Head Coach » First season overall First season at Cincinnati

Jamelle Elliott, a former student-athlete and assistant coach at Connecticut, was named the University of Cincinnati's eighth head women's basketball coach on May 5, 2009.

Elliott has spent the better part of the last two decades with the Connecticut women's basketball program and Hall of Fame head coach Geno Auriemma, the last 12 years as an assistant coach. She has been a part of six national championships, including the Huskies' 2009 undefeated championship run, and won a title as a player, helping UConn to the 1995 championship, the first in the school's history.

Building on her success as a player for the Huskies, Elliott has helped guide UConn to a 402-36 (.918) record in her 12 years as an assistant coach, leading the team to seven NCAA Final Four berths in that span. In conference action, UConn has won the BIG EAST Conference regular season

title in 10 of her 12 seasons, while also claiming a total of nine tournament crowns.

She has mentored some of the game's best post players, including all-Americans Swin Cash, Asjha Jones, Tamika Williams, 2009 Final Four Most Outstanding Player Tina Charles, and 2009 National Player of the Year Maya Moore.

Elliott, a four-year letterwinner, helped build the UConn dynasty as a player and finished her career ranked No. 2 among UConn's all-time rebounding leaders (1,054), No. 5 in BIG EAST career rebounding (558), and No. 11 in UConn career scoring (1,387).

Elliott, at the time, became only the second player in UConn history to surpass the 1,000-point and 1,000-rebound milestones. She is among the Connecticut career leaders for games played with 135, never missing a single game or practice in her four years. UConn posted an overall record of 117-18 (.867) during her career as a player.

During her senior year, Elliott was honored by The UConn Club as its Outstanding Senior Athlete. She was also named the Most Outstanding Player at the *Hartford Courant* Connecticut Classic and was a member of the 1995 NCAA Mideast Regional All-Tournament Team.

After graduating from Connecticut with a degree in business management in 1996, Elliott went on to earn her graduate degree in sports management at UConn in 1997.

Elliott, a native of Washington, D.C., was named to the *Washington Post* all-Metro Team as well as being named Scholar-Athlete at H.D. Woodson High School.

MARKEHLEN

Assistant Coach » 1st season at Cincinnati

Mark Ehlen makes his return to the city of Cincinnati, joining the Bearcats women's basketball coaching staff as an assistant coach. Ehlen has 22 years of Division I head coaching experience, all in the state of Ohio, posting a 362-279 overall record in stints at Toledo and Xavier.

Ehlen, one of the winningest coaches in Mid-American Conference history, spent 13 seasons (1996-2008) at Toledo, earning four MAC Coach of the Year awards and leading the Rockets to eight MAC titles and six postseason berths. A two-time Women's Basketball Coaches Association District 4 Coach of the Year, Ehlen posted a 240-149 record and finished his career at Toledo second in MAC history in conference wins and fifth in overall winning percentage. His 1998-99 team was ranked No. 25 in the final Associated Press poll.

Ehlen teams also have a penchant for performing well in the classroom. In Ehlen's tenure, Rocket players were selected first-team Academic All-MAC eight times and Academic All-District IV first-team seven times, including one CoSIDA Academic All-America pick. The Rockets' success in the classroom was recognized by the WBCA's Academic Top-25 Team Honor Roll four times during his tenure. In 2001-02, the Rockets posted a 3.465 overall team GPA to finish second nationally among more than 300 Division I programs. The Rockets finished in the top eight on three other occasions and posted a 100% graduation rate for four-year players during Ehlen's tenure.

In nine seasons (1986-96) on the bench at Xavier, Ehlen won 122 games and led the Musketeers to the first NCAA Tournament appearance in school history in 1993. He helped XU to the Midwestern Collegiate Conference regular season title in 1992 and the conference tournament title in 1993. His charges were excellent in the classroom as well, holding above a 3.0 grade point average during his nine-year tenure and achieving a 100% graduation rate for four-year players during that span.

Prior to Xavier, Ehlen spent one season as an assistant coach at Dayton, helping the Flyers to an 18-12 record and a second-place finish in the North Star Conference in 1985-86.

Ehlen is an accomplished high school coach as well, having spent five seasons (1979-85) at Forest Park High School in Cincinnati. He compiled a 100-18 overall record and

led Forest Park to the 1984 state championship, the first state title for a Cincinnatiarea girl's basketball team. He twice earned Ohio High School Coach of the Year honors and was inducted into the Greater Cincinnati Basketball Hall of Fame in 2002. A four-time Hamilton County High School Coach of the Year, he also earned Cincinnati High School Coach of the Year honors in 1983 and 1984.

A 1975 graduate of Ohio State, Ehlen received a bachelor's degree in communications education. He also earned a master's degree in broadcast communications from Bowling Green in 1979.

Ehlen and his wife, Mimi, have a 12-year-old daughter, Eliza.







LARITA WILCHER

Assistant Coach » 1st season at Cincinnati

LaRita Wilcher, an 11-year collegiate coaching veteran, joins the UC staff under first-year head coach Jamelle Elliott. Wilcher will be serve as the staff's recruiting coordinator.

Wilcher earned her bachelor's degree in kinesiology from Long Beach State in 1998 where she played one year for the 49ers after transferring from Lewis University.

Wilcher and her husband Eric have a three-year-old son, Eric James Wilcher.

Wilcher spent the 2008-09 season at Louisiana Tech, helping the Lady Techsters to a 21-13 mark and the eighth Western Athletic Conference regular season title in the last nine seasons. The Lady Techsters were selected to play in the Women's National Invitational Tournament, advancing to the second round.

Prior to Louisiana Tech, Wilcher forged an impressive stint at South Alabama where she helped the Lady Jaguars program take giant strides in the Sun Belt Conference. Wilcher served as an assistant coach at USA since 2002 where she was instrumental in helping lead the Jaquars to four winning seasons, two Sun Belt regular season titles and two postseason appearances. In her first two seasons as an assistant coach at South Alabama, the Jaguars won the Sun Belt Conference West Division regular season title and advanced to the first round of the WNIT.

Wilcher was instrumental in recruiting and signing 2004 Sun Belt Conference Freshman of the Year Whitney Woodard and 2005 Sun Belt Newcomer of the Year JoAnna Williams. During her six seasons at South Alabama, the Jaguars recorded a mark of 103-74, a stark turnaround from the six years prior to Wilcher's arrival, in which the team posted a 63-103 record.

Wilcher served for one season as an assistant coach at New Mexico State (2001-02), and got her start at Division II Lewis University (1998-2001) in her hometown of Chicago.

E. Todd Moore joins the Bearcats with 19 years of coaching experience at the high school, college, and A.A.U. levels.

Moore spent the 2007-08 season as coach and director of player development at Apex Academies, a prep school and training center in Pennsauken, N.J. He spent the previous two seasons as varsity girl's coach at Potter's House Christian Academy (2005-06) and Esprit de Corps Center for Learning (2006-07), both in Jacksonville, Fla.

Moore got his start at Simon Gratz High School in Philadelphia, Pa., as an assistant boy's basketball coach, where he worked with eight Division I signees and two future NBA players. He coached NBA all-star Rasheed Wallace to USA Today National Player of the Year honors in the 1992-93 season at Simon Gratz and helped the school to a 31-0 mark, a national No. 1 ranking, and a mythical national championship according to USA Today.

Moore then spent one season as an assistant men's coach at Morgan State and two seasons at Howard Community College before becoming head boy's A.A.U. coach in Columbia, Md.

His A.A.U. credentials include nine years of coaching, a pair of Maryland state championships, and two trips to the national tournament in Florida. Moore coached current NBA superstar Carmelo Anthony at the Mount Royal Recreation Center in Baltimore.



A veteran of 12 years of athletics administration, Dana Rieger follows Jamelle Elliott from Connecticut to serve as the first-year head coach's Director of Basketball Operations. Rieger has experience in coaching, sales,

marketing, athletics development, alumni relations, compliance, event planning, and administrative duties.

Rieger spent the last four seasons at UConn, first as an Assistant Director of Athletic Development and most recently as the Executive Assistant to the Director of Athletics.

Prior to UConn, Rieger spent a season at the University of Hartford as Assistant Athletics Director/External Relations where she was responsible for sponsorship, ticket sales, licensing, supervision of Hartford's sports information and ticket office staffs, and administration of pep band, cheerleading, and dance team activities.

She spent four years in the golf industry, including three with the Greater Hartford Open, where she concentrated on sponsorship and hospitality sales.

Rieger received an associate's degree from Concordia College in 1992, a bachelor's from Albion College in 1994, and her master's from Western Michigan in 1995.

Following her graduation from Western Michigan, Rieger joined the Broncos women's basketball staff as an assistant coach, where she handled summer camps, marketing, travel, and development. GREGORY H. WILLIAMS

Gregory H. Williams serves as the 27th president of the University of Cincinnati, one of the nation's top 25 public research universities. He began his tenure at UC on November 1, 2009.

From 2001-2009, President Williams served as president of The City College of New York (CCNY), the flagship college of The City University of New York. He has worked as a university administrator for over 30 years, serving in a variety of posts at The George Washington University, The University of Iowa and The

Ohio State University. Prior to becoming CCNY's president, he was Dean of the Law School and Carter C. Kissell Professor of Law at The Ohio State University. Early in his career, Dr. Williams was a Deputy Sheriff, and he later worked as an aide to a U.S. Senator.

President Williams has published three books and a number of articles and book reviews for The New York Times, The Los Angeles Times and The Washington Post. He is best known for his award-winning and best selling memoir, Life on the Color Line: The True Story of a White Boy Who Discovered He Was Black. As a result of his autobiography, he has been featured on a number of national programs including "Oprah," "Dateline NBC with Tom Brokaw," "Larry King Live," ABC's "Nightline with Ted Koppel" and "Fresh Air with Terri Gross" of National Public Radio.

In 1995, Life on the Color Line was selected as Book of the Year by The Los Angeles Times. In 1996, the Gustavus Myers Center for the Study of Human Rights in North America named Life on the Color Line an "Outstanding Book on the Subject of Human Rights." It is often required reading for entering students at U.S. colleges and universities.

Currently, Dr. Williams serves as Chair of the Commission on Access, Diversity and Excellence (CADE) of the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities (APLU, formerly the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges), and he is a past president of the Association of American Law Schools.

During his tenure at CCNY, Dr. Williams' leadership brought the college increased national recognition. Enrollment increased by nearly 50% – including an increase in new freshmen, under new, more rigorous admissions standards, with the largest incoming honors class in the college's history. According to US News and World Report, City College is the most diverse college campus in the nation, where Hispanics are the largest group. As a result of his leadership, the State of New York has begun to invest close to \$1 billion dollars in new science facilities and a new home for the CCNY School of Architecture. Dr. Williams also led CCNY's first capital campaign in history, which has raised over \$330,000,000.


President Williams has received numerous awards. Among them are the "Governor's Tribute to African-American Leaders of Excellence in State Service" (2004) from New York Governor George Pataki for his significant contributions to the people of the state, the Austrian Cross of Honor in Science and Art, First Class (2006), and the "Dean of the Year" award given by the National Association of Public Interest Law (1999). He also was the first recipient of the National Bar Association's A. Leon Higginbotham, Jr. Award for Outstanding Contributions to the Preservation of Human and Civil Rights (1999).

President Bill Clinton invited Dr. Williams to the White House in 1998 as part of his "Call to Action" to promote pro bono work and diversity in the legal profession.

President Williams has earned five degrees, including a JD and PhD from George Washington University, and he holds four honorary doctorates.

MIKE THOMAS

A 24-year veteran of college athletics administration, Thomas was named as the University of Cincinnati's **Director of Athletics** on October 20. 2005. Since taking the reins of the

department with 18 teams and 560 student-athletes. Thomas has championed student-athlete development and significant external growth, while also authoring a detailed plan for competitive success in the BIG EAST Conference and on the national level.

In May of 2006, Thomas introduced his vision for Bearcats Athletics, aptly titled CATAPULT - an acronym for championships, academics, and together. Thomas's five-year vision for UC's 18-sport intercollegiate program was launched on the six-month anniversary of his hiring. The plan focuses on three main initiatives: winning BIG EAST team championships, high-level academic achievement, and a comprehensive integration with the UC Campus and Greater Cincinnati Community.

By the end of 2008-09, the third year under the CATAPULT plan, UC's sports teams continue to excel in academics as a whole as the student-athletes combined to achieve a grade-point average (GPA) of 3.034 and continued to graduate at a rate of 16 percent higher than the overall student body. Those numbers will continue to grow as more and more students receive the benefits of the recently expanded and redefined academic services office and the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills program.

In 2007-08, Cincinnati was second in the 16-member BIG EAST with five teams garnering BIG EAST Academic Excellence Awards for posting the highest grade-point average in their respective sports (football, men's cross country, women's golf, women's swimming and diving, and women's indoor track and field).

This past year, two teams garnered BIG EAST Academic Excellence Awards (lacrosse and women's swimming), while five athletes earned the league's Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award in their respective sport, tying

the University of Notre Dame for the most individual awards in the conference.

In 2006, Thomas hired head football coach Brian Kelly and the football team has made program history in the three seasons since. Kelly led UC to a school-record 11 wins in 2008, along with the school's first BIG EAST Conference Championship, and an appearance in the 75th FedEx Orange Bowl, the first Bowl Championship Series appearance by Cincinnati. The Bearcats' 21 wins since 2007-08 marks the first time UC has won 10 or more games in back-to-back seasons.

UC Athletics produced two BIG EAST team titles, five all-Americans, one all-Region selection, and 28 all-BIG EAST honorees in 2008-09.

In March 2007 UC Athletics was recognized in the 2006-07 Diversity in Athletics Award, presented by the Laboratory for Diversity in Sport at Texas A&M University. The award recognizes the NCAA Division I athletics departments that excel in various areas of diversity. UC was one of just 10 programs nationwide to earn the Diversity in Athletics Award for the graduation of African American male student-athletes.

On the external side, the University of Cincinnati is growing at a tremendous rate.

UC established single-season attendance records for football in each of the past two years, as it posted eight of the Top-12 crowds in Nippert Stadium history. In just four years at UC, Thomas has seen the average attendance in football skyrocket as it has almost doubled (16,016 to 31,965).

In terms of donor development, the UCATS office has reached all-time highs for participation with over 3,800 donors joining the club in 2008-09 (double its total two years ago) and annual fund donations at a record high. Thomas' work on the multi-phase "Raising the Bar" capital campaign, which will fund various initiatives for the football program, was crucial in the program raising its first \$5 million over a six-week period.

Fund raising and major gifts are on-going processes at UC with plans to build a new outdoor sports complex with a bubble which will serve as a practice venue for football, a competition site for lacrosse, and be accessible to the UC and Greater Cincinnati communities. The department is also studying the potential renovations and/or expansions of both Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena. The Nippert Stadium renovation is critical as two months before the first football game of 2009, season ticket sales for UC football broke the all-time

Beginning in the fall of 2008, all UC teams were outfitted exclusively in adidas footwear, uniforms, training apparel, and accessories as the department signed its first across-the-board shoe and apparel contract. The four-year contract aligns UC with other adidas marketing partners such as the NFL, MLS, and an 11-year exclusive all-league partnership with the NBA.

Later in 2008-09, Thomas reached an agreement with IMG College, a division of IMG Worldwide, for a new 12-year multimedia rights partnership.

Prior to coming to UC, Thomas spent five years as the Director of Athletics at the University of Akron and seven years as associate athletics director at the University of Virginia, an institution known for achieving impressive success both academically and athletically, before bringing that model to Akron. Virginia finished in the Top 25 in the Director's Cup in each year of Thomas' tenure there while at the same time was in the top ten nationally in student-athlete graduation rates.

Under Thomas' direction, Akron rose from last place to second among Mid-American Conference schools in the Director's Cup annual rankings. Simultaneously, Akron vaulted from last to second place in the MAC Academic Achievement Awards. Thomas increased the financial base of the Akron athletics program through increasing corporate sponsorship levels by 500 percent and boosted annual giving to athletics to its highest level in the school's history. Community support was rallied, with marked increases shown in football and basketball attendance. During this time period, the Zips won their first MAC football championship and the hiring of men's basketball coach Keith Dambrot has led to unparalleled success on the hardwood.

Support services and facilities for academic support for student-athletes were significantly increased, which resulted in a significant improvement in grade point averages and graduation rates of UA student-athletes.

Thomas coordinated over \$140 million in facility construction and renovation, including \$25 million in capital improvements at Akron, including a new indoor fieldhouse, a football practice complex, and a softball facility. He also spearheaded the new on-campus football stadium and was instrumental in the initial fundraising and planning stages of the facility which opened in September of 2009.

Recognized for his administrative acumen by his peers, Thomas presently serves on several national and conference committees, including the NCAA Division I Championship/Sports Management Cabinet (where he also serves as the NCAA men's basketball liaison to the cabinet), the NCAA Men's Basketball Issues Committee, and he also chairs the BIG EAST Championship and Competition Committee. Thomas has also previously served as a member of the NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet, the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Issues Committee, the NCAA Division I Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, the NCAA Postseason Bowl Licensing Subcommittee, and the Division 1A Athletics Director's Association Legislative Review Committee.

Twice during his career, Thomas has received distinction for his efforts and dedication as a director of athletics, garnering the General Robert R. Neyland Outstanding Athletics Director Award in 2005 at Akron and then again in April of 2008 at Cincinnati.

Prior to his experience at Virginia, Thomas spent seven years at the University of Denver as assistant athletics director for internal operations, and one year at the University of Iowa in marketing and promotions, and operations.

Thomas, 49, received his B.S. degree in Business Administration from Colorado State University in 1983, and his M.S. degree in Athletic Administration from Western Illinois University in 1986. He and his wife, Jenifer, have four children: Vince, Joey, Mick, and Meredith.



SENIOR ADMINISTRATION

BOB ARKEILPANE

Deputy Director of Athletics



Bob Arkeilpane joined the University of Cincinnati as Deputy Director of Athletics in December of 2005. He is the No. 2 administrator in charge of UC's 18-sport intercollegiate athletics program and oversees the daily operations of the athletics department.

Arkeilpane has three decades of Division I experience as a student-athlete, coach, and administrator. He joined the Bearcats Department of Athletics after serving for three years as Associate Vice President of the UC Foundation, the private sector fund-raising

entity for the University of Cincinnati and its campuses, colleges, departments, and units. Arkeilpane previously had worked for the UC Foundation as college director of development and alumni affairs from 1987-91.

Arkeilpane made his return to UC after five successful years as Director of Athletics at the University of Buffalo. Arkeilpane was named officer-in-charge in UB's Division of Athletics and then served as interim athletics director for 10 months prior to being named director in February, 1999. He was promoted to the helm of the Bulls' department of athletics after spending three years as Associate Athletics Director of Development at UB starting in 1995.

A native of Amherst, N.Y. and a standout high school football player at Sweet Home High School, he earned an athletics scholarship to Syracuse, where he was a starting defensive back for three seasons. He played with future NFL stars Art Monk, Joe Morris, and Gary Anderson — and against such big-name players as Warren Moon, Dan Marino, and Jim Kelly. Arkeilpane earned his bachelor's degree in 1981 from Syracuse. He earned his master's degree from Ohio University while serving as a graduate assistant football coach.

MIKE WADDELL

Senior Associate Director of Athletics/External Relations



Mike Waddell joined the UC athletics family as senior associate director of athletics in March, 2006. His duties include oversight of the revenue generating areas of the department: marketing/fan development, ticketing/customer service, sports communications, information technology, the CAT TRACKS Wheels of Support program, and UC's profitable athletics licensing and merchandising efforts. He also directs UC's fundraising efforts with UC's Men's Track & Field/Cross-Country / Men's Swimming & Diving teams and serves as a member of UC's Campus Communications Cabinet.

Waddell has sport oversight over the UC men's soccer, men's and women's golf, and men's and women's swimming/diving teams. He also serves as the department's liaison with adidas, IMG College, ESPN and FS Ohio and is a member of the BIG EAST Golf Committee.

The North Carolina native came to UC from the University of Akron, where he served as the associate athletics director for external relations. UA's sports marketing revenues increased more than five-fold during Waddell's tenure via the creation of the TEAM AKRON corporate patron program.

A 1991 graduate of Guilford College (NC) where he was a two-time football letterman, Waddell is an active member of NACDA and the BCA, and serves on the American Cancer Society Board in Cincinnati and is a founding member of the Cincinnati Sports Professionals Network (CSPN). Waddell also is a coach with the Glen Este Youth Basketball Association and donates time to work with the Aubrey Rose Foundation, benefitting seriously ill children in the Tri-State Area.

ANDY HURLEY

Senior Associate Director of Athletics/Development



Andy Hurley joined the University of Cincinnati in March of 2006 to head the Athletics Development office. His primary duties are centered on managing efforts to generate private, philanthropic support to assist UC's student-athletes and coaches in building championship caliber programs in the BIG EAST.

He came to UC after seven years at the University at Buffalo, where he served as UB's Director of Athletics Development since September of 1998 before being appointed an assistant athletics director of development in July of 2003.

Hurley earned his bachelor's degree from UB in 1984 and starred on the football team at defensive back, earning ECAC and Pizza Hut All-America honors in 1984. He received his master's degree in sports administration from the University of Massachusetts in 1987.

DERRICK MAGEE

Associate Director of Athletics/Chief Business Officer



Derrick Magee joined the UC Department of Athletics in October of 2008 as the chief business officer. He develops and monitors the budget performance and strategic planning for the department of athletics and Fifth Third Arena, which encompasses UC's 18 sports and 15 administrative and support areas.

In addition, he oversees and coordinates the department's business, personnel, payroll, and ticket operations.

Magee is also responsible for preparing all University, BIG EAST Conference, NCAA, and public financial reports for the department.

He joined UC from the University of the Pacific where he was the assistant director of athletics for finance and internal affairs since 2006. In June, 2009, he graduated from the NCAA Leadership Institute for Ethnic Minority Males and Females and was named vice president of the Collegiate Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA).

Magee graduated in 2000 with a bachelor's degree in physical education/sport management from Florida A&M University and was a member of the basketball team. He went on to earn his M.B.A. from California State University Stanislaus in August of 2005 and is currently working on his doctorate in higher education administration through the University of the Pacific.

ROBIN MARTIN

Associate Director of Athletics/Senior Woman Administrator



Robin Martin, who has three years of experience as a director of athletics at two institutions, and over 15 years of experience in the field of athletics, took over as UC's Associate AD and Senior Woman Administrator in August, 2007. Martin currently manages 10 of the 18 intercollegiate sport programs and provides supervision for compliance, academics, and CHAMPS/Life Skills.

Prior to coming to UC, Martin was the Director of Athletics at Holy Names University, where she was the first African-American woman to ever hold the position. There, she was the oversight of 10

intercollegiate sports programs, intramurals and recreation, and served as the facilities manager. Under her leadership, the HNU athletics department produced four conference championships, four conference MVP's, and three regional championship appearances.

Prior to HNU, Martin served as the Director of Athletics and head women's basketball coach at Dillard University in New Orleans. Under her direction the department garnered one of the highest student-athlete graduation rates in the nation.

Martin is an integral part of the UC community as well as in Greater Cincinnati, serving in various leadership roles on local boards and committees.

A former basketball coach for 10 years and a Division I basketball player at the University of New Orleans, Martin received a bachelor of arts degree in English and a master's degree in education. Martin was recently accepted into the Urban Education Leadership PhD. program at UC.

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DAN KRONE



Assistant Director of Athletics/Facilities and Operations Dan Krone joined the University of Cincinnati as the Assistant Director of Athletics for Facilities and Operations in May of 2007. Krone is responsible for the staff which operates all of the athletics facilities, including Nippert Stadium and Fifth Third Arena. He is involved with security, parking, ushers, and all aspects of game-day operations for UC events. His duties also include oversight of the strength and conditioning facility/program, the equipment room, as well as any new construction and renovations involving athletics.

Krone comes to Cincinnati after spending four years at the University of Akron where he was the director of the athletics fieldhouse and building services. There, he oversaw all aspects of Akron's 157,000-square foot, state-of-the-art field house which includes a 120-yard football field, a 300-meter track, four batting cages, 8,000-square foot strength and conditioning room, and locker rooms.

A former college basketball player at Bethany College in Lindsborg, Kan., Krone earned his bachelor's degree from there in 1983 in recreational sports administration. He went on to pick up his master's degree from Eastern Michigan in 1990.

MICHAEL HARRIS



Assistant Director of Athletics/Sports Communications Michael Harris joined the University of Cincinnati as Assistant Athletics Director for Sports Communications in April of 2007.

Harris' responsibilities include directing Cincinnati's sports communications department and assisting with the continued development of UC Athletics multimedia, most notably GoBEARCATS. com. He will also serve as a media contact for the Bearcats basketball program.

No stranger to the Cincinnati media, Harris, a native of Springboro, Ohio, worked at Miami University (Ohio) for six years (2001-2007) as an assistant director of athletics, overseeing various media relations and marketing roles. Harris helped the RedHawks realize unprecedented growth in season ticket and attendance numbers, doubling the season ticket base and setting all-time highs for ticket

Harris is a 1995 graduate of Miami where he earned a bachelor of science degree in organizational behavior.

DR. FRITZ RUSS



Faculty Athletics Representative

Dr. Fritz Russ, Professor of Marketing, was appointed as the faculty athletics representative for the Cincinnati Department of Athletics, on February 1, 2007.

Academic integrity, institutional control of the athletics program, and promotion of student-athlete welfare are a FAR's major focus.

The position's duties include being a liaison between academics and athletics; serving on UC's Athletics Advisory Council; assisting in institutional certification processes; participating in compliance

reviews; monitoring student-athletes' academic performance and their welfare; assessing and advising on NCAA and conference policies; and attending conference and NCAA meetings.

Russ, who joined the UC faculty in 1989, has previously served the university as Senior Vice Provost, as Dean of the College of Business and as Marketing Department Head. He currently teaches undergraduate and graduate courses in international marketing and in marketing research. An active researcher, he is also involved in the business community through consulting and corporate boards.

Before coming to the University of Cincinnati, he was a chaired professor at the University of North Carolina, where he also participated for four years on the university's faculty athletics committee. 2008-09 SEASON REVIEW

2 X 1,000

Senior Jill Stephens and junior Kahla Roudebush both reached the 1,000 career point mark last season. Stephens reached the 1,000-point plateau with her fourth point at USF on Feb. 28. She finished her UC career with 1,053 points and is 19th on the all-time UC scoring list.

Roudebush scored her 1,000th point on a free throw with 2:00 to play in the first half against DePaul on March 2, becoming the 23rd player in school history to reach that mark. She is currently 20th on the career scoring chart with 1,044 points.

TAKING HOME THE HARDWARE

Senior Jill Stephens finished her senior season as one of the most prolific free throw shooters in school history finishing with a .791 free throw percentage, placing her fifth in school history. The awards didn't end there for her though. Stephens was the recipient of the BIG EAST Scholar Athlete of The Year Award. Other Bearcats to take home awards include junior Kahla Roudebush who was named 2nd team all BIG EAST and freshmen Shanasa Sanders who was named to the BIG EAST All-Freshmen team.

ROUDEBUSH PICKS UP WHERE SHE LEFT OFF

Junior sharpshooter Kahla Roudebush has made her mark on the UC record books since her arrival on campus three years ago. She led the Bearcats in 2007-08, scoring 16.5 points per game and knocking down 66 triples. This past season she again led the Bearcats in scoring at 16.3 points per game and knocking down 70 triples, shooting at a .395 clip from behind the arc. The 70 three-pointers were sixth most in school history in a single season, while the .395 three point percentage placed her seventh in school history for a single season. She became the 23rd player in school history to score 1,000 career points with a free throw against DePaul on March 2. She led the BIG EAST in minutes played, and finished 8th in the nation averaging 38.5 per contest and averages 39.4 minutes per game in conference play. She ranks fifth in school history with 145 career three-pointers. She knocked down a career-high seven triples at Georgetown, second in school history in a single game. Her 1,195 minutes played this season rank fourth in school single-season history. Her

career three point percentage of .382 places her third all time in school history. Heading into her senior campaign she currently sits in ninth place in school history with 117 games played. Roudebush scored in double figures in all but four games this past season and has 10 20-plus point efforts. To cap off her brilliant season, Roudebush was named to the BIG EAST Conference's 2nd team.

Colone is a second

SUPER STEPHENS

Senior Jill Stephens averaged 12.0 points and 5.3 rebounds per contest this past season. She became the 22nd player in school history to reach the 1,000-point mark in her career at USF. She finished her career with 1,053 points. Stephens graduated in three years and is currently enrolled in UC's audiology doctoral program. She earned CoSIDA Academic All-District honors for the second straight year in 2009 and was named the 2008 BIG EAST Institutional Scholar-Athlete of the Year. The forward scored a career-high 30 points and added 10 rebounds against Providence, marking the first 30-point game for a UC player since the 2003-04 season. Stephens posted her first double-double of the season on Jan. 7 at West Virginia, dropping in 12 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. She had 10 double-doubles last season. Stephens shot 52 percent from the floor, 48 percent from the three-point line and 86 percent from the free throw line, each of which would rank in the school's Top 10 single-season records list. She led the BIG EAST and ranked tied for 16th nationally in free throw shooting (.857) and finished ninth in the BIG EAST in field goal percentage (.520).

SEND ME AN ANGEL

Senior guard Angel Morgan started the season as an energy player coming off the bench, but ended up winning a starting spot. In 29 starts this past season, she is averaged 6.2 points and 7.5 rebounds, finishing the season ninth in the BIG EAST. Morgan grabbed a career-high 14 rebounds in UC's win against Mississippi Valley State and recorded her first career double-double with a career-high 18 points and 12 rebounds against IUPUI. She scored 10 points and added 13 rebounds for her second double-double against Syracuse. Her third double-double came at St. John's where she scored 10 points and added 10 caroms. She had nine double-digit









rebounding efforts this season and has grabbed seven or more rebounds 18 times this past season. Morgan was named to the BIG EAST Honor Roll for the week ending on

Dec. 14.

FUNDAMENTALS

The Bearcats ranked fourth in the nation in personal fouls, committing just 13.2 per contest. UC finished second in the BIG EAST and 16th in the nation in free throw shooting .750 as a team. Jill Stephens led the BIG EAST and ranks 16th nationally in free throw shooting, connecting at a .857 clip.

40 MINUTE WOMEN

UC starters combined to post 30 40-plus minute games this season, led by Kahla Roudebush, who has played the full 40 13 times and played in 49 of a possible 50 minutes in a double overtime loss against Providence. Freshman point guard Shanasa Sanders was thrown into the fire, playing 40 or more minutes six times this season.

SKYLINE TIME

The Bearcats continued their dominance of the Skyline Chili Crosstown Shootout by defeating Xavier 65-55 for a second consecutive victory in the series. The win moves the Bearcats all time record to 22-9 against the arch rival and shifts the momentum of the series back to the Bearcats.

QUICK START

The Bearcat got off to a quick start in conference play in 2008-09. UC won three of its first four BIG EAST games, matching the conference win total from the 2007-08 season in the first two weeks of league play. The Bearcats beat Villanova, which finished in fourth place in the BIG EAST, and knocked off West Virginia on the road and Seton Hall at home in the month of January.
