GAME 12 NOTES

LOBOS COMPLETE REGULAR SEASON AT WYOMING

- The New Mexico Lobos end their regular season Saturday as they travel to Wyoming for yet another key conference game. Kickoff is 12:07 p.m. Mountain Time from War Memorial Stadium in Laramie. KRQE-TV in Albuquerque will televise the game on a delayed basis beginning at 5 p.m. Q-13 is not permitted to air the game live because of the ESPN+Plus window that prevents other live MWC telecasts between 1-4 p.m. The ESPN+Plus game this week is Utah at BYU.
- The Lobos are a bowl eligible 7-4 overall and 4-2 in the MWC after a workmanlike 24-12 victory over Air Force last Saturday. UNM is all alone in second place in the league, a game behind Utah. The Utes are 5-1 and play at BYU Saturday at 1 p.m. Wyoming is 4-6 in all games, 2-3 in conference following a 47-17 setback at Utah. The game was tied 17-17 at halftime. UW started the season 1-4, but is 3-2 since. The Cowboys can become bowl eligible with wins in their final two games. They host UNLV Nov. 29.
- This is the second straight year that the Lobos need to beat Wyoming in the regular-season finale to clinch a bowl berth. UNM was 6-6 heading into last year's game in Albuquerque, and secured its second bowl appearance in 41 years with a 49-20 victory on Nov. 30.
- After playing in the Las Vegas Bowl last year, UNM seeks consecutive postseason appearances for only the second time in school history, since appearing in the 1945 Sun Bowl in El Paso (actually Jan. 1, 1946) and the 1946 Harbor Bowl (Jan. 1, 1947) in San Diego.
- This is the latest date that New Mexico has ever played at Wyoming. Prior to this year, it was Nov. 20, 1999. UNM has played at Laramie 26 times since 1940. Saturday's forecast: Snow showers, windy and a high of 35 degrees.
- In the Air Force win, sophomore **TB DonTrell Moore (Roswell, N.M.)** ran for 188 yards to break the school's single-season rushing record and the UNM defense held the Falcons to season-lows for points, yards rushing (158) and total offense (273).
- After starting 1-3, the Lobos are 6-1 since, including the school's first four-game winning streak since a 6-0 start in 1997. New Mexico completed its first unbeaten October (3-0) since the 1959 team went 5-0.
- After no wins over teams with winning records for nearly two years from the middle of the 2001 season to this year, the Lobos' last three victories have come against Utah, Colorado State and Air Force, teams that all had winning records.
- A victory Saturday would move senior **QB Casey Kelly (Portland, Ore.)** into the top spot on the school's all-time win list. Jim Cromartie went 18-6 from 1960-62. Kelly is 18-12 as a starter. His first collegiate start came at Wyoming on Oct. 6, 2001.
- New Mexico has won seven games for only the 16th time in 105 years of football. However, after going 7-7 last year, the Lobos have won at least seven games in consecutive years for the first time since 1961 (7-4) and 1962 (7-2-1). UNM is seeking an eight-win season for only the eighth time, the others being 1927, 1934, 1938, 1939, 1964, 1982 and 1997.
- A win Saturday would continue New Mexico's distinction of being the only school in the nation to increase its win total every year since 1999: UNM was 3-9 in 1998, 4-7 in 1999, 5-7 in 2000, 6-5 in 2001 and 7-7 in 2002.
- A win would also give head coach Rocky Long his 33rd win at New Mexico, tying him with Dennis Franchione for third place. Long is 32-39. Franchione was 33-36 from 1992-97. Roy Johnson is the all-time leader with a 41-32-6 mark from 1920-30. Bill Weeks was 40-41-1 from 1960-67.
- The triumph over Colorado State on Nov. 7 guaranteed New Mexico of having its third straight non-losing season for the first time since a seven-year run from 1958-64. The Lobos are 19-16 since 2001.
- New Mexico ranks 2nd in the conference and 13th nationally in rushing offense (217.1 ypg). The Lobos are also 2nd in the MWC in scoring offense (31.9 ppg) and total offense (424.3 ypg). Wyoming is last in the league and 110th in the NCAA in rushing defense (219.4 ypg). The Cowboys are last in the MWC in scoring defense (29.9 ppg), pass efficiency defense (134.84 rating) and total defense (449.3 ypg).
- In MWC games, the Lobos lead the league in total offense (439.7 ypg) and total defense (305.0).

Unless otherwise noted all practices are open to the media and the public.

- Wyoming is 1st in the MWC in passing offense, averaging 271.4 yards a game. The Lobos have given up the most passing yards in the conference at 249.3 yards a game, although UNM is 4th in the MWC in pass efficiency defense with a rating of 120.79.
- DonTrell Moore has run for a school-record 1,285 yards in 2003. He has also established New Mexico season records for rushing TDs (19), overall TDs scored (20), points (120) and 100-yard rushing games (8), and he has the career mark with 32 rushing TDs. Moore's current string of four straight 100-yard rushing games ties a season record. He ranks fifth all-time at UNM with 2,419 career yards on the ground. Moore is 1st in the MWC in rushing (116.8 ypg), all-purpose yards (132.5 ypg) and scoring (10.9 ppg), and has scored more TDs (20) than any other NCAA Div. I-A player this season.
- School records for single-game attendance (44,075 for New Mexico State), season attendance (245,891) and average attendance (35,127) have all been set in 2003. The previous standards for total attendance (187,608) and average attendance (31,268) were set in 2001.
- The Lobos are 8-2 in their last 10 contests at University Stadium, although they were 5-2 this season. New Mexico was 3-0 at home against MWC teams last year and it has won eight of its past 11 league games in Albuquerque. UNM has captured eight of its last nine home games against non-conference competition.
- Picked to finish second in the MWC in the preseason poll, UNM returned 53 lettermen - including 17 offensive and defensive starters - from a team that finished second in the MWC last year and played in a bowl game for only the second time since 1961.
- UNM was picked to finish second in the MWC preseason poll. That's the highest predicted finish for the Lobos since polls could be found dating to the early 1980s. Six Lobos were named to the preseason team: DE Daniel Kegler, OT Jason Lenzmeier, TB DonTrell Moore, S Brandon Ratcliff, DE D.J. Renteria and OG Claude Terrell.
- The Lobos received nine votes in the ESPN/USA Today Top 25 preseason coaches' poll, good for a tie for 47th place with Georgia Tech. They had 13 votes prior to the Texas Tech game. UNM's Rocky Long is one of 63 NCAA Div. I-A head coaches who votes.

UNM HISTORY

- The University of New Mexico has a 416-481-31 overall record through 104-plus seasons. UNM was founded in 1889. Three years later, the first football game was played on Oct. 7, 1892, when a team representing UNM played a squad from Albuquerque High School in a vacant lot north of the town's ice factory. The preps prevailed 5-0. The territory of New Mexico was not granted statehood until 1912.

Rocky Long is in his 15th season at New Mexico as either a player or a coach. This is his sixth season as the head coach of his alma mater. The 2002 Mountain West Conference Coach of the Year is 32-39 overall, 22-15 at home, 10-23 on the road and 0-1 at neutral sites. He is 20-22 in conference games (19-15 in the MWC), 11-11 at home and 9-11 on the road. Long is 12-17 in non-conference affairs, 11-4 at home, 1-12 on the road and 0-1 at neutral sites.

Long is 3-1 against Wyoming, 1-1 in Laramie.

Long is one of 20 current head coaches who is now coaching his respective alma mater.

Long was named New Mexico's 28th head football coach on December 20, 1997, after spending two years as the defensive coordinator at UCLA.

This is Long's third stint at UNM. He was a graduate assistant from 1972-73 and an assistant coach from 1978-80.

A quarterback for the Lobos from 1969-71, Long was a three-time team MVP and was selected as the WAC offensive player of the year following his senior season. He graduated from UNM in 1974.

ROCKY LONG QUICK FACTS

- Born January 27, 1950, in Provo, Utah, while his father Rob was playing football at BYU...married to the former Debby Meerdink for 30 years...oldest daughter Roxanne was a four-year basketball letterwinner at Oklahoma and is currently the head girl's basketball coach at Diamond Hill-Jarvis HS in Fort Worth, Texas...youngest daughter Hannah played volleyball and basketball at Portland State and is currently attending Texas A&M where she is pursuing a master's degree in Higher Education.
- Attended Alta Loma High School in Cucamonga, Calif...played in the 1967 California All-Star game...two-time all-league quarterback.
- Started his varsity career at New Mexico as a second-team defensive back...made his first career start at quarterback at BYU on October 11, 1969.
- Was the first UNM sophomore in the Modern Era to be elected team co-captain while in his first season of varsity competition (1969)...also team captain as a senior in 1971

- Named UNM's most valuable player three straight seasons from 1969-71, becoming the first sophomore to receive the award...team leader in passing, punt returns and kickoff returns in 1969, and he finished second to Sam Scarber in rushing with 450 yards
- Was the Western Athletic Conference Offensive Player of the Year following his senior season (1971).
- Earned the Chuck Cummings Memorial Award in 1969 and '71...the award is given to the UNM player based on morale and spirit.
- Was one of four NCAA players that spent part of the summer of 1971, visiting U.S. servicemen in Vietnam...the others were Johnny Musso (Alabama), Lydell Mitchell (Penn State) and Stan Mauldin (Texas).
- A three-time Academic All-WAC selection (1969-71)...recipient of the WAC Scholar-Athlete Award in 1970...honorable mention Academic All-America in 1969...awarded an NCAA post-graduate scholarship in 1972.
- Was an all-pro defensive back for the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League in 1977...led the league in kickoff returns in 1975 and '76 and in punt returns in 1976 and '77...had 22 career interceptions in the CFL, with eight coming in 1976.
- Named to the World Football League all-star team in 1974 as a member of the Detroit Wheels.
- Was a 1996 inductee into the UNM Athletic Hall of Honor.
- As defensive coordinator at UCLA, the Bruin defense was No. 2 nationally in turnover margin (+20) in 1997, forcing 39 turnovers (18 fumbles and 21 interceptions)...the Bruins were 15th nationally in pass eff. defense (103.84 rating) and 33rd in scoring defense (20.4 points/game).

THE WYOMING SERIES

- This is the 56th meeting in a series that started in 1930. Wyoming leads 31-24, but UNM has won the past three. The Cowboys lead 15-11 in Laramie. The Lobos seek their fourth straight win over Wyoming for the first time since a seven-game run from 1969-75.
- UNM won 49-20 last year in Albuquerque, clinching a bowl berth. DonTrell Moore rushed for 176 yards and tied a school record by scoring five TDs. Casey Kelly was 7-11 passing for 164 yards and a career-high 4 TDs. He also rushed for a career-best 84 yards. The Lobo defense was equally impressive, sacking Casey Bramlett a school-record-tying nine times and holding him to 203 yards passing, more than 77 yards under his season average. New Mexico forced three Bramlett interceptions, two by safety Brandon Ratcliff.
- UNM hung on for a 30-29 victory two years ago, its first win in Laramie since 1982. The Lobos had a 30-16 lead with 4:15 left. UW's missed PAT with 21 seconds left was the difference. It was Casey Kelly's first collegiate start. The Lobos returned two interceptions for TDs.
- Lobo head coach Rocky Long was Wyoming's defensive coordinator and secondary coach under Al Kincaid from 1981-85.

WYOMING NOTES

- The Cowboys finished 2-10 in 2002, 1-6 in the MWC.
- Head coach Joe Glenn is in his 19th season as a collegiate head coach. He has a 162-65-1 overall record. The 1971 South Dakota State graduate is meeting the Lobos for the first time. Glenn spent 14 seasons (1989-2002) as a head coach at Div. I-AA and Div. II schools. He won two Div. II national titles at Northern Colorado, and a I-AA championship at Montana.
- The Cowboys were just 1-20 in MWC games between 2000-02, but have won two this season.
- Senior QB Casey Bramlett has passed for 9,276 yards in his brilliant career. He has thrown for more than 300 yards in a game 14 times. He attempted 177 consecutive pass before throwing an interception against Boise State earlier this year.
- Ryan McGuffey has caught a pass in every game of his career, which stands at 39. The junior ranks third at UW with 3,543 yards and third with 220 receptions. Teammate Malcolm Floyd has a catch in 41 consecutive games.
- The Cowboys have beaten BYU and Colorado State in the same year for the first time since 1988.
- Wyoming is a +10 in turnover margin this season. The Cowboys have lost just four fumbles and thrown eight interceptions.

AIR FORCE RECAP

- DonTrell Moore ran for 188 yards to break the school's single-season rushing record and the UNM defense held the Falcons to season-lows for points, yards rushing (158) and total offense (273) in the 24-12 victory. It's the fewest points Air Force has scored in the series since a 27-10 loss in 1981.
- New Mexico scored TDs - both 1-yard runs by Moore - on its first two possessions of the game and held a 14-0 lead four seconds into the second quarter. The Falcons trimmed the halftime deficit to 14-6 on a pair of Joey Ashcroft FGs. **Wes Zunker (New Braunfels, Texas)** connected on his 14th straight FG and QB Casey Kelly tossed a 10-yard TD pass to senior **WR Adrian Boyd (Flint, Mich.)** as the Lobos extended their margin to 24-6 with 9:06 left in the game. The Falcons had just 163 yards offense after three quarters.
- Air Force's lone TD came with 1:14 remaining on a 1-yard run by Darnell Stephens.

POSTGAME NOTES FROM AIR FORCE

- The crowd of 35,132 gave UNM a school-record attendance average of 35,127 for seven home games in 2003.
- Air Force came into the game averaging 30.7 points, 301.8 yards rushing and 406.7 yards of total offense through its first 10 games.
- New Mexico has won four of the past five games against Air Force. The Falcons have been held to an average of 169 yards rushing over the past four games against UNM.
- New Mexico's four scoring drives measured 12 plays, 59 yards and 5:33, 10-76-4:20, 11-75-6:01 and 11-67-5:43. All told, that's 44 plays and a combined time of 21 minutes, 37 seconds for the 24 points. The 6:01 drive is UNM's longest this season from a time standpoint. The Lobos held onto the ball for 35:13.
- New Mexico's five starters on the offensive line (**OT Justin Colburn, C Ryan Cook, OT Jason Lenzmeier, OG Claude Terrell and OG Robert Turner**) and two tight ends (**Bryan**

Penley and Mike Augustyniak combined for a whopping 104 knock-down blocks. All five offensive linemen had at least 13 KDs and an assignment grade of at least 96%. Lenzmeier and Terrell each had 20. Colburn, playing with a torn MCL in his knee, had 15 KDs, a 97% assignment grade and a team-high 84% mark for technique. As a team, UNM had a season-high 109 knockdown blocks. Augustyniak had a career-high 12.

- Senior **LB Daniel Gawronski (Marshville, N.C.)** recorded a career-high 14 tackles, including nine solo stops, and was named MWC Defensive Player of the Week for the first time in his career. Nearly half (43) of his team-high 88 tackles have come in the past four games. He had 12 against Utah and UNLV. Senior **S Terrell Golden (Los Angeles, Calif.)** also had a season-high 10 tackles.
- DonTrell Moore scored two rushing TDs to break Stoney Case's career mark. Moore has 32 scores in 24 career games. Case rushed for 31 touchdowns in 42 games from 1991-94.
- UNM did not turn the ball over for the second straight game, a feat last accomplished against Air Force and Utah during the 2000 season. The Lobos did force one turnover and have now caused 19 in the past seven games. New Mexico is 6-0 this season and 24-8 under Rocky Long when it has fewer turnovers than the opposition.
- UNM is 5-0 this year when scoring first, and 17-3 over the past four seasons.
- New Mexico had recorded a sack in 23 straight games, but had none against the Falcons. The last time the Lobos did not have a sack was the 2002 season opener at North Carolina State.
- The Lobos were 4-4 in the red zone with three TDs and one field goal. UNM is 41-45 inside the 20 on the year, scoring on 15 straight trips.
- Air Force only scored one TD on four trips inside the 20. Opponents have scored TDs on just 16 of their 31 trips in the red zone this year. **Brandon Ratcliff's (Dallas, Texas)** fourth-quarter interception was the Lobos' fifth pick in the redzone this year, four of those coming versus MWC foes.

MOORE ERASING THE MARKS

- DonTrell Moore now holds the UNM single-season rushing record with 1,285 yards in 11 games. The previous mark was 1,240 yards set by Mike Williams in 1976, also in 11 games. The MWC record is 1,582 yards by BYU's Luke Staley in 2001. Moore's other records despite playing just 24 career games at New Mexico:

- Moore is 1st in the MWC and 13th nationally in rushing average (116.8 ypg). The last Lobo to lead the league in rushing was Mike Williams in 1978. He led the Western Athletic Conference with an average of 84.5 ypg. Moore is also 1st in the league in all-purpose yards (132.5 ypg) and scoring (10.9 ppg). He ranks fifth all-time at UNM with 2,419 career yards on the ground.
- **Moore has scored more TDs (20) than any other NCAA Div. I-A player this season.** He is tied with Oklahoma K Trey DiCarlo for 3rd place in NCAA scoring average at 10.9 ppg. North Texas RB Patrick Cobb is 1st at 12.0 ppg, followed by Pittsburgh WR Larry Fitzgerald at 11.4 ppg. Cobb also leads the nation in rushing at 150.4 ypg.
- Moore has eclipsed the 100-yard mark in nine of his last 10 home games,

- Moore had the second-best rushing day in school history against Colorado State on Nov. 7, grinding 34 times for a career-best 242 yards and three TDs to earn MWC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- The durable Moore has galloped an amazing 70 times for 430 yards in his past two games, and he has 560 yards in his last three games - 186.7 ypg - with 6 TDs.
- UNM is 8-4 when Moore rushes for 100+yards, 6-2 this year
- In MWC games only, Moore is averaging 145.3 yards on the ground and 167.3 all-purpose yards a game, both tops in the league.
- Moore had his hand in three scores against UNLV. In addition to a rushing TD, he threw a 21-yard scoring pass to Adrian Boyd and scored on a 40-yard pass from QB Casey Kelly.
- Moore became the sixth Lobo to score at least four rushing TDs in a single game against Texas State. Reginal Johnson tallied five against Tulsa in 1996. Four other Lobos scored four via the run, including Rocky Long against Utah in 1971.
- In seven career November games, Moore has carried 193 times for 1,081 yards and 13 TDs, an average of 154.4 yards a game.

COUNTER SHINING

- It was a sterling performance for senior WR Dwight Counter against UNLV as he hauled in 6 receptions for a career-best 171 yards, including a 71-yard TD. Counter also added 72 yards on 5 punt returns to gather a career-high 243 all-purpose yards.
- It was the 5th career 100-yard receiving game of Counter's career. He now has 28 receptions on the year for a team-high 689 yards, a hefty 24.6 yards per catch, and five TDs. The 24.6-yard average ranks 3rd among the top-100 receivers in this week's NCAA stats. The leaders:

- Counter's 171 yards vs. UNLV are the most by a Lobo since Martinez Williams had 172 against Fresno State in 1998. Counter now has 119 career catches, good for 6th place at UNM. He is 4th with 2,014 career receiving yards and 6th with 13 TDs. The amazing stat is that Counter's "average" TD catch is a staggering 42.2 yards per score.

- For the record, Counter's career TDs have been from 14, 47, 18, 36, 85, 80, 7, 28, 32, 50, 39, 71 and 41 yards. His five TD grabs this season average out to 46.6 yards per score.

NOTHING BEATS THE LENZ

- Maybe it's like comparing apples to oranges based on the opponents, but the Lobo offense is much, much better when senior **OT Jason Lenzmeier (Frisco, Texas)** is in the lineup. Lenzmeier missed 3 1/2 games after suffering a torn MCL late in the second quarter of the BYU game on Sept. 13. He was sidelined for three games against Washington State, New Mexico State and Utah State before returning Oct. 18 at San Diego State. The numbers bear out the dramatic difference with No. 75 on the field:

- Lenzmeier became the first offensive lineman in MWC history to be named Offensive Player of the Week for his performance against Utah. Lenzmeier helped pave the way for UNM to register 633 yards of total offense, the 8th-best total in school history. The Lobos produced 407 yards on the ground as DonTrell Moore and D.D. Cox both ran for more than 100 yards and FB Adrian Byrd got 98. Lenzmeier received a 99% assignment grade and had 15 knock-down blocks.

STEADY KELLY

- A victory Saturday would move senior **QB Casey Kelly (Portland, Ore.)** into the top spot on the school's all-time win list. Jim Cromartie went 18-6 from 1960-62. Kelly is 18-12 as a starter. His first collegiate start - and initial victory - actually came at Wyoming on Oct. 6, 2001, when UNM eeked out a 30-29 triumph.
- The former walk-on, Kelly set a career-high with 408 yards passing against UNLV, which ties for the 6th-highest total in UNM history. It's the most yards since Leach threw for 427 yards against Hawaii in 1991. Kelly's 23 completions are also a career-high. He had 410 yards of total offense, 8th on the Lobos' list and the most since Stoney Case collected 413 yards against Colorado State in 1994.
- Kelly ranks 3rd at UNM in career completions (422), 3rd with 5,577

yards passing, 4th in TD passes (33) and 6th in career completion percentage (53.2%).

- Kelly, the runner, has been very effective the past few weeks. He rushed 10 times for 74 yards against Colorado State - including a career-long 52-yard burst - and followed that with 51 yards on 11 carries against Air Force. He has 195 yards on the ground the past four games after a net of 44 yards the first seven contests.
- Recognized by the Lobo coaches for putting the team in positive situations when he audibles, Kelly's numbers have steadily increased every year as a Lobo:

- UNM's offensive emphasis entering the season was to the throw the deep ball better, and it has done just that. Kelly is averaging 15.8 yards per completion this year compared to just 10.5 yards in 2002.

OFFENSE NOTES

- The Lobos are putting up offensive numbers not seen in a while. UNM is averaging 31.9 points a game, the most since the 1994 team averaged 33.4. The total offense average of 424.3 yards ranks 2nd in the league and 28th in the NCAA and would be the most productive by a Rocky Long team as well, easily besting the 2001 average of 376.8 ypg. UNM averaged 435.7 yards in 1996.
- UNM averaged just 324.4 yards a game last year, last in the MWC and 102nd nationally.
- Nice balance: UNM is averaging 217.1 yards on the ground and 207.2 yards passing.
- New Mexico has gained a math-friendly 2,000 yards of total offense the past four games, an average of 500 yards a game. The 1,218 yards against Utah and UNLV are the most in consecutive games since 1989 (527 vs. San Diego State, 691 vs. Utah).
- Behind DonTrell Moore and an earth-shaking offensive line, the rushing game has been exemplary as well. UNM has averaged 287.3 yards and 5.9 yards per carry the past three games, and 271.2 yards over the past four games.
- UNM has surpassed 500 yards of total offense four times this season and two of those have come on the road (Texas Tech, Utah). In 37 games between 2000-02, the Lobos reached 500 yards just twice.
- For the first time in school history, the Lobos scored 30 or more points in five straight games between Oct. 4 and Nov. 7.
- The past two weeks, junior **OG Claude Terrell (LaMarque, Texas)** has 33 knockdown blocks. He had a 98% assignment grade, a team-best 89% technical grade and a team-high 13 knockdown blocks against Colorado State. His numbers versus Air Force were a career-high 20 KDs and a 96% assignment grade.
- New Mexico is outscoring its opponents 181-96 in the third (99-33) and fourth (82-59) quarters. **The past seven games, the scoring after halftime is 115-64 in the Lobos' favor.**
- The 429 passing yards against UNLV ranks 5th-best all-time at UNM and is the most since Jeremy Leach tossed for a school-record 622 yards at Utah in 1989.
- Against UNLV, Dwight Counter (6-171) and Adrian Boyd (9-103) became the first receiving tandem to reach 100 yards in a game since 1991 when Carl Winston (156) and Manley Woods (113) did so against San Diego State.
- Subbing for the injured DonTrell Moore, D.D. Cox had a memorable evening at Texas Tech. Although his first carry did not come until midway through the second quarter when Moore was sidelined, Cox finished with the 11th-best rushing day in school history: 187 yards on 27 carries and three TDs. He was a real workhorse after halftime, toting it 19 times for 140 yards and getting all of his scores. Cox was also a receiver, hauling in four receptions for 69 yards. His 256 all-purpose yards is the 9th-best single-game total by a Lobo.
- Under Rocky Long, the Lobos are 17-5 when rushing for 200 yards or more and 15-3 when exceeding 225 yards. The losses came against Colorado State (254 yards) in 1999, Utah State (263 yards) in 2002 and Texas Tech (235) this season.
- New Mexico gained just 228 yards of total offense in the 24-17 win against New Mexico State. The last time a Lobo team had fewer yards and won was three years ago, also against New Mexico State. UNM managed 168 yards in a 16-13 victory over the Aggies in Las Cruces in 2000.

NEW MEXICO 47, NO. 23 UTAH 35

- When the Lobos toppled 23rd-ranked Utah 47-35, in Salt Lake City on Oct. 25, it marked the first victory over a ranked team on the road in 28 years and it halted an eight-game losing skid to ranked teams overall. Ironically, the Lobos' last victory over a ranked opponent

had been to Utah in 1994.

- In a game matching two of the best defensive teams in the league, the Lobo offense claimed the headlines by churning out 633 yards - 407 on the ground - in the win. Utah came into the game allowing an average of just 17.4 ppg, 105.0 yards rushing and 337.3 total.
- The 47 points are the most UNM has scored in Salt Lake City since a 58-49 loss in 1985. It's the most points in a road game since a 56-31 victory at New Mexico State in 1994 and the highest output in a league road game since a 49-47 defeat at BYU, also in '94.
- The 633 yards rank 8th-best all-time for a Lobo team and are the most since UNM had a school-record 691 yards in a 41-39 loss at Utah in 1989.
- The 407 yards rushing are the most since UNM gained 423 against New Mexico State in 1997.
- DonTrell Moore (119) and D.D. Cox (106) both surpassed 100 yards on the ground. The last time UNM had two players hit 100 was 1996 when the late Donald Sellers (126) and Lennox Gordon (109) did so against Rice. The Lobos came close to having three reach the century mark as **FB Adrian Byrd (Missouri City, Texas)** ran for a career-high 98 yards, including a career-best 78-yard jaunt. Additionally, Casey Kelly rambled for a season-high 68 yards on 15 carries.
- After no points in the first quarter, the Lobos scored on seven straight offensive possessions in the second and third periods, gaining 482 yards in the process.
- The five starters on the offensive line - **C Ryan Cook (Albuquerque), OT Justin Colburn (Westminster, Colo.), OT Jason Lenzmeier (Frisco, Texas), OG Claude Terrell (LaMarque, Texas) and OG Robert Turner (Austin, Texas)** - all had assignment grades of 95% or higher and at least 12 knockdowns apiece. Lenzmeier was best at 99% while Cook had a team-high 16 KDs.

DEFENSE DATA

- A similar pattern is occurring for the New Mexico defense just as it has the past few years: As the season wears on, the Lobos get tougher. Below is how the defense has stiffened to close out the season:

- The Lobos are now 32nd in the nation in total defense at 334.9 yards a game. They were 83rd after the first five games, allowing 388.2 yards. UNM's defensive averages the past six games: 86 yards rushing, 290.5 yards total offense, plus 14 turnovers gained.
- UNM has been stingy in the fourth quarter, giving up just 46 points in the past eight games.
- The Lobos have won 15 straight games when taking a lead into the fourth quarter. The last loss was to BYU in 2001. UNM led 13-10, but lost 24-20 to the 17th-ranked Cougars.

GAME 12 • NEW MEXICO AT WYOMING • GAME NOTES

- **New Mexico is allowing a league-best 85.6 rushing yards a game, good for 6th nationally behind Ohio State (50.5 ypg), LSU (60.8), Southern Cal (66.4). Oregon State (76.3 ypg) and Boise State (82.7 ypg).** UNM has yielded just 506 yards rushing in its past six games, and only Air Force (158), BYU (136), New Mexico State (106) and Colorado State (111) have reached 100 yards this season. Since stats became official in 1946, only once has a Lobo team held opponents under 100 yards rushing for an entire season. The 2001 defensive unit allowed 87.4 yards a game to finish No. 5 in the NCAA final stats.
- Since the start of the 2001 season - a span of 36 games - opponents have been held to less than 100 yards rushing 19 times.
- Only seven backs have eclipsed 100 yards rushing against UNM since the start of the 2000 season, a span of 48 games: Oregon State's Ken Simonton (184) and UNLV's Jeremi Rudolph (106) in 2000, Utah's Dameon Hunter (177) in 2001, Air Force's Leotis Palmer (125), New Mexico State's Paul Dombrowski (136) and Colorado State's Bradlee Van Pelt (106) in 2002 and BYU's Reynaldo Brathwaite (169) this season.
- Only three times in the past 45 games has an opponent reached 200 yards on the ground, and it's been 66 games since UNM allowed 300 rushing yards. San Diego State churned for 349 yards in 1998.
- In MWC games only, the Lobos are 1st in the league in rushing defense (99.5 ypg) and total defense (305.5 ypg).
- **UNM leads the MWC with 30 sacks. San Diego State has 26. The Lobos led the league in sacks every year from 2000-02.**
- UNM had a season-high five sacks of Washington State QB Matt Kegel, who had been dumped just three times in three prior games against Idaho, Notre Dame and Colorado.

- Defensive Diversity: UNM has 30 sacks by 13 players; 20 Lobos have accounted for the team's 84 tackles for loss; 12 Lobos have recovered the 14 fumbles gained; 10 players have caused the 14 fumble; 17 Lobos have broken up the team's 41 passes.
- Senior **DE Zack Rupp (Pleasant Grove, Utah)** had an unbelievable game against UNLV. Seemingly unstoppable all night, Rupp logged a career-high 15 tackles, including a whopping 5.5 stops behind the line. He had 1.5 sacks and caused a fumble that UNM converted into a TD. Rupp's 15 tackles matches the most by a Lobo in a game this season.
- New Mexico tied a school record by intercepting five passes - three by sophomore CB Gabriel Fulbright in the end zone in the 30-7 triumph at San Diego State.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

- Wes Zunker has made 14 consecutive FGs and is 14 of 15 on the season. His only miss was from 49 yards at Texas Tech, a kick that hit the upright. The school record for consecutive FGs made is 16 by Vladimir Borombozin over two seasons (2000-01). Zunker's conversion rate of 93.3% is best in the MWC.
- Zunker was named MWC Special Teams Player of the Week after the 37-34 win over Colorado State. He booted three field goals, including a 33-yard game-winner as time expired.

RED ZONE EFFICIENCY

- **The Lobos continue to lead the MWC in red-zone conversion percentage on offense.** Offensively, UNM has converted 91.1% (41-45) of their opportunities. Twenty-eight of the scores - or 68% - have been TDs.
- Since an interception in the end zone in the first quarter at Utah, UNM has converted 15 straight times in the red zone (8 TDs and 7 FGs).
- The past 19 games, the New Mexico offense has been nearly flawless inside the red zone, converting 61 of 66 (92.4%) opportunities with 47 - or 77% - of those scores being TDs. Before missing a 34-yard field goal against UCLA in the 2002 Las Vegas Bowl, the Lobos had scored 19 straight times inside the opponents' 20-yard line and 18 of those were TDs, including 15 in a row during one stretch. - On defense, opponents have converted 71.4% (30-42) to rank 2nd in the MWC and UNM has been stingy when it comes to denying TDs in the zone. Only 16 of the 30 scores have been TDs.
- The Lobos have forced six turnovers inside the red zone this season, five interceptions and a fumble.
- The past nine games, foes have penetrated 32 times. The results are 12 TDs and 14 FGs for a total of 126 points, plus four interceptions, a fumble lost, a missed field goal, a turnover on downs and a drive that ended the game.
- If you go back to last season covering the past 18 games, opponents have had 54 opportunities inside the UNM 20. They have scored only 21 TDs, or 39% of the time. The Lobos have forced eight turnovers (7 interceptions and 1 fumble).

THE TURNOVER BATTLE

- After gaining just six turnovers in the first four games, the Lobos have forced 19 (8 interceptions and 11 fumbles) in the past seven. UNM has scored 57 points following those takeaways.
- New Mexico has fared much better than its opponents when it comes to taking advantage of errors. UNM has scored 78 points (9 TDs, 6 FGs) following the 25 takeaways while the opposition has tallied just 34 points following 21 Lobo turnovers. **Of the last 19 turnovers lost by New Mexico, opponents have scored three TDs and one FG.**

SEASON NOTES

- The 72-8 victory over Texas State-San Marcos ranks as the 9th-highest point total in school history while the 64-point victory margin is also No. 9 all-time by a Lobo team. UNM's 41-point outburst to start the game ties for the second-most in a first half and ties for fourth-best of any half.
- UNM senior kicker **Katie Hnida (NIGH-da; Littleton, Colo.)** became the first woman to score in an NCAA Div. I-A game when she converted both of her PATs against Texas State-San Marcos. Hnida was the first woman to play in a Div. I-A game when she attempted a PAT in last year's Las Vegas Bowl against UCLA. The kick was blocked.
- New Mexico has won four straight games at Qualcomm Stadium while the 23-point win is the Lobos' largest ever in San Diego.
- Wes Zunker kicked a 33-yard FG as time expired to give the Lobos a harrowing 37-34 victory over Colorado State. The game-winner came just seconds after Rams' QB Bradlee Van Pelt misplayed a shotgun snap, which was recovered by UNM NT Kyle Coulter at the CSU 16. Zunker's third field goal of the game was true, giving New Mexico its first win over the Rams since 1995 and first victory over CSU in Albuquerque since 1988.

LOBOS LOVE THE BYE WEEK

- Since 1998, UNM is 7-0 following scheduled open weeks under Rocky Long. Looking back further shows the Lobos have won 10 straight - since 1996 - following a scheduled break. The last loss after a bye was 48-42 to none other than San Diego State in Albuquerque on Oct. 19, 1996.

CAPTAINS

- The 2003 Lobo captains as chosen by their teammates last spring are all seniors: QB Casey Kelly and OT Jason Lenzmeier on offense and S Terrell Golden and NT D.J. Renteria on defense. Kelly, a former walk-on who graduated in four years last May, is a repeat selection.

EXCEEDING EXPECTATIONS

- UNM was picked to finish second in the 2003 MWC race by the league's media. That's believed to be the highest predicted finish for a New Mexico team going back the previous 40 years.

NO SUBSTITUTE FOR EXPERIENCE

- After having just 10 seniors on the 2002 team, UNM returned 53 lettermen, the most of any Lobo team ever and the most of any team in the Mountain West Conference in 2003. The next highest for a UNM squad was 1990 when 48 lettermen were back.
- Since 1963, only this year's squad and the 1978 team have returned as many as 17 position starters.
- The current roster shows a breakdown of 24 seniors, 22 juniors, 23 sophomores, 10 redshirt freshmen and 22 true freshmen.
- UNM boasts 10 three-year letterwinners, 17 two-year lettermen and 26 players who have one year of experience in a Lobo uniform.
- Of the 22 position players who started the season opener, only one - redshirt freshman offensive guard Robert Turner - had not played in a Lobo game prior to 2003.

DANGER FOR OPPOSING QUARTERBACKS

- New Mexico has been tops in the conference in quarterback sacks for the past three years. In 2000, New Mexico ranked second nationally with 50 sacks, the third-highest total in school history. UNM registered 26 dumps in 2001 and 38 last year.

THE SKINNY ON THE O-LINE

- Maybe that's the wrong word to use since the Lobos' offensive line ranked as the second-largest in the nation according to a poll conducted by the University of Houston media relations department prior to the season.
- Ranked as the nation's 10th-best unit by *Athlon* magazine, UNM's current five starters averages almost 6-foot-4 and 320.8 pounds, trailing

DEFENSIVE DOMINANCE

- Never has UNM's defense been so good as it has been the past three seasons. In fact, New Mexico is one of only eight schools to have its defense rank in the top-30 nationally each of the past three years (2000-02), the others being Kansas State, Oklahoma, Pittsburgh, TCU, Tennessee, Texas and Utah. UNM finished 17th in 2000 at 309.4 yards per game, 18th in 2001 at 310.8 yards and 30th last year at 332.8 yards.
- The last five games of the 2002 season, the UNM defense allowed just 61 points (5 TDs, 9 field goals), 415 yards rushing, 744 yards passing and 1,159 yards total. Those are meager averages of 12.2 points and 231.8 yards a game. New Mexico moved from 79th to 30th in the nation in total defense in its last five games.

TOUGH AT HOME

- New Mexico is 13-4 in its last 17 home games overall and 17-6 since the middle of the 2000 season. UNM was 5-1 at home in 2002, 3-0 in the MWC.

GAME-DAY COACHING ASSIGNMENTS

- Head coach Rocky Long is joined on the sidelines by assistant coaches Bob Bostad (offensive line), Jeff Conway (special teams/receivers), Curtis Luper (running backs), Lenny Rodriguez (linebackers) and Everett Todd (cornerbacks). Upstairs in the press box are offensive coordinator Dan Dodd, defensive coordinator Osia Lewis, tight ends coach Jason Strauss and safeties coach Grady Stretz.

A PROGRAM ON THE RISE

- New Mexico has won 62 games (61-66 overall record) the past 10-plus seasons, since 1993. In 10 seasons from 1983-92, the Lobos prevailed just 29 times, which is less than three victories a year.
- New Mexico has really improved in conference play. UNM was 11-58 in the Western Athletic Conference in eight seasons from 1984-91. The final six years of the WAC, the Lobos were 20-28, including the 1997 WAC division title. After going 1-7 in its final year in the Western Athletic Conference, UNM has compiled a 19-15 mark in the first five seasons of the MWC, including 5-2 last year.

CHANGE ON THE STAFF

- On Jan. 3, 2003, Osia (pronounced oh-SAY) Lewis was named the Lobos' new defensive coordinator. Lewis comes to UNM after six seasons (1997-2002) as a defensive assistant at the University of Illinois. He replaced Bronco Mendenhall, who accepted the defensive coordinator position at BYU.
- Lewis, 40, is hooking up with Rocky Long for the second time as the two coaches spent five seasons together (1991-95) at Oregon State. Long was the Beavers' defensive coordinator under head coach Jerry Pettibone while Lewis coached the outside linebackers and special teams. Lewis will also oversee the defensive line.
- Additionally, former Lobos Holmon Wiggins and Desmar Black are helping out this fall. Wiggins completed his eligibility in 2001, Black in 2002.

SUPPORTING THE HOME TEAM

- After many, many years where season tickets languished at less than 5,000, the University of New Mexico has surpassed 10,700 season tickets for the 10th consecutive season.
- The top-10 gates in University Stadium history have occurred since 1993, including a record throng of 44,075 Lobo enthusiasts for this year's encounter against New Mexico State.

STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE

- Thanks to New Mexico Governor Bill Richardson and members of the State Legislature, UNM received \$2 million to complete the next phase in the renovation of University Stadium. The bill was sponsored by Rep. Kiki Saavedra. Construction will begin on the northeast corner of the stadium the Monday following UNM's final home game and is expected to be completed in time for the start of the 2004 season. New restrooms, concessions stands, ticket booths

and storage will be built.

- The next phase is to renovate the remaining two corners of the stadium with new entrances, ticket booths, restrooms and concession stands. The final phase is to expand and renovate the south of the stadium. Another 5,000 seats will be added, increasing capacity to 42,000.
- University Stadium was expanded prior to the start of the 2001 season. Capacity was increased to 37,370 as 5,700 seats were added at the north end. The east and west stands were connected by a pavilion and LoboVision, a state-of-the-art videboard and scoreboard, was added.
- The northwest corner of the stadium was completed prior to the 2001 season and features a revamped entrance with new ticket booths, concession stands, restrooms, novelty stands and landscaping.

2002 REVIEW

- UNM finished 7-7 overall after falling to UCLA 27-13, in the Sega Sports Las Vegas Bowl. The 14 games played is a school record. The bowl appearance was not solidified until the last game of the regular season when the Lobos beat Wyoming, 49-20. That victory also locked up second place in the eight-team Mountain West Conference for a team that was picked to finish sixth in the preseason poll. UNM won five of its last six conference games to finish 5-2 in the MWC.
- Following a humiliating 49-0 shutout at the hands of Texas Tech - seen by a national audience on ESPN - on Friday, Sept. 27, the Lobos were reeling at 2-4.
- Only four teams in NCAA Div. I-A started 2-4 or worse in 2002 and qualified for a bowl game: Oklahoma State (2-4), North Texas (1-5), Cincinnati (2-5) and the Lobos (2-4).
- After losing to Air Force in the conference opener on Sept. 7, New

Mexico won five of its last six league games, including four straight for the first time since 1982. UNM won five conference games for only the seventh time.

- The Lobos reached seven wins for the 15th time in school history, but for only the second time since going 10-1 in 1982. UNM was 9-4 in 1997.
- In addition to getting their first victory at BYU since 1971, the Lobos also collected their first win against San Diego State in Albuquerque since 1983 and their first-ever triumph at UNLV.

GPA CLIMBS UNDER LONG

- The University of New Mexico football team compiled a 2.69 grade-point-average for the 2003 spring semester, the highest GPA since UNM began charting grades in the fall of 1988.
- UNM had a 2.63 GPA in the spring of 2002, which means the top-five semester grade-point-averages have been attained under current head coach Rocky Long, all in the past five semesters.

WOMEN'S CLINIC DRAWS RECORD CROWD

- Almost 400 football-starved females attended the 10th UNM Women's Football Clinic on Aug. 4. The clinic benefits the UNM Send-A-Kid program, which provides local underprivileged kids the opportunity to attend a Lobo football game. The proceeds from this year's event alone raised enough money for 900 kids to see the Lobos this year. Nearly 8,000 tickets have been distributed since the program was initiated in 1994.
- After registration and a light meal, the women took a tour of the Tow Diehm Facility, visiting the weightroom, Lobo locker room and the training room. Then, it was out to the field as the assistant coaches and selected UNM players helped explain and demonstrate the skills of their respective positions.

SUCCESSFUL WALK-ONS

- Some of the better-known Lobos - past and present - began their careers as walk-ons, including four team captains over the past three years. Former players Jarrod Baxter, Brian Johnson and Mohammed Konte all started their UNM careers without athletic scholarships, as did quarterback Casey Kelly, an offensive team captain in 2002 and '03, who was awarded a scholarship prior to his sophomore campaign.
- Baxter, a fifth-round pick of the Houston Texans in the 2002 National Football League Draft, was a walk-on during the fall semester of 1997 under former head coach Dennis Franchione. He was placed on scholarship in the spring of 1998. Johnson, a two-time first team all-conference selection, was a 195-pound walk-on running back when he came to UNM in the fall of '97. He had to wait a year for a scholarship after impressing Long and his staff during '98 spring drills. Konte, also a redshirt in '97, paid his own way for three years before being placed on aid in the fall of 2000 and earned honorable mention all-MWC honors.
- Former walk-ons placed on scholarship prior to the 2001 season were senior S Terrell Golden, a two-year starter and honorable mention all-conference selection in 2001, and senior WR Terrence Thomas. The

2002 recipients were S Josh Bazinet, C Ryan Cook, deep snapper Martin Lovato, TE Ryan Rice and K Wes Zunker.

- Sophomore P Tyler Gaus was awarded a scholarship for 2003.

LOBOS IN OVERTIME

- The Lobos are 2-4 all-time in overtime games, including losses at Air Force (38-31) and Utah State (45-44) and a 42-35 double overtime win against Utah in 2002. New Mexico lost 16-13 at Baylor in 2001. UNM played a pair of OT games in 1998, winning 39-36 in triple-OT against Utah State and losing to San Diego State 36-33 in a single overtime.

WORDS FROM ROCKY

- (on Air Force) -- "I thought we had a good game plan going in, but you never can tell until the players execute. And, I thought the players executed it very well. We made some mistakes that gave them some plays, but we didn't make too many of them. I was disappointed they scored at the end because I thought we were going to keep them out of the endzone. That disappointed me and disappointed our defensive players because that's as good as we can play. That's a great offensive football team. They're close to tops in the nation in several categories and they score a lot of points. That was a great effort by our defense. It was a great effort by our offense too, which helped our defense. It's real hard to score points if they don't have the ball. I thought the crowd was great. It was a beautiful afternoon and when I came out of the tunnel all I saw was red in the stands. That's a great atmosphere and the fans really had an impact on our performance."

(On DonTrell Moore's performance): "DonTrell is pretty amazing. They couldn't tackle him, just like we couldn't tackle (CSU QB Bradlee) Van Pelt last week. It's just really nice to have one on your side. We didn't have as many big plays because Air Force does a real nice job of playing an umbrella-type defense. I thought their defense played very well, but I thought our offensive line was as good as they've been the last half of the season."

(On Wyoming) -- "I know I've said this for the past month, but it's another game with a lot on the line for both teams. We would like a shot at tying for the conference championship and playing another game next month. Wyoming can still become bowl eligible as they finish with two home games. Joe Glenn has done a great job in the short time he has been there. They are really going to be a force in the league real soon. I think Wyoming has the best throwing quarterback in the league and he has three outstanding receivers. It's difficult going from two games (CSU and Air Force) that like to run first to a team that will be throwing all afternoon. Sometimes it takes our defense a little time to get adjusted to the change in offensive philosophies. The weather could be an obstacle, too, but we can't worry about that."

GAME 12 • NEW MEXICO AT WYOMING • GAME NOTES

November 30, 2002 • University Stadium

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. -- Behind career days by Casey Kelly and DonTrell Moore, and a suffocating pass rush, the New Mexico Lobos smoked the Wyoming Cowboys defense for 456 total yards in a 49-20 rout, ensuring the team its second bowl invitation since 1961.

New Mexico moved to 7-6 overall to increase its win total every year since 1999. The Lobos, picked to finish sixth in the Mountain West Conference preseason polls, completed the league schedule all alone in second place with a mark of 5-2.

Kelly was 7-of-11 passing for 164 yards and a career-high four touchdowns and no interceptions, and added a career-high 84 yards rushing on 12 carries. Moore rushed for 176 yards on 28 carries and tied a school record by scoring five touchdowns (three rushing and two receiving) to lead the Lobos. Moore's 1,117 yards rushing are the most ever by a Lobo freshman and a total that ranks 3rd-best in a UNM season.

The Lobo defense was equally impressive, sacking standout Wyoming quarterback Casey Bramlett a school-record-tying nine times and holding him to 203 yards passing, more than 77 yards under his season average. The New Mexico defense also forced three Bramlett interceptions, two by safety Brandon Ratcliff.

The Lobos jumped on the board early, marching 80 yards to take a 7-0 lead on a 1-yard run by Moore at the 11:18 mark of the first half. The drive was spearheaded by Kelly's 43-yard completion to Joe Manning on UNM's first play from scrimmage, and a 28-yard run by Moore. UNM made it 14-0 on a 7-yard touchdown run by Moore. His scamper was set up by defensive end D.J Renteria's interception of a tipped Bramlett pass at the Wyoming 7.

The Cowboys kept it close until a 21-point third quarter burst by New Mexico - highlighted by a 28-yard flea-flicker from Kelly to Dwight Counter - put the game out of reach.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Katie Hnida knelt under the south goal posts at University Stadium, silently reflecting on her journey into the record book.

The senior walk-on from Littleton, Colo., became the first woman to score in a Division I game, booting a pair of extra points in New Mexico's 72-8 win over Texas State-San Marcos on Saturday night.

Hnida, a 5-foot-10, 140-pound senior, entered the game with 5:05 left in the fourth quarter after New Mexico scored on a 20-yard touchdown pass from third-string quarterback Tali Ena to Hank Baskett.

Hnida, her long blond hair protruding from the back of her helmet, split the uprights with her kick to give the Lobos a 65-8 lead, then waved her hands in the air.

Hnida also kicked a low extra point after the Lobos' final touchdown with 1:21 left.

DonTrell Moore ran for four touchdowns and Casey Kelly threw for three more, but had to share the stage with Hnida's late-game trot into the record book.

By the time Hnida entered the game, only a fraction of the kickoff time crowd of 35,331 remained.

New Mexico scored on all six of its first half possessions, with Moore scoring three TDs in the first quarter on runs of 16, 2 and 14 yards. Kelly took over in the second quarter with scoring passes of 14, 32 and 6 yards.

Moore and Kelly both left the game in the third quarter. Moore, who rushed for 1,134 yards last season, had 109 yards on 20 carries and Kelly was 12-for-16 for 165 yards.

Kelly made it 27-0 with a 14-yard scoring pass to tight end Mike Augustyniak on the first play of the second quarter and Texas State then got its only score of the night when Barrick Nealy threw a 70-yard touchdown pass to John Tyson.

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - B.J. Symons threw for five touchdowns and ran for another as Texas Tech beat New Mexico 42-28 Saturday night.

After D.D. Cox's 3-yard touchdown run pulled New Mexico within 35-28 in the fourth quarter, Symons engineered one last drive. He took the Red Raiders (2-0) 66 yards in 12 plays and took the ball in from the 1 on a quarterback sneak with 2:43 left.

He finished 37-of-54 for 418 yards.

The Lobos (1-1) turned the ball over four times in the game. Casey Kelly was intercepted three times, but Tech only turned one of those into a score.

Symons' performance in his first two starts for Tech has already brought him more yards (715) and passing touchdowns (eight) than he compiled during his three years as a backup (545 yards and seven touchdowns) to record-setting quarterback Kliff Kingsbury.

Three of Symons' touchdowns went to Mickey Peters, two for 8 yards and one for 52. Peters, who finished with 121 yards on eight receptions, has already tallied half as many TD passes this year (four) as he had all of last season.

Tech safety Ryan Aycock intercepted two passes, giving him three for the season. He had one all of last season.

The only time New Mexico got inside Tech's 15 in the first half, Kelly threw into double coverage and safety Vincent Meeks came out with the ball.

Defense and special teams set up Tech's first two scores, both 8-yard touchdown passes from Symons to Peters.

Early in the first quarter, Aycock intercepted his first pass of the night when Tech lineman Fred Threweatt tipped a pass by Kelly. Aycock pulled it in and returned 14 yards.

Symons then connected on four straight passes, the last one for an 8-yard score to Peters to put Tech up 7-0.

The Lobos failed to get a first down on their ensuing possession, and Tech's Wes Welker returned the punt 31 yards to New Mexico's 31. Welker's return made him the school's punt return yardage leader with 1,470 yards.

A short time later, Symons lobbed an 8-yard pass to Peters in the corner of the end zone for a 14-0 lead.

Until the Lobos opening drive of the second half, it looked like Tech might hold them scoreless for a second consecutive year. But New Mexico drove 80 yards in

PULLMAN, WASH. (AP) - Drew Dunning kicked a school-record five field goals as No. 24 Washington State beat New Mexico 23-13 Saturday.

The Cougars (3-1) had a difficult time figuring out the Lobos' defense and didn't score a touchdown until late in the third quarter, when quarterback Matt Kegel pushed across from the 1-yard line.

It was the first TD in five tries inside New Mexico's 20 as the Lobos dug in on defense and Washington State was backed up by penalties. Kegel was ineffective in the red zone, but completed 29 of 42 passes for 346 yards without an interception. The Cougars got 27 first downs to New Mexico's 12 and held the Lobos to just 22 yards rushing.

The Lobos (1-3) took a 13-12 lead just before the half after the Cougars were forced to punt and Casey Kelly hit Dwight Counter with a 50-yard touchdown pass down the right sideline.

Kelly, who completed 16 of 32 for 214 and a touchdown, caught another touchdown pass for the Lobos' first score in the second quarter.

Trailing 9-0, Kelly handed off to wide receiver Terrence Thomas, who threw a touchdown pass back across the field to his wide-open quarterback. Wes Zunker's extra point attempt was blocked.

The Cougars settled for four field goals in the first half after failing to score three times inside the New Mexico 6. Dunning hit from 37, 36, 23, 21 and 49 yards.

Cougars starting running back Jonathan Smith was sidelined with a concussion in the first quarter, but was cleared to play after the half, finishing with 30 yards on 13 carries.

Lobos tailback DonTrell Moore gained only 21 yards on 11 carries. Smith was starting in place of regular starter Jermaine Green, who missed practices this week with an undisclosed illness, but led the Cougars with 48 yards rushing as a reserve. Backup Chris Bruhn gained 43 yards on nine carries.

Washington State was hit with a dozen penalties for 118 yards, including a couple of costly unsportsmanlike conduct calls after Kelly had been sacked.

Kegel's favorite target was Devard Darling, who caught nine passes for 117 yards. Sammy Moore caught five for 98 yards and had 61 return yards, including one for 48 yards.

Adrian Boyd caught eight passes for 100 yards to lead the Lobos. It was the fifth time in six years New Mexico started its season with a 1-3 record.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - New Mexico's defense converted three New Mexico State turnovers into 17 third-quarter points as the Lobos rallied for a 24-17 victory Saturday night.

The game between the state's only two Division I schools was played before a crowd of 44,075, the largest ever to watch a college football game in New Mexico.

New Mexico (2-3) erased a 14-7 New Mexico State lead, by converting two interceptions and a fumbled punt by the Aggies into an 11-yard TD run by DonTrell Moore, a 43-yard field goal by Wes Zunker and a 7-yard scoring pass from Kole McKamey to Hank Baskett.

Moore's touchdown, his second of the game, and Zunker's field goal, occurred in the third quarter and McKamey's pass to Baskett came with 13:29 left in the game.

That score was set up by Ronshay Jenkins' fumble of a New Mexico punt deep in NMSU territory. Martin Lovato hit Jenkins just as the punt arrived and Lobo Kevin Walton recovered the ball at the NMSU 8.

Until New Mexico's defense took over, the combination of Jenkins and quarterback Buck Pierce had carried the Aggies (1-3).

Jenkins, a senior who had caught only one touchdown pass coming into the game, twice got behind New Mexico's secondary to score on pass plays of 39 and 72 yards in the second quarter. On the second score, New Mexico had only 10 players on the field.

Jenkins had eight catches for 200 yards.

Moore, who had 113 yards on 30 carries, gave New Mexico a 7-0 lead with a 2-yard run with 8:47 left in the first quarter. Moore rushed for 50 of the 72 yards in the nine-play drive.

New Mexico had three turnovers in the first half - two of them interceptions thrown by Casey Kelly. But the Aggies didn't get any points off the three turnovers, continuing a season-long pattern of failing to cash in on opponents' mistakes.

NMSU's defense has forced eight turnovers, but the offense has yet to convert any of them into points.

New Mexico State's only points in the second half were on a 31-yard field goal by Dario Aguiniga midway through the fourth quarter.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - DonTrell Moore ran for two touchdowns and Casey Kelly passed for 230 yards Saturday as New Mexico beat Utah State 34-7.

Moore, who rushed for 132 yards on 30 carries, scored in the first half on runs of 6 and 2 yards and Kelly shook off a slow start to consistently find open receivers.

After completing just 2 of 7 passes in the first quarter, Kelly finished 13-of-22, including a 39-yard TD pass to Dwight Counter with 8:53 left in the second quarter.

That score and Moore's second touchdown sparked a 17-point quarter by New Mexico (3-3) that broke open a 10-7 game.

Utah State (1-4) got its only score on a 79-yard pass from Travis Cox to Barry Tolli with 12:10 left in the second quarter, 17 seconds after Moore scored.

The Aggies, who came into the game averaging 322 yards in total offense, never got their offense untracked against the Lobos' blitzing defense. Cox completed 13 of 27 passes for 162 of the Aggies' 221 total yards.

New Mexico also got field goals of 24 and 41 yards from Wes Zunker and a 6-yard touchdown run from D.D. Cox.

The Lobos forced two Utah State turnovers in the first quarter, a fumble by Travis Cox and a fumbled punt by Tony Pennyman. New Mexico didn't get any points off Cox's fumble, but Pennyman's fumbled punt was recovered by Lobo defensive back Jerrell Malone at the Utah State 19. Moore then carried the ball four straight times, scoring with 3:14 left in the quarter.

Counter had 106 yards receiving on just four catches, his longest being a 46-yarder to the Utah State 3 that set up Zunker's second field goal early in the third quarter.

Kelly, the target of criticism from Lobo fans in recent weeks, had his best game since throwing for 349 yards against Texas Tech a month ago.

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)-New Mexico ensured Utah's first appearance in the national rankings in seven years will be a short one.

DonTrell Moore ran for 119 yards and two touchdowns and D.D. Cox added 106 yards and a score as the Lobos gained 633 yards in a 47-35 victory over the No. 24 Utes on Saturday.

The Lobos (5-3, 2-1 Mountain West) were nearly as effective on defense, holding the Utes to 300 yards - 91 below their average. It was New Mexico's first win over a ranked opponent since 1994 - a 23-21 upset of then-No. 9 Utah - and the first time the Lobos won on the road against a ranked team since beating No. 13 Arizona 44-34 exactly 28 years before Saturday.

The Utes (6-2, 3-1) came out flat and allowed the most points they had since a 51-10 loss to Rice in 1996, which had been their last game as a ranked team. Utah was No. 20 before the loss to the Owls.

On Saturday, The Utes couldn't shut down New Mexico when they needed to most. The Lobos converted 8 of 18 third downs and had five plays go for 40 yards or more.

The Utes were the only Mountain West team without a league loss and could have clinched the MWC title outright by winning their last four games, but they never recovered from a sluggish first half.

Alex Smith, who was off target early in the game, completed 18 of 32 passes for 220 yards and four touchdowns, but most of Smith's offense came as the Utes tried to rally in the second half.

Mike Liti came in when Brandon Warfield left with a sprained knee in the first quarter and ran for 81 yards and a touchdown on 13 carries, but gained just a yard after halftime for the Utes.

Wes Zunker kicked four field goals for New Mexico and Casey Kelly was 9-of-23 for 226 yards and a touchdown and ran 15 times for 68 yards for the Lobos. From the end of the second quarter to early in the third, New Mexico scored on five straight possessions to turn a 14-13 deficit into a 36-14 lead.

The Lobos scored on their first play of the second half when Kelly threw a 57-yard touchdown pass to Adrian Boyd to put New Mexico up 23-14.

New Mexico forced a quick punt by Utah and needed just two plays to score again. Kelly threw a 40-yard pass to Dwight Counter, then Cox ran 20 yards for a score and a 30-14 lead. The Lobos had the ball for a combined 22 seconds on both scoring drives.

Adrian Byrd, who finished with 98 yards rushing, had a 78-yard run on the next drive that ended with a 23-yard field goal by Zunker, who added a 36-yarder on the next possession.

Utah finally snapped New Mexico's 23-0 scoring run after Morgan Scalley returned a kick 89 yards and Smith threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Steve Savoy with 4:22 left in the third quarter. But the Lobos stopped Paris Warren's 2-point conversion attempt, then marched 78 yards to take a 44-20 lead on Moore's 35-yard touchdown run with 1:04 left in the third quarter and squash Utah's hopes of coming back.

Utah caught a few breaks to take a 14-13 lead in the second quarter. Dave Revill pounced on a fumble for Utah at the New Mexico 18 and Liti scored his first career touchdown five plays later on a 2-yard run to make it 7-0 Utah.

The Utes' second touchdown came on a floating, 21-yard pass from Smith to Savoy that easily could have been intercepted. New Mexico's Gabriel Fullbright waited in the end zone as the ball wobbled through the air, but Savoy stepped around Fullbright and made the catch.

Billy Strother scored on a blocked punt that gave New Mexico a 13-7 lead.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Jamaal Brimmer's 62-yard fourth quarter interception return, one of six New Mexico turnovers, gave UNLV a 37-35 win Saturday night.

UNLV (5-4, 1-3 MWC) snapped a three-game losing streak and ended New Mexico's four-game winning streak.

UNLV converted most of New Mexico's mistakes - three fumbles and three interceptions - into points, with Brimmer's untouched return TD of a Casey Kelly pass the eventual game-winner.

New Mexico (5-4, 2-2 MWC) had cut the Rebels' lead to 30-28 on an 8-yard TD run by Kelly and the Lobos were in UNLV territory again when Kelly threw the ball right into Brimmer's hands with just over six minutes left in the game. Brimmer raced down the right sideline for a 37-28 UNLV lead.

The Lobos, who would have moved into second place in the Mountain West Conference with a win, came right back with an 85-yard, 12-play drive, that ended with DonTrell Moore scoring from a yard out.

New Mexico then forced UNLV to punt and took over the ball at its own 20 with 3:00 remaining and no timeouts left. That last chance ended when Kelly's third-down pass was tipped in the air and intercepted by Rebels linebacker Ryan Claridge. UNLV then ran out the clock.

UNLV safety Joe Miklos recovered two fumbles and had an interception. He returned a fumble by Moore 61 yards for a touchdown in the second quarter, the ball bouncing out of Moore's hands and into Miklos'.

There were plenty of other big plays by UNLV's defense, which more than made up for the loss of starting quarterback Kurt Nantkes to an injury in the second quarter.

Nantkes was replaced by sophomore Scott Turner, the son of Miami Dolphins offensive coordinator Norv Turner. The younger Turner completed just 3 of 6 passes for 12 yards. Kelly, meanwhile, completed 23 of 38 passes for 408 yards, but the Lobos could not overcome the turnovers.

Moore rushed for 130 yards on 17 carries, the most yards giving up by UNLV to an opposing back this season. Moore, who fumbled twice, also threw a 21-yard halfback option touchdown pass to Adrian Boyd.

UNLV's Dillon Pieffer kicked three field goals, including a career-best 50-yarder with 2:24 left in the third quarter. That score was set up by a roughing the kicker penalty on the Lobos.

NEW MEXICO 37, COLORADO STATE 34

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Wes Zunker kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired Friday night to give New Mexico a 37-34 win over Colorado State and keep the Lobos' bowl hopes alive.

Zunker's game-winner - his 13th straight successful field goal this season - was set up by a CSU fumble on a bad snap to quarterback Bradlee Van Pelt, who was in the shotgun formation, with just over a minute left.

New Mexico defensive end Kyle Coulter beat Van Pelt to the ball and recovered at the CSU 17. Two plays later, Zunker kicked the winning field goal.

Zunker's kick and halfback DonTrell Moore's record-setting performance gave New Mexico (6-4, 3-2) it's first win over CSU since the Mountain West Conference was formed in 1999.

The loss was the second straight for CSU (5-5, 2-3) and hurt the Rams' bid for a fifth straight trip to a bowl.

Moore rushed for a career-high 242 yards and scored three times to set the school single-season record for touchdowns.

Zunker added field goals of 27 and 40 yards, and that was just enough to offset a solid performance by Van Pelt.

Van Pelt rallied the Rams from a 31-14 second-half deficit, engineering a pair of fourth-quarter scoring drives. He threw a 15-yard touchdown pass to David Anderson on a fourth-and-goal with 10:18 left, and tied the game at 37-all with a 1-yard run on fourth down with 3:07 left.

CSU twice converted on fourth down situations on that drive. CSU's defense then held New Mexico and forced a punt with 1:02 left. The Rams took over at their 32, and the bad snap occurred on their first play from scrimmage.

New Mexico dominated the game until the fourth quarter. With the Lobos' offensive line opening big holes, Moore repeatedly had runs of 10 yards or more and scored from 8, 22 and 45 yards in the second quarter.

Moore has scored 17 touchdowns this season, breaking the previous record of 16 set by wide receiver Terence Mathis in 1989.

Van Pelt and place-kicker Jeff Babcock carried CSU. Van Pelt was the Rams' most effective weapon on offense with his tackle-breaking runs and passing. He had 300 of CSU's 328 total yards - 83 rushing and 217 passing.

The rest of the Rams' points came on Babcock field goals of 22, 24, 40 and 33 yards.

Moore's first touchdown with 11:48 left in the second quarter was set up by quarterback Casey Kelly's 52-yard run on the option to the CSU 30. Moore took it the rest of the way with four straight rushes.

Moore scored again with 6:15 remaining in the second, after CSU's Dexter Wynn fumbled a punt at the Rams' 30 and Josh Bazinet recovered.

Wynn redeemed himself with an 88-yard return on the ensuing kickoff, and Van Pelt scored on the first play. A two-point conversion pass from Van Pelt to David Anderson cut the New Mexico lead to 17-14.

New Mexico needed just six plays to go 80 yards, with Moore racing the final 45 and giving the Lobos a 24-14 lead at halftime.

The Lobos opened the second half with a four-play, 72-yard drive that took just 1:43. The drive was punctuated by Kelly tossing a 41-yard scoring pass to Dwight Counter.

NEW MEXICO 24, AIR FORCE 12

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - DonTrell Moore, the nation's leading scorer, ran for two touchdowns and 188 yards, setting the single-season school rushing record in New Mexico's 24-12 win over Air Force on Saturday.

New Mexico (7-4, 4-2) moved a step closer to its third bowl bid in 42 years and into second place in the Mountain West Conference.

Air Force (7-4, 3-3) came into the game with the nation's third best rushing attack at just under 302 yards a game, but the Falcons' option offense found few holes in the Lobos' everyone-to-the-ball defense.

Air Force finished with season lows in yards rushing (158), points and total offense (273). At the half the Falcons had just 61 yards rushing and got most of the rest after the game had been decided.

Darnell Stephens scored Air Force's only touchdown on a 1-yard run with 1:14 left in the game. Joey Ashcroft kicked field goals of 25 and 26 yards in the second quarter.

Moore, spinning and squinting through the Falcons' defense, had his eighth game this season of over 100 yards and his seventh multi-TD game of the season. His 9-yard run with 10:58 left in the game broke the single season record of 1,240 yards by Mike Williams in 1976. Moore now has 1,285 yards.

Moore, who had a career-high 36 carries, has scored 20 touchdowns this season, 19 of them rushing. He went into the game as the Division I scoring leader, one TD ahead of Pittsburgh wide receiver Larry Fitzgerald.

New Mexico scored on its first two possessions with drives of 59 and 76 yards, with Moore finishing off both of them from a yard out. Moore ate up most of the yardage on the first drive, getting the ball on the final seven plays.

Quarterback Casey Kelly provided the key plays in the Lobos' second scoring drive, running for 28 yards on two carries and throwing a 28-yard pass to Michael Augustyniak to the Air Force 1. Two plays later, Moore walked into the end zone off an option play.

New Mexico opened the second half with a 75-yard drive that ate up six minutes and ended with a 23-yard field goal by Wes Zunker, his 14th straight connection this season.

The Lobos put the game away early in the fourth quarter with a 10-yard scoring pass from Kelly to Adrian Boyd. Moore got his rushing record in that drive and 53 of the 67 yards in the drive.

New Mexico had 274 rushing yards and its ground game was so effective that Kelly threw only 10 times, completing five for 90 yards.
