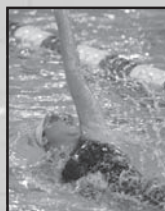

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THE UNIVERSITY OF CINCINNATI

The University of Cincinnati traces its origins to 1819, the year in which Cincinnati College and the Medical College of Ohio were chartered. In 1870, the City of Cincinnati established the University of Cincinnati, which later absorbed the earlier institutions. In 1906, the University of Cincinnati created the first cooperative education program in the United States through its College of Engineering. For many years, the University of Cincinnati was the second oldest and second largest municipal university in the country. In 1968, UC became a "municipally sponsored, state affiliated" institution, entering a transitional period culminating on July 1, 1977 when UC became one of Ohio's state universities. The University of Cincinnati is classified as a Research Extensive University by the Carnegie Commission, and is ranked as one of America's Top 25 public research universities.

UC has been the source of many contributions to society, including:

- ♦ the first electric organ
- ♦ the first oral polio vaccine
- ♦ the first observations of the National Weather Service
- ♦ the first safe anti-knock gasoline
- ♦ the first antihistamine
- ♦ the first use of lasers to remove brain tumors
- ♦ the first bachelor's degree program in nursing and first emergency medicine residency program
- ♦ the first degree program offered via satellite

CINCINNATI SPORTS FIRSTS

- ♦ Cincinnati hosted one of the first night football games in the U.S. in 1923.
- ♦ George Smith, captain of the 1934 football team, wore a device to protect a facial injury, a fore-runner of the facemask.
- ♦ In 1961, Hank Hartong became college football's first soccer-style kicker.
- ♦ UC was the first school to make five consecutive appearances in the men's basketball Final Four, 1959-1963.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

At the University of Cincinnati, excellence is a hallmark of the academic program. *U.S. News & World Reports* ranks 10 UC programs among the top 10 in the country, while another 21 programs are ranked among the top 50 in the nation.

Money Magazine's *Elite Values In Higher Education*, Kaplan's *Unofficial, Unbiased Insider's Guide to the 320 Most Interesting Colleges*, Octameron's *College Match: A Blueprint for Choosing the Best School for You* and Yahoo's *Internet Life* have all ranked the University of Cincinnati's programs among the best in the nation.

Undergraduate students in any college may apply to the University Honors Scholars Program. If selected as an Honors student, the rewards for being an outstanding student include smaller classes, honors housing, special advising and scholarships worth up to \$60,000 over four years.

UC's cornerstone scholarship program is Cincinnatus, which awards more than 1,400 scholarships totaling more than \$11 million.



A LOOK AT THE UNIVERSITY

- ♦ In fiscal year 2005, UC earned more than \$332 million in grants and contracts. Research funding has quadrupled in the past 20 years, and the university's National Science Foundation ranking has climbed from a placement of 76th to 46th.
- ♦ UC's annual endowment is \$1.03 billion, ranking 54th in the U.S. and 12th among public universities.
- ♦ UC offers 98 doctoral degree programs, 170 master's degree programs, 167 bachelor's degree programs and 139 associate degree programs.
- ♦ The Carnegie Commission has designated UC as a Research I university.
- ♦ The University of Cincinnati has an economic impact of over two billion dollars annually on the state's economy.
- ♦ The University of Cincinnati is the home of cooperative education. The first co-op program in America was offered at UC in 1906, and UC's co-op program is now the second largest in the country.
- ♦ The University of Cincinnati is the Greater Cincinnati area's fourth-largest employer with 9,000 employees (not counting student workers).
- ♦ UC's library system contains over three million books, and subscriptions to 39,787 periodicals—ranking it among the top research libraries in the country.

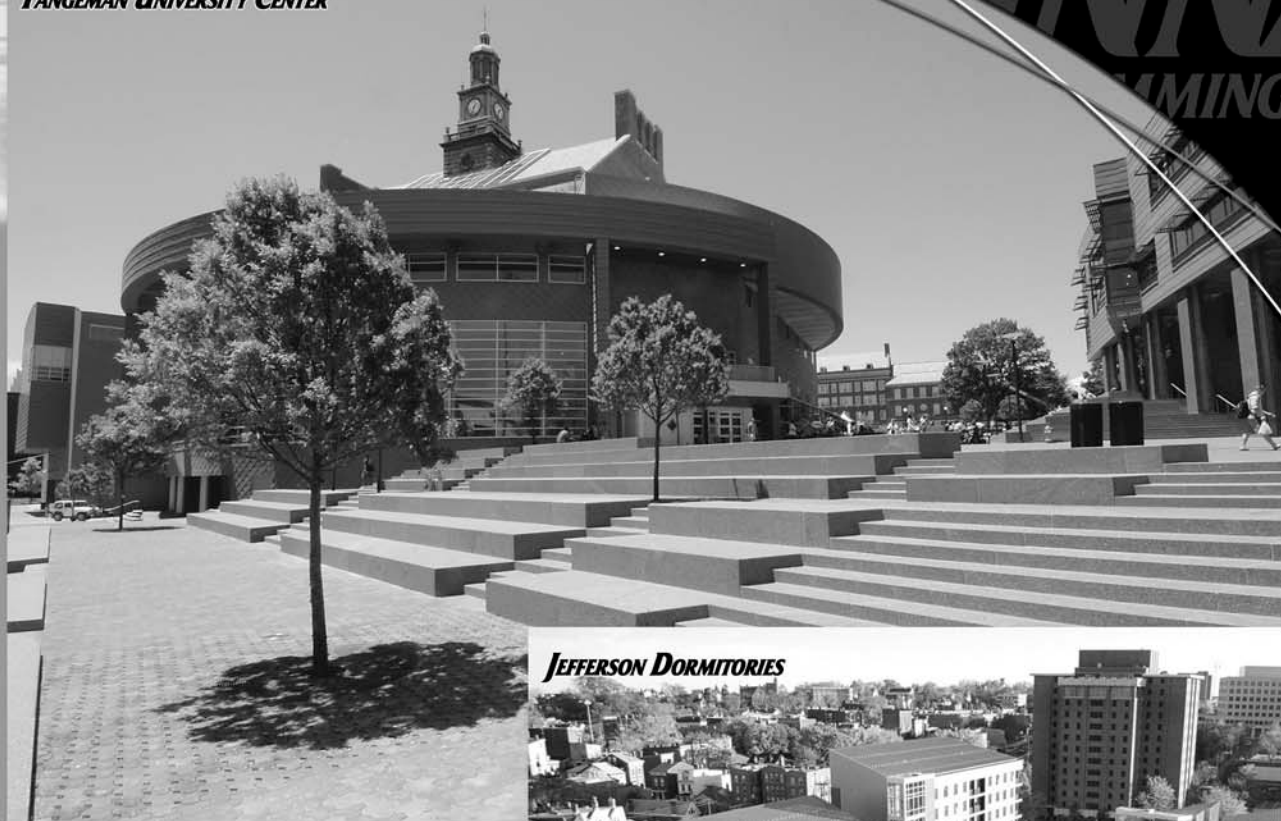

BIG EAST CONFERENCE



In 2006-07, the BIG EAST will be in its second year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference. The first year with 16 members was wrought with curiosity among those in the world of collegiate athletics and in the media, but the league thrived in its new alignment, enjoying significant success in the athletic arenas, on the playing fields and in the classroom.

The goals of the BIG EAST have remained constant throughout its history -- to compete at the highest level and to do so with integrity and sportsmanship.

In football last year, West Virginia garnered the attention of the college football world with its victory over Georgia in the Nokia Sugar Bowl. The Mountaineers were the BIG EAST's representative in the Bowl Championship Series. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads secured a league-record eight NCAA bids. Seven BIG EAST women's basketball teams earned NCAA berths.

In 2005-06, the BIG EAST welcomed five new members to increase its membership to 16: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida. Some were ready to call the new BIG EAST alignment too unwieldy, but the league showed that there can be strength in numbers even when that number is a large one.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets will contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 123 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

Last year, the Villanova women's cross country team was named the NCAA's Silver Anniversary Cross Country Program. The Wildcats have won seven NCAA team titles since 1981. Former Wildcat standout Carole Zajac was named the top individual performer of the women's cross country era.

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also

some of its best athletes. More than 350 student-athletes have earned Academic All-America honors. Last year, West Virginia's Joe Herber was named the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American of the Year in men's basketball.

The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. With the Syracuse men and the UConn women grabbing NCAA crowns the previous year, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in consecutive seasons. In fact, the BIG EAST has won five of the last seven women's basketball crowns and three of the last eight men's titles.

Moving proactively has been a consistent strategy for the conference that was formed in 1979. The BIG EAST has continually turned challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The inaugural women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. The BIG EAST Conference has enjoyed a leadership role nationally. Its student athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranchese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, moved into the Commissioner's chair in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST athletes have earned All America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.

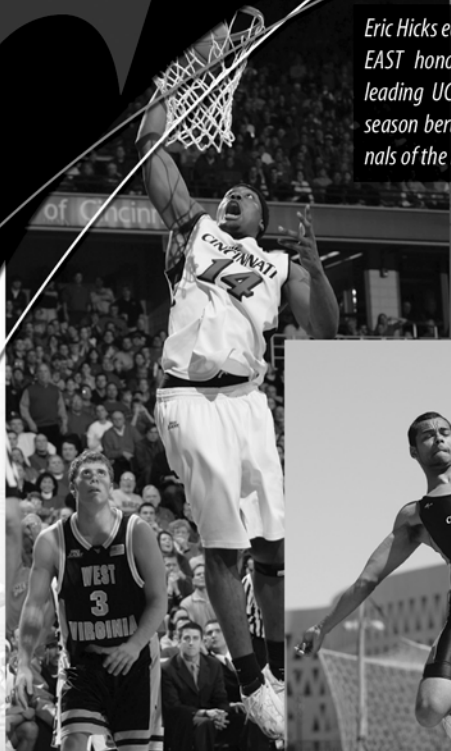

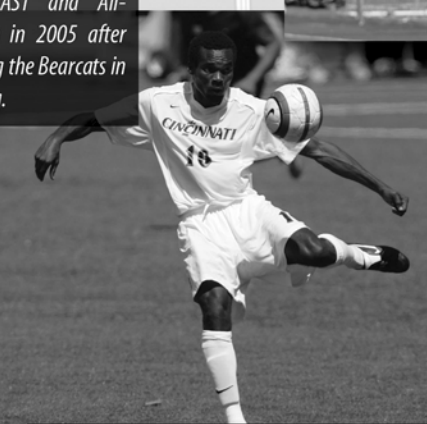
ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

Jessie Nevitt was named BIG EAST Rookie of the Year, first team All-BIG EAST and honorable mention All-American in 2005.

The University of Cincinnati Department of Athletics is nationally recognized as one of the most comprehensive Division I athletics programs in the nation. UC offers 18 intercollegiate sports, 10 for women and eight for men.

The last eight years will go down as one of the most successful eras ever at the University of Cincinnati. Bearcat teams have compiled a winning percentage over .600 in this time.

As the chart below illustrates, four of the most successful years in Bearcat history have taken place in the last eight years, including a .677 mark in 1999-2000, the highest percentage in 39 years.

CATAPULT

CINCINNATI ATHLETICS' DRIVE TO EXCELLENCE

BIG EAST Championships in every sport within the next five years, continued leadership by UC student-athletes in academics, and community engagement are the main goals of CATAPULT, an action plan for UC athletics unveiled by athletics director Mike Thomas.

Thomas's five-year vision for UC's 18-sport intercollegiate program was launched on the six-month anniversary of his hiring as AD. The plan focuses on three main initiatives: winning BIG EAST team championships, high-level academic achievement, and a comprehensive integration with the Greater Cincinnati Community.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

UC will win a BIG EAST championship in every sport within the next five years. The Bearcats completed their first year in the BIG EAST without claiming a league title, though almost every sport was competitive.

ACADEMICS

UC student-athletes will set the pace academically by continuing to lead the general student body in graduation rate and over a five-year period outperform the general student body in grade point average.

TOGETHER

UC student-athletes, coaches and staff will respect and honor the privilege of competing as Cincinnati Bearcats. All participants recognize that UC's goals cannot be achieved without engaging the UC family and the Cincinnati community.

RICHARD E. LINDNER VARSITY VILLAGE



The future arrived for the University of Cincinnati athletics program in May with the completion of the Richard E. Lindner Varsity Village.

The extensive renovation and upgrade of all of UC's athletics facilities, and the construction of some new venues, positions the Bearcat sports programs to compete among the nation's best.

The term "village" aptly applies because the close proximal location and interconnection of the facilities provides ease of use and access to services for all of the sports teams and their student-athletes, similar to that of a small town.

There was nothing small about the vision for Varsity

Village, a \$105 million project, over half of which is privately financed.

The centerpiece of the project is the construction of the new Richard E. Lindner Center, to serve as the home for all of the sports programs as well as the centralized support services.

Located between Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena, the Lindner Center is a futuristic eight-story structure which houses offices, locker rooms, and reception and meeting space for each of the sports teams. The administrative services and support areas are also housed in the building.

The emphasis of the Lindner Center programming is on the student-athlete. One entire floor of the building is devoted to the Nancy Hamant Academics Center, which contains study facilities for UC's 530 student-athletes, including over 80 computer stations.

A new athletics training center, equipped with state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment, including three hydrotherapy pools, is included in the Lindner Center. The University Health Services for students has been relocated to the Lindner Center and provides expanded

medical coverage conveniently located for UC student-athletes. An MRI diagnostic center is also part of the building.

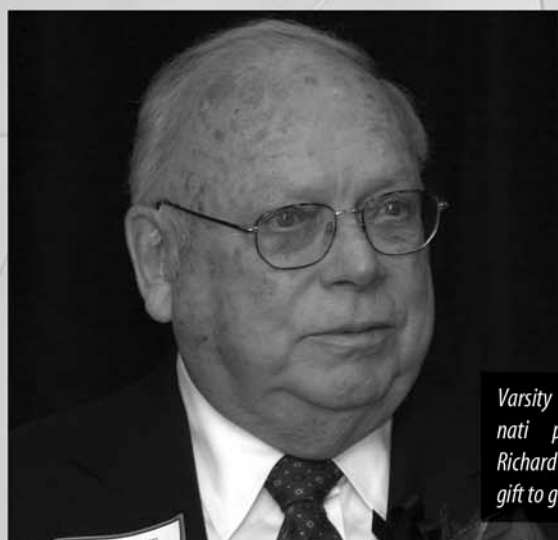
Space for strength and conditioning training in the adjacent Fifth Third Arena has been doubled to 18,000 square feet and has been furnished with the latest in weight training equipment. A new 12,000-square foot practice gymnasium will ease the scheduling of workouts.

While the Lindner Center provides for the present and future of UC athletics, it also recognizes and celebrates UC's proud past. The ground level of the five-story atrium features the George and Helen Smith Museum detailing the history of both the athletics program and the university. Sports histories are portrayed in graphic murals and on video screens. Terminals in the Jack Twyman Traditions Lounge enable former student-athletes and their families to look up photos and records of their participation. A five-story trophy case houses the Bearcats' championship memorabilia.

The unique building was designed by signature architect Bernard Tschumi. UC graduate Eva Maddox (DAAP 1966) orchestrated the design of the museum.

Varsity Village created three new sports venues and made significant upgrades and enhancements to two others.

A new baseball stadium, named for the late Cincinnati Reds owner and area philanthropist Marge Schott, opened late in the 2004 season. UC's tennis program benefits from a new on-campus tennis center. The swimming and diving teams have a new training and competition

home, the Keating Aquatics Center, in the nearby new student recreation center.

UC's track and soccer complex was totally renovated, and permanent seating for 1,400 was added, along with a press box, and reopened as the Ben and Dee Gettler Stadium.

Nippert Stadium, which has been home to UC football, and the activities of just about every other outdoor sport since 1902, has undergone significant improvements in seating and other accoutrements for the spectators, such as expanded concourse and concessions areas and a new video board. Teams benefit from field-level game-day locker rooms and the grass-like FieldTurf artificial playing surface.

Even UC's Marching Band benefited with the creation of the Rockvern Band Center.

Landscaping has created a major walkway, O'Varsity Way, that leads visitors through the heart of Varsity Village. The Raymond D. Sheakley Lawn and Victory Plaza provide gathering and activities space for UC fans attending events.

The eight-floor Richard E. Lindner Center stands nestled between Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena and houses the entire UC Department of Athletics.

The entire fifth floor is taken up by the Nancy Hamant Academic Center, which includes a computer lab with 71 work stations (left), a large study hall and 19 smaller meeting rooms.



The building includes a 335-seat auditorium for University use.



The Jack Twyan Traditions Lounge, named after one of three Bearcats to have their men's basketball number retired, features couches, fireplaces and electronic kiosks where former student-athletes can gather and view archived information on UC athletics.

The Sports Medicine Suite includes a 4,000-square foot treatment and rehab space, three hydrotherapy pools, a sauna and a steam room. Student Health Services, located on the third floor, houses X-ray facilities and a pharmacy.



The nation's largest trophy case stands 53 feet tall and stretches from the fourth floor to the eighth floor of the atrium.

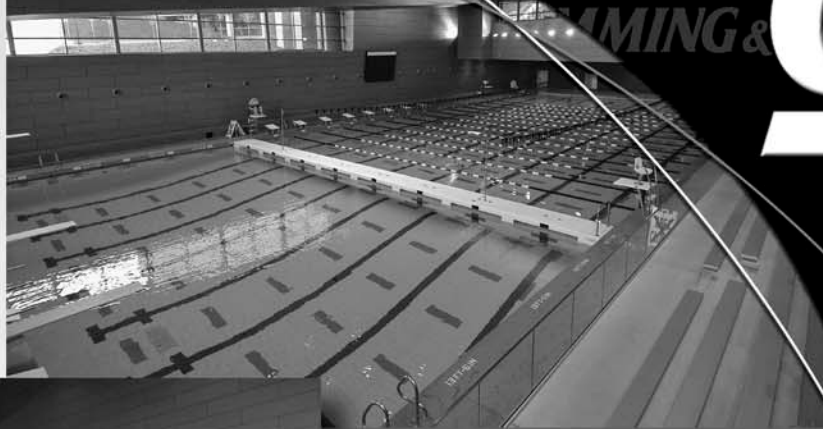

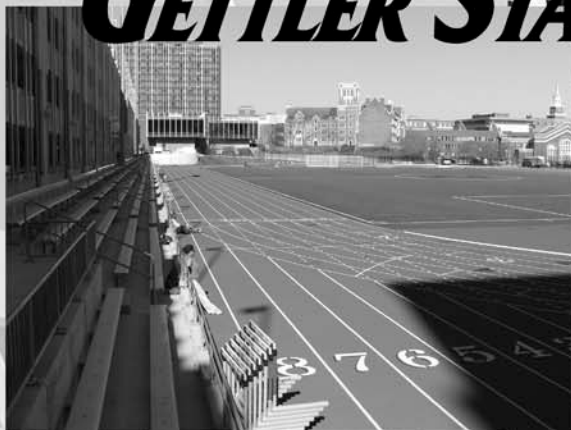

KEATING AQUATICS CENTER



The Keating Aquatics Center opened in February, 2006 and is named after Bill Keating, Sr., who was a Bearcat student-athlete (BBA 1950, JD 1950), member of the UC Athletics Hall of Fame, a recipient of the NCAA Silver Anniversary Medal, and a former Chairman of the Board of the University of Cincinnati Board of Trustees.

Part of the \$113 million Campus Recreation Center, the natatorium features an eight-lane, 50-meter swimming course with an integrated diving well. The pool contains 12,000 square feet of water surface and includes a moveable bulkhead that provides a high degree of flexibility in training course configuration.

The Campus Recreation Center and features a leisure pool as well as the varsity pool, a six court gymnasium, locker rooms, recreation offices, a food court, a juice bar overlooking the gym, a study lounge, administrative offices, weight/fitness areas and a climbing wall.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



Strength and conditioning is one of the most important ingredients of any successful college athletics program. To help Bearcat athletes maximize their athletic potential, UC combines a modern, comprehensive facility with the latest techniques in strength training.

The Richard E. Lindner Center provides a brand-new 18,000 square foot strength training facility. The new center includes over \$1 million in Hammer Strength equipment and a five-lane running track. It is almost three times the size of the previous facility.

The mirror-covered room is trimmed in red and black and features a tuflex floor made especially for weight training facilities. The modernized weight facility is highlighted by a quadraphonic sound system, making it the perfect environment for Cincinnati student-athletes to train to maximize their abilities.

Tim Swanger is the director of UC's strength training and conditioning facility. Swanger is an innovator and motivator, using computer to design programs to meet the specific needs of each individual, then working to help each reach his or her physical potential.

Strength and conditioning is an ongoing program. Programs are tailored to enable athletes to maintain strength during the peak physical demands of a playing season and increase strength through more extensive training during the off-season.

No area of the athletics program is given greater attention and emphasis than strength and conditioning. As a result, UC has become one of the nation's strongest college athletics programs.

ACADEMICS AND STUDENT SERVICES



Cincinnati annually ranks among the national leaders in team GPA. Last season six student-athletes earned academic all-America honors from the College Swimming Coaches Association of America. Additionally, two were named CoSIDA Academic All-District and twice in three quarters a men's swimmer was named UC's Scholar-Athlete of the Quarter in two of three quarters last year. A total of 18 members of the team were named BIG EAST Academic All-Stars.

The Academic Services Office works with coaches, faculty and administrators to help make the student-athlete's academic and athletic experience as enriching and rewarding as possible. The office helps student-athletes keep abreast of the eligibility requirements of their particular colleges, assists with the coordination of class schedules and monitors their progress in their respective programs and toward graduation.

Weekly meetings with athletic academic advisors are set up for all first-year student-athletes to better monitor their academic progress and assist with adjustment to college. Tutoring and educational assistance are also readily accessible.

THE UC TEAM APPROACH

To help new student-athletes adjust to college life, Cincinnati utilizes a mentorship program which pairs new student-athletes with members of the local community who are committed to helping the student-athletes enjoy their first year college experience.

UCTEAM, an acronym for University of Cincinnati Together in Excellence for Athletes through Mentoring, familiarizes student-athletes with UC's academic culture, helps them focus on responsibilities, and ultimately enriches their personal development and experience at the university.

NANCY HAMANT ACADEMIC CENTER

The opening of the Richard E. Lindner Athletic Center will pay huge dividends for student-athletes in terms of academics, as the building houses the spacious Nancy Hamant Academic Center on the entire fifth floor.

The center, named in honor of the longtime Faculty Athletics Representative, gives student-athletes a variety of ways to fulfill their study needs. The large study room is furnished to accommodate a variety of study habits and features 34 work areas. There are also 14 tutor rooms for more focused attention and five group meeting rooms.

Additionally, the Center includes a computer lab, equipped with 71 work stations, that provides a wide-range of computer and word-processing activities, as well as access to the internet.

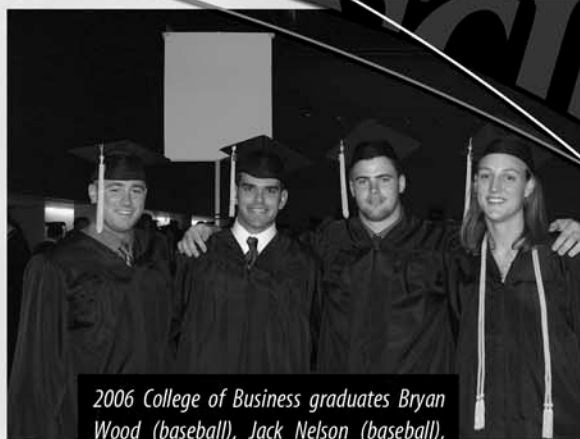

SERVICES PROVIDED FOR STUDENT-ATHLETES

Academic Advising: The UC Academic Services staff provides information regarding policies, procedures, course selection, selection of major and minor areas of study as well as NCAA and university guidelines for adequate academic progress.

Priority Registration: Student-athletes meet with an advisor in their college in order to obtain a checksheet and a graduation plan. The student-athlete then meets with an athletic academic advisor during priority registration in order to register for the quarter. Priority registration allows student-athletes to register for classes around practice and competition schedules.

Counseling: Individual work is done with student-athletes with specific concerns such as decision-making, adjustment to college, communications, relationships, test-anxiety and necessary study skills. Appropriate referrals are made to other campus resources.

Monitoring Academic Progress: Progress reports are used to gather classroom performance information from professors. This information is shared with the student-athlete and his/her coach so everyone can keep abreast of the current academic progress.

Tutorials: Services are provided for one-on-one and small group tutoring. Student-athletes may submit requests for a tutor assignment in most courses.

Career Development and Placement: The interests and strengths of each student-athlete are continually measured to prepare the student-athlete for a career beyond college. In addition to aiding career exploration and placement, this program provides assistance in securing vacation employment opportunities and internships.

SPORTS MEDICINE



The University of Cincinnati's sports medicine program is responsible not only for helping student-athletes make speedy recoveries from injuries, but in preventing injuries from occurring.

UC's sports medicine program is a comprehensive approach to the injury care and the wellness of the university's over 500 athletic participants, utilizing state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment with the latest methods in the care and prevention of injuries. Its objectives are simple; to prevent injuries, to rehabilitate injuries, to adjust to the stress following injuries and to educate student-athletes about various wellness issues.

The goal is to get UC's athletes back in the classroom and back on the playing field functioning at 100 percent capacity. The goal is attained in several ways. New student-athletes are carefully examined before they participate to detect potential problems. Student-athletes are afforded state-of-the-art therapeutic care.

The opening of the Richard E. Lindner Center in May 2006 provided a new, state of the art sports medicine facility that caters to the needs of UC's student-athletes. Features of the new center include over 4,000 square feet of space for treatment and taping, spacious office suites for training staff and physicians, a physicians exam area, pharmacy, and x-ray facilities. A highlight



is the hydrotherapy facility which has a three-level, 5,000 gallon, two-treadmill exercise pool, and two 12-person whirlpools (one for hot and one for cold therapy). The sports medicine facility is located one floor below the new University Health Services center, providing easy access to physicians and services. University Radiology operates an MRI diagnostic center within the new complex.

UC's athletics training staff, under the direction of Bill Walker, is the backbone of the sports medicine program. Trainers are present at every practice and event to monitor the health of the student-athletes and respond to injuries.

Dr. W. Kenneth Stephens, a fellow in the American College of Sports Medicine and member of the American Medical Society for Sports Medicine, has served as the Bearcats' team physician for the past 29 years. UC's University Health Service provides a staff of medical professionals accessible to student-athletes 24 hours a day.

Dr. Angelo Colosimo and the staff of the University Orthopaedics Associates of Cincinnati are on call to address orthopedic injuries, performing all orthopedic surgeries and supervising post-operation rehabilitation programs.

The UC medical college provides nationally-recognized specialists who are immediately accessible. University Hospital, a nationally-recognized medical center, is immediately adjacent to the campus, providing UC student-athletes the absolute best in health and medical care.

BEARCATS MAKE PUSH FOR BIG EAST, NATIONAL RECOGNITION

The University of Cincinnati swimming and diving programs hope to use their brand-new home to vault themselves back into the national spotlight.

One of the most storied athletics programs in Cincinnati history, the swimming squads struggled for the last four seasons without an on-campus facility in which to train and host invitationals and dual meets. Head coach Monty Hopkins had a difficult time recruiting high-caliber swimming talent to the university and team depth suffered.

The opening of the Keating Aquatics Center, a new eight-lane, Olympic-size pool, combined with membership in the BIG EAST Conference should boost recruiting efforts and help the coaching staff develop national contenders.

Men's Outlook

A large group of newcomers will add quantity as well as quality to the Bearcats men's squad in 2006-07.

The loss of David Gustavsson and Ryan Yearwood will be felt, but seniors Marcel Kleiner and Steve Marshall, along with sophomores Bjorn Mates and Jakub Carda are fast, talented swimmers that have the ability to fill the void.

Kleiner is a two-time NCAA 'B' qualifier in the sprint freestyles and holds the third-best marks in UC history in both the 50 and 100 freestyle events. Following the 2005-06 season, Kleiner was named a CoSIDA Academic All-District honoree as well as a CSCAA Academic All-American for the second straight season. Marshall holds the UC record in the 100 breaststroke after posting a 55.58 last season.

Mates and Carda made a major impact on the Bearcats as freshman last season. Mates already ranks in the top five in school history in both the 100 and 200 backstroke events and is part of a pair of school record-holding medley relay teams. The native of Germany, who earned CSCAA Academic All-American honors, finished second in the 200 back at the BIG EAST Championships. A native of the Czech Republic, the versatile Carda was the top Bearcat in the distance freestyles and the 400 IM, while also placing in the backstroke and breaststroke.

A large and talented freshman class will ease the pressure on the upperclassmen. Josh Schnieder, a Cincinnati native, was the 2006 state champion in the 50 freestyle despite the fact that his high school did not have a swimming team. He swam the early parts of the season with a cast after breaking his hand during football season.

Nick Saul of Napoleon, Ohio, finished second in the state in the 500 freestyle and will add needed depth in that event. Ryan Weitzel of Stow, Ohio and Bill Griffin out of Bristol, Ind., have impressed throughout preseason training. Rob Langford, a graduate of perennial state champion St. Xavier High School, returns to Cincinnati after spending one season at Fordham University.

Women's Outlook

A swimmer like Ann Degenstein comes around once in a generation. Her work ethic, ability level and BIG EAST championships will be very difficult for the Bearcats to replace. Seniors Gerdien de Jong and Randi Vogel will take that burden upon their shoulders.

De Jong, a native of the Netherlands, will be the Bearcats' most consistent scorer in the sprint freestyles. She posted an NCAA 'B' qualifying time in the 100 freestyle and held UC's top times in the sprints. She was also part of the school record-breaking 200 medley relay team.

Vogel, who sat out the 2004-05 season following her transfer from Tennessee, owns UC top five marks in the 100 and 200 backstroke after just one season. She met the NCAA 'B' standard in the 200 back and was also a part of the school record-breaking 200 medley relay team.

Annelie Jonsson, a native of Sweden, was the Bearcats' top scorer in the breaststroke last season and returns with a chance to make the NCAA cuts in both distances of the event. The versatile senior will also have an impact in the IM events.

Paola Rivas and Elyse Perez will score in the distance freestyles, while Karen Brasier will take over for Degenstein as the top swimmer in the butterfly events. Brasier, who is on co-op in UC's world-renowned architecture program, will try to fit training into her busy schedule and will rejoin the team on a full-time basis in January.

Several newcomers give UC a solid base upon which to build in the years to come. Freshman Alex Doyle, who finished second in the state in the 50 free and 100 free, will join former Anderson Barracudas club teammate and fellow freshman Jane Neyer on the 2006-07 roster.

Joining them will be Emily Misanik of North Canton, Ohio, and Shannon McCarthy, a transfer from the University of Missouri.

Freshman Elinore de Jong joins the de Jong lineage at UC, following in the footsteps of older sisters Marien (1999-2002) and current Bearcat Gerdien. She will compete in the freestyle and butterfly events.



MONTY HOPKINS

HEAD COACH

The University of Cincinnati swimming and diving program has reached national prominence under the tutelage of former Bearcats standout Monty Hopkins. After a middle-of-the-pack finish in UC's first season in the BIG EAST, the Bearcats are primed to move toward the top of the conference in the years to come.

The 2005-06 Bearcats finished fifth (men) and seventh (women) in the BIG EAST last year and Ann Degenstein earned the school's first-ever BIG EAST Championship, winning both the 100 and 200 butterfly. Degenstein qualified for the NCAA Championships, while the Bearcats earned 10 All-BIG EAST honors. Following the season, as is usually the case with a Monty Hopkins-coached team, UC garnered several academic awards. Degenstein and Marcel Kleiner earned CoSIDA Academic All-District honors and six Bearcats were named to the College Swimming Coaches Association of America Academic All-America teams.

In his 19th year as head coach of the men's and women's teams, Hopkins has used his wealth of competitive and coaching experience to annually produce conference champions and NCAA qualifiers. Owning a 203-184-1 dual meet record as the Bearcats' mentor, Hopkins has established himself as one of UC's most successful swim coaches.

Hopkins has coached two NCAA Champions, 16 All-Americans, 13 Academic All-Americans, and five Olympians during his tenure at UC.

His 2004-05 teams had one NCAA qualifier, Ann Degenstein, who earned All-American honors after finishing 11th and 14th, respectively, in the 100 and 200 butterfly. Four Bearcats earned Academic All-America honors in that season, and the men's and women's programs each finished 10th nationally in combined grade point average.

Hopkins directed the 2003-04 men's and women's teams to fourth-place finishes at the Conference USA Championships. Louise Gowens finished 32nd in the 200 butterfly at the NCAA Championships. UC's women's team was named a 2004 Academic All-American Team by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America.

UC, under Hopkins, claimed two Conference USA Swimmer of the Year awards in 2002-03. Scott Davison qualified for his third consecutive NCAA Championship and was named C-USA Men's Swimmer of the Year after setting a school record in the 500 freestyle with a time of 4:24.82, nearly a full second faster than the old mark. Ann Degenstein was named C-USA Freshman Swimmer of the Year after winning the 200 butterfly, setting a new C-USA record of 2:01.50.

The 2001-02 women's team captured the first-ever Conference USA Championship. For his efforts, Hopkins was named C-USA Coach of the Year. Four swimmers qualified for the NCAA Championships, with Ryan McNally and Maria Oberg each earning All-America honors.

In 2000-01, Hopkins directed the women's team to its fifth-straight National Independent Conference (NIC) title and the men to a second-place finish. The teams combined to take home nine individual conference titles, and three Bearcats participated in the NCAA Championships.

The 1997-98 campaign proved to be one of the most distinguished in the school's history. The men's and women's teams both claimed conference titles, with the men finishing 23rd at the NCAA Championship and the women

25th.

Hopkins' 1995-96 women's team left its mark when the Bearcats placed 16th at the NCAA Championships. Becky Ruehl became UC's first female national champion in any sport when she captured the 10-meter platform diving competition. She was named NCAA Diver of the Year for her efforts.

Hopkins became head coach at Cincinnati in 1989 after an 11-year club head coaching career, with stints as an assistant coach at Ohio State from 1981-83, Mission Viejo in 1985 and Louisiana State in 1988. He coached several world-class swimmers and national qualifiers, as well as over 40 junior national qualifiers in nine years as a USS head coach at Westerville Aquatic Club (Columbus, Ohio), Texas Aquatics (Ft. Worth, Texas) and perennial national power Lakeside Swim Team (Louisville, Ky.).

During his tenure at Lakeside, Hopkins coached a Pan-Am gold medalist and developed a 1988 Olympian. While at the Westerville Aquatic Club, he also coached the Westerville North High boys' team for two seasons and the girls' team for one year.

Hopkins, 50, was a four-year letterman and an NCAA qualifier for UC, serving as co-captain his senior season. A 1978 graduate of Cincinnati, Hopkins was a recipient of the Jimmy Nippert Award as the top UC male senior athlete. He earned all-state honors at Mariemont High School and was an AAU nationals and Olympic Trials qualifier with the Cincinnati Marlins before coming to UC.

Hopkins and his wife, Celeste, have a son, Daniel, and a daughter, Sarah.

Hewitt competed in varying distances in the individual medley, breaststroke, freestyle and backstrokes as a Bearcats swimmer from 1998-2002. Hewitt's times were consistently among the top five on the team all four years. He posted the top time on the team as a senior finishing the 200 IM in 1:53.42, good for a top-five finish in the Conference USA Invitational. 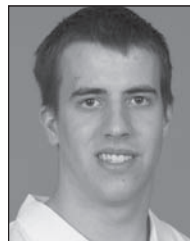

BEARCATS MAKE SPLASH IN FIRST BIG EAST CAMPAIGN

The 2005-06 men's and women's swimming and diving teams made a smooth transition to the powerful BIG EAST Conference. The men's squad placed fifth at the conference meet and the women, led by All-American Ann Degenstein, finished seventh.

UC earned 10 All-BIG EAST awards, with Marcel Kleiner leading the way, earning top-three finishes in the 50 free, 100 free and 200 free. Bjorn Mates was second in the 200 back, while the men's 200 and 400 freestyle and 200 and 400 medley relay teams all finished in the top three. Degenstein won both the 100 and 200 butterfly.

Following the season, six Bearcats were honored by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America as Academic All-Americans. Degenstein was a first-team Academic All-American for the second straight season, while Gerdien de Jong, David Gustavsson, Marcel Kleiner, Bjorn Mates and Ryan Yearwood each earned honorable mention status.

The Bearcats opened the doors to the Keating Aquatics Center in February, and had an on-campus facility in which to train for the first time in four years.

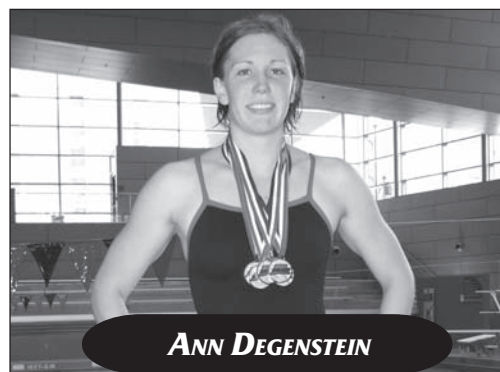

CoSIDA HONORS PAIR OF BEARCATS

Ann Degenstein and Marcel Kleiner were recognized by the College Sports Information Directors of America as Academic All-District honorees for the 2005-06 season. Degenstein holds a 3.72 grade point average as an Interior Design major within the challenging DAAP program. Kleiner, a second-year marketing major, holds a 3.90 GPA. The three-time All-BIG EAST honoree has provisionally qualified for the NCAA Championships in each of his first two campaigns at UC.

DEGENSTEIN DOMINATES

Ann Degenstein broke two school records, won a pair of BIG EAST Championships, and made her second straight appearance at the NCAA Championships, finishing 23rd and 28th, respectively in the 100 and 200 butterfly. She finished the season ranked 9th and 12th, respectively, in the nation in those events. The nine-time conference champion and two-time College Swimming Coaches Association of America Academic All-American earned CoSIDA Academic All-District honors for the first time in her career. She came away from her first BIG EAST Championships in 2006 with six medals, including UC's first two BIG EAST Championships. She also placed fourth in the 500 freestyle and swam on three medal-winning relay teams (200 medley, 400 medley, 400 freestyle).

NEWCOMERS BOOST SQUAD

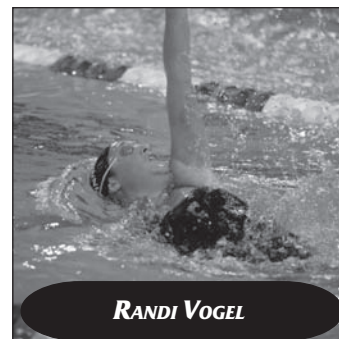
The 2005-06 men's team featured two freshmen that made an immediate impact. Bjorn Mates was an eight-time event champion, winning the 200 backstroke on five occasions. He was a second-place finisher in the 200 backstroke at the BIG EAST Championships and placed fifth in the 100 back. Classmate Jakub Carda won two 400 IM championships during the season and qualified for four events at the BIG EAST Championships. Junior Randi Vogel, in her first season at Cincinnati, won four individual titles and met the NCAA 'B' time in the 200 backstroke, while setting a school record in the 100 back. She finished sixth in the 200 backstroke and seventh in the 100 back at the BIG EAST Championships.

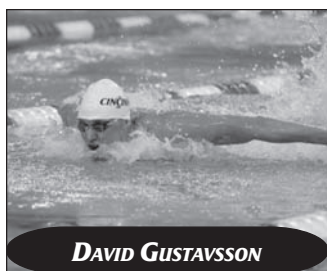

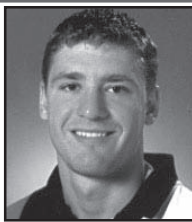

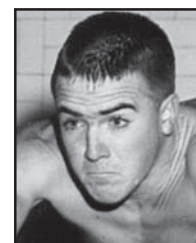
