The Boise State football team will travel to Albuquerque, N.M., for its second-straight road contest of the 2022 season. The Broncos and the Lobos are scheduled to kick off at 7 p.m., MT and the game will air of CBS Sports Network.

This marks the first season the Broncos have played their first two games away from home in over a decade. During the 2011 season, the the Blue and Orange opened its campaign in Atlanta against Georgia (Sept. 3). Then, the team made the trek to Toledo, Ohio, to square off against Toledo (Sept. 16).

THE SERIES

Boise State and New Mexico have met 12 times previously, with the Broncos dominating the Lobos, coming away with 11 victories. In 2021, Boise State shutout New Mexico, 37-0.

BRONCO GAME NOTES

A BRONCO LEADS THE PROGRAM
 Boise State is in its second season with Andy Avalos at the helm of the program. As a Bronco student-athlete, Avalos was a four-year letterwinner, served as team captain, earned a pair of first-team all-conference accolades at linebacker and was a member of the All-Blue Team - a selection of the 30 greatest players in school history, as voted on by the Bronco fanbase, in the 30th anniversary season of the world-famous turf. Avalos initially returned to The Blue in a coaching capacity in 2012 as defensive line coach, took over as linebackers coach in 2014 and was then promoted to defensive coordinator in 2016. After three seasons leading the Bronco defense, Avalos left for Oregon, where the Ducks captured a Rose Bowl victory in his first season and earned a spot in the Fiesta Bowl in his second.

BOWL ELIGIBILITY
 Boise State achieved bowl-eligible status for the 24th-consecutive season in 2021, the third-longest active streak in the country. The Broncos trail only Ohio State (33) and Georgia (25) on the current list.

Entering 2022, Boise State was one of only 13 schools nationally to carry a streak of at least 12-consecutive seasons of reaching bowl eligibility into the season. That list also included the aforementioned schools and Clemson (23), Oklahoma (23), LSU (22), Wisconsin (20), Alabama (18), Oklahoma State (16), Miami, Fla. (14), Texas A&M (13), San Diego State (12) and Toledo (12).

CONFERENCE OPENERS
 Boise State has won 22-straight conference openers spanning the Big West, WAC and Mountain West...Broncos last loss came Oct. 16, 1999 at North Texas as a member of the Big West...Boise State is 11-0 since joining the Mountain West.

This year's game is the earliest by date since Sept. 6, 2014 against Colorado State...game against the Rams was also the second contest of the season...only other Mountain West matchup to occur earlier on the schedule by game number was the season-opener against Utah State in the 2020 COVID-19 shortened season.

Boise State entered its 2022 season receiving votes, but unranked in both the AP and Coaches Poll.

The Broncos have finished the year ranked after opening the season unranked eight times - 2002, 2003, 2004, 2006, 2008, 2014, 2017 and 2019. In two of those seasons, 2006 and 2014, the Broncos capped the year with a victory in the Fiesta Bowl.

SUCCESS WHEN RANKED

Boise State has an all-time record of 119-22 (.844) when ranked in the top 25 of the AP Poll, the Coaches Poll or the College Football Playoff Poll. A complete history of the Broncos in the rankings can be found on pages 30-31.

CONSECUTIVE CLASSES WITH A CHAMPIONSHIP

The Broncos' 2022 senior class is the 24th-straight group that will leave Boise State with at least one conference title. Of the 23 previous senior classes, 19 left with multiple championships, including 11 with three-or-more. This year's seniors helped capture a title in 2019. The last senior class without a league championship was the 1998 group. The streak of 24-straight classes is the longest active streak in the country, and the third-longest in NCAA history. BYU (30; 1975-2004) and Nebraska (28; 1975-2002) boast the longest streaks in NCAA history. Oklahoma's current streak is 23 and is guaranteed a 24th-straight season in 2023.

CHAMPIONSHIP GAMES

Prior to missing out on a Mountain West championship game appearance in 2021, Boise State had made four-consecutive trips to the MW Championship Game, and five such appearances in the nine-year history of the game. The MW moved to its current format in the 2013 season. The Broncos' five appearances are the most in the league, and its four-consecutive appearances from 2017-20 is also a conference record.

MOST MW CHAMPIONSHIPS

Boise State's four conference titles in the Mountain West are the most by a current member of the league, and tied with BYU, Utah and TCU for the most in conference history - despite the Broncos being a member for just 11 of the conference's 23 seasons.

CONFERENCE RECORD

Since 2000, Boise State is a national-best 149-20 (.882) in conference regular-season play. Since joining the FBS in 1996, the Broncos have played in three leagues: the Big West (1996-2000), WAC (2001-10) and Mountain West (2011-Present). Over the campaigns in those three conferences, the Broncos have posted an all-time record of 159-29 (.846).

MW SUCCESS

In its 11 seasons in the Mountain West, Boise State has lost just 16 games against conference opponents, and only five of those losses have come by more than seven points. Additionally, just one of the Broncos' 11 conference foes boasts a winning record over the Broncos (San Diego State; 4-3).

CONFERENCE TITLES

The Broncos currently have 14 league titles since 1996, when it joined the Football Bowl Subdivision, tied with Oklahoma for the most in the country during that time. Ohio State (13) and Florida State (11) are the only other schools in the country to win double-digit conference titles during that time.

The Broncos have won 20 conference championships all-time, including four in the Mountain West, eight in the WAC, two in the Big West and six in the Big Sky.

PRESEASON FAVORITES ONCE AGAIN

For the 12th time in their 12 seasons in the Mountain West, the Broncos found themselves atop the predicted order of finish in a poll of media members that cover the league. The Broncos were predicted to win the Mountain Division in 2022 for the 10th-straight season, and were also predicted to win the league in 2011 and 2012 before the conference moved to a divisional format in 2013.

The Broncos received 14 of 28 first-place votes with a Mountain Division-best total of 151 points. Air Force (136, 10), Utah State (122, 3) and Colorado State (90, 1) each received at least one first-place vote. Wyoming (60, 0), and New Mexico (29, 0) rounded out the predictions.

Fresno State topped the West Division poll, garnering 20 first-place votes and 160 points. San Diego State (148) received the remaining eight votes to win the division followed by San José State (105), Nevada (66), UNLV (58) and Hawai'i (51).

PRESEASON HONORS

Junior kicker Jonah Dalmas, redshirt senior defensive tackle Scott Matlock, sixth-year offensive lineman John Ojukwu and senior safety JL Skinner were each selected to the 2022 Preseason All-Mountain West team.

ROAD WINS

Boise State is one of four schools nationally to post a winning record on the road for each of the last eight seasons. The other are college football royalty in Alabama, Georgia and Ohio State.

The Broncos are 14-1 in their last 15 Mountain West road games.



Mountain West student-athletes who already hold a degree will have a little something extra on their jerseys this season. In conjunction with a program that started in 2019, student-athletes who have earned a degree, but have remaining eligibility will see the MW logo on their jersey replaced with one that incorporates both the MW mark and the word “GRADUATE.”

POSTSEASON AWARDS

Boise State earned a Mountain West Mountain Division-best 13 all-conference honors in 2021. Of those, eight return in 2022, including kicker Jonah Dalmas (first team), offensive lineman John Ojukwu (first team), junior punt returner Stefan Cobbs (second team), offensive lineman Ben Dooley (second team), defensive tackle Scott Matlock (second team), safety JL Skinner (second team), safety (moved to nickel in 2022) Tyreque Jones (honorable mention) and linebacker Ezekiel Noa (honorable mention).

CALL IT THE BLUE ZONE

Boise State’s defense held Oregon State to one touchdown and two field goals in three trips inside the red zone during the 2022 season opener.

Last year, opponents reached the red zone 38 times, but more often than not were coming away with three or nothing. Of the 38 attempts, Boise State opponents scored 30 times, 17 of which were touchdowns. Put another way, in the red zone, Bronco opponents kicked 13 field goals and failed to score eight times – three or nothing on 21 of 38 trips inside the Boise State 20-yard line.

GAMES PLAYED RECORD

Prior to the 2021 season, the most games a Boise State football player could have possibly appeared in was 54.

Last season, nickel Kekaula Kaniho (60), punter Joel Velazquez (56) and linebacker Riley Whimpey (54) reached or surpassed that mark.

This season, offensive lineman John Ojukwu could join the club. He has appeared in 43 games. He has started 38 games, including 30-straight.

THE MIDDLE EIGHT

When Boise State wins the middle eight under Andy Avalos, it wins the game. In the Broncos’ seven wins, during the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half, the team has outscored its opponents, 47-3. In the team’s six losses, the Broncos have been outscored 52-10 in the middle eight.

In the 2022 season opener at Oregon State, the Broncos were outscored 7-3.

SCORING STREAK

Against Colorado State (Oct. 30, 2021), the Broncos moved up the NCAA’s all-time list for consecutive games without being shut out, passing Air Force. Boise State now ranks eighth all-time with a streak of 312-consecutive such games.

The streak ranks behind Florida (423; 1988-present), TCU (367; 1991-present), Michigan (365; 1984-2014), BYU (361; 1975-2003), Virginia Tech (346; 1995-present), Georgia (343; 1995-present) and Nebraska (328; 1996-present).

CAPTAINS

Redshirt senior defensive tackle Scott Matlock and sixth-year senior offensive lineman John Ojukwu were named captains for 2022.

After appearing in two games as a freshman in 2018 and 12 more as a redshirt freshman in 2019, Matlock has started each of the Broncos’ 19 games over the last two seasons. In 2021, he registered a team-leading 8.5 tackles-for-loss, including seven sacks.

Ojukwu has started 38 games in his Boise State career, including 30-straight. He is in position to set a school record for games played by a Bronco offensive lineman.

Both student-athletes are Mountain West Preseason First Team selections and on the Outland Trophy Award Watch List.

ESTABLISHING A LEGACY

The Broncos are the second-winningest football program by percentage in the country since 2000 (231-51; .819), trailing only Ohio State (226-46; .831). Oklahoma (240-53; .819), Alabama (209-65; .763) and Georgia (221-70; .759) round out the top five. For the complete top 15, see page five.

GAME NOTES

OFFENSIVE NOTES

GREEN OFF AND RUNNING

Redshirt freshman quarterback Taylen Green came off the bench in the season opener to rush for 102 yards and two scores on 11 attempts.

He is the first Boise State quarterback to run for 100 or more yards since Grant Hedrick against New Mexico (131), Nov. 8, 2014.

Green scored on a 74-yard dash and a 4-yard carry to become the first Bronco signal caller to have two touchdowns on the ground since Montell Cozart against Wyoming, Oct. 21, 2017.

ASHTON JEANTY DEBUTS

Freshman running back Ashton Jeanty was Boise State's leading receiver against Oregon State with six catches for 52 yards. He averaged 4.0 yards per carry on four attempts and returned one kickoff or 22 yards.

REPLACING KHALIL SHAKIR

Khalil Shakir, drafted by the Buffalo Bills this offseason, led Boise State with 77 catches in 2021. Despite his loss, the Broncos return nine players who caught a pass in 2021. Wide receiver Stefan Cobbs played in nine of Boise State's 12 games last season and is tops among returnees with 34 receptions and five touchdowns.

Cobbs, tight end Tyneil Hopper (two), wide receiver David Koetter (one), tight end Kurt Rafdal (one), tight end Riley Smith (one) and defensive tackle Scott Matlock (one) each caught a touchdown pass last season.

Running back George Holani had receiving touchdowns in 2019 and 2020 as well.

SPREADING THE BALL AROUND

Quarterbacks Hank Bachmeier and Taylen Green combined for 23 completions in the season opener at Oregon State. Of those completions, 10 were to wide receivers, nine to running backs and four to tight ends.

1,000-YARD RUSHERS

Boise State carried a streak of 11-consecutive seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher into the 2020 season, a feat most recently accomplished by George Holani in 2019 (1,014). The 11-straight seasons was the longest active streak in the county, and tied for the second-longest in the history of college football with Texas (11; 1995-2005). Only North Carolina (12; 1973-84) has put together a longer streak in college football history.

OFFENSIVE LINE

Of the Broncos' 95 starts along the offensive line in over the 2020-21 seasons, 57 were made by student-athletes returning for the 2022 season.

Left tackle John Ojukwu has started the last 30 games overall, dating back to 2019. Left guard Garrett Curran all seven games in 2020 and eight last season.

Center Kekaniokoa Holomalia-Gonzalez made six starts in 2020 before sitting out last season with an injury.

Right guard Ben Booley started all 12 games on the right side of the line last season and Will Farrar started five times while playing three different positions.

LONG DRIVES

Boise State put together a pair of 97-yard touchdown drives last season against Colorado State (Oct. 30), matching the total number of 90-plus-yard scoring drives from the team's previous 37 games. Against the Rams, Hank Bachmeier connected with Octavius Evans on a 9-yard pass to cap the first 97-yard drive, and Stefan Cobbs put an exclamation mark on the second with an 11-yard touchdown reception from Bachmeier. The drives each went 13 plays, and took 6:09 and 4:08 off the clock, respectively.

A FAMILIAR NAME

Redshirt senior wide receiver Davis Koetter, a transfer from Portland State, got his first start as a Bronco against Oklahoma State (Sept. 18, 2021). He went on to record his first catch as a Bronco on the squad's first drive, and also caught his first touchdown as a Bronco against the Cowboys.

Davis's father, Dirk, was the Broncos' head coach from 1998-2000, and went on to become head coach at Arizona State (2001-06) before spending 2007-20 in the National Football League as an offensive coordinator (Jacksonville Jaguars, Atlanta Falcons and Tampa Bay Buccaneers) and head coach (Tampa Bay Buccaneers, 2016-18).

BRONCOS IN THE NFL

There are currently 14 Broncos on National Football League rosters (as of Sept. 4), and 11 teams had at least one former member of the Boise State football team on their roster. At least one Bronco has been selected in the NFL Draft in each of the last 13 seasons, and 29 players have been drafted during that time - including nine in the first two rounds.

TIGHT END TOUCHDOWNS

Redshirt junior tight end Tyneil Hopper hauled in a 51-yard touchdown reception against Colorado State last season. The 51-yard reception for a TD was the longest by a Bronco tight end since Jeb Putzier, who was a sixth-round selection in the 2002 NFL Draft by the Denver Broncos, caught an 80-yard scoring pass against San Jose State, Nov. 17, 2001.

Riley Smith caught his first touchdown pass of the season against Wyoming (Nov. 12). It was the second TD grab of his career, and happened one year to the day of his first-career scoring reception, which came against Colorado State on The Blue, Nov. 12, 2020.

Against San Diego State in the regular-season finale (Nov. 26), Kurt Rafdal caught a 20-yard touchdown pass, his first-career scoring reception.

MULTIPLE RECEIVERS

Quarterback Hank Bachmeier connected with 11 different targets against UCF in the Broncos' 2021 season opener. The total was the highest by a Bronco quarterback since Brett Rypien also hit 11 receivers against Nevada, Nov. 4, 2017. Bachmeier then hit 10 different players in Week 2 against UTEP.

Against UCF, Bachmeier's first nine completions went to nine different players.

BIG PERFORMANCES FOR COBBS

Wide receiver Stefan Cobbs returned a punt 81 yards for a score in the first quarter against UTEP (Sept. 10) last season, tied with Avery Williams for sixth-longest return in school history. The return was the first for a score since Williams' 69-yarder against San Jose State in the 2020 Mountain West Championship. Cobbs added a 61-yard receiving touchdown in the second quarter to become the first Bronco since John Hightower (2018 vs. Connecticut) to have two 50-plus yard touchdowns in the same game.

Against Nevada (Oct. 2), Cobbs recorded his first-career 100-yard receiving game, finishing with a career-high 10 catches for 132 yards and a career-best two touchdowns.

THE HAMMER



Boise State selects one player to lead the team onto the field with The Dan Paul Hammer each game. The Hammer was renamed prior to the Hawai'i game, Oct. 12, 2019. Dan Paul, a former fullback from 2009-12, passed away in July of 2019, and symbolized the blue collar culture of the Boise State football team. Traditionally, the honor has gone to the individual that made the best special teams play the week prior. However, the offensive line has been selected in the past, and the entire team entered the field with The Hammer in the MW Championship Games from 2017-20.

DEFENSIVE NOTES

TURNOVER PARTY

With 23 turnovers forced in 12 games last season, the Broncos ranked tied for 21st nationally in the statistical category. The mark includes 10 fumble recoveries (tied for 16th-most in the country) and 13 interceptions (tied for 33rd nationally). The total was also the most by a Bronco defense since 2012 when the team recorded 29 turnovers (14 interceptions and 15 fumble recoveries).

The team's turnover margin (plus-0.67 per game) was 17th nationally.

In the Broncos' 2021 home opener against UTEP (Sept. 10), Boise State forced six turnovers for the first time since also recording six against UT Martin, Sept. 7, 2013. The Broncos intercepted three passes against the Miners, the first such occurrence since Nov. 4, 2017, against Nevada, and picked off multiple passes in consecutive games for the first time since 2019 (at Colorado State/at Utah State).

Boise State also had three fumble recoveries against UTEP, the first such occurrence since Oct. 12, 2019 against Hawai'i. The Broncos followed with another three fumble recoveries against 10th-ranked BYU (Oct. 9).

In the 2022 season opener at Oregon State, the Broncos forced three turnovers. JL Skinner and Caleb Biggers each picked off a pass and Biggers recovered a fumble forced by Ezekiel Noa.

SCORING DEFENSE

The Broncos allowed just 19.0 points per game to opponents last season, ranking 12th nationally.

Boise State did not allow a touchdown in the second half or overtime of six games during the 2021 season.

Additionally, the Broncos held four-straight conference opponents – from Oct. 30-Nov. 20 – to fewer than 20 points for the first time since the 2017 season. Included was a shutout against New Mexico (Nov. 20), the Broncos' first since Oct. 3, 2015 (55-0) against Hawai'i.

DYNAMIC DUO

Defensive linemen Scott Matlock and Isaiah Bagnah each ranked among the top pass rushers in the Mountain West and nationally. Matlock (7.0 sacks; 0.58 per game) and Bagnah (6.0; 0.50) 56th and 89th nationally on a per-game basis, and eighth and 16th in the MW, respectively.

STOPPING ON FOURTH DOWN

In Week 5, Nevada became the first team in 2021 to convert a fourth down against the Bronco defense. Opponents finished 6-for-15 on fourth down, and the Broncos' defensive conversion percentage of .400 ranks tied for 18th nationally.

BECOMING A FORCE

Junior safety JL Skinner had a team-leading 92 tackles (66 solo) in 2021 season, an average of 7.7 per game.

He began the 2022 campaign with 12 tackles at Oregon State.

SACK ATTACK

Since the beginning of the 2010 season, Boise State ranks eighth nationally in sacks. Only Clemson, Alabama, Pittsburgh, Ohio State, Texas A&M, Penn State and Virginia Tech have more sacks during that time than Boise State (408).

EXPERIENCED SECONDARY

Boise State's secondary returns 47 starts from 2021. Leading the way are senior safety JL Skinner and sixth-year nickel (converted from safety) Tyreque Jones, who each started all 12 games a year ago.

Cornerback Caleb Biggers (eight), Kaonohi Kaniho (six), Tyric LeBeauf (five) and Markel Reed (four) each made starts last season.

BREAKOUT SECONDARY PERFORMANCES

Tyric LeBeauf, in his first-career start, registered two interceptions in the Broncos' 2021 season opener at UCF (Sept. 2), and he added his team-leading third against Utah State (Sept. 25). Safety Seyi Oladipo followed LeBeauf's breakout performance with one of his own, registering a pair of interceptions in his first extensive action on defense against UTEP, Sept. 10. For each, their single-game interception total was more than any single player had in all of 2020.

LeBeauf returned his first interception against the Knights 100 yards for a touchdown, and his 127 interception return yards on the game established a school record. His 128 interception return yards on the season are the most in the country in 2021. The 100-yard return for a score tied the Broncos' school record, initially set by Jamar Taylor against Arizona State in the 2011 MAACO Bowl Las Vegas. LeBeauf is the first Bronco to record multiple interceptions in a game since current Los Angeles Ram Donte Deayon did it against BYU, Sept. 12, 2015.

MAKING THE MOST OF THE OPPORTUNITIES

The Broncos returned just 13 punts in 2021, but averaged 15.6 yards per return – the fifth-best mark nationally.

Additionally, thanks to a couple blocks that went for score against New Mexico (Nov. 20), the Broncos' three punt return touchdowns tied with Coastal Carolina for the most in the country.

PHENOMENAL START TO A CAREER

Prior to his fourth-quarter field goal attempt against Oklahoma State being blocked last season, kicker Jonah Dalmas had made two field goals against the Cowboys, pushing his start as a Bronco to 14-for-15. The mark tied Kyle Brotzman (2007-10) and Haden Hoggarth (2017) for best start for a kicker in school history.

Dalmas led the country in field goals per game (2.17) in 2021, and was ninth nationally in scoring (9.7 points per game).

His field goal percentage of .929 (26-of-28) in 2021 was seventh nationally, and second all-time on Boise State's single-season list.

His career field goal percentage of .917 (33-of-36) is the highest nationally amongst active kickers and a Boise State record. The 33 field goals made are ninth all-time in Bronco history.

Dalmas went 4-for-4 on field goal attempts in each of the Broncos' two victories on the road over ranked opponents (BYU, Oct. 9; Fresno State, Nov. 6), and had a streak of having a field goal in 12-straight games snapped against Colorado State (Oct. 30), when he did not attempt one. That was the longest streak by a Bronco since Tyler Rausa's 16-game stretch in 2015-16.

A Lou Groza Award semifinalist, Dalmas has made each of his last 18 field goal attempts, the longest active streak in the country. His 26 field goals in 2021 are the most in school history, and the second-most in Mountain West history.

Dalmas is on the Lou Groza Award Watch List in 2022.

GAME-CHANGING SPECIAL TEAMS

Boise State is one of only three schools nationally (San Diego State and Kansas State) to have a punt return for a touchdown in each of the last five seasons.

Additionally, the Broncos tied for 10th nationally with four blocked kicks in 2021. Redshirt junior defensive tackle Scott Matlock blocked a field goal attempt against Utah State (Sept. 25), redshirt junior linebacker Brandon Hawkins blocked a punt against Colorado State (Oct. 30) and two Broncos – fifth-year senior defensive back Kekaula Kaniho and redshirt sophomore safety Alexander Teubner – blocked punts against New Mexico (Nov. 20). Boise State has blocked a punt in eight-straight seasons.

Against the Lobos, both blocked punts were returned for touchdowns, just the second time the feat has occurred in the school's FBS era (2020 vs. Colorado State). Three blocked punts this season marks the first time since 2010-11 Boise State has recorded multiple blocked punts in back-to-back seasons.

LYLE SMITH



Lyle Smith, the "Father of Boise State Football," head football coach from 1947-67 and Boise State Athletics Director from 1967-81, passed away the morning of July 26, 2017, at the age of 101.

Smith came to Boise Junior College in 1946 as basketball coach and assistant football coach. In 1947, he became head coach of the BJC football program and didn't lose a game until his fourth season.

His 1958 team won the National Junior College championship.

Smith retired from coaching after the 1967 season. In his 20 years as the head football coach at BJC, he compiled a 156-25-6 record, a winning percentage of .850.

Smith continued to lead Boise State as AD until his retirement after the 1980-81 academic year. Smith guided Boise State's transition from a junior college power to a highly-successful NCAA Division I athletic program.

In his honor, a statue was erected at the southwest corner of Albertsons Stadium. He was present for its unveiling prior to the 2016 season.

The Broncos are 16-10 against schools from conferences that comprise the Autonomous Five since the start of the 2006 season.

Since notching its first such victory, a 34-16 win over Iowa State in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the Broncos have gone 18-14. Boise State is 18-26 all-time in such games.

ALBERTSONS STADIUM / THE BLUE



The home of Boise State football has seen many changes. Growing from an original seating capacity of 14,500 and a green AstroTurf field, to a current capacity of 35,944 and the now-famous Blue field.

In 2014, after being known for the past 44 years as Bronco Stadium, one of the great home fields in college football was changed to Albertsons Stadium. The change was made after Albertson's, LLC committed \$12.5 million over 15 years for the naming rights to the stadium.

While the name on the outside of the stadium has changed, the name on the field remains the same. Lyle Smith Field is named after the undisputed "father" of Bronco football. From 1946 through 1967, Lyle Smith built one of the top junior college programs in the country. When he retired from his head coaching position to become the athletic director at Boise State, Smith had produced a record of 156-25-6 (.850).

The current stadium was completed during the summer of 1970 at a cost of \$2.2 million and has expanded four times. The last expansion was completed during the summer of 2012 when permanent steel bleachers were installed in the north and south end zones. Seating in the north end zone was increased to 3,750 while the south was increased to 5,000 at a cost of \$3.1 million.

Prior to the 2008 season, the stadium received its third major expansion with the completion of the Stueckle Sky Center. The four-level, \$35.9 million facility includes loge, club and luxury suite seating, along with a state-of-the-art press box.

The second major expansion came in 1997 when capacity was increased to 30,000 when seating was added in the southwest and southeast corners, construction of the Allen Noble Hall of Fame Gallery and completion of the Larry and Marianne Williams Plaza at a cost of \$10 million.

Albertsons Stadium was first expanded to 20,000 in 1974 when the east side upper deck was added. Portable end zone seating brought the capacity to 22,600 through the 1996 season.

Boise State established a first in 1986 by installing the country's first blue AstroTurf field. The second blue AstroTurf field was installed in 1995, with the third prior to the 2002 season. The first blue FieldTurf surface was installed in 2008. A second blue FieldTurf field was installed prior to the 2010 season, and a third prior to the 2019 season, making a total of six different blue fields at the stadium.

Boise State's was the first collegiate stadium to have the entire field produced in a special color. There were two previous green AstroTurf fields installed at Albertsons Stadium prior to 1986. The first was during the original construction of the current stadium in 1970, with the second installed prior to the 1978 season.

UNIFORM COMBINATIONS



We're so blue collar that our blue collars say "BLUE COLLAR."

Boise State unveiled a new look for the 2017 season, the first time the Broncos had overhauled their Nike uniforms since 2011.

Included in the new slate were blue, orange and white, and the jerseys featured new stripes on the sleeves and "Blue Collar" on the inside of the neck. The Broncos added a black set of uniforms that were unveiled against Air Force, Sept. 20, 2019.

The uniforms are from the Nike Vapor Untouchable line, with stretch woven material, a seamless front and shoulders and laser perforation fabric instead of mesh. The uniforms combine materials and science designed for speed and comfort for the players, based on four core principles - fit, durability, weight and core body temperature.

Andy Avalos is in his second season as the head football coach at Boise State. He is a former Bronco student-athlete, assistant coach and defensive coordinator.

In 2021, Boise State was bowl eligible (7-5) for a 24th-straight season while being ranked 12th nationally in points allowed (19.0 per game) and 17th in turnover margin (+0.67).

Avalos, a team captain and all-conference linebacker during his playing career (2000-04) under head coaches Dirk Koetter and Dan Hawkins, is just the second graduate of Boise State to lead the Broncos' football program (Bryan Harsin). He previously coached at Boise State from 2012-18 under head coaches Chris Petersen and Harsin, ascending to defensive coordinator for the 2016-18 seasons before accepting the same role at Oregon for the 2018-19 seasons under then-head coach Mario Cristobal.

In addition to coaching stops at Boise State (2012-18) and Oregon (2019-20), Avalos also spent time working under Hawkins at Colorado (2006-08), and also at Sacramento State (2011) and at Nebraska-Kearney (2009-10).

The Broncos achieved bowl-eligible status for the 24th-consecutive season in Avalos's head coaching debut, ultimately receiving an invitation to the Barstool Sports Arizona Bowl. Boise State's 24-straight seasons of bowl eligibility is the third-longest streak in the country, trailing only Ohio State (33) and Georgia (25). The Broncos also picked up a pair of road wins over top-25 teams for the first time in school history, and defeated five bowl-eligible teams, tied for the 14th-most in the country during the 2021 regular season.

The Broncos' 13 selections to All-Mountain West Teams were the most among Mountain Division schools in 2021, including first-team honorees Jonah Dalmas (K), John Ojukwu (OL) and Khalil Shakir (WR). Additionally, five student-athletes were named to the NCAA Division I CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team, the most among all schools in District 7, which encompasses Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas.

Shakir and fellow team captain, Kekaula Kaniho, received invitations to the Reese's Senior Bowl and the NFLPA Collegiate Bowl, respectively, slated to take place following the conclusion of the season.

During his five seasons as a defensive coordinator, Avalos established himself as one of college football's premier coordinators. He was named a semifinalist for the Broyles Award, which honors college football's top assistant coach, during his first season at Oregon in 2019.

The Ducks won Pac-12 championships each season with Avalos in charge of the defense, adding to three Mountain West Championships the Broncos captured with Avalos on staff (2012, 2014 and 2017) and two Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference championships while at Nebraska-Kearney (2009-10). As a student-athlete, Avalos won three Western Athletic Conference championships (2002, 2003, 2004) in his four years as a starting linebacker.

In Avalos' two seasons at Oregon, the Ducks earned a victory in the 2020 Rose Bowl and played in the 2021 Fiesta Bowl, a game the Broncos also appeared in during the 2014 season, defeating Arizona (38-30) for Boise State's third victory in the game. With Avalos on staff, Boise State also appeared in the Las Vegas Bowl (2012 and 2017), the Hawai'i Bowl (2013), the Poinsettia Bowl (2015) and the Cactus Bowl (2016), and was selected to play in the First Responder Bowl (2018). While Avalos was playing for the Broncos, Boise State appeared in the 2002 Humanitarian Bowl, the 2003 Fort Worth Bowl and the 2004 Liberty Bowl, a game in which he returned an interception 92 yards for a touchdown.

Avalos has overseen the development of 50 student-athletes that have garnered all-conference honors, and multiple All-Americans, of whom several will be familiar to Bronco Nation - DeMarcus Lawrence, Curtis Weaver and Leighton Vander Esch. Ducks defensive end Kayvon Thibodeaux picked up All-America accolades this past season, in addition to being one of four student-athletes to earn Freshman All-America honors in Avalos' two seasons with Oregon (linebacker Noah Sewell in 2020, and Thibodeaux, defensive back Verone McKinley III and linebacker Mase Funa in 2019). Thibodeaux and Sewell were

named Pac-12 Freshman Defensive Player of the Year in back-to-back seasons (2019-20).

Vander Esch was named MW Defensive Player of the Year for the Broncos in 2017 before declaring early for the National Football League Draft and ultimately being selected in the first round by the Dallas Cowboys. Lawrence and Weaver also opted to forego their final seasons of eligibility with the Broncos, being selected in the second and fifth rounds, respectively.

Oregon led the Pac-12 in sacks over the course of his two seasons as coordinator, and ranked third in the conference in both rush defense and total defense. Oregon finished the 2019 season ninth in the nation in scoring defense, allowing just 16.5 points per game. The Ducks ranked 13th nationally in rushing defense (108.93 yards per game) and 22nd in total defense (329.1 YPG). Avalos' defense disrupted opposing offenses, finishing second in the country in interceptions (20), sixth in passes defended (76), 13th in sacks (41.0) and 21st in tackles-for-loss (97.0).

Prior to joining the Oregon staff, Avalos spent seven seasons coaching at Boise State, including the final three as defensive coordinator. During his time as coordinator the Broncos led the MW in sacks, ranked second in rush defense and third in total defense. While at his alma mater he also served as defensive line coach (2012-13) and linebackers coach (2014-15).

Avalos started his coaching career in his hometown of Corona, Calif., where he coached linebackers at Corona High School. He then spent three seasons as a graduate assistant at Colorado before coaching two seasons at Nebraska-Kearney and one at Sacramento State.

A four-year letterwinner for the Broncos, Avalos earned first-team All-WAC honors at outside linebacker in each of his final two seasons. He completed his career ranked fourth all-time with 355 tackles, and led the Broncos in the statistical category in each of his final three seasons. He was named to the All-Blue Team during the 2016 season, a list of the 30 greatest players at Boise State since the inception of The Blue in 1986.

Avalos and his wife Summer had their first child, a daughter named Paityn, Jan. 31, 2014, and added a second daughter, Paige, April 12, 2016.
