### NITTANY LIONS HOST UCF IN BATTLE OF UNBEATENS

Penn State will look to move its winning streak to five games when the Nittany Lions host undefeated UCF in Beaver Stadium for a 6 p.m. kickoff on Saturday. The Nittany Lions defeated Indiana and Wisconsin to close the 2012 season and have opened 2013 with victories over Syracuse and Eastern Michigan.

In the home opener, Penn State held Eastern Michigan to 183 yards of total offense, the fewest yards allowed against an FBS opponent since holding Minnesota to 138 yards in 2009. Eastern Michigan's only points came on a defensive touchdown. The Nittany Lions held Eastern Michigan to just 44 yards and two first downs on 24 plays in the second half, including five three-and-outs, one four play drive and one five play drive.

Linebacker Glenn Carson's 10 tackles led all players and defensive tackle DaQuan Jones added nine tackles, with two tackles for loss, to tie the career-high he set in the season opening win over Syracuse.

The triple threat running attack of Bill Belton (108 yds, 2 TD), Akeel Lynch (108 yds, 1 TD) and Zach Zwinak (43 yds, 2 TD) led the way to 251 total rushing yards. Belton and Lynch's 100-yard efforts marked the first time since the 2010 Northwestern game that Penn State had a pair of 100-yard rushers in the same game.

Christian Hackenberg threw for a Penn State freshman record 311 yards on 23 of 33 passing with one touchdown, finding nine different receivers on the day. Allen Robinson hauled in seven receptions for 129 yards, including a 45-yard touchdown catch, for his second consecutive 100-yard receiving game and fourth career.

UCF has scored 38 points in each of its first two games and is coming off of a 38-0 thumping of FIU. Running back Storm Johnson has 229 all-purpose yards (188 rush) and five of the team's 10 touchdowns.

# LAST GAME RECAP

## NITTANY LIONS SOAR PAST EAGLES, 45-7

**UNIVERSITY PARK, Pa., Sept. 7, 2013** -- Penn State used a balanced offensive attack and superb defense to post a 45-7 win over Eastern Michigan at Beaver Stadium. With the undefeated 1973 team and Heisman Trophy winner John Cappelletti in attendance, the Nittany Lions had a pair of 100-yard rushers against the Eagles in Bill Belton and Akeel Lynch.

At half, it was announced that Cappelletti's iconic No. 22 would be retired at the end of the career of redshirt freshman running back Akeel Lynch, who wears No. 22.

The Penn State defense was stellar, allowing just 183 total yards, the fewest yards by an FBS opponent since holding Minnesota to 138 in 2009. Glenn Carson registered 10 tackles with a half-sack. DaQuan Jones tied his career-high with nine tackles for the second consecutive game, recording two tackles for a loss and a sack.

After allowing a 10-play, 50-yard drive to open the second quarter, the Nittany Lion defense did not allow a drive of more than 24 yards for the remainder of the day. Penn State ended strong, registering five three-and-outs over the last seven times the defense took the field. The Eagles gained 44 yards on 24 plays in the second half with two first downs.

The rushing tandem of Belton and Lynch marked the first time since 2010 that Penn State has had a pair of 100-yard rushers in a game when Evan Royster (134) and Sias Redd (131) accomplished the feat against Northwestern. Belton carried the ball nine times en route to 108 yards and a pair of touchdowns. His 51-yard touchdown rush in the was the longest run by a Nittany Lion since Evan Royster dashed for a 69-yard touchdown at Northwestern in 2009.

Lynch, who had his first collegiate carries against the Eagles, also ran for 108 yards and a touchdown, the first of his career. Additionally, Zach Zwinak ran for 43 yards and a pair of scores as the Nittany Lions ran for 251 yards.

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg broke the Penn State freshman single-game passing yardage record, going 23 for 33 for 311 yards with one touchdown and one interception. He found nine different receivers, but his favorite target was Allen Robinson, who had seven catches for 129 yards and a touchdown. Hackenberg's first three career touchdown passes have all been 45 yards or longer.

With his touchdown reception, Robinson moved into a tie for eighth on Penn State career receiving TDs list with Jordan Norwood with 13. It is the fourth 100-yard performance of Robinson's career and his second of the season. This is the second-straight week that Hackenberg and Robinson have combined for more than 100 yards.

With 4:01 remaining in the first quarter, Eastern Michigan's Matt Hunter scooped up a Hackenberg fumble and returned it 11 yards to give the Eagles a 7-0 lead. On the ensuing possession, Penn State responded in strong fashion. After two short runs by Zwinak and a nine-yard gain on a pass from Hackenberg to Robinson, the pair hooked up again on a diving 43-yard grab. Zwinak churned out a two-yard touchdown run to even the game.

The Nittany Lions put together a solid drive that was capped off by the five-yard run by Belton to make it a 14-7 Penn State lead less than a minute into the second quarter.

The Nittany Lions took over on their own 12-yard line with 2:12 remaining in the second quarter and put together a drive that saw Hackenberg find four different receivers as he went 5-for-6 for 67 yards. Sam Ficken connected on a 39-yard field goal to extend his consecutive field goals made streak to 14 games, breaking the school record set by Craig Fayak during the 1992 season.

Midway through the third quarter, the Nittany Lions started on the EMU 33 and were able to use a 15-yard run by Hackenberg and a 20-yard run by Zwinak to key the drive that ended with Zwinak's seven-yard scamper for his second touchdown of the game and a 24-7 lead with 2:09 left in the third.

Following a 19-yard reception by Jesse James, Belton found paydirt with a 51-yard touchdown run to make it 38-7 with less than 10 minutes to play. On the Lions' next offensive series, Lynch was again the centerpiece with 65 yards on five carries, capped by an 18-yard touchdown run, the first of his career.

### SERIES NOTES

Penn State owns a 2-0 on-field record vs. UCF. The Nittany Lions met the Knights in 2002, claiming a 27-24 win, and registered a 37-13 victory in 2004.

The Nittany Lions held UCF to 181 yards of total offense in 2004 and posted 524 yards on offense to claim the 37-13 win at Beaver Stadium. Zack Mills threw for 229 yards and one touchdown, while Tony Hunt ran for 125 yards and three scores in the game.

Dan Connor, Paul Posluszny and Matthew Rice tied for the team-high with seven tackles and all contributed 0.5 sacks. Connor also grabbed an interception in the game.

### UCF HEAD COACH GEORGE O'LEARY

George O'Leary is in his 17th season as a head coach and his 10th season as the leader of the UCF program. He owns a career record of 114-88 and is 62-55 as head coach of the Knights.

O'Leary was the head coach at Georgia Tech from 1994-2001, where he led the Yellow Jackets to five straight bowl game appearances. He took the head job at UCF in 2004.

He helped Tech earn the Atlantic Coast Conference Championship in 1998 and has guided UCF to the Conference USA East Division Championship four times. The Knights won the Conference USA Championship Game twice (2007, 2010) before UCF joined the American Athletic Conference this season.

### SCOUTING THE KNIGHTS

UCF has scored 38 points in each of its first two games, defeating Akron, 38-7, at home in the season opener and thumping FIU, 38-0, last week on the road.

The Knights' offense has moved the ball well, averaging 433 yards. The running game is netting 161 yards per game and their passing attacking averages 272 yards a game. Of UCF's 10 touchdowns, six have come on the ground and four have come through the air.

Running back Storm Johnson has rushed for 188 yards, has four catches for 41 yards and has five of the team's 10 touchdowns. William Stanback has run for 93 yards in two games.

Redshirt junior quarterback Blake Bortles is off to a great start, completing 30 of 43 passes for 528 yards in a pair of starts, throwing four touchdown passes and no interceptions.

Sophomore wideout Breshad Perriman has the team's longest scoring play of the season with a 91-yard touchdown catch on the second play of the season. Perriman has 125 total receiving yards, second on the team behind Rannell Hall's 181 yards.

The offense has yet to turn the ball over and the defense has forced three turnovers (1 INT, 2 FR) in the first two wins.

The defense has allowed just 211.0 yards per game and has permitted only one touchdown, a fourth quarter score by Akron.

Defensive end Deion Green leads the team with two sacks, while linebacker Terrance Plummer has amassed 17 tackles, including a team-best 3.0 TFL. Linebacker Troy Gray has the team's interception and a fumble recovery to go along with 11 tackles.

### LAST GAME: UCF BLANKS FIU

UCF thumped Florida International, 38-0, in its first road game of the season on Sept. 6. The Knights scored seven points in the first quarter, 17 in the second period and 14 in the third quarter.

UCF outgained FIU in total yards, 390-173. It was the first time since 2011 that UCF held an opponent to less than 200 yards (Memphis; 134 yds).

Junior quarterback Blake Bortles threw for 214 yards in the win, connecting with J.J. Worton for a touchdown strike. Bortles has at least one touchdown pass in each of his last 10 games.

Storm Johnson rushed for 89 yards and three scores, while Bortles also rushed for a touchdown. Wideout Rannell Hall made four catches for 127 yards in the win.

Terrance Plummer piled up seven tackles, all solo, to lead a defense that combined for seven TFL and two sacks and a recovered fumble vs. the Panthers.

### PENN STATE VS. AAC

The American Athletic Conference is in its first year of competition, but Penn State has a long history vs. the teams in the conference.

The Nittany Lions own a 76-7-2 on-field mark against the current football alignment of the AAC.

Penn State has played 10 of the 12 teams in the American, with longtime rivals Rutgers, who joins the Big Ten in 2014, and Temple among the group.

The last meeting with an AAC team came when Penn State toppled Temple, 24-13, in 2012.

- Bill O'Brien worked with UCF head coach George O'Leary for seven years at Georgia Tech and is one of several ties between the Penn State staff and O'Leary.

O'Brien was a member of O'Leary's staff from 1995-2001 and they helped the Yellow Jackets capture the 1998 Atlantic Coast Conference championship and win three bowl games. O'Leary hired O'Brien as a graduate assistant coach in 1995 and in 1998 he began a three-year run as Tech's running backs coach. In 2001, O'Leary's final year in Atlanta, O'Brien was promoted to offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach.

- Penn State assistant head coach/wide receivers coach Stan Hixon (1995-99) and offensive line coach Mac McWhorter (2000-01) also coached with O'Leary and O'Brien at Georgia Tech. McWhorter was Tech's interim head coach for its 2001 Seattle Bowl victory over Stanford.

- Jim Bernhardt, Penn State Special Assistant to the Head Coach and Director of Player of Development, was a member of O'Leary's UCF staff from 2004-07, helping the Knights to their first Conference USA Championship game and bowl berth.

### LAST MEETING

UCF posted the only points of the first quarter and led, 3-0, before Penn State scored 21 straight points to take control of the game and eventually post a 37-13 victory on Sept. 18, 2004 inside Beaver Stadium.

Zach Mills threw for 229 yards and a touchdown, but Tony Hunt carried the load with 16 carries for 125 yards and three touchdowns. John Bronson caught the one-yard touchdown pass from Mills in the second quarter and Mike Gasparato ran for a 22-yard touchdown late in the fourth quarter.

Dan Connor, Paul Posluszny and Matthew Rice tied for the team-high with seven tackles and all contributed 0.5 sacks. Connor also grabbed an interception.

## NEARLY THIRTY LIONS ON NFL ROSTERS

Twenty-six former Penn State players were on the rosters of 18 National Football League teams during NFL Kickoff Week, the second-highest total in the Big Ten Conference. The Nittany Lions annually are among the top 20 programs nationally in producing players in the NFL.

The Oakland Raiders feature a league-high three former Nittany Lions on their roster, including third-year starting center/guard Stefan Wisniewski, second-year defensive end Jack Crawford and rookie quarterback Matt McGloin, who made the team as a free agent. Six additional NFL squads boast two former Nittany Lions on their opening week rosters: Atlanta, Jacksonville, Miami, Minnesota, San Diego and San Francisco.

Four seniors from Penn State's 2012 squad made NFL teams: Jordan Hill (Seattle), Gerald Hodges (Minnesota), Michael Mauti (Minnesota) and McGloin (Oakland).

Among the other Nittany Lions who made the active roster of new teams this season were: Brett Brackett (Jacksonville), Dan Connor (New York Giants), Derek Moye (Pittsburgh), Rich Ohrnberger (San Diego), A.Q. Shipley (Baltimore) and Nate Stupar (San Francisco).

Chicago Bears All-Pro placekicker Robbie Gould is the elder statesman among former Nittany Lions, in his ninth season, and Kansas City Chiefs All-Pro linebacker Tamba Hali is second in longevity, in his eighth season. Offensive tackle Levi Brown (Arizona) and linebacker Paul Posluszny (Jacksonville) are in their seventh professional seasons.

A total of 332 Nittany Lions have been selected all-time in the NFL Draft, including 36

in the first round. Thirty-three Penn State football student-athletes have been drafted since 2006, including 15 in the first three rounds.

Penn State has had at least one alumnus on a Super Bowl team in 42 of 47 title games, including last season when All-Pro linebacker NaVorro Bowman helped the San Francisco 49ers reach Super Bowl XLVII. Thirty-five former Nittany Lions have earned a total of 51 Super Bowl rings.

### FIVE FORMER NITTANY LIONS ON NFL COACHING STAFFS

Five former Nittany Lions are patrolling the sidelines as part of NFL coaching staffs in 2013, including Mike Munchak, the third-year head coach of the Tennessee Titans.

The list of Penn State who are NFL assistant coaches includes: Gary Brown (Dallas Cowboys), John McNulty (Arizona Cardinals), Jeff Nixon (Miami Dolphins) and Darren Perry (Green Bay Packers).

Former Penn State assistant coach Greg Schiano (1991-95) is in his second season as head coach of the Tampa Bay Buccaneers and former Nittany Lion assistant coach Jim Caldwell (1986-92) is in his second year as the offensive coordinator for the Super Bowl champion Baltimore Ravens after serving as head coach of the Indianapolis Colts.

### HEAD COACH BILL O'BRIEN

Bill O'Brien owns a 10-4 record in his second season as the leader of the Penn State football program. He was named the 15th head coach of the Nittany Lions all-time on January 6, 2012.

During the 2012 season, O'Brien led the Penn State to wins in eight of its final 10 games and earned numerous accolades. He was selected the 2012 Bear Bryant, Maxwell Football Club and ESPN Coach of the Year, as well as the Big Ten-Dave McClain Coach of the Year.

O'Brien was the offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach with the New England Patriots during the 2011 season, helping the Patriots to their second Super Bowl during his five years on the coaching staff.

Like his predecessor, Hall of Fame coach Joe Paterno, O'Brien graduated from Brown University, where he played linebacker and defensive end from 1990-92. O'Brien coached at Brown (1993-94), Georgia Tech (1995-2002), Maryland (2003-04) and Duke (2005-06) before joining the Patriots' staff in 2007.

O'Brien is from Andover, Mass., a Boston suburb. He and his wife, Colleen, have two sons, Jack and Michael.

### O'BRIEN EARNS TRIO OF NATIONAL COACH OF THE YEAR HONORS; NAMED BIG TEN COY

When you think about the challenges that occurred during Bill O'Brien's first season at the helm of the Nittany Lions the distinction of Coach of the Year might not be saying enough.

His on-field and off-field resume garnered the first year head coach to the Big Ten Dave McClain Coach of the Year award and a trio of National Coach of the Year accolades.

O'Brien was the Bear Bryant, Maxwell Football Club and ESPN National Coach of the Year after leading Penn State to an 8-4 overall mark and a 6-2 record in the big Ten, finishing second in the Leaders Division. The Nittany Lions won eight of their final 10 games, capped by a Senior Day overtime win over Wisconsin, the eventual Big Ten champion.

O'Brien's eight wins in 2012 were the most by a first-year Penn State head coach.

### FOUR NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIP COACHES

Four members of the Penn State coaching staff have been members of national championship staffs, including a pair of Bowl Championship Series titles:

### COACHING STAFF CONNECTIONS

When Bill O'Brien was hired he began to compile a staff of people in which he had a prior connection with.

In all, seven coaches on O'Brien's staff have previously worked with at least one other member of the 2013 Nittany Lion coaching staff prior to this season. Among some of the coaching staff ties:

- O'Brien worked with Stan Hixon and Mac McWhorter at Georgia Tech during O'Brien's eight-year tenure on the Yellow Jackets' staff (1995-2002);
- O'Brien worked with Charles London and John Strollo at Duke in 2005-06;

- O'Brien also worked with Craig Fitzgerald, Director of Strength and Conditioning for Football, in 2003-04 when they were on the staff at Maryland;

- John Butler worked with Craig Fitzgerald at Harvard in 2005-06 and at South Carolina in 2011, helping the Gamecocks to 11 wins and their first-ever top 10 finish;

- Larry Johnson and Ron Vanderlinden have worked together as Penn State assistant coaches on the defensive side of the ball since 2001.

### O'BRIEN IN ELITE COMPANY AMONG BIG TEN FIRST-YEAR COACHES

When Penn State won its third straight Big Ten road game at Purdue on Nov. 3, 2012, head coach Bill O'Brien etched his name into some elite company in Big Ten history.

By defeating Illinois, Iowa and Purdue away from Beaver Stadium last season, O'Brien became just the fifth Big Ten coach since 1950 to win his first three road games, joining: Jim Valek (Illinois, 1967), Earle Bruce (Ohio St., 1979), Hayden Fry (Iowa, 1979) and Urban Meyer (Ohio St., 2012).

UCF GAME NOTES

COINTOSS COMMEMORATES CROKE PARK CLASSIC

Officials from Ireland's Gaelic Athletic Association (GAA) and Croke Park Stadium are attending the UCF game to continue the planning for the Croke Park Classic between Penn State and UCF. The first international contest for both teams will take place on August 30, 2014 at Croke Park Stadium in Dublin.

Among the dignitaries visiting Happy Valley are Páiraic Duffy, GAA Director General and Dan Rooney, the Pittsburgh Steelers' team chairman and former U.S. Ambassador to Ireland. Duffy and Rooney will participate in the coin toss.

The winning team in the Croke Park Classic will earn the Dan Rooney Trophy. The Dan Rooney Trophy is a replica football made of bog yew and Pittsburgh steel. The yew comes from what remains of forests which grew six to seven thousand years ago and lie deep in the Irish midlands.

The steel is from Heinz Field, home of the National Football League's Pittsburgh Steelers.

PENN STATE VS. THE STATE OF FLORIDA

The Nittany Lions have faced off with six different schools from the Sunshine State and own an on-field record of 12-10-1.

Head coach Rip Engle took his 1961 Penn State squad to Miami (Fla.) for the program's first ever meeting with a team from the state of Florida. The Lions dropped a 25-8 decision that day to the Hurricanes.

The Nittany Lions have also played 20 bowl games in the state of Florida, owning a 10-9-1 record. They have competed in the Blockbuster Bowl (2), Citrus Bowl/Capital One Bowl (5), Gator Bowl (4), Orange Bowl (5) and Outback Bowl (4).

DEFENSE AMONG NCAA LEADERS

After limiting Eastern Michigan to just 183 total yards, Penn State's defensive unit finds itself among the top-10 in the NCAA in total defense and rushing defense after two weeks.

The Lions rank 10th in the NCAA and third in the Big Ten with 221.5 total yards allowed per game through two games, while ranking eighth in the NCAA and second in the Big Ten with 66.0 rushing yards allowed per game.

Penn State allowed 71 rushing yards to Syracuse, more than 100-yards less than their 2012 average, and limited Eastern Michigan to just 61 rushing yards a week after the Eagles gained 170 yards on the ground against Howard.

The Blue and White are also among the NCAA leaders in first downs allowed (T11th; 22), defensive passing efficiency (16th; 86.3), scoring defense (T20th; 12.0 ppg), passing yards allowed (24th; 156.0 pypg), sacks (T32nd; 2.5 spg) and tackles for loss (T38th; 7.0 tflpg).

ROBINSON TOPS B1G RECEIVING CHARTS

Allen Robinson is in a familiar spot just two weeks into the season; atop the Big Ten receiving charts. The junior is tied atop the receptions chart 14 (7.0 rpg) and his 131.0 yards per game are tops in the conference.

A candidate for the Biletnikoff Award, Robinson has made seven catches, accounted for one touchdown catch and amassed more than 100 yards receiving in each of the first two games. He piled up 133 yards on seven grabs with a 51-yard catch and run vs. Syracuse in the season opener and yielded 129 yards on seven catches with a 45-yard touchdown reception against Eastern Michigan.

The 2012 Richter-Howard Big Ten Receiver of the Year became the first Nittany Lion with consecutive 100-yard receiving games since Jordan Norwood did so vs. Oregon State and Syracuse in 2008.

FICKEN EXTENDS FIELD GOAL STREAK TO 14; SETS CONSECUTIVE MAKES RECORD

After making his final 10 kicks of the 2012 campaign, Sam Ficken moved his consecutive field goals made streak to 13 with a 3-of-3 effort against Syracuse in the season opener to earn Big Ten Specialist of the Week honors for the second time.

In last week's 45-7 win over Eastern Michigan, Ficken lined up for 39-yarder with 17 seconds left in the second quarter and split the uprights to break the Penn State record with his 14th consecutive field goal made.

Ficken broke a tie with Craig Fayak, who made 13 consecutive field goals in 1992, and is one field goal away from becoming the 15th Penn State placekicker to make 20-plus field goals in a career.

HACKENBERG OFF TO STRONG START

True freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg has been a quickly grasped Bill O'Brien's diverse and dynamic offense. He has completed 45-of-64 passes (70.3 percent), amassed 589 passing yards and thrown three touchdowns in his first two career starts. All three scoring strikes have been 45 yards or longer.

Hackenberg has quickly moved among the top signal callers in the Big Ten and in the NCAA. He ranks second in the conference and 21st in the NCAA in passing yards per game (294.5) and is second in the Big Ten and 23rd in the nation in completions per game (22.5).

Hackenberg broke the Penn State single game record for passing yards by a freshman when he threw for 311 yards against Eastern Michigan last week. His yardage total against EMU was the 17th highest single-game total

in the Penn State annals and the 21st 300-yard passing game at Penn State.

Hackenberg topped Zack Mills' freshman yardage mark of 280 yards, which Mills accomplished against Ohio State and Southern Miss in 2001. His 278 yards in the Aug. 31 win over Syracuse rank No. 4 among Penn State freshmen and he earned his first Big Ten Freshman of the Week honor after the win in MetLife Stadium.

**EIGHT TRUE FRESHMEN HAVE MADE DEBUTS**

Eight true freshmen have made their Penn State debuts in the first two games of the season.

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg has started both games, while tight end Adam Breneman earned his first start in the win over Eastern Michigan. Running back Von Walker has seen action on offense and returning punts. Wide receivers Richy Anderson – son of former Penn State running back Richie Anderson – and Gregg Garrity – son of former Nittany Lion wideout Gregg Garrity, Sr. – also have played.

The defensive side of the ball has seen linebacker Brandon Bell and cornerbacks Anthony Smith and Jordan Smith make an impact early in the season. Smith handled long snapping duties for punter Alex Butterworth last week.

**JONES MAKES IMPACT IN FIRST TWO GAMES**

Senior DT DaQuan Jones dropped approximately 15 pounds in the offseason and that has helped him drop more of the opposition in the first two games of 2013.

Jones opened the year with a career-high nine tackles, three tackles for loss and one sack vs. Syracuse.

He followed that up by tying his career-high with nine stops and added two TFL and one sack vs. Eastern Michigan.

Jones has already eclipsed his career totals in tackles for loss and sacks in just two games in 2013. Jones entered the season with four career tackles for loss and already has five TFL in 2013 to lead the Big Ten.

The senior had 1.5 sacks entering 2013 and has already boasted two sacks for minus-16 yards, tied for the Big Ten lead.

His 18 tackles are tops on the squad entering the third game and he is exactly halfway to his career total (36) entering the year.

**LIONS UNDER THE LIGHTS**

Penn State will play UCF in its first non-conference night game since playing at Alabama in 2010 and is hosting its first non-conference night game since Notre Dame in 2007.

The Nittany Lions have three night games scheduled, also hosting Michigan at 5 p.m. on Oct. 12 playing at Ohio

State at 8 p.m. on Oct. 26, and it marks the sixth time since 2000 that Penn State will play multiple night games in the same season.

Penn State has now played at least one regular season night game in 14 consecutive seasons.

The Lions' 23 night games over the past 13 seasons include: Iowa and Ohio State (2012); Northwestern (2011); Alabama, Iowa and Michigan (2010); Iowa (2009); Illinois, Wisconsin and Ohio State (2008); Notre Dame, Ohio State and Texas A&M (2007); Michigan (2006); Illinois, Ohio State and Florida State (2005); Minnesota and Boston College (2004); Nebraska (2002 and '03); Miami (Fla.) (2001) and Indiana (2000).

**BALANCED ATTACK TOPPLES EASTERN MICHIGAN;**

In Penn State's 45-7 victory over Eastern Michigan the Nittany Lions piled up 574 yards of total offense, the most by a Penn State team since their 594 yards against Coastal Carolina in 2008.

Penn State averaged 7.8 yards on its 74 plays vs. the Eagles, with 39 rushes and 35 passes on the day. The balanced attack included 286 rushing yards and 323 passing yards.

Five different players carried the football and 10 different players caught passes from the quarterback duo of Christian Hackenberg and Tyler Ferguson.

**BELTON, LYNCH TOP 100 YARD MARK VS. EMU**

For the 32nd time in program history Penn State had two 100-yard rushers in the same game.

Bill Belton and Akeel Lynch each piled up 108 yards vs. Eastern Michigan, marking the first time since 2010 against Northwestern that two players topped the 100-yard rushing mark.

In his first game carrying the ball, Lynch led the team with 13 carries and scored his first career touchdown. Belton toted the ball nine times and tied with Zach Zwinak for team-high with two touchdown runs.

Zwinak carried seven times for 43 yards, as well.

**LEHMAN TO MISS REST OF 2013 WITH KNEE INJURY**

Senior tight end Matt Lehman will miss the remainder of the season due to a serious knee injury suffered against Syracuse, head coach Bill O'Brien announced on Sept. 3.

Lehman suffered the non-contact injury to his left knee during the first quarter in the win over the Orange at MetLife Stadium. A starter against Syracuse, Lehman made two catches in the first period, including a 16-yard grab from Christian Hackenberg that resulted in a first down.

Lehman made 24 receptions for 296 yards (12.3) with three touchdowns last season, ranking fourth on the team in receptions. A starter in three games, he made a career-high five catches for 70 yards, including a 21-yard scoring grab, in the 35-7 win at Illinois.

A transfer from Shippensburg University, Lehman made the Penn State squad during team try-outs and would eventually earn a scholarship. The former Newport High School three-sport standout graduated in August with a degree in kinesiology.

### CAPPELLETTI BLAZES ANOTHER TRAIL

Penn State's first Heisman Trophy winner in 1973, John Cappelletti returned to Beaver Stadium last week for a recognition of the undefeated 1973 squad, the first Nittany Lion team to earn a 12-0 record.

After announcing the more than 50 members of the 1973 squad that returned to Happy Valley for the 40th anniversary of the historic season, Cappelletti was called out of the tunnel last to a tremendous ovation.

The crowd was further elated to hear the announcement by Director of Athletics Dave Joyner that Cappelletti's iconic No. 22 jersey was to become the first number in Penn State athletics history to be retired.

Redshirt freshman Akeel Lynch, who rushed for 108 yards and a touchdown vs. Eastern Michigan, will continue to wear the number throughout his Penn State career, a request that was made by Cappelletti.

### HACKENBERG, FICKEN EARN BIG TEN HONORS AFTER SEASON OPENER

Placekicker Sam Ficken and freshman quarterback Christian Hackenberg were honored as Big Ten Special Team and Freshman of the Week, respectively, for their efforts in the season opening win over Syracuse at MetLife Stadium.

Their efforts helped head coach Bill O'Brien's Nittany Lions to their third consecutive game overall and their 11th win in their last 12 regular season neutral site contests.

Ficken earned his second career honor after making field goals of 36, 35 and 46 yards in the win over Syracuse. His career-long 46-yard connection early in the fourth quarter gave the Nittany Lions a 16-10 lead. He made both of his PAT attempts and four of his six kickoffs were touchbacks.

He has now made his last 13 field goal attempts and joined Northwestern's Jeff Budzien as the only Big Ten kickers to make three field goals during the opening weekend of the season.

Hackenberg became the second true freshman quarterback to start a Penn State season opener since 1910 and directed the Nittany Lions to five scoring drives in the win over the Orange.

He was 22-of-31 for 278 yards, with a pair of 50-yard touchdown passes in the second half and two interceptions. His 278 yards were the third-highest total by a freshman quarterback in school history (280 - Mills, 2001 vs. OSU and USM).

In the second half against the Orange, Hackenberg was 11 of 16 for 209 yards and two touchdowns to extend Penn State's 6-3 halftime lead to a 23-10 advantage early in the fourth quarter.

Hackenberg became the 27th different quarterback in school history to post a 200-yard passing game and completed his first six passing attempts, including a five-yard completion to running back Zach Zwinak on the Nittany Lions' first play from scrimmage.

### URSCHEL A NOMINEE FOR PRESTIGIOUS SENIOR CLASS AWARD

Senior guard John Urschel has been selected as one of 30 candidates for the Senior CLASS Award for college football.

To be eligible, a student-athlete must have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition.

The 6-foot-3, 301-pound guard has started 14 consecutive games for Coach Bill O'Brien's squad and played in 27 straight games, earning first team All-Big Ten honors last season after blocking for a 1,000-yard rusher and 3,000-yard passer. Urschel is on the Watch Lists for

the 2013 Outland Trophy and the Rotary Lombardi Award.

Considered the nation's premier college football scholar-athlete, Urschel owns a 4.0 grade-point average, earning his bachelor's and master's degrees in mathematics over the past four years. The former Canisius High School standout anchors the Nittany Lions' offensive line, and is working on a second master's degree, in math education.

A 2012 first team CoSIDA Academic All-American, Urschel has an opportunity this fall to earn his fourth straight nod on the Academic All-Big Ten squad, his third selection to the Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-District team and his second Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America selection.

Urschel taught a section of Math 041 - Trigonometry and Analytic Geometry during the 2013 Spring semester and is teaching a section of Math 230 - Integral Vector Calculus this semester, in addition to his academic and football responsibilities.

Urschel has participated in the Penn State Lift for Life, THON events, the Relay for Life and the Special Olympics Pennsylvania State Summer Games during his career.

The 30 Senior CLASS candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one candidate who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of community, classroom, character and competition.

The award program is designed exclusively for college seniors who are utilizing their complete athletic eligibility, remaining committed to their university and pursuing the many rewards a senior season can bring. Premier Sports Management manages the award.

### HACKENBERG HAS SUCCESSFUL DEBUT AGAINST ORANGE

Quarterback Christian Hackenberg became just the third Penn State true freshman get the start under center in a season opener since 1910. He joined Rob Bolden, who started his first career game in 2010, as the first two true freshmen to take the opening snap of the year since 1910.

He captained 16 of the team's 17 offensive possessions and completed 22 of 31 passes for 278 yards and two touchdowns. His yardage total was the third highest for a Penn State freshman in school history and currently ranks second in the Big Ten. He connected with Allen Robinson and Geno Lewis for scoring strikes of 51 and 56 yards, respectively, while also throwing two interceptions.

Hackenberg completed his first six career passing attempts, including a five-yard catch by Zach Zwinak on the opening play of the game. The rookie also became the 27th different Penn State signal caller to post a 200-yard passing game.

Hackenberg currently ranks second in the Big Ten in passing yardage and fourth in total offense.

### DEFENSE HOLDS STRONG AGAINST SYRACUSE

One thing that fans knew heading into the season opener is that the Nittany Lions would be a stout defensive team and the experienced group showed why in the season opener vs. Syracuse.

John Butler's group flew around the field and created three turnovers (2 INT, 1 Fumble), amassed eight tackles-for-loss and broke up eight passes, holding the Orange to just 11 first downs and 260 yards of total offense.

The Lions limited Syracuse to 71 yards on 37 carries on the ground, a 1.9 yards per carry average, which was more than 100 yards under its season average of 178.0 yards per game in 2012.

Stephen Obeng-Agyapong made eight tackles in the game, forced and recovered a fumble and notched his first career interception and converted wide receiver Trevor Williams made his first career start at cornerback and grabbed a fourth quarter interception along the sideline to seal the victory.

DaQuan Jones had a team and career-high nine tackles, including a career-best three tackles-for-loss. With 3 tackles-for-loss vs. Syracuse, Jones surpassed his 2012 TFL total of two.

# ROBINSON ASCENDS TOWARDS TOP OF RECEIVING CHARTS

Allen Robinson entered his junior season with a target on his chest and on his back, as the 2012 Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year will again be a key target in coach Bill O'Brien's offense and a main focus of opposing defenses.

Robinson's game is a perfect fit for O'Brien's up-tempo offense and continues to etch his name into the Nittany Lion record books along side such greats as Butler, Engram, Jurevicius and McDuffie.

On Nov. 17 vs. Indiana Robinson caught ten passes and became the first Nittany Lion to ever eclipse the 70 catch mark in a single season.

He also owns the sophomore record for catches and yards in a single season, topping Engram and Butler's 48 catches and Freddie Scott's 973 yards.

In 2012, Robinson led the conference in catches, catches per game receiving yards, receiving yards per game and touchdowns catches in 2012.

He opened the 2013 campaign with back-to-back seven-catch, 100-plus yard efforts, and caught a touchdown pass against Syracuse and Eastern Michigan. He is closing in on the top-10 in all three categories; currently ranking eighth in career touchdown grabs, tied for 12th in career receptions and is 16th in career receiving yards.

## PENN STATE STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 88 PERCENT GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE

Penn State student-athletes continue to graduate well above their peers nationwide, earning record-setting academic performances, according to statistical information released in October 2012 by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 80 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2002-03 through 2005-06. The 88 percent figure was third to Northwestern (97) and Illinois (89) among Big Ten Conference institutions.

The Penn State football team broke its program record for the second consecutive year with a Graduation Success Rate of 91 percent, tied with Rutgers for the No. 7 graduation rate among all 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams. The national average was 68 percent.

The Nittany Lion basketball (92 percent) and Lady Lion basketball (100) teams also earned Graduation Success Rates at least 15 percent higher than the national average.

The superlative graduation data comes amidst a fall sports season that has four Penn State teams leading, or tied for the lead, in their respective Big Ten standings, with the women's soccer team having already clinched a 15th consecutive Big Ten Championship. Three teams are ranked in the Top 5 nationally: women's volleyball, women's soccer and field hockey.

This is the 22nd annual release of institutional graduation rates since national "right-to-know" legislation was passed in 1990. In 2005, the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance implemented the initial release of the team GSR data.

The GSR is the NCAA's more inclusive calculation of student-athlete academic success. The NCAA rate is more accurate than the federally mandated methodology because it includes incoming transfers and students enrolling in the spring semester who receive athletic aid and graduate, and deletes from the calculation student-athletes who leave an institution and were academically eligible to compete. The federal rate does neither.

In addition to releasing each institution's overall four-year Graduation Success Rate, the NCAA also released the federal graduation rates for students and student-athletes.

The four-year federal graduation rate average for University Park student-athletes was 78 percent, second to Northwestern (88) among Big Ten schools, and significantly above the 64 percent Division I average. The four-year average for University Park students was 85 percent, also far exceeding the 63 percent rate for all students nationwide.

Among the 2005-06 entering freshman class, 80 percent of Penn State student-athletes earned degrees within six years, the same as 2011, and well above the 65 percent average for all Division I institutions. The graduation rate for all Penn State students was 87 percent in the entering class of 2005-06.

The NCAA data revealed that student-athletes from five Penn State squads earned a Graduation Success Rate of 100 percent -- Lady Lion basketball, field hockey, softball, men's tennis and women's tennis -- and 10 additional teams were at 90 percent or higher for a total of 15. Nineteen of Penn State's 25 teams (track/cross country teams combined) earned a Graduation Success Rate at or above the national GSR average of 80 percent.

The 2005-06 entering class for the Nittany Lion football team earned a record 93 percent graduation rate, which was No. 2 among Big Ten teams (Northwestern, 95%). The record 91 percent GSR figure for the Penn State football program also was second-highest to Northwestern among all Big Ten gridiron teams. Penn State football student-athletes earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 84 percent, second in the Big Ten and No. 5 among all FBS teams.

**SECONDARY SHINES IN WIN OVER ORANGE**

It was a strong mix of youngsters and veterans in the Nittany Lions' defensive backfield in the season opener vs. Syracuse and all four starters had a positive impact in the win.

Safeties Malcolm Willis and Adrian Amos both have made double-digit starts, while cornerbacks Jordan Lucas and Trevor Williams were making their first career starts in the season opener.

Willis piled up eight tackles (all solo), just one shy of his career-high, and made his first career tackle-for-loss, while Amos contributed a pair of tackles.

Lucas has three tackles, 0.5 tackle-for-loss and tied for the game-high with two pass breakups. Williams had three tackles, as well, and came away with the game-clinching interception with 1:56 left in the fourth quarter. He made the interception along the Nittany Lions sideline, got a foot down and was mobbed by his teammates as the offense took the field to run out the clock with the Orange out of timeouts.

Senior safety Stephen Obeng-Agyapong was another major contributor vs. the Orange. He logged eight tackles and collected one quarterback sack, while forcing a pair of turnovers. The Bronx, N.Y. native forced and recovered a fumble in the second quarter to set up the first scoring drive for Penn State, which tied the game, 3-3. He collected his first career interception in the third quarter, a play that set up another Sam Ficken field goal for a 16-10 lead early in the fourth quarter.

**FOUR MAKE FIRST STARTS; 15 GET FIRST APPEARANCE VS. SYRACUSE**

Four Nittany Lions made their first career starts, while 15 players saw their first game action wearing the blue and white, in the 23-17 win over Syracuse.

Christian Hackenberg was the lone first time starter and the only true freshman starter for the Lions, while junior Kyle Baublitz, sophomore Jordan Lucas and redshirt freshman Nyeem Wartman all made their first career starts.

Richy Anderson, Adam Breneman, Hackenberg, Anthony Smith, Jordan Smith and Von Walker were the six true freshmen to see game action in the season opener.

Adam Cole, Tyler Ferguson, Brian Gaia, Malik Golden, Austin Johnson, Geno Lewis, Akeel Lynch, Carl Nassib and Tyrone Smith all saw their first career game action during the victory over Syracuse.

**PENN STATE IN NFL VENUES**

Penn State has now played in eighth current National Football League stadium after opening the season at MetLife Stadium, home of the NFL's New York Giants and New York Jets.

Penn State has played the in the current homes of the Miami Dolphins (Sun Life Stadium), Minnesota Vikings (Metrodome), New Orleans Saints (Mercedes-Benz Superdome), Philadelphia Eagles (Lincoln Financial Field), San Diego Chargers (Qualcomm Stadium), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (Raymond James Stadium) and Washington Redskins (FedEx Field). Penn State has played five of the above stadiums since the 2005 season.

In 2015, Penn State will take on Maryland at M&T Bank Stadium, home of the Super Bowl XLVII Champion Baltimore Ravens.

The first documented Penn State game in a

professional stadium was in 1921 when the Nittany Lions defeated Georgia Tech, 28-7, in front of 30,000 fans at the Polo Grounds in Upper Manhattan, New York City.

**LIONS CONTINUE TO HONOR PLAYERS WITH JERSEY NAMES IN 2013**

In 2012, head coach Bill O'Brien felt that something needed to be done to honor those student-athletes who kept their promise to play for Penn State after the NCAA handed down sanctions on the program.

His plan; to place the names of each player on the back of their uniforms. It was something that had never been done in the 126-year history of the program, but was symbolic.

You stuck with us, so we're sticking your name on your uniform and the 2013 season will be no different, as O'Brien and his staff have decided to keep the names on the historically elegant uniforms.

**LIONS IN SEASON OPENERS**

The Nittany Lions own an 93-20-2 record in season openers since defeating Bucknell, 54-0, in the first game in school history in 1887.

Penn State improved to 7-3 all-time in neutral site games to start a season, tying Colgate in its first neutral site season opener in 1941 at Civic Stadium in Buffalo, N.Y.

Before defeating Syracuse, 23-17, at MetLife Stadium to start 2013, the last time that Penn State opened the season at a neutral site was in 2000, when the No. 22 Nittany Lions lost to No. 15 USC in the Kickoff Classic at Giants Stadium.

**LIONS HAVE LONG, SUCCESSFUL HISTORY AT MEADOWLANDS SPORTS COMPLEX**

Penn State played at the Meadowlands Sports Complex for the 14th time in program history and the first time in 13 years when it opened the season with a 23-17 victory over Penn State.

The Nittany Lions were playing in MetLife Stadium for the first time.

Prior to their meeting with Syracuse, the last time the Nittany Lions stepped onto the turf at Giants Stadium was against USC in the 2000 Kickoff Classic.

The Nittany Lions opened the season at the Meadowlands for the sixth time, defeating Syracuse (2013), Rutgers (1977), Georgia Tech (1991) and USC (1996) and losing to Nebraska (1983) and USC (2000). The 2000, 1996, 1991 and 1983 meetings were in the Kickoff Classic.

The Nittany Lions and Syracuse met once before at Giants Stadium, with the Penn State posting a 35-7 win on October 20, 1979.

**PENN STATE ENTERS 21ST BIG TEN SEASON**

After 106 years as an independent in football, Penn State began play in the Big Ten Conference in 1993 and is playing its 21st season in the conference. The Nittany Lions were Big Ten Champions in 1994, beating Oregon to win the 1995 Rose Bowl, and played USC in the 2009 Rose Bowl.

The Nittany Lions will begin Big Ten play at division foe Indiana on Oct. 5 and finish the regular season with a trip to Wisconsin (Nov. 30). Penn State will also play division rival Ohio State (Oct. 26) and Minnesota (Nov. 9) on the road.

The Lions will host Michigan (Oct. 12-Homecoming), Illinois (Nov. 2), Purdue (Nov. 16) and Nebraska (Nov. 23-Senior Day).

The Big Ten will move to East and West divisions in 2014 when Maryland and Rutgers join the conference.

**EIGHT BOWL TEAMS ON 2013 SCHEDULE**

The Nittany Lions will face eight teams that played in bowl games last year, with five games at home, two on the road and one at a neutral site.

Penn State will open the season at MetLife Stadium against Syracuse, which won the New Era Pinstripe Bowl

over West Virginia in 2012.

Among the teams coming to Beaver Stadium this fall are 2012 bowl teams: UCF (Beef O'Brady's), Kent State (GoDaddy.com), Michigan (Outback), Purdue (Heart of Dallas) and Nebraska (Capital One).

Minnesota (Meineke Car Care) and Wisconsin (Rose) are among the road tests for the Nittany Lions, who also visit Ohio State and Indiana.

**SEVERAL ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA® CANDIDATES**

The Penn State football team has had a least one Capital One Academic All-American® in 10 of the past 11 seasons, including a school record five in 2008 and three more in 2009 and again in 2010.

Fifth-year senior guard John Urschel graduated in May 2012 with a perfect 4.0 grade-point average in mathematics and received his master's in math in May 2013. Urschel and 2012 senior Pete Massaro earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America® accolades last year.

Among the Nittany Lions' other potential Academic All-America® candidates are: redshirt junior guard Miles Dieffenbach, junior placekicker Sam Ficken, fifth-year senior center Ty Howle, redshirt junior linebacker Mike Hull and redshirt sophomore linebacker Ben Kline.

The Nittany Lions' 51 all-time Academic All-Americans® rank No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

Nominees for Capital One Academic All-America® consideration must have at least a 3.30 cumulative grade point average and be a starter or key reserve.

**EIGHT NITTANY LIONS ARE GRADUATES**

Eight Nittany Lions have earned their degrees entering the 2013 season.

Four returning Nittany Lions received their degrees at Penn State's spring commencement in May, joining Ty Howle and John Urschel as graduates on the 2013 roster. Urschel earned his master's degree in mathematics just four years after enrolling at Penn State, boasting a perfect 4.0 GPA.

Glenn Carson, Adam Gress, Stephen Obeng-Agyapong and Malcolm Willis received their bachelor's degrees last spring.

Matt Lehman and Brandon Felder earned their degrees at Summer Commencement.

**O'BRIEN TIES CONSECUTIVE WINS RECORD FOR FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACH**

With a 38-14 win at Iowa last season, head coach Bill O'Brien became just the third Nittany Lion head coach to win five consecutive games in his first season at the helm.

O'Brien joined George Hoskins (1892) and Dick Harlow (1915) as the only first-year coaches to win a school record five consecutive games.

**PENNSYLVANIANS ON STAFF**

Penn State quarterbacks coach Charlie Fisher is a native of Allenwood, Pa., 70 miles east of State College, and attended Nittany Lion games in his youth. Secondary coach John Butler and Craig Fitzgerald attended LaSalle College High School in suburban Philadelphia at the same time, along with Keith Conlin, an All-Big Ten tackle for Penn State in 1995 and a starter for the Nittany Lions' 12-0 team in 1994.

**ESPN'S ALL ACCESS: TRAINING DAYS HIGHLIGHTS NITTANY LION FOOTBALL**

Fans got an inside look at the Penn State football team's preparations under Bill O'Brien through ESPN's All-Access: Penn State Training Days.

ESPN All-Access: Penn State Training Days showcased behind-the-scenes access to on- and off-field activities, team meetings and campus facilities. The segments introduced players and coaches as they completed pre-season training camp.

The program culminated with a one-hour ESPN special on Aug. 20. In addition, five Penn State vignettes were shown during College Football Live, SportsCenter and multiple on ESPN shows. A four-part series consisting of 30-minute specials aired on ESPN from Aug. 21-23.

Penn State joined Alabama, Ohio State and Oklahoma as the college football programs featured on the ESPN All-Access: Training Days series since its 2010 debut.

**THIRTY-SEVEN LETTERWINNERS RETURNED**

Penn State returned 37 lettermen from last year's 8-4 squad - 19 on offense, 16 on defense and two specialists.

Of the 37 returning letterwinners, 25 have starting experience - 15 on offense, eight on defense and the starting placekicker and punter.

One returning letterman (No. 38) was lost for the season when defensive end Brad Bars ruptured his achilles tendon during an off-season workout.

Penn State returns 16 starters for this season - eight on offense, six on defense and both specialists.

Returning on offense are guard Miles Dieffenbach, tight end Jesse James, wide receiver Brandon Felder, wide receiver Allen Robinson, tackle Donovan Smith, guard John Urschel and running back Zach Zwinak. Tackle Garry Gilliam, who started eight games at tight end last year, also returns.

The defensive starters returning are safety Adrian Amos, defensive end Deion Barnes, linebacker Glenn Carson, defensive tackle DaQuan Jones, safety Stephen Obeng-Agyapong and safety Malcolm Willis.

Punter Alex Butterworth and placekicker Sam Ficken return to anchor the special teams units.

**TIGHT ENDS HAVE MAJOR IMPACT; RANK 2ND NATIONALLY WITH 82 RECEPTIONS**

Coach Bill O'Brien indicated before the 2012 season that the tight ends would play a vital role in the Penn State offense.

By the end of the season, the Penn State tight ends had combined to make 82 catches, which ranked second in the nation behind Stanford's 90 tight end catches. Among Big Ten teams, Michigan State was second with 37 receptions by its tight ends.

A tight end caught at least one touchdown pass in nine of the team's 12 games in 2012. Thirty-two percent of Penn State receptions were made by tight ends and 10 of the 24 receiving TDs were hauled in by tight ends this season.

Sophomore Kyle Carter ranked second on the team with 36 catches for 453 yards (12.6) and grabbed his first touchdown pass at Virginia. Carter re-set his career-high with 85 yards on six catches in the 38-14 win at Iowa to earn Big Ten Freshman of the Week honors. Carter was a consensus first-team Freshman All-American.

Carter was in range of the Penn State season record for tight end receptions of 41, set by Andrew Quarless in 2009, before being injured at Nebraska.

Senior Matt Lehman made a career-high five catches for 70 yards at Illinois, including a 21-yard touchdown pass. He was fourth on the team with 24 receptions for 296 yards, including five grabs of 20 yards or more and three touchdowns during his junior season.

Sophomore Jesse James had a career day at Iowa with three catches for 52 yards and a 31-yard touchdown grab to open the scoring. His true freshman season netted 15 catches for 276 yards (18.4) and five touchdown grabs.

**BUTLER NAMED DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR**

John Butler enters his second season on the Penn State coaching staff after being promoted from secondary coach to defensive coordinator in January.

Butler, who will continue to coach the cornerbacks, coached the defensive backs and worked with the special teams in 2012. The Philadelphia native inherited a secondary that lost all four starters from the 2011 season and helped the 2012 squad rank second in the Big Ten and No. 16 nationally in scoring defense at 19.1 ppg.

**MIDGET JOINS STAFF AS SAFETIES COACH**

Anthony Midget joined the Penn State staff in February as the safeties coach after serving as defensive coordinator at Georgia State University in 2012.

Midget spent 2008-12 at Georgia State after starting his collegiate coaching career at his alma mater, Virginia Tech.

A third-team All-American and first-team All-Big East

selection at cornerback in 1999, Midget helped the Hokies to four consecutive bowl berths, capped by an appearance in the 1999 BCS National Championship game.

**TRIO OF FIRST TEAM ALL-BIG TEN PERFORMERS HIGHLIGHT RETURNERS**

Six Nittany Lions earned first-team All-Big Ten accolades in 2012 and three of the honorees return for this season.

Wide receiver Allen Robinson attained first-team All-Big Ten honors from the coaches and media and was the conference's Richter-Howard Receiver-of-the-Year.

Tight end Kyle Carter was named to the media first-team following his redshirt freshman season. Guard John Urschel was selected to the coaches' first-team and the media's second team.

In addition, defensive end Deion Barnes was the Big Ten Freshman of the Year.

A trio of 2012 Penn State seniors - defensive tackle Jordan Hill, linebacker Michael Mauti and center Matt Stankiewicz - also gained All-Big Ten first-team accolades and linebacker Gerald Hodges was on the second-team.

**BIG TEN RECEIVER OF THE YEAR ROBINSON ON BILETNIKOFF AWARD WATCH LIST**

Allen Robinson took home the 2012 Big Ten Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year after a breakout season in head coach Bill O'Brien's dynamic offense.

The junior has been named to the Biletnikoff Award Preseason Watch List, which is awarded by the Tallahassee Quarterback Club (TQC) Foundation, Inc. The award recognizes the outstanding receiver in college football.

Robinson set a school single season record with 77 catches last season and joined Bobby Engram, the 1994 Biletnikoff Award winner, as the only other Penn State receiver to log more than 1,000 yards receiving in a season. The junior hauled in 1,013 yards worth of catches and led the Big Ten in every receiving categories.

**CARSON ON BUTKUS AWARD WATCH LIST**

Another in the long line of "Linebacker U." standouts, senior Glenn Carson, who will be a candidate for All-Big Ten honors, is a preseason candidate for the Butkus Award, presented to the nation's top linebacker.

The middle linebacker enters the 2013 season as the most experienced veteran on the squad, starting all but one game the past two seasons, and will begin his third season in the middle of the Lions defense.

His 85 tackles from 2012 make him one of the top returning tacklers in the conference and the former Southern Regional High School product has amassed 171 career tackles, needing just 80 stops to move into the Top 15 on the all-time Penn State tackles list.

**BIG TEN FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR BARNES AMONG CANDIDATES FOR BEDNARIK AND NAGURSKI AWARDS**

After a terrific 2012 campaign, sophomore Deion Barnes finds himself among the preseason watch lists for the Bednarik Award and the Nagurski Trophy.

The 2012 Thompson-Randle El Big Ten Freshman of the Year, Barnes was tied for No. 3 in the conference with three forced fumbles in 2012, tied for No. 5 in the Big Ten in sacks (6.0) and was No. 14 with 10.0 tackles for loss, leading the team in sacks and TFL.

Penn State defensive tackle Mike Reid won the Outland Trophy in 1969, while LaVar Arrington (1999), Paul Posluszny (2005 and 2006), and Dan Connor (2007) all won the Nagurski Trophy.

**URSCHEL ON OUTLAND TROPHY AND ROTARY LOMBARDI AWARD WATCH LISTS**

Senior John Urschel has been tabbed as a preseason candidate for both the Rotary Lombardi Award, given to the top down linemen and those defensive players who line up within five yards of the football, and the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top interior lineman.

The 2012 first-team All-Big Ten guard and first team CoSIDA Academic All-American, Urschel will lead the Nittany Lions' offensive line this fall. The 6-foot-3,



307-pound offensive guard is among the top returning offensive linemen in the Big Ten and helped pave the way for 1,000-yard running back Zach Zwinak and 3,000-yard passer Matt McGloin in 2012.

### ZWINAK ON MAXWELL AND DOAK WALKER AWARD WATCH LISTS

Junior running back Zach Zwinak finds himself on a pair of preseason watch lists entering 2013. The Maxwell Award and the Doak Walker Award have both added Zwinak to their preseason watch lists.

In 2012, Zwinak gained 1,000 yards on 203 carries (4.9) and scored six touchdowns on the ground, while catching 20 passes for 177 yards and a score. His 1,177 all-purpose yards led the squad.

Zwinak delivered the 22nd 1,000-yard rushing season in Penn State history, despite starting only the final four games of last season. He gave the Nittany Lions a 1,000-yard running back for the eighth consecutive year.

### JONES ON OUTLAND TROPHY WATCH LIST

Senior DaQuan Jones is among the preseason candidates for the Outland Trophy, presented to the nation's top interior lineman.

A mainstay in the defensive line rotation during his career, Jones enjoyed his best season in the blue and white in 2012. He made 22 tackles, forced a fumble and registered two tackles for loss.

A strong physical presence in the middle of the defensive line, Jones adds his candidacy for the Outland Trophy to his preseason All-Big Ten selection from Phil Steele's College Football Magazine.

### CARTER RETURNS TO MACKAY WATCH LIST

After being the only freshman on the Midseason watch list last season, sophomore tight end Kyle Carter was named to the Mackay Award Preseason Watch List, awarded to the nation's top tight end.

A 2012 consensus first-team Freshman All-American, Carter ranked second on the team with 36 receptions for 453 yards and was the lone freshman to rank among the Big Ten leaders in receptions and receiving yards per game in 2012. He made six catches of 20-or-more yards, despite missing three of the final four games in 2012 due to injury, and caught a pair of touchdown passes on the season.

### NUMEROUS NITTANY LIONS HAVE FAMILY TIES TO PENN STATE FOOTBALL

Six members on the 2012 squad have ties to current or former Nittany Lion football team players, coaches or staff:

- Freshman wide receiver Richey Anderson's father, Richie, played for the blue and white from 1991-92 and ranks 17th on the

- Freshman wide receiver **Gregg Garrity, Jr.** is the son of Greg Garrity, Sr. who was a wide receiver for the Nittany Lions from 1980-82. The elder Garrity made "The Catch" that helped the Nittany Lions win the 1983 National Championship.

- Redshirt junior linebacker **Mike Hull's** father, Tom, lettered for the Nittany Lions from 1971-73;

- Redshirt freshman **Jonathan Warner's** father, Curt, was a first-team All-America tailback in 1981 and '82, and was instrumental in the Nittany Lions winning their first National Championship in 1982. Curt Warner was inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame in 2009;

In addition, redshirt sophomore **Alex Kenney's** sister, Lauren, is a sophomore on the Penn State women's track and field team, placing fifth in the javelin at the 2013 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

### NITTANY LION FOOTBALL TEAM POSTS RECORD 91 PERCENT NCAA GRADUATION RATE

The Penn State football team broke its program record for the second consecutive year with a Graduation Success Rate of 91 percent according to data released in October 2012 by the NCAA.

The Nittany Lions posted a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 91 percent, tied with Rutgers for the No. 7 graduation rate among all 120 Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) teams. The national average was 68 percent. The

record 91 percent GSR figure was second-highest to Northwestern among all Big Ten gridiron teams.

The 2005-06 entering class for the Nittany Lion football team earned a record 93 percent graduation rate, which was No. 2 among Big Ten teams (Northwestern, 95%).

Penn State football student-athletes earned a four-year federal graduation rate of 84 percent, second in the Big Ten and No. 5 among all FBS teams.

The Nittany Lions posted a then-record 87 percent Graduation Success Rate in the NCAA's 2011 Graduation rates report.

The NCAA's annual study of institutions nationwide revealed that Penn State student-athletes at the University Park campus earned a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 88 percent compared to the 80 percent average for all Division I institutions for students entering from 2002-03 through 2005-06. The 88 percent figure was third to Northwestern (97) and Illinois (89) among Big Ten Conference institutions.

### NEARLY 70 ACADEMIC ALL-BIG TEN HONOREES OVER PAST THREE YEARS

A total of 28 Penn State football student-athletes earned Academic All-Big Ten honors last fall for owning at least a 3.0 grade point average and being a letterwinner. A total of 208 Nittany Lions have earned Academic All-Big Ten on the gridiron honors since 1993, including 67 over the past three seasons.

### NEARLY 50 FOOTBALL STUDENT-ATHLETES EARN 3.0 GPA IN SPRING SEMESTER

The Penn State football team produced another outstanding academic performance during the spring 2013 semester, with 46 squad members earning at least a 3.0 grade-point average.

Among the 46 players with a 3.0 GPA, 37 will be returning for the 2013 season.

The 46 Nittany Lions with a 3.0 GPA during the spring semester is a significant increase from the 34 football student-athletes who earned a 3.0 during the 2012 spring semester. A total of 47 Nittany Lions earned a 3.0 GPA during the 2012 fall semester.

Five football student-athletes earned a perfect 4.0 GPA during the spring semester, three of whom are returning for the 2013 season: sophomore linebacker Ben Kline (Seven Valleys), freshman fullback Dom Salomone (Dillsburg) and 2012 first-team Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-American® John Urschel (Williamsville, N.Y.). A pair of 2012 seniors, Frank Figueroa and Brian Irvin, also earned a 4.0 GPA in the spring.

Among the 46 high achieving Nittany Lions, 20 earned a 3.5 GPA or higher during the spring semester. A total of 12 Nittany Lions earned Dean's List recognition in the spring by earning at least a 3.5 GPA and passing the minimum 12 credits.

The superlative academic performance by Coach Bill O'Brien's squad brings to 34 the total number of Penn State football student-athletes with a cumulative 3.0 or higher GPA who are returning for the 2013 season.

A fifth-year senior this fall, Urschel posted a perfect 4.0 GPA in the spring for the eighth consecutive semester. A 2012 first-team All-Big Ten guard, he earned a master's degree in math in May and is working on a master's in math education. Urschel taught Math 041 to Penn State undergraduate students during the semester, in addition to his academic load and football responsibilities. Urschel will be a primary candidate for the National Football Foundation's William V. Campbell Trophy in the fall as college football's premier student-athlete.

In addition to Kline and Salomone, other returning Nittany Lions who made the Dean's List during the spring semester were: placekicker Sam Ficken (Valparaiso, Ind.), tackle Garry Gilliam (Carlisle), safety Ryan Keiser (Selinsgrove), center Wendy Laurent (Hamilton, N.J.), tight end Matt Lehman (Newport), defensive end Carl Nassib (Malvern), safety Stephen Obeng-Agyapong (Bronx, N.Y.) and running back Deron Thompson (Lititz).

A total of 13 Nittany Lion freshmen or newcomers during the 2012-13 academic year earned at least a 3.0 GPA during the spring, including: tight end Adam Breneman (Mechanicsburg), quarterback Tyler Ferguson

(Bakersfield, Calif.), defensive tackle Brian Gaia (Pasadena, Md.), running back Jack Haffner (State College), linebacker Nyeem Wartman (Philadelphia), Laurent and Salomone.

Bars and Kline joined Urschel and 2012 senior Pete Massaro on the 2012 CoSIDA Academic All-District® team. Massaro earned first-team CoSIDA Academic All-America® honors for the second time.

### BIG TEN ANNOUNCES 2014 FOOTBALL SLATES

Penn State will welcome Maryland and Michigan State back to Beaver Stadium and play at Rutgers for the first time since 1955 next year.

During the 2014 season, the Big Ten will welcome a pair of the Nittany Lions' oldest rivals in Maryland and Rutgers, as they join Penn State, Indiana, Michigan, Michigan State and Ohio State in the Big Ten's East Division.

The Terrapins will visit Beaver Stadium on Nov. 1, 2014 for the first time since a Sept. 26, 1992 contest. Penn State and Maryland have met 37 times, with the first meeting in 1917 and the last contest in 1993 in College Park. From 1960-93, the Nittany Lions and Terrapins played every year except 1976, '81 and '83.

Coach Bill O'Brien's Nittany Lions also will host East Division foe Ohio State (Oct. 25) and Michigan State (Nov. 29) in 2014. Penn State and Ohio State have met 28 times, including every year since 1993. The Nittany Lions and Spartans will end the 2014 regular season against each other as they did from 1993-2010 in the battle for the Land Grant Trophy. Penn State also will host West Division foe Northwestern in the Big Ten home opener on Sept. 27.

Penn State will provide the opposition for the Scarlet Knights' first Big Ten game, on Sept. 13, 2014 in Piscataway, N.J. The clash also will be opening game of the Big Ten's 119th football season. The Nittany Lions have played Rutgers nine times in New Jersey, but the last six meetings came at Giants Stadium, most recently in 1995. Penn State has played at Rutgers in 1951, '53 and '55. The teams have met 24 times, with the first game in 1918 and the last meeting in 1995. From 1977-95, the Nittany Lions and Scarlet Knights played every season except in 1980 and '81.

The Nittany Lions also will visit East Division rivals Michigan (Oct. 11) and Indiana (Nov. 8), as well as West Division foe Illinois (Nov. 22) during the 2014 campaign.

Big Ten teams will play eight conference games from 2013-15, with a nine-game conference schedule starting in 2016. The Nittany Lions will play their six East Division rivals and three West Division teams that rotate starting in 2016. Penn State and all East Division teams will have five Big Ten home games in 2016 and in even-numbered years thereafter.

### ROBINSON BECOMES SIXTH NITTANY LION INDUCTED INTO PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Former Penn State All-America end Dave Robinson became the sixth member of the Penn State Football family to be enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame earlier this year.

Robinson joined Jack Ham, Franco Harris, August Michalske, Lenny Moore and Mike Munchak as Penn Staters in the Hall of Fame.

From Mount Laurel, N.J., Robinson was a first-team All-American for the Nittany Lions in 1962 and a three-year letterwinner under Coach Rip Engle. He helped Penn State to a 24-8 record from 1960-62, including wins over Oregon in the 1960 Liberty Bowl and Georgia Tech in the 1961 Gator Bowl.

An offensive and defensive end, Robinson was the MVP of the 1962 Gator Bowl, despite the Nittany Lions falling to Florida, 17-7 to complete a 9-2 season. He was inducted into the Gator Bowl Hall of Fame in 1996.

The Green Bay Packers and Coach Vince Lombardi selected Robinson in the first round of the 1963 NFL Draft (14th overall selection) and he played linebacker 12 years in the NFL. He played with the Packers from 1963-72 and the Washington Redskins in 1973-74.

Robinson was selected to the Pro Bowl three times (1966-67, 1969) and twice earned Associated Press first-team All-Pro honors (1967, 1969) during his career in Green Bay. Robinson was a starter on teams that won three consecutive NFL Championships (1965-67) and



Super Bowls I and II. He was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team of the 1960s. He intercepted 27 passes in his 12-season career.

Robinson is among 22 members of the Penn State football family who are enshrined into the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame (1997). He was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame in 1982.

### 15 FIRST TEAM ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS@ PAST SEVEN YEARS

The Nittany Lions continue to be at the head of the class when it comes to Capital One/CoSIDA Academic All-America@ selections.

John Urschel and Pete Massaro both earned the distinction in 2012, with Massaro earning his second career selection.

All-America guard Stefan Wisniewski became the first Penn State football student-athlete to earn Academic All-America@ three times, with first-team nods in 2009 and 2010.

Senior linebacker Chris Colasanti and Massaro also were first-team Academic All-Americans@ in 2010.

Penn State has earned a nation's best 17 Academic All-Americans@ over the past seven years, with 15 first team honorees. A program record five Nittany Lions were selected to the 2008 Academic All-America@ team.

The Nittany Lions' 51 Academic All-Americans@ all-time are No. 3 in the nation among Football Bowl Subdivision programs.

### SAN DIEGO ADDED TO 2015 SCHEDULE

The 2015 Penn State football schedule is near completion with the announcement that the Nittany Lions will host San Diego State on Sept. 26 in Beaver Stadium.

The two programs have never collided on the football field. Penn State has one non-conference game left to be scheduled to complete the 2015 schedule.

Penn State has a 4-0 record all-time against current Mountain West Conference members, having played Air Force (3-0) and Utah State (1-0). The last game against a current MWC member was in 1977, as the Nittany Lions beat Utah State in Beaver Stadium.

The Nittany Lions have met four programs from the state of California. Penn State has played against Cal, Stanford, UCLA and USC, compiling a 13-11 on-field overall mark and an 8-2 record at home.

### LIONS AND HOKIES SCHEDULE FIRST MEETING ON GRIDIRON FOR 2022 SEASON

Penn State will visit Blacksburg on September 17, 2022 and Virginia Tech will travel to Beaver Stadium on Sept. 16, 2023.

Despite having campuses located less than 375 miles apart, Penn State and Virginia Tech have never met. The Nittany Lions have played Virginia (5-3), VMI (1-0) and William & Mary (4-0) from The Old Dominion, earning a cumulative 10-3 on-field record.

Virginia Tech AD Jim Weaver earned bachelor's (1967) and master's degrees (1968) from Penn State, playing center and linebacker for the Nittany Lions. A native of Harrisburg, Weaver began his coaching career with the Nittany Lions as a graduate assistant (1967-68) and was an assistant coach from 1969-72.

Virginia Tech will be the 13th Atlantic Coast Conference institution Penn State has played on the gridiron, with Duke the only other ACC team the Nittany Lions have not played. Penn State will open this season vs. Syracuse in the Orange's first game as an ACC member and played at Virginia last year.

Penn State has a 181-87-11 all-time on-field record vs. current ACC teams.

### PITT RETURNS TO SCHEDULE IN 2016

Long-time rivals Penn State and Pitt will renew their rivalry that dates back to the 1893 season.

The two teams will meet every season from 2016-19. The Nittany Lions will play in Pittsburgh in 2016 and 2018 and the Panthers will play in State College in 2017 and 2019.

Penn State owns an on field record of 50-42-4 against the Panthers, but the two teams have not met since 2000.

### 11th ANNUAL PENN STATE UPLIFTING ATHLETES "LIFT FOR LIFE" HITS RECORD \$130,000 TO BENEFIT KIDNEY CANCER ASSOCIATION

The 11th Annual Penn State Uplifting Athletes "Lift For Life" was a tremendous success on Friday, raising the 2013 total to a record total in excess of \$130,000 to benefit the Kidney Cancer Association.

More than 100 members of Coach Bill O'Brien's squad participated in Friday's event, breaking their record for the fifth consecutive year, besting the 2012 total of \$119,701 for the Kidney Cancer Association.

With the \$133,506 in contributions from this year, more than \$825,000 has been raised in the battle against rare diseases by Penn State Uplifting Athletes since the inaugural Lift For Life was held in 2003. The inaugural event raised just under \$13,000. The last three Lift For Life events have all raised in excess of \$100,000.

"Lift For Life has become a great tradition where Penn State Football and our fans are able to raise more than \$100,000 annually for kidney cancer patients and research," said fifth-year senior tackle Eric Shrive (West Scranton), president of Penn State's Uplifting Athletes Chapter. "I couldn't be prouder to be a part of such a great tradition."

During Shrive's Penn State career, he has personally raised more than \$112,000 for Lift For Life, including in excess of \$42,000 for the 2013 event. He was selected the 2013 Uplifting Athletes' Rare Disease Champion earlier this year.

The Penn State Lift For Life was held outdoors at the Penn State Lacrosse Field for the second consecutive year. The defense posted a 220-152 victory over the offense during the five strength and conditioning competitions, winning two of the three tug-of-war battles to conclude the event. The competitions included an obstacle course, sand bag stack (100-lb. sand bags), sled pull and push, keg carry (150 pounds of sand) and the tug of war.

The offense won the 2012 Lift For Life, 176-136, over the defense.

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved eight new therapies for the treatment of kidney cancer in the U.S. since the first Lift For Life in 2003. The Kidney Cancer Association has credited the Penn State Lift For Life as being a catalyst for the new treatments, according to Scott Shirley, Uplifting Athletes Executive Director.

Founded by Penn State Football teammates Scott Shirley, Dave Costlow and Damone Jones in 2003, Lift For Life has continued to build awareness and raise funds for the Kidney Cancer Association. The event is organized by Penn State Football Uplifting Athletes, whose members are on the Penn State football team, led this year by Shrive (Scranton), president of the chapter. Joining Shrive as Uplifting Athlete officers are: vice president - senior tackle Adam Gress (West Mifflin, Pa.); head of operations - senior center Ty Howle (Wake Forest, N.C.); secretary - sophomore cornerback Da'Quan Davis (Baltimore) and fundraising chairman - freshman tight end Adam Breneman (Camp Hill).

Numerous events are held during Blue-White Weekend presented by AAA, including a carnival, fireworks, food, vendors, live music and performances at the entertainment stage, in addition to other Penn State athletic events.

Blue-White Weekend presented by AAA has become the university's unofficial annual spring reunion. The game has drawn more than 50,000 fans in five of the past seven years, which included three consecutive crowds above 70,000.

BTN will air 40-plus football games this season, with each school making a minimum of two appearances, including at least one conference game.

Penn State's Sept. 7 contest vs. Eastern Michigan will be played at Noon and their Sept. 14 contest against UCF will air in primetime on BTN. Additional Nittany Lion games will air on BTN once the 12-day selection process begins.

BTN televised a pair of Nittany Lion games in 2012, three in 2011 and 2010 and four Nittany Lion contests in 2009.

The Big Ten Network is available to more than 90 million homes across the United States and Canada, and has agreements with more than 300 affiliates.

The network, though, is not carried by Adams and Blue Ridge cable in Pennsylvania. Ranks second in the Big Ten in punt return average, with 13.0 yard per punt return. Had three punt returns for 44 yards vs. Syracuse, including a career-long 31 yard return in the third quarter to set up Penn State's second touchdown. Averaged 10.5 yards on two punt returns for 21 total yards vs. Eastern Michigan.

#### 65 - MILES DIEFFENBACH, G

Made his second start of the season against Eastern Michigan and now has 13 career starts. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since 2008 vs. Coastal Carolina (594 yds). Will be a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-District, entering the fall semester with a 3.35 GPA in advertising/public relations.

#### 85 - BRANDON FELDER, WR

Has started both games at wide receiver in 2013 and has 14 career starts. Tied his career-high for the second straight game with six catches for 56 yards against Eastern Michigan, including a long of 16 yards in the second quarter. Also made six catches against Syracuse, gaining 40 yards. Has made at least one catch in 12 straight games.

#### 5 - TYLER FERGUSON, QB

Enrolled at Penn State in January. Made his Nittany Lion debut against Syracuse, completing his only pass attempt for 18 yards to Matt Zanellato. In the win over Eastern Michigan, was 2 of 2 for 12 yards.

#### 97 - SAM FICKEN, PK

Has made 14 straight field goal attempts, a streak which started on Oct. 27, 2012 vs. Ohio State. Owns the Penn State record for consecutive field goals made at 14, breaking a tie with Craig Fayak's 13 straight makes in 1992. Ranks second in the Big Ten in field goals made and has the longest field goal make of the season in the Big Ten (46 yds). Also ranks 8th in scoring in the Big Ten with 10.0 points per game. Earned Big Ten Special Teams Player of the Week for the second time in his career after connecting on all three field goals and both extra points in the win over Syracuse. Made a career-long field goal of 46 yards in the fourth quarter vs. the Orange. Converted his 14th consecutive field goal late in the second quarter (39 yards) vs. Eastern Michigan, breaking the Penn State record he previously held with Craig Fayak (1992). Has seven touchbacks on 14 kickoffs, averaging 62.8 yards per kickoff. Will be a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-District, entering the fall semester with a 3.61 GPA in finance.

#### 77 - GARRY GILLIAM, T

Moved from tight end to offensive tackle during spring practice. Added approximately 30 pounds to his 6-foot-6 frame during off-season workouts. After missing most of the spring with a calf injury, he has earned the start at right tackle in both games this season. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since piling up 594 yards in 2008 vs. Coastal Carolina.

#### 14 - CHRISTIAN HACKENBERG, QB

Became just the second true freshman to start a Penn State season-opener at quarterback since 1911. Has started both games at quarterback. Ranks second in the Big Ten in passing average (294.5 ypg) and is fourth in total offense (280.5). Earned Big Ten Freshman of the Week after completing 22 of 31 passes for 278 yards, with two touchdowns and two interceptions. His 278 passing yards were the third-highest, at the time, by a Penn State freshman signal caller in school history. He threw two 50-plus yard touchdowns, including his first career touchdown pass to Allen Robinson (51 yds) in the third quarter. Also fired 54-yard TD strike to Eugene Lewis in the fourth quarter vs. the Orange. Broke Zack Mills' Penn

State freshman single-game passing record (280 yds; vs. OSU & USM) in the win over Eastern Michigan, going 23-of-33 for 311 yards with one touchdown and one interception. His longest completion against the Eagles was a 45-yard touchdown pass to Allen Robinson in the fourth quarter. Also connected with Robinson on a 43-yarder that set up Lions' first touchdown of the game.

#### 60 - TY HOWLE, C

Has three career starts, including starting both games at center in 2013. Was instrumental in helping the Nittany Lions gain 574 yards of total offense against Eastern Michigan, their most since gaining 594 yards vs. Coastal Carolina in 2008. After serving as the long snapper on all placements the past three seasons, Howle garnered his second career start, first at center, in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Has already earned his degree in kinesiology and is working on a second degree in health policy and administration. Will be a candidate for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, entering the fall semester with a 3.57 GPA.

#### 43 - MIKE HULL, LB

Made his second career start in the season opener vs. Syracuse and made one tackle. Suffered a first half knee injury that knocked him out of most of the game vs. the Orange. Did not play in the Eastern Michigan game due to injury.

#### 18 - JESSE JAMES, TE

Has started both games at tight end this season and has eight career starts. Made two catches for 10 yards in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Made two catches for 46 yards against Eastern Michigan, including a season long of 27 yards in the second quarter.

**9 - JORDAN LUCAS, CB**

Has started both games at cornerback in 2013. Made his first career start in the win over Syracuse. Logged three tackles, 0.5 TFL and tied for team-high with two pass breakups vs. Orange. Collected three tackles, including a TFL, against Eastern Michigan.

**95 - CARL NASSIB, DE**

In his first career game action, made two tackles, including a 17-yard TFL on a bobbled punt snap, in the season opening win over Syracuse.

**7 - STEPHEN OBENG-AGYAPONG, S**

Made his first career start at outside linebacker against Eastern Michigan and 13th career start overall. Was an impact player in the season opener vs. Syracuse with eight tackles, one INT, forced and recovered a fumble and a sack. His interception to end the third quarter vs. Syracuse set up a fourth quarter field goal for 16-10 lead.

Has started three career games, including both games in 2013 at defensive end. Had one tackle in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Made four stops, including his second career TFL and sack against Eastern Michigan.

**8 - ALLEN ROBINSON, WR**

A candidate for the Biletnikoff Award. The 2012 Big Ten Richter-Howard Receiver of the Year. Leads the Big Ten in receiving yards per game (131.0) and is tied for the conference lead with 7.0 catches per game. Made seven catches for 129 yards and one touchdown against Eastern Michigan. Had a diving 43-yard catch in the first quarter that set Penn State up for its first touchdown in the win over the Eagles and made a 45-yard touchdown reception in the fourth quarter. Made seven catches for 133 yards and one touchdown vs. Syracuse. Caught both passes on a two-play scoring drive on Penn State's first drive of the third quarter vs. Syracuse, making a 25-yard catch prior to a 51-yard catch and run for his first score of the season.

Will be among the primary candidates for the William V. Campbell Trophy, presented by the National Football Foundation to the nation's top football scholar-athlete. **5 - NYEEM WARTMAN, LB**

Made his first career start vs. Syracuse after missing the final 10 games of 2012 due to injury and receiving a medical redshirt season. Made three tackles in the win over the Orange. Produced a career-best six tackles, while leading the team with three pass breakups, in the win against Eastern Michigan.

**1 - MALCOLM WILLIS, S**

Has started both games at safety in 2013 and ranks second on the team with 19 career starts. Recorded eight tackles, one shy of his career-high, and one TFL vs. Syracuse. Accumulated three tackles vs. Eastern Michigan.

**10 - TREVOR WILLIAMS, CB**

Moved from wide receiver to cornerback during spring practice and earned his second career start vs. Syracuse (Ohio State, 2012). Has started both games in 2013 at cornerback. Made three tackles and picked off a pass on the sidelines to with 1:56 remaining in the game to seal the victory over the Orange. Logged two solo tackles in the home opener against Eastern Michigan.

**28 - ZACH ZWINAK, RB**

Has started both games at running back in 2012 and has started six straight games. Carried the ball 24 times for 61 yards and caught the first pass of Christian Hackenberg's career, a five yard grab, in the season opener vs. Syracuse. Toted the ball seven times for 43 yards and tied his career-high with a pair touchdown runs in the win over Eastern Michigan. Had a 20-yard carry on 3rd-and-24 to set up a fourth down conversion, which led to his second TD run of the game.
