MATCHUP VS. PENN STATE, 6 P.M. (CBSSN)

The Thundering Herd (3-4) will host Penn State (7-1) Saturday evening in a contest that will tip at 6 p.m. and will air on CBS Sports Network.

Marshall is led by Ryan Taylor's 16.0 points and 9.3 rebounds per game. He and Aleksa Nikolic have a team-high 26 assists on the year, while JP Kambola (18-32, .563) has the top field goal percentage on the squad. Cheikh Sane leads the team with eight blocks apiece, and Austin Loop (16-42, .381) has been the team's top long-range shooter. He also boasts a team-best eight steals.

In its last game, Marshall got 11 points from Taylor and an eight-point, 11-rebound effort from Jay Johnson in a 77-59 loss to South Carolina. The Herd outscored the Gamecocks by one point (39-38) in the second half and outrebounded the visitors by four (43-39).

Penn State's D.J. Newbill has been outstanding this season. He is averaging 24.1 points and a shade under three assists (23 total) per contest. Ross Travis leads the team with 7.8 caroms per game and Brandon Taylor has 13 blocks on the season. Newbill's 11 steals are also a team-high. Newbill and Shep Garner have been exceptional from the 3-point line. Newbill is 17-36 (47.2 percent), while Garner has made 17 of 41 attempts (41.5 percent). Newbill gets to the free throw line over seven times a game and has made 78 percent there. Garner and Geno Thorpe have combined to make 41 of 46 free throws (89.1 percent) this season.

The Nittany Lions, coached by Patrick Chambers, won 61-58 over Virginia Tech Wednesday evening after falling behind by as many as eight in the second half. Newbill had 18 points and Ross added 10 rebounds (six offensive). PSU made just four of its 24 3-point attempts (16.7 percent), but held a 17-4 edge at the free throw line.

Marshall Men's Basketball Hires Dan D'Antoni as Head Coach

Herd legend returns to Huntington

April 24, 2014

HUNTINGTON, W.Va. -- Marshall Director of Athletics Mike Hamrick announced that Dan D'Antoni has been named the Thundering Herd head men's basketball coach on Thursday afternoon.

D'Antoni, the older brother of Los Angeles Lakers coach Mike D'Antoni, has served as an NBA assistant coach for the past nine seasons. He was a member of the Phoenix Suns' staff from 2005-06 through 2007-08. He spent four seasons on the New York Knicks' staff, then served as an assistant on the Los Angeles Lakers' staff for the past two seasons.

During his career, D'Antoni, 66, also served as the head coach of the Knicks' and Lakers' NBA Summer League teams.

After D'Antoni graduated from Marshall in 1970, he joined the Herd staff as the head coach of the freshman basketball team, where he coached his younger brother, Mike, before becoming an assistant coach of the Herd varsity.

D'Antoni was named head basketball coach at Socastee High School in Myrtle Beach, S.C., in 1975. After coaching 30 years at Socastee (1975-2005), D'Antoni had accumulated over 500 wins and multiple coach of the year honors, while founding the Beach Ball Classic, one of the most prestigious high school basketball tournaments in the country. That event has featured more than 75 players who have gone on to play in the NBA.

D'Antoni was the head coach of the Beach Ball Select AAU basketball team, which featured future NBA players Raymond Felton and Ramon Sessions.

As a high schooler, D'Antoni was an All-State first team selection at Mullens. At Marshall, he was the starting point guard on Ellis Johnson's "Iron Man 5" that played in the NIT in the 1966-67 and '67-'68 seasons. The '66-67 team reached the NIT semifinals, and D'Antoni led the tournament in assists. As a senior, he was an All-Mid-American Conference first team selection in 1968-69, when he led the Herd in scoring, at 17.5 points per game. D'Antoni was All-MAC second team his junior season.

D'Antoni is one of Marshall's 49 players to score 1,000 career points, with 1,109, and ranks 13th on the Herd's career free throw percentage list, at .774 (301-of-389).

D'Antoni -- whose given name is Lewis Joseph D'Antoni II -- was inducted into the Marshall Athletics Hall of Fame in 1990.

D'Antoni graduated from Marshall in 1970 with a degree in Speech and Physical Education, and also earned a Master's degree in Principles of Guidance from Marshall in 1972.

He is the father of three sons, all of whom played collegiate basketball: Matt played at Brown; Andrew attended Army and later served 3 1/2 years in Iraq, rising to the rank of captain in the U.S. Army; and Nick attended William & Mary, where he was captain of the basketball team. Dan D'Antoni, a Marshall Athletics Hall of Famer, was named the Thundering Herd men's basketball coach on April 25, 2014. A former star MU point guard, D'Antoni helped Marshall to appearances in the 1967 and 1968 National Invitation Tournaments.

"Coaching Marshall basketball has always been a dream of mine," D'Antoni said as he was introduced as the Herd coach, "even when I was little."

D'Antoni, a native of Mullens, W.Va., is Marshall's 28th men's basketball coach. He signed a four-year contract.

"It's a dream-come-true for me to bring a Dan D'Antoni back to Marshall University," Marshall Athletic Director Mike Hamrick said of D'Antoni's hire. "It's where he belongs. It's taken a while, but he's here."

D'Antoni, 67, is the older brother of former NBA coach Mike D'Antoni. Dan served as one of Mike's assistant coaches for nine NBA seasons. He was a member of the Phoenix Suns' staff from 2005-06 through 2007-08. He spent four seasons on the New York Knicks' staff, then served as an assistant on the Los Angeles Lakers' staff for the past two seasons.

COACHING STAFF ADDITIONS

SCOTT RIGOT, Assistant Coach



Scott Rigot (pronounced Ree-ZJOH) has been an assistant coach at South Carolina, UAB, Hawaii, Kentucky and Duquesne. He has accompanied teams to postseason play in 12 of his 14 seasons as a Division I assistant coach and also enjoyed a successful stint as a junior college head coach. Prior to his seasons at Duquesne, he served as an assistant under coach Tubby Smith at Kentucky from 2002-03 through 2006-07, helping the Wildcats earn five consecutive NCAA Tournament bids.

While at Kentucky, Rigot helped secure a 2004 recruiting class that was ranked No. 1 in the nation by rivals.com. Two members of that class -- Rajon Rondo and Ramel Bradley -- went on to earn All-SEC honors.

Rigot was head coach at Spartanburg (S.C.) Methodist for six seasons (1990-91 through 1995-96) leading that junior college to a 158-35 record and the 1994-95 Pioneers to the NJCAA national championship game. That team was ranked No. 1 for 12 weeks during the season. He was a four-time Carolinas Junior college Conference and coached 26 players who earned Division I scholarships.

Rigot, who has made at least one NCAA Tournament appearance at four of his five Division I coaching stops -- Kentucky, Hawaii, UAB and South Carolina -- has established a reputation as a highly successful recruiter, especially in international circles.

Rigot began his playing career at Jamestown (N.Y.) Community College, where he was part of a Jayhawks team that was ranked No. 1 nationally and participated in the 1982 NJCAA Tournament.

After being sidelined for a year with a knee injury, Rigot transferred to the University at Buffalo where he lettered in 1983-84 and '84-85. He completed his degree in sociology in 1986 and added a master's in education from South Carolina in 1988.

CHRIS DUHON, Assistant Coach



Chris Duhon played nine seasons in the NBA (2004-2013) with four franchises (Chicago Bulls, New York Knicks, Orlando Magic and Los Angeles Lakers), most recently for the Los Angeles Lakers during the 2013-13 season, where D'Antoni served as an assistant coach on the Lakers' staff.

A graduate of Duke University in 2004, Duhon played four seasons for the Blue Devils and helped Duke win the 2001 National Championship. That same season, Duhon was named the ACC Rookie of the Year. After four years at Duke, Duhon compiled a 123-21 record, making him the second winningest in Duke and ACC history. Duhon helped the Blue Devils to three ACC Championships and left as the only ACC player to record 1,200 points, 800 assists, 475 rebounds, 300 steals and 125 three-point baskets.

A native of Mamou, Louisiana, Duhon was the first addition to D'Antoni's staff.

COACHING STAFF



Mark Cline is now in his fifth season as the top assistant men's basketball coach at Marshall.

With Cline's assistance in 2012, Marshall went 21-14 and earned a bid to the NIT for the first time in 24 years. The Herd also made the Conference USA Championship game for the first time in school history and the first team ever to do so as a No. 6 seed.

Coached by Cline, forward Dennis Tinnon ranked 23rd in the nation in rebounds with 10.0 per game. Tinnon's average was the most by a Herd player in 10 years. He also earned a spot on the All-Conference USA Defensive Team and the C-USA All-Tournament Team.

Originally from Williamson, W.Va., Cline returned to the "Mountain State" in 2011 after spending the previous four seasons on the staff at Oklahoma. Jeff Capel's first hire upon arriving at OU, Cline helped guide the Sooners to an 82-51 record, two NCAA Tournaments, a 2009 Elite 8 appearance, and a No. 2 national ranking during his stint in Norman. Cline was the lead assistant at OU and recruited 2009 consensus national player of the year and current NBA all-star Blake Griffin.

Cline was as an assistant coach for Virginia Commonwealth under Capel and helped VCU compile a 61-31 record from 2003-2006 which included a trip to the 2004 NCAA Tournament. Cline's relationship with the Capel family dates back to his days as an assistant coach at Fayetteville State where he served under Capel's father, Jeff Capel Jr., from 1989-93. Cline helped convert the Broncos from a team that finished at the bottom of the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association's Southern Division to one of the top programs in the league. He also served as the head men's golf coach at Fayetteville State and was twice named CIAA Golf Coach of the Year.

He transitioned with Capel Jr., to North Carolina A&T for the 1993-94 season, a year that saw the Aggies claim the Mid-Eastern Athletic Association championship and make an NCAA Tournament appearance. Cline followed Capel, Jr., to Old Dominion where he spent five seasons with the Monarchs. He helped ODU reach the NCAA Tournament in 1995 and 1997. In 1999, the Monarchs tied a school record for wins with 25 and were rewarded with an NIT bid. Cline moved from Old Dominion to Virginia Tech where for four years (1999-2003) he served as an assistant and associate head coach.

Cline enjoyed an outstanding playing career at Wake Forest from 1983-1987 (the same span as Tyrone "Muggsy" Bogues) and was a four-year starter. He finished his career with 1,202 points and currently ranks in the top 30 on Wake's all-time list. He averaged double figures over his final three seasons and served as a co-captain the last two. Cline currently ranks 12th in career free throw percentage (179-219, 81.7 percent). The Demon Deacons advanced to the NCAA Tournament's Elite Eight his freshman season. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater during the 1988-89 campaign.

The two-time West Virginia High School Player of the Year who earned McDonald's and Street & Smith's high school All-America honors, Cline shot .414 from 3-point range during his collegiate career. He is also one of only three players from West Virginia to be named a two-time Parade All-American joining Earl Jones (Mount Hope) and Brett Nelson (St. Albans).

Cline, who graduated from Wake Forest in 1988, and his wife Nancy have a daughter, Layla.

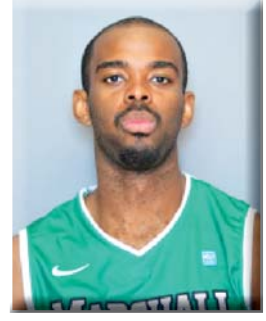
