NITTANY LIONS RENEW RIVALRY WITH CAVALIERS

THIS WEEK

Penn State plays its first road game under Coach Bill O'Brien, visiting Virginia in the first meeting between the schools since 2002. The Nittany Lions will be playing in Charlottesville for the first time since 2001 and teams will meet in Beaver Stadium on Sept. 14, 2013.

All five of Penn State's road opponents this season played in a bowl game last year, with the Cavaliers playing Auburn in the Chick-Fil-A Bowl.

The Nittany Lions are coming off an emotional 24-14 setback to Ohio last Saturday, while the Cavaliers opened the season with a 43-19 win over Richmond.

PENN STATE AND VIRGINIA AMONG NATION'S ELITE IN ACADEMIC AND ATHLETIC SUCCESS

Penn State and Virginia share several personnel ties (see page 4) and rank amongst the nation's premier institutions in the graduation of their student-athletes and success on the field.

In the NCAA's October, 2011 Graduation Rates Report, Penn State student-athletes earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent and Virginia's GSR was 87 percent, both well above the national average of 80 percent.

In the AFCA's annual Academic Achievement Award survey (minimum 70 percent football graduation rate), Virginia and Notre Dame are tied for the most honorable mention honors with 22 apiece. They are followed by Penn State and Rice with 21 and Vanderbilt with 20.

Penn State and Virginia are among only 14 institutions nationwide that have finished in the Top 30 of the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup all 19 years the survey has existed. The Nittany Lions are among only nine schools that have placed in the Top 25 all 19 years. In the 2011-12 Directors' Cup standings, Penn State finished 12th and Virginia was 15th.

VIRGINIA GAME NOTES

OHIO RALLIES IN SECOND HALF

Penn State saw Ohio rally from a 14-3 halftime deficit and fall 24-14, in an emotional season opener in front of an enthusiastic crowd of 97,186 at Beaver Stadium. The Nittany Lions controlled the game in the first half, the most by a Nittany Lion in a half since Zack Mills had 28 attempts against Purdue in 2004. McGloin also set career highs in completions (27) and attempts (48).

Senior quarterback Matt McGloin recorded his eighth career 200-yard passing game and set career-highs by completing 27-of-48 passes for 260 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He attempted 26 passes in the first half, the most by a Nittany Lion in a half since Zack Mills had 28 attempts against Purdue in 2004. McGloin also set career highs in completions (27) and attempts (48).

Sophomore Allen Robinson led all Big Ten players during the opening weekend by making a career-high nine receptions for 97 yards. Sophomore tailback Bill Belton, who rushed for 53 yards on 13 carries in his first career start, and junior tight end Matt Lehman delivered their first career touchdown receptions.

Linebacker Michael Mauti led all players with 12 tackles for his fourth career game registering double-digit stops. Linebacker Gerald Hodges recorded 11 stops for his fifth career game with at least 10 tackles. Sophomore cornerback Adrian Amos recorded a career-best 10 tackles.

HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN

Bill O'Brien was named the 15th head coach of the Penn State football program on January 6, 2012. O'Brien was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach with the New England Patriots during the 2011 season, helping the Patriots to their second Super Bowl during his five years on the coaching staff.

Like his predecessor, Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno, O'Brien graduated from Brown University, where he played linebacker and defensive end from 1990-92. O'Brien coached at Brown (1993-94), Georgia Tech (1995-2002), Maryland (2003-04) and Duke (2005-06) before joining the Patriots' staff.

As a member of Bill Belichick's Patriots' staff, O'Brien coached the wide receivers in 2008 and was the quarterbacks coach his final three seasons. O'Brien was the Patriots' offensive coordinator in 2011 and was instrumental in New England leading the AFC in scoring (32.1 ppg) and ranking No. 2 in the NFL in total offense (428.0 ypg) and passing offense (317.8 ypg) en route to winning the AFC Championship and a berth in Super Bowl XLVI.

Born in Dorchester, Mass., O'Brien was raised in Andover, a Boston suburb. O'Brien and his wife, Colleen, have two sons, Jack and Michael.

O'Brien has coached in Scott Stadium six times previously and every member of his coaching staff except John Butler and Charlie Fisher has coached at least one game in Charlottesville.

- O'Brien also worked with Craig Fitzgerald, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Football, in 2003-04 when they were on the staff at Maryland;

- John Butler was an assistant coach at Minnesota from 2007-10, working with Ted Roof during the 2008 season. Butler also worked with Craig Fitzgerald at Harvard in 2005-06 and at South Carolina in 2011, helping the Gamecocks to 11 wins and their first-ever top 10 finish;

- Larry Johnson and Ron Vanderlinden have worked together as Penn State assistant coaches on the defensive side of the ball.

Penn State quarterbacks coach Charlie Fisher is a native of Allenwood, Pa., 70 miles east of State College, and attended Nittany Lion games in his youth.

Secondary coach John Butler and Craig Fitzgerald attended LaSalle College High School in suburban Philadelphia at the same time, along with Keith Conlin, an All-Big Ten tackle for Penn State in 1995 and a starter for the Nittany Lions' 12-0 team in 1994.

PENN STATE'S 20th BIG TEN SEASON

After 106 years as an independent in football, Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and is playing its 20th year in the conference. The Nittany Lions were Big Ten Champions in 1994, beating Oregon to win the 1995 Rose Bowl, and played USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

The Nittany Lions will begin Big Ten play at Leaders Division foe Illinois on Sept. 29 and finish the regular season with home games against division rivals Indiana (Nov. 17) and Wisconsin (Nov. 24). Penn State also hosts Leaders Division foe Ohio State (Oct. 27) and visits Purdue (Nov. 3).

Penn State will annually play Nebraska (Nov. 10) from the Legends Division and also plays at Iowa (Oct. 20) and hosts Northwestern (Oct. 6 - Homecoming) from the Legends Division this year. In 2013 and '14, Michigan and Minnesota will replace the Hawkeyes and Wildcats on the Nittany Lions' schedule. Michigan State and Iowa return to the Penn State slate in 2015.

SCHOOL RECORD 10 BOWL TEAMS ON SLATE

The Nittany Lions are facing a program record 10 teams that played in bowl games last year, with five games at home and all five games on the road.

Among the teams coming to Beaver Stadium this fall are 2011 bowl teams: Ohio (Idaho Potato Bowl), Wisconsin (Rose), Ohio State (Gator), Northwestern (Meineke Car Care), Temple (New Mexico).

Penn State also will face bowl teams in all five road games: Virginia (Chick-Fil-A), Nebraska (Capital One), Iowa (Insight), Illinois (Kraft Fight Hunger), Purdue (Little Caesars).

THIRTY LETTERWINNERS RETURNED

Penn State returned 28 lettermen from last season – 12 on offense and 16 on defense. Two letterwinners from the 2010 season who were injured and did not play last year also return – tight end Garry Gilliam and defensive end Pete Massaro – bringing the total to 30 returnees.

Penn State returned six starters from the 2011 squad, along with 13 additional players who had made at least one start prior to this season. Two starters are back on offense (C Matt Stankiewicz and QB Matt McGloin) and four on defense (LB Glenn Carson, DT Jordan Hill, LB Gerald Hodges, DE Sean Stanley).

Among the 13 additional returning players that had made starts prior to 2012, seven are on offense and six are on defense. The 13 players have a combined total of 56 career starts, led by CB Stephon Morris (13), DE Pete Massaro (11), LB Michael Mauti (11) and Saf Malcolm Willis (6).

NINE NITTANY LIONS ARE GRADUATES

Nine Nittany Lions have earned their degrees entering the 2012 season.

Pete Massaro and Michael Mauti graduated last December. Evan Lewis, Ty Howle, Matt McGloin and John Urschel, who graduated in three years with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average, joined them as graduates in May.

James Terry, Michael Yancich and Michael Zordich graduated in August.

VIRGINIA COACH MIKE LONDON

Mike London is in his third season as head coach at the University of Virginia. He is 13-13 as head coach of the Cavaliers and has a 37-17 career record in his fifth year, having been head coach at Richmond in 2008 and '09. London led the Spiders to the NCAA Division I FCS title in 2008.

London was a Virginia assistant coach from 2001-04 and 2006-07 before going to Richmond. He is a 1983 Richmond graduate.

SCOUTING THE CAVALIERS

Virginia sprinted past visiting Richmond, 43-19, last Saturday in Charlottesville. Junior quarterback Michael Rocco completed 25 of 37 passes for 311 yards and a touchdown to lead the Cavaliers. Last season, Rocco was one of 13 Cavaliers to start all 13 games as he threw 13 touchdown passes with a completion percentage of 60.7. He also rushed for two touchdowns in 2011. Backing up Rocco this season is Phillip Sims, a transfer from Alabama.

Tim Smith led the receiving corps against Richmond with six catches for 96 yards. Smith caught 33 balls for 565 yards and three touchdowns in 2011. Darius Jennings emerged as a wideout threat last year with 20 catches for 238 yards and caught five balls for 84 and a touchdown against Richmond. Jennings also factors in the return game with Khalek Shepherd and Dominique Terrell.

A strong backfield of Kevin Parks, Perry Jones and Khalek Shepherd pace the Virginia running game as the trio accounted for 153 of UVA's 184 yards on the ground vs. the Spiders. Parks netted two touchdowns, while Jones and Shepherd had one apiece. Last season, Jones led the running attack with 915 yards and five touchdowns, while also making 48 receptions for 506 yards and three scores. Parks totaled 709 yards in the ground with nine touchdowns and one receiving touchdown in 2011.

The Cavalier defense was stout against Richmond, holding the Spiders to just 28 yards rushing. Richmond had the ball for only 22:31 as Virginia out-gained the Soiders, 545-266.

The Cavaliers hounded the Spiders front line, breaking up four passes and making three tackles for loss. Drequan Hoskey, Anthony Harris and Henry Coley led the defensive attack with six tackles apiece. Hoskey and Harris are second-year defensive backfield teammates who played all 13 games last year. Coley is a linebacker who missed six games in 2011, but still

made 2.5 TFL and a sack.

Virginia has a new punter in Alec Vozenilek who averaged 41.3 yards per punt and dropped two balls inside the 20-yard line against Richmond. Drew Jarrett returns to the Virginia squad this year and converted both field goal attempts (45-, 23-yard makes) and all five extra-point tries vs. Richmond. Ian Frye is handling the kick-off duties for the Cavaliers.

LAST MEETING IN CHARLOTTESVILLE

A game of inches truly hit home for the Nittany Lions, as Virginia rallied for a 20-14 win on Dec. 1, 2001 to end Penn State's post-season aspirations.

The Nittany Lions had won five of their last six games to erase an 0-4 start and brought a 5-5 record into the contest.

Leading 14-6 midway through the third quarter and marching toward a possible two touchdown lead, quarterback Zack Mills fumbled as he was tackled and Virginia's Art Thomas picked up the ball and raced 92 yards for the momentum-changing score. Mills' knee may have been on the turf before he lost control of the ball but the play stood and the Lions' lead was trimmed to 14-13.

Following Thomas' return, Penn State went three-and-out. The Cavaliers got the ball back and took their first lead on a 16-yard run by Alvin Pearman with 3:20 left in the third quarter.

The game was originally scheduled to be played on Thursday, Sept. 13, but was postponed due to the Sept. 11 attacks on the United States.

LIONS FROM VIRGINIA

A trio of Nittany Lions hail from Virginia: true freshman DT Derek Dowrey (Winchester), redshirt sophomore DT Evan Hailes (Chesapeake) and redshirt freshman WR Matt Zanellato (Burke). Hailes' career is over due to a health issue and he is serving as a student assistant coach.

VIRGINIA QUARTERBACK HAS FAMILY TIES TO PENN STATE

Virginia starting quarterback Michael Rocco's family has significant ties to Penn State and Nittany Lion Football.

Rocco's father, Frank Rocco, Jr., played quarterback at Penn State, was a member of the Nittany Lions' 1982 National Championship team and two-year letterman.

An uncle, Danny Rocco, was a Penn State football letterman in 1979 and '80. He is a former UVA assistant coach and is the head football coach at Richmond.

Another uncle, David Rocco, was a member of the Penn State squad but saw his career ended by an injury. He served as a student assistant coach and was a member of the Nittany Lions' unbeaten 1994 Big Ten Championship team.

Michael Rocco's grandfather, Frank Rocco, Sr., was a member of the Penn State administrative and football staffs for 18 years. He joined the Nittany Lions' football staff in 1982 as an administrative assistant. He coached the tight ends and passing game in 1985 before serving as Director of Football Operations from 1986-2000.

Frank Rocco, Sr., was one of the founders of the National Football Foundation's Central Pennsylvania chapter. He and his wife, Ann, live in State College.

PENN STATE-VIRGINIA TIES

Several Virginia coaches, athletic staff members and representatives of the school have made their way to Charlottesville via Penn State.

This past spring, Dennis Hohenshelt was named the head coach of the Virginia women's volleyball program after helping lead the Nittany Lions to four national titles (2007-10) as an assistant coach.

Also on the UVA staff is field hockey assistant coach Annie Zinkavich, who was a long-time Penn State goalkeeper coach through the 2011 season.



Zinkovich helped lead the Nittany Lions to the 2011 Big Ten title.

Penn State alums Steve Kirkland ('01) and Aaron Smith ('07) also are employed by the Cavaliers. Kirkland worked in the Penn State athletic communications office and is a native of Shippensburg, Pa. Kirkland has been at UVa for 10 years.

Smith joined Hohenshelt on the women's volleyball staff and played for Hohenshelt on the Penn State men's volleyball team from 2004-07, serving as team captain his senior year.

Virginia's all-time leader in football coaching victories, George Welsh, was a Penn State assistant coach from 1964-72. Welsh was 134-86-3 from 1982-2000 at the Cavaliers' head coach.

PENN STATE vs. ACC

Penn State owns an all-time record of 86-21-2 vs. the 12 current members of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The total does not include vacated wins vs. Miami (1999), Virginia (2002) and Florida State (2005).

Duke and Virginia Tech are the only ACC schools Penn State has not played on the gridiron.

FIVE TRUE FRESHMEN MAKE DEBUT

Five Penn State true freshmen made their debut against Ohio in the season opener: CB Da'Quan Davis, TE Jesse James, Saf Jordan Lucas, LB Nyem Wartman and WR Trevor Williams.

Wartman blocked an Ohio punt at the Bobcats' 25-yard-line in the second quarter that Penn State converted into a 14-yard touchdown pass from Matt McGloin to tight end Matt Lehman for a 14-3 lead. Wartman also had one solo tackle.

MCGLOIN BREAKS CAREER HIGHS VS. OHIO; TOSSES TWO TOUCHDOWN PASSES

Several Nittany Lions broke career highs on Saturday against Ohio, led by Matt McGloin's 27 of 48 day for 260 yards and two touchdowns. The completions and attempts were the most for McGloin in a single outing, with his previous highs coming on a 23 of 43 effort vs. Michigan State in 2010.

McGloin threw a six-yard touchdown pass to RB Bill Belton late in the first quarter for a 7-0 lead. Late in the first half, McGloin connected with TE Matt Lehman on a 14-yard scoring strike for a 14-3 lead.

McGloin posted his eighth career 200-yard passing game, moving him into a tie for ninth with Michael Robinson on the Penn State list. Todd Blackledge and Wally Richardson are tied for seventh with nine.

McGloin was 16 of 26 for 178 yards in the first half and the attempts were the most since Zack Mills against Purdue (2004), while the completions were the most since Daryll Clark's 17 (vs. Akron, 2009).

ROBINSON LEADS ALL BIG TEN RECEIVERS WITH NINE CATCHES ON OPENING WEEKEND

The receiving corps had a productive day vs. Ohio

as sophomore WR Allen Robinson led all Big Ten receivers with a career-high nine catches (9). His 97 receiving yards also were a career-best and he had a career-long 21 reception. Robinson's nine catches were the most by a Nittany Lion since Derrick Williams has 10 vs. Purdue in 2007.

In his first career game, redshirt freshman tight end Kyle Carter was second on the team with six catches for 74 yards, both career highs. He made the most receptions for a Penn State tight end since Andrew Quarless had eight against LSU in the 2010 Capital One Bowl.

Redshirt junior WR Shawney Kersey made a career-best five receptions and sophomore RB Bill Belton scored his first career touchdown on a six-yard reception from McGloin. Making his first career start, Belton also ran for a career-high 53 yards on 13 carries.

Redshirt sophomore Alex Kenney made his first career reception, finishing with two for 21 yards. Junior tight end Matt Lehman took his first career catch 14 yards for a touchdown late in the first half

DEFENDERS SET CAREER TACKLE HIGHS

Sophomore DB Adrian Amos posted a career-high 10 tackles to lead the numerous Nittany Lions who set career tackle highs against Ohio. His previous high had been two stops in a game.

Safety Jacob Fagnano (9, previous high 2), Saf Stephen Obeng-Agyapong (5, previous high 3), DT DaQuan Jones (4, previous high 3) and DE C.J. Olaniyan (3, previous high 1) all set career bests and DE Sean Stanley matched his career high of five tackles.

The defense was led by Michael Mauti with 12 tackles, the fourth time he recorded 10 tackles or more in a game. Fellow Butkus Award candidate Gerald Hodges posted 11 tackles, his fifth game with 10 or more tackles in a game.

NITTANY LION HEAD COACHES IN DEBUTS

Penn State's 15 all-time head coaches sport a 10-4-1 record in their first game as head coach.

ONE OF NATIONS TOUGHEST HOME VENUES

The Nittany Lions own a superlative 178-64 (73.6) all-time record in the nation's second-largest facility, which opened in 1960 and has a capacity of 106,572.

NUMBER CHANGES

Several Nittany Lions changed their jersey number the week of the Ohio game, including: Andree Dupree (30), Jack Haffner (32), Evan Lewis (37), Jordan Lucas (14), Trevor Williams (21) and Zach Zwinak (28).

HODGES NAMED PRE-SEASON FIRST-TEAM ALL-AMERICAN; CANDIDATE FOR SEVERAL NATIONAL HONORS

Senior linebacker Gerald Hodges was selected a 2012 pre-season first-team All-American by Lindy's and is a candidate for four national awards.

Hodges is on the Watch Lists for the: Bednarik Award, Butkus Award, Nagurski Trophy and Rotary Lombardi Award.

Hodges earned first team All-Big Ten honors from the coaches and ESPN.com in 2011. He was instrumental in Penn State having the nation's No. 5 scoring defense in 2011 and became the 22nd Nittany Lion to post at least 100 tackles in a season. Hodges led the team with 106 tackles (60 solo), ranking in the top 15 in the Big Ten in hits (eighth) and sacks (tied-14th with 4.5). Hodges also recorded 10.0 tackles for loss, forced two fumbles, broke-up four passes and made one critical interception and 63-yard return to set-up a touchdown in the win at Northwestern.

The former Paulsboro High School All-South Jersey standout was selected the Touchdown Club of Southern Jersey's 2011 Division I College Player of the Year.

PENN STATE FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES TIED FOR TOP GRADUATION RATE AMONG TOP 25 BCS TEAMS

The Penn State football team was tied with Stanford for the top Graduation Success Rate (GSR) among teams ranked in the final 2011 Bowl Championship Series Top 25 rankings, according to data released by the NCAA in Oct. 2011.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2001-04 earned a superlative Graduation Success Rate of 87 percent, tied with Stanford for No. 10 overall among the nation's 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions.

Penn State's 87 percent GSR was significantly higher than the 67 percent FBS average and was second to Northwestern (94) among Big Ten institutions.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2001-04 earned a strong four-year federal graduation rate of 80 percent, also No. 2 to Northwestern (86) among Big Ten squads. The Nittany Lions' 80 percent graduation figure was 24 points above the 56 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.

In the NCAA's 2009 graduation data, the Nittany Lions earned the highest GSR and federal graduation rate among teams ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 poll.

The strong NCAA graduation rate data is the latest success in a long line of academic achievement for members of the Penn State football program, who consistently are near the top nationally in academic success:

- Penn State has had 15 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans® in the past six years to lead the nation, with 13 first-team selections.

- Penn State's all-time total of 49 Academic All-America® football players is third among all FBS institutions.

HILL ON OUTLAND TROPHY AND ROTARY LOMBARDI AWARD WATCH LISTS

Senior defensive tackle Jordan Hill is a candidate for the Outland Trophy and the Rotary Lombardi Award.

Hill, a pre-season All-Big Ten candidate, will anchor a talented and deep defensive line in 2012. Last year, Hill led the D-line with 59 tackles, including eight tackles for loss and 3.5 sacks, earning honorable-mention All-Big Ten recognition. The former Steelton-Highspire High School standout also topped the team and was tied for second in the Big Ten with three fumble recoveries, had one forced fumble and two pass break-ups.

MAUTI A BUTKUS AWARD CANDIDATE

Senior Michael Mauti joins Gerald Hodges on the Watch List for the Butkus Award, presented to the nation's premier linebacker.

Mauti saw an impressive start to the 2011 season abruptly end versus Eastern Michigan in the fourth game when the pre-season first-team all-conference selection tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee. In the three-plus games in which he played, Mauti recorded 21 tackles, with three tackles for loss, one interception and three pass break-ups. In the clash with No. 2 Alabama, Mauti led the team with a career-high 13 tackles and had two pass break-ups.

STANKIEWITCH ON RIMINGTON TROPHY WATCH LIST

Penn State senior Matt Stankiewitch is on the Watch List for the Rimington Trophy, presented to the nation's top center. All-American A.Q. Shipley won the 2008 Rimington Trophy.

A starter in every game last season, Stankiewitch will anchor the offensive line and is the unit's only returning starter. He was instrumental in helping Penn State lead the Big Ten in fewest sacks allowed last season (14 in 13 games) and gave Penn State a 1,000-yard rusher for the seventh consecutive season.

NUMEROUS NITTANY LIONS HAVE FAMILY TIES TO PENN STATE FOOTBALL

Six members on the 2012 squad have ties to current or former Nittany Lion football team players, coaches or staff:

- Junior **Nate Cadogan's** brother, Gerald, lettered at tackle for the Nittany Lions from 2006-08;

- Senior kick snapper **Mike Furhman** is the son of Chet Furhman, former Penn State Football strength and conditioning coach;

- Redshirt sophomore linebacker **Mike Hull's** father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions from 1971-73;

- Rich Mauti was a letterman for the Nittany Lions in 1975 and '76 and played eight NFL seasons. One of his sons, **Michael Mauti**, is a fifth-year senior linebacker and another son, Patrick, was a senior in 2009;

- Freshman **Jonathan Warner's** father, Curt, was a first-team All-America tailback in 1981 and '82, and was instrumental in the Nittany Lions winning their first National Championship in 1982. Curt Warner was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 2009;

- Senior **Michael's Zordich's** father, Michael, played at Penn State from 1982-85, earning first team All-America honors as a senior before embarking on a 12-year NFL career.

In addition, redshirt sophomore **Patrick Flanagan** is the nephew of Nittany Lion Basketball head coach Patrick Chambers. Redshirt sophomore **Alex Kenney's** sister, Lauren, is a sophomore on the Penn State women's track and field team, placing fourth in the javelin at the 2012 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

UNIFORM CHANGES

The Penn State football team is wearing uniforms featuring a blue ribbon on the back of the helmet to support all victims of child abuse. Also, for the first time, the names of each football player adorn their jersey in recognition of their

BEAVER STADIUM SEES IMPROVEMENTS

Penn State fans are enjoying several significant upgrades to Beaver Stadium during the past two years.

The most significant changes to the venerable facility include:

- WiFi is available throughout the stadium;
- Credit and debit cards will be accepted at all concession stands;
- Waterproofing of the south upper deck seating areas;
- A camera has been installed on the south goalpost for the in-house videoboard;
- A new entry gate - Gate F - on the East side of the stadium near Gate A;
- More than 100 new locations for ADA patrons and companion seating on the East and West sides;
- Paving work on the field level concourse in the East, West and North sides of the stadium will provide a smoother and level surface for fans;
- A total of eight new restroom facilities, which are ADA-accessible, have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse;
- Improved drainage in seating areas

The changes and improvements to Beaver Stadium began as soon as the 2010 season ended and were completed in two phases, according to Associate Athletic Director Mark Bodenschatz. The first phase ended the week prior to the 2011 Blue-White Game and the second phase wrapped up in time for Football Eve on Sept. 2, 2011, and the Nittany Lions' 125th season opener the next day.

The new entry — Gate F — is located near Gate A on the East side of the stadium. Designed to accommodate 6,000-8,000 patrons, Gate F will be a tremendous asset on gamedays, allowing some fans who sit on the East side and previously have entered at Gate E, a smoother entry into the stadium. Penn State students will continue to enter Beaver Stadium at Gate A.

The most noticeable changes inside the stadium have occurred in the lower sections of the East, West and North seating areas. In the East and West, the first three rows of seats from goal line to goal line were removed and replaced with five large, pre-cast sections that will permit additional ADA spectators and companions to watch the Nittany Lions from a great vantage point. The pre-cast sections are approximately eight feet wide, to allow spectator traffic flow with the new ADA and companion seating.

Also in the East and West stands, vomitory ramps have been improved to allow for increased and easier access by ADA patrons to the new seating areas.

Fans will also notice significant changes on the North side of the stadium. The Section NF vomitory ramp has been modified with a gentler slope to permit ADA spectators to enter the North field level seats from Section NF, rather than the visiting team tunnel. A total of eight new ADA-accessible restroom facilities have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse.

Bodenschatz said 101 new ADA seats, as well as 101 companion seats, will be available for the upcoming season. With the ADA improvements, the Beaver Stadium capacity for the 2011 season will be 106,572, to remain the nation's second-largest stadium.

Additional work has been done in a number of areas in the stadium, according to Bodenschatz. The work includes new storm water lines, allowing rain to be captured and re-directed at higher points in the stadium. Trenches, some 8-10 feet deep, were dug in the lower concourse to house the storm water drainage, as well as new water and sanitary lines. With the new lines in place, approximately 50 percent of the field level concourse surface area has been repaved since the end of last season.

Another completed stadium project includes consolidating the storage areas for the field maintenance staff and stadium concessions with new facilities in the North end of the stadium. Electrical work, painting of the east side seats in rows 1-60, new carpeting in the Penn State locker room and painting in the press box on the west side of the stadium also has been completed.

TWENTY-SEVEN NITTANY LIONS ON NFL ROSTERS

(PRO SEASON IN PARENTHESES)

Twenty-seven former Penn State players were on the rosters of 19 National Football League teams as of Sept. 1. Penn State traditionally is among the top 15 schools nationally in producing current NFL players.

The Oakland Raiders feature a league-high three former Nittany Lions on its roster, including second-year starting center Stefen Wisniewski and rookies Jack Crawford and Nate Stupar. Stupar is on the practice squad.

Six NFL teams have two former Nittany Lions on their opening day rosters: Arizona, Cleveland, Dallas, Indianapolis, Miami and the New York Jets.

Bryan Scott is the elder statesman of former Nittany Lions in the NFL, as the Buffalo Bills safety/outside linebacker is entering his 10th professional season. Originally a second round draft choice of the Atlanta Falcons, Scott then played with the New Orleans Saints for one year before spending the last five in Buffalo.

Chicago Bears All-Pro placekicker Robbie Gould is next among Penn Staters in NFL longevity, entering his eighth season.

Three former Nittany Lion offensive linemen made NFL rosters with new teams: Dennis Landolt (Jets), Rich Ohrnberger (Arizona) and A.Q. Shipley (Indianapolis).

A total of 329 Nittany Lions have been selected all-time in the NFL Draft, including 36 in the first round. In the 2012 NFL Draft, Penn State had at least four players selected for the 39th time in NFL Draft history.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team for 41 of 46 title games. Thirty-four former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 51 Super Bowl rings as players, including tackle Kareem McKenzie and defensive tackle Jimmy Kennedy with the New York Giants for Super Bowl XLVI.

Penn State's Andrew Quarless helped the Green Bay Packers win Super Bowl XLV and former Nittany Lions Sean McHugh and Scott Paxson helped the Pittsburgh Steelers win Super Bowl XLIII.

SEVERAL ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® CANDIDATES

The Penn State football team has had at least one Capital One Academic All-American® in nine of the past 10 seasons, including a school record five in 2008 and three more in 2009 and again in 2010.

Redshirt junior guard John Urschel graduated in May 2012 with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average in mathematics. Urschel should be a strong candidate in the fall to become Penn State football's 50th CoSIDA Academic All-American®.

Fifth-year senior defensive end Pete Massaro earned first team Academic All-America® honors in 2010, but missed the 2011 season with a serious knee injury and was not eligible for consideration. Massaro earned a 3.85 undergraduate GPA, earning his degree in finance in December 2011.

Among the Nittany Lions' other potential Academic All-America® candidates are: redshirt sophomore defensive end Brad Bars, junior linebacker Glenn Carson, redshirt sophomore linebacker Mike Hull and senior center Matt Stankewitch.

The Nittany Lions' 49 all-time Academic All-Americans® rank No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

Nominees for Capital One Academic All-America® consideration must have at least a 3.30 cumulative grade point average and be a starter or key reserve.

NEARLY 35 FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 3.0 GPA IN SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the spring 2012 semester, with 34 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade-point average.

Among the 34 Nittany Lions above a 3.0 GPA, 15 earned Dean's List recognition by posting a 3.5 GPA or higher this past semester.

The superlative academic performance brought to 37 the total number of Penn State football student-athletes with a cumulative 3.0 or higher GPA through the spring semester.

Four additional Nittany Lions who are not using their fifth-year of eligibility also earned a 3.0 or higher during the spring semester: Andrew Goodman (Philadelphia), J.D. Mason (Philipsburg), Kenny Pollock (Dallas, Pa.) and Ryan Scherer (Avon Lake, Ohio). Goodman earned Dean's List recognition and graduated in May with Mason and Scherer. Pollock is on schedule to graduate in December.

Redshirt junior guard John Urschel (Williamsville, N.Y.) posted a perfect 4.0 GPA for the sixth consecutive semester and graduated in May, earning his degree in mathematics in three years. Urschel is enrolling in a master's degree program in statistics. The team's projected right guard coming out of spring practice, Urschel should be a strong candidate in the fall to become Penn State football's 50th CoSIDA Academic All-American®.

Also earning 4.0 GPAs during the spring semester were senior tackle Mike Farrell (Pittsburgh) and senior wide receiver Evan Lewis (Gettysburg), who also graduated in May. A minimum 12 credit hours are required for Dean's List consideration.

Among the additional Nittany Lions on the Dean's List last spring were: defensive end Brad Bars (Nashville), cornerback Jess Della Valle (Pittsburgh), linebacker Mike Hull (Canonsburg), linebacker Ben Kline (York), tight end Matt Lehman (Newport) defensive end Pete Massaro (Newtown Square), quarterback Shane McGregor (Ebensburg) and center Matt Stankewitch. Kline earned a 3.94 GPA during the spring semester and brought a 3.92 cumulative GPA in the summer academic sessions.

10th ANNUAL PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES "LIFT FOR LIFE" HITS RECORD \$110,000 TO BENEFIT KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

The 10th Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" was a tremendous success on July 13 raising the 2012 total to a record total in excess of \$110,000 to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

Penn State football student-athletes have raised \$110,374.00 for kidney cancer patients and awareness this year, with additional donations expected. The 2012 total breaks the chapter's previous record from the 2011 "Lift For Life," which netted \$100,930.00 for the Kidney Cancer Association.

More than \$700,000 has been raised in the battle against rare diseases by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural "Lift For Life" was held in 2003.

This year's Penn State Lift For Life was held outside for the first time, as more than 2,500 fans attended at the new Penn State Lacrosse Field. The new format saw the offense defeat the defense, 176-136, securing the victory by winning all three tug of war competitions, good for 30 points, to conclude the event.

A total of 81 Penn State football student-athletes secured at least one donation for Lift For Life, led by junior guard Eric Shrive (Scranton), who raised \$31,868.00. Senior tackle Mike Farrell (Pittsburgh) was next with \$12,755 and fullback J.R. Refice (Jes-sup) was third.

"A big thank you to everyone who donated and supported the football team by attending Lift For Life," said Mike Farrell, president of Penn State's Uplifting Athletes chapter. "We really appreciate everyone who helped in the Penn State community, from Coach (Bill) O'Brien and Coach Fitz (Craig Fitzgerald), the team, Deloris Brobeck, Kevin Henry and all our great volunteers who helped make the event successful."

PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 88 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to statistical information released by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) in October, 2011.

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 80 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2001-02 through 2004-05. The 88 percent figure was third to Northwestern (96) and Illinois (89) among Big Ten Conference institutions.

The Penn State football team earned a record GSR of 87 percent, tied with Stanford for the top graduation rate among teams in this week's BCS rankings and AP Top 25 poll. The Nittany Lion basketball (90 percent) and Lady Lion basketball (100) teams also earned graduation rates at least 15 percent higher than the national average.

This was the 21st annual release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes as it has for the past 21 years. The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 79 percent, second to Northwestern (88) among Big Ten schools, and significantly above the 64 percent Division I average. The four-year average for University Park students was 85 percent, also far exceeding the 62 percent rate for all students nationwide.

Among the 2004-05 entering freshman class, 80 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, up from 76 percent last year and well above the 65 percent average for all Division I institutions. Penn State's 80 percent figure was second-highest among Big Ten schools, trailing only Northwestern (85). The graduation rate for all Penn State students was 85 percent in the entering class of 2004-05.

The NCAA data revealed that student-athletes from six Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent -- Lady Lion basketball, field hockey, women's golf, men's gymnastics, men's tennis and women's tennis - and eight additional teams were at 90 percent or higher. Twenty of Penn State's 25 teams (track/cross country teams combined) earned a Graduation Success Rate at or above the national GSR average of 80 percent.

The Penn State Football (87 percent compared to 67), Nittany Lion Basketball (90 to 66 percent) and Lady Lion Basketball (100 to 84 percent) teams all earned four-year Graduation Success Rates considerably higher than the national average for their sport. Coach Patrick Chambers' Nittany Lions ranked second in the Big Ten with their 90 percent GSR score. Coach Coquese Washington's Lady Lions were tied for first in the Big Ten with their 100 percent GSR average.

The 2004-05 entering class for the Nittany Lion football team earned a stellar 84 percent graduation rate, which was highest among Big Ten Conference teams (Northwestern was second at 80 percent).

"I would like to thank everyone who supported this year's Lift For Life event," said Shrive, vice president of Penn State's Uplifting Athletes chapter. "With everyone's support and generosity this was the best Lift For Life yet. We Are!"

The team was broken into six groups, with two groups from each side of the ball competing against each other:

- offensive linemen vs. defensive linemen,
- running backs/tight ends vs. linebackers
- quarterbacks/wide receivers vs. defensive backs.

The competitions included pushing a 15-passenger van weighing approximately 6,400 pounds, flipping a 680-pound tire, a medicine ball toss over a goalpost, a weighted sled pull and push and relays that included stacking three 50-pound bags, carrying weights and the tug of war.

"It's a hard workout," said Fitzgerald, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Football. "It was a great day for Penn State and most importantly, for (beating) kidney cancer."

Founded by Penn State Football teammates Scott Shirley, Dave Costlow and Damone Jones in 2003, Lift For Life has continued to build awareness and raise funds for the Kidney Cancer Association. The event is organized by Penn State Football Uplifting Athletes, whose members are on the Penn State football team. They are led this year by officers Farrell, Shrive, senior linebacker Mike Yancich (Washing-

ton), who is the secretary, and junior center Ty Howle (Wake Forest, N.C.), who is head of operations.

Uplifting Athletes has grown to 13 chapters, with Boston College, Colgate, Kent State, Maryland, North Carolina State, Northwestern, Ohio State, Princeton, St. Francis, Notre Dame, Illinois and Fordham joining the Penn State chapter.

Navy visits Beaver Stadium on Sept. 15 for the first meeting between the old rivals since 1974. The Nittany Lions will host the game on Sept. 22.



tany Lions and Mids have met 37 times, with Penn State leading the series, 18-17-2. The teams first met in 1894 and played every season from 1967-74.

Navy won the last meeting, in Beaver Stadium in 1974, led by head coach George Welsh, a Penn State assistant coach from 1964-72.

Penn State's proud and enthusiastic student section in Beaver Stadium is the nation's second-largest full season student ticket section of any school, for any sport. ESPN's College Gameday and ESPN The Magazine ("The Nation's No. 1 Student section") are among the national media accolades for the Nittany Lions' loud and impactful student section.

11 FIRST TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS® PAST FOUR YEARS

For the third consecutive year, in 2010, the Penn State Football program was at the head of the class in Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America® selections.

All-America guard Stefan Wisniewski became the first Penn State football student-athlete to earn Academic All-America® three times, with first-team nods in 2009 and 2010.

Senior linebacker Chris Colasanti and defensive end Pete Massaro also were first-team Academic All-Americans® in 2010.

Penn State has earned a nation's best 15 Academic All-Americans® over the past six years, with 13 first team honorees. A program record five Nittany Lions were selected to the 2008 Academic All-America® team.

The Nittany Lions' 49 Academic All-Americans® all-time are No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

SYRACUSE, RUTGERS AND PITT ON FUTURE SCHEDULES

During the past six seasons, Penn State has renewed its rivalries with Notre Dame (2006-07), Syracuse in (2008-09) and Alabama (2010-11). The Nittany Lions and Orange will open the 2013 season at the MetLife Stadium on Aug. 31, 2013.

The Nittany Lions will play Virginia in 2012 and '13, Rutgers in 2014 and '15 and Pitt in 2016 and '17.

DATES SET FOR 2013 BLUE-WHITE WEEKEND

The dates for one of the highlights of the Penn State sports calendar, Blue-White Weekend, have been set for 2013.

Blue-White Weekend will be held April 19-21, 2013, with the Blue-White football game on Saturday, April 20 as the centerpiece for numerous activities throughout the weekend in and around Beaver Stadium.

Numerous events are held during Blue-White Weekend, including a carnival, fireworks, food vendors, live music and performances at the student entertainment stage, in addition to other Penn State athletic events.

The Nittany Lion Club will host its Blue-White Event on April 20, 2013 before the game. The NLC breakfast event features Coach Bill O'Brien and the Nittany Lion seniors and drew more than 1,300 to the Bryce Jordan Center this past April.

Blue-White Weekend has become the university's

unofficial annual spring reunion. This year's scrimmage drew an estimated 60,000 fans, the nation's third-highest spring football game attendance. The Blue-White Game attracted record-breaking crowds in excess of 70,000 from 2007-09, topped by 76,500 at the 2009 contest.

BIG TEN NETWORK TO AIR MULTIPLE PENN STATE GAMES AMONG ITS 40-PLUS FOOTBALL GAMES THIS SEASON

BTN will air 40-plus football games this season, with each school making a minimum of two appearances, including at least one conference game.

Penn State's Oct. 20 contest at Iowa will air in primetime on BTN, with a 7 p.m. CT kick in Iowa City. Additional Nittany Lion games are likely to air on BTN once the 12-day selection process begins.

BTN televised three Penn State football games in 2011 and 2010 and four Nittany Lion contests in 2009.

The Big Ten Network is available to more than 80 million homes across the United States and Canada, and has agreements with more than 300 affiliates.

The network, though, is not carried by Adams and Blue Ridge cable in Pennsylvania. The network also is not available to Armstrong Cable customers in western Pennsylvania and in the Medina and Youngstown, Ohio areas. A combined total of more than 35,000 Penn State alumni live in communities served by the three cable providers, in addition to thousands more fans and current Penn State students.

BTN will air football tripleheaders on Sept. 1, 8 and 15.

The Big Ten Network will televise approximately 800 events in 2012-13, all in HD, including 40-45 football games, at least 110 men's basketball games, at least 55 women's basketball games, Olympic sport events and conference championships.

LAST GAME RECAP

OHIO RALLIES PAST LIONS IN SEASON OPENER

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Sept. 1, 2012 - Penn State saw Ohio rally from a 14-3 halftime deficit to post a 24-14 win over the Nittany Lions in the season opener and Bill O'Brien's first game as head coach. The Nittany Lions controlled the game in the first half, but the Bobcats scored 21 unanswered points in the second half to become just the second Mid-American Conference team to beat Penn State.

Senior quarterback Matt McGloin recorded his eighth career 200-yard passing game and set career-highs by completing 27-of-48 passes for 260 yards and a pair of touchdowns. He attempted 26 passes in the first half, the most by a Nittany Lion in a half since Zack Mills had 28 attempts against Purdue in 2004. McGloin also set career highs in completions (27) and attempts (48).

Sophomore Allen Robinson led all Big Ten players during the opening weekend by making a career-high nine receptions for 97 yards. Sophomore tailback Bill Belton, who rushed for 53 yards on 13 carries in his first career start, and junior tight end Matt Lehman delivered their first career touchdowns on receptions from McGloin.

Linebacker Michael Mauti led all players with 12 tackles for his fourth career game registering double-digit stops. Linebacker Gerald Hodges recorded 11 stops for his fifth career game with at least 10 tackles. Sophomore cornerback Adrian Amos recorded a career-best 10 tackles.

Five true freshmen made their debuts: cornerback Da'Quan Davis, tight end Jesse James, safety Jordan Lucas, linebacker Nyeem Wartman and wide receiver Trevor Williams.

With three seconds left in the first quarter, Belton recorded his first career touchdown for the first score in the Bill O'Brien era. McGloin orchestrated the 10-play, 80-yard drive, marching the Nittany Lions down the field before connecting with the running back for the six-yard catch and run. McGloin completed 5-of-6 passes on the drive, which included a 21-yard reception to Robinson and a 15-yard pass play to tight end Kyle Carter.

The Nittany Lions gained 173 yards in the first quarter on 25 plays and held the ball for 10:19.

In the second quarter, Ohio capitalized on a special teams turnover to make it a 7-3 game. After recovering a muffed punt at Penn State's 13-yard line, the Bobcats' Matt Weller connected on a 22-yard field goal four plays later with 10:22 left in the stanza.

The Nittany Lions then extended their lead to 14-3 with 1:29 left in the half. After Wartman blocked Ohio's punt deep in its own territory, Penn State started its drive at the opposition's 18-yard line. Three plays later, McGloin threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Lehman, whose first career catch was good for six points.

With 10:40 left in the third quarter, the Bobcats made it 14-10 on a 43-yard touchdown reception by Landon Smith. Tettleton sailed a pass down the middle of the field that was nearly intercepted, but the tipped ball fell into the hands of Smith, who ran it in for the score.

Ohio took its first lead of the game at 17-14 after Tettleton engineered an eight-play, 70-yard drive, which he capped with a one-yard touchdown run with 3:49 left in the third quarter. The Bobcats extended their lead to 24-14 with 2:55 left in the game. Tettleton capped off a 14-play, 93-yard drive with a five-yard touchdown completion to Donte Foster.

Playing for the first time since 1974, Penn State lost to Ohio for the first time in six series meetings.
