SCOUTING THE WILDCATS

Northwestern comes into Friday's match at 2-4-2 after drawing with Western Michigan and defeating Oakland last week. The Wildcats posted shutouts against both opponents, battling Western Michigan to a 0-0 tie on Thursday and ousting Oakland 2-0 on Sunday.

Leading the way for the Wildcats are juniors Katie Landgrebe and Georgia Waddle, who have each netted two goals this season. Senior Katie Allen has also been influential for Northwestern's offensive attack, tallying three assists. Freshman keeper Jenna Hascher has been a key component of the Wildcat defense as she has shut out her last three opponents. Hascher has allowed just three goals this season and ranks fourth in the Big Ten with a goals-against average of 0.48.

SERIES HISTORY vs. NORTHWESTERN

The Nittany Lions hold a commanding 20-2-0 all-time record against Northwestern. Penn State overpowered the Wildcats by a count of 4-1 in their last meeting on Sept. 21, 2012. The Lions have not fallen to Northwestern since Oct. 16, 1998.

LAST TIME OUT

Penn State finished out its non-conference slate with an exciting 3-2 victory over Tulsa last Sunday afternoon. Maya Hayes came up big for the Nittany Lions, scoring the game-winning goal in the 89th minute. Sophomore Mallory Weber and senior Tani Costa also netted goals for PSU.

Weber notched the first goal of the match, putting the ball into the net in the 22nd minute. The sophomore got the ball on a high arcing cross from Emily Hurd and headed it in from four yards out to give Penn State a 1-0 advantage.

Claire Nicholson got the Golden Hurricane on the board in the 57th minute of action after Tulsa was awarded a penalty kick. Eckerstrom went left and Nicholson chose right, sending the ball into the back of the net and tying the game at 1-1.

The Nittany Lions pulled ahead at the 73:42 mark with Costa tallying her second goal of the season. Hurd dropped the ball to Costa, who then beat the keeper and tapped the ball in from seven yards out to give the Blue and White a 2-1 lead.

Leading by one with just over four minutes remaining, it looked as though Penn State had the game won but the Golden Hurricane thought otherwise. Kirsch dropped the ball to Kajal Parmar and Parmar crossed it to Pelley, who scored the equalizer on a sliding kick from seven yards out.

Pelley's efforts were not enough to send the game into overtime, however, as Hayes responded with the game-winner with 20 seconds remaining. The senior ripped one into the top of the net from 15 yards out on an assist from Schram, putting the final score at 3-2 in Penn State's favor.

LIONS RALLY TO DEFEAT COWGIRLS

After trailing 2-0 early in the first half, the No. 13 Penn State women's soccer team rallied to defeat Oklahoma State 4-2 last Friday night at Cowgirl Stadium. Senior Maya Hayes led the Lions with two goals while junior Kori Chapic and sophomore Mallory Weber netted one apiece.

Tani Costa also came up big for the Blue and White, tallying assists on three of Penn State's four goals.

Oklahoma State's Allie Stephenson got the Cowgirls on the board early. The sophomore fired the ball in from 20 yards out in the sixth minute on an assist by Joanna Robertson.

The Cowgirls extended their lead to 2-0 eight minutes later as Krissy Killon made a great play to beat Eckerstrom, scoring from eight yards out.

Chapic netted her first goal of the season to get Penn State on the board in the 24th minute. The Junior drilled the ball in off of the far post from 30 yards out, putting the score at 2-1.

The Lions picked up the pace towards the end of the second half, netting two goals in a two minute span. Weber notched the equalizer at the 35:34 mark, flicking the ball into the net from five yards out on a cross from Costa. Hayes tallied the third goal of the match, blasting the ball over Medina's head from 20 yards out to give Penn State its first lead of the evening at 3-2.

Hayes earned her second goal of the game with just six minutes remaining. The senior received the ball on a long pass from Costa before breaking

away from a Cowgirl defender and beating Medina in a one on one situation to give the Lions a 4-2 advantage.

Oklahoma State had one more scoring opportunity as Stephenson made an attempt in the final minute. Eckerstrom came up big with her seventh save of the game, leaving the score at 4-2 in Penn State's favor.

IN THE BOOKS

Forward Maya Hayes solidified her place in the Penn State record books after notching the second most goals (31) and most points (70) in a single season during her sophomore season but she is not stopping there. The senior is now No. 3 on the career goals ledger after netting nine so far this season, bringing her total to 61 in just 74 games.

All-American Tiffany Weimer (2002-05) and MAC Hermann Trophy winner Christie Welsh (1999-02) are atop the standings with an impressive 91 and 82 goals, respectively.

Hayes is also fourth on the career points record list with 140. Eighteen additional points would move her into the third spot, replacing Hoffman. Welsh leads the category with a remarkable 216 points and Weimer follows closely with 214.

PENN STATE NO. 9 IN NSCAA POLL

After four weeks of action, the Penn State women's soccer team ranks ninth overall according to the NSCAA rankings. Michigan (15) and Wisconsin (24) also represent the Big Ten in the poll while Ohio State and Minnesota are just outside of the Top 25, receving votes.

THE BLUE AND WHITE BLANK THE BISON

The No. 13 Penn State women's soccer team used six goals from five different players en route to a 6-0 victory over Bucknell last Tuesday night. Sophomore Mallory Weber led the way with two goals while Emily Hurd, Maya Hayes, Corey Persson and Liv Brandy each netted one.

Sophomore Raquel Rodriguez also had a stellar performance, tallying a personal-best three assists in just 25 minutes of action. It is the first time a Nittany Lion has notched three helpers in a single game since Hayes achieved the feat against Ohio State on Sept. 29, 2011.

Tuesday's match also marked the first time that the Nittany Lions (4-1-1) have scored six goals since they upended Purdue, 6-1, on Oct. 31, 2010.

LIONS SILENCE TERRIERS

Senior Taylor Schram netted her third goal of the season to lead the No. 14 Penn State women's soccer team to a 1-0 victory over Boston University on Sept. 6 at Jeffrey Field. Friday's shutout was the first of the 2013 campaign for the Nittany Lions.

The match was one delegated by defense as Penn State allowed just nine shots from BU and the Terriers held the Nittany Lions to just three shots on goal.

The first half was a back and forth battle with each team taking six shots. Penn State's best look of the half came in the 34th minute as senior Tani Costa fired the ball from 12 yards out but came up short as BU keeper Andrea Green made the

save. The Terriers got three clean looks in the first half but PSU keeper Britt Eckerstrom was up to the task, making saves on all three, which resulted in a scoreless half.

She finally got the Blue and White on the board in the 53rd minute, drilling the ball in from six yards out. The goal originated when Raquel Rodriguez dropped the ball to Mallory Weber, who then passed it to Schram.

The Penn State defensive unit of Kori Chapic, Whitney Church, Brittany Basinger and Salina Williford was superb in the second half as the Lions allowed just three shots, none of which were on goal. Eckerstrom tallied three saves in the second shutout of her career.

LIONS ROAR PAST LA SALLE

The Penn State women's soccer team earned its second victory of the season with a 5-1 win over La Salle on Sept. 1 at Jeffrey Field.

Senior forward Maya Hayes netted two goals for the Nittany Lions while seniors Taylor Schram and Tani Costa and sophomore Raquel Rodriguez posted one apiece.

Hayes got things started for the Nittany Lions in the 34th minute, finding the ball after a free kick was deflected and drilling it into the back of the net to give Penn State a 1-0 advantage. The Lions extended their lead to 2-0 just five minutes later as Rodriguez made a quick move around a La Salle defender and put one in from the edge of the box.

A goal by Kelsey Haycook got the Explorers on the board at the 58:48 mark. The junior knocked the ball into the net on a cross from teammate Maryam Huseini to bring the score to 2-1 in PSU's favor.

Costa gave the Lions their third goal of the game at the 70:31 mark. The forward got the ball from Hayes, who stole it from a defender, and fired it past La Salle keeper Katie Getzinger to give Penn State a 3-1 lead.

The Blue and White were awarded a corner kick just three minutes later and were able to capitalize as Hayes scored off a Kori Chapic header from a Rodriguez cross, putting the score at 4-1.

Penn State capped the scoring in the 84th minute as Schram stole the ball and hammered it into the back of the net, bringing the score to 5-1.

CAVALIERS DOWN PSU

Penn State dropped its first road match of the season to No. 5 Virginia, 5-1, on Friday, Aug. 30 at Klöckner Stadium. The Nittany Lions led 1-0 early on before UVA took control, netting three goals in the first half and two in the second.

Maya Hayes notched the lone goal for PSU, tapping one in on a cross from sophomore Mallory Weber in the sixth minute to give the Blue and White a 1-0 lead.

UVA controlled the momentum for the rest of the half, taking a 2-1 lead in the 18th minute on a goal by Doniak, assisted by Gloria Douglas and Danielle Colaprico. Senior Kate Norbo extended the Wahoos' lead to 3-1 in the 21st minute, netting one from 15 yards out on a breakaway.

Virginia showed no signs of letting up in the second half as senior Shasta Fisher knocked one in at the far post from 15 yards out just two minutes in, giving the Cavaliers a 4-1 advantage.

Keeper Britt Eckerstrom came up with two nice saves in the 72nd and 73rd minutes before Cavalier sophomore Brittany Ratcliffe nudged one past her on an assist from Kailie Torres in the 77th minute to cap the scoring at 5-1.

LIONS CLAW THE PRIDE

The Penn State women's soccer team posted its first win of the 2013 campaign with a 2-1 victory over Hofstra on Sunday, Aug. 25 in the Penn State Invitational. Senior forward Maya Hayes and sophomore forward Mallory Weber led the way for the Nittany Lions with both netting goals in the first half of the contest.

Hayes took the initiative early in the match, sending the ball in to the back of the net in the 11th minute on a low cross from Emily Carrollo to give PSU an early 1-0 lead. Weber extended the Lions' lead to 2-0 in the 19th minute, stealing the ball off a goal kick and putting it into the top of the net. Hofstragot three clean looks in the first half but all were stopped by goalkeeper Britt Eckerstrom, leaving the Pride scoreless in the first half.

Hofstra didn't waste any time in the second half as Leah Galton netted an unassisted goal from 12 yards out in the 51st minute to bring the Pride within one. Hofstra registered three more shots on goal in the second half but could not get by Eckerstrom, who totaled six saves in the match.

PSU DRAWS WITH MOUNTAINEERS

The Penn State women's soccer team kicked off the 2013-14 PSU Athletics campaign with a 2-2 tie against non-conference foe West Virginia on Friday, Aug. 23 in the Penn State Invitational. Despite being down 0-2 late in the contest, seniors Taylor Schram and Maya Hayes rallied to tie it up with 10 minutes to go in regulation.

West Virginia came out hot, netting a goal in the fourth minute. WVU senior Frances Silva put one in on a cross from sophomore Kelsie Maloney. PSU sophomore Mallory Weber and Hayes had clean looks early on but could not capitalize as the Nittany Lions trailed 0-1 at the end of the first half.

With 20 minutes remaining in regulation, Maloney extended the Mountaineers lead, heading one in to put WVU up 2-0. Penn State responded 10 minutes later when Schram ripped one into the back corner of the net on an assist from Hayes, putting the score at 2-1 in West Virginia's favor. Just over a minute later Hayes added another goal for the Nittany Lions, scoring on a cross from Weber to even the score at 2-2.

PSU and WVU registered three shots each in overtime but neither were able to capitalize, leaving the score at an even 2-2.

PACKING THE JEFF

The Blue and White opened the 2013 campaign on Friday, Aug. 23 at Jeffrey Field in front of a crowd of 3,742 fans, the third most in program history and second most for a homer opener. In 2012, the capacity of Jeffrey was exceeded when 5,117 fans flooded into the stands to watch the Nittany Lions take on then-No. 1 Stanford.

LIONS PICKED TO WIN BIG TEN

The 15-time defending Big Ten Champion Nittany Lions were selected by conference coaches to win yet another Big Ten title. The Michigan Wolverines were tabbed to finish second and Illinois rounded out the top three.

THE SCHEDULE

Penn State holds a record of 218-35-16 all-time against its 2013 opponents for an .840 winning percentage. Additionally, PSU is 180-27-14 (.846) against Big Ten foes, which includes last year's 11-1 mark when the Big Ten Tournament is factored in.

The Lions boast a winning or tied record against each of their 2013 adversaries. PSU will face seven teams that made it to the NCAA Tournament in 2012, including Illinois, LaSalle, Michigan, Ohio State, Virginia, West Virginia and Wisconsin.

HAYES, CHURCH NAMED TO MAC HERMANN WATCH LIST

Penn State women's soccer senior forward Maya Hayes and junior defender Whitney Church have been named to the Missouri Athletic Club's Hermann Trophy Watch List for the 2013 season.

The MAC Hermann Trophy is collegiate soccer's most prestigious award presented annually to one male and one female athlete. The winners will be announced Friday, Jan. 10, 2014 at the trophy presentation banquet at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis. Christie Welsh is the only Penn State athlete to win the award (2001).

This is Hayes' second consecutive year on the watch list and Church's first appearance. Hayes was a finalist for the award in 2011 and a semifinalist in 2012. Hayes and Church are joined by Illinois' Vanessa DiBernardo as Big Ten honorees for the award.

Hayes is a two-time NSCAA first team All-America selection and has earned back-to-back Big Ten Forward of the Year honors. She finished second on the team in goals (16) and points (38) in 2012, despite missing the first seven games of the season while participating in the U20 World Cup with the U.S. U20 National Team.

Church received NSCAA first team All-Great Lakes recognition and Big Ten Defender of the Year honors in 2012. She led the Nittany Lion defensive attack, starting all 27 contests and logging over 2,000 minutes.

HAYES SELECTED AS SENIOR CLASS AWARD CANDIDATE

Penn State senior forward Maya Hayes has been selected as one of thirty candidates for the 2013 Senior CLASS Award in collegiate soccer.

The Senior CLASS (Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School) Award is presented yearly to a Division I senior student-athlete who has notable achievements in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition.

Hayes has excelled both on and off the field, earning several academic awards during her time at Penn State. The kinesiology major was a 2011 CoSIDA/Captial One third-team Academic All-America selection and CoSIDA/Capital One first team All-District selection. Hayes was included on the Dean's List for the spring 2013 semester and was inducted into Penn State's Athletic Honor Society, Spiritus Leoninus. She is also a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

The 30-member candidate pool will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 finalists will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select the female candidate who best exemplifies excellence in community, classroom, character and competition.

The Senior CLASS Award winner will be announced during the 2013 NCAA Women's College Cup in Cary, N.C. in December.

BEST X

Senior forward Maya Hayes, junior defender Whitney Church and freshman defender Brittany Basinger (Fairfax, Va.) were named to the 2013 preseason TopDrawerSoccer Best XI teams. Hayes made the first team while Church was named to the second and Basinger was selected to the all-freshman team.

TOP 100

Penn State had five players named to the TopDrawerSoccer preseason women's top 100 player rankings. Senior forward Maya Hayes leads the way for the Nittany Lions with a No. 6 ranking. Junior Whitney Church sits at No. 13, sophomore Mallory Weber ranks 58th, senior Taylor Schram comes in at No. 77 and sophomore Raquel Rodriguez was tabbed No. 86.

HOME FIELD DOMINANCE

The Lions are a force to be reckoned with when playing at Jeffrey Field, having amassed a home record of 185-21-11 (.878). At 91-3-4 (.949), the Nittany Lions have the best Big Ten home record in the conference. In 2012, a PSU-record 5,117 fans packed the stands to watch Penn State play then-No. 1 Stanford. The Lions are currently riding an eight-game unbeaten streak at Jeffrey.

LIONS ON THE BTN

Penn State's 15-time Big Ten Champion women's soccer team will be featured on the BTN at least twice this season. The NIttany Lions' home contests against Ohio State on Thursday, Oct. 17 at 3 p.m. and Illinois on Sunday, Oct. 20 at 12 p.m. will air on the BTN. Additionally, both Big Ten Tournament semifinal matches and the championship game will be aired live on the BTN.

Head coach Erica Walsh enters her seventh season at the helm of the Penn State women's soccer program in 2013. Walsh's 2012 Nitanny Lions were the most successful team in program history after advancing to their first-ever national title game. The Nittany Lions won 21 of 27 games and were unbeaten in Big Ten action with a 10-0-1 record. The Lions registered their 15th consecutive Big Ten title and 18th-straight NCAA Tournament appearance. The 15-title mark stands as the most consecutive Big Ten Championships by a women's program, along with the present Northwestern tennis

team.

2008-present 2008 Olympic Gold Medalists 2011 World Cup Silver Medalists U.S Women's Under-19 2004 Senior Christine Nairn became just the seventh Nittany Lion to finish as a finalist for the prestigous Missouri Athletic Club's Hermann Trophy in 2012 under Walsh's tutelage while junior Maya Hayes was named a semifinalist for the award.

Walsh's success was recognized at the conference and national level as she earned Big Ten Coach of the Year and NSCAA Coach of the Year honors.

Her 2011 team was a dominant force, winning 21 of 26 matches, while out-scoring opponents 70-24. The Nittany Lions were 10-1-0 in Big Ten action and posted the seventh undefeated season at Jeffrey Field (9-0). Walsh helped guide the Lions to their 14th-straight Big Ten title and a spot to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen

for the first time since 2007.

With Walsh's guidance, sophomore Maya Hayes became the nation's most prolific scorer in soccer in 2011. Hayes was a finalist for the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy. Hayes led the nation with 31 goals and 70 points. The sophomore phenom broke single-season record at Penn State for goals and points.

During the 2011 summer, Walsh had an extraordinary experience of being one of the top assistants to Pia Sundhage and the 2011 United State women's national team at the FIFA World Cup in

Germany. The U.S. made a sparkling run through knockout play to the final, falling to eventual champions Japan.

During the 2010 season, Walsh's young club made a remarkable turnaround mid-season, overcoming a two-game deficit in the league standings over the final weeks to capture a share of a record-breaking 13th straight Big Ten title.

After a tough 2-4 start to the 2009 season, Walsh led the Nittany Lions to a remarkable turnaround, going 10-1-2 in the last 13 games of the regular season, earning her the 2009 Big Ten Coach of the Year Award for her efforts. In March of 2010, Walsh's alma mater, William & Mary, honored her by inducting her into the W&M Athletics Hall of Fame

With the impressive end to the season, Walsh and her charges captured the program's 12th-straight Big Ten Championship, tying a record for most consecutive women's Big Ten titles won held by the Michigan swimming & diving program. By winning the Big Ten, the Nittany Lions continued their string of NCAA Tournament berths, making their 15th-straight appearance in the 64-team field in 2009. For the second time in three years, Penn State hosted the first and second rounds of tournament play.

Walsh also orchestrated one of the finest awards seasons in Penn State history when Katie Schoepfer, Alyssa Naeher and Christine Nairn swept the year-end Big Ten Player of the Year awards. Schoepfer was named the Offensive Player of the Year, Naeher the Defensive Player of the Year and Nairn the Freshman of the Year. Danielle Toney was named to the All-Big Ten First Team, while Lexi Marton garnered Second Team mention. Walsh has now coached two players of the year to three awards as Naeher was also the 2007 recipient of the Defensive Player of the Year honors in Walsh's first year in Happy Valley.

Walsh continued her success from the 2007 campaign into a 16-8-0 record that saw Penn State capture its 11th-straight Big Ten Championship and the 2008 Big Ten Tournament crown.

Her transition to Penn State was quite smooth as the 2007 team finished 18-4-2, including a 9-1-0 mark in conference play, and was ranked 12th in the final NSCAA poll of the season.

When she came to Penn State, Walsh brought with her a wealth of experience at both the international and collegiate levels. She already has coached at six different universities, including three stints as head coach as well as serving as an assistant for the U.S. U-19 team in 2004. Walsh served as head coach of the U-17 team from December 2004 until her hire at Penn State in February of 2007

As of January 2009, Walsh was appointed as a member of the Panel of Instructors and Lecturers for FIFA Courses. In addition, she was appointed as the Chairman of the Women's Technical Committee for the period of January 1, 2009 to June 30, 2011.

In January of 2008, Walsh was named as the assistant coach by Pia Sundhage for the U.S. National Team. With Walsh's help and guidance the U.S. team completed its historic run with a gold medal at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China. Even sweeter was that Walsh's main responsibility was the U.S. Team's defense, which held fellow world power Brazil scoreless in the gold medal game.

The head coach at Harvard University as well as the U.S. Under-17 team prior to her hiring at Penn State, Walsh has consistently been active among the coaching ranks both at the Division I level and the U.S. Youth National Team program for nearly a decade. Prior to her time with the Crimson, she was part of a Florida State staff that led the Seminoles to one of its most successful year to date. FSU joined Penn State in the 2005 Women's Soccer College Cup, with both programs reaching the national semifinals.

Walsh's coaching path began in 1997 as a graduate assistant with Bucknell University. In 1998, she accepted a position at Dartmouth, where she was an assistant coach for two seasons. After helping the team to a final NSCAA ranking of No. 8 at the conclusion of the team's 1998 NCAA quarterfinal run as well as an

Ivy League championship in 1999, Walsh assumed head coaching duties before the 2000 season.

As head coach, Walsh led the Big Green to back-to-back Ivy League co-championships in 2000 and 2001. Her squad was ranked in the NSCAA's top 25 each year, rising as high as No. 13 in 2001. In her three seasons as head coach, Dartmouth was invited to the NCAA Tournament each season and reached the round of 16 twice. All three of her teams earned the NSCAA's Academic Team Award.

Walsh left Dartmouth to earn her Master's in business administration at Lehigh University where she served as a graduate assistant from 2003-04.

Beginning in the spring of 2004, Walsh joined the United States Under-19 team as an assistant coach where she helped with preparations for the Under-19 World Cup. The U.S. finished with the bronze medal in Thailand after defeating Brazil in the third place match. After the World Cup, Walsh was appointed the U.S. National Team's U-17 head coach, a position which she held for three years.

As a player, Walsh was an NSCAA All-Region selection at William & Mary. A two-time first team All-CAA pick, she propelled her team to four NCAA Tournament appearances as well as two CAA regular season and two CAA league championships.

A high school All-American at Lower Moreland, she was also a member of the U.S. Under-17 National Team.

Walsh earned her Bachelor of Science degree with a concentration in biology from William & Mary in 1997 and resides in State College, Pa.
