COUNTDOWN TO SPORTS AUTHORITY MW CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The 2015 Sports Authority Mountain West Football Championship game will kick off at 5:30 p.m. MT / 4:30 p.m. PT / 2:30 p.m. HT on Saturday, December 5 and be televised by ESPN2. The contest will be hosted at the home stadium of the regular-season divisional champion with the highest College Football Playoff ranking.

MOUNTAIN DIVISION-CLINCHING SCENARIOS

- Boise State: wins the division with victories over Air Force and San José State and a loss by New Mexico in one of its last two games.
- Air Force: wins the division with victories over Boise State and New Mexico.
 Wins the division with a victory at Boise State and a New Mexico loss against
 Colorado State. Wins the division with a loss at Boise State, a victory at New
 Mexico and the Broncos loss at San José State.
- New Mexico: wins the division with a victories over Colorado State and Air Force.

WEST DIVISION-CLINCHING SCENARIOS

- San Diego State: wins the division with a win over UNLV or Nevada or a Nevada loss at Utah State.
- Nevada: wins the division with wins over Utah State and San Diego State and the Aztecs lose at UNLV.

BOWL ELIGIBILITY

Air Force (7-3), Boise State (7-3), San Diego State (7-3), Nevada (6-4) and New Mexico (6-4) are all bowl eligible this season.

The Falcons have qualified for the postseason in eight of the last nine years, while the Broncos have played in a bowl game in each of the last 13 seasons. The Aztecs became bowl eligible for the sixth straight year after last week's 38-3 victory over Wyoming. Nevada and New Mexico also became bowl eligible last week with victories over San José State (37-34 in OT) and Boise State (31-24), respectively. The Wolf Pack are potentially bowl eligible for the 10th time in the last 11 seasons, while the Lobos reached the six win mark for the first time since 2007.

Air Force, Boise State, Nevada, New Mexico and San Diego State are five of the 62 teams in the FBS to have qualified for postseason play through the first 11 weeks of the 2015 campaign.

The Mountain West sent a record seven teams into postseason bowl games in 2014, posting a 3-4 record (.429). Overall, the Mountain West has earned 69 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 38-31 (.551) all-time record. The league has also posted an overall postseason mark of at least .500 in eight of the last 11 seasons.

The 2015 postseason will mark the ninth straight year the MW has sent at least five teams to bowls and 12th time since the league's inception in 1999.

Over the last 11 seasons, the Mountain West has captured the Bowl Challenge Cup four times and owns the second-best win percentage in bowl games among the 10 FBS conferences with a 31-23 mark (.574) during that span. The MW is the only conference to win the trophy four times since the award's inception in 2002-03.

The Boise State starting secondary has recorded more career interceptions than any other starting secondary in the nation. Made up of **Darian Thompson, Donte Deayon, Jonathan Moxey and Dylan Sumner-Gardner**, the Broncos have 40 career picks. Thompson has 19 career interceptions, the most among FBS defenders and most by a MW defender all-time, while Deayon has 17 career INTs, which is tied for the third-most in Mountain West history and tied for second-most among active NCAA defenders. Moxey has the other four interceptions for Boise State.

TWO NEW HEAD COACHES JOIN MW RANKS IN 2015

For the second consecutive year, the Mountain West welcomes two new head football coaches. Colorado State will be under the direction of **Mike Bobo**, while **Tony Sanchez** takes over at UNLV. Both are first-year head coaches.

Bobo comes to Colorado State from the University of Georgia, where he had spent the previous 14 seasons, including the last eight as offensive coordinator. Bobo's 14-year stint at Georgia, where he was a quarterback in the late 1990s, began in January, 2001, when head coach Mark Richt hired him as quarterbacks coach. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2007. During his time at UGA, Bobo helped lead the Bulldogs to 135 victories, including two Southeastern Conference championships, five SEC Eastern Division titles and eight bowl victories. Prior to his time with the Bulldogs, Bobo began his coaching career at Jacksonville State (1999-2000).

Sanchez spent the last six seasons leading Bishop Gorman (Las Vegas) High School to an overall record of 85-5 and six consecutive state 4A championships. In his six seasons at Bishop Gorman, Sanchez saw 34 of his players earn collegiate football scholarships, including 25 to FBS programs. Prior to his stint in Las Vegas, he coached at Onate High School in Las Cruces, N.M. and Irvin High School in El Paso, Texas. His lone collegiate coaching experience came in 1996 as he was an undergraduate assistant at New Mexico State, the school where Sanchez was a two-year letterwinner.

FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACHES IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST

The Mountain West has welcomed 24 new head coaches over the last 16 seasons. Former BYU head coach Gary Crowton and current Boise State head coach **Bryan Harsin** have posted the most victories and highest win percentage among the group with 12 victories and an .857 win percentage in their inaugural years in 2001 and 2014, respectively. Harsin became the first to conclude his inaugural season by winning the Mountain West Championship Game, the first of two outright MW Championships in program history. Harsin is the only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State. Harsin is one of three first-year coaches to win at least 10 games in their inaugural season, joining Crowton (12 wins, 2001) and Urban Meyer (10 wins, 2003).

MOUNTAIN WEST IN THE POSTSEASON

The Mountain West sent a record seven teams into postseason bowl games in 2014, posting a 3-4 record (.429). Overall, the Mountain West has earned 69 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 38-31 (.551) all-time record. The league has also posted an overall postseason mark of at least .500 in eight of the last 11 seasons.

The 2014 postseason marked the eighth straight year the MW has sent at least five teams to bowls and 11th time since the league's inception in 1999. It also marked the second straight year that six or more MW squads advanced to the postseason.

Over the last 11 seasons, the Mountain West has captured the Bowl Challenge Cup four times and owns the second-best win percentage in bowl games among the 10 FBS conferences with a 31-23 mark (.574) during that span. The MW is the only conference to win the trophy four times since the award's inception in 2002-03.

For the second consecutive year, the Mountain West had seven bowl-eligible teams - Boise State (12-2), Colorado State (10-3), Air Force (10-3), Utah State (10-4), Nevada (7-6), San Diego State (7-6) and Fresno State (6-8). This ties the conference record for most bowl-eligible teams. The MW has boasted at least five bowl-eligible teams 11 times since the league's inception in 1999.

WEEK 1 OFFENSIVE

Nick Stevens, QB, Colorado State

- In his first career start, completed 20-of-28 passes (71.4 percent) for 289 yards and five touchdown passes (all career highs) in Colorado State's 65-13 victory over Savannah State.
- His five touchdown passes went to five different receivers.
- The five touchdown passes tied for the second-most in CSU history, and the most by a Rams quarterback making his debut start. Played in only two and a half quarters due to the score.

DEFENSIVE

Calvin Munson, LB, San Diego State

- Recorded a team-high 11 tackles (3 solo), two interceptions (both returned for a touchdown 19 yards and 67 yards) and 2.5 tackles for loss in San Diego State's 37-3 win over San Diego.

 Became the first player in school history and fourth
- Became the first player in school history and fourth since the inception of the Mountain West in 1999 to have two interceptions returned for a touchdown in a single game (SDSU has been playing football since 1921).
- The two interceptions returned for a touchdown ties an NCAA single-game record for a linebacker and are tied for the second most among all players.
- The two interceptions were more than every player in the country in Week 1 except for teammate Damontae Kazee and West Virginia's Karl Joseph (both had three).
- The fumble recovery was the first of his career.

SPECIAL TEAMS

Andrew Rodriguez, WR/PR, Utah State

- Returned eight punts for 136 yards in Utah State's season-opening 12-9 win against Southern Utah.
- His 88-yard punt return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter proved to be the game-winning score.
 Overall, he returned a USU and MW record eight punts for 136 yards against SUU.
- Rodriguez's 88-yard punt return is tied for the second-longest in Mountain West history.
 The 88-yard punt return for also is a Maverik
- The 88-yard punt return for also is a Maverik Stadium record and the third-longest in Aggie history trailing Kevin Robinson, who returned a punt 90 yards for a touchdown at Troy in 2004, and Dale Leatham, who also returned a punt 90 yards for a touchdown at Wichita State in 1950. Robinson held the previous Maverik Stadium record with an 87-yard punt return for a touchdown against San José State in 2005.
- The previous MW record was also seven by Scott Harding (Hawai'i) in 2014.

WEEK 2 OFFENSIVE

D.J. Johnson, RB, Air Force

- Rushed for 103 yards for his first-career 100-yard game on a career-most 21 carries in Air Force's 36-17 victory over Mountain West foe San José State.
- Tied his career-high with three rushing touchdowns all of which came in the fourth quarter.
- Scored on a 13-yard run to put the Falcons ahead 23-16 with 12:29 left in the game and followed with a one-yard run on fourth-and-goal to give the Falcons a two-score lead.
- Clinched the game with his final touchdown on a career-long 34 yard run with 3:43 left in the game.
- Six carries went for touchdowns or first downs, including five in the fourth quarter.
- Had 12 carries for 82 yards and three touchdowns in the fourth quarter.

DEFENSIVE

- Recorded six total tackles and led the defensive effort of holding San José State to just 16 points in the Air Force victory over the Spartans.

- Outgained the Fresno State team by himself, 345 all-purpose yards to Fresno State's 247 yards of total offense.

WEEK 8 **OFFENSIVE**

Karson Roberts, QB, Air Force

- Rushed for a season-high 92 yards on 18 carries (5.1 yards per carry) and scored a career-high four rushing touchdowns in Air Force's 42-14 victory over Fresno State.
- Completed 5-of-10 passes for 108 yards and caught the first pass of his career (20 yards) to score his first-career receiving touchdown.
- Became the first Falcon to rush for four touchdowns in a single game since fullback Mike DeWitt vs. New Mexico in 2011. Also is the first Air Force quarterback to rush for four touchdowns since Shaun Carney vs. UNLV on Oct. 15, 2005. The four rushing touchdowns tie as the third-most ever in a game by a quarterback.
- His 30 points scored in the game are the secondmost in school history and most since Dee Dowis set the school record of 36 vs. San Diego State Sept. 2 1989

DEFENSIVE

lan Seau, DE, Nevada

- Recorded four solo tackles, all sacks, in Nevada's 30-20 win over Hawai'i. The four sacks are a careerhigh and were a half sack shy of the Wolf Pack single-game record of 4.5 sacks by Jorge Cordova against Washington on Oct. 11, 2003.
- Become the ninth player in Mountain West history to register four sacks in a single game. It also marked the most sacks by an MW player since Wyoming's Korey Jones had four against Texas State on Sept. 10. 2011.
- The 4.0 sacks against the Rainbow Warriors tie for the most in a single game in the FBS this season (with Texas A&M's Daeshon Hall and East Carolina's Montese Overton).

- Boise State had its 18-game home win streak snapped last Saturday in a 31-24 loss to New Mexico. The 18-game stretch was the third-longest active streak in the nation. The Broncos haven't lost back-to-back home games since 1997., when they lost on Oct. 25 to Louisiana Tech (31-27) and on Nov. 8 vs. Nevada (56-42).
- Broncos QB Brett Rypien completed 40-of-74 passes for 503 yards against New Mexico. The passing attempts and completions set program records. On the season, Rypien averages 317.4 passing yards per contest, which ranks 12th nationally. Among freshmen signal-callers, the 317.4 passing yards are the most in the FBS.
- Boise State WR Thomas Sperbeck has caught 69 passes for 1,210 yards and seven touchdowns. His receiving yardage total ranks fourth among all FBS pass-catchers. Last weekend vs. New Mexico, Sperbeck hauled in 20 receptions for 281 yards. These are both the highest totals this season by an FBS player.
- No FBS player caught more than 20 balls in a single game since Oct. 13, 2012 when Louisiana Tech's Quinton Patton caught 21 passes vs. Texas A&M. The 281 receiving yards are the most since Oct. 19, 2013 when Michigan's Jeremy Gallon had 369 yards and Texas A&M's Mike Evans had 287 yards.
- Sperbeck's 1,210 receiving yards are the second-most in a single season by a Bronco player. Titus Young holds the program record of 1,215 yards, set in 2010.

- Boise State's Jeremy McNichols is one of nine running backs nationally with at least 15 rushing touchdowns this season. Overall, McNichols is averaging 12.7 points per game to rank third in the FBS for scoring.
- McNichols has scored a touchdown in nine consecutive games, which ties a Mountain West record. Overall, he has 19 TDs which is third-most in the FBS this season
- Air Force ranks third among all FBS teams in rushing offense, averaging 332.8 yards per game. This is on pace to be the most rushing yards per contest in the Troy Calhoun era.
- Air Force is the only FBS team to have not given up a sack this season. All other FBS teams have allowed at least two. On a similar note, the Falcons rank third nationally in tackles for loss allowed, averaging just 3.5 per game.
- The Falcons are 4-0 this season when producing a 100-yard rusher and have won 10 straight such contests dating back to 2013.
- Air Force has not turned the ball over since Oct. 24 vs. Fresno State.
- Last Saturday vs. Utah State, Air Force WR Jalen Robinette had a career-best 210 receiving yards, which was the third-most in school history and the most by a Falcon since 1978.

- The Bulldogs defense also logged a season-best four takeaways against the Rainbow Warriors. They picked off three passes and recovered one fumble. Entering the contest, Fresno State had five interceptions.
- Fresno State's Ejiro Ederaine moved into third place in Mountain West history
 with 43.0 tackles for loss. He is just 5.0 TFLs shy of the all-time MW leader
 Miles Burris (2008-11) of San Diego State. Among active FBS defenders,
 Ederaine ranks third.
- The Bulldogs have used four quarterbacks in 2015 but last weekend they only
 used one. Zack Greenlee completed 20-of-35 passes for 285 yards and six
 touchdowns, all career highs. The six TD passes are the most by a Mountain
 West signal-caller this season and tied for most by an FBS QB.
- Fresno State is one of the least penalized teams in the nation, averaging 41.1
 penalty yards per contest. This figure ranks 14th among FBS teams and third
 in the Mountain West.

- The Fresno State defense averages 2.7 sacks per contest, which ranks 22nd nationally and second in the Mountain West. On the season, the Bulldogs have 27 sacks.
- The last time the Bulldogs had four or fewer victories in a single season was in 2011. That year, Fresno State compiled a 4-9 record.
- BYU has won five of its last six contests with the lone loss coming last Saturday vs. Missouri (20-16). The Cougars are 2-0 against Mountain West opponents this season, defeating Boise State on Sept. 13 (35-24) and San José State on Nov. 6 (17-16).
- The Cougars are one of the best red zone offenses in the country, ranking fourth as they convert .947 percent of the time. BYU has been inside the red zone 38 times and have scored on 36 occasions.
- BYU is 3-2 in games decided by seven points or fewer this season.

- A victory over Nevada would give Utah State bowl eligibilty for the fifth straight season. The Wolf Pack earned a potential spot in the postseason with a 37-34 overtime victory against San José State last Saturday. Nevada has reached bowl eligibility for the 10th time in the last 11 seasons.
- Utah State is riding a 13-game home win streak, the third-best streak nationally.
 The Aggies haven't lost at home since Oct. 12, 2013 vs. Boise State (34-23).
- The Aggies, who lost on the road at New Mexico on Nov. 7 and at Air Force on Nov. 14, have dropped back-to-back conference games for the first time since 2011. That year they lost at Fresno State (31-21) and vs. Louisiana Tech (24-17).
- Utah State LB Nick Vigil tallied a career-best 20 tackles in last Saturday's defeat
 at Air Force. Vigil, who ranks third nationally averaging 11.8 stops per game,
 registered the second-most tackles in a contest this season by an FBS player.
- When it produces a 100-yard rusher, Utah State has won 19 consecutive games.
- Utah State WR Hunter Sharp caught 13 passes for 193 yards and three touchdowns last Saturday at Air Force. The 13 receptions are the most by an Aggie since 2002 when Kevin Curtis hauled in 13 passes vs. Middle Tennessee.

- Last Saturday, Aggies QB Kent Myers established career highs in completions (25), pass attempts (47), passing yards (364) and passing touchdowns (4).
- Nevada's Brent Zuzo ranks 11th among all FBS kickers with a .875 field goal percentage. He has connected on 14-of-16 attempts this season.
- With six total interceptions on the season, **Dameon Baber** is tied for third nationally. Baber is also tied for first in the Mountain West with San Diego State's **Damontae Kazee**.
- The six interceptions are the most by a Nevada player in a single season since Joe Garcia also picked off six passes in 2006.
- The Wolf Pack are 5-0 this season when both **Don Jackson** and **James Butler** each rush for more than 100 yards in the same game. This is a feat they've accomplished three times this season, most recently against Fresno State on Nov. 7.
- Nevada RB James Butler has rushed for more than 100 yards in four consecutive games. Last Saturday, Butler ran for 119 yards and a touchdown against San José State. On the season, he has six 100-yard rushing performances and eight in his career. Butler is six yards shy of becoming the 31st player in Wolf Pack history to rush for at least 1,000 yards.

- A Colorado State victory would make the Rams bowl eligible for the third consecutive season.
- Colorado State WR Rashard Higgins has caught a pass in 35 consecutive games, every contest he has played in. It is also the longest active streak by a Mountain West player.
- Higgins, who leads all active FBS receivers with 3,356 career receiving yards, has 16 100-yard receiving games, the second-most in Mountain West history, behind BYU's Austin Collie (17).
- Higgins ranks second in the Mountain West for career receiving TDs (31). Fresno State's Devante Adams holds the record with 38 TD grabs from 2012-
- Colorado State LB Cory James has recorded 24 career sacks, which is tied for the third-most in Mountain West history and fourth-best all-time at CSU. James' 24 sacks are fourth-most among active FBS defenders.
- The Rams have scored in 32-of-40 quarters this season.
- As a team, CSU leads the nation with a 43.41 net yards per punt average. Rams punter Hayden Hunt, a semifinalst for the Ray Guy Award, ranks fourth nationally and second in the Mountain West with a 46.3 average, trailing San José State's Michael Carrizosa (48.5).

- CSU DB Trent Matthews has nine career interceptions, one shy of entering the Rams' top 10 career list. The last Ram player to log at least 10 career INTs was Erik Olson (1996-99).
- In its last two games, New Mexico have defeated Utah State (14-13) and Boise State (31-24). The Lobos have won six games for the first time since 2007, when they compiled a 9-4 record and played in the New Mexico Bowl.
- In the last two weeks, Delane Hart-Johnson caught an 85-yard touchdown vs. Utah State (Nov. 7) and hauled in an 81-yard pass at Boise State (Nov. 14). This marks the first time in school history a player has registered two catches of at least 80 yards in the same season. On the season, Hart-Johnson has 10 receptions for 235 yards. The 86-yard pitch and catch was the fifth-longest pass in New Mexico history, and the longest since 1998.
- The Lobos are 3-0 this season when rushing for 300 yards and 3-4 when rushing for fewer than 300 yards. The Lobos have only won three when rushing for fewer than 200 yards under head coach Bob Davie, all three occurences happening this season (vs. Hawai'i, vs. Utah State and at Boise State).
- New Mexico opponents have faced 38 red zone opportunities, but the Lobos defense has only allowed 15 touchdowns and 10 field goals. The .658 red zone defense percentage ranks third in the nation.

- The Spartans lead the nation in fewest passing yards allowed per game (144.4).
 Over the last 22 games, SJSU is allowing just 123.4 passing yards per contest.
 It has been ranked in the top 5 nationally in this category every week since Sept. 20, 2014.
- Through eight games, San José State has 20 rushing touchdowns, eclipsing the team's total of 11 in 2014 and 12 in 2013. The last time the Spartans scored 20 or more rushing touchdowns in a season was in 2004 when they had 22.
- Spartans RB Tyler Ervin ranks eighth nationally with 1,303 rushing yards. Deoncé Whitaker (2000) holds the program record for rushing yards in a single season with 1,577. Ervin needs to rush for 275 rushing yards in the Spartans final two games to set the program record.
- On the year, Ervin has scored 14 total touchdowns, including 12 on the ground, which is the second-most by a Spartan since at least 2001. Former WR Chandler Jones caught 15 TDs in 2013. The program single-season touchdown record is held by Johnny Johnson, Jr., who scored 19 times in 1988.

- When it comes to all-purpose yardage, Ervin ranks second nationally, averaging 209.8 yards per contest. On the season, he has rushed for 1,303 yards, hauled in 245 receiving yards, and has 550 return yards. In his career, Ervin has 5,607 all-purpose yards, which leads all active FBS players. He now owns the program record for career all-purpose yards.
- San José State ranks fifth nationally with 41.97 net yards per punt, while sophomore Michael Carrizosa ranks first among FBS punters, averaging 48.5 yards per boot.
- Hawai'i has dropped eight consecutive games, which is tied for the third-longest losing skid in the nation. Kansas has lost 12 in a row and Eastern Michigan has dropped nine straight.
- Hawai'i LB Julian Gener registered five tackles for loss last Saturday vs. Fresno State. The five TFL's are the most by a Rainbow Warriors defender since 2012 and is tied for the second-most in Mountain West history. Gener racked up 17 tackles, his second straight game with double-digit stops.
- Rainbow Warriors LT Ben Clarke has only allowed two sacks while protecting the blindside of Ikaika Woolsey and Max Wittek.
- Hawai'i WR Marcus Kemp had five receptions for 105 yards against Fresno State last week. It was his third 100-plus yard receiving game of the year.

- Overall, the Aztecs have a six-game win streak, their longest since a seven-game stretch to close the 2012 regular season.
- The Aztecs have won four consecutive games by at least 23 points, the longest streak nationally. In the last four games, SDSU is averaging 39.3 points per contest.
- The SDSU defense has held 13 consecutive Mountain West opponents to fewer than 400 yards of total offense, the longest stretch (in conference games only) in the nation. The last time an MW foe accounted for more than 400 yards of total offense against the Aztecs defense was Sept. 27, 2014 (UNLV - 455).
- The Aztecs have won 19 straight games when rushing for at least 200 yards and are 27-2 in the Rocky Long era when reaching 200-plus yards. The UNLV defense allows 203.4 rushing yards per contest, which ranks 106th nationally.
- The Aztecs have rushed for more than 200 yards in six straight contests.

- San Diego State RB Donnel Pumphrey rushed for 140 yards vs. Wyoming last Saturday. This was his sixth straight game with more than 100 yards on the ground, and 20th of his career. The six straight 100-yard games is one shy of MW record owned by BYU's Luke Staley (2001) and Boise State's Jay Ajayi (2014).
- Pumphrey currently ranks 15th in the nation with 1,171 rushing yards. He is one of five Aztecs to record multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons.
- The Aztecs defense ranks fifth nationally in third down conversions, allowing opponents to convert only 27.5 percent of the time. This leads the Mountain West.
- SDSU defense has the third-best turnover margin nationally, recording 24 takeaways and only losing the ball 11 times.
- UNLV has three victories on the season for only the fourth time in the last 12 seasons. The last time the Rebels won four games was in 2013 (7).
- The Rebels defense has intercepted 12 passes in 2015. The 12 picks, which have been recorded by nine different players, are five more than UNLV registered last season and as many as the 2013 Rebels squad had in 13 games.

The 2015 Mountain West Football Championship game will kick off at 4:30 p.m. PT/5:30 p.m. MT on Saturday, December 5. ESPN2 will broadcast the title match-up.

HOST SITE DETERMINATION

Host Determination. The Conference Football Championship Game shall be played at the site of the divisional champion with the highest College Football Playoff (CFP) Selection Committee ranking. The site determination shall be made no later than the Sunday following the final week of regular-season games, utilizing the latest available CFP poll.

If one divisional champion was ranked ahead of the other divisional champion in the CFP Selection Committee ranking and wins in the final weekend of the regular season, they will be declared the host. If, in that same scenario, the divisional champion that was the highest-ranked in the CFP poll loses in the final weekend of the regular season, a composite of selected computer rankings following the games of November 29 will be used to determine the host.

If no Mountain West teams are ranked in the latest available CFP Selection Committee poll, a composite of selected computer rankings following the games of November 28 will be used to determine the host.

Host Tie Breaker. In the event of a tie in the latest CFP Selection Committee ranking or the composite of selected computer rankings, the following comparison procedure shall be used (in order as necessary) to determine the site of the game:

- a) If one team was the winner of a Conference game between the two teams, it shall be the Championship Game host.
- b) If a tie still exists, winning percentage against common Conference opponents shall determine the Championship Game host.
- c) If a tie still exists, winning percentage against the next highest-placed common opponent in the Conference based upon (in order): 1. order of finish in the respective divisions, 2. record in all Conference games, and 3. most recent composite of selected computer rankings, proceeding through the Conference, will break the tie.
- d) Coin toss.

Divisional Champions. A divisional champion shall be the team with the highest winning percentage in all Conference games, both inter-divisional and intra-divisional, in the division. (Adopted January 2013)

a) Tie Games. A tie football game shall count as half-a-game won and half-a-game lost in the standings

[Note: A team ineligible under NCAA or Mountain West rules for post-season (bowl) competition shall not compete in the Championship Game.]

DIVISIONAL TIEBREAKERS

Tie Between Two Teams. In the event of a percentage tie for a divisional championship between two teams, if one team was the winner of the Conference game between the two teams, it shall be the divisional champion.

If no game was played between the two tied teams, or that game ended in a tie, the following comparison procedure shall be used to break the tie:

- a) Winning percentage in games played within the division.
- b) Winning percentage against the next highest-placed team in the division (based upon the team's record in all games played in the Conference), proceeding through the division.
- c) Winning percentage against common Conference opponents.
- d) Highest CFP ranking (or the composite of selected computer rankings if neither team is ranked in the CFP rankings) following the final week of Conference regular-season games.
- e) Overall winning percentage against FBS opponents.
- f) Coin toss.

Tie Between More Than Two Teams:

In the event of a percentage tie for a divisional championship between more than two teams, the following comparison procedure shall be used to eliminate all but two tied teams, at which point the two-team tie-breaking procedure shall be used:

- a) Winning percentage in games played among the tied teams.
- b) Winning percentage in games played against division opponents.
- c) Winning percentage against the next highest-placed team in the division (based upon the team's record in all games played in the Conference), proceeding through the division.
- d) Winning percentage against common Conference opponents.
- e) Highest CFP ranking (or the composite of selected computer rankings if neither team is ranked in the CFP rankings) following the final week of Conference regular-season games

MW BOWL SYNOPSIS

The number of postseason appearances for the Mountain West will be driven by on-the-field performance, starting with the opportunity to play in the national semifinals or another New Year's Day bowl game as part of the College Football Playoff arrangement. The highest-rated champion from among the five non-contracted conferences

the five non-contracted conferences **PLAYOFF** (American, C-USA, MAC, MW, Sun Belt, or chosen by the playoff selection committee) is guaranteed a slot in the system. In the 16 seasons since the league's inception, the Mountain West's champion or a current MW member has secured that position 12 times, placing teams in the Fiesta (3), Rose and Sugar (2) Bowls during that period.

The MW also has agreements with seven (7) different bowl games that in any given year will generate as many as seven (7) postseason opportunities for its member institutions. These include primary positions in some or all years with the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Gildan New Mexico Bowl, Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, Hawai'i Bowl and the Arizona Bowl - and a secondary position with the Cactus Bowl.

NOTE: The MW is the primary backup for the Ticket City Cactus Bowl if the Big 12 or Pac-12 does not fill.

<u>ABOUT THE COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF</u>

In its second season, the College Football Playoff format remains unchanged: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and the national championship game played in a different city every year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

THE SELECTION COMMITTEE

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performances during the regular season, including strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game.

THE ROTATION

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.
