THE GAME: The Boise State football team, which returned to the national rankings this week, takes its five-game winning streak on the road for a Mountain Division showdown with New Mexico, Friday (Nov. 16). The Broncos (8-2, 5-1 MW), ranked 23rd and 24th in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches Polls, respectively, and Lobos (3-7, 1-5 MW) are slated to kick at 7 p.m. at Dreamstyle Stadium in Albuquerque, N.M., and the game will be nationally televised by CBS Sports Network.

Should the Broncos return to Boise with a victory over UNM, they will host Utah State next week (Nov. 24) for the Mountain Division title and a second-straight berth in the 2018 Mountain West Championship Game.

BRONCO GAME NOTES

BOWL ELIGIBILITY: With the Broncos' victory over Air Force three weeks ago, Boise State became bowl eligible for the 21st-consecutive season (1998-2018). Despite being eligible, the Broncos were not selected for a bowl in 1998 (6-5) or 2001 (8-4). Regardless of the snubs, Boise State entered 2018 having appeared in a bowl game in each of the last 16 seasons, tied for the sixth-longest active streak in the country.

WINNING SEASONS: Boise State has cemented its 21st-consecutive winning season, the second-longest active streak in the country and tied for the 15th-longest in the history of college football.

Virginia Tech, currently 4-5, entered 2018 with 25-straight winning seasons, the nation's longest active streak and tied for the 11th-longest in college football history. Notre Dame recorded 42-straight winning seasons (1887-1932), the longest such streak.

FIVE-STRAIGHT: Since falling to San Diego State (19-13), the Broncos have reeled off five-straight wins, tied for the 11th-longest active winning streak in the country (Buffalo and Iowa State).

Only UCF (22), Alabama (12), Notre Dame (11), Clemson (10), Michigan (nine), Utah State (nine), UAB (eight), Washington State (six), Army (six) and Northern Illinois (six) enter this week with longer active streaks than the Broncos.

NON-SATURDAY GAMES: Boise State is playing its third of three non-Saturday games of the 2018 regular season. The Broncos are 57-17 alltime in non-Saturday games, including a mark of 49-11 during the regular season. On Fridays, Boise State is 32-11 all-time, including a mark of 32-9 during the regular season.

BRONCOS IN THE POLLS

ONE OF THE VOTERS: Boise State head coach Bryan Harsin is one of 65 voters in the 2018 Amway Coaches Poll.

17 YEARS IN THE RANKINGS: By opening the 2018 season ranked in the national polls, Boise State extended its streak of consecutive seasons with at least one week in the rankings, a mark that now stands at 17. Boise State has been ranked for at least one week in either the AP or the Coaches Poll every season since 2002.

PRESEASON RANKINGS: Boise State opened the 2018 season ranked No. 22 in both the AP and Coaches Polls, marking the seventh time in the last 10 seasons that the Broncos were ranked to open the year. It is, however, the first time Boise State opened a season ranked since 2015.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED: Boise State has an all-time record of 105-18 (.854) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP Poll, the Coaches Poll or the College Football Playoff Poll. A complete history of the Broncos in the rankings can be found on page 31.

MOUNTAIN WEST NOTES

KINGS STAY KINGS: Boise State captured its third Mountain West title in six seasons this past season, beating No. 25 Fresno State, 17-14, in the conference championship game at Albertsons Stadium.

The title ties Boise State with Colorado State (1999, 2000, 2002) and San Diego State (2012, 2015, 2016) for the most Mountain West crowns among current members, while BYU, TCU, and Utah still remain tied for most overall at four apiece.

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: The Broncos have played in four conferences all time, and have won multiple conference championships in each: six in the Big Sky (1970-95), two in the Big West (1996-2000), eight in the WAC (2001-10) and three in the MW (2011-Present).

CONFERENCE TITLES: Boise State's 2017 Mountain West Championship was its 13th since joining what is now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision in 1996, more than any school in the country during that time. Only Florida State (11), Oklahoma (11) and Ohio State (10) have won 10-or-more since the Broncos joined FBS.

The Broncos have won 19 conference championships all-time, including three in the Mountain West, eight in the WAC, two in the Big West and six in the Big Sky.

SENIOR SUCCESS: The Broncos' 2017 senior class was the 19th-straight group that will leave Boise State with at least one conference title. Of those 19 senior classes, 17 left with multiple championships, including 11 with three-or-more. The last senior class without a league championship was the 1998 group.

This year's seniors will be the 20th-straight with at least one conference title.

GAME NOTES

BRYAN HARSIN NOTES...

THE HARSIN ERA: The 2018 campaign marks Boise State's fifth under head coach Bryan Harsin, a former Bronco quarterback and assistant coach. Harsin, who is 50-14 over his Boise State tenure, has led the Broncos to three 10-win seasons and two Mountain West titles, most recently going 11-3 and capturing the conference crown in 2017. In his first season at the Bronco helm in 2014, Harsin guided the program to a 12-2 mark, which included the school's first outright Mountain West Championship since joining the league in 2011 and the school's third victory in the Fiesta Bowl.

HARSIN HITS 50 (WINS): Boise State football head coach Bryan Harsin has 57 wins through his first five-plus seasons as a head coach. Harsin has won over 74 percent of his games (57-19) at Arkansas State (2013) and Boise State (2014-present).

Harsin also hit the 50-win mark at Boise State with Nov. 9's victory over Fresno State, and his 50 victories with the Broncos are currently fifth-most for a head coach since Boise State became a four-year football playing institution in 1968. Only Chris Petersen (2006-13; 84), Tony Knap (1968-75; 71), Jim Criner (1976-82; 59) and Dan Hawkins (2001-05; 53) boast more wins as a head coach.

HEAD COACHES AT ALMA MATER: Bryan Harsin is one of only 22 head coaches in the country currently serving at his alma mater. Of the 22, five are in the Mountain West: Troy Calhoun (Air Force), Harsin, Nick Rolovich (Hawai'i), Jeff Tedford (Fresno State) and Matt Wells (Utah State).

DODD TROPHY WATCH LIST: Head Coach Bryan Harsin is the only head coach from the Mountain West - and from the Group of Five - on the Dodd Trophy's preseason watch list.

TEAM NOTES...

TWO EARLY LOSSES LEAD TO A HAPPY ENDING?: For the fourth time in the last six seasons (2013, 2014, 2017, 2018), Boise State sat at 3-2 through the first five games. While not ideal, a 3-2 start has, of late, been a sign of strong finishes for the Broncos.

Although the Broncos lost their bowl game and finished 8-5 in Chris Petersen's final year at the helm in 2013, Boise State has bounced back emphatically from 3-2 starts under Brian Harsin (2014-present). In 2014, the Broncos won 10-straight games after the 28-14 loss to Air Force dropped them to 3-2, a run that included a Mountain West Championship Game victory and a VIZIO Fiesta Bowl win.

Last season, the Broncos sat at 3-2 after a humbling 42-23 loss to Virginia at Albertsons Stadium. Again, the team responded, reeling off six-straight wins to clinch the Mountain Division. Then, following a loss at Fresno State in the regular-season finale, the Broncos rebounded to beat the Bulldogs in the Mountain West title game followed by a 38-28 win over Oregon in the Las Vegas Bowl.

FIGHTING BACK INTO THE POLLS: Boise State broke back into both national polls this week after an eight-week absence from the Associated Press Poll and a five-week absence from the Amway Coaches Poll. The Broncos came in at No. 23 in the AP Poll and No. 24 in the Coaches Poll. It marks the fifth time in program history that the Broncos have returned to the AP Poll after being dropped in the same season.

Since joining the FBS in 1996, previous returns to the poll in the same season came in 2007, 2012 (twice), and 2015. In 2007, the Broncos were dropped from the poll following a 24-10 loss at Washington on Sept. 8, but returned at No. 21 ahead of a Nov. 3 matchup with San Jose State following a six-game winning streak. In 2012, the Broncos returned to the AP Poll twice after being dropped. The 3-1 Broncos were dropped from No. 24 to unranked following a 32-29 win at New Mexico on Sept. 29, but spent just a week on the outside, returning at No. 24 following a 40-14 rout at Southern Mississippi. Boise State got as high as 19th in the poll before falling out once more following a 21-19 loss to San Diego State on Nov. 3, be-fore returning at No. 24 following two wins ahead of a Dec. 1 matchup with Nevada. In 2015, the Broncos went from No. 20 to unranked following a 35-24 loss at BYU on Sept. 12, but, following four-straight wins, returned at No. 25 for a week before dropping a 52-26 decision at Utah State on Oct. 16.

GAME NOTES

SWEET 16: Fresno State, at No. 16 in the Associated Press Poll, came into Nov. 9's matchup as the co-highest-ranked team to play the Broncos at Albertsons Stadium, matching Oregon in the 2009 season opener. The Bulldogs would meet the same fate as those Ducks, as Boise State beat Fresno State, 24-17, to improve to 2-0 in the contests against the co-highest-ranked teams to come to Boise.

CLEAR PATH TO WIN DIVISION, HOST TITLE GAME: Boise State's win over Fresno State, combined with other results in the conference over the Nov. 9-10 weekend, has given the Broncos control of their own destiny not only for winning the Mountain Division, but hosting the Mountain West Championship Game on Dec. 1.

The Broncos can accomplish both goals simply by winning its final two games: Nov. 16 at New Mexico, and Nov. 24 against No. 14/13 Utah State at Albertsons Stadium.

For hosting the title game, Boise State currently holds the head-to-head tiebreaker over Fresno State and Nevada, and holds the better conference record over San Diego State, which nullifies the Aztecs' win over the Broncos on Oct. 6.

HOME COMEBACKS: The Broncos, which trailed Fresno State 17-3 early in the third quarter on Nov. 9, overcame a 14-point deficit at home for the first time since being down 20-0 to San Diego State on Nov. 15, 2014 (Boise State won that game, 38-29).

Also, the last time Boise State came back to win at Albertsons Stadium after trailing entering the fourth quarter was last year's Mountain West Championship Game against Fresno State (Dec. 2, 2017), in which the Broncos trailed the Bulldogs, 14-10, entering the fourth quarter of that game, and won, 17-14.

LEFT AT ALBUQUERQUE: Albuquerque has been a good place for the Broncos, who are 4-0 on the road against New Mexico. Boise State averages 43.0 points per game over its four trips to The ABQ, highlighted by a 60-point outburst in 2014 and a 49-point performance two seasons ago.

A NOVEMBER FIRST: Nov. 9's win over then-No. 16/17 Fresno State marked Boise State's first victory over a ranked team in the month of November. Heading into the game against the Bulldogs, Boise State had been 0-4 in such games, dropping November contests against AP-ranked Fresno State (2005), Hawai'i (2007), and Nevada (2010), along with TCU (2011), which was ranked in the Coaches' Poll at the time.

The Broncos will likely have another program first on Nov. 24, as it could face a second ranked team in the same November should Utah State still be in the Top 25.

PROTECTING ALBERTSONS STADIUM (FROM BYU): Nov. 3's 21-16 victory over BYU brought the Broncos to 5-0 all-time against the Cougars at Albertsons Stadium. It was also the fourth time of the five meetings in Boise that the teams played a game that was decided by five or less points.

A HOME-FRIENDLY NOVEMBER: November provides an advantageous schedule for the Broncos in its attempt to claim the Mountain Division, with two of its final three conference games at home. Beginning Friday, the Broncos will have home dates against Fresno State (Nov. 9) and Utah State (Nov. 24) sandwiched around its conference road finale at New Mexico on Nov. 16.

With the Nov. 3 and Nov. 9 wins over BYU and Fresno State, respectively, the Broncos are now a combined 24-3 at Albertsons Stadium against its three November home foes. Broken down individually, the Broncos are 5-0 at home against BYU, 10-1 against Fresno State (the Broncos have won 10 in a row at home against the Bulldogs since the lone loss in 1984), and 9-2 against Utah State (last home loss to the Aggies coming in 1996).

THANKFUL FOR TOUCHDOWNS: Boise State has 12 different offensive players that have scored a touchdown in 2018, a mark that ranks tied for ninth nationally. Texas Tech lead the country with 15 different players.

GAME NOTES

Including Tyler Horton's three defensive touchdowns, and special teams scores from both Kekaula Kaniho and Avery Williams, the Broncos have 15 players that have found the end zone, tied for the seventh-most nationally. Boston College, Miami and Texas Tech, each with 18, lead the country in total players with TDs.

ANOTHER SINGLE-DIGIT LOSS IN MOUNTAIN WEST PLAY: Boise State's 19-13 loss to San Diego State on Oct. 6 was just its 12th in Mountain West play since joining the conference in 2011. Out of those 12, Saturday's loss was the ninth by single digits, as the Broncos have only been beaten by 10 or more points by a Mountain West foe on three occasions (28-14 at Air Force on Sept. 27, 2014; 52-26 at Utah State on Oct. 16, 2015; 28-17 at Fresno State on Nov. 25, 2017).

OVER 200 WINS SINCE 2000: Sept. 29's victory at Wyoming was Boise State's 201st since the start of the 2000 season, and, currently at 205 wins, the Broncos are the winningest team in college football since 2000. Oklahoma is second with 204 wins since 2000 and Ohio State is third at 202.

CONFERENCE RECORD: Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 129-17 (.884) in conference play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 139-26 (.842). Boise State went 5-3 in Mountain West play in 2015, just the second time since 1998 - when Boise State went 2-3 in the Big West - that the Broncos lost three conference contests in a season. It was also just the fourth time since 2001 - Boise State's first year in the WAC - that the Broncos lost multiple conference games (also went 6-2 in WAC play in 2001).

MW SUCCESS: Since joining the Mountain West for the 2011 season, Boise State has lost just 12 conference games, with only three of those 12 losses being by more than seven points. Outside of a 28-14 loss to Air Force (Sept. 27, 2014), a 52-26 loss at Utah State (Oct. 16, 2015), and a 28-17 loss at Fresno State (Nov. 25), the Broncos' other nine Mountain West losses have come by a combined 36 points. Boise State's four Mountain West losses from 2011-13 were by a combined seven points: TCU in 2011 (36-35); San Diego State in 2012 (21-19); Fresno State (41-40) and SDSU (34-31, OT) in 2013. Additionally, no Mountain West team has a winning record against the Broncos, although San Diego State is 3-3 against Boise State.

DEFENDING THE CROWN: Boise State will aim to win back-to-back Mountain West titles for the first time in2018. The Broncos last won consecutive conference titles with a WAC three-peat from 2008-10. Following its first two Mountain West titles (2012, 2014), the Broncos went 6-2 and 5-3 in conference play the following seasons (2013 and 2015, respectively).

SERVING UP 50-BURGERS: With Oct. 19's 56-28 win over Colorado State in the books, the Broncos have thrice hit the 50-point mark this season, the most since having five 50-point games in 2015.

Boise State's 56 points Sept. 1 at Troy marked the first time it had put a 50-burger on an opponent in a season opener since beating Weber State, 56-7, in the 2007 lid-lifter. The last time that the Broncos had scored at least 50 in an opener against an FBS team was in a 65-7 win over Idaho (then in the Sun Belt) in 2004.

ACTUALLY, MAKE IT A 60-BURGER: Boise State topped (no pun intended) its 50-Burger at Troy by serving up a 60-Burger to UConn on Sept. 8, beating the Huskies, 62-7. It marked the first time since a 63-14 win at Wyoming on Nov. 22, 2014, that the Broncos had hit the 60-point mark.

It was also Boise State's first 60-point performance at home since beating Southern Mississippi, 60-7, on Sept. 28, 2013.

BOISE STATE VOTED TO CAPTURE MOUNTAIN DIVISION (AGAIN): The preseason Mountain West predicted order of finish was released on July 24, and, voted to win the Mountain Division for the sixth-straight season was, you guessed it, Frank Stallone.

The announcement extended Boise State's run of being voted the preseason favorite to win the Mountain West (2011-12) or the Mountain Division (2013-present) every year since joining the conference ahead of the 2011 campaign. This preseason,

the Broncos received all 22 first-place votes, topping the Mountain Division with 132 points. They were followed, in order, by Wyoming (92 points), Colorado State (82), Utah State (78), Air Force (52), and New Mexico (23).

On the other side of the conference, Fresno State topped the West Division poll, receiving 16 first-place votes for 126 points, followed by San Diego State with six first-place votes and 116 points. UNLV (78 points), Nevada (72), Hawai'i (45), and San Jose State (25) rounded out the poll.

RYPIEN, WILLIAMS HEADLINE PRESEASON ALL-MOUNTAIN WEST HONORS: Senior quarterback Brett Rypien (Offensive Player of the Year) and redshirt sophomore CB/KR/PR Avery Williams (Special Teams Player of the Year) were announced as two of the three Mountain West preseason award recipients at the start of the Mountain West Football Media Summit on July 24.

Rypien is the second Boise State player to ever be named the Mountain West's Preseason Offensive Player of the Year (Kellen Moore, 2011), while Williams is also the second to be named the conference's Preseason Special Teams Player of the Year (Mitch Burroughs, 2012). Together, they are the first Broncos to earn a preseason Mountain West individual honor since Burroughs' recognition.

EIGHT BRONCOS NAMED TO PRESEASON ALL-MOUNTAIN WEST TEAM: Boise State had a program-record eight players named to the Preseason All-Mountain West Team in July. The previous record for the program since joining the Mountain West was in its inaugural season in the conference (2011).

Quarterback Brett Rypien, running back Alexander Mattison, and offensive linemen Ezra Cleveland and John Molchon represented the Boise State offense, while the trio of cornerback Tyler Horton, defensive tackle David Moa, and STUD Curtis Weaver were voted to the defensive team. CB/KR/PR Avery Williams was voted the team's return specialist.

PLENTY OF BRONCOS ON PRESEASON WATCH LISTS: The summer months ahead of the college football season are dominated by #WatchListSZN, during which the array of postseason awards release their preseason candidates.

This preseason, the Broncos had 10 athletes named to 16 different award watch lists, led by quarterback Brett Rypien, who was named to six. Rypien was named a preseason candidate for national player of the year honors such as the Maxwell Award and Walter Camp Award, in addition to quarterback of the year awards as the Davey O'Brien Award, Unitas Golden Arm Award and the Manning Award, in addition to the Wuerffel Trophy.

Defensive stalwarts Tyler Horton and David Moa were named to three lists apiece, each landing on the Bronko Nagurski Trophy list. Horton, a senior cornerback, was also included on the lists for the Jim Thorpe Award and Bednarik Award, while Moa was a candidate for the Outland Trophy and the Polynesian Player of the Year award.

More Broncos named to award watch lists for 2018 included: tight end John Bates (Mackey Award), nose tackle Sonatane Lui (Polynesian Player of the Year), MLB Tyson Maeva (Polynesian Player of Year), running back Alexander Mattison (Doak Walker Award), safety Kekoa Nawahine (Jim Thorpe Award, Polynesian Player of the Year), STUD Curtis Weaver (Ted Hendricks Award), and CB/KR/PR Avery Williams (Paul Hornung Award).

AMONG THE MOST 10-WIN SEASONS: This season, Boise State will seek its 16th 10-win campaign since joining Division I-A (now FBS) in 1996. The Broncos' current mark of 15 10-win seasons since 1996 ranks second in the country only to Ohio State, which has won 10 games 17 times over that span.

Last year's 11-3 campaign marked Boise State's third 10-win season in four years, a stretch which includes marks of 12-2 (2014) and 10-3 (2016). The Broncos had a run of seven-straight 10-win seasons from 2006-12, highlighted by undefeated campaigns in 2006 (13-0) and 2009 (14-0).

BRONCOS IN THE NFL

There are currently 16 Broncos on National Football League rosters (as of Nov. 11), and 11 teams have at least one former member of the Boise State football team on their roster.

At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last nine seasons, and 22 players have been drafted during that time - including eight in the first two rounds.

GAME NOTES

BOISE STATE'S BOWL STREAK AMONG BEST IN THE COUNTRY: Boise State's 48-38 win at Air Force on Oct. 27 made the Broncos bowl-eligible for the 21st-straight season (1998-2018).

Currently, the Broncos' streak of 16-straight bowl games, which will increase to 17 come the postseason, is tops among "Group of Five" schools and is surpassed by only five "Power Five" schools. Florida State, Georgia, LSU, Oklahoma and Virginia Tech have each played in at least 17-straight bowl games entering 2018.

COACHING CHANGES: The Boise State coaching staff made three changes this past offseason, promoting a graduate assistant and adding two new faces. Spencer Danielson, who served as a defensive graduate assistant in 2017, was promoted to full-time assistant coach and will oversee Boise State's STUDs after the NCAA passed legislation allowing for a 10th full-time assistant position.

Chad Kauha'aha'a joined the Boise State staff as the defensive line coach after spending the past three seasons at Oregon State, including the past two as associate head coach. Kauha'aha'a, oversaw the defensive line for all three seasons at Oregon State, in addition to the outside linebackers from 2016-17.

The third addition to the Bronco staff was Jeff Popovich, who oversees the cornerbacks. Popovich, who has 12 seasons of experience in the collegiate coaching ranks, spent the last two seasons in the NFL with the Indianapolis Colts, serving as assistant to head coach Chuck Pagano, a former Boise State assistant coach (1987-88), in 2016, before moving to a defensive quality control position in 2017.

COORDINATOR CONTINUITY: Boise State enters the 2018 season with its three coordinators intact from a season ago, as Zak Hill (offense), Andy Avalos (defense), and Kent Riddle (special teams) form the triumvirate once again. Notably, with Hill entering his second season as offensive coordinator and Avalos his fourth in charge of the defense, Boise State will carry over the same offensive and defensive coordinators for a second-straight season for the first time since Robert Prince and Pete Kwiatkowski oversaw the Bronco offense and defense, respectively, from 2012-13.

Hill, who served as co-offensive coordinator with offensive line coach Scott Huff in 2016, took sole possession of the role in 2017 after Huff's departure to Washington.

AMONG THE GREATEST: Boise State boasts the fourth-best all-time winning percentage amongst the Football Bowl Subdivision. The Broncos' all-time record at the four-year level through Nov. 10 is 445-167-2 (.726). Notre Dame (916-324-42; .7308) is first on the all-time list, with Michigan (952-340-36; .7304) second. Ohio State (907-325-53; .726) is third. For the complete top 15, see page four.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY: The Broncos are the winningest football program in the country since 2000, with an overall record of 205-40 (.837). Ohio State (202-42; .828), Oklahoma (204-46; .816), LSU (183-58; .759) and Alabama (188-60; .758) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page four.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: The Broncos were one of only five schools in the country to receive the NCAA's Public Recognition Award in football for ranking in the top-10 percent nationally in APR from 2010 through 2014. Joining the Broncos were Clemson, Duke, Northwestern and Rutgers. Additionally, center Mason Hampton was a two-time CoSIDA Academic All-American (2016-17) and a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy in 2017, given annually to the top football scholar-athlete in the country. Boise State also had 36 team members named to the Fall 2017 Academic All-Mountain West list, marking the seventh-straight year in which Boise State has led the MW in all-academic selections.

DEFENSE...

AMERICA'S TEAM OR BOISE'S TEAM?: The NFL's Dallas Cowboys have endeared themselves to Boise State fans over the past few seasons with frequent acquisitions of Bronco greats.

Currently, the Cowboy roster boasts six Bronco alumni, including five on defense: defensive tackle Tyrone Crawford (at Boise State from 2010-11), defensive end

GAME NOTES

DeMarcus Lawrence (2012-13), safety Darian Thompson (2012-15), wide receiver Cedrick Wilson (2016-17), and linebacker Leighton Vander Esch (2015-17). Dallas also features former Boise State quarterback Kellen Moore (2008-11) as its quarterbacks coach.

SUPER GLUE AND DUCT TAPE: It would make sense to sympathize with Boise State defensive coordinator Andy Avalos, whose defense has suffered the loss of numerous starters and key contributors to season-ending injury this season, while others have missed games due to various knocks. But Avalos continues to work his magic, as demonstrated by Nov. 9's win over Fresno State, as the Broncos held Fresno State to just 107 yards rushing over 28 carries, and kept Bulldog quarterback Marcus McMaryion, a Davey O'Brien Award semifinalist, in check at 283 yards and just one touchdown pass.

Avalos' defense has been clutch when it matters, coming up with game-clinching stops deep in Bonco territory over the past two games. First, Tyson Maeva and Scale Igiehon sacked BYU quarterback Zach Wilson at the Bronco 4 on the final play of the game to preserve Boise State's 21-16 win on Nov. 3, then the defense stopped Fresno State at the Bronco 29 with 1:18 remaining to keep the Broncos' 24-17 lead intact.

MAEVA MAKES KEY SACKS: Two weeks in a row now junior linebacker Tyson Maeva has come up with the key sack for the Broncos defense. On Nov. 3 against BYU, Maeva teamed with Scale Igiehon to drop Zach Wilson at the four-yard line on the final play of the game to preserve Boise State's 21-16 win. Six days later, with Fresno State at the Bronco 23 and driving for a potential go-ahead score late in the fourth quarter, Maeva broke through and dropped Marcus McMaryion for a loss of six on third down, forcing the Bulldogs into a 4th-and-11 at the 29. On the ensuing play, Avery Williams would break up McMaryion's pass with 1:18 to play, ending the Bulldogs' final threat.

With his efforts over the past few weeks, Maeva has moved into third on the team in tackles (45), and he leads the Bronco linebacker corps in both sacks (3.0) and tackles-for-loss (6.0).

WEAVER JOINS THE TOP 10: Redshirt sophomore Curtis Weaver hasn't suffered any drop-off from his All-America redshirt freshman campaign of 2017. This year, Weaver leads the Mountain West and ranks 16th in the country with 8.5 sacks.

His sack Nov. 9 against Fresno State brought his career total to 19.5, breaking into Boise State's all-time top 10 at ninth.

Weaver has recorded 3.5 sacks over the last two games, and recorded a career-high seven tackles in Nov. 3's win over BYU. His 2.5 sacks against the Cougars marked his fifth-career game with at least two sacks.

SACK RACE: Boise State accomplished quite the feat Nov. 9 against Fresno State, recording three sacks against an offensive line that had only surrendered five over its previous nine games. Curtis Weaver and Jabari Watson each had a sack, while Tyson Maeva and Tony Lashley shared a third.

The Broncos lead the Mountain West and rank sixth in the country with 3.40 sacks per game, and pace the conference with 34 sacks. Weaver leads the Broncos with 8.5 sacks on the season. Behind him, fellow STUD Jabril Frazier has 5.5 and senior defensive end Durrant Miles is third with 4.5 sacks.

GET OFF THE FIELD: The Boise State defense has been incredible on third downs this season, holding opponents to just a 31.0 conversion rate (39-for-126). That marks leads the Mountain West and ranks 13th in the country.

The ability of the Bronco defense to get off the field continued Nov. 9 against Fresno State, as the Bulldogs converted just 2-of-10 third downs (20.0 percent).

NAWAHINE MAKES THE STOPS: Junior safety Kekoa Nawahine has quietly put together another good season for the Broncos, leading the team with 61 tackles after a 10-tackle performance Nov. 9 against Fresno State.

GAME NOTES

Also notable about Nawahine's contributions and leadership is that he is one of just two members of Boise State's opening day starting secondary (along with cornerback Avery Williams) to not miss a game this season due to injury. Tyler Horton missed two games earlier this season, while fellow safety DeAndre Pierce suffered a season-ending injury Sept. 29 at Wyoming.

THAT'S THE "STUFF": Boise State's defense added another dramatic moment to the program's rivalry with BYU on Nov. 3, as linebacker Tyson Maeva and nose tackle Scale Igiehon combined to sack Cougar quarterback Zach Wilson at the Bronco four-yard line on the final play to preserve the 21-16 victory.

Credit has to also go to the Boise State secondary for its coverage on the short field, as it forced Wilson to scramble right into the grasps of Maeva and Igiehon.

HORTON HUSTLE: Senior cornerback Tyler Horton recovered his team- and FBS-leading fourth fumble of the season against Nov. 3 BYU, and it came on a big hustle play. After missing on an interception attempt, which was caught by the BYU receiver, Horton recovered, chased down the runner, and stripped him just before the goal line. Horton would go on to pounce on the ball in the end zone for the Bronco touchback, snuffing out a Cougar scoring threat.

GETTING THE BOUNCES: Boise State recovered three fumbles in Nov. 3's win over BYU, matching its season high (Sept. 1 at Troy). With Tyler Horton leading the way with his team- and FBS-leading four fumble recoveries, the Broncos lead the Mountain West and rank second in the country with 12 fumble recoveries.

BACKS AGAINST THE WALL: The Bronco defense has, of late, saved its takeaway skills for deep in its own territory. Oct. 13 at Nevada, the Broncos made two takeaways inside the 10-yard line, first with Jabril Frazier's forced fumble that was recovered by Sonatane Lui in the first quarter, then followed by Tyler Horton's 99-yard pick-six in the second quarter.

A week later against Colorado State, Kekaula Kaniho snuffed out a Colorado State drive with an interception of K.J. Carta-Samuels at the Bronco 2-yard line, returning it out to the eight. Nov. 3 against BYU, the Broncos stopped another drive deep, this time with Tyler Horton's strip and fumble recovery in the end zone.

KANIHO HITS THE TRIFECTA: Sophomore SLB Kekaula Kaniho demonstrated once again on Oct. 19 against Colorado State his flair for the big play, being in the right spot to scoop up Avery Williams' fumble on a first-quarter punt return and take it 74 yards for a touchdown.

As it officially goes in the books as a 74-yard punt return touchdown for Kaniho, it marks the third non-offensive touchdown of his career, and he is believed to be (due to incomplete records in early seasons of the program's history) the only Boise State player to have scored touchdowns on a fumble return (Oct. 14, 2017 at San Diego State), interception return (2017 Las Vegas Bowl against Oregon), and a punt return.

MAMA, THERE GOES THAT MAN: Senior cornerback Tyler Horton continued to show off his uncanny nose for the ball Oct. 13 in Reno, nabbing an interception and returning it 99 yards for a touchdown. The 99-yard pick-six was not only tied for the second-longest in Boise State history (Tasi Autele, at Montana on Oct. 2, 1993), but was also Horton's third defensive touchdown this season, a Boise State record.

Horton has now scored five defensive touchdowns in his career, two on interceptions and three on fumble returns. This year, the Fresno, Calif., native leads the FBS with four fumble recoveries, two of which he took back for touchdowns at Troy on Sept. 1.

COMING THROUGH IN TOUGH SPOTS: Boise State's defense has found itself with tall tasks on occasion, coming on the field with an opponent beginning a drive in Bronco territory, and answered resoundingly.

Oct. 6 against San Diego State, the Aztecs, after Bronco turnovers, began three drives inside the Bronco 31. Boise State's defense responded by limiting the Aztecs to two field goals, a touchdown, and just two first downs on those drives.


KINGS OF CHAOS



The Boise State defense unveiled a new incentive for being the most disruptive player in practice during Fall Camp - a bike; a spruced-up white BMX bike with a gold seat, gold streamers and a gold mini football on the handlebars. It even includes a king's crown to wear and a flag on the back that reads, "It's All About The Ball."

In the opening game of the 2018 regular season, the "King of Chaos" was rewarded with something new – a seat on a throne. The Bronco defense escorts the ballhawk to the Turnover Throne (seen below), where the honored Bronco sits and is feted by his teammates.

Last season the Boise State football team had a turnover belt that was earned by the defender who was a thorn in the offense's side. This year, just a few yards off the practice field is a shiny, freshly-painted new reward.



GAME NOTES

Oct. 13 in Reno, the Bronco defense forced and recovered a Nevada fumble inside the 10-yard line in the first quarter, preventing the Wolf Pack from taking a two-score lead. Then, after the Wolf Pack opened a drive on the Bronco 29 following an interception, the defense came through again, as Tyler Horton picked off a pass at the Bronco 1 and returned it 99 yards for a touchdown, turning a 10-7 deficit into a 14-10 Boise State lead.

Most recently, against BYU on Nov. 3, Tyler Horton forced a fumble and recovered it in the end zone for a touchback to end a Cougar drive. And, of course, Tyson Maeva and Scale Igiehon dropped BYU quarterback Zach Wilson at the Bronco 4 on the final play of the game to preserve the 21-16 win.

OPENING DRIVE 3-AND-OUT STREAK SNAPPED: The Bronco defense's season-opening streak of forcing a 3-and-out on its opponents' opening drives came to an end Oct. 13 in Reno, as Nevada drove 58 yards and came away with a field goal.

Over the first five games of this season, here's the total number of yards for each opponent (in order: Troy, Connecticut, Oklahoma State, Wyoming, San Diego State): 5, 4, 1, 7, 2.

UNDER-300 GAMES: With nine games in the books this season, the Boise State defense has held three opponents to under 300 yards of total offense this season (Connecticut, Wyoming, San Diego State).

Sept. 8 against Connecticut, the Broncos yielded just 193 yards to the Huskies, before holding Wyoming to 295 on Sept. 29 in Laramie, then limiting San Diego State to 267 yards on Oct. 6.

Boise State's defense posted another strong effort Oct. 6 against San Diego State, limiting the Aztecs to just 267 yards of total offense, and holding them to 12 points over three drives that started in Bronco territory due to turnovers.

BOUNCING BACK AFTER GIVING UP 40: Boise State, which has only given up 40 points to a team in regulation five times in the Bryan Harsin Era (2014-present), and six times overall (including a 47-44 triple-overtime loss at Washington State in 2017), continued its trend of bouncing back defensively with Sept. 29's 34-14 win at Wyoming.

After Sept. 15's 44-21 loss at Oklahoma State, Boise State held Wyoming to just 14 points, the fourth-straight time that the Bronco defense had yielded less than 20 points in the game following an opponent scoring 40. The Broncos are also now 6-0 in the game after an opponent has hit 40.

HORTON EARNS CONFERENCE, NATIONAL RECOGNITION: Senior cornerback Tyler Horton was rightly heralded following his outstanding defensive performance in Sept. 1's 56-20 victory at Troy. After deflecting a pass that led to a Bronco interception, and returning two fumbles for touchdowns, Horton was named the Mountain West Defensive Player of the Week for the second time in his career on Sept. 3, as well as being named the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Week on Sept. 4.

HORTON BRINGS THE CHAOS: Horton reigned as the supreme King of Chaos in Sept. 1's victory at Troy, not only returning a pair of fumbles for touchdowns but also creating the Broncos' first takeaway by deflecting a screen pass that ended up picked off by linebacker Tony Lashley.

Horton, a preseason candidate for the Bednarik Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, and Jim Thorpe Award in 2018, became one of just five players all-time in FBS history to record two fumble returns for touchdowns in a single contest at Troy. His first score came in the third quarter, as he plucked a loose ball caused by Kekoa Nawahine and winded his way 55 yards to the house, while his second came on an 11-yard return in the fourth quarter.

For his career, Horton now has five defensive touchdowns after Oct. 13's 99-yard pick-six at Nevada. His first came on an 85-yard pick-six against Washington State on Sept. 10, 2016, and the second on a 21-yard fumble return against Air Force on Nov. 18, 2017.

GAME NOTES

VANDER ESCH GOES FROM BRONCO TO COWBOY: Redshirt junior linebacker Leighton Vander Esch capped one of the greatest seasons by a Boise State player by entering the 2018 NFL Draft and being selected 19th overall by the Dallas Cowboys. With that selection, Vander Esch became the fifth Bronco all-time to be selected in the first round of the draft, joining Ryan Clady (Denver Broncos, 2008), Kyle Wilson (New York Jets, 2010), Doug Martin (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 2012) and Shea McClellin (Chicago Bears, 2012). At No. 19, Vander Esch matched McClellin for the second-highest a Boise State player has been drafted, seven spots behind Clady, who was taken 12th.

Vander Esch finished the 2017 college season with a team-high 141 tackles, also leading or sharing the team lead in interceptions (three) and forced fumbles (four). He was voted the Mountain West Defensive Player of the Year and was named Defensive MVP of the Mountain West Championship Game as he tied a career high with 16 tackles, and made the game-sealing interception, in Boise State's 17-14 win over No. 25 Fresno State.

The Riggins, Idaho, native finished the season ranked 14th in the country with 10.1 tackles per game, and fifth in the country with 6.5 solo tackles per game.

HORTON'S GOT IT COVERED: Senior cornerback Tyler Horton is ready for a big final season with the Broncos, coming off of a 2017 campaign in which he was named to the All-Mountain West First Team ahead of being voted to the 2018 Preseason All-Mountain West Team.

Last year, Horton picked off two passes, and recovered two fumbles, one of which he returned 21 yards for a touchdown against Air Force (Nov. 18). The Fresno, Calif., native also led the Broncos with 11 passes defended, which also tied for fourth in the Mountain West.

This preseason, Horton's name has gained some steam with national awards, as he has been named to the watch lists for the Bednarik Award, Bronko Nagurski Trophy, and the Jim Thorpe Award, the latter of which is given annually to the nation's top defensive back.

RAPTORS ALWAYS HUNT IN PAIRS: After Boise State's victory over Wyoming last Oct. 21, head coach Bryan Harsin referred to STUDs Jabril Frazier and Curtis Weaver as the defense's "velociraptors," in that opposing defenses couldn't key in on defending one without the other breaking through from a different angle. That nickname proved true as the pair combined for 17.0 sacks, with Weaver (11.0) ranking 13th in the country and leading the Mountain West, and Frazier (6.0) ranking fifth in the conference.

Ahead of 2018, each Bronco was named to Athlon Sports' Preseason All-Mountain West Team, while Weaver was named to the Watch List for the Ted Hendricks Award, and Frazier to the Reese's Senior Bowl Watch List.

Last season, STUD Curtis Weaver became the first freshman in Mountain West history to be named to the conference's defensive first team. In addition to his sack totals, he scored a defensive touchdown, a 55-yard fumble return at Washington State (Sept. 9), and against Nevada made his first-career interception.

Frazier, meanwhile, bounced back very well from an injury-plagued late 2016 and offseason of rehabilitation, ranking second on the team in sacks (6.0), tacklesfor-loss (6.5) and forced fumbles (two) in 2017.

One unique way in which Frazier's superb play boosted the Bronco defense is through his "assists," as each of his forced fumbles, coming on strip sacks at Washington State (Sept. 9) and against Air Force (Nov. 18), resulted in a Bronco scoop-and-score touchdown, as Curtis Weaver and Tyler Horton respectively converted.

WILLIAMS LOOKS TO FOLLOW BREAKOUT FIRST SEASON: Redshirt sophomore cornerback Avery Williams will aim to improve this season upon his eye-opening first year of action, in which he electrified the Boise State faithful with his play on defense and special teams.

LYLE SMITH



Lyle Smith, the "Father of Boise State Football," head football coach from 1947-67 and Boise State Athletics Director from 1967-81, passed away the morning of July 26, 2017, at the age of 101.

Smith came to Boise Junior College in 1946 as basketball coach and assistant football coach. In 1947, he became head coach of the BJC football program and didn't lose a game until his fourth season.

His 1958 team won the National Junior College championship.

Smith retired from coaching after the 1967 season. In his 20 years as the head football coach at BJC; he compiled a 156-25-6 record, a winning percentage of .842.

Smith continued to lead Boise State as AD until his retirement after the 1980-81 academic year. Smith guided Boise State's transition from a junior college power to a highly-successful NCAA Division I athletic program.

In his honor, a statue was erected at the southwest corner of Albertsons Stadium. He was present for its unveiling prior to the 2016 season.

GAME NOTES

Williams was named to the All-Mountain West Second Team as a return man, after leading the conference in punt return average (11.2 ypr) and punt-return touchdowns (two), and ahead of the 2018 season was named the loop's Special Teams Player of the Year. On his first-career touch last Sept. 2 against Troy, Williams returned a punt 81 yards for a touchdown, and followed with a 53-yard touchdown return Oct. 14 at San Diego State.

On defense, Williams broke into the starting lineup at cornerback on Oct. 6 at BYU, and went on to finish the season with two interceptions, 45 tackles, and eight passes defended.

The multi-threat Bronco was also recognized nationally this preseason by being named a candidate for the Paul Hornung Award, given annually to college football's most versatile player.

READY TO CREATE MORE TURNOVERS: Last year, Boise State's defense forced 26 turnovers, a stark contrast to its 2016 total of nine, which was a program-record low. In 2017, it took just five games for the Broncos to exceed that number, and the team went on to force multiple turnovers in nine of 14 games.

OFFENSE...

RYPIEN MAKES MIDSEASON AWARD CUTS: Quarterback Brett Rypien has made the midseason cuts for three national awards over the last couple of weeks, being named to the Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award Top 10 on Nov. 7, after being announced as one of 12 semifinalists for the Wuerffel Trophy on Nov. 1, and a midseason candidate for the CFPA Performer of the Year Trophy on Nov. 6.

In his final season at Boise State, Rypien is going out in style, setting Mountain West records and being on pace for a career year, as he currently has a career-high 25 touchdown passes and, with at least three games remaining, is just 598 yards away from his career high in passing yards (3,646 yards in 2016) and 27 completions from his career best of 273 in 2015.

This year Rypien has posted six 300-yard passing performances, and his 68.9 completion percentage is on pace to be his career best.

MATTISON HEATING UP: Junior running back Alexander Mattison took the Bronco offense onto his shoulders Nov. 9 against Fresno State, fueling Boise State's comeback from a 17-3 second-half deficit by running for 91 yards and two scores over the final 30 minutes. The effort highlighted a night in which he carried a career-high 30 times for 144 yards (a season high).

In the second half against Fresno, Mattison figured in four of five Boise State drives. On the first, he carried five times for 36 yards and caught two passes for nine yards, capping the drive with a seven-yard touchdown run. On the second drive, he ran four times for 20 yards, with the game-tying one-yard plunge. He ran for 19 yards on the third drive, which was capped by Brett Rypien's 49-yard touchdown pass to Khalil Shakir for the go-ahead score, then finished his night by powering for 10 yards on three carries to gain the game-clinching first down.

Mattison's performances over the last few weeks have reignited his hopes for a second-straight 1,000-yard season back on pace, as he is currently at 870 yards along with 12 rushing touchdowns on the season.

THIRD-DOWN CONSISTENCY: Boise State continued its solid play on third downs Nov. 9 against Fresno State, converting 10-of-16 for first downs. The team's success on third downs this season has been key to the 8-2 record, as the team ranks second in the nation with a 56.4 percent success rate, behind only Army (56.4). Over 10 games this season, the Broncos have failed to convert half of their third downs in just one, when they went 6-for-19 against San Diego State on Oct. 6.

Over its last four games, against Colorado State (Oct. 19), at Air Force (Oct. 27), against BYU (Nov. 3) and Fresno State (Nov. 9), the Broncos have gone an impressive 34-for-53 (64.2 percent) on third-down conversions.

GAME NOTES

MEMORABLE FIRST TOUCHDOWN CATCH: Freshman wide receiver Khalil Shakir has been used in a variety of roles by the Broncos this season, running the ball, whether as a back or from the Wildcat, and returning punts in addition to his wide receiver role.

While he scored his first-career touchdown on a carry at Wyoming, Shakir finally got his first receiving touchdown Nov. 9 against Fresno State, hauling in a 49-yard throw from Brett Rypien to put the Broncos ahead for good and cap a 14-point comeback. It highlighted a four-catch, 59-yard night for the freshman, both of those figures being season highs.

This year, along with running for 70 yards and a touchdown, Shakir has caught 16 passes for 170 yards and a score.

USING HIS LEGS: Quarterback Brett Rypien has obviously made his name by using his arm to bring success to the Bronco offense, but Nov. 9 against Fresno State, he used his legs to great effect. Rypien finished the game with eight attempts for 30 yards, adeptly dodging Bulldog rushes to pick up key yardage. The 30 yards on the ground were a season-high for Rypien.

ALL HE DOES? CATCH TOUCHDOWNS: Redshirt senior A.J. Richardson kept up his touchdown-scoring ways Nov. 3 against BYU, as he made his team-best eighth touchdown grab of the season in Boise State's 21-16 win.

On Oct. 19 against Colorado State, he posted career highs in receiving yards (137) and touchdown catches (two) while matching his best with six receptions. At Air Force (Oct. 27), despite coming out with just two catches for 33 yards, one was a 21-yard scoring grab from Brett Rypien in the first half.

On the year, Richardson, in addition to leading the team with eight touchdown, a figure that is third in the Mountain West, is second in both receptions (44) and yards (719), and paces the receiving corps with three 100-yard games.

THE HIGHTOWER EFFECT: Wide receiver John Hightower, a junior-college transfer from Hinds Community College, continued his eye-opening debut season with a career effort Oct. 27 at Air Force, setting personal bests in receptions (eight), receiving yards (182), and touchdown catches (three).

Hightower scored Boise State's first two touchdowns against the Falcons, hauling in scoring passes of 44 and 18 yards, respectively, but saved his best for last, catching a Brett Rypien deep ball in stride for a 61-yard score with 3:21 to go.

The performance brought Hightower's numbers this season to 30 catches for 496 yards and six touchdowns. He's also rushed eight times for 163 yards and two more scores, and is tied for second on the team with eight total scores (with A.J. Richardson).

TWO HIT THE CENTURY MARK: For the second time this season, two Broncos receivers eclipsed the century mark in yardage as John Hightower (182 yards on eight catches) and Sean Modster (101 yards on six catches) had big nights Oct. 27 at Air Force.

Previously this year, Hightower and A.J. Richardson achieved the feat Sept. 8 against Connecticut, as Hightower went for 119 yards and Richardson an even 100.

SOMETHING ABOUT PLAYING THE RAMS: Oct. 19's 56-28 win over Colorado State marked the sixth time in eight overall meetings with the Rams that the Broncos scored at least 40 points, and the third time hitting the 50-point mark.

Boise State's 56 points against the Rams were also the most in a conference home game since scoring 63 against Idaho on Nov. 14, 2009 (WAC).

RECEIVER ROULETTE: Boise State's receiving corps has resoundingly answered its preseason skeptics, if the first nine games of this season are any indication. One major question mark hovering over the group was who would step into the role left by Cedrick Wilson, who caught 83 passes for a program single-season record 1,511 yards and seven touchdowns last season?

GAME NOTES

Through 10 games, nine Bronco receivers have hauled in at least 10 passes, with redshirt senior Sean Modster leading the way with a team-high 50. Five receivers have caught at least two touchdowns, with A.J. Richardson (44 catches for 719 yards) leading the way with eight, followed by John Hightower (30 catches for 496 yards) with six, and Modster with four. CT Thomas (31 catches for 407 yards) has hauled in four touchdown grabs while Akilian Butler (23 catches for 189 yards) has two.

Additionally, Modster, Hightower and Richardson have each posted at least two 100-yard receiving game already this season, with Richardson leading the team at three. Modster posted career highs in catches (seven), receiving yards (167), and touchdowns (two) in the season opener at Troy, while Hightower has his career game Oct. 27 at Air Force, grabbing eight balls for 182 yards and three touchdowns. Richardson, on the strength of his 74-yard touchdown catch, finished the Connecticut game with exactly 100 receiving yards on three catches, racked up 113 yards and a score on six catches at Wyoming (Sept. 29), then had career highs of 137 receiving yards and two scores against Colorado State (Oct. 19).

The receivers have also demonstrated the ability to break off big plays, as Richardson (74 yards), Hightower (67, 61), Modster (54), and Thomas (53) each have at least one catch of over 50 yards.

THE END ZONE...THAT'S WHERE THE LOCALS GO: Meridian native and former Mountain View High School standout Garrett Collingham scored the first touchdown of his career Oct. 19 against Colorado State, taking a sweep around left end for a four-yard score.

It showed a continued role in the Bronco offense for the tight end, who made the first catch of his career Sept. 1 at Troy, an 11-yard grab that converted a third down for the Broncos.

Collingham began his career with the Broncos as a quarterback before moving to punter, then to wide receiver, then to linebacker and special teams in 2017.

He saw game action on special teams last year, making two tackles, before moving to tight end to begin 2018. He made his second-career catch Oct. 13 at Nevada, a 19-yard reception, and followed with two grabs for 27 yards against Colorado State.

BLEEDING THAT CLOCK: The Bronco offense ran a clinic on possession and bleeding the clock in the second half at Nevada on Oct. 13, possessing the ball for an incredible 13:28 of the fourth quarter and 20:55 of the second half in the 31-27 win.

In the fourth quarter, Nevada only got two possessions, with the second beginning at its own 24 with six seconds left on the clock. The Wolf Pack's only significant possession of the period was a 3-and-out that lasted just 1:26 and began with 9:52 left in the game.

NOT AFRAID TO GO FOR IT: A season after struggling on fourth downs, Boise State has had a resurgent 2018 season when it comes to going for it. The Broncos rank 31st in the country in fourth-down conversions, at 61.1 percent. The Broncos' confidence on fourth downs was highlighted at Nevada, as the offense converted a 4th-and-8 with under three minutes to play which allowed Boise State to run the clock down to under 10 seconds before giving Nevada one final possession.

HIGHLIGHT-REEL CATCHES: This season has been one for highlight-reel catches already for Boise State receivers. Sept. 15 at Oklahoma State, wide receivers John Hightower and A.J. Richardson made a couple of highlight-reel scoring grabs, as Hightower laid out to haul in a 31-yard touchdown pass down the sideline, putting the Broncos up 7-0 on the Cowboys. In the third quarter, Richardson, running the same route along the sideline, reached up and made a spectacular one-handed catch, gathering the ball in then walking the tightrope along the sideline over the final five-to-seven yards for the score, helping the Broncos cut the Cowboy lead to 20-14.

Sept. 29 at Wyoming, the two struck again. First, it was Richardson catching a 21-yard touchdown pass in the second quarter between two defenders and holding on despite taking a hard hit. Later in the quarter, Hightower, despite losing a

GETTING THE TIGHT ENDS GOING: Just as the receivers have helped fuel the offense, the Bronco tight ends have begun getting into the flow of things. Redshirt sophomore John Bates, a preseason John Mackey Award candidate, has made seven catches this season, including a 24-yard touchdown reception Sept. 8 against Connecticut. Redshirt senior Chase Blakely, meanwhile, made a career high six receptions for 30 yards Sept. 15 at Oklahoma State, including his first-career scoring grab. On the year, Blakley leads the group with 14 catches for 66 yards and a touchdown.

Against the Cowboys, Bates and Blakely combined for 10 catches for 79 yards and a score, with Bates hauling in four passes for 49 yards to complement Blakely's career day.

A HISTORIC NIGHT FOR OFFENSE: Boise State's 818 yards of total offense Sept. 8 against UConn not only set the program's single-game record, it blew away the previous best of 742 yards set in 2011 against Colorado State.

The Broncos racked up 514 yards of offense by halftime, and even tied the single-game Mountain West record of 822 yards with just over a minute left in the contest before taking a knee twice to drop down to 818 yards at the final gun.

Boise State's output included 400 rushing yards, the sixth-highest single-game total in program history, as well as a per-carry rushing average of 8.88 yards, the program's fourth-highest single-game mark.

PLENTY OF OPTIONS IN THE GROUND GAME: The Broncos showed off plenty of depth and talent in the run game against UConn, as the team rushed for 400 yards, the sixth-highest single-game total in program history.

Junior Alexander Mattison led the way with his sixth-career 100-yard rushing performance, carrying 11 times for 115 yards and two touchdowns. Freshman Andrew Van Buren saw his first extended action of the season, gaining 75 yards on 13 carries and scoring his first-career touchdown.

The team rushing performance was supplemented by receiver John Hightower's 55-yard touchdown run, backup quarterback Chase Cord's 41 yards over two carries, and 35 yards over seven carries from safety-turned-running back Skyler Seibold.

MATTISON GOING FOR BACK-TO-BACK 1,000-YARD CAMPAIGNS: Junior running back Alexander Mattison aims to become the sixth Bronco running back since 2001 to record back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons. With a 1,000-yard season in 2018, he would join the list that features Brock Forsey (2001-02), lan Johnson (2006-07), Doug Martin (2010-11), Jay Ajayi (2013-14), and Jeremy McNichols (2015-16).

Through 10 games in 2018, Mattison leads the Broncos with 870 rushing yards and 12 touchdowns, averaging 4.2 yards per carry.

Last year, Mattison, despite various nagging injuries, rushed for 1,086 yards and 12 touchdowns and averaged 5.1 yards a carry, being named All-Mountain West Honorable Mention. His season was highlighted by a career-best 242 rushing yards and three touchdowns, including a 70-yard scoring run, in Boise State's 59-52 overtime win at Colorado State on Nov. 11.

He also made his mark in the passing game, catching 28 passes for 284 yards and a score.

This year, Mattison was named to the Preseason All-Mountain West Team in addition to the preseason watch list for the Doak Walker Award, given annually to college football's top running back.

1,000-YARD RUSHERS: It was well established last season that when Alexander Mattison eclipsed 1,000 yards rushing that Boise State had extended its streak of consecutive seasons with such a performance to nine, tied with Auburn for the longest in the nation. However, per research done by Louisiana Tech, it was discovered that this streak is tied for the sixth-longest in the history of college

SHUTOUT STREAK: Boise State has not been shut out in 261 consecutive games, the ninth-longest active streak in the country and the 15th-longest streak in NCAA history. The last shutout came on the road against No. 15 Washington State, Sept. 27, 1997 (58-0). The loss to the Cougars is one of only two shutouts the Broncos have suffered since becoming a four-year institution in 1968.

SPECIAL TEAMS...

SCORING ON KICKOFF AND PUNT RETURNS: Boise State's special teams scored on both a punt return and a kickoff return Oct. 19 against Colorado State, marking what is believed to be the first time the Broncos have pulled that feat in program history.

With the exception of missing box scores from the 1981 season, this current campaign is the only one since 1968 in which the Broncos have scored touchdowns on a kickoff and punt return in a single game. Kekaula Kaniho was credited with a 74-yard punt return touchdown after picking up teammate Avery Williams' fumble after an initial return of 10 yards on the first-quarter punt, and Williams grabbed an onside kick on the bounce and dashed 44 yards for the score in the fourth quarter against the Rams.

WILLIAMS BACK INTO FORM: Kick/punt returner Avery Williams has rounded into the 2017 form that led to him being voted the 2018 Preseason Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Year, once again instilling fear in opposing kick units.

Over the last three games, Williams has averaged 20.2 over five punt returns, including one that he returned for a touchdown but had called back due to a penalty Oct. 19 against Colorado State, and a 67-yard, third-quarter return Oct. 27 at Air Force that set up a Bronco touchdown from the 5-yard line. Currently, Williams averages 12.1 yards per punt return.

Against Colorado State, Williams also scooped up an onside kick and dashed 44 yards to the house for his first-career kickoff return for a touchdown.

HOGGARTH KEEPS PAT STREAK GOING: Redshirt senior kicker Haden Hoggarth hit all three of his PAT attempts Nov. 9 against Fresno State, bringing him to a perfect 47-for-47 on the season and 104-for-104 in his career.

Hoggarth had one of his finest games Oct. 27 at Air Force, going 2-for-2 on field goals, including a career-long 47-yarder, along with a 5-for-5 effort on PATs.

On Oct. 19, Hoggarth kicked eight PATs against Colorado State, the third time this season, and fourth time in his career, that he has achieved that feat. He is now just the third Boise State kicker with at least four eight-PAT games in his career. Tyler Jones (2001-04) leads with six, followed by Nick Calaycay (1999-2002) with five.

On the year, Hoggarth is also 8-for-13 on field-goal attempts and is second on the Broncos with 71 points.

FILL-IN SKILLIN: Redshirt senior punter Quinn Skillin filled in on kickoff duties against Colorado State (Oct. 19) and at Air Force (Oct. 27) in the absence of usual kickoff man Joel Velazquez, and acquitted himself well with 12 touchbacks on 17 attempts.

While his day job is as the team's No. 1 punter, Skillin has honed his accuracy as he's been called on very often to punt with short field to work with. This was evident Oct. 6 against San Diego State, when Skillin punted a career-high nine times, and, despite punting with a short field much of the time, delivered to help the Broncos pin San Diego State deep.

Although he averaged just 39.1 yards per punt, Skillin pinned the Aztecs inside the 20-yard line seven times, including one punt being downed at the 1-yard line in the second half. He also boomed a first-quarter punt 56 yards that was muffed

GAME NOTES

VELAZQUEZ MAKES HIS PLACEKICKING DEBUT: Oct. 6's game against San Diego State marked the placekicking debut of redshirt sophomore Joel Velazquez, who went 1-for-2 on PAT attempts. Prior to Saturday, Velazquez had been Boise State's full-time kickoff specialists, in addition to sharing punting duties with Quinn Skillin.

PAT STREAK SNAPPED: Joel Velazquez' missed PAT in the fourth quarter of Oct. 6's 19-13 loss to San Diego was Boise State's first since Tyler Rausa missed one at San Jose State on Nov. 27, 2015. The miss ended a streak of 157-straight converted PATs for the Broncos.

BLOCK THAT PUNT!: A game after surrendering two blocked punts, Boise State's special teams turned things around Sept. 29 at Wyoming by blocking a punt, and forcing a muffed snap on a second.

Jalen Walker's pressure helped force a muffed snap in the first quarter, as Wyoming punter Tim Zaleski dropped the ball as he prepared to punt. Walker ended up recovering the fumble to set up the Broncos at the Cowboy 24. In the second quarter, John Hightower broke through and blocked Zaleski's punt, which was recovered just past the line of scrimmage by Skyler Seibold at the Cowboy 43. That play set up a Haden Hoggarth field goal that put the Broncos up 24-0.

QB BRETT RYPIEN

#RYPITGOOD: Quarterback Rypien continues to cement himself among the top quarterbacks in Mountain West history this season, a year after earning his third-career All-Mountain West honor, being named to the second team.

Rypien has been putting up video game numbers in 2018, ranking in the national top 20 in completions per game (24.6, seventh), passing yards (3,048, seventh), completion percentage (68.9, ninth), passing yards per game (304.2, 10th), passing touchdowns (25, eighth), passing efficiency (159.8, 16th).

Rypien is currently the FBS' active career leader in passing yardage at 12,924, and on Nov. 9 against Fresno State became the Mountain West's alltime leader (passing San Diego State's Ryan Lindley, who has 12,690), as well as in completions (also passing Lindley, who had 961).

Rypien also ranks second all-time in the Mountain West in passing attempts.

With his performance Oct. 19 against Colorado State, Rypien eclipsed the 12,000 career passing yards mark, becoming just the second Boise State quarterback (along with Kellen Moore) and second Mountain West quarterback to do so.

Oct. 27 at Air Force, Rypien threw for 399 yards, posting his 20th-career 300-yard passing performance, to become the Mountain West's co-leader with BYU's Max Hall (20: 2007-09). The Spokane, Wash., native also threw five touchdowns against the Falcons, tying his career high.

MOVING UP IN THE RECORD BOOKS:

Rypien has continued his march up the Boise State record books, surpassing Kellen Moore (2008-11)'s record of 16-career 300-yard passing games on Sept. 15 (Rypien is now at 20), and sitting second all-time at in passing yards, completions, and attempts. Sept. 1 at Troy, Rypien passed Tony Hilde (1993-96) into second place in career attempts, currently sitting at 1,499, while remaining in second in passing yards (12,655) and completions (957). He trails Moore in all three categories.



ALBERTSONS STADIUM / THE BLUE



Albertsons Stadium - and Lyle Smith Field - is the home of Boise State football and the annual Famous Idaho Potato Bowl.

Smith, who passed away in July of 2017 at the age of 101, is the undisputed father of Bronco football, who from 1946-67 built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director, Smith had a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

Completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million, what was originally known as Bronco Stadium had a seating capacity of 14,500. Since that time the stadium has expanded four times to its current capacity of 36,387.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the first blue AstroTurf in the country. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third going in prior to the 2002 season. The first Blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second Blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, making a total of five different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color.

Since 1986, Boise State is a combined 181-38 on The Blue, a winning percentage of .827. And since 2000, Boise State has gone 112-8 at home (.933), the highest winning percentage in the country during that time.

Overall, since the construction of Albertsons Stadium in 1970, Boise State is 264-55 (.828), the second-highest winning percentage of any stadium in the country built before 1980. Only Alabama's Bryant-Denny Stadium (264-53-3; .830), built in 1929, has a higher winning percentage for its tenant among stadiums built before 1980.

UNIFORMS





Boise State unveiled a new look for the 2017 season, the first time the Broncos had overhauled their Nike uniforms since 2011.

Included in the new slate are blue, orange and white, and the jerseys feature new stripes on the sleeves and "Blue Collar" on the inside of the neck.

The uniforms are from the Nike Vapor Untouchable line, with stretch woven material, a seamless front and shoulders and laser perforation fabric instead of mesh. The uniforms combine materials and science designed for speed and comfort for the players, based on four core principles – fit, durability, weight and core body temperature.

HEAD COACH BRYAN HARSIN

Bryan Harsin, a former Boise State quarterback, assistant coach and offensive coordinator, is entering his fifth season as the head coach at his alma mater. Harsin boasts a record of 42-12 at Boise State, an average of more than 10 wins per season. Overall, he is 49-17 as a head coach – including one season at Arkansas State – and has led his programs to bowl games in each season as a head coach.

In his debut season Harsin led his alma mater back to where it rose to national prominence. Boise State went 12-2 in 2014, winning its first outright Mountain West Championship and capping the campaign with a 38-30 victory over Arizona in the 2014 VIZIO Fiesta Bowl.

The victory in the Fiesta Bowl was the third such win for the Broncos in the previous nine seasons. Harsin, serving as offensive coordinator in the first two Fiesta Bowl victories, has been a part of each of the school's three appearances in the game.

The team's victory in the 2014 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship marked Boise State's first outright league title since joining the conference in 2011, and the first overall since 2009. The only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State, Harsin has now won a conference championship as a student-athlete, assistant coach and head coach.

Boise State captured another MW title in 2017, Harsin's second in four seasons, capping the championship year with a 38-28 victory over Oregon in the Las Vegas Bowl. The Broncos concluded the year at 11-3 overall and ranked No. 22 in both the Associated Press and Coaches Polls.

The Broncos have been ranked in the top 25 in each of Harsin's four seasons, climbing as high as No. 13 in each poll in 2016, Boise State's highest ranking since finishing eighth and sixth in the AP and Coaches Polls, respectively, in 2011.

In 2015, the Broncos went 9-4, climbing as high as No. 20 in both the AP and Coaches Polls. Boise State capped the 2015 campaign with a 55-7 victory over Northern Illinois in the San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, the fifth-largest margin of victory in the history of bowl games. In 2016, Harsin guided the Broncos to a 10-3 record and an appearance in the Motel 6 Cactus Bowl.

The Broncos' four-consecutive bowl appearances under Harsin runs the school's streak to 16, tied for the nation's sixth-longest streak.

For his efforts in 2014, Harsin was named a finalist for the Paul "Bear Bryant" National Coach of the Year Award, the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year Award and the Dodd Trophy, given annually by the Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year Foundation. He was also named the nation's top first-year head coach by the Football Writers Association of America. Harsin was a candidate for the Dodd Trophy in each of his first three seasons at Boise State, and in 2016 Harsin was once again named to the watch list for the Bryant Award.

Harsin was named head coach, Dec. 11, 2013. A graduate of Capital High School in Boise, he played quarterback for the Broncos from 1995-99. Following his graduation from Boise State with a degree in business management, Harsin coached running backs and receivers at Eastern Oregon in 2000.

The former Bronco letterwinner began his coaching career at Boise State as a graduate assistant in 2001, before taking over the tight ends as a full-time assistant coach from 2002-05. When Chris Petersen was hired as head coach in 2006, Harsin assumed the role of offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. Harsin was Petersen's offensive coordinator for five of his eight seasons as head coach (2006-10), and was named a finalist for the 2009 Broyles Award, awarded annually to the nation's top assistant coach. Boise State went 61-5 during his tenure as offensive coordinator.

With Harsin on staff, Boise State has won 10 conference championships.

Harsin and his wife Kes have two daughters, Devyn Lynn and Dayn Mykena, and a son, Davis.

Including the 2018 season, the Boise State coaching staff boasts a combined 108 years of previous experience - more than a century - with the Broncos, including 40 years in the program as student-athletes and 68 years as assistants.



TROY, Ala. (AP) - Brett Rypien passed for 305 yards and four touchdowns, and Sean Modster had 167 yards receiving, to lead No. 22 Boise State to a 56-20 opening victory over Troy. The Broncos raced to a 35-7 halftime lead over a Trojans team coming off an 11-win season, largely with the Rypien-to-Modster connection. Then, Tyler Horton and Boise State's defense mostly took over the scoring for the second half against Troy. The cornerback scooped-and-scored on a pair of fumbles,



with returns of 55 and 11 yards. Horton, who has four defensive touchdowns, tied the FBS record for fumble returns for TDs in a game shared by four others.
