Rutgers finished with three in double figures led by junior guard Shrita Parker with a season-high 16 points. Junior Kandiss Barber and sophomore Aliyah Jeune followed with 10 points each. Victoria Harris also contributed eight boards, one shy of tying her career-high.

RU graduated six players from last year's roster that went 19-15 overall and reached the second round of the WNIT Tournament. Two members of the Class of 2016 - Kahleah Copper and Rachel Hollivay - were drafted by the WNBA.

Eight Scarlet Knights return, however, returning leader scorer and Second Team All-Big Ten honoree, Tyler Scaife, will sit out the 2016-17 season after having a routine medical procedure over the summer.

Hall of fame head coach C. Vivian Stringer is in her 22nd season at Rutgers and 46th overall having accumulated 974 wins, ranking her third among active Division I coaches in career victories.

#### **ABOUT PENN STATE**

The Lady Lions come to the RAC for their lone meeting with the Scarlet Knights sporting a 10-3 overall mark and after suffering a 89-70 setback at home to Indiana to start Big Ten play.

The loss to the Hoosiers on Wednesday snapped a six-game win streak for Penn State and was the first loss at the Bryce Jordan Center for the Lady Lions after collecting seven consecutive wins at home to open up the 2016-17 season.

Penn State is led by sophomore guard Teniya Page at 20.2 ppg, which places her in a tie for fourth the Big Ten in scoring and 20th nationally.

Senior guard Lindsay Spann is the other Lady Lions in double figures averaging 12.9 ppg.

Senior forward Kaliyah Mitchell and sophomore forward De'Janae Boykin lead Penn State on the boards with 5.7 rpg each.

#### **900 WINS AND COUNTING**

Both the Rutgers and Penn State squads collected their program's 900th victories this season. To date, 21 Division I programs have collected 900 wins or more.

RU has gone 900-406 with the Scarlet Knights earning its 900th program victory in the 53-45 win over in-state rival Seton Hall on Dec. 13.

Penn State meanwhile is 909-440 overall and captured its 900th victory in a 106-50 over St. Peter's in its home opener on Nov. 13.

Kahleah Copper led the way for Rutgers with 20 points, her seventh 20-point scoring game of the season. Tyler Scaife followed with 15 points, while Rachel Hollivay contributed 13 points. Briyona Canty added in 11 points, nearly eclipsing a triple-double with nine assists and eight rebounds. Khadaizha Sanders tied her then career-high with 11 points to round out the double-figure scorers.

Penn State had three Nittany Lions finish in double figures led by Teniya Page with 18 points. Lindsey Spann notched 13 points, while Brianna Banks contributed 12 points in the loss.

Scaife opened the afternoon's scoring with a three-pointer, as Rutgers coasted to a 12-4 lead by the 3:40 mark of the first quarter. Copper responded later in the quarter with seven consecutive points to extend the RU advantage to 19-5 with 2:02 left in the first.

Penn State would briefly shut down Copper and the Scarlet Knights with six uncontested points of their own to bring the gap to 19-11 moving into the second frame.

PSU continued its run into the second with a jumper from Page, however, Sanders drained a three-pointer to push RU's lead to 22-13.

Although the battle continued, a jumper from Scaife as the time expired gave Rutgers a 36-26 advantage to carry into the break.

Rutgers started the third quarter with a 10-2 burst to push the Scarlet Knights ahead, 44-28, and maintained at least a 10-point cushion for the remainder of the third. Canty added in a jumper as the clock ran out to give RU a 55-43 advantage moving into the fourth quarter.

An 8-2 RU run extended the Scarlet Knight lead to 63-45, capped by a Scaife free throw with 5:40 to go in the game. RU held its control, expanding its lead to the largest of the night at 69-49 with 3:02 remaining.

#### NONCONFERENCE RECAP

Rutgers closed out non-Big Ten play at 3-10 overall. Three of the Scarlet Knights' 2016-17 nonconference opponents captured conference titles last season in Chattanooga (SoCon), James Madison (CAA) and St. John's (Big East), while ten of Rutgers' 13 nonconference opponents reached either the NCAA or WNIT Tournament a season ago.

#### **RU DEFENSE ON THE B1G OFFENSE**

Rutgers tackled the Big Ten's top offense in Michigan in its Big Ten opener on Dec. 28. While the Wolverines emerged with the 63-50 win, Michigan had entered the contest averaging 81.0 ppg.

Michigan's 63 points were the fewest scored by the Wolverines in a victory this season. The previous low was 66 in a 66-44 win over Western Michigan on Nov. 21.

#### **COURT TIME**

Shrita Parker and KK Sanders are among the league leaders in time on the court this season. Both Scarlet Knight average 34.0 minutes of playing time, the fourth most minutes of any Big Ten player.

#### **TRIPLE DOUBLE TERRITORY**

Sophomore guard KK Sanders flirted with a triple-double on Dec. 13 against Seton Hall with 17 points, nine rebounds and 10 assists.

Sanders would have been the first Scarlet Knight since Khadijah Rushdan in 2011 to perform the feat. Rushdan poured in 13 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists against Pittsburgh.

The only other Scarlet Knight to have recorded a triple double is Tasha Pointer.

Several Scarlet Knights have come close to a triple double over the last few years. Last season, former Scarlet Knight Briyona Canty was nearing triple double territory with 11 points, nine assists and eight rebounds at Penn State.

Rachel Hollivay also nearly captured a tripledouble against Howard on Nov. 22, 2013 with 26 points, 13 rebounds and nine blocks as did Syessence Davis with 12 points, 10 rebounds and nine assists at Iona on Dec. 20, 2014.

#### **KEYING IN ON KK SANDERS**

Over the last eight contests, KK Sanders has averaged 5.5 assists per contest and has handed out an average of 7.3 assists in the last three games with Seton Hall, Temple and Michigan.

Sanders had a 10-assist performance against Seton Hall on Dec. 13. Prior to her 10 helpers against the Pirates, the last Scarlet Knight to hand out 10 or more assists was Briyona Canty with 12 in an overtime battle at Purdue on Feb. 25, 2016.

Sanders is averaging 4.1 assists on the year placing her 11th in the Big Ten

Opponent offenses may also want to watch out for the Kankakee, Illinois native who is averaging 2.2 steals per game, which is fourth in the Big Ten.

Sanders most recently reset her career benchmark in the category with five at Houston on Dec. 10. She previously had a career-high four thefts at Elon and Virginia earlier this season.

#### **BRIGHT SPOT WITH BARBER**

Junior college transfer Kandiss Barber has been doing some damage on the boards as of late. The Chula Vista, California native has averaged 7.0 rebounds in the last five matchups. Included in the span was a season-high tying eight boards at Houston on Dec. 10.

Barber, who is leading the team in scoring at 9.6 ppg, was at one point averaging 16.7 ppg during a three-game span with Bucknell, James Madison and St. John's

Barber followed a 17-point effort in the victory over Bucknell on Dec. 3, with 22 points two days later in the double overtime contest with James Madison on Dec. 5. She then poured in 11 points at St. John's on Dec. 7.

In RU's first win of the season over Bryant on Nov. 27, the junior guard went 6-of-9 from the field for her second double figure scoring game of the year with 14 points.

Against the Bison, she went 7-of-15 from the floor and nailed two free throws in the waning moments to keep the Scarlet Knights from losing their cushion in the game.

In the ACC/Big Ten Challenge against the Blue Devils on Dec. 1, Barber, who was fighting a stomach bug, hauled in a season-high eight rebounds as the game's leader on the boards along with six points. In overtime with the Dukes, Barber was 9-of-16 from the field, which included a jumper from the right wing as the buzzer closed out regulation to force overtime.

#### ANOTHER DOUBLE-DOUBLE IN THE BOOKS

After coming close to a double-double three times earlier in the nonconference season, Desiree Keeling finally nabbed her first career double-double as the Scarlet Knights closed out the nonconference schedule against Temple on Dec. 17.

Keeling led Rutgers with 10-points to go along with a career-high and game-leading 14 rebounds.

Keeling had previously come close to a double-double in contests with James Madison in addition to Princeton and Bryant in late November.

Keeling had a career-high 21-point contest with James Madison on Dec. 5, where she went 10-of-12 (.455) from the field in addition to hauling in eight boards.

At Princeton on Nov. 25, the sophomore put up seven points and nine rebounds, while in the Nov. 27 victory over Bryant, Keeling collected eight points and nine rebounds.

After grabbing five rebounds in the season opener with Chattanooga, she followed with

eight against Elon and registered 11 boards in the next game against Wake Forest.

To date, the Roanoke, Virginia native leads RU at 7.1 rpg and is 11th in the Big Ten in the category.

#### **20/20 VISION**

Kandiss Barber and Desiree Keeling finished with 22 and 21 points respectively against James Madison on Dec. 5. The duo combined to go 19-of-28 from the field against the threetime defending Colonial Athletic Association champions.

The last time two RU players registered 20+ points in a game were by a pair of WNBA draft picks. Rachel Hollivay led RU with 22 points while Kahleah Copper netted 21 in the first round WNIT contest against Georgetown (Mar. 17, 2016).

#### PARKER'S PRESENCE

Shrita Parker is not who the opposition wants at the line when the game is on the line. The Virginia Beach, Virginia native has missed only one free throw to date and is 25-of-26 (.962) from the stripe.

Her free throw prowess came in handy in the victory over Bucknell on Dec. 3. As the Bison closed in on the RU advantage, Parker iced two free throws with 17 seconds remaining to put the game away.

Also against the Bison, the junior guard was only one rebound away from her first career and the Scarlet Knights' first double-double of the season. She logged 11 points and nine boards in the win.

Parker was also clutch the following game against three-time CAA champion James Madison. She drilled a three-pointer with less than a second remaining in the first overtime to knot the score at 71-71, forcing an additional five minutes on the court.

#### I GET BY WITH A LITTLE HELP FROM MY FRIEND ALIYAH

Aliyah Jeune set a new career-high with seven helpers in RU's victory over Bryant on Nov. 27. It was the most assists by a Scarlet Knight since Briyona Canty's 12 assists in an overtime loss at Purdue on Feb. 25, 2016.

Jeune, whose previous career-high was three last captured in RU's loss at Wake Forest on Nov. 17, is averaging 2.1 assists per game.

The younger Jeune sister is also tied for seventh in the Big Ten in steals per game averaging 1.9 thefts per contest. Most recently, she logged a career-high six steals in RU's double overtime contest with James Madison on Dec. 5.





#### **NEWS FROM DOWNTOWN CHARLOTTESVILLE**

After shooting just 13.3% (2-of-15) from 3-point range at Wake Forest on Nov. 17, the Scarlet Knights showcased their 3-point prowess in the following game at Virginia.

Rutgers went 8-of-16 (.500) against the Cavaliers on Nov. 20, knocking down the most 3-point shots since last season's season opening victory at Saint Joseph's. Against the Hawks, RU shot 8-of-12 from beyond the arc.

Leading the way was sophomore Aliyah Jeune, who knocked down four of her eight attempts from downtown. It was the most 3-pointers made by a Scarlet Knights since Shrita Parker drained four against Ohio State (1-24-16) and Tyler Scaife at Saint Joseph's (11-13-15).

# **C. VIVIAN STRINGER** Head Coach • 22nd Season at Rutgers, 46th Season Overall

One of the most recognizable names and faces in all of college basketball, C. Vivian Stringer has built an illustrious career highlighted by countless milestones, and now guides the Scarlet Knights into it's newest era as a member of the Big Ten Conference.

In 45 seasons on the sidelines, Stringer has been the primary architect in transforming three programs into national title contenders ever since her appearance in the first-ever NCAA National Championship game. She has guided teams to 25 of the 35 NCAA Tournaments, including 10-straight from 2003

to 2012, and won the WNIT title in 2014.

The first coach in men's or women's basketball history to take three different schools to the Final Four (Cheyney in 1982, Iowa in 1993 and Rutgers, in 2000 and again in 2007), Stringer has been a pioneer, visionary and leader during her four decades of success on the hardwood.

Entering the 2016-17 season, Stringer has compiled a remarkable overall record of 971-366 (.726), which ranks fourth on the all-time Division I women's coaches victories list and third among active coaches.

Only former Tennessee head coach Pat Summitt, North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell and Stanford's Tara VanDerveer have compiled more career wins than Stringer in women's basketball coaching ranks. In Feb. 2013, Stringer became just the seventh coach - men's or women's - to reach the 900-win mark and more recently in Feb. 2015, she became the all-time winningest Big Ten women's basketball coach with 182 conference wins during her tenure at Iowa and Rutgers. Additionally, her 34 20-win seasons are second-best in women's basketball history.

In her 21 seasons "On The Banks", Stringer has registered a 451-231 mark, having led the Scarlet Knights to 15 NCAA Tournament appearances, as well as the WNIT Championship in 2014. During the 2015-16 campaign, she became RU's all-time winningest basketball coach, surpassing fellow Women's Basketball Hall of Famer, Theresa Grentz.

Further solidifying her name among the elite in the game, Stringer was enshrined into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in arguably the best Hall of Fame class ever on Sept. 11, 2009. She joined fellow esteemed basketball greats Michael Jordan, David Robinson, John Stockton and Jerry Sloan on the stage at Symphony Hall to receive basketball's ultimate honor. She became just the 11th women's coach to earn the prestigious prize.

A 2001 inductee into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, Stringer has led her three teams to 25 appearances in the NCAA Tournament, including nine trips to the regional final. She also made her sixth appearance on a USA Basketball coaching staff in 2004, serving as an assistant coach for the gold-medal winning 2004 U.S. Olympic Team. Named one of the "101 Most Influential Minorities in Sports" by Sports Illustrated in 2003, Stringer continues to be one of the most recognized coaches in the game.

A coal miner's daughter, Stringer learned a valuable lesson from her parents growing up in the small tight-knit community of Edenborn in western Pennsylvania: "Work hard and don't look for excuses, and you can achieve anything."

That lesson has stuck with the legendary college basketball coach and has been one of the primary messages she has passed on to the hundreds of players who have stood before her. It's been her perseverance and strength in the eyes of adversity that has meant the most to the people around her. Stringer prides herself on not only teaching her players the game of basketball but more importantly providing them life lessons that stand the test of time.

Stringer has overcome many challenges in her life; the loss of her beloved father at the tender age of 19; in 1982, her only daughter being stricken with spinal meningitis just prior to her Cheyney team's appearance in the very first Final Four; the sudden death of her beloved husband, Bill, to a heart attack on Thanksgiving Day 1992 and a bout with breast cancer which she kept a secret from nearly everyone in her life.

Through it all, Stringer has handled life with dignity and grace rising above the tragedies to make a difference in the lives of hundreds of young women.

#### THE ROAD TO RUTGERS

Stringer began her teaching and coaching career at Cheyney, a small, historically-black school outside of Philadelphia, Pa., in the early 1970s. Even before the seeds of Title IX had truly started to take root nationally, Stringer and her Wolves were playing to packed houses and creating a name for themselves on the East Coast.

In 1982, the NCAA sponsored its first-ever National Championship for women's basketball, and Cheyney did the unthinkable by advancing to that first Final Four, losing to Louisiana Tech in the championship game. For Stringer and her players (not much older than herself), Cheyney's postseason run put the small university on the national map, as well as on par with the national powerhouse programs.

Following 12 successful and fulfilling seasons at Cheyney, Stringer sought out a new challenge and found that opportunity at the University of Iowa. Beginning

with the 1983-84 season, Stringer built a program that helped elevate women's basketball to a whole new level. When Stringer got to Iowa, the Hawkeyes had won just seven games the season before her arrival and were ranked 299 out of 302 teams nationally in attendance. Stringer helped the team achieve unprecedented amounts of attention, including women's basketball's first-ever advance sellout at Carver-Hawkeye Arena.

Stringer's hard work and dedication culminated in Iowa's trip to the 1993 Final Four, a feat that made her the first coach in history to lead two different schools to the national semifinals.

#### WE ARE A FAMILY

It is not just about the success on the floor for the Scarlet Knights. Stringer's programs have always had the feel of a family, but that family extends well beyond the confines of the RAC.

Community involvement has been an important part of extending that family, whether it be conducting free basketball clinics for local children, visiting with the young and old at local hospitals and centers, emphasizing the importance of education or lending support to Rutgers-based charities and events. The Scarlet Knights have become more than students and athletes during their careers -- they have become citizens and role models as well.

That public visibility and involvement has, in turn, caused the community to embrace the Scarlet Knights and lend them support at the RAC. RU recorded its largest crowd in history to see a women's home game when 8,587 fans witnessed the Scarlet Knights' victory against the nation's number-one team, Notre Dame, on Feb. 17, 2001, one of seven advance sellouts for RU since Stringer's arrival.

#### ACCOLADES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Stringer was at a loss for words before she was to give her Naismith enshrinement speech on Sept. 11. After all, her career extended over four decades of work and involved countless players and coaches who touched her life. Overcome with emotion and fighting back tears, Stringer delivered one of the most eloquent speeches, sharing with the crowd and a national audience on ESPN how her desire to coach was fueled early in her life.

In addition to Naismith, Stringer is also a member of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame. Enshrined on June 9, 2001, in Knoxville, Tenn., the honor truly showed Stringer's mark on the game in regards to equality, innovation and growth.

Stringer has been named the National Coach of the Year three times (Wade Trophy -- 1982, Converse -- 1988 and Naismith -- 1993) by her peers. She also was named the 1993 Coach of the Year by Sports Illustrated, USA Today, Converse, the Los Angeles Times and the Black Coaches Association.

In addition, she was tabbed the 2000 Female Coach of the Year by the Rainbow/PUSH Organization, a group founded by Rev. Jesse Jackson; the District V Coach of the Year in 1985, 1988 and 1993; the District I Coach of the Year in 1998 and 2006; the Big Ten Coach of the Year in 1991 and 1993; the BIG EAST Coach of the Year in 1998 and 2005; and a six-time Metropolitan Basketball Writers Association Coach of the Year(1998-00, 2005-06 and 2008).

A native of Edenborn, Pa., and a member of the Alumni Hall of Fame at her alma mater, Slippery Rock University, Stringer and the late William D. Stringer have three children -- David, Janine and Justin. Stringer became a first-time grandmother in June 2009 with the addition of granddaughter, Dayton, and welcomed her first grandson, Ryker, in the summer of 2013.

Rutgers Athletics retired Rutgers women's basketball great Cappie Pondexter's jersey during a halftime ceremony on December 1 when the Scarlet Knights hosted Duke in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge at the RAC.

With a storied career, Pondexter becane only the third Scarlet Knight on the women's side to have her jersey retired joining June Olkowski and Sue Wicks. She was the first player in BIG EAST history to earn first team honors four-straight years and recorded 2,211 points during her illustrious career to rank second all-time at RU. She was the first player in Rutgers history to post 1,000 points, 500 rebounds and 400 career assists in a career and her name can be found among the top-10 in 12 categories in the RU record books. During her career, the Chicago native averaged 18.3 points per game, 4.4 rebounds per game and 1.8 steals per game in 121 games played. Her named is scattered all across the Rutgers record book including ranking second in all-time scoring (2,211), first in three-point field goal percentage (.426), sixth in assists (470) and as one of three Scarlet Knights to pour in 40 or more points in a game.

As a senior, Pondexter was both a First Team Associated Press and Kodak/WBCA All-American, the unanimous choice for BIG EAST Player of the Year, the 2006 Women's Basketball News Service National Player of the Year and a finalist for all three major national player-of-the-year awards - State Farm Wade Trophy, Naismith and Women's Wooden Award. Pondexter's accomplishments are not limited only to Rutgers. The highest WNBA draft pick in school history, taken second by the Phoenix Mercury in 2006, Pondexter's career has continued to shine following her days "On The Banks." Wrapping up her 11th season in the league and second season with the Chicago Sky, she is a two-time WNBA champion (Phoenix Mercury '07 & `09), a seventime WNBA All-Star and a three-time All-WNBA First Team selection. Most recently, she was named one of the 20 greatest players in the 20-year history of the WNBA and became the seventh player in league history to score more than 6,000 career points.

Internationally, Cappie was a member of Team USA that earned a gold medal at the 2008 Beijing Olympics. She has also had a successful overseas career that has resulted in Fenerbache SK capturing five Turkish Cups and UMMC Ekaterinburg winning the Russian League and Russian Cup three times.

Former Rutgers women's basketball Scarlet Knight Essence Carson wrapped up her ninth season in the WNBA capturing the 2016 WNBA title with the Los Angeles Sparks in the fifth and deciding game of the finals on Thursday night at the Target Center. Carson becomes the fourth Scarlet Knight to hoist the championship trophy.

Carson, one of 19 Scarlet Knights to be drafted by the WNBA and one of nine former Rutgers student-athletes on a WNBA roster this season, was in her first season with the Los Angeles Sparks. She was a first round selection with the seventh pick in the 2008 WNBA Draft by the New York Liberty.

During the finals, Carson averaged 6.0 points and 2.4 rebounds per game against the defending champion Minnesota Lynx.

A three-time BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year, Carson collected 1,262 points and 707 rebounds while "On The Banks" having appeared in 133 contests as a Scarlet Knight. In all, Scarlet Knights have won five WNBA championships. Carson joins Chelsea Newton (Sacramento -2005), Cappie Pondexter (Phoenix - 2007 & 2009) and Tammy Sutton-Brown (Indiana - 2012) with a WNBA title.
