# Head Coach » 10th season overall Second season at Cincinnati

Michelle Salmon took over the reigns of the Cincinnati women's soccer program in 2008, becoming the fourth head

women's soccer coach in school history after spending two seasons at Ball State.

In her first season at UC, Salmon led the Bearcats to their most successful season in the BIG EAST Conference. UC accomplished a 10-win season, earned its best finish in the BIG EAST regular season, and made a BIG EAST Women's Soccer Championship Quarterfinal appearance. Cincinnati's 10 wins was its best in a season since 2002.

Senior midfielder Kristin May was named to the 2008 all-BIG EAST conference women's soccer second team under Salmon's guidance. Additionally, May and classmate Kim Sykes were named all-Ohio first and second team, respectively.

Academically, Sykes earned her third College Sports Information Director's of America (CoSIDA) Academic All-District honor, 13 players were placed on the coveted Topcat scholar list (3.5-4.0 GPA) and another five players were named to the Bearcat Honor Roll (3.0-3.49 GPA).

Rounding out the successful 2008 season was the announcement

of Kim Sykes earning UC's Female Scholar-Athlete Award and earning the most prestigious female-athlete award at Cincinnati, the Helen Norman Smith Award.

Salmon guided the Ball State soccer program to unprecedented heights in her two seasons at the helm of the Cardinals. She led the team to its first ever Mid-American Conference regular-season championship in 2006 and wasted no time capturing the programs' second in 2007. The two-time MAC Coach of the Year held a 26-9-5 record, including a 17-3-2 mark in league play, while at BSU.

Salmon led Ball State to a 13-5-2 record in 2007, which included a 9-1-1 mark in MAC play. The Cardinals became the first team in MAC history to win back-to-back outright regular-season titles, while the nine MAC victories tied for the most in a single season in Ball State history. The Cardinals finished the season ranked 10th in the Great Lakes Region by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America and 14th in the Great Lakes Region by *Soccerbuzz*.

Ball State received numerous accolades for its play in 2007 as a program-record seven different players were named to all-MAC teams. The seven players honored are tied for the most ever in MAC history by a single team. Ball State also excelled in the classroom as the Cardinals placed a program-record four players on the Academic all-MAC squad.

The Cardinals were led by the top defensive unit in the Mid-American Conference and one of the top squads in NCAA Division I lin 2007. Ball State only allowed 13 goals against for the year and just five goals against in MAC play. The Cardinals finished 16th in the nation in goals against average (0.626) and 35th in shutout percentage (0.50). The five goals allowed in conference play are the fewest allowed by a MAC team in a 10-game plus season. Ball State posted a school record seven straight shutouts during the 2007 season and finished the year with 10 total shutouts.

In her first season at BSU, Salmon guided the Cardinals to their first ever Mid-American Conference regular-season championship with a 13-4-3 overall record and an 8-2-1 mark in MAC action. The Cardinals' 13 victories were tied for third most wins in a single season, while the eight conference wins are tied for most in program history. Salmon guided the Cardinals to a regional ranking in nine out of the 13 weeks during her first season (Great Lakes Region — *Soccerbuzz*). Under her tutelage, the Cardinals excelled both on and off of the field. The Cardinals had four players earn first-team all-MAC honors, marking the first time in program history that feat was accomplished. She also placed three players on the NSCAA All-Region team — the first time BSU has had multiple players on the all-Region squad. Senior midfielder Amy

Holst also became the Cardinals first ever ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American, earning second team accolades. BSU also had three players named Academic All-MAC under Salmon's guidance.

Prior to Ball State, Salmon spent six seasons as head coach at University of Maryland-Baltimore County. In just her second year at the helm of the program, she led the squad to the Northeast Conference Tournament finals and tutored the Retrievers to a second-place league finish with an 11-6-2 mark. A former all-American in soccer at Maryland, Salmon served as UMBC's assistant coach in 1999 before being appointed head coach prior to the 2000 season.

Salmon, who holds a USSF `A' license, served as a senior regional staff member of the United States Youth Soccer Association, where she helped evaluate players' development and impact on the regional scene. She has also been the assistant coach of the United States Under-15 National Team and served as the USYSA Under-16 regional team head coach.

In the summer of 2008, Salmon served as one of eight U.S. Under-14 National Program staff coaches who interacted at the Under-14 level between National, State and Region coaches and administrators. As one of the coaches, she helped to discover the top young players in the nation and took part in U.S. Soccer's Development Academy in Carson, Calif.

Salmon captained the Maryland Terrapins in 1997 and 1998 and led the program to three straight NCAA Tournament appearances from 1995 through 1997. In 1996, she was selected as a preseason all-America candidate. She finished her outstanding career second on the Terrapins' all-time assists list.

Salmon graduated from Maryland in 1998 with bachelor's degrees in government and politics as well as criminology and criminal justice.

Salmon participated on the United States Olympic Festival squad in 1998 and represented the United States as a member of the Under-20 National Team from 1993 to 1995, as well as the Under-16 Team in 1991.

Salmon was an all-American as a prep standout at Old Mill High School (Md.) and was inducted into the school's Hall of Fame. She still holds the Anne Arundel County scoring record with 90 goals and 15 assists.





# **CHRISKOUNS**

### Associate Head Coach » 2nd season

Chris Kouns, former head coach at Jacksonville University, joined the University of

Cincinnati women's soccer staff as an assistant in 2008 and was promoted to associate head coach after one season with the Bearcats.

Kouns was instrumental in Cincinnati's most successful season since 2002 as the Bearcats finished the season 10-7-3 overall and advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2008 BIG EAST Championship. He is UC's recruiting coordinater and also assists with compliance and eligibility, camps and clinics, team travel and match analysis.

Kouns spent four seasons on the sidelines at Jacksonville, where he led the Dolphins to the 2006 Atlantic Sun Tournament Championship and the program's second trip to the NCAA College Cup. JU made the A-Sun Tournament all four years of his tenure. A talented recruiter, Kouns brought in one A-Sun Freshman of the Year and his players earned six all-conference and five all-freshman mentions. His teams also fared well in the classroom, as Jacksonville earned three straight NSCAA Team Academic Awards from 2004-2006 and had 54 players earn A-Sun All-Academic honors.

Kouns spent the 2003 and 2004 seasons as an assistant coach at the University of Pennsylvania. In 2004, he helped lead the Quakers to a 9-5-3 mark and a fourth-place finish in the lvy league. During his time at Penn, he helped develop two all-lvy League performers, while the Quakers were ranked as high as No. 10 in the NSCAA Mid-Atlantic Regional rankings. Kouns also acted as the recruiting coordinator for the 2003-04 recruiting class, which was considered one of the best in school history.

Prior to coaching at Penn, Kouns spent the 2002 season as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at Georgia State. He helped the Panthers to a nine-win season and a berth in the A-Sun Tournament. Two of Kouns' recruits earned A-Sun all-freshman team accolades.

Kouns was an assistant coach at Samford University from 2000-02. During that span, he helped guide the Bulldogs to 16 wins and a spot in the 2001 A-Sun tournament for the second time in school history. The 2000 squad also posted a school-record 1.54 goals against average, while two of his recruits earned A-Sun all-freshman team honors in 2001.

Kouns began his collegiate coaching career as head coach at Union (Ky.) College, where he led Bulldogs to a 15-9-0 overall record and the Mid-South Conference Tournament Championship in 1999. The squad featured the MSC Player of the Year and all-time leader

in goals for college soccer, Juliana Filipe.

He started his coaching career as head coach at Fayette County (Ga.) High School from 1993-98, where Kouns posted an 85-29-3 record and made five appearances in the Georgia High School Association Final Four. In 1993, the Tigers earned a No. 25 national ranking and Kouns was tabbed as the *Atlanta Journal-Constitution* Co-Coach of the Year. In his six seasons, the Tigers never finished lower than No. 5 in the GHSA state rankings and captured two region championships.

Kouns graduated cum laude from Mars Hill College (N.C.) with a bachelor's degree in history and psychology in 1992. A four-year letter winner for the Lions as a defender, he earned South Atlantic Conference Honor Roll honors all four years. In 1992, Kouns earned first-team NAIA Academic All-America honors and was a GTE-CoSIDA Academic All-America finalist.

Kouns has earned a United States Soccer Federation 'A' License and a NSCAA Premier Diploma. He has served on the Olympic Development Program Region III staff and has conducted state mini-camps in Arkansas as well as the regional camp in Alabama. He has also been a member of the Region I ODP Regional staff and on the state coaching staffs in Pennsylvania, Georgia and Alabama.

Kouns is married to Tammy Allen-Kouns and they have one son, Caden.







# AMANDAMARTIN

### Assistant Coach » 2nd season

A former assistant women's soccer coach at the University of Oklahoma, Amanda Martin begins her second season as an assistant coach for the University of Cincinnati women's program. Martin coaches the UC goalkeepers and assists with compliance and eligibility, team travel, academic oversight, and alumni and booster relations.

In her first season at Cincinnati, the Bearcats qualified for the BIG EAST Championship for the first time and advanced to the quarterfinal round. Junior goalkeeper Andrea Kaminski recorded four shutouts and had 86 saves, ranking her fifth in the final BIG EAST conference regular-season statistics.

Martin comes to Cincinnati after serving one season as an assistant at Oklahoma, where she was responsible for goalkeeper training. OU goalkeeper Jenny Nichols was twice named BIG XII Goalkeeper of the Week under Martin's watch.

Prior to her stint at Oklahoma, Martin spent one season at Charlotte, where she worked with the 49ers' goalkeepers. Under her tutelage, UNCC keepers recorded the school's lowest goals-against average (GAA) in four years. Additionally, Martin's goalies combined to record five shutouts, which tied the most by a 49ers club in the last five years. Freshman Lauren Brown was named to the Atlantic-10 all-Rookie Team after finishing the year with a perfect 6-0 record and one shutout for the A-10 champs.

Martin graduated in May 2006 from Saint Louis University with a degree in communications, where she also put together an impressive playing career for the Billikens.

The Franklin, Tenn., native finished her soccer career at Saint Louis as the career leader for goals-against average (0.65). She also ranked second all-time at Saint Louis with 19 shutouts and 34 wins in over 4,100 minutes of action in 51 games played during her three-year career.

Prior to transferring to Saint Louis, Martin began her collegiate career at the University of Arizona where she started nine games and recorded two shutouts as a freshman. As a senior goalkeeper at Saint Louis, Martin played a vital role in helping lead the Billikens to their first appearance in the NCAA Tournament in 2005. The postseason appearance came after the program captured the A-10 regular season and tournament titles. During her final season, Martin was 9-2 and recorded a 0.91 goals-against average in 11 starts.

Martin earned first-team all-Conference USA honors as a junior during the 2004 season. During that campaign, she set the Saint Louis school record with a 0.53 GAA, which was also the seventh-lowest mark in the nation that season. Martin also led C-USA with a 0.20 GAA in conference play in 2004.

In addition to playing soccer on the collegiate level, Martin was a member of the W-League's Charlotte Lady Eagles team from 2003-2005.

### Volunteer Assistant »2nd season

Former professional soccer player Kyle Swords was appointed as the Bearcats volunteer assistant coach in 2008. He assists the UC program with on-field instruction, scouting, and provides in-depth training assistance.

Prior to joining the UC staff, Swords spent

four seasons as the head boys varsity soccer coach at Loyola Blakefield High School in Towson, Md. Under Swords' guidance, Loyola Blakefield was the 2005 Maryland Interscholastic Athletic Association champions, earned national and regional rankings, and was honored with the NSCAA Team Academic Award. Swords also served as a volunteer assistant coach at Goucher College and was an assistant coach

for the Maryland Olympic Development Program during his stint in Maryland.

Swords earned his bachelor of business administration degree from James Madison in 1996. He was a member of the JMU soccer team from 1992-1996, contributing to three Colonial Athletic Association championships and advancing to the NCAA Tournament every season — twice advancing to the quarterfinals.

After college, Swords continued his soccer career as a member of the A-League Hershey Wildcats (1997-2001), the Charleston Battery (2002), and the Harrisonburg City Islanders (2004). Additionally, he played professional indoor soccer, serving as a captain on the Harrisonburg Heat (1997-2001) and won the MISL championship with the Baltimore Blast (2003).

Swords is married to UC lacrosse coach Lellie Swords.

Monica Rimai, JD, is the University of Cincinnati's Interim President. She has served as Senior Vice President for Administration and Finance at UC since 2006 and retains that title in addition to her presidential duties. She is the 26th president of UC.

She was initially recruited to the university in 2005. In her role in Administration and Finance, she has led the effort to restructure the university's finances, paying down a significant structural deficit, opening up participation in the budget-setting process, introducing performance-based budgeting, strengthening ethics and regulatory compliance, and reorganizing administrative areas for improved efficiency.

Prior to joining UC, Rimai spent five years at the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, including two years as interim Vice Chancellor for Administrative Affairs, the principal administrative officer for the university. Rimai has experience as an assistant U.S. attorney, municipal attorney and as an attorney in private practice.

She earned her JD degree from the University of Michigan in 1987, preceded by a bachelor's degree in history from the same university in 1984.

#### **DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS**



A 24-year veteran towards our collective goals in the three components of our of college athletics administration, Thomas was named as the University of Cincinnati's

athletes, Thomas has championed student-athlete development and significant external growth, while also authoring a detailed plan for competitive success in the BIG EAST Conference and on the national level

In May of 2006, Thomas introduced his vision for Bearcats Athletics, aptly titled CATAPULT. Thomas's five-year vision for UC's 18-sport intercollegiate program was launched on the six-month anniversary of his hiring. The plan focuses on three main initiatives: winning BIG EAST team championships, high-level academic achievement, and a comprehensive integration with the UC Campus and Greater Cincinnati Community.

CATAPULT - an acronym for championships, academics, and together - sets a goal that in the next five years UC will win a BIG EAST championship in every sport; UC's student-athletes will lead the general student body in graduation rate and grade-point average; and UC's student-athletes and coaches will engage the UC campus and the Cincinnati community in service.

By the end of 2008-09, the third year under the CATAPULT plan, UC's sports teams continue to excel in academics as 11 of the 18 sports programs achieved a grade-point average (GPA) of 3.0 or higher and the student-athletes continued to graduate at a rate of 16 percent higher than the overall student body. Those numbers will continue to grow as more and more students receive the benefits of the recently expanded and redefined academic services office and the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program. In 2007-08, Cincinnati was second in the 16-member BIG EAST with five teams garnering BIG EAST Academic Excellence Awards for posting the highest grade-point average in their respective sports (football, men's cross country, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, and indoor track and field).

"It is exciting to see our student-athletes and staff working together and making significant progress in so many areas, so quickly," says Thomas. "We will continue to progress as we work

The football team made program history in head coach Brian Kelly's third season at the helm. Kelly led UC to a school-record 11 wins in 2008, along with the school's first BIG EAST Conference Championship, and an appearance in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl, the first Bowl Championship Series appearance by Cincinnati. The Bearcats' 21 wins since 2007-08 marks the best two-year stretch in school history, and the first time UC has won 10 or more games in back-to-back seasons.

The UC volleyball team also posted a historic year in the fall as it claimed its first BIG EAST title since joining the league and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament for just the second time in program history. Four Bearcats earned conference honors, including Jessie Nevitt, who became the first player in UC volleyball history to earn first-team all-conference honors four times in a

All told, UC Athletics produced five all-Americans, one all-Region selection, and 28 all-BIG EAST honorees in 2008-09.

"Spreading the Bearcats' message is vital to our continued brand building efforts and our charge to reach out to our fans, alumni, and Greater Cincinnati Community and share the excitement of being a Bearcat," says Thomas. "I am very proud of the strides that we are making in all areas of UC Athletics. Our achievement is coming as a result of working together as a team. Our student-athletes and staff are setting the bar high and then reaching their goals, which is fun to be a part of."

In March 2007 UC Athletics was recognized in the 2006-07 Diversity in Athletics Award, presented by the Laboratory for Diversity in Sport at Texas A&M University. The award recognizes the NCAA Division I athletics departments that excel in various areas of diversity. UC was one of just 10 programs nationwide to earn the Diversity in Athletics Award for the graduation of African American male student-athletes.

On the external side, the University of Cincinnati is growing at a tremendous rate

UC established single-season attendance records for football in each of the past two years, as it has posted eight of the Top-12 crowds in Nippert Stadium history. In just four years at UC, Thomas has seen the average attendance in football skyrocket as it has almost doubled (16,016 to 31,965).

In terms of donor development, the UCATS office has reached all-time highs for participation with over 3,800 donors joining the club in 2008-09 (double its total two years ago) and annual donations exceeding \$5 million. Thomas' work on the multi-phase "Raising the Bar" capital campaign, which will fund various initiatives for the football program, was crucial in program raising its first \$5 million over a six-week period.

Fundraising and major gifts are on-going processes at UC with plans to build a new outdoor sports complex with a bubble which will serve as a practice venue for football and a competition site for lacrosse. The department is also studying the potential renovations and or expansions of Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena.

Those renovations are import because two months before the first football game of 2009, season ticket sales for UC football broke the all-time record (11,500) and were approaching 14,500 season ticket holders before the start of the 2009 season.

Beginning in the fall of 2008, all UC teams were outfitted exclusively in adidas footwear, uniforms, training apparel, and accessories as the department signed its first across-the-board shoe and apparel contract. The four-year, \$14.5 million contract aligns UC with other adidas marketing partners such as the NFL, MLS, and an 11-year exclusive all-league partnership with the NBA.

Later in 2008-09, Thomas reached an agreement with IMG College, a division of IMG Worldwide, for a new 12-year multimedia rights partnership worth more than \$30 million in guaranteed payments to the University.

Prior to coming to UC, Thomas spent five years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Akron and seven years as associate athletic director at the University of Virginia, an institution known for achieving impressive success both academically and athletically, before bringing that model to Akron. Virginia finished in the top 25 in the Director's Cup in each year of Thomas' tenure there while at the same time was in the top ten nationally in student-athlete graduation rates.

Under Thomas' direction, Akron rose from last place to second among Mid-American Conference schools in the Director's Cup annual rankings. Simultaneously, Akron vaulted from last to second place in the MAC Academic Achievement Awards. Thomas increased the financial base of the Akron athletics program through increasing corporate sponsorship levels by 500 percent and boosted annual giving to athletics to its highest level in the school's history. Community support was rallied, with marked increases shown in football and basketball attendance. During this time period, the Zips won their first MAC football championship and the hiring of men's basketball coach Keith Dambrot has led to unparalleled success on

Support services and facilities for academic support for studentathletes were significantly increased, which resulted in a significant improvement in grade point averages and graduation rates of UA student-athletes.

Thomas coordinated over \$140 million in facility construction and renovation, including \$25 million in capital improvements at Akron, including a new indoor fieldhouse, a football practice complex, and a softball facility. He also spearheaded the new football stadium and was instrumental in the initial fundraising and planning stages of the facility which is currently under construction on the Akron campus and set to open in the fall of 2009.

Recognized for his administrative acumen by his peers, Thomas presently serves on several national and conference committees, including the NCAA Division I Championship/Sports Management Cabinet (where he also serves as the NCAA men's basketball liaison to the cabinet), the NCAA Men's Basketball Issues Committee, and he also chairs the BIG EAST Championship and Competition Committee. Thomas has also previously served as a member of the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet, the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Issues Committee, the NCAA Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, the NCAA Postseason Bowl Licensing Subcommittee, and the Division 1A Athletics Director's Association Legislative Review Committee.

Twice during his career, Thomas has received distinction for his efforts and dedication as a director of athletics, garnering the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletics Director Award in 2005 at Akron and then again in April of 2008 at Cincinnati.

Prior to his experience at Virginia, Thomas spent seven years at the University of Denver as assistant athletic director for internal operations, and one year at the University of Iowa in marketing and promotions.

Thomas, 49, received his B.S. degree in Business Administration from Colorado State University in 1983, and his M.S. degree in Athletic Administration from Western Illinois University in 1986. He and his wife, Jenifer, have four children: Vince, Joey, Mick, and
