NITTANY LIONS HOST HUSKERS IN HUGE SENIOR DAY CLASH

Penn State hosts No. 19/17 Nebraska in a critical conference clash as the national powers meet for the first time as Big Ten competitors. The teams will annually meet as cross division rivals. The No. 12 Nittany Lions bring a seven-game winning streak into the contest; the last five in conference play.

Penn State is the only unbeaten team in the Leaders Division with a 5-0 mark and can clinch no worse than a tie for the division title with a win.

Twenty Penn State seniors will be introduced in a pre-game ceremony, as the Nittany Lions face their second member of the 800-win club this season.

The Nittany Lions have not played since a comeback 10-7 win over Illinois on Oct. 29. The Cornhuskers lost to Northwestern, 28-25, last Saturday.

Penn State has a 66-20 (76.5) record since the start of the 2005 season, tied for the nation's No. 9 winning percentage over the past seven seasons.

NITTANY LIONS AND CORNHUSKERS AMONG NATION'S ELITE

Penn State and Nebraska are among just eight FBS teams nationally that have won 800 games all-time. In their 125th season, the Nittany Lions have an 826-358-42 record to rank fifth in victories. The Huskers have an 844-347-40 record in their 122nd season to rank fourth

Penn State is No. 3 with 27 bowl wins among its 43 appearances (8th). The Nittany Lions' 65.1 bowl winning percentage (27-14-2) is second-best among schools with at least 20 bowl appearances. Nebraska's 47 bowl appearances are No. 5 in the nation and its 24 post-season wins are eighth.

FOLLOWING BYE WEEK

Penn State has a 32-16 record under Joe Paterno following a bye week, earning a 14-5 record since 1994. The Nittany Lions won at Minnesota last year following their only bye week and are playing a home game following a bye week for the first time since 2004. Penn State's last three games after a bye week were on the road prior to this week's clash with Nebraska.

SENIORS TO BE INTRODUCED IN PRE-GAME CEREMONY

Twenty Penn State seniors will be playing their final game in Beaver Stadium on Saturday and will be introduced before the contest with the Huskers.

Over the past four years, the group has been instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions win the 2008 Big Ten Championship and Rose Bowl berth, win the 2010 Capital One Bowl, and earn a spot in the 2011 Outback Bowl with the possibility of a fourth January bowl game this season.

The seniors have helped the Nittany Lions earn a 37-11 record since the start of the 2008 season, among the best marks in the nation.

Among the 20 seniors are 14 players who havebeen starters for most of the season (seven on offense, seven on defense).

The Nittany Lions have won 19 of their 21 Senior Day games since 1990. The lone losses have come to No. 16 Michigan in 1999 and No. 11 Michigan State last year.

PATERNO POSTS 409TH CAREER WIN TO BECOME NCAA DIVISION I LEADER

The Nittany Lions' 10-7 decision over Illinois was the 409th victory in Joe Paterno's career, breaking a tie with former Grambling State University coach Eddie Robinson for the all-time NCAA Division I lead.

Robinson earned a 408-165-15 record at Grambling from 1941-97, compiling 45 winning seasons.

Paterno is second in all-time victories across all NCAA divisions, trailing only John Gagliardi, head coach at St. John's (Minn.). He has a 483-133-11 record in his 63rd season as head coach.

STILL NAMED BEDNARIK AWARD SEMI-FINALIST; MID-SEASON ALL-AMERICAN

Penn State senior DT Devon Still (Wilmington, Del.) was named a semifinalist for the Chuck Bednarik Award, presented annually to the nation's defensive player of the year by the Maxwell Football Club.

A first-team Mid-season All-American, Still has been a significant force as the anchor of Penn State's talented and productive defense. For the season, the co-captain ranks No. 2 in the Big Ten with 15.5 tackles for loss (minus-72) and is second on the team and seventh in the conference with four sacks. With 47 tackles, including 25 solos, Still ranks fourth among Nittany Lion defenders and also has registered one fumble recovery and a pass break-up.

In Penn State's 10-7 win over Illinois on Oct. 29, Still recorded a career-high 10 tackles and tied his career-high with 3.5 tackles for loss. His previous career-best in tackles was seven against No. 2 Alabama earlier this year and against Florida (also had 3.5 TFL) in the 2011 Outback Bowl.

The former Howard prep standout helped hold the Illini to seven points and 296 yards, well below their season averages of 28.6 ppg and 417.1 ypg entering the contest. Penn State forced a season-high four turnovers, as Illinois became the sixth team to score 10 points or less on the Nittany Lions' Top 10 defense

Still is among the primary candidates for Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year and Defensive Lineman of the Year.

Still was selected to the ESPN.com, CBSsports. com and Sl.com Mid-season All-America first teams and to the Phil Steele's College Football second team.

Still also was selected runner-up for ESPN.com's Big Ten Mid-season Defensive Player of the Year.

HODGES EARNS SECOND CONSECUTIVE BIG TEN HONOR AFTER 19 STOPS VS. ILLINI

Linebacker U's Gerald Hodges (Paulsboro, N.J.) earned his second consecutive Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honor after another dominating performance to lead the Penn State defense in the 10-7 Big Ten Leaders Division win over Illinois.

Hodges is the first Nittany Lion to earn back-toback conference accolades since former Linebacker U standout Navorro Bowman did so in 2009 (vs. Indiana and Michigan State).

Penn State players have been honored six times this season by the conference, with Hodges joining quarterback Matt McGloin, cornerback/kick returner Chaz Powell and kicker/punter Anthony Fera (twice).

A junior, Hodges broke his hits career-high for the second consecutive week, recording 19 tackles (six solo) to lead another superb defensive effort by the Nittany Lions in the comeback win over the Illini. The

Hodges' 19 tackles were the most by a Nittany Lion since Paul Posluszny recorded 22 tackles at Northwestern in 2005, and tied for 15th highest in Penn State annals.

Penn State held Illinois to seven points and 286 yards in the win. The Illini entered the game averaging 28.6 points and 417.1 yards per game. The Nittany Lions forced a season-high four turnovers, bringing their season total to 22, and held their sixth opponent to 10 points or less.

Hodges recorded a career-high 14 tackles (eight solo), with 1.5 sacks and high first career interception in the win at Northwestern. Early in the third guarter, he grabbed a pass tipped by DT Jordan Hill (Steelton) and raced 63 yards to the Northwestern 19-yard-line. On the next play, Silas Redd scooted for a touchdown run to give Penn State a 34-24 lead and the final points of the game.

For the season, Hodges leads Penn State and is No. 8 in the Big Ten with 77 tackles (41 solo). He leads the Nittany Lions and is No. 5 in the conference with 4.5 sacks and is second on the team and No. 11 in the conference with 9.0 TFL (minus-35).

REDD LEADS ALL FBS PLAYERS IN RUSHING IN OCTOBER

Sophomore Silas Redd (Norwalk, Conn.) posted five consecutive 100-yard games and led all FBS players with 703 rushing yards in October. Western Kentucky's Bobby Rainey was second with 673 yards.

Redd averaged 140.6 ypg and 5.3 yards on his 133 carries in October, compiling five consecutive 100-yard games, scoring three touchdowns. Redd is the first Nittany Lion with five consecutive 100-yard rushing games since All-American Curtis Enis logged eight straight in 1997

Redd's 703 rushing yards were the most by a Big Ten player in October since Mike Hart (Michigan) had 903 in 2004.

REDD CRACKS 1,000 YARDS WITH FIFTH CONSECUTIVE 100-YARD EFFORT

Sophomore TB Silas Redd gained 137 yards on a career-high 30 carries in the win over Illinois to crack 1,000 yards for the season. Redd scored the gamewinning touchdown on a three-yard run with 1:08 to play in the game.

Redd has gained 1,006 yards this year, becoming the 12th different Penn State player to post 1,000 yards rushing in a season (20 times overall).

Penn State has posted seven-straight seasons with a 1,000-yard rusher covering seasons by Tony Hunt (2), Rodney Kinlaw (1), Evan Royster (3) and Redd (1).

In Penn State's 34-24 win at Northwestern, Redd gained a career-high with 164 yards on just 18 carries (9.1) for his fourth consecutive 100-yard effort. His previous high was 142 yards vs. Iowa on Oct. 8.

For the season, Redd has 1,066 yards on 195 carries (5.4) and seven touchdowns. His 111.8 ypg is No. 3 in the conference and No. 18 in the nation. Redd is No. 6 in the Big Ten in all-purpose yardage at 115.2 ypg.

REDD, O-LINE SPARK MORE PRODUCTIVE GROUND GAME IN BIG TEN PLAY

The Nittany Lions entered Big Ten play ranked last in the Big Ten in rushing offense at 137.0 ypg (548 yards), boosted primarily by 245 yards vs. Indiana State.

But, over the past five games, the Lions' veteran offensive line has paved the way for Silas Redd and other running backs to be much more productive on the ground, also winning the important time of possession battle.

In bursting to a 5-0 Big Ten start, Penn State has rushed for 914 yards (182.8) the past five games. The Nittany Lions are averaging 162.4 ypg and have moved up in the conference in rushing.

BIG TEN LEADER IN FEWEST SACKS ALLOWED

Penn State is tied for the Big Ten lead with Nebraska in fewest sacks allowed with an average of 1.22 per games. The Nittany Lions' veteran offensive line has given up only 11 sacks in nine games to pace the conference and rank No. 24 in the nation in fewest sacks allowed

DEFENSE RANKS IN TOP 10 NATIONALLY IN FOUR CATEGORIES

The Nittany Lion defense again is among the nation's elite units, ranking in the top 25 nationally in six primary categories. Penn State ranks in the top three in the Big Ten in all six categories.

MOYE CRACKS TOP 5 ON SCHOOL RECEIVING LISTS

Co-captain Derek Moye (Rochester) continued his climb into the Top 5 in the school receiving charts by delivering a career-high 158 yards on six catches in the win at Indiana. Moye made a 40-yard catch on Penn State's opening drive of the game and zipped past the IU secondary for a 74-yard scoring strike late in the third quarter.

Moye made two catches for 42 yards in the win over lowa, including a spectacular 23-yard grab between three defenders. He has 134 career receptions, passing All-American O.J McDuffie (126) for fifth place at Penn State during the IU game.

A co-captain, Moye has 18 career TD catches, good for No. 4 in school history. Deon Butler is next with 22

Moye broke a small bone in his left foot the week of the Purdue game and missed the Purdue and Northwestern games.

Moye followed up his career-high seven catches for 112 yards at Temple with a game-high six catches for 65 yards and two touchdows vs. Eastern Michigan.

With his efforts against EMU, Moye became just the sixth Nittany Lion to eclipse 2,000 career receiving yards. His 2,255 yards are No. 3 all-time.

Moye posted his sixth career 100-yard receiving game in the win at Indiana. His six career 100-yard receiving games are tied for fifth all-time at Penn State.

Moye also returned two punts for 39 yards vs. the Owls, including a career-long 31-yard effort, giving him a career-high 151 all-purpose yards.

For the season, the pre-season first team All-Big honoree and Biletnikoff Award candidate leads the team with 30 catches for 514 yards (17.1). He is seventh in the Big Ten in receptions (4.3 rpg) and is fifth in receiving yards (73.4 ypg).

Penn State is third in scoring defense (12.4 ppg), eighth in the nation in total defense (282.3 ypg), third in pass efficiency defense (96.4) and 7th in pass defense (170.4 ypg).

Penn State leads the Big Ten in scoring and pass efficiency defense. The Nittany Lions have allowed only 12 touchdowns, the nation's third-fewest behind Alabama (6) and LSU (10).

The Nittany Lions also are tied for 24th nationally in rushing defense at 111.9 ypg, having limited six opponents to less than 100 yards on the ground. Penn State is tied for 12th nationally in tackles for loss (7.67 per game).

Penn State has held six of nine opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense. Illinois came into the Oct. 29 game averaging 28.6 ppg and 417.1 ypg and was held to seven points, 286 yards and had four turnovers.

Purdue came into the Oct. 15 game averaging 32.6 ppg and was held to 18 points and had three turnovers. Iowa came into the Oct. 8 game averaging 421.8 ypg, with 281.2 passing ypg, and was held to 253 yards by Penn State (84 rush, 169 pass).

TURNOVER TURNAROUND

Penn State has forced multiple turnovers in seven of its initial nine games and is first in the Big Ten and tied for 12th nationally with 22 turnovers. The Nittany Lions forced a total of 17 turnovers during the 2010 season.

The Nittany Lions have grabbed 14 interceptions, tied for No. 7 in the nation. Penn State had 10 interceptions last year.

In the win over Illinois, the Nittany Lions forced a season-high four turnovers. Cornerback D'Anton Lynn and defensive end Sean Stanley grabbed interceptions and Stanley recovered a fumble, as did linebacker Nate Stupar.

In the win at Northwestern, a turnover was the play of the game. With Penn State leading 27-24, early in the third quarter, Gerald Hodges grabbed a pass tipped by Jordan Hill at the PSU 18-yard-line and raced 63 yards to the Northwestern 19. On the next play, Silas Redd zipped for a touchdown to give Penn State a 34-24 lead and the final points of the game.

The Nittany Lions grabbed a season-high three interceptions in the 23-18 win over Purdue, with two in the second half by senior linebacker Nate Stupar (State College). Stupar's second grab came at the Purdue 19 with just 1:59 to play in the game and the Lions were able to run out the clock.

Senior safety Nick Sukay dove to grab his teamhigh third interception (8th career) late in the third quarter at the Penn State 15-yard-line to end another Purdue drive.

Penn State has scored six touchdowns and kicked three field goals after forcing a turnover, resulting in 50 points.

DEFENSE HOLDS SIXTH FOE TO 10 POINTS OR LESS

The Penn State defense continued its superlative play by limiting Illinois to just a touchdown, significantly less than the Illini's season average of 28.6 ppg entering the game.

The Nittany Lions have held six of their initial nine foes to 10 points or less for the second time in three years.

The Nittany Lions held five of their initial six opponents to 10 points or less for the first time since the 1978 squad that played Alabama for the National Championship in the Sugar Bowl.

SECOND-FEWEST POINTS ALLOWED IN INITIAL SIX GAMES IN BIG TEN ERA

Penn State allowed 63 points in its first six games (10.5 avg.), its second-lowest total since starting Big Ten play in 1993, trailing only 61 points in 2009.

Penn State has permitted only four touchdowns in the last five games and only eight touchdowns for the season, third-fewest in the nation.

HILL & STILL BIG TEN'S PREMIER DEFENSIVE TACKLE TANDEM

Senior co-captain Devon Still (Wilmington, Del.) and junior Jordan Hill (Steelton) have developed this season into the Big Ten's most productive set of defensive tackles.

In the 10-7 win over Illinois, Still, a first-team Midseason All-American, recorded career highs in tackles (10) and matched his career-high in tackles for loss (3.5), which included a sack. Still's previous career-best in tackles was seven against Alabama earlier this year and against Florida in the 2011 Outback Bowl. He has 15.5 tackles for loss this year.

An All-Big Ten candidate, Hill also posted a careerhigh 10 tackles in the win over the Illini. His previous career high was eight against Alabama earlier this season.

For the season, Still is second in the Big Ten with 15.5 TFL (minus-72) and is tied for seventh in the conference with four sacks. His 47 hits are tied for fourth on the team and he has a fumble recovery and a pass break-up.

A semifinalist for the Bednarik Award, Still was selected a first-team Mid-season All-American by ESPN.com, Sl.com and CBSsports.com.

Hill is is second on the team with 51 tackles. He is 12th in the Big Ten with 3.5 sacks and 12th with with 8.0 TFL for minus-45. He also a forced fumble and fumble recovery.

In the win at Northwestern, Hill recorded a careerhigh 2.0 sacks for minus-24 yards among his six tackles and tipped a pass that Gerald Hodges intercepted and returned 63 yards in the game's pivotal play. Still had 2.0 tackles for loss, with a sack, among his three hits in the win over the Wildcats.

Still recorded six tackles, with 1.5 tackles for loss and a sack for minus-12 yards in the 13-3 win over lowa. Hill also made six hits vs. the Hawkeyes, helping hold them to 84 rushing yards on 30 attempts.

Hill recorded a career-high 3.0 tackles for loss, with a sack, in the win at Indiana. Still delivered 2.0 TFL for minus-10 yards and recovered a fumble to set-up the go-ahead field goal early in the third quarter.

FERA A SEMIFINALIST FOR GROZA AWARD; CANDIDATE FOR RAY GUY HONOR

Penn State punter/placekicker Anthony Fera (Cypress, Texas) has been selected one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Collegiate Place-kicker Award and to the list of candidates for the Ray Guy Award, presented to the nation's top punter.

Fera, Nebraska's Brett Maher and Oklahoma State's Quinn Sharp are the nation's only players who are Ray Guy Award candidates and semifinalists for

PENN STATE FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES TIED FOR TOP GRADUATION RATE AMONG BCS/AP TOP 25 TEAMS

The Penn State football team is tied with Stanford for the top Graduation Success Rate (GSR) among teams ranked in the Oct. 30 Bowl Championship Series and AP Top 25 rankings, according to data recently released by the NCAA.

Penn State football studentathletes that enrolled in the University from 2001-04 earned a superlative Graduation Success Rate of 87 percent, tied with Stanford for No. 10 overall among the nation's 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions. Penn State's 87 percent GSR was significantly higher than the 67 percent FBS average and was second to Northwestern (94) among Big Ten institutions.

Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2001-04 earned a strong fouryear federal graduation rate of 80 percent, also No. 2 to Northwestern (86) among Big Ten squads. The Nittany Lions' 80 percent graduation figure was 24 points above the 56 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.

In the NCAA's 2009 graduation data, Coach Joe Paterno's Nittany Lions earned the highest GSR and federal graduation rate among teams ranked in the final Associated Press Top 25 poll two years ago.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically elicible to compete.

The strong NCAA graduation rate data is the latest success in a long line of academic achievement for members of Paterno's program, who consistently are near the top nationally in academic success:

- Penn State has had 15 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans® the past five years to lead the nation, with 13 first-team selections.
- During Paterno's tenure, Penn State has had 47 Academic All-Americans® (37 first team). Penn State's all-time total of 49 Academic All-Americas® football players is third among all FBS schools and leads all Big Ten institutions.
- Forty Penn State football student-athletes earned a 3.00 GPA or higher during the 2010 fall semester, including 16 who earned Dean's List recognition by posting a 3.5 GPA or higher.

the Lou Groza Place-kicker Award.

Fera was selected Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week twice in October after significant contributions in Penn State conference wins over Indiana and Purdue.

The Augusta Sports Council created the Ray Guy Award in 2000 to honor College Football Hall of Fame inductee, Ray Guy.

A redshirt sophomore, Fera is in his second year as the Nittany Lions' punter and took over the placekicking duties six games ago for Penn State. He ranks in the top five in a trio of Big Ten categories, including third in punting with a 42.1 average on his 39 punts. Fera has landed 11 punts inside the 20-yard-line and has a long of punt of 69 yards.

In his first year as the Nittany Lions' placekicker, Fera is tied for the Big Ten in field goal percentage. In his six games since taking over the field goal duties, he has connected on 12-of-14 attempts (85.7), with a career long of 40 yards, and has made all 13 of his PAT attempts. Fera is tied for second in the Big Ten in field goals made per game (1.50 fgpg), leads the Nittany Lions in scoring with 49 points and is averaging 65.4 yards on kickoffs, with nine touchbacks.

A prep All-American at St. Pius X, Fera is the first Nittany Lion since Chris Bahr in 1975 to be the starter for field goals, kick offs and punts.

The Groza Award, which is sponsored by the Palm Beach County Sports Commission, is named in honor of Pro Football Hall of Famer Lou Groza, who played 21 seasons for the Cleveland Browns

The winner of the 2011 Lou Groza Award will be revealed as part of the Home Depot ESPNU College Football Awards Show, on Dec. 8. The formal presentation of the award will be made at the 20th Annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Awards Banquet in West Palm Beach, Fla. on Dec. 6.

The list of Ray Guy Award candidates will be narrowed to 10 semifinalists to be announced on November 11. The three finalists will be announced on November 21.

The presentation of the Ray Guy Award will be featured on The Home Depot College Football Awards live on Thursday, December 8 at 9:00 pm ET on ESPN.

SIX NITTANY LIONS NAMED TO PHIL STEELE'S MID-SEASON ALL-BIG TEN TEAMS

Phil Steele's College Football has selected six Penn Staters to its Mid-season All-Big Ten teams, led by co-captain Devon Still (Wilmington, Del.), who was named a season team All-American.

A senior defensive tackle, Still recently was named to ESPN.com's Mid-season All-America Team. He was named first team All-Big Ten by Phil Steele's. Still is second in the Big Ten with 10.0 tackles for loss for the No. 22 Nittany Lions (6-1, 3-0).

Four Nittany Lions were selected second team Midseason All-Big Ten by Phil Steele's: safety Drew Astorino (Edinboro), defensive end Jack Crawford (Longport, N.J.), wide receiver Derek Moye (Rochester) and tailback Silas Redd (Norwalk, Conn.). Safety Nick Sukay (Mount Pleasant) earned third team honors.

"GREAT SHOW" = GREAT RESULTS

Penn State has won 43 of its last 50 home games dating to a Senior Day win over Michigan State in 2004. The Nittany Lions were 7-0 in Beaver Stadium in 2005 and 2008 and 6-1 in 2006 and '07.

Penn State has a 252-62 record (80.2) in Beaver Stadium since the facility was erected in 1960, including 15 unbeaten seasons. Beaver Stadium's capacity of 106,572 is the nation's second-largest.

The only setbacks over the past 50 home games have come to No. 4 Michigan in 2006, No. 1 Ohio State in 2007, lowa in 2009, No. 15 Ohio State in 2009, Illinois and No. 10 Michigan State in 2010 and No. 3/2 Alabama in 2011.

Penn State at home the past seven seasons: 2005 (7-0), 2006 (6-1), 2007 (6-1), 2008 (7-0), 2009 (6-2), 2010 (5-2) and 2011 (5-1).

The Nittany Lions have earned a 231-54 (81.0) home record under Joe Paterno since he became head coach in 1966, including 14 undefeated seasons.

COACH JOE PATERNO

In his 46th season as head coach of the Nittany Lions and 62nd year on the coaching staff, Joe Paterno is the leader in all-time victories among major college coaches. A 1950 graduate of Brown University, Paterno owns a career record of 409-136-3 for a winning percentage of 74.9.

He ranks third in winning percentage among active Football Bowl Subdivision coaches with 10 or more years as a head coach.

Paterno is the longest serving head coach at one school in major college football history. Amos Alonzo Stagg served as head coach at the University of Chicago for 41 years (1892-1932) of his 57-year tenure as a head coach.

Paterno has led the Nittany Lions to two national championships (1982 and '86) and five undefeated

seasons (1968, '69, '73, '86 and '94). Selected the AFCA National Coach of the Year an unprecedented five times, Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl wins with a record of 24-12-1.

He has guided Penn State to three Big Ten Championships and has been selected the Dave McClain Big Ten Coach of the Year three times, the award's second-highest total.

Paterno is one of only nine coaches in NCAA history (five in FBS) to win 300 games and reached the milestone faster than anyone (380 games). He also is the only FBS head coach with 300 victories at one school.

Paterno was inducted into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame in 2007 and was among the first three active coaches to be inducted.

NO. 3 IN WINNING PCT. AMONG ACTIVE COACHES

In addition to his record victories total, Joe Paterno ranks third in winning percentage (74.9) among active Football Bowl Subdivision coaches with 10 or more years as an FBS head coach.

Oklahoma's Bob Stoops leads the list with an 81.0 winning percentage, (137-32), followed by TCU's Gary Patterson (77.8, 105-30), Paterno, Georgia's Mark Richt (74.1, 103-36), South Carolina's Steve Spurrier (71.8, 193-75-2) and Alabama's Nick Saban (71.6, 137-54-1).

PATERNO LONGEVITY AMAZING

Since Joe Paterno became head coach in 1966, there have been 888 head coaching changes in the

NUMEROUS BEAVER STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS GREET FANS

Penn State fans will see several significant upgrades at Beaver Stadium that have taken place during the off-season.

The most significant changes to the venerable facility include:

- A new entry gate Gate F on the East side of the stadium near Gate A;
- More than 100 new locations for ADA patrons and companion seating on the East and West sides;
- Paving work on the field level concourse in the East, West and North sides of the stadium will provide a smoother and level surface for fans;
- A total of eight new restroom facilities, which are ADA-accessible, have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse;
- Improved drainage in seating areas

The changes and improvements to Beaver Stadium began as soon as the 2010 season ended and were completed in two phases, according to Associate Athletic Director Mark Bodenschatz. The first phase ended the week prior to the Blue-White Game and the second phase will wrap-up in time for Football Eve on Friday, Sept. 2 and the Nittany Lions' 125th season opener the next day.

The new entry - Gate F - is located near Gate A on the East side of the stadium. Designed to accommodate 6,000-8,000 patrons, Gate F will be a tremendous asset on gamedays, allowing some fans who sit on the East side and previously have entered at Gate E, a smoother entry into the stadium. Penn State students will continue to enter Beaver Stadium at Gate A.

The most noticeable changes inside the stadium have occurred in the lower sections of the East, West and North seating areas. In the East and West, the first three rows of seats from goal line to goal line were removed and replaced with five large, pre-cast sections that will permit additional ADA spectators and companions to watch the Nittany Lions from a great vantage point. The pre-cast sections are approximately eight feet wide, to allow spectator traffic flow with the new ADA and companion seating.

Also in the East and West stands, vomitory ramps have been improved to allow for increased and easier access by ADA patrons to the new seating areas.

Fans will also notice significant changes on the North side of the stadium. The Section NF vomitory ramp has been modified with a gentler slope to permit ADA spectators to enter the North field level seats from Section NF, rather than the visiting team tunnel. A total of eight new ADA-accessible restroom facilities have been constructed in the East, West and North sides on the field level concourse.

Bodenschatz said 101 new ADA seats, as well as 101 companion seats, will be available for the upcoming season. With the ADA improvements, the Beaver Stadium capacity for the 2011 season will be 106,572, to remain the nation's second-largest stadium.

Additional work has been done in a number of areas in the stadium, according to Bodenschatz. The work includes new storm water lines, allowing rain to be captured and re-directed at higher points in the stadium. Trenches, some 8-10 feet deep, were dug in the lower concourse to house the storm water drainage, as well as new water and sanitary lines. With the new lines in place, approximately 50 percent of the field level concourse surface area has been repaved since the end of last season.

Another completed stadium project includes consolidating the storage areas for the field maintenance staff and stadium concessions with new facilities in the North end of the stadium. Electrical work, painting of the east side seats in rows 1-60, new carpeting in the Penn State locker room and painting in the press box on the west side of the stadium also has been completed.

Bodenschatz also said that design and planning are underway for the installation of new video scoreboards to be In place for the 2012 season.

PENN STATE ALUMNI ON 22 NFL TEAMS

A total of 25 Penn State football alumni were on active NFL Kickoff Week rosters and additional seven players were on practice squads or injured to bring the total to 32. The Nittany Lions annually are in the top 15 nationally among schools in producing current NFL players, tied for 13th this year with Florida State and Nebraska.

Since the season began, DE Aaron Maybin signed with the New York Jets and RB Larry Johnson was cut by Miami.

The Miami Dolphins lead all teams with three former Nittany Lions: DT Jared Odrick and All-Pro LB Cameron Wake, as well as rookie WR Brett Brackett on the practice squad.

The Chicago Bears, Cleveland Browns, New York Giants and St. Louis Rams all have two Penn Staters on their ac-

Nine former Nittany Lions are playing linebacker in the NFL (6 are starters), the most of any school in the nation.

Quarterback Kerry Collins signed with the Indianapolis Colts to add a new chapter to his distinguished 17-year professional career. The 1994 Davey O'Brien Award winner, Collins (1995-present) and placekicker Matt Bahr (1979-95) are tied for the most years in the NFL (17) by a Nittany Lion.

New York Giants offensive tackle Kareem McKenzie is in his 11th season and New Orleans Saints' tight end John Gilmore is in his 10th season.

Five seniors from the Penn State's 2010 team are on NFL rosters. First-team All-America guard Stefen Wisniewski was selected by the Oakland Raiders in the second round of the NEL Draft and starts for the Baiders, Brett Brackett (Miami), Ollie Ogbu (Indianapolis) and Evan Royster (Washington) are on practice squads and Lou Eliades (Raiders) is on the Injured Reserve list.

More than 360 Nittany Lions have signed NFL contracts under Paterno's tutelage. The Hall of Fame coach has seen 247 of his players drafted by NFL squads, including 33 first round draft choices. Miami selected All-America defensive tackle Jared Odrick in the first round of the 2010 NFL Draft. Four Nittany Lions have been first round draft choices in the past six NFL drafts.

A total of 26 Penn State Football student-athletes have been drafted since 2006, with 13 in the first three rounds.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team in 40 of 45 title games, including 2011 when Andrew Quarless won an NFL title in his rookie season with the Green Bay Packers. Thirty-three former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 49 Super Bowl rings.

SEVEN FORMER NITTANY LIONS ON NFL COACHING STAFFS

Seven former Nittany Lions are patrolling the sidelines as part of NFL coaching staffs in 2011, including Mike Munchak, the first-year head coach of the Tennessee Titans.

The list of Penn Staters who are NFL assistant coaches includes: Gary Brown (Cleveland Browns), Sam Gash (Detroit Lions), Ron Heller (Jacksonville Jaguars), John McNulty (Arizona Cardinals), Darren Perry (Green Bay Packers), and Michael Zordich (Philadelphia Eagles).

Former six-year Penn State assistant Jim Caldwell is entering his third season as head coach of the Indianapolis Colts after leading the franchise to Super Bowl XLIV in his first year.

Football Bowl Subdivision, an average of more than six changes per institution, including 25 changes after the 2010 season and three during the 2011 season.

There have been 36 head coaches at the other Big Ten institutions since the Nittany Lions began conference play in 1993 (total does not include Big Ten newcomer Nebraska). Paterno is the dean of Big Ten coaches by six years over all his conference counterparts, with Iowa's Kirk Ferentz second in longevity (started in 1999).

PATERNO AMONG TRIO WITH 400 WINS

Joe Paterno is the all-time wins leader among FBS coaches (409) and one of only three coaches in NCAA history to record 400 victories.

During the 2010 season, the Hall of Fame coach joined John Gagliardi (483-active) and Eddie Robinson (408) as the only coaches in NCAA history with 400 victories. Penn State rallied from a 21-0 deficit to defeat Northwestern, 35-21, on Nov. 6, 2010 to give Paterno his 400th win in the greatest home comeback of his legendary career.

On October 29, 2011, Penn State beat Illinois, to move Paterno past Robinson for the all-time NCAA Division Llead with 409 victories.

Amos Alonzo Stagg's 578 games top all major college coaches. He is followed by Paterno (548), Bobby Bowden (522), Pop Warner (481) and Paul "Bear" Bryant (425).

Paterno's 46 years as head coach are the most at one institution all-time among major college coaches.

PATERNO HITS 700 GAMES ON PENN STATE STAFF

The Oct. 1 Indiana game marked Penn State's 700th game since Joe Paterno joined the Nittany Lions' coaching staff in 1950. Paterno followed Rip Engle, his head coach at Brown University, to State College when Engle was named the Nittany Lions' head coach in 1950. Paterno was an assistant coach for 16 seasons, was promoted to head coach in 1966 and is in his 46th season leading Penn State. He was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in 2007.

Since 1950, Penn State has earned a 513-184-7 record, with its 73.3 winning percentage good for No. 3 in the nation over the past 62

NEBRASKA COACH BO PELINI

Bo Pelini has a 37-14 record in his fourth year as coach of the Cornhuskers. Peini lead Nebrasksa to at least a share of the Big 12 North title in each of this initial three years as head coach. He was Nebraska's defensive coordinator in 2003 and returned to Lincoln after serving as LSU's defensive coordinator from 2005-07.

Pelini is a graduate of Cardinal Mooney High School in Youngstown, Ohio, which produced current Nittany Lion running backs Brandon Beachum and Michael Zordich. Pelini is a1990 graduate of Ohio State.

THE SERIES

The Nittany Lions and Cornhuskers are meeting for the 14th time, with Penn State leading the series, 7-6.

The teams are meeting for the first time since

an 18-10 Husker win in Lincoln in 2003 and the first time since a 40-7 Penn State win in Beaver Stadium in 2002.

Starting this year, Penn State and Nebraska will play on an annual basis as protected cross division rivals. The next meeting is Nov. 10, 2012 in Lincoln.

The teams first met in 1920, then met every year from 1949-52 and again in 1958. The squads also met from every season from 1979-83, with the Huskers winning three of the five contests, including in the 1983 Kickoff Classic.

Joe Paterno has been on the Penn State coaching staff for 11 of the previous 13 games in the series.

SCOUTING THE HUSKERS

Nebraska returns to Happy Valley for the first time since 2002 in its first visit as a Big Ten member. Nebraska saw its three-game winning streak come to an end last week, falling to Northwestern, 28-25, in Lincoln. The Huskers are 7-2 overall and 3-2 in conference play, positioned in a tie for second place in the Legends Division.

Nebraska scored 22 second half points against Northwestern, but dropped its first home game to a Big Ten opponent as a conference member. The Huskers rushed for 122 yards, well below their season average, but Taylor Martinez was 28 of 37 for 289 yards, with two touchdowns and no interceptions.

Sophomore dual threat signal-caller Martinez triggers the Nebraska offense, which averages 34.7 points and 412.2 yards per game, good for fourth in the Big Ten. Martinez has thrown for 1,545 yards, completing 118 of 201 passes (58.7 pct.), with 10 touchdowns and seven interceptions. He also ranks second on the team in rushing, totaling 712 yards (5.3 avg.) with nine touchdowns.

The Huskers are averaging 237.7 rushing ypg, good for No. 2 in the Big Ten and No. 13 in the

Junior I back Rex Burkhead is NU's offensive workhorse. He leads the team and ranks fourth in the Big Ten in rushing, compiling 951 yards on 187 carries (5.1) and 13 touchdowns, good for 105.7 ypg). He also contributes in the passing game, catching 14 passes for 129 yards and two touchdowns. Burkhead is second in the conference in scoring with 90 points.

Redshirt freshman wide receiver Kenny Bell tops Nebraska in receiving yards with 265 and is tied for the team lead in receptions (19) and touchdowns (2). Brandon Kinnie also has 19 catches for 192 yards and Jamal Turner has 15

receptions for 243 yards.

Junior linebacker Lavonte David headlines NU's Blackshirt defense. He tops the Huskers in tackles (88-fourth in the Big Ten) and tackles for loss (7) and is tied for the team lead in interceptions (2). The safety tandem of Daimion Stafford (58 tackles, 7 pass break-ups) and Austin Cassidy (47 tackles, 2 interceptions) anchor the secondary. The defensive line is without All-American tackle Jared Crick, who suffered a season-ending injury in October. Junior defensive end Cameron Meredith has a team-high four sacks.

Junior Brett Maher handles both the placekicking and punting duties. Maher leads the Big Ten in kick scoring with 81 points (third in overall

scoring) converting on 15-of-18 field goal attempts, with a long of 50 yards, and 36-of-36 PATs. He is also tied for first in the Big Ten in punting, averaging 45.5 yards per kick.

LAST MEETING

A hard-fought, resilient effort by the Nittany Lions fell just short in Memorial Stadium, as the No. 18 Cornhuskers earned an 18-10 win on Sept. 13, 2003.

The Cornhuskers ran the ball 72 times, the most by a Penn State foe since 1977, gained 337 yards rushing and held the ball for 39:45 compared to the Lions' 20:15. Penn State managed just 44 yards rushing on 21 carries, and gained 203 total yards.

Despite the big advantage in numbers, the Nittany Lions were in the game until less than three minutes remained, when a Zack Mills fourth down pass fell incomplete from the NU 44. Nebraska took possession and ran out the clock.

The Cornhuskers ran 78 plays (to PSU's 54), but could reach the end zone only once against the resilient Nittany Lion defense.

LAST MEETING IN STATE COLLEGE

Penn State tallied 20 points in the third quarter and grabbed three second half interceptions en route to a 40-7 victory over No. 7 Nebraska on Sept. 14, 2002 in State College.

Playing in front of an electric Beaver Stadium record crowd of 110,753, the No. 25 Nittany Lions led just 13-7 at halftime but gained control in the second half to hand the Cornhuskers their first loss of the season.

The win was Penn State's first over a top 10 team since beating No. 8 Miami in 1999.

The Nittany Lion defense was superb in limiting the Huskers to their fewest points since a 19-0 loss at Arizona State in 1996. Penn State forced six punts and grabbed three interceptions on NU's 11 possessions.

With Penn State leading 19-7 midway through the third quarter, cornerback Rich Gardner grabbed his first career interception and took it 42 yards to paydirt to break the game open. Gardner made eight tackles and had two pass break-ups to earn Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week honors.

Zack Mills was 19 of 31 for 259 yards with no interceptions and quarterback Michael Robinson ran for 56 yards and two scores. Tailback Larry Johnson powered his way to his first career 100-yard rushing game, gaining 123 yards on 19 carries and scoring twice en route to winning the Doak Walker Award.

THRILLER IN 1982 MEETING

On September 25, 1982, the Nittany Lions defeated the No. 2 Cornhuskers, 27-24, in arguably the most exciting game in Beaver Stadium history.

Penn State grabbed leads of 14-0 and 21-7, but a one-yard TD run by quarterback Turner Gill gave the Huskers a 24-21 lead with just 1:18 to play in the game.

After the score, three Todd Blackledge completions and a six-yard run got the ball to the Nebraska

PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN OUTSTANDING 88 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to statistical information released in October 2011 by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 80 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2001-02 through 2004-05. The 88 percent figure was third to Northwestern (96) and Illinois (89) among Big Ten institutions.

The Penn State football team earned a record GSR of 87 percent, tied with Stanford for the top graduation rate among teams in this week's BCS rankings and AP Top 25 poll. The Nittany Lion basketball (90 percent) and Lady Lion basketball (100) teams also earned graduation rates at least 15 percent higher than the national average.

This is the 21st annual release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes as it has since 1990.

The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 79 percent, second to Northwestern (88) among Big Ten schools, and significantly above the 64 percent Division I average.

Among the 2004-05 entering freshman class, 80 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, up from 76 percent last year and well above the 65 percent average for all Division I institutions. Penn State's 80 percent figure was second-highest among Big Ten schools, trailing only Northwestern (85).

The NCAA data revealed that student-athletes from six Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent -- Lady Lion basketball, field hockey, women's golf, men's gymnastics, men's tennis and women's tennis – and eight additional teams were at 90 percent or higher.

Other highlights from the NCAA Graduation Rates Report:

- The Penn State Football (87 percent compared to 67), Nittany Lion Basketball (90 to 66 percent) and Lady Lion Basketball (100 to 84 percent) teams all earned four-year Graduation Success Rates considerably higher than the national average for their sport. Coach Patrick Chambers' Nittany Lions ranked second in the Big Ten with their 90 percent GSR score. Coach Coquese Washington's Lady Lions were tied for first in the Big Ten with their 100 percent GSR average.

- The 2004-05 entering class for Coach Joe Paterno's Nittany Lions' earned a stellar 84 percent graduation rate, which was highest among Big Ten Conference teams (Northwestern was second at 80 percent). The record 87 percent GSR figure for the Penn State football program was second to Northwestern among all Big Ten gridiron teams. Penn State football student-athletes earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 80 percent, also second to Northwestern among Big Ten football teams.

The record 87 percent GSR figure for Coach Joe Paterno's Nittany Lion football program was tied with Stanford for the top graduation rate among teams in the Oct. 30 BCS rankings and AP Top 25 poll.

Blackledge then hit tight end Mike McCloskey just inside the left sideline at the two. The standout signal-caller then rifled a low throw to tight end Kirk Bowman who cradled the catch for the winning score with just four seconds to play. Bowman had opened the scoring with a 14-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter.

The teams combined for 977 yards and each side had three turnovers. Blackledge was 23 of 39 for 295 yards and three touchdowns. A then-record crowd of 85,304 was on hand in Beaver Stadium.

PREP TEAMMATES MEET

Several high school teammates will be on opposite sidelines Saturday:

- Penn State TB Brandon Beachum and RB Michael Zordich played at Cardinal Mooney High School, as did Nebraska's Braylon Heard, Tim Marlowe and Mark Pelini.

RED ZONE IMPROVEMENT

Through the initial six games of the season, Penn State was 17 of 23 (74 percent) in the Red Zone, with 11 touchdowns and six field goals.

The Nittany Lions have improved inside the 20-yard-line the past three games, scoring on 11 of 13 (85 percent) trips into the Red Zone. Penn State has scored six touchdowns and kicked five field goals

in the wins over Purdue, Northwestern and Illinois.

Against the Wildcats, the Nittany Lions were officially 4 of 5 in the Red Zone (3 TD, 1 FG, took a knee at end of game). Penn State was 2 of 2 in the Red Zone against Illinois, including a three-yard touchdown run by Silas Redd with 1:08 to play for the winning score.

For the season, Penn State is 28 of 36 (78 percent) in the Red Zone with 17 touchdowns and 11 field goals.

TOUGH IN TIGHT GAMES

Penn State is 104-53-3 under Joe Paterno in games decided by seven points or less, going 42-23 in such contests since starting Big Ten play in 1993.

The Nittany Lions are 4-0 in games decided by seven points or less this season.

Penn State is 6-0 in games decided by 10 points or less, its most wins in such games since winning seven games by seven points or less in 1985.

NOTING HEAD COACH JOE PATERNO

- 46th season as Penn State head coach and 62nd year as a member of the PSU coaching staff, Paterno has been on the sideline for 701 Penn State games (704 games on staff). His 46 years in Happy Valley are a record for longevity among major college coaches at one school.
- First all-time in career victories among Football Bowl Subdivision (Division I-A) coaches. Became first FBS coach with 400 wins with 35-21 win over Northwestern on Nov. 6, 2010, as PSU erased 21-0 deficit
- Owns a career record of 409-136-3. His winning percentage of 74.7 was third-best among
- active FBS coaches entering the 2011 season (minimum 10 years as an FBS coach). Broke the record for career wins by a major college coach, passing Paul "Bear" Bryant, with his
- 324th victory in a thrilling 29-27 win over Ohio State on Oct. 27, 2001. Re-gained the lead for career wins by a major college coach, breaking a tie with Bobby Bowden, with his
- 376th victory, 45-3 over Temple on Sept. 20, 2008. Ranks second all-time in games coached (548) among major college coaches.

NOTES ON COACH JOE PATERNO

62 YEARS IN HAPPY VALLEY

Joe Paterno is in his 62nd season as a member of the Penn State coaching staff. He came to Penn State with new head coach Rip Engle before graduating from Brown University in 1950. After 16 seasons as an assistant coach under Engle, Paterno was named the Nittany Lions' 14th head football coach on February 19, 1966. The Hall of Fame mentor is in his 46th season as head coach.

ALL-TIME LEADER IN BOWL WINS AND APPEARANCES

Joe Paterno owns a post-season record of 24-12-1, a winning percentage of 66.2, including a 17-8 mark in New Year's bowl games. Paterno is the all-time leader in bowl wins and appearances (37) and his winning percentage is No. 3 all-time among coaches with at least 20 bowl appearances.

PATERNO AMONG ELITE GROUP OF BIG TEN COACHES

Joe Paterno is one of just six coaches in Big Ten history to win at least 140 games at one institution, ranking No. 5.

The Nebraska game will be Joe Paterno's 549th as head coach

Amos Alonzo Stagg's 578 games top all major college coaches. He is followed by Paterno (548), Bobby Bowden (522), Pop Warner (481) and Paul "Bear" Bryant (425).

Paterno made his head coaching debut on Sept. 17, 1966, earning a 15-7 win over Maryland before a Beaver Stadium crowd of 40,911.

700TH GAME COACHED IN

The Northwestern game was the 700th contest Joe Paterno has coached in since joining the Nittany Lions' staff in 1950 and his 703rd as a staff member.

The Indiana game was Paterno's 700th as a member of the coaching staff, with the total rising to 704 through the Illinois game (see below).

In his 62nd season as a member of the Penn State staff, Paterno followed Rip Engle from Brown to Penn State after graduating in 1950 and was involved in 155 games as an assistant coach from 1950-65. He was promoted to head coach in 1966.

Paterno has missed just three games in his career. As an assistant coach, he missed the 1955 game at Army when his father, Angelo, died. As head coach in 1977, Joe and Sue Paterno's son, David, was involved in a serious trampoline accident the day before the Lions' game at Syracuse and Paterno did not attend the contest.

Paterno missed the Nov. 11, 2006 game with Temple, which took place five days after he had surgery on his left leg, which was injured in a sideline

collision at Wisconsin on Nov. 4, 2006.

Paterno's first game on the Penn State staff was Sept. 30, 1950, a 34-14 win vs. Georgetown. The Nittany Lions have earned a 513-184-7 record with Paterno on the staff, with their 73.3 winning percentage third-best nationally since 1950.

LIONS EARN 500TH WIN WITH PATERNO ON STAFF

The 24-0 blanking of Kent State on Sept. 18, 2011 was Penn State's 500th victory since Joe Paterno joined the coaching staff in 1950.

In his 62nd year on the Penn State coaching staff, Paterno followed his coach at Brown University, Rip Engle, to Penn State as he was completing his degree at Brown. Engle compiled a 104-48-4 record from 1950-65, with Paterno being named head coach on February 19, 1966.

Joe Paterno received the 2011 NCAA President's Gerald R. Ford Award from Mark Emmert at the NCAA Convention in January.

The NCAA President's Gerald R. Ford Award, named in recognition of former President Gerald Ford, honors an individual who has provided significant leadership as an advocate for intercollegiate athletics on a continuous basis over the course of their career.

Paterno is the ninth recipient of the Ford Award. Previous winners include former NCAA President Myles Brand, Billie Jean King, James Frank, Christine Grant, Birch Bayh, John Wooden and Rev. Theodore M. Hesburgh. their resources.

Smith has been living with ALS, also known as Lou Gehrig's disease, for nine years. While most diagnosed with the disease survive only a couple of years (Gehrig lived only a year after he was diagnosed), Smith continues to fight.

As a senior in 1986, Smith helped lead Penn State to its second national championship. Smith was a 6-foot-1, 235-pound fullback who wore No. 33. During his Nittany Lion career he had 1,259 rushing yards, 31 receptions for 293 yards, and scored 13 touchdowns.

He was drafted by the Los Angeles Raiders and had a nine-year NFL career with the Raiders and Seattle Seahawks. While primarily a blocker, he finished his career with 1,627 rushing yards, had 131 receptions for 1,250 yards, and scored 22 touchdowns.

Now, though, Smith has lost the ability to control his muscles, is bedridden, and can no longer walk or talk. Smith relies on a computer controlled by his eye movements as his sole means to communicate.

Smith's fight has come at a cost. He wisely saved for retirement during his nine-year pro football career, but he has drained that fund and his family's financial cushion to keep up with medical expenses.

Smith lives in Richardson, Texas, with his wife, Chie, and their two children, Dante, 21, and Jazmin,

SPECIAL TEAMS KEY WIN OVER PURDUE; POWELL NO. 7 IN NATION IN KICK RETURNS

Placekicker/punter Anthony Fera's superb performance, which netted Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honors, was only part of Penn State's strong special teams effort in the win over Purdue.

After the Boilermakers drew within 20-18 with 8:08 to play in the game, senior CB/KR Chaz Powell unleashed a thrilling 92-yard, stop-and-go kickoff return to the Purdue three-yard-line. The Nittany Lions were called for unsportsmanlike conduct after the play and took possession at the Purdue 18-yard-line, with Fera connecting on a 29-yard field goal for a 23-18 lead with 6:24 to play.

Early in the third quarter, WR/PR Justin Brown zipped 33 yards on a punt return to give Penn State the ball at the Purdue 31. The return was the longest of his career and the Nittany Lions' longest this season. Fera hit a 29-yard field goal for a 13-6 margin.

Powell is No. 7 in the nation in kickoff returns with a 31.3 yard average on his 15 returns. He took the opening kickoff the season 95 yards for a touchdown vs. Indiana State for his second career kickoff return score

NITTANY LIONS WIN 250TH GAME IN BEAVER STADIUM

Penn State's 13-3 win over lowa was its 250th all-time in Beaver Stadium. Penn State has a 251-62 record (80.2) in Beaver Stadium since the facility was erected in 1960, including 15 unbeaten seasons.

Beaver Stadium's capacity of 106,572 is the nation's second-largest.

PENN STATE WINS 50TH BIG TEN HOME GAME

The Nittany Lions' 13-3 win over lowa also was their 50th Big Ten home win since starting conference play in 1993. Penn State is 51-23 in Big Ten home games and has a 94-54 overall conference record.

FERA EARNS SECOND BIG TEN HONOR

Placekicker Anthony Fera earned his second Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week honor in October after tying his career-high with three field goals and effectively punting and kicking off in Penn State's 23-18 win over Purdue on Oct. 15.

A redshirt sophomore, Fera also was honored on Oct. 3 after Penn State's win at Indiana.

In his fourth game as the Nittany Lions' field goal kicker, Fera connected from 29, 40 and 29 yards, despite winds gusting above 40 mph during the game. His 40-yard effort in the third quarter was a careerlong and his three field goals tied his career-high, set against Indiana.

Fera punted six times for a 44.5 average, with three kicks downed inside the Purdue 20-yard-line. The former St. Pius X standout launched a 69-yard punt, second-longest of his career, that was downed at the Purdue two-yard-line with 2:36 to play and the Lions up 23-18. The punt was tied for 12th-longest in school history. Fera also kicked off five times for a 65.6-yard average and one touchback.

Fera is the first Nittany Lion since Chris Bahr in 1975 to be the starter for field goals, kick offs and punts.

McGLOIN HITS 10TH PLACE IN 200-YARD PASSING IN FIRST 10 GAMES

Matt McGloin delivered the seventh 200-yard passing game of his career (in first 10 career games), in the Oct. 1 win at Indiana to move into sole possession of 10th place on the school list.

Entering the game late in the first quarter, McGloin threw for 204 yards against the Hoosiers. He threw a 74-yard scoring strike to Derek Moye, the longest completion of his career, in the third quarter for a 13-3 lead.

With seven 200-yard games, McGloin broke a tie with John Hufnagel and Mike McQueary, the Nittany Lions' receivers coach. Michael Robinson is No. 9 with eight 200-yard efforts.

For the season, McGloin is 90 of 162 for 1,193 yards, with seven touchdowns and three interceptions

THREE PENN STATE GAMES AMONG BTN'S 40-PLUS FOOTBALL GAMES THIS SEASON

Three Penn State games have been among the Big Ten Network's 40-plus games this season, with each school making a minimum of two appearances, including at least one conference game.

The Nittany Lions' Oct. 22 contest at Northwestern aired in prime time on BTN. The Purdue and Indiana State games also aired on BTN. Additional Nittany Lion games may air on BTN later this season.

BTN televised three Penn State football games in 2010 and four Nittany Lion contests in 2009.

The Big Ten Network is available to more than 80 million homes across the United States and Canada, and has agreements with more than 300 affiliates.

BTN, though, is not carried by Adams and Blue Ridge Cable in Pennsylvania. The network also is not available to Armstrong Cable customers in western Pennsylvania and in the Medina and Youngstown, Ohio areas. A combined total of approximately 35,000 Penn State alumni live in communities served by the three cable providers, in addition to thousands more fans and current Penn State students.

The Big Ten Network will televise approximately

700 events in 2011-12, all in HD, including 40-45 football games, at least 110 men's basketball games, at least 55 women's basketball games, Olympic sport events and conference championships.

The Big Ten Network is available in more than 95 percent of the homes in the nine Big Ten states and 19 of the nation's top 20 markets.

PENN STATE WINS FIRST LEADERS DIVISION GAME

The Penn State defense forced two turnovers and kept Indiana out of the end zone until late in the game to register a 16-10 win in Bloomington on Oct. 1 in the first Big Ten Leaders Division game. The Nittany Lions improved to 10-3 in Big Ten road games over the past four seasons.

The Nittany Lions won their Big Ten opener on the road for the first time since the 2005 contest at Northwestern, having lost their last three conference openers away from Beaver Stadium.

BIG TEN OPENERS

The Nittany Lions improved to 8-11 in Big Ten opening games with their Oct. 1 win at Indiana.

Penn State opened Big Ten play on the road for the 11th time in 19 years and improved to 5-6 in such games. The Nittany Lions will open conference action on the road in 2012 (at Illinois) and 2013 (at Indiana).

BUTKUS AWARD CANDIDATE MAUTI TO MISS REST OF SEASON

Penn State starting outside linebacker Michael Mauti (Mandeville, La.) will miss the remainder of the season after suffering a serious knee injury in the victory over Eastern Michigan on Sept. 24.

A redshirt junior, Mauti tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee during the first quarter, according to Dr. Wayne Sebastianelli, Penn State Director of Athletic Medicine. Mauti will have surgery within the next two weeks and rehabilitation will take a minimum of nine months, according to Sebastianelli.

The Nittany Lions' leading tackler entering the Eastern Michigan game, Mauti suffered a serious knee injury for the second time. During pre-season practice in August 2009, he tore his right ACL and missed the entire season. He took a medical redshirt in 2009 after playing as a true freshman in 2008.

A pre-season first-team All-Big Ten choice and Butkus Award candidate, Mauti entered the Eastern Michigan game with a team-high 20 tackles and tied for the team lead with 3.0 tackles for loss. The former Mandeville High School All-American made a career-high 13 hits vs. No. 3 Alabama on Sept. 10. Mauti recorded six solo tackles in the Sept. 17 win at Temple, tying his career-high with 3.0 TFL, and made a diving interception that led to the game-winning touchdown drive in the fourth quarter.

For the season, Mauti made 21 tackles. He also had one interception, 3.0 TFL and three pass breakups.



BOUNCING BACK

Penn State is 15-3 in its next game after a loss since the start of the 2005 season. The Nittany Lions are 17-3 after a loss if the 2009 and 2011 season opening wins are included.

QUARTET ELECTED CAPTAINS

A quartet of senior standouts were elected captains of the 2011 Penn State football team.

Safety Drew Astorino (Edinboro), tackle Quinn Barham (Durham, N.C.), wide receiver Derek Moye (Rochester) and defensive tackle Devon Still (Wilmington, Del.) were selected by their teammates in voting the week of the season opener.

NINE GRADUATES ON ROSTER

Penn State boasts nine players on the 2011 roster that have already graduated.

The nine Nittany Lions that have graduated are either enrolled in a second undergraduate degree or are taking graduate level courses.

LIONS LEAD NATION IN UNBEATEN REGULAR SEASONS SINCE 1966

Joe Paterno has led Penn State to seven unbeaten, untied regular seasons since becoming head coach in 1966, the most of any team in the nation.

The Nittany Lions have earned five unbeaten, untied seasons under Paterno (1968, '69, '73, '86, '94), with two teams (1978, '85) losing in national championship bowl games.

LIONS OWN NATION'S THIRD-BEST MARK SINCE 1950

It should come as no surprise that Penn State has the nation's third-best record since Joe Paterno joined the coaching staff in 1950.

The Indiana game was Paterno's 700th as a member of the Nittany Lion staff.

Oklahoma is the leader with a 538-166-12 mark (75.8), followed by Ohio State (502-157-15, 75.7), Penn State (513-184-7, 73.3), Nebraska (523-193-9, 72.7) and Texas (505-197-10, 71.7).

NON-CONFERENCE SUCCESS

Penn State has a 67-15 (81.7) record in non-conference games since starting Big Ten play in 1993, including wins against: Arizona, Auburn, Florida State, LSU, Louisville (2), Miami (Fla.), Maryland, Nebraska, Notre Dame, Oregon, Oregon State, Pittsburgh (3), South Florida, USC (3), Southern Miss (2), Tennessee (2), Texas, Texas A&M (2), Texas Tech, Virginia and UCF (2).

The Nittany Lions have won 20 of their last 24 non-conference games, with the lone losses coming to USC (2009 Rose Bowl), to Alabama (2010 and '11) and to Florida (2011 Outback Bowl).

SEVEN BOWL TEAMS ON SLATE

The Nittany Lions will face seven teams that played in bowl games last year, including four at home. Among the teams coming to Beaver Stadium this fall are 2010 bowl teams: Alabama (Capital One), Iowa (Insight), Illinois (Texas) and Nebraska (Holiday). Penn State also will face three bowl teams on the road in Northwestern (Ticket City), Ohio State (Sugar) and Wisconsin (Rose).

NITTANY LIONS' 1986 NATIONAL CHAMPION-SHIP TEAM HONORED AT IOWA CLASH

The Nittany Lions' 1986 National Championship football team, one of the elite squads in Penn State's storied gridiron history, was reunited at the Oct. 8 Big Ten home opener against lowa in Beaver Stadium.

The 1986 Nittany Lions recorded an unblemished 12-0 record after defeating No. 1 Miami (Fla.) in a thrilling title clash en route to their second national championship in four years under Coach Joe Paterno. The 2011 season marks the 25th anniversary of Penn State's memorable championship run.

More than 60 members of the 1986 squad were on hand for the Iowa game, including three of the team captains, Shane Conlan, John Shaffer and Bob White.

The 1986 team's fourth captain, fullback Steve Smith, has amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) and was represented by his parents, Morris and Norma Smith, and children, Dante and Jazmin.

Among the other team members who attended are: All-Americans Chris Conlin, D.J. Dozier, Tim Johnson and Blair Thomas, as well as Trey Bauer, Tom Bill, Pete Curkendall, John Greene, Eddie Johnson, Matt Johnson, Keith Karpinski, Matt Knizner, Lance Lonergan, Massimo Manca, Tim Manoa, Quintus McDonald, Al Polamalu, Paul Pomfret, Keith Radecic, Ray Roundtree, Mark Sherburne and Brian Silverling.

The 1986 season was capped by Penn State's epic 14-10, down to the wire, victory over Miami in the Fiesta Bowl. In the "Duel in the Desert" on January 2, 1987 in Tempe, Ariz., the Nittany Lions picked off Hurricanes' quarterback Vinny Testaverde five times to help secure the victory. Linebacker Pete Giftopoulos hauled in the final interception of the night inside the Penn State five-yard line as Testaverde took one last shot at the end zone on fourth and goal. Giftopoulos ran the ball out to the 10-yard line before falling to the ground with nine seconds left, securing the pulsating victory.

More than 70 million people watched the thrilling prime-time telecast on NBC, breaking the previous record for a college football telecast.

The 1986 Nittany Lions are one of five Paternoled teams that finished the season unbeaten, joining the 1968 (11-0), 1969 (11-0), 1973 (12-0) and 1994 (12-0) squads.

The 1986 season also was highlighted by a Nittany Lion defense that held nine opponents to 15 points or less, while also winning four games by six points or fewer. On Sept. 6, 1986, the Nittany Lions played the first night game at Beaver Stadium in the season opener against Temple. That year, Penn State finished the regular season by beating Maryland (17-15), Notre Dame (24-19) and Pitt (34-14). The Lions also defeated No. 2 Alabama, 23-3, just the third loss by the Crimson Tide at Bryant-Denny Stadium in 25 years.

The 1986 team produced many Penn State household names, including team captains, Shane Conlan, John Shaffer, Steve Smith and Bob White. The team also produced four All-Americans, as linebacker Conlan, tackle Chris Conlin, running back D.J. Dozier and defensive tackle Tim Johnson all were honored.

A program record 13 Nittany Lions were selected in the 1987 NFL Draft, led by first round picks Conlan (Buffalo) and Dozier (Minnesota).

NOTES FROM PREVIOUS GAMES:

NITS AT NIGHT

Penn State played at least one regular season night game for the 12th consecutive season. Last year, the Nittany Lions played night games at Alabama and lowa and at home vs. Michigan.

After its 34-24 win at Northwestern, Penn State has a 37-22 overall record in night games, going 8-7 at home, 18-8 on the road, 1-1 at regular season neutral sites and 10-6 in bowl games.

The Lions' night games over the past 12 seasons: Northwestern (2011), Alabama, Iowa and Michigan (2010); Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007), Michigan (2006), Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005), Minnesota and Boston College (2004), Nebraska (2002 and '03), Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).

PENN STATE THROTTLES PURDUE

The Penn State defense forced three turnovers for the fifth time this season and Silas Redd ran for 131 yards and a touchdown in the Nittany Lions' 23-18 win over Purdue Oct. 15 in front of a Homecoming audience in Beaver Stadium.

The defense grabbed a season-high three interceptions, two by senior linebacker Nate Stupar, including one with 1:59 to play to help seal the game. Penn State increased its turnover total to 17 for the season, matching its total from 2010 with five games to play. The Nittany Lions held the Boilermakers 14 points below their 32.6 ppg average.

Redd gained 125 yards or more for the third consecutive game, becoming the first Nittany Lion with three straight 100-yard efforts since all-time leading rusher Evan Royster in 2009.

The Penn State special teams also had a huge day. Anthony Fera was 3 of 3 on field goals on a day that featured gusts above 50 mph on campus and boomed a 69-yard punt that was downed at the Purdue two-yard-line late in the game. Chaz Powell delivered an electric 92-yard kickoff return to set-up a field goal midway through the fourth quarter. Justin Brown had a team season-long 33-yard punt return in the third quarter to set-up a 40-yard Fera field goal.

SUPERB DEFENSIVE EFFORT LIFTS LIONS PAST HAWKEYES

Penn State has played staunch defense all season, but delivered its best performance in the 13-3 win over lowa. The Nittany Lions limited lowa to just a field goal, nearly 35 points less than half the Hawkeyes' season average of 37.8 ppg entering the game.

lowa was held to three or fewer points for the first time since a 23-3 loss to lowa State on in 2005. The Hawkeyes were held to three points or fewer in a Big Ten game for the first time since a 31-0 loss to Illinois in 2000.

lowa's three points were the fewest Penn State has allowed in a Big Ten game since beating Minnesota, 20-0. in 2009.

The Hawkeyes came into the game averaging 421.8 ypg (281.2 passing ypg) and were held to 253 yards by Penn State (84 rush, 169 pass).

The Nittany Lions recorded a season-high five sacks. The Hawkeyes had allowed a total of five sacks in their first four games.

Senior co-captain Drew Astorino recorded a career-high 11 tackles vs. lowa, with 0.5 tackles for loss and a pass break-up. He had 10 tackles against letticase in 2000

Senior co-captain Devon Still had another big game, with six tackles, including 1.5 TFL and a sack for minus-12 yards. DT Jordan Hill and LB Glenn Carson also had six hits. Linebacker Gerald Hodges made five stops, with a sack and a forced fumble and LB Khairi Fortt made five hits, including a sack for minus-13 yards.

RUNNING GAME DELIVERS AGAINST IOWA; REDD AND DUKES POST CAREER HIGHS

The Nittany Lions produced their best rushing performance of the season in the win over lowa, gaining 231 yards on 46 carries (5.0). The total was Penn State's second-highest total of season (245 yards vs. Indiana State).

The success of the ground was highlighted by a punishing touchdown drive in the fourth quarter to give Penn State a 13-3 lead. Getting the ball at the lowa 49 after Gerald Hodges forced a fumble, Penn State ran the ball 10 consecutive plays, earning four first downs.

Silas Redd carried five times for 30 yards and

Curtis Dukes had three carries for 20 yards to set-up Matt McGloin's two-yard touchdown pass to tight end Kevin Haplea for a 13-3 lead with 8:08 to play.

Redd ran for a then-career-best 142 yards on 28 carries. His previous career-best had been 131 yards last season against Northwestern.

Redd also caught two passes for eight yards, giving him then-career best 150 all-purpose yards.

Dukes broke his career-best for the second straight week, punishing his way to 60 yards on nine carries. His previous career-high was 54 yards at Indiana.

In addition to opening running lanes, Penn State's veteran offensive line did not allow any sacks against the Hawkeyes.

The effective ground game enabled Penn State to hold a significant advantage in time of possession in the win over lowa, 35:54 to 24:06.

McGLOIN EARNS BIG TEN ACCOLADES

Penn State quarterback Matt McGloin (Scranton) was selected Big Ten Co-Offensive Player of the Week after completing 14 of 17 passes and throwing three touchdowns to help spark Penn State to a 34-6 win over Eastern Michigan.

A junior, McGloin shared his first career conference honor with Michigan quarterback Denard Robinson.

McGloin entered the game early in the second quarter with Penn State leading, 3-0. He led the Nittany Lions to three touchdown drives on his four possessions and left the game in the third period with Penn State leading 31-0. On McGloin's fourth possesion, he completed a pass to running back Michael Zordich, but he fumbled at the EMU 1-yard line and the ball went out of the end zone for a touchback.

The former West Scranton High School standout connected with nine different receivers among his 14 completions. He threw a 27-yard touchdown pass to running back Joe Suhey to give Penn State a 10-0 lead. He then connected with wideout Derek Moye on five and 20-yard scoring strikes. The three touchdown passes were second-highest in McGloin's career, trailing only the four vs. Northwestern last season.

McGloin delivered the sixth 200-yard passing game of his career, finishing with 220 yards, completing 82.3 percent of his passes.

McGloin combined with quarterbacks Rob Bolden (115 yds, 1 TD), Garrett Venuto (17 yds) and Shane McGregor (12 yds) for 364 passing yards, the eighth-highest total under Joe Paterno.

LIONS BEGIN NEW NON-CONFERENCE HOME WIN STREAK

Penn State started a new non-conference home win streak when it defeated Eastern Michigan. The Nittany Lions' 23-game non-conference home winning streak was snapped with the loss to No. 3/2 Alabama on Sept. 10. The streak had been tied for second-longest in the nation with Florida.

Prior to the Alabama game, the Nittany Lions' last non-conference loss in Beaver Stadium had been to Boston College on Sept. 6, 2003.

DEFENSE DELIVERS IN WIN OVER TEMPLE

The Penn State defense limited previously unbeaten Temple to 10 points and forced three turnovers, including two in the the fourth quarter, to lift the Nittany Lions to a 14-10 win in Philadelphia.

Temple entered the game averaging 41.5 ppg. The Owls averaged 445.5 ypg in their first two games, but were limited to 197 by Penn State. Temple was averaging 272.5 ypg rushing, but was held to 74 yards on 30 carries by the Nittany Lions.

Talented RB Bernard Pierce had gained 297 yards in the initial two contests, but was held to just 50 yards on 17 carries (2.9) by Penn State.

Michael Mauti made a diving interception, the first of his career at the Temple 44 with 8:46 to play. The Lions converted two fourth down plays during their game-winning drive, capped by Michael Zordich's 1-yard run with 2:42 to play. DE Sean Stanley capped

his best career game, by forcing a fumble on a sack on fourth down from the PSU 34 yard-line with 1:01 to go.

STANLEY A FORCE IN TOP CAREER GAME

Earning his second start of the season, junior DE Sean Stanley delivered the top game of his career in the win over Temple.

Stanley tied his career-high with five tackles (four solo), had 2.0 TFL, a sack and was in on two forced fumbles. He finished Temple's last drive by sacking Mike Gerardi on fourth down from the Penn State 34 and forcing a fumble.

Stanley combined with LB Glenn Carson to force Bernard Pierce to fumble in the third quarter. The ball was recovered by safety Nick Sukay, his third career fumble recovery, at the Penn State 48.

THIRD NFL STADIUM IN LAST TWO YEARS

In the win over Temple, the Nittany Lions played in their third stadium in the past six games that is home to a National Football League team.

Penn State played in Lincoln Financial Field for the second time, having played Temple in the Philadelphia Eagles' facility on Nov. 10, 2007. The Nittany Lions squared off against Indiana at FedexField on Nov. 20, 2010 and played Florida in the 2011 Outback Bowl in Raymond James Stadium on New Year's Day.

Penn State has played in seven stadiums that currently are home to an NFL team: in Lincoln Financial Field (Eagles), Raymond James Stadium (Buccaneers), FedExField (Redskins), Louisiana Superdome (Saints), The

Metrodome (Vikings), Qualcomm Stadium (Chargers) and Sun Life Stadium (Dolphins).

Penn State has played five of the above stadiums since the 2005 season.

LINEBACKER U. TRIO SET TACKLE HIGHS VS. ALABAMA

"Linebacker U.'s" starting unit all set career-highs in tackles against No. 3/2 Alabama. Junior OLB Michael Mauti recorded a career-high 13 tackles and had two pass break-ups. It was the third time in his last seven games where he recorded at least 10 tackles. His previous high was 11 hits last season against Northwestern.

Junior OLB Gerald Hodges made a then-careerbest 11 tackles vs. the Crimson Tide. His previous high was six against Florida in the 2011 Outback Bowl. Sophomore MLB Glenn Carson also tallied a career-best 11 tackles. His previous high was six last year against Indiana at FedEx Field.

POWELL EARNS BIG TEN HONOR

Penn State cornerback Chaz Powell was selected Big Ten Co-Special Teams Player of the Week after returning the opening kickoff for a touchdown to help spark Penn State to a 41-7 win over Indiana State on Sept. 3.

A senior, Powell shared his first career conference honor with Nebraska kicker Brett Maher.

Powell's 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown on the opening kick was the second of his career. He returned a kickoff 100 yards last year against Youngstown State on the opening kickoff of the second half—the last time that a kick had been returned for a touchdown by Penn State prior to the ISU game.

TRIO OF TRUE FRESHMEN MAKE DEBUT

Three Nittany Lion true freshmen made their debuts in the season opener vs. Indiana State: CB Adrian Amos, PK Sam Ficken and WR Allen Robinson.

True freshman wideout Bill Belton increased the total to four when he played at Temple.

Amos returned a fourth quarter interception 46 yards to the Indiana State 12-yard-line to set-up Shane McGregor's three-yard touchdown run. Amos made two tackles, also seeing action on special teams.

Ficken made his debut in the second half, connect-

ing on a PAT attempt and kicking off once.

BIG TEN WELCOMES NEBRASKA

Penn State's 19th season of Big Ten competition brought the most significant changes in the conference's 116 years. Nebraska officially joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011 and began football play this fall, with the 12 institutions split into the Leaders and Legends Divisions.

The Nittany Lions are in the Leaders Division with Illinois, Indiana, Ohio State, Purdue and Wisconsin and will play their division foes every season, as well as protected crossover opponent Nebraska. Penn State will play two other teams from the Legends Division each season on a rotating basis, with Iowa and Northwestern set for the 2011 and '12 seasons. Michigan, Michigan State and Minnesota are the other Legends Division members, with the Wolverines and Golden Gophers rotating back onto to the Nittany Lions' schedule in 2013.

The winners of the Leaders and Legends Divisions will play in the inaugural Big Ten Championship Game in primetime on Saturday, Dec. 3 at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis. Fox Sports is the official television partner of the 2011-16 Big Ten Championship games. The contest will kick at 8:00 p.m. ET.

Lucas Oil Stadium, home of the NFL's Indianapolis Colts, will be the site for the 2011-16 Big Ten Championship Games.

The winner of the Big Ten Championship Game will either play in the Rose Bowl Game or Bowl Championship Series National Championship Game.

STAGG-PATERNO CHAMPIONSHIP TROPHY AWARDED TO BIG TEN WINNER

The winning team in the Big Ten Football Championship Game will earn the Stagg-Paterno Championship Trophy. The trophy pays homage to Paterno and Amos Alonzo Stagg, who won 199 games at University of Chicago when the Maroons were Big Ten members.

Paterno ranks fifth among Big Ten coaches all-time with 162 wins since the Nittany Lions began conference play in 1993. Stagg's win total is second-highest total in Big Ten history.

NATION'S NO. 2 BOWL WINNING PERCENTAGE

The Nittany Lions are 27-14-2 overall in bowl games, with their 65.1 winning percentage second in the nation among schools that have at least 20 bowl appearances. Penn State trails only USC, which has a 32-16 (66.7) post-season mark.

Penn State ranks No. 3 in the nation with its 27 bowl wins and No. 8 with 43 appearances.

BOWL LEADER AMONG BIG TEN TEAMS

Penn State leads all Big Ten institutions in bowl victories (27), appearances (43) and winning percentage (65.1). The Nittany Lions are 10-4 in post-season contests since starting Big Ten competition in 1993, winning four of their last six bowl games, including three New Year's games (FedEx Orange, Outback, Capital One).

AMONG BEST IN BCS AND NEW YEAR'S BOWLS

Over the past six years, the Nittany Lions have won two Big Ten Championships, won four bowl games and played in five New Year's or Bowl Championship



Series (BCS) games, the nation's third-highest total.

Joe Paterno has led Penn State to 25 New Year's or BCS contests, earning a 17-8 record.

15 OF TOP 20 HOME CROWDS LAST SIX YEARS

Penn State has drawn 15 of its top 20 all-time home crowds since 2005 to Beaver Stadium, which was expanded for the seventh time under Coach Joe Paterno prior to the 2001 season.

FIVE BIG TEN NEW YEAR'S BOWL GAMES

The Big Ten's post-season lineup for the 2010-13 seasons includes six bowl games to be featured annually on or around New Year's Eve and New Year's Day, including five contests on Jan. 1.

With New Year's Day falling on Sunday in 2012, five Big Ten bowls will be played on Monday, January 2, 2012.

In 2009, the conference announced four-year bowl extensions with the Capital One (vs. SEC), Outback (SEC) and Insight (Big 12) and new four-year bowl agreements with the Gator, Texas and TicketCity Classic. The Big Ten is in the midst of an eight-year extension with the Rose Bowl through the 2013 season. This Big Ten bowl lineup will run concurrently with the latest Bowl Championship Series contract.

The Big Ten's 2010-13 bowl lineup begins on December 30 with the Insight Bowl in Tempe against a Big 12 opponent, followed by six more post-season contests played on New Year's Eve and New Year's Day. The Meineke Care Care of Texas Bowl will be played on December 31, followed by five more conference bowl games over a roughly nine-hour period on Jan. 2, including the TicketCity Classic (vs. Big 12/Conference USA), Capital One Bowl, Outback Bowl, and Gator Bowl (vs. SEC) and the Rose Bowl Game.

SECOND IN BIG TEN VICTORIES SINCE 1993

Penn State is playing its 19th season as members of the Big Ten Conference this fall. Since 1993, the Nittany Lions are second in the Big Ten in overall victories with a 162-69 record. Penn State is 94-54 in conference contests, trailing only Ohio State and Michigan.

MOYE A BILETNIKOFF AWARD CANDIDATE

Senior standout Derek Moye (Rochester) is on the Watch List for the Biletnikoff Award, presented to the nation's top wide receiver. Penn State All-American Bobby Engram was the inaugural winner of the Biletnikoff Award in 1994.

A pre-season first team All-Big Ten honoree, Moye led the Nittany Lions in 2010 with 53 catches for 885 yards and eight touchdowns, catching at least one scoring strike in seven of the last eight games. Moye was named 2010 honorable mention all-conference after averaging 16.7 yards per catch, which was second highest in the Big Ten. His 68.1-yard per game was good for fifth in the league.

The 6-5 Moye is on schedule to graduate in De-

DEFENSE AMONG NATION'S TOP FIVE SINCE 2004

Since the start of the 2004 season, Penn State is one of only three defensive units that rank among the top five in the nation in scoring defense (3rd, 16.4 ppg), total defense (5th, 298.7 ypg) and rushing defense (5th, 107.1 ypg) entering this season. Ohio State and TCU are the only other team ranks in the top five in the three categories.

Since the start of the 2004 campaign, the Nittany Lions have held 59 of their 97 opponents (60.8 pct.) to 17 points or less, including six foes in 2011, 10 in 2009 and nine in 2008. Three of Penn State's six bowl opponents have scored 17 points or less, including LSU in the 2010 Capital One Bowl.

Since the start of the 2004 season, Penn State has limited 51 of 97 opponents (52.6 pct.) to 100 rush-

ing yards or fewer, with eight foes failing to do so every year from 2006-09 and six in 2011. Among the teams failing to crack 100 rushing yards against the Nittany Lions were bowl foes LSU, USC, Tennessee and Florida State.

BIG TEN LEADS WAY ON ALL-TIME WINS LIST

With Nebraska joining the Big Ten this year, the conference boasts four of the nation's top six all-time winningest programs in Michigan (1st, 891), Nebraska (4th, 844), Penn State (5th, 826) and Ohio State (6th, 825).

SEVERAL ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® CANDIDATES

The Penn State football team has had a least one Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® in each of the past nine seasons, including a school record five in 2008, with three more in 2009 and again in 2010.

Redshirt sophomore defensive end Pete Massaro earned first team Academic All-America® honors last year and was joined by 2010 seniors Chris Colasanti and Stefen Wisniewski. A finance student, Massaro owned a 3.84 cumulative GPA after the spring semester, but will not be eligible for 2011 Academic All-America® consideration after suffering a serious knee injury in spring practice that will sideline him for this season.

Junior guard John Urschel owned a perfect 4.00 GPA through the spring semester and will lead Penn State's 2011 Academic All-America® candidates. Senior linebacker Nate Stupar (3.64 GPA) also will be a strong Academic All-America® candidate. Stupar graduated in May.

Nominees for Capital One Academic All-America® consideration must have at least a 3.30 cumulative grade point average and be a starter or key reserve.

11 FIRST TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS® PAST THREE YEARS

For the third consecutive year, the Penn State Football program was at the head of the class in Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America® selections. Guard Stefen Wisniewski became the first Penn State football student-athlete to earn Academic All-America® three times, with first-team nods in 2009 and 2010.

Senior linebacker Chris Colasanti and defensive end Pete Massaro also were first-team Academic All-Americans® in 2010.

Penn State has earned a nation's best 15 Academic All-Americans® over the past five years, with 13 first team honorees. A program record five Nittany Lions were selected to the 2008 Academic All-America® team.

During Joe Paterno's tenure, Penn State has had 47 Capital One Academic All-Americans®, with 37 earning first team honors. The Nittany Lions' 49 Academic All-Americans® all-time are No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

MORE THAN 30 FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATH-LETES EARN 3.0 GPA IN SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the Spring 2011 semester, with 33 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade point average.

Among the 33 Nittany Lions, 16 - nearly half - earned Dean's List recognition by posting a 3.5 GPA or higher this past semester.

The superlative academic performance brings the number of returning Nittany Lion football student-athletes to 42 who had a cumulative 3.0 GPA through the spring semester.

Three Nittany Lions earned a perfect 4.0 GPA during the spring semester: defensive end Pete Massaro, kick snapper Jon Rohrbaugh and guard John Urschel. Massaro was a 2010 first-team Academic All-American®. Urschel brought a 4.0 cumulative GPA into his fifth semester as a Penn State student-athlete.

The Nittany Lions had 19 Academic All-Big Ten football honorees during the 2010 season, improving their conference-leading total to 260 since starting conference play in 1993.

"CAPTAINS' LETTERS TO JOE" BOOK NOW AVAILABLE

At the 2010 State College Quarterback Club banquet, a special gift was given to Coach Joe Paterno, in honor of his Hall of Fame career, which includes more than 400 wins.

Knowing that Paterno already had an adequate collection of plaques and trophies, the Penn State Football Letterman's Club and the Quarterback Club created a unique gift. Their intention was to capture the impact Coach Paterno has on players' lives, long after they have passed through the Beaver Stadium tunnel for the final time

The Letterman's Club placed a call to the former captains of Coach Paterno back to his first team in 1966. The captains were asked to write a Letter To Joe, about the impact he and Penn State made on their lives. Some told stories, others revealed feelings long kept inside. Nearly all recounted the same, consistent lessons taught through the years. The letters were put into a single book and presented at the 2010 Senior Banquet. It was called, "Captains' Letters To Joe"

That gift to Coach Paterno is now being made available to the public, in an effort to raise funds for the Penn State Football Letterman's Club Scholarships, including one in the name of Joe and Sue Paterno. "Captains' Letters To Joe" includes 119 personalized letters to Joe Paterno from the leaders of each team he has coached.

The names of the players who wrote a letter for "Captains' Letters To Joe" is a litany of Penn State football legends, pro and college Hall of Famers, All-Americans, All-Big Ten performers and Academic All-Americans. The list begins with Mike Irwin and John Runnells in 1966 and goes to Brett Brackett and Ollie Ogbu from the 2010 season. The complete list can be found at: www.letterstojoe.org.

NITTANY LION STANDOUTS BROWN AND KWALICK HONORED WITH CONFERENCE TRO-PHIES

The Big Ten Conference announced last December it would initiate the presentation of 18 trophies following the 2011 season and will honor some of its all-time premier football student-athletes with the newly named trophies, including Penn State's Courtney Brown and Ted Kwalick.

The Big Ten will award the Smith-Brown Defensive Lineman of the Year beginning this year, recognizing the Nittany Lions' Brown and Michigan State's Bubba Smith, who recently passed away. Brown was a consensus first-team All-American in 1999, breaking school records in career tackles for loss (70), career sacks (33) and season TFL (29). The 1999 Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, he was a three-time all-conference selection. Brown was the first overall selection in the 2000 National Football League Draft by the Cleveland Browns.

Also starting this season, the conference will present the Kwalick-Clark Tight End of the Year, honoring Penn State's Kwalick and Iowa's Dallas Clark. Kwalick was a first All-American in 1967 and '68 and finished fourth in balloting for the 1968 Heisman Trophy. A first round draft choice by the National Football League's



San Francisco 49ers, and a three-time All-Pro, Kwalick was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1989.

NUMEROUS NITTANY LIONS HAVE FAMILY TIES TO PENN STATE FOOTBALL

Nine returning squad members have ties to current or former Nittany Lion football team players, coaches or staff:

- Sophomore **Nate Cadogan's** brother, Gerald, lettered at tackle for the Nittany Lions from 2006-08;
- Junior kick snapper **Mike Furhman** is the son of Chet Fuhrman, former Penn State Football strength and conditioning coach;
- Redshirt freshman linebacker **Mike Hull's** father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions from 1971-73;
- Rich Mauti was a letterman for the Nittany Lions in 1975 and '76 and played eight NFL seasons. One of his sons, **Michael Mauti**, is a redshirt junior linebacker and another son, Patrick, was a senior in 2009:
- Redshirt junior **Kenny Pollock's** great uncle, Ben Pollock, played at Penn State from 1937-40, earning letters his final two seasons;
- Wide receiver **Ryan Scherer's** father, Rip, was a graduate assistant football coach at Penn State in 1974 and '75. Ryan's grandfather, Rip, lettered for the Nittany Lions in 1948.
- Senior linebacker **Nate Stupar** comes from a family with multiple ties to Penn State, including his father, Steve, who was a lineman for Paterno in the late 1970's. Uncles Ron, Doug and Jeff Hostetler all played for the Nittany Lions in the late 1970's and early 1980's.
- Senior running back **Joe Suhey** is a member of the one the most prominent families in Penn State football history. His great grandfather, Bob Higgins, was Penn State's second All-American, in 1915, and earned All-America honors again in 1919. He served as head coach of the Nittany Lions from 1930-48. Suhey's grandfather, Steve Suhey, was a letterman in 1942 and again in 1946-47, earning All-America honors his senior season. He married one of Bob Higgins' daughters, Ginger. Three of their sons, Paul, Larry and Matt (Joe's father) played for Penn State in the 1970's. One of Joe's first cousins, Kevin Suhey, graduated in 2008 after playing for the Nittany Lions;
- Junior **Michael Zordich's** father, Michael, played at Penn State from 1982-85, earning first team All-America honors as a senior before embarking on a 12-year NFL career.

In addition, redshirt freshman **Patrick Flanagan** is the nephew of Nittany Lion Basketball head coach Patrick Chambers. Redshirt freshman **Alex Kenney's** sister, Lauren, is a member of the Penn State women's track and field team.

PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES "LIFT FOR LIFE" HITS RECORD \$100,000 TO BENEFIT KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

Contributions from the Ninth Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" has boosted the 2011 total to a record total in excess of \$100,000 to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

The "Lift For Life" was held on July 8 in Holuba Hall and the initial total raised by the strength and conditioning event was \$94,410.09. Uplifting Athletes has grown to nine chapters, with Boston College, Colgate, Kent State, Maryland, North Carolina State, Northwestern, Ohio State and Princeton joining Penn State in the fight against rare diseases. Boston College, Maryland and Northwestern also conducted Lift for Life events this past summer.

PENN STATE AND PITT TO RENEW RIVALRY

Long-time rivals Penn State and Pitt will meet September 10, 2016 in Pittsburgh and September 16, 2017 in Beaver Stadium.

The Nittany Lions have met the Panthers more than any other opponent – 96 times - with Penn State owning a 50-42-4 series advantage. The teams first met in 1893 and played every season from 1900-31 and 1935-92, often in a compelling final game of the regular season.

The teams did not meet from 1993-96, when Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference, and then played a four-game series from 1997-2000, with the Nittany Lions winning the first three games. The Panthers won the last meeting, 12-0, in Three Rivers Stadium 11 years ago.

VIRGINIA, SYRACUSE AND RUTGERS ON FUTURE SCHEDULES

During the past five seasons, Penn State played Notre Dame in 2006 and '07 and renewed its rivalry with Syracuse in 2008 and '09. The Nittany Lions and Orange will open the 2013 season at the New Meadowlands Stadium and are tentatively scheduled to play in 2020 and '21.

Following the current series with Alabama, the Nittany Lions will play Virginia in 2012 and '13, Rutgers in 2014 and '15 and Pitt in 2016 and '17.

BIG TEN MOVING TO NINE-GAME CONFERENCE SCHEDULE IN 2017

The Big Ten announced in August that conference football programs will move to a nine-game Big Ten schedule beginning with the 2017 season.

Three teams each from the Legends Division and Leaders Division will feature five conference home games during odd-numbered years, while the other three schools from each division will host five conference contests during even-numbered years.

The 2017 schedule will include five conference home outings for lowa, Michigan State and Nebraska from the Legends Division and Illinois, Indiana and Ohio State from the Leaders Division. The 2018 schedule will feature five Big Ten home games for Michigan, Minnesota and Northwestern of the Legends Division and Penn State, Purdue and Wisconsin of the Leaders Division.

Penn State will play three home non-conference games during odd-numbered years, when the Nittany Lions are scheduled to play five Big Ten away games, for a total of seven games in Beaver Stadium.

During even-numbered years, when Penn State is scheduled to play five conference home games (start-

ing in 2018), the Nittany Lions will play a total of seven or eight contests in Beaver Stadium.

Football broadcasts on the Penn State Sports Network begin 90 minutes prior to kickoff with "The Penn State Tailgate Show presented by UnitedHealthcare."

LAST GAME RECAP

NITTANY LIONS RALLY TO BEAT ILLINI

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa.; Oct. 29, 2011 - Silas Redd's three-yard touchdown run with 1:08 left in the game propelled No. 19 Penn State to a 10-7 comeback victory against Illinois at Beaver Stadium. The Nittany Lions improved to 8-1 overall (5-0 Big Ten) with the crucial Leaders Division win, earning their seventh consecutive win overall.

With snow falling in Beaver Stadium before and during the game, head coach Joe Paterno recorded his 409th career victory, moving him past Eddie Robinson for most wins in NCAA Division I history.

After Redd scored the go-ahead touchdown, Illinois drove down the field to set up a 42-yard field-goal attempt with five seconds remaining. Illini place-kicker Derek Dimke, who previously had not missed all season, sent his attempt off the right upright as time expired and the Penn State sideline and fans erupted.

Redd carried the ball a career-high 30 times for 137 yards, giving him 1,006 yards on the season. Redd became the 12th Nittany Lion to reach the 1,000-yard mark with his fifth straight game of at least 100 yards. Redd's fifth straight game reaching the century mark was the first time a Penn State tailback accomplished the feat since Curtis Enis in 1997.

One week after recording a career-high 14 stops, Gerald Hodges rewrote career-best with 19 tackles, including a sack to earn his second consecutive Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week. Devon Still also registered a career-high 10 tackles, including one sack and 3.5 stops for a loss, and Jordan Hill also made a career-best 10 stops.

Sean Stanley recorded his first career fumble recovery and interception, and D' Anton Lynn collected his first interception of the season. Penn State created a season-high four takeaways to increase its season total to 22.

Matt McGloin made his second start of the season and led the Nittany Lions 80 yards to go-ahead touchdown late in the game. Justin Brown led the Penn State receiving corps with 50 yards on three catches. Derek Moye, who had missed the last two games, returned to the field late in the third quarter and caught a pair of critical passes for 29 yards on the Nittany Lions' last offensive possession.

After both teams combined for the first scoreless first half in a Penn State game since the 6-0 loss to Alabama in 1984, Illinois scored its lone touchdown with 3:32 remaining in the third quarter. Nathan Scheelhaase connected on a 10-yard pass with Spencer Harris to cap off an 11-play, 64-yard drive.

With Illinois facing a fourth down from its 37-yard line in the fourth quarter, Brad Bars blocked the punt attempt to give the Nittany Lions a short field. Penn State reached as close as the Illini five-yard line but settled for Anthony Fera's 30-yard field goal to close the gap, 7-3, with seven minutes remaining.

With 3:05 left in the game, the Nittany Lion offense got the ball at their own 20-yard line and embarked on a 10-play, 80-yard drive. Although only garnering 129 yards of offense before the drive, McGloin threw for 58 yards and Redd ran for 12 more, including a three-yard rush up the middle to reach the 1.000-yard plateau.
