NITTANY LIONS HOST NO. 3/2 CRIMSON TIDE

THIS WEEK

Penn State hosts No. 3/2 Alabama in the first meeting between the national powers in Beaver Stadium since 1989.

The Crimson Tide lead the series, 9-5, after posting a 24-3 win last year in Tuscaloosa. The teams played a spirited series from 1981-90 and met in three bowl games prior to 1981, including the 1979 Sugar Bowl for the national championship.

The Penn State-Alabama game is the only Big Ten-SEC regular season match-up this season. The conferences will be pitted in at least three 2011-12 bowl games.

The No. 25 Nittany Lions opened their 125th season with a 41-7 win over Indiana State. The Crimson Tide defeated Kent State, 48-7, in their opener last Saturday.

Penn State has a 59-19 (75.6) record since the start of the 2005 season, the nation's 11th-best winning percentage over the past seven seasons.

NITTANY LIONS AND CRIMSON TIDE AMONG ELITE

Penn State and Alabama are among just eight FBS teams nationally that have won 800 games all-time. In their 125th season, the Nittany Lions have an 819-357-42 record to rank sixth in victories. Alabama has an 803-319-3 record in its 120th season to rank eighth in wins.

Alabama's 58 bowl appearances and 33 bowl wins lead the nation, while Penn State is No. 3 with 27 bowl wins among its 43 appearances (8th). The Nittany Lions' 65.1 bowl winning percentage (27-14-2) is second-best among schools with at least 20 bowl appearances.

HIGHLY RATED VISITOR

The last time Penn State hosted the nation's No. 1, 2 or 3 ranked team was when No. 1 Ohio State visited on October 27, 2007. The last No. 1, 2 or 3 ranked non-conference squad to travel to Beaver Stadium was No. 2 Miami (Fla.), which won the 2001 season opener.

**125th SEASON****125TH SEASON OF GRIDIRON EXCELLENCE;
ONE OF EIGHT WITH 800 WINS**

Penn State is in its 125th season of intercollegiate football and owns an 819-357-42 record, to rank sixth nationally in all-time victories.

Penn State became just the sixth school in the nation to win 800 games with its victory over Michigan State in 2008, joining Michigan (885), Texas (851), Notre Dame (845), Nebraska (838) and Ohio State (820). Oklahoma (812) and Alabama (803) joined the 800-win club during the past two seasons.

IN TOP 12 FOR WINS OVER LAST SEVEN SEASONS

Since the start of the 2005 season, the Nittany Lions are 59-19 (75.6), good for No. 11 in the nation in winning percentage over the past seven seasons.

The Nittany Lions have won 61 of their past 80 games overall (76.2 pct.) dating to the final two games of the 2004 season. Ohio State is the only Big Ten team with a better record than Penn State over the past 80 contests.

ALABAMA GAME NOTES**PENN STATE TO MARK 10TH ANNIVERSARY
OF SEPTEMBER 11 AT GAME**

Penn State will mark the 10th anniversary of the Sept. 11, 2001 attacks on the United States with pre-game and halftime events at the Alabama game.

Before the 3:30 p.m. kickoff, a color guard of New York City firefighters will be on the field for the National Anthem, which the Penn State Blue Band will play with a special lead-in. Immediately following the National Anthem, there will be a stadium flyover of F-18 Hornets.

The Penn State Blue Band will play a patriotic half-time show, with tributes to those lost, those saved and those who have served. Five students will step forward onto the field, each representing one branch of military service and the more than 2,100 members of the University community who have served in Iraq and Afghanistan. The Blue Band also will lead the Beaver Stadium audience in the singing of "God Bless America."

NON-CONFERENCE HOME WIN STREAK

Penn State's 23-game non-conference home winning streak is tied for second-longest in the nation with Florida. LSU leads at 31. The Nittany Lions' last non-conference loss in Beaver Stadium was to Boston College on Sept. 6, 2003.

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

Penn State has a 65-14 (82.3) record in non-conference games since starting Big Ten play in 1993, including wins against: Arizona, Auburn, Florida State, LSU, Louisville (2), Miami (Fla.), Maryland, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Oregon, Oregon State, Pittsburgh (3), South Florida, USC (3), Southern Miss (2), Tennessee (2), Texas, Texas A&M (2), Texas Tech, Virginia and UCF (2).

The Nittany Lions have won 19 of their last 22 non-conference games, with the lone losses coming to USC (2009 Rose Bowl), at Alabama (2010) and to Florida (2011 Outback Bowl).

LIONS VS. SEC

Penn State has a 17-18 record against current members of the Southeastern Conference; 14-16 under Joe Paterno. The Hall of Fame coach has an 8-5 mark vs. SEC teams in bowl games.

Florida was Penn State's last SEC opponent, with the Gators earning a 37-24 win in the 2011 Outback Bowl. The Nittany Lions' last win over an SEC team was over LSU in the 2010 Capital One Bowl.

Penn State is playing an SEC foe in Beaver Stadium for the first time since Alabama visited in 1989. South Carolina (1940), Vanderbilt (1957) and Kentucky (1975, '77) are the only other current SEC teams that have played in State College.

Arkansas, Ole Miss and Mississippi State are the only SEC schools Penn State has not played against on the gridiron.

CRIMSON TIDE VS. BIG TEN

Alabama has an 18-11 record against current Big Ten squads, with 14 of the contests vs. Penn State. The Crimson Tide's most recent game vs. a Big Ten team was a win over Michigan State in the 2011 Capital One Bowl.

RARE SEC VISIT TO BIG TEN STADIUM

Alabama played at Penn State in 1981, '83, '85, '87 and '89 when the Nittany Lions were independents, starting Big Ten competition in 1993.

The Crimson Tide's visit this week marks the third time since 1981 that a Big Ten team has hosted a team from the Southeastern Conference, excluding the previously annual Indiana-Kentucky series. In 1988, LSU visited Ohio State and in 2006, Vanderbilt visited Michigan.

Big Ten teams are 20-13-1 when hosting an SEC team since 1993. (research provided by the Big Ten Network).

IN THE POLLS

Penn State was ranked No. 25 in the USA Today Coaches pre-season poll and was second among teams receiving votes (No. 27) in the Associated Press poll. The Nittany Lions have finished in the Top 25 a total of 35 times under Joe Paterno, with 23 Top 10 finishes.

Alabama was ranked No. 2 in both pre-season polls.

"GREAT SHOW" = GREAT RESULTS

Penn State has won 39 of its last 45 home games dating to a Senior Day win over Michigan State in 2004. The Nittany Lions were 7-0 in Beaver Stadium in 2005 and 2008 and 6-1 in 2006 and '07.

Penn State has a 248-61 record (80.2) in Beaver Stadium since the facility was erected in 1960, includ-

ing 15 unbeaten seasons. Beaver Stadium's capacity of 106,572 is the nation's second-largest.

The only setbacks over the past 45 home games have come to No. 4 Michigan in 2006, No. 1 Ohio State in 2007, Iowa in 2009, No. 15 Ohio State in 2009, Illinois and No. 10 Michigan State in 2010.

The Nittany Lions have earned a 223-43 (83.8) home record under Joe Paterno since he became head coach in 1966, including 14 undefeated seasons.

NITTANY LIONS THUMP INDIANA STATE

Penn State opened its 125th season by rolling past Indiana State, 41-7, on Saturday at Beaver Stadium. Penn State led throughout following Chaz Powell's 95-yard kick-off return touchdown to open the game.

The Nittany Lions improved to 39-7 in season openers under Joe Paterno, winning their 10th straight season debut.

Sophomore Silas Redd led the Nittany Lion ground game with a pair of touchdowns and 104 yards on 12 carries. The Penn State rushing attack gained 245 yards on the day.

Penn State out-gained Indiana State, 359-170, in total offense and earned 16 of its 21 first downs on the ground. The Nittany Lions did not turn the ball

over.

The Penn State defense was sterling, holding ISU to just eight first downs with two interceptions, two sacks and a fumble recovery. The three turnovers were the most forced by the Nittany Lions since causing four last year against Temple. The Nittany Lions converted the turnovers into two touchdowns (13 points).

SEASON OPENERS

The Nittany Lions own an impressive 104-19-2 (84.0) record in the first contest of the season, winning their last 10 and 19 of the last 21. Penn State is 39-7 (84.8) in season openers under Joe Paterno and 112-12-1 in home openers overall.

POWELL EARNS BIG TEN HONOR

Penn State cornerback Chaz Powell has been selected Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week after returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown to help spark Penn State to a 41-7 win over Indiana State last Saturday.

A senior, Powell shares his first career conference honor with Nebraska kicker Brett Maher.

Powell's 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown on the opening kick was the second of his career. He returned a kickoff 100 yards last year against Youngstown State on the opening kickoff of the second half—the last time that a kick had been returned for a touchdown by Penn State prior to last Saturday.

The former Susquehannock High School standout, Powell made one solo tackle to help the Nittany Lions force three turnovers and hold the Sycamores to eight first downs and 170 total yards.

REDD CRACKS 100 YARDS TO LEAD PRODUCTIVE GROUND GAME

Making his first career start, sophomore tailback Silas Redd led the Nittany Lion ground game with a pair of touchdowns, tallying 104 yards on 12 carries (8.7) in the 41-7 win over Indiana State.

The Penn State rushing attack gained 245 yards, its highest total since gaining 260 yards vs. Northwestern last season. The Nittany Lions averaged 5.1 yards on their 48 carries and earned 16 first downs on the ground.

Redd earned his second career 100-yard rush-

ing game and had his first career multiple-touchdown game, scoring from nine and four yards out in the first half. Redd gained a career-high 131 yards vs. Northwestern last year.

Sophomore tailback Curtis Dukes had a career-long 30-yard rush in the third quarter, and a career-best 47 yards on his six carries vs. the Sycamores. Returning to the field after missing 2010 with a serious knee injury, junior Brandon Beachum gained 41 yards on just seven attempts, including a 22-yard burst.

Senior fullback Joe Suhey gained 29 yards on six carries and scored his first career rushing touchdown in the third quarter. Junior fullback Michael Zordich added 15 yards on five attempts and also scored on a one-yard run.

DEFENSE HAS STRONG EFFORT IN OPENER

The Penn State defense delivered a strong effort in the opener, holding Indiana State to just eight first downs and 170 yards. The Nittany Lions grabbed two interceptions, recorded seven tackles for loss, two sacks and a fumble recovery.

Penn State forced three turnovers, its highest total since causing four last year against Temple. The Nittany Lions converted the turnovers into two touchdowns (13 points).

Captain Drew Astorino set the tone by grabbing his fifth career interception in the first quarter and returning it 33 yards. Jordan Hill forced and recovered his first career fumble at the ISU 21-yard-line to set-up a one-yard run by Joe Suhey. Freshman CB Adrian Amos grabbed his first career interception in the fourth quarter to set-up another touchdown (see below).

In his first game on the field, linebacker Mike Hull led Penn State with seven tackles, including a 0.5 TFL. Junior linebacker Michael Yancich made a career-best six hits, including 1.5 TFL. Junior defensive tackle Jordan Hill made five stops, half a sack.

TRIO OF TRUE FRESHMAN MAKE DEBUT

Three Nittany Lion true freshmen made their debuts in the season opener: CB Adrian Amos, PK Sam Ficken and WR Allen Robinson.

Amos returned a fourth quarter interception 46 yards to the Indiana State 12-yard-line to set-up Shane McGregor's three-yard touchdown run. Amos made two tackles, also seeing action on special teams.

Ficken made his debut in the second half, connecting on a PAT attempt and kicking off once.

QUARTET ELECTED CAPTAINS

A quartet of senior standouts were elected captains of the 2011 Penn State football team.

Safety Drew Astorino (Edinboro), tackle Quinn Barham (Durham, N.C.), wide receiver Derek Moye (Rochester) and defensive tackle Devon Still (Wilmington, Del.) were selected by their teammates in voting the week of the season opener.

COACH JOE PATERNO

In his 46th season as head coach of the Nittany Lions and 62nd year on the coaching staff, Joe Paterno is the leader in all-time victories among major college coaches. A 1950 graduate of Brown University, Paterno owns a career record of 402-135-3 for a winning percentage of 74.7.

He ranks third in winning percentage among active Football Bowl Subdivision coaches with 10 or more years as a head coach.

Paterno is the longest serving head coach at one school in major college football history. Amos Alonzo Stagg served as head coach at the University of Chicago for 41 years (1892-1932) of his 57-year tenure as a head coach.

Paterno has led the Nittany Lions to two national championships (1982 and '86) and five undefeated seasons (1968, '69, '73, '86 and '94). Selected the AFCA National Coach of the Year an unprecedented five times, Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl wins with a record of 24-12-1.

He has guided Penn State to three Big Ten Championships and has been selected the Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year three times, the award's second-highest total.

Paterno is one of only nine coaches in NCAA history (five in FBS) to win 300 games and reached the milestone faster than anyone (380 games). He also is the only FBS head coach with 300 victories at one school.

Paterno was inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in December 2007 and was among the first three active coaches to be inducted.

NO. 3 IN WINNING PCT. AMONG ACTIVE COACHES

In addition to his record victories total, Joe Paterno ranks third in winning percentage (74.7) among active Football Bowl Subdivision coaches with 10 or more years as an FBS head coach.

Oklahoma's Bob Stoops leads the list with an 80.7 winning percentage, (130-31), followed by TCU's Gary Patterson (77.1, 98-29), Paterno, Georgia's Mark Richt (73.3, 96-35) and South Carolina's Steve Spurrier (71.7, 187-73-2).

PATERNO LONGEVITY AMAZING

Since Joe Paterno became head coach in 1966, there have been 885 head coaching changes in the Football Bowl Subdivision, an average of more than six changes per institution, including 25 changes after the 2010 season.

There have been 36 head coaches at the other Big Ten institutions since the Nittany Lions began conference play in 1993 (total does not include Big Ten newcomer Nebraska). Paterno is the dean of Big Ten coaches by six years over all his conference counterparts, with Iowa's Kirk Ferentz second in longevity (started in 1999).

PATERNO AMONG TRIO WITH 400 WINS

Joe Paterno is the all-time wins leader among FBS coaches (402) and one of only three coaches in NCAA history to record 400 victories.

During the 2010 season, the Hall of Fame coach joined John Gagliardi (479-active) and Eddie Robinson (408) as the only coaches in NCAA history with 400 victories. Penn State rallied from a 21-0 deficit to defeat Northwestern, 35-21, on Nov. 6, 2010 to give Paterno his 400th win in the greatest home comeback of his legendary career.

Amos Alonzo Stagg's 578 games top all major college coaches. He is followed by Paterno (540), Bobby Bowden (522), Pop Warner (481) and Paul "Bear" Bryant (425).

Paterno's 46 years as head coach are the most at one institution all-time among major college coaches.

ALABAMA COACH NICK SABAN

Nick Saban is in his fifth season as head coach at Alabama and has earned a 39-11 record, including the 2009 BCS national championship. He also directed LSU to the 2003 BCS crown.

Saban was head coach at Michigan State from 1995-99, going 2-3 vs. Penn State. He is a 1973 and '75 graduate of Kent State University.

SCOUTING THE CRIMSON TIDE

Alabama visits Happy Valley for the first time since 1989 to complete a home-and-home series between the national powers. The teams were originally scheduled to meet during the 2004 and '05 seasons, but the series was postponed at Alabama's request in 2003.

Ranked No. 2 in the nation, Alabama embarked on its quest for a second national championship in three years last week, belting Kent State, 48-7, at Bryant-Denny Stadium.

The Alabama defense was superb, limiting Kent

State to just six first downs and 90 total yards. The Crimson Tide recorded seven tackles for loss, with four sacks, to limit the Golden Flashes to minus-nine rushing yards on 23 carries. Alabama had eight pass break-ups and grabbed one interception.

The Crimson Tide offense amassed 482 yards, including 299 through the air, recorded 24 first downs, and tallied five rushing touchdowns versus the Golden Flashes.

Sophomore quarterback A.J. McCarron started the season opener, but he and freshman Phillip Sims both saw action. Each threw two interceptions but McCarron had the more productive day overall, completing 14-of-23 passes for 226 yards and a touchdown. Senior Marquis Maze stepped forward as the Tide's top receiving threat in game one, catching eight balls for 118 yards and one touchdown. Freshman DeAndrew White started opposite Maze, making four receptions for 44 yards in his first collegiate game.

The Alabama ground game is powered by junior running back Trent Richardson, who is on five pre-season award watch lists. Playing with 2009 Heisman Trophy winner Mark Ingram in his first two seasons, Richardson rushed for 1,451 yards and 14 touchdowns averaging 5.6 yards per carry, the past two years. The Tide offensive line features two pre-season All-American picks in Barrett Jones and William Vlachos.

Free safety Mark Barron and linebackers Dont'a Hightower and Courtney Upshaw headline the defense. Barron, who was named a first team pre-season All-American by several different publications, recorded 75 total tackles and had three interceptions, two sacks, and one forced fumble in 2010. Hightower finished second on the team in tackles (69) a year ago while Upshaw led the Tide with 14.5 tackles for loss, seven sacks, and four forced fumbles.

Junior Jeremy Shelley and sophomore Cade Foster are listed atop the depth chart at kicker. In 2010, Foster handled the long distance field goals and the kickoffs while Shelley primarily attempted shorter distances and extra points. Cody Mandell is the punter. He averaged 39.2 yards per kick as a freshman last season.

BOLDEN-ALABAMA TIE

Penn State quarterback Rob Bolden's great uncle is former Alabama All-America cornerback Don McNeal. Bolden's maternal grandfather, Henry McNeal, is Don McNeal's brother.

In the epic 1979 Sugar Bowl between Penn State and Alabama, Don McNeal tackled Nittany Lion WR Scott Fitzkee after a completion just short of the goal line on second-and-goal during the Crimson Tide's fourth quarter goal line stand, preserving Bama's 14-7 lead.

LAST MEETING

Penn State turned the ball over three times inside the Alabama 30-yard-line and had four turnovers overall, and the No. 1 Crimson Tide posted a 24-3 win on Sept. 11, 2010 in Bryant-Denny Stadium.

In the first meeting between the national powers and old rivals since 1990, the Nittany Lions moved the ball against the Crimson Tide's Top 5 defense, but converted on only one of three Red Zone chances, getting a 36-yard field goal from Collin Wagner in the fourth quarter.

Alabama, which won its 16th consecutive game, led 17-0 at halftime. But, in the second half, Penn State outgained the Tide, 152-121, had more first downs (10-6) and earned a slight edge in overall time of possession.

In his first road game, quarterback Rob Bolden was 13 of 29 for 144 yards, with two interceptions.

With Alabama leading 7-0 in the first quarter, Bolden connected with Derek Moye on a beautiful 31-yard strike to the UA 22. But, on third down, Bolden was hit as he threw and the Tide intercepted at the 3 to stop the drive and begin their own 97-yard scoring drive.

Sophomore WR Devon Smith set career-highs with five catches for 47 yards and Moye had a game-high 69 receiving yards on three catches. Bolden was not sacked for the second straight week.

Cornerback D'Anton Lynn made nine tackles, safety Nick Sukay had eight stops and DT Jordan Hill made a career-best seven hits. The Lions had three minus-yardage plays to Alabama's one.

PENN STATE-ALABAMA SERIES HIGHLIGHTS:

Oct. 27, 1990 - The Penn State defense forced six Alabama turnovers as the Nittany Lions blanked the Crimson Tide, 9-0 on Oct. 27, 1990 in Bryant-Denny Stadium.

The Nittany Lions got all their points off the strong right foot of freshman kicker Craig Fayak. Fayak stuck field goals from 34, 50 and 34 yards, respectively. The Nittany Lions held the Tide to just six net yards rushing, the poorest output for an Alabama team since the football program had began in 1892.

Safety Darren Perry led the way for the Nittany Lions as he registered two interceptions. Penn State garnered just 201 yards of offense, but held Alabama to 141.

Oct. 28, 1989 - Had it not been for Alabama's Thomas Rayam, the second largest crowd in Beaver Stadium history at the time would have left with nothing but fond memories of the clash between the No. 6 Crimson Tide and the No. 14 Nittany Lions. Rayan foiled an otherwise ideal finish by getting his hand on Ray Tarasi's fourth field goal try of the afternoon and the Penn State hopes were rejected as the Tide survived, 17-16. Penn State registered 296 yards of offense and additionally won the turnover battle, 4-2.

Oct. 22, 1988 - The Alabama defense smothered the Penn State offense and carried the Crimson Tide to an 8-3 victory in a game in which neither team scored a touchdown. Alabama linebacker Derrick Thomas registered eight tackles, twice dropped Lion runners behind the line of scrimmage, broke up a pair of pass attempts and sacked Penn State's Tony Saca three times, including once for a safety. With Thomas's disruptive play, the Nittany Lions failed to get any flow in their offense, which accounted for a season-low 169 yards of offense.

PENN STATE FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN TOP 10% GRADUATION RATE AMONG FBS TEAMS

The Penn State football team produced another superb academic performance, according to the NCAA Graduation Rates Report, released in October 2010.

Penn State was among the top 10 percent nationally and owned the Big Ten Conference's No. 2 Graduation Success Rate (GSR), according to the NCAA.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2000-03 earned a Graduation Success Rate of 84 percent, tied for No. 12 among the nation's 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions. Penn State's 84 percent GSR was significantly higher than the 67 percent FBS average and was second to Northwestern among Big Ten Conference institutions, according to the NCAA.

Coach Joe Paterno's Nittany Lions earned the No. 8 GSR score among institutions that play in a Bowl Championship Series automatic qualifying conference.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2000-03 earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 77 percent, also No. 2 to Northwestern among Big Ten squads. The Nittany Lions' 77 percent graduation figure was 22 points above the 55 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.

The Graduation Success Rate data includes only student-athletes receiving athletic aid and is generated from four years of graduation data. The GSR data also includes student-athlete transfers to Penn State that receive athletic aid.

In 2009, the Penn State football team earned the highest GSR and federal graduation rate among teams ranked in the final 2009 Associated Press Top 25 poll.

Nittany Lion football student-athletes that enrolled in the University in the fall of 2002 earned a federal graduation rate of 89 percent, which was 34 points above the 55 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.

The Nittany Lions also led all AP Top 25 teams with a program record 85 percent Graduation Success Rate. Penn State's 85 percent Graduation Success Rate was significantly higher than the 67 percent FBS average and was second to Northwestern among Big Ten Conference institutions, according to the NCAA.

Sept. 12, 1987 – Tailback Bobby Humphrey slashed through the Penn State defense for 220 yards, including a 73-yard touchdown to help No. 19 Alabama earn a 24-13 victory over No. 11 Penn State in Beaver Stadium. Penn State had streaks of 13 straight victories, 23 regular season triumphs and 15 wins in a row at home ended by the loss, the first for the Lions since the 1986 Orange Bowl. Penn State managed just 88 yards rushing in the game.

Oct. 25, 1986 – Quarterback John Shaffer was at his best along with the Penn State defense as the No. 6 Nittany Lions surprised previously-undefeated and second-ranked Alabama, 23-3, at Bryant-Denny Stadium. It was just the 13th loss for the Tide since the stadium opened in 1929.

Shaffer posted the best single-game completion percentage of his Penn State career as he hit 13 of 17 passes for 168 yards. D.J. Dozier and Blair Thomas scored the Lion touchdowns on 19 and three-yard runs, respectively.

Oct. 12, 1985 – The No. 8 Nittany Lions clipped the No. 10 Crimson Tide, 19-17 in Beaver Stadium. Trailing 7-6 at halftime, Penn State was able to battle back and outscore Alabama, 13-10, in the second half to secure the narrow victory. The Nittany Lion offense accumulated 403 yards of offense, which was led by D.J. Dozier's 85 yards on the ground. Massimo Manca connected on field goals of 38, 44, 50 and 20 yards.

Oct. 13, 1984 – In a game that featured superlative defensive play, the Crimson Tide captured a 6-0 victory in Tuscaloosa. With no scoring occurring in the first three quarters,

Alabama kicked field goals of 53 and 23 yards to lock down the win. Alabama was held to 55 yards on the ground while Penn State tallied just 40. Alabama won the turnover battle, 2-1.

Oct. 8, 1983 – Penn State played near-perfect football for three quarters and then held off a furious Alabama rally in the final quarter to score a 34-28 upset over the No. 3- ranked

Crimson Tide in front of 85,614 Beaver Stadium fans.

The Lions held a commanding 31-7 lead after three quarters, but Alabama never gave up, as it had the ball on its own 49 with 2:56 remaining, trailing by six. Alabama moved the ball down to the 12-yard line after completing four straight passes. After the Tide pounded the ball down to the two-yard line, Greg Gattuso and Mark Fruehan stopped tailback Kerry Goode for no gain as time expired.

Oct. 9, 1982 – Penn State's hopes of an unbeaten season were dashed abruptly in a 3:14 period in the fourth quarter, as No. 4 Alabama earned a 42-21 victory at Legion Field in Birmingham, Ala. The Crimson Tide had taken a 21-7 half-time lead, but the No. 3 Nittany Lions marched back into contention with a pair of second half touchdowns to cut the lead to 24-21 with just under 14 minutes to play. However, a 47-yard field goal, a 7-yard run and a 31-yard interception return helped seal the win for Alabama. Penn State out gained the Tide, 429-334.

Penn State bounced back from the loss to win its last six regular season games and beat No. 1 Georgia in the Sugar Bowl to capture its first National Championship.

Nov. 4, 1981 – No. 6 Alabama scored 17 points in the final six minutes of the second quarter to take a 31-16 victory in front of a record Beaver Stadium crowd of 85,133. Trailing 24-3 at halftime, No. 5 Penn State had a chance to cut into the lead. The Lions took the opening kickoff of the second half and drove to the Alabama one-yard line in 15 plays. Penn State had seven plays inside the four, but failed to score, helping to secure a victory for the Crimson Tide.

Jan. 1, 1979 – A goal-line stand by Alabama was the pivotal series of plays in depriving Penn State of its first national championship, in a 14-7 loss in the Sugar Bowl. The top-ranked Lions, who went 11-0 during the regular season, twice came up short from inside the one-yard line as No. 2 Alabama hung on to win the game and the national title. With Penn State trailing 7-0, Pete Harris intercepted a Jeff Rut-

ledge pass to set up a Chuck Fusina 17-yard pass to Scott Fitzkee to tie the game in the third quarter. However, Alabama's Major Ogilvie's eight-yard TD run gave the Crimson Tide a 14-7 lead, which would be maintained for the remainder of the game.

Dec. 31, 1975 – No. 8 Penn State and No. 4 Alabama made history in the first Sugar Bowl played in the newly-constructed Louisiana Superdome. The game was typical of the Nittany Lions' season, featuring outstanding defense and kicking. Alabama managed the only touchdown of the game, a 14-yard run by Mike Stock in the third quarter, to pull out a 13-6 victory. Penn State placekicker Chris Bahr accounted for all the Nittany Lions' scoring with a 42-yard field goal in the third period and a 37-yarder in the final quarter. The Lions gained just 214 yards of total offense.

Dec. 19, 1959 – Penn State scored on a fake field goal play to upset No. 10 Alabama, 7-0, in the inaugural Liberty Bowl in Philadelphia. The play came in the final seconds of the first half with Galen Hall passing 18 yards to Roger Kochman for the score. Directed by quarterback Richie Lucas, the Maxwell Award winner and Heisman Trophy runner-up, the Nittany Lions' offense and defense were superb, as Penn State out-gained Coach Bear Bryant's team, 319-131.

NINE GRADUATES ON ROSTER

Penn State boasts nine players on the 2011 roster that have already graduated.

The nine Nittany Lions that have graduated are either enrolled in a second undergraduate degree or are taking graduate level courses.

The following Nittany Lions have graduated: safety Drew Astorino, tackle Quinn Barham, defensive end Eric Latimore, tackle Chima Okoli, linebacker Nate Stupar, running back Joe Suhey, safety Nick Sukey, tight end Andrew Szczerba and guard Johnnie Troutman.

POSITION CHANGES

NUMEROUS BEAVER STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS AWAIT FANS

Penn State fans will see several significant upgrades at Beaver Stadium that have taken place during the off-season.

The most significant changes to the venerable facility include:

- A new entry gate - Gate F - on the East side of the stadium near Gate A;
- More than 100 new locations for ADA patrons and companion seating on the East and West sides;
- Paving work on the field level concourse in the East, West and North sides of the stadium will provide a smoother and level surface for fans;
- A total of eight new restroom facilities, which are ADA-accessible, have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse;
- Improved drainage in seating areas

The changes and improvements to Beaver Stadium began as soon as the 2010 season ended and were completed in two phases, according to Associate Athletic Director Mark Bodenschatz. The first phase ended the week prior to the Blue-White Game and the second phase will wrap-up in time for Football Eve on Friday, Sept. 2 and the Nittany Lions' 125th season opener the next day.

The new entry - Gate F - is located near Gate A on the East side of the stadium. Designed to accommodate 6,000-8,000 patrons, Gate F will be a tremendous asset on gamedays, allowing some fans who sit on the East side and previously have entered at Gate E, a smoother entry into the stadium. Penn State students will continue to enter Beaver Stadium at Gate A.

The most noticeable changes inside the stadium have occurred in the lower sections of the East, West and North seating areas. In the East and West, the first three rows of seats from goal line to goal line were removed and replaced with five large, pre-cast sections that will permit additional ADA spectators and companions to watch the Nittany Lions from a great vantage point. The pre-cast sections are approximately eight feet wide, to allow spectator traffic flow with the new ADA and companion seating.

Also in the East and West stands, vomitory ramps have been improved to allow for increased and easier access by ADA patrons to the new seating areas.

Fans will also notice significant changes on the North side of the stadium. The Section NF vomitory ramp has been modified with a gentler slope to permit ADA spectators to enter the North field level seats from Section NF, rather than the visiting team tunnel. A total of eight new ADA-accessible restroom facilities have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse.

Bodenschatz said 101 new ADA seats, as well as 101 companion seats, will be available for the upcoming season. With the ADA improvements, the Beaver Stadium capacity for the 2011 season will be 106,572, to remain the nation's second-largest stadium.

Additional work has been done in a number of areas in the stadium, according to Bodenschatz. The work includes new storm water lines, allowing rain to be captured and re-directed at higher points in the stadium. Trenches, some 8-10 feet deep, were dug in the lower concourse to house the storm water drainage, as well as new water and sanitary lines. With the new lines in place, approximately 50 percent of the field level concourse surface area has been repaved since the end of last season.

Another completed stadium project includes consolidating the storage areas for the field maintenance staff and stadium concessions with new facilities in the North end of the stadium. Electrical work, painting of the east side seats in rows 1-60, new carpeting in the Penn State locker room and painting in the press box on the west side of the stadium also has been completed.

Bodenschatz also said that design and planning are underway for the installation of new video scoreboards to be in place for the 2012 season.

NEARLY 40 NITTANY LIONS ON NFL ROSTERS AS OF AUG. 27 (PRO SEASON IN PARENTHESES)

A total of 39 Penn State football alumni were populating the rosters of 23 NFL teams in training camps as of August 27. The Nittany Lions annually are in the top 15 nationally among schools in producing current NFL players.

The Miami Dolphins feature a league-high five former Nittany Lions on its roster, including All-Pro Larry Johnson and Cameron Wake, second-year players Jared Odrick and Mickey Shuler, and rookie Brett Brackett. Two NFL teams, the Oakland Raiders and the Seattle Seahawks, have three Penn Staters on their rosters.

Seven seniors from Penn State's 2010 squad are vying to make NFL squads as rookies, including draft choices Stefen Wisniewski (Oakland Raiders) and Evan Royster (Washington Redskins) and free agent signees Brackett, Chris Colasanti (Indianapolis Colts), Lou Eliades (Oakland Raiders), Bani Gbadyu (Oakland Raiders) and Ollie Ogbu (Indianapolis Colts).

Quarterback Kerry Collins signed with the Indianapolis Colts in August to add a new chapter to what is now a distinguished 17-year professional career. New York Giants offensive tackle Kareem McKenzie is entering his 11th season and Pittsburgh Steelers' tight end John Gilmore is in his 10th season. McKenzie has blocked for five NFL running backs that rushed for more than 1,000 yards in a season and won a Super Bowl ring in 2005.

More than 360 Nittany Lions have signed NFL contracts under Paterno's tutelage. The Hall of Fame coach has seen 247 of his players drafted by NFL squads, including 33 first round draft choices. Miami selected All-America defensive tackle Jared Odrick in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft. Four Nittany Lions have been first round draft choices in the past six NFL drafts.

A total of 26 Penn State Football student-athletes have been drafted since 2006, including 13 in the first three rounds.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team in 40 of 45 title games, including 2011 when Andrew Quarless won an NFL title in his rookie season with the Green Bay Packers. Thirty-three former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 49 Super Bowl rings.

Joe Paterno has led Penn State to seven unbeaten, untied regular seasons since becoming head coach in 1966, the most of any team in the nation.

The Nittany Lions have earned five unbeaten, untied seasons under Paterno (1968, '69, '73, '86, '94), with two teams (1978, '85) losing in national championship bowl games.

LIONS OWN NATION'S THIRD-BEST MARK SINCE 1950

It should come as no surprise that Penn State has the nation's third-best record since Joe Paterno joined the coaching staff in 1950.

Ohio State is the leader with a 498-154-15 mark (75.8), followed by Oklahoma (532-166-12, 75.7), Penn State (506-183-7, 73.2), Nebraska (518-192-9, 72.6) and Texas (501-195-10, 71.6).

SEVEN BOWL TEAMS ON SLATE

The Nittany Lions will face seven teams that played in bowl games last year, including four at home. Among the teams coming to Beaver Stadium this fall are 2010 bowl teams: Alabama (Capital One), Iowa (Insight), Illinois (Texas) and Nebraska (Holiday). Penn State also will face three bowl teams on the road in Northwestern (Ticket City), Ohio State (Sugar) and Wisconsin (Rose).

BIG TEN WELCOMES NEBRASKA

Penn State's 19th season of Big Ten competition will bring the most significant changes in the conference's 116 years. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011 and begins football play this fall, with the 12 institutions split into the Leaders and Legends Divisions.

The Nittany Lions are in the Leaders Division with Illinois, Indiana, Ohio State, Purdue and Wisconsin and will play their division foes every season, as well as protected crossover opponent Nebraska. Penn State will play two other teams from the Legends Division each season on a rotating basis, with Iowa and Northwestern set for the 2011 and '12 seasons. Michigan, Michigan State and Minnesota are the other Legends Division members, with the Wolverines and Golden Gophers rotating back onto the Nittany Lions' schedule in 2013.

Penn State leads the Nebraska series, 7-6, and the squads will be meeting for the first time since

2003. The Huskers last visited Beaver Stadium in 2002.

The winners of the Leaders and Legends Divisions will play in the inaugural Big Ten Championship Game in primetime on Saturday, Dec. 3 at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. Fox Sports is the official television partner of the 2011-16 Big Ten Championship games. The contest will kick at 8:00 p.m. ET.

Lucas Oil Stadium, home of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts, will be the site for the 2011-16 Big Ten Championship Games.

The winner of the Big Ten Championship Game will either play in the Rose Bowl Game or Bowl Championship Series National Championship Game.

STAGG-PATERNO CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY AWARDED TO BIG TEN WINNER

The winning team in the Big Ten Football Championship Game will earn the Stagg-Paterno Championship Trophy. The trophy pays homage to Paterno and Amos Alonzo Stagg, who won 199 games at University of Chicago when the Maroons were Big Ten members.

Paterno ranks fifth among Big Ten coaches all-time with 155 wins since the Nittany Lions began conference play in 1993. Stagg's win total is second-highest total in Big Ten history.

NITTANY LIONS RETURN EXPERIENCED SQUAD

It was a productive and challenging eight months for the Nittany Lions since concluding the 2010 season by falling to Florida in the Outback Bowl.

Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno is leading a squad that returned 15 starters and 41 letter-winners from last year, in addition to 16 players with starting experience. A total of 44 letterwinners returned, including TB Brandon Beachum, WR Curtis Drake and TE Andrew Szczerba, who missed the 2010 season with injuries.

Seven starters are back on offense and seven on defense, along with punter Alex Butterworth.

The 16 additional returning players that had made starts had a combined total of 83 amongst them entering the season.

FIVE RETURNEES EARNED ALL-BIG TEN RECOGNITION

Among the returnees are five Nittany Lions who earned honorable All-Big Ten recognition in 2010: senior safety Drew Astorino, senior tackle Quinn Barham, senior cornerback D'Anton Lynn, senior wide receiver Derek Moyer and senior defensive tackle Devon Still.

NATION'S NO. 2 BOWL WINNING PERCENTAGE

The Nittany Lions are 27-14-2 overall in bowl games, with their 65.1 winning percentage second in the nation among schools that have at least 20 bowl appearances. Penn State trails only USC, which has a 32-16 (66.7) post-season mark.

Penn State ranks No. 3 in the nation with its 27 bowl wins and No. 8 with 43 appearances.

BOWL LEADER AMONG BIG TEN TEAMS

Penn State leads all Big Ten institutions in bowl victories (27), appearances (43) and winning percentage (65.1). The Nittany Lions are 10-4 in post-season contests since starting Big Ten competition in 1993, winning four of their last six bowl games, including three New Year's games (FedEx Orange, Outback, Capital One).

AMONG BEST IN BCS AND NEW YEAR'S BOWLS

Over the past six years, the Nittany Lions have won two Big Ten Championships, won four bowl games and played in five New Year's or Bowl Championship Series (BCS) games, the nation's third-highest total.

Joe Paterno has led Penn State to 25 New Year's or BCS contests, earning a 17-8 record.

15 OF TOP 20 HOME CROWDS LAST SIX YEARS

Penn State has drawn 15 of its top 20 all-time home crowds since 2005 to Beaver Stadium, which was expanded for the seventh time under Coach Joe Paterno prior to the 2001 season.

The Nittany Lions have won 38 of their last 44 home games (86.4) since 2005, dating to the Senior Day win over Michigan State in 2004.

FIVE BIG TEN NEW YEAR'S BOWL GAMES

The Big Ten's post-season lineup for the 2010-13 seasons includes six bowl games to be featured annually on or around New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, including five contests on Jan. 1.

With New Year's Day falling on Sunday in 2012, five Big Ten bowls will be played on Monday, January 2, 2012.

In 2009, the conference announced four-year bowl extensions with the Capital One (vs. SEC), Outback (SEC) and Insight (Big 12) and new four-year bowl agreements with the Gator, Texas and TicketCity Classic. The Big Ten is in the midst of an eight-year extension with the Rose Bowl through the 2013 season. This Big Ten bowl lineup will run concurrently with the latest Bowl Championship Series contract.

The Big Ten's 2010-13 bowl lineup begins on December 30 with the Insight Bowl in Tempe against a Big 12 opponent, followed by six more post-season contests played on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. The Meineke Care Care of Texas Bowl will be played on December 31, followed by five more conference bowl games over a roughly nine-hour period on Jan. 2, including the TicketCity Classic (vs. Big 12/Conference USA), Capital One Bowl, Outback Bowl,

PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN RECORD 90 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to statistical information released in October, 2010 by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a record Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 90 percent compared to a 79 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2000-01 through 2003-04. The 90 percent figure was second to Northwestern (97) among Big Ten Conference institutions. Penn State's previous record was 89 percent from the 2008 and 2009 NCAA reports.

This is the 20th release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes as it has for the past 20 years.

The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 80 percent, significantly higher than the national average of 64 percent, and second to Northwestern (88) among Big Ten schools. The four-year average for University Park students was 85 percent, also far exceeding the 62 percent rate for all students nationwide.

Among the 2003-04 entering freshman class, 76 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, well above the 64 percent for all Division I institutions. Penn State's 76 percent figure was third-highest among Big Ten schools, trailing only Northwestern (91) and Michigan (80). The graduation rate for all Penn State students was 85 percent in the entering class of 2003-04.

The NCAA data revealed that student-athletes from 23 of Penn State's 25 teams (track/cross country teams combined) earned a Graduation Success Rate at or above the national GSR average of 79 percent. Eight Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent and 20 of 25 Nittany Lion teams earned a GSR higher than or equal to the national average for their respective sport.

Other highlights from the NCAA Graduation Rates Report:

- Penn State's four-year federal graduation rate for African-American student-athletes was 75 percent, marking the 20th consecutive year the Nittany Lions topped the Division I national average (53 percent). The 87 percent GSR figure for Penn State African-American student-athletes was a school record and was 24 points higher than the national average.

- The Penn State Football (84 percent compared to 67), Nittany Lion Basketball (86 to 65 percent) and Lady Lion Basketball (100 to 83 percent) teams all earned four-year Graduation Success Rates higher than the national average for their sport. Coach Ed De Chellis' Nittany Lions ranked third in the Big Ten with their 86 percent GSR score. Coach Coquese Washington's Lady Lions were tied for first in the Big Ten with their 100 percent GSR average (see below).

The 84 percent GSR figure for Coach Joe Paterno's Nittany Lion football program was one point off last year's school record and second to Northwestern among all Big Ten Conference football teams. Penn State earned a 77 percent four-year federal graduation rate for student-athletes entering school in 2003-04, also second to Northwestern among Big Ten football teams.

SECOND IN BIG TEN VICTORIES SINCE 1993

Penn State will be playing its 19th season as members of the Big Ten Conference this fall. Since 1993, the Nittany Lions are second in the Big Ten in overall victories with a 155-68 record. Penn State is 90-54 in conference contests, trailing only Ohio State and Michigan.

92nd HOMECOMING GAME

Purdue will provide the opposition for Penn State's 92nd Homecoming Game on Oct. 15. The Nittany Lions have an impressive 65-21-5 record in front of the alumni audience, with a 39-6 Homecoming record under Joe Paterno.

MOYE A BILETNIKOFF AWARD CANDIDATE

Senior standout Derek Moyer (Rochester) is on the Watch List for the Biletnikoff Award, presented to the nation's top wide receiver. Penn State All-American Bobby Engram was the inaugural winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 1994.

A pre-season first team All-Big Ten honoree, Moyer led the Nittany Lions in 2010 with 53 catches for 885 yards and eight touchdowns, catching at least one scoring strike in seven of the last eight games. Moyer was named 2010 honorable mention all-conference

and Gator Bowl (vs. SEC) and the Rose Bowl Game. after averaging 16.7 yards per catch, which was second highest in the Big Ten. His 68.1-yard per game was good for fifth in the league.

Moyer enters the season ranked ninth in Penn State annals with 108 receptions and 10th with 1,798 receiving yards. The former Rochester High School all-stater needs 18 catches and 209 yards to move into the top five in each category. The 6-5 Moyer is on schedule to graduate in December.

MAUTI A CANDIDATE FOR BUTKUS AWARD & NAGURSKI TROPHY

Redshirt junior linebacker Michael Mauti (Mandeville, La.) will be among the primary leaders for the defense and is on the Watch Lists for the Butkus Award and the Bronko Nagurski Trophy. Earning 2011 pre-season first-team All-Big Ten recognition, Mauti finished fifth on the team with 67 tackles last year despite missing all or parts of four games last year with injuries.

The "Linebacker U." standout started seven games last year, recording 5.5 tackles for loss and two sacks. Mauti recorded a career-high 11 tackles, with 3.0 TFL, in the historic comeback win over Northwestern to earn Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week accolades. The former Mandeville High

NOTING HEAD COACH JOE PATERNO

- 46th season as Penn State head coach and 62nd year as a member of the PSU coaching staff, Paterno has been on the sideline for 693 Penn State games. His 46 years in Happy Valley are a record for longevity among major college coaches at one school.
- First all-time in career victories among Football Bowl Subdivision (Division I-A) coaches. Became first FBS coach with 400 wins with 35-21 win over Northwestern on Nov. 6, 2010, as PSU erased 21-0 deficit
- Owens a career record of 402-135-3. His winning percentage of 74.7 was third-best among active FBS coaches entering the 2011 season (minimum 10 years as a I-A coach).
- Broke the record for career wins by a major college coach, passing Paul "Bear" Bryant, with his 324th victory in a thrilling 29-27 win over Ohio State on Oct. 27, 2001.

NOTES ON COACH JOE PATERNO

62 YEARS IN HAPPY VALLEY

Joe Paterno is in his 62nd season as a member of the Penn State coaching staff. He came to Penn State with new head coach Rip Engle before graduating from Brown University in 1950. After 16 seasons as an assistant coach under Engle, Paterno was named the Nittany Lions' 14th head football coach on February 19, 1966. The Hall of Fame mentor is in his 46th season as head coach.

ALL-TIME LEADER IN BOWL WINS AND APPEARANCES

Joe Paterno owns a post-season record of 24-12-1, a winning percentage of 66.2, including a 17-8 mark in New Year's bowl games. Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl wins and appearances (37) and his winning percentage is No. 3 all-time among coaches with at least 15 bowl appearances.

PATERNO AMONG ELITE GROUP OF BIG TEN COACHES

Paterno made his head coaching debut on Sept. 17, 1966, earning a 15-7 win over Maryland before a Beaver Stadium crowd of 40,911.

690 AND COUNTING

The Alabama game will be the 694th contest Joe Paterno has coached in since joining the Nittany Lions' staff in 1950.

In his 62nd season as a member of the Penn State staff, Paterno followed Rip Engle from Brown to Penn State after graduating in 1950 and was involved in 155 games as an assistant coach from 1950-65. He was promoted to head coach in 1966.

Paterno has missed just three games in his career. As an assistant coach, he missed the 1955 game at Army when his father, Angelo, died. As head coach in 1977, Joe and Sue Paterno's son, David, was involved in a serious trampoline accident the day before the Lions' game at Syracuse and Paterno did not attend the contest.

Paterno missed the Nov. 11, 2006 game with Temple, which took place five days after he had surgery on his left leg, which was injured in a sideline collision at Wisconsin on Nov. 4, 2006.

LIONS EARN 500TH WIN WITH PATERNO ON STAFF

The 24-0 blanking of Kent State on Sept. 18, 2011 was Penn State's 500th victory since Joe Paterno joined the coaching staff in 1950.

In his 62nd year on the Penn State coaching staff, Paterno followed his coach at Brown University, Rip Engle, to Penn State as he was completing his degree at Brown. Engle compiled a 104-48-4 record from 1950-65, with Paterno being named head coach on February 19, 1966.

PATERNO EARNS NCAA PRESIDENT'S GERALD FORD AWARD

Joe Paterno received the 2011 NCAA President's Gerald R. Ford Award from Mark Emmert at the NCAA Convention in January.

The NCAA President's Gerald R. Ford Award, named in recognition of former President Gerald Ford, honors an individual who has provided significant leadership as an advocate for intercollegiate athletics on a continuous basis over the course of their career.

Paterno is the ninth recipient of the Ford Award. Previous winners include former NCAA President Myles Brand, Billie Jean King, James Frank, Christine Grant, Birch Bayh, John Wooden, William Friday and Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh.



School All-American broke his career-high in tackles in three consecutive games last season, topped by the effort against the Wildcats in Coach Joe Paterno's 400th win.

Presented annually since 1985, "Linebacker U." All-Americans LaVar Arrington (1999) and Paul Posluszny (2005) are former winners of the Butkus Award. Nittany Lions Shane Conlan (1986), Andre Collins (1989), Brandon Short (1999), Posluszny (2006) and Dan Connor (2007) were Butkus Award finalists.

DEFENSE AMONG NATION'S TOP FIVE SINCE 2004

Over the past seven seasons, Penn State is one of only three defensive units that rank among the top five in the nation in scoring defense (3rd, 16.4 ppg), total defense (5th, 298.7 ypg) and rushing defense (5th, 107.1 ypg) entering this season. Ohio State and TCU are the only other team ranks in the top five in the three categories.

Since the start of the 2004 campaign, the Nittany Lions have held 54 of their 89 opponents (60.6 pct.) to 17 points or less, including 10 foes in 2009 and nine in 2008. Three of Penn State's six bowl opponents have scored 17 points or less, including LSU in the 2010 Capital One Bowl.

Over the past six years, Penn State has limited 46 of 89 opponents (51.7 pct.) to 100 rushing yards or fewer, with eight foes failing to do so every year from 2006-09. Among the teams failing to crack 100 rushing yards against the Nittany Lions were bowl foes LSU, USC, Tennessee and Florida State.

BIG TEN LEADS WAY ON ALL-TIME WINS LIST

With Nebraska joining the Big Ten this year, the conference boasts four of the nation's top six all-time winningest programs in Michigan (1st, 885), Nebraska (4th, 838), Ohio State (5th, 820) and Penn State (6th, 819).

SEVERAL ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® CANDIDATES

The Penn State football team has had at least one Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® in each of the past nine seasons, including a school record five in 2008, with three more in 2009 and again in 2010.

Redshirt sophomore defensive end Pete Massaro earned first team Academic All-America® honors last year and was joined by 2010 seniors Chris Colasanti and Stefan Wisniewski. A finance student, Massaro owned a 3.84 cumulative GPA after the spring semester, but will not be eligible for 2011 Academic All-America® consideration after suffering a serious knee injury in spring practice that will sideline him for this season.

Junior guard John Urschel owned a perfect 4.00 GPA through the spring semester and will lead Penn State's 2011 Academic All-America® candidates. Senior linebacker Nate Stupar (3.64 GPA) also will be a strong Academic All-America® candidate. Stupar graduated in May.

Nominees for Capital One Academic All-America® consideration must have at least a 3.30 cumulative grade point average and be a starter or key reserve.

11 FIRST TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS® PAST THREE YEARS

For the third consecutive year, the Penn State Football program was at the head of the class in Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America® selections. Guard Stefan Wisniewski became the first Penn State football student-athlete to earn Academic All-America® three times, with first-team nods in 2009 and 2010.

Senior linebacker Chris Colasanti and defensive end Pete Massaro also were first-team Academic All-Americans® in 2010.

Penn State has earned a nation's best 15 Academic All-Americans® over the past five years, with 13 first team honorees. A program record five Nittany Lions were selected to the 2008 Academic All-America® team.

During Joe Paterno's tenure, Penn State has had 47 Capital One Academic All-Americans®, with 37 earning first team honors. The Nittany Lions' 49 Academic All-Americans® all-time are No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

MORE THAN 30 FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 3.0 GPA IN SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the Spring 2011 semester, with 33 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade point average.

Among the 33 Nittany Lions, 16 – nearly half – earned Dean's List recognition by posting a 3.5 GPA or higher this past semester.

The superlative academic performance brings the number of returning Nittany Lion football student-athletes to 42 who had a cumulative 3.0 GPA through the spring semester.

Three Nittany Lions earned a perfect 4.0 GPA during the spring semester: defensive end Pete Massaro, kick snapper Jon Rohrbach and guard John Urschel. Massaro was a 2010 first-team Academic All-American®. Urschel brought a 4.0 cumulative GPA into his fifth semester as a Penn State student-athlete.

Nine 2010-11 true freshmen earned a 3.0 GPA or higher last spring.

The Nittany Lions had 19 Academic All-Big Ten football honorees during the 2010 season, improving their conference-leading total to 260 since starting conference play in 1993.

"CAPTAINS' LETTERS TO JOE" BOOK NOW AVAILABLE

At the 2010 State College Quarterback Club banquet, a special gift was given to Coach Joe Paterno, in honor of his Hall of Fame career, which includes more than 400 wins.

Knowing that Paterno already had an adequate collection of plaques and trophies, the Penn State Football Letterman's Club and the Quarterback Club created a unique gift. Their intention was to capture the impact Coach Paterno has on players' lives, long after they have passed through the Beaver Stadium tunnel for the final time.

The Letterman's Club placed a call to the former captains of Coach Paterno back to his first team in 1966. The captains were asked to write a Letter To Joe, about the impact he and Penn State made on their lives. Some told stories, others revealed feelings long kept inside. Nearly all recounted the same, consistent lessons taught through the years. The letters were put into a single book and presented at the 2010 Senior Banquet. It was called, "Captains' Letters To Joe."

That gift to Coach Paterno is now being made available to the public, in an effort to raise funds for the Penn State Football Letterman's Club Scholarships, including one in the name of Joe and Sue Paterno. "Captains' Letters To Joe" includes 119 personalized letters to Joe Paterno from the leaders of each team he has coached.

The names of the players who wrote a letter for "Captains' Letters To Joe" is a litany of Penn State football legends, pro and college Hall of Famers, All-Americans, All-Big Ten performers and Academic All-Americans. The list begins with Mike Irwin and John Runnels in 1966 and goes to Brett Brackett and Ollie Ogbo from the 2010 season. The complete list can be found at: www.letterstojo.org.

NITTANY LIONS' 1986 UNBEATEN NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP TEAM TO BE HONORED AT IOWA CONTEST

The Nittany Lions' 1986 National Championship football team, one of the elite squads in Penn State's storied gridiron history, will be reunited at the Oct. 8 Big Ten home opener against Iowa in Beaver Stadium.

The 1986 Nittany Lions recorded an unblemished 12-0 record after defeating No. 1 Miami (Fla.) in a thrilling title clash en route to their second national championship in four years under Coach Joe Paterno. The 2011 season marks the 25th anniversary of Penn State's memorable championship run.

The 1986 season was capped by Penn State's epic 14-10, down to the wire, victory over Miami in the Fiesta Bowl. In the "Duel in the Desert" on January 2, 1987 in Tempe, Ariz., the Nittany Lions picked off Hurricanes' quarterback Vinny Testaverde five times to help secure the victory. Linebacker Pete Giffopoulos hauled in the final interception of the night inside the Penn State five-yard line as Testaverde took one last shot at the end zone on fourth and goal. Giffopoulos ran the ball out to the 10-yard line before falling to the ground with nine seconds left, securing the pulsating victory.

More than 70 million people watched the thrilling prime-time telecast on NBC, breaking the previous record for a college football telecast.

The 1986 Nittany Lions are one of five Paterno-led teams that finished the season unbeaten, joining the 1968 (11-0), 1969 (11-0), 1973 (12-0) and 1994 (12-0) squads.

The 1986 season also was highlighted by a Nittany Lion defense that held nine opponents to 15 points or less, while also winning four games by six points or fewer. On Sept. 6, 1986, the Nittany Lions played the first night game at Beaver Stadium in the season opener against Temple. That year, Penn State finished the regular season by beating Maryland (17-15), Notre Dame (24-19) and Pitt (34-14). The Lions also defeated No. 2 Alabama, 23-3, just the third loss by the Crimson Tide at Bryant-Denny Stadium in 25 years.

The 1986 team produced many Penn State household names, including team captains, Shane Conlan, John Shaffer, Steve Smith and Bob White. The team also produced four All-Americans, as linebacker Conlan, tackle Chris Conlin, running back D.J. Dozier and defensive tackle Tim Johnson all were honored.

A program record 13 Nittany Lions were selected in the 1987 NFL Draft, led by first round picks Conlan (Buffalo) and Dozier (Minnesota).

NITTANY LION STANDOUTS BROWN AND KWALICK HONORED WITH CONFERENCE TROPHIES

The Big Ten Conference announced last December it would initiate the presentation of 18 trophies following the 2011 season and will honor some of its all-time premier football student-athletes with the newly named trophies, including Penn State's Courtney Brown and Ted Kwalick.

The Big Ten will award the Smith-Brown Defensive Lineman of the Year beginning this year, recognizing the Nittany Lions' Brown and Michigan State's Bubba Smith, who recently passed away. Brown was a consensus first-team All-American in 1999, breaking school records in career tackles for loss (70), career



sacks (33) and season TFL (29). The 1999 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, he was a three-time all-conference selection. Brown was the first overall selection in the 2000 National Football League Draft by the Cleveland Browns.

Also starting this season, the conference will present the Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year, honoring Penn State's Kwalick and Iowa's Dallas Clark. Kwalick was a first All-American in 1967 and '68 and finished fourth in balloting for the 1968 Heisman Trophy. A first round draft choice by the National Football League's San Francisco 49ers, and a three-time All-Pro, Kwalick was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1989.

Nine returning squad members have ties to current or former Nittany Lion football team players, coaches or staff:

- Sophomore **Nate Cadogan's** brother, Gerald, lettered at tackle for the Nittany Lions from 2006-08;
- Junior kick snapper **Mike Furhman** is the son of Chet Furhman, former Penn State Football strength and conditioning coach;
- Redshirt freshman linebacker **Mike Hull's** father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions from 1971-73;
- Rich Mauti was a letterman for the Nittany Lions in 1975 and '76 and played eight NFL seasons. One of his sons, **Michael Mauti**, is a redshirt junior linebacker and another son, Patrick, was a senior in 2009;
- Redshirt junior **Kenny Pollock's** great uncle, Ben Pollock, played at Penn State from 1937-40, earning letters his final two seasons;
- Wide receiver **Ryan Scherer's** father, Rip, was a graduate assistant football coach at Penn State in 1974 and '75. Ryan's grandfather, Rip, lettered for the Nittany Lions in 1948.
- Senior linebacker **Nate Stupar** comes from a family with multiple ties to Penn State, including his father, Steve, who was a lineman for Paterno in the late 1970's. Uncles Ron, Doug and Jeff Hostetler all played for the Nittany Lions in the late 1970's and early 1980's.
- Senior running back **Joe Suhey** is a member of the one the most prominent families in Penn State football history. His great grandfather, Bob Higgins, was Penn State's second All-American, in 1915, and earned All-America honors again in 1919. He served as head coach of the Nittany Lions from 1930-48. Suhey's grandfather, Steve Suhey, was a letterman in 1942 and again in 1946-47, earning All-America honors his senior season. He married one of Bob Higgins' daughters, Ginger. Three of their sons, Paul, Larry and Matt (Joe's father) played for Penn State in the 1970's. One of Joe's first cousins, Kevin Suhey, graduated in 2008 after playing for the Nittany Lions;
- Junior **Michael Zordich's** father, Michael, played at Penn State from 1982-85, earning first team All-America honors as a senior before embarking on a 12-year NFL career.
- In addition, redshirt freshman **Patrick Flanagan** is the nephew of Nittany Lion Basketball head coach Patrick Chambers. Redshirt freshman **Alex Kenney's** sister, Lauren, is a member of the Penn State women's track and field team.

PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES "LIFT FOR LIFE" HITS RECORD \$100,000 TO BENEFIT KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

Contributions from the Ninth Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" has boosted the 2011 total to a record total in excess of \$100,000 to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

The "Lift For Life" was held on July 8 in Holuba Hall and the initial total raised by the strength and conditioning event was \$94,410.09. Additional contributions lifted the total to \$100,930 raised for kidney cancer research and patients by Penn State Football student-athletes. The previous record was just over

\$98,000 in 2010.

More than \$600,000 has been raised in the battle against rare diseases by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural "Lift For Life" was held in 2003.

Uplifting Athletes chapter officers provided the leadership, led by Mike Farrell (Pittsburgh), Eric Shrive (Scranton), Mike Yancich (Washington) and Ty Howle (Wake Forest, N.C.).

Shrive, a redshirt sophomore, led the squad by securing more than \$25,000 in "Lift for Life" donations. Farrell, a redshirt junior tackle, was second with donations totaling \$10,880.

Uplifting Athletes has grown to nine chapters, with Boston College, Colgate, Kent State, Maryland, North Carolina State, Northwestern, Ohio State and Princeton joining Penn State in the fight against rare diseases. Boston College, Maryland and Northwestern also conducted Lift for Life events this past summer.

PENN STATE AND PITT TO RENEW RIVALRY

Long-time rivals Penn State and Pitt will meet September 10, 2016 in Pittsburgh and September 16, 2017 in Beaver Stadium.

The Nittany Lions have met the Panthers more than any other opponent – 96 times - with Penn State owning a 50-42-4 series advantage. The teams first met in 1893 and played every season from 1900-31 and 1935-92, often in a compelling final game of the regular season.

The teams did not meet from 1993-96, when Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference, and then played a four-game series from 1997-2000, with the Nittany Lions winning the first three games. The Panthers won the last meeting, 12-0, in Three Rivers Stadium 11 years ago.

VIRGINIA, SYRACUSE AND RUTGERS ON FUTURE SCHEDULES

During the past five seasons, Penn State played Notre Dame in 2006 and '07 and renewed its rivalry with Syracuse in 2008 and '09. The Nittany Lions and Orange will open the 2013 season at the New Meadowlands Stadium and are tentatively scheduled to play in 2020 and '21.

Following the current series with Alabama, the Nittany Lions will play Virginia in 2012 and '13, Rutgers in 2014 and '15 and Pitt in 2016 and '17.

BIG TEN MOVING TO NINE-GAME CONFERENCE SCHEDULE IN 2017

The Big Ten announced in August that conference football programs will move to a nine-game Big Ten schedule beginning with the 2017 season.

Three teams each from the Legends Division and Leaders Division will feature five conference home games during odd-numbered years, while the other three schools from each division will host five conference contests during even-numbered years.

The 2017 schedule will include five conference home outings for Iowa, Michigan State and Nebraska from the Legends Division and Illinois, Indiana and Ohio State from the Leaders Division. The 2018

schedule will feature five Big Ten home games for Michigan, Minnesota and Northwestern of the Legends Division and Penn State, Purdue and Wisconsin of the Leaders Division.

Penn State will play three home non-conference games during odd-numbered years, when the Nittany Lions are scheduled to play five Big Ten away games, for a total of seven games in Beaver Stadium.

During even-numbered years, when Penn State is scheduled to play five conference home games (starting in 2018), the Nittany Lions will play a total of seven or eight contests in Beaver Stadium.

The Big Ten will return to a full nine-game conference schedule for the first time since the 1983 and 1984 seasons, prior to Penn State joining the conference for the 1993 season.

All Penn State football and basketball games can be heard on the Penn State Sports Network, a property of Learfield Sports.

Fifty stations in six states carry the Nittany Lion broadcasts, which can also be heard on GoPSUSports.com, the official website of Penn State Athletics, and Sirius XM. Steve Jones and Jack Ham are in their 12th season together calling the action.

Football broadcasts on the Penn State Sports Network begin 90 minutes prior to kickoff with "The Penn State Tailgate Show presented by UnitedHealthcare."

BIG TEN NETWORK TO AIR MULTIPLE PENN STATE GAMES AMONG ITS 40-PLUS FOOTBALL GAMES THIS SEASON

The Penn State-Indiana State contest was one of six football games televised by the Big Ten Network during the opening weekend of the season.

BTN will air 40-plus football games this season, with each school making a minimum of two appearances, including at least one conference game.

Penn State's Oct. 22 contest at Northwestern will air in primetime on BTN, with a 6 p.m. CT kick in Evanston. Additional Nittany Lion games are likely to air on BTN once the 12-day selection process begins.

BTN televised three Penn State football games in 2010 and four Nittany Lion contests in 2009.

The Big Ten Network is available to more than 80 million homes across the United States and Canada, and has agreements with more than 300 affiliates. The network, though, is not carried by Adams and Blue Ridge Cable in Pennsylvania. The network also is not available to Armstrong Cable customers in western Pennsylvania and in the Medina and Youngstown, Ohio areas. A combined total of approximately 35,000 Penn State alumni live in communities served by the three cable providers, in addition to thousands more fans and current Penn State students.

BTN will air its first football tripleheaders on Sept. 10 and 17.

The Big Ten Network will televise approximately 700 events in 2011-12, all in HD, including 40-45 football games, at least 110 men's basketball games, at least 55 women's basketball games, Olympic sport events and conference championships.

The Big Ten Network is available in more than 95 percent of the homes in the nine Big Ten states and 19 of the nation's top 20 markets.

LAST GAME RECAP

LIONS DOWN INDIANA STATE 41-7 IN SEASON OPENER

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Sept. 3, 2011 - Penn State opened its 125th season in style, rolling past Indiana State, 41-7, in Beaver Stadium. Penn State led throughout following a Chaz Powell 95-yard kick-off return touchdown to open the game.

Sophomore Silas Redd led the Nittany Lion ground game with a pair of touchdowns and 104 yards. The Penn State rushing attack earned 245 yards on the day.

Penn State improved to 104-19-2 record in season openers. The Nittany Lions are 39-7 in season openers under Joe Paterno and 112-12-1 in home openers. Penn State has won 10 consecutive season openers.

On a day where Penn State out-gained Indiana State, 359-170, in total offense, the Nittany Lion rushing game proved decisive against the Sycamores. Penn State earned 16 of its 21 first downs on the ground.

The Penn State defense was sterling, holding ISU to just eight first downs with two interceptions, two sacks and a fumble recovery. Penn State forced three turnovers, the most forced by the Nittany Lions since causing four last year against Temple. The Nittany Lions converted the turnovers into two touchdowns (13 points).

Six seniors started on offense and six seniors started on defense for Penn State.

Penn State wasted no time scoring as Powell took the opening kick-off 95 yards to open a 7-0 lead just 13 seconds into the game, with Evan Lewis adding his first career PAT kick. The TD return by Powell was his second straight in a season opener, having returned a kickoff 100 yards for a score to open the second half against Youngstown State in 2010.

Redd delivered his second-career 100-yard rushing game and had his first career multiple-touchdown game with two rushing touchdowns. Tailback Curtis Dukes had a career-long 30-yard rush in the third quarter, and a career-best 47 yards on his six carries.

Co-captain Derek Moyer had four catches, giving him 108 on his career. He moved into ninth place at Penn State, behind Terry Smith (109 catches). Moyer's 57 receiving yards gave him 1,798 yards in his career, which is 10th place in the Penn State annals.

Redshirt linebacker Mike Hull had seven tackles in his first career action. Linebacker Michael Yancich notched a career-best six tackles.

Three Nittany Lion true freshmen made their debuts: CB Adrian Amos, PK Sam Ficken and WR Allen Robinson.

After an Indiana State three-and-out on the Sycamores' first possession, the Nittany Lions rattled off a long drive led by starting quarterback Rob Bolden that resulted in a Redd nine-yard touchdown run on the 11th play of the drive, which totaled 77 yards. The march down the field was highlighted by a 16-yard run by Redd on the second play and a 14-yard scramble by Joe Suhey on the next play. The drive lasted a second shy of five minutes as PSU took a 14-0 lead with 8:20 left in the first quarter.

Co-captain Drew Astorino intercepted a third-down pass by ISU's Ronnie Fouch and ran it back 33 yards to the Indiana 22-yard line. But, Lewis missed a 38-yard field goal attempt.

Penn State opened the second quarter by embarking on another long touchdown drive. Penn State chipped away with Brandon Beachum while sprinkling in rushes of seven and three yards by Mike Zordich. Matt McGloin entered on the first offensive play in the second quarter and led three scoring drives.
