SCOUTING THE HAWKEYES

lowa is coming off a tough weekend that saw the Hawkeyes tie Minnesota, 2-2, on Friday before dropping a hard-fought 2-1 match at Wisconsin on Sunday. Junior Anne Marie Thomas and senior Alex Melin notched goals against the Golden Gophers while Freshman Bri Toelle posted the Hawkeyes' lone goal versus the Badgers.

U of I is led by seniors Ashley Catrell and Melin and juniors Melanie Pickert and Thomas as each have tallied a team-high four goals. Catrell is also second on the team in assists with four. Hannah Clark leads lowa in goal, having posted a Big Ten-best seven shutouts. The sophomore ranks second in the league with a goals-against average of 0.91.

SERIES HISTORY vs. IOWA

Penn State owns a perfect 19-0-0 record against the Hawkeyes all-time. The Lions edged U of I, 2-1, in Iowa City last year during the regular season and eliminated the Hawkeyes from the Big Ten Tournament in Bloomington, Ind. by a count of 2-0.

SCOUTING THE CORN HUSKERS

Nebraska enters the weekend as the leader in the Big Ten race at 12-3-1 overall and 7-1-0 in league play. The Huskers battled to a 2-1 double overtime victory over Wisconsin last Friday before shutting out Minnesota 1-0 on Sunday. Kylie Greischar and Caroline Gray lifted the Huskers over the Badgers with one goal each and Jordan Jackson netted Nebraska's lone goal in the win over Minnesota.

Jackson, a senior, leads Nebraska's offensive attack with seven goals and six assists while freshman Jaycie Johnson has posted seven goals and two assists. Goalkeeper Emma Stevens leads NU's defensive unit, having amassed a goals-against average of 0.85 in Big Ten action. The senior has collected 61 saves this season.

SERIES HISTORY vs. NEBRASKA

The Blue and White hold a 2-0-0 record against the Corn Huskers all-time. PSU blew past Nebraska last season, posting a 4-0 shutout, and outscored NU 5-4 in 2011.

ON THE PITCH

The No. 16 Penn State women's soccer team travels west this weekend to face Iowa and Big Ten front-runner, Nebraska. The Lions will meet Iowa on Friday evening before taking on the Com Huskers on Sunday afternoon.

LAST TIME OUT

The No. 17 Penn State women's soccer team registered its first shutout of the Big Ten season on Sunday, downing Illinois by a count of 5-0 in the final home game of the regular season. Sophomore Raquel Rodriguez notched the first multi-goal performance of her career with two goals while Tani Costa, Mallory Weber and Maya Hayes also found the back of the net.

Rodriguez put Penn State on the board early, notching her first goal in the eighth minute. Senior Taylor Schram sent a through ball to Rodriguez and the midfielder fired it in from just outside the box to put the Lions up 1-0.

It did not take long for Rodriguez to double the Nittany Lions' lead as she buried another ball in the net just six minutes later. She rebounded the ball after a shot by Emily Hurd was blocked by an Illini defender and was able to finish from the top of the 18 yard box.

Costa pushed PSU's lead to 3-0 in the 31st minute after notching her sixth goal of the season. The forward made use of her quick footwork to turn a defender around before sending the ball in from 12 yards out.

The Blue and White showed no sign of slowing down entering the second half as Weber flicked in another goal at the 47:20 mark. The sophomore received the ball on a cross from freshman Brittany Basinger (Purcellville, Va.) and put it in from point blank range to give the Lions a 4-0 advantage.

Hayes capped the scoring in the 50th minute with her 16th goal of the year. Weber found Hayes inside the 18 yard box and the senior slipped the ball past Illinois keeper Claire Wheatly from 12 yards deep.

HAYES DRAWS WEEKLY HONORS

Senior Maya Hayes raked in the weekly awards this week for her efforts against Ohio State and Illinois last weekend. The forward earned Disney Soccer/NSCAA National Player of the Week, Big Ten Co-Offensive Player of the Week, Philly Soccer News Player of the Week and was named to the TopDrawerSoccer.com National Team of the Week after leading the Blue and White to back-to-back Big Ten victories.

Hayes notched three goals on the week, including the game-winner versus the Buckeyes. She found the back of the net twice against OSU, scoring the game-winner in the 54th minute of action, and tallied one goal in the Lions' 5-0 win over Illinois.

PENN STATE NO. 16 IN NSCAA POLL

After nine weeks of action, the Penn State women's soccer team ranks 16th overall according to the NSCAA rankings. Michigan (10) and Nebraska (21) also represent the Big Ten in the poll while Wisconsin is just outside of the Top 25, receiving votes.

LEADING THE LEAGUE

The Blue and White currently lead the conference in five offensive categories. They are No. 1 in goals (48), goals per game (3.00), assists (42), assists per game (2.62) and points (138). Penn State is also in the top five in the nation in points (3rd) and scoring offense (3rd).

HAYES FINALIST FOR SENIOR CLASS AWARD

Penn State senior Maya Hayes has been selected as one-of-10 finalists for the 2013 Senior CLASS Award in collegiate soccer. Hayes is the first PSU women's soccer student-athlete in the seven-year history of the award to be named a finalist.

The Senior CLASS (Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School) Award is presented yearly to a Division I senior student-athlete who has notable achievements in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition.

Penn State fans can vote for Hayes at the Senior Class Award website. Fans can vote DAILY for their top three choices and are encouraged to vote often as fan voting is a key factor in determining the winner of the award.

Hayes leads the Nittany Lions and the Big Ten and tied for third in the nation in points this season with 37 through 16 matches. The forward is also second in the league and tied for fourth in the country in goals (16) and has notched five assists.

A two-time NSCAA first team All-America selection, Hayes was second on the team in goals (16) and points (38) in 2012 despite missing the first seven games while participating in the U20 World Cup with the U.S. U20 Women's National Team. She led the nation in scoring in her sophomore season, registering 31 goals and eight assists for a Big Tenrecord 70 points.

A kinesiology major, Hayes has received several academic awards during her time as a Nittany Lion. She was a 2011 CoSIDA/Captial One third-team Academic All-America selection and CoSIDA/Capital One first team All-District selection. Hayes was included on the Dean's List for the spring 2013 semester and was inducted into Penn State's Athletic Honor Society, Spiritus Leoninus. She is also a two-time Academic All-Big Ten selection.

The finalists were chosen by a media committee from the list of 30 men's candidates and 30 women's candidates announced in August. Nationwide fan voting begins immediately to help select the winner. Fans are encouraged to vote on the Senior CLASS Award website through November 25. Fan votes will be combined with media and Division I head coaches' votes to determine the winner. The Senior CLASS Award winners will be announced during the 2013 NCAA Men's and Women's College Cup championships in December.

TOP TIER

Senior Maya Hayes leads the B1G and is tied for third in the nation in points with 37. The forward is also is second in the B1G and tied for fourth in the country in goals with 16.

Hayes has found the back of the net in 13-of-16 matches this season.

IN THE BOOKS

Forward Maya Hayes solidified her place in the Penn State record books after notching the second most goals (31) and most points (70) in a single season during her sophomore campaign but she is not stopping there. The senior is now No. 3 on the career goals ledger after netting 16 so far this season, bringing her total to 68 in just 81 games.

All-American Tiffany Weimer (2002-05) and MAC Hermann Trophy winner Christie Welsh (1999-02) are atop the standings with an impressive 91 and 82 goals, respectively.

Hayes is also third on the career points record list with 156. Welsh leads the category with a remarkable 216 points and Weimer follows closely with 214.

HOME FIELD DOMINANCE

The Lions are a force to be reckoned with when playing at Jeffrey Field, having amassed a home record of 190-22-11 (.877). At 96-4-4 (.942), the Nittany Lions have the best Big Ten home record in the conference.

PSU also leads the league in attendance, averaging 1,742 fans per game this season. The program with the next highest attendance average is Michigan at 853 fans per match.

LIONS ROAST BUCKEYES

Seniors Taylor Schram and Maya Hayes led the No. 17 Penn State women's soccer team to a 4-2 victory over Big Ten rival Ohio State on Thursday afternoon at Jeffrey Field. Schram netted the Lions' first goal of the match and Hayes found the back of the net twice.

The OSU defense held the Nittany Lions to its second lowest shot count of the season, allowing just 10 shots by the Blue and White offensive attack. The Lions had seven attempts on net to the Buckeyes' six and were awarded eight corner kicks while Ohio State took five.

After two consecutive scoreless games, PSU made sure to find the back of the net early. Schram received a low cross from sophomore Mallory Weber and put the ball in on a sliding kick from six yards out to put Penn State up 1-0.

The Penn State lead was extended to 2-0 at the 33:12 mark after the Buckeyes sent an own goal into the net. Weber crossed the ball towards the goal and it deflected off of OSU defender Marisa Wolf, putting the Blue and White up 2-0.

Nichelle Prince put the Buckeyes on the board a little over three minutes later. Alexis Degler found Prince inside the 18 yard box and the forward finished from 12 yards out, bringing the score to

The Buckeyes were awarded a corner kick in the 53rd minute and were able to capitalize on it as Morgan Wolcott netted the equalizer. Danica Wu took the corner kick and sent the ball flying towards Wolcott, who found the ball and headed it inside the far post to tie the match at 2-2.

The Nittany Lions did not waste any time responding as Hayes notched her first goal just over a minute later. The senior intercepted an OSU pass inside the 18 yard box and beat the goalkeeper before burying the ball in the net from eight yards out.

Three minutes later, Hayes booted another one in to register her third multi-goal game of the season. The forward rebounded the ball after a shot by Schram collided with the crossbar and was able to knock it in from just outside the box.

Michela Paradiso attempted to cut the deficit in the 83rd minute as she found the ball inside the box, but her shot was off target as the ball sailed high, leaving the final score at 4-2.

THE BLUE AND WHITE FALL TO MICHIGAN

The Penn State women's soccer team was unable to capitalize on its offensive opportunities on Sunday, Oct. 13 as the Nittany Lions fell, 1-0, to Michigan. The loss marks the Lions' first home defeat since August 24 of last season, when they fell to then-No. 1 Stanford.

Despite outshooting the Wolverines 21-7, the Blue and White could not find the back of the net, resulting in their third loss of the 2013 campaign and fourth-ever loss to Michigan. Ultimately, a cross by U-M forward Nkem Ezurike led to a scoring opportunity for senior Tori Combs, who tapped the game-winner in from point blank range in the 67th minute.

LIONS OUTSHONE BY GOLDEN GOPHERS

The Penn State women's soccer team registered its first Big Ten loss of the season on Oct. 6, falling to Minnesota 1-0 at Elizabeth Lyle Robbie Stadium. The Lions outshot the Gophers 20-6 and notched seven shots on goal but could not get past Minnesota keeper Tara Hobbs, who collected seven saves.

Haley Helverson scored the lone goal in the 17th minute of action. The sophomore received the ball right in front of the goal on a cross from Steph Brandt and knocked it into the net from point blank range to put Minnesota up 1-0.

THE BLUE AND WHITE BURY THE BADGERS

The No. 7 Penn State women's soccer team collected its first Big Ten road win on Oct. 4, edging No. 18 Wisconsin, 2-1, at the McClimon Soccer Complex. The Nittany Lions used goals from seniors Tani Costa and Maya Hayes to earn their ninth-straight victory.

The Lions put three shots on goal early on in the first half before netting one at the 30:59 mark. Hayes beat a Badger defender and sent a through ball to Costa, who found the back of the net from just outside the box to give Penn State a 1-0 advantage.

The Lions extended their lead to 2-0 just five minutes later as Hayes buried one in the back of the net. The senior received the ball on a beautiful cross from Mallory Weber and headed it in from 10 yards out.

Rose Lavelle gave the Badgers their first and only goal of the match in the 66th minute. McNicoll took a shot from just outside the box, which was blocked by Eckerstrom but Lavelle found the rebound, knocking the ball in from 10 yards out.

Raquel Rodriguez made the final attempt of the match in the 87th minute. The midfielder was awarded a free kick and sent the ball flying straight for the net but Richard was prepared, yet again, making a diving save to leave the final score at 2-1.

SEPTEMBER SWEEPS

The Nittany Lions completed their perfect September record (8-0-0) on Sunday, Sept. 29 with a 4-1 win over Indiana. They now own a 124-31-13 (.777) record in the month of September all-time.

PSU defeated Purdue, 6-1, on Sept. 26 night and opened up conference play with a 3-2 double overtime win against Northwestern on Sept. 20.

The Blue and White have also posted consecutive wins over Tulsa (9/15), Oklahoma State (9/13), Bucknell (9/10), Boston University (9/6) and LaSalle (9/1).

LIONS HANDLE HOOSIERS

The then-No. 8 Penn State women's soccer team completed its perfect September record (8-0-0) on Sunday afternoon as it overpowered Indiana, 4-1, at Jeffrey Field. Raquel Rodriguez, Tani Costa, Emily Hurd and Maya Hayes each netted goals for the Nittany Lions.

Rodriguez started things off for the Nittany Lions for the second-straight match, netting her third goal of the year in the seventh minute. Kori Chapic played a ball to Hurd and Hurd crossed it to Rodriguez, who was able to head it in to give PSU a 1-0 lead.

IU tied it up at the 25:01 mark as Monica Melink notched her second goal of the season. The midfielder received the ball on a cross from Rebecca Candler and put it in from the far corner of the box.

The Nittany Lions came out firing on all cylinders in the second half, posting four shots in the first seven minutes. Costa found success on the fourth shot, burying the ball in the net from 12 yards ahead on a beautiful cross from Hurd.

Hayes posted her 12th goal of the year and capped the scoring with seven minutes remaining in the game. Taylor Schram dropped the ball to Hayes and the senior dribbled past an Indiana defender before firing the ball in from 12 yards deep.

LIONS STEAM BOILERMAKERS

The then-No. 8 Penn State women's soccer team used six goals from five different players en route to a dominant 6-1 victory over Purdue on Sept. 26 as it honored the life and legacy of Mack Brady. Raquel Rodriguez, Kori Chapic, Maya Hayes, Tani Costa and Kindrah Kohne each scored for the Nittany Lions.

Penn State's offense was not the only impressive part of the match as the defensive unit held the Boilermakers (5-4-1, 0-2-0) to just one shot for the entire game.

Rodriguez put the Nittany Lions on the board early, tallying her second goal of the season in the seventh minute of action. Hayes dribbled the ball to beat a defender and crossed it to Rodriguez, who put it in from eight yards out.

The Boilermakers evened the score in the 16th minute as forward Maddy Williams tallied her seventh goal of the year. Juliana Hairston played a cross to Jordan Pawlik and Pawlick flicked it to Williams, who was able to finish from 10 yards out.

With the goal, Williams became the first Purdue player to score on Jeffrey Field since 2005.

The Blue and White were awarded a corner kick in the 37th minute and came up with their second goal of the match. Chapic headed the ball in off a fantastic corner from Rodriguez to give Penn State a 2-1 lead.

The Lions' next tally came right before the half as Purdue sent an own goal into the net. Costa crossed the ball towards the goal and it deflected off of Boilermaker defender Kim Love as she was attempting to clear it, putting PSU up 3-1.

Penn State didn't waste much time before extending their lead to 4-1 as Costa posted her third goal of the season in the 53rd minute. Emily Hurd crossed the ball to Costa and the senior buried the ball in the back of the net from point blank range.

Hayes was the next to score for the Lions, registering her 11th goal of the year at the 62:00 mark. The forward beat a defender at the edge of the box and slid one past Kridler, giving the Blue and White a 5-1 advantage.

Kohne capped the scoring and posted her first Penn State goal in the 77th minute of play. The junior midfielder intercepted a pass from Purdue and hammered the ball in from 20 yards deep to leave the score at 6-1.

PSU RALLIES PAST NORTHWESTERN

Junior defender Whitney Church posted two crucial goals on Sept. 20 to lift the then-ninth-ranked Penn State women's soccer team over Big Ten foe Northwestern, 3-2, in a double overtime thriller at Jeffrey Field. Maya Hayes also came up big for the Lions, netting the game-tying goal in the conference opener for both squads.

NU senior Kate Allen put the Wildcats on the board early, netting the first goal of the match in the fourth minute of action. Sami Schrakamp crossed the ball to Allen, who then fired it into the top of the net over Eckerstrom to give NU a 1-0 lead.

Allen netted her second goal of the game in the 78th minute, stretching NU's lead to 2-0. Georgia Waddle dropped the ball to Allen and the forward fired one past Eckerstrom to give the Wildcats a two goal advantage with 12 minutes remaining in regulation.

The second Northwestern goal seemed to motivate the Nittany Lions as they fired back with their first goal of the game just two minutes later. The Blue and White were awarded another corner kick and this time they made it count. Rodriguez sent the ball to Church, who headed it in from six yards out to bring the score to 2-1.

Hayes added another goal for PSU in the 84th minute. Hayes got the ball on a long pass from Chapic and then went on to beat Hascher one-on-one, tapping the ball into the net to tie the game at 2-2 and send the match into overtime.

Church sealed the deal for the Blue and White with 3:35 remaining in the game. The defender got the ball after it bounced off of several PSU and NU players and drilled it into the far corner of the net from 20 yards out to leave the final score at 3-2.

PENN STATE EDGES TULSA

Penn State finished out its non-conference slate with an exciting 3-2 victory over Tulsa on Sept. 15. Maya Hayes came up big for the Nittany Lions, scoring the game-winning goal in the 89th minute. Sophomore Mallory Weber and senior Tani Costa also netted goals for PSU.

Weber notched the first goal of the match, putting the ball into the net in the 22nd minute. The sophomore got the ball on a high arcing cross from Emily Hurd and headed it in from four yards out to give Penn State a 1-0 advantage.

Leading by one with just over four minutes remaining, it looked as though Penn State had the game won but the Golden Hurricane thought otherwise. Kirsch dropped the ball to Kajal Parmar and Parmar crossed it to Pelley, who scored the equalizer on a sliding kick from seven yards out.

Pelley's efforts were not enough to send the game into overtime, however, as Hayes responded with the game-winner with 20 seconds remaining. The senior ripped one into the top of the net from 15 yards out on an assist from Schram, putting the final score at 3-2 in Penn State's favor.

LIONS LASSO COWGIRLS

After trailing 2-0 early in the first half, the then-No. 13 Penn State women's soccer team rallied to defeat Oklahoma State 4-2 on Friday, Sept. 13 at Cowgirl Stadium. Senior Maya Hayes led the Lions with two goals while junior Kori Chapic and sophomore Mallory Weber netted one apiece.

Tani Costa also came up big for the Blue and White, tallying assists on three of Penn State's four goals.

Oklahoma State's Allie Stephenson got the Cowgirls on the board early. The sophomore fired the ball in from 20 yards out in the sixth minute on an assist by Joanna Robertson.

The Cowgirls extended their lead to 2-0 eight minutes later as Krissy Killon made a great play to beat Eckerstrom, scoring from eight yards out.

The MAC Hermann Trophy is collegiate soccer's most prestigious award presented annually to one male and one female athlete. The winners will be announced Friday, Jan. 10, 2014 at the trophy presentation banquet at the Missouri Athletic Club in St. Louis. Christie Welsh is the only Penn State athlete to win the award (2001).

This is Hayes' second consecutive year on the watch list and Church's first appearance. Hayes was a finalist for the award in 2011 and a semifinalist in 2012. Hayes and Church are joined by Illinois' Vanessa DiBernardo as Big Ten honorees for the award.

Hayes is a two-time NSCAA first team All-America selection and has earned back-to-back Big Ten Forward of the Year honors. She finished second on the team in goals (16) and points (38) in 2012, despite missing the first seven games of the season while participating in the U20 World Cup with the U.S. U20 National Team.

Church received NSCAA first team All-Great Lakes recognition and Big Ten Defender of the Year honors in 2012. She led the Nittany Lion defensive attack, starting all 27 contests and logging over 2,000 minutes.

Head coach Erica Walsh enters her seventh season at the helm of the Penn State women's soccer program in 2013. Walsh's 2012 Nitanny Lions were the most successful team in program history after advancing to their first-ever national title game. The Nittany Lions won 21 of 27 games and were unbeaten in Big Ten action with a 10-0-1 record. The Lions registered their 15th consecutive Big Ten title and 18th-straight NCAA Tournament appearance. The 15-title mark stands as the most consecutive Big Ten Championships by a women's program, along with the present Northwestern tennis team.

Senior Christine Nairn became just the seventh Nittany Lion to finish as a finalist for the prestigous Missouri Athletic Club's Hermann Trophy in 2012 under Walsh's tutelage while junior Maya Hayes was named a semifinalist for the award.

Walsh's success was recognized at the conference and national level as she earned Big Ten Coach of the Year and NSCAA Coach of the Year honors.

Her 2011 team was a dominant force, winning 21 of 26 matches, while out-scoring opponents 70-24. The Nittany Lions were 10-1-0 in Big Ten action and posted the seventh undefeated season at Jeffrey Field (9-0). Walsh helped guide the Lions to their 14th-straight Big Ten title and a spot to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for

the first time since 2007.

With Walsh's guidance, sophomore Maya Hayes became the nation's most prolific scorer in soccer in 2011. Haves was a finalist for the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy. Hayes led the nation with 31 goals and 70 points. The sophomore phenom broke single-season record at Penn State for goals and points.

During the 2011 summer, Walsh had an extraordinary experience of being one of the top assistants to Pia Sundhage and the 2011 United State women's national team at the FIFA World Cup in

Germany. The U.S. made a sparkling run through knockout play to the final, falling to eventual champions Japan.

During the 2010 season, Walsh's young club made a remarkable turnaround mid-season, overcoming a two-game deficit in the league standings over the final weeks to capture a share of a recordbreaking 13th straight Big Ten title.

After a tough 2-4 start to the 2009 season, Walsh led the Nittany Lions to a remarkable turnaround, going 10-1-2 in the last 13 games of the regular season, earning her the 2009 Big Ten Coach of the Year Award for her efforts. In March of 2010, Walsh's alma mater, William & Mary, honored her by inducting her into the W&M Athletics Hall of Fame.

With the impressive end to the season, Walsh and her charges captured the program's 12th-straight Big Ten Championship, tying a record for most consecutive women's Big Ten titles won held by the Michigan swimming & diving program. By winning the Big Ten, the Nittany Lions continued their string of NCAA Tournament berths, making their 15th-straight appearance in the 64-team field in 2009. For the second time in three years, Penn State hosted the first and second rounds of tournament play.

Walsh also orchestrated one of the finest awards seasons in Penn State history when Katie Schoepfer, Alyssa Naeher and Christine Nairn swept the year-end Big Ten Player of the Year awards. Schoepfer was named the Offensive Player of the Year, Naeher the Defensive Player of the Year and Nairn the Freshman of the Year. Danielle Toney was named to the All-Big Ten First Team, while Lexi Marton garnered Second Team mention. Walsh has now coached two players of the year to three awards as Naeher was also the 2007 recipient of the Defensive Player of the Year honors in Walsh's first year in Happy Valley.

Walsh continued her success from the 2007 campaign into a 16-8-0 record that saw Penn State capture its 11th-straight Big Ten Championship and the 2008 Big Ten Tournament crown.

Her transition to Penn State was quite smooth as the 2007 team finished 18-4-2, including a 9-1-0 mark in conference play, and was ranked 12th in the final NSCAA poll of the season.

When she came to Penn State, Walsh brought with her a wealth of experience at both the international and collegiate levels. She already has coached at six different universities, including three stints as head coach as well as serving as an assistant for the U.S. U-19 team in 2004. Walsh served as head coach of the U-17 team. from December 2004 until her hire at Penn State in February of

As of January 2009, Walsh was appointed as a member of the Panel of Instructors and Lecturers for FIFA Courses. In addition, she was appointed as the Chairman of the Women's Technical Committee for the period of January 1, 2009 to June 30, 2011.

In January of 2008, Walsh was named as the assistant coach by Pia Sundhage for the U.S. National Team. With Walsh's help and guidance the U.S. team completed its historic run with a gold medal at the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China. Even sweeter was that Walsh's main responsibility was the U.S. Team's defense, which held fellow world power Brazil scoreless in the gold medal game.

The head coach at Harvard University as well as the U.S. Under-17 team prior to her hiring at Penn State, Walsh has consistently been active among the coaching ranks both at the Division I level and the U.S. Youth National Team program for nearly a decade. Prior to her time with the Crimson, she was part of a Florida State staff that led the Seminoles to one of its most successful year to date. FSU joined Penn State in the 2005 Women's Soccer College Cup, with both programs reaching the national semifinals.

Walsh's coaching path began in 1997 as a graduate assistant with Bucknell University. In 1998, she accepted a position at Dartmouth, where she was an assistant coach for two seasons. After helping the team to a final NSCAA ranking of No. 8 at the conclusion of the team's 1998 NCAA quarterfinal run as well as an Ivy League championship in 1999, Walsh assumed head coaching duties before the 2000 season.

As head coach, Walsh led the Big Green to back-to-back Ivy League co-championships in 2000 and 2001. Her squad was ranked in the NSCAA's top 25 each year, rising as high as No. 13 in 2001. In her three seasons as head coach, Dartmouth was invited to the NCAA Tournament each season and reached the round of 16 twice. All three of her teams earned the NSCAA's Academic Team Award.

Walsh left Dartmouth to earn her Master's in business administration at Lehigh University where she served as a graduate assistant from 2003-04.

Beginning in the spring of 2004, Walsh joined the United States Under-19 team as an assistant coach where she helped with preparations for the Under-19 World Cup. The U.S. finished with the bronze medal in Thailand after defeating Brazil in the third place match. After the World Cup, Walsh was appointed the U.S. National Team's U-17 head coach, a position which she held for three years.

As a player, Walsh was an NSCAA All-Region selection at William & Mary. A two-time first team All-CAA pick, she propelled her team to four NCAA Tournament appearances as well as two CAA regular season and two CAA league championships.

A high school All-American at Lower Moreland, she was also a member of the U.S. Under-17 National Team.

Walsh earned her Bachelor of Science degree with a concentration in biology from William & Mary in 1997 and resides in State College,
