**INSIDE THE GAME**

**NO. 6 PENN STATE OPENS 2017 SEASON**

The reigning Big Ten Champions will open their 131st season of football, as Penn State hosts Akron in Beaver Stadium for its 2017 season opener. The telecast will begin at noon on ABC.

Penn State will have the luxury of returning depth and experience this season. A total of 44 letterwinners and 18 starters are back from a team that won Penn State's fourth Big Ten Championship and earned its fourth Rose Bowl appearance. Accordingly, Penn State's No. 6 preseason ranking in both major polls is its highest since 1999.

A prolific offense was a hallmark of the 2016 team and key returners include a pair of Big Ten preseason honorees, running back Saquon Barkley and quarterback Trace McSorley. Barkley set a sophomore record for rushing yards en route to multiple prestigious honors in 2016, while McSorley was perhaps the biggest surprise, breaking Penn State's single-season passing yard and passing touchdown records in his first season as a starter. McSorley will have plenty of targets to throw to with record-setting tight end Mike Gesicki joining Barkley on preseason All-America teams and he will have the protection of a veteran offensive line.

Linebacker Jason Cabinda and safety Marcus Allen lead the defense with their names appearing on several watch lists. All three levels of the unit lost players to the NFL, but more than 72 percent of the tackles to return.

Penn State will be looking to extend a seven-game winning streak in Beaver Stadium, playing its first three games of the season at home.

Akron will be seeking its first win over the Nittany Lions after coming up short in its first five attempts. Veteran coach Terry Bowden guides the Zips, while linebacker Ulysees Gilbert III leads the defense and is on the Bronko Nagurski preseason watch list.

131st SEASON OF GRIDIRON EXCELLENCE

Penn State is in its 131st season of intercollegiate football and owns an 867-385-42 record, to rank No. 8 nationally in all-time victories.

WINNING RECORD

Penn State is one of eight teams that have had a winning season the last 12 consecutive years. Wisconsin, Oklahoma, Virginia Tech, Boise State, USC, Florida State and LSU have also accomplished the feat. According to ESPN Stats & Info, Penn State holds the FBS record for most consecutive seasons without a losing record at 49 (1939-1987).

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

A total of 389 of Penn State football student-athletes, including 19 in 2016, have earned Academic All-Big Ten honors since 1993 for owning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner.

ONE OF NATION'S TOUGHEST HOME VENUES

Penn State owns a superlative 278-72 (.794) record inside Beaver Stadium, the nation's second-largest facility, which opened in 1960 and has a capacity of 106,572.

LIONS IN THE NFL

35 NITTANY LIONS ON NFL CAMP ROSTERS

A total of 35 Penn State football alumni are populating the training camp rosters of 22 National Football League teams.

The Nittany Lions are perennially a top-15 program in producing players in the NFL. In addition, seven former Nittany Lions are members of NFL coaching staffs.

The Miami Dolphins and San Francisco 49ers are currently carrying a league-high three former Nittany Lions each. Ninth-year veteran Cameron Wake is joined by Mike Hull and Jordan Lucas in Miami and 13th-year veteran Robbie Gould and Gary Gilliam have joined eighth-year vet NaVorro Bowman in San Francisco.

Gould is the Lions elder statesman, and is followed by Chiefs All-Pro linebacker Tamba Hali in his 12th season, Jaguars linebacker Paul Posluszny (11th), Wake and Cowboys linebacker Sean Lee (9th). Lee and Wake were both Pro Bowlers in 2017.

Nine squads boast two Nittany Lions each, including Detroit, Jacksonville, Kansas City, New Orleans, N.Y. Jets, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Tampa Bay and Tennessee.

Five players from Penn State's 2016 squad are in NFL camps as rookies: Chris Godwin was drafted in the third round by Tampa Bay, and Brandon Bell (Cincinnati), Garrett Sickels (Colts), Evan Schwan (Giants) and Malik Golden (Steelers) all signed free agent contracts.

There are also two Nittany Lions on NFL rosters that did not play football at Penn State in Chris Hogan (New England) and Ross Travis (Kansas City). Hogan, a wide receiver in his sixth NFL season, played lacrosse for the Nittany Lions and went to play football at Monmouth after earning his Penn State degree. Travis, a tight end, was a standout men's basketball player.

Penn State has had 45 NFL Draft picks since 2006, including 21 in the first three rounds, and at least three draft picks 18 times since starting Big Ten Conference competition in 1993. A total of 344 Nittany Lions have been selected all-time in the NFL Draft.

For the 46th time in the Super Bowl's 51-game history, at least one Penn State alumnus was a member of one of the participating teams (20 times in last 22 years). Thirty-nine former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 56 Super Bowl rings, most recently Chris Hogan with New England last year. A total of 107 Nittany Lions have been on Super Bowl rosters.

**HEAD COACH JAMES FRANKLIN**

**CAREER AT A GLANCE**

- Franklin enters his seventh year as a collegiate head coach, leading his first six squads to a bowl game with victories in three.
- Franklin is one of 12 current FBS head coaches to lead his teams to a bowl game in each of his first six seasons as a head coach.
- He owns a 49-30 career record, with five consecutive winning seasons.
- Franklin has led his teams to one Top 10 finish (Penn State) and three Top 25 finishes (2 at Vanderbilt; 1 at Penn State).
- Franklin has 22 years of coaching experience at the collegiate and NFL level.
- In his first five years as a head coach, Franklin mentored 24 players that have gone on to the NFL ranks.
- Franklin has secured Top 25 recruiting classes each of the last four seasons, including back-to-back Top 20 classes at Penn State.

**NITTANY LIONS ON THE FIELD**

- Franklin was named the 16th head football coach in the storied history of the Nittany Lion program on January 11, 2014.
- The Nittany Lions surged in 2016, winning nine consecutive games en route to the Big Ten Championship, a Rose Bowl berth and an 11-3 overall record.
- Penn State finished the season ranked No. 5 in the College Football Playoff Rankings and No. 7 in the Associated Press and Amway Coaches polls. It was Penn State's highest finish in the polls since 2005.
- The Nittany Lions claimed their fourth overall Big Ten Championship and first outright title since 1994 with a thrilling 38-31 comeback win over Wisconsin in the Big Ten Championship game.
- In 2016, Franklin was honored as the Sporting News National Coach of the Year and the Woody Hayes National Coach of the Year, as well as the Dave McLain Big Ten Coach of the Year and Associated Press Big Ten Coach of the Year.
- Franklin was also a finalist for the Paul "Bear" Bryant, Eddie Robinson and Associated Press National Coach of the Year awards.
- The 2016 season brought record-breaking performances from the Nittany Lions as the offense set marks for total offense (6,056), passing yards (3,650), points scored (526) and double-digit comeback wins (4).
- The Nittany Lions' +14.4 scoring improvement in 2016 ranked fourth in FBS and second among Autonomy 5 schools.
- Sophomore running back Saquon Barkley was selected as the Graham-George Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, Big Ten Running Back of the Year and Chicago Tribune Silver Football winner for the conference's top player. He is the fourth Nittany Lion to win the Silver Football and first since 2009.

- First-year starting quarterback Trace McSorley was named the Grange-Griffin Big Ten Championship Game MVP, as well as earning Maxwell Club Tri-State Player of the Year and All-Big Ten second team honors. He was the first Penn State quarterback to win all-conference honors since Daryll Clark in 2009.
- Not to be outdone, the Nittany Lion defense finished seventh in FBS in tackles for loss (8.1) and 19th in sacks (2.86).
- Penn State posted back-to-back 40-sack seasons for the first time since 2005-07.
- Franklin guided the Nittany Lions to a 7-6 record in 2015 and a berth in the TaxSlayer Bowl.
- Under Franklin's tutelage, Carl Nassib claimed a trio of national awards -- Lombardi Award, Lott IMPACT Trophy and Ted Hendricks Award -- and became Penn State's 13th unanimous Consensus All-American.
- Nassib also led the nation in sacks with a school-record 15.5 in 2015.
- The 2015 season also saw Christian Hackenberg break every Penn State career passing record, including passing yards, passing touchdowns and completions, and true freshman Saquon Barkley break the freshman season rushing record with a 1,000-yard campaign.
- Barkley was named the Big Ten Network's Freshman of the Year and claimed second team All-Big Ten honors, while wide receiver Chris Godwin (second team) and defensive tackles Austin Johnson (second team) and Anthony Zettel (third team) also earned All-Big Ten accolades.
- Franklin's first season was bookended with a pair of thrilling victories for the Nittany Lions. The Penn State head coach's inaugural season began with a final-play 26-24 victory over UCF in Dublin, Ireland in Penn State's first-ever international game and ended with a comeback, a 31-30 overtime win over Boston College in the New Era PinStripe Bowl in Yankee Stadium. The Nittany Lions overcame a 14-point deficit late in the third quarter, tying the largest comeback in Penn State's bowl history.
- With the PinStripe Bowl win, Franklin became just the third Penn State coach to lead the team to at least seven wins in his first season, joining Dick Harlow (1915) and Bill O'Brien (2012).
- Franklin guided the Nittany Lions to a 4-0 start, joining Harlow as the only first-year Penn State coaches to win their initial four games.
- In Franklin's first season at Penn State, he helped Mike Hull to the Butkus-Fitzgerald Big Ten Linebacker of the Year award to carry on the "Linebacker U" tradition.
- Zettel earned All-Big Ten first team honors, while receiver DaeSean Hamilton garnered All-Big Ten second team accolades after pulling in 82 catches for 899 yards.

## NIITTANY LIONS IN THE CLASSROOM

- The 2015 fall semester saw the Nittany Lions post a record 56 squad members with at least a 3.0 grade-point average, marking the fifth consecutive semester (including summer sessions) the Nittany Lions have had more than 50 student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA or better.
- The 56 Nittany Lions with a 3.0 GPA or higher surpasses the mark of 55 set by the 2008 fall semester for the most 3.0 students in a semester in football program history.
- Additionally, 22 Nittany Lions earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition in 2015.
- Tyler Yazujian collected a berth on the CoSIDA Academic All-America® second team in 2015.
- A total of 23 Nittany Lions posted a 3.5 GPA or higher in the 2015 fall semester, with 19 earning Dean's List recognition for having 3.5 GPA or higher with 12 credits earned in undergraduate work.
- The Nittany Lion freshmen were impressive in the 2015 fall semester with 14 posting a 3.0 or higher.
- During Franklin's first fall semester on campus, the football student-athletes set program records with 25 student-athletes earning Dean's List recognition (3.5 GPA) and 57 players owning a cumulative 3.0 grade-point average (GPA) or higher after the 2014 fall semester.
- Additionally, 51 squad members compiled at least a 3.0 GPA in the fall of 2014, the third-highest semester total in program history.
- The spring of 2015 saw continued success in the classroom with 51 student-athletes compiling at least a 3.0 GPA, marking the first time in program history with 50 or more 3.0s in a spring semester.

## NIITTANY LIONS IN THE COMMUNITY

- In the last two seasons, the Nittany Lions have completed more than 4,000 hours of community service.
- The Nittany Lions' community service activities include: Uplifting Athletes, THON, Pennsylvania Special Olympics Summer Games, State College Area Food Bank and Penn State Hershey Children's Hospital visits.
- The football team's 2,100 hours of community service in 2014-15 equate to nearly 40 percent of the 5,300 community service hours by Penn State student-athletes.
- The engaging and enthusiastic Franklin is a popular speaker and media interview subject. He was a guest analyst on ESPN's coverage from the site of college football's National Championship game, spending a day appearing on various ESPN platforms in 2013 and 2014. In 2015, Franklin joined the FOX studio crew for pregame, halftime and postgame coverage of the Big Ten Championship game.
- In February 2015, Franklin was the lone college head coach among the speakers and panelists at the prestigious MIT Sloan Sports Analytics Conference in Boston. He was a panelist for the session, "The Formula to Win: College Football Analytics," which was moderated by CNN anchor/reporter Rachel Nichols.

## RECRUITING SUCCESS

- The Class of 2016 at Penn State finished in the Top 20, ranking as high as 18th by ESPN, and featured a pair of five-star recruits.
- In 2016, Franklin secured the No. 1 player in the state of Pennsylvania (Miles Sanders) for the first time since Jared Odrick (2006).
- The Nittany Lions laid claim to the No. 1 running back in the state of Pennsylvania in 2015 (Saquon Barkley) and 2016 (Sanders).
- Forty-three of the 70 signees under Franklin are from within a 350-mile radius of State College.
- In February 2015, the Nittany Lions' highly-regarded class of 25 signees was ranked in the Top 15 nationally by the four major recruiting services.
- Franklin and his staff organized a Top 25 recruiting class in short order after being hired at Penn State in January 2014.
- While at Vanderbilt, Franklin assembled a recruiting class that finished as high as 19th in 2014.
- In each of his three seasons in Nashville, Franklin signed classes that finished in the Top 50 nationally. Prior to Franklin's arrival, the Commodores average class rank was 64.6 since 2000 (based on 247Sports composite).

## HELPING THE COMMODORES GET THEIR WINGS

- Franklin directed Vanderbilt to consecutive Top 25 finishes for the first time in the 124-year history of the program (No. 23/24 -- 2013 & No. 23/20 -- 2012).
- The Commodores finished 23rd in the final 2012 Associated Press poll, marking their first AP final ranking since 1948.
- Franklin's 24 wins tied Dan McGugin for the most by a Vanderbilt coach in his first three seasons.
- Franklin led Vanderbilt to a bowl game in each of his three seasons in Nashville, with the last two years resulting in wins over North Carolina State (Music City Bowl) and Houston (BBVA Compass Bowl). The Commodores had played in four bowl games all-time in the 121 seasons prior to his arrival, none in consecutive years.
- Vanderbilt has posted four nine-win seasons in program history, with Franklin's last two teams comprising half of the total.
- Over the last 20 games during the 2012-13 seasons, the Commodores' 16-4 record was second-best in the SEC to Alabama's 17-3 mark.
- Franklin guided the Commodores to a 6-6 regular-season record and earned a berth in the Liberty Bowl during his first season after inheriting a Vanderbilt team that finished 2-10 in both 2009 and 2010, including a 1-15 SEC mark.
- The 2011 bowl berth was Vanderbilt's second since 1983 and running back Zac Stacy broke the Commodores' season record with 1,193 rushing yards.

- The Commodores had a breakthrough campaign in 2012 under Franklin, finishing on a seven-game winning streak (longest since 1948) to post a 9-4 mark, Vanderbilt's most wins in 97 years, and a berth in the Music City Bowl, which VU defeated N.C. State, 38-24.
- A victory at Missouri sparked an 8-1 finish, which included three consecutive SEC road wins for the first time in program history.
- The Commodores were 5-3 in SEC play, winning five SEC games for the first time since 1935, and posted two shutouts for the first time since 1968.
- Franklin was among five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach of the Year award in 2012.
- Stacy became the first player in Vanderbilt history to rush for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons, gaining 1,141 yards to finish with a school-record 3,143 yards and 30 rushing touchdowns.
- Wide receiver Jordan Matthews broke the Vanderbilt season receiving record with 1,363 yards on 94 catches.
- Vanderbilt continued its historic rise under Franklin during the 2013 season, capping a school-record second consecutive 9-4 campaign with a 41-24 win over Houston in the BBVA Compass Bowl.
- The Commodores defeated Florida, Georgia and Tennessee in the same season for the first time in program history, winning in Gainesville and Knoxville.
- Franklin helped Matthews develop into a two-time All-American and the SEC's career leader in receptions (262) and receiving yardage (3,759). Matthews broke the SEC season record with 112 receptions for 1,477 yards and seven touchdowns in 2013, becoming the first SEC receiver to make 100 catches in a season.

## RISING UP THE RANKS

- Franklin began his coaching career as the wide receivers coach at Kutztown (Pa.) University (1995) and was a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, East Stroudsburg (Pa.) University in 1996, working with the secondary.
- He then was the wide receivers coach at James Madison (1997), a graduate assistant (tight ends) at Washington State in 1998 and the wide receivers coach at Idaho State (1999).
- In 2000, Franklin was named the wide receivers coach at Maryland under head coach Ron Vanderlinden, who would go on to coach the Penn State linebackers from 2001-13.
- Franklin continued in that role under new head coach Ralph Friedgen in 2002 and '03 and helped the Terps to three consecutive 10-win seasons, including an appearance in the 2002 FedEx Orange Bowl. In 2003, Franklin added duties as recruiting coordinator and directed back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in the Top 25 nationally. Franklin and former Nittany Lion head coach Bill O'Brien (running backs) were Maryland assistant coaches in 2003 and '04 under Friedgen.
- After five successful years at Maryland, Franklin was named wide receivers coach on Mike Sherman's Green Bay Packers staff in 2005. During that season, Green Bay ranked third in the NFL in receptions (383) and seventh in receiving yards (3,766). Donald Driver was among the top receivers in the NFL, ranking second in receptions and eighth in receiving yards, with a then-career-high 86 catches for 1,221 yards.
- Franklin served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kansas State during the 2006-07 seasons under head coach Ron Prince. In 2006, he helped the Wildcats to their first winning season in four years. Franklin coached quarterback Josh Freeman and oversaw an offense that produced a 3,000-yard passer (Freeman), 1,500-yard receiver (All-American wide receiver Jordy Nelson) and 1,000-yard rusher (James Johnson) during the 2007 season, a first in school history. Freeman would go on to become the Wildcats' highest NFL offensive draft pick since 1954 when the Tampa Bay Buccaneers selected him 17th overall in the 2009 NFL Draft.
- Franklin returned to Maryland in 2008 as the Terps' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He helped the Terrapins to victories in the 2008 Humanitarian Bowl and the 2010 Military Bowl. The 2010 squad was among the national leaders in scoring offense at 32.2 points per game and was led by ACC Rookie of the Year quarterback Danny O'Brien. He threw for 2,438 yards, 22 touchdowns and only eight interceptions in 2010, with All-ACC receiver Torrey Smith making 67 catches for 1,055 yards and 12 scores.
- In 1998, Franklin began his participation in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program, starting with a stint with the Miami Dolphins and working with Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. Franklin also worked with Donovan McNabb of the Philadelphia Eagles (1999) and Minnesota Vikings (2008) in the NFL program.

## PLAYING CAREER

- Franklin was a four-year letterman at quarterback and a two-time All-PSAC selection at East Stroudsburg.
- He set seven school records as a senior to earn team MVP honors and was a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee as the NCAA Division II Player of the Year.
- Among the season records he set were for total offense (3,128 yards), passing yards (2,586) and touchdown passes (19).
- Franklin graduated having broken or tied 23 school records.
- Franklin was inducted into the East Stroudsburg Athletics Hall of Fame October 15, 2016.

## PERSONAL

- Franklin graduated from East Stroudsburg in 1995 with a degree in psychology and earned a master's degree in educational leadership from Washington State University.
- Franklin graduated from Neshaminy High School in Langhorne.
- Franklin and his wife, Fumi, have two daughters, Shola and Addison.



LEADERSHIP



TEAM CAPTAINS ELECTED

Seniors **Marcus Allen, Jason Cabinda, Tyler Davis, Grant Haley** and **DaeSean Hamilton** and juniors **Saquon Barkley, Trace McSorley** and **Nick Scott** will serve as team captains for the 2017 season, as voted by their teammates.

Allen was selected third-team All-Big Ten by the conference's coaches and honorable mention by the media panel last season. He made a team- and career-high 110 tackles on the season to become the first Penn State safety to lead the team in tackles since Shawn Mayer (144) in 2002. For his career, Allen has 249 tackles, 13.0 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and eight pass breakups.

Cabinda garnered third-team All-Big Ten accolades from the conference coaches last season, despite missing five games due to injury. He posted eight tackles or more in all nine games he played in and has logged eight or more tackles in 11 of his last 13 games, dating back to 2015. Cabinda finished third on the squad with 81 tackles in 2016, after posting 100 stops in his sophomore season. For his career, Cabinda has 198 tackles, eight pass breakups, 3.5 sacks and 10.0 tackles for loss.

Davis earned the 2016 Vlade Award for the nation's most accurate kicker to go along with first-team All-Big Ten accolades from the conference coaches and second team accolades from the media. Davis led the Big Ten and was eighth nationally with a .917 field goal percentage and was second in the conference and 11th nationally in total points (128).

Haley was on the back-end of one of the most memorable plays of the 2016 season when he scooped up Marcus Allen's blocked field goal and ran 60 yards for the game-winning touchdown against No. 2 Ohio State. Haley also earned CoSIDA Academic All-District honors last season and has earned a spot on the Academic All-Big Ten team twice.

A fifth-year senior, Hamilton has 161 career catches, which ranks tied for fourth in program history, and he needs 19 receptions to break Deon Butler's career receptions record (179). He also ranks 10th on Penn State's all-time receiving yardage list (1,985) with catches against No. 13 Ohio State.

Barkley is a preseason first-team All-American for several publications. In 2016, Barkley claimed the Graham-George Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, Ameche-Dayne Big Ten Running Back of the Year and the Chicago Tribune Silver Football for the Big Ten's best player last season. The junior back was second in the conference and 24th nationally with 106.9 rushing yards per game. His 1,496 yards in 2016 broke the Penn State sophomore season record and rank fifth on the single-season charts.

McSorley earned the Grange-Griffin Most Valuable Player award as MVP of the Big Ten Championship game after throwing for a Big Ten Championship game-record 384 yards and four touchdowns. He was also a second-team All-Big Ten choice by the conference's coaches and media. McSorley turned in one of the top QB campaigns in program history, breaking the Penn State season record for passing yards (3,614), passing touchdowns (29) and total offense records (3,979).

Scott has embraced his role as a leader on special teams. He appeared in 13 games last season and finished second on the squad with eight special teams tackles. Scott had a career-high three special teams tackles against Maryland in October. In 2016, Scott also returned six kickoffs for 138 yards (23.0 ypr).

LEADERSHIP COUNCIL ANNOUNCED

- The 30-member Leadership Council, which is comprised of 21 seniors, four juniors, three sophomores and two freshmen, serves as the voice for the team.
- This year's members are: seniors **Marcus Allen, Troy Apke, Saeed Blacknall, Jason Cabinda, Christian Campbell, Tyrell Chavis, Curtis Cothran, Parker Cothren, Desi Davis, Tyler Davis, Mike Gesicki, Grant Haley, DaeSean Hamilton, Cody Hodgins, Brendan Mahon, Josh McPhearson, Andrew Nelson, Tom Pancoast, Daniel Pasquariello, Brandon Smith** and **Mitchell Vallone**; juniors **Saquon Barkley, Trace McSorley, John Reid** and **Nick Scott**; sophomores **Ryan Bates, Juwan Johnson** and **Tommy Stevens**; and freshmen **Michal Menet** and **Jake Zembiec**.
- This group is not only charged with leading the team, but the expectation is to also uphold the program's four core values: positive attitude, great work ethic, compete in everything and must be willing to sacrifice. The Leadership Council meets at least twice a month in Franklin's office.

**SERIES NOTES**

**HEAD COACH TERRY BOWDEN**

- Terry Bowden enters his sixth season at Akron.
- Owning a 164-99-2 record over a 23-year collegiate coaching career, Bowden ranks sixth nationally among active Division I head coaches in career wins (164).
- In 2015, Bowden guided the Zips to an 8-5 overall record en route to the program's first winning season and bowl appearance since 2005. Akron captured its first-ever bowl victory in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) era (since 1987).
- Bowden, who served as a studio analyst and color commentator with ABC Sports' college football for 10 years, was the head coach at Auburn from 1993-98 and spent the three seasons prior to coming to Akron at Division II North Alabama.
- In 1993, Auburn had a perfect 11-0 record and he swept virtually every national coach of the year award in his rookie season.
- Bowden was again a finalist for coach of the year following his second season at Auburn as the Tigers had reeled off 20-straight wins, still an Auburn record, and finished 9-1-1. He posted a 47-17-1 record at Auburn and led the Tigers to three bowl games.

**SCOUTING THE ZIPS**

- Akron was tabbed to finish fourth in the East Division in the 2017 Mid-American Conference Football Preseason Poll by members of the MAC media.
- The Zips return 57 letterwinners, including 14 starters, to its spread offense and 4-3 defense.
- Linebacker Ulysees Gilbert III leads defensive returners and is on the Bronko Nagurski preseason watch list as a candidate to be the nation's top defensive player. Last season as a sophomore, he was a first-team All-MAC honoree after starting all 12 games and leading the Zips' with 122 tackles, 11.5 tackles for loss, four sacks and two forced fumbles.
- Senior center LaVonne Gauthney anchors the offensive line and is on the Rimmington Trophy Fall Watch List.
- Akron finished the 2016 season at 5-7. The Zips fell short of bowl eligibility in heartbreaking fashion, unable to connect on a game-tying touchdown in the last seconds in the season finale at Ohio.

**LAST MEETING**

**JAMES' TWO TOUCHDOWNS LEAD LIONS PAST AKRON, 21-3**

Junior tight end Jesse James corralled two touchdown catches and the Nittany Lion defense swarmed for seven tackles for a loss, including four sacks in a 21-3 victory over Akron in the 2014 home opener.

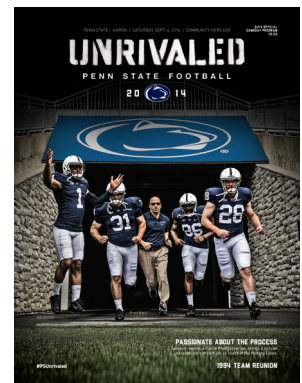
James finished with 57 yards on two catches, both of which went for touchdowns. Sophomore quarterback Christian Hackenberg passed for 319 yards and three touchdowns. With his performance, Hackenberg broke the Penn State record for most passing yards in consecutive games, as he threw for 454 in the season opener in Ireland against UCF for a two-game total of 773.

Defensively, the Nittany Lions held the Zips to 69 rushing yards and 208 of total offense. Redshirt senior linebacker Mike Hull was the heartbeat of the Penn State defense with 11 tackles, including a sack, for his second-straight double-digit tackle performance. Junior cornerback Jordan Lucas notched seven tackles and had his second career sack.

The Lions got on the scoreboard late in the first quarter as Hackenberg capped a four-play, 58-yard drive with a 22-yard touchdown toss to running back Bill Belton. Neither team could sustain any offensive momentum for the remainder of the first half as the Nittany Lions went into the break with a 7-0 lead.

In its first possession of the second half, Akron notched a field goal to cut the Nittany Lions' lead to 7-3. However, the Nittany Lions found an offensive rhythm with a 10-play, 79-yard drive over a 5:26 span to extend their lead with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Hackenberg to James for the 14-3 lead with 2:38 remaining in the third. Hackenberg connected on all six of his passes for a total of 81 yards.

Hackenberg then found James with a 44-yard pitch-and-catch to give the Nittany Lions the 21-3 lead with 8:58 remaining.

AKRON NOTES

PENN STATE SEASON OPENERS

- The 2017 season marks the 131st in Penn State history, with the Nittany Lions owning a record of 107-21-2 in opening games.
- The 2017 opener is the second of four consecutive season openers at home: Kent State (2016, W, 33-13), Akron (2017), Appalachian State (2018) and Idaho (2019).
- The Lions have won 13 of their last 15 season openers.
- Penn State's longest streaks of winning their season openers are: 12 (1919-30), 11 (1893-1903), 10 (1973-82; 2002-11), 9 (1909-17), 7 (1942-48).
- Penn State has only lost consecutive season openers twice in school history; 1964-65, 1989-90, 2000-01.
- The Nittany Lions went unbeaten from 1909-30, winning 20-of-21 season openers. They tied Wissahickon Barracks, 6-6, in 1918 and the streak was stopped by Waynesburg, a 7-0 setback, in 1931.

HOME OPENER HISTORY

- Penn State's all-time record in home openers is 116-13-1 and 48-9 in Beaver Stadium.
- Penn State has won 14 out of its last 15 home openers and its last three consecutively, defeating Kent State last season (33-13), Buffalo in 2015 (27-14), Akron in 2014 (21-3) and Eastern Michigan in 2013 (45-7).
- This is the sixth consecutive home opener against a MAC opponent.

VERSUS OHIO SCHOOLS

- Penn State has a 42-21 record against teams from the state of Ohio.
- Penn State won both of its games against Ohio-based opponents last season, defeating Kent State (33-13) and No. 2 Ohio State (24-21).
- The Nittany Lions have played Ohio State more than any other Ohio school (32 games), with the two border rivals meeting every year since Penn State began Big Ten play in 1993.
- Penn State vs. teams from Ohio: Kent State (5-0), Ohio State (14-18), Akron (5-0), Bowling Green (2-0), Cincinnati (8-1), Oberlin (1-0), Ohio (5-1), Toledo (0-1) and Youngstown State (2-0).

- Penn State defensive backs coach **Terry Smith** coached Akron QB Thomas Woodson while at Gateway Senior H.S. in Monroeville, Pa.
- Akron Assistant AD for Communications Cathy Bongiovi is a 1987 graduate of Penn State and worked at her alma mater from 1997-2001, working with the 2000 women's basketball NCAA Final Four squad.

HOME IN HAPPY VALLEY

- The Nittany Lions went 7-0 at home in 2016 for the first time since 2008 and the fifth time in the Big Ten era (1994, 1998, 2005, 2008, 2016).
- Penn State's seven-game home win streak is tied for the third longest active streak in FBS.
- Dating back to last season, Penn State has won 13 out of its last 14 home games.

PENN STATE VS. MAC

- Penn State owns a 24-3 mark against the 2017 football alignment of the Mid-American Conference.
- The Nittany Lions have played 10 of the 13 members of the MAC, playing their first MAC opponent, Buffalo, on Nov. 29, 1900. The Lions lost, 10-0, that day on the road.
- Recently, the Nittany Lions defeated Eastern Michigan (45-7) and Kent State (34-0) in 2013, Akron (21-3) in 2014, Buffalo (27-14) in 2015, and Kent State (33-13) in 2016.
- PSU has played a MAC school every year since 2009.

- Penn State went 4-1 against its neighbors last season.
- The only FBS teams Penn State had not played since 2012 within the radius were Pitt and West Virginia. Penn State played the first of a four-game series against Pitt last season and the Mountaineers are on Penn State's schedule in 2023 and 2024.
- The last time Penn State did not play any of its nearest neighbors was 2005.
- Since joining the Big Ten in 1993, Penn State is 40-4 against FBS teams within 250 miles.
- All-time, Penn State is 286-111-17 against its current FBS regional foes.
- Penn State will play four nearby teams in each of the next two seasons.

**PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS**

- RB **Saquon Barkley** and TE **Mike Gesicki** were both selected to the Preseason Associated Press All-America team.
- Barkley is also a preseason first-team All-American for ESPN, *USA Today*, *Sporting News*, *Lindy's*, *Street & Smith* and *Athlon Sports*. Additionally, he was named the #5 player in FBS by SI.com and earned the #1 spot on Sports Illustrated's "Feldman's Freaks" list heading into the 2017 campaign.
- Barkley was stellar in 2016, claiming Graham-George Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, Ameche-Dayne Big Ten Running Back of the Year and the *Chicago Tribune* Silver Football for the Big Ten's best player last season. Barkley was named to the All-Big Ten first team by the coaches and media, which made him a unanimous first team choice.
- Barkley led the Big Ten and was fifth in the FBS in total touchdowns (22) and was tops in the conference and 21st nationally in all-purpose yards (140.86 ypg). The junior back was second in the conference and 24th nationally with 106.9 rushing yards per game. His 1,496 yards in 2016 broke the Penn State sophomore season record and rank fifth on the single-season charts. Barkley heads into his junior season 12th on Penn State's career rushing yardage list (2,572) and 10th in career rushing touchdowns (25).
- Gesicki, who is also a preseason All-American according to *Athlon*, *Street & Smith's*, *Lindy's* and *Sporting News*, had a breakout campaign in 2016, breaking the Penn State single-season record for receptions and yardage by a tight end. His 48 catches broke the record held by Andrew Quarless (41; 2009) and his 679 receiving yards best Mickey Shuler's previous mark of 600 receiving yards (1977). Gesicki also tied the Penn State season record for touchdown catches for a tight end (5) in 2016.
- Gesicki led the Big Ten and was tied for seventh nationally in receptions and receiving yards by a tight end. For his efforts, Gesicki was named second-team All-Big Ten by the media and All-Big Ten honorable mention by the coaches. Gesicki has four or more catches in seven of his last 12 games.
- Additionally, S **Marcus Allen** drew first-team preseason All-America recognition from *Sporting News* and third team honors from *Athlon Sports* and Pro Football Focus.
- Allen was selected third-team All-Big Ten by the conference's coaches and honorable mention by the media panel last season. He made a team- and career-high 110 tackles on the season to become the first Penn State safety to lead the team in tackles since Shawn Mayer (144) in 2002.

**BARKLEY, McSORLEY TEAM UP ON WALTER CAMP, MAXWELL LISTS**

- RB **Saquon Barkley** and QB **Trace McSorley** each earned a spot on the Walter Camp and Maxwell Player of the Year Award watch lists.
- The Walter Camp Trophy is awarded to the outstanding player of the year who has exemplified the qualities of self-discipline, unselfish team play, desire to excel, mature judgement and respect for leadership. He must be a dedicated competitor who has made effective use of his athletic talent to enhance the great American game of college football. His standout performance on the playing field must be accompanied by an equally strong effort to contribute to the betterment of the life of all his fellow human beings. He must exhibit an awareness of the need to fulfill his role as a leader. He must espouse the ideals adhered to by Walter Camp, the "Father of American Football."
- Penn State has two Walter Camp winners: John Cappelletti (1973) and Larry Johnson (2002.)
- Penn State is tied for the national lead among all schools with its seven Maxwell Award winners.
- The Maxwell Award, named in honor of Robert W. "Tiny" Maxwell, has been given to America's College Player of the Year since 1937. Maxwell's contributions to the game of football were extensive, including time as a player, a sportswriter and an official.

**3,500 & 1,000**

- Penn State is one of three FBS teams to return a 3,500 yard passer and 1,000-yard rusher.
- The Nittany Lions return QB **Trace McSorley**, who threw for a team-record 3,614 yards in 2016, and RB **Saquon Barkley**, who rushed for a team-sophomore record 1,496 yards.
- The other two teams are Oklahoma State, returning QB Mason Rudolph (4,091 passing yards) and RB Justice Hill (1,142 rushing yards), and Louisville, returning QB Lamar Jackson (3,543 passing yards and 1,571 rushing yards).
- Penn State was one of 11 FBS teams to boast a 3,500-yard passer and a 1,000-yard rusher in 2016. Furthermore, Penn State was one of six teams in the Autonomy Five and the only Big Ten school to accomplish the feat last year.
- McSorley owns the Penn State season passing yards record at 3,614. Only two other Penn State quarterbacks eclipsed 3,000 yards passing in a single season: Matt McGloin (3,266 yds; 2012) and Daryll Clark (3,003 yds; 2009).
- Barkley tallied 1,496 rushing yards to rank fifth in program history. It was also the highest total by a Penn State back since Larry Johnson's record-breaking campaign in 2002.
- PSU's two other seasons with a 3,000-yard passer also featured a 1,000-yard rusher: Zach Zwinak (1,000 yards, 2012) and Evan Royster (1,169 yards, 2009).

## OFFENSE NOTES

## OFFENSE COVERING GROUND

- Penn State's offense averaged 432.6 yards per game last season, which was its most since the 2013 season (433.2). The figure ranked 49th in FBS and second in the Big Ten.
- The Nittany Lions had 11 games with 400 or more yards of total offense, the most since the 1994 team had 11 games with 400-plus yards, including the Rose Bowl.
- Penn State had four games with 500 or more yards of total offense, the most in a season since the 2009 team had the same.

## SECOND HALF SUCCESS

- The Nittany Lion offense ranked second in FBS in second half scoring (23.29) and third in fourth quarter scoring (11.86).
- Penn State led FBS in second half scoring differential (+14.00) and fourth quarter scoring differential (+6.71). *Courtesy of SportSource Analytics*
- Penn State outscored its opponents in the second half, 326-130.
- In the final nine games of the season, Penn State outscored opponents 149-39 in the fourth quarter.
- Just 133 of the 356 points allowed by Penn State were after halftime.
- Seven of Penn State's 11 wins were either one possession games at halftime (six occasions) or Penn State was down by two scores (Big Ten Championship Game). In total Penn State was trailing at halftime on four occasions.
- Penn State shut out four teams in the second half: Kent State, Maryland, Rutgers (entire game) and Michigan State.
- Only two teams outscored Penn State in the second half last season: Temple and Michigan. Those games were the third and fourth of the season.

## COMEBACKS

- Penn State had arguably one of its most exciting seasons, posting a program-high four double-digit comebacks in 2016.
- The comeback trend started vs. Minnesota. Penn State trailed by 10 at halftime (13-3) but rallied to win 29-26 in overtime.
- Against Ohio State, Penn State trailed by 14 points entering the fourth quarter, but scored 17 unanswered to win.
- The Ohio State win marked the first time that PSU won when trailing going into the fourth quarter by 14 points since at least 1967. The Nittany Lions trailed Michigan State by 13 points (37-24) in 1993 entering the fourth quarter. Penn State won the game, 38-37.
- The Nittany Lions trailed by 10 points (24-14) in the third quarter at Indiana, but rallied to outscore the Hoosiers 31-7 over the final 16:09 for their third double-digit comeback of the season.
- The Nittany Lions' rallied from 21 points down with 5:31 remaining in the second quarter in the Big Ten Championship Game. The Lions scored a touchdown before halftime to trail by 14 points at the break, and then outscored Wisconsin, 24-3 in the second half.
- The Big Ten Championship Game comeback was the biggest for Penn State since rallying from a 21-0 deficit in the second quarter for a 35-21 win over Northwestern on Nov. 6, 2010.

## HIGH SCORING

- Penn State averaged 37.7 points per game in 2016, which is its highest scoring rate since averaging 38.9 points per game for the 2008 season that also concluded in Pasadena.
- Penn State had not averaged over 30 points per game since the 2008 season.
- Penn State's scoring offense ranked 21st in FBS and third in the Big Ten.
- The Nittany Lions scored 40 or more points in five games, the most in a season since the 2008 squad did it seven times.
- Penn State scored 30 or more points in 10 games this year, the most in a season since the 1994 squad did it 12 times.
- The Nittany Lions have scored 319 points in their last seven games, marking the highest seven-game total since scoring 328 over a seven-game stretch in 1994.
- Penn State's five 20-plus point wins were the most since the 2012 team had five.
- The 49 points scored by Penn State against USC were the most in a loss in program history.

## BARKLEY ON WALKER WATCH LIST

- RB **Saquon Barkley** is among the candidates selected to the Doak Walker Award watch list for the nation's top running back.
- Penn State's lone Doak Walker Award winner was Larry Johnson in 2002. Ki-Jana Carter and Curtis Enis were finalists for the award in 1994 and 1997, respectively.
- The Doak Walker Award, presented annually by the SMU Athletic Forum, was created in 1989 to recognize the nation's top running back for his accomplishments on the field, achievement in the classroom and citizenship in the community. It is the only major collegiate football award that requires all candidates to be on schedule to graduate within one year of other students of the same classification.

CONTINUING ACADEMIC TRADITION

- The Penn State football team continued to excel in the classroom during the 2016 fall semester with 51 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade-point average.
- The fall effort marks the seventh time in the last eight semesters (including summer sessions) the Nittany Lions have had more than 50 student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA or better.
- The Lions have had 50 or more student-athletes with a 3.0 GPA or higher in each of the last three fall semesters.
- A total of 19 Nittany Lions posted a 3.5 GPA or higher in the fall semester, with 15 earning Dean's List recognition for having 3.5 GPA or higher with 12 credits earned in undergraduate work.
- Overall, 48 football student-athletes own a 3.0 cumulative GPA or higher after the fall semester, with 16 posting a 3.5 cumulative GPA or higher.
- The 2016-17 academic year also saw true freshman punter Blake Gillikin and graduate student Cody Hodgens posted perfect 4.0 GPAs in both the fall and the spring semesters.
- Gillikin is enrolled in the Schreyer Honors College.
- In addition to Gillikin and Hodgens, Brandon Smith and Jake Zembiec earned perfect 4.0 GPAs in the spring semester.
- Additionally, 19 Nittany Lions earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition last fall.
- Three Nittany Lions earned Big Ten Distinguished Scholar accolades for 2016-17: Gordon Bentley, Brandon Smith and Tyler Yazujian.
- The Nittany Lion freshmen were impressive in the fall semester with 15 posting a 3.0 or higher.

BARKLEY IN THE RECORD BOOKS

- Running back **Saquon Barkley** has placed his name in the Penn State record books in just two seasons.
  - His 1,496 rushing yards as a sophomore rank fifth on the Penn State single-season charts.
  - Barkley is in 12th place on Penn State's career rushing yardage list with 2,572 yards.
  - Barkley's two rushing touchdowns in the Rose Bowl brought his season total to 18, which ranks tied for fifth place in the Penn State record books

WATCHING MCSORLEY

- In addition to the Maxwell and Walter Camp Player of the Year watch lists, QB **Trace McSorley** is on three quarterback watch lists - the Davey O'Brien, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm and Manning Award lists - as well as one for community service, the Wuerffel Trophy.
  - The Davey O'Brien National Quarterback Award is presented annually to the nation's best college quarterback and is the oldest and most prestigious national quarterback award. The award honors candidates who exemplify Davey O'Brien's enduring character while exhibiting teamwork, sportsmanship and leadership in both academics and athletics.
  - Todd Blackledge (1982) and Kerry Collins (1994) are the Lions that have claimed the Davey O'Brien Award.
  - The Golden Arm Award is presented at the end of each football season and the winner is selected based on his accomplishments both on and off the field. Candidates must be a college senior or fourth-year junior on schedule to graduate with their class.
  - The Golden Arm Award is named in honor of Johnny Unitas, who was an 18-year veteran of the NFL and played his collegiate career at the University of Louisville before joining the Baltimore Colts in 1958. His career passing figures include 2,830 pass completions for 40,239 yards, 290 touchdowns and throwing a touchdown pass in 47 consecutive games.
  - The Wuerffel Trophy, known as "College Football's Premier Award for Community Service," is presented annually by the All Sports Association in Fort Walton Beach Florida. Named after 1996 Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Danny Wuerffel from the University of Florida, the Wuerffel Trophy is awarded to the FBS player that best combines exemplary community service with athletic and academic achievement.
  - McSorley turned in one of the top QB campaigns in program history last season, breaking the Penn State season record for passing yards (3,614), passing touchdowns (29) and total offense records (3,979).

- McSorley has thrown four touchdowns in each of his last three games (Michigan State, Big Ten Championship Game - Wisconsin and Rose Bowl - USC).
- He's the first Big Ten QB to throw four touchdowns in three straight games since J.T. Barrett (OSU) in 2014.
- McSorley threw more TD passes (12) in the final three games of 2016 than any other FBS QB.
- McSorley threw TD passes to 10 different receivers in 2016, marking the first time since 1971 a Penn State quarterback found 10-plus pass catchers for scores.

MCSORLEY = McRECORDS

- In addition to setting Penn State records for passing yards in a season, passing touchdowns in a season and total offense in a season, Trace McSorley ranks sixth on Penn State's single-season pass completions list (224) and fifth in season pass attempts (387).
  - McSorley had one of the most productive games by a Nittany Lion ever against Minnesota. He accounted for 408 yards of total offense -- 335 passing and 74 rushing -- to mark the third-highest total in school history. It was the most yards of total offense since Christian Hackenberg posted a school-record 454 yards against UCF in the 2014 Croke Park Classic vs. UCF. McSorley also had his longest career completion, an 80-yard touchdown to Irvin Charles.
  - McSorley set Big Ten Championship Game records for passing yards (384) and passing touchdowns (4).
  - He became the first Penn State quarterback with three consecutive games with both a rushing touchdown and passing touchdown since Matt McGloin in 2012 (vs. Temple, at Illinois, vs. Northwestern).
  - McSorley had four passing touchdowns in each of the final three games of the season. He joins Todd Blackledge (1982 - vs. Temple, Maryland, Rutgers) as the only Penn State quarterback to have at least four passing scores in three-straight games.

GESICKI ON MACKKEY WATCH LIST

- **Mike Gesicki** is on the preseason Mackey Award watch list for the second-straight season.
  - The Mackey Award is given annually to the most outstanding collegiate tight end. The award is named after NFL Hall of Famer John Mackey, who is considered to be the best to have played the position.
  - Gesicki had a breakout campaign in 2016, breaking the Penn State single-season record for receptions and yardage by a tight end. His 48 catches broke the record held by Andrew Quarless (41; 2009) and his 679 receiving yards best Mickey Shuler's previous mark of 600 receiving yards (1977). Gesicki also tied the Penn State season record for touchdown catches for a tight end (5) in 2016. He led the Big Ten and was tied for seventh nationally in receptions and receiving yards by a tight end. For his efforts, Gesicki was named second-team All-Big Ten by the media and All-Big Ten honorable mention by the coaches. Gesicki has four or more catches in seven of his last 12 games.

## DEFENSE NOTES

- **S Marcus Allen** and LB **Jason Cabinda** are listed on the Bednarik Award, Nagurski Trophy, and Lott IMPACT Award watch lists.
- The Bednarik Award has been presented to the College Defensive Player of the Year since 1995. Chuck Bednarik, former standout at Penn and with the Philadelphia Eagles, is a member of both the College Football Hall of Fame's Class of '69 and the NFL Hall of Fame's Class of '67.
- The Nittany Lions' four Bednarik Award recipients are the most of any school in the nation.
- The Bronko Nagurski Trophy is given yearly to the National Defensive Player of the Year. The award is named for legendary two-way player from the University of Minnesota, Bronko Nagurski, who dominated college football then became a star for the Chicago Bears in the 1930s.
- Penn State has never won a Nagurski Trophy, but has had five finalists, most recently Carl Nassib in 2015.
- The Lott IMPACT Trophy honors the top defensive player in college football who makes the biggest impact for his team, both on and off the field. The award is given to a distinguished young man who represents the qualities embodied by Hall of Famer Ronnie Lott – Integrity, Maturity, Performance, Academics, Community and Tenacity.
- Penn State's Carl Nassib won the award in 2015. **See Preseason Honors on Page 10**

## CABINDA ON BUTKUS WATCH LIST

- In addition to the Bednarik, Nagurski, and Lott lists, LB **Jason Cabinda** was also named to the Butkus Award watch list.
- The award, named in honor of legendary linebacker Dick Butkus, annually recognizes the nation's top collegiate linebacker.
- Cabinda will be vying to become the first Nittany Lion to earn the honor since Paul Posluszny in 2005. LaVar Arrington also won the award in 1999, and five have previously been named finalists: Shane Conlan (1986), Andre Collins (1989), Brandon Short (1999), Posluszny (2006) and Dan Connor (2007).
- Cabinda, a 2017 team captain, Cabinda garnered third-team All-Big Ten accolades from the conference coaches, despite missing five games due to injury in 2016. He posted eight tackles or more in all nine games he played in last season and has logged eight or more tackles in 11 of his last 13 games, dating back to 2015. Cabinda finished third on the squad with 81 tackles in 2016, after posting 100 stops in his sophomore season. He had 13 tackles in the upset win over No. 2 Ohio State, including the game-clinching takedown of Buckeye quarterback J.T. Barrett on 4th-and-23 on OSU's final drive. For his career, Cabinda has 198 tackles, eight pass breakups, 3.5 sacks and 10.0 tackles for loss. **See Preseason Honors on Page 10**

## SACK MASTERS

- With 46 sacks in 2015 and 40 sacks last season, Penn State posted back-to-back 40-sack seasons for the first time since it posted three-consecutive 40-sack seasons in 2005 (41), 2006 (40) and 2007 (46).
- In 2015, led by a record 15.5 sacks by Carl Nassib, Penn State posted 46 sacks.
- Despite only returning 41.3 percent of the sack production from the previous year, the Nittany Lions got to the quarterback 40 times last season.
- **Kevin Givens** is Penn State's returning sack leader, with 4.5 quarterback drops last season. Penn State returns 52.5 percent of its sack production.

## ALLEN ON THORPE AWARD WATCH LIST

- In addition to the Bednarik, Nagurski, and Lott lists, **S Marcus Allen** earned a spot on the Paycom Jim Thorpe Award watch list.
- The Paycom Jim Thorpe Award is awarded to the best defensive back in college football based on performance on the field, athletic ability and character. The award was established in 1986 and is named after history's greatest all-around athlete, Jim Thorpe. Thorpe excelled not only as a running back, passer, and kicker on the offensive side of the ball; but also stood out as a defensive back. In addition to his legendary performance on the football field, Thorpe played professional baseball and won Olympic gold medals in the decathlon and pentathlon.
- Allen was selected third-team All-Big Ten by the conference's coaches and honorable mention by the media panel last season. He made a team- and career-high 110 tackles on the season to become the first Penn State safety to lead the team in tackles since Shawn Mayer (144) in 2002. He was honored as the Big Ten Co-Defensive Player of the Week and Rose Bowl Player of the Week for his 22-tackle effort versus Minnesota Oct. 1. He also claimed Oct. 24 Co-Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week accolades after blocking a field goal attempt versus No. 2 Ohio State, which led to the game-winning touchdown by teammate **Grant Haley**. Allen finished the season ranked 16th in the Big Ten with 7.9 tackles per game and was third in the conference with two fumble recoveries. For his career, Allen has 249 tackles, 13.0 tackles for loss, three forced fumbles, three fumble recoveries and eight pass breakups. **See Preseason Honors on Page 10**

## B1G DEFENSIVE PERFORMANCES

- Penn State did not allow a touchdown in its last two regular-season B1G games (Michigan State and Rutgers). The Lions yielded four field goals in the first half against Michigan State and shutout Rutgers.
- It was the first time since 2009 that PSU had held teams without a TD in back-to-back games. It held Eastern Illinois to three points (Oct. 10, 52-3) before shutting out Minnesota (Oct. 17, 20-0) on Homecoming.
- Moreover, the last time Penn State held back-to-back Big Ten opponents without a touchdown was in 2006: Illinois (Oct. 21, 26-12) and at Purdue (Oct. 28, 12-0).
- Penn State shutout Rutgers 39-0 for its first shutout since a 39-0 home victory over Illinois in 2015. The last time Penn State shutout an opponent in back-to-back seasons was 2009 and 2010.
- The 39-point shutout win was Penn State's largest road shutout victory since joining the Big Ten in 1993 and the largest road shutout since 1973 (Navy, 39-0).
- It was Penn State's seventh Big Ten shutout (against 6 different teams) and the first time doing so in consecutive seasons:

- The Nittany Lions allowed just 87 yards of offense to the Scarlet Knights, the fewest given up in a Big Ten game by a Penn State team and the fewest in a game overall since giving up 74 yards versus Temple in 2006.
- Penn State gave up just five first downs to Rutgers, the fewest surrendered in a B1G game in program history. The five first downs allowed were the fewest in any game since giving up two versus Temple in 2006.

## FRANKLIN INKS EXTENSION

- Penn State Director of Athletics Sandy Barbour announced in August that head football coach **James Franklin** has signed a contract extension. The new agreement extends Franklin's current contract to six years, keeping the 2016 *Sporting News* and Woody Hayes National Coach of the Year as the leader of the Nittany Lions through at least the 2022 season.
- During the 2016 campaign, Franklin's third in Happy Valley, he led Penn State to its first outright Big Ten Championship since 1994 and its second Big Ten divisional title. Named Penn State's 16th head football coach on January 11, 2014, Franklin has directed the Nittany Lions to three consecutive winning seasons, including an 11-3 mark and Rose Bowl berth last year.
- From Langhorne, Pennsylvania, Franklin is entering his fourth year as the leader of the Nittany Lions and his seventh as a collegiate head coach. He is among 12 active FBS head coaches (7 at Autonomy 5 schools) to lead his team to a bowl game in each of his first six years as a head coach and has posted five consecutive winning seasons. Franklin, who directed Penn State to the No. 5 CFP and No. 7 final ranking in 2016, has mentored 44 players who've matriculated to the NFL during his initial six years as a head coach.
- Franklin has guided Penn State football student-athletes to tremendous achievement in academics and community service. Included in the accomplishments are a program-record 56 squad members earning a 3.0 grade-point average or higher during the 2015 fall semester (19 on Dean's List) and more than 6,100 hours of community service during his first three years in Happy Valley. A total of 61 Nittany Lions have earned Academic All-Big Ten recognition for posting at least a 3.0 GPA and being a letterwinner during the past three years.

## COACH OF THE YEAR CANDIDATE

- **James Franklin** was one of 19 selections on the Dodd Trophy watch list for the nation's top coach.
- The Dodd Trophy, college football's most coveted coaching award, celebrates the head coach of a team who enjoys success on the gridiron, while also stressing the importance of scholarship, leadership and integrity – the three pillars of legendary coach Bobby Dodd's philosophy. The award, which was established in 1976, honors the coach of a team which enjoys a successful football season, while also stressing the importance of academic excellence and character, as did coach Bobby Dodd's teams during his 22 years as head football coach of the Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets.

- For the third time in four seasons, head coach **James Franklin** was able to keep his coaching staff intact.
- Seven out of his 10 coaches are members of his original Penn State staff, and half have been with him for seven or more consecutive years.

- The 15th Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift for Life" in July was a tremendous success. The preliminary fundraising total for the 2017 event was more than \$95,000 to benefit Uplifting Athletes and its commitment to life skills development, patient focused programs and rare disease research. The 15-year total or "Lift for Life" is now nearly \$1.3 million.
- Donations to the Penn State chapter of Uplifting Athletes and Lift for Life will remain open until Sept. 30. As of Aug. 25, the current fundraising total is \$96,549.98. - With the contributions from this year, nearly \$1.3 million has been raised by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural Lift for Life was held in 2003. The inaugural event raised just under \$13,000.
- The Penn State Lift for Life featured more than 100 members of the Nittany Lion football team and was held at Holuba Hall, with approximately 2,000 fans in attendance. The exhibition featured rotations of one-on-one battles in the tire flip, sled pull, bench press and farmer's hold, followed by tug of war competitions.
- The 2017 Penn State Lift for Life included a kids clinic for the fourth year in a row, which was run by the Nittany Lion true freshmen football student-athletes. The event concluded with a team autograph session.
- Founded by Penn State Football teammates Scott Shirley, Dave Costlow and Damone Jones in 2003, Lift for Life has benefitted cancer research and the rare disease community.
- The Penn State Uplifting Athletes Chapter also announced linebacker **Jason Cabinda** and quarterback **Trace McSorley** will serve as co-presidents. The 2017 Uplifting Athletes officers are: offensive lineman **Andrew Nelson**, vice president; offensive lineman **Ryan Bates**, secretary; former offensive lineman **Tom Devenney**, treasurer.
- About Uplifting Athletes: A nonprofit organization founded in 2007, Uplifting Athletes inspires the rare disease community with hope through the power of sport. A rare disease is one that affects fewer than 200,000 Americans and typically lacks financial incentive to make and market new treatments. With a network of university chapters run by current college football student-athletes, Uplifting Athletes has established 22 chapters with Division I football programs across the country. Overall since its inception Uplifting Athletes has had an economic impact of more than \$400 million on the rare disease community. ## LIONS BRING SMILES TO HERSHEY

- For coach **James Franklin**, part of the developmental process means at Penn State involves taking time to make a positive impact. True to Franklin's first core value - a single positive attitude duplicated by more than 100 came out in full force for an afternoon in July.
- For the fourth consecutive year, Franklin and his 105-member team boarded three buses for a trip to Hershey to visit the Penn State Children's Hospital. From dancing to coloring, games and in-room visits, the Nittany Lions brought smiles to even the weariest of faces, even if just for a moment.
- "It's a really good experience we love doing this every year," sophomore running back **Andre Robinson** said. "This is one of the cooler things that we do, getting to give back to these kids. It makes their day just for us to come and hang out for an hour or two. We're really privileged to have that opportunity to make that impact on their lives."
- For the staff and team, seeing pure delight stretch across the faces of so many is a yearly highlight. "There are people who have had much more challenging upbringings than me, but there were people who really made a difference for me and for my family, who went above and beyond and didn't have to, and I realized what's it has done for me," Franklin said.

## SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

- PK **Tyler Davis** and **Blake Gillikin** joined the pack of Nittany Lions on preseason watch lists with berths on the Lou Groza Award and Ray Guy Award charts, respectively.
- The Lou Groza Award is awarded to the nation's top kicker, while the Ray Guy Award is given annually to the nation's top punter.
- The Augusta Sports Council created the Ray Guy Award in 2000 to honor Thomson, Georgia, native and College and Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee, Ray Guy. Among the statistics used to identify the winner is net punting average, number of times punt is downed or kicked out of bounds inside the opponents 20-yard line, total yardage punted, average returned yardage and percentage of punts not returned with particular emphasis placed on net punting average. The winner must display team leadership, self-discipline and have a positive impact on the team's success.
- Davis earned the 2016 Vlade Award for the nation's most accurate kicker from the Touchdown Club of Columbus to go along with first-team All-Big Ten accolades from the conference coaches and second team accolades from the media. He was a semifinalist for the Groza award last season.
- Davis tied the Penn State single-season record with 62 converted extra points attempts, equaling Brett Conway's mark from 1994 and tied for No. 2 on Penn State's single-season field goals made charts (22), trailing only Sam Ficken's 24 makes from 2014. Davis finished No. 5 on the PSU single-season scoring charts (128 points) and also tied the Big Ten single-season kick scoring record with 128 points, equaling the mark set by Ohio State's Sean Nuernberger in 2014. For his career, Davis ranks No. 12 on Penn State's career field goals made charts with 30. He also broke the school record for consecutive field goals made with 18, topping Sam Ficken's mark of 15 straight makes between the 2012 and 2013 seasons. The 18-straight made field goals were tied for the longest streak in the Big Ten since Brad Craddock (UMD) converted 24-straight in from 2013-14 and are tied for fourth in Big Ten history. Davis led the Big Ten and was eighth nationally with a .917 field goal percentage and was second in the conference and 11th nationally in total points (128). Davis had the third-most extra point makes among kickers with a perfect percentage in FBS in 2016.
- Gillikin was selected to ESPN.com's True Freshman All-America team and was an All-Big Ten honorable mention selection by the conference's coaches and media after a stellar rookie campaign. He broke the Penn State freshman season punting average record with 42.8 yards per punt, surpassing the record set by Jeremy Kapinos in 2003 (41.9). His effort also ranks No. 7 on Penn State's single-season chart. Gillikin finished the season 30th in FBS and third in the Big Ten in punting average. In addition, Gillikin set the Penn State freshman record for punting average in a game with five kicks for an average of 50.8 yards in the Rose Bowl against USC. He was also stellar in the classroom, posting perfect 4.0 grade point averages in both semesters and claimed the President's Freshman Award, which recognizes Penn State students for academic excellence.

## DAVIS WINS VLADE AWARD

- Tyler Davis was recognized as the NCAA's most accurate kicker, as he was named the winner of the 2016 Vlade Award presented by The Touchdown Club of Columbus.
- The award is named for former Ohio State kicker Vlade Janakievski, who was one of the most accurate placekickers in Ohio State football history.
- In 2016, Davis was perfect on 62 PAT attempts and accurate on 91.7 percent (22-of-24) of field goal tries, with both of his failed conversions coming on blocks.

## SEASON NOTES

## BIG TEN CHAMPIONS

- Penn State defeated Wisconsin, 38-31, in the 2016 Big Ten Championship game in Lucas Oil Stadium to win its first Big Ten Championship since 2008 and fourth overall (1994, 2005).
- It was Penn State's first appearance in the Big Ten Championship game since the game's inception in 2011.
- Finishing at 8-1 in Big Ten play during the regular season, Penn State clinched a share of the Big Ten East Division title with Ohio State. It is the first divisional title for the Nittany Lions since sharing the Leaders Division crown with Wisconsin in 2011.

## WINNING BIG

- Penn State posted eight Big Ten wins in 2016 for just the second time in program history with the other being the 8-0 conference mark in 1994.
- The Nittany Lions finished Big Ten play at 8-1 for the first time ever, as Penn State had never played nine Big Ten games in a season before.
- Penn State's 8-1 Big Ten record represents its third one-loss Big Ten season (2005 & 2008, 7-1) and second eight-win season (1994, 8-0).
- Including the Big Ten Championship game, the Nittany Lions have won nine consecutive Big Ten games.
- Penn State's longest winning streak in Big Ten games is 12, running from the final four conference games in 1993 through the entirety of the 1994 season.

## FRANKLIN CLAIMS COACH OF THE YEAR HONORS

- Penn State head coach James Franklin was named the Sporting News National Coach of the Year, as well as the Woody Hayes National Coach of the Year.
- He is the second Penn State head coach to win the Sporting News honor, joining Joe Paterno, who claimed the award in 2005.
- Franklin joins Paterno as Penn State coaches to win the Woody Hayes Award. Paterno was a four-time recipient in 1978, 1982, 1986 and 2005.
- Franklin was also selected as the College Sports Madness National Coach of the Year. Additionally, he was a finalist for the 2016 Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year award as presented by the Football Writers Association of America and the Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year Award.
- Franklin earned his first conference Coach of the Year accolade, winning Big Ten Coach of the Year from the Associated Press and the conference's media.
- Franklin's Dave McLain Big Ten Coach of the Year marks the fifth time a Penn State head coach has won the honor, joining Paterno (1994, 2005, 2008) and Bill O'Brien (2012).

## LIONS HOST PANTHERS FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 1999

- Penn State welcomes Pittsburgh to Beaver Stadium for the first time since 1999 when the Panthers visit Happy Valley Sept. 9 at 3:30 p.m. This is the second game of a four-game series.
- The Nittany Lions have met the Panthers more than any other opponent - 97 times - with Penn State owning a 50-43-4 series advantage.
- The teams first met in 1893 and played every season from 1900-31 and 1935-92, often in a compelling final game of the regular season.
- The teams did not meet from 1993-96, when Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference, and then played a four-game series from 1997-2000, with the Nittany Lions winning the 1997-99 contests.
- The Panthers have won the two last meetings, including a 42-39 decision at Heinz Field in 2016.
- Penn State owns a 17-6 record against Pitt in State College, while the Panthers have a 35-29-4 advantage in games played on their home field.
- Penn State leads, 5-1, in neutral site games, the majority of which were played in Pittsburgh.





**RUTGERS IS HOMECOMING FOE**

- When the alumni return to Happy Valley for the 2017 Homecoming game, the Penn State faithful will cheer their Nittany Lions against Rutgers.
- The Scarlet Knights will provide the opponent for the 2017 Homecoming contest on Nov. 11 at noon.
- This is the third time that Penn State will meet Rutgers in a Homecoming game. The Nittany Lions defeated the Scarlet Knights in 1987 (35-21) and 1991 (37-17) in Homecoming contests.
- Penn State owns a 70-22-5 record all-time on Homecoming, including wins in 10 of its last 12 games.

- Active duty, guard and reserve military, veterans, and fallen and Gold Star families able to apply online for complimentary-donated tickets to the Penn State-Rutgers game on Saturday, Nov. 11 as part of the Seats for Servicemembers program at Penn State's Military Appreciation Week.
- In its sixth year, the program honors the commitment and sacrifices of veterans, families and loved ones by providing tickets at no cost to active and retired Servicemembers, as well as a complimentary pregame tailgate at the Bryce Jordan Center. Penn State supporters, alumni, and business donations have graciously made this possible.
- Thanks to the generosity of Penn State supporters, tickets are now available for military members and veterans, their families and loved ones to request on a first-come, first-served basis to the Nov. 11 game.
- All active duty, Guard and Reserve military, veterans, and Fallen and Gold Star families are eligible to redeem one complimentary ticket for themselves and up to three additional complimentary seats for immediate family members. Additionally, all qualifying individuals are eligible to request up to five additional tickets for a discounted rate of just \$35 per person. There will be 7,500 tickets available to be distributed -- all sign-ups are simply requests until confirmed via email by Penn State Athletics.
- There will be a number of events occurring throughout the week, as part of Penn State's Military Appreciation Week. Kicked off by the home football game against Rutgers. On Sunday, November 12, Penn State men's basketball and Lady Lion basketball will be honoring Servicemembers throughout their doubleheader. The Lady Lions take on Drexel, while men's basketball is slated to play Farleigh Dickinson. Military can request a \$10 ticket per person, which includes admission into both games! Game times are TBD.
- Supporters can still purchase Seats for Servicemembers tickets that will be distributed to military by visiting [GoPSUsports.com/militaryappreciation](http://GoPSUsports.com/militaryappreciation) or by calling 1-800-NITTANY, Monday -- Friday between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. Tickets for the Seats for Servicemembers program are only \$35 per Servicemember.
- Penn State hosted 10,000 military members for the game against Iowa last season.
- Active duty, guard and reserve military, veterans, and fallen and Gold Star families who already have game tickets for the November 11 game against Rutgers, they are encouraged to attend the pre-game tailgate at the Bryce Jordan Center. The event will require a ticket for admission, please call 1-800-NITTANY to request a ticket.

- Three Nittany Lions are wearing new numbers in 2017, including **Cam Brown** (6), **Steven Gonzalez** (74) and **Shaka Toney** (18).

**RIVALRY RENEWED**

- Penn State has many long and storied rivalries on the gridiron. The Nittany Lions have played 19 teams 20 or more times in the 131-year history of the program.
- Penn State owns a winning record against 16 of the 20 teams that they have met 20 or more times.
- Eight of the 20 teams are on the 2017 schedule; including Pitt (97 meetings), Iowa (25), Indiana (20), Michigan (20), Ohio State (31), Michigan State (31) Rutgers (25) and Maryland (37).
- Since 2012, Penn State has played or has a future meeting scheduled meeting with 13 of the 20 teams (all of the FBS teams except Navy). Those opponents include: Army (2015), Illinois (2014-15, '18), Iowa (2016-18), Pitt (2016-19), Syracuse (2012), Temple (2014-16) and West Virginia (2023-24), while the Lions will meet yearly with Big Ten East Division opponents Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Ohio State and Rutgers.
- Fifteen of the 20 programs are currently members of NCAA Division I FBS. Bucknell, Lehigh and Penn are in NCAA Division I FCS, while Gettysburg and Lebanon Valley are Division III programs.

**GENERATIONS OF GREATNESS**



The Penn State football team will turn back the clock for a special "Generations of Greatness" game against Indiana Sept. 30 in Beaver Stadium. Elements of the game against the Hoosiers will take fans back in time, while the Nittany Lions will don uniforms with designs elements from uniforms past.

**Game Day Elements**

- Videoboard – The Beaver Stadium scoreboards in the North and South end zone will be a flipboard display from the 1950s.
- Music – The in-game music will be a variety of hits from the 1950s to today.
- Cheer and Dance Teams – The Penn State cheerleaders and Lionettes will wear historic outfits.
- Honorary Captains – The coin toss is slated to have honorary captains to represent the 1950s to today.
- Blue Band – The Blue Band will perform music throughout the game from 1950s to today.
- Uniform Elements
- Numbers on Helmets – The Nittany Lions had the number on the side of their helmet from 1959-61 and then again from 1967-74. A No. 42 also appeared on the side of every Penn State helmet in the season finale against Wisconsin in 2012 to honor injured senior Michael Mauti.
- Block Uniform Numbers – The block uniform numbers are similar to those uniform numbers that donned the Blue & White from mid-1950s-66.
- White Stripe on Sleeve – Penn State's uniform had a white stripe on the sleeve several times, including 1957-66, 1982-89 and 1992-2011.
- Stripe on the Pants – The Nittany Lions had a blue stripe on their pants from 1952-68.
- Striped Socks – The striped sock pays tribute to those worn on game days from 1970-72.
- Gray Facemask – The gray facemask was donned by the Nittany Lions from 1959-86.
- White Cleats – The white cleats were worn by the Nittany Lions in the 1979 Sugar Bowl.
- Gloves – The gloves for the Indiana game will feature the Lion Shrine on the palm of the hands.
- Lion Shrine – The image of Lion Shrine appears on the "home plate" of the front of the jersey. It is an original element of the "Generations of Greatness" uniform to pay homage to the Lion Shrine that was a gift from the Class of 1940.
- Back Inside Collar – The back inside collar of the jersey reads "Penn State 1959" in recognition of the first Liberty Bowl game, played in Philadelphia. Penn State defeated Alabama, 7-0.

**OVERTIME OVER TIME**

College football introduced overtime during the bowl season in 1995 and adopted it for regular season games in 1996.

- Since then, Penn State has played 12 overtime games, including six over the 2012-14 seasons. Eight of the 12 overtime tilts have come at home, two in true road games, one in the 2006 Orange Bowl and one in the 2014 Pinstripe Bowl.
- Penn State is 7-5 all-time in overtime games, with a 4-4 record at Beaver Stadium, 1-1 mark in true road games and 2-0 ledger at a neutral site.
- Most recently, Penn State defeated Minnesota, 29-26, on Oct. 1, 2016. After Minnesota kicked a field goal on its first possession, Penn State running back **Saquon Barkley** rushed 25 yards for a touchdown on the Nittany Lions first offensive play.
- It was the sixth overtime game at Beaver Stadium since the start of the 2012 season. Penn State is 4-2 in those games.
- Penn State's first two overtime contests came vs. Iowa in 2000 and 2002 at home. The Nittany Lions dropped their first three contests that went to the extra period, but won five straight overtime contests before falling to Nebraska on Nov. 23, 2013.

**LIONS UNDER THE LIGHTS**

- With six game times still to be determined, Penn State has one night game on the schedule this season. Penn State will host Georgia State at 7:30 p.m. on Sept. 16.
- This season marks the 17th straight with at least one regular season night game on the schedule.
- Since 2000, Penn State has played multiple night games in the same season on nine occasions.
- Last season, Penn State went 4-0 in night games.
- Most recently, the Lions rallied past No. 6 Wisconsin, 38-31 in the Big Ten Championship game in Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis, to improve its night game record to 46-29.
- All-time Penn State is 12-10 at home, 21-12 on the road and 13-7 in neutral site games. Penn State is 1-1 at regular season neutral sites, 11-6 in bowl games and 1-0 in conference championship games.
- The 2016 Iowa game was Penn State's first nighttime regular season game in November since Nov. 14, 1987 at Pitt, and the game against Rutgers (Nov.19) was the latest regular season night game since Nov. 23, 1985 at Pitt.
- It was also the first time Penn State has played two primetime games in November.
- Penn State opened its primetime slate with its annual White Out game against Ohio State. It was the eighth primetime clash since 2005 and the fifth consecutive. Penn State rallied from 14 points down in the fourth quarter against then-No. 2 Ohio State for a victory.
- The Lions' night games since 2000 include: Ohio State, Iowa, Rutgers and Wisconsin (2016); Ohio State and Rutgers (2015); Boston College (Pinstripe Bowl), Ohio State, Michigan and Rutgers (2014); Ohio State, Michigan and UCF (2013); Iowa and Ohio State (2012); Northwestern (2011); Alabama, Iowa and Michigan (2010); Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007); Michigan (2006); Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005); Minnesota and Boston College (2004); Nebraska (2002 and '03), Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).
- On Oct. 12, 2013, the Nittany Lions claimed the longest game in Big Ten history when they edged Michigan under the lights, 43-40, in front of a sellout Beaver Stadium crowd of 107,844 on Homecoming.

**DUO ON BALLOT FOR 2018 COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME CLASS**

- First-team All-Americans Kerry Collins and Steve Wisniewski have been selected for the national ballot for the National Football Foundation's College Hall of Fame's Class of 2018. A total of 75 players and six coaches from FBS are on the 2018 ballot.
- They have an opportunity to join 18 former Nittany Lion players and five Penn State coaches who have been inducted into the Hall.
- Also on the ballot is former Nittany Lion student-athlete Glenn Killinger, who is among the candidates for the divisional coach Class of 2018. Killinger was inducted into the Hall of Fame as a player in 1966.
- To be eligible for the Hall of Fame ballot, players must have been named a first-team All-America by a major/national selector as recognized and utilized by the NCAA for their consensus All-America teams; played their last year of intercollegiate football at least 10 years prior to nomination; played within the last 50 years and cannot be currently playing professional football. Once nominated for consideration, all player candidates are submitted to one of eight District Screening Committees, which conducts a vote to determine who will appear on the ballot and represent their respective districts.
- Linebacker Shane Conlan was the most recent Penn State player inductee, entering the Hall in 2014, while running back Curt Warner was enshrined in the Hall of Fame in 2010.
- The announcement of the 2018 class will be made Monday, Jan. 8, 2018, in Atlanta. The city is serving as the host for the CFP National Championship, which will be played later that day at Mercedes-Benz Stadium.
- The Jan. 8 announcement will be televised live, and specific viewing information will be available as the date draws near.
- Collins helped Penn State earn a 40-9 record from 1991-94 and was instrumental in the Nittany Lions earning a 22-2 overall mark (14-2 conference) during their first two years in the Big Ten Conference. The recipient of the 1994 Maxwell Award as the National Player of the Year, he helped Penn State win three New Year's Day bowl games: the 1992 Fiesta, 1994 Citrus and 1995 Rose Bowls.
- Wisniewski was a three-year starter at guard for the Nittany Lions who would go on to become an All-Pro lineman in the NFL. He was one of two sophomores to start on the 1986 National Championship team and he opened holes for two first-team All-America running backs, Blair Thomas (1987) and D.J. Dozier (1986). One of just four Penn State offensive linemen to earn a pair of first-team All-America honors, he was recognized in 1988 by the American Football Coaches (AFCA) and repeated All-America accolades from Sporting News. A 1988 team captain, Wisniewski is one of just two offensive linemen to earn Penn State's team MVP honor since its creation in 1978.
- From Harrisburg, Killinger was a Walter Camp All-American at quarterback for the Nittany Lions in 1921. He coached at Dickinson (1922), Rensselaer (1927-32), Moravian (1933) and West Chester (1934-41, 45-59). Killinger is the winningest coach in West Chester history and is a member of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He died in 1988.

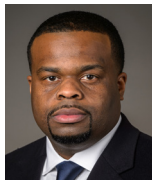
