A LOOK AT THE 2015 MOUNTAIN WEST SCHEDULE

The 2015 Mountain West football schedule is comprised of 97 games, including 48 Conference matchups. The scheduling format for the 12-member football lineup consists of five intra-divisional games and three cross-divisional contests. Each institution will play four home and four road Conference games. This is the third year of the initial four-year cycle in which each member institution will play every other Mountain West opponent home and away. In 2015, the cross-divisional opponents will flip from the first two years, with teams playing their new opponents from the other division.

The 2015 schedule will play out over 14 weeks, concluding on Sat., Dec. 5 with the Mountain West Football Championship Game to be played at the home stadium of the highest-ranked of the two divisional champions.

The non-conference slate features 22 games against teams that earned bowl berths in 2014, including Arizona, Arizona State, Auburn, BYU (4 games), Minnesota, Mississippi, Michigan State, Navy, Northern Illinois, Ohio State, Penn State, South Alabama, Texas A&M, UCLA, Utah (2 games), Washington (2 games) and Wisconsin. Nine non-conference opponents finished ranked in last year's final USA Today/Coaches' and Associated Press Top 25 polls, including national champion Ohio State, #5 Michigan State, #10 UCLA, #13 Wisconsin, #14/12 Arizona State, #17/19 Arizona, #19/17 Ole Miss, #20/21 Utah and #23/22 Auburn.

FOUNTAIN OF YOUTH

The Mountain West is home to five of the 13 youngest head coaches at the FBS level. Boise State's Bryan Harsin (38), Nevada's Brian Polian (40), Colorado State's Mike Bobo (41), UNLV's Tony Sanchez (41) and Utah State's Matt Wells (41) are among the group of 13 coaches who were born in 1973 or later.

NO FLY ZONE

The Boise State starting secondary has recorded more career interceptions than any other starting secondary in the nation. Made up of Darian Thompson, Donte Deayon, Jonathan Moxey and Dylan Sumner-Gardner, the Broncos have 40 career picks. Thompson has 19 career interceptions, the most among FBS defenders and most by a MW defender all-time, while Deayon has 17 career interceptions, which is tied for the third-most in Mountain West history and tied for second-most among active NCAA defenders. Moxey has the other four interceptions for Boise State.

MAJOR AWARD SEMIFINALISTS

Boise State's Darian Thompson was named a semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, an honor given to the nation's top defensive back. Thompson, who leads the Broncos with 53 tackles and five interceptions, is one of 16 semifinalists for the honor. The three Thorpe Award finalists will be named on Nov. 23 and the winner will be announced at the Home Depot College Football Awards Show on ESPN on Dec. 10.

Utah State LB Kyler Fackrell is a semifinalist for the Butkus Award, an honor given annually to the nation's best linebacker. This season, Fackrell has compiled 53 tackles, including 11 tackles for loss and three sacks, and four fumble recoveries. Fackrell is one of 10 semifinalists for the award. Butkus Award finalists will be announced on Nov. 23 and winners will be notified on or before Dec. 8.

For the second consecutive year, the Mountain West welcomes two new head football coaches. Colorado State will be under the direction of **Mike Bobo**, while **Tony Sanchez** takes over at UNLV. Both are first-year head coaches.

Bobo comes to Colorado State from the University of Georgia, where he had spent the previous 14 seasons, including the last eight as offensive coordinator. Bobo's 14-year stint at Georgia, where he was a quarterback in the late 1990s, began in January, 2001, when head coach Mark Richt hired him as quarterbacks coach. He was promoted to offensive coordinator in 2007. During his time at UGA, Bobo helped lead the Bulldogs to 135 victories, including two Southeastern Conference championships, five SEC Eastern Division titles and eight bowl victories. Prior to his time with the Bulldogs, Bobo began his coaching career at Jacksonville State (1999-2000).

Sanchez spent the last six seasons leading Bishop Gorman (Las Vegas) High School to an overall record of 85-5 and six consecutive state 4A championships. In his six seasons at Bishop Gorman, Sanchez saw 34 of his players earn collegiate football scholarships, including 25 to FBS programs. Prior to his stint in Las Vegas, he coached at Onate High School in Las Cruces, N.M. and Irvin High School in El Paso, Texas. His lone collegiate coaching experience came in 1996 as he was an undergraduate assistant at New Mexico State, the school where Sanchez was a two-year letterwinner.

FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACHES IN THE MOUNTAIN WEST

The Mountain West has welcomed 24 new head coaches over the last 16 seasons. Former BYU head coach Gary Crowton and current Boise State head coach **Bryan Harsin** have posted the most victories and highest win percentage among the group with 12 victories and an .857 win percentage in their inaugural years in 2001 and 2014, respectively. Harsin became the first to conclude his inaugural season by winning the Mountain West Championship Game, the first of two outright MW Championships in program history. Harsin is the only alumnus to lead the Broncos as head coach in the history of Boise State. Harsin is one of three first-year coaches to win at least 10 games in their inaugural season, joining Crowton (12 wins, 2001) and Urban Meyer (10 wins, 2003).

MOUNTAIN WEST IN THE POSTSEASON

The Mountain West sent a record seven teams into postseason bowl games in 2014, posting a 3-4 record (.429). Overall, the Mountain West has earned 69 bowl bids since 1999 and holds a 38-31 (.551) all-time record. The league has also posted an overall postseason mark of at least .500 in eight of the last 11 seasons.

The 2014 postseason marked the eighth straight year the MW has sent at least five teams to bowls and 11th time since the league's inception in 1999. It also marked the second straight year that six or more MW squads advanced to the postseason.

Over the last 11 seasons, the Mountain West has captured the Bowl Challenge Cup four times and owns the second-best win percentage in bowl games among the 10 FBS conferences with a 31-23 mark (.574) during that span. The MW is the only conference to win the trophy four times since the award's inception in 2002-03.

For the second consecutive year, the Mountain West had seven bowl-eligible teams - Boise State (12-2), Colorado State (10-3), Air Force (10-3), Utah State (10-4), Nevada (7-6), San Diego State (7-6) and Fresno State (6-8). This ties the conference record for most bowl-eligible teams. The MW has boasted at least five bowl-eligible teams 11 times since the league's inception in 1999.

- Became the first player in school history and fourth since the inception of the Mountain West in 1999 to have two interceptions returned for a touchdown in a single game (SDSU has been playing football since 1921).
- The two interceptions returned for a touchdown ties an NCAA single-game record for a linebacker and are tied for the second most among all players.
- The two interceptions were more than every player in the country in Week 1 except for teammate Damontae Kazee and West Virginia's Karl Joseph (both had three).
- The fumble recovery was the first of his career.

Andrew Rodriguez, WR/PR, Utah State

- Returned eight punts for 136 yards in Utah State's season-opening 12-9 win against Southern Utah.
- His 88-yard punt return for a touchdown in the fourth quarter proved to be the game-winning score.
 Overall, he returned a USU and MW record eight punts for 136 yards against SUU.
- Rodriguez's 88-yard punt return is tied for the second-longest in Mountain West history.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Nevada DB Dameon Baber picked off three passes in last Thursday's game at Fresno State. The three INTs are tied for the most by an FBS player this season. Baber, who is one of two freshmen nationally to register three picks, became the first Wolf Pack player to accomplish this feat since Sept. 28, 1974 (Greg Grouwinkel, vs. Portland State).
- With six total interceptions on the season, Baber is tied for third nationally.
 Baber is also tied for first in the Mountain West with San Diego State's Damontae Kazee.
- The six interceptions are the most by a Nevada player in a single season since Joe Garcia also picked off six passes in 2006.
- The Wolf Pack are 5-0 this season when both Don Jackson and James Butler each rush for more than 100 yards in the same game. This is a feat they've accomplished three times this season, most recently against Fresno State on Nov. 7.
- Nevada's Jackson became the 15th player in program history to reach 2,000 career rushing yards, when he ran for 140 yards at Fresno State on Nov. 7.
- Nevada's Brent Zuzo ranks fifth among all FBS kickers with a .929 field goal percentage. He has connected on 13-of-14 attempts this season. Last Saturday at Fresno State, Zuzo went three-for-three on field goal attempts, on his way to earning Mountain West Special Teams Player of the Week honors.
- Last Friday, Nevada shut out its opponent in the second half for the first time since Nov. 1, 2014 in a 30-14 victory over San Diego State at Mackay Stadium. The Wolf Pack has now allowed just one touchdown in the second half in the past five games.

- The Spartans lead the nation in fewest passing yards allowed per game (141.4). Over the last 21 games, SJSU is allowing just 121 passing yards per contest. It has been ranked in the top 5 nationally in this category every week since Sept. 20, 2014.
- Through eight games, San José State has 19 rushing touchdowns, eclipsing the team's total of 11 in 2014 and 12 in 2013. The last time the Spartans scored 20 or more rushing touchdowns in a season was in 2004 when they had 22.
- Spartans RB **Tyler Ervin** ranks seventh nationally with 1,239 rushing yards. Deoncé Whitaker (2000) holds the program record for rushing yards in a single season with 1,577.
- On the year, Ervin has scored 14 total touchdowns, including 12 on the ground, which is the second-most by a Spartan since at least 2001. Former WR Chandler Jones caught 15 TDs in 2013. The program single-season touchdown record is held by Johnny Johnson, Jr., who scored 19 times in 1988.
- When it comes to all-purpose yardage, Ervin ranks second nationally, averaging 216.0 yards per contest. On the season, he has rushed for 1,239 yards, hauled in 245 receiving yards, and has 460 return yards. In his career, Ervin has 5,453 all-purpose yards, which leads all active FBS players. Deoncé Whitaker holds the SJSU career record for all-purpose yards with 5,596.
- San José State ranks third nationally with 42.21 net yards per punt, while sophomore Michael Carrizosa ranks second among FBS punters, averaging 47.8 vards per boot.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

Next Week

- Colorado State WR Rashard Higgins has caught a pass in 34 consecutive games, every contest he has played in. It is also the longest active streak by a Mountain West player.
- Higgins, who is one of five active FBS receivers with over 3,000 career receiving yards, has 15 100-yard receiving games, tied for the second-most in Mountain West history, behind BYU's Austin Collie (17). Higgins lead all FBS players with 3,254 career receiving yards.
- Higgins ranks fourth in the Mountain West for career receiving TDs (28). Boise State's Matt Miller (2004, 07-08) and Wyoming's Jovon Bouknight (2002-05) are tied for third with 29 career TDs.
- Colorado State LB Cory James has recorded 23 career sacks, which ranks as the fourth-most in program and Mountain West history. James' 23 sacks are tied for the fourth-most among active FBS defenders.
- As a team, CSU leads the nation with a 43.26 net yards per punt average. Rams punter Hayden Hunt, a candidate for the Ray Guy Award, ranks fourth nationally and second in the Mountain West with a 46.3 average, trailing San José State's Michael Carrizosa (47.8).
- The Colorado State rush defense may rank 106th nationally, allowing 204.6 yards per contest, but last Saturday at Wyoming, Cowboys RB Brian Hill was limited to 65 rushing yards. Hill entered the contest as the nation's No. 2 rusher, averaging 140.2 yards per game.

- CSU DB Trent Matthews has nine career interceptions, one shy of entering the Rams' top 10 career list. The last CSU player to log at least 10 career INTs was Erik Olson (1996-99).
- This season, the Rams are outscoring their opponents 95-40 in the opening
- In the last 22 games, UNLV has only lost five fumbles. The Rebels set a program record for fewest lost fumbles in 2014 with three, and they've only lost two this year, both by QBs. They are tied for first nationally with only two fumbles lost.
- The Rebels defense has intercepted 11 passes in 2015. The 11 picks, which have been recorded by nine different players, are four more than UNLV registered last season and as many as the 2013 Rebels squad had in 13 games.
- UNLV WR Aaron Criswell registered the second-longest pass play in program history, hauling in an 85-yard touchdown. This was just two yards shy of the school record set in 1977 when Henry Vereen caught an 87-yard TD.
- The Rebels have three victories on the season for only the fourth time in the last 12 seasons. The last time a UNLV team won four games was in 2013 (7).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Last Friday, Fresno State's Ejiro Ederaine moved into third place in Mountain West history with 42.5 tackles for loss, after recording 1.5 TFLs vs. Nevada. He is just 5.5 TFLs shy of the all-time MW leader Miles Burris (2008-11) of San Diego State. Among active FBS defenders, Ederaine ranks third.
- The Bulldogs defense has only registered one interception since their Sept. 19 contest vs. Utah. That INT came last Friday against Nevada.
- Fresno State is one of the least penalized teams in the nation, averaging 40.1 penalty yards per contest. This figure ranks 14th among FBS teams and second in the Mountain West.
- The Fresno State defense averages 2.8 sacks per contest, which ranks 23rd nationally and second in the Mountain West. On the season, the Bulldogs have 25 sacks.
- Hawai'i QB Ikaika Woolsey recorded his second start of the season last Saturday, throwing for 187 yards. On the season, Woolsey has completed 44 passes for 498 yards and one touchdown.

- The Rainbow Warriors defense has allowed multiple 100-yard rushers in backto-back weeks. Last Saturday, UNLV's Keith Whitely (124) and Lexington Thomas (120) both surpassed the 100-yard mark, and the week before that Air Force's Jacobi Owens (137) and Timothy McVey (113) reached the century mark.
- The Rainbow Warriors have dropped seven consecutive games, dating back to Sept. 19 when they defeated UC Davis (47-27). Currently, the losing streak is tied for the nation's fourth-longest.
- Hawai'i has the nation's 12th-best punting team, averaging 40.71 net yards per boot. This ranks third in the Mountain West.
- Rainbow Warriors DB Marrell Jackson ranks second among FBS defenders with three fumble recoveries on the season. Jackson only trails MW foe Kyler Fackrell from Utah State, who leads the nation with four.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- San Diego State has won seven consecutive Mountain West games dating back to last season. The Aztecs last Conference loss was at Boise State on Nov. 15, 2014 (38-29). The seven-game Conference win streak ranks tied for sixth-
- Overall, the Aztecs have a five-game win streak, their longest since a sevengame stretch to close the 2012 regular season.
- The SDSU defense has held 12 consecutive Mountain West opponents to fewer than 400 yards of total offense, the longest stretch (in conference games only) in the nation. The last time an MW foe accounted for more than 400 yards of total offense against the Aztecs defense was Sept. 27, 2014 vs. UNLV (455).
- The Aztecs have won 18 straight games when rushing for at least 200 yards and are 26-2 in the Rocky Long era when reaching 200-plus yards. The Wyoming defense allows 222.6 rushing yards per contest.
- San Diego State RB ${\bf Donnel\ Pumphrey}$ rushed for 121 yards and two touchdowns at Colorado State before the bye week. This was his fifth straight game with more than 100 yards on the ground, and 19th of his career. The five straight 100-yard games is tied for fifth in MW history.
- Pumphrey currently ranks 16th in the nation with 1,031 rushing yards. He is one of five Aztecs to record multiple 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

- Cowboys RB Brian Hill was held to 65 rushing yards and a touchdown vs. Colorado State last Saturday. Hill currently ranks second nationally with 1,327 yards on the ground. Ryan Christopherson holds the program record with 1,455 rushing yards in 1994.
- To set the Wyoming record, Hill must rush for 129 yards in the next two games, which averages out to be 64.5 yards per contest.
- Hill has three 200-yard games this season, which is tied for the most in a single-season by a MW player.
- San Diego State hasn't allowed a 100-yard rusher since Sept. 19 vs. South Alabama. In that game, Xavier Johnson carried the ball 19 times for 142 yards and two touchdowns. On the year, the Aztec defense only allows 107 rushing yards per contest, which ranks 10th nationally.
- Wyoming DE Eddie Yarbrough has racked up 36 career tackles for loss, which ties John Fletcher (2005-09) with the most TFLs by a Cowboys defender.
- Wyoming WR Jake Maulhardt has 49 receptions for 497 yards and seven touchdowns. His seven receiving TDs are tied for the most in the MW with Boise State's Thomas Sperbeck. Furthermore, the seven TDs are the most by a Cowboys player since 2013 (Robert Herron - 9, Dominic Rufran - 8).
- The Cowboys have lost six straight road games, with their last victory away from War Memorial Stadium coming on Nov. 1, 2014 at Fresno State (45-17).

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

A victory over Air Force would give Utah State bowl eligibilty for the fifth straight season. The Falcons earned a spot in the postseason with a 20-3 victory over Army last Saturday.

- Air Force has a program record 11-game home win streak, which is tied for the seventh-longest active streak nationally. The last time the Falcons lost at home was on Nov. 21, 2013 vs. UNLV (41-21).
- Air Force ranks fifth among all FBS teams in first down defense. Falcon opponents have combined for 130 first downs.
- Air Force is the only FBS team to have not given up a sack this season. All other FBS teams have allowed at least two. On a similar note, the Falcons rank third nationally in tackles for loss allowed, averaging just 3.67 per game.
- The Falcons have the second-best rushing attack in the FBS, averaging 335.9 yards per game. The 335.9 rushing yards per contest average is on pace to be the most in the Troy Calhoun era.
- The Falcons are 4-0 this season when producing a 100-yard rusher and have won 10 straight such contests dating back to 2013.

- At home this season, the Falcons have only trailed for 10:19 in five games. In four of the five contests, Air Force hasn't trailed at any point.
- Utah State is one of 11 teams nationally to have recovered 10 or more fumbles in 2015.
- Utah State LB Nick Vigil leads the Mountain West with 10.9 tackles per contest, which ranks 10th nationally. On the year, Vigil has 98 tackles.
- Utah State has won 13 of its last 17 Conference road games. Under head coach Matt Wells, the Aggies are 7-4 in Mountain West road contests.
- The Aggies, who lost on the road at New Mexico last Saturday, haven't dropped back-to-back conference games since 2011. That year they lost at Fresno State (31-21) and vs. Louisiana Tech (24-17).
- Aggies LB **Kyler Fackrell** leads the nation with four fumble recoveries this season. The four fumbles recovered are the most by a Utah State defender since at least 2003.
- When it produces a 100-yard rusher, Utah State has won 19 consecutive

WHAT TO WATCH FOR

- Boise State has won 18 consecutive games at home, which is the third-longest home win streak in the nation. Baylor (20) and Florida State (19) are the only teams with longer home win streaks.
- Boise State kicker Tyler Rausa is tied for fourth nationally with 1.89 field goals per game. On the season, Rausa has made 17-of-20 field goals. The 17 makes are tied for the fouth-most nationally.
- Boise State ranks fourth among all FBS squads in rush defense, limiting its opponents to just 83.4 yards on the ground.
- Boise State's Jeremy McNichols is one of nine running backs nationally with at least 14 rushing touchdowns this season. Overall, McNichols is averaging 12.8 points per game to rank third in the FBS for scoring. On the season, McNichols has carried the ball 155 times for 773 yards.
- Boise State's Darian Thompson is the Mountain West's outright career leader
 in interceptions with his 19th at UNLV on Oct. 31. He is also the only active
 player in the FBS with more than 18 career picks. On the year, Thompson has
 five INTs, which is second-best in the MW behind San Diego State's Damontae
 Kazee (6).

- Broncos QB Brett Rypien averages 290.9 passing yards per contest, which ranks 19th nationally. Among freshmen signal-callers, the 290.9 passing yards ranks second, trailing only Middle Tennessee State's Brent Stockstill (310.9).
- In his last outing, Rypien threw for a Mountain West freshman record 469 yards at UNLV on Oct. 31. Among all FBS freshmen QBs, the 469 yards are the second-most this season. Cincinnati's Hayden Moore threw for 557 yards against Memphis on Sept. 24.
- The Lobos are 3-0 this season when rushing for 300 yards and 2-4 when rushing for fewer than 300 yards. The Lobos have only won twice when rushing for fewer than 200 yards under head coach **Bob Davie**, both happening this season (vs. Hawai'i and vs. Utah State).
- Lobos WR Delane Hart-Johnson caught an 86-yard touchdown pass from Lamar Jordan vs. Utah State last Saturday. The 86-yard pitch and catch was the fifthlongest pass player in New Mexico history, and the longest since 1998.
- New Mexico leads the Mountain West, averaging 7.8 tackles for loss per contest. The Lobos have recorded double-digit tackles in the backfield four times, including 13 in the season opener vs. Mississippi Valley State.
- This is New Mexico's first five-win season since 2007. That year, UNM compiled a 9-4 record and defeated Nevada in the New Mexico Bowl.



2015 MOUNTAIN WEST FOOTBALL CHAMPIONSHIP GAME

The 2015 Mountain West Football Championship game will kick off at 4:30 p.m. PT/5:30 p.m. MT on Saturday, December 5. ESPN2 will broadcast the title match-up.

HOST SITE DETERMINATION

Host Determination. The Conference Football Championship Game shall be played at the site of the divisional champion with the highest College Football Playoff (CFP) Selection Committee ranking. The site determination shall be made no later than the Sunday following the final week of regular-season games, utilizing the latest available CFP poll.

If one divisional champion was ranked ahead of the other divisional champion in the CFP Selection Committee ranking and wins in the final weekend of the regular season, they will be declared the host. If, in that same scenario, the divisional champion that was the highest-ranked in the CFP poll loses in the final weekend of the regular season, a composite of selected computer rankings following the games of November 29 will be used to determine the host.

If no Mountain West teams are ranked in the latest available CFP Selection Committee poll, a composite of selected computer rankings following the games of November 28 will be used to determine the host.

Host Tie Breaker. In the event of a tie in the latest CFP Selection Committee ranking or the composite of selected computer rankings, the following comparison procedure shall be used (in order as necessary) to determine the site of the game:

- a) If one team was the winner of a Conference game between the two teams, it shall be the Championship Game host.
- b) If a tie still exists, winning percentage against common Conference opponents shall determine the Championship Game host.
- c) If a tie still exists, winning percentage against the next highest-placed common opponent in the Conference based upon (in order): 1. order of finish in the respective divisions, 2. record in all Conference games, and 3. most recent composite of selected computer rankings, proceeding through the Conference, will break the tie.
- d) Coin toss.

Divisional Champions. A divisional champion shall be the team with the highest winning percentage in all Conference games, both inter-divisional and intra-divisional, in the division. (Adopted January 2013)

a) Tie Games. A tie football game shall count as half-a-game won and half-a-game lost in the standings

[Note: A team ineligible under NCAA or Mountain West rules for post-season (bowl) competition shall not compete in the Championship Game.]

DIVISIONAL TIEBREAKERS

Tie Between Two Teams. In the event of a percentage tie for a divisional championship between two teams, if one team was the winner of the Conference game between the two teams, it shall be the divisional champion.

If no game was played between the two tied teams, or that game ended in a tie, the following comparison procedure shall be used to break the tie:

- a) Winning percentage in games played within the division.
- b) Winning percentage against the next highest-placed team in the division (based upon the team's record in all games played in the Conference), proceeding through the division.
- c) Winning percentage against common Conference opponents.
- d) Highest CFP ranking (or the composite of selected computer rankings if neither team is ranked in the CFP rankings) following the final week of Conference regular-season games.
- e) Overall winning percentage against FBS opponents.
- f) Coin toss.

Tie Between More Than Two Teams:

In the event of a percentage tie for a divisional championship between more than two teams, the following comparison procedure shall be used to eliminate all but two tied teams, at which point the two-team tie-breaking procedure shall be used:

- a) Winning percentage in games played among the tied teams.
- b) Winning percentage in games played against division opponents.
- c) Winning percentage against the next highest-placed team in the division (based upon the team's record in all games played in the Conference), proceeding through the division.
- d) Winning percentage against common Conference opponents.
- e) Highest CFP ranking (or the composite of selected computer rankings if neither team is ranked in the CFP rankings) following the final week of Conference regular-season games

the five non-contracted conferences **PLAYOFF** (American, C-USA, MAC, MW, Sun Belt, or chosen by the playoff selection committee) is guaranteed a slot in the system. In the 16 seasons since the league's inception, the Mountain West's champion or a current MW member has secured that position 12 times, placing teams in the Fiesta (3), Rose and Sugar (2) Bowls during that period.

The MW also has agreements with seven (7) different bowl games that in any given year will generate as many as seven (7) postseason opportunities for its member institutions. These include primary positions in some or all years with the Lockheed Martin Armed Forces Bowl, Famous Idaho Potato Bowl, Gildan New Mexico Bowl, Royal Purple Las Vegas Bowl, San Diego County Credit Union Poinsettia Bowl, Hawai'i Bowl and the Arizona Bowl - and a secondary position with the Cactus Bowl.

NOTE: The MW is the primary backup for the Ticket City Cactus Bowl if the Big 12 or Pac-12 does not fill.

<u>ABOUT THE COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF</u>

In its second season, the College Football Playoff format remains unchanged: top four teams, two semifinals played in bowl games, and the national championship game played in a different city every year. Each semifinal will be played during the New Year's holiday with the national championship game in prime time on a Monday night at least a week later.

THE SELECTION COMMITTEE

A selection committee will choose the four teams for the playoff based on their performances during the regular season, including strength of schedule, head-to-head results, championships won, and other factors. The teams will be seeded so that #1 will play #4 in one semifinal and #2 will meet #3 in the other, with the winners advancing to the national championship game.

THE ROTATION

The semifinals will rotate among six different bowls, extending the experience to more fans. In the years when the bowls are not hosting semifinals, the bowls will feature eight other teams in four compelling matchups.
