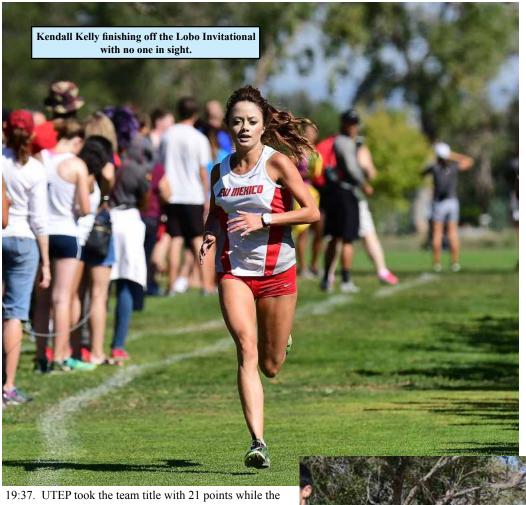

SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 3 - LOBO INVITATIONAL

Each year the Lobo Invitational which is held in early September provides an opportunity for many of the younger, inexperienced runners on the team to step up and represent their school. It is a fun time, and often brings nice surprizes, when athletes that maybe weren't expected to challenge for a top seven ranking on the team, an a spot on the travel squad do exceptionally well. In the womens 5000 meter race which featured athletes from UTEP, New Mexico State, Eastern New Mexico, along with unattached athletes junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque School, ABQ, NM) running her finest race in the cherry & silver colors took control early and ran away from every other collegiate runner to easily take the victory in 18:34. This was a significant improvement on her last previous 5000 meter cross country race when she finished in 19:19 at Notre Dame last year one month farther along in the season, and a faster course. It is obvious that Kendall had a solid summer of training, exhibiting the consistency and hard pacing necessary to compete at the Division I level. It wasn't for another 33 seconds that a collegiate runner crossed the finish line which shows the dominance that Kendall showed. Finishing second for the Lobos in eighth place overall was sister Reilly, who clocked in at

19:37. UTEP took the team title with 21 points while the Lobos finished second with 42 points, New Mexico State 66, and Eastern New Mexico 109.

In the men's race top 3-4 athletes were able to run together for much of the race before senior Jesus Mendoza (Rio Rancho, NM) pulled away from the rest of his teammates. Jesus finished fourth overall in the 5000 meter race when he race 15:53, and then sophomore Jared Garcia (Belen, NM) came through in sixth place with a 16:12. The men's scoring found UTEP winning the competition when they scored 18 points, with the Lobos taking second with 37. Eastern New Mexico tallied 80 points for third place and New Mexico State with 805points rounded out the scoring.

FRIDAY, SEPTEMBER 30 - NOTRE DAME INVITATIONAL

During the meet build-up to the Notre Dame Invitational there was great excitement. At the always strong meet there would be 24 teams in the women's race, and 26 in the men's race. On the womens side there were six nationally ranked teams in attendance with the Lobos holding down the #3 national ranking. There were also six nationally ranked men's programs but so far this season the Lobos were unranked. For the women's team after last years NCAA Championship there were many new faces, and new dynamics playing out. Just because a team has talent, does not always mean there is chemistry to match. So for the Lobo women it was a start to the 2016 with many good answers, but also some interesting questions. Only once before had a Lobo women won the individual Notre Dame title, and that was in 2014 when former All American Charlotte Arter ran 16:09 on the flat golf course. The last two years the women's team had walked off with the team title. The perfectly flat golf course provides a nice incentive to run fast and the Lobos two All Americans, Alice Wright (Worcester, England) and Calli Thackery (Yorkshire, England) got right to work screaming out in front of the 184 woman field. Alice and Calli has tremendous fitness, and they are not afraid to take it out and make others pay the price to run fast. At the mile the tandem was together in a swift 5:09 and with that tempo had blown up the field and strung the runners out. There were a small number of runners with Alice and Calli but then a gap to the next grouping. Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England) a track All American who was seriously racing cross country for the first time in her Lobo career was in the next grouping as she passed one mile in 5:15. Four seconds later was newcomer Kathryn Fluehr (Naples, FL) who clocked in at 5:19. Then running together was

sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) and froshie Alex Buck (Pendleton, Ind) who was on her home soil in 5:27. The pace upfront did not relax as Alice and Calli towed the field through a 10:32 split for two miles. Sophie was not near any other Lobos as she remained the third team runner at 10:49. Kathryn had made a nice move forward to a time of 10:55, #4 for the group. Then Alex and Natasha came by side by side working hard for each other with a 11:07. The pace upfront remained relentless as a group of about six runners had definitely made their statement. Alice, Calli, sophomore Anna Rohrer from Notre Dame, junior Bethann Knights from California, senior Maggie Montoya from Baylor, and senior Grace Barnett from Clemson. This is like a who's-who of collegiate distance running. At mile three Alice was not leading any longer while Calli had settled into the top seven of the race. At three miles Alice was at 15:46 while Calli was at 16:04. Sophie was still sort of caught all my herself and she clocked 16:32 for three miles. Kathryn, Alex, and Natasha were all essentially together working hard for each other. Over the final several hundred meters Alice got back up to second place and took aim at the leader from Notre Dame coming down the homestretch. Calli, always able to reach down and give a hard, driving final sprint was working her way up. Sophie was driving her arms hard trying to run under 17:00 for the 5000 meter race. At the finish Alice crossed the finish line in second place with a 16:11, 18 seconds faster than she ran last year on the Notre Dame course. That was a nice improvement. Then Calli flew across the line in fifth place at 16:30, ten seconds faster than 2015. Sophie got her wish as she just dipped under the 17:00 threshold with a 16:59 clocking which left her with a 37th place total. Last year Sophie ran 17:33 on the Notre Dame course. Then Alex and Natasha were sprinting together with Alex getting to the line in 60th place (17:16) with Natasha one split back in 17:17. Kathryn finished in 71st with a 17:23. Next in for the Lobos was junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque, ABQ, NM) who made a huge improvement from last years 19:19 by clocking 17:41!!! That got her in 93rd place. The final Lobo on the day was newcomer Kieran Casey (Perry Meridian, Indianapolis, IN) who clocked 17:41. When all the dust had settled the Lobos finished fourth as a team with 166 points. The #1 team in the country, Providence won the meet with 117 points.

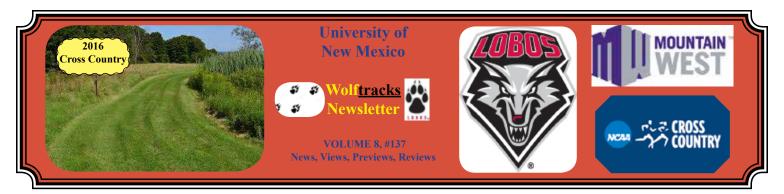

The Lobo men went into the competition with lots of questions based on the fact there would be four freshmen and three seniors in the seven man line-up. Even of the three senior only one had any NCAA regional or national experience. So all in all it was a young inexperienced group. Perhaps the excitement of the first meet got to the guys as five of the seven took off from the line a bit too fast and got to the mile mark in around 4:43-4:45ish. By the two mile froshie Jacob Simonsen (Aarhus, Denmark) had split off from the other guys and hit in 9:37 which translated into a 4:54 second mile. Zac Castillo (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM) was next through the two miles in 9:40 right alongside froshie Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jama, Sweden). Then senior Jesus Mendoza (Rio Rancho, NM) clocked 9:45 and the fifth scoring runner then was froshie Alex Palm (Norrkoping, Sweden). From two miles on Jacob was able to run 5:00 miles which is a good solid pace for him. Jesus got caught away from all his teammates throughout the race which is not always easy. Zac and Emil teamed up to run with each other and it was a good thing. Emil struggled in the fourth mile and Zac was able to help him through that difficulty which is exactly what a good teammate does. At the finish Jacob was 72nd in the 202 man race with a 24:41 overall time. Finishing second for the Lobos with a 105th place was Jesus with his 24:56. Out of the 25 teams, the Lobos finished 23rd. It was certainly a rough start but at least will give the lads some place to start and build from.

As would be expected the Wisconsin race started off controlled but strong and of course the two stalwarts of the Lobo team, junior Alice Wright (Worcester, England) and senior Calli Thackery (Yorkshire, England) made sure they placed themselves near the front of the 210 woman race. The runners were packed like sardines into the course as everyone tried to get out in good position. As the race got into the first five minutes the runners were 10-12 wide using every inch of the 10 meter wide course. By the mile mark in addition to Alice and Calli runners from Providence, Washington, Notre Dame, Boise State, and Harvard were exerting their influence up front. The mile passed in

FRIDAY, OCTOBER 14 ADIDAS WISCONSIN INVITATIONAL

In a span of 5 years the Wisconsin Cross Country Invitational has become one of the preeminent cross country meets in the country. The Badgers plan when they built the Thomas Zimmer course was to annually host the top teams in the country. With the 2016 meet having 18 ranked teams in the 31 teams in attendance they seemed to have met their goal of staging a highlevel competition. In 2015 of the top 15 finishing teams at the Wisconsin meet every single one qualified to the NCAA meet five weeks later. That speaks to the quality of the meet. And it would seem that if people wanted to draw some type of conclusions from the Wisconsin meet it has a very good "predictability" for what might happen at the NCAA Championship. The chart to the right shows the final results from 2015, and then to the right where that team actually placed at the NCAA Championships.

5:33, a little conservative but given the 25 mph winds blowing no one really wanted to lead and break the wind for everyone else. As the picture on the previous page shows just past the mile there were still huge numbers of athletes within contact of each other. But about 10-15 runners used a small hill and then a larger hill to surge away and get just a small bit of daylight between them and the peloton. As the bottom picture shows senior **Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England)** is just ahead of senior **Kathryn Fluehr (Naples, FL)** as they were running in tandem about 10 seconds behind Alice and Calli. Wearing the signature turquoise jerseys in a large race is certainly an advantage to finding a teammate. Then slightly back from Sophie and Kathryn was sophomore **Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM)** pictured on the next page on the top who was looking ahead trying to see a turquoise jersey of her training mates. The first timing pad had been laid down at 2000 meters and Alice and Calli passed in 6:54, about the same time as a dozen other runners. Sophie and Kathryn were then together at about 7:02/7:03. Natasha was three ticks back from them at 7:05. With a timing pad across the course they can also get team scores and at 2000 meters Washington led with 71 points, then UCLA with 223, Providence 226, and New Mexico in fourth with 251. That was a good start.....now to deal with the middle section of the race. After racing around the far outside of the course, once the runners passed by 2000 meters they entered the inner loops before passing behind the starting line and getting around



the far outside of the course again. The front of the race was starting to pull apart as the incessant pressure of the leaders began to take its toll. A group of about a dozen runners pressed their case and the rhythm and tempo increased. The front battle was certainly enjoyable to watch as there were all these great athletes listening and watching each other, each trying to ascertain their own vital signs, then also deduce everyone elses! At 12:00 into the race the lead pack was down to nine runners with another six lurking about five meters back. As the runners came up on the 4000 meter timing pad everyone was on pins and needles waiting to see the team results. When the scores at the 4k mark came up Washington still led with 85 points, and North Carolina State had moved from fifth at the 2k with 258 points to second

at 4k with 146 points. Providence, the #1 ranked team in the country was still third, although they had gone from 226 points to 162 points so they were making a nice team move. Still in fourth place were the Lobos as they had tallied 251 points at 2000 meters but were holding 187 points two thousand meters later. Baylor, who was tenth at 2000 meters was now chasing the Lobos with their fifth place total of 221 points. Once the athletes passed 2000 meters Alice starting driving hard, and everyone could see another increase in the tempo of the leaders. Within a span of 30 seconds the front six racing very hard had put Calli in distress and she along with five others fell back ever so slightly. Alice was now racing Boise State, Harvard, Washington, Notre Dame, and San Franciso. With the race now in full action at 15:00 into the slugfest Brenna Peloquin, from Boise State made a concerted effort to push even harder and the strain on her face was evident. Quickly, the chase back with Calli and others were ten meters back. The five leaders were just going at each other like there was no tomorrow. Just when everyone thought there could be no more effort, Peloquin increased the tempo even more at 17:00. It was a full out crazy hard pace and the Husky from Washington and the Crimson from Harvard fell off. It was now down to three athletes, Anna Rohrer from Notre Dame, Peloquin, and Alice. The Fighting Irish athlete fell back every so slightly as Alice and the Bronco pushed. But just as quickly as she fell back, the Irish runner came right back up to the duo thirty seconds later and then took the lead back. It was a fun thing to watch these three athletes going at it. At 19:00 into the race Peloquin quickly increased her stride and took the lead by a couple of meters. The Irish athlete finally gave way by a couple of meters. But Alice determined to not lose any ground put her head down and drove hard forward. She and Peloquin had a classic battle the final 300 meters of the race





as they entered the home straight. Peloquin held on to finish first in 20:00 while Alice was one tick back at 20:01 and the Irish runner 20:03. Wow, what a race. Calli, coming into the homestretch used her patented sprint to outkick everyone around her and finish ninth in 20:19. Sophie, in her biggest cross country test so far passed with flying colors as she came through 40th in 20:53. Natasha was the fourth Lobo in at 63rd place and froshie Alex Buck (Pendleton, IN) moved up to

finish fifth at 93rd place. When the final results were tallied the Lobos combined for fourth overall place which should provide good incentive for the rest of the season. This was a big race for the turquoise clad women and now they turn their attention to the conference and regional championships.

MEN'S OPEN RACE

After the difficult race at Notre Dame where the men did not race well as a collective group head coach Joe Franklin decided to do something which some might think strange. He entered the men's team in the "open" race, not in the championship race. While there were good runners in the open race its certainly not the quality of the championship race that had 19 ranked teams in the 30 that toed the starting line. And why was this decision made? Well maybe an analogy would be appropriate. Anyone who has ever flown has heard the pilot say that they could make up time, or fly faster as soon as they hit some "clean air". Well what does that really mean? Essentially if the air stream is conducive to faster flying, or a lack of turbulence the plane can fly better. Well the same thing happens in large cross country races. If the men were to be in the championship race, they would be stuck in the middle of the 200+ runners, having their stride pattern negatively affected, being bumped and shoved the entire way, and having to constantly weave in and out of a large pack of athletes. All of that takes away from smooth running which is "fast" running. In the "B" race, the guys would have less athletes to deal with, and could concentrate on working together and having "clean" running lanes in front of them. The strategy worked very well as the men looked much better as a group, and had a much, much better overall result. Senior **Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM)** led the way for the Lobos as he placed seventh overall with a 25:06. Then classmate **Jesus Mendoza (Rio Rancho, NM)** was the second Lobo in at 10th place. He and Graham were in



the same vicinity of each other throughout the race which is always a positive. Then three Lobos came in consecutively in 15th/16th/17th places. Froshie Jacob Simonsen (Aarhus, **Denmark)**, then senior Zac Castillo (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM) and froshie Alex Palm (Norrkoping, Swe**den)** ran the entire race almost in unison which is huge for conference reasons, where racing with teammates a key to success. These guys were never more than a couple of seconds apart and the five second split between these three guys at the finish line was a big progression for all of them.

LOBO WOMEN WIN 9TH STRAIGHT MOUNTAIN WEST CONFERENCE







CHAMPIONSHIP



Friday, October 28, 2016

The 18th annual Mountain West Conference Cross Country Championship was held at Falcon Crest Golf Club in Kuna, Idaho with host Boise State University doing the honors. The meet course was an undulating series of 2000 meter grass loops that the women would run three times, and the men four times. It was slightly overcast but overall a great cross country day with cool temperatures which distance runners like. The Lobo womens team came into the championship ranked #2 in the NCAA Mountain Region, and #7 in the country while the men were ranked #10 in the region, and unranked

nationally. The women were up against the Boise State Bronco's, ranked #28 nationally, and the Falcons of Air Force ranked #34 nationally. The men had a tougher road as the Colorado State Rams were #17 nationally, Boise State #24, and Air Force #28.

Head Coach Joe Franklin was hired as the Lobo head mentor on June 18, 2007, and with such a late hiring date did not have an opportunity to recruit or plan much for the 2007-2008 year. That fall, in his first MWC meet the Lady Lobos finished 3rd. But after that first meet the women have been victorious nine straight times breaking the all-time conference record for titles which was formerly held by BYU. As in most conference championships the race started out a little conservatively as the athletes warmed their bodies, and figured

out what type of race it would be, slow and tactical, or fast paced and hard. Almost from the gun junior All American Alice Wright (Worcester, **England**) and senior All American Calli Thackery (Yorkshire, England) put themselves near the front of the race. After that it was difficult to pick out the other red-clad Lobo women as a huge pack formed, and the athletes were tightly bunched. It almost seemed like the couple of leaders could be picked out and then the rest of the 88 woman field was shoulder to shoulder and shoe to shoe. After a straightaway the athletes made a left hand turn and proceeded up a slight incline. It was at that point that Alice comfortably and easy slid to the lead, with Calli off her left shoulder. Right with them was Annmarie Schwanz from Fresno State and Carina Gillespie from Air Force. Senior Sophie



Connor (Hertfordshire, England) was probably about 12th at this point but surrounded with a huge pack. About 2:30 into the race Alice shifted gears and put some gusto into her stride and extended the lead with Boise State's highly successful Brenna Peloquin right behind, and Calli glued to Peloquins side. By 4:00 those five women, Wright, Thackery, Peloquin, Schwanz, and Gillespie separated themselves from the race by about five meters. Then a nice group of about ten runners were clumped together with Sophie in that group but at the front. Boise State had a lot of their top five runners in this pack and it almost appeared during this early stage that BSU was the team leader. As the runners passed the 2000 meter timing pad the score actually was New Mexico 48, Boise State 56, Air Force 73 so the Broncos were doing a good job of attacking the front of the race. The Lobo placings at the 2k mark were 1-3-8-16-20. After the the pack of runners Sophie was in the next pack of 10-12 runners was almost ten meters back from her and in this grouping were seniors Kathryn Fluehr (Naples, FL), and sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM). Froshie Alex Buck (Pendleton, IN) and junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque Prep, ABQ, NM) were fighting hard to get in contact with Kathryn and Natasha. At about 6:00 into the race Alice surged again and the Falcon from Air Force had to give way, leaving a quartet at the lead. Alice was driving and controlling the pace for the entire group but looked comfortable doing it. As the runners went up and down the short slight inclines at 8:30 into the race the Fresno State Bulldog gave way, and suddenly the lead group was a trio, and a pretty talented trio. All three of them looked comfortable with an easy, but powerful stride pattern. By this point the gap back to the group Sophie was running in had grown to

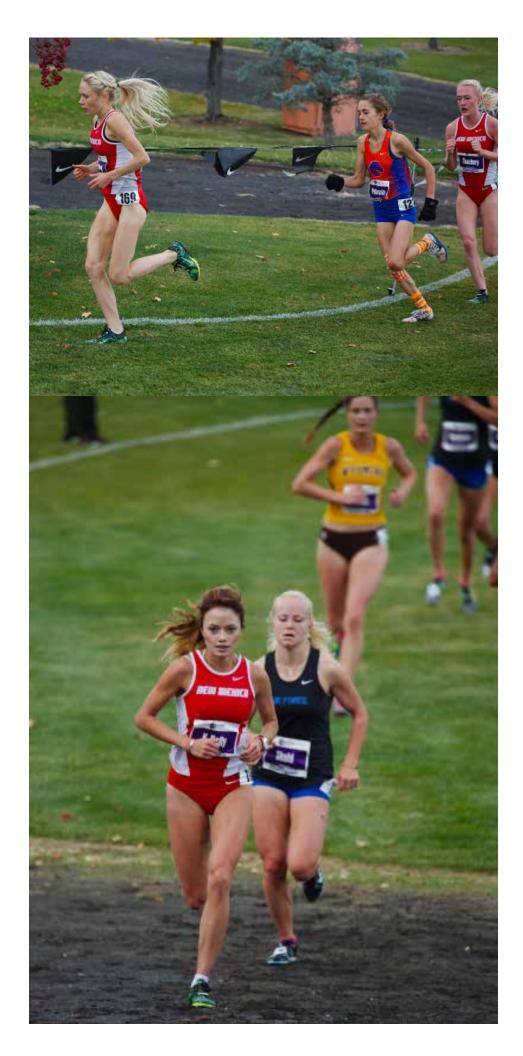

about 50-60 meters and the race was clearly starting to string out. At the 12:00 point Alice was extending her lead, and Calli slid into sole possesion of second place, ten meters down from Alice. The Bronco had quickly fallen ten meters behind Calli so it was a powerful sign to have the 1-2 runners in the race. Behind the leaders Sophie's group had shrunk to seven athletes with Sophie at the front of the group. There was a small gap to Natasha who was running by herself which is never a good idea so all she could do was look ahead to Sophie, and try to focus on catching her later in the race. But the positive was that Natasha was pulling in Sophie with every stride. Kathryn, Kendall, and Alex were almost exactly five meters apart from each other and trying to get re-engaged as a trio. At the 4000 meter timing pad the Lobos had exerted their strength and were pulling away from the field. The actual scoring at the 4k mark was New Mexico 40, Air Force 61, Boise State 62. The Lobos held down places



1-2-9-12-16-25-37. Fifteen minutes into the race Alice took a quick glance and saw that Calli was the only one in sight so for the most part victory at this point was assured. At 17:00 Sophie was running all by herself but Natasha had finally reeled her in and was only a couple of ticks of the clock behind her. That was a long time to keep plugging away to bring her in. Kendall caught Kathryn and went by her into fifth place on the team and clearly, this was Kendalls finest hour in Lobo cross country. Surprizingly, Air Force was having a great team race, and though the Lobos were clearly in the team lead, they couldn't let up to the end. At the finish line Alice crossed in 20:02 with Calli across in 20:11 for second place. Then three Air Force athletes came flying in (3-5-6) before Sophie crossed in tenth place at 20:52. Natasha was next in one place behind Sophie at 20:56. Another Air Force athlete crossed in 15th before Kendall as the fifth scorer on the team hit the line in 21:15 good for eighteenth place. That shut the door on any hope that Air Force had of upsetting the Lobos. So another championship in the books! Now the Lobo women will turn their attention to the NCAA Mountain Region Championship which will be held at Utah State University on November 11th. It is there that they will attempt to qualify as a team to the NCAA finals at Indiana State University on November 19th. Given the solid results, the Lobos should be in an excellent position.

The men's 8000 meter race provided many challenges for the Lobo men. With three nationally ranked teams in the field of eight mens teams (Boise St., Colorado St., Air Force), that meant there would be plenty of high-level talent at the front of the race and experienced talent to boot. The Lobos graduated their only two all conference athletes from last years team and did not have any first or second team MWC finishers from a year ago on the roster. On top of that six of the nine team members were competing in their first conference championship. That is a young team when experience is factored in. Realistically, the top three team positions were locked up, so the other five teams were fighting for the remaining positions. It appeared on paper that Utah State and New Mexico had similar type teams so fourth place was the objective for both programs. On the positive side the Lobo men were coming off the Wisconsin Invitational race where they ran their best of the season with a 1-5 finishing split of just :26. That is a solid result and one that needed to be replicated. Essentially the men knew they had to run well as a collective group to have a successful meet. Right after the start the Lobo men made a concerted effort to get near the front of the race. Race position was critical for the Lobo men to make sure there was a minimum





of pushing and shoving. The photograph on the left top shows senior Adam Cotton (Penkridge, England) leading the Lobo lads out to the front part of the race. The photograph on the left bottom shows the men finding each other during the race and grouping together. The men did a great job during the first 2000 meters of the race as they scored 75 points having places 6-11-16-20-22 which was third placed behind Colorado State's 20 points and Boise State's 63. Utah State had 104 points, and Air Force 135. Now they would need to settle down, and maintain that excellent start. During the next 2000 meters the three nationally ranked teams started to put pressure on the field by increasing the intensity, which is what good teams do. Senior Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) made a move forward to join the top 20 and give the team one low place. At the 4000 meter point a great deal had changed. Colorado State still led with 34 points, but Boise had made a move to get up to 48 points for second place. Likewise Air Force had surged and dropped their point total to 91. Then just as thought, Utah State and New Mexico were locked in a tight battle with the Aggies at 107 and UNM at 111. The places for the men

were 12-22-24-25-28. During the third 2000 meter segment the difficulty began to rear its ugly head. The race was far enough along to cause distress, and there was still a long way to go. It was clear by the 6000 meter point that the top three team places would be decided between Colorado State, Boise State, and Air Force. When the runners passed by the 6k point almost the entire top 20 individuals were from those three teams. And the close battle between Utah State and New Mexico continued. USU had a top individual who was running in the top four of the race, while UNM had better depth. It was just a matter of a couple of points. After the 6000 meters it was one more big loop around the golf course and then into the chute. The Lobo men got separated slightly, but kept fighting to not lose each other. That is something that can be built on for the future. At the finish line Boise

State moved just past Colorado State to win the title with 41 points to the Rams 48. Air Force, after their great move forward couldn't maintain and finished third with 61 points. Of the top 20 athletes in the field, 16 of them came from the top three teams which is why they are successful. Graham Thomas came across the finish line in 18th place with a 24:36 clocking, while the next Lobo in was Jesus Mendoza (Rio Rancho, NM) in 28th (25:00). Then came three Lobos in a row at 31st, 32nd, and 33rd. Adam Cotton was the first of that group, and then sophomore Alex Palm (Norrkoping, Sweden), and senior Zac Castillo (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM). Their times were 25:06, 25:06, 25:08. When all the runners had finished and the final team scores showed. Utah State just outlasted the Lobos by seven points. So close, yet so far. There were some nice positives in the final results. Graham Thomas improved all four years in the conference with finishes of 43rd, 29th,

26th, 18th. Consistent progress is very important. Last year Jesus Mendoza finished 54th and this year he improved to 28th. Zac Castillo finished 47th last year and this year he clocked in at 33rd. Now the men will spend the next two weeks preparing for the NCAA Regional, and trying to improve on their 10th ranking in the region.

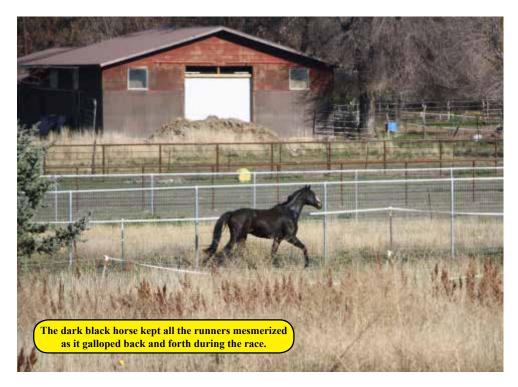

The 2016 NCAA Mountain Region Championship was hosted by Utah State University in Logan, Utah. It was a particular warm, sunny day for northern Utah, but was well greeted by specators and athletes alike. The new course designed by Utah State found a nice setting with the mountains in the background, and a rustic course situated on their agricultural farm which had horses galloping around the outside. The course was comprised of grass and gravel trails and was a series of three large loops and with no high vegetation in the way, so everyone could see every inch of the course.

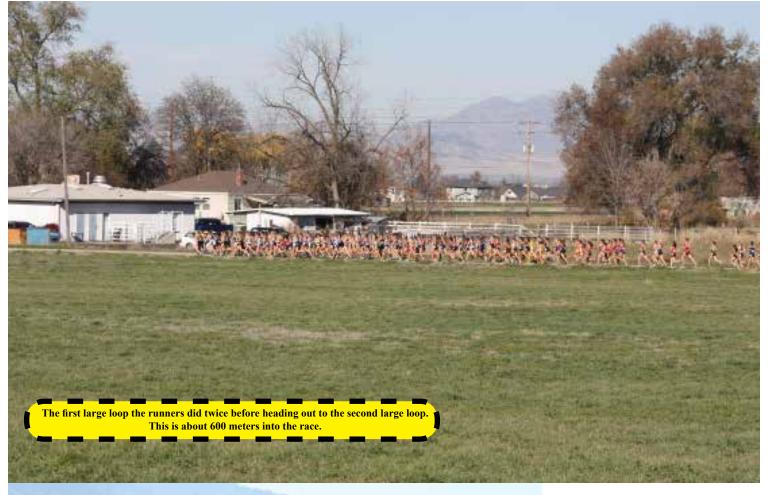


The Cache Mountains play a backdrop to one of the large loops the runners circled

The 20 women's teams, and 17 men's teams which make up the Mountain region were attempting to get one of two automatic qualifying team positions which would lead to next weeks NCAA Championship in Terre Haute, Indiana. The Lobo women came in ranked #2 in the region, while the men were ranked #10. On the women's side Colorado was ranked #1 in the country, so most pundits believed the Buffalo's would take the team title, but at least five teams were picked to qualify after final NCAA at-large selections. The Mountain region is highly



talented, and quite deep compared to the other eight NCAA regions. The women's race was first up and immediately from the start junior Alice Wright (Worcester, England) took command of the race. Alice might have been inspired by the majestic horse which kept galloping back and forth in front of the runners. It certainly was an incredible image and an example of grace and power. And that is exactly what Alice resembled, grace and power. While with each stride she towed the front of the race with her, it looked ridiculously easy. While everyone knew it wasn't, it certainly seemed to be. After a 400 meter straight, the





runners took a left hand turn and began a tour of their first large loop. It was difficult to see clearly as the runners were tightly bunched behind Alice, but there was a speck of red near the front and that had to be senior Calli Thackery (Yorkshire, **England**). Calli, who was definitely feeling under the weather, nevertheless knew her importance in the team race. The Lobos needed five of their seven athletes to have a real good day. As the runners completed their first loop, and then re-entered the starting straight Alice had built up a 10-15 meter lead on the pack. No one seemed interested, or capable of chasing after Alice, so the group just huddled together like penguins trying to stay

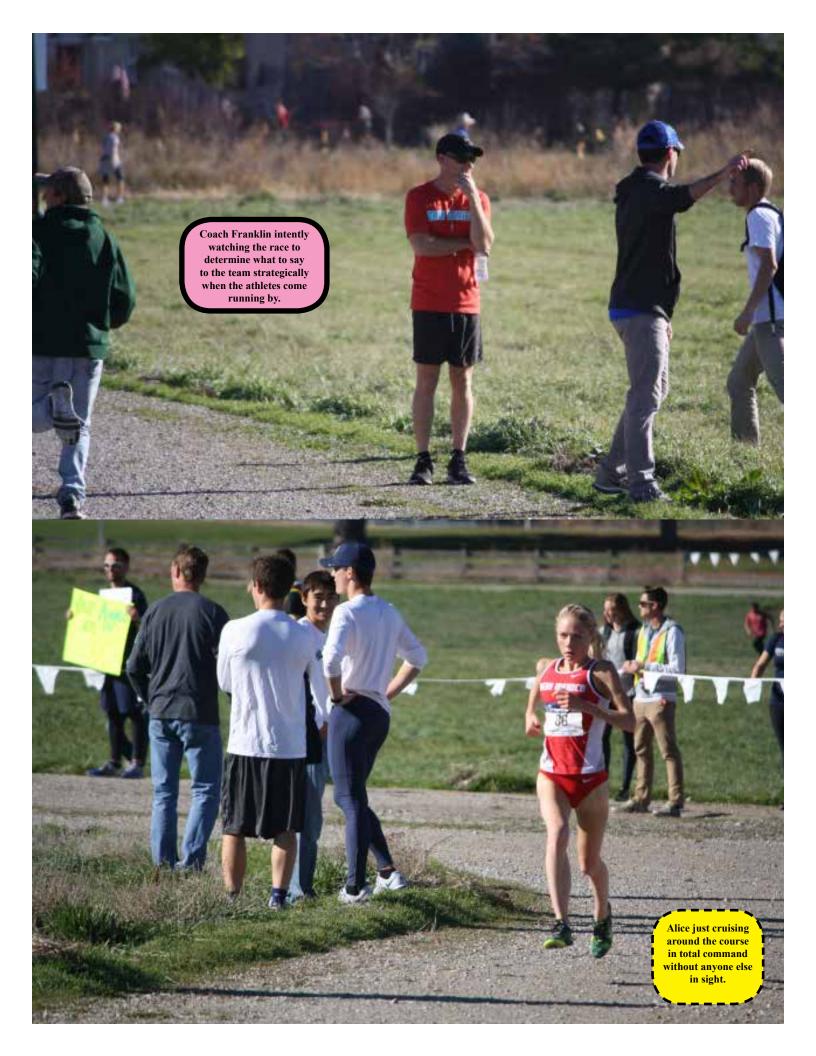
warm. Sophomore **Kendall Kelly** (Bosque Prep, ABQ, NM) came running by, the third Lobo to show the school colors. The runners followed the same first loop before exiting to the second loop, and this time the race had strung out more. Alice was churning away and she was running almost side by side with the horse as it galloped along. Two fine thoroughreds!



Alice had a nice lead and was adding to it with each stride. Calli then came around the corner racing with a group of about fifteen athletes. This group had about a ten meter gap over the next large group of about 20 runners. That group had about five more meters on the next pack which included Kendall, senior Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England), froshie Alexandra Buck (Pendleton, IN), and sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM). While they were just a tad farther back in the pack than what would have been good, they certainly were in no danger given the early stage of the race. And the real positive was that the four of them were in immediate contact with each other which is crucial in championship level races. Its just reassuring when you look to your left and see a teammate, and look to your right and see the same thing. It reinforces that everyone is invested in the same manner. As the runners started the next large loop it was quite apparent to all spectators and coaches that Colorado was easily the team leader. The Buffalos had six of their seven runners in the top fifteen of the race



which is quite impressive. But after that there was a real good team race going on. There were five teams looking good (Air Force, Utah, BYU, Colorado State, New Mexico) and although the Lobos appeared to be leading those programs, its was very close. Time to get down to business. Alice kept the pressure on up front and no one was going to chal-

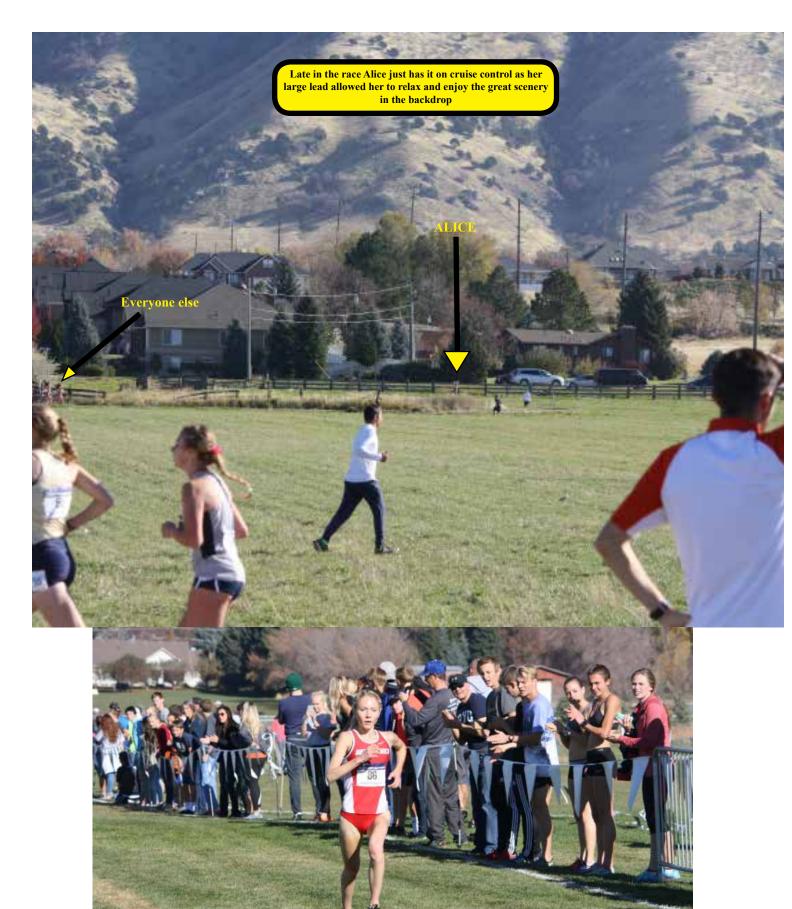

lenge her on this day. Effectively, unless she stopped and had a lunch break, the victory was going to be hers. As the race got to the 5000 meter point of the 6000 meter race, Utah, BYU, and Colorado State had fallen just slightly behind. But Air Force was running the race of their lives, and it was neck and neck with the Lobos. Coming around Coach Franklin was imploring the group to latch on to the person in front of them and focus all the way to the end. Coming down the homestretch it was just too close to call for the second automatic qualifying position. Alice flashed across the finish line in an outstanding 19:59 for the 6k course, a very, very fast time under any condition. But then two Cadets came through in 3rd/5th. Calli was in next for the Lobos as

she placed 11th with a 20:26. Then Air Force got their third runner in at 19th. Natasha having her best race was the third Lobo in at 27th place and 20:56. Sophie then outkicked an Air Force runner getting her by a 21:13.5 to 21:13.7 margin and a 34th to 35th placing. Alex made sure she didn't let Sophie pull away finishing right behind the Air Force runner for 36th place (21:14). That gave the Lobos a total of 109 points, good for second place, while the Cadets totalled up 111. A real fine battle between the Mountain West Conference rivals.

The men's team had a daunting task as they toed the starting line coming in ranked #10 in the region. Seven of the seventeen teams competing were nationally ranked, and the Mountain Region was the toughest and deepest region of all nine NCAA regions. To put that in perspective, the Great Lakes region which is comprised of 30 teams and includes the Bia Ten conference only got two men's teams to the NCAA. When the Mountain region slugfest was all said and done it had six of the seventeen in the "Big Dance". That is just a tough go for any team.

The men got out well and picture #1 shows #259 senior Adam Cotton (Penkridge, England) leading the Cherry & Silver out during the first 400 meters. As the race was over 10,000 meters (6.2 miles) the field just stayed patient and relaxed as they clicked off mile after mile. Froshie Jacob Simonsen (Aarhus, Denmark) is shown in picture #2 following Adam's good lead out of the starting area. Once the race got going senior Jesus Mendoza (Rio Rancho, NM) on the left in picture #3, and froshie Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jarna, Sweden) on the right teamed up to run together to

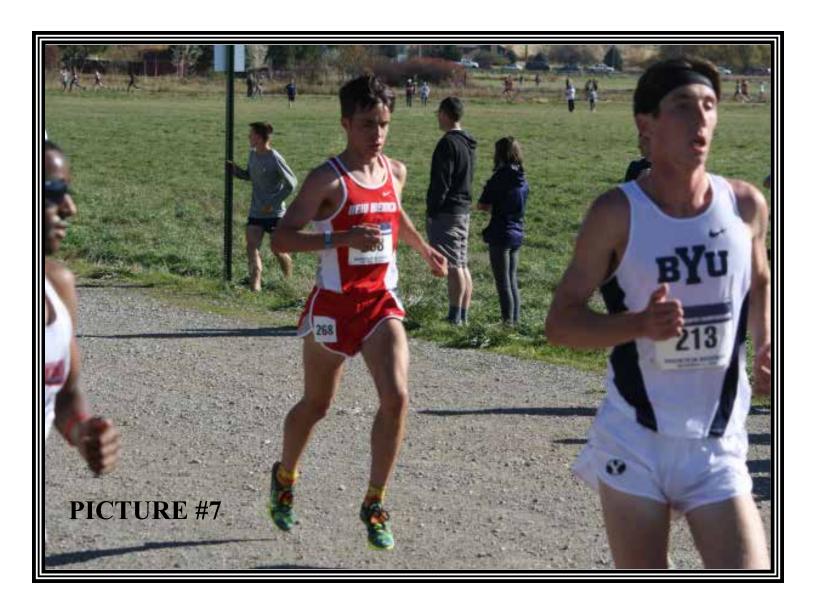


help each other out. As it is always stated, teamwork within a meet is of utmost importance. In picture #4 senior Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) and Jacob are doing the same thing as the going gets tough. Jacob has his eyes firmly on Grahams back trying to make sure he matches Graham stride for stride. It seemed at the halfway point of the race that the men were definitely in the top 10, but definitely not in the top seven. So every point would

When the lads got to the finish line they totalled as a group 237 points, which was good for ninth place on the day.

Lobo Women Place in NCAA Top 10 for 9th Consecutive Year Wright & Thackery Earn All American Honors

The hallmark of any successful organization is high level consistency over a long period of time. Successful corporations like Proctor & Gamble, Ford, General Mills, Apple, and Johnson & Johnson have created a culture that breeds success, year after year. The women's cross country program at the University of New Mexico is doing just that at the Division I level. With 348 institutions sponsoring women's cross country just at the DI level, and over 6000

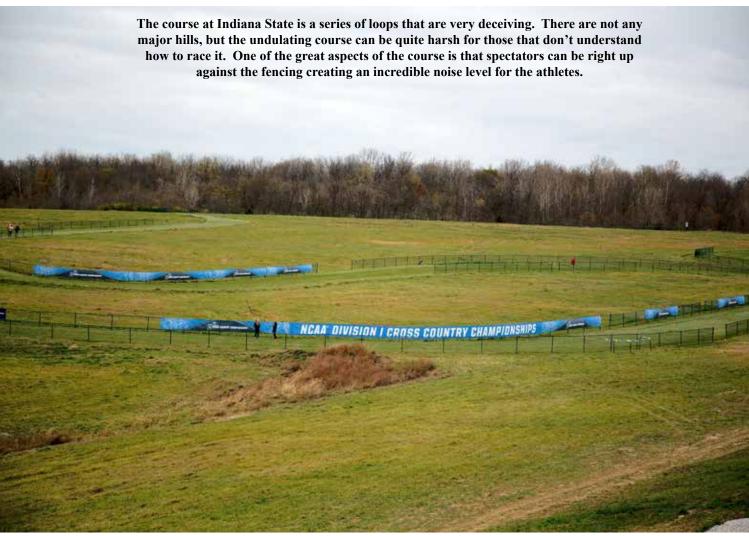
women athletes competing on those 348 teams, competition for the top spots is intense. But for the last decade, and especially over the last nine years, the UNM Lobos have been one of the premier programs in America. As the chart in blue below shows, there have only been six programs that could even get to the NCAA Champion-ships each year over that nine year span. And of those six, UNM is clearly the second best program, and the only non-Power 5 member among those teams. Typically, Power 5 institutions have greater financial flexibility and a more significant revenue stream which allows them to recruit globally, fly teams where they need to, and provide more for their athletes. And as such, successful coaching in a non-Power 5 program becomes the primary

HIGH LEVEL CONSISTENCY AT NCAA WOMEN'S CHAMPIONSHIPS

Since the University of New Mexico women's program started its annual trek to the NCAA Championships the following programs have qualified to the NCAA cross country championships each of the last 9 years, the only teams of the over 340 NCAA Division I programs to do so. reason that program can be fighting for top national spot each year. The UNM Lobos have finished in the Top 10 for seven straight years which is currently tied for the seventh-longest streak in NCAA history.

The weather forecast for Terre Haute, Indiana earlier in the week had to make one laugh, although not in a positive manner. All week was supposed to be way above average temperatures, in the mid to high 60's, and then Friday night, just before Saturdays race become cold and windy. And while the weathermen and weatherwomen are typically only average

in their forecasts, this time they absolutely nailed it. On Thursday and Friday, as teams arrived to run the course in their pre-meet preparation the men ran around the course with no shirts, and the women wore sports tops. Most of the coaches and meet workers were in shorts and short-sleeved shirts. It was borderline humid. And then around 4:00pm on Friday, the skies darkened, the winds whipped up, and in came a torrential downpour with



strong winds that leveled lots of stuff. And it went from 60 degrees to the 40's, and it rained all night long. In the morning on the day of the meet it was overcast and drizzling, but with 25-30mph winds, and temperatures in the 30's. Thankfully given the Indiana region had so little rain over the last month, the course took on the water well. and the footing on the course was a speck soft, but overall in good shape. The weather experts did say it would



feel like 24 degrees so maybe the ground was at least a little hard from that!!!

With an attitude from the top runners that no matter what the weather conditions were, they were going to bang it out hard and aggressive, so it was no surprise when that is exactly what happened. The course at Indiana State's Lavern Gibson site has an 800 meter straightaway, before entering a gradual, then sharp turn leading past the 1000 meter point. On the long straight both senior Calli Thackery (Yorkshire, England), and junior Alice Wright (Worcester, **England**) took their time, and ran the tangent from the outside starting box to get to the front of the race. As the runners finally got to the turn, both Calli and Alice were right at the front as perhaps as many as eight athletes spread out across the course. That is exactly the position they wanted. But then there spelled trouble for the other five Lobo runners, senior Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England), senior Kathryn Fluehr (Naples, FL), junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque

Prep, ABQ, NM), sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM), and froshie Alex Buck (Pendleton, IN). Not one of them was in the top 200 of the race with only 255 total athletes. The five had been swallowed up at the start, and were far back from a position of working through the race. The problem starting that far back is that with a huge number of similar talented runners in the meet, there are simply bodies all around, and it takes much focus and energy to try to get by them. But thankfully the 6000 meter distance provided 5000 meters more to accomplish the goal of moving forward. After the 1000 meter point the athletes enter one of the inner loops on the course, where they run about 500 meters straight, have a gradual left hand turn, then 500 meters of straightaway, then a sharp turn to the right where they pass the first timing pad at 2000 meters. At 5:00 into the race both Alice and Calli were right at the front with Anna Rohrer from Notre Dame, then a long and tight pack behind them. At the 2000 meter split there were about 15 women in the front, before a very slight separation to the next huge pack of maybe 50 runners. Rohrer led the race through a split of 6:28 with Calli second at the same time, and Alice in

tenths of second before the gun blast.

fourth at the same time. Erin Finn from Michigan, the pre-meet favorite was third in the same time. Sophie had moved clearly into third place for the Lobos at 6:46 which left her at 145th team place. Alex had moved up to 148th, with Natasha at 166th, Kathryn at 170th, and Kendall at 171st. When the team scores were flashed up on the large videoboard the team leader was Michigan with 106 points, with Oregon second at 134. Premeet favorite, Colorado was fourth with 229 points. The Lobos were way down the ranking in 16th place with a total of 465 points. The 38 individual qualifiers, those that qualified but not on a team were taken out of the scoring, so the scoring places for the Lobos was 2-4-145-148-166.

After passing by the 2000 meter point the course takes the athletes on a 900 meter straightaway on the farthest point away from the finish line area, along large trees in the background. The picture to the left shows the athletes in this section of the race course. Both Alice and Calli can be seen with the front group of athletes. At 9:00 there was a break as 12 runners split away

from the main pack. Calli and Alice were in the front 4-5 of that lead pack. Behind the lead group the hard pace was starting to take its toll as the race began to string out. Once the race got to the end of that particular straight, the runners made a gradual right hand turn, and passed the 3000 meters, halfway through the course. They then cruised through another 500 meter straight before handling a gradual left hand turn, running another 500 meters to get to the 4000 meter point, which was the second timing pad. At 11:00 Rohrer threw in another very hard surge, and the pack was whittled down to ten athletes as folks trying to stay on the back simply couldn't maintain that pace. Among the front group of ten were Notre Dame, Michigan, New Mexico, New Mexico, Kansas, Missouri, Boise State, New Hampshire, and San Franciso. And then within 30 seconds the Michigan and Notre Dame

athletes threw in another massive surge, and just as quickly the lead pack was down to five Michigan, Notre Dame, Boise State, Kansas, and Missouri. Five meters back was the San Franciso runner, then about a five meter gap back to Alice and Calli was about three meters back of Alice with ten runners right behind. Then a huge gap went back to the next runners in the race. Rohrer kept pounding the pace and the strain on the top athletes faces was evident. Essentially the Irish runner blew the race apart with her surges. Coming up on the all important 4000 meter timing pad this would give the Lobos another piece of information to see if they made a dent from the 465 points at the 2000 meter point. As the runners flashed across the timing pad Alice was 5th in the team scoring while Calli was one place back in 6th. Then Sophie was all the way back in 141st, with Alex at 147th and Natasha at 165th being the top five. The 464 points meant that the team had not moved either forward or backward. All season long Coach Franklin had preached to the athletes to be mentally tough over the last 2000 meters of a race, and now that advice would be put to the test. Remarkably the front three of Rohrer, Finn, and

Peloquin turned up the intensity one more notch, and it seemed they were in a full bore sprint with almost a mile to go in the race. Alice and Sophie were banging away trying like crazy to make any headway, but they couldn't pull in the lead group. Both of the Lobos were running hard and fast which showed how intense it was up front. Sophie, realizing how far she had to go started the process of passing people right and left. The high level fitness that she had developed over last spring, and then the summer months was kicking in, and allowing her to move past athletes. Alex, sensing the same thing began her long sustained move forward as well. She looked very much in control and the high altitude training was starting to pay off for the Indiana native, and she found it possible to pick people off. Natasha was caught all by herself in relation to her teammates, but kept driving hard. Every point counted! She was doing a good job but was starting to run out of real estate. Gotta keep moving hard.

Even though she is only a freshman, Alex Buck listened to Coach Franklin very well, and was not running right behind athletes, getting out away from them so she could pass them with solid footing. Over the last 2000 meters Alex had a fantastic finish.





The athletes entered a small loop which would take them past the 5000 meter split, before exiting the loop and following a wide sweeping turn leading into the 600 meter home straightaway. The finish line is very deceiving as the athletes can look up and see it, but it still is a long way to go. At the 5000 meter point Alice and Calli were pressing hard, and the look of strain was on their face. Several athletes after the race said by that point on the course the legs were numb, and one was just going on guts and glory. While there was still a kilometer to go it was apparent the team was making a great move forward. Both Alice and Calli had placed themselves in All American position and they certainly were worthy of that. The photographs to the left show both of the ladies just past the 5000 meter point. Alice got to the finish line first, her 14th place team finish well earned. Alice clocked a 20:13 for the 6000 meter (4.97 miles) distance. Calli got passed by a few athletes on the home straight, but about 50

meters from the finish line pulled out her great kick and flew by those same athletes. She ended up finishing 22nd in the team scoring with a 20:17. Sophie was the next turquoise-clad Lobo on the course and when she came into view she was absolutely destroying people around her. She was flying by them like they were stuck in the mud. In fact, Sophie looked like she could have run the course again! Coming down the homestretch she ran hard all the way into the finish chute, coming through with a 58th team placing at 20:42. Lets stop and take a breath here. At 2000 meters Sophie was in 145th team place. At 4000 meters she hadn't changed much, only moving up four slots to 141st. 2000 meters later at the 6000 meter point she finished 58th! That means she passed an incredible 83 athletes in the final 7:00 of the race......holy cow! Now that is high level fitness. Next in for the Lobo ladies was Alex and she passed the finish line in 80th team scoring position at 20:52. She must have been thinking.... well I have to match what Sophie does. Alex was 148th at 2000, 147th at 4000 and 80th at 6000 meters.......which means she passed 67 athletes in the final 2k. Yikes. Flying down the homestretch as the fifth and final scorer for

the Lobos was Natasha who had a team place of 136 and a 21:10. Natasha had cut off 29 team places in her final 2k. So between Sophie, Alex, and Natasha they accounted for 179 passed athletes in the final 2000 meters. Kendall came across in 159th team placing and a 21:23, while Kathryn grabbed 173rd team placing at 21:33. When all was said and done the Lobos tallied 310 team points good for seventh place.

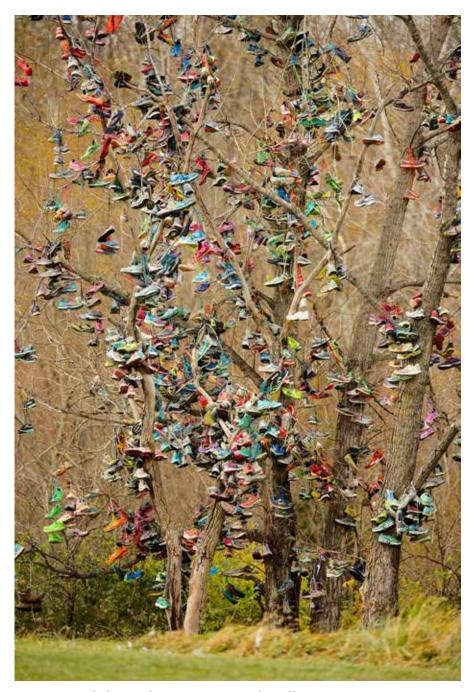












One of the unique aspects of Indiana States Cross

This year 18 collegiate teams along with about 60 post-collegiate athletes (527 athletes total) showed up to compete on the red Mondo banked facility, dubbed one of the 10 fastest indoor tracks in the world. For the Lobos, it was the first meet of the season, which brought about anticipation and anxiety for both coaches and athletes. It is fun because as the great movie character Forrest Gump said, "My momma always said, Life is like a box of chocolates. You never know what you are going to get" And that is exactly how the coaching staff felt - the first meet brings about the unknown as we never know what exactly will happen. Every year the first meet sets the tone for the remainder of the season, it is in some regards like the first exam of the semester, its provides great insight to what needs to be done. There were some sterling moments as newcomers to the program provided a glimpse into the future, while established athletes reaffirmed their standing within the conference. All in all the meet was an excellent start to the season and very positive in nature. With many more of the team prepping to compete in the next several weeks it should add to the excitement of the year.

the eventual fastest man in the world. During the second lap Mark, in third came around the bend at the 300 meter point and the other three runners made a huge push forward led by Korir. Korir passed the 400 meter point in 49.3 seconds while Mark came through in 50.5. Suddenly Korir threw in a fast surge and was leading with Hinds on his shoulder, about a 10 meter gap, then Koech and Mark on his shoulder. Up the backstretch the UTEP Miner was flying and Mark in fourth was digging down to keep pace. Coming down the homestretch Korir looked like he was running a 200 meter instead of a three lap race and everyone in the house knew it would be fast. Korir crossed the line in



600 Meters Produces World Best

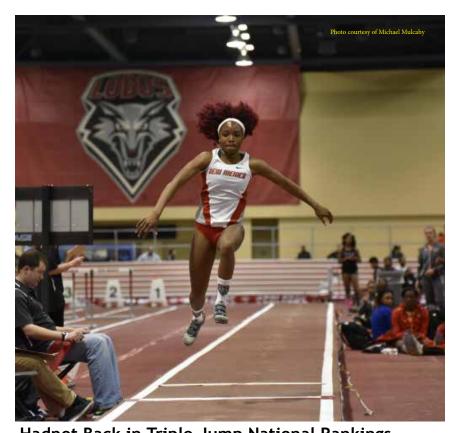
What a way to start the indoor season as the Convention Center track produced another world record! The 600 meter race is not an IAAF world sanctioned standard event but athletes all over the world do compete in it during the indoor season, and there are world rankings associated with the event. The Lobos have always contested the event as it is a good distance for the 400 meter runners to run, while also a great evaluative tool for 800 runners. The fast section of the 600 was primed for a quick pace as two UTEP runners, Emanuel Korir and Jonah Koech both who had run 1:46 for the 800 meters were in the race as well as Lobo junior Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM), a 46 second 400 runner, and Tre Hinds from Wayland Baptist who was the NAIA national leader in the 600. Once the gun went off the Wayland Baptist runner pressed the pace during the first 200 meters, and Mark and both UTEP runners went right with him. All of them passed the 200 meters in about 24 seconds flat. The picture below shows Mark running stride for stride with



a stupendous 1:14.97 shattering the previous world best of 1:15.12 set by Nico Motchebon of Germany in 1999 and became the first man in history to run under 1:15. Mark, fighting all the way to the finish line crossed in 1:19.31, just missing the UNM indoor school record of 1:19.18. Mark finished the race as the #3 fastest man in Lobo history. But the event wasn't done. In section 2, frosh Kristian Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark) followed another Wayland Baptist runner to a second place finish and a time of 1:20.94. For a split second Kristian was #8 all-time at UNM. In section #3 junior Adam Monroe (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) clocked a huge PR of 1:21.29, just missing the all-time top ten ranking. And then finally, in the slowest seeded race on the day froshie Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) took the lead and never let up as he toured the three lap race to an excellent 1:20.36, moving to #5 all-time at UNM in his very first race! Now that is certainly a great way to start a running career. So when the dust settled there were three new entries into the all-time Lobo Top 10 ranking list, Mark at #3, Gavin at #5, and Kristian at #9.

Hadnot Back in Triple Jump National Rankings Senior Jannell Hadnot (Lodi, CA) pictured above qualified for both the indoor and outdoor NCAA Championships last year as a junior. On both her first two jumps in the Cherry & Silver Invitational Jannell couldn't find the board, and ended up with fouls. Steadying herself, she came down and hit a 41' 9 3/4" effort on her third attempt to move into the finals, where she would get three more attempts. In the fifth round she bounded out to a 42' 9" distance, the 4th longest indoor jump in Lobo history and her second longest ever (after her school record tying 43' 2 1/2"). That leap moved her to the top of the Mountain West Conference, and also up to #10 nationally.



Kerr Surprizes in 800 Meters Sophomore Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) pictured above wasn't supposed to run this fast in the 800 meters. After all, being at the start of a solid block of training, Josh had run an 8 mile tempo run at 5:25 pace the day before the race, and was only going to use the 800 race to get in some good leg turnover work and assess his overall fitness. Instead, he went out and blitzed a PR 1:50.75, took the lead in the MWC rankings, and



moved to #7 all-time in Loboland. Oh, and is ranked #25 in the NCAA. Josh got out slowly (probably due to associated fatigue from the tempo run), but slowly chipped away at the lead pack, and as they entered the last 200 meters made a concerted effort to reel the runners in, and finish as the top collegian on the day. An interesting fact is that Coach Franklin had former two time NCAA indoor mile champion Lee Emanuel follow the exact same formula, and in the corresponding weekend in 2009 and 2010 (the years Lee won the championship) he ran 1:50.30 and 1:50.31. A tried and true prescription for success. Also in the 800 was soph. Alex Palm (Norrkiping, Sweden) pictured above who had battled injuries all last year, not racing at all, and thus was running his first track race in a long time. Alex, who had also done the Friday tempo run fell behind early just as Josh had, and in the last 200 meters slowly pulled the group in, and then exploded around the final turn to run away with the section and finish in 1:52.29, good for 4th overall in the race. Alex now is ranked #2 in the MWC rankings.

Long Jumpers Have Great Start The young trio of Long Jumpers put together a fine group effort. Sophomore Decathlete Ryan Chase (Olympia, WA) pictured to the right unfortunately had his freshman season cut short by a serious hand injury while Pole Vaulting but did have a 2016 indoor LJ best of 23' 6". In the second round of the C&S meet he scared that with a 23' 4 3/4" leap, then waited until the fifth round to blast a 23' 10 3/4" PR. That placed second collegiately in the meet, and also gets him up to #2 in the MWC.



Blount Rips Off Three of Top Ten Throws in History Junior Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) pictured above came into the competition as the #2 20 Lb Weight Thrower in Lobo history. While not eclipsing her single best throw of 58' 6 1/2" she did produce three of the ten longest throws in history. On AB's first toss of the competition she plunked the ball down at 56' 9 1/4", the #5 longest in history. On her second toss she spun the ball out to 56' 5 3/4", the #6 longest in history. And then finally, on her third round effort she twirled the ball out to 56' 11 1/2", the #4 longest in history. In the finals she couldn't come up with anything longer, but ended on a very good note. Amaris is currently ranked #8 in the MWC.



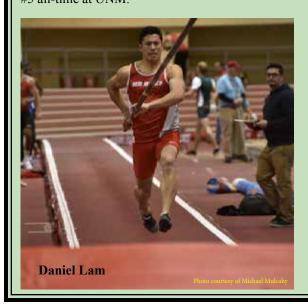

Finally, froshie sprinter/jumper Alejandro Goldston (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM) pictured below running the 200 meters wanted to join the party, and he was right behind Tanner finishing in 23' 6 1/4". That also gets Alejandro to #7 in the MWC.





POLE VAULTERS HAVE A FUN DAY GETTING HIGH OVER BAR

In the men's Pole Vault on Friday night the four Lobo vaulters all had a solid day at the office. Leading the parade was junior Decathlete Daniel Lam (Amsterdam, Netherlands) who hit a big PR of 16' 6 3/4" finishing as the second best collegian on the evening. Daniel opened up the competition clearing 14' 7 1/4" on his first attempt, but then had to take all three attempts at 15' 1" clearing it on his last attempt. Moving on to 15' 7" he took two attempts to clear before nailing 16' 3/4" on his first jump. The bar went to 16' 6 3/4" and on his second attempt he cleared. That bar clearance is the #2 ranked height in the MWC so far this season. Backing up Daniel was froshie Nathan Burnett (Del Norte, ABQ, NM) who was last years New Mexico State high school champion where he set a new state record of 15' 3 1/4". Nathan cleared 16' 3/4" before bowing out. Both sophomores Jason Atencio (Hope Christian, ABQ, NM) and John Harari (Loomis, CA) cleared 15' 7" which for John was a new PR. Over on the ladies side on Saturday junior Katherine Whiting (Santa Cruz, CA) entered the competition with an indoor PR of 12' 5 1/2" which she did at the 2016 MWC Championship, placing her 8th. KW passed the first two heights before entering at 11' 9 3/4", and she made that easily. She then went on to have first bar clearances at 12' 3 1/2" and a PR 12' 9 1/2". Then the bar went to 4.00 meters or 13' 1 1/2". She missed on her first attempt, but scaled it on her second establishing a second PR on the day. Katherine went out of the competition at 13' 5 1/4". Her 13' 1 1/2" clearance moves her to #2 in the MWC and #5 all-time at UNM.

Sophomore Larimar Rodriguez (Rio Rancho, NM) who can be seen behind Hannah finished in 1:37.05 which moves her to #6 all time at UNM.

4 x 400 Relay Takes Conference Lead

The quartet of Cheyne Dorsey (Rio Rancho, NM), Isaac Gonzales (Taos, NM), Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM), and Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, Wyoming) combined for a 3:15.78. The group finished 3rd behind UTEP's strong performance of 3:10.99 which currently ranks #20 in the country. Cheyne led off with a solid 48.7 clocking, just off his existing PR. Cheyne handed to Isaac who clocked 49.0, just 1/10 off his all-time best. The above picture shows Isaac handing the baton to Mark. Mark must still have been exhilarated from the great 600 the night before since he screamed around the track to a 46.9 clocking, the fastest Lobo relay split in at least eight years. That is half a second faster than his old PR. Carlos finished off the effort with a 50.3 clocking. Last year at this time the relay group ran around 3:16.88 and ended the indoor season with a 3:13.94, fourth fastest in history. Maybe this year if all things go well the quartet can have some type of shot at the indoor school record of 3:12.27 which has stood since 1983! Fun, fun, fun.



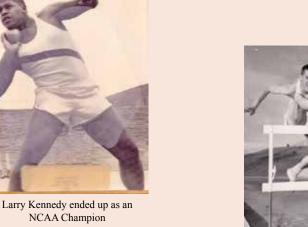

A Look Back in Lobo Track History

In January, 1964 the University of New Mexico entered an exciting time period as a 10 laps to the mile (176 yards) new state-of-the-art banked plywood indoor track was unveiled. Designed by a UNM professior (Floyd Highfill) the track employed "banked" turns which was unheard of at that time. Dr. Highfill carefully crafted the turns to maximize running speed, and the unique design was so popular that meet directors all over the country clammered for him to build them one. That was the formation of Pro-West Track company based out of Albuquerque. The budget to build the track was \$13,000 which pales in comparison to the Convention Center indoor track currently used by the Lobos which would cost over \$2 million dollars to build today. The new indoor track was housed in Tingley Coliseum, and the bright red painted wood was uniquely New Mexico. In later years they would paint one lane of the oval yellow, and the other red in honor of New Mexico's colors. Indoor track & field was incredibly popular in Albuquerque, and crowds for the annual Jaycee meet were over 10,000. UNM averaged over 6000 spectators for their regular season collegiate meets. Track & Field WAS big in Albuquerque!

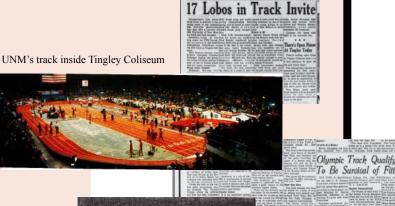


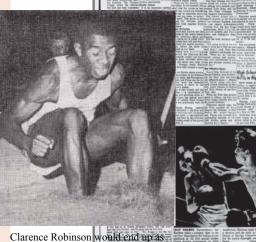

NCAA Champion in the Long Jump and Triple Jump.



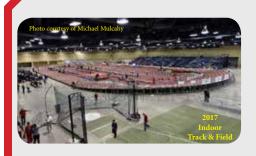

Meet Review: The annual UNM Team Invitational is a fun, action filled small one day meet that brings a different dynamic to the team. Usually UNM hosts large two day meets with anywhere from 500-900 athletes, 15-20 teams, and its quite difficult to have a meaningful "team concept" in those scenarios. In essence athletes are competing for a PR or a conference or national ranking and many athletes tend to get "lost" within the size of the meet. But in 4-6 team meets the scope of the competition changes dramatically. Athletes who have difficulty managing the large invitationals, can add a scoring place to the team, and have a real connection with the end process. And that is exactly what transpired in the 2017 team meet. Collectively, the Lobos had 39 team members who scored at least one point for the team, and hopefully feel their accomplishments were valuable. In small meets the score is typically closer due to the scoring format used, and this years meet was no different. Two points was all that separated both the men and women victors and in the end it was a rousing affair which will help set the tone for the upcoming MWC Championship later in February.

Connor Moves to #6 Nationally in Mile

Senior Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England) pictured to the left opened up her final indoor campaign with a sterling mile run to move right up on the NCAA leaderboard. Sophie was content to run right behind former Villanova NCAA Champion, and now professional with the Boston Athletic Association Em-

ily Lipari for the first 1200 meters. She clocked 72, 2:23, 3:34 for the first six laps of the race. Then Sophie turned up the tempo and spurted to the lead with one lap to go. Lipari, always known for her grit and ability to finish a race pulled Sophie in around the final turn, and as the picture shows had a wonderful battle over the final 60 meters of the race. The BAA runner was able to eek out a narrow victory, but Sophie benefited from having her in the race as she crossed in 4:36.86. While not a PR (her existing best ever is 4:36.37) it is the 6th fastest mile ever run in Loboland. Sophie has a ten second cushion on the second fastest runner so far this season in the Mountain West Conference. Finishing third in 4:46.82 was senior Calli Thackery (Worcester, England) and that performance is ranked #3 in the MWC. Right behind Calli in fourth place was sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) who PR'd with her 4:50.61, good for a #4 ranking in the MWC.

Twirl.....and Booom



Both juniors Allison Mady (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) and Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) had some serious fun in the Shot Put and 20 Lb Weight throws. In the throwing events, the farther one throws, the louder the sound effect when the implement makes contact with the ground, given the force of the object is greater. And both were making some loud sound effects. Starting off in the Weight Throw AM hit a nice big PR of 43' 9 3/4" which moves to #8 alltime at UNM. Amaris, competing in the final flight came in with an all-time best of 58' 6 1/2", set last year at the Don Kirby Elite meet. On her very first throw she hit 58' 8 3/4" and by the fourth round distanced 59' 5", an almost one foot PR. She had been working on being more consistent throughout all her series of throws, and for her five legal throws she averaged 57' 5 3/4". Currently, Amaris ranks #4 in the MWC Weight Throw. Later in the meet AM came back to toss the 4 kilo ball around and with an indoor PR of 41' 4 1/2" was looking for more. Well, she got that as she threw five throws longer than her previous PR, with a longest of 43' 4 1/2", and averaged 42' 6 1/4" for those five legal throws. She moves to #6 all-time at UNM in the Shot Put

Kerr Joins National Ranking in Mile

Sophomore Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) pictured on the left was hoping for a fast early pace which would propel him to a sub 4:00 mile but once the halfway point was reached in 2:08, any chance of that was gone. But Josh, running through 1200 meters with Alex Palm (Norrhoping, Sweden) pictured on the right decided to really bear down over the final 800 meters of the race and at least see how close he could get. His (and Alex's) fifth lap was 30.6, then he followed with a 31.0 with Alex still in tow. But on the seventh lap Josh increased his tempo to a 29.2 and Alex had to let go. Then on the eighth and final lap Josh ran a 28.1, crossing in 4:07.69, which when NCAA altitude converted came out at 4:02.29. Josh ran his final half of the race in under 2:00! That 4:02.29 moves JK up to #21 nationally, and #3 in the MWC. It also gets him on the Lobo All Time mile ranking at #10. Alex held on for a 4:08.29 clocking and a #5 ranking in the MWC.



Ayanniyi Joins All-Time Top 10 Sprint Ranking

Froshie Akeisha Ayanniyi (Santa Fe, NM) pictured to the left opened up her Lobo career last week at the Cherry & Silver Invitational with a 7.75 in the 60 meter dash. This week in the prelims of the 60 she powered to a 7.70 PR to qualify for the eight woman final. By the way, that 7.70 would have moved her into a tie for the seventh fastest in Lobo history. Well, in the final she got out even better, and stayed consistent throughout leaning at the finish line to record a 7.63 fourth place tally. That 7.63 clocking moves her into a tie for the fifth fastest in UNM indoor track history.



Uldbjerg Hansen Takes the 800

Froshie Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark) pictured to the left running the 4x400 Relay last week toured a fast 600 in preparation for a fast 800 this week. The youngest Dane ever to break 1:50 in the 800 (did it at age 17) wanted something in the 1:52 range. After an opening lap of 28.4, he followed with a 28.1, coming through the 400 in 56.5. His third lap of the red Mondo track was in 28.6 and he finished off his final lap in 28.5. His finishing time of 1:53.14 was a good start to the season. Later in the day Kristian came back on the 4x400 relay and split a fine 49.6, improving on last weeks 50.5. Right behind Kristian in the 800 was fellow froshie Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) who clocked 1:53.58.

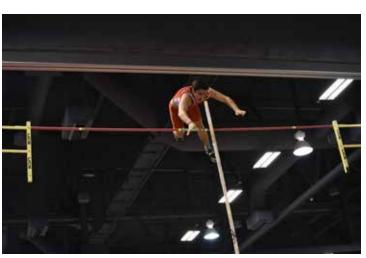

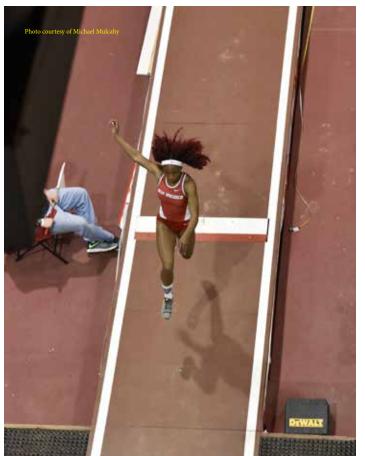

Sometimes it just takes......Time

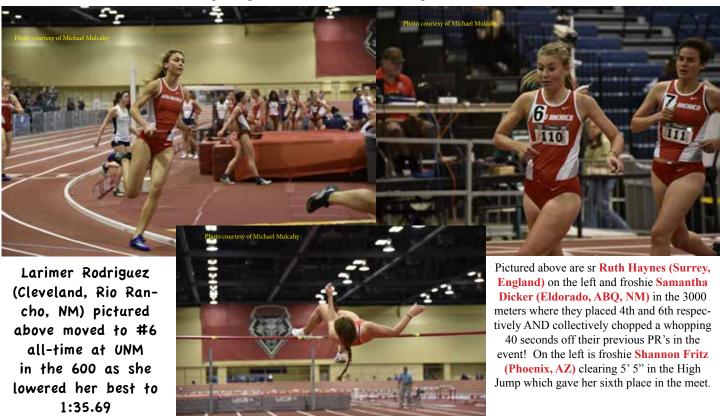
Two years ago as a redshirt froshie Kendall Kelly (Bosque Prep, ABQ, NM) pictured above clocked 5:05.14 and 10:14.26 for the 1 Mile and 3000 meters during the indoor season. Then last year as a sophomore she struggled to an indoor seasonal best of 5:16.01 for the mile, and didn't compete in the 3000. But every athlete who goes through struggles, and then finds a renewed sense of dedication and commitment typically come out on the other end of the tunnel much better off. This past fall, following closely what the Lobo distance coaching staff wanted Kendall made the travel squad for the NCAA Cross Country Championship and got to compete on the sports biggest stage. Using that experience as a springboard she took all that accumulated work and translated it into a marvelous 3000 meter race during the team invitational. For the first mile of the race Kendall was content to follow through very consistent laps of 41 seconds. In fact it was incredibly consistent with laps of 41.7, 40.5, 40.1, 41.6, 41.2, 41.2, 41.6, 41.6 leading her to a 5:29 mile split. Then after the mile point the laps were 41.7, 41.6, 41.9 until Kendall decided to press the pace and take the lead. She slowly on the next lap increased the tempo to a 39.4, then lowered it to 38.0. With Coach Franklin urging her to run the last 400 meters in at least 75 seconds (5:00 mile pace) she did him one better flying around the track with a 67.5 last 400. KK flew across the finish line with a HUGE improvement to 9:45.61. Thats "only" a 29 second PR and the time moves her up to #8 in the MWC rankings.

A Look Back in Lobo Track History

The date was January 24, 1974 and the Lobos pulled off a nice upset at the Air Force Academy. In the 1950's, 1960's, and 1970's the "dual" meet was a very important part of collegiate track and field. Track programs would compete against one other team and the dual meet record at the end of the year a highly valued part of the program. It wasn't until the 1980's and more so into the 1990's that larger invitational-type track meets became more a part of the collegiate system.

Tracksters Stun Air Force in Dual Meet

New Mexico defeated the Air Force Academy, 76-64, in an indoor track meet in Colorado Springs Saturday. The Lobos won 11 of 16 events in the meet. Air Force had won 14 straight dual indoor meets with its last loss coming at the hands of UNM in 1974. Michael Solomon won the 440- yard run and won the 300-yard dash in a Falcon fieldhouse record time. Marlon Gates won the 60-yard low hurdles and placed in two other events. Lionel Ortega won the one and two mile events. In the field events Robert Nance was first in the long jump, Mikael Bernhardt won the triple jump and Mark Henderson was first in the pole vault. Running events were won by Jay Miller in the 1000-yard run, Jose LaPorte in the 60-yard dash and Tom Snowdon in the 880 yard run. UNM coach Hugh Hackett thought the team, "All did quite well for the first meet. We came through pretty well." Several new school records were set in the meet. Solomon ran the 300-yard dash in 30.7 and Gates ran the 60-yard low hurdles in 6.8. Charles Dramiga from Uganda in his first race for UNM finished second in the 600 yard run, but set a new school record of 1:09.4. This is the third best time in the world this year. Coach Hackett said Air Force was strong in the hurdles and sprints but, "We met their strength with our strength and did a little better." New Mexico is now 1-0 and Air Force is 2-1 for the season.

NEW MEXICO COLLEGIATE CLASSIC FRIDAY & SATURDAY, FEBRUARY 3-4, 2017

The 2017 New Mexico Classic, while small in number of Lobos competing was high in good performances by those that did compete. Typically, the distance side of the team takes this weekend as a time to put in some good miles on the roads in preparation for the Don Kirby, MWC, and NCAA segment of the season. But no less than 17 PR's were established over the two day meet by Lobo athletes which was attended by over 500 athletes with 19 schools.

For the third week in a row the throwing events produced exciting results. In the Shot Put, junior Ally Mady (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) entered the meet with an all-time indoor best of 43' 4 ½" which she had set just one week earlier. And before that she had a PR of 40' 6"! On AM's first toss she spun the ball to a 42' 1" distance. Then on her second throw of the competition she locked in the dynamics of sequencing technical movements and just nailed the release to a fantastic improvement to 45' 2 1/2". So in the span of three weeks she added two feet and then two feet again to her PR. With that 45' 2 ½" distance Ally moves to a #10 ranking in the Mountain West Conference, and also moves to #4 all-time at UNM. Throwing partner Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) had been having a good stretch in the 20 Lb. Weight Throw, and she continued that trend with another nice PR. Amaris had a wonderful opportunity as the #3 and #6 best throwers in the NCAA ranking came into the Convention Center representing the University of Mississippi. The Ole Miss throwers had consistently thrown the implement over 70' which is a long way in womens Weight. On her first toss she fouled, but came back on the second one to hit a 57'9". Then on her third throw she unleased a massive 18.38 meter toss which is 60' 3 3/4". Amaris becomes only the second woman in Lobo indoor track history to eclipse the 60' barrier. She followed with a foul in the fourth round then two other solid throws right around 59'. At the end of the competition

Amaris finished third overall to the two Ole Miss athletes, who threw 71' 8" and 71' 1". Amaris is currently ranked #3 in the Mountain West Conference. Over in the sand pit senior **Jannell Hadnot (Lodi, CA)** was having a spectacular day. The two time NCAA qualifier in the Triple Jump was on the NCAA national ranking list, but not high enough to guarantee entry to the NCAA Championships over at Texas A&M in March. Well all that changed at the Classic. Jannell entered the meet with an all-time indoor best of 43' 2 ½" which was tied for the UNM school record. On her first round attempt she hit a safe 40' 4" distance and then got more aggressive on her second attempt when she flew out to 42' 9". The third round showed a 41' 10" and at the end of the preliminary round Jannell was comfortably in the lead. In the fourth round she went 42' 10" and then in the fifth round hit the big one she was looking for. JH came down the runway with excellent speed, hit her first phase well, maintained it through the second phase, and then exploded on her third phase to come down in the soft sand at 43' 6". That leap gives her a new indoor school record, a MWC leading distance, and most importantly moves her up to #10 nationally. Her distance has never not qualified to the

NCAA Indoor meet, so it was a good attempt. In the sixth and final round Jannell finished off the competition with a 42' 8" mark. The 4x400 Relay was primed for a good effort. Being in the right race with teams that are comparable in ability helps immensely to produce good times. Two weeks ago the quartet of Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM), Isaac Gonzales (Taos, NM), Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, WY), and Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM) had produced a 3:15.78 which at the time led the MWC Conference. But then last week Utah State and Air Force put the smack down and produced a 3:10 and 3:12 effort respectively. So

it was time to up the effort. In order to run well a relay teams needs a solid lead-off man that will always put the group into good position. Cheyne has been that go to guy, and he didn't disappoint coming through with an excellent 48.4 clocking, just 1/10th off his all-time best. Cheyne handed off to Isaac, and IG produced a 49.2 then handing off to Carlos. Carlos flew around the red Mondo oval and produced his fastest ever, a 48.0 split, which gave Mark the chance to bring it home with a great time. Mark did not let the group down as he clocked 47.1, his second fastest ever. The clock showed the groups final time as 3:13.71 which meant they moved up the all-time UNM chart to #4. The 3:13.71 is the fastest relay time in eight years, and maybe gives the guys a



chance to think about taking down the UNM school record of 3:12.27 which has stood since 1983 - and that would be cool. Senior Elmar Engholm (Stockholm, Sweden) started his 2017 indoor season with an 800 and boy did he get in a crazy fast race. In fact after the race was completed the two Kenyan freshmen from UTEP had run 1:46.15 and 1:46.30 respectively which are #1 and #2 in the NCAA rankings. Wow! Elmar was the third collegian in the race with his 1:52.86. Junior Adam Monroe (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) did the exact

opposite of what Elmar did where EE dropped down in distance Adam decided to run the mile for the first time in his collegiate career. He ran a very nice controlled race, and worked hard to win the second section of the race in 4:13.91 just ahead of fast closing junior Tyler Valdez (Belen, NM) who crushed his old PR of 4:20.69 with a 4:15.48. Both guys had a good effort and should be proud of the advancement. The men's 200 meters produced some really fine efforts led by froshie Alejandro Goldston (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM). Learning to the race on a banked track, especially in the 200 meters is an acquired skill set, and the more one does it, the better they become. Alejandro, still learning to use the banked turn to his advantage took a major step forward in that learning process as he dropped his

seasonal best from 22.16 all the way to 21.88. That gets him up to #8 in the MWC ranking. Right on his heels was sophomore Carlos Salcido who also PR'd as he lowered his best from 22.18 to 22.06 and a #10 ranking in the MWC. Freshman Jay Griffin (Huntsville, TX) who was a redshirt member of the Lobo football team this fall ran his first 200 of the season with only a week of practice, and produced a very fine 22.29. With three more weeks before the conference championship, it should give Jay a nice training segment. Froshie Akeisha Ayanniyi (Santa Fe, NM) double PR'd in the 200 meters and the Long Jump. In the Long Jump she had a 17' 11" seasonal best and almost jumped a foot farther as she landed in the sand at 18' 10". That distance got her sixth place in the meet, and moves her within a couple of inches away from the eighth spot in the MWC. She also made some good solid inroads in the 200 meters dropping her PR from 25.83 to 25.59. Ben Shields (Sheffield, England), after having a couple of weeks to acclimate to the altitude and training of Albuquerque got a nice PR in the 60 meters when he clocked 6.91. That performance moves him to #10 all-time at UNM in the sprint race. He also clocked a PR in the 200 at 22.58. Currently he is

#5 in the MWC in the 60 meters. Larimar Rodriguez (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) made her first foray into the 400 meters this indoor season and came away with a new PR of 57.64 knocking a tenth off her previous PR. Junior Parker Jones (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) also notched a double PR in the 60 and 60 Hurdles. In the latter Parker lowered his best to 8.52 which makes him the 8th fastest ever indoors at UNM. Junior Kyra Mohns (Eldorado, **ABQ**, **NM**) got her combined event season off to a good start. The Pentathlon (60H-HJ-LJ-SP-800) has been good to Kyra as she has placed in all MWC Championships. Last year Kyra produced a seasonal best of 3681 points at the MWC Championship, and wanted to start at a slightly higher point. In the 60 Hurdles Kyra skimmed the barriers to a nice PR of 9.01 and moved on to the High Jump. KM cleared 5' 4 1/2" just shy of her PR. In the Shot Put Kyra had thrown 35' 10 1/2", 35' 10", and 35' 1 1/4" in her last three Pentathlons. On her very first toss she eradicated those marks with her 37' 6" PR. Moving on the to Long Jump she finished with a 17' 6" leap. The final event found Kyra running to a 2:26.87 clocking, one second off her previous PR. When the totals came out Kyra had scored 3691 which has her as the #4 all-time at UNM. Decathlete Ryan Chase (Olympia, WA) always working on his event specialties made a nice progression in the High Jump. Ryan had previously jumped 5' 9 3/4" one year ago, but this year improved to 6' 2 3/4". In decathlon-speak that is an additional 112 points! Very good point production.

A Look Back in Lobo Track History

The Western Athletic Conference (WAC) indoor meet was held much earlier in February than the Mountain West Conference is currently held but the level of competition was incredible. The WAC was considered the premier track & field conference in the country during the 1960's & 1970's and even into the 1980's. The WAC was comprised at that time of New Mexico along with UTEP, BYU, Arizona, Arizona State, Utah, Colorado State, and Wyoming. UTEP won 12 NCAA team championships either in indoor track or outdoor track from

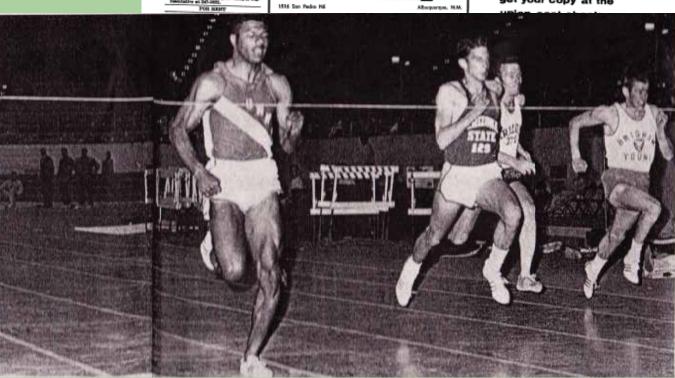
1975-1982, and the number of world-class athletes that competed in the WAC were numerous. The headline in this segment of Lobo history came from 1968 and the meet was held in ABQ's Tingley Coliseum. The article talked about three Lobo athletes in particular that had significant contributions to the team that weekend. Rene Matison was a world-class sprinter who multiple times clocked times in either the 60 yard sprint, or the 100 yard dash which tied the existing world record. He was a multiple time NCAA qualifier. Adrian DeWindt also was a multiple time NCAA qualifier as a distance runner, and also had the distinction of making the NCAA meet in cross country, indoor track and outdoor track. Like the others Art Baxter was a multiple time NCAA qualifier in the jumps. All three men were either listed on the world ranking list, or high on the USA ranking list.

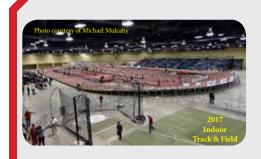

A Magical Mile.....Again

Last year at the Don Kirby Elite Sophie Connor flew around the track and ran one of the nations top mile times, which eventually got her to the NCAA Indoor Championships, where she was All American. There are precious few opportunities to run fast during the indoor season based on UNM"s academic calendar, and the dearth of "fast" indoor tracks in the Western part of the United States. When second semester begins, there are really only four weekends before the MWC Championship, which traditionally doesn't produce top national performances due to the doubling and tripling athletes do. So

careful planning must be done by head coach Joe Franklin in order to give Lobo athletes the best opportunity to qualify for the NCAA Championships. Sophomore Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) had the Don Kirby meet circled as he was going to attempt to do exactly what Sophie had done one year prior. Coach Franklin got a field of athletes together that seemed capable of doing just that. He got two Utah State distance runners to run a hard early pace, then allow former UTEP NCAA 3000 Steeplechase national champion, and owner of a 3:57 mile time, Anthony Rotich, now a professional runner to take over at the halfway point and keep the pace strong. And then there was Utah States sub-4:00 miler Dillon Maggard in the field and he needed to run fast to get on the national list given he was not high enough. So it appeared everything was in order for a good race for the top three men. At the starting gun the USU couple did exactly as they had been instructed, take the field through the 400 in about 60 flat (4:00 mile pace), and then stay consistent. Josh was content to just tuck in and stay relaxed, letting the three men in front of him do the work. The USU guys got to the assigned time of 2:00 for the 800 and then bowed out of the race. Rotich quickly took over and kept the cadence strong, and it appeared at one point that he might run away from the field. But both Dillion and Josh covered his move with Josh in third behind former Lobo great Alex Herring, and Dillion stalking Josh. At the 1200 point which the trio reached in 3:03 there were only 3/10th of a second separating them. Maggard slid by Josh, and got right off the outsdside shoulder of Rotich, who was trying his best to run away from the collegiate men. Up the backstretch Rotich opened up a five meter gap, but then the Aggie and Lobo put their head down and drove hard up to Rotich's back. At the bell lap Josh was still third, but the pace was nice and quick and Josh remained patient. As the trio entered the final banked turn Josh easily slid to the outside shoulder of Dillion, and then when they entered the home straight, only 40 meters to the finish line Josh found another gear, and slowly inched by the other two men. It wasn't until about 20 meters left in the race that Josh led for the first time. As he crossed the finish line the announcer excitedly shouted out that Josh had run 3:58.04. Wow!!! That performance moves Josh to #3 all-time in the mile in Loboland, and also gets him up to #8 on the NCAA ranking list. Maggard, who ran 3:58.23 gets up to #11.

Records Are Made to be Broken

No matter what event in track & field, at some point an existing record will be broken. On the world scene great performances which are proclaimed to be "unbreakable" usually are shattered at some point in time. Take for instance Bob Beamons Long Jump at the Mexico City Olympics in 1968 (29' 2 1/4"). That was two FEET farther than any man had ever jumped before. Track experts said that it could not be broken.....until Mike Powell came along in 1991 and jumped 29' 4 1/4". So all records will be broken. To be fair, indoor track at UNM didn't really start until the mid-1960's when the indoor track was placed inside Tingley Coliseum, which gave the Lobos a place to compete. And women's track didn't start until 1976, so any record would have begun then. On the women's side former Lobo national level athete, Margaret Metcalf cleared 5' 11" in the High Jump in 1979, and so far that has stood the test of time. On the men's side the oldest record on the book in an event that is still contested (events like the

60 yard dash and the 600 yard run are no longer NCAA events) would be Sammy Kipkurgats 1:48.13 halfmile from 1977. The second oldest record was the 4x400 Relay which was 3:12.27 from 1983. Last week at the New Mexico Classic the quartet of Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM), Isaac Gonzales (Taos, NM), Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, WY), and Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM) ran their fastest 4x400 Relay yet, a 3:13.71, which ranked as the 4th fastest in Lobo history. And the group actually started thinking through what it would take to break the school record and that is good strategic planning. The section of the race the group was seeded into was just about perfect for them. There were two teams that had much faster seed times (Arizona & Arizona State), and then two other teams that seemeed about the same, UCLA and Stanford. Lead-off man Cheyne Dorsey did not get a great start around the first turn, and put himself in a huge rut during the first 150, but worked really hard during the second lap to pull in the other four teams and come down the homestretch in good position. Cheyne handed off to Isaac, splitting 48.5. Isaac was essentially caught between two runners and probably couldn't catch the guy in front of him, so he just focused on getting as close as possible. When Isaac handed to Carlos he had run his fastest relay split ever, a 48.2. Carlos got the baton and screamed around the first and second turns. In fact he was running so aggressive there was a fear he might run out of gas. He didn't flying by

UCLA and leaving Stanford in the dust. Carlos never stopped pressing and he clocked a huge PR of 47.7. Taking the baton from Carlos, Mark was in third place, and Arizona and Arizona State had too large of lead but Mark made sure he didn't let UCLA or Stanford back in the game. Mark finished with his usually strong carry of 47.0. The groups total time of 3:12.10 took down the old record of 3:12.27. Now we will wonder how long before its broken again?



A Fast Mile But Not the Easy Way

Senior All American Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England) wanted to get in another fast mile before conference and NCAA's. Currently ranked #14 on the NCAA list with her 4:36.86 done two weeks ago at the Team Invitational. Ednah Kurgat, who is redshirting this year agreed to help Sophie along for the first 1200 meters, and then let Sophie go at it by herself. Ednah did a good job of pacing coming through splits of 70-2:22-3:33 for the 400/800/1200. Then Sophie took over and continued that pacing level running the penultimate lap in 35.6, and the final lap in 35.0. Her finishing time of 4:37.83 is certainly not her fastest, but it shows a high level of fitness to be able run the 8th fastest performance in Lobo history, and a time that would rank #20 on the national list like that. Sophie owns the #3, #6, #7, #8, #10 fastest times in UNM history. The picture to the left shows no one around at the finish line.

Indoor sprinters live by the thousandth of a second and this week Ben lowered his best from last weeks 6.91 to this weeks 6.88. While that may not seem like a lot to outsiders, it can be the difference between winning a conference sprint title, or finishing third or fourth. Ben is currently ranked #3 in the conference with the two leaders at 6.76 and 6.85.

Froshie 800 Runners Can Be a Formidable Duo

One of the dynamics that teammates have to learn, is how valuable having good training partners around. Good teammates feed off each other, encourage each other, listen to each other, and most importantly race like crazy to get to the finish line first, which brings about the best in their teammate. Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark) and local athlete Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) seem an unlikely pairing, but this indoor season they have jelled into a formidable duo. Both had run a nice 600 meters at the opening Cherry & Silver, when Gavin outleaned Kristian 1:20.36 to 1:20.94. Then they came back one week later and Kristian outleaned Gavin in the 400, 49.6 to 49.7. So the guys have good leg speed, but also good mid distance strengh. At the team invite two weeks ago they ran the first 800 of their Lobo career and finished in 1:53.14 (Kristian) and 1:53.58 (Gavin) and showed good spunk. 1:49 800 man Elmar Engholm was asked to take the guys through about a 54 second first 400 and he did a good job of that clocking 54.1. Then it was left to the rest of the six man talented field to get after it. At the 600 meter point, Kristian led with a 1:22.9 while Gavin was right behind. On the last lap Kristian kept pouring on the pressure and coming off the final turn looked like he might take it. But Gavin suddenly found another gear and surged past as both guys got to the line at the same time. Gavin was given the nod with his 1:50.47 while Kristian got a 1:50.73. Those are excellent performances and actually move them into the All Time Top Ten ranking at #7 and #8. With miler Josh Kerr holding down the #9 spot with his 1:50.75 the Lobos have a great 800 group that can tangle with a lot of good teams. Gavin is ranked #3 in the MWC while Kristian has #5!







Riker-Urrutia Moves to #4 All Time in 600 Junior Hannah Riker-Urrutia (Valley, ABQ, NM) pictured above came into the meet with an all-time best of 1:35.37. Trying to stay more engaged with the lead pack, Hannah went out in 29.9, and then came back with a 30.7 to cruise through the 400 in 60.6. She finished off with a 32.8 for a total and fifth place finish of 1:33.50 which moves her up two slots on the All Time Ranking list. She ends the season only 6/10ths of a second off the school record.

They continued rolling together, now putting plenty of space between them and everyone else, running 33, 33, 33, before a 34 and then a 35. At just past the mile and a half (2600 meters into the race) point Graham, feeling good picked up the pace and ran a 32 second tour around the red Mondo facility, while Alex clocked a 34. Graham, feeling really spunky flew around the last lap and ran his last 200 in 31 seconds while Alex hit 35. When Graham crossed the finish line his finishing time was a new PR of 8:09.41 which moves him to #9 all-time at UNM. Alex finished in a solid 8:15.21. They are currently ranked #5 and #7 in the MWC.



Women Want to Run a Fast 3000 Also

There were four Lobo women who wanted a quick time to see where they were at over the 3000 meter distance. Soph. Ednah Kurgat, who is redshirting, was ready to run real well and she wanted some help up front, and got that from an excellent distance runner from New Mexico Junior College. Also in the race and pictured to the left were Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABO, NM), Kathryn Fluehr (Naples, FL), and Kendall Kelly (Bosque, ABQ, NM). Edna went out in 73 and 75 for the first two laps, and whoooosh, she was gone from everyone else in the field except the NMJC runner. Natasha, Kathryn, and Kendall all were 76/77. An Aggie from Utah State was the third runner and our trio was right behind her, letting her do the work. At the 1 Mile Ednah was at 4:58 (wow), while the other three were at 5:09/5:11. Following the mile point Ednah was all on her own as she pulled away from the Thunderbird. She kept clicking off 36 or 37 second laps until the final two when she went 35 and 35. Ednahs time was a stellar 8:59.84.....which would be the #1 time in the NCAA if she wasn't redshirting. Natasha, Kathryn, and Kendall stayed relatively close through the mile and half point and over the final couple of laps they focused on maintaining their good pacing. The last lap found Kendall flying around the banked oval to run a fine 36.7, the second fastest last lap in the field other than Ednahs 35.2. Natasha clocked in a 9:37.85, only 2/10ths off her PR and third place, while Kendall clocked in at 9:40.18 which is a nice five second PR and fourth place. Kathryn finished in 9:51.89, good for sixth place collegiately. Natasha's time gets her on the All Time UNM Top 10 ranking list at #9.

Big PR's are Certainly Nice
In the 3000 meters senior Jesus Mendoza (Rio Rancho, NM) clocked 8:26.76, a 13 second PR! The picture to the lower left on the top is Jesus. Taylor Potter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) is shown on the upper right clocking a nice 4:10.70 mile, 7 seconds better than his previous best. The lower left photo is Adam Monroe (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) hitting a nice 800 meter PR, one second better than his previous best. Adam clocked 1:51.69. The photo in the lower right is froshie Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jarna, Sweden) who lowered his 1 mile best from 4:21.69 to 4:07.62 which gets him right near the top eight in the MWC. THIS DAY IN LOBO WOMENS TRACK & FIELD

This report was in the February, 1979 Daily Lobo after the women's team had competed in Tingley Coliseum. The women's track team had started in 1976, and was slowly building a program, and it wasn't until the 1980's that women got more funding for scholarships and funding to compete appropriately. In the 1970's when the women traveled it was sometimes by cars, and sometimes they packed their lunch, or dinner. It was a very different time in the early days of women's track & field. Coach Tony Sandoval, now the head coach at Cal (Berkeley) was the coach trying to build the Lobo women into a competitive team.

The Lobo women's track team walked away from the Region 10 A.A.U, indoor track invitational last weekend with eight first places and seven second places, including one meet record and three school records. Margaret Metcalf set a meet andschool record with a high-jump of 5'10". Lobos Susan Vigil, Sherry Caton, Margaret Metcalf and Regina Dramiga placed first in the mile relay, setting a school record of 4:00.5. Other Lobo firsts included Debbie Davis in the Shot Put throwing 37' 11", Anita Marsland running the 60 yard hurdles in 9.2 and Regina Dramiga running the 800 in 2:17.0. Second place Lobos included Patti Kaufmann in the 3000, with a time of 10:42.0, missing the school record by six seconds. Etta Linton ran the 400 in 60.8 and Lynn Brasher made the all-time top five in the 800 with a time of 2:22.3. Pam Gutierrez tied the school record in the 60-meter dash, running it in 8.0 seconds. Gayle Bassett ran the 60-meter hurdles in 9.6 seconds. We are slowly improving," said women's track coach Tony Sandoval. "We are becoming more competitive." Margaret Metcalf and Susan Vigil are planning to travel to Baton Rouge, La for the Pepsi Invitational to compete in the High Jump and 880 repsectively Saturday, February 17.

WHAT DO ALL THE SYMBOLS MEAN????? In parentheses after a performance will be a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. This indicates the COLLEGIATE place in the meet that athlete finished. All unattached or professional athletes are removed since we are most focused on NCAA competition. After that may be two numbers like (2,8). This stands for how the athlete ranks on the All Time Top Ten Indoor Track & Field PERFORMER and PERFORMANCE list. The number on the LEFT indicates how that athlete is ranked as far as individual PERFORMERS are concerned. The #2 would tell us that performer (athlete) is the second-best in New Mexico indoor track & field history in that event. The number on the RIGHT indicates how that performance is ranked in relation to all the top performances in New Mexico history in that event. The #8 would tell us that performance is the 8th best in New Mexico history in that event. It is possible, and even probable that one athlete could have many performances which rank in the top ten during their four year career. An x on the LEFT (x,8) tells us that they have achieved a better performance before, while on x on the RIGHT (8,x) tells us it doesn't make the performance list. PR indicates a PERSONAL RECORD (their best ever in that event). An @ indicates the performance has been altitude adjusted based on the NCAA protocol.

VIEWS: In conference championships coaches expect athletes to do several things as being part of the program. The first is to be a great team member and support every Lobo athlete in the meet. We are all Lobos! The second is to find a way to win titles, or score in the top eight places, and earn points for the team. The higher the percentage of team members who score, the better the end team result is. The third is if the second can't happen, run, jump, or throw the best that you have every done (PR) or at the least get a seasonal best (SB). Theoretically, if everyone on a team hits a PR or SB what more can be expected? Of the 52 Lobo athletes who competed in the 2017 championship, 33

scored in the top eight, hit a PR, or got a SB, and that is quite good. The fourth place team finishes replicate what the Lobos accomplished in 2016, but it was still a positive fourth if there is such a thing. Sometimes a team can be predicted to do very well, and then for whatever reason fail to reach that goal. The Lobos fourth

place finish was filled with so many positives it was a good feeling being around the team. Now, certainly, we need to, and are focused on how to get back to winning the conference championship for UNM like we did in 2013, 2014, 2015 and that is the ultimate goal but still it was a good effort by the Lobos. Everyone around the conference had predicted both teams would end up fourth, so it was no surprise at all when that actually happened. Four Lobo athletes were crowned as MWC champions, and we are very proud and happy for them. It is a great honor to become a conference champion. And within several days the NCAA will announce which 16 athletes in each event will be invited to compete at the 2017 NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championship. Right now we have about nine Lobos athletes waiting to hear. Hopefully, most will get in and represent the turquoise and cherry with great pride and distinction!



DISTANCE MEDLEY RELAY.....JUST STUNNING

Before we discuss the incredible exploits of the Distance Medley Relay (1200-400-800-1600) there is an important back story. Until two years ago the Distance Medley Relay was always the last event on Friday night. So that meant, any miler, 400 runner, or 800 runner would have already run a prelim in their individual event some time Friday afternoon, and not be fresh for the DMR. Because of this only one team had ever qualified to the NCAA Championships out of the conference championship so it was very, very hard to do. Head Coach Joe Franklin had been trying to convince the conference coaches it was in "everyones" best interest to move the DMR to Thursday, so it would add some excitement to Thursdays schedule, but also allow everyone to enter a DMR with fresh athletes. Most MWC teams at some point can put together a good DMR, so it was in the conferences best advantage to do this. But for years the conference coaches voted not to move it from Friday which never made sense but was typical of coaches who never think outside the box. Finally, three years ago the conference coaches agreed to move the DMR to Thursday and last year Boise State's women almost made the NCAA Championship when they would





never have had a chance if the event was still on Friday. So it did work exactly the way Coach Franklin had told the coaches! Okay, fast forward to 2017. There were some loaded teams entered in the DMR which made it exciting and supposedly all the teams could help each other run fast, and maybe, just maybe run fast enough to get on the NCAA ranking list top 12. The Lobo quartert of senior Elmar Engholm (Stockholm, Sweden), junior Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM), froshie Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark), and sophomore Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) had some real fire power and had a good chance to run fast, but to run in the 9:30 range and get in the top 12 NCAA ranking would be challenging, VERY challenging. Utah State and Colorado State had dynamite teams and so the race was ready to get hot.....hopefully. No matter what anyone says, there is immense pressure on the lead-off man as he sets the tone for everything else that follows. Have a great leadoff, and the rest of the team feels the energy, and feeds off of that. Have a poor lead-off, and it complicates everything for the other three lads. To get in a position to run in the 9:30 range it was assumed Elmar would have to run in the 2:56-2:58 range for his 1200 meter leg. What is that in English??? He would have to run the same pace as if he was going to run a sub-4:00 mile, 58-59 seconds for the 400, 1:56-1:58 for the 800 and then continue with that tempo Ahhh, no problem you say! The gun went off and as expected Utah State, Colorado State, and New Mexico grouped together but thankfully an Air Force Falcon took the pace and pressed. The group passed the 200 meter point in 31.2, then hit the 400 in 60.5.....way too slow. They did another 30.9 lap and followed with a 30.0 to get to the 800 point in 2:01. Elmar being an experienced veteran realized the pace was not what he needed so he went out on his own surging to the lead and running away from the group. He exploded around the turns and pumped his arms furiously. Elmar was gapping the group with each stride and he gritted his teeth and fought hard to sprint around the track. He ran his last 400 of his relay leg in 57.14 and got to the hand-off in 2:58.7. That definitely set the tone for the rest of the guys. Mark took the baton and flew away and around the track and he never let up splitting an excellent 46.9 for his two laps around the oval. Kristian grabbed the baton from Mark and knew he had to do all the work by himself, but he put his head down and ran with emphasis and purpose. He clocked a quick 52.3 first 400, and knew the pain would come real soon, but still followed with a 58.5, running his 800 leg in 1:50.9, a great job by him. The quartet had a huge lead and just as Kristian knew, Josh knew he would have to run the entire 1600 meter leg by himself. Thankfully the group was ahead by enough that Josh could try to pick off other runners as he lapped them. At least there was someone he could chase down. Nevertheless, Josh went out in a fast 27 seconds for the first tour around the red oval, before settling in for 30 second laps. He got to the 800 point in 1:59.2 but continued his barrage against the stopwatch. He went 30.7, 31.2, 31.3 before finishing off with a 29.8. His total time for the metric mile (1600 meters) was 4:02.2 which is the equivalent to a 3:58.2 mile run. When Josh crossed the finish line the clock read 9:30.07 which the coaching staff knew was top ten in the country. Further examination found that the time ranked #6 in the country! It also just barely took down the former UNM record of 9:30.38 set in 2009 when former two time NCAA mile champion Lee Emanuel anchored the quartet. To say this was a marvelous effort would be an understatement. Almost every team that ever qualifies in a DMR has a group of people around them to feed off of. The Lobo quartet essentially had to run most of the race by themselves, pushing, pushing, and pushing to stay psychologically in the race with no one to compete against. It was a fantastic effort by the lads, and their reward will be competing at the NCAA Championships.







BLOUNT HEAVES WEIGHT THROW TO NEW RECORD

Junior Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) had had a very good season up to the conference championship. She was ranked sixth in the 20 Lb. Weight Throw, and had moved up to #2 alltime at UNM with her 60' 3 3/4" toss at the New Mexico Classic. Assistant Coach Matt Hull had noticed a serious improvement in her consistency at practice, and felt Amaris was ready to throw very far IF she would stick to the plan.....relax, and follow the technical sequences worked on in practice. During warm-ups for the Weight Throw Amaris looked very good but things can change when the official tells the athletes its for real. AB was scheduled to be the eighth thrower in the competition and as the athletes threw before her nothing was spectacular.....and then Amaris stepped in the ring. She relaxed, followed the patterns practiced for the last two weeks, rotated, and when she released it, there was a huge.....ahhhhhhh from the crowd, and the ball just exploded out of her hands and the implement went WHOOOSH, and when it landed it was a looooooong way out in the sector and went KABOOM. The officials pulled the tape measure out, took their time, and finally read out 19.37 meters or 63' 6 3/4". Holy cow, that was the longest throw anyone in the conference had achieved all year and Amaris took the early lead. She followed up with a second round foul, and then a 61' 3/4" distance. A Fresno State Bulldog tossed 64' 1" in round #2 to take the lead back from Amaris so at the end of the prelim round of three throws Amaris was second. In the fourth round Amaris tossed 60' 1/4", then 59' 10 1/2" in round five, before a foul in the sixth and final round. After the competition was completed AB finished in third place as another Fresno State athlete passed her with a 64' 6" toss. Amaris destroyed the existing Lobo school record of 60' 10 3/4" which had stood since 2005.



Wright Dominates 5000 Meter Race Junior Alice Wright (Worcester, England) pictured to the

Junior Alice Wright (Worcester, England) pictured to the left wanted to try and run fast but knew she wouldn't have any company on her 25 lap journey around the Mondo track. Great distance runners sometimes know they will have to do the work alone, so they prepare for that occurrence, and simply go forward in their pursuit. After two laps of the race Alice was already one second ahead of the next person, and with each lap that distance grew. She ran consistent 38 or 39 second laps through a 5:30 first mile then continued with that tempo to almost two miles which she passed in 10:24. It was at that point she shifted to 40 second laps and kept it that way until the last lap which she breezed through in 36 seconds. Thankfully, with 24 runners in the field Alice always had someone to chase as most of the athletes had been lapped. When all was said and done Alice created a masterful 15:56.94 victory which moved her into the Top 20 nationally. It was her best ever indoor time over 5000 meters, and the second fastest

performance in Lobo history. It also was the third fastest time ever recorded in the Albuquerque Convention Center facility only two seconds off Olympian Abby D'Agostino facility record performance. Finishing seventh in the competition with her first indoor 5000 meter ever was soph.

Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) who clocked in at 16:36.31 which makes her the eighth fastest in Lobo history.

Hadnot Flies to Triple Jump Victory

Senior Jannell Hadnot (Lodi, CA) pictured on the right had an interesting situation. She was the only jumper in the field of 16 athletes who had been over 13 meters (42'8") this year and she was ranked 14th nationally. Her best jump of 13.26m (43'6") was over three feet better than the second best in the conference! So what is a person to do??? Haha, the answer is not hard to figure out......come down the runway on the first attempt and crush the hope out of anyone else in the competition. And that is exactly what Jannell did as she cruised down the runway, and blasted out to a 43' 3 1/4" distance which DID end up three feet longer than anyone jumped. But for good measure Jannell nailed a 43' 6" distance on her second attempt which equalled her longest distance ever indoor, tied her school record, and made her the seventh longest leaper ever in the Convention Center facility. Nicely done:)





Connor Blisters 800 Meter Record Senior Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England) doesn't get to run many 800's, and when she does, she likes to take full advantage of them. In the prelim round on Friday Sophie was seeded in the same section as the conference leader from Boise State, who also happened to be the 12th ranked athlete in the country with her 2:04.01 performance. They both cruised to the two fastest times as Sophie clocked 2:08.83 which actually is the 7th fastest performance in Lobo history. In the finals the two met again, along with six other women but they had decided to try to help each other run fast. Going out in 30.4 they continue to be side by side through a 61.5 at the halfway point. The Bronco spurted to a slight lead at 600 meters, 1:32 to 1:33 but this was good as Sophie got to chase someone. All the way to

the finish Sophie churned away and when she crossed in second place she was at 2:05.84! This was almost two seconds faster than her previous school record of 2:07.71 done last year. It also gets Sophie up to #30 nationally.



Kerr Wins Mile in Sub-4:00 Effort

Sophomore Josh Kerr pictured to the left was coming back after his sterling 1600 meter relay leg in the DMR with two rounds of the mile. On Friday in the prelim Josh just essentially jogged around the track eight times to record a 4:06.32 clocking. It looked ridiculously easy which should have sent a message to all other competitors. Right behind Josh in the prelim was Elmar Engholm with his fine 4:07.26 clocking. Racing to a PR to qualify for the final was junior Taylor Potter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) who finished in 4:09.66. The ten men in the final was a real solid group but Josh who was ranked #8 nationally also had a Utah State runner ranked #11 nationally in the field. When the gun went off the USU Aggie just sprinted away from everyone, which caught all by surprise. Given Josh had outkicked him multiple times maybe this was his way of trying to steal the race. The Aggie ran the first lap in 29.5 and followed with a 29.1 getting to the 400 mark in a really fast 58.7! Josh, who looked just a little lethargic got

there in 59.5 but the gap between the two was significant. Everyone was looking in awe as the Aggie kept pouring it on getting to the 600 meters in 1:28, while Josh was at 1:30 and Elmar at 1:33. Taylor was behind a group and fighting to stay in contact with the group. At 800 meters the Aggie got there in 1:59.6, while Josh was at 2:01.4, ahead of Elmar who was at 2:04.9. From the 800 meter to the 1000 meter Josh had to make a decision......do I simply settle for second place as the gap between me and the leader is large, or do I dig down and try to increase my tempo and bridge the gap between us and see what happens. Great runners always have that decision at some point in races, and Josh, not surprisingly decided to do the latter which by the way hurts like crazy. By 1000 meters the Aggie was at 2:31.6 while Josh was hunting him down, adrenaline flowing, and now was at 2:32.3, within striking distance. And then before the 1200 meter point it was over, Josh had caught the Aggie, passed him, and was starting to add distance with each stride. By the 1400 meter mark Josh was at 3:33, while the Aggie had fallen to 3:35. And then Elmar looked up and saw the Aggie and started to make a run at him. Unfortunately EE didn't have enough time. Josh, looking revitalized crossed the finish line in 3:58.11, the fifth fastest performance in Lobo history (Josh has the fourth fastest at 3:58.04). Elmar flew across in 4:03.93, good for third place, and then Taylor racing very well on the weekend was able to grab eighth place at 4:10.10.



Speedy Race to Third Place Junior Ben Shields (Sheffield, England) came into the meet ranked #4 in the 60 meter sprint but there were only hundredths of a second separating the top athletes. In the prelims Ben was hooked up against the top seeded athlete from Air Force, and they had a great battle as the Falcon nailed a 6.75 while Ben was right behind in a new PR of 6.83. That 6.83 moves Ben up to #7 all-time at UNM. In the eight man final Ben got out well, had a nice surge in the middle of the race, and dipped at the line to grab third place with a 6.84, just one one hundredth in front of fourth.



Women's Distance Medley Relay #4 All-Time

The women's DMR pictured above of Sophie Connor (lower left), Calli Thackery (lower right), Larimar Rodriguez (upper left) and Hannah Riker-Urrutia (upper right) combined to produce the fourth fastest relay in Loboland history. The group had a nice battle with Boise State, who ended up running the 19th fastest time in the country. Sophie, leading off for her 1200 meter leg was fortunate to have BSU's national class 800 runner

to work with, and it ended up with Sophie running a 3:23.3 time, and then handed off to Larimar, for her 400 meter segment. Larimar toured her two laps in 57.1 and then handed to Hannah for an 800. Hannah clocked 2:14.9 before handing to Calli who split her 1600 meter leg in 4:53.7 finishing second. The total time of 11:18.61 was a nice ending for the quartet. Of the five fastest DMR's in Lobo history, both Calli and Sophie have been members of four each. That signifies true long-term greatness.



Chase Finishes Third in Heptathlon

Sophomore Ryan Chase (Olympia, WA) pictured above during the 60 Hurdles produced a score of 5333 points, which was good for third place in the seven event competition. Ryan started off the event with a 7.12 clocking in the 60 meter sprint which nabbed him a new PR. He then went to his specialty, the Long Jump but was unable to come down where he wanted, settling for a 22' 8 1/2" distance. He went to the third event, the Shot Put and tossed a 41' 1/4" distance. He then came roaring back in the High Jump hitting a nice PR of 6' 4 1/4" which moved him back to second place at the end of day one with a 3028 point total. On day two, he started off with another sprint PR this time in the 60 Hurdles where he clocked 8.60. He then went to the Pole Vault and cleared a 13' 11 1/4" height. Ryan finished off his competition with a 2:49.02 in the 1000 meter run. That total score is the second highest score in Lobo history, with Richard Yorks 5590 as the standard.



Well That Was Quick

Two weeks ago at the Don Kirby Elite, the foursome of senior Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM), junior Isaac Gonzales (Taos, NM), soph Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, WY), and junior Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM) had broken a 4x400 Relay record that had stood for 34 years when they ran 3:12.10, taking down the 3:12.27 standard. Well leading up to the MWC Championship the lads had put in some good training, but more importantly had fully developed the chemistry necessary to run well as a unit. What is chemistry? Well in track relay events that is the feeling the group outcome is bigger than any individual in the group, and they do not want to let their teammates and friends down by not holding up their end of the bargin. Certainly, talent is important, but chemistry allows that talent to fully be realized. Going into the final event the Lobos were up against two powerhouses in defending champion and nationally ranked Utah State (3:07.23), and then the Air Force Academy (3:09.26). Leading off for the Lobos as he always does was Cheyne, and still smarting a little from his ouster from the open 400 prelim the night before (by 8/100ths of a second) he flew around the track to his fastest lead-off split ever, a 48.0. That placed the Lobos third behind USU and AF. Cheyne then handed to Isaac.

Slipping into third Isaac was content to stay there through 150 meters into his leg, then after USU sprinted away, he pounced on the Air Force runner coming down the homestretch section. Going up the backstretch Isaac was chasing a 45 second USU runner and at 250 meters started to make some headway getting the lead down to about 15 meters. Down the homestretch he kept strong, and handed off to Carlos with his finest ever split of 47.8. That was huge. The above picture is Isaac to Carlos. Carlos, taking the baton roared around the turn and was still facing a 15 meter deficit. Coming down the homestretch on his first revolution, Carlos started to pull in the USU runner and as they went into the second lap was catching him with each stride. Coming off the turn going up the backstretch Carlos made a huge surge forward and flew by the blue-clad Aggie, with the Lobo team screaming and yelling on the back stands. Keeping his lead around the final turn the Aggie came back on him, and they went stride for stride down the homestretch. Carlos handed to Mark after his fantastic 47.2 split. Mark, taking the baton flew around the turn and immediately built a ten meter lead. But the Aggie anchoring their team is the finest 400 runner in the conference, and someone who has run 45 seconds before. Going into the second lap the Aggie made a huge push toward Mark and up the backstretch got back to Marks shoulder. At 300 meters into the race the Aggie got by Mark and then it was simply a dogfight to the end. While the Aggies ended up winning the race the guys should be proud of how they represented the Lobo team. When the finish clock read off the final times the Lobo group had run to a 3:10.78 time, knocking a second and a half off what they had accomplished 14 days earlier. A real credit to these guys.

Thomas Double Scores in 3000-5000

Senior **Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM)** was entering somewhat new territory never having run an indoor 5000 meter race. While he is very used to running outdoor races, touring 25 laps around an indoor track is certainly different. There were six men in the field that had run under 14:20 during the indoor season, so there was the potential for some tough sledding in the event but as every athlete knows, its not what you have done, its what you do on this day that counts. The two Colorado State runners were ranked #9

and #13 in the NCAA so they were capable of a fast pace. Early in the race the two Rams were content to lead the field through a comfortable but consistent pace as they hit the mile mark in 5:08. Graham made sure that he was right there off their pace as he clocked 5:09. Right with Graham was Alex Palm (Norrkoping, Sweden) making sure he was in the mix as well. Almost the entire field of scorers was together as the leaders got the race to 9:58 for two miles. Now the fun begins. At 2 1/2 miles the hammer got dropped and the two CSU runners threw down a hard lap which put some distance between them and the group Graham was with. Graham had no problem handling the rest of the race and he went on to finish third in 14:32.38 taking down the pre-meet #3,4,5,6, and #7. Its what you do on the day!!! Alex hung in to finish 6th in 14:39.62. The next day Graham came back to race again over only 15 laps (3000 meters) and finish 7th with an 8:11.26, just off his all-time best of 8:09.41.

Senior Calli Thackery pictured to the far left, and sophomore Natasha Bernal on the right came back from the DMR and 5000 meters to have another go around the red Mondo oval as they locked up with 35 other runners. Calli & Clare O'Brien from Boise State, who is ranked #18 nationally ran hard upfront as they hit 5:00 for the first mile. Natasha was running behind a nice group of eight runners, and trying to figure out when to pounce. At a mile and a half the

Boise State athlete got away from Calli and she was left to fend on her own the rest of the race. Natasha made a huge move after the mile and a half and went by the huge group which was real confident for a young athlete. But nothing ventured, nothing gained. Calli held on for second place as she crossed in 9:25.80 the 10th fastest time ever run in Loboland. Natasha fought right to the line getting fourth place in a PR 9:31.19, moving her to being the sixth fastest runner in Lobo history.





MOHNS SUCCESSFULLY DIGS OUT

In the world of combined event competition there are those situations where an athlete messes up an event, and then has to decide how hard to press to make up for that mistake. Sometimes athletes just give up and finish the combined event out, but junior **Kyra Mohns** (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) doesn't have that in her DNA. The five event Pentathlon is comprised of the 60 Hurdles, High Jump, Shot Put, Long Jump, and 800 meters. In the 60 Hurdles Kyra ran 9.11, solid based on her 9.01 all-time PR. Moving over to the High Jump Kyra was expecting to clear about 5' 4 1/2" which would have given her 783 points for the event. Instead, she strug-

gled from the onset and barely cleared 4' 11 3/4" only gathering in 644 points. To say she was upset would be an understatement. But she went up in the stands, got some encouragement and comfort from her parents, then headed back down to the track for the Shot Put. Krya had an all-time best of 37' 6" which is solid by MWC combined event standards. On her first throw she hurled a one foot PR of 38' 6 3/4"....way to take out that frustration. After a second round 37' 8" toss she came up and crushed a huge 39' 4" effort, almost a two foot PR. Wow.....now that makes up for the HJ!!! On to the Long Jump. In the Long Jump KM had a UNM best of 17' 10 3/4" and on her first leap she went 17' 9", then 18' 0", then finally 18' 1 1/2", a new PR. Way to continue the momentum. Finally, in the 800 with a UNM best of 2:25.76 she went out and hit another PR of 2:24.06. That left her with a total of 3660 points which was good for third place. While Kyra was hoping for a bigger point score, the event was good in that she fought through adversity, and came out in a positive manner.



Salcido Runs to #6 All-Time in 200

Soph Carlos Salcido certainly had his work cut out for himself. He entered the MWC 200 ranked #9 with his seasonal best of 21.86 but only eight men would make the final. Carlos took care of business in the Friday night prelim when he clocked a 21.71 PR to end with the seventh best time on the night. Isaac Gonzales made a nice bid to get into the final, but his PR of 21.99 left him just shy of the Saturday race. In the Saturday race, running out of lane three, Carlos didn't run the first 100 great, but exploded around the final turn and fought hard all the way to the finish line leaning hard to get the Air Force Falcon for fifth by 1/1000th of a second, in 21.70. He now ranks #6 all-time with the #10 fastest overall performance all-time.



Sleeter Grabs Fifth Place in 800 Meters

Last year as a high school senior now Lobo froshie Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) pictured above won the 6A state 800 meter by four seconds when he went 1:52.87. He said after the finals of the MWC 800, "Last year I could walk away from everyone, but this year these guys are for real, and they run hard the entire way". You bet. But Gavin, in his first Lobo season is showing that he too can run with the "big" boys. Gavin came into the meet ranked #3 with his 1:50.47 clocking but there were literally only tenths of a second separating the top five men. To get to the eight man final he had to go through a prelim round which would be very tough. Gavin was scheduled to run in the first of three sections, with the qualifying procedure, the top two finishers in each of the three races, then the next two fastest times. Being in the first section is a disadvantage given once it is done the next two races know how fast they have to run. So it was important to finish in the top two. A Wyoming runner who likes to take it out hard and lead was in Gavins race so that played to his strength, and the Cowboy took it out in 54.1 and got to the 600 in 1:22.5 with Gavin chasing. GS had to race hard all the way to the finish line to grab second in 1:52.43 as he just held off teammate Adam Monroe (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) who clocked in at 1:52.88. Froshie Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen coming back from his stellar DMR leg was in the third section, and even though Kristian ran faster than Gavin (1:52.10) he finished fifth in his section and ended up as the first one out of the final. In the final the two Wyoming athletes had decided to go out and try to run 1:47 so one of the Cowboys hit 53.3 for the first 400. As the picture above shows everyone was pretty clumped together. By the 600 meter Gavin had secured fifth running spot, and he held that all the way to the finish outleaning a hard charging Air Force froshie. His finishing time of 1:50.67 was just off his PR.

Long Jump Takes Three Places

Froshie teammates Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) pictured to the right, and Alejandro Goldston (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM) combined for a 3rd

and 7th, and soph Ryan Chase added an eighth place to the Lobo tally of nine points. Tanner who came into the competition seeded 6th got off his seasonal-best effort of 23' 11 3/4" on his third round attempt, while Alejandro who came in seeded eighth got his 23' 3 1/2" best on his first attempt in the competition, the direct opposite of Ryan who waited until his final attempt to plunk down in the sand at 23' 3 1/4". Having three young Lobos in the finals and scoring points is a solid foundation to build upon for the 2017 outdoor season, and going forward into 2018.







Atencio Does His Happy Dance

did so at the conference slugfest. Opening up at 15' 3" he was clear on his first attempt. He then ran into some trouble at 15' 9" failing to clear on his first two attempts. Without a clearance at 15' 9" he wouldn't score. But on his final attempt he corrected what he needed to, and he was over. Then the bar went to 16' 3/4" and he sailed over it on his first attempt as the picture shows, and when he landed in the pit, he did his PR happy dance for the new PR and the points he would score. The crossbar then went to 16' 4 3/4" but Jason couldn't clear that on this day. His PR height placed him in sixth place again. Grabbing eighth place was soph. John Harari (Loomis, CA) who also cleared 16' 3/4".



Katherine Whiting (Santa Cruz, CA) shown above getting ready to plant finished 7th with a 12'9 1/2" clearance in the Women's Pole Vault. From the pre-meet rankings it appeared that it would take the 12'9" height to have any chance of placing, and that is exactly what happened. Katherine cleared 11' 11 3/4", and 12'5 1/2" on her first attempts, then had to take all three at 12'9 1/2". She couldn't scale the next bar in the progression which was 13'1 1/2".



Kelly Finishes 7th in Women's 1 Mile

With nationally ranked milers Sophie Connor and Calli Thackery running other races it was left to junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque, ABQ, NM) to try and earn some points in the event. Kendalls best mile had come way back in 2015 when she ran 5:05 but given her fine 9:40 3k at the Don Kirby Elite two weeks prior she seemed ready for a good race. In the prelims on Friday Kendall was trying to be one of the ten fastest to earn their way to the finals on Saturday. From the seeding the 10th fastest time was 5:00 and given Kendall hadn't run a mile indoor this season she was entered with a no time. In her prelim race she went out in 74 right off the lead pace, and kept that way through the 800 which she passed in 2:30. At the 1200 she was running fourth at 3:46, and continued to the finish line in that position clocking a new big PR of 4:52.68. That was the fourth fastest overall time once the two sections were done. On Saturday she lined up with some real experienced milers but hung in to stay with the group through a 72 first 400 and then a 2:31 halfway split. At 1200 she clocked 3:45 then finished off with a 73 second last 400 to hit the line in another new PR of 4:52.34, good for seventh place.



High Jump Action

Froshie Shannon Fritz (Phoenix, AZ) came into the competition with the 11th best seed mark, and from the rankings it appeared that maybe it would take 5' 6" to score. Shannon cleared 5' 1/4", then 5' 2 1/4", and 5' 4 1/4" on her first attempts, before exiting the competition at 5' 6". On the countback once the competition was completed due to her no misses until 5' 6" she earned seventh place overall.



Women's 4x400 Runs to 10th Fastest All-Time

The women's 4x400 relay just hadn't developed this indoor season like we would have liked it to. There were lots of reasons, but the usually solid Lobo relay group went into the conference championship ranked 7th, and thus placed in the slow section (the top 6 teams go in the fast section, while the other 5 go in the slow section). Obviously a team wants to be with the fastest teams in order to maximize their ability. But regardless, the Lobos were in the slow section, so all the ladies could do was run fast, and compete hard. The quartet of Kyra Mohns, Abby Smith (Westlake, CA), Larimar Rodriguez (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM), and Hannah Riker-Urrutia (Valley, ABQ, NM)had run 3:53.00 as their best, and based on actual individual splits should have been maximized around 3:52 or so. But that leaves out one important ingredient in relay running - chemistry!!! The four ladies were extremely excited to race, and they were willing to go to the wall for each other, and that transformed a mild manner group, into hard core racers!!! Gosh, was it fun to see. Kyra leading off had had one day rest after the Pentathlon on Thursday, so she was raring to go. She led off and fought hard at the front of the race, and came in at 57.3, one full second faster than she had run at the UNM Team Invt on January 28th!!! Off to a good showing. Abby, taking the baton got in trouble on the first 200, but going up the backstretch on her second lap really dug down, and remade contact with the lead group, and she clocked a PR of 57.6. Abby then handed off to Larimar, who had not had the season she wanted, but she made up for that by roaring around everyone and putting the team into contention for winning the section. Larimar hit her best time of the season, a 56.3. Hannah (pictured above taking the baton from Larimer) was anchoring the relay, and based on her excellent training over the last month should have been ready - and she was. Hannah ran neck and neck with the Nevada team anchor leg and it was exciting as they ran hard at each other, and down the homestretch Hannah made the Wolfpack runner go hard through the finish line. When it was over, the Lobo quartet was rewarded with a fine 3:48.95 clocking, way superior to what might have been predicted. That time stood up for sixth place.

But an athlete can only control what they can control, so Ally got busy. On her first attempt she fouled, and then collected herself and came up with a 43' 4 1/2" effort. Then on her third throw she extended that out to 43' 10 1/2". That was the longest

throw of the first section, so she had to wait for the top 10 ranked throwers to finish off their section. After all was done Ally was the ninth best and got to compete in the finals. She could not come up with a little more distance in the finals, and missed out on placing by just a few inches. Still, a good effort to make finals.

LOCAL TALENT HELPS LOBO TRACK & FIELD PROGRAM: The University of New Mexico Track & Field program has always been a good destination for not only Albuquerque high school talent, but New Mexican talent as well. omore finished runner-up in the Triple Jump, and also placed in the Long Jump. Monique would come back in 2001 and 2002 to take the Triple Jump championship.



In 2003 sophomore Bridgid Isworth (Melbourne, Australia) became the first women in MWC history to clear 13' when she jumped 13' 2 1/2" to not only win the MWC title, but establish a new conference record.

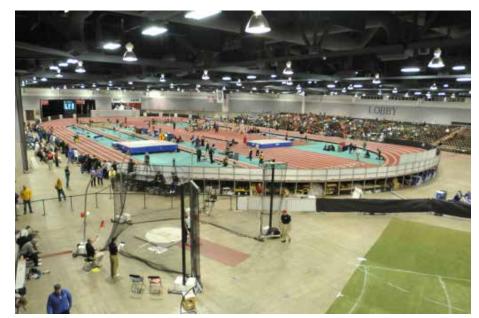

In 2003 Keren Sari-Bentzur (Beer-Sheva, Israel) was awared the MWC "High Point" award when she won the Pentathlon and Long Jump, and placed third in the Triple Jump.



In 2004 senior Mark Johnson (Fontana, Wisconsin) scored 5263 points as he took the Heptathlon crown and placed in the Pole Vault (16' 9").



After the city of Albuquerque purchased the indoor track facility in 2005, UNM was chosen to host the 2006 MWC Championship. It was an exciting time for the program as it brought conference competition back to Albuquerque for the first time in several decades.



In 2006 seniors Robert Caldwell (Socorro, NM) pictured above, and Derek Mackel (Sandia, ABQ, NM) put on a show all season long with their outstanding vaulting efforts. Both men ended up placing 2nd/3rd in the conference championship, but went on to qualify for the NCAA Championship. They rank #2 (Mackel) and #3 (Caldwell) all-time in Loboland at 17' 11" and 17' 7".



In 2009 and 2010 Lee Emanuel (Hastings, England) pictured to the right had began his dominance in middle distance running. Lee, who won the NCAA 1 Mile title in 2009 came back in 2010 even more dominant, winning both the 1 Mile and 800 at the MWC Championship. He went on to repeat as the 2010 NCAA 1 Mile champion. Lee set the MWC Championship record in the mile (4:05.85) which still stands in 2017. He was "Athlete of the Year" in both 2009 and 2010.







In 2011 Richard York (St. Clair, MO) pictured above took the Heptathlon title and also the "Athlete of the Year" honors. His Heptathlon score was the second best in MWC history to that point. 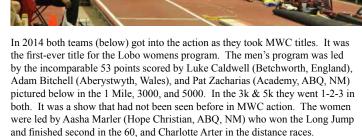


The 2013 men's team pictured above accomplished something that hadn't ever been done in Lobo indoor track history - win a conference title. The team accomplished the goal at Boise State, and it was a hard fought battle the entire way. Only a second place in 1990, and 2009 even got the Lobos close. And it had been since 1967 that a title of any kind had been won by a Lobo track team. It certainly was a long time in coming.





In 2012 Shirley Pitts (Las Vegas, NV) pictured to the left took the 400 title when she ran 53.89 on her home track. The women's team finished a strong runner-up to TCU. Pictured below is Kendall Spencer (San Mateo, CA) who won the Long jump title, which would be the first of three consecutive titles. Kendall would go on to win the NCAA Long Jump title several weeks after the conference meet was done.







The 2015 teams repeated as double conference champions, doing so at home, and the titles were led by some amazing performances by Lobo athletes. No one will ever forget Adam Bitchells' (pictured top right) come from behind victory in the 3000 meters as the Lobo crowd was going crazy. Adam, who had already won the 5000 and finished third in the mile was chosen as "MWC Athlete of the Year" in the conference. Also not able to forget would be Yannick Roggatz (Birkenbau, Germany) pictured above who hadn't High Jumped in three years volunteering to do it for team points. Heck, he hadn't even practiced the event. He electrified the crowd with his gutsy performance, and ended up scaling 6' 9 3/4" and taking fifth - just the kind of team man that is needed. Scoring 40 points between them Holly Van Grinsven (Brentwood, TN) and Sammy Silva (La Mesa, CA) pictured above to the left (Holly to the far left) gave the womens team a huge boost. Holly came out of nowhere to win the 400 meters, and then finished runner-up in the 60 Hurdles plus anchored the 4x400 Relay, while Sammy won both the 1 Mile and 800 meters. The men also got a great 1-2-3-5 finish in the mile run (pictured to the left) as Adam Bitchell (#1) grabbed third, Elmar Engholm (Stockholm, Sweden) (#3) won, Ross Matheson (Edinburgh, Scotland) (#5) finished second, and Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) (#7) took fifth place.

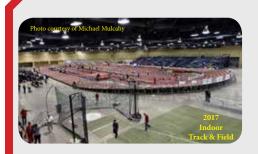


2016 found Allan Hamilton (Edinburgh, Scotland) pictured to the left being awarded the "Outstanding" Performer award for the conference as he won the Long Jump, then also placed in the Triple Jump and 60 meters. The picture to the right shows Calli Thackery (Yorkshire, England), and Sophie Connor (Hertfordshire, England) having a fun battle in the 1 Mile. They hit the line exactly at the same time and it took a large computer screen to sort it out, Sophie winning by an eyelash, 4:39.54 - 4:39.56

NCAA INDOOR TRACK & FIELD CHAMPIONSHIP

COMMENTARY: The NCAA Indoor Championship is one of the best meets I in the world each year, and is extremely challenging to qualify for. Several years ago the NCAA decided to lower the number that qualified in each individual event to 16, and only take 12 relay teams. So for every athlete that makes it to the championship it is a difficult and stressful process. There are over 300 Division I colleges that sponsor indoor track & field, and there is tremendous challenges to make that final 16. Lets take for instance the men's 400. There are over 1500 men who race the 400 meter distance in Division I. This year the top time in the country was a 44.94 and the 500th best performance was 49.35! So over 500 male athletes broke the 50 second barrier. And of all those men competing in the 400 meters only 16 make it to the NCAA finals. The point of this mental exercise is each of the Lobo athletes who qualified should hold their head high for an incredible accomplishment. And no matter what the final outcome is at the championship, it is an honor to be at the meet and wear the turquoise top and cherry bottoms. Lobo nation is very proud of what you did!!!



Kerr Wins NCAA Mile Title

For the third time in the last eight years a Lobo man took the NCAA mile title. In 2009 Lee Emanuel won the title on the same track as Josh was running on, while in 2010 Lee repeated winning the championship on the Arkansas track. Coming into the meet Josh had had a very solid indoor season, and was ranked #7 of the 16 athletes. Every man in the field had run under 3:59 just to get to the meet and Josh had a seasonal best of 3:58.04.

<u>PRELIM</u>: The 16 men were divided into two preliminary sections, with the top four from each prelim and the next two fastest athletes qualifying for the ten man final on Saturday. Josh was scheduled to run in the second prelim, which always allows the athletes to see how fast the first prelim ran, and then gauge their running tactics based on that result. In the first section it was won by Edward Cheserek from Oregon in 3:59.30 who just happens to be the most decorated NCAA athlete in history with 17 NCAA titles. Fourth place in the first prelim was 4:00.10 so that was the time to beat. Josh took off and settled in third place as the runners split 31 for the first 200,

and then continued on as the leader from Colorado hit 59.94 at the quarter. Josh maintained his third place position making sure he was at the front and ready to strike when he needed to. At 600 the Buffalo still led in 1:30 while Josh was at 1:31. The group hit 2:01 for the 800 and then 2:33 for the 1000. From the 800 to the 1000 the group tempo began to pick up as almost everyone split a 30 second lap and they were bunched together at 3:03. From the 1200 to the 1400 only the Buffalo could stay in front of Josh and then on the final lap Josh finally unleashed his strength and speed as he easily clocked a 28 second last lap which no one else could duplicate. Josh cruised to a 3:59.90 winning time, and prepared for the final.

FINALS: NCAA finals are rarely fast and tend to be tactical and slow through the first 800, then fast through the last 800. In Lee Emanuels first NCAA victory the 2016 Olympic 1500 meter champion Matt Centrowitz, then at Oregon led the field through a dawdling 2:06 first 800 before Lee got tired of that pace and blew the field away with a 1:54 final half and a 4:00 mile. Then in 2010 Lee led the pack through a 2:03 before employing exactly the same tactics and burning the track up over the last half to run 3:59.26 and win by over two seconds. In fact over the last eight years only twice has any miler took it out with a 2:00 or faster first half mile. Last year the leader came through in an unbelievablely slow 2:11! In the finals Josh was seeded into the outside alley and he gracefully glided around the track and when they got to the cut-in point, slid right into the top four, with a Virginia Tech Hokie and Oklahoma State Cowboy at the lead with the two Oregon Ducks right behind. Between the 400 (leader was in 64) and 600 Josh tried to make a small move on the outside but there was a lot of pushing and tripping, and Josh just backed off for the moment as everyone was still running 33 second laps. Cheserek had moved to the lead, running shoulder to shoulder with the Hokie at the front, trying to control the pace. The ten men were tightly bunched together and their stride pattern was affected by this closeness. And then Josh reminescent of what Lee did when coming down the homestretch toward the halfway point, pushed right through the group in lane one, and took the lead passing 800 in 2:11.

From the 800 to the 1000 the group seemed to come awake with Josh's move, and the tempo of the race quickened as everyone ran two seconds faster on that lap going to a 31 from the previous 33 second laps. And then just as quickly as Josh had sped up, Cheserek came from last place and blew by everyone taking the lead and forcing every other athlete to pick up the pace as he clicked off a 27.7 lap.

Josh, not giving any ground, slipped in right behind "King Ches" and as they went up the backstretch, the Cowboy moved by Josh into second. Around the turn and coming into the homestretch Josh threw in a hard, hard surge and blew by the field into the lead running that lap in 26.5. Josh started to pull away from everyone but Cheserek and they flew up the backstretch one more time. By the time they cruised through the turn and into the homestretch one more time Josh and Ches had separated themselves from the field and it was down to the froshie from New Mexico and the greatest NCAA distance runner in history. At the bell lap Ches tried to pull up on Josh's right shoulder and

get by, but Josh rebuffed him, and continued to lead. Could this actually happen? Up the backstretch for the final time Josh was in full, sprint mode, opening up his stride and powering away. Josh's lead was three meters, then five meters, then ten meters and as he came around the final bend he glanced over his left shoulder and could see no one there. Josh flew down the homestretch to a deafening roar of the crowd that had expected Cheserek to win another NCAA title. Josh cruised the final 200 meters in 26.6 and ran the final 400 meters in 53 seconds and when he crossed the finish line had a huge smile on his face!!! That folks is some serious "wheels" over the final two laps and shows an amazing power output. Josh's final four laps (800 meters) were 30.99, 27.41, 26.52, 26.68 which equals 1:51.60. As soon as Josh was done the lead announcer on ESPN interviewed him and Josh had to explain how he felt he could make it a good race. What an ending to his first NCAA indoor season.

Wright Runs to PR in 9th Place 5000 Finish

Junior Alice Wright came into the NCAA Championship ranked 14th with her regular season PR of 15:56.94 which she did at the MWC Championship. At the gun three of the top four seeds took off at a hard pace and by the 800 meter point built up a 1-2 second cushion on the rest of the field, and it continued through the 1600 meter point when they got there about three seconds up on the field. The rest of the women in the race were grouped in a larger pack and Alice was in this group, getting to the 1600 meter point in 4:59 running 37 second laps around the Texas A&M oval. She was in 13th place but only a few meters behind the leader of the group. Alice then switched to running consistent 38 second laps and by the 3200 meter point (approximately 2 miles) was at 10:06.04 and ready to go by people. Over the last 1800 meters of the race Alice did that moving up to 9th place at the finish with a new PR of 15:56.24. At the conclusion of the 2017 indoor season Alice now owns 6 of the 10 fastest 5000 meter performances in Lobo history as she has #2, #3, #5, #6, #8, and #10. With one more year to go Alice will certainly have a chance to rewrite the record books.

DISTANCE MEDLEY RELAY FINISHES 10TH

This year the NCAA adopted a new policy which greatly affected the national distance medley race (1200-400-800-1600). In the past, a head coach could only change two of the original four members of the qualifying team which provided some challenges when trying to figure out who would actually race at the nationals. Frequently the mile anchor leg would have qualified for the open mile race, and sometimes the 800 leg qualified for the open 800. Therefore, given the mile and 800 prelims is always before the Distance Medley Relay final on Friday coaches had to make some judgements. Do I run my mile and 800 athletes in the prelims and have them come back for the DMR, or do I substitute? This year however the NCAA decided to adopt a policy that the qualifying relay performance belongs to the school, and a head coach can run four different athletes at the NCAA if they so desire. So when looking at the 12 teams who were accepted into the meet it was hard to predict which teams would run the same four members who originally qualified, and who would take athletes off. In the case of

the Lobos Josh Kerr had anchored the original qualifying quartet but with the mile prelims before the DMR it was decided to wait until after that event was done, and if Josh made the mile final on Saturday he wouldn't run the DMR, but if he didn't make the mile finals, he would run. Well, with his dominating performance in the mile prelims it was decided to give him the rest and focus on the mile final. That meant the first three guys would remain the same and senior Graham Thomas would run the anchor leg. Senior Elmar Engholm led off the quartet with a 1200 meter leg, and as usual it was a shoving, bumping, and physical affair as there were 12 runners all trying to impose their will on the rest of the field. It was tightly bunched the entire way, and Elmar handed off after a 2:58 leg which was the sixth fastest. Second leg Mark Haywood then ran 49.23 for the 400 to hand off in ninth position. Froshie Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen then clocked a fine 1:50.48 for his 800 split which maintained the ninth place team position. Graham then finished off the relay with a 4:08.46 clocking, and an overall time of 9:46.87, good for tenth place. That performance also is the 10th fastest in Lobo history.



WOMENS 1 MILE

Senior Sophie Connor the most consistent miler in Lobo history with five of the ten fastest mile performances all time was in the second of two prelims with the top four from each prelim, and the next two fastest overall athletes advancing to the ten woman final. Sophie's section went out in 75 for the first 400, and SC was right off the leader from Arkansas shoulder. The pace quickened slightly, but the leader who remained the Arkansas senior came through in 2:27 which was dangerous as the first prelim had gotten to that juncture in 2:20. That meant for all practical purposes, the two fastest time qualifiers was going to come from prelim #1. Sophie stayed in good position as she was running second at the halfway point. Because the pace was so moderate every one of the eight athletes was bunched tightly together and at the 1200 meter point there was only one second from first to last, and putting eight athletes in that small of a time frame problematic. Sophie at 3:35.16 was only 35/100ths of a second off the leader. During the next lap the front group threw down a hard surge and on this day Sophie couldn't respond the way she normally has and she ran into difficulty. At the end she finished a non-qualifying 4:45.36



Hadnot Finishes Illustrious Career

Senior Jannell Hadnot like classmate Sophie Connor will finish her indoor career at UNM as the most dominant athlete in her specialty, the Triple Jump all-time. Jannell came into the championship ranked 15th of the 16 athletes in the field with her seasonal best of 43′ 6″. In the prelim round Jannell opened up with a 41′ 3″ distance, then extended it out to 42′ 0″ on her second round attempt. With only nine athletes qualifying to the final, for three additional attempts, Jannell was down to her last attempt to extend her best. She came down the runway and just fouled leaving her out of the last nine competing. Still Jannell has set an incredible standard for all future TJ'ers in the Lobo program. Of the ten longest leaps in school history Jannell has eight of them, and the top five longest.

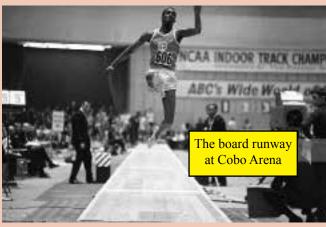

A Look Back At Lobo Indoor Track & Field NCAA Championship History

The year was 1967 and for the third year Cobo Arena in Detroit, Michigan hosted the NCAA Indoor Championship. Six Lobos qualified for the meet and with three scoring in individual events, and one relay team scoring, the team finished fifth overall. Miler Web Loudat finished fourth with a 4:06.8 clocking in a race that was won by the world-class Jim Ryan, who would go on to set a world record. George Scott would finish runner-up in the 2 Mile as he clocked 8:37.8 behind another world-class runner Gerry Lindgren. Clark Mitchell finished second by one tenth of a second in the 600 yards as he clocked 1:10.3. Then the Mile Relay team of Rene Matison, Clark Mitchell, Kenny Head, and Art Baxter finished fourth with a 3:18.5.

The year was 1976 and the NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championship was hosted at Cobo Arena in Detroit, Michigan for the 12th straight year. Cobo Arena hosted the very first NCAA indoor meet in 1965 and would continue to host through the 1981 year. New Mexico would send the largest men's team in history to the championship as nine Lobos qualified for the championship. Two individuals and one relay team were able to score in the top six (at that time only six places scored). Charles Dramiga would take the 600 yard run in 1:10.58, while Mike Solomon would grab fifth in the same event in 1:11.28. Then the 1 mile Relay team of Bob Nance, Charles Dramiga, Mel Powers, and Mike Solomon would take sixth place with a 3:19.39 clocking. Overall the Lobos finished tenth at the championship meet.

Saturday, April 1, 2017 - DON KIRBY TAILWIND

On April Fools Day the rain, sleet, cold wind, and dreary conditions was NOT a joke! The 2017 outdoor season began with the Don Kirby Tailwind Invitational, a meet that is typically blessed with nice sunshine, and great conditions. But Mother Nature decided to challenge athletes from Adams State, Eastern New Mexico, Fort Lewis, Grand Canyon, New Mexico Highlands, New Mexico State, UTEP, West Texas A&M, and Western State who took part in the meet. Several events had to *be cancelled due to the wet conditions (see picture to the left)* and safety concerns with those events. While Lobo athletes are usually not faced with wet cold conditions it was nice to see those athletes who competed not worry about whether the wind was in their face, or the track was slippery, or if the sand was hard and clumped and didn't feel good when landing. To be successful in the sport one has to prepare and accept that perfect conditions are not always presented to us, but that doesn't mean good things can't happen.

PALM TAKES 1500 IN COLLEGIATE PR

A sopping wet Alex Palm (Norrköping, Sweden) pictured to the right leading the race spent most of last year rehabbing an injury, but was able to get on the track at the 2016 Don Kirby Tailwind as a first collegiate meet. In last years 1500 he clocked 4:04.15. This year he took the lead and ran from the front and held off a late charge to cross the finish line first in 4:01.35. His all time PR came back on June 13, 2014 when he clocked 3:52.99 in Göteberg, Sweden. Alex most likely is focusing more on the 5000 and maybe even the 10,000 later in the season, but was nice to get in a good hard 1500 despite the conditions.





Battikha Takes Conference Lead

Froshie Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) took over the Mountain West Conference lead in the Long Jump despite the poor conditions. Tanner, pictured to the left extends as hard as he could to maximize the jump. The picture also shows the hard, drenched, damp sand the jumpers were hitting, which was not enjoyable. Tanner opened up with a 23' 7 1/2" distance which was the longest in the conference this season. He followed up with a 23' 4", 23' 3" before hitting his longest of the day, a 23' 10 1/4" distance. He finished off with a 23' 6" and 23' 4" on his remaining two attempts. To qualify for the NCAA West Regional (top 48 in each event) last year took 23' 10 3/4" so Tanner is right on target to get a chance to jump in Austin, Texas in late May.

4x100 Races to 1st Place

Every spring across the country many things happen - flowers pop up out of the ground, birds start chirping early in the morning, grass turns lush green, allergies kick up, and relay coaches try to find four sprinters and mold them into one cohesive unit. Last year the Lobo 4x100 Relay team set a new school record of 40.20, but three members of that team graduated, so an entire new quartet would have to be educated in the mechanics of the sprint relay. Sprint coach Jade Ellis took junior Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM), froshie Alejandro Goldston (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM), soph. Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, Wyoming), and junior Isaac Gonzales (Taos, NM) and began the process of getting four individuals to act as one interdependent group. Only Carlos had run on last years relay so there would be a lot of learning going on. The pouring rain did

not make the prospect of running the 4x100 for the first time any easier, as newbies to the sprint relay haven't had time to learn the nuances of how each other react. Experienced relay units know each other, and can make adjustments during the relay, but new teams haven't learned the subtle signals yet. But the meet must go on, so the guys got in their lanes for the first time this year. The guys used very conservative "go" marks (a tape mark on the track where when the incoming running hits, the outgoing runner takes off) given the hard rain. Mark got off to a good start, and really picked up steam about 50 meters into his segment but had to slow down hard going into the zone, almost running Alejandro over. But Alejandro got the baton and sped down the backstretch. Carlos took off a little too hard, and had to slow down before he got to the end of the zone to get the baton, but he did get it. The picture to the right shows Carlos slowing down as he was running up on Isaac's back, but they passed it well despite that. Isaac finished off the relay with a 42.05 clocking, which



given everything wasn't too bad. Once the lads get some more hard practice during the week, and find a dry meet, they should be able to run significantly faster and move up the MWC rankings.



RODRIGUEZ & RIKER-URRUTIA GO 1-2 IN ONE LAPPER

Sophomore Larimar Rodriguez (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) is shown coming down the homestretch in the 400 meters. LR was the top overall finisher taking control of the race from the beginning. Larimar just missed her outdoor PR from last year (57.46) as she clocked in at 57.57 while junior Hannah Riker-Urrutia (Valley, ABQ, NM) was right behind in 58.38.



Mudada & Dorsey Take 1st & 2nd in 400 Hurdles

Senior Mustafa Mudada (Highland, ABQ, NM) shown above at the seventh hurdle took top honors with his 53.81 clocking. One year ago MM opened up with a 53.22 but that was two weeks later in the season, and in the warm, sunny confines of Azusa, California so the 53.81 is solid under the circumstances. Right now, 53.81 is ranked #5 in the MWC. Finishing second was classmate Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) who finished in 53.99. Last year in his first serious 400H he clocked 54.30 over at Arizona State. Cheyne is ranked #6 in the MWC.



Two years ago as a first year Lobo sprinter now junior Erynn Caldwell (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM) shown above averaged around 12.10 for the 100 meters and 25.35 for the 200 meters for the entire season. It was a nice opening year. Last year as a sophomore things didn't work as smoothly and Erynn opened up her outdoor campaign at the Don Kirby meet with a 12.89 in the 100 meters and then several weeks later hit 26.51 at UTEP for her seasonal bests. Not pleased with those results Erynn returned this year to the basics of running faster, but running relaxed, and enjoying the pleasure of being able to run fast. Some times all athletes forget the simple joy of running and racing, and try to "pound a square peg into a round hole" which never works. In the 100 meters Erynn ran to a 12.51 which given the weather conditions was good, and then came back in the 200 meters to clock 25.98 which was a solid improvement.

Haywood Takes 400 Meters

Junior Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM) shown below in all red was the fastest man on the day as he finished the race with a 48.46. Mark got out conservatively for the first 200 meters, but then turned up the intensity around the final turn. In 2015 Mark opened up with a 48.13, then last year he clocked 48.22 for his first meet, so the time on this tough day was solid. Finishing third was Isaac Gonzales (black tights) who clocked in at 49.17. Given his overall outdoor PR is 49.03 from a meet in California late in April this is a good sign of things to come.

Uldbjerg Hansen & Sleeter: Almost Inseparable!!

As was discussed during the indoor season having a great teammate and training partner is critical to progressions, and froshies Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark) pictured above (#6) and Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) (#3) are taking that to new limits. Both young athletes are highly competitive and love to win, but respectful that if the other man finishes first, you shake his hand, and move on. Good chemistry between teammates always leads to great results for everyone, and intelligent athletes know this and take advantage of it! Kristian and Gavin are incredibly similar in the results they have gotten so far this indoor and outdoor season. In fact, the lads have run five total meets and eight races together (600, 400, 800, 400, 800, 800, 800, 400) spanning a total distance of 5000 meters. Each of the guys has run faster than the other in four races (in other words they are tied). The total time for all of Kristians races is 678.44 seconds or putting it into minutes 10:78.44 while Gavins total is 678.09 seconds (10:78.09).....seriously, they have run all that and only 35/100ths of a second separates all their races. This has to be some type of record, but where would one find that???? Ohhhh, yes, in the Don Kirby Tailwind meet they both ran only the 400 as they know to race over the 800 distance well in the MWC, and the NCAA West you have to be able to run a fast 400. And what were the results today...... Kristian 50.53 and Gavin 50.58.....only separated by a blink of the eye. This is sort of fun to watch.

Haynes Hits Big PR in 3000

A year ago senior Ruth Haynes (Surrey, England) clocked 11:12.21 for the 7 1/2 laps around the Great Friends of New Mexico track facility. This year with extended good training she came back to finish second in 10:33.65. The way the race developed Ruth was caught out all by herself for much of the race, so this massive improvement is even more impressive as she couldn't latch on to a group and get pulled through the challenging times. The picture on the next page is Ruth with about one lap to go in the

race.





Former Belen, NM high school teammates and now Lobo teammates Jared Garcia (#3) and Tyler Valdez (#2) ran to a 1-2 collegiate finish in the 3000 meters. #1 Sal Perdomo, a post-collegiate athlete won the race, but Jared at 8:41.91 and Tyler at 8:45.88 were the top collegians.

focused on NCAA competition. After that may be two numbers like (2,8). This stands for how the athlete ranks on the All Time Top Ten Outdoor Track & Field PERFORMER and PERFORMANCE list. The number on the LEFT indicates how that athlete is ranked as far as individual PERFORMERS are concerned. The #2 would tell us that performer (athlete) is the second-best in New Mexico outdoor track & field history in that event. The number on the RIGHT indicates how that performance is ranked in relation to all the top performances in New Mexico history in that event. The #8 would tell us that performance is the 8th best in New Mexico history in that event. It is possible, and even probable that one athlete could have many performances which rank in the top ten during their four year career. An x on the LEFT (x,8) tells us that they have achieved a better performance before, while on x on the RIGHT (8,x) tells us it doesn't make the performance list. PR indicates a PERSONAL RECORD (their best ever in that event). An @ indicates the performance has been altitude adjusted based on the NCAA protocol.

Hammer Throwers Get Double PR's

Juniors Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) pictured to the top left, and Ally Mady (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) both ended their competitions with new PR's. Amaris came into the competition with a PR of 173' 7" set way back on April 30, 2016 in El Paso, Texas but had made major progressions during her training sessions. On her first attempt in the competition she threw the ball and chain out to a 176' 4" PR. On her second attempt she hit 175' 7", followed that with two sector fouls, before hitting a 174' 4" in the fifth round. On her very last throw she extended her PR out to 178' 7". For her four legal throws she averaged 176' 2" and any time an athlete can average higher than their previous PR it is a sign of good things coming. Amaris moves to the #2 all-time performer at UNM with the ninth best performance in Lobo history. She currently ranks #6 in the MWC and #55 in the NCAA West Regional (the top 48 advance to NCAA First-Round Qualifying). Ally came into the competition with her PR of 148' 8" which she set March 23rd down at UTEP. In her first-round attempt she hit 137' 10" then extended it out to 147' 2" before ending her competition with a nice PR of 149' 4". For Ally that moves her up to #6 all-time at UNM and within about 15' from the top eight in the MWC.

Casey & Danielsson Win 1500 Meter Sections

At the 2016 Rio Olympic Games American Matt Centrowitz won the gold medal in the 1500 meters becoming the first American to ever win that event. It was a slow tactical race, and Matt's winning time of 3:50.00 was the slowest winning time since 1932! What is the point here? Athletes need to learn to win races and not focus on times in order to become successful. Yes, fast times are nice and have their place in the equation, but winning trumps all other things. Very few will ever remember Matt's winning performance being slow, but everyone will remember he was the gold medalist! In the open 1500 meter sections junior **Kieran Casey (Indianapolis, IN)** and froshie **Emil Danielsson (Dala-Järna, Sweden)** made sure they dominated their races to win. Kieran, racing in section two was content to let a Kansas Jayhawk, and Minnesota Golden Gopher take the pace out through the first 300 as Kieran reached that point in 54.7, just ticks off the two leaders. The leaders then ran the next 400 in 75 seconds, and Kieran remained off the pace but always in contact with the leaders. Another Golden Gopher joined the party as did an Aggie from Texas A&M and there was a group of five battling at the front. The next 400 went much quicker as the pace dropped to 73 seconds and with one lap to go Kieran was at 3:23.7 with one Gopher at 3:23.0 and her teammate at 3:23.2. Over the last 400 meters of the race no one in the field could match Kieran's speed at 69 seconds and she ended up winning the race by over two seconds in

4:33.01. In the men's 1500 meters
Emil started off near the back of the pack as his first 300 meters was covered in 47.9 but he followed up with a 61.8 lap to pull up to fourth place.
Emil ran another 61 second lap and now it was down to he and a Jayhawk from Kansas at the front. Emil powered to a 60.3 final lap and no one else could respond as his winning time of 3:52.08 was over two seconds ahead of second place.

400 Hurdlers Have a Fun Battle With Each Other

Seniors Mustafa Mudada (Highland, ABQ, NM) and Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) have been having fun battling each other in the hurdles since their high school days. In 2012 when Cheyne was a senior and Mustafa a junior they had an exciting state meet when Cheyne just got by Mustafa in the 300 Hurdle Prelim, but Mustafa came back to just nudge out Cheyne for the state championship 38.55 to 38.70. And for the past four years they work out with each other



every day going over thousands of hurdles in the process. After racing in rain the previous week they were excited to have a nice warm day to do their specialty. Cheyne, running out of lane three and Mustafa in lane seven wanted to get their respective times down as they try to move up the MWC rankings. Mustafa, who likes to get out hard did so and he came off hurdle one near the lead, while Cheyne, who has been trying to get out harder did so. Over hurdles two and three they were touching down almost together and up the backstretch they kept getting up and over the hurdles almost the same time. Clearly, they were running better than they had the week prior. It wasn't until hurdle seven that Cheyne got ahead just slightly, and over hurdle eight he hit it in stride while Mustafa didn't giving him just a slight edge. Cheyne held that slight margin over hurdles nine and ten. But once they both were over the final hurdle and they had a straight 40 meters to the finish line it was guts time, and Mustafa gave one final push and they hit the finish line in unison as the picture above shows. It took the finish camera operator a second to separate the two guys and Mustafa was given the nod, 53.33 to 53.34. Now that was fun For Cheyne that is a new PR and the guys are currently ranked #4 and #5 in the MWC and #55 and #56 in the West regional rankings.

Matthews-Gordon Moves to #5 in MWC

Sophomore Malik Matthews-Gordon (Sandia, ABQ, NM) in his first Lobo competition tossed the Javelin 195' 2" to move up in the MWC rankings to #5. The former two-time New Mexico high school state champion was fortunate to have the #10 ranked NCAA competitor from Texas Tech to compete against as going against top ranked opponents brings out the best. Malik opened up with a 185' 4" throw, and followed with a 185' 5" in the second round. He hit 183' 4" in the third round of competition then busted out a 190' 4" effort in the fourth round. It is always positive for throwers to be able to improve throughout the competition, and be able to come up with their best effort on the final throw.

The two horizontal jumping events (Long Jump & Triple Jump) produced solid results for the Lobos. In the Long Jump froshies **Tanner Battikha** (San Diego, CA) and Akeisha Ayanniyi (Santa Fe, NM) got off solid jumps. Tanner, pictured above coming down the runway finished sixth overall collegiately as he leaped 23' 41/2" on his third round attempt. In his section of the jump he had Olympic gold medalist Jeff Henderson competing as well. Currently Tanner is ranked #2 in the Mountain West Conference Long Jump. Akeisha, who is ranked #7 in the MWC got off

Junior Kyra Mohns (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) pictured to the left in lane two ran the 300 Hurdles in high school and did it pretty well finishing as state runner-up one year, and then winning the state title another year. But since she came to UNM she had only done the sprint hurdles (100 Hurdles) and the seven event Heptathlon where she had placed at conference both of her first two years. This year trying to add another training and competition perspective to her repertoire she decided to race over the 400 Hurdle distance. In her first race of the year she got out conservatively over the first several hurdles, trying to remember the stride pattern necessary to keep the momentum moving forward. But as the race developed she seemed much more comfortable, and once she got to the ninth hurdle exploded, and started racing by the athletes in her section. At the finish Kyra clocked a solid 62.90 which places her 10th in the MWC rankings.

Kerr.....#1 in the World in 1500 Meters!!!!

Not many times in an athletes career can they say to family and friends that they are ranked #1 in the entire world of 7.5 billion people but sophomore **Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland)** can do that right now. After Josh won the NCAA Indoor mile championship at Texas A&M in March defeating pre-meet favorite Edward Cheserek from Oregon he went back into Coach

Franklin's consistent and patterned training program in order to rebuild his foundational base for what hopefully will be a long period of competing in June, July, and August. The Bryan Clay Invitational was a chance for Josh to simply get back out on the track for the first time in a month, and see where his training was at. Oh, and Cheserek was scheduled to compete so the race was being hyped as a chance for the Oregon Duck to get revenge on Josh. On the day of the race the Duck pulled out of the competition, so Josh was left to just go out and race and see what happened. Anyone who has ever watched the Tour de France bike race has listened to the announcers speak about different riders and their "wattage" or power output. In basic terms this is the ability to put out power when needed, and the top riders are able to harness, and then utilize a higher wattage than others. One of the best bike "sprinters" in the world over the years has been Mark Cavendish and he is able to output a higher maximum wattage at the end of a race than others, thus he is always able to outsprint others to the finish line. In the NCAA Indoor race, Josh showed that he has the capability of harnessing an incredible level of wattage (power) over the final stages of a race as he covered the final 800 of the mile in an amazing 1:51. The Bryan Clay 1500 had several world-class professional runners from Nike's Bowerman Track Club, along with other top collegiate runners so it had all the makings of a great race. Several pacesetters were enlisted to run at the front of the race to make sure the tempo of the race was fast. Right from the gun everyone could tell it was going to be a fast race as the entire field of 14 athletes took off up the backstretch with gusto. Sometimes pacesetters get too excited and instead of the 58 second split at 400 meters that was requested, the split read a super fast 55 seconds. Josh was content to lay back and run in fifth place so his split was more reasonable and nearer to 58. By the time the field got to the 800 meter point (in about 1:56) they had collapsed and gotten much more in contact with each other and Josh was near the front, but not at the front, and looking relaxed and comfortable. Coming off the turn and into the homestretch for the bell lap, Josh made a concerted effort to get to the front, and by the bell he had taken the lead at about 2:41. Rounding the turn and passing the 1200 meter point Josh was only a few meters ahead, but as he had done at the NCAA Indoor meet, he suddenly and gracefully increased his tempo, and boom.....he was five, then ten meters ahead of the pack. Rounding the final turn and



getting to the homestretch Josh was in full flight, and leaving the entire field behind him. He was up tall and pushing hard, gritting his teeth and driving hard to the finish line showing a huge power output. When he got to the line he leaned hard and the entire crowd jumped up and down for they all knew it was a spectacular time. What they didn't know until the announcer boomed out was that Josh has just run 3:35.99 which was the 6th fastest time in NCAA collegiate history. But no one at the time seemed to realize that Josh's performance had eclipsed Brazilian Andre' Thiago's 3:37.39 done on March 12th in Sao Bernadrdo do Campo Arena which had been the world leader. Josh's performance also established a new University of New Mexico record taking down former NCAA Champion Lee Emanuel's 3:37.25 done on May 2, 2009 at Stanford University. Josh, also set a new under-20 Scottish national record, taking down the old standard which had lasted since October 17, 1979 when Graham Williamson ran 3:36.6 in Oslo, Norway. Quite an evening for the affable Scot and this performance shows the training program is right on schedule, and providing Josh with both the training base, and ability to run fast when needed. Wow, what an evening in Azusa, California.

Trigg & Hadnot Move Into Top in Country

Seniors Sam Trigg (Plymouth, England) and Jannell Hadnot (Oakland, CA) started to make their presence known nationally in their specialty, the Triple Jump. Sam, who last year finished the NCAA regular season ranked #39 nationally, and Jannell, who ended at #22 both were the top collegians in the Bryan Clay Invitational section of the hop, step, and jump. Sam had professional athlete Christian Taylor, the reigning Olympic and World champion to contend with, while Jannell had pro athlete Shara Proctor an Anguillan born jumper who competes for Great Britian. She is the national record holder of both countries and has earned a world championship silver med-



So it is safe to say that both Lobo athletes had a full cup of competition on their hands.....but great competition brings out the best in top level athletes. Jannell opened up at 42' 8 1/4" then extended to 42' 10 1/4" on her second leap, then matched that on her third attempt. The 42' 10 1/4" distance would be her best on the day which was third overall, but the top collegiate mark. Sam leaped 51' 6 1/2" on his first attempt, followed up with three consecutive close fouls, before ending the competition with a 51' 9 1/4". Like Jannell, Sam finished third overall but was four inches better than the nearest collegian. Jannell is ranked #14 nationally, while Sam is ranked #22 nationally.

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move forward into the top 5-6 spots in the race, while Sophie was still trying to move forward. There were still 20 athletes running together at the front. Nearing 11:00 Sophie made a huge move flying by everyone in the race and fracturing the lead pack, which very quickly fell to about 10 runners. As the runners crossed the finish line Sophie threw in another hard surge and suddenly she was away by about 10 meters, with Kendall moving hard into third place. The next lap around Sophie had built up a huge lead on second place which just so happened to be Kendall, who had a nice cushion on third place. They continued to race away from the rest of the pack and with one lap to go Sophie was probably about 40 meters ahead, but Kendall was not giving in. With about 200 meters to go in the race Kendall made a huge surge and raced hard toward Sophie. Coming down the homestretch to the finish line it appeared that Kendall might just get up to her teammate, but at the finish line Sophie crossed in 16:34.26 while Kendall came in second in 16:36.20. Both fine efforts. In section one of the women's 5000 All American Alice Wright (Worcester, England) and sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) were in with the other 24 athletes. Very quickly the race split as Alice loves a hard driving pace and by 5:00 there were six athletes in the front part, a string of another five runners, and then huge gaps back to other smaller groups. Alice followed the pacesetter for 6:00 and then she took over the lead with a Michigan Wolverine and Razorback from Arkansas on her back. By 8:00 that trio was joined by a post-collegiate athlete. Alice pushed hard and the foursome had about 30 meters on the next duo, who then had about 50 meters on the next pack of four. At the 10:00 mark the Wolverine took over lead duties with the Razorback second and Alice third. All three of them hammered away the rest of the time and Alice re-took the lead again at 14:00 and tried to turn up the intensity one more time. Alice ended up crossing the finish line in third at 15:53.28, the ninth fastest performance in Lobo history, and just slightly off her all time PR of 15:45.87. Natasha would cross the finish line in 16:28.34, just missing her PR from last year.

Mustafa got out very hard over the first five hurdles and as the athletes rounded the final turn he could see all the people he needed to beat. He came off the hurdle in good shape, but then had to change stride for the final hurdle which caused a momentary hesitation and the guys around him got a slight break. Mustafa's all time best is 52.21 and he is fast approaching surpassing that performance.

One of the best bike "sprinters" in the world over the years has been Mark Cavendish and he is able to output a higher maximum wattage at the end of a race than others, thus he is always able to outsprint others to the finish line. In the NCAA Indoor race, Josh showed that he has the capability of harnessing an incredible level of wattage (power) over the final stages of a race as he covered the final 800 of the mile in an amazing 1:51. The Bryan Clay 1500 had several world-class professional runners from Nike's Bowerman Track Club, along with other top collegiate runners so it had all the makings of a great race. Several pacesetters were enlisted to run at the front of the race to make sure the tempo of the race was fast. Right from the gun everyone could tell it was going to be a fast race as the entire field of 14 athletes took off up the backstretch with gusto. Sometimes pacesetters get too excited and instead of the 58 second split at 400 meters that was requested, the split read a super fast 55 seconds. Josh was content to lay back and run in fifth place so his split was more reasonable and nearer to 58. By the time the field got to the 800 meter point (in about 1:56) they had collapsed and gotten much more in contact with each other and Josh was near the front, but not at the front, and looking relaxed and comfortable. Coming off the turn and into the homestretch for the bell lap, Josh made a concerted effort to get to the front, and by the bell he had taken the lead at about 2:41. Rounding the turn and passing the 1200 meter point Josh was only a few meters ahead, but as he had done at the NCAA Indoor meet, he suddenly



and gracefully increased his tempo, and boom......he was five, then ten meters ahead of the pack. Rounding the final turn and getting to the homestretch Josh was in full flight, and leaving the entire field behind him. He was up tall and pushing hard, gritting his teeth and driving hard to the finish line showing a huge power output. When he got to the line he leaned hard and the entire crowd jumped up and down for they all knew it was a spectacular time. What they didn't know until the announcer boomed out was that Josh has just run 3:35.99 which was the 6th fastest time in NCAA collegiate history. But no one at the time seemed to realize that Josh's performance had eclipsed Brazilian Andre' Thiago's 3:37.39 done on March 12th in Sao Bernadrdo do Campo Arena which had been the world leader. Josh's performance also established a new University of New Mexico record taking down former NCAA Champion Lee Emanuel's 3:37.25 done on May 2, 2009 at Stanford University. Josh, also set a new under-20 Scottish national record, taking down the old standard which had lasted since October 17, 1979 when Graham Williamson ran 3:36.6 in Oslo, Norway. Quite an evening for the affable Scot and this performance shows the training program is right on schedule, and providing Josh with both the training base, and ability to run fast when needed. Wow, what an evening in Azusa, California.

Trigg & Hadnot Move Into Top in Country

Seniors Sam Trigg (Plymouth, England) and Jannell Hadnot (Oakland, CA) started to make their presence known nationally in their specialty, the Triple Jump. Sam, who last year finished the NCAA regular season ranked #39 nationally, and Jannell, who ended at #22 both were the top collegians in the Bryan Clay Invitational section of the hop, step, and jump. Sam had professional athlete Christian Taylor, the reigning Olympic and World champion to contend with, while Jannell had pro athlete Shara Proctor an Anguillan born jumper who competes for Great Britian. She is the national record holder of both countries and has earned a world championship silver med-



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In section two of the men's 5000 junior Alex Palm (Norrkoping, Sweden) and froshie Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jarna, Sweden) were making their Lobo debut in the 12 1/2 lap funfest. The 29 men who started the race in section two stuck together like glue, and there was a lot of bumping and contact as they guys who were stuck in lane two, tried hard to get inside to the curb. Both Alex and Emil were content to stay towards the back of the pack through the first 5-6 minutes before making a concerted effort to move up. Alex was near the top eight, but running in lane two, while Emil was boxed in and couldn't do much. By the 9:00 point of the race, it had broken up slightly and Alex was able to run more cleanly and move up to second, while Emil had slid forward and attached himself to the back of the lead pack of about 12 runners. At around 11:00 into the fourteen minute race, Alex was running smoothly off the shoulder of the leader while Emil, who had been losing contact with the lead pack made a hard, hard move forward to reattach himself to the lead group. That was a very good move on his part. With two laps to go the pace quickened an the lead pack had shrunk to nine runners. Alex, was still running in second or third place, and Emil was working hard as the previous surge had made life challening for him. Going into the final lap one runner took off, and Alex covered his move and fought hard to stay near him. Going up the backstretch of the final lap Alex was gritting his teeth and there were three men all trying hard to get to the finish line. All three crossed in 14:11, with Alex given third in 14:11.88, a very good time for him. Emil, staying the course and fighting hard crossed in 14:16.79, also a fine performance. In section two of the women's 5000 both Lobos were also making their 5000 entry. Junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque, ABQ, NM) and froshie Sophie Eckel (Adelaide, Austrialia). Just like the previous men's race there were 25 athletes and the early going was like bumper cars with everyone trying to get to the same running lane. Both Kendall and Sophie were content to stay near the back and attempt to stay out of trouble. It wasn't until about 7:00 into the 16:00 race that some athletes fell off and the four Michigan Wolverines leading picked up the tempo. By 9:00 into the race Kendall had made a nice

move forward into the top 5-6 spots in the race, while Sophie was still trying to move forward. There were still 20 athletes running together at the front. Nearing 11:00 Sophie made a huge move flying by everyone in the race and fracturing the lead pack, which very quickly fell to about 10 runners. As the runners crossed the finish line Sophie threw in another hard surge and suddenly she was away by about 10 meters, with Kendall moving hard into third place. The next lap around Sophie had built up a huge lead on second place which just so happened to be Kendall, who had a nice cushion on third place. They continued to race away from the rest of the pack and with one lap to go Sophie was probably about 40 meters ahead, but Kendall was not giving in. With about 200 meters to go in the race Kendall made a huge surge and raced hard toward Sophie. Coming down the homestretch to the finish line it appeared that Kendall might just get up to her teammate, but at the finish line Sophie crossed in 16:34.26 while Kendall came in second in 16:36.20. Both fine efforts. In section one of the women's 5000 All American Alice Wright (Worcester, England) and sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) were in with the other 24 athletes. Very quickly the race split as Alice loves a hard driving pace and by 5:00 there were six athletes in the front part, a string of another five runners, and then huge gaps back to other smaller groups. Alice followed the pacesetter for 6:00 and then she took over the lead with a Michigan Wolverine and Razorback from Arkansas on her back. By 8:00 that trio was joined by a post-collegiate athlete. Alice pushed hard and the foursome had about 30 meters on the next duo, who then had about 50 meters on the next pack of four. At the 10:00 mark the Wolverine took over lead duties with the Razorback second and Alice third. All three of them hammered away the rest of the time and Alice re-took the lead again at 14:00 and tried to turn up the intensity one more time. Alice ended up crossing the finish line in third at 15:53.28, the ninth fastest performance in Lobo history, and just slightly off her all time PR of 15:45.87. Natasha would cross the finish line in 16:28.34, just missing her PR from last year.

Battikha Sails Over 24' in Long Jump

Froshie Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) came into the Bryan Clay Invitational ranked #2 in the MWC with a seasonal-best of 23' 10 1/4". Competing in the top seeded flight of the Long Jump with twelve other athletes TB sailed 23' 1 3/4" on his first attempt, and then came back with a 22' 10" in the second round. Getting accustomed to the runway Tanner came down the runway and as the picture to the left shows extended every bit he could to come down in the sand at 24' 1 3/4". That would end up finishing 3rd out of the 63 jumpers entered in the meet. Currently Tanner is tied for second in the conference and the 24' 1 3/4" distance is right around what has qualified for the NCAA First-Round competition in the last several years.



Mudada Lowers Seasonal Best in 400 Hurdles

Senior Mustafa Mudada (Highland, ABQ, NM) came into the meet ranked #4 in the MWC but by virture of his seasonal best 52.68 moved up one slot. Mustafa got out very hard over the first five hurdles and as the athletes rounded the final turn he could see all the people he needed to beat. The picture to the left shows the athletes approaching the ninth hurdle. He came off the hurdle in good shape, but then had to change stride for the final hurdle which caused a momentary hesitation and the guys around him got a slight break. Mustafa's all time best is 52.21 and he is fast approaching surpassing that performance.

Sleeter Moves Up to 5th in MWC in 800

Froshie Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) pictured to the right ran a nice opening 800 meters as he clocked 1:51.61, which currently has him as the top rookie in the conference. He went out controlled and made a nice move up the backstretch and stayed in contact the entire race. Classmate Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark) also ran a solid opening season 800 as he clocked 1:52.24. That marks has him ranked #8 in the conference.





Double PR's in 800 Sophomore Larimar Rodriguez (Rio Rancho, NM) and senior Hannah Riker-Urrutia (Valley, ABQ, NM) both came into the Bryan Clay meet with PR's in the 2:16 range. Using a great competitive situation they both ran to excellent improvements. The picture to the left shows Larimar slightly ahead of Hannah as they approach the finish line. Larimar got there first in a nice PR of 2:14.72, while Hannah was just a few ticks behind in 2:14.99. For their first 800 of the season it was a good start to what hopefully will lead to movement up the MWC rankings. Next they race at Stanford.



Mady Throws Big Outdoor PR

Junior Ally Mady (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) came into the Bryan Clay meet with an outdoor PR of 42' 11 1/2" from 2016. On her first throw she hurled it out to 44' 6 1/4", then followed with a 43' 7" throw. On her final throw of the prelims she extended her PR out to 44' 8 3/4", which was good enough to make the finals. In the finals she fouled twice before ending her day with a 44' 7 1/2" effort. That is a great series when an athlete can have four throws beyond a previous PR. Ally moves up to #7 all-time at New Mexico.

WHAT DO ALL THE SYMBOLS MEAN????? In parentheses after a performance will be a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. This indicates the COLLEGIATE place in the meet that athlete finished. All unattached or professional athletes are removed since we are most

focused on NCAA competition. After that may be two numbers like (2,8). This stands for how the athlete ranks on the All Time Top Ten Outdoor Track & Field PERFORMER and PERFORMANCE list. The number on the LEFT indicates how that athlete is ranked as far as individual PERFORMERS are concerned. The #2 would tell us that performer (athlete) is the second-best in New Mexico outdoor track & field history in that event. The number on the RIGHT indicates how that performance is ranked in relation to all the top performances in New Mexico history in that event. The #8 would tell us that performance is the 8th best in New Mexico history in that event. It is possible, and even probable that one athlete could have many performances which rank in the top ten during their four year career. An x on the LEFT (x,8) tells us that they have achieved a better performance before, while on x on the RIGHT (8,x) tells us it doesn't make the performance list. PR indicates a PERSONAL RECORD (their best ever in that event). An @ indicates the performance has been altitude adjusted based on the NCAA protocol.

ECKEL & KELLY PUT UP BIG MARKS IN 5000

Froshie Sophie Eckel (Adelaide, Austrialia) and junior Kendall Kelly (Bosque, ABO, NM) had run nice 5000 meter efforts at the Bryan Clay Invitational one week earlier when they produced 16:34.26 and 16:36.20 marks. While very solid marks, they were well short of being in consideration for an NCAA First-Round Qualifying spot. So Coach Franklin made the decision to have the duo run again at the Stanford Cardinal Classic. There were two sections of the 5000 due to large numbers and the Lobos were placed in different sections of the race with Kendall first up. While the 48th performance each year changes somewhat, it was predicted that to have a chance of making the NCAA First-Round competition a performance of around 16:25 would be needed. Kendall started out well, but quickly her section fell apart, and there wasn't a big group helping each other. She was imbedded into a much smaller group that did well at first, but then the pace lagged, and Kendall was in danger of letting the race slow down too much. She recovered well and finished hard over the last several laps and crossed the finish line in an excellent 16:26.36 an nice big 10 second PR. After all the weekend meets were completed the national list had Kendall ranked 48th in the West. In the other section of the race Sophie made the decision to stay with the lead group as they hammered away with a hard, driving pace. There were about eight athletes who were in the larger lead pack

and they were all intent on racing fast. Lap after lap Sophie stayed attached to the back and she went through two miles in great shape. Some time after two miles the pace was a little much, and Sophie detached from the lead group by about ten meters running all by herself which is incredibly hard to do. But she continued to race well. Knowing that she was running well, Sophie's confidence showed as in the last two laps she made a hard surge forward and got right back up with several athletes. At the finish line Sophie crossed in an out-



standing 16:08.09, good for 6th place overall. That performance also gets her name listed on the Lobo All-Time Top Ten ranking at #7. It is the #3 performance in the Mountain West Conference this year, and #26 on the NCAA West regional ranking.

Speedy 200's Highlight Friday Night Action

The men's 200 meters had four sections with four Lobos competing on a cool, calm evening. In the second section of the race junior Mark Haywood (Alamorgordo, NM) and froshie Alejandro Goldston (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM) were competing. The picture to the left shows Mark on the outside, and Alejandro two lanes inside. Mark made a big push over the last 50 meters of the race and flashed across the finish line in 21.91, just one one hundredth off his all-time best. Alejandro grabbed a mini PR of 22.17. In the third section sophomore Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, WY) pictured in the outside lane had a great battle with an Aggie from Utah State and Carlos got to the line second in a big PR of 21.31, down from his old PR of 21.81. Junior Isaac Gonzales (Taos, NM) pictured to the right of Carlos had a huge PR as he clocked 21.91 erasing his old PR of 22.47. When all the races were completed Carlos took third place out of the 27 sprinters. He is currently ranked #6 in the MWC.

Bernal Moves Up the Charts

Sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) had run the 3000 meter Steeplechase earlier in the season at the Stanford Invitational. That race had not gone to plan, so she was determined to make amends for that race, and get back to moving in the direction she wanted. At the beginning of the Cardinal Classic race, there was a good group of about ten athletes clumped together, helping each other out. One non-collegiate athlete took off right from the start, and left everyone, running alone the entire race. The picture to the left shows a group of five athletes each taking turns pushing the pace. Natasha placed herself at the front of the group and it wasn't until about five minutes into the race that a group of four split out. At seven minutes there was a good push by a Colorado Buffalo and four athletes and Natasha surged. Right after that she fell off the pack and was close to losing contact. With one lap to go Natasha had fallen almost ten meters off the leader of the chase pack. With 300



meters left she was still in trouble, but then put her head down and drove hard right back up to the group of four. Coming around the final water jump she got right back in the mix, and down the homestretch she battled with the other athletes. Crossing the finish line in fifth place overall, but fourth collegiately in a nice PR of 10:15.90. That time is the seventh fastest performance all-time in Lobo history, and has her ranked #7 in the MWC, and #17 in the NCAA West. The picture to the left shows Natasha hurdling the barrier with the small group during the middle of the race.

Uldbjerg Hansen Drops Big PR in 800 Meters

Froshies Kristian Uldbjerg Hansen (Aalborg, Denmark) and Gavin Sleeter (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) were placed in the third of four sections of the 800 meters. Racing against three Big Ten competitors of the Minnesota Golden Gophers, along with one PAC 12 athlete, a Stanford Cardinal, both guys were looking for improvement from the Bryan Clay meet. There was a pacesetter in the race that was

supposed to take the field through 1:19 for the 600 meters before dropping out, which would get the guys under 1:50. The guys went out and hit the 200 meters in about 26 seconds and they were one after another in a line. Coming around hitting 39 seconds for the 300 meters the pace was good. The pacesetter led, then the Cardinal, then a Golden Gopher, then Kristian, and right behind him, Gavin. The picture to the right shows the guys almost at the halfway point of the race with Kristian leading Gavin. The leader got to the 400 split in 52 seconds but there was a big gap back to Kristian and Gavin. Up the backstretch Kristian pushed hard to get right with the three Minnesota guys, but Gavin had fallen way behind. Around



the final turn Kristian was battling with the Big Ten representatives and then finally on the homestretch Gavin got back in the game, and the guys fought hard to the finish line. Kristian was credited with a 1:50.94 PR and Gavin hit 1:51.26, a PR also. It typically takes around a low 1:50 performance to get to the NCAA West meet, so the guys are getting closer. Kristian is ranked #5 in the MWC, while Gavin sits at #8. In the West rankings Kristian is just outside the 48th position at 58th but only 4/10ths behind the 48th athlete.

Blount Bombs Big Ball

Hammer thrower, junior Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) has been steadily making progress in the ball and chain event. Competing in the most technically challenging event in track & field, twirling around and releasing a four kilo ball, attached to a wire and handle just takes time to learn. Amaris came into the competition with a best of 178' 7", which made her the #2 thrower all-time in UNM history. On her very first throw of the competition she unleashed a monster 185' 3" throw which ended up being her best throw of the day. That toss is the second longest throw in UNM history, after Jamie Fishencords school record toss of 192' 6", in 2005. Amaris is currently ranked #6 in the MWC and #47 in the NCAA West.



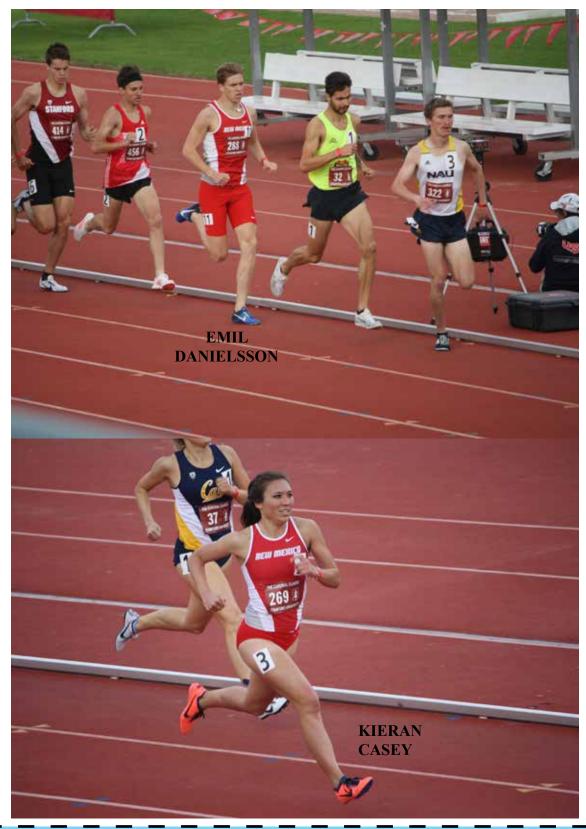

Thomas Gets Back to Steeplechase

After running the 1600 leg of the NCAA indoor qualifying Distance Medley Relay, senior Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) took about a month to train hard, and re-establish a base before competing at the Bryan Clay Invitational in the 1500 meters where he ran a PR 3:50. Racing in his specialty, the 3000 meter Steeplechase for the first time at the Cardinal Classic brought excellent results. There were 14 men in the race, and Graham slid into second place right from the start, while an Aggie from Utah State led. Once the race got going the group stuck together, and Graham was in the middle of the pack. About three minutes into the race, Graham swung out and got away from the bumping and shoving. At the halfway point the race got strung out so the guys were running in a line. Once the race passed the halfway point there was a

clear break with a Longhorn from Texas leading, with a Cal Bear, and the Utah State athlete plus Graham pulling away. At about seven minutes into the race, another Cal Bear worked hard to get up with the front four so there was a group of five now at the front. With one lap to go Graham suddenly slipped into the lead with one of the Cal Bears right on his shoulder, the other Cal Bear just a few feet off, and then a space of about five meters to the USU athlete. As the runners went up the backstretch one of the Cal runners spurted to the lead and Graham responded immediately. Going into the final water jump Graham was just feet behind the Cal athlete, and as they came out of the water jump, and then into the final homestretch Graham sprinted to the lead. Over the final barrier both men were straining. With 50 meters to go they were racing stride for stride (as the picture to the above left shows) and they did that to the finish line. Graham was given second place as he recorded a 8:54.29 performance. That performance moves him to #2 in the MWC this season, and #21 in the NCAA West.



Two Good 1500 Meter Races

Pictured at the top is froshie **Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jarna, Sweden)** while the bottom picture is junior **Kieran Casey (Indianapolis, Ind)**. In the men's 1500 Emil came into the meet after having run 3:52.08 at the Arizona State Sun Angel Classic two weeks before, and having an all-time best of 3:45.42 which he did on July 9, 2016 at the Solihull British Milers Club Grand Prix in England. Before that race his PR was 3:46.84. Running in section 2 there were 12 men but one was a pacesetter. At the gun the pacesetter went right to the front trying to hit 59 seconds for the first 400. He did just that as Emil was probably right around 60 seconds in the middle of the pack. The race turned into a single file procession as the runners got toward the 800 meter point. Emil was in fifth place as he crossed in 2:00. He stayed patient, and as the runners came toward the finish line for the bell lap, Emil was now in third place at 2:45. Crossing the 1200 meter split in under 3:00 Emil took second place. He maintained that up the backstretch, and as the race turned around the final bend a group of runners came up on his back. As that group

came into the homestretch there were no less than six runners in the pack, each straining to get that little extra. All the way to the finish line this group battled, and at the finish line only 5/10ths of a second separated five of the men. Emil was clocked in 3:46.43, his second fastest time ever, and an indication that in a couple of weeks he can erase his old PR.

In section three of the women's 1500 Kieran also had a pacesetter and that person was supposed to bring the field through a 70 second pace. Kieran came into the meet with a seasonal best of 4:25.56 which she did at the Bryan Clay Invitational. Kieran's all-time best was 4:24.99 which she did at the NCAA Division II championship last year when she attended the University of Indianapolis. The goal for the race was to run around 4:24 which is the time usually needed to get into the NCAA West regional. The pacesetter came through a little quick at 68, but Kieran was in the middle of the pack and probably hit around 70. As the runners went through the second lap they were running in single file and Kieran was in sixth place. At the 800 point the runners passed in about 2:21 and the pacesetter dropped out. Kieran pressed toward the front of the race and was just a few meters down from the leader, who was from California. Six of the athletes were grouped tightly at the bell lap as they crossed in 3:16 and Kieran seemed poised to make a concerted effort over the final 400 meters. Around the turn they went and they passed 1200 meters in 3:33. Up the backstretch the front group was down to four runners, the Cal runner, an Aggie from Utah State, a Stanford Cardinal, and Kieran. The foursome stayed tightly bunched and as they came around the final turn they were all preparing for the hard sprint that would come on the homestretch. Each of the ladies dug down and tried to get up tall and push off. The Aggie got the jump on everyone, but Kieran made a nice surge toward her, but ran out of space, finishing second in a UNM PR of 4:25.23. Currently, Kieran is ranked #58 in the NCAA West.



Battikha Adds to His MWC Ranking Froshie Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) pictured to the left had been Long Jumping well this outdoor season, ranking second in the MWC. On Friday he competed in the Long Jump, and got off a solid 23'8 1/4" distance which ended up placing fourth collegiately in the competition. His current seasonal best is a 24'1 3/4", only three inches away from the conference lead. But Coach Ellis had been preparing Tanner to enter the Triple Jump world, and Stanford was the day. Coach Ellis believed that TB could jump around 46' in his first competition. Trying to get accustomed to the different event Tanner came down the runway on his first attempt and only spanned 42', looking out of sorts. But he made a nice adjustment on his second attempt, and hop, stepped, and jumped all the way out to 46' 3/4"! (Good prediction Coach Ellis). That distance held up as his best on the day and now Tanner ranks #8 in the MWC in the TJ.



Junior Kyra Mohns (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) is shown to the left going over hurdle #9 in good form. Kyra wanted to get out harder in her third 400 Hurdle race of the season and she did that having good position over the first five hurdles. She ran into a little difficulty on hurdles six and seven, but rebounded on number eight and nine. She didn't get good position at number ten, but still ran a solid race as she finished seventh in 62.33. Kyra is just about half a second out of ranking in the top eight in the MWC.

Trigg & Hadnot Move Into Top 15 of NCAA Ranking

Seniors Sam Trigg (Plymouth, England) and Jannell Hadnot (Oakland, CA) certainly used the great facility at Texas, and the available tailwind to their advantage in recording top national performances. The men's Triple Jump was up first and Sam, (pictured below) like all jumpers was trying to adjust to the wind, and get their approach steps down. Extra wind pushed the athletes faster down the runway, so they had to make adjustments so they didn't foul. On Sam's first jump he extended out to 51' 9" aided by a 3.4mps tailwind. For any type of record purposes a tailwind can not exceed 2.0mps but for purposes of just the NCAA First-Round qualifying competition anything up to 4.0mps is allowed. On Sam's second round attempt he boomed a 52' 10 3/4" monster, the longest he has ever jumped and it got a 3.3 meter per second tailwind, so it was good for the NCAA! That jump catapulted him all the way up to #13 in all the NCAA, and #7 in the NCAA West region. On Sam's third round attempt he sailed to a 52' 8" distance, and the wind had died down slight-



The New Mexico Lobos competed in the Texas Longhorn Invitational for the first time in program history, and came away with many significant performances. The strong winds made it enjoyable for any sprint or jump event given all the athletes had a nice breeze at their backs the entire day. Unfortunately, that same nice breeze caused havoc with any race around the track oval as the athletes had to deal with a strong headwind during part of their races. Of the 18 Lobo athletes who competed a high percentage of them either hit a seasonal-best, lifetime best, or placed themselves into a better position for the NCAA West First-Round qualifying competition. And that is exactly what was the purpose of attending the meet and the conclusion to the 2017 regular season. Now the team will begin final preparations for the Mountain West Conference Championship in two weeks up in Logan, Utah hosted by Utah State University.

ly, so the aiding tailwind was only 2.0, so that jump counts in the New Mexico Lobo All-Time Top 10 ranking - moving Sam up to #6 all time in Loboland. Sam finished off with leaps of 51'0", 51'11, and 52'6" for his complete series. When all Sam's jumps were averaged they came up to 52'1" which was farther than any other athletes one best jump in the meet. That shows excellence!



Once Sam completed his jumping the women began theirs, and with only four athletes in the competition the rest interval between when jumpers would jump would be very, very short. That gives the athletes little recovery time. The wind was flucuating much more during the women's competition than the mens and Jannells first leap only had a 0.9 tailwind but she still went over 13 meters as she came down at 42' 9", which would have been the best jump of all athletes on the day. She then came down in the second round and nailed a 43'5" leap with a 3.2 tailwind, and that effort bumps her all the way up to #15 on the NCAA ranking list, and #7 in the NCAA West region. Jannell had one other leap over 13 meters in the fourth round when she cranked out a 43' 1/4" distance! This was a good jump day!!!

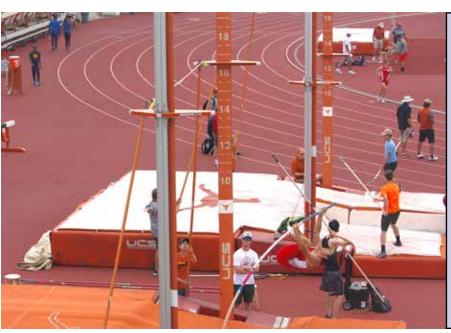
Salcido Speeds to #2 Ranking in Mountain West Conference

Sophomore Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, WY) was excited about the chance to race over the 200 meter distance again, and with the favorable tailwinds assisting races, maybe could get under 21.10, which would allow him a chance to qualify for the NCAA West regional. Carlos was scheduled to race in the fourth of six sections, and the wind was gusting up and down. In section one of the 200 the wind ended up at 4.3mps negating any performance in the section. Then the second section came in a 3.4mps, which did allow for performances to be used. Then the third section was back up to 4.6mps which was illegal. So as Carlos got into the blocks it was just a random chance with Mother Nature and all he could do was run fast and hope the wind reading was legal. At the crack of the gun Carlos shot out of the blocks and within five strides had made up the stagger on the athlete outside him. He roared around the turn, and came into the home straight pumping his arms furiously. He dug hard all the way to the finish line as the above picture shows, and then immediately looked up at the huge scoreboard. The first part was fantastic........21.07, the fastest he had ever run......but then wait for it......the wind reading hadn't popped up......and then it read 3.1! Legal for NCAA purposes!!!!! That time is the second fastest this year in the MWC and gets him close to NCAA West qualifying. While athletes won't know until after all the conference championship are done whether they make the NCAA West meet, what is known is that 21.07 has never NOT made the meet in the seven years the meet has been going on. All Carlos can do now is try to run faster at the conference championship.



Battikha Punches Ticket for NCAA First-Round

Froshie Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) pictured above came into the Longhorn Invitational with a seasonal best of 24' 1 3/4" in the Long Jump. That jump ranked #2 in the Mountain West Conference, and about #60 in the NCAA West ranking. Given only the top 48 in each event qualify for the NCAA First-Round competition which is actually back at the Texas track facility at the end of May Tanner needed some extra inches. With the wonderful tailwind behind him and a great field of men to jump against the day was just about perfect. With that backdrop the normally quiet Californian got juiced for his first jump, and came roaring down the runway and just nailed the take-off, and flew through the air, landing way out in the pit. Tanner walked back to the take-off board, and looked over the officials shoulder to see what the tape measure said. When he heard 7.56 meters (24' 9 3/4") he pumped his fist, but then had to run to the wind gauge operator halfway down the Long Jump approach to find out what that instrument read. He just narrowly got under the 4.0 meter per second threshold with a plus 3.7! That leap moves him all the way up to #28 in the NCAA West ranking, and relief that he can go to conference and focus on having a chance to win the title no matter what the distance is. Tanner is currently ranked #1 in the MWC.



Atencio Clears 16' in Pole Vault Sophomore Jason Atencio (Hope Christian, ABQ, NM) pictured to the left in his rock back position cleared 16' 0" for the first time outdoors. Jason had cleared that threshold both at the indoor Don Kirby Elite, and the Mountain West Conference Championship this past undercover season and now has added that to his outdoor resume. Opening up at 15' 1" he easily cleared on his first attempt. Then he moved on to 15'7" and duplicated that with a nice clearance. Moving on to 4.90m (16' 3/4") he kept the momentum going clearing on his first attempt. Now, on to the 5.00 meter barrier (16'4 3/4"). Jason took several good attempts but wasn't able to clear that threshold on this day. Currently, Jason ranks #5 in the Mountain West Conference.

In the men's & women's Javelin both Lobo entrants got seasonal-best efforts. In the women's Javelin Heptathlete Kyra Mohns (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) working on one of the seven events she will compete in is shown watching the flight of the spear after release as it travels out to 119' 10" her best so far this season. Kyra ranks #10 in the MWC in the Javelin. Sophomore Malik Matthews-Gordon (Sandia, **ABQ, NM)** came into the competition with a best of 195' 2" which he got at the Arizona State Sun Angel meet. After a 187' 6" opening toss he bombed a 200' o" distance on his second attempt which left him fifth overall after the competition. Since the NCAA changed the aerodynamics of the Javelin in 1986 there have only been about a dozen men that have thrown at least 200' as a Lobo, and Malik joins that exclusive club. That 200' distance also moves him up to #5 in the MWC and #54 in the NCAA West region. It looks like Malik is about one meter away from getting into the top 48 of the region.







4 x 100 Relay Races to Seasonal Best

Mudada & Dorsey Race to 4th & 6th Places

Seniors Mustafa Mudada (Highland, ABQ, NM) and Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) who currently rank #3 and #6 in the MWC 400 Hurdles raced to fourth and sixth place finishes at the Longhorn Invitational. With the wind howling down the backstretch, it was challenging for all the athletes to maintain their normal stride pattern as they went right into the wind. As an example, the winner from Michigan has run 49.73 as a lifetime best and 50.86 this year, but could only manage a 52.00 while the runner-up from Texas (San

Antonio) has run 50.86 but could only manage 52.69. The harsh wind probably cost each of the runners between 1.5-2.0 seconds. The above picture shows Mustafa halfway up the backstretch trying to manage the headwind. Both Mustafa and Cheyne ran very solid races but didn't get the 52 second races they were hoping for. Currently Mustafa is ranked #55 in the NCAA West region, about 3/10th out from the top 48.

Mady Moves Up to #4 All Time

Junior Ally Mady (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) came into the Longhorn meet with a best distance of 149' 4" in the Hammer which ranked her #7 all-time at UNM. On her first throw she plunked the ball and chain down at 148' 1" then followed up on her second throw with a 141' 3". Focusing on her technical progressions she twirled the ball out to 156' 6" on her final throw. That vaults her all the way up to #4 all time in Loboland.

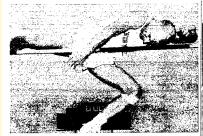

A Look Back in Lobo Track History

The decade of the 1960's was an exceptional one for the Lobo men's track & field program. Considered to be one of the best five programs in all the land, the team had a remarkable talent pool. USC (Southern California) was considered to be the top program in the country, and on April 3, 1965 the two squads met in a dual meet in Albuquerque. Dual meets were very important in the 1960's and the large invitational type meets which are prominent nowdays were not common. In fact, throughout the season most teams only competed in dual meets so there might have been eight weeks in a row during the outdoor season with only dual meets. UNM had opened up the outdoor season with dual meet victories over Arizona (109-36), then Wyoming (132-33), then Minnesota (121-24) before meeting USC. UNM finished the outdoor season with dual victories over Colorado (101-44), Arizona State (84-60) and BYU (88-59). In dual meets it was just two collegiate teams against each other, and the focus was on beating an athlete that wore a different color uniform. USC was as powerful as they come, and had only lost two dual meets in the previous 20 years, and the last dual meet they lost was three years prior to the UNM-USC competition. The Trojans had won two of the previous four NCAA Championships, and in fact would go on to win the 1965 championship. The last time the Trojans visited Albuquerque they won the 1963 NCAA title. In the 1965 dual meet the Lobos absolutely crushed the Trojans 98-46 using three school records to propel them to the victory. The crowd of about 6000 spectators in University Stadium watched as the Lobos win 13 of 17 events. Two newspaper articles describing the event follow. It was one of the highlight stories both nationwide and locally in the 1965 year.

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Wright Takes Down 10,000 Meter Lobo Record

Last year (2016) on May 1st junior Alice Wright (Worcester, **England**) pictured to the left traveled to the Payton Jordan/ Stanford Invitational and came away with a 32:36.11 clocking, which came up an agonizing 4/100ths of a second away from the Lobo school record set by Sarah Waldron in 2012 (32:36.07) at this same Stanford track. Alice would go on to finish second at the NCAA Championship in June, 2016. Her phenomenal 2016 year had her ranked very highly in all of Europe, and especially in the UK. Alice ranked #6 in the UK, and was the youngest of those six athletes by two years. When looking at all 50 countries which make up "Europe" Alice was ranked 18th, and the third youngest of all those athletes. Racing over the grueling 10,000 meters (25 laps of a track) is something that comes slowly with distance running maturity, and Alice has a bright future based on her youth in the event. The top ranked UK athlete is almost 44 years old and has been to five Olympiads, and five of the European athletes ranked ahead of her are 10 years older than Alice!

This year the Payton Jordan meet changed significantly. Over the past decade it has been a place for both collegiate and

professional athletes to come together and produce incredible distance performances, and at the end of each year when one reviews the top collegiate times in the country, almost all of them always come from Stanford. This year there was a change, as the meet management split the meet into an early collegiate meet (the Stanford Collegiate Classic which UNM attended two weeks earlier) and a professional Payton Jordan competition. Very few collegiate athletes were invited to attend the Payton Jordan meet as the list of Olympians and world ranked distance runners was impressive. Only a handful of the very best collegians were given entry, and Alice was the only collegiate athlete invited for the 10,000 meters. The purpose of the Payton Jordan was quite simple - provide professional distance runners an opportunity to hit the World Championship qualifying standard. This August, the 2017 World Track & Field Championship will be hosted in London in the same venue that hosted the 2012 Olympic Games. In the 10,000 meters the qualifying standard established was 32:15.00. One of the reasons distance runners love the Stanford facility is at night it cools down in Palo Alto, and almost always there is absolutely no wind to negate a performance. Well this year the athletes got a heavy dose of both cold and wind. The temperature in Palo Alto had spectators wearing down coats and stocking hats with gloves, and although distance runners like it cool to race, this was borderline cold. And the wind!

Early in the evening the winds were breezy, then they died down for some of the later events, but unfortunately, right before the womens 10,000 meters, they churned up again. That made running fast challenging for all, but the show must go on, so athletes simply prepared to do their best. Thirty six women toed the starting line and most had that World Championship standard in mind. Lets go to the end of the race, and then work our way back. Alice was seeded 26th and finished 16th. She established a new Lobo school record and PR of 32:29.28. That is the #3 time in all of the NCAA so far this season. She is ranked #28 in the world right now. But lets take a look what it took to beat her. Here is a list from 1-15 of the athletes that finished ahead of her: Seven of the athletes had competed in the Olympic Games, three competed in the World Cross Country Championship, one was an NCAA All American, one was a medalist at the World University Games, one finished 11th in the US Olympic Trials, one represented her country at a world respected cross country meet, and one is a top distance runner in her country. Those are the athletes who finished in front of her. Now back to the race. The top professional runners took off and the race split into four mini-races with Alice in the third running pack. She got to the one mile point in 5:08 and then the two mile mark in 10:16 for another 5:08. She hit three miles in 15:28 (a 5:12 mile) and the halfway point (5000 meters) in 16:07. She dug down for a 5:14 fourth mile to get her to 20:42, and then replicated that 5:14 to get to five miles in 25:56. After a 5:18 sixth mile she finished with a flourish, sprinting to a 75 second final lap, her fastest of all 25 laps. With one year to go in her Lobo track career Alice has the #1, #3, #4, #5, #7 fastest 10,000 meter performances in **UNM** history!

Kurgat Runs Quick 5000

Sophomore **Ednah Kurgat (Eldoret, Kenya)** pictured below is redshirting this year which is not easy if you ask any athlete who does it. Athletes who are redshirting cannot travel with the team to any meet, and if they want to compete must pay to attend meets themselves and can't wear their school uniform. And they miss out on team chemistry which is established during away meets, and just the experience of racing for the team. Plus redshirting athletes cannot score points for the team in any scored competition and must therefore focus on trying to stay competitive and ready for the following season. Ednah had done two 3000's at the Lobo home open meets, one indoor in February, and the other, an outdoor meet in April. The results of those 3000 meter races was very good, but Coach Franklin was excited to see how she did over the longer distance. So the Payton Jordan meet was an opportunity for her to run a longer 5000 meter which is more suited to her specialty. Placed in the second section of 18 athletes Ednah was not afraid to get out hard, and maintain that pace throughout. She finished second in her section with an outstanding 15:26.00 effort and ran the last 1600 meters in 4:44 which is equivalent to a 4:46 mile! Yikes. After the top seeded section raced with 20 athletes competing, Ednah had the 11th fastest overall performance. And just as Alice had finish in front of her listen to the resume of some of those athletes in front of Ednah: 4 had competed in the 2016 Olympics, 2 had competed in the World Track Championships, and two others had competed in the World Junior Track Championship. Wow! And

how is 15:26.00 as a time? Glad you asked. It would break former Lobo All American Calli Thackery's school record by eleven seconds AND be the fastest collegiate time in the NCAA by three seconds this year!!!! Oh, and be the 18th fastest time in the world so far this year. Can't wait until cross country season!!

A Star Burns Bright

Sophomore Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) earlier in the season ran the fastest 1500 meters IN THE WORLD when he clocked 3:35.99 at the Bryan Clay Invitational. Other than an easy

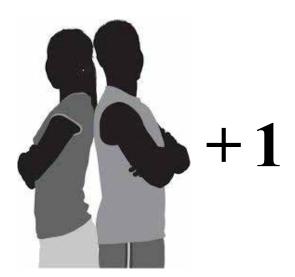
pacing situation at the Stanford Classic, he just trained and prepared, trying to make sure he was ready for the latter parts of the NCAA season, but also the UK Trials for the World Championship later in the summer. At the MWC Championship Josh was scheduled to race both the 1500 meters and 800 meters which has historically not been an easy double. In fact, over the last ten years there have only been six men who even scored in both, and only four of those had been victorious in at least one of the race. Peter Callahan, former Lobo had won the 1500 and finished second in the 800 in 2014 while Alex Herring, another former Lobo, had won the 800 and finished runner-up in the 1500 in 2013. Lee Emanuel former Lobo NCAA Champion had won the 1500 meters and finished second in the 800 in 2010, while former BYU All American Miles Batty had won the 1500 meters, and finished sixth in the 800 in 2011. Only once in conference history had an athlete been able to win both, and that was way back in 2000, the first year of the MWC.

Honestly speaking, Josh had not doubled well in the past, so this was a big test of not only his fitness, but mental toughness to deal with multiple races over consecutive days. On Friday, Josh was scheduled to begin his 2017 MWC duties when he ran the preliminary round of the 800, and that was an easy test as he clocked 1:53.15 the fastest of all athletes in the event. On Saturday, Josh first had the 1500 meters to contend with, and he was content to let two athletes from Utah State lead in the early stages of the race. He continued to be patient, knowing he had the best "sprint kick" in the field, so pushing the pace was not necessary. With one lap to go, Josh started to exert his influence and going up the back-stretch he started to press a little, which blew up the field, and strung the entire race out. Coming around the final turn heading for the finish line Josh turned around to make sure he was clear of the pack, and he just strode to the finish line for a comfortable victory, defending his title he won last year at Fresno State. The picture above shows Josh just cruising down the homestretch with a 54.5 final 400 meters. Josh's finish time of 3:41.87 was over one second in front of the second place finisher even though he ran easy the last 100 meters of the race. But his biggest test of the championship lay ahead as it was a stacked field of 800 runners waiting for him. Also, in the 1500 meters froshie Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jarna, Sweden) came up with his fastest of the year to grab 7th place at 3:46.08. It is always nice to see freshmen earning a scoring spot in the conference championship. A short time later Josh went to the starting line of the ten man 800 meter final. Waiting for him in the field were the #6, #13, #28, and #35 ranked athletes in the NCAA West region, which was a powerful representation of the conference. At the gun, Josh did

not look spry, and he ran the first lap in the middle of the field coming through the halfway point in 55.3, sixth of the ten men in the field. Right on his heels was froshie Gavin Sleeter, (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) who had made his first outdoor final. Up the backstretch, Josh was running hard to move up into a better position, and as the race got to the 600 meter point he was not near the lead. Coming around the final turn Josh was in fifth place behind the defending champion from the Utah State Aggies, one Air Force Falcon, and two Wyoming Cowboys. Swinging wide into lane two Josh got up to fourth with 50 meters to go, and then third, but there was only about 30 meters to go, and the Utah State Aggie had about 3-4 meters on him and one Wyoming Cowboy one meter. With 20 meters to go Josh was digging for all he could and he got up to the Cowboy, but it looked like he was going to run out of space. With ten meters to go Josh was still down to the Aggie, but then pushed real hard and had an amazing stride pattern, running right through the finish line. Who knew who won.....and



then the video board showed that Josh had somehow managed to outlean the defending champion by two one hundredths of a second, 1:47.51 to 1:47.53. The picture to the above right shows the exact moment Josh leaned past the Aggie. Now that was an incredible showing of brute power! That performance moves Josh all the way up to #3 all-time at UNM and #8 in the NCAA West region. He drops his former outdoor PR of 1:50.60 way down the pike. Gavin, kept working hard right through the end, and finished sixth in 1:51.89.



HADNOT GOES BACK TO BACK TO BACK

Senior **Jannell Hadnot (Oakland, CA)** pictured to the right came into the MWC Championship having won the previous two editions of the Triple Jump after having finished fourth as a froshie in 2014. Jannell was the prohibitive favorite, as during the regular season she had jumped almost three feet! farther than the second best leaper in the conference with her 43′ 5″ distance. That is a huge differential in sand. There is an old saying in athletics in that when you are the best, make sure you show everyone you are the best, and don't let anyone get any emotional energy going. Well on Jannells first attempt she extended out to a comfortable 41′ 8

1/4" distance and then in the second round moved that farther out to a 42' 2 1/4". From that point it was cruise control as any one of Jannell's four leaps (she passed the final two jumps) would have won the competition as the second placer got a 40' 9" distance. Jannell joins two other athletes as the conferences three time victors in the Triple Jump. Former Lobo Monique Harris won the first three years of the conference (2000-02), while Shanieka Thomas from San Diego State took the crown from 2012-14. Jannell now turns her attention to the NCAA West First-Round Qualifying as she enters the competition as the #10 ranked athlete with the #19 national ranking. Earlier in the MWC Championship Jannell competed in the Long Jump, and she came away with an eighth place finish with a leap of 18' 10" which she got in the fifth round of competition. Want to know why Jannell is smiling........its called success!





pionship 10,000, where she finished runner-up. An athlete can't run too many 10ks during the outdoor season as it is highly taxing race. This year, again after having run the third fastest 10,000 in the country the week prior to the MWC Championship, Alice was scheduled to run the 5000 meters where oh by the way she is ranked #18 nationally. For the first 1200 meters Alice was content to stay behind two runners from Utah State as they tried to pace their teammate to a fast race. But once Alice got to the 1 mile point, she easily and steadily pulled away from the rest of the field. She clicked off several 78 second laps, before hitting five consecutive 79 second laps. With two laps to go she ran a low 78 second lap, then finished off with a flurry, racing to a 74.7 last lap. Alice's winning time of 15:53.85 is the tenth fastest performance in Lobo history (she has #4 and #9). She now preps for the NCAA West, First-Round Qualifying race over 10,000 meters, and then the NCAA Finals.

Trigg Scores in Both Horizontal Jumps

Senior Sam Trigg (Plymouth, England) pictured to the right came into the championship ranked #8 in the Long Jump, and #2 in the Triple Jump. On Friday in the Long Jump all the jumpers enjoyed massive tailwinds which helped extend them out in the pit so right from the beginning of the event there were some seriously long jumps. Sam opened up with a 23' 6" effort, then came back in the second round with a 24' 3/4" leap. He finished up with three fouls, and one 22' 11" jump. There were a large number of fouls by the athletes as they were having difficulty getting on the take-off board with the huge tailwinds. When all was said and done, Sam finished fourth overall to go along with his third place finish in 2016. Froshie Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) placed seventh with his best leap of 23' 9 1/2". On Saturday, in the Triple Jump, the winds had died down significantly and there was less fouling by the group. In the first round of compe-



tition, after an opening foul, Sam, the defending MWC Champion took the early lead with a 50' 4" leap. After a third round leap of 49' 6", he extended his lead to 50' 6". After a fifth round foul, a Wyoming Cowboy, the regular season leader came down the runway and bombed a 51' 5 3/4" distance on his very last leap. Sam had one more chance but he couldn't surpass the Cowboy. Sam heads into the NCAA First-Round competition ranked #10 in the West (the top 12 advance to NCAA's). Tanner, pictured to the right still learning the Triple Jump came into the meet with a seasonal best of 46' 3/4" and struggled early hitting 45' 5" and 43' 1" to go along with two fouls. On his fifth round jump, Tanner put the pieces together and smacked downa 47' 1 3/4" leap, which vaulted him up to fifth place. That is where he ended up with a nice new PR and placing.

Salcido Speeds to #8 All-Time

Sophomore Carlos Salcido (Rock Springs, WY) pictured below came into the championship feeling very positive about the 200 meter sprint race. He had been improving every week, and was highly ranked in the conference. In the prelim the 15 men were vying for 8 spots in the final. Carlos easily made the final clocking 21.13, and entered the final as the #5 seed. In the loaded final the eight men were very fast. At the gun, Carlos was away quickly, but so was everyone else. The slender Wyomingite was racing stride for stride with the athletes on either side. He flashed across the finish line in a new PR of 21.01 good for fifth place, and became the eighth fastest Lobo all-time. Carlos's performance places him into contention for an NCAA West regional slot.







A Great Race All the Way to the Finish Line

The men's 3000 Steeplechase had all the makings of a great competitive race between about five athletes. Senior Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) pictured to the left in the white uniform came into the conference championship ranked #2 behind a Boise State Bronco, and just ahead of two Utah State Aggies and one Air Force Falcon. The ten men running the event stayed tightly packed and ran that way for four and a half of the seven and a half lap race. Eight of the ten men were within one second of each other at that juncture. At five and a half laps the group was down to six and then Graham sprung into action. After running basically 75 second laps, the turned up the intensity with a 69 second lap, and only the Falcon and

Bronco could go with him. Going into the bell lap Graham and the Bronco dropped the Falcon and Graham led the charge. Up the backstretch Graham was racing as hard as he could with a slight advantage. Into the last water jump, Graham led, but the Bronco was trying hard to re-engage. As they both came out of the water pit, Graham still led and with one dry barrier to go Graham was in full flight. As they approached the last barrier they went over in unison, and then with approximately 70 meters to the finish line it was man to man, both athletes straining to run hard. It wasn't until the last few strides that the Bronco got ahead and at the finish line the Bronco outlasted Graham 9:01.28 to 9:02.00. On Saturday, about 24 hours after the steeplechase Graham lined up for the 5000 meter competition. With almost every athlete doubling back from a previous race the pace was moderate due to fatigue. For 9 1/2 laps there were about eight men in close proximity with Graham at the tail end of the racing pack. With about two laps left Graham was in danger of getting dropped, but then the deep inner drive and desire kicked in, and Graham sprung to life. He ran the penultimate lap in 63 seconds and suddenly he went right up to third place, and then he finished it with another 63 seconds to maintain that position as he crossed the finish line in 14:55.14. What a nice finish.

Lam Has Huge Decathlon

Junior Daniel Lam (Amsterdam, Netherlands) injured his achilles during the indoor season, and had to spend most of the last three months cross training, strength training, and doing everything possible to maintain a high level of general fitness. It wasn't until several weeks before the MWC Championship that he could transition into technical work specific for the Decathlon (High Jump, Javelin, etc). Given the final results of the MWC Championship it is clear that great general fitness trumps technical parameters, and should always be the primary focus of training. Because of the lack of meet competition there was trepidation as the event began, but once the first event got underway it was business as usual. In other words, no matter how prepared an athlete is, once the competition starts all one can do is the best they are capable of under the circumstances. In the 100 meters Daniel clocked a 11.29 PR that was actually run into a 1.1 mps headwind. Then moving on to the Long Jump he spanned a huge jump, 23' 7 1/2", the longest he has ever jumped although the wind was over the allowable 2.0mps for record purposes. In the third event, Daniel threw a huge PR of 42′ 3/4″ in the Shot Put and kept the good momentum going. Having a prior PR of 6 3/4" in the High Jump Daniel blew that height away as he scaled 6' 31/4". Finally, he finished off Day 1 with a 50.82 PR. He ended Day 1 with a great score of 3827. Day 2 began with a good solid 110 Hurdle race (15.35) before a good Discus toss (124' 9"). With an outdoor PR of 15' 7" Daniel cleared 16' 3/4'' for 880 points, his largest point event of the ten. He moved on to the ninth event, the Javelin where he tossed the spear 159' 10". Finally, in the last event, the 1500 Daniel ran to a 4:59.09 clocking. His total of 7277 points is almost 200 points higher than his total from 2016. That total got him second place in the Decathlon and an important eight points for the team. It also moved him up to 39th in the NCAA national rankings. Finishing 4th in the Decathlon was sophomore Ryan Chase (Olympia, WA) who totalled 6563.

Mohns Has Monster Heptathlon..... and 400 Hurdles

Junior Kyra Mohns (Eldorado, ABQ, NM) took up the 400 Hurdles at the beginning of the outdoor season. She had done the 300 Hurdles at the high school level, but had not done them collegiately. The training effect working the 400 Hurdles twice per week certainly paid off for her. Training programs are designed by nature to improve an athletes performance by developing the appropriate energy sources, increasing muscular structures, and improving neuro-muscular patterns. Varying the type, volume, and intensity of training allows the body to recover and grow in new ways. Having been training for the Heptathlon for three years the hurdles provided new pathways to improvement. First, the Heptathlon. Kyra got a good Heptathlon started by blazing a 14.51 100 Hurdle race aided by a just over the allowable 2.1 mps tailwind. Still it was a very good hurdle race for her, the fastest that she had ever run, and got the most points of any of the seven events (913 points). She then hit 5' 3 3/4" in the High Jump, before hurling the Shot Put out to a new PR of 39' 8", a one and a half foot improvement! She finished day one with a nice PR of 25.40 in the 200 run into a headwind. On Day 2 she Long Jumped 17' 10 1/4" with a 2.2mps tailwind. She sailed the Javelin out to 124' 11" and finished off the Heptathlon with a 2:23.27. Her total score was a big PR of 5280 points. That makes Kyra the #5 ranked Hep-

tathlete in Lobo track history. On to the 400 Hurdles. Leading up to the conference championship Kyra had only run four 400 Hurdle races in her life, first a 62.90, then a 62.27, a 62.33, and a 65.28. She entered the MWC meet ranked #10, and with only eight athletes advancing to the finals had her work cut out for her. Every athlete in the field was much more experienced in the long hurdle race, a race that demands rhythm and balance. In the preliminary round Kyra got out well, struggled around the second turn with hurdles #7, #8, and #9 before showing excellent strength to manage hurdle #10 and bring it home in an outstanding 60.98 PR, the fifth fastest out of the 21 women entered. In the finals Kyra cleaned up the ineffiency around the turn and she came into the homestretch looking like a seasoned veteran. She kept her hips up, and was always moving forward and she came through the finish line nicely. Her final time of 60.51 was good enough to grab third place and that time moves her to #6 all-time at UNM......WOW. Kyra is shown in the picture to the right sailing through the air in the Heptathlon Long Jump. The picture below captures the 400 Hurdle final with Kyra all the way to the left in lane 7.











400 Hurdles Yields Two Scoring Places

Seniors Cheyne Dorsey (Cleveland, Rio Rancho, NM) and Mustafa Mudada (Highland, ABQ, NM) came into the championship with the goal to make the final. Cheyne had already scored in the two previous editions of the conference championship, as he had finished 6th in 2015 and then 8th last

year. Mustafa had had some bad luck with his hamstrings, so he was actually looking for his first taste of point scoring. In the preliminary race only ten men entered. Mustafa was entered in the first section and after the gun he went out very hard, to make sure it was a clean, hard race. At the 200 meter point Mustafa was clearly leading, but then, the #10 ranked hurdler in all the country, from Utah State made a hard push to get up to Mustafa. Mustafa kept his composure, and finished the race third in his section at 53.55, comfortably into the final. In section two Cheyne did likewise, being conservative on hurdle #1, but then extending himself into the next five hurdles. He had to given the #12 ranked hurdler in the country from Boise State was pressing hard. Cheyne finished fourth in his section at 54.47 and qualified for the final. In the final Mustafa was seeded into lane seven with the fifth fastest overall time from the prelim, and Cheyne got lane eight by virtue of his seventh fastest prelim time. In the final both guys got out hard, and



did some really good things technically up the backstretch. They stuck with the race plan of consistency and adaptability and as they came around the final bend were doing well. Mustafa would come down the homestretch and cross the final line in 52.23 for fifth place, while Cheyne would come home in 53.50. It is the first time since 2011 that two Lobos were able to score. In that year froshie Chaz Lewis grabbed second place while classmate Yusuf Muhammad placed third. Chevne is on the left in the picture to the left.



BERNAL FINISHES FIFTH IN STEEPLECHASE

Sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, **ABQ, NM)** pictured to the left found a very good 3000 meter Steeplechase field to race and ended up finishing fifth overall. Natasha was ranked #7 in the MWC during the regular season with her PR of 10:15.90 which also had her at #22 in the NCAA West region. Two of the MWC ranked athletes ran other events so Natasha was the #5 seed in the meet. The race staved relatively close through the first 3 1/2 laps of the 7 1/2 lap journey as the top eight runners were within two seconds of each other. At 5 1/2 laps Natasha was racing sixth, but then she made a late charge past the Utah State runner to take fifth place. That is where she finished in 10:37.29.

Blount Twirls Hammer To Sixth Place

Junior Amaris Blount (Rio Rancho, NM) ranked #6 in the conference during the regular season with a best of 185' 3" which she did at Stanford. Throwing as the first athlete in the best section Amaris opened up at 178' 11", the tenth longest throw in Lobo history (and Amaris' third longest). She then followed with fouls in the second and third round. By virtue of her 178' 11" she entered the finals as the seventh best. In the fourth round she had a foul, but then followed with a nice 183' 10" distance in the fifth round which moved her up to sixth place. Amaris had a foul in round six, so she ended up with that sixth place finish. That distance is the fourth longest throw in Lobo history. On the next page Amaris is shown in the middle of the throw, and then speaking with Coach Matt about what technical improvements can be made. In the first flight of the Hammer, junior Ally Mady (La Cueva, ABQ, NM) snatched a new PR of 158' 1" which moves her to #4 all-time at UNM.





Newcomer Malik Matthews-Gordon (Sandia, ABQ, NM) had thrown the Javelin exactly 200'0" at the Texas Longhorn Invitational, which meant he entered the MWC Championship ranked #6 out of the 13 men competing. Malik opened up his series with a 172' 11" toss, then followed with a 194' 0" effort which moved him up to fourth place. He then followed in the third round with a 193' 5". Entering the finals he was now in fifth place. In the fourth round he extended his best throw out to 196' 5" and that would be the best on the day. When all was said and done Malik placed sixth and the pre-meet rankings held to form. The picture to the left shows Malik hurling the spear.



Froshie Shannon Fritz (Phoenix, AZ) pictured to the left came into the MWC Championship ranked 14th of the 16 women competing, and was not expected to score. But conference championships are a fun time in that there are always surprizes in many events. With a seasonal best of 5'5", it was expected it would take at least 5'7" to have any chance of scoring. Shannon opened up at 5'1" and cleared on her first attempt, then replicated that at 5'3" and 5'5". As soon as she cleared 5'5" the field had been reduced to 12 jumpers, but Shannon was ahead of two of them based on misses. She then moved on to 5'7" and missed once at that height, before nailing it on her second attempt. With that clearance she was in 7th. The bar then went to 5'8 3/4" which would have moved her to 5th place but Shannon could not clear it. Still the 7th place finish was a good team surprize.



HAYWOOD TAKES 6TH IN 400 METERS

Junior Mark Haywood (Alamogordo, NM) pictured to the left is shown racing to a sixth place finish. In the prelims Mark finished with the sixth fastest overall time of 48.35. In the finals he got out well, but made a hard, driving surge up the backstretch to match what the leaders were doing. Around the bend and into the homestretch Mark was driving hard all the way. At the finish line Mark was sixth in 47.66, which equals his all-time best.



4x100 Relay

The 4x100 Relay is always a work in progress. The process of taking four athletes, and getting them to think as one cohesive unit challenging. The relay of Mark Haywood, Alejandro Goldston (Volcano Vista, ABQ, NM), Carlos Salcido, and Tanner Battikha had struggled at times during the outdoor season, but were well prepped for the MWC meet. The group had a best mark of 41.52 which was ranked fifth in the conference. Mark got out very well and had a conservative hand-off to Alejandro. Alejandro ran the backstretch well and had a nice smooth baton exchange with Carlos. Carlos roared around the corner, and as the picture shows got a decent hand-off with Tanner. Tanner brought the baton across the finish line in a seasonal-best time of 41.40 which ended up fourth. The lads did a nice job of earning five points for the team.



4x400 Relay Races to Fourth Place Finish

The longer relay of Mark Haywood, Cheyne Dorsey, Carlos Salcido, and Mustafa Mudada combined for a 3:11.73 clocking. Mark led off with a 47.7 split, then gave the baton to Cheyne who toured the track in 48.2. Carlos being very aggressive charged around the track to a 46.7 split, handing off to Mustafa to finish the days work. Mustafa shown gritting his teeth worked the track to a 48.4.

Kieran had a seasonal best of 4:25.23. Below is Ally Mady who launched a nice PR in the Shot Put. Ally came into the meet with an all-time outdoor best of 44' 8 3/4" and on her second throw hit 44' 11", which makes her the #7 longest thrower in Loboland.

WHAT DO ALL THE SYMBOLS MEAN????? In parentheses after a performance will be a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. This indicates the COLLEGIATE place in the meet that athlete finished. All unattached or professional athletes are removed since we are most

focused on NCAA competition. After that may be two numbers like (2,8). This stands for how the athlete ranks on the All Time Top Ten Outdoor Track & Field PERFORMER and PERFORMANCE list. The number on the LEFT indicates how that athlete is ranked as far as individual PERFORMERS are concerned. The #2 would tell us that performer (athlete) is the second-best in New Mexico outdoor track & field history in that event. The number on the RIGHT indicates how that performance is ranked in relation to all the top performances in New Mexico history in that event. The year was 1955 and the Lobo men's track & field team had a full schedule on tap for the month of May. The AAU Championship (Amateur Athletic Union) was first on the agenda. The AAU was founded in the 1880's with the goal of creating championships with common standards of play. Regional championships led to national championships during the summer months. The AAU was the main organization in international competition for track & field for almost 100 years. During the 1970's United States athletes rebelled against the restrictive policies of the AAU and their unwillingness to allow athletes to accept prize money or sponsorships. The athletes were led by outspoken Steve Prefontaine and finally in the late 1970's Congress inacted the Amateur Sports Act which effectively diminished the AAU's power over athletes. In the 1955 regional AAU meet the Lobos rolled to the championship. Brothers Bobby and Oliver Lee (Alamogordo, NM) were the standouts on the team with Bobby running the sprints and doing the jumps, while Oliver ran both the high and low hurdle events. Middle distance ace Jimmy Brooks also was a main contributor to the team. Following the regional AAU victory, the team moved on to the Eastern Skyline Championship. The Skyline Conference held two quadrangular meets the week prior to the full conference championship. The Lobos competed against Colorado Agriculture and Mechanical College (now Colorado State), Wyoming, and Denver. The Western Skyline was comprised of BYU, Utah State, Utah, and Montana. The Eastern meet was hosted by Denver and the Lobos ran away with the title, scoring in all 15 events. The Lee brothers took four first places along with scoring in other events. The present day practice of specialization wasn't prevalent in those days and it was not uncommon to find distance runners who threw the Javelin, or sprinters who threw the Shot Put. The Lobo team of 20 men took seven first places. Stan Bazant finished an important second in the Shot Put and pressed the eventual winner from Denver to a new conference record. Wayne Tucker (Texico, NM) took runner-up in the Long Jump while Dave Lindner (Roy, NM) won the Javelin with Oliver Lee finishing fourth. Louis Gonzales was the only placer in the one mile race as he finished fourth. Tucker came back to finish in second place in the 440 yard dash, one place ahead of Harrison Smith (Gallup, NM). Bobby Lee ran 10.1 to win the 100 yard dash with teammate Lynn Parker right behind in second. Oliver Lee won the 110 yard High Hurdles in 15.0. Jimmy Brooks led all 880 yard runners with his 1:57.4 victory. In the 220 yard dash Lee and Parker duplicated what they did in the 100 yard race with Lee finishing in 22.0. In the 220 yard low hurdles Oliver Lee took the victory in 24.0. Pole Vaulter Chester Norris tied for the conference title with his 13' 0" clearance.

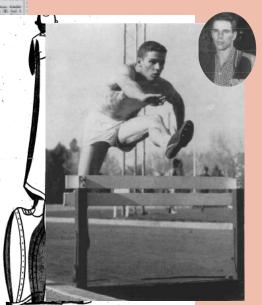
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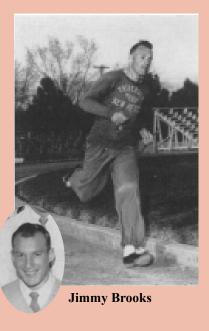

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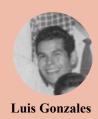

NCAA West First-Round Qualifying Meet
Thursday May 25 - Saturday, May 27, 2017
University of Texas, Austin, Texas

The 2017 NCAA First-Round West Regional Qualifying competition was held in sweltering, uncomfortable Austin, Texas weather conditions. One local weatherman stated, "it was going to be more like a July 4th weekend, than a Memorial Day one" and he wasn't kidding. The three day meet was treated to heat indexes of 99, 104, and 105 and the track facility radiated heat. For some of the longer distance races the conditions were borderline dangerous, and in the 10,000 meters three athletes crumpled to the ground as their core temperatures skyrocketed. Needless to say it was a challenge for many. The first round West competition has 48 athletes in each event, and through a process of advancement, 12 athletes in each of those events will head to the NCAA finals in Eugene, Oregon to match up with 12 athletes from the East region. Now its its 7th year of this qualifying format, the 2017 competition from the West was superb. In the sprint, hurdle, jump, and throw events, it was the hardest ever to advance to the finals while the heat destroyed any hope the distance races would be fast. For the Lobos, the team was able to advance four athletes on to Oregon, while six others ended their 2017 campaign. Two Lobo athletes, Josh Kerr and Alice Wright won their respective events (1500 meters and 10,000 meters). On Thursday, froshie Tanner Battikha (San Diego, CA) (pictured to the right) took to the track as the first Lobo to compete in the Long Jump. In the first-round competition, all athletes in the field events only get three attempts, so hitting ones mark right off the bat important. Tanner had gotten his qualifying jump of 24' 9 3/4" right on the same Texas track during the Longhorn Invitational in April. On his first leap he spanned 23' 8 1/4" which was a good, solid opening leap. On his second he didn't get the take-off he wanted and settled for a 23' 3/4" jump. So on his last attempt he had to





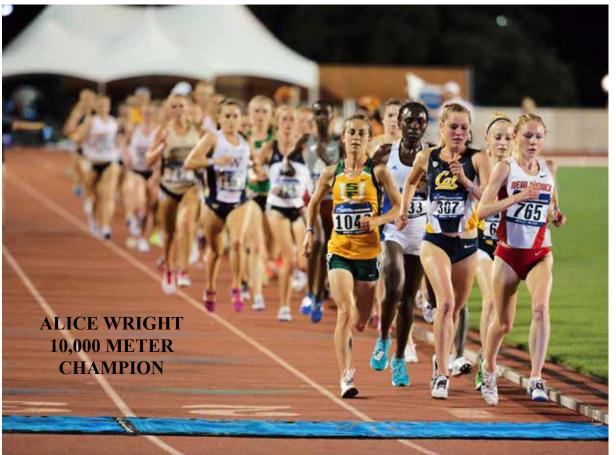


go for it as most thought it would take almost 25' to make the final 12, and unfortunately he fouled, leaving him in 41st place overall. Tanner had a great froshie year and should look forward to a fine sophomore season. That was the only field event on the docket for Thursday while both 1500 meters had prelims, and the 10,000 meters had a final. In the men's 1500 meters both Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) and Emil Danielsson (Dala-Jarna, Sweden) were trying to get in the top 24, to advance to Saturdays quarter-final. Rarely in prelim races at the NCAA First-Round qualifying are they fast, and most often they become jogging-fests for the first 1200 meters, and then an all-out crazy sprint to the finish, and that is exactly what happened. The 48 competitors were divided into four sections of 12, with the top five in each section and the next four fastest times moving on to the Saturday quarterfinal. Josh, racing in the second section was content to just ease along and the 12 athletes were tightly bunched as they toured the track. As the race wound down the pace started to pick up, and with 300 left the leg turnover was increasing, and the racing got much

more serious. Josh, with the top time in all of the NCAA, and holder of great finishing speed, looked comfortable and confident the entire time, and down the homestretch just accelerated like no one else could, and he won the section in 3:51.70. Emil, running in the third section had more of a challenge as he entered the meet with the 43rd best performance. As should happen with each succeeding section, the athletes watch was just happened in the preceding section, and know what they have to run to be one of the four "time qualifiers" so the third section went out slightly faster than Josh's section. Emil did a nice job



of putting himself into a good position throughout the race and as the race got to the 1200 meter point, he felt he needed to throw in a hard surge to move up into third place, but with the intense heat the surge cost him dearly, as he ran away from a chase pack behind him, but with 150 meters to go lost his energy and the chase pack caught him. Around the final turn Emil was fighting hard, and thankfully he could maintain just enough momentum, and get to the finish line in 8th place with a 3:52.57. Now, he had to wait for the final section to race given he had the fourth and final "time qualifier" and if the sixth place finisher in section four ran faster than 3:52.57 he would be eliminated. Strangely, the fourth section did not go out fast enough, and the sixth place finisher ran 3:57.06 and Emil advanced to the quarter-finals!!! Junior Kieran Casey (Indianapolis, IN) (pictured above) came into the meet ranked 41st in the 1500 meters and was scheduled to run in the third of four sections, with the same qualifying method as the men had. The first section was very fast ending up

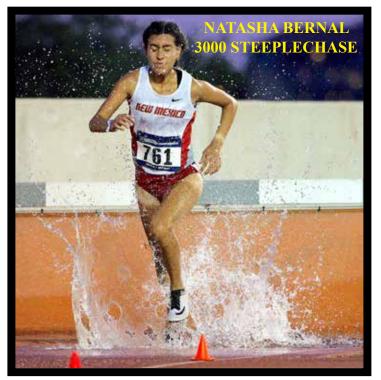


as the fastest of all four, and put every other section on notice. By the time it got to the third section it was clear that one pretty much had to finish in the top five auto qualifiers to advance. Kieran ran a good hard race, and fought like crazy in the last 200 meters but her final time of 4:32.63 ended

up seventh in her section and she didn't advance. But she did end up 32nd overall which was a nice improvement on her entry ranking. At 9:00pm, in the final race of the evening, junior Alice Wright (Worcester, England) was trying to advance to her third NCAA Championship in outdoor track. Already the most decorated Lobo athlete in history with three NCAA Cross Country appearances, and two NCAA Indoor Track & Field Championship appearances. Alice was up against 47 others as every one of the 48 athletes was placed on the track at the same time. Alice came in as the second ranked athlete, so the strategy was to just go with the flow and make sure to always be in the top ten. The race began and as expected the entire race clumped together and ran 81 seconds, then 85, 84, and 85 to get to the 1600 meters mark (nine meters shy of one mile) in 5:36ish. From the front of the race to the back of the race was about two seconds, so 48 athletes were trying to get into that two seconds. Alice was content to run near the front, but not at the front. Through the second four laps Alice moved easily to the front, running 82, 85, 83, 83 for a 11:09 through 3200 meters. She then led the race through 5000 meters in roughly 17:10 with five others in tow, a California Golden Bear, San Franciso Don, Missouri Tiger, Kansas Jayhawk, and UTEP Miner. The lead pack of six runners had pulled away and were clearly defined as they had about a five second space to the next pack. By 6000 meters it stayed the same with Alice at the front running 81 or 82 second laps. Once the race got to 7000 meters there were only four at the front pack as the Don and the Miner had fallen off. Alice went on to lead the rest of the race and cross the finish line not pressed in 34:06.78. Friday night found the two 3000 meter Steeplechases in action with sophomore Natasha Bernal (La Cueva, ABO, NM) and senior Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) (pictured below) in the field. In the womens 3000 Natasha came in ranked 20th with her seasonal best of 10:15.90. The field was divided into three sections of 16 with the top three in



each section auto qualifying, and then the next three fastest times. Natasha, racing in the first section knew it would be fast as top national athlete Allie Ostrander from Boise State was in the her race. The race did turn out quick and Natasha did a good job to finish seventh in 10:41.64. That ended up ranking 21st when all the races were done. Last year Graham came into the First-Round qualifying meet with a seasonal best of 8:48 which ranked 19th. He was not able to advance to the NCAA finals finishing 16th. This year he came in ranked 25th with his seasonal best of 8:54.29, but with a much higher confidence level. As with the women, the races were divided into three sections of sixteen, and Graham was scheduled to run in the final race. That meant he could watch, and see what the non-auto times would be. After the first two sections were completed the third non-auto time was 8:57.29, so that meant if Graham finished in the top four and ran 8:57.28 he would advance to the NCAA finals. The section Graham was in would most definitely be fast as the West leader from Gonzaga, who had run 8:39 during the regular season was in the field. It was a strong, steady pace from the beginning, and



Graham was content to stay in the pack that was leading the race. He looked smooth and comfortable and not stressed at all. As the race got to the halfway point, Graham had done exactly as he needed, and was in good position. With two laps to go, it started to get interesting, but Graham took control of his own race, and surged into the top five, with two athletes far in front (Gonzaga and Oklahoma), and two others on his heels. As the race got to the finish line with one lap to go Graham put the hammer down, and increased his tempo to pull away from one of the guys from BYU who was on his heels, and drag the Minnesota Golden Gopher with him. Up the backstretch Graham pressed hard and made the Minnesota athlete all off. Around the bend and over the water jump Graham was not going

to be denied and he barreled over the final barrier on the homestretch and jetted to the finish line, crossing in an auto qualifying third spot. Graham Thomas, originally a walk-on had just qualified to the NCAA's! Now that is a good story. Saturday had three events for the Lobos, both Triple Jumps, and the quarter-final of the 1500 meters. The men's Triple Jump was first on the ledger, and senior **Sam Trigg (Plymouth, England)** (pictured below) was the only Lobo contestant. The 48 men were divided into four sections of 12 athletes.



The lowest 24 ranked athletes jumped in two side by side pits, then the top 24 did the same once that process was complete. Sam, based on his 10th place ranking coming in (52' 10 3/4"w) was seeded into the top section, so he would be iumping against the best in the field. After the first two flights were done, 51' 11 1/4" was the best overall jump of the day so every athlete in the final two flights knew they would have to jump farther than that. On Sam's first attempt he

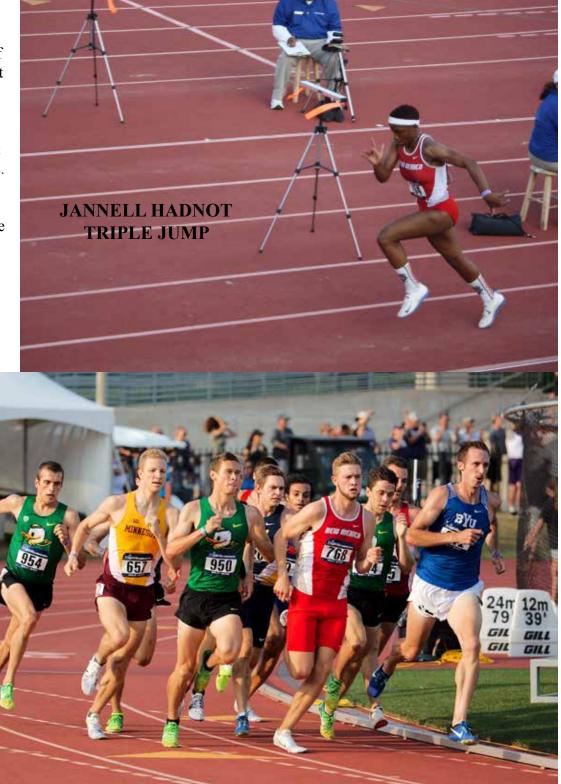
didn't get the drive he wanted, and he ended up with a 51' 1 ½", certainly not a distance that would get him to the NCAA. So on his second attempt, he got very aggressive down the runway, and boomed out to a massive 53' 9" PR effort with a legal +1.9 tailwind which moved him up to third place. He finished off his three attempts with a 51' 9 ¾" but would be moving on to Eugene, Oregon. Sam's massive PR extended his Lobo all-time legal (2.0mps tailwind or less) best by over 1 FOOT!!!! Holy cow. Right now, according to the IAAF Sam's jump is the 48th best in the World. And presently, in Sam's native England he is ranked #4,

behind Nathan Fox with a 55' 2", Ben Williams with a 54' 11 ¼", and Nonso Okolo with a 53' 11 ¾". Sam moves up the All-Time Lobo ranking list to #3 behind former All Americans Dwayne Rudd and Floyd Ross. It is the fifth longest legal leap in Lobo history behind three by Rudd and one by Ross. In the women's Triple Jump senior Jannell Hadnot (Oakland, CA) also entered the competition ranked #10 with her sea-



sonal best distance of a windy (+3.2mps) 43' 5". For the last two years it took approximately 42' 0" to make the top twelve and move on, but this years pool of athletes was loaded. As Sam had experienced Jannell was seeded into the best group of jumpers. From the first two flights of the competition the top leap had been 42' 1". On her first jump Jannell extended out to 42' 5 1/4" which was fine, but based on how everyone was jumping around her concerning. Lots of athletes were coming up with huge jumps, seasonal-best type leaps. After all the first round efforts were tallied Jannell was eighth overall. Then in round two Jannell came down and seemed to hit the board and be off for a big jump, but uncharacteristically lost her balance mid-flight and had to bail out of the jump. After the second round was completed Jannell had fallen to 14th place overall. Always a good final attempt jumper Jannell had one more attempt to jump over 43'. She came down and just didn't get the position she wanted and had to settle for a 42' 6 ³/₄" which ended up 16th. To make the top 12 this year was an amazing 42' 11" which is by far the longest it has ever taken. The final event for the Lobos was the quarter-final of the men's 1500 meters. The 24 men were divided into two sections, and the top five in each section, plus the next two fastest times would advance to Oregon. Josh, running in the first section knew there would be

a lot of pushing and shoving so he tried to stay out of the mix, running to the outside of the pack. The group just moved along, and everyone could tell it was going to be another in the series of great last 300 or 400 meter sprints. As the runners came down the homestretch for the bell lap they were clustered together and one could see the tempo slowly, but steadily increasing (pictured above). Once they crossed the line for one more oval, it started, the



rapidly escalating pace and by the time the group got to the backstretch it was a full on charge. Josh was at the front but was closely surrounded by athletes, and as he entered the final turn he was in full flight. Coming down the homestretch (picture on next page) he showed everyone his power and he made sure looking quickly right and left that he was slightly ahead. Josh came across the finish line first in 4:00.07. Emil, racing in the second section just couldn't replicate his race from Thursday, and ended up in 4:14.47, not qualifying on to Oregon.



WHAT DO ALL THE SYMBOLS MEAN????? In parentheses after a performance will be a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. This indicates the COLLEGIATE place in the meet that athlete finished. All unattached or professional athletes are removed since we are most

focused on NCAA competition. After that may be two numbers like (2,8). This stands for how the athlete ranks on the All Time Top Ten Outdoor Track & Field PERFORMER and PERFORMANCE list. A Look Back In Lobo Track & Field History The Year: 1985

It was a loooong four days in May. From Friday, May 10 through Saturday, May 11, 1985 the High Country Athletic Conference staged their championship on the brand new outdoor track in the Great Friends of New Mexico Track & Field facility. The HCAC was comprised of New Mexico, BYU, Northern Arizona, Utah, Colorado State, Wyoming, and Utah State, The HCAC was formed in 1983 and stayed together until 1990. Five of the eight years the Lobos finished second in the conference, but it was the crazy 1985 season that was the most fascinating. For those that have been raised in the state of New Mexico, or attended UNM the rivalry with BYU has a long history of bitterness. Where that feeling started who knows, but people and alums do not like losing to BYU of all teams. The Lobos, in finishing second five times always were beaten to the punch by BYU, so the talented and motivated team of 1985 felt it was finally their day to shine, and win the conference title. For two days the Cougars and Lobos slugged it out, with the Lobos winning five events, while the Cougars won five also. It was an evenly matched competition between the two teams, and Northern Arizona was a distant third in the team scoring. The excitement began as the meet came down to the final event, the 4x400 Relay. New Mexico had 156 points, and BYU had 160 and the race went according to plan with the talented foursome of the Lobos leading the race. In the final straightaway as UNM was leading, BYO's anchor leg made a furious rally from way back and leaned hard at the finish line to snatch the victory from the Lobos. That made the final score RYII 170 UNM 164. But as the RYII anchor leg crossed the finish line, she hurled the baton to the ground in a demonstrative manner. NCAA rules are very clear in that if the anchor leg of a relay throws the baton it is an unsportsmanlike act and the penalty is disqualification. A protest was lodged, the games committee discussed, and they decided to not DQ the BYU relay team. Case closed and BYU wins another team title. Head women's coach Mike MacEachen was honored by the HCAC as "Coach of the Year" but it was bittersweet. But here is where the second chapter of the story begins. After the meet was concluded and the UNM staff was looking at the results they noticed a discrepancy in the scoring. It seemed that a Northern Arizona 1500 meter runner, who finished third, had mistakenly been identified as a BYU runner and the judges recorded the third place finish, and the corresponding six points to BYU. Once this mistake was found, it was turned over to the HCAC Commissioner, and she ruled that yes, in fact, the points should have been awarded to NAU and not BYU. Once those six points were awarded to NAU it reduced BYU's total to 164, the same as UNM. But as soon as the HCAC Commissioner made her ruling, BYU filed a protest claiming that a Lobo runner had been given fifth place, when she had finished sixth. That protest was dismissed given there was no proof that actually happened.....maybe it was just BYU's imagination! So UNM and BYU were honored as co-champions of the 1985 outdoor meet.

KERR WINS NCAA 1500 METER TITLE

First Lobo Man in 50 Years to Win NCAA Outdoor Crown NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championship Wednesday, June 7 - Saturday, June 10, 2017 University of Oregon Eugene, Oregon

"Historic Hayward Field"

On June 17, 1967 in Provo, Utah the NCAA Championship was hosted by BYU. Lobo junior Art Baxter from Raton, New Mexico sailed 52' 4 1/4" on his second round Triple Jump to outdistance the competition by over one foot to capture the NCAA championship. Who knew at that time he would be the last Lobo man for five decades to stand on the top of the podium during the outdoor championship.

Sophomore Josh Kerr (Edinburgh, Scotland) had shocked the track community in March when he beat the most decorated distance runner in collegiate history to run away with the NCAA One Mile at Texas A&M. Following that championship Josh no longer was an unknown, and he was faced with being labeled "the favorite" to win the outdoor NCAA 1500 meter crown. But true to the Lobo track program philosophy, Josh went back to training in preparation for racing well during the outdoor season. In his first race following the NCAA Indoor Championships Josh ripped off a marvelous 3:35.99 at the Bryan Clay Invitational in April, which was the sixth fastest time in collegiate history. From that point, he simply continued to train in the strength based distance program set up by Coach Franklin. Leading up to the NCAA First-Round and National Championships there was much chatter about Josh, and his chances of earning a second NCAA crown.

The problem with that discussion was that in the 52 years since the NCAA began the indoor championship (1965) only ten times had an athlete been able to win the indoor mile, and then come back three months later, and win the outdoor 1500 meters. It's just not that easy to do as there are so many fine runners! And of the athletes who did achieve the indoor/outdoor crown just look at their resumes. In 1967 world record holder Jim Ryun from Kansas did it, then in 1971 Marty Liquori from Villanova, who was an Olympian did it. Then two years later, in 1973 Olympic Gold Medalist Dave Wottle from Bowling Green State University accomplished it. Four years later in 1975 Eamon Coghlan from Villanova, who was a three time Olympian did it. In 1977 Wilson Waigwa from UTEP who was an Olympian did it, then in 1988 Joe Falcon from Arkansas who later won the Oslo Dream Mile did it. In 1995 Kevin Sullivan running for Michigan, and a two-time Olympian did it, then in 2000 US Olympian Gabe Jennings from Stanford did it as well. Only in 2001 did Bryan Berryhill running for Colorado State accomplish it and not be an Olympian. Finally, the last time it happened was by US Olympian Leo Manzano in 2008. So yes, runners before Josh had been able to win both, but it wasn't like it was something to be expected.

PRELIMINARY RACE:

Josh, running in the second of two prelims had to simply finish in the top five to advance to the finals two days later. After the starters gun he comfortably slipped into second place behind a Virginia Tech Hokie, and the leader brought the race through 44.2 for the first 300 meters. Nothing significant happened and the leader ran the next lap in 63.5 with Josh still right there off his shoulder. So much of prelim races is just trying to stay out of the pushing, shoving, and heel clipping which occurs. The next lap was run in a much-improved 61.2 and at the bell lap Josh quickly moved to the front of the race. After he passed 1200

meters a Michigan State Spartan moved up and tried to pass for the lead, but Josh rebuffed him and increased his tempo. Around the final turn Josh led (see picture above), and as everyone got to the homestretch the craziness began. The line of athletes across the track was impressive, but Josh simply looked to his right several times, opened up his stride slightly, and pulled away from the group to cross the finish line first in 3:44.60, running his final lap in 55.3.

FINALS: In the final the 12 men got a comfortable start under a very light rain, and Josh settled into the middle of the field as the leader from Virginia Tech brought the race through 46 seconds for the first 300, then 61.3 for the first lap. The guys were very compact as they were touching each other in a small group. Slowly, Josh moved up and by the time the race hit two laps to go, Josh was in the front on the rail as he had run the previous lap in 59.9. But just as quickly as he had moved to the lead, a Colora-



do Buffalo spurted out and increased the tempo taking the lead. That quickly strung out the field, and one could see the tempo and stride pattern increasing. As the runners came down the homestretch for the bell lap an Oklahoma State Cowboy had joined alongside the Buffalo. Josh was content to stay right behind, and the group of athletes behind the leaders re-engaged as one big group, all getting ready for the flurry that would follow. At the bell Josh moved off the railing and started to move up to the right shoulder of the Cowboy to make

sure he had a clean running path up the backstretch. With 300 meters to go, Josh was now up to a clear second place one stride off the Cowboy in bright orange. Sensing runners coming up right behind him, at 200 meters Josh threw down the gauntlet, and let it go, and the race was in full flight. With 150 meters to go the other top runner in the field from Ole Miss was right on Josh's heels, as he prepped to take down the Lobo. As the runners hit the homestretch a Michigan State Spartan joined the party and Josh, the Rebel, and Spartan were going man to man. All three were gritting their teeth and with about 75 meters to go, the Rebel had just about gotten up to Josh's right shoulder. But sensing the Rebel was too close Josh put the hammer down, and showed his incredible power, hitting big strides during the last 50 meters of the race. Josh ended up winning by about five meters as the Spartan outleaned the Rebel for second. Josh's final time was 3:43.03 and he covered the final lap of Hayward Field in 54.05.

Wright Shows She is the Pre-eminent Long Distance Runner in 10,000 Meters

Three Straight Years of All American Status in 25 Lap Extravaganzas

Junior Alice Wright (Worcester, England) came to Hayward Field for the first time in 2015 and proceeded to finish 8th in the 10,000 meters when she clocked 33:41.86. For 8400 meters of that 10,000 meter race she was at the front, battling it out with nine other athletes. It was only over the final one mile did some of the older, more experienced runners pull away from her, but she was always a factor in the race. Then last year right back at Hayward Field Alice decided she was not going to let the race be easy, and was going to make it an honest, hard paced event. Right from the gun she went to the lead, and for 20 of the 25 laps she pounded the pace, leading all 23 athletes. It wasn't until past five miles of the race that 2016 South African Olympian; Dominique Scott from Arkansas burst past her and went on to win the race. Alice finished second in (32:46.99) after an excit-



ing homestretch sprint race with two other athletes that brought the crowd to its feet. This year for the third year in a row racing the championship at Hayward Field Alice hoped someone would be willing to take the pace out, and make the race honest. There is the tendency in distance running, which is sometimes on display during NCAA Championships to run comfortably, and not push hard, then race hard over the last little bit of the event. Alice, a true competitor in every sense does not believe that is the way to honor the event, that athletes should press and push hard to see how

fast they can run, and reach down inside to maximize their abilities. That is the true spirit of racing. Thankfully, a Notre Dame Fighting Irish runner, who was the top seeded athlete, and the only runner in the field who had run under 32:00 this outdoor season decided to get out and run pretty hard. She took the group through 5:12 and 10:30 splits for the first two miles. Just before three miles (picture below) Alice felt the pace slightly decelerating, so she slipped into the lead and continued to press the pace. In 2016



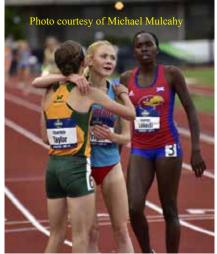
Alice had come through three miles in 15:53, while this year she brought the group through in 15:50. After the three-mile mark Alice clipped off laps of 78, 76, 78, 77 (a 5:09 mile) and only three other athletes were still with her, a San Francisco Don, a Kansas Jayhawk, and a Montana State Bobcat. That is what racing is really about, laying ones heart and soul out in the middle of a race and seeing where it takes you. At four miles Alice's total time was 21:00. She followed up through the five-mile point with four laps of 79 seconds that got her to 8000 meters (about five miles) in 26:17. Now the race was down to three, as the Bobcat couldn't maintain that pace. The Don and Jayhawk were stalking Alice, running right behind her, trying to take advantage of any wind resistance break. Alice kept racing hard going with laps of 79, 78, and 78 and then the Don and Jayhawk went past her and she slipped in right behind them. With 800 meters to go it was anyone's race.



Alice lowered her lap to 78 but the Don went to a 77. In the last lap (as the above picture shows) the San Francisco athlete ran a hard 68-second lap while Alice threw down a 71.7, and the Jayhawk couldn't respond. Alice came across in second place with a 32:42.64 and for the third year in a row earned All American honors.

ALICE WRIGHT - ONE OF THE BEST ALL TIME IN NCAA

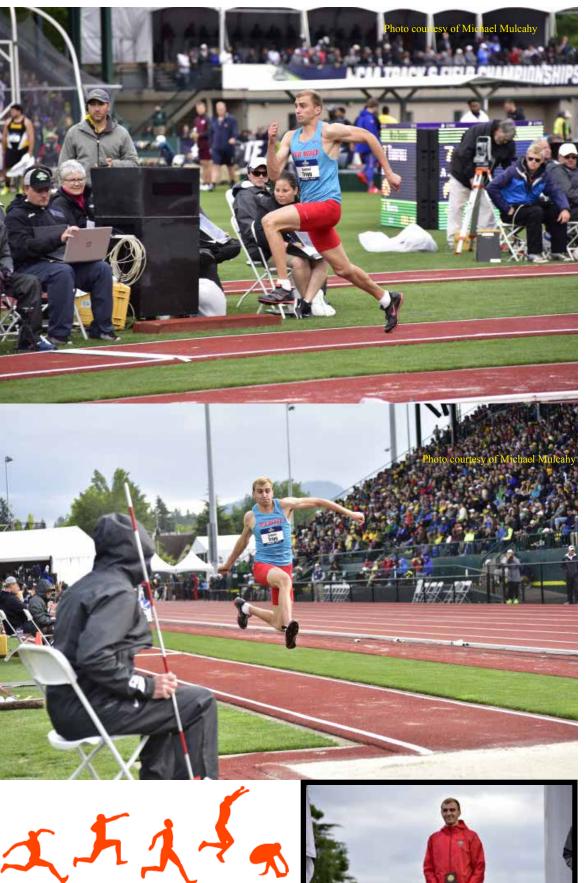
The NCAA began offering championships for women in 1982, and in the last 35 years literally thousands and thousands of young women have attempted to qualify for the NCAA Championship 10,000. Of those thousands, there have been about 700 who actually made the qualification standard, and got a chance to compete. Of that number there have only been 280 who earned a top eight place and All American status. Of those 280 places there have been 51 women athletes who placed in the top eight (earning All American) on two occasions during their career in the 10K which is a wonderful accomplishment! And then in the last 35 years there have only been 9 women who placed three times......with Alice Wright one of them. This is a magnificent accomplishment for the Lobo junior. And just think even thought its way to early to start thinking about 2018......with Alice having one more year of UNM eligibility, if she were somehow to be in a position to place at the NCAA meet next year she would become the ONLY woman in NCAA history to place four times in the 10,000!!! Stop and think about that statement......the ONLY one!!! Wow. There is no way that anyone can say that Alice Wright is not one of the premier long distance track runners in NCAA history!

Trigg Comes Up Big at the Right Time

Senior **Sam Trigg (Plymouth, England)** ended the NCAA regular season with a #19 national ranking in the Triple Jump, and a seasonal-best of 52′ 10 ¾". But at the NCAA First-Round Qualifying competition in Austin, Texas Sam had really put the pieces of the event together as jumps coach Jade Ellis had predicted, and boomed a 53′ 9" leap with a legal tailwind which easily advanced him to the NCAA finals. That distance also moved him up to #5 in the UK which is a nice honor for Sam. That 53′ 9" leap also meant Sam had the #3 best legal jump of anyone in the competition coming into the NCAA finals. On Friday at 5:40pm when the event was scheduled to be held, it was cool, overcast, and some light rain coming down. It was definitely not great jumping weather, but the 24 men simply got ready to do their best. In Round 1 there were four fouls, and lots of problems getting on the take-off board mostly due to the weather. Sam came down and hit a good, solid 51′ 8 ¼" which after all athletes competed was fifth at the end of round one. In Round 2 there were five more men who fouled, but Sam improved to 52′ 1 ¼", still that moved him down to 8th place overall when everyone

was done with that round. In Round 3 Sam finished off the prelims with a 51' 5" distance, and made the top nine, which meant he got three additional jumps.

FINALS: As Sam started the finals he knew to earn All American honors (top eight) he would have to jump at least 52' 4 3/4" (15.97m) as the current eighth place athlete had done that in round one. On Sam's first jump in the finals he came down with great speed (as the top picture to the left shows), got excellent push-off the board, had a great second phase (as the bottom picture shows), and sailed into the sand at.....15.97m! Interesting! But when there is a tie, the NCAA rules state the officials look at the second best jump of both athletes, and Sam had the superior second jump, so he moved into eighth place. With the weather being difficult, only one of the nine athletes competing in the finals could improve on their previous best prelim distance and Sam did not jump farther. When the last athlete came down in the sand, Sam knew he had finished eighth, earning a coveted All American slot. Nicely done.



A Long, Long Journey from Dulce, New Mexico to Eugene, Oregon

Senior Graham Thomas (Dulce, NM) came out of the small, census-designated place in Rio Arriba County with a population of about 2500 residents. It is the largest community and tribal headquarters of the Jicarilla Apache Reservation and sits in northern New Mexico near the Colorado border. The local school is comprised of only 650 students in grades K-12. From Dulce to Eugene is 1277 miles and if one wanted to drive the route most likely you would go up through Utah, through Salt Lake City, Ogden, and Logan, Utah, before entering Idaho. You would then turn left at Twin Falls, going west, and head straight through Boise, Idaho. Once you make it through Boise, you enter





Oregon, and you would drive west right across the state, passing Bend, Oregon, and get to Eugene. Most likely it would take about 22 hours of actual driving to make it.

It only took Graham five years of hard work to make it. Five years ago Graham only wanted a chance to try-out for the Lobo distance squad, and each year he slowly progressed, getting better and better. In many respects the journey that Graham has been on is one of a wonderful story of belief and dedication to ones craft. Two weeks ago in Austin, Texas Graham came up with his finest collegiate race, and he finished third in the 3000 meter Steeplechase, and got an NCAA bid to race at Historic Hayward Field, on the same track as legendary Oregon distance runner Steve Prefontaine. Graham would stand on the starting line, hear his name introduced with the finest runners in the land. In the prelims of the steeple, there were 24 athletes with the top 12 advancing to the finals. As one can see from the picture of Grahams left leg, there was blood gushing down his leg during the race. While Graham is never one to complain, he was affected by the pushing, shoving, bumping......and oh yeah, the spikes that were stuck in his leg. Unfortunately, Graham could not summon the spirits to come up with one last fast time and he did not qualify for the final, finishing in 9:01.75. It took 8:43.64 to make the final, and Grahams all-time collegiate best was 8:48.07 so it would have taken something unique. After all the results were compiled Graham finished 20th in the country. Lets say that one more time......20th in the country. Well done.







WHAT DO ALL THE SYMBOLS MEAN????? In parentheses after a performance will be a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, etc. This indicates the COLLEGIATE place in the meet that athlete finished. All unattached or professional athletes are removed since we are most

focused on NCAA competition. After that may be two numbers like (2,8). This stands for how the athlete ranks on the All Time Top Ten Outdoor Track & Field PERFORMER and PERFORMANCE list. The number on the LEFT indicates how that athlete is ranked as far as individual PERFORMERS are concerned. The #2 would tell us that performer (athlete) is the second-best in New Mexico outdoor track & field history in that event. The number on the RIGHT indicates how that performance is ranked in relation to all the top performances in New Mexico history in that event. The #8 would tell us that performance is the 8th best in New Mexico history in that event. It is possible, and even probable that one athlete could have many performances which rank in the top ten during their four year career. An x on the LEFT (x,8) tells us that they have achieved a better performance before, while on x on the RIGHT (8,x) tells us it doesn't make the performance list. PR indicates a PERSONAL RECORD (their best ever in that event). An @ indicates the performance has been altitude adjusted based on the NCAA protocol.
