HOME OF THE BEARCATS FIFTH THIRD ARENA

A 20-month, privately-funded \$87-million renovation, Fifth Third Arena reopened prior to the 2018-19 season as the latest marker in the continued growth of University of Cincinnati basketball.

Improvements to the 12,012-seat arena include two 360-degree concourses with court-centric seating, club seats, loge boxes and premium suites. The Champions Club and Lexus Courtside Club provide entertainment options for fans. State-of-the-art videoboards and ribbon boards raise the gameday experience to the next level while increased points-of-sale concessions feature food options from some of Cincinnati's most famous restaurants.

New student-athlete amenities include new locker rooms, a film room and a hydrotherapy room.

What hasn't changed, though, is the thrilling environment on gameday, featuring loud and intimidating students sections along both baselines and passionate, determined play on the court.

In the first two seasons after its renovation, Fifth Third Arena welcomed more than 11,100 fans per game and ranked among the national leaders in attendance.

In all, more than 5.7 million fans have watched a Bearcats men's basketball game since the arena originally opened on November 25, 1989. In that time, Cincinnati men's basketball has posted a 475-107 record (.813 winning percentage) record in the building, while the program has achieved 21 NCAA Tournament bids, six Sweet 16 appearances, one Final Four and 12 regular-season conference titles.

Originally tabbed the Myrl H. Shoemaker Center, it was named after the former Ohio lieutenant governor who was instrumental in securing state funding for the building while he was chairman of the Ohio House Finance Appropriations Committee. Shoemaker died in 1985.

Affectionately known as "The Shoe," the arena was renamed Fifth Third Arena at Myrl H. Shoemaker Center in 2004 after recognition of Fifth Third Bank's support of the Varsity Village facilities enhancement project. Fifth Third Bank remains a valued long-term, campus-wide partner on numerous initiatives.

In 2002, the floor was named Ed Jucker Court in honor of the head coach who led Cincinnati to its two national titles in 1961 and 1962.

Renovations included the building facade, entries and plazas, and the addition of an outdoor videoboard.

New upper-level concourse with its own fan amenities, including new restrooms, concessions and a specialty drink bar.

Additional bars at the north end of the main ad upper concourses - the Armory Bar and the Queen City Bar - that highlight UC Athletics' partnerships wth Rhinegeist.

New center-hung videoboard, ribbon boards, sound system and LED lighting to enhance game atmospheres.

Increased points of sale for concessions including some of Cincinnati's favorite food options - Buffalo Wings & Rings, Skyline Chili and 50 West.

Open entrance plaza with centralized ticketing and guest services along with the new Fan First Center.

Wes Miller enters his fifth season as head coach of the University of Cincinnati men's basketball program, continuing to lead the Bearcats through their transition into the Big 12. Known for molding tough, resilient teams, Miller has compiled a 267-194 career record across 14 seasons as a head coach, including seven 20-win seasons—two at Cincinnati.

A former walk-on and captain at North Carolina, Miller won the 2005 NCAA title as a player and is one of just seven current Division I head coaches to have captured a national championship on the court. By his 40th birthday, he had amassed 217 career wins, ranking 15th all-time and seventh among coaches who began after 1970.

At Cincinnati, Miller became the first coach in program history to start 5-0, highlighted by a 20-point win over No. 14 Illinois. He has guided the Bearcats to back-to-back NIT Quarterfinal appearances (2023, 2024) and delivered multiple signature victories, including four ranked wins in UC's inaugural Big 12 season—capped by a 72-52 rout of No. 16 Kansas in the Big 12 Tournament. The Bearcats have posted two 20-win seasons under his leadership, knocked off crosstown rival Xavier, and signed the program's first McDonald's All-American since 2009 in Shon Abaev.

Miller has coached 25 All-Conference players, including six at UC. Standouts like Landers Nolley II, David DeJulius, Dan Skillings Jr., and Aziz Bandaogo have earned league honors during his tenure. His teams have also excelled academically, setting a program-record 3.484 GPA in his first semester at the helm.

Before Cincinnati, Miller built UNC Greensboro into a perennial power, becoming the program's all-time winningest coach (185 victories). He guided the Spartans to five straight 20-win seasons, four Southern Conference regular-season titles, two SoCon Tournament championships, and two NCAA Tournament appearances.

Miller's playing career began at James Madison before transferring to UNC, where he helped the Tar Heels to two ACC regular-season championships, an ACC Tournament title, and three NCAA Tournament runs, including the 2005 national championship. Following graduation, he played professionally with the London Capitals, averaging 19.6 points per game.

Born Jan. 28, 1983, in Greensboro, N.C., Miller holds a degree in political science from UNC. Regarded as one of the nation's top young coaches, he was named ESPN.com's No. 1 Coach Under 40 in 2020 and continues to position Cincinnati among the nation's elite.



ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH CHAD DOLLAR

FIFTH SEASON



Chad Dollar enters his fifth season with the Bearcats in 2025-26 and third as associate head coach after being promoted in September 2022. Dollar joined Wes Miller's first Cincinnati staff in May 2021 and has been a key part of the Bearcats' recruiting efforts, player development and game planning as the program continues its rise in the Big 12.

Dollar arrived in Clifton after three seasons at Georgia under Tom Crean, where he coached Anthony Edwards, the No. 1 overall pick in the 2020 NBA Draft. He also helped Sahvir Wheeler set Georgia's freshman assist record (139) in 2019-20, ranking No. 14 on the Bulldogs' single-season list.

Before Georgia, Dollar spent the 2016-17 season at Auburn, where the Tigers posted their most wins since 2008-09, and five years at Georgia Tech (2011-16), including two as associate head coach. His coaching résumé also includes stops at Wichita State — where he helped the Shockers to the 2011 NIT fitle — Arkansas State, LSU, Murray State, Georgia Southern, Eastern Kentucky and Western Carolina.

Dollar began his coaching career at Gardner-Webb as a volunteer assistant and graduate assistant before joining Southern Miss for the 1996-97 season, where the Golden Eagles finished 22-11 and advanced to the NIT.

He also has international coaching experience with Athletes in Action, traveling to Macedonia, Croatia and the Ivory Coast for competition tours in 1997 and 2001.

As a player, Dollar was a three-year letterwinner at South Florida, helping the Bulls to the 1991 NIT and 1992 NCAA Tournament, before completing his career at Milligan College. He set a school record with 194 assists in 1994-95 while leading Milligan to its first NAIA Tournament appearance.

Dollar earned his bachelor's degree in sociology from Milligan in 1996. He and his wife, Kyla, have three children: Aliyah, Chloe and Darian.

ASSISTANT COACH RECRUITING COORDINATOR ANDRE MORGAN

FOURTH SEASON



Andre Morgan joined the University of Cincinnati men's basketball staff in April 2021 as an assistant coach, bringing with him a reputation as a strong recruiter and player developer with deep ties to the Southeast. He enters his fourth season with the Bearcats in 2025-26 as a key member of Wes Miller's coaching staff.

Morgan came to Cincinnati after three seasons as an assistant coach at Middle Tennessee State, where he worked under head coach Nick McDevitt. While with the Blue Raiders, he was instrumental in recruiting and developing talent in Conference USA, helping the program add multiple all-conference performers.

Before MTSU, Morgan worked alongside Miller at UNC Greensboro from 2016-18, where he helped guide the Spartans to a 52-18 record, a 29-7 mark in Southern Conference play, and back-to-back SoCon regular-season titles. UNCG advanced to the 2018 NCAA Tournament as the league's regular-season and tournament champions, marking one of the most successful two-year stretches in program history.

Morgan's resume also includes one season as associate head coach at Kentucky Wesleyan, where he helped the Panthers to a 27-4 record, a Great Midwest Athletic Conference championship and an NCAA Division II Midwest Regional appearance. He previously spent a season as an assistant coach at The Citadel — his first stop in the Southern Conference — after working in Conference USA on head coach Jerod Haase's support staff at UAB.

A native of Buford, Georgia, Morgan began his coaching career with a three-year stint at Young Harris College, where he contributed to a 17-game turnaround and a 22-win campaign in 2011-12.

As a player, Morgan starred at Kennesaw State, where he was named 2006 Atlantic Sun Freshman of the Year, before transferring to North Georgia. He earned All-Peach Belt Conference honors as a junior and graduated with a degree in business administration in 2010.

Morgan and his wife, Lynn, are proud parents of daughters, Amaya and Makenzie.

ASSISTANT COACH TIM BUCKLEY

SECOND SEASON



Tim Buckley enters his second season with the Bearcats in 2025-26 after joining Wes Miller's staff as an assistant coach in June 2024. Buckley brings over 35 years of experience as a head coach, high-major assistant, and NBA scout, providing a wealth of perspective to Cincinnati's staff.

He came to UC after two seasons at South Carolina, where he helped lead the program's most successful season since 2017. The Gamecocks went 26-8 in 2023-24, tying the school record for wins and returning to the NCAA Tournament. South Carolina led the SEC in scoring defense (66.4 ppg) and ranked in the nation's top 50 in both offensive and defensive efficiency, according to KenPom.

Prior to Columbia, Buckley spent three seasons at UNLV (2019-22). In 2019-20, the Rebels tied for second in the Mountain West, their best finish in 12 seasons, and defeated No. 4 San Diego State for their highest-ranked road win in nearly three decades. Stadium's Jeff Goodman named him one of the Mountain West's top assistants that summer.

Buckley was a scout with the Minnesota Timberwolves from 2017-19 before returning to the college ranks. He spent nine seasons at Indiana under Tom Crean, helping the Hoosiers win two Big Ten titles (2013, 2016), make four NCAA Tournament appearances and reach three Sweet Sixteens. He coached future NBA players Cody Zeller. Victor Oladipo and Yooi Ferrell.

His career also includes assistant coaching stops at Marquette, lowa, and Bemidji State, as well as head coaching stints at Ball State (2000-06) and Rockford University (1989-93). He guided Ball State to upset wins over No. 3 Kansas and No. 4 UCLA during the 2001 Maui Invitational.

Buckley earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees from Bemidji State, where he also finished his playing career. He and his wife, Shannon, have a daughter, Meredith. COACHING STAFF

MEN'S BASKETBALL STAFF

ASSISTANT COACH MAMADOU N'DIAYE

FIRST SEASON



Mamadou N'Diaye enters his first season with the Bearcats in 2025-26 as an assistant coach on Wes Miller's staff. A proven developer of frontcourt talent and a respected international recruiter, N'Diaye brings more than a decade of coaching experience across multiple conferences, as well as a 10-year professional playing career that included four seasons in the NBA.

N'Diaye arrives in Cliffon after four seasons at UCF, where he was elevated to associate head coach in 2024. He helped guide the Knights through their transition to the Big 12 and mentored one of the conference's top defensive frontcourts, leading the league in blocks per game in 2023-24. He played a key role in landing and developing some of the most talented players in program history, including five-star signee Moustapha Thiam — the highest-rated recruit in UCF history — and Taylor Hendricks, who became the Knights' first lottery pick when he was selected ninth overall by the Utah Jazz in the 2023 NBA Draft.


Before UCF, N'Diaye spent two seasons as associate coach at San Francisco, where the Dons tied the program record for wins (22) since reinstatement and reached the West Coast Conference semifinals. He also coached at Georgia Tech (2014-16), helping the Yellow Jackets post consecutive top-two finishes in the ACC in rebound margin, and at Coastal Carolina (2011-13), where the Chanticleers won a Big South title and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in 21 years.

A native of Dakar, Senegal, N'Diaye is widely recognized for his ability to identify and recruit international talent, establishing a pipeline for players from Africa to the college game.

As a player, N'Diaye was the first Senegalese player ever selected in the NBA Draft, going 26th overall to the Denver Nuggets in 2000. He went on to play for the Toronto Raptors, Dallas Mavericks, Atlanta Hawks and Los Angeles Clippers. At Auburn, he was a four-year letterwinner, a two-time All-SEC performer and ranks second in school history in blocked shots (241). He helped the Tigers to the 1999 SEC Championship and a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament.

ASSISTANT COACH DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT JAYLEN STOWE

SECOND SEASON



Jaylen Stowe returned to Cincinnati in July 2024 as an assistant coach and director of player development, rejoining Wes Miller's staff after gaining valuable experience at the Division I level. Known for his strong player relationships and recruiting acumen, Stowe plays a key role in mentoring the Bearcats' student-athletes both on and off the court.

Stowe previously served as a graduate assistant at Cincinnati from 2021-23, Miller's first two seasons at the helm, before accepting his first full-time coaching position at High Point. As an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator, he was instrumental in assembling a roster that featured 11 newcomers. The Panthers went on to capture the Big South regular-season title and finish 27-9, setting a new program record for wins at the Division I level. The memorable campaign saw first-year head coach Alan Huss named Big South Coach of the Year, with several players earning postseason honors.

Before joining the Bearcats as a GA, Stowe spent the 2020-21 season with Miller at UNC Greensboro, helping the Spartans to a Southern Conference Championship and an NCAA Tournament appearance. That experience marked a reunion for Stowe and Miller within the SoCon, as Stowe played collegiately at Mercer from 2015-19, where he was a four-year letterwinner. He averaged 10.5 points per game as a senior while starting all 31 contests, showcasing leadership and consistency on both ends of the floor.

After graduating, Stowe played one season professionally in the ABA for the Richmond Elite before transitioning into coaching. His playing and coaching background give him a unique perspective on player development, recruiting, and the overall student-athlete experience.

Stowe earned his bachelor's degree from Mercer, where he was recognized for his academic commitment and leadership within the program. His return to Cincinnati underscores his strong connection to Miller's coaching philosophy and his passion for helping student-athletes reach their potential.

CHIEF OF STAFF BILL COMAR

SECOND SEASON



Veteran coach and administrator Bill Comar joined the Cincinnati men's basketball staff in June 2024 as Chief of Staff. Comar brings more than two decades of experience and has been part of programs with 18 postseason appearances, including 12 NCAA Tournament berths and three Elite Eight runs. At Cincinnati, Comar serves as the program's chief of staff, managing day-to-day operations and ensuring all areas of the team function efficiently.

He spent the previous three seasons at Ball State in the same role, first under James Whitford and then Michael Lewis, where he oversaw all non-coaching personnel and coordinated relationships with academics, compliance, financial aid, housing, scheduling and athletics administration.

Prior to Ball State, Comar was on staff at Indiana, helping the Hoosiers recruit three straight Indiana Mr. Basketball recipients while posting three consecutive winning seasons.

From 2011-17, Comar played a key role at Dayton, where the Flyers earned four NCAA Tournament bids, reached the 2014 Elite Eight and captured back-to-back Atlantic 10 championships. He previously served as Dayton's director of operations and assistant coach from 1998-2001, helping the program earn its first NCAA Tournament appearance in 10 years.

A Wilmette, Illinois native, Comar played three seasons at Kenyon College and earned a bachelor's degree in 1993 and a master's degree from Miami (Ohio) in 1995. He and his wife, Liz, have two daughters, Camille and Emily.

GENERAL MANAGER

COREY EVANS

FIRST SEASON



Corey Evans was named Cincinnati's first-ever general manager for men's basketball on March 31, 2025. He brings a unique combination of NBA experience, scouting expertise, and operational knowledge to the Bearcats' staff.

Evans joins Cincinnati after serving as an amateur evaluation scout with the Oklahoma City Thunder since 2021. In that role, he was responsible for evaluating pre-draft prospects worldwide, conducting intelligence work on potential draft picks and assisting in the hiring of entry-level coaches and interns. During his tenure, the Thunder became the youngest team in NBA history to earn a No. 1 seed, a distinction they are in position to achieve again this season.

Before entering the NBA, Evans built a national reputation as a high school evaluator. From 2017-

Malik Massey joined the Cincinnati men's basketball staff as a graduate assistant in the summer of 2022 and was promoted to his current role as Player Development Associate in the summer of 2024.

BASKETBALL HISTORY

The University of Cincinnati men's basketball program ranks among the nation's elite with 33 NCAA Tournament appearances, six Final Fours and back-to-back national championships (1961, 1962).

The Associated Press thinks so too, listing the Bearcats' program 10th in the nation in 2017 for its all-time appearances in the weekly AP polls. And the program's 162 wins since the start of the 2016-17 season, including a school-record tying 31 victories in 2017-18, have helped the Bearcats climb to 12th nationally for most wins, with 1,930.

American Athletic Conference trophies returned to Clifton in 2017-18 as the Bearcats claimed their first outright regular-season title since 2002 and their first league tournament championship since 2004. The Bearcats repeated as league tournament champions in 2018-19 and claimed the AAC's regular-season crown in 2019-20. In fact, during UC's stay in the seven-year-old AAC, the Bearcats have claimed three regular-season crowns (2014, 2018, 2020) and two league tournament championships (2018, 2019) along a conference-best 99 league victories.

In all, since UC's program began in 1901-02, the Bearcats have won 41 conference championships (29 regular-season titles and 12 league tournament crowns).

UC has advanced to postseason play 44 times, including 33 appearances in the NCAA Tournament, where the Bearcats own a 46-32 (.590) record.

Cincinnati's excellence is not portrayed in numbers alone. UC is the alma mater of several college basketball greats - 31 Bearcats have earned All-America honors, two went on to become Olympic gold medalists, two are enshrined in the National Basketball Hall of Fame, and Oscar Robertson was the first UC basketball player inducted into the FIBA (International Basketball Hall of Fame).


One of the first of UC's long list of standouts was Jack Twyman, who earned All-America status in 1954-55. He went on to NBA stardom and is in the Basketball Hall of Fame.

Robertson is still widely recognized as one of the greatest to play the sport — college or professional. A unanimous three-time All-American, he was college basketball's all-time leading scorer at the close of his career. His 33.8 scoring average today ranks third on the NCAA career charts, and he has the NBA's sixth-most career assists. The Hall of Famer led the U.S. Olympic team to the 1960 gold medal.

Sparked by the exploits of Robertson, who became the first player to lead the nation in scoring in three consecutive seasons (1958-60), Cincinnati advanced to the Final Four in 1958-59 and 1959-60, settling for third place

both years.

With a rookie head coach, and without Robertson, the Bearcats won their first national title in 1960-61. Then to prove that the first championship was no fluke, UC repeated as champion in 1961-62 — beating Ohio State in the title game both seasons. Cincinnati made a then-unprecedented fifth-straight trip to the Final Four in 1962-63, and narrowly missed capturing a third-straight national crown when Loyola (Illinois) overcame a 15-point deficit and defeated the Bearcats by a basket, 60-58, in overtime.

During those five seasons, UC recorded a 37-game win streak and posted a 161-16 ledger. The five straight Final Four appearances is a feat topped only by UCLA.

Connie Dierking (1958), Ralph Davis (1960), Bob Wiesenhahn (1961), Paul Hogue (1961, 1962), Tom Thacker (1963), Tony Yates (1963), Ron Bonham (1963, 1964) and George Wilson (1963) were accorded All-American recognition, with Wilson playing on the U.S. 1964 Olympic gold medal team.

The Bearcats success continued in the 1970s, during which UC compiled a 170-85 record (.667). Cincinnati inaugurated the Metro Conference by winning the league's first two tournament championships and made four post-season appearances. Jim Ard (1970), Lloyd Batts (1973), Steve Collier (1976), Gary Yoder (1977), Bob Miller (1978) and Pat Cummings (1979) earned All-America recognition.

Bob Huggins, who was named head coach in 1989, rekindled those national championship expectations in only his third season at the helm when he directed UC to the 1992 Final Four. The Bearcats advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Tournament three times and reached the Sweet 16 four times under his direction.



Cincinnati won its conference season and/or tournament title 12 times during the Huggins era. UC claimed eight league tournament titles and 10 regular-season crowns during the span, including seven Top 10 finishes in the final polls. During this time, Cincinnati ranked among the nation's winningest programs both in terms of winning percentage and victories.


Seventeen Bearcats garnered first-team all-conference honors during this era with three of those, Danny Fortson (1996, '97), Kenyon Martin (2000) and Steve Logan (2001, '02), picking up a total of four C-USA Most Outstanding Player awards. Fortson (1996, 1997), Nick Van Exel (1993), Ruben Patterson (1998), Bobby Brannen (1998), Melvin Levett (1999), Logan (2001, '02), Martin (1999, 2000) and Pete Mickeal (2000) joined Cincinnati's list of All-Americans.

Fortson was a consensus first-team All-American in 1996-97 after receiving second-team recognition in 1995-96. Martin was college basketball's top player of the 1999-2000 season, making a clean sweep of the national Player of the Year awards. Logan was a consensus All-American in 2001-02 and a finalist for every national Player of the Year award.

Mick Cronin became the 26th head coach in school history prior to the 2007 campaign and reestablished the Bearcats as a national contender. In his 13 seasons leading his alma mater, Cronin guided the Bearcats to the NCAA Tournament nine consecutive years before leaving to coach UCLA following the 2018-19 campaign.

As a senior, All-American Sean Kilpatrick (2014) joined Oscar Robertson as only two players in school history to score 2,000 career points.

Gary Clark (2018) earned AP Honorable Mention All-America accolades and several conference awards, including the AAC Player of the Year and Defensive Player of the Year, in leading the Bearcats to a 31-5 overall and

16-2 league mark in 2017-18. UC was ranked in the AP Poll every week of the season, climbing as high as fifth.

Jarron Cumberland (2019) also earned AP Honorable Mention All-America honors and grabbed AAC Player of the Year accolades as a junior while helping the Bearcats to 88 wins during his first three years at Cincinnati. It marked the first time a Bearcat had won conference player of the year accolades in back-to-back seasons since Steve Logan in 2001 and 2002 (Conference USA).

In 2019-20, John Brannen became the first UC head coach to win a conference regular-season championship in his first season leading the program since Tay Baker in 1966. The Bearcats claimed the top seed in the AAC tournament prior to the event's cancelation due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

On April 14, 2021, Wes Miller was named the 28th University of Cincinnati men's basketball head coach after spending a decade as the head coach at UNC Greensboro. Regarded as one of the top young coaches in college basketball, Miller built the Spartans into perennial championship and NCAA Tournament contenders, was named as ESPN.com's No. 1 Coach Under 40 in May 2020 and also was tabbed for The Athletic's 40 Under 40 list a year ago. His 185-career wins coming into the 2021-22 season also put him in the national lead for coaches under 40, ahead of LSU's Will Wade (177) and New Mexico's Richard Pitino (159).



OSCAR ROBERTSON, CINCINNATI LEGEND

A player like no other — that might be the best description of Oscar Robertson. The Bearcat great clearly was the greatest college performer of his time and today is recognized as one of the game's all-time bests on the pro and college levels.

During his three-year career (1957-60), "The Big O" established himself not only as the finest player in Cincinnati history, but one of the finest in all of college basketball. Robertson was the first player to lead the nation in scoring for three straight seasons (LSU's Pete Maravich is the only player since to match that feat), and closed his career as the NCAA's all-time scoring leader. His 2,973 points currently ranks seventh on the NCAA career scoring list while his 33.8 career scoring average is the third-highest of all-time.

Though scoring was the most publicized portion of his game, it was far from the only aspect in which he excelled. Robertson also owns UC's season and career rebounding records and has the second-most assists — a record he would have also broken if assists had been kept as a statistic during his sophomore year.

He led the Bearcats to two Final Fours and a 79-9 record during his three varsity seasons. Among his 14 NCAA records was a career scoring mark that stood until Pete Maravich bested it in 1970. As a sophomore, Robertson scored 56 points in a tournament game at Madison Square Garden, and he

scored 62 points in another contest.

No brief sketch can begin to include all of Robertson's honors and accomplishments. He was a three-year consensus All-American and a three-time pick for National Player of the Year honors.

Robertson was well-honored for his performance during his 14-year career in the NBA, making the all-star team 12 times and amassing career records for assists. He is one of two players in league history to post a triple-double average for an entire season (1961-62), when he averaged 30.8 points, 12.5 rebounds and 11.4 assists per game.

Robertson is well-regarded as one of the top performers in the history of the league and was inducted into the National Basketball Hall of Fame in 1979, as well as the FIBA (International Basketball Association) Hall of Fame in 2009. He was honored with the NBA's Lifetime Achievement Award in 2018.

ABOUT UC

As the global founder of what we like to call "hire education," we at the University of Cincinnati are world renowned for experience-based learning — also known as cooperative education.

Indeed, U.S. News & World Report ranks UC's co-op program in the top-five nationally, beating out institutions like Stanford, Duke and many more. In the 2023-24 school year, UC students earned a collective \$8.8 million working for nearly 2,000 global partners. How does co-op work?

Our students alternate academic semesters in the classroom with semesters of paid, professional work tied directly to their majors.

Today at UC, we make these and many other opportunities available to a community of more than 53,000 students.

On behalf of our students and our wider community, we've always been about advancing the power of creativity, ingenuity, invention and impact. That's our mission as a leading urban, public university focused on innovation and impact — a legacy we foster every day through our strategic direction, Next Lives Here.

And our drive to invent in and beyond the classroom has also been the source of many other breakthrough contributions, including the oral polio vaccine and the first antihistamine. Our endeavors today encompass science, medicine, business, education, engineering, technology, the humanities and the arts. Some of our specific areas of focus include analytics, digital media, precision cancer medicine, water and urban futures.

It's no wonder UC has been dubbed a "research heavyweight," ranked in the top 40 among American's public research universities by the National Science Foundation. UC has also been rated a Research 1 university by Carnegie Classification, as well as "the most ambitious campus design program in the country" by the New York Times.

RESEARCH AND INNOVATION

The university has more than 200 years of history as a research pioneer, with a culture strongly emphasizing collaboration in order to achieve innovative results that can be applied to solving complex problems and furthering scientific advancement. UC fosters early stage research and launches start-up companies via an expanding innovation incubator, the 1819 Innovation Hub, providing a key location amidst Cincinnati's rising Innovation Corridor. Partnering with UC are a wide range of visionaries: From seed-stage investors like CincyTech (one of the most active in the nation) to Fortune 500, corporations like Procter & Gamble, Microsoft, Kroger, Fifth Third Bank and FIS.

UC FACILITY

Many UC faculty members have been awarded significant honors at the local, state, national and international levels. These include numerous NSF Career awards as well as Fulbright awards and Guggenheim grants. UC faculty and their work routinely receive support from the Ohio Board of Regents, Department of Health and Human Services, National Institutes of Health, Department of Defense, Department of Education, Department

of Energy, U.S. EPA, National Endowment for the Humanities, National Endowment for the Arts, National Geographic Society, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, U.S. Geological Survey, Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute and many others.

UC is home to a number of Ohio Centers of Excellence where faculty research as well as their scholarly and creative endeavors serves to advance innovation and entrepreneurial activity as well as draw gifted students seeking to augment and apply their skills. These centers focus on advanced energy and sustaining the urban environment; transforming healthcare in the 21st century; intelligent air and space vehicle energy systems; nanoscale sensor technology; design and innovation; and music and theater arts.

UC STUDENTS

Throughout their academic careers, UC students earn many external honors and awards, including Fulbright and Goldwater scholarships as well as grants and research project support from internal and external entities as varied as the NSF, NEH, the U.S. Air Force and others. At UC, both undergraduates and graduate students receive both funding and mentoring support to pursue research through specialized programs like ROSE (Research, Observation, Service and Education Experiences), WISE (Women in Science and Engineering), and SURF (Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship). Such opportunities allow students to directly contribute to innovation, build a meaningful portfolio, engage with faculty and other thought leaders outside the classroom, and hone their inquiry and investigative skills according to the scientific method.

CINCINNATI, OHIO

Our urban campus is interwoven into a thriving city full of career opportunities, culture nd memorable experiences.

Whether you are looking for professional opportunities, creative inspiration or just a great place to make memories with friends, you are in for something special in Cincinnati. In recent years, Cincinnati has experienced an impressive renaissance of its urban core — from The Banks entertainment district and the downtown business corridor to the trendy Over-the-Rhine and Uptown neighborhoods near campus.



NEVILLE G. PINTO, PHD

PRESIDENT



Neville G. Pinto serves as the 30th President of the University of Cincinnati. A university teacher, researcher and administrator with nearly 40 years of experience in higher education, he became UC's chief executive on February 20, 2017. He is the first UC president to rise from the ranks of UC's faculty since Herman Schneider, the founder of cooperative education (1928–1932).

Dr. Pinto leads the Cincinnati region's only Carnegie Research 1 university — an institution attracting \$740 million in annual external research grants and contracts (including affiliates). In February 2018, he launched UC's strategic direction, NEXT LIVES HERE, which is a new paradigm for university planning that allows the university to be nimble and responsive to the world's changing landscape. It focuses on UC leading public universities into a new era of innovation and impact, with three main platforms of academic excellence, the innovation agenda and urban impact. As a part of this strategic direction, Pinto established a new position - the university's first Chief Innovation Officer — and UC opened doors to its 1819 Innovation Hub and Digital Futures Complex. Pinto's leadership led UC's intellectual property process to be reimagined and it became a model for the state's "Ohio IP Promise." Under Pinto's guiding vision, the university also is reinventing its cooperative education program — the world's first — for the digital economy and has attracted a \$100 million investment from JobsOhio to accelerate the number of its STEM graduates, promote federal research at UC and the affiliated Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center, and launch the Cincinnati Innovation District in Uptown.

Pinto also presided as UC celebrated its Bicentennial in 2018—2019 while looking ahead to its next century and launching a \$2 billion comprehensive campaign, "Next, Now."

Regionally, Pinto currently serves on the Ohio Governor's Executive Workforce Board, the Cincinnati Business Committee (CBC) and as chair of the Uptown Consortium in Cincinnati.

Just prior to returning to UC to serve as president, Dr. Pinto led the University of Louisville as acting president and professor of chemical engineering. Before serving at the University of Louisville, he served for 26 years on the faculty in chemical engineering at the University of Cincinnati, where he established the Adsorption and Ion Exchange Laboratory, which focused on research in biochemical and environmental engineering. His research included purification of genetically engineered drugs, the study of bio-membranes, and air and water purification. His laboratory attracted over \$6 million

in external research funding and trained 32 graduate students including 16 PhD students, many of whom have moved on to become leaders in industry and academia.

Earlier in his career at UC, Pinto held a number of administrative posts including Department Head for Chemical Engineering, Assistant Dean for Graduate Studies in the College of Engineering and Applied Science, and Vice Provost and Dean of The Graduate School. As Dean, he had a leadership role in attracting major external awards totaling over \$10 million to UC to support graduate and STEM education.

Pinto joined the University of Louisville (UofL) as Dean of the Speed School of Engineering in 2011. While dean, his accomplishments included overseeing a major expansion in the enrollment of the college and spearheading the development of the Belknap Engineering and Applied Sciences Research Park. He significantly strengthened the university's relationship with GE, to develop a partnership that has led to significant educational and career opportunities for students and encouraged the company to bring its FirstBuild microfactory to campus. This effort earned the Silver Fleur-de-Lis award from Greater Louisville Inc. in 2015.

From May 2015 to July 2016, Pinto served as Interim Executive Vice President and University Provost at UoL. During this period, he finalized the 21st Century University Plan and launched major initiatives to strengthen educational excellence, student success and access, research and community engagement. He was appointed Acting President in 2016.

Pinto was elected Fellow of the Graduate School at UC based on outstanding scholarly attainment and was elected to the National Academy of Inventors in recognition of U.S. patents awarded. He has variously been active in the American Institute of Chemical Engineers, American Society for Engineering Education, American Chemical Society and is a member of the Tau Beta Pi Engineering Honor Society. He is also the recipient of numerous outstanding teaching and service awards.

Pinto was born in Mumbai, India. He was educated at the Indian Institute of Technology, New Delhi, where he earned his bachelor's in chemical engineering. He earned his MS and his PhD in chemical engineering at Penn State University.

JOHN CUNNINGHAM

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Now in his sixth year as the Director of Athletics at the University of Cincinnati, John Cunningham has proven to be the perfect fit for the Bearcats, packing win after win into his time on Clifton Heights since taking the helm in December 2019.

Some of the many highlights of his tenure include guiding the Bearcats into the Big 12, opening the \$134 million Sheakley Indoor Practice Facility and Athletics Performance Center as part of a landmark \$100 million Day One Ready fundraising campaign, securing a new apparel deal with Nike and Jordan Brand and serving as the administrative oversight for the first-ever Group of Five team to advance to the College Football Playoff.

This spring, Cunningham also brought Cincinnati's multimedia rights representation (MMR) inhouse by establishing Cincy Sports Partners. The department serves as the Bearcats' corporate sales and sponsorships home for student-athlete NIL, unique fan experiences, local broadcasting and much more.

In his first few months on campus, Cunningham led the Bearcats' response to the COVID-19 pandemic and created the Next Level Success Fund to provide the necessary resources to achieve competitive success and crucial support for UC's student-athletes.

In 2021, Cunningham spearheaded Cincinnati's charge to join the Big 12 and launched the \$100 million Day One Ready Campaign initiative. The Day One Ready Campaign raised money in the areas of student-athlete wellness, signature facilities and operational resources to compete for championships in the Big 12, which Cincinnati officially joined on July 1, 2023.

The centerpiece of the Day One Ready Campaign was the Indoor Practice Facility and Performance Center, which broke ground in May 2023. The state-of-the-art complex features a 100-yard football field, brand-new weight room, fueling station and sports medicine offices over more than 200,000 square feet.

Cunningham restructured his leadership team to provide a new focus on internal and external operations, tapped Wes Miller, one of the nation's best young coaches, to lead the men's basketball program, hired two-time conference coach of the year Scott Satterfield to guide the football team, and brought UC alum Katrina Merriweather back home to coach women's basketball.

He also added head coaches Jordan Bischel (baseball), Erica Demers (women's soccer) and Aimee Ponte (women's golf) to guide Bearcats' programs during the 2023-24 academic year among five new coaches during the first year of Big 12 competition. Bischel proceeded to guide the Bearcats to the NCAA Regionals this spring, their first appearance since 2019.

UNPRECEDENTED SUCCESS ON THE FIELD AND ON THE COURSE

The Bearcats' football program found unprecedented success in 2021, winning a school-record 13 games and a second consecutive American Athletic Conference Championship en route to becoming the first non-"Power Five" team to participate in the College Football Playoff.

UC football boasts two conference titles and 19 NFL draft selections since 2020.

Additionally, the Cincinnati men's golf program has found its most success in program history in recent years, culminating with the Bearcats first-ever NCAA Regional Championship appearance in 2023 and Ty Gingerich's individual Big 12 Championship in 2024.

Cunningham has also embraced the changing landscape of college athletics, fully embracing Name, Image and Likeness (NIL) by creating IMPACT, a comprehensive NIL development program. The Bearcats have been bold and innovative in the NIL space in recent years, partnering with Kroger on the nation's largest female-only activation as well as Jason and Travis Kelce's podcast, New Heights, to host a live event in 2024 where a significant portion of ticket sales supported NIL. Additionally, Cincy Reigns, the official NIL partner of UC Athletics, collaborated with Rhinegeist to create Cincy Light - the country's fastest-growing craft light lager.

In 2024, Cincinnati's IMPACT program was named the nation's Best Institutional Program at the NIL Summit in Atlanta.

UC CREATES NEW DEPARTMENTS, SETS ACADEMIC RECORDS

Cunningham has focused attention and resources on student-athlete-centric initiatives such as launching the department's first ever Sports Psychology Department and creating the Performance Nutrition department, while prioritizing student-athlete mental health and wellness. He also hired Brad Pike (now Chief of Staff) as UC's first ever Senior Associate AD for Health and Wellness and added Senior Associate AD/CFO John Daniel and Deputy AD/External Anthony Di Fino.

 $\ensuremath{\mathsf{UC}}$ has reached exceptional heights in academics under Cunningham, as well.





In the spring of 2025, Bearcats student-athletes achieved a record overall GPA of 3.52, the fifth-straight semester above a 3.4.

Through the 2023-24 school year, Cincinnati ranked No. 1 in the Big 12 and sixth in the nation in Graduation Success Rate at 96%.

In 2022, six student-athletes collected Academic All-America accolades.

CUNNINGHAM SERVES AS DEPUTY AD AT MINNESOTA AND SYRACUSE

Before leading the Bearcats, Cunningham served as Minnesota's Deputy Athletics Director for Administration from 2016-19, overseeing the day-to-day administrative operations of the department, working with all 25 Gopher programs and external units, as well as serving as sport administrator for football, men's basketball and men's golf.

He was part of the fundraising and implementation of the Gophers' Athletes Village, a privately-funded project of \$166-million which added more than 338,000 square feet of new academic, leadership, nutrition, practice and team support space for all sports.

Cunningham joined the Minnesota staff from Syracuse, where he also served as the Deputy Athletics Director for Administration from 2015-16.

Prior to his tenure at Syracuse, Cunningham worked at Boise State University from 2011-2014 as the senior associate athletics director for external relations and executive director for NCAA Compliance.

BOISE STATE AND TCU BOLSTER HIS RESUME

At BSU, Cunningham was promoted to senior associate athletics director for external relations in 2014 after leading the NCAA Compliance program for three years. As the head of external relations, Cunningham led the operations of Boise State's development, marketing, media relations and ticket offices. He was also the sport administrator for men's basketball, men's and women's golf, and men's tennis.

Prior to his appointment at BSU, Cunningham worked at Texas Christian University for five years in the compliance field. He was hired by the Horned Frogs in 2006 as the assistant director of compliance and followed up a year later with a promotion to director of compliance. In 2011, he was promoted again to assistant athletics director for compliance. In that position, he was responsible for a comprehensive rules education program and provided rules interpretations for athletics staff, coaches, student-athletes and university officials.

LOVE FOR SPORTS TRACED BACK TO YOUTH IN LINCOLN

Cunningham started his career in collegiate athletics as the compliance coordinator at the University of Maryland. While in law school, he was a compliance intern at Maryland for two summers.

A 2001 TCU graduate, Cunningham received a law degree from the University of Nebraska's College of Law in 2005.

A native of Lincoln, Nebraska, he developed his love for college athletics by following his hometown Cornhuskers as a kid.

Cunningham and his wife, Caitlin, have two sons, Gus and Hank.



CHEER, DANCE & BEARCAT







he University of Cincinnati's Cincy Bearcats program is renowned for its elite cheer, dance and mascot spirit. The cheerleading squad has earned MULTI-PLE NATIONAL TITLES, including the Division IA Gameday National Championship in 2022 and 2023 at the UCA College Cheerleading & Dance Nationals. The dance team is a powerhouse, with victories like the seventh hip-hop national crown in 2017 and five NCAA-recognized championships between 2004–2006, 2009 and 2015.

Adding to the spirit are the legendary Bearcat mascots. The costume character "THE BEARCAT" HAS TWICE TAKEN HOME DIVISION I-A MASCOT NATIONAL TITLES (2022, 2023) AND SCORED A THIRD IN 2025 AT THE COLLEGE CHEERLEADING & DANCE NATIONALS. In 2023, Bearcat received a prestigious nomination for the Mascot Hall of Fame and was recognized as 2009 Capital One Mascot of the Year.

With a secret team of six to eight students performing at around 350 university and 150 community events annually, Bearcat is a beloved ambassador. Together, these cheer, dance and mascot programs showcase Cincy pride through championship-caliber performances and award-winning spirit.



MARCHING BAND

he University of Cincinnati's Bearcat Marching Band, a flagship unit of the Bearcat Bands program, is celebrated for its dynamic performances, educational impact and historic achievements. Comprising over 270 members, including instrumentalists, color guard, twirlers, and drum majors, the band performs at home and select away football and basketball games, as well as bowl games like the Cotton and Fenway Bowls. Directed since 2017 by Christopher Nichter, the band embraces "tradition through innovation," holding triweekly rehearsals and rigorous preparation to ensure musical and visual excellence. The band has earned several unique honors: it was the first college band to perform in Egypt (2024) and at the DCI.

Its excellence at marching events is proven by its regular participation in Bands of America exhibitions since 1995. The band's alumni association won UC Foundation's 2024 Group Philanthropy Award and the UC Alumni Association's 2017 Constituent Network of the Year. Internally, musicians can earn the prestigious Roy A. Colclaser Award for outstanding performance and the program awards a variety of scholarships recognizing excellence across ensembles.

Affiliated with the College-Conservatory of Music, the band benefits from CCM's nationally ranked programs and strong support from donors who fuel initiatives like "Charge Into the Next Century," ensuring students have top-tier instruments. Through community engagement, international travel and award-winning musicianship, UC's marching band exemplifies the school's vision to be "the most musical campus in the United States."

ince 1979, UCATS (an acronym representing University of Cincinnati Athletic Teams Scholarships) has been the principal fundraising arm for UC Athletics. Purpose-driven and relationship-centered, UCATS provides a way for individuals, fans, alumni and corporate entities to help Bearcat student-athletes receive a quality education, while ensuring UC's tradition of academic and athletic excellence.

More than 5,000 active UCATS members provide philanthropic support for 400+ student-athletes across 16 sports, with a vast majority receiving financial aid from the athletics department to attend the University of Cincinnati. On average, UC Athletics spends more \$79,756.16 per year to fund one in-state student-athlete scholarship. For out-of-state student-athletes, that cost increases to \$95.090.16.

Donations to UCATS include philanthropic gifts. Through the outstanding financial investment of each member, UCATS was able to generate more than \$33M in total contributions. All contributions, both large and small, make it possible for UC Athletics to support Bearcat student-athletes with vital resources such as academic support, athletic training, sports medicine

and mental health services. UCATS members have also been instrumental helping Cincy Reigns become one of the best NIL (Name, Image and Likeness) collectives in the country, while supporting the ongoing construction and renovation of the Indoor Practice Facility and the Armory Fieldhouse, respectively.

To elevate the men's basketball program, a dedicated group of donors known as the Flight Club was formed in 2022. Comprised of 15 households each giving a minimum of \$100,000 annually, the Flight Club was established to help the Bearcats compete in the ever-evolving collegiate athletics landscape. These impactful contributions are used to enhance the men's basketball program at a national level, allowing the Bearcats to remain competitive in recruiting, development, and overall program resources.

Additionally, we want to give special thanks to Larry and Rhonda Sheakley, Dave and Wendy Herche and Ed and Nina Paul for their transformational gifts to our athletics department and student-athletes this past year.



SEASON PREVIEW

Now in its third year in the Big 12, the Cincinnati men's basketball team enters the 2025-26 campaign with lofty expectations despite a roster that features 12 newcomers and only one player with more than 10 games played in a Bearcat uniform.

Those expectations are elevated in large part by a combination of six veteran transfers come to Cincinnati averaging 80 career games played at the college level, in addition to graduate point guard Day Day Thomas' 67 career games played as a Bearcat. Throw in a strong freshman class that is spearheaded by top-30 recruit and McDonald's All-American Shon Abaev and the Bearcats feel they have all they need to compete in the Big 12 and nationally.

"I thought our staff did an excellent job of identifying the right types of players to put a roster together, recruiting those players and finding a way to piece it together," fifth-year head coach Wes Miller said. "We worked to not just get talent and Big 12 talent, but to piece together a group that makes sense on paper. Now, the fun part for coaching is getting them out here together and making that all come to life."

Making that come to life will start with Thomas, a veteran of 67 games and 50 starts in a Bearcat uniform, who has averaged 10.3 points and three assists per contest in his two seasons in Clifton. The Bishopville, S.C., native has always been a defensive standout, but he made significant strides offensively

a season ago, shooting 40.2% from deep, up from 28% the year before. To help bolster the Bearcat backcourt, Miller brought in Sencire Harris from West Virginia and Kerr Kriisa from Kentucky — a pair that has combined to play in 173 career games. Harris knows all about what it takes to compete in the conference — the Canton, Ohio native was the only guard names to the Big 12 All-Defensive Team a year ago — and Kriisa, from Vissu Kula, Estonia, is a 1,000-point scorer who became the first player to lead the Pac-12 in assists in in back-to-back years for the first time since 2001 while he was at Arizona.

Then in the frontcourt, newcomers also bring a wealth of experience, with Jalen Celestine (Baylor) entering his sixth year of college basketball, Jalen Haynes (George Mason) seeing his fifth, Baba Miller (Florida Atlantic) playing in his fourth and Moustapha Thiam (UCF) entering his second. Celestine and Haynes each bring a plethora of toughness, maturity and versatility to the roster, Miller's coming off a year in which he averaged 11.3 points and seven boards per contest, while dishing out 92 assists and blocking 58 shots at FAU and Thiam was a Kyle Macy Award finalist, which is given to the nation's top freshman, last year while averaging 10.4 points, 6.4 rebounds and 2.6 blocks per game. All that is in addition to what returning big men Halvine Dzellat and Tyler McKinley. Dzellat, from Blois, France, played in 10 games as a freshman a year ago, while McKinley, a local product, is a former No. 1 player in the state of Ohio who suffered a season-ending injury last September.

Then come the fresh new faces, led by Abaev and fellow Top-50 recruit Keyshuan Tillery. Abaev, from Broward County, Fla., is a consensus top-30 recruit, a McDonald's All-American and Cincinnati's second-highest ranked recruit of the 247Sports era, behind only eventual NBA veteran Lance Stephenson. Tillery, a native of Albany, N.Y., was the No. 6-ranked point guard in the 2025 class and led New Hampton School (N.H.) to a 22-4 record and a runner-up finish at the 2025 NEPSAC Class AAA Championship.

On top of that, Miller brought in a pair of international guards. Jordi Rodriguez averaged 13.6 points, 2.9 rebounds and 2.6 assists per game while teaming with fellow Bearcat Baba Miller to lead Spain to the championship at the 2023 FIBA U-19 World Cup and Lucas Atauri, a member of the Brazilian national team, shot 38% from beyond the arc and 86% from the charity stripe in 39 contests last season for his club team, Paulistano. Fellow newcomer guards Bryson Buckingham, a freshman from Edmond, Okla., and Grant Darbyshire, a Cincinnati native who is a graduate transfer after three seasons at Kentucky, will provide additional depth to the Bearcat backcourt.

"I think offensively, there's a lot of versatility with this team," Miller added. "You see so many different skillsets and areas that you could play through. There are ways to play back to the basket — not just to throw it to score, but to play offense from a back-to-the-basket situation. You look at multiple guys on this roster that can catch it back to the basket or in the post area, and we can score it or play offense from that spot on the floor. There are multiple guys that can play in pick-and-roll action or dribble handoff action or on-ball screening action. There are a lot of different areas you could go offensively with this group. It's not limited."

The Bearcats will be facing a non-conference schedule that certainly will prepare them well for running the Big 12 gauntlet. In the non-league portion of the schedule alone, Cincinnati will face seven NCAA Tournament teams from a season ago. The Bearcats will face Mount St. Mary's, Alabama State and Lipscomb at Fifth Third Arena, Louisville downtown at Heritage Bank Center, Xavier on the road in the Crosstown Shootout, Georgia at Holiday Hoopsgiving at State Farm Arena in Atlanta and Clemson in the Greenville Winter Invitational at Bon Secours Wellness Arena.

The Big 12 slate opens against reigning regular-season and tournament champion Houston at Fifth Third Arena before road games at West Virginia Jan. 6 and UCF Jan. 11. The Bearcats return home for matchups with Colorado Jan. 14 and Iowa State Jan. 17 before a trip west to Arizona Jan. 21 and Arizona State Jan. 24. January concludes with a home contest against Baylor Jan. 28 and a road matchup in Houston Jan. 31.

The Bearcats open a string of three of four at Fifth Third Arena against West Virginia Feb. 5. Cincinnati welcomes UCF Feb. 8 and Utah Feb. 15 around a road matchup at Kansas State Feb. 11. Trips to Kansas and Texas Tech follow on Feb. 21 and Feb. 24, respectively, before the Bearcats host Oklahoma State Feb. 28 and BYU for a Senior Night matchup March 3. The regular season concludes March 7 with a road contest at TCU.

The Phillips 66 Big 12 Men's Basketball Championship is March 10-14 at Kansas City's T-Mobile Center.

"I've enjoyed this group," Miller added. "I've really, genuinely enjoyed the time on the court with this group. Like anything else, you have to find your why, and I enjoy just walking out onto the court and doing what I love to do every day. This group has been as fun to work with as any group I've coached. And again, we have a long way to go and a lot to go through, but I have enjoyed this group a lot."

This group of Bearcats do have a long way to go, but they have all the necessary parts to compete and excel in 2025-26.



SPORTS MEDICINE

The University of Cincinnati's sports medicine program is responsible not only for helping student-athletes make speedy recoveries from injuries, but also for preventing injuries from occurring.

UC's sports medicine program, in partnership with NovaCare Rehabilitation, takes a comprehensive approach to injury care and the overall wellness of the University's nearly 500 student-athletes. The program utilizes state-of-the-art diagnostic and treatment equipment along with the latest methods in injury care and prevention.

The goal is to help UC's student-athletes return to the classroom and the playing field at 100-percent capacity. New student-athletes undergo thorough evaluations before participating to detect potential issues, and all student-athletes are afforded advanced therapeutic care.


During the summer of 2011, following an extensive departmental review, UC decided to outsource its sports medicine operations to Select Medical, the parent company of NovaCare Rehabilitation, which has been UC's long-time provider of rehabilitation services.

Under the direction of Senior Associate AD Bob Mangine and UC Athletics' Chief of Staff Brad Pike, UC's athletic trainers serve as the backbone of the sports medicine program.

Mangine, who works with men's basketball and men's golf, is entering his 51st year as a collegiate athletic trainer and is in his second rotation at UC, having returned in 2002 and previously serving in multiple roles within the department. He currently serves as the head trainer for men's basketball and oversees the year-round health and wellness program for UC athletes, drawing on over four decades of experience in sports medicine, including work with amateur and professional athletes, the Olympics and the Goodwill Games.

Mike Donaworth is entering his 11th season as the men's basketball team physician, and Adrienne Maniktala is a physical therapy intern working with men's basketball this season.

THE MONSTER FACTORY

Championship basketball programs establish a consistent strength and conditioning regimen year-round. The focus is on athletic enhancement through physical development, education and reinforcement, providing elite-level professional training tailored to the needs of each athlete. The goal of the program is to optimize functional basketball strength, power, quickness, agility, flexibility, speed, injury prevention and conditioning, purposefully bridging the gap between the weight room and the court. The success of both the team and individual players is built on preparation, commitment and development.

University of Cincinnati Senior Associate Athletic Director of Sports Performance Mike Rehfeldt returned to UC after a short stint at the University of Connecticut (2020-2021 season) and has been part of Bearcats Men's Basketball since June 2021.

"I was thrilled to return to Cincinnati and join Coach Wes Miller and his staff," Rehfeldt said. "What I love about being a coach is the ability to foster deep and meaningful relationships, be part of something greater than myself, and have the daily opportunity to positively impact others. There is nothing more rewarding than watching student-athletes grow and develop—not just on the court but as people."

Rehfeldt oversees the physical development of UC players, helping them perform optimally while reducing the risk of injury. He is closely involved in preparing each player for practices and games through nutrition, recovery and education. His efforts have been instrumental in the development of former Bearcats Sean Kilpatrick, Troy Caupain, Gary Clark, and Jacob Evans III, all of whom have gone on to play professionally in the NBA. In 2022, Rehfeldt played a key role in hiring Dillon Frees, UC's first Director of Performance Nutrition, to guide student-athletes in proper fueling strategies. Initiatives include team nutrition education, Kroger field trips, updated menu options at the Gould Family Dining Hall at the Sheakley Indoor Practice Facility and sharing simple, healthy recipes via the Instagram account @ gobearcats.fuel.

The 4,000-square-foot University of Cincinnati basketball-specific Sports Performance Center, known as the Monster Factory, is designed to bridge the gap between physical development in the weight room and performance on the court. The facility features customized equipment, an in-house sports science laboratory, a BlazePod reactive intelligence wall for vision training, and force plate technology. MERRIWEATHER

Katrina Merriweather enters her third season as head coach of the University of Cincinnati women's basketball program, continuing to guide the Bearcats through their transition into the Big 12. One of the fastest-rising coaches in the country, Merriweather has amassed 180 wins in nine seasons as a head coach, leading three different programs to six postseason appearances, including two NCAA Tournaments. The former Bearcat captain and one of the winningest players in school history has quickly revitalized her alma mater, delivering Cincinnati's first winning season since 2019-20 and first postseason appearance since 2019 with a berth in the 2024 WNIT. Under Merriweather, UC posted its best non-conference winning percentage since 2005-06, strung together its longest win streak since 2019-20, and earned its first SEC win in nearly two decades. The Bearcats also led the Big 12 and ranked among the nation's top five in made free throws per game, while forward Jillian Hayes became the first player in program history to earn All-Big 12 honors.

Before returning to Cincinnati, Merriweather transformed Memphis into a contender, guiding the Tigers to their first 20-win season in more than a decade and a WNIT Sweet 16 berth in 2023. She turned a four-win team into a 38-23 program in just two years, clinching the highest AAC regular-season finish in school history and producing three All-Conference players. Merriweather previously built Wright State into a Horizon League power, winning three Coach of the Year awards, two league tournament titles, and the program's first NCAA Tournament game in 2021. She finished her five-year tenure with a program-record .706 winning percentage (113-47) and seven postseason appearances as either a head coach or assistant.

Internationally, Merriweather helped USA Basketball earn a silver medal at the 2023 FIBA Women's AmeriCup in León, Mexico, serving as a bench coach after previously assisting with the 2021 U19 National Team Trials.

A four-year letterwinner under Hall of Fame coach Laurie Pirtle from 1997-01, Merriweather became UC's first player to advance to four consecutive postseasons and later helped the Bearcats to their first NCAA Tournament win as a graduate assistant. The Indianapolis native holds two degrees from Cincinnati—English literature (2001) and secondary education (2002)—and remains deeply connected to the program she now leads. She is committed to building a championship-caliber program that reflects the pride and tradition of Bearcats basketball.

ARE YOU A BOOSTER? IF YOU ARE READING THIS, YOU PROBABLY ARE!

A booster, also known as "a representative of UC's athletic interests," is someone who has ever:

- · Contributed to a collective that supports UC
- · Been a member of an organization promoting UC Athletics (UCATS).
- · Contributed to the Department of Athletics or its booster organization.
- · Made any financial contributions to any area of UC.
- · Assisted in the recruitment of prospects for UC.

- Provided benefits (e.g., summer jobs or occasional meals) to prospects, enrolled student-athletes or their families.
- · Been a season ticket-holder in any sport at UC at any time.
- · Promoted the athletics program at UC in any way.
- · Remember, once you become a booster, you retain that identity indefinitely.

SO I'M A BOOSTER, WHAT DOES THAT MEAN?

As a booster, you are expected to abide by all NCAA, Big XII, and UC rules and regulations when it comes to your interaction and involvement with UC athletics, our student-athletes, and any potential recruits. As a booster, there are a few key things to be aware of, but the most important is to Ask Before You Act! UC Athletics Compliance is here to help you. A few other things to know:

PROSPECTIVE STUDENT-ATHLETES (PSAS):

A PSA is any student that has started classes for the 9th grade or any college athletes at other institutions. A student can also become a PSA if they receive any benefits not available to all PSAs. There are limitations for boosters and institutional staff when interacting with PSAs. A student remains a PSA until they sign an athletic scholarship or accept admission to UC; they complete all academic requirements for high school or transfer; and they receive a benefit from UC.

SOCIAL MEDIA, PSAS, AND YOU!

You should NOT contact a PSA (or their family) to encourage attendance at UC. This includes commenting on a PSA's social media feed, @replies, mentions, and direct messaging. However, you may follow PSAs on social media (X/Instagram, etc).

Coaches also have these same social media expectations. They are also not permitted to comment on any PSAs publicly (includes verbally) except to confirm if we are recruiting them. Please do not pressure them to share inside recruiting information!

NAME, IMAGE, AND LIKENESS (NIL)

- Compensation is tied to the NIL activities: there is a valid business purpose for their deliverables and those deliverables are directly tied to their compensation
- Payment is not based on athletic participation and separate from team activities
- · Payment is not an inducement to attend UC
- Pay is tied to the fair market value for the SA's service
- Student-Athlete (SA) reports the deal through NIL Go (https://nilgo.com/login)

TOP 10 NCAA RULES FOR BOOSTERS

ASK BEFORE YOU ACT! Please reach out to the compliance staff before any interactions with our student-athletes or any PSAs/recruits. We value your support of UC and want to make sure that can continue!

DON'T RECRUIT! The only persons who can permissibly contact a recruit are UC Coaches and authorized Department of Athletics Staff members. Boosters may NOT make any recruiting contact with PSAs or their relatives. This includes not making phone calls, sending DMs or emails, or making face-to-face contact with a PSA. If there is someone you think would be a great fit at UC, please share their info with our coaching staff.

NO FACE-TO-FACE CONTACT WITH PSAS You may see PSAs on campus, especially on game days. Game days are a great time for us to show of our campus and all UC has to offer. However, you are NOT permitted to have face-to-face contact with these PSAs nor are they permitted to be contacted by the media. Please continue to cheer on our current Bearcats and leave the visitors to our UC staff.

FEED THE STUDENT-ATHLETES! SAs may be invited to the home of a booster on an infrequent basis to have an "occasional meal." These meals may be provided in the home of a booster, on-campus, or at an off-campus restaurant. Please reach out to UC Compliance for the Occasional Meal Form before hosting any student-athletes.

GIVE THEM A JOB (BUT ONLY AFTER HS GRADUATION!) Boosters are allowed to employ UC students AND PSAs, but only after they have graduated high school. They should be paid the going rate for their role and compensated for work actually performed. Reach out to the compliance office prior to offering any SAs or PSAs a job.

ENTER LEGITIMATE NIL DEALS WITH OUR SAS! Boosters are permitted and encouraged to do NIL deals with our student-athletes! NIL deals must have a valid business purpose and SAs must be paid the fair market value for the deal. SAs must submit all deals through the NIL GO platform (https://nilgo.com/login).

NO LOANS! Boosters may not be involved in providing or co-signing any type of loan (e.g., cosigning on an apartment) for a student-athlete, a PSA, or their family or friends. If a SA is concerned about their finances, you can enter valid NIL deals with them or hire them into a bonified job.

NO EXTRA BENEFITS OR INDUCEMENTS! Boosters may not provide extra benefits to current UC SAs and their families or provide inducements to any PSAs. Special arrangements or discounts, including use of a car, phone, house, boat, lodging, or discounts on any of these goods or services are NOT permitted.

SORRY, CAPTAIN MORGAN! While SAs are permitted to enter into NIL deals to promote various goods, there are certain product types student-athletes may not be involved with including liquor, gambling, and tobacco.

DON'T ASK FOR INSIDER INFORMATION! Sports gambling has been legalized across the nation, but UC SAs and staff are NOT permitted to gamble on any NCAA-sponsored sports at any level. This includes but is not limited to paying money to participate in fantasy pro-sports leagues or betting the over/under at a college game. All SAs and staff are also prohibited from sharing any inside information that could affect the outcome of the game with anyone that may place a bef. Don't put our students' eligibility at risk and ask for information to help you win a bet!
