2024 NEWS

- New Mexico Men's and Women's Cross Country head to Madison, Wisc. this week to get a preview of this year's NCAA Championship Course against even more nationally-ranked competition at Wisconsin Pre-Nationals on Saturday.
- After a strong showing at the Cowboy Jamboree that saw the women knock off No. 16 Oklahoma State and the men beat No. 22 Oregon and No. 24 Texas while finishing second behind No. 1 Oklahoma State, both squads will get a significant step up in competition at Zimmer Championship Course. Saturday's "A" races will feature 20 women's teams and 19 women's teams ranked in the most recent USTFCCCA National Polls, with 10

women's teams and five men's teams that received votes last week in the mix.

- Saturday will be the final regular-season racing of the fall for UNM, with Mountain West Championships (Colorado Springs, Colo.) up next on Nov. 1 ahead of NCAA Mountain Regionals (Reno, Nev.) on Nov. 15.
- The Lobo men will be looking to get a better picture of where they stand among the Top 10

nationally this week after passing their first test in Stillwater last month.

- Habtom Samuel will be in the hunt for his first individual win of the fall after finishing as runner-up at the Cowboy Jamboree -- he won an NCAA title in the outdoor 10,000m in June and has racked up four more MW titles and four more All-American trophies since the conclusion of the 2023 XC Season.
- The UNM women had their unprecedented streak of 14 consecutive Mountain West titles snapped with a fourth-place finish at conference championships and narrowly missed out on a team qualification to nationals in 2023, but they're climbing in the polls and could pick up momentum with another big showing.
- Pamela Kosgei put the nation on notice with a blistering runaway win (19:50.0) in Stillwater that won her MW Athlete/ Freshman of the Week honors -- she'll be racing against even better competition this time around and gunning for a course record.

RANKINGS UPDATE

- The UNM men remained at No. 8 their highest preseason rank in history and highest weekly rank since the final poll of the 2010 season - with the women moving up four spots to No. 17 in the nation in last week's USTF-CCCA Coaches' Poll.
- · The reigning Mountain West champions, the UNM men entered the rankings for the first time since 2015 last season, rising as high as No. 13 in the final poll before placing 18th as a team at NCAA Cross Country Championships behind a runner-up individual finish from Mountain Region Athlete of the Year Habtom Samuel.
- · 2024 marks the 11th consecutive season in which the Lobo women are ranked in the preseason poll, not counting the 2020 season in which there was no preseason ranking — they opened the 2023 season at No. 21 and were ranked no lower than fourth in the nation in each of the previous seven preseason polls, winning national team titles in 2015 and 2017 along the way.
- In the USTFCCCA Regional Rankings released on Monday, the UNM men moved up to No. 2 in the Mountain Region -- matching 2010 for their highest regional ranking in program history -- with the women ranked No. 4. They finished third and seventh at Mountain Regionals in 2023, respectively.

PAMELA KOSGEI: MW ATHLETE & FRESH-MAN OF THE WEEK

After a dominant run in her collegiate debut last week in Stillwater, New Mexico's Pamela Kosgei has been named Mountain West Freshman & Athlete of the Week, the league announced Tuesday. It's the first cross country conference weekly award of the season won by a UNM

athlete. One of the most highly-touted international recruits to come to UNM in recent memory, the Kenyan national solidified her place in the national conversation in her first cross country race as a Lobo with a runaway victory to lead UNM to a women's team title at the OSU Cowboy Jamboree. Her winning time of 19:50.0 was 43.5 seconds faster than the next finisher as she led a Lobo Top 7 that all packed into the overall Top 20 to beat out No. 16 Oklahoma State in the team score with 34 points to the Cowgirls' 40. The UNM women moved up four spots to No. 17 in the USTFCCCA National Coaches' Poll the following week as a result.

Kosgei took the lead just over a kilometer into the race and didn't relinquish it the rest of the way, posting 3:17.5 and 3:13.8 splits over her final two kilometers -- her time was the 10th-fastest 6K time ever ran by a woman on OSU's Greiner Cross Country Course and fastest there since NCAA Championships in 2022.

THE STAGE IS SET

In the early 2000's with a significant donation from Badger alum Thomas Zimmer, the University of Wisconsin built a permanent standalone cross country course consisting of rolling hills and switchbacks - to help spectators enjoy the competition - paired with lush, green grass suitable for fast times. Over a decade later, the course has become known for the prestigious Nuttycombe Invitational in mid-October -- but this year, since the Wisconsin course will also be the NCAA Championship course, Nuttycombe was moved to earlier in the fall with this weekend slotted for Pre-Nationals.

Annually, at least half of the USTFCCCA ranked teams attend Nuttycombe in mid-October - in large part, the meet has become almost necessary to secure NCAA

at-large qualifying points. In 2021, there were 19 ranked women's teams out of the 36 teams in attendance with 18 of the 34 men's teams nationally ranked. In each season that it was held, no less than 10 of the teams selected to the NCAA Championship competed at the Nuttycombe earlier in the year.

The UNM women have won Nuttycombe four times, first in 2015 and 2017 - years the Lobos went on to win an NCAA Championship – as well as 2021 and 2022, when they went on to finish third and second, respectively.

LAST TIME AT ZIMMER CHAMPIONSHIP **COURSE**

Habtom Samuel finished third overall to pace a 14th-place finish for the UNM men while the Lobo women finished 25th in the team total behind a Top-25 finish from Nicola Jansen at last year's Nuttycombe Invitational on Oct. 13, 2023 -- UNM's 14th-place finish in the 8K "A" race was the best finish at Nuttycombe for the Lobo men since 2014, when they finished 12th.

After receiving votes in that week's USTFCCCA National Coaches' Poll, the Lobo men beat 10 teams ranked in the Top 30 nationally and four in the Top 15 in Friday's team score as well as five other teams that were receiving votes this week -- they've been ranked among the Top 25 nationally in every USTFCCCA poll that's been released since.

Samuel hung with eventual champ Graham Blanks of Harvard (23:23.4) and second-place finisher Nico Young of Northern Arizona (23:26.1) the whole way, never dipping lower than seventh place and holding the No. 3 spot from the 6K mark till the finish. Evans Kiplagat (18th, 23:45.5) and Lukas Kiprop (45th, 24:06.1) both rounded out the Lobos' Top Three - UNM was one of only six teams in the Men's 8K to place three runners in the Top 50. They were followed by Samuel Field (156th, 24:43.9) and Thomas Termote (215th, 25:08.6) to round out the point-scoring.

In the women's 6K, Nicola Jansen placed 21st with a 20:18.8 finish and Klara Dess made it two Lobos in the top 100 with an 86th-place finish (20:56.6). They were followed by Semira Mebrahtu Firezghi (145th, 21:30.8), Sarah Eckel (149th, 21:33.0), Christina Nisoli (186th, 21:54.5), Tyler Schwartz (189th, 21:57.4) and Stefana Purkovic (244th, 23:05.0). The Lobo women's Top 5 collectively picked up 50 places over the final 2,000 meters to move up to No. 25 from No. 27, with Firezghi and Eckel moving up 65 places each over the final 4,000m.

2024 OUTLOOK

The Lobo men get back their top three runners from last season went 1-2-3 at MW Championships last season -NCAA Runner-Up Habtom Samuel, All-American Evans Kiplagat and MW third-place finisher Lukas Kiprop – and augment their depth with a pair of D-I transfers in Iker Sanchez (Arizona) and Rikus Van Niekerk (CBU) along with the addition of NCAA Track & Field West Regional Qualifier (5,000m & 10,000m) Vincent Chirchir and Kenyan freshman Collins Kiprotich to the mix. With all of their top runners competing for the first time this season in Stillwater, they fared well against solid competition --Samuel finished as individual runner-up The UNM women had their unprecedented streak of

Kosgei dominated in her first

Even with a women's program that won two NCAA Championships and finished among the Top 10 in the nation 13 years in a row under former coach Joe Franklin, the Lobos have only sent both men's and women's squads to NCAA Championships in the same season six times in their history (2009-2014). This time around, they're racing in Madison in hopes both will be back again in November. "That's our goal – We want to be top 14 for both the men's and women's programs every single year," Gauson told CITIUSMAG earlier in the season. "On my whiteboard, we've got the weeks written down – We're just excited for every week to come along."

LOBOS SWEEP NO. 1 SPOTS IN MOUNTAIN WEST PRESEASON POLLS

New Mexico Men's and Women's Cross Country were both voted No. 1 in the Mountain West Preseason Coaches' Poll, the league announced Wednesday – the first time since 2015 that both Lobo squads enter the season as the preseason favorites in the conference.

The men earned seven of nine possible first-place votes to clock in at the top spot with 63 points ahead of second-place Air Force, which finished with two first-place votes and 55 points in total. The Lobo women received nine first-place votes to lead the conference with 97 points, outpacing second-place pick and 2023 champs Colorado State (2 first-place votes, 88 points).

2023-24 SEASON RECAP

In Gauson's first year at the helm, the UNM men found a level of success they hadn't enjoyed in nearly a decade, winning a Mountain West title and punching their ticket to NCAA Championships as a team for the first time since 2014 and finishing the season 18th in the nation. Alongside NCAA runner-up and Mountain Region Champion Habtom Samuel, Evans Kiplagat (33rd) also finished as an All-American, with Nicola Jansen (36th) also earning All-American honors as UNM's lone representative in the women's race.

All three will be returning to lead a retooled roster that seeks to get both teams to NCAA's in the same year for the first time since that 2014 season.

"Before I got here, Coach Franklin's [men's] team was sixth in the conference and hadn't made the meet for a number of years," Gauson told CITIUSMAG last week.

"We were able to bring in a few athletes with Thomas Termote, Lukas Kiprop, Evans Kiplagat, and obviously Habtom as a freshman and launched straight into 18th in year one.

"We were hoping for a little bit more," Gauson said. "I think we were sitting in tenth and then Lukas had a little bit of a knee problem ... [he] fell back quite a lot into the hundreds which really killed our team score."

THE YEAR OF HABTOM

Since the start of the 2023-24 season, Samuel has racked up accomplishments at a pace unseen by any true freshman in UNM history. Last week, he added his first NCAA title and another All-American finish today to a lengthy resume:

UNM COACHING STAFF



DARREN GAUSONHEAD COACH / DIRECTOR OF TRACK & FIELD / CROSS COUNTRY

Darren Gauson was named UNM's Head Coach for Track & Field / Cross Country on June 30, 2023.

In his first season at UNM, the Lobo men won their first Mountain West Championship since 2014, and Gauson was named MW Men's Coach of the Year. Led by a Mountain Region individual title by freshman Habtom Samuel, the Lobos finished third at regionals — their best finish since 2013 — and qualified for the NCAA

Championship race as a team for the first time since 2014. They went on to finish 18th in the nation, with Samuel finishing as a national runner-up and Evans Kiplagat also earning All-American honors. Nicola Jansen, a Bradley transfer who followed Gauson to Albuquerque, qualified as an individual and finished 36th at the National Championship race to become the third XC All-American of Gauson's tenure.

In the first meet of the 2023-24 indoor season, Samuel broke the indoor 5,000m record and Lukas Kiprop broke the 3,000m record at the Sharon Danville-Colyear Season Opener. In Gauson's short tenure so far, the Lobos have already seen seven marks that ranked among the Top 10 in their respective events in the indoor all-time list.

PRIOR TO UNM

Gauson has spent the last eight years as the head coach of the track and field and cross country programs at Bradley University in Illinois. He led the Braves to 10 Missouri Valley cross country titles, six by the men and four by the women, including this past year when Bradley swept both the men's and women's titles at the 2022 Missouri Valley Championships. Prior to arriving in Peoria, Gauson was the cross country coach and assistant track and field coach at Lamar University, where he guided the Cardinals to back-to-back Southland Conference men's and women's cross country titles in 2013 and 2014.

"It's an incredible honor to join a storied program and become the next head track & field and cross country coach at the University of New Mexico," said Gauson. "UNM has developed into a championship program and I am excited to build on the tradition established at the school. Albuquerque is a place where athletes dream of coming to train and develop into national champions and Olympians. I want to thank Athletic Director Eddie Nuñez, Deputy Athletic Director David Williams and Senior Woman Administrator Amy Beggin for their faith in me and their desire to continue to elevate the program to new heights. I also want to thank Bradley University for all that they've done for me in my career. I can't wait to get to work at New Mexico and develop high-character student-athletes in the classroom and on the track."

During his time at Bradley and Lamar, in addition to the 14 team conference titles, Gauson has coached 75 conference champions,

14 conference athletes of the year and 15 conference freshman of the year. He has mentored four All-Americans and six conference outstanding track performers.

A 10-time Missouri Valley Coach of the Year and the 2018 USTFCCCA Midwest Region Men's Coach of the Year, Gauson build Bradley into a powerhouse. His teams included a record-setting performance by the men's cross country team in 2019, when the Braves had the top four

finishers at the conference meet to set the modern-day Missouri Valley scoring record with 17 points. A year earlier, Bradley qualified for the NCAA Men's Cross Country Championship for the first time in program history, finishing 24th at the 2018 meet. The Bradley women's team had the second-lowest score in MVC history in 2017, when it had five runners in the top eight en route to the conference title.

On the track, Gauson coached the first individual outdoor and indoor MVC champions for the BU men in 30 and 34 years, respectively, during the 2016 and 2017 championships. Additionally, the Bradley women won their first distance medley relay crown in school history in 2019. Bradley set school records for points scored at the MVC Indoor and Outdoor Championships by both the men and women over the past five seasons. In 2017, Daniel Gagne became the first BU man to qualify for the NCAA Track and Field Championship in 42 years, where he earned second-team All-America honors in the 1,500m run in 2017. In 2021, Wilma Nielsen became the first Bradley freshman to qualify for the NCAA Championship and finished the campaign as the nation's third-ranked rookie in the 800m. Earlier this month, Tiana LoStracco earned honorable mention All-America honors as she qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championship in the 1500m.

In addition to success on the course and on the track, Bradley also had success in the classroom under Gauson. He has coached seven Academic All-Americans and 11 MVC Elite 17 Award winners. Bradley has earned USTFCCCA All-Academic Team honors in each of year of his tenure. The men ranked as high as fourth nationally in team GPA (2019 and 2021), while the women peaked at fifth in 2017.

Gauson came to Bradley from Lamar University, where he guided both the Cardinals men's and women's cross country programs to consecutive Southland Conference championships in 2013 and 2014. In addition to the championship success of the cross country teams at Lamar, Gauson coached the Cardinals runners to 29 individual Southland Conference championships in cross country and track in just three seasons. Among his star runners, Gauson helped Matt Johnsen to a 33rd-place finish at the 2012 NCAA Cross Country Championship and the first All-America honor for the Cardinals since 1969. Additionally, Sam Stabler posted the second-fastest 5,000m time in the nation in 2015 to go along with Academic All-America honors.

A 2006 graduate of Napier University in Edinburgh, Scotland, with a degree in sport and exercise science, Gauson competed two years at Butler University where he was coached by former UNM head coach Joe Franklin. He earned a master's of science degree in education from Butler in 2008. With the Bulldogs, Gauson earned a Horizon League title in the 1,500m during his final year of eligibility in addition to claiming Scottish national championships in the event in both 2004 and 2005.

Following graduation, Gauson was also an assistant cross country/track and field coach at Butler for four seasons. The Butler men were able to extend their streak of consecutive conference cross country titles to 14 during Gauson's time in Indianapolis and the team finished 29th at the NCAA Championship during his first season on the coaching staff. Butler boasted four All-Americans overall during his tenure at the school.

UNM COACHING STAFF



BRIAN MATY ASSISTANT COACH: DISTANCE

A native of Palos Heights, Illinois, Maty joined the UNM staff in the Summer of 2023. Maty assists with all facets of all six programs, focusing on distance running with both indoor and outdoor teams as well as serving as the assistant cross country coach. In 2022, Maty was part of the staff that led Bradley to a sweep of Missouri Valley Conference titles in men's and women's cross country. Bradley's women basically lapped the field, scoring 22 points to outpace second place Belmont by 53 points. He also coached Wilma Nielsen, who turned in the NCAA's No. 2 time all-time in the 1,000m (2:38.95)

at the Dr. Sander Invitational in New York City. She also earned first team All-American 800m indoor honors. He also coached Tiana LoStracco and honorable mention All American Tiana LoStracco 1500m in Austin. TX

That came after a 2021 season that saw Bradley runners claim nine conference track titles in his first season on campus, while the Bradley women also set school records for most points at the Missouri Valley Conference meet, tallying 70 at the 2022 Indoor Championship

and 84 points at the 2022 Outdoor Championship.

Prior to joining the Braves, Maty spent the 2021 fall semester as a graduate assistant at Eastern Illinois. The EIU men's and women's cross country teams both posted record-setting seasons with Maty's assistance, highlighted by sweeping the Ohio Valley Conference individual cross country titles. The Panthers boasted a total of nine All-OVC performers (six men & three women) in addition to setting school records in the women's 6K and men's 8K. The EIU men's team also claimed the OVC title, with Dustin Hatfield going on to become the first NCAA Championship qualifier from Eastern Illinois in 20 years. On the women's side Lindsey Carlson became the first female all-region performer in school history, following a 20th-place individual finish at the NCAA Midwest Regional Championship.

Maty graduated from Loras College in 2021. He spent the 2020 indoor track & field season as an intern at the University of Portland where he assisted with videography, recruiting, coaching, social media management and home meet setup. Maty's indoor season with the Pilots was highlighted by a school record in the men's mile (3:59.61).

In January 2019, Maty completed an externship under Danny Mackey and the Brooks Beasts Track Club in Seattle, Washington, that featured instruction on running physiology and biomechanics, along with focusing on the facets of marketing such as brand advertising and social media management.



JENNA SCHWARTZ ASSISTANT COACH: DISTANCE

Jenna Schwartz joined the Lobo XC/T&F staff as an assistant coach in August of 2024.

Originally from Waterloo III. Schwartz joins the

Originally from Waterloo, Ill., Schwartz joins the Lobos after a four-year career at Missouri, where she recently completed her Graduate Certificate in Positive Coaching and Athletic Leadership along with a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with an emphasis in management. Competing in cross country and track for the Tigers from from 2019 to 2024, Schwartz ranks No. 4 in program history in the Indoor 5000m (16:25.20), No. 6 in the

Outdoor 10,000m (33:56.58) and No. 9 in the Outdoor 5000m, earning a spot on the SEC Academic Honor Roll in every semester during her time in Columbia.

"I'm incredibly excited to join such a historic program and work with an incredible staff," Schwartz said. "Albuquerque is an outstanding place to train at an elite level and I'm humbled and grateful to do whatever I can to keep our successes going."



JARED BERRYMAN ASSISTANT COACH / DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS

Berryman came to UNM in the Summer of 2023 from Bradley, where he was a part of Darren Gauson's staff as an assistant coach. Among various duties as director of operations for both XC and track, Berryman is UNM's co-meet director along with Kyra Mohns.

During his season in Peoria, the Braves won the Missouri Valley women's cross country championship and had individuals qualify for the NCAA Indoor and Outdoor Track and Field Championships. Berryman spent the 2021-22 season as an

intern at his alma mater, Cal State East Bay, assisting with the program's recruiting, meet management and social media.

A native of Long Beach, Calif., Berryman is a 2022 graduate of CSUEB, where he earned a bachelor's degree in kinesiology with an emphasis in sport nutrition and wellness. He ran three seasons for the Pioneers and was a two-year captain of the Cal State East Bay track & field team.
