2015 NCAA TEAM CHAMPIONS

Behind one of the most dominating performances in NCAA history, the No. 1 University of New Mexico women's cross country team won its first national title NOV. 16, 2016 at the NCAA Division I Cross Country Championships in Louisville, Ky.

The Lobo women, competing in their 10th-ever NCAA Championship, placed all five of their scorers in the top 25 at E.P. "Tom" Sawyer State Park in Louisville and combined to score 49 points, the lowest team score by any team since 1982.

"It's a great day," New Mexico head coach Joe Franklin said. "Super excited for the women. They're going to remember this for the rest of their lives and that's really special."

The Lobos' championship is the second NCAA title in University of New Mexico history, joining the New Mexico state's NCAA title in 2004. It's the fourth NCAA women's cross country title in Mountain West history.

"It's amazing," senior Courtney Frerichs said after the race.

Long deemed the prohibitive favorite after assembling its talented squad of runners, the Lobos lived up to their reputation, running through the 31-team field to an 80-point victory over runner-up Colorado.

New Mexico's margin of victory is the fifth-largest in NCAA history and the best since 2004. No. 2 Colorado finished with 149 points, while No. 6 Oregon was third with 214 points.

It's the second straight top-three finish for the Lobos, who placed third last year in an upstart and portentous performance.

Frerichs led UNM over the women's six-kilometer course, placing fourth overall in 19 minutes, 48 seconds. The Lobos' top runner at four of the five



meets at which they ran in 2016, her finish is the best in program history, beating Sammy Silva's 12th-place finish from 2013.

Alice Wright wasn't far behind Frerichs, finishing fifth overall in 19:53.1. In fact, the Lobos finished with a team spread of 29.6 seconds, the lowest since the NCAA moved the distance of the championship race to six kilometers in 2000.

Rhona Auckland finished 13th overall in 20:07.1, with Calli Thackery (15th, time of 20:07.3) and Molly Renfer (24th, 20:17.6) also scoring for the Lobos.

All five earned All-American honors (which are given to the top 40 finishers), making them the first women's team to have five All-Americans in a single championships since Villanova in 2008.

New Mexico is also just the first team since the 2001 BYU women to place all five of their scorers in the top 25.

Heleene Tarnbet (74th, 20:40.4) and Whitney Thornburg (109th, 20:55.4) rounded out the New Mexico contingent.

"Everyone played a role," Frerichs said. "Rhona got to the outside for us which helped through the bumps. Molly got out front. Every did an amazing job. We couldn't have done it without each other."

The Lobos were in second place 2,000 meters into the race on a windy and chilly Saturday. UNM trailed Oregon by 91 points for first place a third of the way through the race.

Although all five scorers were in the top 60 through 2 kilometers, New Mexico fought back as they raced progressed, eventually moving up as a team en route to the win.

"We thought that they could score well, but you never know when you get out there," Franklin said. "You look at the 2K splits and we were way back, but they kept plugging and plugging and plugging."

But, for a New Mexico team that went in without any expectations, they came away with their first national title.

2017 NCAA TEAM CHAMPIONS

For the second time in three years, the Lobo women's cross country team won the national title at the NCAA Division I Cross Country Championships in Louisville, relying on a dominant performance by individual winner Edneh Kurgat for its second team title ever.

Behind Kurgat's meet-record victory over the six-kilometer course at E.P. Tom Sawyer State Park, the second-ranked UNM woman placed four scorers in the top 16 en route to becoming the ninth team in NCAA history to win multiple national titles in women's cross country.

The Lobo championship was the third NCAA title in University of New Mexico history, joining the their win in 2016 and the New Mexico skiing program's NCAA title in 2004. It's the fifth NCAA women's cross country title in Mountain West history.

It was also the team's eighth-straight top-10 performance at the NCAA Championships — the longest active streak in NCAA history — and the team's third top-three showing in the last four years, joining 2014's third-place finish in Terre Haute, Indiana.

But, it was a new cast of runners hoisting the championship trophy after the race, led by an undefeated Kurgat.

"This win was different than 2016," Franklin said. "This team was a lot different. They've been running well all year."

Kurgat continued her remarkable season, capturing the team's first individual title in cross country with a time of 18 minutes, 19.42 seconds.

Winning for the fifth time this season in as many tries, Kurgat ran up near the front of the 255-runner field from virtually the start, eventually taking over about two kilometers in. Washington's Amy-Eloise Neale was second



in 18:28.03.

Kurgat's time was the fastest in championship history since the NCAA moved the race distance up from 5,000 meters in 2000. She also recorded the largest margin of victory, 7.61 seconds, since 2014.

"I was so excited," Kurgat said. "I don't take anything for granted. My challenges were behind me. They all act as a stepping stone to where I am today."

However, as it's been all season, Kurgat was quickly joined at the finish line by her teammates, with three other Lobos finishing in the top 16.

Weini Kelati placed seventh overall with a time of 19:36.77, while Charlotte Prouse took 12th (19:48.93) and Alice Wright finished 14th (19:48.75).

All four earned All-American honors (which were given to the top 40 finishers), giving the team 18 All-American plaques since their streak of top-10 team finishes started in 2010.

For Wright, she earned her fourth career All-American nod in cross country, becoming the first female runner in Division I to earn the honor in four straight years since Colorado's Sha-

leya Kipp (2010-15). Since the current criteria for All-American status was implemented in 2008, Wright was just the fifth female athlete to accomplish the feat.

But, facing a field where every second and every place counted, New Mexico's title hopes relied significantly on the performance of its No. 6 runner.

Alondra Negrón Texidor didn't let her team down, scoring via her 35th-place time 20:38.67. Close behind were Alex Buck (106th place, time of 20:44.65) and Kieran Casey (123rd, 20:54.27).

"I got asked a question the other day who our fifth [runner] would be and I didn't have any idea," Franklin said. "Alondra, Alex and Kieran all ran well."

As a team, UNM tallied 80 points, beating No. 3 San Francisco (106 points) and No. 1 Colorado (139) in the low-score-wins format.

Like in 2016 when they scored 48 points, the Lobos finished with a team score below 100 points. The score on Saturday was just the third under 100 points since 2010. (Michigan State had 85 in 2014.)

Darren Gauson was named UNM's Head Coach for Track & Field / Cross Country on June 30, 2023. In his first two seasons at the helm in Albuquerque, Gauson has led the Lobos to three individual national titles, five Mountain West team titles, six national individual runner-up finishes, producing 26 All-American finishes. In the 2024-25 academic year, New Mexico was the only program in the nation to finish in the Top 10 in the team score at both NCAA Cross Country & Outdoor Track & Field Championships — the Lobo women finished seventh in the nation in XC and ninth outdoors, while the men finished ninth in cross country and fifth outdoors.

2024-25 SEASON

In Gauson's second year at the helm, the Lobos reached new heights on the national stage for both men and women. They won four Mountain West titles — including the first sweep of women's cross country, indoor and outdoor track & field team titles in program history — and finished in the Top 10 nationally for men & women at both NCAA XC and Outdoor Track & Field Championships, with Ishmael Kipkurui (10,000m) and Pamela Kosgei (5,000m & 10,000m) winning individual national titles outdoors.

At NCAA Cross Country Championships, the Lobo women finished 7th and the men finished 9th, making UNM one of just three schools in the nation with both teams finishing in the Top 10 alongside NAU and BYU. Habtom Samuel repeated as national runner-up despite losing a shoe halfway through the race and Pamela Kosgei finished as national runner-up on the women's side — both earned USTFCCCA Mountain Region Athlete of the Year honors following the conclusion of the season.

At the conclusion of the indoor season, UNM qualified five athletes for NCAA Indoor Championships — Brodie Young (400m), Collins Kiprotich (Mile), Ishmael Kipkurui (3,000m; 5,000m), Habtom Samuel (3,000m; 5,000m) and Pamela Kosgei (3,000m; 5,000m). Samuel (2nd, 5,000m) and Kosgei (3rd, 5,000m) both took home First Team All-America honors.

During the outdoor regular season, Ishmael Kipkurui broke the NCAA collegiate record in the 10,000m at Sound Running's THE TEN (26:50.21). Habtom Samuel broke the collegiate 5,000m record (13:05.87) and Pamela Kosgei ran the second-fastest 5,000m (14:52.45) and 10,000m performances (31:02.73) in NCAA history.

At NCAA West Region Preliminaries, 11 Lobos qualified for NCAA Outdoor Championships — the second-most in program history and most since a 28-athlete showing in 2011.

In addition to national titles from Pamela Kosgei (5,000m, 10,000m) and Ishmael Kipkurui (10,000m), Mathew Kosgei (6th, 3,000m Steeplechase), Habtom Samuel (2nd, 5,000m & 10,000m) and Marion Jepngetich (4th, 5,000m) all earned First Team All-America honors. With Kosgei and Kipkurui's 10,000m victories, UNM became the first D-I institution to sweep both men's and women's 10K titles at the same NCAA Outdoor Championships.

The UNM men finished 5th in the team score — their highest finish ever — with the most points in program history (31 points). The women placed ninth with 25 points — their second-best finish in history. The two squads' 56 points combined were the most in any single season at UNM, more than twice the previous highest combined of 22 points (2018).

After outdoor championships, Gauson was named USTFCCCA Mountain Region Coach of the Year for both men and women, with Pamela Kosgei named Regional Athlete of the Year and becoming the first finalist for The Bowerman in program history.

2023-24 SEASON

In his first season at UNM, the Lobo men won their first Mountain West Championship since 2014, and Gauson was named MW Men's Coach of the Year. Led by a Mountain Region individual title by freshman Habtom Samuel, the Lobos finished third at regionals — their best finish since 2013 — and qualified for the NCAA Championship race as a team for the first time since 2014. They went on to finish 18th in the nation, with Samuel finishing as a national runner-up and Evans Kiplagat also earning All-American honors. Nicola Jansen, a Bradley transfer who followed Gauson to Albuquerque, qualified as an individual and finished 36th at the National Championship race to become the third XC All-American of Gauson's tenure.

In the first meet of the 2023-24 indoor season, Samuel broke the indoor 5,000m record and Lukas Kiprop broke the 3,000m record



at the Sharon Danville-Colyear Season Opener.

In the 2023-24 indoor season, UNM athletes produced 33 marks that rank among the Top 10 in program history in their respective events. The women finished 4th and the men finished 5th at MW Indoor Championships, with Habtom Samuel and Mercy Kirarei sweeping the men's and women's 3,000m and 5,000m

titles — the first time in program history that UNM won all four races at the same indoor championships. 10 Lobos earned indoor All-MW honors following the meet, with Habtom Samuel named Performer of the Meet and Indoor Track Athlete of the Year.

Samuel and Kiplagat both qualified for NCAA Indoor Championships, with Samuel finishing 4th in the 5,000m and 7th in the 3,000m for his second and third All-American awards and Kiplagat finishing 15th in the 5,000m for 2nd Team honors.

The Lobos put up 18 more Top-10 marks in the outdoor season, with Samuel breaking the UNM outdoor 5,000m and 10,000m records in the spring, winning his first NCAA individual title in the 10,000m and NCAA Outdoor Championships and finishing 6th in the 5,000m to make it five All-American honors in his freshman year alone. Maja Gebauer also matched the previous UNM record in the pole vault and became the first Lobo to win a MW title since 2009.

The UNM women finished 6th and the men finished 5th at Gauson's first MW Outdoor Championships in Clovis, with 11 All-MW honorees. Samuel won both the 1,500m and 5,000m races — his 4th and 5th conference individual titles — to join Gebauer as at the top of the podium, later being named MW Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year to complete the season sweep of conference year awards. At 2024 NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships in Eugene, Ore., Samuel scored 13 points in total for the Lobos with his first- and sixth-place finishes — the most points the UNM men have scored as a team at NCAA Outdoor Championships since 1967 (24) — to help the Lobos finish tied for 23rd in the men's team score with Northern Arizona. It's only the fifth time UNM has produced 13 or more points in the men's team score in program history and the highest the Lobo men have finished in the team score since 2017.

UNM concluded the week as the second-highest placing non-P5 team in the men's field behind Harvard (T-16th), outscoring 113 of 137 teams competing.

PRIOR TO UNM

Gauson has spent the last eight years as the head coach of the track and field and cross country programs at Bradley University in Illinois. He led the Braves to 10 Missouri Valley cross country titles, six by the men and four by the women, including this past year when Bradley swept both the men's and women's titles at the 2022 Missouri Valley Championships. Prior to arriving in Peoria, Gauson was the cross country coach and assistant track and field coach at Lamar University, where he guided the Cardinals to back-to-back Southland Conference men's and women's cross country titles in 2013 and 2014.

During his time at Bradley and Lamar, in addition to the 14 team conference titles, Gauson has coached 75 conference champions, 14 conference athletes of the year and 15 conference freshman of the year. He has mentored four All-Americans and six conference outstanding track performers.

A 10-time Missouri Valley Coach of the Year and the 2018 USTFCCCA Midwest Region Men's Coach of the Year, Gauson guided Bradley into a powerhouse. His teams included a record-setting performance by the men's cross country team in 2019, when the Braves had the top four finishers at the conference meet to set the modern-day Missouri Valley scoring record with 17 points. A year earlier, Bradley qualified for the NCAA Men's Cross Country Championship for the first time in program history, finishing

24th at the 2018 meet. The Bradley women's team had the second-lowest score in MVC history in 2017, when it had five runners in the top eight en route to the conference title.

On the track, Gauson coached the first individual outdoor and indoor MVC champions for the BU men in 30 and 34 years, respectively, during the 2016 and 2017 championships. Additionally, the Bradley women won their first distance medley relay crown in school history in 2019. Bradley set school records for points scored at the MVC Indoor and Outdoor Championships by both the men and women over the past five seasons. In 2017, Daniel Gagne became the first BU man to qualify for the NCAA Track and Field Championship in 42 years, where he earned second-team All-America honors in the 1,500m run in 2017. In 2021, Wilma Nielsen became the first Bradley freshman to qualify for the NCAA Championship and finished the campaign as the nation's third-ranked rookie in the 800m. Earlier this month, Tiana LoStracco earned honorable mention All-America honors as she qualified for the NCAA Outdoor Championship in the 1500m.

In addition to success on the course and on the track, Bradley also had success in the classroom under Gauson. He has coached seven Academic All-Americans and 11 MVC Elite 17 Award winners. Bradley has earned USTFCCCA All-Academic Team honors in each of year of his tenure. The men ranked as high as fourth nationally in team GPA (2019 and 2021), while the women peaked at fifth in 2017.

Gauson came to Bradley from Lamar University, where he guided both the Cardinals men's and women's cross country programs to consecutive Southland Conference championships in 2013 and 2014. In addition to the championship success of the cross country teams at Lamar, Gauson coached the Cardinals runners to 29 individual Southland Conference championships in cross country and track in just three seasons. Among his star runners, Gauson helped Matt Johnsen to a 33rd-place finish at the 2012 NCAA Cross Country Championship and the first All-America honor for the Cardinals since 1969. Additionally, Sam Stabler posted the second-fastest 5,000m time in the nation in 2015 to go along with Academic All-America honors.

A 2006 graduate of Napier University in Edinburgh, Scotland, with a degree in sport and exercise science, Gauson competed two years at Butler University where he was coached by former UNM head coach Joe Franklin. He earned a master's of science degree in education from Butler in 2008. With the Bulldogs, Gauson earned a Horizon League title in the 1,500m during his final year of eligibility in addition to claiming Scottish national championships in the event in both 2004 and 2005.

Following graduation, Gauson was also an assistant cross country/track and field coach at Butler for four seasons. The Butler men were able to extend their streak of consecutive conference cross country titles to 14 during Gauson's time in Indianapolis and the team finished 29th at the NCAA Championship during his first season on the coaching staff. Butler boasted four All-Americans overall during his tenure at the school.
