BRONCO GAME NOTES

THE GAME: The Boise State football team will travel to Albuquerque, N.M., to square off against New Mexico in the team's first Mountain West road game of 2016, Friday (Oct. 7).

The Broncos (4-0, 1-0 MW) and Lobos (2-2, 1-0 MW) are scheduled to kick at 7 p.m. at University Stadium, and the game will be nationally televised by CBS Sports Network. The match-up is also the first of five non-Saturday games for the Broncos during the regular season.

THE SERIES: Boise State is 6-1 all-time against New Mexico, the Broncos' first loss coming last season at Albertsons Stadium (31-24; Nov. 14, 2015). Boise State is 3-0 in Albuquerque.



The 2016 Boise State football campaign marks the 30th anniversary of the world-famous Blue Turf at Albertsons Stadium.

Boise State installed the first non-green field for the 1986 season, and since that time is a combined 167-36 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .823.

Since 2000, Boise State has gone 98-6 at home (.942), the nation's best home winning percentage.

BRONCO GAME NOTES

MOVIN' ON UP: The Broncos made their national poll debut last week, and moved up to No. 19 this week in both the Associated Press Top 25 and the Amway Coaches Poll. Boise State has been nationally ranked in each of the last 15 seasons, tied with USC for the eighth-longest active streak nationally.

ONE OF THE LAST UNBEATENS: Boise State is one of only 16 schools in the country that has yet to lose a game in 2016, a list that also includes Air Force, Alabama, Baylor, Clemson, Houston, Maryland, Miami (Fla.), Michigan, Nebraska, Ohio State, Tennessee, Texas A&M, Washington, West Virginia and Western Michigan.

EXORCISING DEMONS: Boise State lost four games last season, and all four teams are back on the schedule for 2016. The Road to Redemption began last week against Utah State, and the Broncos avenged last season's loss to the Aggies with a 21-10 victory.

Boise State has another such opportunity this week against New Mexico. The Lobos may have won last season's meeting, but stringing together back-to-back wins is rare for Boise State's opponents. Since the Broncos joined the Western Athletic Conference in 2001, only two opponents have notched back-to-back victories over Boise State - San Diego State (2012-13) and Air Force (2014-15). Only 10 conference opponents in school history have accomplished the feat against Boise State.

TGIF: The Broncos have played 50 non-Saturday games during the regular season all-time, though this is the first such match-up against the Lobos. Boise State is 41-9 (.820) in regular-season non-Saturday games, including a mark of 26-7 (.788) on Fridays. Boise State will play five non-Saturday games this season, including four on Friday and one on Thursday.

ONE OF THE VOTERS: Boise State head coach Bryan Harsin is one of 64 voters in the 2016 Amway Coaches Poll.

15 YEARS IN THE RANKINGS:

With Boise State cracking the polls entering week five of the 2016 season, the Broncos have now been ranked for at least one week in 15-consecutive seasons (2002-16; AP). The streak is tied with USC for the eighth-longest in the country. The nation's 10-longest streaks can be found on page 18.

IT'S COOL, GUYS: Boise State did not open the 2016 season ranked in either the AP or Coaches Polls. However, historically, that seems to bode well for the Broncos. Over the course of the previous 14 seasons, Boise State did not open the season ranked in the preseason polls on six occasions. Each year - 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2008 and 2014 - the Broncos finished ranked in the top 25. In two of those seasons (2006 and 2014), the Broncos capped their season with wins in the Fiesta Bowl.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED: Boise State has an all-time record of 94-13 (.879) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP and/or Coaches Polls.

MOUNT RUSHMORE

WINS OVER THE LOBOS

The following is the Mount Rushmore of victories over New Mexico for Boise State:

Boise State 60, New Mexico 49 Nov. 8, 2014

This one was a roller coaster, featuring 109 combined points, 1,285 yards of total offense and three separate 14-point deficits faced by the Broncos. It was wild from the start, as both New Mexico and Boise State scored on their first plays from scrimmage. In the end, Boise State outscored the Lobos, 25-7, in the second half and overcame a New Mexico rushing attack that gained 505 yards to grab the win. Quarterback Grant Hedrick piled up 498 yards of total offense (367 passing, 131 rushing) and had a hand in six touchdowns (four passing, two rushing), while Jay Ajayi ran for 161 yards and two touchdowns in addition to a 75-yard touchdown catch.

Boise State 45, New Mexico 0 Dec. 3, 2011

Boise State made an emphatic point to end the 2011 regular season, jumping out to a 31-0 halftime lead and cruising to its only shutout of the season. Kellen Moore completed 28-of-33 passes for 313 yards and three touchdowns while Doug Martin led the ground attack with 110 yards and a pair of touchdowns. The Bronco defense held the Lobos to just 52 yards rushing, with Shea McClellin and Ricky Tjong-A-Tjoe each recording a sack.

Boise State 45, New Mexico 17 Nov. 30, 2013

In what would be Chris Petersen's final game on The Blue as Boise State's head coach, the Broncos bounced back from a loss at San Diego State the week before to rout the Lobos, 45-17. After New Mexico cut Boise State's lead to 21-10 in the third quarter, the Broncos scored 21-straight points, coming from a Jay Ajayi 18-yard touchdown run and two scoring receptions by Matt Miller, to open it up and take a 42-17 lead. Grant Hedrick threw for 175 yards and three touchdowns, with Miller hauling in three scoring passes to highlight a nine-catch, 111-yard day. Ajayi totaled 147 yards on the ground to go with his touchdown.

Boise State 31, New Mexico 14 Sept. 2, 2000

Boise State opened the 2000 campaign with a 31-14 win in Albuquerque, its first such contest at New Mexico. The victory kick-started a campaign in which the Broncos finished 10-2 and captured the Big West title (5-0), concluding the season with a 38-23 victory over UTEP in the Crucial.com/Humanitarian Bowl.

GAME NOTES

THE HARSIN ERA: The Broncos are entering their third year under head coach Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach. Harsin led the Broncos to a record of 12-2 in his debut season, which included the school's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining the league in 2011 and the school's third victory in the Fiesta Bowl. For his efforts in year one, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year Foundation. In year two, the Broncos went 9-4 and defeated Northern Illinois 55-7 in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl. And for the second-straight season, Harsin was named a midseason finalist for the Dodd Trophy, the only one from a non-Resource Five school.

COACHING CHANGES: The Broncos have a different offensive coordinator for the fourth time in as many seasons, but this time around, multiple people will handle the responsibilities. Offensive line coach Scott Huff and quarterbacks coach Zak Hill will serve as co-offensive coordinators, and head coach Bryan Harsin will call the plays. The Broncos also have a new defensive coordinator, as linebackers coach Andy Avalos takes over the defense in 2016. Hill is entering his first season with the Broncos, as are defensive backs/cornerbacks coach Ashley Ambrose and safeties coach Gabe Franklin. Hill spent the last seven seasons at Eastern Washington, where he helped lead the Eagles to the 2010 FCS National Championship. Ambrose, a former All-Pro cornerback in the NFL, was at Texas State in 2015. Franklin, a three-time all-league honoree for Boise State, spent the last five seasons at UTEP.

FEELS LIKE 2011: Boise State's 4-0 start to 2016 matches the program's best through the first four games since 2011, when the Broncos finished 12-1. From 2006-11, the Broncos opened five of those six seasons (2007 being the exception) 4-0, and here's how Boise State finished each of those seasons:

- 2006 - 13-0 (Fiesta Bowl champions)
- 2008 - 12-1 (lost at Poinsettia Bowl)
- 2009 - 14-0 (Fiesta Bowl champions)
- 2010 - 12-1 (MAACO Bowl Las Vegas champions)
- 2011 - 12-1 (MAACO Bowl Las Vegas champions)

STILL HAVEN'T TRAILED: For just the second time in Boise State's FBS history (1996-present), the Broncos have not trailed at any point through the season's first four games. The only other Bronco team to achieve this feat was the 2009 team, which set the program record by going 306:35 of game time to start the season without trailing. This run was snapped when Tulsa scored 6:35 into the sixth game of the season to go up 7-0. This year's Bronco team has now gone 240:00 of game time without trailing.

After this past weekend's action, Boise State and Miami are the only remaining FBS teams that have not trailed at any point this season.

STILL PERFECT IN MOUNTAIN WEST OPENERS: Saturday night's 21-10 win over Utah State kept Boise State perfect all-time in Mountain West openers (6-0), although the 11-point margin of victory was the second-smallest of those six wins. The Broncos have now won their six Mountain West openers by an average margin of 25.7 points, with two of those openers being decided by at least 50 (63-13 over Colorado State in 2011, 55-0 over Hawai'i in 2015).

GAME NOTES

CONFERENCE RECORD: Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 112-13 (.896) in conference play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 123-23 (.843). Boise State went 5-3 in Mountain West play in 2015, just the second time since 1998 - when Boise State went 2-3 in the Big West - that the Broncos lost three conference contests in a season. It was also just the fourth time since 2001 - Boise State's first year in the WAC - that the Broncos lost multiple conference games (also went 6-2 in WAC play in 2001).

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: Boise State will be looking for its 19th conference title in 2016. The Broncos have played in four leagues all time, and have won multiple conference championships in each: six in the Big Sky (1970-95), two in the Big West (1996-2000), eight in the WAC (2001-10) and two in the MW (2011-Present).

MW SUCCESS: Since joining the Mountain West for the 2011 season, Boise State has lost just eight conference games, with only two of those eight losses being by more than seven points. Prior to a 28-14 loss to Air Force (Sept. 27) in 2014, the Broncos' four league losses were by a combined seven points: TCU in 2011 (36-35); San Diego State in 2012 (21-19); Fresno State (41-40) and SDSU (34-31, OT) in 2013. That 14-point loss at Air Force, along with a 52-26 loss at Utah State last season, are Boise State's only two Mountain West losses of more than seven points. No team in the Mountain West boasts a winning record over Boise State.

AGAINST THE POWER FIVE: Boise State went 2-0 in its matchups with the Power Five in 2016, defeating Washington State (31-28) and Oregon State (38-24) in consecutive games. The wins improve the Broncos to 14-5 against schools from the Power Five since the start of the 2006 season, and up the team's winning streak against such opposition to five. Boise State has also won 15 games against Power Five schools since 2003, third-best among all Group of Five teams over that span (Navy - 22, BYU - 21). It should be noted that all five of Boise State's losses to Power Five schools since 2006 have come on the road or at a neutral site. Since notching its first victory over a Power Five school, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, Boise State is 16-9 all-time in games against Power Five teams, and 16-21 overall.

PAC-12 SUCCESS: Boise State's 38-24 win at Oregon State Saturday, combined with Sept. 10's 31-28 win over Washington State, improved the Broncos to 2-0 against the Pac-12 this season, the most against the conference by any school through the season's opening four weeks. While Boise State is 11-13 overall against the Pac-12, the Broncos are 11-5 against the Power Five conference since 2004 and are currently on a four-game winning streak dating back to the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl victory over Arizona.

AMONG THE GREATEST: Boise State is the third-best all-time winning percentage amongst the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Broncos' all-time record at the four-year level entering this Friday is 422-159-2 (.726). Notre Dame is first (894-315-42; .7314) on the all-time list, and Michigan is second (930-331-36; .7309). For the complete top 15, see page four.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY: The Broncos are the winningest football program in the country since 2000, with an overall record of 180-32 (.849). Ohio State (173-37; .824), Oklahoma (173-43; .801), TCU (156-49; .761) and LSU (162-50; .764) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page four.

GAME NOTES

OUT OF THE NORM: The Broncos went 9-4 in 2015, missing double-digit victories for just the second time in the last decade. Boise State has won 10-or-more games in 13 of the last 17 seasons, including 12-or-more in six of the last 10.

SENIOR SUCCESS: Each of the last 14 Boise State senior classes have won at least 40 games during their careers, or an average of 10 victories per season. The 2016 class will need to win 11 games to make it 15-straight senior classes, having won eight games in 2013, 12 in 2014 and nine last season.

BOWLING AGAIN: Boise State made its 14th-straight bowl appearance and the 16th over the last 17 years this past season. The bowl-appearance streak is tied with Wisconsin for the sixth-longest in the country, trailing only Florida State (34), Virginia Tech (23), Georgia (19), Oklahoma (17) and LSU (16). Since the Broncos joined FBS in 1996, they have failed to make the postseason just four times (1996-98, 2001). In 2001, the last season in which the Broncos did not go bowling, Boise State was bowl-eligible with an 8-4 record but was not selected for a game.

RETURNING ALL-MW: Of the 13 Broncos named All-MW in 2015, seven return for the 2016 season. Quarterback Brett Rypien was named Mountain West Freshman of the Year in addition to being one of six Broncos named to the first team. He was joined on the first team by wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck and kicker Tyler Rausa. Tight end Jake Roh and running back Jeremy McNichols were each named second team, while linebacker Tanner Vallejo and offensive lineman Mario Yakoo were named honorable mention.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: The Broncos were one of only five schools in the country to receive the NCAA's Public Recognition Award in football for ranking in the top-10 percent nationally in APR from 2010 through 2014. Joining the Broncos were Clemson, Duke, Northwestern and Rutgers. At the conclusion of the 2015-16 academic year, the Boise State football team posted a combined cumulative grade-point average of 3.12, the highest on record. Additionally, the Broncos boasted a league-high 30 members on the Fall Academic All-Mountain West Team. Boise State has led the MW in all-academic selections in each of its five seasons in the league.

DEFENSE

SACK GAME STRONG: Boise State's defense entered Saturday's game against Utah State tied for the national lead with 4.33 sacks per game, and with four sacks in the 21-10 win remains in the FBS lead with 4.25 sacks per game. Overall, the Bronco defense has made 17 sacks this season, led by the defensive line trio of nose tackle David Moe (5.5 sacks), defensive end Sam McCaskill (4.5 sacks) and STUD end Jabril Frazier (3.0 sacks).

Moe ranks second, McCaskill tied for third and Frazier eighth in the Mountain West in sacks. The trio also ranks fourth, 14th and 54th nationally, respectively. The unit has also made 35.0 tackles for loss, led by 7.0 from McCaskill and 5.5 from Moe.

STILL NO CENTURY MARK ON THE GROUND: Four games into the 2016 season and the Bronco defense has still not yielded 100 rushing yards to an opponent, holding Utah State to just 71 yards on the ground Saturday night. The performances have led to the Broncos ranking fifth in the country in rushing defense (72.0 ypg), as opponents so far have rushed for just 81 yards (at Louisiana), 40 (Washington State), 98 (Oregon State) and 71 (Utah State) this season.

BRONCOS IN THE NFL

There are currently 18 Broncos on National Football League rosters (as of Sept. 4), and 13 teams have at least one former member of the Boise State football team on its roster. At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last seven seasons, and 18 players have been drafted during that time - including seven in the first two rounds. GAME NOTES

Overall, the Bronco defense has held its opponents to under 100 yards on the ground in each of the last five games, dating back to last year's Poinsettia Bowl in which Northern Illinois was held to negative-five rushing yards.

BUT THEY SAID THIS WASN'T LAST YEAR'S D-LINE: Boise State's 2015 defensive line finished that season ranked fifth in the nation in rushing defense, allowing just 108.2 yards per game. After losing every starter from that unit to graduation or the NFL Draft, many had reservations about how well this year's unit would perform. The crew of Sam McCaskill, David Moa, Elliot Hoyte, Jabril Frazier and Gabe Perez have answered the call, ranking fifth in the nation after four weeks by allowing just 72.0 rushing yards per game.

Leading the way has been McCaskill, a redshirt senior who started for the Broncos in 2014, and this year leads the unit with 18 tackles and 7.0 tackles-for-loss, along with 4.0 sacks. His TFL total ranks 10th nationally. Redshirt sophomore David Moa leads the team with 5.5 sacks on the season, while Hoyte (six tackles, 1.5 tackles-for-loss) and Frazier (16 tackles, 3.0 sacks) have also brought the heat up front.

MOXEY UP TO THE TASK: Senior cornerback Jonathan Moxey has quietly locked down his half of the field for the Broncos this season, and punctuated that Saturday night by breaking up three passes in addition to making seven solo tackles against Utah State. This season, Moxey, along with fellow corners Raymond Ford and Tyler Horton, leads the secondary with three pass breakups while he is second among the group with 20 tackles (18 solo).

TWO GAMES, TWO DEFENSIVE TOUCHDOWNS: The Boise State defense came up with big, momentum-swinging touchdowns in consecutive games earlier this season. Sept 10 against Washington State, it was cornerback Tyler Horton with the 85-yard pick-six on the opening drive of the game to put the Broncos up, 7-0, and on Sept. 24 at Oregon State it was middle linebacker Darren Lee stripping Beaver receiver Seth Collins and taking it 19 yards to the end zone in the fourth quarter. Lee's play helped ice the win for the Broncos, as the Beavers had cut the Boise State lead to 14 (31-17) and was looking to drive for a score to make it a one-possession game.

STRONG ON FOURTH DOWN: Through four games Boise State's defense has answered the call when it comes to critical fourth-down plays, as opponents have been successful on only 5-of-11 fourth-down conversions (45.5 percent). That figure ranks 44th in the country and fourth in the Mountain West.

After holding Louisiana to 0-for-2 on fourth downs on opening weekend, and Washington State to just 2-for-5 on their fourth-down situations, the Broncos snuffed out Oregon State's only fourth-down attempt Sept. 24. Two of Boise State's fourth-down stops against Washington State came inside Boise State territory (the first from the Bronco 13, the second from the Bronco 46), and the stop against the Beavers this past Saturday also came in Bronco territory, as the defense stuffed a 4th-and-1 rush at the Bronco 46.

VALLEJO MAKING PLAYS: Linebacker Tanner Vallejo has gotten off to hot start to his senior season, racking up 27 tackles, second on the team despite missing Saturday night's contest against Utah State. Vallejo made 14 tackles in Sept. 10's win over Washington State, and followed up with four (two solo) and a shared tackle-for-loss in abbreviated action at Oregon State.

CONTROLLING THE SECOND LEVEL: Boise State’s starting linebacker trio of Tanner Vallejo, Ben Weaver and Darren Lee has played a pivotal role all season, contributing to Boise State’s defensive rankings of fifth in rushing defense (72.0 ypg), 19th in scoring defense (18.0 ppg) and 39th in total defense (358.0 ypg).

Weaver leads the Broncos with 37 tackles this season, with Vallejo second at 27 and Lee is fourth with 23, as the trio is among Boise State’s top four in tackles. The trio has also contributed 5.5 tackles-for-loss and 2.0 sacks.

Also making an impact in this group is newcomer Blake Whitlock, a junior-college transfer from Saddleback College. Whitlock made his first start this past Saturday against Utah State, making four tackles (two solo) including one for loss.

SECONDARY STANDING OUT: Boise State’s secondary has performed well through the first four games of the season, led by first-time starter Cameron Hartsfield, who ranks third on the team with 26 tackles (16 solo). Fellow first-time starter Evan Tyler made four tackles (three solo) before suffering a season-ending knee injury Sept. 24 at Oregon State, while Chancellor James has contributed 14 tackles (nine solo) including a tackle-for-loss.

Cornerback Tyler Horton has contributed the play of the year so far for the secondary, recording an 85-yard pick-six Sept. 10 against Washington State, and earning Mountain West Defensive Player of the Week recognition for it.

NOT AS MANY NEW FACES AS YOU’D THINK: Boise State returns four starters from its 2015 defensive unit which ranked 12th in the FBS in total defense (318.3 yards per game) and fifth in rushing defense (108.2 yards per game). However, there is a stable of individuals returning with starting experience, including redshirt senior defensive lineman Sam McCaskill, redshirt senior defensive tackle Elliot Hoyte, redshirt junior linebacker Joey Martarano, cornerbacks Raymond Ford (redshirt senior) and Tyler Horton (sophomore), and safeties Dylan Sumner-Gardner (redshirt sophomore) and Kameron Miles (redshirt junior).

OFFENSE

RED ZONE: After starting the 2016 season a perfect 11-for-11 in the red zone, the Boise State offense is now 12-of-13 (.923). The only “failed” attempt inside the opponent 20 came against Oregon State, Sept. 24. On the final drive against the Beavers, the Broncos marched to the OSU 13-yard line, but took a knee and ran out the clock.

DOESN’T MATTER WHO THROWS IT, McNICHOLS WILL CATCH IT: While Jeremy McNichols has made his bones at Boise State as a running back, he remains a dangerous option as a receiver. Saturday night against Utah State he led the Broncos with six catches for 73 yards and a touchdown, with the scoring catch going for a career-long 61 yards. Of note on that catch was that it came from wide receiver Cedrick Wilson, marking the third different passer from whom McNichols has caught a touchdown pass this season (Thomas Sperbeck at Louisiana, along with Rypien this season).

McNICHOLS KEEPS CHURNING: Jeremy McNichols continued to prove himself the workhorse of this Boise State offense and a bona fide Doak Walker Award candidate Saturday night against Utah State, rushing 30

GAME NOTES

times for 132 yards and catching six passes for 73 yards and a score.

McNichols only got stronger as Saturday night's game went on, rushing for 100 yards in the second half, and, on Boise State final drive in the fourth quarter, carrying 10 times for 44 yards as the Broncos burned 6:04 off the clock and left Utah State just 1:37 to try and make up an 11-point deficit.

On the year, McNichols is tied for second in FBS with 10 touchdowns (seven rushing, three receiving), third in FBS with 193.00 all-purpose yards per game, while ranking fourth in the Mountain West with 504 rushing yards.

UP THERE WITH THE OFFENSE: Boise State put up 384 yards of offense against Utah State Saturday, and now rank 35th in the nation with 475.0 yards per game. This figure is helped by a passing attack that ranks 26th in the nation with 298.3 yards per game, and a rushing attack that cranks out 176.8 yards per contest, ranking 60th in the country.

Scoring-wise, the Broncos rank 52nd in the country and second in the Mountain West with 33.8 points per game.

WAIT, HOW MANY QUARTERBACKS DO YOU GUYS HAVE?: Despite the Bronco roster listing five players at quarterback, Boise State in fact retains the services of a couple of converted signal-callers in wide receivers Cedrick Wilson and Thomas Sperbeck. Former prep quarterbacks, the pair showed off their talents at their former positions Sept. 24 at Oregon State as Wilson completed a 23-yard pass to tight end Alec Dhaenens, and Sperbeck took a snap from the Wildcat and ran for nine yards.

Wilson added to his numbers Saturday against Utah State, completing a 61-yard touchdown pass to Jeremy McNichols.

This season, Wilson has completed both of his pass attempts for 84 yards and a touchdown, while Sperbeck is 1-for-1 for 48 yards and another touchdown.

SPERBECK KEEPS MOVING UP IN THE RECORD BOOK: Senior wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck, the only current Bronco voted by the fans to the 30-Year All-Blue Team, made five catches for 64 yards in Saturday's 21-10 win over Utah State. The performance continued Sperbeck's ascent up multiple categories of the Boise State record book, as he now stands fourth all-time with 2,760 receiving yards (304 back of all-time leader Titus Young), and tied for sixth all-time with 168 receptions (76 behind all-time leader Matt Miller). His 104 receiving yards on Sept. 24 against Oregon State also marked the 11th 100-yard receiving game of his career, tied for second all-time at Boise State and just two behind all-time leader Ryan Ikebe (1993-96).

With just four games under his belt, Sperbeck is fourth in the Mountain West with 431 receiving yards and 24 receptions, a season after leading the conference in that category with a Boise State single-season record 1,412 receiving yards as well as with 88 receptions, which tied Miller's Boise State single-season record.

#RYPITGOOD: Quarterback Brett Rypien has picked up right where he left off in 2015, ranking fourth in the Mountain West with 1,024 passing yards through the first five weeks of the season. Rypien became the first Boise State quarterback to throw for 300 yards in a season opener back on Sept. 3, going for 347 yards in the 45-10 win over Louisiana. It was also his sixth-career 300-yard passing game, a mark he reached by halftime, finishing the opening 30 minutes with 304 yards through the air. Against

GAME NOTES

Washington State, the school for which his uncle, Super Bowl XXVI MVP Mark Rypien played for, Brett threw for 299 yards and a touchdown.

RYPIEN-TO-SPERBECK: When Brett Rypien took the reins as Boise State's starting quarterback in 2015, he formed a productive partnership with wide receiver Thomas Sperbeck. Since Rypien's first series behind center, coming on Boise State's second possession of the third quarter against Idaho State (Sept. 18, 2015), he and Sperbeck teamed up 82 times for 1,382 yards and nine touchdowns.

That connection picked right up in 2016, as Rypien has found Sperbeck 24 times for 431 yards and three touchdowns over the first four games.

SHUTOUT STREAK: Boise State has not been shutout in 242 consecutive games, the ninth-longest active streak in the country and the 16th-longest streak in NCAA history. The last shutout came on the road against No. 15 Washington State, Sept. 27, 1997 (58-0). The loss to the Cougars is one of only two shutouts the Broncos have suffered since becoming a four-year institution in 1968.

O-LINE EXPERIENCE: Although the Broncos lost two linemen to the National Football League, the team still counts four returning starters along the line. Archie Lewis started eight games, including the final five at left tackle; Travis Averill started 11 games at left guard; Steven Baggett started all 13 games at right guard; and Mario Yakoo started 12 games, 10 of which coming at right tackle. Last season Marcus Henry started all 13 games at center, and was picked up by the New Orleans Saints as a free agent, and Rees Odhiambo, a third-round selection by the Seattle Seahawks, started eight games at left tackle. According to Phil Steele, the Broncos' 95 returning starts along the offensive line ranks 14th nationally entering 2016.

Bryan Harsin, a former Boise State quarterback, assistant coach and offensive coordinator, is in his third season as the head coach at his alma mater.

In his debut season Harsin led his alma mater back to where it rose to national prominence. Boise State went 12-2 in Harsin's inaugural season, winning its first outright Mountain West Championship, and capping the campaign with a 38-30 victory over Arizona in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

The victory in the Fiesta Bowl was the third such win for the Broncos in the previous nine seasons. Harsin, serving as offensive coordinator in the first two Fiesta Bowl victories, has been a part of each of the school's three appearances in the game.

The team's victory in the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship marked the team's first outright league title since joining the league in 2011, and the first overall since 2009. The only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State, Harsin has now won a conference championship as a student-athlete, assistant coach and head coach.

In 2015, the Broncos went 9-4, climbing as high as No. 20 in both the Associated Press and USA Today Coaches Polls. The Broncos concluded the 2014 season ranked No. 16 each poll.

Boise State capped the 2015 campaign with a 55-7 victory over Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, the fifth-largest margin of victory the history of bowl games.

For his efforts in 2014, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear Bryant" National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the nation's top first-year head coach by the Football Writers Association of America.

In addition to rejoining the national rankings - Boise State ranked 20th nationally in the final College Football Playoff Top 25 - the Broncos' offense also returned the nation's elite. Boise State concluded the 2014 season ranked ninth nationally in scoring offense (39.7) and 14th nationally in total offense (494.3). The team concluded the 2015 season ranked 15th nationally in both scoring offense (39.1) and total offense (501.5). The Broncos also concluded the 2015 season ranked 16th nationally in passing offense (310.2). For his efforts, Rypien was named first-team All-Mountain West, in addition to garnering MW Freshman of the Year honors.

Harsin was named head coach, Dec. 11, 2013. A graduate of Capital High School in Boise, he played quarterback for the Broncos from 1995-99.

Harsin and his wife Kes have two daughters, Devyn Lynn and Dayn Mykena, and a son, Davis.

The Broncos are 14-5 against schools from conferences that comprise the Resource Five since the start of the 2006 season, including a current streak of five-straight wins: Arizona in the VIZIO Fiesta Bowl (Dec. 31, 2014; 38-30), Washington (16-13; Sept. 4, 2015), Virginia (56-14; Sept. 25, 2015), Washington State (31-28; Sept. 10, 2016) and Oregon State (38-24; Sept. 24, 2016). Also included was a streak of six-consecutive victories, which was snapped in the 2012 season opener against Michigan State.

Since notching its first such victory, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the Broncos have gone 16-9. Boise State is 16-21 all-time in such games.

ALBERTSONS STADIUM / THE BLUE



Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third going in prior to the 2002 season. The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, making a total of five different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.



Since 1986, Boise State is a combined 167-36 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .823. And since 2000, Boise State has gone 98-6 at home (.942), the highest winning percentage in the country.

Overall, since the construction of Albertsons Stadium in 1970, Boise State is 250-53 (.825), the highest winning percentage of any stadium in the country built before 1980.
