CONSISTENCY COUNTS

Jake Lewis has served as not only the Vikings' top offensive weapon thus far this season, but also the team's most consistent performer. He is the only Viking to score in seven of the team's first nine games. Lewis is also the only Viking to contribute multiple points in eight or more contests. He owns four goals and five assists in his past three games and tops the team in all scoring categories.

.m. DANNY BOY

.m. Midfielder Danny Tesler has picked up where he left off upon returning from injury March 11 at Ohio State. Tesler has won 62% of his faceoffs this year and leads the team with 36 ground balls. He has scored eight goals while shooting at a 38% clip. Tesler is riding a seven-game point streak and is fifth nationally in ground balls per game among freshmen. He has won 24 of his past 35 faceoffs.

WHAT HAPPENS WITH WENDEL

After scoring the first goal in program history and notching three points in the first two games, midfielder Nick Wendel suffered an injury and did not tally a point in the next four games. Wendel has eight points in three games in the month of March, including the first two hat tricks of his career.

SCHEDULE STRENGTH

No matter which metric you use, Cleveland State has faced one of the toughest schedules in D1 this season. The NCAA ranks CSU's slate as the toughest so far with its opponents a combined 30-12. Meanwhile, using analytic-based statistics, Patrick McEwen of Inside Lacrosse has CSU with the second-hardest schedule.

THE YOUNG AND THE RESTLESS

While it is expected that a first-year program would have a large group of freshmen, head coach Dylan Sheridan has gone further than recent startup programs. Sheridan has expressed a desire to have his first team consist mainly of freshmen that were all going through the same new experiences at the same time. Thirty four of the 37 Vikings on the opening-day roster were true freshmen. Of the more than a dozen programs to begin Division I men's lacrosse within the past decade, Cleveland State had the highest percentage of freshmen on its roster at 91.9%. On the other side of the coin, half of the recent startups had fewer than 70% of their inaugural roster composed of freshmen.

NOT THE ONLY 'FIRST'

Cleveland State's inaugural season is not the only new lacrosse development in Ohio this spring. For the first time, the Ohio High School Athletic Association, the primary governing body for interscholastic athletics in Ohio, is sponsoring boys and girls lacrosse. The Board of Directors of the OHSAA voted unanimously to add lacrosse in the summer of 2015. It is the first time the organization has added sports since 2006-07. The season began March 17, and four state title games, two per gender, will take place June 3.

CAPTAINING THIS SHIP

With his program in its inaugural season, head coach Dylan Sheridan has elected to rotate the team captain duties on a game-by-game basis.

STUDENT-ATHLETES

Although Cleveland State did not play any official games this past fall, the program still put up some impressive numbers. The Vikings posted a 3.19 grade point average in their inaugural semester as a program. Freshman Logan Bradford, a civil engineering major, posted the first 4.0 semester average in team history.

NOT BRAND NEW TO HIM

The first regular-season game for Cleveland State University also represented the collegiate head coaching debut of Dylan Sheridan. However, this was not the first time Sheridan has served as a head coach on a big stage. The Ohio native was the head coach for Thailand during the 2014 World Lacrosse Championships. Despite the Asian nation participating in the World Championships for the first time, Sheridan led his squad to four wins in the event, tied for the second-highest figure among the nine nations competing for the first time.

VIKING VOLUNTEERS

One of the first things that head coach Dylan Sheridan did when the team arrived on campus in the fall was to get the players involved in the community. The Vikings spent multiple days in the fall working with the Habitat for Humanity Organization. The team also helped at a St. Jude Walk/Run to End Childhood Cancer and gave a clinic to Ohio City Lacrosse immediately after its fall exhibition.

TOUGH SLEDDING

Head coach Dylan Sheridan did not shy away from anyone in putting together his inaugural schedule. Cleveland State was scheduled to face seven teams that were ranked in the preseason USILA poll in its 15 regular-season games. All seven of those games were to occur away from home. No startup program within the past decade has played more than five top-20 teams in its inaugural season, based on the final RPI rankings. CSU will face three programs that have won a national title in the past six years. The Vikings had a five-game road trip scheduled to begin in March in which every team they were to face earned preseason votes nationally.

START ME UP - THE BIRTH OF A PROGRAM

March 30, 2015

Cleveland State University announces it will establish a varsity men's lacrosse program that will begin competing in the 2016-17 academic year. The addition came as a result of a program prioritization process led by CSU Athletics Director John Parry.

June 30, 2015

Dylan Sheridan is named the program's first head coach. Sheridan, a northeast Ohio native, was the top assistant at Princeton before accepting the position at CSU and also served as an assistant at Denver for four seasons.

July 27, 2015

Andy German is named the program's first assistant coach. German was most recently the head coach at St. Joseph's Prep in Philadelphia and was previously an assistant at Villanova for four seasons.

November 11, 2015

The first prospective student-athletes formally commit to Cleveland State. Seventeen students join the program on the first day while a total of 34 commit within the next week.

April 11, 2016

Cleveland State and Warrior Sports announce a multi-year partnership in which Warrior will serve as the Vikings' official equipment provider.

June 8, 2016

Fresh off leading Maryland to an appearance in the national championship game, Kyle Bernlohr is named an assistant coach. The Northeast Ohio native earned first team All-America honors with the Terrapins.

August 8, 2016

Cleveland State and UN1TUS announce a multi-year partnership in which UN1TUS will serve as the Vikings' official apparel provider.

August 23, 2016

In conjunction with season tickets going on sale for the inaugural season, Cleveland State announces its first-ever game will be a home contest against Michigan.

September 8, 2016

Cleveland State holds its first official practice.

September 29, 2016

The program holds a Green-White scrimmage during the University's Homecoming week that doubles as the first chance for the community to see the new program in action.

October 23, 2016

Cleveland State hosts Bellarmine in an exhibition to end its fall season. It marks the first time the Vikings face an outside foe in any format.

October 28, 2016

Sheridan announces the program's inaugural schedule live on Lax Sports Network. The slate features three teams that have won national titles in the past six years.

January 16, 2017

Cleveland State has its first practice in conjunction with the spring season.

January 25, 2017

Lax Sports Network announces it will produce and broadcast the inaugural game in program history.

February 4, 2017

Cleveland State hosts Michigan in its first regular-season game. Nick Wendel scores the game's opening goal in front of a sell-out crowd in a 13-8 setback.

February 12, 2017

Cleveland State plays its first road game in program history at Duke. It doubles as the program's first contest against a nationally ranked team, with Duke being ranked No. 7/10.

February 18, 2017

Cleveland State collects its first victory in program history, a 9-2 win at home over Baldwin Wallace. The Vikings scored five goals in the first 12 minutes en route to the win.

February 25, 2017

Cleveland State plays at Denver as part of the Faceoff Classic, the first time the program plays a No. 1 ranked team. The Vikings led early, 3-1, before falling to the Pioneers.

March 11, 2017

Cleveland State plays at Ohio State in the first-ever game between two Division I teams from the state of Ohio.

March 16, 2017

Cleveland State collects the first road win in program history, an 18-10 triumph at Wittenberg. The Vikings scored nine third-quarter goals in the win.

HEAD COACH DYLAN SHERIDAN



Dylan Sheridan was named the inaugural head coach of the Cleveland State men's lacrosse program on June 30, 2015.

Sheridan started the CSU program after spending the previous year as the defensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Princeton where he was responsible for the training and coaching of the defense, clearing and faceoff units.

Sheridan helped lead the Tigers to a share of the regular season Ivy League title and a top-20 mark in the final RPI rankings. Under his direction, Princeton was among the top 10 teams nationally in clearing percentage with an .889 mark.

Prior to arriving at Princeton, Sheridan spent four years at the University of Denver, helping the Pioneers to NCAA semifinal appearances in 2011, 2013 and 2014. Denver also won three regular-season conference championships in four years with Sheridan, twice winning the ECAC and also claiming a BIG EAST crown.

Sheridan also helped the program reset its single-season wins record in two of his four years in the Centennial State.

Sheridan first worked with the face off unit before becoming the defensive coordinator and the recruiting coordinator for head coach Bill Tierney. The 2014 Denver defense, led by Sheridan, was the top-ranked defense in the Big East and the 10th-ranked defense in Division I, allowing just 8.47 goals per game. Sheridan was promoted to assistant coach at Denver prior to the 2012 season. Sheridan's faceoff unit finished fifth nationally in success rate that season, winning over 59 percent of their faceoffs, en route to a berth in the NCAA Quarterfinals. He helped Chase Carraro to USILA All-America honors, the first-ever All-America honor at a specialist position for Denver. In total, Denver claimed 16 All-America honors during his four years on staff.

Sheridan joined the Denver staff prior to the 2011 season as a volunteer assistant coach. He helped the 2011 team to a then programrecord 15 wins and an unbeaten conference mark. His faceoff unit finished 15th nationally in winning percentage after ranking 36th the year prior to his arrival.

Away from the NCAA level, Sheridan served as the head coach of the Thailand National Team at the 2014 World Championships. Despite it being the nation's first appearance in the world event, Sheridan led the team to four wins during the competition.

Sheridan was a member of the club lacrosse team at Claremont McKenna, serving as team captain three times. He earned Men's Collegiate Lacrosse Association All-America honors three times and was the Western Collegiate Lacrosse League Offensive Player of the Year as a senior when he led the MCLA with over 100 points. Sheridan, who finished his collegiate career with over 300 points, was a three-time All-WCLL selection. He helped the program climb from an unranked club to the No. 1 ranked team in the MCLA. In addition to lacrosse, Sheridan was also a four-year member of the football team at Claremont McKenna.

Sheridan played professionally for three years with the Denver Outlaws, winning the Major League Lacrosse Championship in 2014.

Sheridan began his college coaching career at Pfeiffer University in 2008 as an assistant coach and offensive coordinator. He also coached at Lebanon Valley College as an assistant in 2010.

Sheridan graduated from Western Reserve Academy in Hudson, Ohio, fewer than 25 miles from downtown Cleveland. He helped the Pioneers to three Ohio high school state championship games, including the 2001 title, the only lacrosse state title in school history.

Sheridan graduated from Claremont McKenna in 2006 as a double major in psychology and film studies. His wife, Brianne, played lacrosse at both Loyola and Colgate and has held multiple collegiate and high school coaching jobs in women's lacrosse. The couple live in the western suburbs of Cleveland.

ASSISTANT COACHES



Andy German was named the first assistant coach of the Cleveland State men's lacrosse program in July of 2015.

German spent the 2015 season as the head coach at St. Joseph's Prep in Philadelphia where he led the squad to the Catholic League championship and a berth in the PIAA boys' lacrosse championship. He mentored 11 players to the All-Catholic team, including seven who earned first team accolades.

German was an assistant coach at Villanova for four years (2010-14), serving as an offensive assistant coach and recruiting coordinator for the first three years and the Defensive Coordinator for the final two years.

In 2011, German helped the Wildcats to a No. 7 ranking as Villanova earned its first-ever at-large berth to the NCAA Tournament. The following season, he helped Villanova to new heights after the team was ranked well inside the top-20 for all 16 weeks during the regular season.

In 2013, German helped lead the Wildcats to the Big East regular season title and No. 1 overall seed for the Big East Tournament where the Wildcats fell to eventual NCAA runner-up Syracuse in the title game.

Prior to his stint at Villanova, German was the offensive and recruiting coordinator at Susquehanna for two seasons. He has also served as the assistant coach of the Thailand National Team, coaching the squad in the 2014 World Championships near Denver.

German attended Alfred University for two years before transferring to Villanova for the 2006 season. At Villanova, he developed into a captain and two-year starter as a midfielder. He graduated from Villanova in 2008 with a Bachelor of Arts in political science.



Kyle Bernlohr, a Northeast Ohio native who was a standout goalie at Maryland, is in his first season as an assistant lacrosse coach at Cleveland State.

Bernlohr was one of the top goalies in the country over the last two seasons, setting program records for single season victories in 2015 (15) and 2016 (17). A member of four NCAA Final Four teams, he helped the Terrapins to three NCAA Championship game appearances in five seasons.

After redshirting in 2012 and playing in 13 games over his first two seasons, Bernlohr emerged as a junior in 2015, starting all 19 games and earning the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr. Award, which is given to the National Goalie of the Year. A first team All-America (USILA) and All-Big Team honoree, he led the country in goals against average (6.95) and was sixth in save percentage (.571).

As a senior, Bernlohr started all 20 games and ranked ninth in the country in goals against average (8.25), helping Maryland to its second straight national runner-up finish. He was once again named to the first

team All-Big Ten and was a second team All-America pick by USILA. Bernlohr was a Tewaaraton Award Nominee in each of his final two seasons.

Bernlohr was selected with the 11th overall pick in the second round of the 2016 MLL Draft by the Ohio Machine, becoming the highest drafted goalkeeper in Maryland history.

A native of Akron, Ohio, Bernlohr was a four-year letterwinner at Western Reserve Academy, earning first team all-league honors three times. He set the Western Reserve single-game saves record with 27 against Landon in 2010 and was named to the 2009 Under Armour Underclassmen Midwest team.

Bernlohr graduated from Maryland in the spring of 2016.

Head coach Dylan Sheridan announced the addition of Gary Cintron as a volunteer assistant coach prior to the program's inaugural season.

After attending college, Cintron moved to the Cleveland area where he was a founding member of the Rocky River youth and high school lacrosse programs. Cintron has coached youth, high school and travel lacrosse for the past 17 years and has been an integral part of the growth of the sport in northeast Ohio.

Cintron played lacrosse collegiately for Ohio University, competing in the Men's Collegiate Lacrosse Association (MCLA).

Cintron is a business owner in the Cleveland suburb of Rocky River. A native of Long Island, Cintron lives with his wife, Erin, and their children, Maddison, Crew and Blade.

ANY GIVEN SATURDAY

With its second month of action almost complete, six Vikings have started every game thus far. Tristen Copeland has started every game on attack, Quinn Lemke has suited up each contest on defense and Caleb Espinoza has been between the pipes every game. Noah Gleeson, Jake Lewis and Stephen Masi have started every game either on attack or in the midfield.

DOUBLE DIGITS

Caleb Espinoza has been racking up saves in Cleveland State's recent games. The rookie has hit double figures in stops in each of the past five games and is one of six DI goaltenders to have at least 100 saves in 2017.

MAN DOWN

Cleveland State has killed off eight consecutive EMO chances for its opponent and 13 of the last 17 it has faced over its past six games.

MAN DOWN DOWN

In each of its past two games, Cleveland State has been faced with the unenviable task of playing down two men due to concurrent penalties. However, both times the Vikings were able to successfully kill off the 4-on-6 without allowing a goal.

THREE TIMES THREE IN THIRD

In its win over Wittenberg last time out, Cleveland State scored half of its goals, nine of the 18, in the third quarter. The Viking scored five goals in the final 5:07 of the frame to tally a season best for goals in a quarter. The nine goals were scored by eight different Vikings.

ON THE OFFENSIVE

Tristen Copeland already had a pair of four-goal games to his credit, but he produced a four-assist performance last time out. He became the first Viking with four helpers and the second with a five-point game.

COMPOSED IN CLEVELAND

Through the first nine games, the Vikings have accrued 22:30 in penalties, seven minutes fewer than their opponents. Cleveland State has had fewer penalty minutes than its opponent in six games thus far.

FLIPPING THE SCRPT

CLEVELAND STATE Through its first seven games, Cleveland State scored 39 of its 54 goals in the first half. However, the Vikings have flipped that narrative on its head recently, as CSU has scored 15 of 22 goals in the second half over the past two games.

FROM HERE AND EVERYWHERE

The 10 players in the starting lineup for Cleveland State's first two games of the season went to high school in eight states, ranging from upstate New York to Las Vegas to North Carolina to the Seattle area.

SHIFTING SCHEDULE

Cleveland State had been scheduled to play at nationally ranked Hofstra and Fairfield on back-toback days over Spring Break. However, those contests were cancelled due to weather in the northeast U.S. With the Vikings looking at going two weeks without playing, head coach Dylan Sheridan added a contest at Wittenberg.

HOMETOWN HERO

Playing fewer than 60 miles from where he went to high school, Caleb Espinoza had a performance to remember in Cleveland State's contest at No. 1 Denver, as the rookie made 19 saves. Only two DI goaltenders have made more than 19 saves in a game this season.

LUCKY SEVEN

Seven different Vikings found the back of the net in the season opener against Michigan. None of the 13 Division I startups within the past decade had more than seven distinct goal-scorers in its inaugural game. Richmond was the only one to match CSU's total.

DOUBLED UP

With the addition of Cleveland State, the number of Division I men's lacrosse teams in Ohio doubled from one to two with the Vikings joining Ohio State. Cleveland State faced off with the Buckeyes in the inaugural Battle of Ohio March 11.

HOW LONG?

The University announced that lacrosse would be added to the intercollegiate athletics program March 30, 2015. It was 677 days from that announcement to the program's first regular-season game.

ONE AND ONLY

While the NCAA men's lacrosse ranks have grown rapidly in recent years, Cleveland State is the only addition to the club this season. The Vikings are the 71st institution currently sponsoring men's lacrosse at the Division I level. In three of the past four years, more than one program was playing its inaugural DI season.
