TEAM CAPTAINS

Penn State head football coach James Franklin announced on Aug. 13 that seven Nittany Lions were elected co-captains by their teammates and the coaching staff. Two offensive and two defensive co-captains were elected and three special teams co-captains were elected.

The defensive co-captains are senior linebacker Mike Hull and senior defensive end C.J. Olaniyan.

The offensive co-captains are senior guard Miles Dieffenbach and quarterback Christian Hackenberg, who becomes the first sophomore to be selected a Penn State football captain.

The special teams co-captains are senior safeties Jesse Della Valle and Ryan Keiser and senior placekicker Sam Ficken.

"The players and the coaches voted on the team captains and these players have clearly earned the respect of their teammates and coaches," Franklin said. "We are trying to promote and develop leadership throughout the entire program and I'm really excited about the role our captains will have throughout the season."

The seven co-captains are tied for the most in Penn State's illustrious 128 years of varsity football with the 1976 squad coached by Joe Paterno. The 1991 squad featured six captains.

Hackenberg, the 2013 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, is the second-youngest Nittany Lion to be named a team captain. Freshman John Chuckran was the captain of the 1944 squad during World War II.

NEARLY 30 NITTANY LIONS ON NFL ROSTERS ENTERING WEEK 16

Twenty-seven former Penn State players continue to dot rosters of 19 National Football League teams. That total is tied for second-highest in the Big Ten. The Nittany Lions annually are among the top 15 programs nationally in producing players in the NFL.

Tight end Brett Brackett was signed by the Seattle Seahawks, pushing the total of Nittany Lions in the NFL to 28.

The Jacksonville Jaguars feature a league-high three former Nittany Lions on their roster, including Pro Bowl linebacker Paul Posluszny, tight end Mickey Shuler and rookie wide receiver Allen Robinson.

Seven additional NFL squads boast two former Nittany Lions on their rosters: Dallas, Miami, Minnesota, Oakland, San Diego, Seattle and Tennessee.

Five players from Penn State's 2013 squad are currently on NFL teams as rookies: Robinson, linebacker Glenn Carson (Arizona), offensive tackle Gary Gilliam (Seattle), defensive tackle DaQuan Jones (Tennessee) and guard John Urschel (Baltimore). Carson & Gilliam made their respective rosters as a free agents.

Chicago Bears All-Pro placekicker Robbie Gould is the elder statesman among former Nittany Lions, in his 10th season, and Kansas City Chiefs All-Pro linebacker Tamba Hali is second in longevity, in his ninth season.

Posluszny is in his eighth professional season and Rich Ohrmberger (San Diego) and All-Pro Cameron Wake (Miami) are in their sixth NFL seasons.

Penn State has had 36 NFL Draft picks since 2006, including 16 in the first three rounds, and at least three NFL Draft picks 16 times since starting Big Ten Conference competition in 1993. A total of 335 Nittany Lions have been selected all-time in the NFL Draft.

Super Bowl XLVIII marked the 43rd time in the NFL Championship contest's 48-game history that at least one Penn State alumnus was a member of one of the participating teams. Former Nittany Lion standouts Jordan Hill and Michael Robinson helped capped off a dominant playoff run for Seattle with a victory in Super Bowl XLVIII over the Denver Broncos. In all, 37 former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 54 Super Bowl rings.

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HEAD COACH JAMES FRANKLIN

James Franklin, a Pennsylvania native who is one of the nation's most successful and dynamic coaches, is in his first season as the Penn State head football coach.

Franklin was named the 16th head football coach in the storied 128-year history of the Nittany Lion program on January 11, 2014.

In his four seasons as a head coach, he has led all four teams to a bowl berth, winning his last two.

Franklin began his Penn State tenure with a 4-0 record. He and Dick Harlow (1915) are the only two first year Nittany Lion coaches to start 4-0.

The enthusiastic and passionate Franklin led Vanderbilt University to unprecedented success as head coach from 2011-13, winning nine games in each of the past two years, finishing in the Top 25 and winning bowl games in consecutive seasons, all for the first time in school history.

From Langhorne, Pa., a Philadelphia suburb, Franklin vowed to "Dominate The State" during his introductory news conference in Beaver Stadium. He has electrified Nittany Nation with his passion and vision for the program and ability to recruit premier student-athletes from across the nation. Franklin assembled a coaching staff that features a record of success and tremendous chemistry and familiarity with each other, Penn State and the region.

From Day 1, Franklin has reinforced the four core values for the Penn State program to return to national championship contention — a positive attitude, great work-ethic, competing on and off the field and the ability to sacrifice.

Penn State and Vanderbilt annually rank among the nation's top institutions in the graduation of its football student-athletes. In the NCAA Graduation Success Rate data from October 2013, the Nittany Lions and Commodores both ranked among the leaders in the Football Bowl Subdivision. Penn State's 85 percent Graduation Success Rate was tied for 12th among the nation's 124 FBS programs and Vanderbilt's 82 percent GSR was tied for the best in the Southeastern Conference. Both programs were well above the 70 percent FBS graduation rate average.

Franklin's tireless efforts and enthusiasm resulted in taking Vanderbilt to new heights over the past three years, posting a 24-15 record, including marks of 9-4 during each of the past two seasons, capped by bowl victories. The Commodores finished the 2013 season with five consecutive victories, with wins over Florida, Georgia, Tennessee and Kentucky in Southeastern Conference play, along with a win over Houston in the BBVA Compass Bowl. Franklin's 2012 squad finished the season with seven consecutive victories and posted Vanderbilt's first nine-win season since 1915.

A two-time All-Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference (PSAC) quarterback at East Stroudsburg University, Franklin has demonstrated the ability to recruit,

teach and motivate talented student-athletes throughout his coaching tenure. He was named Vanderbilt's head coach on December 17, 2010 after three years as the assistant head coach/offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach at Maryland, his second stint with the Terps. Franklin was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kansas State in 2006-07 and the wide receivers coach of the NFL's Green Bay Packers (2005) prior to arriving in Nashville.

Just days before he was named the Nittany Lions' head coach, the engaging and highly-detailed Franklin spent the day in Pasadena, Calif., appearing on multiple ESPN platforms throughout the day during the network's coverage of the BCS National Championship Game in the Rose Bowl.

Following spring practice and individual meetings with every player, Franklin spent a good portion of May criss-crossing the Commonwealth and Mid-Atlantic region on the Penn State Coaches Caravan. Attending all 17 Caravan events, Franklin met and spoke with more than 6,000 Penn State alumni, students, fans and former players in Maryland, New Jersey, New York and Washington, D.C. He did more than 50 interviews with local and national media over the three weeks to assist in introducing himself to Penn Staters and potential recruits and spreading his core values and vision of Penn State football.

In his 20th year in coaching, Franklin directed Vanderbilt to consecutive Top 25 finishes for the first time in the 124-year history of the program. The Commodores finished the 2013 season No. 24 in the Associated Press poll and No. 23 in the USA Today Coaches survey. The 2012 Vanderbilt squad finished No. 23 and 20, respectively, marking its first AP final ranking since 1948. Franklin's 24 wins tied Dan McGugin for the most by a Vanderbilt coach in his first three seasons.

Franklin led Vanderbilt to a bowl game in each of his three seasons in Nashville, with the last two years resulting in wins over North Carolina State (Music City Bowl) and Houston (BBVA Compass Bowl). The Commodores had played in four bowl games all-time in the 121 seasons prior to his arrival, none in consecutive years.

Vanderbilt has posted four nine-win seasons in program history, with Franklin's last two teams comprising half of the total. Over the last 20 games during the 2012-13 seasons, the Commodores' 16-4 record was second-best in the SEC to Alabama's 17-3 mark.

Franklin inherited a Vanderbilt team that finished 2-10 in both 2009 and 2010, including a 1-15 SEC mark. From 1983-2010, the Commodores had just one winning season (2008) prior to his arrival. His drive, coaching acumen and enthusiasm drove a quick turnaround in Vanderbilt's fortunes, as the team posted a 6-6 regular-season record and earned a berth in the Liberty Bowl during his first season. The 2011 bowl berth was Vanderbilt's second since 1983 and running back

Zac Stacy broke the Vanderbilt season record with 1,193 rushing yards.

The Commodores had a breakthrough campaign in 2012 under Franklin, finishing on a seven-game winning streak (longest since 1948) to compile a 9-4 mark, Vanderbilt's most wins in 97 years. A victory at Missouri sparked an 8-1 finish, which included three consecutive SEC road wins for the first time in program history. The Commodores were 5-3 in SEC play, winning five SEC games for the first time since 1935, and recorded two shutouts for the first time since 1968. Vanderbilt defeated North Carolina State, 38-24, in the Liberty Bowl and Franklin was among five finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach-of-the-Year. Stacy became the first player in Vanderbilt history to rush for 1,000 yards in consecutive seasons, gaining 1,141 yards to finish with a school-record 3,143 yards and 30 rushing touchdowns. Stacy started 12 games and ran for 973 yards and seven touchdowns as a rookie with the St. Louis Rams in 2013. Wide receiver Jordan Matthews broke the Vanderbilt season receiving record with 1,363 yards on 94 catches.

Vanderbilt continued its historic rise under Franklin during the 2013 season, capping a school-record second consecutive 9-4 campaign with a 41-24 win over Houston in the BBVA Compass Bowl. The Commodores defeated Florida, Georgia and Tennessee in the same season for the first time in program history, winning in Gainesville and Knoxville, and finished 4-4 in the SEC. Franklin helped Matthews develop into a two-time All-American and first-team All-SEC honoree, having compiled 262 career receptions for 3,759 yards and 24 touchdowns. He broke the SEC season record with 112 receptions for 1,477 yards and seven touchdowns this past season, becoming the first SEC receiver to make 100 catches in a season. Tackle Wesley Johnson also earned first-team All-SEC honors from the coaches and the Associated Press.

Franklin began his coaching career as the wide receivers coach at Kutztown University (1995) and was a graduate assistant coach at East Stroudsburg in 1996, working with the secondary. He then was the wide receivers coach at James Madison (1997), a graduate assistant (tight ends) at Washington State in 1998 and the wide receivers coach at Idaho State (1999).

In 2000, Franklin was named the wide receivers coach at Maryland under head coach Ron Vanderlinden, who would go on to coach the Penn State linebackers from 2001-13. Franklin continued in that role under new head coach Ralph Friedgen in 2002 and '03 and helped the Terps to three consecutive 10-win seasons, including an appearance in the 2002 FedEx Orange Bowl. In 2003, Franklin added duties as recruiting coordinator and directed back-to-back recruiting classes ranked in the Top 25 nationally. Franklin and former Nittany Lion head coach Bill O'Brien (running backs) were Maryland assistant coaches in 2003 and '04 under Friedgen.

After five successful years at Maryland, Franklin was named wide receivers coach on Mike Sherman's Green Bay Packers staff in 2005. During that season, Green Bay ranked third in the NFL in receptions (383) and seventh in receiving yards (3,766). Donald Driver was among the top receivers in the NFL, ranking second in receptions and eighth in receiving yards, with a then-career-high 86 catches for 1,221 yards.

Franklin served as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Kansas State during the 2006-07 seasons under head coach Ron Prince. In 2006, he helped the Wildcats to their first winning season in four years. Franklin coached quarterback Josh Freeman and oversaw an offense that produced a 3,000-yard passer (Freeman), 1,500-yard receiver (All-American wide receiver Jordy Nelson) and 1,000-yard rusher (James Johnson) during the 2007 season, a first in school history. Freeman would go on to become the Wildcats' highest NFL offensive draft pick since 1954 when the Tampa Bay Buccaneers selected him 17th overall in the

2009 NFL Draft.

Franklin returned to Maryland in 2008 as the Terps' assistant head coach and offensive coordinator. He helped the Terrapins to victories in the 2008 Humanitarian Bowl and the 2010 Military Bowl. The 2010 squad was among the national leaders in scoring offense at 32.2 points per game and was led by ACC Rookie-of-the-Year quarterback Danny O'Brien. He threw for 2,438 yards, 22 touchdowns and only eight interceptions in 2010, with All-ACC receiver Torrey Smith making 67 catches for 1,055 yards and 12 scores.

In 1998, Franklin began his participation in the NFL's Minority Coaching Fellowship Program, starting with a stint with the Miami Dolphins and working with Hall of Fame quarterback Dan Marino. Franklin also worked with Donovan McNabb with the Philadelphia Eagles (1999) and Minnesota Vikings (2008) in the NFL program.

Franklin was a four-year letterman at quarterback and a two-time All-PSAC selection at East Stroudsburg. He set seven school records as a senior to earn team MVP honors and was a Harlon Hill Trophy nominee as the NCAA Division II Player-of-the-Year. Among the season records he set were for total offense (3,128 yards), passing yards (2,586) and touchdown passes (19). Franklin graduated having broken or tied 23 school records.

Franklin graduated from East Stroudsburg in 1995 with a degree in psychology and earned a master's degree in educational leadership from Washington State University. Franklin graduated from Neshaminy High School in Langhorne.

Franklin and his wife, Fumi (foo-ME), have two daughters, Ava and Addison.

NCAA REDUCES SANCTIONS FOLLOWING REPORT FROM INTEGRITY MONITOR

The NCAA Executive Committee has modified the Penn State football bowl and scholarship limitations previously imposed by the consent decree between the University and the NCAA.

The action comes following a Sept. 8 release of another positive annual report and recommendations by Sen. George Mitchell, the independent, third-party athletics integrity monitor for Penn State.

The Penn State football team will be eligible for a bowl game beginning this season, and scholarship limitations will be restored to the full complement of 85 beginning in 2015. All financial penalties remain in place.

Concurrently, the Big Ten announced Penn State would be eligible to play in the Big Ten Championship game starting this season.

This is the second annual report issued by Mitchell, who was named by the NCAA as the independent monitor for Penn State to oversee the Athletics Integrity Agreement signed by Penn State, the Big Ten and the NCAA. He has provided quarterly updates to the University and general public on the University's compliance with the Athletics Integrity Agreement.

SPECIAL SENIOR CLASS HONORED VS. MICHIGAN STATE

- There were 17 Nittany Lion seniors that took to the field inside Beaver Stadium for the final time vs. Michigan State.
- The 2014 seniors have been instrumental in the Nittany Lions earning a 30-19 on-field record the past four years under unprecedented circumstances, with three winning seasons and an opportunity for a fourth during their careers.
- The 17 players that were introduced in a pre-game ceremony included: Adrian Amos, DeShawn Baker, Brad Bars, Bill Belton, Drew Boyce, co-captain Jesse Della Valle, co-captain Miles Dieffenbach, co-captain Sam Ficken, co-captain Mike Hull, co-captain Ryan Keiser, Jesse Merise, co-captain C.J. Olaniyan, Devin Pryor, T.J. Rhattigan, Tyrone Smith, Deron Thompson and Zach Zwinak. Keiser and Zwinak suffered season-ending injuries in October.
- Among the group are: nine graduates from prior to the season, the No. 3 scorer in school history, one of the nation's elite tacklers, a 1,000-yard career rusher, a 2,000-yard career rusher, a fearless punt returner, a pair of edge rushers, valued members of the scout and special teams, and six of the team's seven captains.

LIONS CONTINUE TO HONOR PLAYERS WITH JERSEY NAMES IN 2014

In 2012, the Penn State coaching staff felt that something needed to be done to honor those student-athletes who kept their promise to play for Penn State after the NCAA handed down sanctions on the program.

The plan; to place the name of each player on the back of their uniform. It was something that had never been done in the 126-year history of the program, but was symbolic.

You stuck with us, so we're sticking your name on your uniform and the last two seasons have been no different, as head coach James Franklin and his staff decided to keep the names on the historically elegant uniforms in 2014.

ANOTHER SELLOUT FOR PENN STATE'S UNRIVALED STUDENT SECTION

Including a lightning-fast six-minute sellout for the freshman class, Penn State student football season tickets sold out again.

More than 21,000 students purchased season tickets to take their place amongst as the top student sections in the nation.

Penn State's proud and enthusiastic student section in Beaver Stadium is the nation's second-largest full season student ticket section of any school, for any sport.

ESPN's College Gameday and ESPN The Magazine ("The Nation's No. 1 Student section") are among the national media accolades for the Nittany Lions' loud and impactful student section.

CAPPELLETTI'S NO. 22 TO BE RETIRED

John Cappelletti, who won the Heisman Trophy in leading Penn State to a 12-0 record in 1973, will have his No. 22 jersey retired.

The announcement was made by Director of Athletics Dave Joyner during the Sept. 7, 2013 game against Eastern Michigan, as the 1973 team celebrated its 40th reunion.

Cappelletti is the first Penn State student-athlete to have his or her number retired.

The No. 22 jersey will be retired at the end of the career of redshirt sophomore running back Akeel Lynch, a request that was made by Cappelletti.

From Upper Darby, Pa., Cappelletti was a consensus first-team All-America running back in 1973 for Coach Joe Paterno and won the Maxwell Award, and the Walter Camp, ABC-TV and UPI Player-of-the-Year in addition to the Heisman.

A defensive back his first two years as a Nittany Lion, Cappelletti ran for 1,522 yards and 17 touchdowns as a senior in 1973. His 1,522 yards remain No. 4 on the Penn State season list. His 2,639 career rushing yards rank No. 11 in Penn State history and he scored 29 career touchdowns.

Cappelletti posted 13 100-yard rushing games and strung together three consecutive 200-yard games in the final month of the 1973 season, topped by 220 yards in a win over North Carolina State.

Cappelletti captured the nation's heart when he dedicated the Heisman Trophy to his younger brother, Joey, who would pass away from childhood leukemia. The story of Cappelletti's family and the 1973 season inspired the TV movie "Something For Joey."

A first-round draft choice of the NFL's Los Angeles Rams, Cappelletti played 10 seasons in the NFL, six with the Rams and four with the San Diego Chargers.

Cappelletti was enshrined in the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 1993.

THREE NITTANY LIONS HAVE PENN STATE FOOTBALL LINEAGE

A trio of returning members of the 2014 Penn State squad have ties to current or former Nittany Lion players, coaches or staff:

- Redshirt freshman guard Evan Galimberti is the son of Mark Galimberti, who played at Penn State and graduated in 1988;
- Sophomore wide receiver Gregg Garrity's father, Gregg, lettered from 1980-82. The elder Garrity made one of the iconic plays in Penn State football history with his diving TD catch to help beat Georgia in the 1983 Sugar Bowl for the Nittany Lions' first National Championship;
- Senior linebacker Mike Hull's father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions at linebacker from 1971-73, helping Penn State to its first 12-0 season as a senior. An uncle, John Hull, was a tight end who lettered for the Nittany Lions in 1970-71.

MLB STADIUMS

The Penn State football program has a history of playing games inside of historic Major League Baseball parks, dating back to an Oct. 29, 1921 meeting with Georgia Tech at the iconic Polo Grounds.

Here are a few quick note regarding the Nittany Lions' history inside of MLB ballparks.

- The Blue and White own a record of 16-4-3 in their 23 games played at Major League Baseball facilities.
- Penn State has played one bowl game inside a facility that served as a Major League Baseball Stadium. The Nittany Lions toppled BYU, 50-39, to win the 1989 Holiday Bowl.
- Penn State joins Nebraska and Rutgers as current members of the Big Ten to play at Yankee Stadium. Nebraska played in the 1962 Gotham Bowl, while Rutgers played a regular season game vs. Army in 2011 and appeared in the 2011 and 2013 Pinstripe Bowls.

TALIAFERRO, LEGRAND SERVED AS HONORARY CAPTAINS

Two of the most inspiring players in the history of Penn State and Rutgers football were re-united when the schools meet for the first time as Big Ten opponents on Sept. 13 at High Point Solutions Stadium.

Penn State's Adam Taliaferro and Eric LeGrand of Rutgers, forever linked through horrific spinal cord injuries suffered on the field and their courageous recovery efforts that followed, served as honorary game captains when the Nittany Lions visited the Scarlet Knights in the opening game of the 119th season of Big Ten Football.

Both players were on the field for the pre-game coin toss.

As a true freshman cornerback, Taliaferro suffered a career-ending spinal cord injury making a tackle against Ohio State in a game on Sept. 23, 2000. Paralyzed by the injury when he fractured his 5th cervical vertebrae and bruised his spinal cord, the Voorhees, N.J. native was given a five percent chance by doctors of ever walking again. He has made a full recovery.

LeGrand was paralyzed while making a tackle on a kickoff against Army at MetLife Stadium on Oct. 16, 2010, fracturing both his C-3 and C-4 cervical vertebrae. Though he remains confined to a wheel chair, paralyzed from the neck down, LeGrand said he has gained some trunk movement and occasionally has sensation in his fingers.

LeGrand will also be working as a radio analyst for the Rutgers Radio Network during the Penn State game, doing a pre-game, halftime and post-game report.

A little more than 11 months after his injury, Taliaferro completed one of the major goals he had set soon after the injury. On September 1, 2001, he walked, then skipped and jogged onto the Beaver Stadium turf in front of a jubilant record crowd of more than 109,000, leading the Nittany Lions onto the field against Miami (Fla.).

Taliaferro began taking a full academic course load again at Penn State in the 2001 fall semester while continuing his rehabilitation. In May, 2005 he walked across the stage at the Bryce Jordan Center and was awarded his degree in labor and industrial relations.

A member of the Penn State Board of Trustees, Taliaferro earned his law degree from Rutgers School of Law-Camden in 2008. He works for Bristol Myers Squibb.

RIVALRY RENEWED

Penn State has many long and storied rivalries on the gridiron. The Nittany Lions have played 18 teams 20 or more times in the 128-year history of the program.

- Penn State owns a winning record against 15 of the 18 team's that they have met 20 or more times.
- Seven of those 18 teams are on their 2014 schedule; including Temple (42 meetings), Maryland (38), Ohio State (30), Michigan State (29), Rutgers (25) and Illinois (22).
- Six of those 18 teams are current members of the Big Ten: Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, Michigan State, Ohio State and Rutgers. Seven teams are among the opponents on the 2015 and 2016 schedules.
- Penn State has played since 2012 or has a future meeting scheduled meeting with 10 of the 18 teams. Those opponents include: Army (2015), Illinois ('14, '15, '18), Iowa ('16-18), Pitt ('16-19), Syracuse ('12) and Temple ('14-16), while the Nittany Lions will meet yearly with Big Ten East Division opponents Maryland, Michigan State, Ohio State and Rutgers.
- Thirteen of the 18 programs are currently members of NCAA Division I FBS. Bucknell, Lehigh and Penn are among NCAA Division I FCS, while Gettysburg and Lebanon Valley are Division III programs.

NITTANY LION SIDELINE BOSSES MAKE QUICK IMPRESSION

There have only been 16 head coaches in the 128-year history of the Penn State football program, but it hasn't taken each of them long to make a successful impression.

- Following the season opening win over UCF in James Franklin's first game, Penn State first-year head coaches own a record of 11-4-1 in their initial contest as the Nittany Lions' field boss.
- The coaches who have won their first game at the helm of the Nittany Lions' program include: James Franklin (2014), Joe Paterno (1966), Rip Engle (1950), Bob Higgins (1930), Dick Harlow (1915), Jack Hollenback (1910), Bill Hollenback (1909), Daniel Reed (1903), Pop Golden (1900), Sam Boyle (1899), Dr. Samuel Newton (1896).
- Franklin joined Newton, Boyle, Golden, Reed, Jack Hollenback, Harlow and Higgins as the only seven PSU head coach to start a career 2-0.
- Franklin, Newton, Boyle, J. Hollenback, Harlow and Higgins started their coaching careers 3-0 or better.
- Franklin and Harlow are the only two Penn State coaches to begin their career with four straight wins. Harlow started his tenure with a 5-0 mark in 1915.
- Hugo Bezdek (1918) played Wissahickon Barracks to a 6-6 tie during his first season in 1918.
- Bill O'Brien (2012), Joe Bedenk (1949), Tom Fennell (1904) and George Hoskins (1892) all dropped their first career games before leading their squads to a winning record during their first season.

LYNCH POWERING RUNNING GAME; CLOSING IN ON 1,000-CAREER YARDS

On a cool, cloudy and windy afternoon in Champaign, sophomore running back Akeel Lynch made a case for more carries as the season nears an end.

- He ran for a career-high 137 yards. He carried the ball a career-high 28 times. He broke a career-long 47-yard scamper, which ended in the end zone for a 14-10 fourth quarter lead.
- Lynch did all of that just one week after setting a then-career-high with 130 yards in the win over Temple. He had set his previous career-high for carries vs. Maryland on Nov. 1, 2014 when he toted the pigskin 21 times and his 46-yard run vs. UMass on Sept. 20, 2014 was his previous long carry.
- The Toronto, Ontario, Canada native has four career 100-yard rushing efforts, including back-to-back games over the century mark. He is among the 31 Nittany Lions with four or more career games of 100-plus rushing yards, joining teammates Bill Belton (4) and Zach Zwinak (1).
- Through the first seven games of the season, Lynch had accumulated 187 yards on 36 carries and had one touchdown. Over his last five games, he has 422 yards on 94 carries and three rushing scores.
- Lynch is the team's leading rusher with 603 yards on 130 carries and four rushing touchdowns, followed closely by senior Bill Belton, who has 518 yards and six scores.
- Lynch is closing in on the 1,000-yard mark in his career. He enters today's game with 961 rushing yards on 190 carries (5.1 ypc) and five touchdowns.

NINE GAME BIG TEN SLATE IN 2016

Big Ten teams will play eight conference games from 2013-15, with a nine-game conference schedule starting in 2016.

The Nittany Lions will play their six East Division rivals and three West Division teams that rotate starting in 2016.

Penn State and all East Division teams will have five Big Ten home games in 2016 and in even-numbered years thereafter.

MILLEN ON ESPN BROADCAST TEAM

Former Penn State and NFL standout Matt Millen will join Bob Wischusen and Quint Kessenich in calling Saturday's meeting between the Nittany Lions and Boston College.

Millen earned first-team All-America honors as a junior in 1978, helping the unbeaten and No. 1 ranked Nittany Lions earn a berth vs. Alabama in the dramatic 1979 Sugar Bowl for the national title. Millen was a team co-captain in 1979, but missed most of his senior year with an injury. He also helped Penn State earn the first of two consecutive 11-1 records in 1977, capped by a win in the Fiesta Bowl.

The Oakland Raiders selected Millen the second round of the 1980 NFL Draft to begin a 12-year career that would see him earn four Super Bowl rings. Millen played for the Oakland/Los Angeles Raiders (1980-88), San Francisco 49ers (1989-90) and Washington Redskins (1991). He was a Pro Bowl selection in 1988.

Millen began his broadcasting career in 1992, working NFL games for CBS and then FOX. The Lehigh Valley native left broadcasting in 2001 and was team president of the Detroit Lions for the next eight years. Millen returned to broadcast booth as a college football and NFL analyst with ESPN and the NFL Network in 2009.

LIONS UNDER THE LIGHTS

Penn State played its third Big Ten night game of the 2014 campaign on Oct. 25 in front of a sellout, Penn State White Out crowd inside Beaver Stadium.

- Penn State and Ohio State played their sixth primetime clash since 2005 and were in primetime for the third consecutive year.
- The Nittany Lions played two road night games for the first time since 2008 when they won at Wisconsin and at Ohio State. This season, Penn State posted a come-from-behind, 13-10, victory at Rutgers on Sept. 13 and dropped an 18-13 decision at Michigan on Oct. 11.
- On Oct. 12, 2012 the Nittany Lions claimed the longest game in Big Ten history when they edged Michigan under the lights, 43-40, in front of a sellout Beaver Stadium crowd of 107,844 on Homecoming.
- This year marks the seventh time since 2000 that Penn State will play multiple night games in the same season. Along with road games at Rutgers and Michigan, they host Ohio State on Saturday.
- Penn State has played at least one regular season night game in 15 consecutive seasons.
- Penn State has a 40-28 on-field record in night games, going 9-10 at home, 20-11 on the road, 1-1 at regular season neutral sites and 10-6 in bowl games.
- The Lions' night games over the past 15 seasons include: Ohio State, Michigan and Rutgers (2014); Ohio State, Michigan and UCF (2013); Iowa and Ohio State (2012); Northwestern (2011); Alabama, Iowa and Michigan (2010); Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007); Michigan (2006); Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005); Minnesota and Boston College (2004); Nebraska (2002 and '03); Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).

ADDING TO THE TRADITION

Penn State football has a long and storied history and that was added to when UMass arrived at Beaver Stadium.

- Massachusetts became the 154th different opponent that Penn State will meet on the gridiron.
- It was the first new opponent on the schedule since the Nittany Lions defeated Indiana State, 41-7, to open the 2011 season.
- Penn State added Eastern Illinois to the all-time ledger in 2009, after opening the 2008 season against first-time opponents Coastal Carolina and Oregon State.

ATTENDANCE GROWS

Penn State football fans are demonstrating their excitement for new coach James Franklin and his squad, boosting the Nittany Lions' home attendance an average of 5,036 over the first six games compared to the 2013 season.

- Penn State is finished the year over 35,000 tickets sold ahead of last year's final total home attendance.
- Nittany Lion fans pushed this year's ticket total above the 2013 final tally a week prior to the season opening win over UCF.
- The average increase of 5,036 fans per game (5.0 percent) this season ranks No. 11 nationally among FBS schools whose stadiums did not expand prior to this season.
- Penn State's average increase is fifth highest among teams in the Big Ten, ACC, Big 12, Pac-12 and SEC whose stadiums did not expand this year.
- The Beaver Stadium crowd of 102,910 for the Sept. 27 game vs. Northwestern was the largest for a Penn State home day game since the 2011 season.
- Against Maryland, Penn State hosted its third crowd of 100,000-plus at Beaver Stadium and bested the Northwestern crowd with 103,969 fans in the stands for the home day game.
- The Penn State White Out crowd of 107,895 fans for the double overtime thriller vs. No. 13 Ohio State was the largest in Beaver Stadium since 107,903 attended the game against Nebraska in 2011.
- The attendance of 100,173 for the Temple home game marked the fourth consecutive 100,000-plus crowd of the season, the first time since 2011 Penn State had four crowds of 100,000-plus during the same season.
- Nearly 6,000 tickets were purchased as a part of the "Seats for Soldiers" program for the Temple game, twice the total sold in 2013.
- More than 6,000 new Penn State football season tickets, 1,200 partial season tickets and 80,000 single game and group sale tickets were sold for the 2014 season.

UPLIFTING ATHLETES REACHES \$1 MILLION RAISED FOR KIDNEY CANCER RESEARCH

One Cause. One Program. Together Uplifting Athletes and Penn State have stood the test of time.

- Under the guidance of current Chapter President Ben Kline and his leadership team, the Penn State Chapter raised a record \$151,990 this past year for kidney cancer research.
- Thanks to the ongoing support of the Penn State and State College communities for the past 12 years, the Penn State Chapter has now raised more than \$1 million. Penn State is the first Uplifting Athletes Chapter to reach this milestone.
- As the single largest donor to the Kidney Cancer Association, the funds raised from the Penn State Chapter has helped bring seven new treatments to market in the last 12 years.
- And what started at Penn State has sparked a movement that is growing nationwide, as 24 other college football programs have formed Uplifting Athletes Chapters — including half the Big Ten, ACC and at least one chapter in each major FBS conference.

LIONS RUNNING GAME HITTING STRIDE

Penn State had not had a 100-yard rusher entering its game at Indiana, but that all changed with Bill Belton's 137-yard effort vs. the Hoosier and continued over the last two weekends.

- Over the last three games, Penn State has gained 588 yards on the ground. They had just 617 yards rushing through their first eight games.
- Belton's 137-yard effort against the Hoosiers marks his fourth career 100-yard rushing game. He is the 30th player in Penn State history with at least four games over 100 yards rushing.
- He scored on a 92-yard rushing touchdown at Indiana, marking the longest rushing score by a single player in Penn State history.
- He followed up that effort with 92 yards on 19 carries and a touchdown vs. Temple.
- Sophomore Akeel Lynch needed just 18 carries vs. the Owls to notch his third career 100-yard rushing effort. He ended the day with a then-career-best 130 yards and a touchdown.
- Lynch set career-highs in both carries and yardage at Illinois. He toted the ball 28 times for 137 yards, including a career-long run of 47 yards.
- His 47-yard rush vs. the Illini went for a fourth quarter touchdown that gave Penn State a 14-10 edge.
- With his 100-yard effort vs. Illinois, Lynch became the 31st player in school history with four or more career 100-yard games.
- Penn State racked up a season-high 273 rushing yards vs. Temple and added 162 at Indiana to account for their first back-to-back games with over 100 yards on the ground.

LIONS EARN HIGHEST POINT TOTAL IN FIVE YEARS

Penn State's 48 points vs. UMass were its most points since a 52-3 win over Eastern Illinois in 2009. The 48 points were the most against an FBS team since the Nittany Lions scoring 49 in a win over Michigan State in 2008.

Penn State's 28 points in the second quarter vs. the Minutemen were the most points by the Nittany Lions in a quarter since scoring 28 at Michigan State in the third quarter of the 2009 regular season finale.

OVERTIME OVER TIME

College football introduced overtime during the bowl season in 1995 and adopted the system for regular season games in 1996.

- Since then, Penn State has played 10 overtime games, including five over the past three seasons.
- Seven of the ten overtime tilts have come at home, two in true road games and one in the 2006 Orange Bowl.
- Their first two overtime contests came vs. Iowa in 2000 and 2002 at home.
- The Nittany Lions dropped their first three contests that went to the extra period, but won five straight overtime contests before falling to Nebraska on Nov. 23, 2013.

ZWINAK REACHES 1,000 YARDS, 20 TDS; BELTON CLIMBS OVER 1,500 YARD MARK

Seniors Bill Belton and Zach Zwinak both entered the 2014 campaign among the elite runners in Penn State history. The duo has 15 combined 100-yard rushing efforts and over 3,700-yards rushing combined over the in their careers.

- Only 41 players in Penn State history have totaled 1,000 career rushing yards. Zwinak and Belton are both among that group.
- Zwinak became just the 18th player in school history to eclipse the 2,000-yard barrier in a career when he rushed for 32 yards vs. UCF. He ended his career with 2,108 yards; good for 15th in school history.
- Zach Zwinak's first touchdown run vs UMass gave him 20 career rushing touchdowns, making him the 18th player in Penn State history to have at least 20 career rushing scores. He added a second rushing score later in the second quarter to give him 21.
- Belton currently ranks 23rd in school history with 1,646 rushing yards.
- The duo has combined for 15 career 100-yard rushing games. Belton has four such efforts, including becoming the 15th PSU player with 200-yard in a game vs. Illinois in 2013, while Zwinak ranks tied for 10th in school history with 11 games over 100-yards rushing.

SHOOP NOMINATED FOR BROYLES AWARD

Defensive coordinator and safeties coach Bob Shoop was nominated for the Broyles Award, presented by the Rotary Club of Little Rock and Delta Dental to the nation's most outstanding assistant college football coach.

- In his first year at Penn State, Shoop has been instrumental in developing a Top 5 nationally ranked defense. The Nittany Lions are the only Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) team that is ranked in the Top 5 in rushing defense (1st, 81.7 ypg), total defense (3rd, 267.2 ypg), scoring defense (4th, 16.2 ppg) and pass efficiency defense (3rd, 98.74). Penn State also is No. 2 in third down conversion pct. defense at 27.6 percent.
- Shoop and co-defensive coordinator Brent Pry have directed a unit that leads the Big Ten in rushing, pass efficiency, total, scoring and first down defense and is No. 2 in third down conversion defense and team tackles for loss.
- A native of Oakmont, Pa., Shoop has led a unit that has limited 9 of 12 opponents to 20 points or less in regulation, with only UCF, Northwestern and Michigan State scoring more than 20 points in regulation. Ohio State scored 17 points in regulation against the Nittany Lions, winning 31-24 in double overtime.
- The Nittany Lions have held 11 of their 12 opponents under their scoring and yards per game averages entering the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.
- The Nittany Lions have not allowed any points on 128 of 167 (76.6 percent) opponent possessions, with 63 three-and-outs (37.7 percent). Penn State has permitted an FBS low eight plays of 30-or-more yards this season. Stanford is second with nine.

PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES

The 12th Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" was a tremendous success on Saturday, raising the 2014 total to a record \$140,000 and the cumulative total to nearly \$1 million to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

More than 100 members of Coach James Franklin's squad participated in Saturday's Lift For Life, breaking their fundraising efforts record for the sixth consecutive year, surpassing the 2013 event total of \$133,506.

More than \$990,000 have been raised in the battle against rare diseases by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural Lift For Life was held in 2003. The inaugural event raised just under \$13,000. The last four Penn State Lift For Life events have all raised in excess of \$100,000, pushing the cumulative total to the brink of \$1 million.

The Penn State Lift For Life was held outdoors at the Penn State Lacrosse Field for the third consecutive year, with approximately 2,500 fans in attendance. The offense posted a 30-24 victory over the defense during the seven strength and conditioning competitions. The competitions included a 225-pound bench max, dead lift, sled push, tire flip, shuttle, tug run and the tug of war. The defense won two of the three tug-of-war battles to conclude the event.

The 2014 Penn State Lift For Life included a kids clinic for the first time, which was run by the Nittany Lion freshmen football student-athletes. The event concluded with an autograph session with team. Members of the Penn State men's basketball and women's volleyball teams attended the event to support Penn State football. Uplifting Athletes also partnered with the State College Spikes to raise funds at one of their home games.

In addition, the Success With Honor organization coordinated all the volunteers at the Penn State Lift For Life.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved eight new therapies for the treatment of kidney cancer in the U.S. since the first Lift For Life in 2003. The Kidney Cancer Association has credited the Penn State Lift For Life as being a catalyst for the new treatments, according to Scott Shirley, Uplifting Athletes Executive Director.

Founded by Penn State Football teammates Scott Shirley, Dave Costlow and Damone Jones in 2003, Lift For Life has continued to build awareness and raise funds for the Kidney Cancer Association.

The event is organized by Penn State Football Uplifting Athletes, whose members are on the Penn State football team, led this year by Ben Kline, president of the chapter. Joining Kline as chapter officers are: running back Deron Thompson (vice president); tight end Adam Breneman (secretary); tight end Jesse James (director of marketing); running back Akeel Lynch (compliance manager) and tight end Brent Wilkerson (director of fundraising). Former football squad members and current Penn State students Joe Marvin (treasurer) and Bryce Wilson (director of operations) also are officers.

About Uplifting Athletes: Uplifting Athletes is a full-service national nonprofit organization aligning college football with rare diseases and raising them as a national priority through research, outreach, education and advocacy. What makes Uplifting Athletes unique is that the university chapters are run by current football student-athletes, providing them with an opportunity to gain management and leadership skills while learning how to leverage their assets and abilities to make a positive and lasting impact.

NEAR AND FAR

Simply put, the 2014 Penn State Football roster is one with significant geographic diversity. In all, Penn State has student-athletes from 20 states, the District of Columbia, Australia and Canada.

- The 2014 roster consists of 90 players from states within a 350-mile radius of State College. Pennsylvania leads the way with 50 players hailing from in-state areas.
- With 20 different states represented on the roster, Penn State ranks among the nation's most geographically diverse programs in the country. The Nittany Lions are tied for 11th nationally.
- Nebraska is the only Big Ten school with more states located on their 2014 roster, ranking second in the NCAA with 25 of the 50 states represented. Penn State and Minnesota are tied with 20 state apiece.
- New Jersey is second on the list with 15 players from the Garden State. There are nine players from Maryland and seven from Virginia. Florida is fifth on the list with four Nittany Lions from the Sunshine State.

GOING BOWLING

NITTANY LIONS EARN 45TH BOWL BERTH

Penn State made its first postseason appearance in 1923 when they traveled across the country to face USC in the first ever Rose Bowl Game to cap off the 1922 season. Since then, the Blue and White have made the ninth most postseason appearances in FBS history.

- Penn State will be making its 45th bowl appearance all-time, tied for No. 9 nationally. The Nittany Lions' 27 on-field post-season victories are tied for No. 4 nationally with Georgia and Texas, and lead all Big Ten Conference institutions.
- Penn State's 63.6 on-field winning percentage in bowl games (27-15-2 record) is No. 3 nationally among teams with at least 20 post-season appearances. USC (66.7) and Ole Miss (65.7) are the only schools with a better bowl winning percentage than Penn State.
- Penn State has won four of its last seven bowl appearances, with victories in the 2006 FedEx Orange Bowl (Florida State), 2007 Outback Bowl (Tennessee), 2007 Alamo Bowl (Texas A&M) and 2010 Capital One Bowl (LSU). The losses came in the 2009 Rose Bowl (USC), 2011 Outback Bowl (Florida) and 2012 TicketCity Bowl (Houston).

DECEMBER 27TH BOWL HISTORY: 1976 GATOR BOWL

Meeting Notre Dame for the first time since 1928, a 3-0 turnover deficit proved to be Penn State's undoing as the Irish posted a 20-9 victory in the 1976 Gator Bowl.

It was apparent in the early going that the teams were evenly matched and breaks would be the determining factor. After Penn State took an early 3-0 lead that Notre Dame erased with a first-quarter touchdown, the Irish used a turnover and solid offense to outscore the Lions, 13-0, in the second period, cruise to a 20-3 halftime lead and never relinquish their hold.

Penn State out-gained the Irish, 274-273, led by the rushing tandem of Bob Torrey and Matt Suhey. Quarterback Chuck Fusina hit 14 of 33 passes for 118 yards, including Penn State's only touchdown, an eight yard strike to Suhey in the fourth quarter. Jimmy Cefalo made five catches for 60 yards and had three carries for 18 yards to earn Penn State Outstanding Player-of-the Game honors. All-America linebacker Kurt Allerman made a game-high 16 tackles.

PENN STATE IN DECEMBER BOWL GAMES

Penn State will be playing the programs 16th December bowl game and owns an 11-5 record in those contests.

The Nittany Lions have won their last two December bowl appearances, dropping Texas A&M for a pair of Alamo Bowl victories. Penn State won 24-17 in the 2007 Alamo Bowl, after shutting out the Aggies, 24-0, in the 1999 game.

Penn State's first December bowl appearance came in 1959, a 7-0 triumph over Alabama in the inaugural Liberty Bowl.

- The New Era Pinstripe Bowl will mark the 15th different bowl game that the Nittany Lions have played in since appearing in their first postseason contest; the 1923 Rose Bowl.
- Penn State has appeared in the Alamo (2), Aloha (1), Blockbuster (2), Citrus (5), Cotton (3), Fiesta (6), Gator (4), Holiday (1), Liberty (3), Orange (5), Outback (4), Rose (3), Sugar (4) and TicketCity (1) Bowls.

TWENTY-NINTH BOWL OPPONENT

In 45 all-time bowl appearances, Penn State will be meeting its 29th different bowl opponent when they take on Boston College in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl

- Penn State will be meeting the 29th different opponent and second straight newcomer, after playing Houston in the 2012 TicketCity Bowl.
- The Nittany Lions had played repeat opponents in seven straight bowl games prior to the TicketCity Bowl.
- Penn State has matched up with the following teams on multiple occasions: Alabama (3), Auburn (2), Florida (3), Florida State (3), LSU (2), Oklahoma (2), Oregon (2), Tennessee (3), Texas (2), Texas A&M (2) and USC (3).
- The Nittany Lions have met the following teams once in their postseason history: Arizona State, Baylor, Boston College, BYU, Clemson, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Houston, Kansas, Kentucky, Miami (Fla.), Missouri, Notre Dame, Ohio State, SMU, Stanford, Tulane, Washington.

SIX OPPONENTS EARN BOWL BERTHS IN 2014; SEVEN ELIGIBLE FOR POSTSEASON

The Nittany Lions faced seven teams that earned bowl eligibility this season, with six of them earning an invitation into postseason play.

- Ohio State earned the No. 4 seed in the College Football Playoff and will face Alabama in the Allstate Sugar Bowl on Jan. 1.
- Illinois (Heart of Dallas), Maryland (Foster Farms), Michigan State (Cotton), Rutgers (Quick Lane) and UCF (Bitcoin) were all selected for bowl games.
- Temple defeated Tulane in its final game of the regular season to finish at 6-6, but was not selected for a postseason game.

NATIONALLY ELITE DEFENSIVE UNIT

Whether it was the Wild Dogs, LinebackerU. or the #NoFlyZone, the Penn State defense has been up to the task throughout the 2014 season.

Penn State the only FBS defense to rank among either first or second in total, rushing and pass efficiency defense entering the postseason.

- Penn State owns the nation's toughest rushing defense, surrendering an NCAA-low 84.8 yards per game on the ground. The Nittany Lions are one of two units limiting their opponents to less than 90 yards rushing per game (Alabama, 88.7).
- The defense ranks second nationally in pass efficiency defense (99.71 rating), total defense (269.8 ypg) and first down defense (174), tied with Michigan State. They are No. 6 in 3rd down conversion defense (.301), No. 8 in scoring defense (17.7 ppg) and No. 10 in passing yards allowed (185.0 ypg).
- Penn State is the only FBS team ranked among the top-five in total, rushing, and passing efficiency defense.
- Through 12 games, the defense is limiting the opposition 17.7 points per game and 269.7 yards per game. Those totals are 14.5 points and 141.1 yards fewer than the opponent's averages entering the game. Only one opponent, Northwestern, has eclipsed the 300-yard mark in total offense.
- The Nittany Lions have held 11 of their 12 opponents under their scoring and yards per game averages this season. The Wildcats are the only team to eclipse their season average for points and yardage against Penn State, finishing eight points and 17.3 yards above their averages entering the game.
- Penn State has held eight of its 12 opponents to 20 points or fewer this season, with just three opponents having eclipsed the 20-point barrier in regulation. UCF tallied 24 points in the season opener and Northwestern scored 29 points. Ohio State tallied 31 points in the double-overtime contest, but had just 17 points in regulation.
- Over the past five games, Penn State opponents are just 18 of 79 (.227) on third down conversions. For the season, foes are 56 of 186 (.301) on third down, with the average opponent converting just 4.6 third downs per game.
- The Nittany Lions have held their opponents out of the end zone on 76 percent of their drives, including forcing a three and out on 37 percent of their drives.

DEFENSE LIMITING EXPLOSIVE PLAYS

One way to be a successful defense is to limit teams to small chunks of yardage and the Nittany Lions have been among the best in the nation at this in 2014.

- Of the 128 FBS football programs, only Penn State has not allowed a rushing play of 30 or more yards this season.
- The Nittany Lions have allowed a FBS low eight plays of 30-or-more yards this season. Stanford is second with nine.
- Penn State has allowed just 33 plays of 20-or-more yards this season, including just eight of 30-plus yards.

DEFENSE STACKING UP AS ONE OF THE BEST IN PROGRAM & NCAA HISTORY

It's old school. It's bring your lunch pail with you. It's Penn State football and it has been built on the shoulders of some great defenses.

The 2014 defensive unit will look to close out the 2014 season with one last dominant performance in the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

- Penn State is looking to lead the NCAA in rushing defense for the third time in program history. They are one of only 20 programs to lead the NCAA in rushing defense multiple times.
- Only eight FBS programs have ever led the NCAA in rushing defense three or more times ; (5) Oklahoma; (4) Alabama; (3) Auburn, Michigan State, Ohio State, Virginia Tech, USC and Wyoming.
- The Nittany Lions also have the opportunity to become just the third team to lead the nation in rushing and passing defense in the same season.
- Only Alabama in 2011 and Oklahoma in 1986 have led the nation in both categories. *Passing defense based on yards allowed from 1937-1989 and passing efficiency from 1990-present.*
- It has been 36 years since a Penn State defense held their opponents under 270 yards of total offense per game. The 1978 limited the opposition to just 203.9 yards per game.

DEFENSE OVERPOWERS INDIANA

The Penn State defense flexed their muscle against the NCAA's then-leading rusher on Nov. 8 at Indiana.

- Indiana running back Tevin Coleman entered the Nov. 8 meeting leading the nation at 162.5 rushing yards per contest and had rushed for at least 100 yards in 10 straight games.
- The Blue and White held him to just 71 yards on 20 carries and held him out of the end zone for the first time in 2014.
- Coleman entered the game averaging 8.0 yards per carry, but was held to 3.5 yards per attempt by the Nittany Lions, with a long carry of 17 yards.
- The Nittany Lions piled up a season-high 10.0 tackles for loss, tying their output from Sept. 20 vs. UMass.
- S Jesse Della Valle and LB Nyeem Wartman each grabbed their first career interceptions. Della Valle's closed out the first half and Wartman's led to Ficken's second field goal of the game and a 13-7 lead.
- Penn State held Indiana to seven points and 221 yards; 20.6 points and 205.6 yards below its season averages entering the game.

DEFENSE STINGY VS. AKRON OFFENSE

- PSU held Akron to 277 yards, the second straight game holding its opponent to under 300 yards of total offense. The last time that happened was in the opening two games of 2013 against Syracuse (260) and Eastern Michigan (183).
- Akron gained just 69 yards rushing, the second straight opponent held to less than 70 yards on the ground. The last time Penn State kept two consecutive opponents to less than 70 yards rushing was Eastern Illinois (59) and Minnesota (37) in 2009.
- The three points allowed are the fewest allowed since shutting out Kent State on Sept. 21, 2013.
- Penn State allowed only 17 first downs and forced five three and outs vs. Akron.

DEFENSE STIFLES KNIGHTS

Penn State forced a three-and-out on UCF's first possession of the season opener in Dublin, and later in the first quarter stood tall on a first-and-goal from the PSU four-yard line – including three stops at the one.

- The Blue and White limited UCF's offense to just 11 first downs and 246 total yards in their 26-24 victory over the Knights.
- UCF managed only 24 rushing yards on 29 attempts (0.8 ypc) and the Knights ran just 51 plays in the game.
- UCF had just 171 yards of offense entering their final drive of game, a 75 yard touchdown drive.
- In the first half, the Nittany Lions limited UCF to just 35 yards and three first downs.

POSITION CHANGE FINE WITH ZETTEL

Junior Anthony Zettel moved from defensive end to defensive tackle this spring, but the change hasn't affected his production as one of the most disruptive pass rushers in the Big Ten.

- Zettel has set career-highs in tackles (36), tackles for loss (15.0), sacks (8.0), interceptions (3), forced fumbles (1) and fumble recoveries (1).
- Entering the season, Zettel had 31 career tackles, 8.0 career sacks and 10.0 tackles for loss. He has surpassed those totals in 2014 alone.
- He is the only player in the NCAA ranked in both interceptions and sacks per game.
- Zettel is the only defensive lineman to rank among the top-100 in interceptions per game in the NCAA this season.
- His three interceptions are the most by a Penn State defensive lineman since at least 1959.
- His eight sacks this season are the most by a PSU player since Aaron Maybin logged 12.0 sacks in 2008.
- His 16.0 career sacks rank 15th on the career charts, tied with National Football Foundation Hall of Famer Shane Conlan.

WINNING THE TURNOVER BATTLE AT RU

Penn State had gained just one turnover entering their win at Rutgers, but the Nittany Lions defense accomplished an impressive feat with five interceptions vs. the Scarlet Knights.

- The five interceptions are tied for the most in a game this season in Division I FBS (Air Force; vs. Boise State).
- It marks the first five interception game for Penn State since a 2004 meeting with Michigan State.
- The last time Penn State grabbed five interceptions from the same quarterback in a game was a 2000 contest vs. Louisiana Tech (Brian Stallworth).
- The five picks were the most by a Nittany Lion squad since grabbing four vs. Michigan State in 2005.
- The last time a Penn State team created five turnovers in the same game was in the 2007 season opener vs. FIU. All five turnovers were fumble recoveries.

HALTING THE RUN VS. UMASS

The Penn State defense limited Massachusetts to a season-low three yards rushing and in the process accomplished something that hasn't been done by a Nittany Lion defense since 2007.

The three rushing yards mark the fewest allowed by Penn State since holding Notre Dame to zero yards rushing in their 2007 primetime clash inside Beaver Stadium. The Lions won that contest, 31-10, in front of 110,978 white-clad fans in the first ever stadium-wide Penn State White Out.

The LinebackerJ. mantra wasn't something that was just haphazardly given to Penn State, it was earned by the many successful linebackers that earned All-America distinction or those who went on to NFL success.

From Arrington, Connor and Posluszny to Conlan, Ham and Onkotz, that distinction has been earned and senior Mike Hull is carrying the torch forward with an All-American caliber 2014 season.

Entering the 2014 season, Hull had 154 career tackles and was getting ready to take the reins of the Nittany Lions defense from his good friend, Glenn Carson.

The Canonsburg, Pa. native logged 10 stops vs. UCF to open his senior campaign and that was a sign of things to come.

- In 12 games this season, Hull has a Big Ten-best 134 tackles and ranks seventh nationally with 11.2 stops per game. His 6.1 solo tackles per game rank 16th nationally and second in the Big Ten.
- Hull has led the team in tackles in 11 of 12 games this season and is the 23rd player in school history to top 100 tackles in a season.
- He is the only Big Ten tackler averaging 10-plus stops per game and looks to become the first Penn State tackler to lead the Big Ten in stops since Dan Connor averaged 11.2 stops per game in 2007.
- He has eight double-digit tackle games, including a career-high 19 tackles in a double-overtime thriller vs. Ohio State. His 19 tackles are tied for the most in the Big Ten and ninth most in the NCAA in a single game this season.
- His 2014 campaign has solidified his spot among the best in the LinebackerJ. lineage and has featured at least nine tackles in 11 of his 12 games. Hull has added nine tackles for loss, two sacks, one interception, one forced and one recovered fumble.
- His only game this season with less than nine stops came against UMass. Hull made six stops, playing only 31 snaps, his lowest total of the season, in the 48-7 victory.
- Hull has quickly moved up the single season and career tackles charts. Passing Carson for the No. 10 spot on the career charts on Nov. 15 vs. Temple, Hull ranks No. 6 in school history with 288 career stops.
- His 134 tackles this season are No. 6 on the single season charts and are just five shy of passing Sean Lee's 138 stops from 2007.
- He is the first PSU defender with 100-plus stops since Gerald Hodges collected 109 tackles in 2012.
- Hull is in elite company with his 11.0 tackles per game average. Only four Penn State players have averaged 10.7 or more tackles for a complete season since 1970 (Greg Buttle: 1975 & '76; Andre Collins: 1989; Shawn Mayer: 2002; Dan Connor: 2007).
- He has 12 double-digit tackle performances in his career, with eight coming in 2014.
- In his last 20 games, Hull has made at least nine tackles on 17 occasions, including a career-high 19 vs. Ohio State, 16 vs. Northwestern (2014), and 13 vs. Illinois (2013).
- Hull also made 10-plus stops three times in 2013 and once in 2012. He had 13 stops vs. Illinois and 10 at Indiana and vs. Michigan last season, while making 11 stops vs. Indiana in 2012.
- Hull accepted an invitation to participate in the 66th Reese's Senior Bowl
- Hull was elected as a team captain prior to the start of the 2014 season. He was joined by C.J. Olaniyan as defenders elected team captains.



B1G HAPPENINGS

QUARTET SELECTED ALL-BIG; HULL TABBED LINEBACKER OF THE YEAR

Four Penn Staters were selected All-Big Ten and seven Nittany Lions earned honorable mention accolades from the media and coaches, with one Nittany Lion standout earning a prestigious individual honor.

- LB Mike Hull lead the Nittany Lions' contingent, as he was selected the Butkus-Fitzgerald Linebacker of the Year. The conference's leading tackler and All-America candidate also was named first-team All-Big Ten by the coaches and media.
- Hull joins All-American Michael Mauti as recipients of the Big Ten Linebacker of the Year Award, giving LinebackerU two of the award's initial four recipients.
- DT Anthony Zettel also earned first-team All-Big Ten from the coaches and media.
- Hull and Zettel were named to the BTN.com All-Big Ten first-team on Sunday.
- PK Sam Ficken earned the second-team All-Big Ten nod from the coaches and media after breaking the Penn State season field goal record with 23 successful attempts.
- WR DaeSean Hamilton was named second-team all-conference by the media. The Big Ten's leading receiver all season, Hamilton was selected Big Ten Freshman of the Week twice this season, the second-highest total in the conference.
- Seven Lions earned honorable-mention recognition, six of whom return for 2015: S Adrian Amos, DE Deion Barnes, TE Jesse James, DT Austin Johnson, CB Jordan Lucas, C Angelo Mangiro and CB Trevor Williams.
- Senior Ryan Keiser was named Penn State's Sportsmanship recipient.
- Penn State has 43 first-team All-Big Ten selections since 2005 and 28 second-team honorees, for a total of 71 over the past 10 seasons. During the past three seasons, the Nittany Lions have had six individual Big Ten award winners, including Freshman of the Year Deion Barnes (2012) and Christian Hackenberg (2013).

FIVE NITTANY LIONS EARN BTN.COM FRESHMAN ALL-BIG TEN HONORS

Five Penn State freshmen were named to the BTN.com Freshman All-Big Ten team, tied for the conference's highest total.

- The Nittany Lion freshmen on the BTN.com team were: S Marcus Allen, TE Mike Gesicki, WR DaeSean Hamilton, OT Andrew Nelson and P Daniel Pasquariello.
- The five All-Freshman selections for Coach James Franklin's squad were tied with Ohio State for most in the Big Ten. Michigan State was next with three.
- The Nittany Lions also had a conference-high five BTN.com All-Freshman honorees in 2013 in LB Brandon Bell, QB Christian Hackenberg, DT Austin Johnson, RB Akeel Lynch and LB Nyeem Wartman.

PENN STATE VS. BIG TEN

Penn State owns a 188-94-3 on-field mark against Big Ten Conference teams since the Nittany Lions first opposed Ohio State in 1912.

The Nittany Lions began play as a member of the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and have a 109-68 on-field mark in their 22nd conference season.

Prior to joining the conference, Penn State played 107 games vs. the current Big Ten alignment and was 79-25-3 in those games.

Maryland and Rutgers joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2014.

B1G OPENERS OVER THE YEARS

Penn State opened its 22nd Big Ten season with a 13-10 come-from-behind win on Sept. 13 against old rival and conference newcomer Rutgers in Piscataway, N.J.

Here are some facts and figures about the Nittany Lions' 22 B1G opening games.

- Penn State owns an on-field record of 10-12 in Big Ten opening contests. Fourteen of the Nittany Lions' 22 B1G openers have come on the road (7-7).
- Their win at Rutgers was the earliest Big Ten opener for Penn State since it opened the 1993 and 1994 seasons with Big Ten games. They hosted Minnesota on Sept. 4, 1993 (W, 38-20), and won at Minnesota on Sept. 3, 1994 (W, 56-3).
- Penn State has played Wisconsin more than any other team to open Big Ten play. The Nittany Lions and Badgers have met four times to open B1G play.
- The Nittany Lions have also played Illinois (3), Indiana (3), Iowa (3), Michigan (1), Minnesota (3), Northwestern (1), Ohio State (3) and Rutgers (1) in Big Ten openers.
- The Sept. 13 contest was the earliest Big Ten Conference opening game since August 31, 1996. That season Illinois was edged by Michigan, 20-8, and Michigan State bested Purdue, 52-14, in the season opener for all four teams.

PENN STATE IN 22ND BIG TEN SEASON

After 106 years as an independent in football, Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and is playing its 22nd season in the conference. The Nittany Lions were Big Ten Champions in 1994, beating Oregon to win the 1995 Rose Bowl, and played USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

The Nittany Lions will begin Big Ten play at division foe Rutgers on Sept. 13 and finish the regular season against Michigan State at Beaver Stadium on Nov. 29. Penn State will also play division rival Ohio State (Oct. 25) and Maryland (Nov. 1) at home.

The road schedule features divisional opponents Michigan (Oct. 11) and Indiana (Nov. 8), while they will face non-division opponent Northwestern (Sept. 27) at home and Illinois (Nov. 22) on the road.

The Big Ten will play an eight game schedule in 2014 and '15, before moving to a nine-game slate starting in 2016.

MARYLAND, RUTGERS ENTER BIG TEN; EAST-WEST DIVISION ALIGNMENTS BEGINS

A pair of old Penn State rivals, Maryland and Rutgers, will become members of the Big Ten on July 1, 2014 and join the Nittany Lions in the conference's East Division starting this season.

The Big Ten East Division will consist of Penn State, Indiana, Maryland, Michigan, Michigan State, Ohio State and Rutgers. The West Division will include Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota, Nebraska, Northwestern, Purdue and Wisconsin. Teams in the same division will play each other annually.

Penn State will provide the opposition for the Scarlet Knights' first Big Ten game, on Sept. 13, 2014 in Piscataway, N.J. The meeting also will be the opening game of the Big Ten's 119th football season. The Nittany Lions have played Rutgers nine times in New Jersey, but the last six meetings came at Giants Stadium, most recently in 1995. Penn State has played at Rutgers in 1951, '53 and '55. The teams have met 24 times, with the first game in 1918 and the last meeting in 1995. From 1977-95, the Nittany Lions and Scarlet Knights played every season except in 1980 and '81.

The Terrapins will visit Beaver Stadium on Nov. 1 for the first time since a Sept. 26, 1992 contest. Penn State and Maryland have met 37 times, with the first game in 1917 and the last contest in 1993 in College Park. From 1960-93, the Nittany Lions and Terrapins played every year except 1976, '81 and '83.

The Nittany Lions and Spartans will end the 2014-16 campaigns against each other as they did from 1993-2010 in the battle for the Land Grant Trophy. In 2017, Penn State will visit Maryland in the regular-season finale.



SOLID START

OFF TO A SOLID START

Penn State opened the James Franklin era with four straight victories and started 4-0 for the first time since Joe Paterno's 2008 squad began the season 9-0.

- With their 48-7 victory over UMass, the Nittany Lions started a season with a 4-0 record for the 29th time in the program's 128-year history and the first since 2008.
- The Nittany Lions were riding a five-game winning streak dating back to the 2013 season ending win at Wisconsin. It was tied for the nation's sixth-longest winning streak prior to their loss to Northwestern.
- Head coach James Franklin is just the second Penn State head coach to start his Nittany Lion career 4-0, joining Dick Harlow, who started 5-0 in 1915.
- Franklin was the sixth Penn State first-year head coach to start 3-0; first since Bob Higgins in 1930.
- Franklin also became the 11th Penn State head coach to win his first game as the head coach of the Blue and White with the thrilling 26-24 win over UCF in the Croke Park Classic.
- Eleven of 16 sideline bosses have won their first game (11-4-1).

HISTORY MADE IN HISTORIC CROKE PARK

Penn State football's 128-year history has included two national championships, more than 800 on-field wins and enjoys one of the most passionate fan bases in the country.

- Penn State's fan base went worldwide in their season opener when an estimated 20,000 blue and white clad fans went across the pond to support the Nittany Lions in their first-ever international game.
- Inside of the most historic stadiums in the world, Sam Ficken's 36-yard field goal with no time left on the clock capped a thrilling 26-24 triumph at Croke Park Stadium.
- Ficken lined up a kick from the right hash mark and slipped the 36-yard effort inside the right upright and the celebration was underway on the pitch and in the stands.
- It was the first international victory for the Nittany Lions and moved their record to 8-3 in neutral site season opening games.
- Penn State's official season opening record is now 94-20-2.

COLLEGE FOOTBALL ON THE EMERALD ISLE

When Penn State and UCF land in at Dublin Airport, they will begin preparations for the eighth college football game ever played in Ireland.

- This will mark the eighth overall college football game played in Ireland, with five of them taking place in Dublin (*), one in Galway (#) and one in Limerick (^).
- This will be the second college football contest played in Croke Park Stadium. The first came in 1996 when Notre Dame defeated Navy, 54-37, in front of 38,651 fans. That game was called the Shamrock Classic.
- Five of the eight games featured teams from the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS). Two match-ups of Division III opponents and one between teams from the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) have also been played on the Emerald Isle.

PENN STATE SEASON OPENERS

The 2014 season marks the 128th in Penn State history, with the Nittany Lions owning an official record of 94-20-2 in opening games.

- Penn State played their second straight season opening game away from home when they defeated UCF, 26-24, in Dublin, Ireland. They topped Syracuse, 23-17, at MetLife Stadium in 2013.
- It was the first time since 1991-92 that the Nittany Lions will play consecutive season openers away from Beaver Stadium.
- Penn State is 8-3 in neutral site season openers dating back to their first known neutral site season opener in 1941. That was a 7-0 loss to Colgate on Oct. 4 at Civic Stadium in Buffalo, N.Y.
- Penn State has only lost consecutive season openers twice in school history; 1964-65, 1989-90, 2000-01. They have never lost three consecutive season openers.
- Penn State's longest streaks of winning their season openers are: 12 (1919-30), 11 (1893-1903), 10 (1973-82), 9 (1909-17), 7 (1942-48).
- The Nittany Lions went unbeaten from 1909-1930, winning 20 of 21 season openers. They tied Wissahickon Barracks, 6-6, in 1918 and the streak was stopped by Waynesburg, a 7-0 setback, in 1931.

ACROSS THE POND FOR SEASON-OPENER

Penn State played its first international game since the program's 1887 inception when it opened the season against UCF in the Croke Park Classic on August 30 in Dublin, Ireland.

- The contest was played at Croke Park, the headquarters of the Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) in front of 53,304 fans.
- The Penn State-UCF contest was the eighth American college football game held in Ireland. The last American football game hosted in Croke Park was in 1996 when Notre Dame played Navy.
- The last game hosted on the Emerald Isle was when the Irish and Middies played in Dublin's Aviva Stadium to open the 2012 season.
- Penn State was the first Big Ten Conference team to play internationally since Michigan State and Wisconsin met in Tokyo in the 1993 regular-season finale.

FIRST TIME TRAVELERS

Although many of the players on the Penn State football team have done their fair share of traveling, the season opener vs. UCF in Dublin, Ireland was the first time that a major portion of the squad traveled outside of North America.

Approximately 85-percent of the players that comprise the Nittany Lions' roster made their first trip outside of North America when the team plane departs for Dublin, Ireland and the Croke Park Classic.

STAFF TIDBITS

James Franklin assembled a coaching staff with extensive collegiate experience, familiarity and strong recruiting ties to the Mid-Atlantic, South and Northeast regions of the United States.

Franklin's staff includes seven members of his former staff at Vanderbilt that were instrumental in the Commodores achieving unprecedented success the past two years, a coach who previously worked with Franklin and one of Penn State's greatest all-time receivers, who was a highly-successful high school coach in western Pennsylvania.

- Seven of the assistant coaches were members of Franklin's staff at Vanderbilt the past two years, helping the Commodores to historic heights, including nine wins each in 2012 and 2013, two bowl victories and consecutive Top 25 finishes for the first time in program history.
- Charles Huff was an offensive quality control coach in 2011 during Franklin's first season at Vanderbilt and served with Franklin at Maryland in 2009.
- Terry Smith made 108 receptions and 15 touchdown catches at Penn State (1988-91) and was a highly successful head coach at Gateway High School near Pittsburgh from 2002-12.
- All but one member of the coaching staff graduated from a college or university in the Mid-Atlantic or Northeast.

- Four members of the coaching staff hail from the Keystone State: Franklin (Langhorne), Pry (Altoona), Shoop (Oakmont) and Smith (Aliquippa).



RECORD SETTERS

HACKENBERG BUILDING IMPRESSIVE RESUME IN SECOND SEASON

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg impressed everyone with his abilities and moxie during his freshman campaign in 2013, but the second-year signal caller is now moving into elite territory among PSU passers.

- Hackenberg has completed 467-of-826 career passes (56.5 percent), for 5,561 passing yards and 28 touchdown passes in 24 career starts.
- His is just the eighth player in Penn State history to surpass the 5,000-yard passing mark and one of 10 to eclipse the 4,000-yard passing mark. He is closing in on Daryll Clark's 5,742 yards from 2006-09 for No. 4 on the career list.
- His 467 completions rank third in school history.
- The second year signal caller owns the freshman and sophomore passing yardage records. He threw for 2,955 yards as a rookie and has 2,606 yards this season. Zach Mills held the freshman (1,669) and sophomore marks (2,417) prior to Hackenberg.
- He owns the overall, freshman and sophomore single game passing records.
 - Set the freshman single game record twice in 2013. He threw for 340 yards at Indiana on Oct. 5 after a 311-yard effort against Eastern Michigan on Sept. 7. Zack Mills twice threw for 280 yards (USU & Southern Miss) in 2001.
 - His 454 yards passing vs. UCF in the 2014 season opener broke Mills' school & sophomore record of 399 yards vs. Iowa in 2002.
- Hackenberg threw for 773 yards in his first two games of 2014 to break the Penn State consecutive game passing record. He eclipsed Zack Mills' record of 686 yards from 2002.
 - Hackenberg compiled 454 yards vs. UCF and 319 against Akron.
 - Mills threw for 399 yards vs. Iowa and 287 at Wisconsin.
- His nine games with at least 200 yards broke Mills' freshman record of five from the 2001 season.
- Hackenberg has 14 200-yard passing games, which ranks fifth in school history. He is tied with Daryll Clark for fourth place and trails only McGloin (18), Collins (16) and Mills (16).
- His seven 300-yard passing games (24 games played) put him atop the list of only four quarterbacks in PSU history to post multiple 300-plus yard passing games.
- Hackenberg's 55 passing attempts at Indiana in 2013 marked just the fourth time in PSU history a signal caller amassed 50 passing attempts in a game. It broke Collins' school record of 54 in 1992 at BYU.
- Ten of his 28 scoring strikes are 40 yards or longer, including a career-long 79-yard touchdown pass to Eugene Lewis in the 2014 season opener vs. UCF.
- Hackenberg has thrown for at least 250 yards in nine of his 22 career games, including six 300-yard efforts and one 400-yard contest.
- He had 14 completions of 40-plus yards or longer in 2013, which tied for eighth nationally and tied for tops among freshman quarterbacks in the NCAA (Winston, FSU).
- On the awards front, Hackenberg is a preseason candidate for the Maxwell and O'Brien Awards.

FICKEN ADDS TO RÉSUMÉ; MOVES UP CAREER SCORING CHARTS

Senior placekicker Sam Ficken converted one field goal and one extra point during his true freshman season, but over the last three seasons he has been the team's top scorer.

And now, the senior is writing his name among the top scorers in Penn State history.

- With his four points vs. Michigan State, Ficken pushed his career total to 264 and continues to hold the No. 4 spot on the all-time scoring list.
- He is one of just 11 players in Penn State history to score 200 points in a career and one of just four to eclipse the 260-point mark.
- He is currently No. 2 on the Penn State career field goals made list with 52 converted tries in his career, making him just the third Lion to log 50 successful attempts.
- His 23 field goals this season are a school record, moving past Matt Bahr (1978) and Kevin Kelly (2006), who each made 22 during their respective seasons.
- He is just the sixth player in school history to make 40 field goals in a career.
- Ficken leads the Big Ten and ranks No. 4 nationally with 1.92 field goals per game, having made 23 of 28 attempts, and ranks fifth in the conference in scoring among kickers at 7.8 points per game.
- He opened the 2014 campaign with a career-best four field goals made (4-for-4) vs. UCF in Dublin, Ireland and duplicated that effort vs. Maryland (4-4).
- He was true from 50-yards vs. Temple to mark his second career 50-plus yard field goal.
- Three of Ficken's four field goals vs. Maryland were 45 yard or longer, marking the first time since at least 1982 a Penn State kicker connected on three 45-yard efforts in the same game.
- Ficken's game winning field goal vs. UCF on Aug. 30 was his second career game ending field goal, joining the overtime game winner vs. Wisconsin in 2012.
- Ficken connected on a then-career-long 47-yard field goal in against UCF to mark his 15th consecutive successful attempt, which set the school standard. Ficken made his final 10 attempts of 2012 and connected on his first five field goals in 2013 to break Craig Fayak's mark of 13 straight makes in 1992.
- Ficken again wrote his name into the Penn State record books on Sept. 21 vs. Kent State when he converted a career-best 54-yard field goal. His effort was the longest field goal by a Penn State player in home game history and tied for fifth in the NCAA in 2012.
- The 54-yard field goal also ranks tied for fourth on the career charts with Herb Menhardt (1979) and trails only three 55-yard conversions by Chris Bahr in 1975. The other four field goals all came on the road.

JAMES EARNING NATIONAL RECOGNITION; OWNS TIGHT END TD RECORD

There are not many tight ends in the NCAA that measure 6-foot-7, 271-pounds. There are even fewer that can handle blocking a blitzing linebacker and taking on a cornerback in space.

Those attributes are what make Jesse James such a vital player and he continues to move towards Penn State tight end receiving records and earn national recognition.

- James was named one of the 31 tight ends selected to the John Mackey Award Midseason Watch List. He was among the preseason candidates for the award, as well, joining teammate Kyle Carter on that list.
- James' selection to the Mackey Award Midseason Watch List marks the third straight season Penn State has had a player on the list (Carter, 2012 & 13).

- He is tied for the second most career starts on the team with 30, including 24 straight dating back to the start of 2013.
- James' 11 career touchdown receptions passed Ted Kwalick (10; 1966-68) for the most by a tight end in school history.
- He has caught 75 passes for 978 yards in his career. Among Nittany Lion tight ends, Andrew Quarless (2006-09) owns the career receptions record with 87 and Ted Kwalick (1966-68) holds the school standard with 1,343 yards.
- James has caught at least one pass in 17 straight games, besting his previous streak of 11 that spanned the 2012-13 seasons.

BELTON RUSHES INTO THE RECORD BOOKS AT INDIANA

It started like any other run, but once Bill Belton broke the #LionOfScrimmage there was no stopping him on his way to the longest rushing touchdown in Penn State history.

- The record-setting second quarter burst also tied the school standard for the longest offensive scoring play in the 128-year history of Penn State football.
- Belton rushed up the opening in the middle created primarily by blocks from Brian Gaia, Angelo Mangiro and Jesse James, then bounced the run to the Penn State sideline and slipped a late would-be tackler on his way to a 92 yard rushing score.
- It was the longest rushing score by one player in school history, eclipsing Bill Suter's 90-yard touchdown scamper at Navy in 1894. Duane Taylor (14 yards) and Dan Natale (78) combined on a 92-yard touchdown that included a fumble return at Syracuse in 1973.
- The play tied a 92-yard scoring pass from Bill Hess to Bob Higgins in 1919 at Pitt. It also marked only the fourth 90-yard play from scrimmage in program history, with all four coming on the road.
- Belton's effort broke the Memorial Stadium record (since 1960) for longest running play, eclipsing Wisconsin's David Gilreath's 90-yard run in 2008.
- Belton's run was the longest Nittany Lion play from scrimmage since 1986 when Blair Thomas ran for 92 yards vs. Syracuse. Thomas was stopped at the one-yard line on the carry.
- Belton ran for 137 yards on 16 carries in the game, earning his fourth career 100-yard effort.
- His 92-yard run is the longest run by a Big Ten player this season and tied for the fourth-longest in the nation this year.
- Belton's burst also is tied for ninth-longest in the 119-year history of Big Ten football.

HAMILTON'S BREAKOUT ROOKIE SEASON

Legendary college football announcer Keith Jackson sometimes uttered the phrase "check him for stick 'em" when a wide receiver was having an exceptional game.

There is no doubt that he would have uttered that phrase a few times through the first eight games of redshirt freshman DaeSean Hamilton's career as a Nittany Lion.

- Through 12 games, Hamilton leads the Big Ten with 75 catches (6.3 rpg) and is fifth in the conference at 70.7 ypg, scoring one touchdown.
- Against Ohio State, Hamilton hauled in a school record 14 passes, breaking Freddie Scott's mark of 13 catches vs. Wisconsin in 1995.
- His 126 receiving yards vs. Ohio State marked his fourth 100-yard effort of the season to extend his school freshman record.
- His 75 catches have broken the PSU freshman standard for receptions in a season and rank third in



school history. With the second of his seven catches at Michigan, Hamilton moved past Deon Butler's freshman mark of 37 catches in 2005.

- Hamilton set the freshman single game record in Dublin, Ireland vs. UCF. He caught 11 passes for 165 yards, moving past Deon Butler's 125-yard effort vs. Wisconsin in 2005 and Maurice Humphrey's eight catch game against Northwestern in 2003.
- Hamilton eclipsed Butler's freshman season record of 691 yards in 2005 when he caught a nine-yard pass in the second quarter vs. Maryland. Hamilton now has 848 yards on the season.
- Hamilton became the first Nittany Lion freshman wideout to eclipse the 100-yard mark in a game - doing so in the first half - since Butler and Jordan Norwood both accomplished the feat in 2005.
- Hamilton's four 100-yard receiving games are the most by a freshman in school history. Butler had two during his redshirt rookie season in 2005.
- He is just the fifth freshman to post a 100-yard receiving game; joining Butler (2005, R-Fr.), Jimmy Cefalo (1974, Fr.), Humphrey (2003, Fr.) and Norwood (2005, Fr.).
- Hamilton has earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors twice this season; vs. UCF and vs. Ohio State.

HACKENBERG BECOMES FIRST LION TO THROW FOR 400 YARDS

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg, the 2013 Big Ten Freshman of the Year, picked up where he left off to start his sophomore season.

After throwing for a career-best 355 yards in Madison to close out last year with a win over the No. 14 Badgers, Hackenberg made history on the storied pitch inside Croke Park vs. UCF.

- In the season opener vs. UCF, Hackenberg added to his already impressive career résumé with a school record 454 passing yards, going 32-of-47 with one touchdown.
- The 454 yards broke Zack Mills' school record of 399 yards (vs. Iowa, 2002) as he became the first Penn State signal caller to eclipse the 400-yard mark in a game.
- His 456 yards of total offense broke the school record previously held by Zack Mills (418 yds vs. Ohio State, 2001). He threw for 454 yards and rushed for two yards vs. UCF
- The 32 completions also were a career-high and rank third on the Penn State single game charts.
- After UCF took its first lead of the game at 24-23 with 1:13 to play, Hackenberg directed an 8-play, 55-yard drive that led to Sam Ficken's game-winning 36-yard field goal on final play of game. Hackenberg was 4 of 6 for 47 yards on the drive and ran eight yards for a first down on 4th and 3 to keep the drive alive on the Penn State side of the field.

ROOKIE HALEY SETS RETURN RECORD

Freshman Grant Haley was hailed as one of the fastest members of the Penn State football team by head coach James Franklin and it took one kick off return to see that was true.

Haley took the opening kick off of the second half up the right sideline for 69-yards - if not for a holding penalty - and his role as the kick returner was sealed.

- Haley has lined up deep on every kick off this season and his 30 kick off returns this season are a school record.
- Haley's 30 returns top Chaz Powell's 27 returns from 2011 and his 621 return yards this season are second only to Powell's school-record 733 from 2011.
- Haley will become just the ninth true freshman to lead to the team in kick off return yardage. He joins the likes of Jimmy Cefalo ('74), Booker Moore ('77), Curt Warner ('79), Blair Thomas ('85), Leroy Thompson ('87), Kenny Watson ('96), Eddie Drummond ('98) and A.J. Wallace ('06).

#FICKENFORTHWIN

Sam Ficken has endured a lot in his career and he's been through a lot during this past spring and training camp with his head coach spraying water at him or blowing an air horn in his face during drills to prepare him for the pressures of a game.

There were no air horns and maybe a slight chance of rain in Dublin, Ireland for the season opener, but Ficken handled everything thrown his way.

- The senior placekicker handled all four of his field goal attempts, including the 36-yard game-winner. He slid his final attempt inside the right upright into the open end of Croke Park.
- It was the second game-ending field goal of Ficken's career, joining his 2012 overtime game winner vs. Wisconsin on Senior Day in Beaver Stadium.
- For his superlative efforts in the 26-24 win over UCF, Ficken was selected Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week.
- The UCF contest was the first four field goal game of Ficken's career - he had made three field goals on four other occasions - and are the most field goals by a Penn State kicker since 2010 when Collin Wagner knocked through five attempts against Temple.

HACKENBERG LEADS #RALLYATRUTGERS

There are many notes regarding sophomore Christian Hackenberg, but here are a few more that followed the come-from-behind win at Rutgers.

- It was Hackenberg's fourth straight 300-yard passing game, which was tied for the longest streak in the Big Ten since Brett Basanez had five straight for Northwestern in 2005.
- His consecutive 300-yard game streak was tied for second longest in the Big Ten since 1997 (Joe Germaine, 1998).
- Hackenberg's 1,082 passing yards through three games were the most by a Big Ten quarterback through a team's first three games since 1996.
- The go-ahead score with 1:13 left at Rutgers was the fourth game-winning or game-tying drive in the fourth quarter in his career.
- He led game-tying drives vs. Illinois and Michigan in 2013 and a game-winning drive vs. UCF in the 2014 season opener.
- Hackenberg was 7-for-10 for 131 yards passing on his two game winning drives this season. He was 4-of-6 for 47 yards vs. UCF and 3-of-4 for 84 yards at Rutgers.

HAMILTON BREAKS OUT IN WIN OVER UCF

DaeSean Hamilton came to Penn State as a play-making athlete, but an injury forced him to miss his true freshman season in 2013.

He more than made up for the missed time last inside Croke Park as the redshirt freshman broke two rookie receiving records and played a large role in helping lead Penn State to a thrilling season opening win over UCF.

- His 11 catches and 165 yards against UCF re-wrote the freshman pass catching standards, moving past Deon Butler's 125-yard effort vs. Wisconsin in 2005 and Maurice Humphrey's eight catches against Northwestern in 2003.
- For his efforts, Hamilton was named Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week.
- He became the first freshman wideout to eclipse the 100-yard mark in a game - doing so in the first half - since Butler and Jordan Norwood both accomplished the feat during the 2005 season.
- Hamilton and Eugene Lewis became the eighth pair of teammates to record 100-plus receiving yards in the same game and the first tandem to log 150-plus yards in the same game. The last duo to surpass 100-yards in the same game was Butler and Norwood vs. Michigan State in 2008.

HACKENBERG AMONG NCAA BEST IN CRUNCH TIME

Penn State sophomore signal caller Christian Hackenberg has been calm under pressure during his career at Penn State and ranks tied for 11th in the NCAA in game-winning drives in the fourth quarter or overtime.

- The go-ahead score with 1:13 left at Rutgers was the fourth game-winning or game-tying drive in the fourth quarter in his career.
- He led game-tying drives vs. Illinois and Michigan in 2013 in regulation, winning both games in overtime.
- He also led a game-winning drive with vs. UCF in the final 1:13 in the 2014 season opener in Dublin.
- Hackenberg is 7-for-10 for 131 yards passing on his two game winning drives this season. He was 4-of-6 for 47 yards vs. UCF and 3-of-4 for 84 yards at Rutgers.

INTO THE HALL

CARTER ELECTED TO ROSE BOWL HALL OF FAME

Penn State All-American running back Ki-Jana Carter has been selected for induction into the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame as a member of the Class of 2014, joining legendary coaches Knute Rockne and Dick Vermeil.

Carter was a key member of the 1995 Rose Bowl Championship squad that capped off a perfect 12-0 season with a 38-20 win over Oregon on Jan. 2, 1995.

Coach Joe Paterno's 1994 squad, led by first-team All-Americans Carter, Kyle Brady, Kerry Collins, Bobby Engram and Jeff Hartings, will be recognized at the home-opener against Akron on Saturday, Sept. 6 as part of their 20-year reunion. Kickoff is set for noon at Beaver Stadium for Coach James Franklin's first home game.

- Carter finished second in the 1994 Heisman Trophy voting (Rashaan Salaam, Colorado) and was consensus first-team All-American, earned co-MVP honors in the Rose Bowl after rushing for 156 yards and three touchdowns on 21 carries.
- He ran for an 83-yard touchdown on the first offensive play of the game, which is the third-longest run in Rose Bowl history and the longest run in Penn State bowl history.
- The 1994 Nittany Lions won their first Big Ten Championship in just their second year in the conference.
- Penn State became the first Big Ten team to post a perfect 12-0 mark, making the Nittany Lions the first conference team to post an unblemished record since the 1968 Ohio State team.
- Carter's Rose Bowl performance capped an outstanding junior season in which he finished fourth nationally in rushing (139.9), second in scoring (10.8 ppg) and fifth in all-purpose yardage (158.4). His 1,539 yards rushing in 1994 remains the third-best season total in Penn State history, and 23 touchdowns are tied for second to Lydell Mitchell's 29 TDs in 1971.
- Carter opted to forego his final season of eligibility to enter the NFL Draft and became the first Nittany Lion to be chosen No. 1 overall when he was selected by the Cincinnati Bengals. He spent six seasons with the Bengals (1995-00), two years with Washington (01-02) and two seasons with New Orleans (03-04).
- He still among Penn State's all-time Top 10 in rushing (9th) with 2,829 yards in his three seasons.
- The Rose Bowl Hall of Fame was established in 1989 and the Induction Ceremony will take place on December 30 at the Pasadena Convention Center, two days before the 101st Rose Bowl Game.

CONLAN INTO THE NFF HALL OF FAME

Former Penn State All-America linebacker Shane Conlan, the leader of the Nittany Lions' tenacious 1985-86 defenses, has been elected to the National Football Foundation College Football Hall of Fame.

- Conlan became the 23rd member of the Penn State program to receive college football's ultimate honor, joining 17 other former players and five Nittany Lion coaches. The most recent inductee was running back Curt Warner in 2009.
- Conlan was inducted with other members of the Class of 2014 at the NFF's 57th annual awards dinner on December 9 in New York City.
- He was instrumental in helping the Lions post a 23-1 mark his last two seasons, capped by the 1986 National Championship. A co-captain in 1986, Conlan led Penn State to a stunning 14-10 win over No. 1 Miami (Fla.) in the 1987 Fiesta Bowl to capture Penn State's second national title in five seasons.
- Conlan capped his career by leading a superlative defensive effort in the 1987 Fiesta Bowl to earn the game's Defensive MVP, recording eight tackles and two interceptions to lead Penn State past previously unbeaten Miami for the 1986 national title.
- He led a Nittany Lion defense that forced seven turnovers, including a season-high five interceptions of Vinny Testaverde, the '86 Heisman Trophy winner.
- He returned his second interception 38 yards to the Miami five-yard-line to set-up D.J. Dozier's game winning touchdown in the fourth quarter.
- A four-year letterman and a three-year starter, he was a consensus first-team All-American in '86. As a junior in '85, Conlan was selected a first-team All-American by Newspaper Enterprise Association and a second-teamer by UPI and Football News.
- Conlan led Penn State in tackles during the '84 and '86 seasons. He recorded 274 career tackles, which were tied for No. 2 on the PSU list when his career ended and remain No. 7 on the school charts. His 186 career solo hits still rank No. 3 on the school list (held solo tackles record for 20 years).
- Conlan becomes the 18th Nittany Lion to be inducted, joining John Cappelletti (1971-73), Keith Dorney (1975-78), Jack Ham (1968-70), Glenn Killinger (1918-21), Ted Kwalick (1966-68), Richie Lucas (1957-59), Pete Mauthe (1909-12), Shorty Miller (1910-13), Lydell Mitchell (1969-71), Dennis Onkotz (1967-69), Mike Reid (1966, 1968-69), Glenn Ressler (1962-64), Dave Robinson (1960-62), Steve Suhey (1942, 1946-47), Dexter Very (1909-12), Curt Warner (1979-82) and Harry Wilson (1921-23). Five coaches with stops in State College are in the Hall: Hugo Bezdek (1918-29), Rip Engle (1950-65), Dick Harlow (1915-17), Bob Higgins (1930-48) and Joe Paterno (1966-2011).

YOUTH MOVEMENT

YOUTHFUL LIONS

- Penn State has the nation's second-youngest team, with 76 of the 105 (76.4 percent) allowable players in training camp being either freshmen or sophomores. Only Pitt has a younger squad, with 78.6 percent of its players in pre-season camp being underclassmen.
- The Nittany Lions have 12 seniors, with only five seniors starting in the senior day set back to Michigan State: RB Bill Belton, OG Miles Dieffenbach, S Adrian Amos, LB Mike Hull and DE C.J. Olaniyan.
- Penn State enters the New Ear Pinstripe Bowl with 47 recruited scholarship players available, including just seven seniors.
- Nine of the 24 scholarship true freshmen have played this year, with the coaching staff looking to redshirt the other 15 freshmen.

A GAME OF FIRSTS: VS. TEMPLE

When the Nittany Lions clinched bowl eligibility vs. Temple, a number of firsts occurred throughout the afternoon:

- Freshman cornerback Christian Campbell became the second true freshman to start on defense. Marcus Allen has started six games at safety.
- Campbell pulled down his first career interception near the end of the third quarter vs. the Owls.
- Freshman cornerback Grant Haley also nabbed his first career interception in the fourth quarter, returning it 30 yards for a touchdown.
- Haley became the first true freshman to score a defensive touchdown in exactly 11 years. The last time it happened was when Paul Posluszny returned an interception for a score in a Nov. 15, 2003 win over Indiana.
- Kick snapper Tyler Yazujian collected his first career tackle while covering a punt. He handled all of the kick snapping duties this season.
- Junior Angelo Mangiro started at left guard, the third different offensive line position he has started in the last four games. For the season, he has started at center (7 games), right tackle (2 games) and left guard (1 game).

A GAME OF FIRSTS: VS. OHIO STATE

In the double-overtime thriller against No. 13 Ohio State, the Nittany Lions had a number of firsts that occurred throughout the game:

- S Marcus Allen made his first career start and became the first true freshman to start on defense this season. He was the 10th different Nittany Lion to make their first career start this season.
- True freshman WR Saeed Blacknall caught his first career touchdown pass in the fourth quarter. The leaping 24-yard grab in the end zone pulled Penn State within three points, 17-14, with 11:08 to play in the game.
- LB Brandon Bell and Allen each notched their first career double-digit tackle games and re-wrote their career highs. Allen ended the night with 10 tackles, while Bell finished with 13 stops.
- DE Anthony Zettel scored his first career touchdown when he grabbed a J.T. Barrett pass in the third quarter and returned it 40 yards for the Nittany Lions' opening score. It was Zettel's third career interception and his second in as many games.

TRUE FRESHMEN MAKING IMPACT FOR NATION'S SECOND-YOUNGEST TEAM

Nine true freshmen have made their Penn State debut this season on the heels of 13 first-year player introductions last year.

- S Marcus Allen, S Troy Apke, WR Saeed Blacknall, LB Jason Cabinda, CB Christian Campbell, TE Mike Gesicki, WR Chris Godwin, CB Grant Haley and P Daniel Pasquariello have all made their debuts.
- Campbell made his first career start vs. Temple, grabbing his first career interception.
- Cabinda ranked second on the team with eight tackles in his debut against Northwestern and became the fifth true freshman to start at Illinois.
- Allen, Blacknall, Gesicki, Godwin and Haley all made their first appearances in the thrilling season opening, 26-24, victory over UCF in Dublin, Ireland.
- Campbell saw his first career game action at Rutgers and Pasquariello punted twice in the second half vs. UMass.
- On Oct. 11 in Ann Arbor, Mich., Blacknall and Godwin each made their first career starts against Michigan.
- Allen made his first career start in Penn State's thrilling double-overtime loss to No. 13 Ohio State.
- On Nov. 1 vs. Maryland, Gesicki became the fourth true freshman to start a game.
- Apke saw his first game action at Indiana on the kick off coverage team.

KEISER, ZWINAK TO MISS REST OF SEASON

Penn State football coach James Franklin announced on Oct. 27 that senior safety Ryan Keiser and senior running back Zach Zwinak will miss the remainder of the season with injuries.

Keiser, a co-captain, was injured last Thursday in practice. Zwinak sustained an injury on the opening kickoff of last Saturday's 31-24 double overtime loss to No. 13 Ohio State.

Keiser started the initial six games of the season at free safety. Prior to last week's game, he was No. 3 on the team with 25 tackles (17 solo), had the game-clinching interception at Rutgers and two pass break-ups.

The former Selinsgrove High School standout played in 42 of a possible 43 career games, with 11 starts. Keiser made four career interceptions, including two in the end zone to clinch wins over Illinois and at Wisconsin last season. He graduated with a degree in kinesiology in August.

Zwinak finishes his career 15th on the Penn State career rushing list with 2,108 yards. Having played in all 31 games the past three seasons, he is tied for 10th on the school list with 11 career 100-yard rushing games, eight of which came in November games the past two years. The former Linganore High School standout scored 18 career rushing touchdowns, including 12 last season, and started 12 career games.

Zwinak became the 14th different Nittany Lion (22 times) to rush for 1,000 yards in a season in 2012, finishing with exactly 1,000 yards after gaining a career-high 179 yards in the Senior Day overtime win over Wisconsin. He graduated with a degree in criminology in May.

Entering the 2014 season, Penn State ranked as the second youngest team in the NCAA Division I FBS, just behind Pittsburgh.

- Penn State is the nation's second youngest team, with 76 underclassmen (49 freshmen/27 sophomores) among the NCAA limit of 105 players able to practice during training camp. Only Pittsburgh had more underclassmen, with 81.
- Due to an injury to Miles Dieffenbach, the offensive line returned just 20 starts, all coming by left tackle Donovan Smith, entering the season.
- This season, 48 of Penn State's 60 offensive line starts have been made by first-year starters. Thirty-eight of the 60 starts have been made by either sophomores or freshmen.
- The offense has only two senior starters, running back Bill Belton and Dieffenbach. The unit starts two seniors, four juniors, three sophomores and two redshirt freshmen.
- Nine true freshmen have made an appearances this season.

FICKEN NAMED SEMIFINALIST FOR GROZA

Penn State senior standout Sam Ficken was been selected as one of 20 semifinalists for the Lou Groza Collegiate Place-kicker Award.

- Ficken and Maryland's Brad Craddock were the only Big Ten semifinalists, with Craddock winning the award.
- Ficken was been selected the Big Ten's Special Teams Player of the Week twice this season and four times in his career. His four career selections are tied for fifth place in Big Ten history.
- Ficken ranks fourth in the FBS in field goals made per game (23, 1.92 pg) and No. 20 in FG accuracy at 82.1% (23 of 28).
- He is fourth nationally with 23 field goals made, and is No. 5 in the conference in kick scoring (7.8 ppg, 93 points) and No. 8 in overall scoring.
- Ficken is leading the Nittany Lions in scoring for a third consecutive year, having scored 93 points on 23 of 28 field goals and 24 of 24 PAT attempts.
- Ficken became the first Penn State kicker since at least 1982 to make three field goals of 45 yards or longer in a game when he connected on 46, 47 and 48-yard attempts vs. Maryland, in addition to a 25-yard attempt.
- Ficken's 50-yard field goal vs. Temple was the second longest of his career, joining a 54-yard connecting vs. Kent State in 2013.
- The former Valparaiso High School standout has made 53 career field goals, good for No. 2 all-time in the in Penn State annals.

FICKEN EARNS BIG, GROZA WEEKLY HONORS AFTER MARYLAND OUTING

Sam Ficken was true on all four of his field goal attempts and one extra point vs. Maryland, and for that was named the Big Ten Specialist of the Week and one of the Lou Groza Award Stars of the Week:

- Ficken was selected the conference's Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time this season and the fourth time in his career.
- His four career selections are tied for fifth place in Big Ten annals, with Nebraska's Brett Maher (2011-12) the most recent kicker to earn at least four career weekly honors.
- Ficken also was selected one of the three Lou Groza Award "Stars of the Week" for the second time this season. The Groza Award also recognized Ficken following the season opener against UCF.
- Ficken connected on all four of his field goal attempts in the 20-19 setback to the Terrapins to tie his career-high
- Ficken became the first Penn State kicker since at least 1982 to make three field goals of 45 yards or longer in a game when he connected on 46, 47 and 48-yard attempts vs. Maryland, in addition to a 25-yard attempt.
- He is the first Penn State placekicker to make three 40-plus yard field goals in a game since Collin Wagner had three against Youngstown State in 2011 (44, 48 and 49 yards).
- Ficken's 48-yarder vs. Maryland is the third longest of his career.
- He previously earned the Big Ten honor after the season opening win over UCF, last year's season opening win over Syracuse in MetLife Stadium and also after the 2012 Senior Day win over Wisconsin, when he hit the game-winning field goal in overtime.

HULL EARNS ALL-AMERICA DISTINCTION FROM EIGHT NATIONAL PUBLICATIONS

After logging a Big Ten-best 134 tackles during the regular season, senior linebacker Mike Hull has earned All-American honors from eight different national publications.

They are the first All-America laurels of Hull's career.

- The Canonsburg, Pa., native earned second team All-America distinction from the FWAA, FoxSports.com, Sporting News, USA Today, Phil Steele's College Football and Scout.com.
- He was a third team selection pick by the Associated Press and Athlon Sports.
- The Big Ten Butkus-Fitzgerald Linebacker of the Year, Hull led the conference with 134 tackles. Hull joins All-American Michael Mauti as recipients of the Big Ten Linebacker of the Year Award, giving LinebackerU two of the award's initial four recipients.
- He was named first-team All-Big Ten by the coaches and media. Hull also was named to the BTN.com All-Big Ten first-team.
- Sixteen Nittany Lions have earned a total of 19 first or second-team All-America honors since 2005. With Hull's USA Today selection, five Penn State linebackers have earned a total of seven first or second-team All-America accolades since 2005: Paul Posluszny (2005-06), Dan Connor (2006-07), Navorro Bowman (2009), Michael Mauti (2012) and Hull (2014).
- Hull is averaging at least 1.9 tpg more than every other Big Ten tackler. He ranks seventh nationally in stops (11.2) and also leads the Big Ten in tackles in conference games only (96, 12.0 tpg).

SIX NITTANY LIONS EARN ESPN.COM ALL-BIG TEN HONORS

Six Penn State football student-athletes have been named to ESPN.com's All-Big Ten teams, including four on the conference's All-Freshman Team.

- LB Mike Hull and DT Anthony Zettel were selected to the ESPN.com All-Big Ten team to lead Penn State's contingent.
- The Nittany Lions placed four players on ESPN.com's Freshmen All-Big Ten team, the conference's second-highest total.
- S Marcus Allen, WR DaeSean Hamilton, T Andrew Nelson and P Daniel Pasquariello made the squad
- All four Nittany Lions also were selected to the 247Sports Big Ten All-Freshman team, as well as the BTN.com All-Freshman team, where they were joined by tight end Mike Gesicki.

HULL EARNS TWO NATIONAL POTW AWARDS AFTER 19 STOP EFFORT VS. OHIO STATE

Senior Mike Hull was named the Bednarik Award National Player of the Week and Reese's Senior Bowl Player of the Week after recording a career-high 19 tackles in the Nittany Lions double overtime clash with Ohio State.

- Hull recorded a career-high 19 tackles vs. Ohio State, including 2.5 tackles for loss and an interception.
- The 19 tackles were the most by a Nittany Lion since Gerald Hodges had 19 hits against Illinois in 2011.
- He was instrumental in helping hold the Buckeyes to 17 points and 256 yards in regulation, well below their season averages of 46.5 ppg and 533.8 ypg entering the clash.

HAMILTON'S EARNS SECOND B1G FRESHMAN OF THE WEEK HONOR VS. OHIO STATE

DaeSean Hamilton was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Week after another record-setting performance in the Lions' double overtime setback to No. 13 Ohio State.

- Hamilton was selected the Big Ten Freshman of the Week for the second time after breaking the Penn State single game record with 14 receptions in the Nittany Lions' double overtime setback to No. 13/12 Ohio State.
- He gained 126 yards, extending his school freshman record to four 100-yard games in his first seven career contests.
- A redshirt freshman, Hamilton eclipsed Freddie Scott's previous school record of 13 catches against Wisconsin in 1995.
- He made three catches on Penn State's 77-yard drive late in the fourth quarter that ended in Sam Ficken's game-tying field goal to force overtime. His 14 receptions are the most by a Big Ten player this season and tied for eighth-highest nationally.

QUARTET EARN MID-SEASON ACCOLADES

- Senior LB Mike Hull earned first-team Mid-season All-Big Ten accolades from ESPN.com and Phil Steele's College Football.
- Joining Hull on ESPN.com's All-Big Ten team were redshirt freshman WR DaeSean Hamilton and junior DT Anthony Zettel. ESPN.com selected one team.
- Hamilton and Zettel were named second-team Mid-Season All-Big Ten by Phil Steele's College Football and were joined by senior PK Sam Ficken.

WILLIAMS, ZETTEL HONORED AFTER WIN AT RUTGERS

Trevor Williams was selected Big Ten Defensive Player of the Week after grabbing two interceptions against the Scarlet Knights. Anthony Zettel was named the conference's Player of the Week by Athlon Sports.

- Williams collected the first Penn State interception of the season in the first half and then made a leaping third quarter interception for the first multi-interception game of his career and fourth overall pick.
- Williams' two interceptions were the most by a Nittany Lions since linebacker Michael Mauti had two at Illinois on Sept. 29, 2012.
- It was the first multi-interception game by a Penn State defensive back since safety Nick Sukay collected two vs. Temple in 2010.
- Zettel tied his career-high with three tackles for loss against the Scarlet Knights. He recorded four solo tackles and had a sack on Rutgers' final possession.
- Rutgers came into the game averaging 39.5 ppg and 446.5 ypg and was held to 10 points and 294 yards. In the second half, the Nittany Lions allowed just three first downs and 95 yards and limited them to 1-of-7 on third down.

FICKEN, HAMILTON EARN BIG TEN PLAYER OF THE WEEK ACCOLADES VS. UCF

Senior PK Sam Ficken and redshirt freshman WR DaeSean Hamilton were honored by the Big Ten Conference for their performances in Penn State's season opening 26-24 win over UCF in Dublin, Ireland.

- Ficken earned his third career B1G Special Teams Player of the Week honor. He had earned one selection in each of the past three seasons: Syracuse (8/31/13) & Wisconsin (11/24/12).
- Ficken connected on all four of his field goal attempts in the Croke Park Classic to set a career-high, including the game-winner as time expired.
- The UCF contest was the first four-field goal game of Ficken's career - he had made three field goals on four other occasions - and were the most field goals by a Penn State kicker since 2010 when Collin Wagner knocked through five attempts against Temple.
- In his first game playing for Coach James Franklin's Nittany Lions, Hamilton was named the Big Ten Co-Freshman of the Week. He shares the honor with J.T. Barrett of Ohio State.
- After missing 2013 with an injury, Hamilton broke two Penn State freshman receiving records with 11 catches for 165 yards against UCF. He eclipsed Deon Butler's 125-yard effort vs. Wisconsin in 2005 and Maurice Humphrey's eight catches against Northwestern in 2003.
- Hamilton became the first Nittany Lion freshman wideout to eclipse the 100-yard mark in a game - doing so in the first half - since Butler and Jordan Norwood both accomplished the feat during the 2005 season.
- For the second consecutive year, Penn State grabbed the Big Ten Special Teams and Freshman honors following the opening game. In 2013, it was Ficken and eventual conference Freshman of the Year Christian Hackenberg.

DUO ADDED TO BILETNIKOFF WATCH LIST

The pass catching tandem of DaeSean Hamilton and Eugene Lewis were among the 12 receivers added to the 2014 Biletnikoff Award Watch List on Sept. 16.

- Hamilton set the Penn State school record with 14 grabs vs. Ohio State and owns the freshmen record for catches (14; OSU) and yards (165; UCF) in a game.
- Hamilton also owns the freshman season record for receptions (75) and receiving yards (848), passing Deon Butler's totals of 37 and 691, respectively.
- Lewis has 48 catches and 669 yards to rank second on the team in both categories.
- The Biletnikoff Award goes to the top receiver in the nation regardless of position. Bobby Ingram was the inaugural winner of the award in 1994 and Allen Robinson was a semifinalist in 2013.

From Forestville, Md., the 1994 graduate played 12 seasons in the NFL and was named to the St. Louis Rams' All-Decade Team for the 2000s. A successful businessman, Jackson also serves as a Big Ten Network studio football analyst.

Three Penn State student-athletes have been named to the Capital One Academic All-District® Football Team as selected by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

- Earning the distinction were senior defensive end Brad Bars, senior safety Ryan Keiser and sophomore kick snapper Tyler Yazujian.
- Bars earns his second Academic All-District® selection, also earning the honor in 2012. All three players were eligible for consideration for the Academic All-America® Team.
- The three selections for Coach James Franklin's Nittany Lions were second-highest among the FBS and FCS institutions in the six states that comprise District II. Penn State led all District II FBS and FCS institutions with nine CoSIDA Academic All-America® nominations.
- Penn State football student-athletes have earned 63 CoSIDA Academic All-America® selections all-time, the second-highest total among all Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) institutions. In 2013, All-America guard John Urschel earned his second consecutive first-team Academic All-America® honor.
- The Nittany Lions' 18 Academic All-Americans® over the past eight seasons (16 first-team) lead the nation. The Penn State football team has had a least one first-team Academic All-American® in 10 of the past 12 seasons (19 overall first-team selections since 2002).
- Along with Bars, Keiser and Yazujian, six other Penn Staters were nominated for CoSIDA Academic All-District® honors: Jesse Della Valle, Sam Ficken, Chris Gulla, Mike Hull, Andrew Nelson and Deron Thompson.

FICKEN AMONG CANDIDATES FOR NFF SCHOLAR-ATHLETE FELLOWSHIP

Senior Sam Ficken is among the candidates for the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame's Scholar-Athlete Fellowship and the prestigious William V. Campbell Trophy, presented by Fidelity Investments, to the nation's premier college football student-athlete.

- A co-captain, Ficken had an opportunity to become Penn State's 18th NFF Scholar-Athlete recipient. In 2013, All-America guard John Urschel became the Nittany Lions' first recipient of the Campbell Trophy and the 17th Penn State football student-athlete to be selected an NFF Scholar-Athlete.
- Ficken is on schedule to earn his bachelor's degree in Finance in December, doing so in 3.5 years.
- He was selected Academic All-Big Ten in 2012 and '13 and has been nominated for Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America the past two years.
- A Dean's List student, he has been inducted into Penn State's *Spiritus Leoninus* honor society, which recognizes student-athletes for outstanding performance in athletics, academics, leadership and community service.
- This summer, Ficken was an intern with Merrill Lynch, working with the Latin America Linked Markets team.

OVER 90 ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN HONOREES SINCE 2010

A total of 24 Penn State football student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2012 for owning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner.

A total of 232 Nittany Lions have earned Academic All-Big Ten honors on the gridiron since 1993, including 91 over the past three seasons.

NEARLY 50 NITTANY LIONS COMPILE 3.0 GPA DURING SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the spring semester, with 46 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade-point average, including three with a perfect 4.0 GPA.

Forty of the 46 Nittany Lions will be returning for the 2014 season. During the 2013 spring semester, there also were 46 players that compiled a 3.0 GPA or higher.

Among the 46 high achieving Nittany Lions this past spring semester, 24 posted a 3.5 GPA or higher, with 21 passing the minimum 12 credits, to earn Dean's List recognition. The 21 Dean's List honorees is a significant increase from last spring's total of 12.

The superlative academic performance by James Franklin's squad during the spring semester brings to 41 the total number of Penn State football student-athletes with a cumulative 3.0 or higher GPA who are returning for the 2014 season. The 41 total also is an increase over the spring 2013 total of 34 returning players with a 3.0 GPA.

Redshirt freshman placekicker Chris Gulla was among three Nittany Lions that compiled a 4.00 grade-point average during the semester. The Dean's List student has a 3.60 cumulative GPA. Also earning a 4.0 GPA were seniors Kyle Baublitz and Pat Zerbe, who graduated in May.

Among some of the other returning Nittany Lions who made the Dean's List last spring were: wide receiver Gregg Garrity, safety Ryan Keiser, linebacker Ben Kline, kick snapper Zach Ladonis, cornerback Jesse Merise, quarterback Michael O'Connor and receiver Matt Zanellato.

SIXTEEN FIRST-TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS IN PAST EIGHT YEARS

Penn State has earned a nation's-best 18 Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-Americans® over the past eight years, with 16 first-team honorees.

In 2013, guard John Urschel became the 11th Nittany Lion to attain first-team Academic All-America honors twice.

Penn State has had 63 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans® all-time, to rank No. 2 nationally among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

The Penn State football team has had at least one first-team Academic All-American® in 10 of the past 12 seasons (19 overall first-team selections since 2002).

In his first press conference as head coach of the Penn State football program James Franklin vowed that his team would compete in every endeavor they pursued and that is true on and off the field.

That competitive spirit helped Penn State rank among the top programs in the country with 17 graduates entering the New Ear Pinstripe Bowl.

On top of that, the Penn State football team's superlative NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) was among the top 15 of the nation's Football Bowl Subdivision institutions and tied for fifth nationally among public FBS institutions., according to 2014 NCAA data.

- Penn State football student-athletes that enrolled in the University from 2004-07 earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 75 percent, second highest nationally among all FBS public institutions (Northern Illinois).
- The Nittany Lions' 75 percent figure was an improvement of three points from 2013 and also No. 2 to Northwestern among Big Ten teams.
- Penn State's graduation figure was 16 points above the 59 percent FBS average, according to the NCAA.
- The 87 percent figure was up two points from the 2013 NCAA report and tied for the football program's second-highest graduation rate (with 2011).

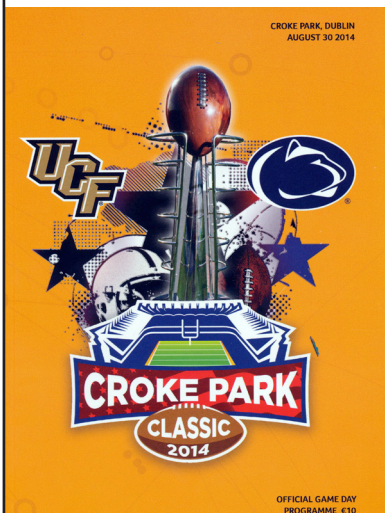

DUBLIN, Ireland - Senior Sam Ficken's 36-yard field goal as time expired capped a memorable ending to a historic day in Penn State football history, as the Nittany Lions claimed a 26-24 victory over UCF in the Croke Park Classic to open their 2014 campaign.

It was the second game-ending kick in Ficken's career (Wisconsin, 2012) and gave head coach James Franklin his first win as the head coach of the Nittany Lion program.

Sophomore Christian Hackenberg threw for a school record 454 yards on a career-high 32 completions on 47 attempts vs. UCF. He became the first player in school history to throw for 400 yards, breaking Zack Mills' record of 399 yards vs. Iowa in 2002.

Redshirt-freshman wide receiver DaeSean Hamilton was on the receiving end of a freshman record 11 of those passes and amassed a rookie record 165 yards. He topped Deon Butler's 125 yards vs. Wisconsin in 2005 and moved past Maurice Humphrey's eight catches vs. Northwestern in 2003.

Eugene Lewis set career-highs with eight catches for 173 yards vs. the Knights, including a personal-best 79-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter. The 79-yard pass play was also the longest of Hackenberg's career.

The Penn State 2,000-yard rushing club gained a member in Dublin, as senior Zach Zwinak's 32 yards on the day pushed his career total to 2,028. He passed Franco Harris for 17th on the all-time charts.

The day, however, would belong to Ficken, who connected on a career-best four field goals, going 4-for-4 on the day. He connected on attempts of 22-, 33-, 24- and 36-yards, respectively. Ficken's four field goals were the most since Collin Wagner had five successful attempts vs. Temple in 2010.

Brian Gaia, DaeSean Hamilton, Brendan Mahon, Angelo Mangiro and Andrew Nelson all made their first career starts vs. UCF, while 12 players made their first career appearances against the Knights.

Of the 12 first time participants, four were true freshmen: Marcus Allen, Saeed Blacknall, Chris Godwin, Mike Gesicki, Grant Haley.

Penn State received the Dan Rooney Trophy, a

football made of ancient Irish bog wood that was specially commissioned for the game.

Penn State ended the first half up 10-3, as both teams looked a little let-lagged in what was the first overseas game in either school's history.

The Nittany Lions' opening drive was extended by a roughing-the-kicker penalty, then Hackenberg dropped a 44-yard pass between two defenders to Hamilton. Zwinak punched the ball in from the 1-yard line to put Penn State up 7-0.

A 68-yard kickoff return by Jordan Akins gave UCF the ball on Penn State's 23, but the Nittany Lions held on 4th-and-goal on the PSU 1-yard line. The defense made four stops inside their own four yard line on the goal line stand.

UCF cornerback Jacoby Glenn made a diving interception on Hackenberg's next possession, but the Knights could manage only a 36-yard Shawn Moffitt field goal to make the score 10-3.

Justin Holman entered the game for UCF in the second half and ran for two touchdowns, the first a one-yard plunge to pull UCF within 13-10 with 2:39 left in the third quarter.

Holman also threw for a touchdown, a 10-yarder to Josh Reese with 11:31 left in the game to narrow Penn State's lead to 20-17.

Between those two UCF scores, Hackenberg pulled off the longest play of the game. On 3rd-and-17 deep in his own half, he lobbed a bomb to Lewis, who ran untouched for a 79-yard score.

UCF's defense forced Penn State to settle for a third field goal with 3:30 left to make it 23-17.

Holman, who finished 9 of 14 for 204 yards, then led the Knights down the field - straight into a 4th down-and-10 crisis on the Penn State 37.

Holman connected on a long ball pass the left sideline, a leaping grab by Reese at the PSU 6. Holman scored on the ground the next play, leaving too much time on the clock for Hackenberg, who led the Nittany Lions down the field to set up Ficken's 36-yard boot.

Hackenberg was 4-of-6 passing for 47 yards and ran for eight yards on the final drive of the game.

- RB Zach Zwinak's 32 rushing yards in the game gave him 2,028 yards for his career. He is the 18th player in school history to eclipse the 2,000-yard mark and passed Franco Harris during the game for 17th place.
- WR DaeSean Hamilton broke the Penn State freshman record for receptions and receiving yards in a game. His 165 yards broke Deon Butler's mark of 125 yards vs. Wisconsin in 2005. His 11 catches moved past Maurice Humphrey's eight catches vs. Northwestern in 2003.
- Hamilton became the first freshman since 2005 to eclipse 100 receiving yards in a game. That season, Deon Butler & Jordan Norwood each accomplished the feat.
- Hamilton 165 yards are tied for the 12th highest total in a single game at Penn State. One person he is tied with is current assistant coach Terry Smith (USC, 1991).
- WR Eugene Lewis caught a 79-yard touchdown pass in the third quarter vs. UCF, marking the longest career reception for the sophomore. The 79-yard completion is tied for 9th longest in Penn State history.
- Lewis had career-highs in catches (eight) and receiving yards (173) vs. UCF. His 173 receiving yards were the most since Allen Robinson logged 173 yards at Ohio State in 2013 and are tied for eighth in school history.
- Hamilton and Lewis became the eighth pair of teammates to record 100-plus receiving yards in the same game and the first tandem to log 150-plus yards in the same game. The last duo to surpass 100-yards in the same game was Butler and Norwood vs. Michigan State in 2008.

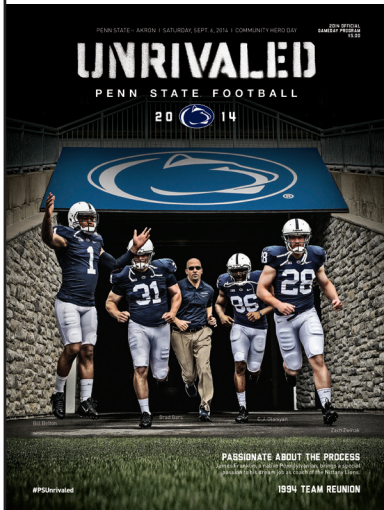

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Junior tight end Jesse James corralled two touchdown catches and the Nittany Lion defense swarmed for seven tackles for a loss, including four sacks, as Penn State improved to 2-0 with a 21-3 victory over Akron.

James finished with 57 yards on two catches, both of which went for touchdowns. It was the first time in James' career that he logged two touchdown catches in a game and brought his career total to 10.

Sophomore quarterback Christian Hackenberg passed for 319 yards and three touchdowns. With his performance, Hackenberg broke the Penn State record for most passing yards in consecutive games. His 773 passing yards in the first two games of the season surpass the mark of 686 set by Zach Mills in back-to-back contests in 2002.

Redshirt sophomore wide receiver Eugene Lewis had another solid outing with six catches for 98 yards, while redshirt freshman wideout DaeSean Hamilton pulled in seven throws for 69 yards. Akeel Lynch paced the ground game with 45 yards. Bill Belton added 36 rushing yards and four catches for 49 yards and a touchdown.

Defensively, the Nittany Lions held the Zips to 69 rushing yards and 208 of total offense. Redshirt senior linebacker Mike Hull was the heartbeat of the Penn State defense with 11 tackles, including a sack, for his second-straight double-digit tackle performance. Junior cornerback Jordan Lucas notched seven tackles and had his second career sack.

The Zips sprinted out of the gates needing just seven plays to move into a first-and-goal situation at the Penn State 7. However, a quarterback pressure by Anthony Zettel forced an incomplete pass and back-to-back sacks by Zettel and Lucas forced Akron into a 31-yard field goal attempt by Tom O'Leary, which sailed wide left to keep the game scoreless. Penn State collected a pair of first downs in its first four plays of the drive, but were unable to capitalize on the Zips' miscue.

After forcing a three-and-out, the Nittany Lions quickly went on the attack as they put together a four-play, 58-yard drive. Hackenberg opened the drive by finding Lewis for 20 yards. After a one-yard run by Zack Zwinak, Hamilton pulled in a 15-yard toss from Hackenberg. The Lions got on the scoreboard as

Hackenberg found Belton for a 22-yard touchdown completion to give Penn State a 7-0 lead with less than three minutes left in the first quarter.

Neither team could sustain much offensive momentum for the remainder of the first half as the Nittany Lions went into the break with a 7-0 lead.

In its first possession of the second half, Akron took advantage of a drive starting from the Penn State 41. The Zips moved the ball into field goal range and connected on a 28-yard kick to cut the Nittany Lions' lead to 7-3 with 11:11 left in the third quarter.

The Nittany Lions found an offensive rhythm with a 10-play, 79-yard drive over a 5:26 span to extend their lead with a 13-yard touchdown pass from Hackenberg to James for the 14-3 lead with 2:38 remaining in the third. Hackenberg was stellar on the drive, connecting on all six of his passes for a total of 81 yards.

The Penn State defense held strong and forced an Akron punt on the ensuing possession.

The Nittany Lions took over at their own 20 and moved the ball well on the ground to the Akron 16. However, Hackenberg was intercepted by Bre' Ford at the two-yard line. Ford then returned it 51 yards to the Penn State 45 with 10:58 remaining.

The Lion D held strong again, forcing a turnover on downs that included a stop for a two-yard loss on fourth-and-one by C.J. Olyanian and Brandon Bell.

On the ensuing possession, Penn State started the drive with a one-yard rush by Zwinak and added a 15-yard facemask penalty on the end of the run. Hackenberg then found James for his second score of the day on a 44-yard pitch-and-catch to give the Nittany Lions the 21-3 lead with 8:58 remaining.

- Penn State held Akron to 277 yards, the second consecutive game holding its opponent to less than 300 yards of total offense. The last time that the Nittany Lions held two straight opponents to less than 300 yards of total offense was in the opening two games of 2013 against Syracuse (260 yards) and Eastern Michigan (183 yards).
- The Penn State defense kept Akron to just 69 yards rushing, the second straight game an opponent had less than 70 yards on the ground. - Hackenberg's 319 passing yards (22 of 36) are the 15th highest single-game total in school history.
- Hackenberg's 319 yards gave him 773 yards over his last two games, breaking the school record for passing yardage in consecutive games. The old record of 686 yards was set by Zack Mills in 2002 (399 vs. Iowa and 287 at Wisconsin).
- It was Hackenberg's 11th career 200-yard passing games.
- TE Jesse James had a career-best two touchdown catches (13 and 44 yards). He had eight previous games with one touchdown catch.



Junior tight end Jesse James scored two of the Nittany Lions' three touchdowns against Akron. James caught scoring strikes of 13 and 44 yards vs. the Zips, setting a career-high for touchdowns in a game.

- Jesse James had 3 touchdown catch and runs of 40+ yards in his last nine games at Beaver Stadium. All 3 scoring grabs were down same sideline, in the same direction (East sideline, toward South end zone).
- TE Mike Gesicki grabbed a then-career-long 11-yard reception in the opening stanza.

INDIVIDUAL - SPECIAL TEAMS

- P Chris Gulla set a school record for average yards per punt in a single game by a freshman with 48.8 yards per punt on his five punts. The previous record was 48.7 yards per punt by Jeremy Kapinos against Boston College in 2003.
- Gulla had three punts downed inside the 20 yard line.



Penn State honored the 20th Anniversary of the 1994 Big Ten Championship team that defeated Oregon in the Rose Bowl and finished ranked No. 2 nationally that season. The 1994 season was just the Nittany Lions' second as a member of the Big Ten.

PISCATAWAY, N.J. - Senior Bill Belton scored on a five-yard run up-the-middle with 1:13 left to play to give the Nittany Lions a 13-10 lead, completing a Penn State comeback from a 10-point halftime deficit. An interception by senior Ryan Keiser, the Nittany Lions' fifth pick of the night, sealed the victory at High Point Solutions Stadium.

Penn State was 3-0 to start a season for the first time since 2009 and the 52nd time in school history. Head coach James Franklin became the sixth first-year Penn State coach to start 3-0.

The blue and white also improved to 23-2 all-time vs. Rutgers and won the first Big Ten match-up between the schools.

The Nittany Lions' offense gained 373 total yards, including 309 through the air as sophomore quarterback Christian Hackenberg completed 25-of-44 passes, including 3-of-4 on the game-winning drive.

It marked the seventh time in his career that Hackenberg had thrown for over 300 yards. He secured the school record mark only 15 games into his career. Hackenberg broke a tie with Matt McGloin (2009-12). Hackenberg also became the first Nittany Lion signal caller to throw for 300 yards in three consecutive games in the same season.

Penn State allowed 294 yards, forced five interceptions and recorded three sacks.

Junior cornerback Trevor Williams picked off two passes, while Keiser, Adrian Amos and Brandon Bell all recorded an interception. Defensive tackle Anthony Zettel had three tackles for loss, including a sack.

The Nittany Lions allowed only three first downs and 95 yards in the second half, allowing for the comeback.

Senior Sam Ficken hit field goals of 32 and 25 yards in the second half. Ficken was tied with Colin Wagner (2007-10) for ninth on the career list.

Freshman DaeSean Hamilton and sophomore Eugene Lewis both topped 100 yards receiving. Hamilton hauled in eight passes for 103 yards, while Lewis had six receptions for 109. It marked the second time in 2014 that the duo have both eclipsed the 100 yards receiving in a game.

Belton caught four passes for 52 yards to go along with 36 yards rushing on 15 carries. Seven different Nittany Lions caught a pass.

Senior linebacker Mike Hull led the defense with nine tackles, including six solo. Williams added five stops to his first career multi-interception performance. With three tackles for loss, Zettel moved his total to seven on the

season, which tied his season career-high for TFL.

Amos' interception was the fifth of his career. The Williams and Amos picks came on back-to-back passes by Rutgers quarterback Gary Nova in the first quarter.

After Amos' interception, the Nittany Lions drove the ball to the Rutgers' 17 yard-line, but Ficken's 34 yard attempt was blocked by Kemoko Turay.

Rutgers capitalized on the next possession with a 10-play, 80-yard drive that ended with a 14-yard touchdown run by Nova with 11:32 left in the first half.

After the teams traded punts, the Scarlet Knights started with the ball on their own eight yard-line. A 14-play, 78-yard drive ended with a Kyle Federico 32-yard field goal to give Rutgers a 10-0 lead at the break.

The Nittany Lions got on the board in the third quarter with a 32-yard field goal by Sam Ficken. On the second play of the drive, Hackenberg hit Belton for an 18-yard completion, one of three completions over 10 yards on the drive. Consecutive completions to freshman Chris Godwin and another to Hamilton got Penn State down to the Rutgers 14 yard-line. Ficken's kick completed a 13-play, 72-yard drive.

A 47-yard pass to Hamilton at the end of the third quarter jump-started another scoring drive. The reception got the Nittany Lions down to the Rutgers 26 yard-line. Three runs by Bill Belton and completions to Belton and Mike Gesicki setup a 25-yard kick for Ficken, finishing a nine-play, 68-yard drive.

With 3:02 left in the game, the Nittany Lions started with the ball at their own 20 yard-line. On the first play of the drive, Hackenberg hit Lewis on a comeback route. Lewis broke a tackle and took the ball 53 yards, down to the Rutgers 27 yard-line. Two plays later, Hackenberg hit Hamilton on an eight-yard strike. A holding penalty brought the ball back to the Rutgers 29 yard-line, but Hackenberg responded by completing a 23-yard toss to Lewis. With the ball at the Rutgers six yard-line, Belton was held to a one-yard gain on his first rushing attempt. On the next play, Belton took a hand off up-the-middle into the end zone to give Penn State it's first lead of the game. The run capped a six-play, 80-yard drive in only 1:51.

It was Hackenberg's fourth comeback win in the fourth quarter or overtime in his 15-game career.

Rutgers' final possession began with Zettel sacking Nova for an eight-yard loss and, on fourth and 12, Keiser intercepted Nova to seal the win.

- RB Bill Belton scored the game-winning touchdown with 1:13 left in the fourth quarter for his first rushing touchdown of the season.

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The Nittany Lions used a balanced offensive attack and relentless defense on the way to a 48-7 win over UMass in front of 99,155 fans at Beaver Stadium. The Nittany Lions rushed for 228 yards, led by Bill Belton, who scored twice and had 76 yards on seven carries. Zach Zwinak also scored twice, while Akeel Lynch added a team-best 81 yards and one touchdown.

Christian Hackenberg threw for 179 yards to lead the air attack. Redshirt freshman D.J. Crook saw his first collegiate action, going 6-for-9 for 57 yards and a touchdown. Eugene Lewis continued his strong start with five catches for 82 yards, while DaeSean Hamilton added four catches for 65 yards.

The Nittany Lion defense was stellar, holding UMass to three yards rushing thanks in part to 10 tackles for a loss, including three sacks. The three rushing yards allowed were the fewest since the Nittany Lions held Notre Dame without a rushing yard in 2007. Mike Hull led the unit again with six tackles and one forced fumble, while Nyeem Wartman added five stops.

Place kicker Sam Ficken connected on field goals of 42 and 40 yards and moved into a tie for eighth place on Penn State's career field goals list with Nick Gancitano (1981-84). Ficken had 38 career field goals. Additionally, Ficken became the 11th player in school history with 200 points. He moved into eighth in program history with 207 points.

Penn State improved to 4-0 for the first time since 2008. Head coach James Franklin became the first Penn State first year coach to start 4-0 since Dick Harlow in 1915.

After the Minutemen missed a 39-yard field goal, Penn State put together a 53-yard drive over 15 plays that led to a 42-yard field goal by Ficken. Belton had the key play of the drive with a 14-yard run on second down to position the Nittany Lions for the field goal.

The Penn State defense forced a three-and-out on the next UMass drive and Lynch reeled off a 46-yard run, the Lions' longest rush of the season to that point, to kick-start the PSU drive. The Lions advanced the ball four more yards before yielding to Ficken for his second field goal of the game, this time from 40 yards out, to take a 6-0 lead with 2:38 left in the first quarter.

After a turnover on downs for the Minutemen, the Penn State offense was clicking on all cylinders as the Lions turned in an eight-play, 69-yard drive. Hackenberg threw

for 39 yards and Belton rushed for 30 yards, capped off with a 24-yard run for his second rushing touchdown of the season to give Penn State a 13-0 lead with 10:11 remaining in the second quarter.

On the ensuing UMass drive, Hull forced a fumble by Tajae Sharp and it was recovered by Austin Johnson to give the Nittany Lions the ball at the UMass 20. On the second play from scrimmage, Belton found a gap and ran 20 yards for paydirt and a 20-0 Penn State lead with 8:48 remaining in the first half.

The Nittany Lion defense continued to impress as Tarow Barney sacked and stripped UMass quarterback Blake Frohnapfel on third down to force another Minuteman punt. After advancing the ball to the Penn State 45, Hackenberg hit Lewis for a 38-yard completion to move to the UMass 10. Following an illegal procedure penalty on the Minutemen, Zwinak scampered in from five yards out for the touchdown with 3:37 left in the opening half.

Following a three-and-out for UMass, the Nittany Lions capped the first-half scoring with Zwinak's second touchdown of the half on a one-yard run to make it 34-0 Penn State with 1:24 on the clock. Hackenberg hit Hamilton for 35 yards and Lewis for 11 yards to propel the drive for the Lions. The 28 points scored by the Nittany Lions in the second quarter were the most for a Penn State team since notching 28 tallies in the third quarter against Michigan in 2009.

Penn State picked up in the second half where it left off in the first with a defensive three-and-out to open the frame. In the first offensive series of the second half, Hackenberg rushed for a career-long 17 yards on third-and-12 to keep the Penn State drive alive. Lynch then rushed for 13 yards on three carries before Hackenberg hit Hamilton for a 13-yard gain to the UMass 17. Lynch's number was called again as he rushed for two yards and then broke free for a 15-yard touchdown run to give the Lions the 41-0 lead with 8:10 left in the third.

The Lions added to their lead with Crook as he connected with Brent Wilkerson for an 11-yard touchdown catch to increase the lead to 48-0. Crook was 4-for-6 on the drive for 39 yards.

The Minutemen got on the board to open the fourth quarter with a 77-yard touchdown to cut the Penn State lead to 48-7.

- The Nittany Lions ran for 228 yards vs. UMass and entered the game with 227 rushing yards in the first three games this season.
- Penn State's 28 points in the second quarter were the most points by the Nittany Lions in a quarter since scoring 28 at Michigan State in the third quarter of the 2009 regular season finale.
- Penn State's four rushing touchdowns in the second quarter marked the first time that the Nittany Lions had four rushing touchdowns in a single quarter since at least 1981.
- Penn State had five rushing touchdowns, the most on the ground since having five rushing touchdowns last season against Purdue.
- The three rushing yards allowed by Penn State are the fewest since allowing zero yards rushing against Notre Dame in 2007.
- Penn State has outscored its opponents 20-0 in the first quarter this season. Penn State has not allowed an opponent to score in the first quarter in the past seven games, dating back to last season. The last team to score against the Nittany Lions in the first quarter was Minnesota, who scored 10 points in the opening stanza last season in Minneapolis.
- Penn State's 15-play field goal drive in the first quarter tied for the longest drive in terms of plays this season. The Nittany Lions had a 15-play field goal drive against UCF earlier this year.
- P Daniel Pasquariello became the seventh true freshman to play for the Nittany Lions this season.
- Five redshirt freshmen made their Nittany Lion debuts: DE Curtis Cothran, QB D.J. Crook, OL Tom Devenney, OL Evan Galimberti, OL Andrew Terlingo

INDIVIDUAL - DEFENSE

- LB Mike Hull forced the second fumble of his career in the second quarter. On the same play, DT Austin Johnson grabbed the second fumble recovery of his career.
- Hull led the Nittany Lions in tackles for the fourth consecutive game with six stops.
- DT Tarow Barney notched his first career sack and first career forced fumble in the second quarter.
- LB Brandon Bell recorded his first career sack early in the second quarter.
- DE Garrett Sickels had first career sack in the fourth quarter.



Junior center Angelo Mangiro helped Penn State gain 228 yards on the ground and 236 yards through the air. The offensive line helped the Nittany Lions score their most points since a 52-3 win over Eastern Illinois in 2009.



Senior running back Zack Zwinak ran for a pair of scores vs. UMass to move his career total to 21 rushing touchdowns. Zwinak is just the 18th player in Penn State history with at least 20 career rushing scores.

- RB Akeel Lynch's 46-yard rush in the first quarter was a then-career-long for Lynch and the then-longest rush of the season by the Nittany Lions. Lynch's previous longest rush was 43 yards against Kent State last season.

- RB Zach Zwinak's second quarter touchdown gave him 20 rushing touchdowns for his career, and makes him the 18th player in Penn State history to have at least 20 rushing touchdowns. He added a second rushing score later in the second quarter to give him 21 career rushing touchdowns.
- TE Brent Wilkerson caught his first career touchdown pass in the third quarter.
- A Massachusetts native, QB D.J. Crook made his first career appearance vs. the Minutemen. He completed his first three career passes and ended the game completing six-of-nine passes for 57 yards.
- Crook threw his first career touchdown pass in the third quarter, an 11-yard connection with Wilkerson.
- G Derek Dowrey started at right guard and was the sixth Nittany Lion to make his first career start this season.

INDIVIDUAL - SPECIAL TEAMS

- PK Sam Ficken's 12 points give him 207 points for his career, which made him the 11th player in Penn State history to score at least 200 points.
- Ficken passed Ki-Jana Carter (204), Larry Johnson (206) and Massimo Manca (206) on the career list vs. UMass.
- P Daniel Pasquariello booted his first career punt in the fourth quarter, a 45-yarder. He added a 42 yard punt later in the quarter that pinned UMass at their own 10 yard line.

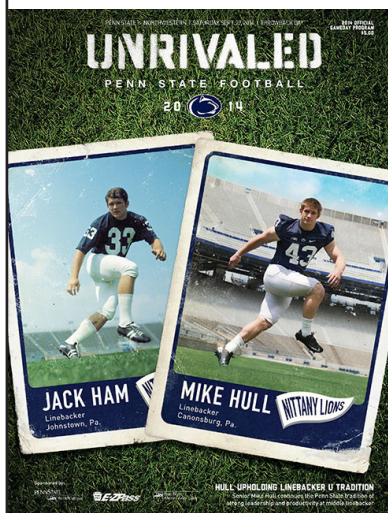

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Senior linebacker Mike Hull recorded a then-career-high 16 tackles, including one for a loss, but Penn State dropped a 29-6 decision to Northwestern. The homecoming contest brought in a then-season-high 102,910 fans to Beaver Stadium.

With his performance, Hull surpasses his previous personal best of 13 stops set against Illinois on Nov. 2, 2013. Freshman linebacker Jason Cabinda finished second on the team with eight tackles in his collegiate debut. Junior defensive end Deion Barnes added six tackles, including his fourth sack of the season.

Senior kicker Sam Ficken accounted for all of Penn State's points with a pair of field goals to move him into a tie for fifth place in school history for career field goals with Massimo Manca (1982, 1984-86). Ficken ended the day with 40 career field goals.

Sophomore Christian Hackenberg threw for 216 yards for his seventh 200-yard game in his last eight outings. Freshman receiver DaeSean Hamilton pulled in six passes for 100 yards. His 51-yard reception in the second quarter was a career-long catch. It was Hamilton's third 100-yard receiving performances in five career games.

On the opening drive, the Wildcats drove down to the Penn State 27-yard line, but a personal foul penalty on Northwestern backed the Wildcats up to the Penn State 42. The Nittany Lion defense made three consecutive stops and forced Northwestern into a 44-yard field goal attempt, which went wide right.

After a three-and-out for the Lions, Northwestern's Miles Shuler returned a punt 42 yards to put the Wildcats in prime position to start their next drive at the Penn State 31. On third-and-eight, Trevor Siemian found Mike McHugh for a 28-yard gain to the one-yard line and Siemian ran it in for the score on the next play to put Northwestern up 7-0 with 9:29 left in the first.

Northwestern engineered another drive, going 60 yards in 10 plays for another Siemian touchdown from one-yard out to make it 14-0 Wildcats with 3:59 left in the opening quarter. The Wildcats again started in great field position, taking over at the Penn State 29. Siemian found Mark Stotz for a 22-yard pitch-and-catch to the Penn State 7. The Nittany Lion defense

stood tall and stopped the Wildcats on a fake field goal to take over on downs.

Neither team could sustain offensive momentum in the second quarter until Penn State's final drive of the half. Hackenberg led the Lions on a 10-play, 55-yard drive that resulted in a 42-yard field goal by Ficken with five seconds left in the half. Hackenberg threw for 45 yards and rushed for five on the drive. The squads hit the locker room with Penn State trailing 14-3.

After the teams swapped drives to open the second half, Jesse Della Valle returned the Northwestern punt 41 yards to the NU 30. Hackenberg found Akeel Lynch for 11 yards, which led to a 36-yard field goal by Ficken to cut the deficit to 14-6 with 11:17 left in the third.

On the ensuing Northwestern possession, Adrian Amos picked off Siemian's pass deep in Nittany Lion territory to foil the Wildcat drive. Hackenberg opened the drive with a three-yard rush and followed it up with a 29-yard pass to Hamilton to continue the offensive momentum. The Nittany Lions would advance to the Northwestern 35-yard line, but turned the ball over on downs.

The fourth quarter opened with Hackenberg being intercepted by Anthony Walker, who returned it 49 yards for the touchdown. However, the Wildcats missed the extra point to take a 20-6, just 11 seconds into the fourth quarter.

On the first play of Penn State's next possession, Hackenberg was sacked and fumbled, which was recovered by Northwestern at the Penn State 15. The Wildcats advanced the ball eight yards and converted on a 23-yard field goal to increase the margin to 23-6 with 13:06 left.

Another rushing touchdown for Siemian in the fourth quarter extended the Wildcats' lead, but the extra point failed again to make it 29-6 with 7:22 remaining.

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Penn State scored on its first three possessions and took a 13-7 lead in the second quarter on a 10-yard strike from sophomore Christian Hackenberg to redshirt-freshman DaeSean Hamilton, but Michigan scored the final 11 points of the game to win 18-13 in Ann Arbor.

The loss snapped the Nittany Lions' four-game on-field win streak against Michigan and ended a three-game winning streak in games away from Beaver Stadium.

Penn State gained 214 total yards, including 160 through the air. Hackenberg completed 21-of-32 passes, with a touchdown and an interception.

Senior Bill Belton gained 69 yards rushing on 14 carries, including a then-season-long 31-yard run on the opening drive, and added four catches for 26 yards.

Freshman DaeSean Hamilton led the Nittany Lion receivers with seven receptions for 58 yards and his first career touchdown. Hamilton was one of seven players to catch a pass.

With 43 receptions this year, Hamilton broke the freshman record for receptions in a season, topping 37 catches by Deon Butler in 2005.

Senior Sam Ficken connected on 35- and 32-yard kicks in the first quarter and moved into sole possession of fifth place on the career field goals made list, passing Massimo Manca.

Penn State held the Wolverines to just 256 yards, including just 64 rushing, and 12 first downs.

Linebacker Mike Hull once again led the team in tackles with 11, including eight solo and 2.0 for loss. Hull added a sack and a pass breakup. Hull hit the double-digit tackle mark for the second straight game and fourth time this season, leading the Nittany Lions in tackles in each of the team's first six games.

Defensive end Anthony Zettel picked off a pass for his second career interception. Each of his first two career picks came against the Wolverines, with the first coming in last year's 43-40 four-overtime win in Beaver Stadium.

The Nittany Lions got their opening drive jump started with a 31-yard run by Belton on the third play of the drive. Belton also had a 13-yard burst and a 10-yard reception to help Penn State reach the Michigan seven yard-line. Ficken hit a 35-yard kick to give the Blue and White the first points of the game.

However, the Wolverines responded with their own scoring drive. quarterback Devin Gardner went 4-for-4 on the drive, with his final completion a 43-yard touchdown pass to Devin Funchess, who came up with the ball after safety Ryan Keiser narrowly missed grabbing an interception.

Belton got the Nittany Lions going again, starting the second drive of the night with a nine-yard run. He ran the ball on four straight plays to start the drive and also grabbed an 11-yard pass to setup Penn State in Michigan territory. Back-to-back 13-yard completions to Hamilton moved the ball to the Michigan 23 yard-line. The Nittany Lions earned eight more yards on the drive and with 52 seconds left in the opening quarter, Ficken drilled a 32-yard kick to pull the Nittany Lions within one, 7-6.

Zettel's interception on the next Michigan possession setup another scoring drive for Penn State. Starting with the ball at Michigan's 28 yard-line, Hackenberg connected with Hamilton for a 20-yard pass to open the drive. On third-and-goal from the UM 10, Hackenberg found Hamilton again, this time in the end zone, to give Penn State a 13-7 lead early in the second quarter.

On the following drive, Gardner connected with four different receivers as he drove Michigan down to the Penn State 28-yard line. Matt Wile hit a 45-yard field goal to shorten the Nittany Lion lead to three.

Penn State would enter the halftime break with a 13-10 advantage.

A Jourdan Lewis interception setup the Wolverines at Penn State's 28 yard-line with 4:02 left in the third quarter. After a pair of runs and an incomplete pass, Wile connected on a 42-yard attempt to tie the game at 13.

Michigan's opening drive of the fourth quarter featured a 24-yard completion to Devin Norfleet and Wile would hit his third field goal of the day, a 37-yard kick, with 11:24 left in the quarter to move UM ahead, 16-13.

Backed up inside their own three yard-line with 1:41 left in the game, Penn State decided to take a safety to give them an opportunity to get the ball back.

The Nittany Lions attempted an onside kick and Mike Hull recovered it, but Penn State was called for an offside penalty. Michigan would recover the second attempt and seal the win with four straight run plays.

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The packed Penn State White Out crowd of 107,895 watched as senior linebacker Mike Hull and junior defensive end Anthony Zettel paced a fantastic Penn State defensive effort as the Nittany Lions battled No. 13 Ohio State in a double overtime thriller. The Buckeyes used a four-yard run from J.T. Barrett in the second overtime to secure the 31-24 victory.

Hull made a career-high 19 tackles, including 2.5 for a loss, and nabbed his second career interception to lead the defensive effort. Hull's 19 stops are the most by a PSU player since Gerald Hodges made 19 against Illinois in 2011.

Zettel grabbed his second interception of the season and returned it 40 yards for the first touchdown of his career. In his first career start, Marcus Allen was solid with 11 tackles and two pass breakups, while sophomore Brandon Bell added 13 tackles, including a sack for a seven-yard loss.

Redshirt freshman DaeSean Hamilton broke the Penn State single-game record for receptions with 14 catches for 126 yards. He topped the record of 13 catches held by Freddie Scott against Wisconsin in 1995.

Sophomore quarterback Christian Hackenberg was 31-for-49 for 224 yards and a touchdown. Freshman receiver Saeed Blacknall pulled in his first career touchdown and finished with four catches for 34 yards.

The Buckeyes' first possession started in Penn State territory after an interception of Hackenberg by Vonn Bell at the PSU 39. Ohio State needed just seven plays to score, capped off by a 10-yard run by Ezekiel Elliott for the touchdown and a 7-0 lead for the Buckeyes less than five minutes into the game.

After an exchange of three-and-outs, the Nittany Lions put together a seven-play, 37-yard drive, but were forced to punt. Ohio State took over at their own nine-yard line and drove down to the Penn State 17-yard line before the raucous crowd forced the Buckeyes into a pair of false start penalties, a timeout and a sack to help hold OSU to a 49-yard field goal by Sean Nuernberger to extend the Ohio State lead to 10-0 with 11:07 left in the second quarter.

Ohio State again started in prime field position at the Penn State 39 after a Nittany Lion punt. The Buckeyes needed six plays to reach the end zone via a one-yard pass from J.T. Barrett to Jeff Heurman to make it a 17-0 OSU lead with 3:58 remaining in the opening half.

The Buckeyes opened the second half with the ball and after modest gains on their first two plays, Zettel intercepted

Barrett and returned it 40 yards for the touchdown to make it a 17-7 game with 13:37 remaining in the third quarter. It is the first interception returned for a touchdown for the Nittany Lions since Navarro Bowman had a pick six against Indiana in 2009. The interception was the second of the season for Zettel and third of his career.

After an exchange of possessions, the Buckeyes methodically marched down the field over 12 plays, but Nuernberger's 41-yard field goal attempt went wide right to keep the margin at 10 with 5:09 remaining in third.

Hull nabbed his first interception of the season and second of his career to jumpstart the Penn State offense and the sold out Beaver Stadium crowd. After a first down via a roughing the passer penalty, Akeel Lynch clicked off runs of eight and four yards to push the Lions to the OSU 28. Hackenberg completed passes to Blacknall for three yards and Chris Godwin for one yard to move to the 24-yard line. On the ensuing play, Hackenberg found Blacknall for a 24-yard leaping grab for his first career touchdown to make it a 17-14 Ohio State lead with 11:08 left in the contest.

The Penn State defense held strong as the clock wound down in the fourth quarter and forced a punt with 2:58 remaining. Hackenberg came out strong and marched the Lions down the field in an 18-play drive, going 9-of-13 for 63 yards with two rushes for six yards to put Penn State in field goal position. Ficken connected on a 31-yard field goal to cap the drive with nine seconds remaining to tie the game at 17-17.

Ohio State won the toss in the first overtime and elected to start on defense. A 12-yard pitch-and-catch from Hackenberg to Hamilton highlighted the Penn State overtime drive that ended with a one-yard run by Bill Belton for the touchdown and a 24-17 lead for Penn State, the first of the game for the Lions.

The Buckeyes responded with a five-yard TD run by Barrett to force a second overtime period. During the extra point, Penn State was flagged for leaping, a penalty that was assessed on the Buckeyes' possession in the second overtime.

It took just three plays for the Buckeyes, who started from the 12-yard line, to score a touchdown on a four-yard run by Barrett and take a 31-24 lead. Penn State advanced the ball five yards on its possession, but a sack of Hackenberg on fourth down ended the game and sealed the win for the Buckeyes.

- Since a 2012 Senior Day win over Wisconsin, Penn State had seen five of its last seven home Big Ten games go into overtime.
- The Nittany Lions have an overall record of 5-5 in overtime games, losing their last two OT games after winning five straight.

- Hackenberg's 31 completions are the second most of his career (32 vs. UCF, 2014) and the fourth highest single-game total in Penn State history.
- Hackenberg's 49 pass attempts are tied for the fifth-highest single-game total by a Penn State quarterback. Zack Mills had 49 pass attempts against Purdue in 2004.
- True freshman WR Saeed Blacknall grabbed his first career touchdown reception on a 24-yard grab in the fourth quarter. He also had a career-best 34 yards receiving on a career-high four catches.
- WR Chris Godwin caught three passes, tying his career-high set at Rutgers earlier this season.

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Senior kicker Sam Ficken connected on four field goals, including three from beyond 46 yards, and the Penn State defense held Maryland to 196 yards of total offense, but Brad Craddock's 43-yard field goal in the final minute lifted the Terps to a 20-19 win over the Nittany Lions.

With the effort, Ficken moved into a tie for third on Penn State's career field goals list with 47 (Travis Forney; 1996-99). The Penn State defense was stellar yet again, holding Maryland to just 35 net rushing yards, recording six sacks and three turnovers. Freshman Marcus Allen posted his second-straight double-digit tackle performance with 11 stops, including his first career sack. Senior Mike Hull continued his solid play with nine tackles, including five solo, and a fumble recovery, while Austin Johnson added six tackles with a sack. Deion Barnes also stood out with two sacks and a forced fumble.

Redshirt freshman DaeSean Hamilton had five catches for 42 yards. With his performance, Hamilton broke the Penn State freshman season receiving yardage record set by Deon Butler (691) in 2005. Hamilton ended the game with 728 receiving yards on the season.

Jesse James scored the lone touchdown for the Nittany Lions on an eight-yard grab. He snagged five catches for 48 yards, including a long of 20 yards.

The Nittany Lion offense came out of the gates strong with a 14-yard return by Grant Haley on the kickoff. Christian Hackenberg found a rhythm as he completed 5-of-6 pass attempts to lead Penn State on a nine-play, 36-yard drive that resulted in a 47-yard field goal by Ficken for the 3-0 lead with 11 minutes left in the opening half.

The teams exchanged possession over the next 10 minutes until Maryland took advantage of good starting field position at the Penn State 43 to put together an eight-play 43-yard drive that ended with a two-yard touchdown pass from C.J. Brown to P.J. Gallo to give the Terps a 7-3 lead with 13:52 left in the second quarter.

Neither team would score on their next two opportunities until the Nittany Lions started their drive on their own 43. Penn State went to the run game to move the ball to the Maryland 8-yard line and produce a 25-yard Ficken field goal to cut the deficit to one point (7-6) with five minutes left in the first half.

The Penn State defense came out strong on the ensuing Maryland possession, forcing a three-and-out that included a sack for Barnes. The Nittany Lions took over on the Maryland 45 and got an eight-yard run from Belton and a nine-yard

catch by Hamilton to advance the ball to the Maryland 29. Ficken converted on a 46-yard field goal, his third of the game and second from beyond 46 yards, to give Penn State the 9-7 lead with 1:30 left in the second quarter.

Neither team could sustain offensive momentum to start the second half. Anthony Zettel hit Wes Brown in the backfield and forced a fumble, which was recovered by C.J. Olaniyan to give the Nittany Lions the ball at their own 49-yard line. Hackenberg marched the Nittany Lion offense down the field, going 6-for-6 for 54 yards and found James for an eight-yard touchdown catch to extend Penn State's lead to 16-7 with 3:18 left in the third quarter. Hamilton nabbed two passes for 27 yards and Kyle Carter had two catches for 21 yards during the eight-play, 51-yard drive.

The Terrapins responded with a drive of their own, going seven plays for 48 yards down to the Penn State one before settling for a 25-yard field goal to make it a 16-10 Penn State lead with 13:11 remaining in the game.

On the ensuing kickoff, Haley fumbled and recovered by the Terps at the Penn State 24. The Nittany Lion defense pushed Maryland back with a 10-yard sack by Johnson on the opening play of the drive. However, Brown hit Amba Etta-Tawo for a 25-yard gain and then found Stefon Diggs for an eight-yard catch to put the Terps on the end zone's doorstep. On the next play, Wes Brown punched it in from the half-yard line to give Maryland the 17-16 lead with 11:30 left in the fourth quarter.

Following an exchange of possessions, the Penn State offense took the field with 9:39 on the clock. After an illegal procedure penalty, Hackenberg rushed for a career-long 17-yard gain for a first down near midfield. The Nittany Lions retreated on their next two plays to the Penn State 35. On third-and-23 when Hackenberg found Lewis for a 33-yard gain to the Maryland 32. Penn State advanced the ball one yard before Ficken hit his fourth field goal of the day from 48 yards with 6:52 remaining to give the Nittany Lions a 19-17 lead.

Penn State was forced to punt with 1:06 on the clock and Diggs returned the ball to the Penn State 42. The Terps got a pass from C.J. Brown to Wes Brown for a 13-yard gain on first down and followed that up with a pair of two-yard runs by Wes Brown to set up a 43-yard field goal by Craddock to give Maryland the 20-19 lead.

The Nittany Lions had one last opportunity, but were unable to record a first down and turned the ball over on downs to the Terps.

- Hamilton owns the Penn State freshman records for yards in a game (165 vs. UCF) and receptions/yards in a season (62/728). He also owns the school record for receptions in a game (14 vs. Ohio State).
- QB Christian Hackenberg threw his 27 career touchdown pass (in 20 games), good for a tie for 10th on the Penn State career list with Wally Richardson.
- Hackenberg's 42 pass attempts gave him 318 on the season, moving him ahead of four Nittany Lions and into ninth on the single-season chart. Hackenberg passed Michael Robinson (311, 2005), Tony Sacca (292, 1991), Todd Blackledge (292, 1982) and Wally Richardson (279, 1996).
- Hackenberg had 18 completions, giving him 183 this season, good for ninth place in the Penn State single-season record book. Hackenberg passed Kerry Collins (176, 1994) and Tony Sacca (169, 1991) today.
- Hackenberg's 18 completions boosted his career total to 414, and pushed him into fifth place at Penn State. Hackenberg is the sixth Penn State quarterback to surpass 400 career completions.
- Hackenberg also had a 17-yard rush in the fourth quarter, tying a career long set earlier this season against Massachusetts.
- RB Akeel Lynch had a career-high 21 carries. He had 13 carries on two occasions previously, including last week's Ohio State game.
- TE Mike Gesicki became the fourth true freshman to start for Penn State this season.
- Three of starting offensive line members started new positions (LT Andrew Nelson, C Wendy Laurent, RT Angelo Mangiro).

INDIVIDUAL - SPECIAL TEAMS

- Sam Ficken is the first Penn State kicker since at least 1982 to make 3 FG of 45+ yards in a game (46,47,48).
- PK Sam Ficken's 48-yard field goal in the fourth quarter was then the second longest of his career and gave Penn State a 19-17 lead. He booted a 54-yard field goal last year against UCF.
- Ficken became the first Penn State place kicker to have three 40+ yard field goals in a game since Collin Wagner had three against Youngstown State in 2011 (44, 48 and 49 yards).
- Ficken's four field goals today give him 47 for his career, moving him into a tie for third place at Penn State with Travis Forney.
- Ficken was 4-4 on FG, tying a career-high, set earlier this season against UCF, when he made the game-winning field goal on the final play of the game.
- Ficken's 13 points moved him into sixth place with 239 career points. He passed Curtis Enis (230 points) and Robbie Gould (232).
- S Troy Apke played on the punt return team in the second quarter, becoming the ninth true freshman to play for Penn State this season. A total of 16 scholarship freshmen remain available for a possible redshirt season.



Freshman safety Marcus Allen tied his career-high with 11 tackles and logged his first career sack vs. Maryland. Allen helped the defense hold Maryland to a season-low 35 rushing yards.

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. - Senior Bill Belton bolted through a crease up the middle, side-stepped one defender and was off on a 92-yard touchdown run that propelled Penn State to a 13-7 victory over Indiana at Memorial Stadium.

Belton ended the afternoon with 137 yards to post his four career 100-yard rushing effort. His 92-yard touchdown scamper marked the longest rushing score in school history by one player and is tied for the longest offensive touchdown in Penn State history (Higgins to Hess; at Pitt, 1919).

It was the longest rush in the Big Ten this season and is tied for ninth longest in Big Ten history.

Sam Ficken added two field goals and an extra point, moving into a tie for fifth place on the Penn State career scoring charts with Lydell Mitchell (1969-71) with 276 points.

The defense stood tall against the nation's leading rusher, Tevin Coleman, who entered the afternoon averaging 162.5 yards per game on the ground. Coleman logged just 71 yards and finished with less than 100 rushing yards for the first time in 10 games.

The defense piled up 10.0 tackles for loss and Anthony Zettel logged the only sack of the afternoon, his fifth of the season.

Safety Jesse Della Valle and linebacker Nyeem Wartman each grabbed their first career interceptions in the game.

Linebacker Mike Hull led all player with nine stops on the afternoon, leading the team in tackles for the eighth time in nine games. He had made at least nine stops in all nine games this season.

Indiana defensive lineman Mark Murphy oped the scoring with an interception return for a touchdown in the second quarter. The 53-yard interception return gave the Hoosier a 7-0 lead.

The lead didn't last long, as Belton took the next play from scrimmage 92-yards to tie the game with 3:37 remaining in the half.

With Indiana looking to put points on the scoreboard before the half, Diamont threw his first interception, a leaping grab by Della Valle along the Penn State sideline.

Ficken extended the Penn State lead to 10-7 with a 27-yard field goal midway through the third quarter and the Nittany Lion defense continued to hold the Hoosier at bay.

Indiana's Oakes Griffin missed a 51-yard field goal attempt with a chance to tie the game early in the fourth quarter.

After exchanging possessions over the next nine minutes, Penn State took over with 4:55 on the clock and an opportunity to burn clock, but the Lions could only expunge two minutes before Daniel Pasquariello booted his ninth punt of the day, which was downed at Indiana 22 yard line.

The Hoosiers would have 2:55 to get into field goal range to tie or score a touchdown to take the lead. On the second play of the drive, however, Wartman stepped in front of a Diamont pass and returned it 13 yards to set up Ficken's 28-yard field goal with 55 seconds left in the game.

The Hoosiers had one last opportunity with 55 seconds on the clock, but the Penn State defense held on 4th-and-10 from the Indiana 33 yard line as the clock expired.

- Four of the last five PSU-IU games played in Bloomington have been decided by six points or less, with Penn State winning all four of those tight contests.
- The Nittany Lions have won four of their last five games away from home dating back to a season-ending victory at Wisconsin in 2013.
- Senior co-captain Guard Miles Dieffenbach made his season debut on Saturday at Indiana. He missed the first eight games due to an injury sustained during spring practice.

Sophomore linebacker Nyeem Wartman grabbed his first career interception in the fourth quarter, leading to a Sam Ficken field goal that extended Penn State's lead to 13-7. Wartman also ranked second on the team with eight tackles vs. the Hoosiers.

- All three of the Nittany Lions' 90-plus yard scoring plays all-time have come on the road.
- Belton's 92-yard TD run was the longest rush in the Big Ten this year and tied for 9th longest in Big Ten history.
- Belton's 92-yard rush broke the Memorial Stadium record, eclipsing Wisconsin's David Gilreath's 90-yard run in 2008.

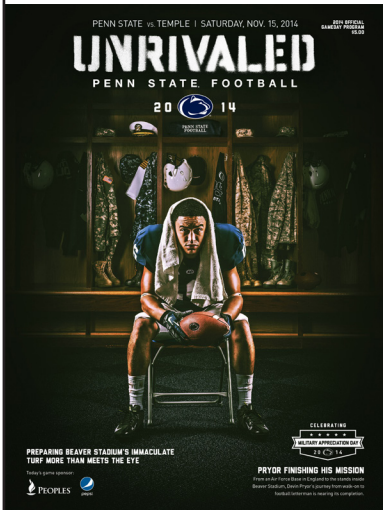

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - The Penn State football team used complementary football with stellar performances on both sides of the ball to post a 30-13 win over Temple to become bowl eligible for the first time since the 2011 season. The Nittany Lions rushed for a season-high 254 yards, led by Akeel Lynch and Bill Belton, while the defense forced five turnovers.

Lynch ran for 130 yards on 18 carries for an average of 7.2 yards. He also rushed for his first touchdown of the season and second of his career. The 254-yard team rushing total was the highest since a 289-yard afternoon against Purdue last season.

Penn State defense's five turnovers forced tied the season mark set against Rutgers. Seniors Adrian Amos and Jesse Della Valle and true freshmen Christian Campbell and Grant Haley each registered interceptions on the day.

Haley returned his first career pick 30 yards for the touchdown. Haley's touchdown was the first defensive touchdown scored by a true freshman since Paul Posluszny returned an interception against Indiana Nov. 15, 2003. It was also the first interception returned for a touchdown since Anthony Zettel's pick-six against Ohio State in October. Penn State's defense notched two defensive scores in a season for the first time since 2009 when Navorro Bowman had a pair of touchdowns (fumble return and interception).

Senior linebacker Mike Hull had his sixth double-digit tackle performance of the season with 10 stops, including a half-tackle for a loss. With his effort, Hull moved into 10th place on Penn State's career tackles chart with 265 tackles, passing Glen Carson (2010-13; 261) for the position. Zettel recorded his sixth sack of the year with a stop for a two-yard loss.

Senior kicker Sam Ficken connected on three field goal attempts on the day, including a 50-yard attempt. It was the second make of Ficken's career from beyond 50 yards, joining his 54-yard make against Kent State in 2013. With the two kicks, Ficken moved into second place on Penn State's career field goals list with 52, passing Craig Fayak (1990-93).

Ficken also moved up the Nittany Lion career scoring charts and into a tie for fourth place with Travis Forney (1996-99) with 258 career points.

The Penn State offense sprinted out of the gates, marching down to the Temple eight-yard line in just eight plays. Belton and Lynch combined for 32 rushing yards in the first eight plays. After a one-yard loss, Belton advanced to the three-yard line, but Penn State could not find the end zone and settled for a 29-yard Ficken field goal for the 3-0 lead midway through the first quarter.

The squads exchanged possessions before Temple found success through the air on the way to a game-tying field goal. P.J. Walker completed three passes for 36 yards on the drive that ended with a 31-yard field goal by Austin Jones with 2:27 left in the first quarter.

Neither team could establish offensive momentum as they combine for seven punts and an interception over the next eight drives. After forcing a Temple punt, Penn State took over at their own 12 and put together another long drive to end the half.

Christian Hackenberg hit Chris Godwin for a 21-yard completion to spark the drive. A 19-yard personal foul call and a 12-yard rush by Hackenberg advanced to the Temple 32. Hackenberg connected with Lynch for a four-yard gain to set up a 50-yard field goal by Ficken to end the opening frame and give Penn State a 6-3 lead.

The Owls came out strong to open the second half with a nine-play, 48-yard drive. However, Austin Jones' 42-yard field goal fell short to turn the ball over to the Lions at the Penn State 25.

A Todd Matakevich interception ended that drive, but the Nittany Lions held Temple to a 25-yard field goal by Jones to tie the game at 6-6 with 11:04 left in the third quarter.

Penn State responded with the run game on its ensuing possession. Belton opened the drive with a 37-yard run and Lynch followed that up with a 38-yard touchdown run to give the Nittany Lions a 13-6 lead.

After a three-yard rush by Temple's Jahad Thomas, Amos hauled in his team-high third interception of the season and returned it 33 yards to the Temple 8. On the first play from scrimmage, Belton ran it up the middle for paydirt and a 20-6 Penn State lead with 5:19 left in the third. Unfazed by the turn of events, the Owls responded with a 75-yard pitch-and-catch from Walker to Jalen Fitzpatrick for a touchdown to cut the lead to 20-13.

The squads swapped possessions until Haley intercepted Walker and returned it 30 yards for the touchdown and a 27-13 Penn State lead with 13:57 left in the game. It was the first interception returned for a touchdown since Zettel's pick-6 against Ohio State in October.

The defense continued to shine for Penn State as Johnson recovered a fumble on the next Temple drive to give the Nittany Lions prime starting position at the TU 23. Lynch ran for 20 yards on the drive, but Penn State was forced to settle for a 21-yard Ficken field goal for a 30-13 lead with 10:36 remaining.

The Temple offense again turned the ball over as Della Valle made a leaping interception and managed to get his elbow down inbounds before his momentum took him out of bounds. It was Della Valle's second pick of the season. The Nittany Lions were unable to capitalize on the Della Valle interception as Ficken's 42-yard field goal attempt was blocked. All four of Ficken's misses to that point had been blocked.

Penn State defense forced the Owls to turn the ball over on downs and the offense ran the clock out to secure the 30-13 win to become bowl eligible.

- Earning its sixth win of the season, Penn State became bowl eligible.
- Penn State improved to 39-3-1 in the all-time series with Temple. The teams will meet in the 2015 season opener on Sept. 5 at Lincoln Financial Field in Philadelphia.
- Penn State finished the non-conference portion of its schedule with a 4-0 record, its first undefeated mark vs. non-league foes on the field since the 2009 season.
- The Owls had just eight first downs, the fewest by a Penn State opponent since Indiana State had eight in the 2011 season opener Sept. 3, 2011.
- The defense held Temple to 61 rushing yards, becoming the eighth team to rush for less than 105 yards this season against Penn State's No. 1 ranked rushing defense.
- Temple's QB P.J. Walker entered the game averaging just over one interception per game, but was picked off four times, with two of the ensuing PSU drives ending in a touchdown.
- Penn State scored 17 points off of Temple turnovers in the second half to pull ahead 30-13 with 10:36 to play. The Owls had five turnovers, tying the season-high for PSU opponents (Rutgers), and the most for Temple this season.
- Two Penn State freshman cornerbacks earned their first career interceptions in the contest: Christian Campbell and Grant Haley.
- Campbell also made his first career start and was the 14th (11 offensive/3 defensive) different player to make first his first start in 2014. Campbell was the eighth different Penn State freshman to start this season (5 true freshmen; 3 redshirt freshmen).
- The attendance of 100,173 was the fourth consecutive 100,000-plus crowd of the season.
- Through six home games, Penn State has an average home attendance of 101,909, an increase of 5,870 per game over the 96,039 average through the first six home games of 2013.
- Military Appreciation Day activities were held throughout the game with ROTC elite, active duty, Wounded Warriors and veterans being honored. Nearly 6,000 tickets were purchased for the "Seats for Soldiers" program and donated to active duty and veteran military personnel and their families.
- A special commemorative coin was used honoring Medal of Honor recipient Lt. Michael Murphy. Gold Star parents John and Mary Ann Cahir were present on the field for the coin toss, representing all Gold Star and Fallen Families. Their son, Marine Sgt. William J. Cahir, a 1990 Penn State graduate, was killed in action in Afghanistan in 2009.

- Big Ten tackle leader Mike Hull had 10 tackles, leading the team for the ninth time this season and earning his sixth double-digit stop performance this season (three games with nine tackles).
- Hull ended the game with 265 career tackles, taking over 10th place on the Penn State career charts from Glenn Carson (261; 2010-13).
- S Adrian Amos made his third interception of the season and returned it 33 yards to the Temple 8 to set up the Bill Belton TD run with 5:19 to play in the third quarter.

- CB Grant Haley grabbed his first career interception, returning it 30 yards for a TD to give Penn State a 27-13 lead early in the fourth quarter.
- Haley is the first Penn State true freshman to score a defensive touchdown since LB Paul Posluszny returned an interception for a score in a Nov. 15, 2003 win over Indiana.
- Penn State has two interception return touchdowns in a season (Zettel vs. Ohio State) for the first time since having three in 2003.
- In his first career start, CB Christian Campbell grabbed his first interception with a pick of Temple QB P.J. Walker late in third quarter.

INDIVIDUAL - OFFENSE

- Penn State gained a season-high 254 rushing yards on 47 carries (5.4). The previous high was 228 yards in the win over UMass.
- Penn State scored back-to-back rushing touchdowns in the third quarter, marking the second game this season with multiple TDs off the run. The Lions had a season-high five vs. UMass.
- RB Akeel Lynch scored his second rushing touchdown of the season with a 38-yard run in the third quarter. He ended the day with a ten-career-high 130 yards rushing on 18 carries for his first 100-yard rushing game of the season and third of his career.
- With 112 passing yards, QB Christian Hackenberg moved his season total to 3,067 and career total 5,273 yards. He moved into second place on the season charts, passing Daryll Clark (3,003; 2009).
- Hackenberg completed 12 of 26 pass attempts, moving into second place in single-season pass attempts with 418. He passed Anthony Morelli (402; 2007).
- Angelo Mangiro started at left guard, the third different offensive line position he has started in the last four games. For the season, he has started at center (7 games), right tackle (2 games) and left guard (1 game).
- In the second series of the game, Miles Dieffenbach lined up at LG next to LT Donovan Smith for first time this year, with Angelo Mangiro moving to center.

INDIVIDUAL - SPECIAL TEAMS

- With 12 points vs. Temple, PK Sam Ficken moved into a tie for fourth place in all-time career scoring at Penn State with 258 points. He is even with Travis Forney (1996-99).
- Ficken hit a 50-yard field goal to put the Nittany Lions up 6-3 heading into halftime. The FG was the second-longest of the senior kicker's career and made him 7-for-7 on attempts of 40+ yards this season.
- Ficken moves into second place at Penn State in career made field goals with 52, passing Craig Fayak (50; 19990-93).
- Ficken's 22 field goals on the season were tied for the most in Penn State history with Matt Bahr (1978) and Kevin Kelly (2006).
- P Daniel Pasquariello had a then-season-long 49-yard punt in the second quarter to give Temple possession at its own 35-yard line.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill. - A 47-yard rushing touchdown by sophomore Akeel Lynch gave Penn State a 14-10 lead early in the fourth quarter, but Illinois place kicker David Reisner connected on a pair of fourth quarter field goals, including the game winner with just eight seconds left on the clock, to give Illinois a 16-14 victory inside Memorial Stadium.

The Nittany Lion defense limited Illinois to just 283 yards of total offense - their sixth straight opponent held under 300 yards of total offense. On the season Penn State had held 10 of their 11 opponents to under 300 yards of total offense.

Lynch topped his career-highs in rushing attempts (28) and rushing yardage (139) and his 47-yard touchdown run was a career long carry. He eclipsed his previous career-best of 130 yards, which he set vs. Temple just one week prior.

The 100-yard rushing effort was the fourth of Lynch's career and gave Penn State a 100-yard rusher for the third straight game. Bill Belton ran for 137 yards at Indiana, while Lynch logged 130 yards on the ground vs. Temple.

Sophomore Christian Hackenberg completed passes to seven different receivers in the game, finding freshman Chris Godwin for an 18-yard scoring strike on the Nittany Lions' opening drive of the game.

It was the 28th career touchdown pass for Hackenberg and moved him into a tie for ninth with Tom Shuman (1972-74) on the Penn State career charts.

It was the first career touchdown grab for Godwin, who joins Saeed Blacknall as the only two true freshman to catch touchdown passes this season. The grab also extended Godwin's streak to 11 straight games with at least one catch to open his career.

Senior Mike Hull piled up 10 tackles to lead all players in the contest and moved his season total to 121 stops. He moved him into No. 9 on the Penn State season charts, passing Dan Connor (113; 2006), Brian Gelzheiser (113; 1993), Gary Gray (115, 1971), Josh Hull (116, 2009), Paul Posluszny (116; 2005 & '06) and Dennis Onkotz (118; 1967) vs. the Illini.

Penn State forced a punt on the first six Illinois possessions, but could only capitalize with a score on one of their ensuing drives.

The Nittany Lions opened the scoring with a nine-play, 52-yard touchdown drive that ended with Hackenberg finding Godwin for in the back corner of the end zone for the score on 3rd-and-9.

Penn State looked primed to extend their lead on their next drive as they drove to the UI three yard line, but the field goal attempt never materialized as the snap was bobbled and Illinois took over on downs.

The Illini capitalized on a PSU mistake on the final drive of the first half. Illinois punted the ball away on 4th-and-3, but an offsides against the Lions gave the Illini a new set of downs.

After a pair of runs by the Illini, quarterback Reilly O'Toole completed six of his next seven passes, including a one-yarder to Matt LaCosse to knot the game at 7-7 heading into halftime.

The kickoff to open the half was knocked down by a stiff 19-mph wind, falling down at about the Penn State 20. Illinois' Clayton Fejedelem recovered at the Nittany Lion 28 and four plays later Reisner kicked a 28-yard field goal and a 10-7 lead.

Penn State recaptured the lead on Lynch's 47-yard scamper with 13:37 to play in the fourth quarter, but Illinois trimmed the lead to 14-13 on Reisner's second field goal of the game with 8:43 to play.

The Illini missed a potential 50-yard go-ahead field goal with 6:15 to play in the game and Penn State took over.

On the ensuing drive, Hackenberg was just shy of the first down on a 3rd-and-5 rush and the Nittany Lions punted with 1:48 to play.

The Illini drive started at their own 28, but a pair of completions from O'Toole moved them to the Penn State 47. Josh Ferguson and Donovan Young carried the ball to the Penn State 18 to set up the game winning 36-yard field goal by Reisner.

- Penn State leads the all-time series with a 17-5 on-field record vs. Illinois. The teams next meet on October 31, 2015 in Beaver Stadium.
- Freshman LB Jason Cabinda made his first career start at Illinois. He was the seventh true freshman to start in 2012 (including punter Daniel Pasquariello) and the 15th Nittany Lion to make his first appearance this season (11 offense, 4 defense).
- Returning from a spring practice injury, senior G Miles Dieffenbach made his first start of the season.
- By limiting Illinois to just 16 points, the Nittany Lions held their 9th opponents to 20 points or less in regulation.
- Penn State's FBS No. 1 ranked rushing defense allowed just 68 yards to Illinois on 27 carries (2.5). The Nittany Lions continued to lead the nation in rushing defense at 81.7 ypg and 2.53 ypc.
- With its 68 rushing yards, Illinois became the ninth team to rush for less than 105 yards this season against Penn State's No. 1 ranked rushing defense.
- Illinois was 2 of 16 on third down conversions. In the past four games, Penn State opponents are 9 of 63 (.143) on third down conversions.
- The Penn State defense held the opponent off the scoreboard on its first drive of the game for the ninth time in 11 contests this season. The opposition has punted six times and missed three field goals on their opening possession.
- Penn State remained in Top 5 in FBS in rushing defense (1st, 81.7 ypg), total defense (3rd, 267.2 ypg), scoring defense (4th, 16.2 ppg), pass efficiency defense (3rd, 98.74) and third down conversion pct. defense (.276).

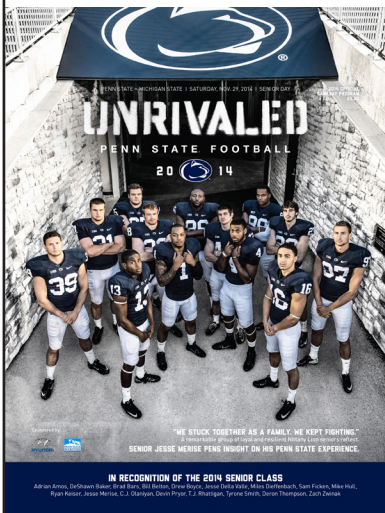

UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa. - Penn State fell to No. 10 Michigan State, 34-10, to end the regular season at Beaver Stadium.

With the help of a game-high 13 tackles from Mike Hull, Penn State held Michigan State to just 298 yards of total offense, 216.5 yards below the Spartans' season average of 514.5 yards.

Sam Ficken kicked his 23rd field goal of the season late in the second quarter and moved into sole possession of the No. 1 spot in Penn State's single-season field goals made chart, breaking a tie with Matt Bahr(1978) and Kevin Kelly(2006).

Prior to the game, Hull, Ficken and 15 of their fellow seniors were honored for their contributions to the program throughout their careers.

The Spartans scored on all three of their first-quarter drives, including a 90-yard kickoff return by R.J. Shelton to open the game. It was the first kickoff return for a touchdown by a PSU opponent since Nov. 3, 2007, vs. Purdue when Dorien Bryant ran the ball 98 yards for the score.

Penn State took the ensuing possession 41 yards, punctuated by a 17-yard pass from Hackenberg to DaeSean Hamilton, who finished the day with a game-high six receptions for 55 yards. After a pair of incomplete passes from the Michigan State 34-yard line, Ficken took the field to attempt a 51-yard field goal but had it come up short for his first miss that was not blocked of the season.

The Spartans' next two trips downfield ended with field goals by Michael Geiger, as the sophomore kicker converted on attempts from 36 and 39 yards, respectively, to give MSU a 13-0 lead by the end of the first quarter.

The Penn State defense forced back-to-back 3-and-outs from Michigan State to start the second period. On the second Spartan drive, defensive tackle Anthony Zettel came up with his 16th career sack after taking down Spartan QB Connor Cook.

Zettel came up big on Michigan State's third drive as well, intercepting Cook's pass on the MSU 43-yard line and returning it seven yards to set up the offense on MSU's 36. With the play, the West Branch, Mich.,

native became the first defensive lineman to have at least three interceptions in a season since at least 1982.

Penn State picked up a first down with the help of a 9-yard reception by Jesse James. Following an incomplete pass, Hackenberg's next attempt was intercepted and the Spartans took their 13-3 lead into the half.

MSU increased its lead to 27-3 in the third quarter with a pair of touchdowns. Jeremy Langford rushed three yards for a TD at 7:24, capping off a seven-play, 63-yard drive. MSU added another just under three minutes later after forcing a fumble off a sack and recovering the ball at Penn State's 18. Cook took four plays before hitting Tony Lippett for a 10-yard TD. Akeel Lynch produced Penn State's lone touchdown run of the game late in the third quarter with a 3-yard rush at the end of the 10-play drive. Lynch now has four rushing TDs on the season.

In the fourth quarter, Michigan State's Langford capped off scoring for the Spartans with a 6-yard run that made it 34-10 with 2:49 to play. MSU ate up over 9 minutes of possession between two drives sandwiching a 3-and-out by Penn State before picking up its fourth touchdown of the game.

- The Penn State and Michigan State series is tied 14-14-1. The teams met for the first time since 2010.
- Penn State held Michigan State to just 298 yards of total offense, which was 216.5 yards below the Spartans' season average of 514.5 yards and 9.9 point below their season scoring average of 43.9 ppg. The Spartans became the 11th Penn State opponent held under its scoring and total offense averages entering the game.
- Penn State's Top 5 defense has held 11 of 12 opponents under 300 yards of total offense. Northwestern had 361 yards on Sept. 27.
- For the season, Penn State's top 5 defense held the opposition to an average of 14.4 points and 141 yards below their season averages entering the game.
- The game marked the third-latest home game in Penn State football history, and the latest home matchup since 1979. The Nittany Lions hosted Pittsburgh on December 1, 1979 and Syracuse on December 7, 1968.
- Penn State had 60 recruited scholarship players available to play vs. Michigan State (minus 16 true freshmen who will likely redshirt); for a total of 44 recruited scholarship players who were available to play vs. the Spartans.

INDIVIDUAL - DEFENSE

- DT Anthony Zettel tied his career-high with 3.0 TFL and made his team-high eighth sack. He also grabbed his third interception of the season and made five tackles (four solo).
- Zettel's sack in the second quarter gave him 16 for his career, moving him into a tie with Shane Conlan for 15th place at Penn State.
- Zettel's interception late in the second quarter was his third of the season, and ties him for the team lead this year with safety Adrian Amos. He is the first PSU defensive lineman to have at least three interceptions since at least 1982.
- LB Mike Hull had 13 tackles and a 1.5 TFL vs. MSU, giving him 134 stops this season and moving him into sixth place on the single-season tackle list at Penn State. He passed Andre Collins (130 tackles, '89), Ed O'Neil (126, '72) and Brian Gelzheiser (126, '94). Sean Lee is in fifth place (138, '07).
- Hull's 13 tackles gave him 288 for his career, moving him ahead of Dennis Onkotz (287 tackles) and into sixth place at Penn State for career tackles. Brian Gelzheiser (315 tackles) is in fifth place.
- Hull made 10 or more tackles for the seventh time this season. He has led the Nittany Lions in tackles in 11 games this season.
- MLB Gary Wooten made his first career start, the 16th different Nittany Lion to make his first start this season (11 offense, 5 defense).
- True freshman safety Marcus Allen had 9 tackles. He has started the last 6 games and rose to third on the team with 52 tackles (33 solo).
- Junior CB Jordan Lucas wore No. 23 in honor of senior safety Ryan Keiser, who suffered a season-ending injury the week of the Ohio State game.
- MSU RB Jeremy Langford became just the second runner to gain 100 yards this season on Penn State's FBS No. 1 ranked rushing defense. Langford gained 118 yards on 30 carries (3.9).

Seventeen Penn State seniors were honored prior to kick off vs. No. 10 Michigan State. The 2014 seniors have been instrumental in the Nittany Lions earning a 30-19 on-field record the past four years under unprecedented circumstances.

INDIVIDUAL - OFFENSE

- WR DaeSean Hamilton made a game-high six catches, giving him 75 for the season. He is just the second Penn State player to have at least 70 catches in a season. All-American Allen Robinson did it twice (97 in 2013, and 77 in 2012). The top three school season receptions totals have all occurred in the past three seasons.
- QB Christian Hackenberg threw for 195 yards, giving him 5,561 for his career. He moved into fifth place at Penn State, passing Chuck Fusina (5,382 yards).
- Hackenberg moved into sixth place for school single season passing yardage with a Penn State sophomore record 2,606 yards. The previous sophomore mark was 2,417 yards by Zack Mills in 2002.
- Hackenberg's 45 pass attempts gave him 434 on the season, which is the second highest season total at Penn State. Matt McGloin's 446 attempts (2012) are first.
- Hackenberg's 45 attempts gave him a career total of 826, which moved him into third place past Anthony Morelli (821) and Tony Sacca (824). He trails Matt McGloin (894 attempts) for second place in the Penn State annals.
- Hackenberg's 21 completions gave him 467 for his career, and moved him into third place for career completions at Penn State. He passed Anthony Morelli (460 completions), with Matt McGloin (513) sitting in second.
- Hackenberg's 21 completions gave him 236 for the season, moving him into second place at Penn State for a single season. He passed his own mark of 231 from last season, Daryll Clark's 232 in 2009 and Anthony Morelli's 234 in 2007. Matt McGloin (270 completions, 2012) has the top mark in a single season at Penn State.
- Hackenberg had 178 yards of total offense, giving him 5,399 for his career, which moves him into fifth place at Penn State in the career total offense chart. Hackenberg passed Kerry Collins (5,300 yards).
- TE Jesse James has caught at least one pass in 17 consecutive games.
