INSIDE THE GAME

PENN STATE OPENS 2019 SEASON HOSTING IDAHO

- OPENING KICK:** No. 15/14 Penn State opens its 133rd season of football by hosting Idaho in Beaver Stadium in the first matchup between the schools. Game time is set for 3:30 p.m. on BTN.
- LOOK WHO'S BACK:** Penn State returns 37 lettermen from last year's Top 25 squad - 13 on offense, 21 on defense and three on special teams. The Nittany Lions return 14 starters - five on offense, six on defense and three on special teams. Eleven additional Penn Staters have starting experience - five on offense, five on defense and one specialist. Among the returning starters are 2018 All-Big Ten first-team honoree **Yetur Gross-Matos**, as well as honorable-mention selections **Steven Gonzalez**, **KJ Hamler**, **Micah Parsons**, **John Reid**, **Garrett Taylor** and **Robert Windsor**. **Pat Freiermuth**, Hamler and Parsons were also Freshman All-Americans.
- STARTING OFF RIGHT:** Penn State has won 15 of its last 17 season-opening contests and its last six consecutive home openers. All-time, the Nittany Lions are 109-21-2 in season-opening games.
- RARE MATCHUP:** Idaho is Penn State's first Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) opponent since the 2011 season opener against Indiana State. From 2012-18, Penn State was one of just six Power Five schools (Michigan, Notre Dame, Texas, USC, UCLA) to not play an FCS opponent. Forty-six different Power Five schools have scheduled 48 games against FCS opponents this season.
- THE OPPOSITION:** Idaho went 4-7 overall last season and 3-5 in Big Sky Conference play, and is returning eight starters on offense and five on defense from that team. The Vandals are returning four starters on their offensive line, including STATS FCS preseason first-team All-American Noah Johnson. Additionally, punter Cade Coffey was named to STATS' preseason All-America second team.

PROGRAM NOTES

SUSTAINED EXCELLENCE

Penn State and Wisconsin are the only Big Ten teams to have posted a winning season the last 14 consecutive years. Penn State is one of five teams (Penn State, Boise State, LSU, Oklahoma, Wisconsin) in FBS to have a winning record each of the last 14 years. Penn State holds the FBS record for most consecutive seasons without a losing record at 49 (1939-87). (ESPN Stats & Info)

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A total of 452 of Penn State football student-athletes, including 28 in 2018, have earned Academic All-Big Ten honors since 1993 for owning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner.

ONE OF NATION'S TOUGHEST HOME VENUES

Penn State owns a superlative 290-74 (.797) record inside Beaver Stadium, the nation's second-largest facility, which opened in 1960 and has a capacity of 106,572.

NOTABLE

- Penn State snapped a streak of two consecutive losses in season openers with a 27-24 win over UCF in 2002. The Nittany Lions broke open a 10-9 game at the half with 17 points in the second half, and then fended off a Knights rally in the fourth quarter.
- Christian Hackenberg became just the second true freshman quarterback since 1911 to start a Penn State season opener and directed the Nittany Lions to a 23-17 victory over Syracuse at MetLife Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Hackenberg was 22-of-31 for 278 yards, throwing a pair of 50-yard plus touchdown passes en route to the first of his five Big Ten Freshmen of the Week accolades.

HEAD COACH JAMES FRANKLIN

CAREER AT A GLANCE

- Franklin was named the 16th head football coach of the Nittany Lion program on January 11, 2014.
- Franklin is in his ninth year as a collegiate head coach, leading his first eight squads to bowl games.
- Franklin is one of seven current FBS head coaches to lead his teams to a bowl game in each of his first eight seasons as a head coach.
- Franklin is one of three current Big Ten coaches (Mark Dantonio, Kirk Ferentz) to have won a Big Ten Championship.
- He owns a 69-36 career record, with six consecutive winning seasons.
- Franklin has led his teams to two Top 10 finishes (2 at Penn State) and five Top 25 finishes (2 at Vanderbilt; 3 at Penn State).
- Under Franklin, Penn State is one of six teams (Alabama, Clemson, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Washington) to rank in the Top 15 of the CFP final rankings in each of the last three seasons.
- Franklin led the Nittany Lions to back-to-back New Year's Six bowls in 2016 (Rose) and 2017 (Fiesta) for the first time since 1985 (Orange) and 1986 (Fiesta).
- Franklin has 24 years of coaching experience at the collegiate and NFL level.
- In his first eight years as a head coach, Franklin mentored 68 players who have gone on to the NFL ranks.
- Franklin has secured top-25 recruiting classes each of his last seven seasons, including a top-5 class at Penn State in 2018.

NITTANY LIONS ON THE FIELD

- In **2018**, the Nittany Lions posted their third-straight season with at least nine wins in 2018 with a 9-4 overall record, earning a berth in the VRBO Citrus Bowl. Penn State finished No. 12 in the final CFP rankings and No. 17 in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls. Penn State has finished in the AP Top 25 in the last three consecutive seasons for the first time since a seven-year stint from 1993-99.
- Penn State continued to be among the nation's elite in **2017**, climbing as high as No. 2 in the rankings and appearing in a second-straight New Year's Six bowl, earning a 35-28 win over No. 11 Washington in the PlayStation Fiesta Bowl. The Nittany Lions earned back-to-back 11-win seasons for the fifth time in program history and first time since 2008 and 2009 with an 11-2 record. Penn State finished the season No. 8 in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls and No. 9 in the final CFP rankings.
- Penn State surged in **2016**, winning nine consecutive games en route to the Big Ten Championship, a Rose Bowl berth and an 11-3 overall record. Penn State finished the season ranked No. 5 in the College Football Playoff rankings and No. 7 in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls. It was Penn State's highest finish in the polls since 2005. The Lions claimed their fourth overall Big Ten Championship and first outright title since 1994 with a thrilling 38-31 comeback win over Wisconsin in the Big Ten Championship Game. Franklin was honored as Sporting News National Coach of the Year and the Woody Hayes National Coach of the Year, as well as the Dave McLain Big Ten Coach of the Year and Associated Press Big Ten Coach of the Year.
- Franklin guided the Nittany Lions to a 7-6 record in **2015** and a berth in the TaxSlayer Bowl.
- Franklin's first season in **2014** was bookended with a pair of thrilling victories for the Nittany Lions. His inaugural season began with a final-play 26-24 victory over UCF in Dublin, Ireland, in Penn State's first-ever international game and ended with a comeback, a 31-30 overtime win over Boston College in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl in Yankee Stadium. Franklin became just the third Penn State coach to lead the team to at least seven wins in his first season, joining Dick Harlow (1915) and Bill O'Brien (2012), and he guided the Nittany Lions to a 4-0 start, joining Harlow as the only first-year Penn State coaches to win their initial four games.

NITTANY LIONS IN THE CLASSROOM

- Quarterback Trace McSorley was selected as a 2018 National Football Foundation (NFF) Scholar-Athlete and a finalist for the Campbell Trophy, known as the "Academic Heisman." He was the 18th Nittany Lion to be selected as an NFF Scholar-Athlete.
- Two Nittany Lions have garnered Google Cloud CoSIDA Academic All-America recognition. Punter Blake Gillikin earned first-team honors in 2018 and long snapper Tyler Yazujian collected a berth on the CoSIDA Academic All-America first team in 2016 after an appearance on the second team in 2015. Penn State has 66 Academic All-America honorees all-time, which ranks second in Division I football history (FBS and FCS).
- The Nittany Lions had a program-record 35 student-athletes claim Academic All-Big Ten honors in the fall of 2017.
- The 2015 fall semester saw the Nittany Lions post a record 56 squad members with at least a 3.0 grade-point average (GPA).
- During Franklin's first fall semester on campus, the football student-athletes set program records with 25 student-athletes earning Dean's List recognition (3.5 GPA) and 57 players owning a cumulative 3.0 GPA or higher after the 2014 fall semester. The spring of 2015 saw continued success in the classroom with 51 student-athletes compiling at least a 3.0 GPA, marking the first time in program history with 50 or more 3.0s in a spring semester.

NITTANY LIONS IN THE COMMUNITY

- The Nittany Lions are active in the community, participating in activities such as Uplifting Athletes, THON, Pennsylvania Special Olympics Summer Games, State College Area Food Bank and Penn State Hershey Children's Hospital visits.
- Two Nittany Lions have been named to the Allstate AFCA Good Works team during Franklin's tenure - linebackers Ben Kline (2015) and Brandon Smith (2017). Kline and Smith were recognized for their selflessness and community service, and both were one of 11 FBS honorees in their respective years.

RECRUITING SUCCESS

- Franklin's recruiting classes in the last four years have been ranked an average of 13.1 nationally, which is a significant jump from the 40.8 average from 2012-14.
- Penn State is one of nine programs to sign a top-15 class in each of the last three years and one of 12 schools to claim a top-20 class each of the last five seasons.
- Seven of the 15 highest-ranked 247Sports Composite recruits at Penn State since 2000 have been signed by Franklin.
- The 3.83 average star ranking for the 2019 class was the highest in program history since the inception of the 247Sports Composite in 2000.
- The 2018 recruiting class was ranked No. 4 among by ESPN.com, the highest finish in program history. The class was also ranked No. 5 by Rivals and No. 6 by 247Sports.

HELPING THE COMMODORES GET THEIR WINGS

- Franklin directed Vanderbilt to consecutive Top 25 finishes for the first time in the 124-year history of the program (No. 23/24 – 2013 & No. 23/20 – 2012).
- The Commodores finished 23rd in the final 2012 Associated Press poll, marking their first AP final ranking since 1948.
- Franklin led Vanderbilt to a bowl game in each of his three seasons in Nashville, with the last two years resulting in wins over NC State (Music City Bowl) and Houston (BBVA Compass Bowl). The Commodores had played in four bowl games all-time in the 121 seasons prior to his arrival, none in consecutive years.
- Vanderbilt had posted four nine-win seasons in program history, with Franklin's last two teams comprising half of the total.
- Franklin guided the Commodores to a 6-6 regular-season record and earned a berth in the Liberty Bowl during his first season after inheriting a Vanderbilt team that finished 2-10 in both 2009 and 2010, with a combined mark of 1-15 SEC play. The 2011 bowl berth was Vanderbilt's second since 1983.
- The Commodores had a breakthrough campaign in 2012 under Franklin, finishing on a seven-game winning streak (longest since 1948) to post a 9-4 mark for Vanderbilt's most wins in 97 years. Franklin was among five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year award.

RIISING UP THE RANKS

- Franklin began his coaching career as the wide receivers coach at Kutztown (Pa.) University (1995) and was a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University in 1996, working with the secondary.
- He then was the wide receivers coach at James Madison (1997), a grad assistant (tight ends) at Washington State (1998) and the wide receivers coach at Idaho State (1999).
- In 2000, Franklin was named the wide receivers coach at Maryland under head coach Ron Vanderlinden, who would go on to coach the Penn State linebackers from 2001-13.
- Franklin continued in that role under new head coach Ralph Friedgen in 2002 and 2003 and helped the Terps to three consecutive 10-win seasons, including an appearance in the 2002 FedEx Orange Bowl. In 2003, Franklin added duties as recruiting coordinator and directed back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in the Top 25 nationally. Franklin and former Nittany Lion head coach Bill O'Brien (running backs) were Maryland assistant coaches in 2003 and 2004 under Friedgen.
- After five successful years at Maryland, Franklin was named wide receivers coach on Mike Sherman's Green Bay Packers staff in 2005. During that season, Green Bay ranked third in the NFL in receptions (383) and seventh in receiving yards (3,766). Donald Driver was among the top receivers in the NFL, ranking second in receptions and eighth in receiving yards, with a then-career-high 86 catches for 1,221 yards.
- Franklin served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kansas State during the 2006-07 seasons under head coach Ron Prince. In 2006, he helped the Wildcats to their first winning season in four years. Franklin coached quarterback Josh Freeman and oversaw an offense that produced a 3,000-yard passer (Freeman), 1,500-yard receiver (All-American wide receiver Jordy Nelson) and 1,000-yard rusher (James Johnson) during the 2007 season, a first in school history. Freeman would go on to become the Wildcats' highest NFL offensive draft pick since 1954 when the Tampa Bay Buccaneers selected him 17th overall in the 2009 NFL Draft.
- Franklin returned to Maryland in 2008 as the Terps' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He helped the Terrapins to victories in the 2008 Humanitarian Bowl and the 2010 Military Bowl. The 2010 squad was among the national leaders in scoring offense at 32.2 points per game.
- In 1998, Franklin began his participation in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program, starting with a stint with the Miami Dolphins and working with Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. Franklin also worked with Donovan McNabb of the Philadelphia Eagles (1999) and Minnesota Vikings (2008) in the NFL program.

PLAYING CAREER

- Franklin was a four-year letterman at quarterback and a two-time All-PSAC selection at East Stroudsburg.
- Franklin graduated having broken or tied 23 school records. He set seven school records as a senior to earn team MVP honors and was a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee as the NCAA Division II Player of the Year.
- Among the season records he set were for total offense (3,128 yards), passing yards (2,586) and touchdown passes (19).
- Franklin was inducted into the East Stroudsburg Athletics Hall of Fame October 15, 2016.

PENN STATE SEASON OPENERS

- The 2019 season marks the 133rd in Penn State history, with the Nittany Lions owning a record of 109-21-2 in opening games.
- The 2019 opener against is the fourth of five consecutive season openers at home: Kent State (2016; W, 33-13), Akron (2017; W, 52-0), Appalachian State (2018; 45-38, OT).
- The Lions have won 15 of their last 17 season openers and their last three consecutive.
- Penn State's longest streaks of winning their season openers are: 12 (1919-30), 11 (1893-1903), 10 (1973-82; 2002-11), 9 (1909-17) and 7 (1942-48).
- Penn State has only lost consecutive season openers three times in school history; 1964-65, 1989-90, 2000-01.
- The Nittany Lions went unbeaten from 1909-30, winning 20-of-21 season openers. They tied Wissahickon Barracks, 6-6, in 1918 and the streak was stopped by Waynesburg, a 7-0 setback, in 1931.

- Penn State's all-time record in home openers is 118-13-1 and 50-9 in Beaver Stadium.
- Penn State has won 16 out of its last 17 home openers and its last six consecutively, defeating Appalachian State (2018; 45-38, OT), Akron in 2014 (21-3) and 2017 (52-0), Kent State (2016; 33-13), Buffalo (2015; 27-14), and Eastern Michigan (2013; 45-7).

- Following another season with nine or more wins in 2018, Penn State finished in the Top 25 of both polls for the third-straight season. The Nittany Lions came in No. 17 in the final Associated Press (AP) and Amway Coaches polls.
- Additionally, Penn State was No. 12 in the final College Football Playoff Rankings, announced in December.
- Penn State is one of six teams (Alabama, Clemson, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Washington) to rank in the Top 15 of the CFP final rankings in each of the last three seasons (2016-18).

- Three of Penn State's 2019 opponents won their respective conference divisions last season.
- Buffalo won the MAC East Division title and lost to Troy in the Dollar General Bowl (42-32).
- Pittsburgh won the ACC Coastal Division crown and lost to Stanford in the Hyundai Sun Bowl (14-13).
- Ohio State won the Big Ten East Division and went on to defeat Northwestern in the Big Ten Championship Game (45-24). The Buckeyes defeated No. 9 Washington in the Rose Bowl (28-23).
- Iowa defeated No. 18 Mississippi State in the Outback Bowl (27-22), while Minnesota defeated Georgia Tech in the Quick Lane Bowl (34-10).
- Michigan lost to No. 10 Florida in the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl (41-15), Michigan State lost to Oregon in the Redbox Bowl (7-6) and Purdue lost the Franklin American Mortgage Music City Bowl to Auburn (63-14).

- Penn State, Wake Forest and Miami (Fla.) are the only three FBS schools to improve their national rushing offense ranking in each of the last five seasons. (*Wake Forest Athletic Communications*)

NEW SIGNAL CALLER

- After the graduation of all-time passing leader Trace McSorley, the Nittany Lions have named sophomore **Sean Clifford** as the starting quarterback.
- Clifford redshirted in 2017 and appeared in four games last season, including the Citrus Bowl. He completed his first five passing attempts of his career and threw for a pair of touchdowns.
- Clifford’s first career appearance was at Pitt, and on his first career pass attempt, he became the first PSU quarterback to throw for a touchdown on his first career completion since Matt McGloin against Minnesota in 2010.
- In his next game against Kent State, Clifford completed all three passes for 117 yards and connected with **Daniel George** on a career-long and school-record 95-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter.
- Clifford will be the most inexperienced quarterback to start for Penn State since Christian Hackenberg started as a true freshman in 2013.
- With Clifford as the lone Nittany Lion QB on the roster to attempt a pass in a game, Penn State has the second fewest returning passing attempts and completions in FBS entering the 2019 season:

FREIERMUTH ON MACKKEY LIST

- TE **Pat Freiermuth** was named to the Mackey Award watch list for the outstanding collegiate tight end.
- The Mackey Award is given annually to the most outstanding collegiate tight end. The award is named after NFL Hall of Fame member John Mackey, who is considered to be the best to have played the tight end position. Former Nittany Lion Mike Gesicki was a finalist for the honor in 2017.
- As a freshman last season, Freiermuth was selected as a Freshman All-American by The Athletic, 247Sports and ESPN. He also earned honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades from the conference’s coaches and media.
- Freiermuth finished No. 2 among FBS tight ends and led the Big Ten tight ends with eight touchdown catches as a true freshman, setting the Penn State mark for most touchdowns by a freshman tight end and ranking 10th overall in team history.

MENET ON RIMINGTON LIST

- C **Michal Menet** earned a spot on the Rimington Trophy watch list for the nation’s best center.
- The Rimington Trophy is given annually to the most outstanding center. The award is named for former University of Nebraska standout Dave Rimington and benefits the Boomer Esiason Foundation for cystic fibrosis.
- A.Q. Shipley is Penn State’s lone Rimington Trophy winner in 2008.
- Menet started 12 games at center in 2018. He helped the Penn State offense finish 16th in red zone offense (.923), 29th in rushing offense (208.6) and 29th in scoring offense (34.6) in FBS in 2018.

GREEN LIGHT IN THE RED ZONE

- Dating back to 2017, Penn State has scored on 78 of its last 85 red zone trips, including 63 touchdowns.
- Last season, the Nittany Lions were 52-for-58 (44 TD, 9 FG, 3 missed FG, 2 turnovers, 1 kneel down) in the red zone.
- In 2018, Penn State ranked 16th in FBS and third in the Big Ten with a 89.7 percent success rate in the red zone.

PILING UP THE POINTS

- Penn State averaged 33.8 points per game to rank third in the Big Ten and 32nd in FBS in scoring last season.
- Penn State has scored 30 or more points 24 times in the last 32 games.
- Penn State has scored 20 or more points in 33 of its last 35 games.

HAMLER NAMED TO THREE WATCH LISTS

- WR **KJ Hamler** found his way on to three preseason watch lists: the Maxwell Award for national player of the year, the Paul Hornung Award for the most versatile player in major college football and the Biletnikoff Award for the nation’s top wide receiver.
- The Maxwell Award, named in honor of Robert W. “Tiny” Maxwell, has been given to America’s College Player of the Year since 1937. Maxwell’s contributions to the game of football were extensive, including time as a player, a sportswriter and an official.
- The Biletnikoff Award annually recognizes the outstanding receiver in college football. Any player, regardless of position (wide receiver, tight end, slot back, and running back) who catches a pass is eligible for the award. As such, the Biletnikoff Award recognizes the outstanding receiver, not merely outstanding wide receiver.
- The Paul Hornung Award is presented by the Louisville Sports Commission to the most versatile player in major college football. Saquon Barkley won the honor in 2017 and Hamler was a finalist for the honor in 2018.
- In 2018, Hamler was a finalist for the Paul Hornung Award for the nation’s most versatile player and also collected Freshman All-America honors from the Football Writers Association of America and The Athletic as a kick returner. He also earned honorable-mention All-Big Ten accolades as both a wide receiver and return specialist after finishing No. 3 in the conference in kick return average (26.2) and No. 2 in yards per catch (17.95). Hamler ended the season No. 6 in the conference with 109.0 all-purpose yards per game.
- Hamler pulled in a catch in all 13 games, had six games with four or more receptions and 10 multi-reception games in 2018. He had 25 catches of 10 or more yards, pulled in 16 balls for 20 or more yards and registered a first down on 71 percent (30-42) of his receptions.

DEFENSE NOTES

CAUSING CHAOS BEHIND THE LINE

- In 2018, Penn State led the country in sacks per game (3.62) and ranked fourth and led the Big Ten in tackles for loss (8.2) per game.
- Penn State has posted four consecutive 40-plus sack seasons for the first time in program history after totaling 47 last season, 42 in 2017, 40 in 2016 and 46 in 2015.
- Penn State's 175 sacks over the last four years are second only to Clemson (197) and Alabama (192), the lone winners of the last four National Championships.
- Penn State's 3.30 sacks per game over the last four years are second only to Alabama (3.34).

THREE NAMED TO NAGURSKI LIST

- DT **Robert Windsor**, who also earned a berth on the Outland Trophy watch list for the nation's top interior lineman, DE **Yetur Gross-Matos** and LB **Micah Parsons** were all selected to the Bronko Nagurski Trophy watch list for the nation's top defensive player.
- The Bronko Nagurski Trophy is given yearly to the National Defensive Player of the Year. The award is named for legendary two-way player from the University of Minnesota, Bronko Nagurski, who dominated college football then became a star for the Chicago Bears in the 1930s.
- Penn State has never won a Nagurski Trophy, but has had five finalists, most recently Carl Nassib in 2015.
- The Outland Trophy is named after the late John Outland, an All-America lineman at Penn at the turn of the 20th century and is given to the nation's top interior lineman (offensive or defensive).
- Penn State defensive tackle Mike Reid won the Outland Trophy in 1969 and All-America defensive tackle Devon Still was the most recent Nittany Lion finalist, in 2011.
- Gross-Matos claimed first-team All-Big Ten honors from the conference's media last season. The junior finished second in the Big Ten and No. 12 in FBS with 1.5 tackles for loss per game in 2018.
- Parsons was chosen as Freshman All-American by The Athletic, 247Sports and ESPN to go along with his honorable-mention All-Big Ten laurels. He finished the season, leading the Nittany Lions with 83 tackles, becoming the first freshman (true or redshirt) in Penn State history to lead the team in tackles in a season.
- Windsor collected second-team All-Big Ten honors from the Associated Press last season and was named honorable-mention All-Big Ten by the league's coaches and media. The senior finished No. 6 in the Big Ten and No. 42 in FBS with 0.63 sacks per game. Windsor had a career game against Wisconsin, collecting a career-high six tackles and personal-best two sacks. For his efforts against his home state team, the Fond du lac native was named the Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week and Outback Bowl Player of the Week.

GROSS-MATOS NAMED TO LOTT IMPACT AND HENDRICKS WATCH LIST

- In addition to the Nagurski watch list, DE **Yetur Gross-Matos** is on the Lott IMPACT and Ted Hendricks award watch lists.
- The Lott IMPACT Trophy honors the top defensive player in college football who makes the biggest impact for his team, both on and off the field. The award is given to a distinguished young man who represents the qualities embodied by Hall of Famer Ronnie Lott - Integrity, Maturity, Performance, Academics, Community and Tenacity.
- Penn State's Carl Nassib won the award in 2015.
- The Ted Hendricks Award is named in honor of college football's first three-time first-team All-American. It is in the spirit of Ted Hendricks' aggressive style of play, winning attitude and determination that the Defensive End of the Year Award for college football's premier defensive end is presented.
- Penn State's lone winner of the Hendricks Award is Carl Nassib in 2015, while Michael Haynes (2002), Tamba Hali (2005), Maurice Evans (2007) and Aaron Maybin (2008) were finalists for the honor.

LINEBACKER U REPRESENTED ON BUTKUS LIST

- LBs **Cam Brown** and **Micah Parsons** both earned a spot on the Butkus Award watch list for the nation's top linebacker.
- The award, named in honor of legendary linebacker Dick Butkus, annually recognizes the nation's top collegiate linebacker.
- Brown and Parsons will be vying to become the first Nittany Lion to earn the honor since Paul Posluszny in 2005. LaVar Arrington also won the award in 1999, and five have previously been named finalists: Shane Conlan (1986), Andre Collins (1989), Brandon Short (1999), Posluszny (2006) and Dan Connor (2007).
- Brown started in 12 of his 13 appearances last season. He led the team with three forced fumbles and was fifth on the squad with a career-high 63 tackles. Brown also registered a personal-best six pass breakups, which was fifth on the team.

LIMITED ACCESS

- Last season, Penn State led the Big Ten and ranked 11th in FBS in red zone defense, only yielding scores on 75.0 percent of opponents' trips inside the 20.
- Penn State's 20.5 points allowed per game in 2018 ranked 23rd in FBS and fourth in the Big Ten.

SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

RETURN GAME LEADER

- KJ Hamler** averaged 26.2 yards per kickoff return in 2018 to rank 18th in FBS and third in the Big Ten. The average presently ranks as the 18th-best single-season mark in Penn State history. It also presently ranks him seventh on Penn State's career list with Gary Hayman (1972-73).
- Hamler's 26.2 yards per kickoff places him seventh on Penn State's career list in the category heading into 2019.
- Hamler's return prowess and success on offense ranked him with the sixth-highest all-purpose yards average (109.0) in the Big Ten.

GILLIKIN NAMED TO RAY GUY WATCH LIST

- P **Blake Gillikin** landed on the Ray Guy Award watch list for the nation's top punter.
- The Augusta Sports Council created the Ray Guy Award in 2000 to honor Thomson, Georgia, native and College and Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee, Ray Guy. Among the statistics used to identify the winner is net punting average, number of times punt is downed or kicked out of bounds inside the opponents 20-yard line, total yardage punted, average returned yardage and percentage of punts not returned with particular emphasis placed on net punting average.
- The winner must display team leadership, self-discipline and have a positive impact on the team's success.
- Gillikin enters his final season as Penn State's record holder in career punting average (43.32 ypp) and season punting average (43.95 ypp).
- Gillikin is the only player in program history with three punts of 70 or more yards, all of which came in 2018. Gillikin hit a career-long 74-yard punt at Michigan, which is tied for fourth on Penn State's single-game charts with Anthony Fera.
- In his last outing, Gillikin averaged 51.2 yards per punt in the 2019 Citrus Bowl against Kentucky, which is second in Penn State bowl history and fifth overall.
- A perfect 4.0 student, Gillikin was a first-team CoSIDA Academic All-American last year. He spent the summer interning at Drayer Physical Therapy and performing a job shadow at Penn State Health in State College.

CLASSROOM SUCCESS

DEGREES ON THE WALL



- Five student-athletes have earned six Penn State degrees already, while **Weston Carr** is a graduate transfer from Azusa Pacific who earned a degree in sociology.
- Jan Johnson** earned an undergraduate degree in psychology in August 2018 and a master's in management and organizational leadership in May 2019. He is now working on a third degree in health policy and administration.
- Nick Bowers** graduated with a degree in labor and employment relations in May 2019 and is now working on a second degree in health policy and administration.
- Steven Gonzalez** graduated with a degree in history in December 2018 and is working on a second degree in rehabilitation and human services.
- Garrett Taylor** graduated with a degree in advertising and public relations in December 2018 and is working on a second degree in telecommunications.
- Robert Windsor** graduated with a degree in telecommunications in December 2017 and is working on a second degree in media studies.

CONTINUING ACADEMIC TRADITION

- Punter **Blake Gillikin** (kinesiology) leads the Nittany Lions in the classroom with a perfect cumulative 4.0 grade point average following the 2019 spring semester.
- Gillikin was one of 15 Penn State student-athletes to earn a 4.0 GPA last academic year.
- Gillikin claimed the Evan Pugh Scholar Award, given to those juniors and seniors who are in the upper 0.5 percent of their respective classes, in May 2018.
- Gillikin was presented with the President's Freshman Award, given annually to undergraduate degree candidates who have earned a 4.0 cumulative grade-point average based on at least 12 graded Penn State credits completed in their first semester of admission, in May 2017.
- Gillikin led seven Nittany Lion football players earning Big Ten Distinguished Scholar recognition for having a 3.7 or higher GPA for the 2018-19 academic year, contributing to a school-record 117 honorees across all sports. He was joined by **Dan Chisena** (security and risk analysis), **Nick Eury** (agribusiness management), **Cameron Pica** (finance), Charlie Shuman (management and organizational leadership), Jason Vranic (kinesiology) and Christopher Welde (mechanical engineering).
- Those seven were among 28 football student-athletes to earn All-Big Ten Academic honors following the 2018 fall semester.

- With a 290-74 all-time record in Beaver Stadium, Penn State owns the eighth-best winning percentage (.797) in its current home venue amongst current FBS schools and leads the Big Ten.
- Only Alabama (.831) and Oklahoma (.812) have higher winning percentages in facilities older than Beaver Stadium.

BEAVER STADIUM WINS 2019 ULTIMATE STADIUM BRACKET

- Beaver Stadium was the winner of For the Win/USA Today's 2019 Ultimate Stadium Bracket.
- The competition pitted venues from college football, college basketball, the NBA, NFL and Major League Baseball against each other in a bracket-style tournament with the winner of each round advancing based on fan votes.
- The home of the Nittany Lions topped Kansas' Allen Fieldhouse in the final, earning 78.64 percent of the vote (14,026 votes to 3,810). Beaver Stadium's route to the final included wins over LSU's Tiger Stadium, UCLA's Rose Bowl and the Atlanta Falcons' Mercedes Benz Stadium.

SEASON NOTES

OVERTIME OVER TIME

- College football introduced overtime during the bowl season in 1995 and adopted it for regular season games in 1996.
- Since then, Penn State has played 13 overtime games, including six over the 2012-14 seasons. Nine of the 13 overtime tilts have come at home, two in true road games, one in the 2006 Orange Bowl and one in the 2014 Pinstripe Bowl.
- Penn State is 8-5 all-time in overtime games, with a 5-4 record at Beaver Stadium, 1-1 mark in true road games and 2-0 ledger at a neutral site.
- Penn State has won three-straight overtime games under James Franklin. It's the longest streak of overtime wins since winning five-straight from 2006 to 2013
- Penn State went into overtime in a season opener for the first time, opening the 2018 season with a 45-38 OT-win over Appalachian State. It was the seventh overtime game at Beaver Stadium since the start of the 2012 season. Penn State is 5-2 in those games.
- The 2018 overtime game was the first since Penn State defeated Minnesota, 29-26, on Oct. 1, 2016. After Minnesota kicked a field goal on its first possession, Saquon Barkley rushed 25 yards for a touchdown on the Nittany Lions first offensive play.
- Penn State's first two overtime contests came vs. Iowa in 2000 and 2002 at home. The Nittany Lions dropped their first three contests that went to the extra period, but won five straight overtime contests before falling to Nebraska on Nov. 23, 2013.

- For the sixth consecutive year, Penn State is playing at least four FBS teams that are within a 250-mile drive (based on Google Maps from stadium to stadium).
- The Nittany Lions have won their last 11 consecutive against their neighbors.
- The only nearby FBS team Penn State has not played since 2012 is West Virginia, but the Mountaineers are on the Nittany Lions' schedule in 2023 and 2024.
- Since joining the Big Ten in 1993, Penn State is 47-4 against FBS teams within 250 miles.
- All-time, Penn State is 293-111-17 against its current FBS regional foes.

WINNING THE WEST

- Penn State has won its last 10 games against Big Ten West Division opponents, dating back to an overtime win over Minnesota on Oct. 1, 2016.
- The streak includes Penn State's Big Ten Championship Game victory over Wisconsin in 2016 and three wins over Iowa.

PENN STATE VS. BIG TEN

- Penn State has won 22 out of its last 27 games against Big Ten opponents.
- Penn State won 13 consecutive games against Big Ten opponents from 2016-17, breaking its record of 12 from 1993-94.
- Penn State owns a 214-104-3 mark against Big Ten Conference teams since the Nittany Lions first opposed Ohio State in 1912.
- The Nittany Lions began play as a member of the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and have a 132-78 mark.
- Penn State played 109 games vs. the current Big Ten alignment when either or both Penn State itself (prior to 1993) or the opponent (Nebraska prior to 2011; Maryland and Rutgers prior to 2014) was not yet a member of the Big Ten. The Nittany Lions went 80-26-3 in those games.

PURDUE IS HOMECOMING FOE

- When the alumni return to Happy Valley for the 2019 Homecoming game, the Penn State faithful will cheer their Nittany Lions on against Purdue on Oct. 5.
- This is the fifth time Penn State will square off against Purdue in a Homecoming game. The Nittany Lions are a perfect 4-0 against the Boilermakers with wins in 1996 (31-14), 1998 (31-13), 2005 (33-15) and 2011 (23-18).
- Penn State owns a 71-23-5 record all-time on Homecoming, including wins in 11 of its last 14 games.

LIONS UNDER THE LIGHTS

- The 2019 season marks the 19th straight with at least one regular-season night game on the schedule and the 11th since 2000 with multiple night games in the same season.
- Penn State is presently scheduled to host Buffalo at 7:30 p.m. (Sept. 7) and visit Maryland for a Friday night kick at 8 p.m. (Sept. 27).
- Penn State's lone losses in its last 11 night games are both to Ohio State.
- Penn State is 51-31 at night all-time. The figure breaks down to 14-10 at home, 25-14 on the road and 12-7 in neutral site games. Penn State is 1-1 at regular season neutral sites, 11-6 in bowl games and 1-0 in conference championship games.
- The Lions' night games since 2000 include: Ohio State, Illinois and Pitt (2018); Michigan, Iowa and Georgia State (2017); Ohio State, Iowa, Rutgers and Wisconsin (2016); Ohio State and Rutgers (2015); Boston College (Pinstripe Bowl), Ohio State, Michigan and Rutgers (2014); Ohio State, Michigan and UCF (2013); Iowa and Ohio State (2012); Northwestern (2011); Alabama, Iowa and Michigan (2010); Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007), Michigan (2006), Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005), Minnesota and Boston College (2004), Nebraska (2002 and 2003), Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).
- On Oct. 12, 2013, the Lions claimed the longest game in Big Ten history when they edged Michigan under the lights, 43-40, in four overtimes in front of a sellout Beaver Stadium crowd of 107,844 on Homecoming.

HISTORIC SERIES

- Penn State has many long and storied series on the gridiron. The Nittany Lions have played 20 teams 20 or more times in the 132-year history of the program.
- Penn State owns a winning record against 16 of the 20 teams that it has met 20 or more times.
- Eight of the 20 teams are on the 2019 schedule, including Pitt (99 meetings), Iowa (27), Indiana (22), Michigan (21), Ohio State (34), Michigan State (33) Rutgers (28) and Maryland (42).
- Since 2012, Penn State has played or has a future meeting scheduled meeting with 13 of the 20 teams (all of the FBS teams except Navy). Those opponents include: Army (2015), Illinois (2014-15, '18, '21), Iowa (2016-21), Pitt (2016-19), Syracuse (2012), Temple (2014-16) and West Virginia (2023-24), while the Lions will meet yearly with Big Ten East Division opponents Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Ohio State and Rutgers.
- Fifteen of the 20 programs are currently members of NCAA Division I FBS. Bucknell, Lehigh and Penn are in NCAA Division I FCS, while Gettysburg and Lebanon Valley are Division III programs.

THREE ON COLLEGE HOF BALLOT

- First-team All-Americans Jeff Hartings and Steve Wisniewski have been selected as a part of the national ballot for the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame's Class of 2020.
- A total of 76 players and five coaches from FBS are on the 2020 ballot.
- To be eligible for the Hall of Fame ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-America by a major/national selector as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for their consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior to nomination; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. Once nominated for consideration, all player candidates are submitted to one of eight District Screening Committees, which conducts a vote to determine who will appear on the ballot and represent their respective districts.
- The pair of standouts were instrumental in helping Penn State post undefeated and championship seasons have an opportunity to join 19 former Nittany Lion players and five Penn State coaches who have been inducted into the Hall.
- Also on the Hall of Fame ballot is former Nittany Lion student-athlete Glenn Killinger, who is among the candidates for the divisional coach Class of 2019. Killinger was inducted into the Hall of Fame as a player in 1966.
- The announcement of the 2020 Class will be made in January 2020 in the days leading up to the College Football Playoff (CFP) National Championship in New Orleans.
- Hartings excelled on the field and in the classroom for the Nittany Lions, claiming first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and six first-team All-America accolades during his career. In 1995, he was an NFF Hall of Fame Scholar-Athlete team honoree and Rotary Lombardi Trophy semifinalist. The native of St. Henry, Ohio was the keystone of the offensive line that helped the 1994 offense break 14 school season records and seven Big Ten season marks.
- Hartings was a three-time All-Big Ten first team selection and a three-time Academic All-Big Ten choice in his career. He earned first-team All-America honors from the Associated Press and Walter Camp in 1994 and followed that up by collecting first-team All-America honors from UPI, AFCA, Sporting News and Walter Camp.
- Hartings was selected with the 23rd overall pick of the 1996 NFL Draft by the Detroit Lions. He played 11 seasons in the NFL with the Lions and Pittsburgh Steelers. He was a three-time All-Pro selection, two-time Pro Bowl pick and member of the 1996 NFL All-Rookie Team.
- Wisniewski was a three-year starter at guard for the Nittany Lions who would go on to become an All-Pro lineman in the NFL. He was one of two sophomores to start on the 1986 National Championship team and he opened holes for two first-team All-America running backs, Blair Thomas (1987) and D.J. Dozier (1986). One of just four Penn State offensive linemen to earn a pair of first-team All-America honors, he was recognized in 1988 by the American Football Coaches (AFCA) and repeated All-America accolades from Sporting News. A 1988 team captain, Wisniewski is one of just two offensive linemen to earn Penn State's team MVP honor since its creation in 1978.
- From Westfield High School in Houston, Wisniewski was the first pick in the second round of the 1989 NFL Draft by the Dallas Cowboys, who immediately traded his rights to the Los Angeles Raiders. Wisniewski was a mainstay for the Raiders from 1989-2001, starting the final 175 games of his career. He was selected to the Pro Bowl eight times, with six first-team All-Pro selections. He was elected a Raiders team captain seven times, was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 1990's and to Oakland's 50-Year All-Raider Team. Wisniewski missed only two of a possible 208 career games.
- From Harrisburg, Killinger was a Walter Camp All-American at quarterback for the Nittany Lions in 1921. He coached at Dickinson (1922), Rensselaer (1927-32), Moravian (1933) and West Chester (1934-41, 45-59). Killinger is the winningest coach in West Chester history and is a member of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He died in 1988.

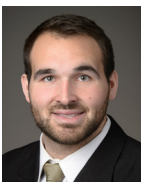
