 The Bearcats advanced to the Sun Bowl but are edged by West Texas State, 14-13.

1951 UC posted an all-time best record of 10-1. Gene Rossi and Bob Stratton became the first Bearcats to earn all-America recognition.

1953 Cincinnati led the nation in both total offense (409.5 yards per game) and total defense (184.3), a feat accomplished by only three other teams in college football history.

1954 Sid Gillman left for the Los Angeles Rams after directing UC to an 8-2 ledger. In six seasons under the eventual college and pro hall of fame coach, the Bearcats posted a 50-13-1 record and won three Mid-American Conference titles.

1956 UC led the nation in punt return average, averaging 17.7 yards per return.

1959 Dave Canary became the first of 11 Bearcats to earn academic all-America honors. Canary eschewed pro football possibilities to pursue a successful acting career and became a regular in several TV series. Teammates Jack Lee and Jim Leo were named MVP of the Senior Bowl and College All-Star games, respectively.

1963-64 Cincinnati won back-to-back Missouri Valley Conference titles under Chuck Studley, who went on to become head coach of the Houston Oilers. UC compiled a 14-6 record during those two seasons.

1968 Cincinnati led the nation in passing offense, averaging 335.8 yards per game. Greg Cook led the nation in total offense, amassing 3,210 yards, while receiver/kicker Jim O'Brien was the nation's leading scorer with 142 points.

1970 Bob Bell became the second Bearcat in as many seasons to be a first-round selection in the NFL Draft.

1976 Cincinnati defeated Arizona State and Vanderbilt en route to a 9-2 ledger. Co-captain Mike Woods earned first-team all-America honors and was a second-round draft pick by the Baltimore Colts.

1983 UC opened the season with a 14-3 upset of defending national champion Penn State at Beaver Stadium.

1985 The Bearcats upset a pair of 1984 bowl teams, Virginia Tech and Boston College.

1986 UC hosted the No. 1 Miami Hurricanes at Nippert Stadium. The Hurricanes validated its ranking with a 45-13 win.

1992 Nippert Stadium reopened to full use following an extensive renovation. The Bearcats hosted No. 8 Penn State in the season opener, and nearly pulled off the upset before falling, 24-20.

1995 Robert Tate led the nation in kickoff return average, averaging 34.3 yards on 15 returns. Tate was named both Offensive and Special Teams MVP in Conference USA.

1996 Cincinnati began competition in Conference USA. The Bearcats posted back-to-back crowds of 30,729 for Kentucky and 30,887 for Miami University, breaking the old stadium attendance record.

1997 Cincinnati ended a drought of 47 seasons without a bowl game appearance when it was selected to play in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl. The Bearcats defeated Utah State, 35-19, to finish the year at 8-4.

1999 Cincinnati upset No. 8 Wisconsin, 17-12 in Nippert Stadium.

2000 UC won five of its last six games to finish second in Conference USA and earn a bid to play Marshall in the Motor City Bowl. Jonathan Ruffin became a first consensus first-team all-America choice and received the 2000 Lou Groza Award after leading the nation in field goals.

2001 The Bearcats opened the season against No. 25 Purdue in front of the largest Nippert Stadium crowd in history. UC won its first four league games en route to a second-place finish in Conference USA and second straight trip to the Motor City Bowl. Quarterback Gino Guidugli is named the Conference USA Freshman of the Year after setting school and league freshman records by throwing for 2,573 yards and 16 touchdowns.

2002 Cincinnati set school and Conference USA single-game attendance marks when 66,319 packed Paul Brown Stadium to see UC play eventual national champion Ohio State. UC won its final five league games to claim a share of the Conference USA title, its first league championship since 1964. Quarterback Gino Guidugli threw for 3,543 yards, one of five season records set by the sophomore. UC earned a bowl bid for a record third straight year, playing in the New Orleans Bowl.

2004 The Bearcats recovered from a 2-4 start to win five of their last six games, including a convincing 52-24 victory over No. 21 Southern Miss. UC was selected for the Fort Worth Bowl where the Bearcats defeated Marshall, 32-14.

2005 Cincinnati began play in the BIG EAST Conference

2006 The Bearcats posted a 7-5 regular-season mark, playing a schedule that featured five teams ranked in the Top 10 at the time they faced UC. After a couple of near misses against those ranked foes, UC downed No. 7 Rutgers, 30-11, before a national television audience. Cincinnati earned a berth in the inaugural International Bowl in Toronto, Ont. Though head coach Mark Dantonio and his staff departed following the end of the regular season, new coach Brian Kelly and his staff directed the UC squad to a 27-24 win over Western Michigan.

2007 In Brian Kelly's first full season as head coach at UC, the program equaled the school single-season record for wins, posting a 10-3 record and earning a No. 17 ranking in the final Associated Press poll. It marked the first time UC ended the season among the nation's Top 25 programs. Three Bearcats earned all-America honors, including punter Kevin Huber, who was the school's second consensus selection.

2008 The Bearcats had a banner season that included a school-record 11 wins, the program's first BIG EAST Conference Championship, a final ranking of No. 17 in both the Associated Press and USA Today Top 25 polls, and a Bowl Championship Series appearance in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl on Jan. 1, 2009. Five UC players earned all-America honors while punter Kevin Huber became the first two-time First Team Associated Press all-America selection in school history.

2009 Cincinnati ran off a school-record 12-straight wins, achieved a best-ever ranking of No. 3 in the country (AP/USA Today/BCS) and won its second-straight BIG EAST Conference Championship before falling to Florida in the 2010 Allstate Sugar Bowl. Wide receiver Mardy Gilyard re-wrote parts of the UC record book on the way to earning AFCA First-Team All-America honors.

2010 Butch Jones took the helm as UC's 38th head football coach in late 2009. In 2010, the Bearcats led the BIG EAST in scoring offense (27.1 ppg), total offense (417.3 ypg), passing offense (260.7 ypg), first downs (21.9 pg), third-down conversions (45.6 pct.), and touchdown passes (27). Wide receiver Armon Binns and quarterback Zach Collaros were both First-Team all-BIG EAST selections while five other teammates earned all-BIG EAST honors. Nineteen players were named Academic All-BIG EAST and John Goebel earned the 2010 American Eagle Outfitters BIG EAST Football Scholar-Athlete of the Year award.

BEARCATS COACHING LEGACY

The University of Cincinnati has been well-represented on the lists of professional and college coaching greats, a legacy which continues into 2011 with a proliferation of former Bearcats mentors, assistant coaches and players in the NFL, CFL and major university ranks.

Sid Gillman has long been the standard-bearer for Bearcat coaching greats. Gillman, whose 50-13-1 record in his six seasons in the late 1940s and early 1950s is one of the winningest marks at UC, is one of the few coaches to earn induction into both the college and professional football halls of fame. His UC success vaulted him into the NFL, with the Los Angeles Rams.

Two other members of the College Football Hall of Fame, Frank Cavanaugh, George Little, launched their head coaching careers at UC. Cavanaugh, the legendary "Iron Major" for his accomplishments as a coach and war hero at Army, in 1898, and Little, who earned fame at Michigan and Wisconsin, in 1914-15. Former UC assistants Dick MacPherson and Don Nehlen are also in the College Football Hall of Fame. MacPherson, a UC assistant in the early 1960s, concluded a distinguished career at Syracuse. Nehlen, on the 1963 UC staff, was West Virginia's winningest coach following his 21 seasons there.

One-time Bearcat mentors Homer Rice (1967-68), and Chuck Studley (1961-66) were NFL head coaches at Cincinnati and Houston, respectively, as were former assistants Leeman Bennett (Atlanta) and Jack Faulkner (Denver).

Nick Skorich, a member of the UC Athletic Hall of Fame for his football prowess in the 1940s, was head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles and Cleveland Browns.

A trio of former Bearcats assistants, John Harbaugh (Baltimore Ravens), Rex Ryan (New York Jets), and Mike Tomlin (Pittsburgh Steelers) are current NFL head coaches.

Harbaugh was a UC assistant from 1989-96, Ryan from 1996-97, and Tomlin was on the UC staff from 1999-2000.

Both Harbaugh and Tomlin have assistants on their staff with UC ties. Amos Jones (1999-2002) is an assistant special teams coach in Pittsburgh. Jerry Rosburg (1992-95) serves on Harbaugh's staff in Baltimore as the Assistant Head Coach/Special Teams and has coached in the NFL for over 10 years. Ravens offensive assistant Craig Ver Steeg was on the UC staff from 1990-93 and has coached nearly 30 years at all levels of football.

The Cleveland Browns staff features two former UC letterwinners in linebackers coach Bill Davis (1985-88) and offensive line coach George Warhop (1981-82). Davis is in his 17th season as an NFL assistant, previously serving as defensive coordinator for the Arizona Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers. Warhop, a center during his time at UC, has coached in the NFL for 15 seasons during stints for the Browns, Arizona Cardinals, Dallas Cowboys, and St. Louis Rams.

Bob Wylie, entering his fourth decade of coaching football that includes 18 years at the professional level, coached at UC in the mid 1990s and is currently the Oakland Raiders offensive line coach.

Former UC offensive line coach Larry Zierlein (1997-2000) recently wrapped up a 40-year coaching career that included nearly 10 years in the NFL and a win in Super Bowl XLII with the Pittsburgh Steelers in 2008.

Former UC aide Bill Sheridan is linebackers coach for the Miami Dolphins while Tracy Rocker (1997) enters his first season with the Tennessee Titans after a storied collegiate career that included a stint with 2010 National Champion Auburn.

In Canada, former Bearcats player and coach Dave Ritchie directed British Columbia and Winnipeg to Grey Cup titles, the Canadian Football League's Super Bowl, and former UC quarterback Danny Barrett spent six years as the head coach of the Saskatchewan Roughriders (2000-06).

UC's representation in the college coaching ranks is highlighted by a trio of former assistants. Paul Dietzel, an aide to Gillman in 1949-50, directed LSU to the national title in 1958 and later coached at Army and South Carolina. Other UC assistants to garner head coaching positions include Foge Fazio (Pittsburgh), Mark Duffner (Holy Cross), Chuck Stobart (Toledo, Utah, Memphis), Lou West (Indiana State) and Ron Zook (Florida, Illinois).

Joe Morrison, a standout as a Bearcats player and later for the New York Giants in the NFL, achieved similar success during his 15 seasons as a major college head coach. Urban Meyer, a Bearcat in the mid-1980s and later a student assistant coach, carved out an impressive career at Florida following successful stints at Bowling Green and Utah and is now a college football analyst for ESPN.

Seven former UC assistants are current head coaches at the collegiate level, including Dan Enos (Central Michigan), Jeff Filkovski (Marietta College), Jimbo Fisher (Florida State), Joker Phillips (Kentucky), Don Treadwell (Miami OH), Jeff Quinn (Buffalo), and Zook (Illinois).

Fisher has a pair of former Bearcats on his Florida State staff in Greg Hudson (Assistant Head Coach/Defense Florida State) and Eddie Gran (Associate Head Coach/Special Teams Coordinator/RB),

Several former UC assistants are coordinators at NCAA FBS schools including former UC letterwinner Dana Bible (Offensive Coordinator NC State) and Joe Tresey (Defensive Coordinator UCLA).

Tom Rossley, who set many UC receiving records has spent nearly four decades in the coaching ranks at the college and NFL levels, including a stint as head coach at SMU and six seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Green Bay Packers. He is currently the quarterbacks coach at Texas A&M.

Former assistant Harry Hiestand (1987-93) spent five years with the Chicago Bears and now serves as the offensive line coach at Tennessee.

BOWL HISTORY



Cincinnati's proud bowl history includes a number of firsts, possibly including the first postseason bowl game.

The Bearcats, according to records, played a pair of postseason games in 1897 against the Southern Athletic Club and Louisiana State University.

In recent years, UC's postseason destinations have taken them to Texas, Canada, Alabama, Miami, and New Orleans.

The Bearcats have played the part of college football vagabond over the years, spending 65 seasons as an independent with no bowl tie ins.

Since joining Conference USA in 1996, UC has played in nine postseason games, including a pair of Bowl Championship Series contests in 2009 and 2010.

The Bearcats are 6-6 all-time in 12 postseason appearances and are 3-2 in their last five bowls.

The post-World War II influx of veterans into colleges rejuvenated college athletics, and with that came a surge of new bowls. Cincinnati capped a successful 1946 season with a trip to the Sun Bowl in El Paso, Texas. There, the Bearcats defeated Virginia Tech, 18-6.

UC made appearances in the Glass Bowl in Toledo in 1949 and returned to the Sun Bowl at the end of the 1950 campaign.

After 47 years without a bowl appearance, Cincinnati's drought was broken when the Bearcats played in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl in Boise, Idaho in 1997.

With Conference USA developing alliances with five bowls, the Bearcats made three straight bowl appearances in 2000, 2001 and 2002—the first two in the Motor City Bowl in Detroit and the third in the New Orleans Bowl.

In 2004, UC was selected to represent Conference USA in the PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl, the teams' fourth bowl appearance in five years. UC defeated Marshall, 32-14, in that contest.

In 2006, Cincinnati earned its first BIG EAST Conference bowl appearance after knocking off Connecticut in the season finale. In unusual circumstances following Mark Dantonio and his staff's departure to Michigan State before the bowl game, UC hired Brian Kelly from Central Michigan who came in and in just 34 days prepared UC and defeated Western Michigan University, 27-24, in the inaugural International Bowl in Toronto, Ontario.

Following an impressive 9-3 regular season in 2007 - which included three wins against top-25 opponents, the Bearcats had the opportunity to face former Conference USA foe Southern Mississippi in the Papajohns.com Bowl, in Birmingham, Ala. Victory number 10, a 31-21 win at Legion Field, marked just the second 10-win season in Bearcats history (UC's 1951 squad finished 10-1). In addition, the Bearcats were ranked No. 17 in the final AP poll, the first time in school history.

With the move to the BIG EAST Conference, a Bowl Championship Series league, doors have opened for UC to play in some of the game's most prestigious bowls and the Bearcats have taken advantage of those opportunities, participating in a pair of BCS games over the past three seasons.

On the heels of 11 wins in 2008 and UC's first BIG EAST Championship, the Bearcats earned a spot in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl, their first New Year's Day Bowl appearance since 1951 against Virginia Tech from the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Bearcats followed up their 2008 successes by winnings their second-straight BIG EAST Championship in 2009 after a perfect 12-0 regular season. Climbing to No. 3 in the final Bowl Championship Series rankings, UC earned a spot in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl against the Florida Gators, coached by UC alum Urban Meyer.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL'S FIRST BOWL?



While the NCAA Official Football Records recognizes the Rose Bowl, started in 1902, as being the first collegiate bowl game, former UC athletic director Bill Schwarberg points to a bowl appearance by Cincinnati that pre-dates the Rose Bowl by five years.

Citing a record in the University's McMicken Review, Schwarberg indicated that following the 1897 season, Cincinnati was in fact the first institution from Ohio to make a trip south to play in a postseason game.

Cincinnati posted a 7-1-1 record that year, which included a 34-0 win over Ohio State. The lone team to beat UC was the powerful Carlisle Indians.

Shortly after Thanksgiving a travel party of 14, which included the substitutes and the coach and manager, departed for New Orleans to play a game there on New Year's Day. Hosted by the Southern Athletic Club, accounts of the game have UC winning with ease by a score of 16-0.

At a victory party that evening, players from Louisiana State challenged the Bearcats to a game the next day in Baton Rouge.

UC accepted the challenge and overwhelmed the LSU team, 28-0.

If this was indeed UC's first bowl game, it was 49 years before the Bearcats again experienced postseason play.

The University of Cincinnati football team, reeling from the resignation of former head coach Brian Kelly, saw its perfect season blemished with a loss to Florida in the 2010 Allstate Sugar Bowl.



Tim Tebow threw for a career-high 482 yards and three touchdowns, ran for 51 yards and another score, and fifth-ranked Florida (13-1) overwhelmed No. 4 Cincinnati (12-1) 51-24 inside the Louisiana Superdome.

Cincinnati, who donned white helmets for the game for the first time since 1966, was playing in its second straight BCS game, but this one was even more lopsided than last year's 20-7 loss to Virginia Tech in the Orange Bowl. Kelly resigned in early December to take the head coaching job at Notre Dame.

Quarterback Tony Pike completed 27 of 45 passes for 170 yards and three scores, all in the second half when the outcome was no longer in doubt.

UC was held to a season low 246 yards of total offense, including a season low 170 passing yards by the Gators defense.

Mardy Gilyard finished the game with seven receptions, giving him 204 career receptions which ties Dominick Goodman and LaDaris Vann as the UC record holders in career catches.

Florida finished with a Sugar Bowl-record 659 yards of total offense

NO. 21 VIRGINIA TECH 20, NO. 12 CINCINNATI 7

Mardy Gilyard had 255 all-purpose yards and a touchdown catch, but it was not enough as No. 21 Virginia Tech knocked off No. 12 Cincinnati, 20-7, in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl.

Gilyard had seven receptions for 158 yards and a touchdown, along with 97 kickoff return yards for Cincinnati (11-3), which had its six-game winning streak snapped. Tony Pike threw for 239 yards and a touchdown, but had his night marred by four interceptions and getting stopped on a fourth-and-goal in the fourth quarter.

The Bearcats took the opening kickoff, sent their spread offense onto the field, and made the Hokies look very confused. Pike found Gilyard for a 38-yard pickup on the third play from scrimmage, and they hooked up for a spectacular 15-yard touchdown three plays later to open the scoring.

Facing a third-and-9 from the right hash, Pike waited before lofting a fade to the far left of the end zone. Gilyard took off on a sprint, made a diving catch as he sailed out of bounds and managed to just barely drag his right toe on the turf painted in Virginia Tech's colors for a 7-0 Cincinnati lead.

The Hokies defense held UC to 137 yards, stifled the Bearcats running game (eight carries, 11 yards) over the remainder of the half, and battled their way to a 10-7 lead by intermission. Darren Evans, the game's MVP, had 28 carries for 153 yards and a touchdown

Terrill Byrd led the UC defense with 11 tackles, including 10 solo stops, four tackles for a loss, and a sack. Brandon Underwood had six tackles, including a sack and an interception.

**No. 20 Cincinnati 31, Southern Miss 21**

Ben Mauk shrugged off mistakes and Southern Miss defenders alike, and helped No. 20 Cincinnati make one more entry into an impressive season. The hard-to-tackle Mauk passed for 334 yards and four touchdowns, and DeAngelo



Smith intercepted three passes, leading the Bearcats to a 31-21 victory over Southern Miss in the PapaJohns.com Bowl.

The victory gave Cincinnati (10-3) its second 10-win season and first since 1951, while virtually assuring a spot in the final rankings for the first time.

Mauk, the game's most valuable player, completed 30-of-52 passes and overcame three interceptions to become only the third Bearcats player to have a 3,000-yard passing season.

Mauk, who also rushed for 41 yards and frequently broke loose from defenders to make plays, threw three touchdown passes during an 8-minute span extending into the second half.

Cincinnati stopped punter Britt Barefoot on a fake punt on fourth-and-1 from his own 29 and Mauk hit Earnest Jackson for a 29-yard TD strike on the next play for a 21-7 lead. Jeremy Young answered with a 1-yard scoring run for Southern Miss before Mauk struck again with a 10-yarder to Antwan Giddens and set up a 22-yard field goal by Jake Rogers in the final seconds of the third quarter to put the Bearcats up 31-14.

Young cut into the lead again with a 5-yard touchdown pass to Chris Johnson but Southern Miss could not recover an onside kick or convert a fourth-and-1 play on its next possession.

Smith's third pick ended any hope of a comeback in the final minutes. Dominick Goodman caught seven passes for 95 yards and a pair of scores for UC. Connor Barwin (86 yards) and Antwan Giddens (64) also had seven catches apiece.

CINCINNATI 27, W. MICHIGAN 24

The International Bowl provided Cincinnati fans with a preview of what Brian Kelly has in store as UC knocked off Western Michigan, 27-24.

Kevin Lovell's 33-yard field goal with 6:11 remaining provided the winning margin for Cincinnati and Western Michigan's 51-yard field goal try with 1:26 left fell short.

Dominick Goodman was named the game's Most Outstanding Player. Butler Benton led UC rushing attack with 62 of the team's combined 126 yards against the Broncos—a defense that was ranked fifth nationally defending the run.

John Bowie put UC on the scoreboard first when he gathered in a tipped pass and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter. On Cincinnati's next drive, Davila connected on a 21-yard TD toss to Goodman. Goodman later hauled in a second touchdown pass in the second quarter.

The reeling Broncos used some trickery on the first play following Lovell's field goal. E.J. Biggers, on a double reverse, lofted the ball to Jamarko Simmons for a 76-yard touchdown.

The Broncos' defense got the ball right back and Cubit tossed a 30-yard scoring pass to close the gap to 24-14. A miscue by the UC offense—Davila's pass was deflected and intercepted with 23 seconds to play in the half—setting up Nate Meyer's 29-yard field goal.

Cincinnati's seniors capped their careers with a dominating performance in a 32-14 win over Marshall at the PlainsCapital Fort Worth Bowl.

Linebacker Tyjuan Hagler started things by blocking a punt one minute into the game, which was returned by Antwan Giddens for a touchdown. Hagler forced a fumble to set up one of three Kevin Lovell field goals, recorded a sack and had a team-high seven tackles to earn a spot on *Football News*' all-bowl team.

Trent Cole and Andre Frazier each recorded sacks while leading the defensive pursuit from their end positions. Cole also blocked a punt for a safety. UC's defense held the Thundering Herd to 134 total yards, minus-3 yards rushing.

Gino Guidugli capped his stellar career with his guttiest performance. Playing with a broken hand, Guidugli completed 24-of-36 passes for 231 yards and staked the Bearcats to their lead with a pair of second-quarter TD tosses. Guidugli was to be limited to shotgun snaps, but with the running game sputtering, he moved under center in the second quarter, a move which energized the offense. UC gained 168 yards on the ground, 62 by Richard Hall who capped his senior season with 1,000 yards. Hannibal Thomas caught nine passes for 102 yards to top the 1,000-yard mark in receiving.

UC jumped out to a 10-0 lead on Antwan Giddens return of Hagler's blocked punt and Lovell's 23-yard field goal. The Herd retaliated with two late first quarter TD's, the second on a 32-yard interception return of an errant Guidugli pass, the senior's lone miscue of the night. The Bearcat defense shut down Marshall after that, allowing just 52 yards in total offense the remaining three quarters.

Guidugli capped scoring drives of 13 and 11 plays with TD passes of 15 yards to Brent Celek and eight yards to Earnest Jackson to give UC a 28-10 lead before the half. The Bearcats coasted from there.

Kevin Galbreath rushed for 130 yards and a touchdown to earn MVP honors as North Texas defeated Cincinnati, 24-19, in the second annual New Orleans Bowl.

After Cincinnati took an early 7-0 lead on a six-yard pass from Gino Guidugli to Tye Keith, North Texas ran off 24 straight points to build a 24-7 advantage.

Patrick Cobbs put the Mean Green ahead for good, 10-7, when he broke free for a 27-yard TD run with 10:53 left in the half. UNT extended the lead to 17-3 at the intermission when Jeremy Pearl returned a Guidugli interception 20 yards for a TD.

Galbreath finished the UNT scoring when he broke loose for a 35-yard TD run on the opening drive of the second half.

The Bearcats rallied as Jonathan Ruffin connected on field goals of 29 and 33 yards, the second allowing him to break his own school record with 13 straight field goals made. Franklin Callicott pulled UC to within 24-19 when he stripped Cobbs of the ball in the backfield and raced 43 yards for a touchdown with 5:15 left. Guidugli's two-point conversion pass fell incomplete.

Cincinnati would not get the chance to come any closer as North Texas used a time-consuming ground game to key an 11-play drive to run out the clock.

Guidugli led the UC offense by completing 19-of-34 passes for 224 yards and a touchdown but the sophomore threw a career-high five interceptions.

DeMarco McCleskey rushed 23 times for 85 yards to set the UC season rushing record with 1,361 yards. Jon Olinger's four catches for 107 yards raising his season receiving total to 1,114 yards, allowed the senior to break Jim O'Brien's 34-year old record of 1,107 receiving yards.

Chester Taylor rushed for a bowl-record 190 yards, including a game-winning 24-yard touchdown with 3:23 left to lead Toledo to a 23-16 win over Cincinnati in the Motor City Bowl.



Cincinnati had a chance to tie the game in the closing moments but could not score following a first down at the 11 yard line.

Tavares Bolden was 14-for-28 for 135 yards and ran for 99 yards, which helped the Rockets set a Motor City Bowl-record with 322 yards rushing. Toledo held Cincinnati to just 13 yards on the ground, also a record in the five-year history of the bowl.

Taylor's 24-yard touchdown capped an 80-yard drive, which he sparked with three carries for 52 yards. The third-team all-America selection had a bowl-record 31 carries.

After Todd France gave Toledo a 3-0 lead on a 28-yard field goal with 9:24 left in the first quarter, the Bearcats ran off 13 straight points to take a 13-3 halftime lead. Jonathan Ruffin sandwiched field goals from 29 and 46 yards, the latter coming as time expired in the first half, around a 28-yard Gino Guidugli touchdown pass to Tim Walker.

Toledo pulled even after three quarters as France connected on a 42-yard field goal and Tavares Bolden scored on a 28-yard run with 1:44 left in the third. Both teams put together long drives on the first two possessions of the fourth quarter but settled for field goals.

The Rockets went 76 yards on 14 plays over five minutes, but stalled at Cincinnati's 13. France's 30-yard field goal gave them a 16-13 lead with 9:42 left.

The Bearcats then stalled at Toledo's 8 after driving 73 yards. Ruffin's 25-yard kick tied the game with 6:26 to go. The Rockets then drove 80 yards in seven plays with Taylor breaking loose up the middle for the winning score with 3:23 left.

Guidugli was 29-for-46 for 283 yards and a touchdown. Tye Keith caught a bowl-record nine passes for 63 yards.

Chad Plummer threw for a touchdown and ran for another score and Cornelius Bonner caught two touchdown passes as Cincinnati defeated Utah State, 35-19, in the inaugural Humanitarian Bowl.



Deontey Kenner, who rotated at quarterback with Plummer, completed 10-of-16 passes for 124 yards and one touchdown for Cincinnati, which had not played in the postseason since the 1951 Sun Bowl.

Plummer, voted the game's Most Valuable Player, completed 5-of-10 passes for 61 yards while rushing 15 times for 53 yards.

Bonner, who had 48 yards on four receptions, caught touchdown passes of 14-yards each from Plummer and Kenner as the Bearcats raced to a 21-0 halftime lead.

Orlando Smith led Cincinnati in rushing with 82 yards on 15 carries while the Bearcats held a 265-76 advantage in rushing yards while holding the ball for more than 42 minutes.

Following a fumble by Utah State's Demario Brown early in the second half, the Bearcats went 57 yards in seven plays, capped by Plummer's 15-yard scoring run around right end that made it 28-0.

Just 1:03 later, Utah State's Steve Smith turned a five-yard pass from Matt Sauk into a spectacular 75-yard touchdown as he broke tackles and outran the secondary. But Cincinnati answered with a seven-yard scoring run by Orlando Smith on a screen pass that was ruled a lateral.

Melvin Blue's three-yard TD run capped an 80-yard drive in just 1:54, but the Aggies missed the extra point and trailed 35-13 with 29 seconds left in the third quarter.

The Aggies got themselves back in the game two minutes into the fourth quarter. Cincinnati punter Doug Johnson could not handle a high snap and freshman linebacker Brent Passey picked up the loose ball and went 10 yards for the score.

W. TEXAS A&M 14, CINCINNATI 13

1951 Sun Bowl • Jan. 1, 1951 • El Paso, Texas

A missed extra point in the second quarter proved to be the difference as West Texas A&M edged Cincinnati, 14-13, in the 16th annual Sun Bowl.

The Buffaloes took a 7-0 lead three minutes into the second quarter. Bill Cross capped off a 57-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown run.

Cincinnati used the passing game to come back. On a 68-yard scoring drive, quarterback Gene Rossi completed a 36-yard pass to Joe Benzinger and short passes to Dick Jarvis and Dan McKeever. When Dan McKeever was injured on a running play, he was replaced by his brother, Tom, who carried three straight plays, the last a three-yard touchdown.

Jim Kelly's extra-point attempt went wide right and proved to be important as the game progressed.

Cincinnati claimed its first lead, 13-7, when Rossi threw a 17-yard touchdown pass to Bob Stratton and Bill Shalonsky added the extra point. A crucial play in the 69-yard drive came on third down at the UC 43 when Rossi completed a 22-yard pass to Kelly and a West Texas A&M penalty moved the ball to the Buffalo 20.

West Texas A&M used a trick play on a fake punt to score the game-winning touchdown. Faced with a fourth and long, punter Frank Wise moved under center, took the snap and lateraled to the right to quarterback Gene Mayfield. Mayfield completed a pass to Cross at the UC 40 and Cross broke several tackles to finish the 62-yard touchdown pass. Roy Lee Dunn added the extra point to give West Texas A&M a 14-13 lead.

Cincinnati could not take advantage of its best scoring chance in the fourth when Shalonsky's 35-yard field goal attempt went wide right.

West Texas A&M drove 79-yards to the UC one but the Bearcat defense held on a fourth down play. With time running out, the Bearcats moved to the Buffaloes' 27 on a long pass to Kelly, but the game ended when Rossi was sacked on successive plays.

Cincinnati used a strong defense and solid play on special teams to dominate Toledo, 33-13, in the fifth annual Glass Bowl.

After a scoreless first quarter the Bearcats recorded a safety when Jack Tracy trapped Rocket back Emerson Cole in the end zone. Following a Toledo fumble, UC's Bob Stratton scored the first of his two touchdowns on a 10-yard run. He later added a 29-yard TD early in the third quarter.

Gene Gibson showed his open-field running skills with a pair of touchdowns. He returned a punt 76-yards in the third quarter to give the Bearcats a 27-6 lead. On the next possession, Don Jansen intercepted a Toledo pass and pitched it to Gibson who returned it 80 yards for the score.

CINCINNATI 18, VIRGINIA TECH 6

UC made its first bowl appearance in the 1947 Sun Bowl, knocking off Virginia Tech 18-6.

The Bearcats played in their first-ever bowl game in school history, earning an 18-6 victory over Virginia Tech in the 12th annual Sun Bowl.

Both teams struggled offensively in the first half, due largely in part to the three inches of snow that fell in El Paso the day before the game.

The Bearcat offense dominated play in the second half. UC outtrushed the Gobblers, 369 to 34 for the game, scoring all three touchdowns on the ground.

After a scoreless first half, Cincinnati took the second half kickoff and drove 75 yards for the game's first score, a 13-yard run by sophomore Harold Johnson. After holding Virginia Tech to just three plays on offense in the next possession, the Bearcats regained possession and drove 52 yards for the second score, taking a 12-0 lead on junior fullback Hugo Sabato's one-yard run.

Virginia Tech cut the lead to 12-6 early in the fourth quarter when Ralph Beard capped off a 55-yard drive with a three-yard touchdown run.

Johnson emerged as the defensive leader for the Bearcats, intercepting a pass in the end zone late in the third quarter to stop a potential game-tying drive.

With time running out, Tech drove into Cincinnati territory, before Johnson made his second interception, returning it deep into Gobbler territory. Three plays later, Don McMillan scored on a quarterback sneak from three yards to provide the final margin.

Cincinnati finished the season with a 9-2 record, including wins over defending Big Nine champions Indiana and Michigan State.
